MICHAEL BARRICKMAN of FREDERICK COUNTY, MARYLAND AND KIN TO PENNSYLVANIA, OHIO, ILLINOIS, INDIANA AND IOWA.

Michael Barrickman was a son of Peter Barrackman of Frederick County, Maryland and Westmoreland County, Pennsylvania. Michael was undoubtedly born about 1760. He was born in Maryland, his mother was Ursulla Bergman, the first wife of Peter Bergman-Barrackman. (See will of Peter Barrickman dated Sept. 8th, 1791-Knox County, Ind.)

Michael Barrickman is listed in Volume 22, pages 370 and 645, 3rd series of Pennsylvania Archives. He had the transcript of property in Westmoreland County, Pennsylvania, Rostroner Township. There were six members in his family, at this time. Michael's wife's name was Sarah. (Dated year of 1783).

Michael Barrickman went west to the Northwest Territory, with his father and several brothers. They claimed land in what is now Knox County Indiana. (P. 140-141 History of Knox County, Ind.)

Michael claimed a lot in the back part of the town of Vincennes, Indiana, it was twenty five toises square. A court grant of 1785 approved the lot to be surveyed, as considerable improvements had been made upon it. Record of this is found in the American State Papers, volume on Public Lands. This may have been a military donation. This as yet has not been proven.

Michael Barrickman did not find this rugged countryside to his liking and returned to Pennsylvania. (Vol. 26 p. 400-539 Pennsylvania 3rd Series, 1788-1892-1893 Westmoreland and Washington Counties, Pa., Survey of Land.)

Michael's lot in Vincennes was finally disposed of by his half-brothers who remained there. This was legalized in 1830. Michael may have signed the land over to his father before leaving Vincennes. Many early Knox County, Ind., records were destroyed.

Michael Barrickman and family were in Mifflin Township, Allegheny County, Pennsylvania by 1792. Following is a record of a deed for that area:

Know by all men present, that I John McKeen of Allegheny County, Versills Township, and Commissioner of Pennsylvania, Yozman, have for as in consideration of the sum of 100 and 75 pounds, lawful money, of the state affairs to me in hand paid by Michael Barkman, of the State, County Pennsylvania, ritten at and before sealing and delivering of these presents the receipt where I do thereby acknowledge myself fully satisfied, have bargained, sold and made good to said Michael Barkman all my right, title, claims and interest of a warrant dated at Philadelphia the 1st day of July One Thousand seven hundred and eighty four, granted to William Huskins and conveyed from said Huskins to me, by deed bearing date the 25th March one thousand seven hundred

and eighty five. Containing 150 acres. Executed by Joshua Elder, Surveyor, lying on the north side of Kiskuminitus River, about two miles from mouth of said river, supposed to contain 200 and 22 acres. To have and to hold the afore mentioned land with all the singular improvements and appurtenances there unto belonging for the only use of said Michael Barkman, his heirs, executors, administrators or assigns.

In witness thereof, I have this day set my hand and affixed my seal this sixth day of December 1792.

I, Michael Barickman, of Allegheny County, for and in consideration of 25 pounds, lawful money, of the State, to me in hand paid by Thomas Bell Patterson, of Mifflin Township, County and State of Pennsylvania. I sell to Thomas Bell Patterson, his heirs, executors, Administrators and assigns forever, all his rights, titles, interests, claims, all that certain land situated and laying in said 6th District of Donation land No. 1772. Beginning at a maple and running east by lot No. 1269, 130 perches to a Chestnut, thence south by lot 1271, 261 perches to a stake, thence west by lot 1279, 130 perches to a white oak thence by north by lot 1273, 261 perches to the place of beginning. Contains 200 acres, with the usual allowances of 6% for roads, etc. Granted to John Kellen, Matross in the late army of the United States, as well more fully appear by reference, had to a deed granted to said Kellen by the Commonwealth to said Barickman by said Kellen as appears on back of original deed having Michael Barickman gave to Thomas Bell Patterson, his heirs, assigns, etc. forever.

This indenture made this ninth day of April in the year of our Lord, 1796, between John McKee and his wife, Sally, of the town of McKeesport in the county of Allegheny, in the State of Pennsylvania, of the first part, and Michael Barickman, of the town, county and state upon said of the other witnesses, that this John McKee and Sally, his wife, for and in consideration of the sum of 7 and  $\frac{1}{2}$  dollars, lawful money of the United States of America, to them in hand paid by the

said Michael Barickman. The receipt whereof bargained is hereby adjudged and acknowledged by the said John McKee and Sally, his wife, had granted, bargained and sold, released and conferred unto the said Michael Barickman, his heirs, a certain outlot within the reserve tract in the mouth of Big Beaver Creek. Beginning at the corner of lot No. 64 and running by the line of the same north 60 degrees east 50 perches, thence by lot No. 70 north 30 degrees west 24 perches, thence along said Lotre on side of Beaver Creek 74 south 60 degrees west 50 perches thence 24 perches and one tenth to a perch at the place of beginning, containing 7 acres three quarters and 31 perches of land bounded by said Island Lotre and by out lots numbered 64, 70 and 74. It is a part of the certain tract of land which the Governor of the Commonwealth has empowered by an Act of Congress, etc.

Lot of Michael Barickman to have and to hold, the said lot, as above described unto the said Michael Barickman, his heirs, and assigns to the only proper use and be of him the said Michael Barickman, his heirs and assigns, forever.

Our next record of Michael Barickman shows him in Westmoreland County, Pennsylvania, where he has land next to his dear friends--the Beatty family.

Know all men by these presents that George Dale of Westmoreland county, and State of Pennsylvania, disteller, I am held and firmly bound to Michael Barickman, his heirs and assigns in the just and full sum of 150 pounds species given under my hand, this 12th day of June in 1798. The condition of this obligation is seen that the said Dale in 12 months after death does give Michael Barickman or his assigns a clear deed in fee simple for a parcel of land, beginning at scagger tree and running down said river 50 perches from corner thence to a post of Doctor Marchants' land. Then joining William Beattys' land, the different courses to the place of the beginning., it being surveyed by Joshua Elder on a Warrant in the name of Robert McKee, dated the 13th day of June 1797. In Witness, whereof, I have here unto set my hand and sealed the date on day mentioned above.

By 1810 we have a record of Michael Barickman and his family in

Armstrong Township, Allegheny County, Pennsylvania.

There were 76 tracts that had been surveyed at an earlier date on Warrants. The names of the Warantees and the number of acres were written on the respective tracts. This early list is found in the Commissioner's office.

Michael Barrickman had 218 $\frac{1}{2}$  acres. His son, Captain John Barrickman, had 100 acres. We have a record of Captain John Barrickman's land. But there are no records on the land of his father, Michael Barrickman.

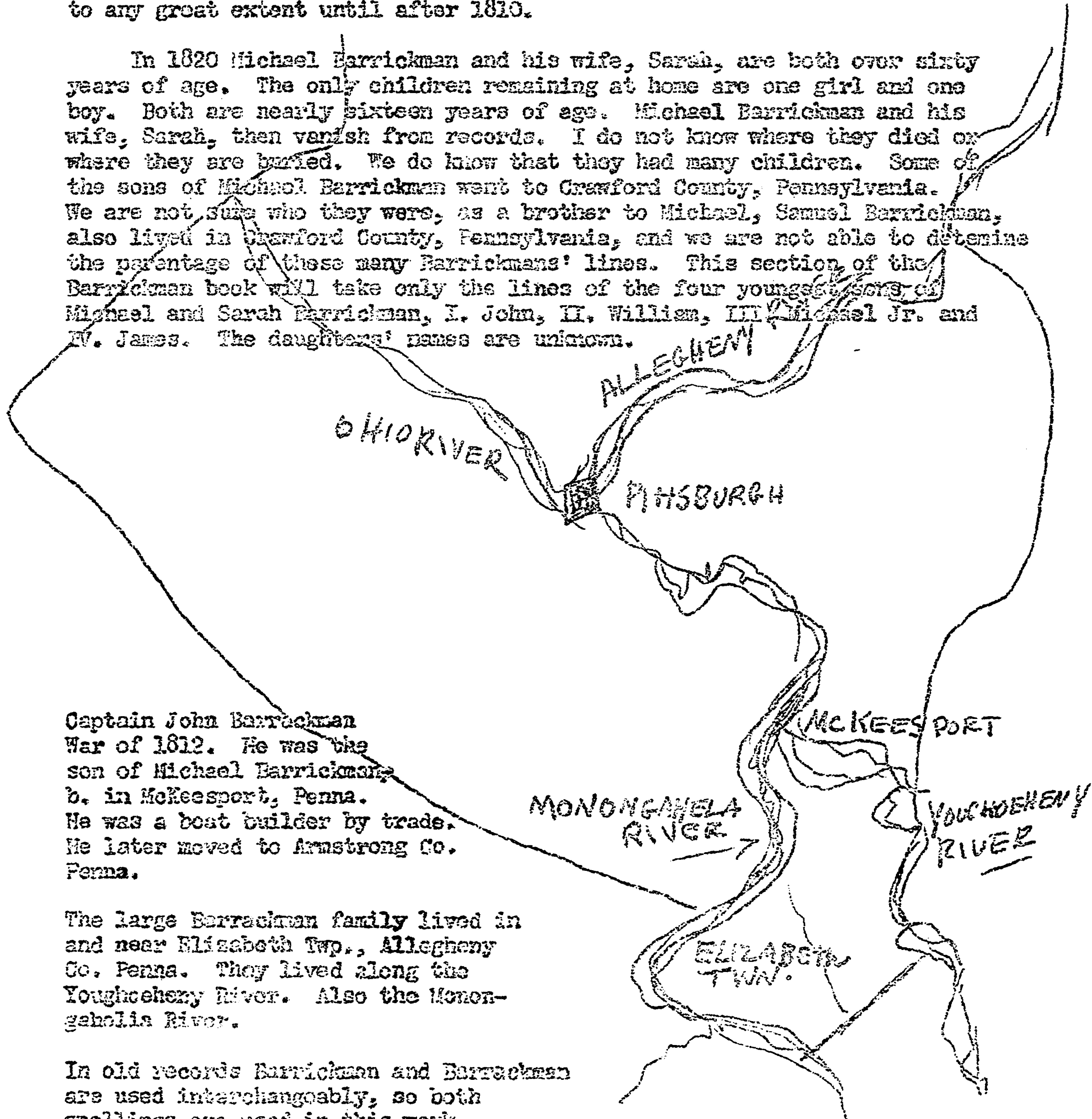
Armstrong County, Pennsylvania was formed in March of 1800. However, the section--Allegheny Township--in Armstrong County was not inhabited to any great extent until after 1810.

In 1820 Michael Barrickman and his wife, Sarah, are both over sixty years of age. The only children remaining at home are one girl and one boy. Both are nearly sixteen years of age. Michael Barrickman and his wife, Sarah, then vanish from records. I do not know where they died or where they are buried. We do know that they had many children. Some of the sons of Michael Barrickman went to Crawford County, Pennsylvania. We are not sure who they were, as a brother to Michael, Samuel Barrickman, also lived in Crawford County, Pennsylvania, and we are not able to determine the parentage of these many Barrickmans' lines. This section of the Barrickman book will take only the lines of the four youngest sons of Michael and Sarah Barrickman, I. John, II. William, III. Michael Jr. and IV. James. The daughters' names are unknown.

In old records Barrickman and Barrackman  
are used interchangeably, so both  
spellings are used in this work.





Following is the history of JOHN BARRICKMAN, a son of Michael and Sarah Barrackman.

John was born in McKeesport, Pennsylvania on April 2nd, 1794. He grew up on land owned by his parents. This property was situated on the Allegheny River near Pittsburgh. John, because of his early familiarity with water, became a boat builder by trade.

At quite an early age he married Eleanor Lockridge, who died shortly after their marriage. It is not known whether or not they had any children. John married a second time on April 4th, 1812, in Armstrong County, Penna. His bride was Sarah Beatty, daughter of William Beatty. The Beatty land joined that of John's father, Michael.

In the Fall of 1812, John Barrickman (Barrackman) enlisted in the Pittsburgh Blues under the command of Captain Orr. John served his six month's enlistment and was honorably discharged from Fort Meigs, upon completion of duty in April of 1813. His services is recorded in the Pennsylvania Archives 6th Series, Volumes 4, 7 and 8. He was the Captain of a Rifle Company. John was honored by the Governor of Penna., Simon Snyder, on August 25th, 1812.

"The Governor with pleasure embraces the honorable occasion to perpetuate the honorable fame acquired by these gallant sons of Pennsylvania, who volunteered their services by naming the commandants of those patriotic corps and companies and the Division and Brigade to which they severally belonged.

We also find John Barrickman under the following service listing:

Captain Barrickman's Company volunteered for fifteen days after expiration of their six month tour in the Northwest under William H. Harrison.

We certify on honor that this payroll exhibits the true statement of Capt. John Barrickman.

Upon completion of his services, John and his wife, Sarah Beatty Barrickman, lived for a time in Pittsburgh and later moved to Armstrong County, Pennsylvania. John Barrickman died in the May of 1819.

(See end of this section for Capt. J. Barrickman's Master Roll.)

Following are the four children of John and Sarah Barrickman:

1. William Harrison Barrackman was born March 3, 1813 in Armstrong

County, Pennsylvania. He died in Mattaska County, Iowa, in the late 1890's.

2. Sarah Barrackman was born in 1815. She married Rosswell B. Webster. There is no further information to date.
3. Ellen (or Eleanor) Susan Barrackman was born ca 1817. She married Ben Cutler who was born in 1816. Ben lived in Spencer County, Indiana, in 1837; later in Iowa. They evidently were married in Iowa. Ben Cutler died in 1896. There is no record of the death of Ellen Barrackman Cutler or a record of any offspring.
4. John Barrackman Jr. was born June 5th, 1818. He died March 31st, 1845, in Wabash County, Indiana.

After the death of Captain John Barrackman in 1819, his widow, Sarah Beatty Barrackman married William Foreman. The Barrackman children moved with the Foremans to Monroe County, Ohio; Marion County, Ohio; Bourbon Co. Ohio and Oskaloosa, Iowa. This accounts somewhat for the Barrackmans in Ohio and Iowa.

William Foreman died in Iowa in 1871. Upon his death, Sarah Beatty Barrackman Foreman applied for a pension., claiming such from her first husband, John Barrackman. Sarah was 84 years of age at the time of her claim. This was in 1874 and she received a pension of \$8.00 per month until her death.

Sarah Beatty Barrackman Foreman's Application:

"APPLICATION FOR PENSION FOR 1812 WAR of widow made in Monroe County, Ohio, by Sarah Foreman, states she is the widow of Captain John Barrackman and that they were legally married, that she is the identical person to whom Land Warrant No. 114073 was granted and issued 24 Jan. 1876 by H.M. Atkinson, Commissioner of Pensions, at that time that said John Barrackman, did serve more than 60 days in War of 1812 as Captain of a Pennsylvania militia and that she was age 82 on 2 Apr. 1876. Thru your petitioner prays that she be placed on pension roll and that she be granted a pension as the widow of John Barrackman, that her postoffice is Mt. Gilead, Monroe County, Ohio, and she appoints H.L. Buler, as power of attorney....Affidavit of Sarah Rice in said county and State states she is acquainted with Sarah Foreman and knows she is identical person she represents herself to be."

In 1880 Sarah Foreman made another application in Monroe County, Ohio, before court stating she is the identical person who made application for a land warrant as widow of Captain John Barrackman, of War of 1812, that said application was No. 331062, that the number of her land warrant was 114073, that Barrackman is deceased, that he served for more than 14 days in said war, that she resided with Captain Barrackman from the time of their marriage to wit, Apr. 2nd 1812, to date of his death, that affiant was born April 2, 1794, that they had four children born to wit: Wm. Harrison, Sarah, Ellen and John. That she after the death of Captain John Barrackman married William Foreman; that William Foreman died sometime since, that she has not remarried since his death, that she is now the widow of John Barrackman and not married,



that she makes this application for the purpose of authorizing the Secretary of the Interior to place her name on the pension rolls in pursuant to Chapter 28 of the U.S. Laws passed March 9th, 1878 and for further proof refers the Department to her said application No. 331062. H.L. Ruler of Mt. Gilead, Monroe county, Ohio is her Attorney.

.....also personally appeared Samuel Thornburgh of Cannon, the said county and state and Samuel Gillen of Gilead Township, that they were present when she signed her mark.

Following is the Will of CAPTAIN JOHN BARRICKMAN\*BARRACKMAN.

"In the Name of God. Amen. I, John Barrackman of the township of Allegheny, in the County of Armstrong, and the State of Pennsylvania, being very sick and weak in body--- but of sound mind, memory and understanding, I blessed be God for the same.

Do make and publish this my last will and testament, in manner and form following to wit. Principally and first of all I command my immortal soul into the hands of God who gave it and my body to the faith. To be buried in a Christian manner, at the discretion of my executors herein after named, and as such worldly estate where with it has pleased God to bless me in this life. I give and dispose of the same in the following manner to wit: It is my will and desire, and I do order that all my just debt and funeral expense be duly paid and satisfied as soon as possible after my death. Then I give and bequeath unto my dear wife Sarah Barrackman all such of my personal estate, such as house and lot and furniture, kitchen utensils, bedding, cattle, as she may deem necessary for her own use and those of my dearly beloved children.

ITEM. I give and bequeath to my dear wife Sarah the use, occupations---of all my real estate until my youngest son John shall attain his age of 21 years. She maintaining and educating my minor children throughout and after his arrival such age, then I give and divide unto my two sons, William Harrison and John all my real estate for their heirs and assigns forever, the said real estate to be appraised by by three or more honest men and judicious men, and whatever the said property may be appraised at, it is my will and testament that I do order the same to be equally divided among my four children. To wit one fourth to be paid to my eldest daughter Sarah and  $\frac{1}{4}$  to my youngest daughter Eleanor, subject however to the decision of my wife Sarah who shall be petitioned to receive the interest of  $\frac{1}{3}$  of the valuation during her natural life and further should either of both of my said sons die before the youngest shall arrive at the age of 22 or should they refuse to accept the valuation of of the said real estate at the value aforesaid mentioned then I do order and direct my executors herein named or the juratice of them to sell said real estate to such person or persons and for such price or prices as may be reasonable gotten for the same and for that purpose I do hereby authorize and empower my said executors or the survivors of them, to sign, seal, execute and acknowledge all such deed or deeds or conveyance as may be necessary and requisite for the granting

or appointing the same to the purchaser or purchasers thereof in fee simple and the money arriving from said sale or sales to be equally divided among my four children before named or among the survivors subject therefor to the decision of my wife heretofore mentioned and as to touching all the residues and remainder of my estate of what kind or nature whatever the same may be. I give and devise this same unto my dearly beloved wife Sarah during her natural life. And from and immediately after her death, I give and devised of the same unto my four children--William Harrison--Sarah--Eleanor--John or the survivor or survivors of them, and the heirs of such survivor or survivors. Equally to be divided between them and I do further order that the respective shares of my two daughters Sarah and Eleanor before there within two years after the said valuation or sale as the case may be, and lastly I do nominate, constitute and appoint my said wife Sarah and my dearly beloved James Beatty, my brother in law to be my executors of this my will. Hereby revoking all others, and declaring this and no other to be my last will and testament. In witness thereof I have set my hand (seal) this the 11th day of April in the year of 1819.

#### DEED TO SARAH BARRICKMAN-1819.

This indenture made on the 26th day of November in the year of our Lord 1819 between Thomas Reid of the county of Jefferson in the state of Kentucky and Margaret, his wife, of the one part, and Sarah Barrickman and James Beatty, executors of the last will and testament of John Barrickman (Barrickman) late of Allegheny Township in the county of Armstrong and Commonwealth of Pennsylvania, deceased on the other part. Witnesseth that whereas the said Commonwealth of Pennsylvania by patent bearing date the 22nd of July 1815, enrolled in Patent Book H, Volume 11, page 232, did grant unto Samuel Beatty a certain tract of land situated in the said township of Allegheny containing three hundred and sixty two acres and 92 perches and the usual allowances, etc. And whereas Samuel Beatty by his last will and testament in writing dated on the 13th day of August 1805, did among other things, give and bequeath unto the said Margaret Reid, his daughter, one hundred acres of said land to be divided off in a certain manner therein particularly mentioned and directed which said one hundred acres was afterwards divided and off as follows to wit: Beginning at an ironwood tree on the bank of the Allegheny River, thence south twenty two degrees east, forty nine perches to a beach, thence south fifty two and a half degrees east one hundred and twenty six perches to a black oak thence south seventy five degrees west and seven tenths of a perch to a hickory, thence south seventy five degrees west ninety four perches to a fallen chestnut, thence north forty five degrees west one hundred and thirteen perches--to a poplar tree, thence north fifty six degrees west sixty perches to a fallen sugar tree. On the bank of the Allegheny River, a corner of the land of Michael Berckman thence up the Allegheny river, a way north sixty three degrees west forty nine perches then up the same north forty five degrees that sixty six perches to the beginning place. Containing one hundred acres and allowance, etc., and whereas the said Thomas Reid and Margaret, his wife, by their agreement in writing, bearing the date of the thirty first day of October 1811, in consideration of the sum of two hundred dollars, to them in hand paid by the said John Barrickman and

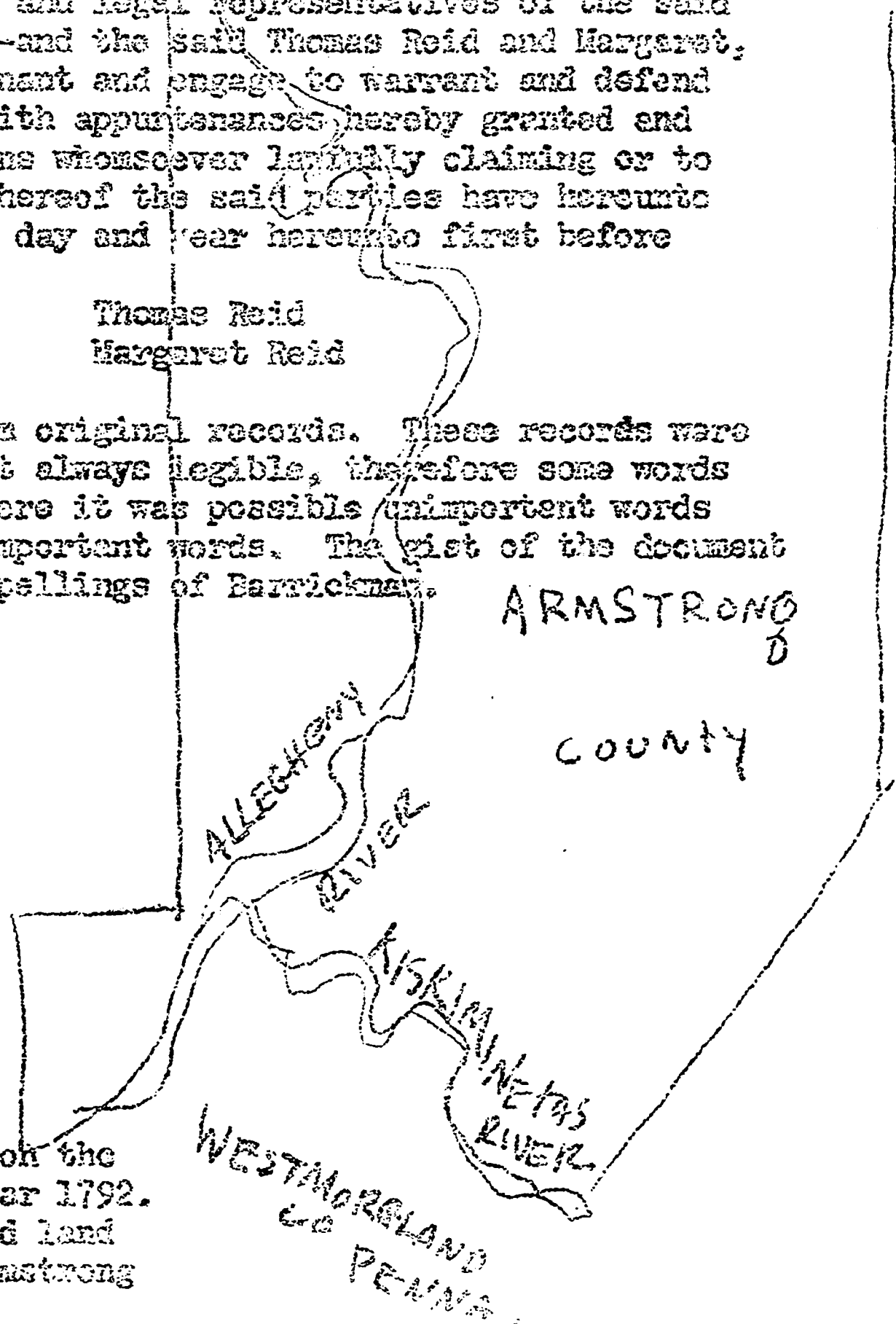
of the further sum of 200 dollars agreed to be paid on the first day of November 1812, did covenant and engage to make and execute a sufficient deed of conveyance in fee simple and clear of incumbrances to the said John Barrickman for the one hundred acres of land herein before described with the usual allowance, etc. and whereas the said John Barrickman, the one who died having just made his last will and testament in writing whereby he did give and bequeath to his wife, Sarah, the use, occupation and possession of all his real estate until his youngest son, John, shall attain his age of 21 years, and after his arrival at such age then he gave and bequeathed unto his two sons William Harrison and John all his real estate whatsoever the said real estate to be appointed by three or more honest and judicious men and whatsoever it should be appraised at the same to be divided among his four children; to wit: one fourth thereof paid to his eldest daughter, Sarah and one fourth to his youngest daughter Elizabeth,---subject to the dower of his said wife Sarah Barrickman as by the said will dated Apr. 11th, 1819 and entered and registered in the register's office in the County of Armstrong in Will Book #1, page (?) Now this indenture witnesseth that the said Thomas Reid and Margaret, his wife, for consideration of the sum of \$200.00 paid by them in hand, now paid by the said Sarah Barrickman and James Beatty being the second payment for the said one hundred acres of land together with the interest paid thereon accrued (the receipt whereof is hereby acknowledged) have granted, bargained and sold and by these presents do grant, bargain and sell alien (?) release and confirm unto the said Sarah Barrickman and James Beatty in trust for the use of the devisees and legal representatives of the said John Barrickman directed forever--and the said Thomas Reid and Margaret, his wife, do hereby further covenant and engage to warrant and defend the tract of land and premises with appurtenances hereby granted and intended to be against all persons whomsoever lawfully claiming or to claim the same or in testimony whereof the said parties have hereunto set their hands and seals on the day and year hereunto first before mentioned.

Note: The above document is from original records. These records were hand written. The script was not always legible, therefore some words were impossible to make out. Where it was possible unimportant words were substituted for equally unimportant words. The gist of the document is intact. Also note the many spellings of Barrickman.

1. Michael Barrickman had land on the Kiskiminetas River in the year 1792.
2. John & Michael Barrackman had land on the Allegheny River in Armstrong county by 1815.





The first child of Captain John Barrickman (son of Michael Barrickman) was named William Harrison Barrickman. He was so named in honor of the commanding officer in the Northwest Territory where Captain John Barrickman had done extra voluntary duty.

William Harrison Barrickman was born on March 3rd, 1813 in Armstrong County, Pennsylvania. After the death of his father, Capt. John Barrickman in 1819, his mother, Sarah Beatty Barrickman, married William Foreman. Following is a part of an article taken from page 187 of the Biographical Album of Mahaska County, Iowa, in the year 1887:

'Mr. Barrickman died in 1819, and Mrs. Barrickman was again married -- this time to William Foreman. By this marriage there were born nine children, six of whom are living. Samuel resided at Stockton, California, where he went in 1849 and is engaged in farming; George lives at Coon Rapids, Iowa and is a miller; James is engaged in farming in Marion county, Ohio; Margaret, widow of Andrew Rice, lives at Bourbon, Indiana; William is a farmer in Marion county, Ohio and Silas is engaged in the same occupation near Lima in the same state. Mrs. Foreman died in Ohio in 1861. She was a member of the Methodist Episcopal church for many years.

The subject of this sketch remained with his mother until he was fourteen years old, when he was apprenticed for four years to the tailor's trade, receiving for his services, his board and clothes. He was married in Pennsylvania in 1833 to Miss Margaret Reynolds. Who was a native of Lancaster county, Pennsylvania. She was born on March 18th, 1813. In 1835 or 36 he removed to Marion county, Ohio. It was a new county and a new state and his wife was not pleased with their location. He then returned to Pennsylvania where he stayed only a short time--he then went back to Marion county, Ohio, where he remained until 1854. During that year he came west stopping first at Tipton, Cedar county, Iowa, where he remained until 1864, when he came to Oskaloosa, where he has since resided. The firm of which he is a member is engaged in the furniture and undertaking business and is a leading concern in this county.

Politically Mr. B. is a Republican. Mr. and Mrs. B. are members of the Methodist Episcopal church of this city. In estimating the qualities of a man, actions speak louder than words. Measuring Mr. Barrickman by this rule we class him as a most estimable citizen, possessing all the qualities which should and do command him to his fellow man and which have made him a host of friends, and few, if any enemies.'

Upon detailed research I could find no record for Margaret and William H. Barrickman in Marion county, Ohio. There is none in Tipton, Cedar county, Iowa or Montezuma Poweshiek county, Iowa. (Prior to coming to Oskaloosa Mr. B. stayed for a while in Montezuma).

My first records on this family are from the 1860 census of the township of Oskaloosa-county of Mahaska. This information was supplied by the Iowa State Department of History and Archives, at Des Moines, Iowa.

W.H. Barrickman in 1860 was listed as 43 years of age. His occupation was as a lawyer. Margaret Barrickman was age 47 (this was shown incorrect she was really 43). This was the wife of W.H. Barrickman. John Barrickman was 14. He was born in Indiana. Possibly it was on a visit to William H. Barrickman's younger brother, John, who lived in Mahash county, Ind. George Foreman was the half brother to William H. Barrickman, George's age was given as 37. He lived with the Barrickmans. His occupation was also that of a lawyer.

After a considerable amount of bad leads I managed to locate Mrs. Margie Barrickman who lived in Oskaloosa, Iowa. Her husband, Bob, was of the West Virginia line of Barrickmans. The latter is distantly related to the Wm. H. Barrickman family.

Margie Barrickman was willing to go to the courthouse for me. On January 26th, 1962 Mrs. Barrickman sent me the following important information on William H. Barrickman:

Deed of property of W.H. Barrickman, lots 5b6 in block 2 in the city of Oskaloosa for \$400.00. Signed Apr. 26th, 1864, bought from J.E. St John, who is guardian of minor heirs of Martha McMurray.

Deed of property of Joseph J. Bundy and Elizabeth C. Bundy, husband and wife, to J.B. McGurdy and W.H. Barrickman, lot 5, block 15, Nov. 20, 1875 for \$5000.00.

J.E. McGurdy and W.H. Barrickman and Marcella F. McGurdy and Margaret Barrickman, their wives, sold to Wm. H. Hawkins and Walter C. Hawkins, lot 5, block 15, building except machinery. Executed 2nd day of March 1881.

William H. Barrickman to Jonas B. McGurdy and wife, Marcella, undivided  $\frac{1}{2}$  interest in that unknown Jan. 28th, 1885. Book 37, page 157.

Margaret Barrickman, bought from Roxanna & M.W. Benjamin, lot No. 3, in Block No. 14 in the city of Oskaloosa. Executed this 7th day of February, 1885. A mortgage was against this property of Mrs. Roxanna Benjamin and Elizabeth E. Morris of \$1500.00 to be paid off in payments of \$500.00 each on the first day of December 1886 at 8 % interest, and \$500.00 on the first day of December 1888 at 8% interest and \$500.00 on the first day of December 1890 with the interest at 8%.

I went through the birth and death records but couldn't find any Barrickmans listed anywhere. I think the records started with the year 1850. I also went through the wills but found nothing.

You asked about the McGurdy and firm. There is a McGurdy Real Estate listed at 218 1st Ave., in Oskaloosa. The men in the recorder's office here told me they were not any relation to this McGurdy that was associated with Wm. H. Barrickman. He said J.E. McGurdy was in the Undertaking business a long time ago.

That is all the Barrickmans listed in the books at the courthouse here. My children have been sick with the flu or I would have gotten this sooner.

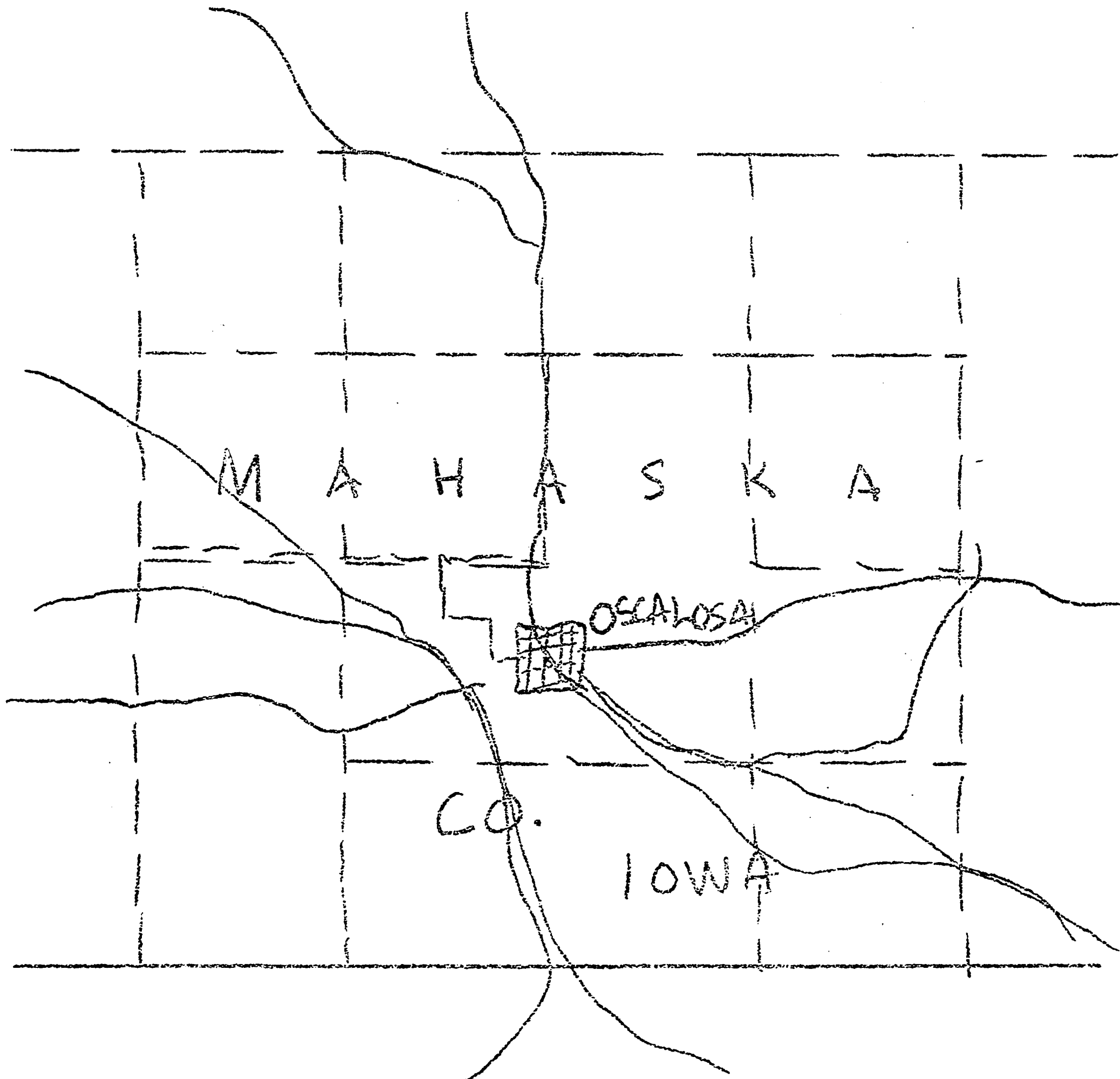

I wrote a great many letters to which I did not receive any replies. I offered rewards as high as \$25.00 for further information. The Oskaloosa Historical Society--which I hoped could or would help--did not reply to any of my letters. So this ends my account of the Wm. H. Barrickman family. Unfortunately I do not know how many children Wm. H. Barrickman and Margaret Reynolds Barrickman had. We found no leads on a son, John Barrickman, and

no records of deaths or burials, to date. Perhaps in time we will be able to complete these records. I hope so.

Following is a map of Mahaska County, Iowa--where William H. Barrickman and his kin lived. Not only did his immediate family live here but also his Indiana cousins from the Vincennes line. The latter were close by many years until they moved to Polk county, Iowa. At a later date, the Barrickmans of West Virginia moved to Mahaska county, Iowa.

, We have little knowledge of the two daughters of Captain John Barrickman and his wife, Sarah Beatty Barrickman. The fourth and last child of Captain John and Sarah was John Jr.

John Barrickman Jr. was born June 5th, 1818 in Armstrong County, Penna. John died on March 3rd, 1845 in Lauro township, Wabash County, Indiana.

John Barrickman Jr. married Nancy Battey on Oct. 14th, 1841 in Wabash County, Indiana. They had two sons:

1. Robert Emmet Barrickman b. Nov. 4th, 1843.
2. John Claudius Barrickman b. 1845.

Robert E. and John C. were both soldiers in the Cavalry during the Civil War.

Nancy Battey Barrickman was born in New York in 1817. We do not know what became of her after the death of her husband--John Barrickman Jr.

The Wabash County Historical Society, the Recorder of Deeds, the Probate Court Clerk and many others tried to help me. But the Barrickman widow and children evidently moved away from that area.

We find our first record of Robert Emmet Barrickman, the son, in 1860. He is living in the township of Des Moines, county of Polk. He is a farm laborer living with the Peter Ives family from Pennsylvania. The Ives may be of Nancy Battey's side of the family.

On August 2nd, 1861, Robert E. Barrickman enlisted from Des Moines, Iowa. He was mustered in August of 1861. He served in Company D. 2nd Iowa Cav. He was slightly wounded on Feb. 20th, 1864. He was injured at Prairie Station, Mississippi. He re-enlisted and was mustered in on Mar. 28th, 1864. He was promoted to Fourth Corporal on Nov. 1st, 1864. He was mustered out on Sept. 19th, 1865 at Selma, Alabama.

Robert E. Barrickman married Martha Jane Hammer of Des Moines, Iowa. The date of the marriage is not known. They were married by Rev. P.P. Ingalls.

Martha J. Hammer Barrickman died in Oct. of 1898 at Saver, Oregon. Robert E. and Martha J. Barrickman had four daughters:-

1. Lolly Maude Barrickman b. Sept. 7, 1868
2. Etta Gladys Barrickman b. Feb. 21, 1870
3. Mary Fordella Barrickman b. Sept. 28th, 1873
4. Eda Ethel Barrickman b. Feb. 28, 1880

The first three daughters were born in Iowa. Eda Ethel was born in Smith County, Kansas.

Robert E. Barrickman was five feet eight inches and a half tall. He had light hair and light complexion. He had grey eyes. Robert was severely injured and applied for a pension in Smith County, Kansas in 1877. He had sore eyes which partially disabled him. One eye could not remain open for any length of time. He spent some time in the Washington General Hospital at Memphis, Tenn. Robert Barrickman was a farmer. The partial loss of his eye sight hindered him in his occupation.

Robert E. Barrickman died on Nov. 22, 1921 in Benson county, Corvallis, Oregon.

In further research nothing was ever uncovered at Smith County, Kansas. It is not known why Robert E. Barrickman went as far as Oregon--unless he went to work for a relative. We find no record of him ever owning land in the state of Oregon.

The name "Barrickman" is often spelled Barkman.

In Benton county, Corvallis, Oregon, we find three deeds to Barkman. This could very easily be the son of his younger brother--John Claudius Barrickman.

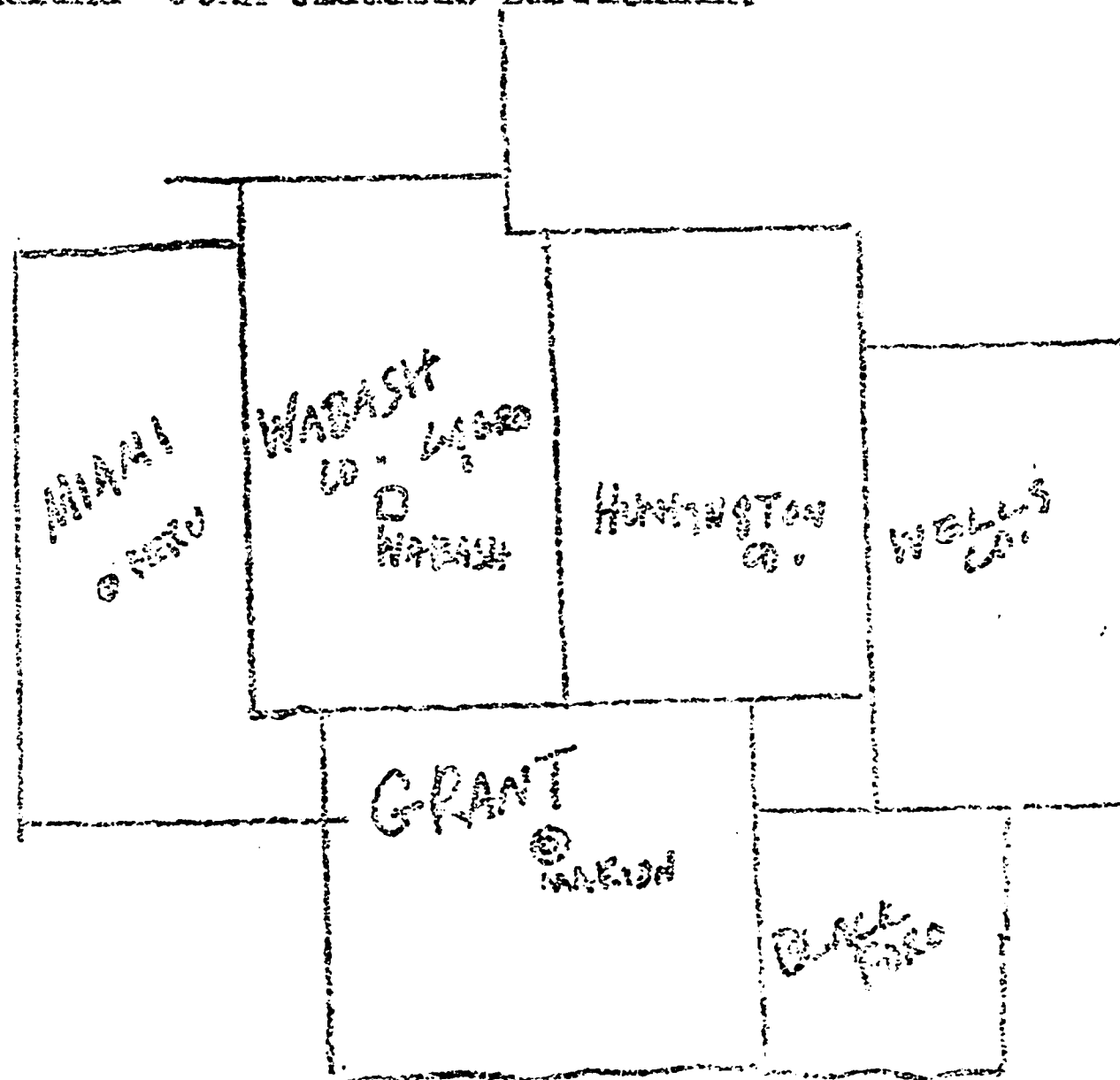
One is a quit claim deed from Curtis Young to Charles Barkman, dated June 26th, 1915. A little over one acre in return for just \$1.00. The deed states that Curtis Young is unmarried.

D.S. Adams for \$25.00 gives to Annie Barkman and Charles Barkman, husband and wife, 2 Lots No. 5 and No. 7, Job's Addition to the city of Corvallis, Benton County, Oregon. July 22nd, 1909.

Charles Barkman leased from Peter Bengert a plot of ground--wherein he must erect at his own expense a stable large enough to hold hay and feed for one cow. The date was July 31st, 1909.

There are no further deeds for Barkman--Barrickman after 1915. Nor wills of any kind. No evidence that this family remained in this area.

The second son of John Barrickman Jr. (son of Captain John Barrickman) and his wife, Nancy Battey Barrickman, was born in LaGro township, Wabash county, Indiana--John Claudius Barrickman.



John Claudius was born in 1845. He was married in Mahaska County, Iowa to Mary E. Jefferies on January 1st, 1872. It seems fairly obvious that Nancy Barrickman must have moved to Mahaska County, Iowa, after the death of her husband--John Barrickman Jr. Much close contact was then kept with the Wm. H. Barrickman family.

I would appreciate any help on John Claudius Barrickman and his line of kin.

The Journal and Diary of Captain John Barrickman, kept during the war of 1812, measure 8 x 12½ inches. The covers are a dull varnished brown board. The pages are rusted with age, water stained, the ink has turned brown. Captain John Barrickman's children have scribbled their names on the front and back pages. The diary starts thus:

'Pittsburgh Oct. 2nd 1812.

Journal of the Marching Detachment under the Command of Brigdier General Richard Crooks being the 2nd Detachment from Pennsylvania militia in the service of the United States of America.

Kept by Captain J. Barrickman, 3rd Co. First Regiment Ind. D.P.M. U.S. Northwest Army.

Captain Barrickman lists 62 men in his outfit, as follows (should anyone be interested) can tell the age of these men, where they lived and their occupation (in civilian life):

Michael Barrickman Sr., son of Peter Barrackman of Westmoreland county, Pennsylvania and Elisebeth Sarah, his wife, had a son William. William spelled his last name "Barrickman" so note again that there will be variant spellings of the family name.

II. William Barrickman was born about 1803 in Allegheny county, Penna. His wife was Lydia (surname unknown) She was also born in Pennsylvania in 1825. William and Lydia Barrickman spent the first ten years after their marriage in Pennsylvania, then moved to Adams County, Ohio, joining his brother, Michael Jr. and his wife Christina.

It seems that William and Lydia Barrickman spent a few years in Butler County, Pennsylvania. We have record of six children born to them:

1. Matilda b. July 8, 1835 Ashland, Butler county, Pennsylvania.
2. Edward b. in 1841 in Pennsylvania.
3. William Jr. born in Ohio in 1846.
4. Eli born 1849 in Pittsburgh, Penna.
5. Henry born 1852 in Ohio.
6. Eliza born in 1854 in Ohio.

There are undoubtedly others who we have not been able to trace.

1. Matilda, the first born child of William and Lydia Barrickman was born July 8th, 1835 in Pennsylvania. A great deal of mystery surrounds her life.

We know that these Barrickmans in Adams County, Ohio, are related to the Crawford and Butler Counties, Penna. Barrickmans. Matilda seems to have spent some time in Butler county, Penna.

Matilda was born in Ashland, Penna. and lived near her Dufford cousins. We know that she moved into Indiana. Here she may have married. Then we find her at home in Adams county, Penna. Later lines of kin of Matilda remember her talking about coming from Pennsylvania to Indiana in a covered wagon and then after some years coming into Ohio to rejoin her brothers, and sisters. She had two sons, their names being Harvey N. and James Franklin, surname Barrickman. Life must have been hard for this little family. Matilda worked as a servant for S.S. Mathews, his wife was insane. Matilda Barrickman had Harvey at home with her, while James Franklin worked out on a farm. Matilda never told anyone if she was married. She appeared at her home in Adams county, Ohio, with her two small boys. They were raised as Barrickmans.

Matilda worked many years for Mr. S.S. Mathews and after his wife's death they were married. Matilda Barrickman Matthews died Jan. 25th, 1922 in Adams county, Ohio and is buried in the Fairfax Cemetery.

THE LINES OF JAMES FRANKLIN AND HARVEY NELSON....to note that the name is now spelled.....Barrackman.

1. James Franklin Barrackman was b. April 6th, 1860 and married Nannie Rebecca Gasser who was b. August 3rd, 1859. They were married in Adams county, Ohio. Nannie Barrackman died on March 24th, 1934. They had four children. (1.) Elizabeth Barrackman b. Dec. 28th, 1880 and died Feb. 10th, 1942. Elizabeth married Alva Lawson and had four children (a) Mae Viola b. Jan. 10th 1904 (b) Opal b. Jan. 13th, 1905 (c) John B. born May 1st, 1913 and (d) Geneva b. July 14th, 1918. The father Alva Lawson died Nov. 4th, 1933. (2) Bessie Barrackman b. March 13th, 1883. Married James C. Ralston. They had one daughter, Ethel Gayelle who married Truman Elder. A son



Nelson married Betty McCutcheon. There was a son Richard Lee and a son, Cecil who married Ruth Core. A daughter, Hattie, married the Rev. Ray Hughes. Bessie Barrackman Ralston died in 1935.

William Franklin Barrackman was born Sept. 11th, 1891. He married Alice Baker. A son, Franklin, was born and died Dec. 3rd, 1905.

Sylvia Barrackman was born Feb. 1st, 1900 and died Dec. 3rd, 1905.

2. Harvey Nelson Barrackman, the second son of Matilda Barrackman was born March 9th, 1866. He died May 31st 1951. He married Rebecca Walker she born May 25th, 1863 and died Nov. 17th, 1951. Harvey N. Barrackman was married Feb. 22, 1888. They had two daughters, Maude Jane and Sarah Zelda Barrackman, born in Ohio. Harvey Nelson Barrackman and his wife Rebecca Walker Barrackman are buried in Fairfax cemetery.

Maude Jane Barrackman was born Nov. 6th, 1889, she married Clifton Duff Stevenson on Nov. 28th, 1908 at Hillsboro House, Hillsboro, Ohio. Clifton was the son of Franklin Stevenson and Mary E. Sayer Garvey. Clifton Duff Stevenson was killed in a rail accident Nov. 2nd, 1955. He is buried in Hillsboro, Ohio, cemetery.

Maude Jane and Clifton Duff Stevenson had two children: Vilma Ethelyn and Richard Doyle Stevenson.

Vilma was b. Nov. 18th, 1909 in Adams county, Ohio. Vilma married Leonard Yuik March 31st, 1931. They had a son, Richard W. Yuik b. Sept. 1th, 1937., he married Joan Brewery. They have a son, Steven, born June 30th, 1958 and a daughter, Andrea Joq b. Aug. 23rd, 1961. Leonard Yuik was b. June 11, 1902.

Richard Doyle Stevenson was b. Oct. 2nd, 1916, served in the Second World War. He had fourteen missions over Japan. He was a mechanic and was promoted to Aerial Flight in the Pacific area from Apr. 21st, 1942 to August 12th, 1945. Richard Doyle Stevenson now lives in Monmouth, Illinois. He married Irene Vance May 6, 1940. They have daughters, Shari Lynn b. June 1, 1945 and Janet Lee b. Dec. 23, 1946.

Sarah Zelds Barrackman is the second child of Harvey Nelson and Rebecca Walker Barrackman. She was born at Seaman, Adams County, Ohio, March 6th, 1895. She married V.G. Walker, he was b. Jan. 31st, 1895. His father was L.D. Walker and his mother was Ella. V.G. Walker was killed by lightning on June 1st, 1941. He is buried at Sugartree Ridge Cemetery at Clinton county, Ohio.

Sarah Zelda and V.G. Walker had a son, Lloyd, b. Feb. 1th, 1916 at Highland county, Fairfax township, Ohio. Lloyd married Dorothy Morris on Nov. 25th, 1937. She was born May 15th, 1917 in Highland County, Ohio. Lloyd and Dorothy Walker had two children--Peggy Yvonne b. Sept. 9th, 1938, she married Richard A. Wright b. Oct. 1st, 1937. They were married Sept. 2th, 1961. Richard Wright was b. in Napanee, Indiana. Robert Norman Walker, second son, b. Jan. 8th, 1938, also in Highland county, Ohio.

Mrs. Maude Barrackman Stevenson has her great grandfather's old Bible; and her grandmother's hand woven coverlet--with the name of William McClelland, ergave (?) 1848 woven into the corners. The colors of this is red, white and blue.

The fly leaf of William Barrackman's Bible reads "Elvira Thornton is my name. English is my nation. New York is my dwelling place. Christ is my salvation."

Published 1816. Who can solve this puzzle--who was Elvira Thornton?



2. Edward Barrickman born in 1841 in Pennsylvania is later known as Edward Barkman. Edward must have returned to Pennsylvania from Ohio, to live with his cousins in Butler County, Penna. Here he enlisted to serve in the Civil War. Following are his service records:

Enrolled as Private Co. E. 103rd Regiment Infantry., at Butler, Penna.  
20 Nov. 1861.

Age at time of enrollment.....20 years.

Residence...Butler County, Penna.

Occupation...carpenter      Ht. 5'7½"

Mustered into service at Camp Orr, Penna. 7 Dec. 1861.

Captured at Plymouth, N.C.....20 Apr. 1864.

Absent..Prisoner of war since.....20 Apr. 1864.

Remarks..Rolls show name as Barkman.

Edward Barrickman was taken prisoner at Plymouth, N.C. Apr. 20th, 1864. He was sent to Andersonville Prison in Georgia. He died there and lies buried. He had never married.

3. William Barrickman Jr. b. in Ohio in 1846, never married. There is no given day of death. Little is known about him.

4. Eli Barrickman was the third son of William and Lydia Barrickman. Eli was born July 15th, 1845 in Allegheny county, Penna. He married Nancy Jane Beckman b. Apr. 17th, 1850. Nancy Jane died Jan. 1st, 1925 and is buried in Pineview Cemetery in Ashton, Chis- Idaho. Date of Eli Barrickman's death is unknown. Eli and Nancy Jane Barrickman had four children, two sons and two daughters.

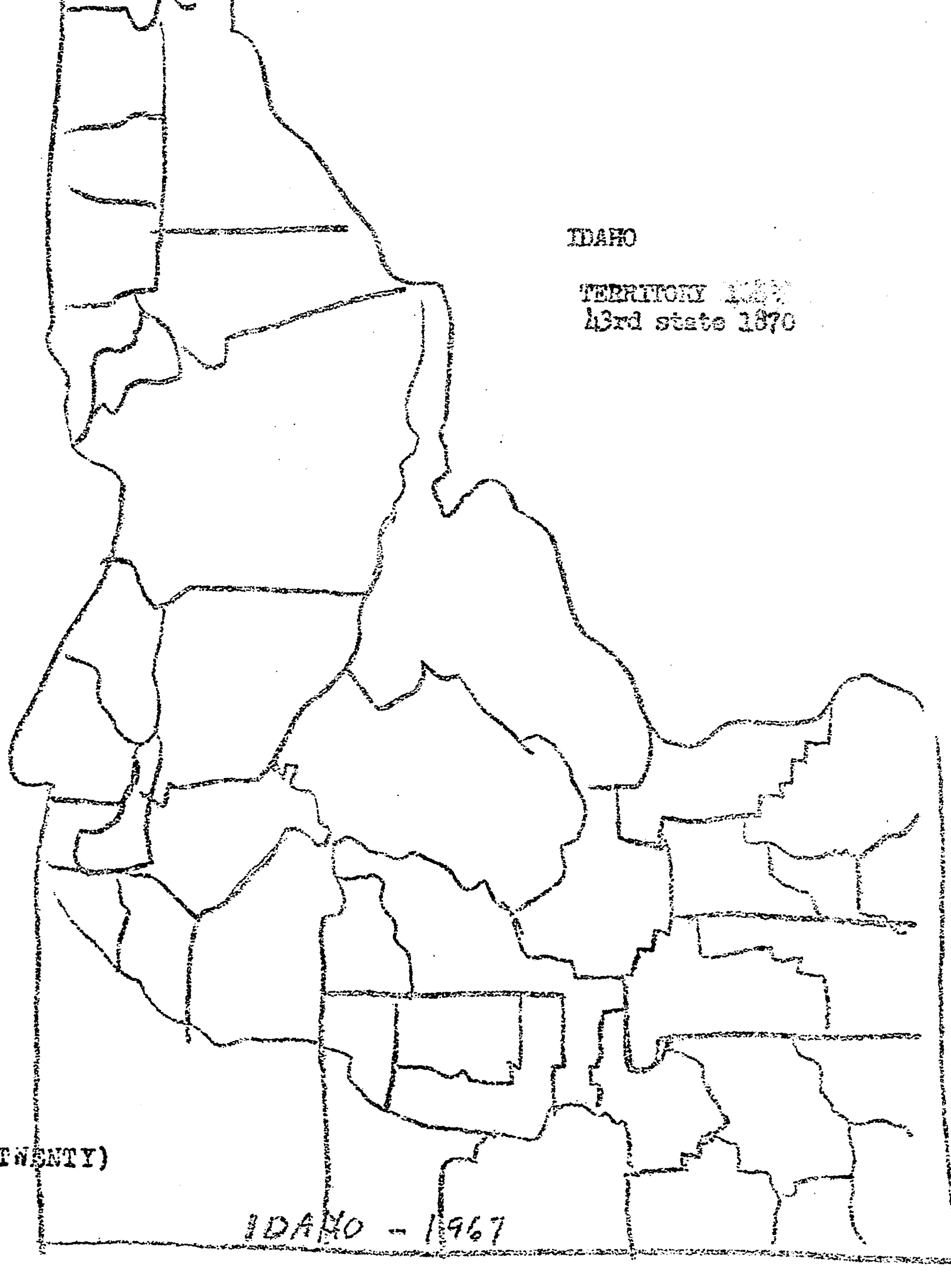
A. Leavina Barrickman b. July 17th, 1875 in Missouri, married James B. Argo, in Missouri. He died in 1940 and is buried in Missouri. Leavina Argo died Apr. 10th, 1933 and is also buried in Missouri. They had seven children: Henry, Stella, Olek, Cora, Herbert, Raymond and Eleanor.

B. Harry Bransen b. August 27th, 1877 in Missouri, married Maggie Elizabeth Almond on Jan. 27th, 1904. Maggie E. b. Sept. 3rd, 1882 in Bigelow, Holt county, Mo., the child of Thomas and Frances Elizabeth Almond. Henry Bransen Barrickman died Oct. 16th, 1938 and is buried at Pineview Cemetery, Ashton, Idaho. Henry B. and Maggie E. Barrickman had four daughters. (a) Gladys May b. in Mound City, Mo. Apr. 15th, 1905, married Harold Tell of Las Vegas, Nevada. (b) Elsie Leona b. June 1st, 1907 at Mound City, Mo., married Harris Barnhart of Pocatello, Idaho. (c) Maude Francis b. August 19th, 1911 at Ashton, Fremont county, Idaho, married Wm. Sturges of Pocatello, Idaho. (d) Lucille Edna b. July 12th, 1915 at Ashton, Idaho, married Gilbert Latham of Rexbury, Idaho.

C. Daniel Barrickman was the third child of Eli and Nancy Jane Beckman Barrickman. Daniel was b. Feb. 9th, 1882 at Swanton, Ohio. Daniel married May Hardy, the child of Wm. and Minniebeth Hardy. May Hardy was b. in Ashton, Idaho. They were members of the Church of Latter Day Saints. Daniel Barrickman died Sept. 30th, 1933 and is buried at Twin Falls Cemetery at Twin Falls, Idaho. Following are the names of their four children.

Pearl, Ernest, Eugene and Floyd. They were all born in Ashton, Idaho. There are no further information or dates on these children.

D. Minnie Barrickman was the last born child of Eli and Nancy Jane Beckman Barrickman. She was born August 7th, 1890 at Hillsboro, Ohio. Minnie Barrickman married twice. First to Ernest Carver who was b. Feb. 27th, 1887 in Missouri. He died Apr. 30th, 1942 and is buried at Pineview Cemetery, Ashton, Idaho. They had two children: 1. Mildren Carver b. Nov. 2nd, 1915 and Dorothea who was born Dec. 19th, 1918. Both born in Ashton, Idaho. Minnie Barrickman Carver married second Mr. Sealey and they have two sons: Raymond b. March 17th, 1922 and Harold b. Dec. 5th, 1924. They, too, were born in Ashton, Idaho. Minnie Barrickman Carver is now the only living child of Eli and Nancy Jane Beckman Barrickman.

III. Michael Barrickman, Sr. (son of Peter Barrackman of Westmoreland county, Pennsylvania and Michael's wife, Sarah, had a son Michael Jr. Michael Jr. was born in Allegheny county, Pennsylvania about 1806. He married Christina (surname unknown), she was born in Penna. in 1810. Michael Jr. and his wife with their two older sons moved to Adams county, Ohio, early in 1835.

By trade Michael Jr. was a turn piker. Following is a list of his children: James, Wm. H., Harriet, Mary F., Robert S., Thomas M., and Nancy R.J. Living with them in Franklin township, Adams county, Ohio, was John C. McAloy, he was 35 years old in 1860. He was also a turn piker and was born in Ireland.

William H. son of Michael Barrickman Jr. and wife Christina, b. 1833 in Penna. When two years of age his family moved to Ohio. William H. married Hester Ann Smalley in Adams county, Ohio, Nov. 13th, 1864. They were married by Rev. James Arbuthnot. They lived in Oliver township, Adams county, Ohio. William H. Barrickman answered the call to arms and enlisted in Co. I. Regt. 182 of the Ohio Vol. Inf., commanded by Col. Lewis Butler. Wm. H. enlisted in 1862 in the Union army, Civil War. He contracted camp fever and was sent home. He died on the 7th of Sept. 1865. He was buried in the Baptist cemetery at Wheatridge, Ohio. Hester Ann Barrickman was left with five small children to raise. She returned to her father's home and there applied for a pension from the United States government. She obtained pension certificate No. 92,549 under the acts of July 11th, 1862 and July 25th, 1866. It was dated Apr. 7th, 1867 and recorded in the pension office in Book B. Vol. 1 $\frac{1}{2}$  on page 22. Hester Ann Smalley Barrackman died at Adams County, Ohio on the 8d of April 1872 and was buried at Wheatridge, Ohio. The five children of William and Hester are now to be raised by the Smalley grandparents. Jesse Smalley then asks that the pension of William H. Barrackman be paid to him, for the sole purpose of use to raise the children of his daughter and son in law. Jesse Smalley lived in Dunkinsville, Adams county, Ohio.

Before Hester Barrackman's death she bought some land in Adams county, Ohio, as follows:

NEWKIRK HULL TO DEED HESTER A. BARACKMAN.

Know all men by these presents that we, Newkirk Hull and Miniam Hull, wife of said Newkirk Hull of Adams county, Ohio, in consideration of the sum of \$400.00 to them paid by Hester A. Barackman of the same place, the receipt whereof is hereby acknowledged, do hereby grant, bargain, sell, and convey to the said Hester A. Barackman, her heirs and assignees forever, the following real estate situated in the county of Adams and State of Ohio, lying and being on the waters of the Ohio Brush Creek bounded and described as follows to wit: Beginning at a stone on the south side of the Dunkinsville road and Winchester road thence south thirty four poles to a stone south-east corner to David Clark's land and in the line of Josial Neull's land thence with said line south slightly eighty eight and a half degrees east fourteen poles to a stone on the west side of Newport road and Treber road thence north one and a half deg. west twenty eight and two thirds poles to a stone at the corner of the carpenter shop thence north sixty eight west fifteen and two thirds poles to the beginning, containing three acres of land, more or less, being part of Andrew Ellison's survey No. L1921 and all the estate, title and interest of the said Newkirk Hull and Miniam Hull, his wife, either in law or in

equity of, in and to the said premises together with all privileges and appurtenances to the same belonging and all rents, issues and profits thereof to have and to hold the same to the only proper use of said Hester A. Barackman, her heirs and assigns forever and the said Newkirk Hull and Miniam Hull, his wife, for themselves and for their heirs, executors, and administrators do hereby covenant with the said Hester A. Barackman, her heirs, and assigns that they are true and lawful owners of the said premises and have full power to convey the same and that the title so conveyed is clear, free and unincumbered and further that they will warrant and defend the same against all claim or claims of all persons whomsoever. In witness whereof the said Newkirk Hull and Miniam Hull, his wife, hereby release her right and expectancy of Dower in the said premises have hereunto set their hands and seals this fifth day of August in the year of our Lord, one thousand and eight hundred and sixty six.

Following is the lineage of the five children of William H. and Hester Ann Smally Barrickman:

1. Harriet J. Barrackman was b. Nov. 20th, 1855 in Adams county, Ohio. She married William Hughes on the 31st of March in 1870. They lived in Cuba, Clinton county, Ohio. They had four boys and two girls. Frank Hughes worked for the county highway department. Alvin Hughes had two children. John Hughes lived in Wilmington, Ohio, and was a mechanic. Lloyd Hughes was a painter and lived in Cuba, Ohio. He now lives in Tarpon Springs, Florida. Anna Hughes never married and worked at the children's home in Wilmington, Ohio. William Hughes ran a blacksmith shop until the age of the auto, when he became an automobile mechanic.
2. Rachel C. Barrackman was b. July 23rd, 1864 in Adams county, Ohio, she married a Mr. Smith. They had five children. One son was Ora Smith. The two sons settled near Blackwell, Oklahoma. Rachael and her husband left for an Indian reservation in Oklahoma and staked a claim.
3. Thomas James Barrackman was born Oct. 27th, 1857 in Dunkinsville, Ohio.



He died March 17th, 1936 in Peebles, Ohio. He is buried in Locust Grove Cemetery in Locust Grove, Ohio. Thomas James Barrackman married Rebecca Angeline Thompson. She was born June 11th, 1860 at Whestridge, Ohio. She died the 5th of February 1948. She is buried next to her husband in Locust Grove Cemetery. Rebecca Angeline was the daughter of Israel and Nancy (Willman) Thompson. Thomas James Barrackman and Angeline Thompson were married November 1st, 1881 at West Union, Ohio. They had five children,

- A. William Edward Barrackman was born January 2, 1882 in Adams county, Ohio. Married Bessie Williams. They had one son, Raymond Lee, born October 15th, 1902. He married Margaret Weiss October 14th, 1936. They had no children.
- B. Edna Florence Barrackman was born March 15, 1884 in Adams county, Ohio. She married Douglas William. They had three children. Bonnie Lucille died in an accident when she was only eight years old. Glenn Douglas was born in January 1906. Doris Gaynelle was born January 11th, 1922. Doris married Rev. Ellis Kretschmer. There was no issue.
- C. Mary Collier Barrackman was born February 28th, 1888 in Adams county, Ohio. She died May 27th, 1960. She married Welda Dugan March 29th, 1930.
- D. John Leonard Barrackman was born February 24, 1892 in Adams county, Ohio. He died September 24th, 1903.
- E. Eva Jane Barrackman was born September 24th, 1890 in Adams county, Ohio, she married James Hawston Conkle. He was born August 11th, 1895 at Seaman, Ohio. He died April 21st, 1951 and is buried at Winchester, Ohio. He was the son of James White Conkle and Rhoda Virginia McClure. James and Eva Barrackman Conkle had three children. All were born at Seaman, Ohio. Mary Virginia was born June 29th, 1919, she married Raymond Shelton on November 24th, 1937. They had one daughter, Rosalynd Shelton, born September 11th, 1942. She married John Thomas Kendall on June 11th, 1960. There were no children. The second child of James and Eva Barrackman Conkle was Lois Jean. She was born August 2nd, 1922. She married Oct. 14th, 1944 to Lester Peger. The third child of James and Eva was Thomas Spencer born October 30th, 1928. He married Anna Muller on May 5th, 1956. There were two children born to them: Sarah Ann born August 25th, 1958 and Angela Rose born December 3rd, 1959.

Jessie H. Barrackman was the fourth child of William H. and Hester Ann Barrackman. Jessie H. was born May 18th, 1860 in Adams county, Ohio, she married Eliza Sims born November 1868 in Middletown, Butler county, Ohio. Eliza Sims Barrackman died July 1912 and is buried in Woodside Cemetery at Middletown, Ohio. Three children had died in infancy. Jesse at two months, Arthur Howard at two months and Bernard at the age of one year. When Eliza Barrackman died the following children were living:-

1. W.R.---whose whereabouts have not been known since 1932. He is possibly the William R. Barrackman of Texas, who was believed to be a carnival owner and operator through the Southwestern states.
2. Anna Barrackman was born March 4th, 1898. She now lives in California and is married to Roy Browning, he born May 18th, 1889. He died in California on 7th of April 1961. They had lived in Newark, Ohio. They were married October 22nd, 1930. Mr. Browning was born in Detroit, Michigan. One child, a daughter, was born to them. Shirley Browning was born September 12th, 1925 in Detroit, Michigan. She married a Mr. Kennedy, has a boy of nine and a girl aged 13.

3. Pearl Barrackman was born in 1899 in Butler county, Ohio and is married to a Mr. Bushby. They have a daughter born in 1927. There is no more information on her.
4. Bertha Barrackman was born in 1916 and died in Detroit, Mich. in July of 1925.

Jesse Barrackman died February 28th, 1930 in Detroit, Michigan.

William Riley Barrackman, son of William H. and Hester Ann Barrackman was born July 23rd, 1864 near Dunkinsville, Adams county, Ohio. He was their last child. William Riley Barrackman married Jennie Dunkin. She was the daughter of John and Rachel Rhodes Dunkin and was born April 8th, 1865 at Dunkinsville, Adams county, Ohio. William R. owned a hotel in Sardinia, Ohio, known as the Commercial House. When Jennie Dunkin married William Riley Barrackman, she was widowed with two small children. They were adopted by William Barrackman and raised as his own. William Riley Barrackman died in 1945 and Jennie Dunkin Barrackman on March 10th, 1919. Their two children are:

1. John Barrackman was born the 6th of October, 1889 at Harwood, Ohio. He died in 1947. John was married twice. Both wives died. A daughter, Mrs. Howard Spaulding and a grandson, Roger and a grand daughter Connie who married John Linele. The daughter's given name is Wilma.
2. Verna Barrackman was born ~~September~~ December 24th, 1894 in Harwood, Highland county, Ohio. She married Fred Winters who was born on the 30th of August, 1889 at Lucasville, Ohio. He was the son of Frank and Nancy Ellen Anderson Winters. Verna Barrackman married Fred Winters on August 14th, 1913. He died February 3rd, 1958 at Batavia, Ohio. Following are their children:
  - A. Alene Winters born October 1st, 1914 in Columbus, Ohio.
  - B. William Winters born December 2nd, 1917 in Columbus, Ohio.
  - C. Betty Ellen Winters born November 1st, 1919 at Batavia, Ohio.

Michael Barrickman Jr. and Christina, his wife, had a son--James born in Pennsylvania in 1835.

James Barri(a)ckman seemed to be a very quiet man and little is known of him or his life. Like his brother, William H. Barrackman, James was a soldier in the Civil War. James was born October 23rd, 1834. James Barrackman enlisted August 11th, 1862 from Ohio. As private he served under Samuel E. Clarke in Co. E. 91st Regiment Ohio Volunteers Infantry. James Barrackman was wounded on May 9th, 1864, at the battle of Clay Mountain, Cumberland, Maryland. James was honorably discharged and sent home.

Our first record of land to James is as follows:

Know all men that we Reason Ogle and Susan, his wife, of the county of Adams and State of Ohio, in consideration of the sum of three hundred seventy dollarsto be paid by James Barickman the receipt thereof is hereby acknowledged do hereby bargain, sell and convey to the said James Barickman his heirs and assigns forever the following real estate viz: Situated in the township of Franklin, in the county and state aforesaid, and beginning at the mouth of Shepherd's Run thence N 16 $\frac{1}{2}$  E. 13/9 poles to a black walnut. Thence with the meander of the Branch N 30 26 poles to a stone. Thence S 67 degrees W 14 poles to a stone thence N 55 3/4 W 29.8 poles to a white oak corner to J. Fustin. Thence S 36 & 16 poles to an ash, thence N 77 3/4 W 10 poles to a stone, thence S 36 & E 30 poles to a stone thence W 50 E 5.3 poles to a hickory. Thence S 49 W 11.8 poles

to the beginning containing eight acres, be the same more or less, according to the bounds aforesaid. Together with all the privileges and appurtenances to the same belongings. To have and to hold the same to the said Reason Ogle and Susan, his wife, for themselves and their heirs do hereby covenant with said James Barickman his heirs and assigns that they are lawfully seized of the premises aforesaid that the premises are free and clear from all incumbrances whatsoever and that they will forever warrant and defend the same with the appurtenances unto the said James Barickman his heirs and assigns against the lawful claims of all persons whomsoever. In witness whereof the said Reason Ogle and Susan Ogle, his wife, have hereunto set their hands this 22nd day of October in the year eighteen hundred and sixty.

In testimony whereof I have hereunto subscribed my name and affixed my seal on the day and year last aforesaid.

Our next record of land for James is in the year 1871.

In October of 1866 James Barrackman had married Elizabeth Davis, she was born May 28th, 1840. They had three children that we know of: Anna, Minnie and Peter Barrackman.

Peter Barrackman was born June 2, 1868. His wife is unknown, she died young. They had three daughters:

1. Rena Barrackman b. Oct. 27th, 1888. Married a Mr. Blair.
2. Lulu Barrackman b. May 20th, 1895. Married Gilbert Storer.
3. Leslie Barrackman b. April 1899.

James Barrackman and his wife are buried in a cemetery at Unity, Ohio.

Little is known of the last two sons of Michael and Christina Barrackman of Armstrong county, and of their daughter, Mary.

Son-Robert S. Barrickman married Ida E. Davis September 24th, 1891. He owned land in Adams County, Ohio. There is no further information.

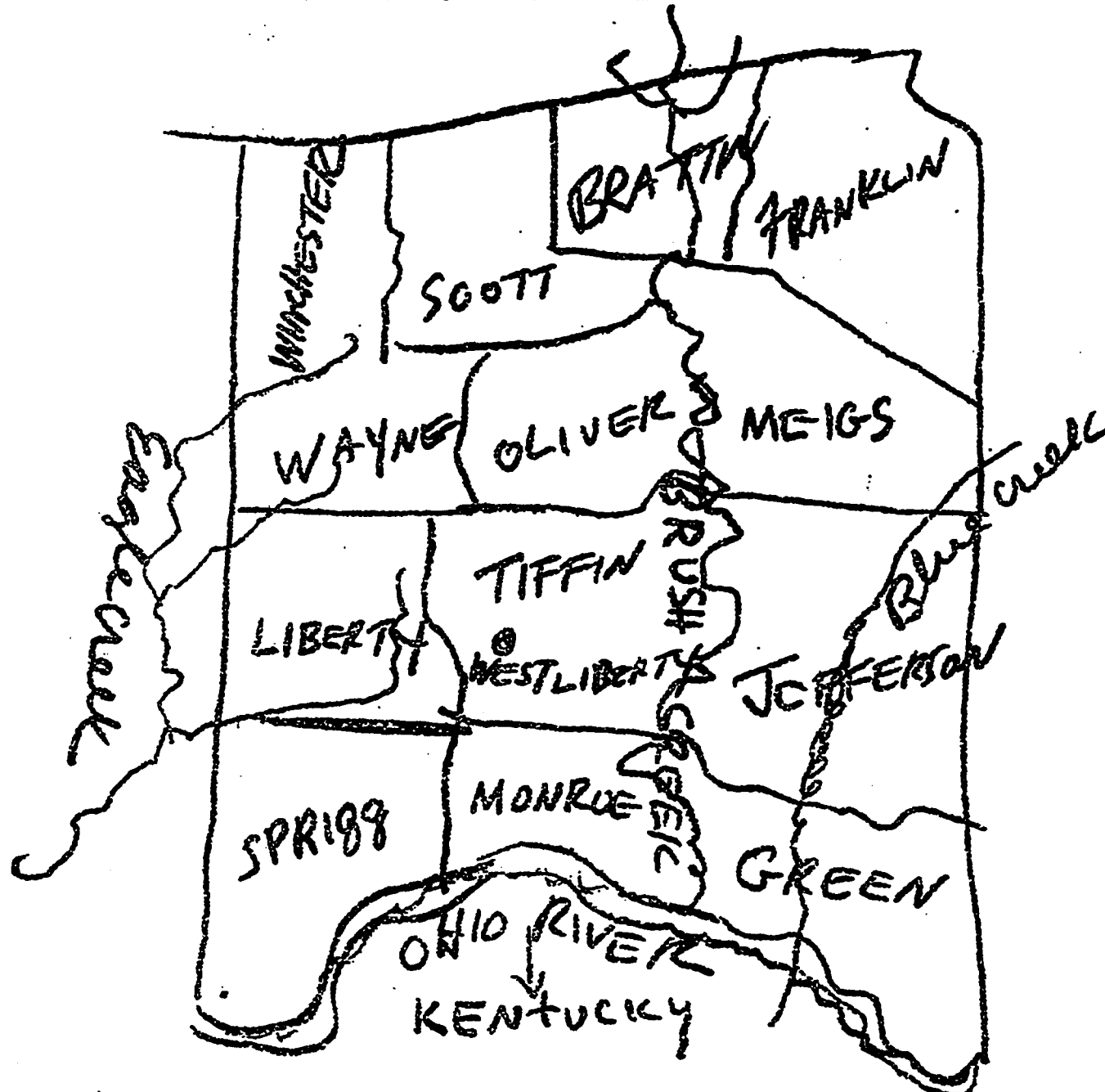
Son-Thomas M. Barrickman was born in 1848, was first married to Harriet Smalley. They had a son, James. The daughters were Eva, Edna, and Mary.

There are other deeds through the year of 1912. These, however, were not copied by the clerk in the recorder's office of Adams County, Ohio.

**IV. JAMES BARRICKMAN--SON OF MICHAEL BARRACKMAN SENIOR AND HIS WIFE, ELIZABETH SARAH.**

Michael Barrackman and his wife, Elizabeth Sarah, had a son born ca 1807. This was James who was born in Armstrong county, Pennsylvania. James Barrickman married Elizabeth Snyder. She was born in 1816 in Pennsylvania. She was the daughter of Christian Snyder (b. 1796 in Pa.) and Rachel (b. Pa. in 1790). James and Elizabeth Barrickman had thirteen children, by 1860. In that year they lived in Madison Twp. Clarion County, Pennsylvania.

Of their children: Elizabeth was born in 1834, John in 1835, Thomas in 1836, Daniel in 1839, James Jr. in 1841, Rachael in 1843, Joseph in 1844, William in 1846, Susan in 1848, Peter in 1850, Catherine in 1852, Henry A. in 1855 and Mary E. in 1859. All these children were born in Armstrong or Clarion counties, Pennsylvania.

After a careful search, including the History of Clarion County published in 1887; History of Northwest Pennsylvania; the Allegheny Valley History-Volumes 1,2 and 3; the Clarion County Records of wills, deeds, mortgages and judgements; Bates' Records--Mr. Merle B. Eberlin, Historian-genealogist reported that there were no wills in Clarion County on anyone by the name of Barrickman, in any of its variations in spelling.

Following is what we were able to abstract from the Clarion County Courthouse:--

Deeds: On August 4th, 1868, Elizabeth and James Barrickman and Susanna and Timothy Thomas sold to William Jardine, 72 acres in Madison township (Rimersburg area) for \$1195. Elizabeth and Susanna inherited this property through the will of Christian Snyder, who held the original patent or grant. Both Elizabeth and Susanna made their mark (X) in signing the deed. Signatures were witnessed by John T. Barrickman. No other record of John T. could be found.

On April 28th, 1863, James Barrickman purchased 5 acres and 3 perches from J.M. & Barbara Ellen Cunningham for \$122.50 in Madison township. The Cunninghams' signatures were witnessed by James L. Barrickman. This property was sold on January 7th, 1867 to Joseph Jardine. It seems that the property was located near the junction of Red Bank Creek and the Allegheny River. The other property may have been there also.

The records show that Elizabeth and James B. Barrickman mortgaged their property for \$400.00 which was later repaid. Also, James L. and Narcissa B. Barrickman mortgaged their property for \$100.00. No further record.

In 1866 James Barrickman sold a right-of-way to the Allegheny Railroad, apparently along the Red Bank Creek.

Further research in the 1870 census of Armstrong county does not reveal any Barrickmans. The search of the 1870 census of Oil City, Franklin, Wards 1,2 and 3; French Creek township, Venango County, all in Pennsylvania, proved equally unfruitful. We do not know that no wills or deeds for Barrickman were found in Venango county, Penna. It is known that this family lived for a time in Oil City, Venango county.

Where the Barrickman family went for a period of time after leaving Clarion County is not known. The 1880 census for the three wards of McKeesport Borough or Mifflin Township--which included Dravosburg, in Allegheny County, Pennsylvania, shows no Barrickmans.

Yet 1880 shows (in records not found in any legal papers) in the counties of Allegheny, Venango and Clarion, kin of the thirteen children of James and Elizabeth Snyder Barrickman.

An earlier letter dated May 21st, 1954, Dravosburg, Pennsylvania, was written to Mrs. Vivian Barrickman Shoemaker. It is as follows:

'Dear Madam,

Your letter of May 20th, 1954 stated that you were working on a Barrickman record. I am quoting you what I know. My father was Peter Barrickman, born in 1850 in Pennsylvania and worked as a oil well rigger in and around the oil field of Pennsylvania in the Allegheny Valley around Oil City and Retrolia. He married a girl by the name of Thirsa Dora Blatchford. They had six children. There were three boys and three girls. Clara May, Roseta, Susanna, James Sidney (me), Edward Perval, Dad had five brothers, can't remember sisters. Henry, David, Hugh, James, John. All are dead now except me and the baby Ed. I was born July 8th, 1886. (68 in 1954) I did hear that there were a lot of Barrickmans up around Fairmount West Virginia. I hope that this which I have given you will be of some use.

Upon writing to Mr. James Barrickman in 1960, I discovered that he had passed away. I tried to trace members of this tribe with no results.

The youngest son of Peter Sullivan Barrickman was Edward P. Barrickman. He passed away in 1962. Here is a letter from that family line:

Dear Miss Barekman, May 30, '62  
In reply to your letter of the 25th I wish to say that Edward Barrickman passed away January 15th, 1962. He was the youngest son of Peter S. Barrickman, the brother of my grandmother-- Clara May Barrickman.  
I do not know of any other Barrickmans that might help you out in your information, and I am sorry. If I can be of further help just let me know.

Mrs. Marilyn Tasserce.

Upon a trip to the courthouse in Allegheny County, Pennsylvania,-- in June, I came across the following items on the sons of Peter S. Barrickman born in 1850 in Clarion County, Pennsylvania. He is next to the last son born to James and Elizabeth Snyder Barrickman.

#### INFORMATION ON THE CHILDREN OF PETER S. BARRICKMAN.

1. William Barrickman, wife-Effie Barrickman. The daughter of Moreen

Phillips of Wilson, Pennsylvania. These Barrickmans had lived at 2365 Avenue, McKeesport, Pennsylvania. (My letter to Mrs. Phillips was returned- Address Not Known) William Barrickman died December 16th, 1943.  
Adminstrator William P. Sabin Volume 78 Page 294.

2. James Sidney Barrickman died May 22nd, 1958 in the borough of West Mifflin, Allegheny County, Pennsylvania. He is buried at Jefferson Memorial Cemetery. His wife was Elizabeth. They evidently had no children. His niece, Marilyn Tasserce was the adminstrator of the estate.

3. Edward P. Barrickman was born October 4th, 1893 at Jones Station, Jefferson, Pennsylvania. He died January 15th, 1962 at Elizabeth, Penna. The date of death was supplied by Mrs. Marilyn Tasserce, a niece.

It seems obvious that these sons of Peter S. Barrickman and wife Theresa Dora Blatchford left no male heirs. Thus one line of the James and Klizabeth Barrickman family of Clarion County, Pennsylvania, has ended.

John was the oldest son of James and Elizabeth Snyder Barrickman. He was born in Clarion County, Pennsylvania, in 1835. He married Annabel (Nancy) Fedder. She was born in Pennsylvania in 1844. They had four sons and one daughter.

Their children:-

1. Anna Barrickman married a Mr. Payne. They had six children:-Loretta, Howard, Edward, Floyd, Ruth and Mildred. Anna was a twin to Harry. She was born Dec. 16th (year not known).
2. John Barrickman lived in Seegel, Pennsylvania. He is deceased.
3. Lyde Barrickman lived in New Castle. He is deceased.
4. Harry Barrickman lived in Richwood, West Virginia. He had sons:- Walter, Ray and Harry.
5. Sylvester Addison Barrickman was born March 13th, 1867 and died April 27th, 1946. He is buried in Franklin Cemetery in Venango County, Pennsylvania. He married Mary J. Bean in St. John's Methodist Church in Franklin, Penna. May J. Bean Barrickman was born in Pennsylvania on the 8th of March 1862. She died the 27th of September 1941. She is buried at the side of her husband. Sylvester and Mary Jane Barrickman had three children:-
  1. Robert S. Barrickman b. August 11th, 1899 in Oil City, Venango Co. Pennsylvania.
  2. Caroline Isabelle Barrickman b. October 12th, 1888 in Foxbury, Butler County, Pennsylvania. She married a Mr. Wilson. She died January 3rd, 1916.
  3. Ross Barrickman b. June 2nd, 1904 in Franklin, Pennsylvania, died June 2nd, 1904.

Robert S. Barrickman was born August 11th, 1899 in Oil City, Penna. He married Elsie Patterson who was born June 7th, 1914 at Bear Run, Pa. Elsie M. Patterson was the child of George M. Patterson born July 31st, 1868. He was killed on a railroad job May 5th, 1920. Elsie's mother was Malinda Hardenstine b. January 25th, 1875. She died April 19th, 1955. At the time of her death, she was married to Ben Sipe (second marriage). Robert and Elsie Barrickman have the following children, all born in Franklin, Venango county, Pennsylvania.

The twins were Ruth and Ruby Barrickman b. February 12th, 1937.  
Robert E. Barrickman was b. April 15th, 1941. Harry L. Barrickman was b. date not known.. William Barrickman was b. March 9, 1945.  
Charles J. Barrickman was b. September 15th, 1947.



Of the remaining sons of James and Elizabeth Snyder Barrickman there are Thomas H. born in 1836; Daniel born 1839; James Jr. born 1841; Joseph born 1844; William born 1846 and Henry A. born in 1855.

Elsie Patterson Barrickman wrote and told me that she believes that Henry A. born in 1855 was married and had no children. Also that William born in 1846 was also married and had no issue. Daniel born in 1839 was married and had no issue.

James Barrickman married, he had two sons and a daughter. They moved to Warren, Ohio.

Serving from Clarion County, Pennsylvania in the Civil War was Elijah S. Barrickman. Elijah was the brother of James Barrickman. Following is his service record:-

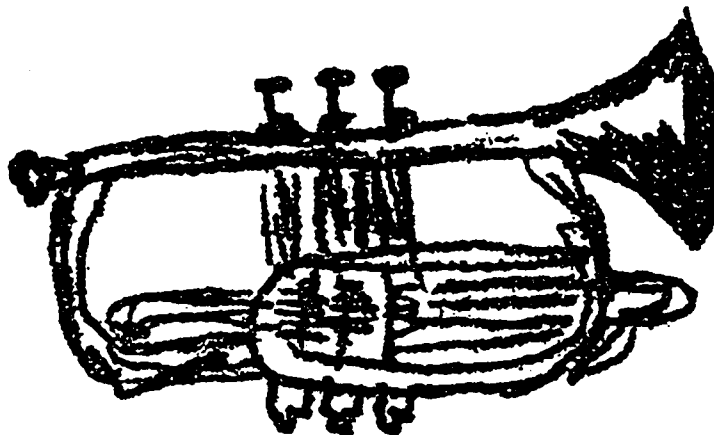

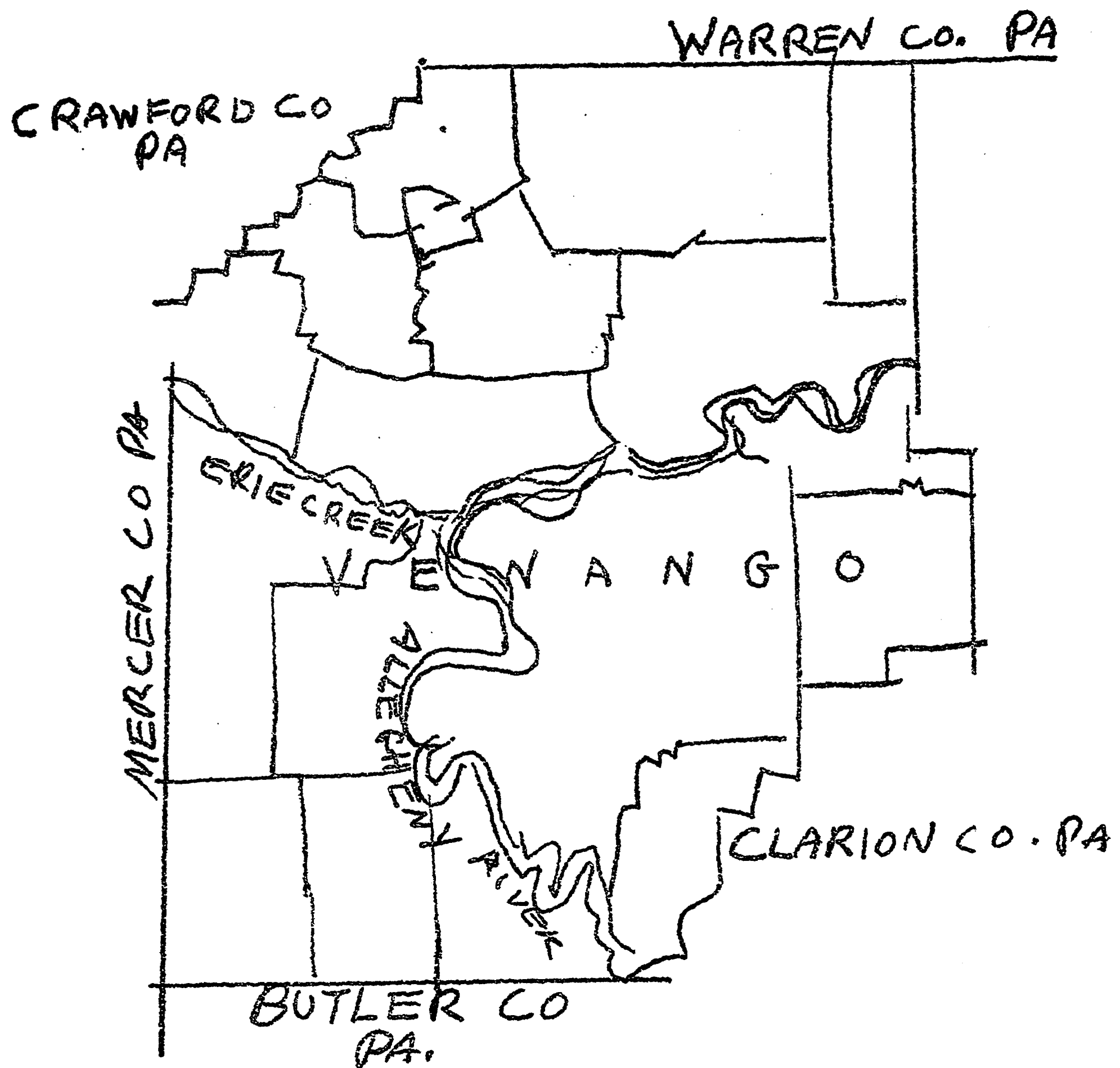

The men of the Barrickman family lived for some time in Cornplanter Township of Venango County, Pennsylvania. They worked in Oil City. About 1900 and 1910 parts of the family moved to Clarion County, Pennsylvania where they farm today. Others moved into Allegheny County, Pennsylvania.

Joseph Barrickman was born in 1844 in Madison Township, Clarion County, Pennsylvania. He had a son, Joseph Barrickman Jr. We have no information on J.B. Sr's wife, nor where they lived--or of their children, except for the one son. J.B. Jr. was born February 2nd, 1883. It is known that they moved to Butler County, Pennsylvania. There Joseph Jr. was married to Belle Laudebaugh. Belle Laudebaugh Barrickman died in Cranberry Township Butler County, Pennsylvania, in 1910. Joseph Barrickman Jr. died November 24th, 1954. The husband and wife are buried at the Plains Presbyterian Church Cemetery in Cranberry Township. They had six children:- Bortha, Stella, Elvia, Joe, Martha and Ernest.

"There was little time for my father to tell us tales of the family," said son, Ernest. "Pop was just busy trying to make a living and raise us youngsters without a mom. He just didn't talk at all about his kin. We only knew he had a lot of brothers and sisters."

Ernest Barrickman, son of Joseph Barrickman Jr. was born January 8th, 1908 in Cranberry Township, Butler County, Pennsylvania. He married Elsie Hendrickson, also of Butler County, on August 22nd, 1930. Elsie was the daughter of David and Annie (Davison) Hendrickson.

Elsie and Ernest Barrickman have four children. They are:-

1. Ernest Jr. b. March 31st, 1931 in Butler County, Pennsylvania.
2. Beverly b. May 31st, 1934 in Butler County, Pennsylvania.
3. William b. February 16th, 1937 in Allegheny County, Pennsylvania.
4. Betty b. May 23rd, 1939 in Allegheny County, Pennsylvania.

THOMAS CROFT TO JOSEPH BARRICKMAN.

This indenture made the tenth day of July in the year of our Lord one thousand nine hundred and eighteen between Thomas Croft, a single man of Cranberry Township, Butler County, Pennsylvania, party of the first part and Joseph W. Barrickman of the same township, county and state, party of the second part witnesseth, that the said party of the first part, for and in consideration of the sum of five hundred dollars, lawful money of the United States of America, unto him well and truly paid by the said party of the second part, at and before sealing and delivery of these presents, the receipt whereof is hereby acknowledged, has granted, bargained, sold, aliened, enfeoffed, released, Conveyed, and confirmed, and by these presents does grant, bargain, sell, alien, enfeoff, release, convey and confirm unto the said party of the second part, his heirs and assigns, all that certain piece or parcel of land situated in Cranberry Township, Butler County, Pennsylvania, bounded and described as follows: to wit:---Beginning at the northeast corner at line of lands of John Davis heirs. Thence south by lands of the same 1 45' west six hundred fourteen and 40 feet to a post. Thence north by lands of said first party 86 100 30' west three hundred twenty and 60 feet to a post. Thence by lands of said first party north 100 1 45' east four hundred fifty and 70 feet to a post at the southeasterly line of the Pittsburg, 100 Harmony, Butler and New Castle Railway thence by lands of north same 60 35' east two hundred ninety eight and 17 feet to a post, and thence by lands of North Pittsburgh 100 Realty Company south 87 41' east sixty and 43 feet to a post at the place of beginning containing four acres measure. Being part of a larger tract of land of which Frederick Croft of Cranberry Township, Butler County, Pennsylvania died, seized and intestate and his children, grand-children and heirs at law conveyed the six-eighths interest in the same to John Murray by deed dated December 31st, 1896, recorded in the recorder's office in Butler County in Deed Book 244 page 171, and John W. Croft, guardian of Ida May Marlatt, a grand daughter of the said Frederick Croft deceased, conveyed one eighth interest in the same premises to Mary Croft Murray, also in heir by deed dated June 24th, 1847 recorded in the recorder's office in Butler County in Deed Book 173 page 250, and John Murray and Mary Murray, sole owners, conveyed the above described piece or parcel of land with other lands to Thomas Croft the present grantor by deed dated August 20th, 1906. Recorded in the office for the recording of deeds in said Butler County, Pennsylvania, in deed book 247 page 148, reference being had to the records of Butler County the title to the said piece or parcel of land will more fully and at large appear, together with a private right of egress and migress to and from the said premises as now used, viz:---commencing at the southeast corner of said premises and running westward on present location to railway company's right-of-way about 760 feet. Thence along the southeasterly side of the said right-of-way to the Franklin road about 593 feet.

Together with all and singular the various improvements, ways, waters, water courses, rights, liberties, privileges, hereditaments, and appurtenances whatsoever thereunto belogning or in any wise appertaining and the reversions and remainders, rents, issues and profits thereof, and all the estate, right, title, interest, property, claim and demand whatsoever of the said party of the first part, in law, equity, or otherwise howsoever of in and to the same and every part thereof; to have and to hold the said piece or parcel of land with the hereditaments and premises hereby granted, or mentioned and intended so be, with the appurtenances, unto the said party of the second part, his heirs and assigns; to and for the only proper use and behoof of the said party of

second part, his heirs and assigns forever, and Thomas Croft the said party of the first part for himself, his heirs, executors and administrators, does by these presents, covenant, grant and agree, to and with the said party of the second part, his heirs and assigns, that he the said party of the first part, his heirs, all and singular the hereditaments and premises, hereinabove described and granted, or mentioned and intended so be, with appurtenances, unto the said party of the second part, his heirs and assigns, against him the said party of the first part, and his heirs, and against all and every other person or persons, whomsoever, lawfully claiming or to claim the same or any part whereof shall and will warrant and forever defend in witness whereof, the said party of the first part to these presents set his hand and seal dated the day and year above first written.  
Sealed and delivered in the presence of J.F. Shannon.

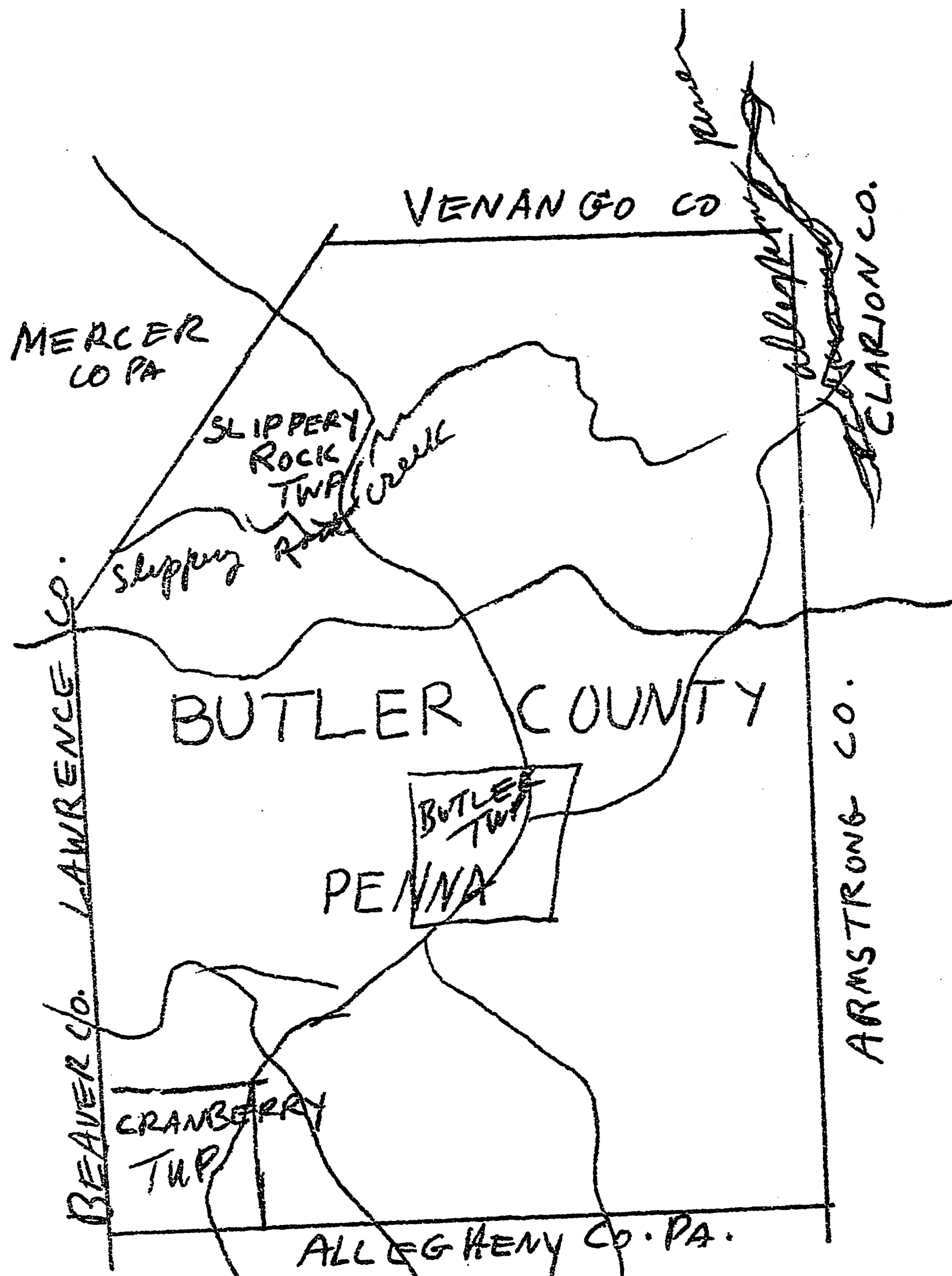

Peter Barrickman served as a Patriot during Revolutionary War. (See annals of the Carnegie Museum Vol.1 P.537. Published by authority of the Board of Trustees of the Carnegie Institute) He lived on the Military Road to Ft. Dunsmore (Ft. Pitt); here he had a Ferry Service on the Monongahela River running parallel to the Dunsmore Military Road to Ft. Pitt. His ferry was used to ferry troops and supplies 1776-7. After 1785 Peter Barrickman had a river station on the De Shee, Knox Co., Ind.

The proof of Micheal Barrickman being a son of Peter Barrickman Of Maryland was found in the following deed.

In the matter and estate papers of Peter Barrickman of Knox County Indiana, I found the following will.

The last will and Testament of Petter Barrickman, Deceased. A certified copy of will dated, January 26, 1791. Probated, Sept. 8, 1791. Box One. Knox County, Indiana.

In the name of God, Amen:

I, Peter Barrickman, of the county Knox and town of Vincennes, being of sound mind, but weak in body, make my last will, etc. ....  
I give and dispose of my worldly estate in the following form and manner. ....

FIRST- I give to my OLDEST SON, PETER BARRICKMAN, five Shillings.

SECONDLY- I give to my DAUGHTER, BARBARY, ONE Shilling Sterling.

THIRDLY- I give to my DAUGHTER, MARY, One Shilling Sterling.

FOURTHLY- I give to my SON, MICHEAL, One Shilling Sterling.

FIFTHLY- I give to my DAUGHTER, CATHERINE, One Shilling Sterling.

SIXTHLY- I give to my SON, JACOB, One Shilling Sterling.

SEVENTHLY\_ I give to my SON, ANDREW, One Shilling Sterling.

I, likewise give to my DAUGHTER, MAGDALENE WYANT, One Shilling Sterling.

I likewise give to my WIFE, ELIZABETH, one third of all of my lands and goods that I shall hold in this country and all of my movable estate that shall be left in her hands during her life or widowhood. To bring up, give schooling and maintain her children, upon and at her death that the whole and movables shall be equally divided amongst my FOUR SONS AND TWO DAUGHTERS, THAT NOW LIVE IN THE HOUSE WITH ME. Nevertheless if any of these Six children shall want any of the movables that my Wife can spare, that they shall have that my wife can spare, they shall have them the articles to be appraised, and deducted out of their share in the dividant at the death of their mother. And whereas, I, Peter Barrickman have bought up land if transfered to me and my Heirs by the Lord of the soil, I dispose of it in the following manner. To my Wife, and that of the second child, second eldest of the six, living with me, or any of them or after one another, as they shall stand in need, shall have their share laid out to them in equal proportion as honest men shall judge, chosen by my executors for that purpose.



If it so happen that their only eight hundred shall be held that it be equally divided amongst my four sons, and my two daughters now living with me in my house, their mother taking her share as written above and so in less proportion, I do also constitute my wife and son ABRAHAM, the sole executors of my last will and testament, and I hereby disallow, revoke and disannul all and every other testament, wills, legasses, bequests and executors, ratifying and confirming this my only last will and testament.

In witness thereof I have set my hand and seal this twenty sixth day of Jan, in the year on thousand seven hundred and ninty one.

Sighened, sealed, published, pronounced and declaired by the said Peter Barrickman as his last will and testament, in the presence of us who in his presence and in the presence of each other have subscribed our names.

Jacob Barrickman, lived in Kentucky, later in Franklin County, Indiana.

Andrew Barrickman, lived in the Shenandoah valley, Virginia, and later Licking Co., Ohio. His present day kin live in Danville, Illinois.

Barbara, Mary, Catherine. To date we are not sure of who these daughters married, but I dont think they left Maryland.
