### Last Mords.

HIS may seem an odd place for "last words"; but in all books the first section, containing usually title, dedication and table of contents, is the last part printed, since it can readily be understood that some of it could not be given until the book was otherwise completed.

This is also the place where omissions and errors are sometimes noted, having been detected too late for correction elsewhere.

In the line of omissions, the writer wants to call attention to a fact confirmatory of the connection with the Weiler family of Freys. A visit to the Freysville cemetery after nearly half of this book was printed, revealed the existence of Conrad Frey's tombstone, which recorded his death on Feb. 17, 1800, aged 84 years. The Weiler Conrad was born March 10, 1715.

In the Explanatory Chapter an important explanation is omitted. Where a subject is married the second time, only his number is given, followed by a dash. See page 142, where 161253———

Page 96 Wesley Brawner Smith should appear in *italics*.

Facing page 142. The boy's surname is Maher instead of Mahr.

Page 185. The name of 1655111 is Helen Elizabeth Wernock Maxwell.

Page 201. The name of 1672291 is William Franklin Ramer Holtzworth.

On page 241 Regina's age is given at 12 years, 10 months, 2 weeks and 1 day. This should have been 12 years. 10 months, 3 weeks and 2 days.

Page 269, 192741 and 192742. The surname should be Peartree.

It is hoped that this covers the more serious errors and omissions in this volume; if the reader discovers others his indulgence is sincerely sought.

The first steps in this work were taken in February, 1909; this page was printed in October, 1913.

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
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# Introductory

### Benesis.

HEN the making of books was not as common as it is now, it was customary for the author to give some reason or excuse for thrusting upon a longsuffering public a new work; though everybody suspected that it was the hope of literary fame or financial reward that prompted the deed. Such apology usually appeared in the beginning of the book as a "Preface" or "Introduction." Though the custom has fallen into disuse during late years, the writer deems it fitting that he should state the purpose of this volume.

### THE INSPIRATION.

The writer first became acquainted with "family records" through his intimate association<sup>1</sup> with the late E. W. Spangler, Esq., whose work "Spangler Families" is one of the most complete genealogical and local historical books ever written. It was then that a Frey book was dreamed of; but pressure of business interests, and the discovery that not one of the living relatives even knew the name of the great-grandfather, put a stop to any work in that direction before there was even a beginning.

Ten years later, in a business way, the writer came to know of another genealogical work, of a much more modest character,<sup>2</sup> wherein the compiler simply published the names of his grandfather's descendants. Then came the idea that what a railroad man, with limited time, could do to preserve the memory of his grandfather, might be done by one who had his evenings as his

own, by reason of his profession had access to court records, and through his daily vocation could readily superintend the mechanical part of the undertaking. So the Rubicon was crossed, and the attempt to discover and publish in book form the descendants of Samuel Frey, the writer's grandfather, was inaugurated.

### ANTICIPATION AND REALIZATION.

When first beginning the work, the idea was, as Samuel Frey had nine children who became heads of families, to get some one in each branch to furnish the information concerning that particular line, and then the writer would simply have to be the editor, arranging the data thus furnished, procuring as much of the earlier history of the Freys as he could without going to too much trouble, and preparing the book for the printer. The scheme was very good; but when it came to actual practice in only two of the lines was it successful; in the others the writer had to get the statistics himself.

Starting out with the grandfather idea, the thought came that as two or three Freys were known that were not of the grandfather stock, though closely related, it might be as well to spread the benefits of this publication to others of the kin. This missionary spirit existed before the magnitude of the task involved in getting all the facts pertaining to the children of Samuel Frey alone was fully appreciated. Once started on this line, there was no valid reason for not including all the brothers and sisters of Samuel. So there inevitably followed the conclusion to make the book not simply the story of Samuel Frey's descendants; but the record of George Frey (Samuel's father) and his posterity.

In the glow of self-appreciation that this altruistic resolution aroused, there came the thought of another line of Freys (or Frys. as they wrote it), with whom the writer has been acquainted since childhood, one of them having been his first school teacher, about whose connection with Samuel's stock there was some doubt, and it was determined to settle this question, once for all. The result was a step still further back into the past, and the great-great-

grandfather of the writer appears as the progenitor of the several thousand persons recorded in this volume. When it is noted that four of Gottfried Frey's children are taken up in this work; that these four furnished eighteen of his grandchildren, of whom the writer's grandfather was one—it will give some idea of the difference in the work first planned and the labor actually expended.

It was also expected that every one addressed and asked for information would cheerfully and promptly give all in his power, considering that a work of this kind is never for the profit of the author, but for the benefit of the whole kin; of just as much interest to the one questioned as to the interrogator. It was quite a blow to one's faith in common courtesy and unselfishness to discover how many were loth to go to the trouble of writing a letter, or even to answer when personally visited; apparently unwilling to do anything for nothing;3 all of which not only delayed the completion of the work, but made the task so much the harder, and the final results so much the more imperfect. No one more regrets the omission of three of Gottfried's children, possibly a half dozen of his grandchildren, and many of his descendants further down the line, than does the writer; but the fear that he himself might not live to finish it, or that many of those who had cheered him on in the undertaking might not live to see it completed, determined him to send the book forth in its present state. It is not as complete as he expected it to be; it is more full than he intended it to be when he first planned it; and not all of its sins of omission can be charged to him. Such as it is, it is the only book of the descendants of Gottfried Frev vet published. Should some one more capable ever take up the task and publish a more perfect record of the progeny of the Pioneer lad, no one will congratulate him more heartily than one who has spent over three vears at the work and fully appreciates all that it involves.<sup>4</sup>

### GETTING THE FACTS.

The actual labor of a project like this may be divided into three parts. The first of these is, of course, getting the information. This, again, may be classified into two groups: concerning the past and relating to the present.

In older countries, or even in our own country in future years, the work of the genealogist is comparatively easy. Where the law requires the recording of births and deaths, where marriages licenses are issued and records kept, it is not so difficult to trace out any particular line. But such things are of very recent existence in York County, or in any county of the United States for that matter: and of course the further back the more difficult. The early church records content themselves with the actual church membership: then, a little later, appear births, if the children are baptized; then, still later, deaths and marriages are given. Of course, where parents were not church members, no such records are to be found.

A source of information not confined to church membership are the court records, administrations, wills, inquests of real estate and deeds and releases; but these also have their limitations. If a man has no property there is no administration; if he has no real estate there are no inquests, deeds or releases, and here again is shown one of the inconveniences of being poor. Gottfried Frey died a man of means: but one of his sons died without leaving any estate to pass through the court house records, so nothing could be learned of his children by that means. Fortunately, however, for the purposes of this book, a brother-in-law of this particular son died childless and intestate, leaving quite valuable real estate, and by means of the inquest in the partition thereof the writer was able to trace all his father's uncles and aunts, something which would otherwise have been impossible.

Owing to the almost universal custom of women taking the surnames of their husbands, daughters are much harder to trace than sons. Of the two daughters of Gottfried who grew to maturity one was already married at the time of the writing of his

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will, and while he mentions that fact he fails to say to whom she was married. An inspection of a church marriage record gave the name of her husband: but whether the other daughter ever married, or, if she did, to whom, is one of the things the writer has been unable to find out. He may have seen her name hundreds of times in his search, but there was no way of recognizing it. This is one of the things that marriage license records will make easy for future genealogists.

The newspapers of the present day are a fruitful source of information, especially such as, in their obituary notices, give the names of surviving relatives. A score of years ago this was not done, and fifty years ago they were very chary about publishing deaths at all. The early papers of York County gave more room to essays and political dissertations than to local news or mortuary records.

Tradition is not to be despised as a source of information; but it must always be taken with a grain of salt. Verbal communications may easily become distorted, and age makes the line between truth and error so indistinct as to render accuracy impossible. In other pages in this work reference is made to tradition, and what part it played in revealing the past.

The writer is indebted, also, to the "Spangler Families." heretofore referred to, to Pennsylvania Archives, York County Histories, Rupp's 30,000 names, and the Pennsylvania German Society, for some of his earlier information. The work done by many of these historians was both conscientious and accurate. and has served to preserve for the use of future historians and genealogists facts which otherwise would have been utterly lost. He feels devoutly thankful that through the courtesies of the York County Historical Society he has had access to some works of whose very existence he was unaware, wherein he found facts which proved corner stones in the erection of his genealogical The formation and maintenance of societies of this structure. nature is a work well worthy the time and attention of men who have the leisure and the means to devote thereto.

Concerning the present, there were two ways of acquiring facts; by personal interview and through correspondence. Quite a number of the kin live in the city or immediate vicinity, and these were, of course, called upon; but the great majority are at a distance, and the number of letters written runs into the thousands. Unfortunately, not all of those written to replied, and trips afoot, by steam, trolley and vehicle, were numerous. In all but a few instances the inquirer was courteously received, and his impertinent questions cheerfully answered. Those who were too far away to be visited and who neglected to answer have been omitted, except in the few cases where the information was obtained from another source. In many instances second and even third letters were necessary to produce desired results, and the writer feels that he has done all that could be reasonably expected to make this record complete.

Having had the question asked several times, and having himself experienced a similar curiosity when reading other genealogical works, a more detailed account of how the various branches of the family were discovered is given as such divisions are taken up in their proper order. It is believed they will serve to relieve the monotony of dry statistics, and prove an aid to such readers as may be tempted to engage in a similar work. To all such the writer bids Godspeed, believing that the task of collating and preserving historical information, though it be of but a single family, is worthy the best endeavor of any man.

### PAYING THE FIDDLER.

The second important matter in the publication of a "family book" is paying for it. Once in a while there happens the combination of a man with both the will and the means; but usually the first is easier to find than the latter. Many printers and bookbinders throughout the country can produce hundreds of copies of books which the author was surely going to pay as soon as they were finished, since there would be no trouble at all in selling them; and the attics and storerooms of many authors who paid

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their publishing bills are filled with unsold copies. Of course, the wise man usually endeavors to secure subscriptions before beginning the actual work of publication: but frequently, after about fifty per cent. of the estimated cost has been apparently provided for, he goes ahead, confident of being able to raise the balance. Then occurs the two-fold process that brings financial difficulty: the cost is greater than was expected, and the last half of the income does not materialize as easily as was hoped.

When the author first started on the "Grandfather" idea, he interviewed a few of the grandsons of Samuel Frey, and received encouragement sufficient to justify him in beginning the work. When the line was widened, the cost grew out of all proportion to the people who were brought within the scope of the book, and if the response of those most closely related to the original object of research had not been unexpectedly liberal, there would be a goodsized deficit to be met. This extra effort on the part of some of Gottfried's descendants may be principally attributable to the fact that those still bearing the name of Frey are naturally more interested in a Frev book than such whose connection is not at once apparent, and who may have to go back several generations to show that they are really concerned therein; and it is also possible that the latter class, more distantly related to the writer, may have had less confidence in his integrity or his ability to produce a volume worth paying for. In fact, some persons were very chary of furnishing any information, to say nothing of signing any subscriptions, because they feared "a skin game."

It would really have been amusing, had it not been rather mortifying, to find that others who answered requests for information very promptly, became as dumb as the grave when written to for subscriptions to the work. Of course, that was a privilege they had; but at the low price at which this volume has been offered it seems that every descendant of the pioneer lad should have in his possession a copy; and that there could hardly be one so poor as not to be able to procure one. It has been the aim of the writer to make the price low, with the idea of having information

procured at the expense of so much labor put into the hands of every one who should be interested. If possible, he would be only too happy to do this; and to the extent that anyone who really would like this book is unable to get it, the writer feels that his efforts have been in vain.

The last step in the work is the delivery of the book and the receipt of the price. The writer steadfastly refrained from soliciting payment in advance of publication, preferring to run the risk of some losses himself rather than have anyone say that they had been defrauded, if, perchance, through death or other causes, the work should never be issued. He sincerely trusts that none of Gottfried Frey's descendants will find themselves in the position of being unable to pay for the book after they have once subscribed for the same; it would be a position unpleasant for the writer and even more unpleasant for the subscriber.

For personal reasons and for the sake of being able to say that this was one of the few genealogical books that has not been a source of loss to the publisher, it is hoped that not only all who subscribed therefor will be able to secure their copies; but that many of the descendants of Gottfried Frey will avail themselves of this opportunity to learn whence they came and what manner of men their forefathers were, for it is unlikely that the chance will ever come again.

### QUI BONO?

There were a few with whom the writer came in contact who looked upon the undertaking as labor wasted. One described it as "Nonsense," another said his children were all registered, and a third thought it more important that time be devoted to having one's name recorded in the Lamb's Book of Life than in the Frey book. To the latter assertion the writer adds a hearty "Amen;" but fails to see what is to prevent the acquisition of both these desirable records. That man must in truth be all for self who gives no thought to his ancestry; who never stops to think what manner of men were those who are responsible for his appearance in this

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world; who never wonders from where he has received this tendency or that trait in his character; who, reading the history of his country, never asks whether any of his forebears played the part of men in the upbuilding of the country, in the strife with the wilderness, the savage or the enemy. That we may have some ancestors of whom the less said the better, is not to be denied; but there is also the glorious compensation that some were men to be proud of, men whose part in the grand drama being played was no mean one, men who endured toil and privation and peril that we of the present day might live in safety, with none to molest or make us afraid. And the mothers of the past, those sturdy German dames, who were true helpmeets to their husbands, whose relaxation from household toils consisted of work in the fields, who spun and wove, washed and cooked, sewed and knit, from early morn till late at night, yet withal found time to bear and rear, not one or two, but a dozen or more of healthy sons and daughters to rise up in after years and call them blessed-who would begrudge the little effort required to preserve their names and features for the coming generations to know and love?

### The Freys.

CITIZEN of York<sup>1</sup> who has traveled extensively in his time, and has had the good fortune to visit the town in Germany from whence his ancestors came, was asked by the writer, whether he ever met any Freys. "Not in Germany;" was the reply; "but plenty of them in Switzerland." The German name had led the writer to look for a German origin; and this theory seemed born out by the arrival of Tobias among "The Palatinates," and the fact that Heinrich Frey came from Alsace. There is also a record in Christ Lutheran church, of York, of a Mrs. Smith, "born a Frey," who came from "a town in Germany."

The discovery of Kaspar Frey in Udorf, Switzerland, does not necessarily mean that the Freys are not of Germanic origin. Situated as it is, Switzerland is the meeting place of three nationalities, German, Italian and French, and it can be seen how easily a family could move from any one of these countries into the mountain Republic.

### THE NAME.

After all, it matters little whether German or Swiss; the etymology of the name shows that the family was composed of free men in the days when the majority of men were peasants or serfs. It was the fact of their being free, something out of the ordinary lot of their cotemporaries, that was the very origin of the family name, and marked them as something different from their fellows; as possessing a sturdy spirit of independence and a love of liberty that kept them from bowing to the yoke. How this

freedom was won the writer knows not. It may have been the reward of some heroic deed in battle, or some great service for the State: it may have been bought with a price, been the gift of a sovereign or a matter of inheritance. But, however it came about, when it did come it gave to the man who before was only a Hans or a Frederick a surname, a something to distinguish him from the other Hanses and Fredericks, and something not brought about by his occupation, as the Snyders or the Millers, or by his dwelling place, as the Glatfelters or the Vandersloots: but by his changed condition. Henceforth he was "Frey!" the German word for "free."

Many families go to much trouble to show their descent from royalty: scarcely any are willing to claim any so-called "lower" ancestry than the nobility. It seems to the writer that however laudable this may be where title and princely prerogative still prevail, it has no place in a land of free people. In a country where the law recognizes no titles save such connected with an office itself the gift of the people or their representatives, and where no title is hereditary, it seems poor taste to lay any stress on being connected with those who possessed rights and privileges by the ancient law of might and the accident of birth. To be noble is not to be born of one wearing a crown or a title; but to do noble acts. How can he be noble who is enjoying the fruits of wrongdoing and oppression, of property and privilege wrung from the people in the days of old, by deeds that reeked with blood and cruelty.

It is for the Freys to rejoice that the family was founded in the spirit of freedom, and that, so far as is known, they have always preserved their birthright. Rather than submit to the exactions of civil and ecclesiastical oppressors they emigrated to a new and a strange land across the seas; they settled in a wild country, wresting from a virgin soil a livelihood for their generous families: amid dangers from wild beast and wilder men they built their homes, transformed the frowning forests into smiling fields and reared sturdy sons and daughters to people the new land; and when a tyrannical king sought to oppress those who had carved

out a new nation in the New World, the names of these same Freys again appear as bearing arms in the cause that was to preserve that which was of their very nature, the very name by which they were distinguished from all other people.

It behooves the present and future Freys to continue this noble trait of our ancestors; to be free from the servitude of tyrant or oligarchy, of priest or party; to quit themselves, not as slaves or cravens, but as free men, doing their whole duty in the uplift of the human race.

### THE ORTHOGRAPHY.

The fac-simile of Gottfried Frey's signature to his will, and the Hillsbach church records, show the German spelling of the name. Possibly the old Freysville tombstone, where it is carved "Frei," is the most proper English method, and is less liable to be mispronounced; but the F-r-e-y spelling presents a more finished appearance, and corresponds more literally with the original orthography. There is but one objection to the F-r-e-y spelling, and that is the matter of pronunciation, some people saying "Free" and some "Fray"; both of which are justified by the pronunciation of the last syllable in such words as Geoffrey, Godfrey, etc., and by the pronunciation of grey, they, etc. But since "eye" is pronounced "i", why should the consonants "Fr" affect the sound of the vowel "y" Why should it not be "Frey"—"Frei."

Let us not allow the significance of the good old name to be lost merely because those who know no language but English are unable to decide which of the three ways of pronouncing "ey" they are to follow. Personal acquaintance will soon set them aright, and where there is no personal acquaintance it matters little what we are called.

It is a great pity that some members of the family in this country have seen fit to change the ancient and symbolical orthography of the name to that which is practically meaningless, or at the most bears with it nothing to be proud of. "Fry," "a swarm or crowd, particularly of fish;" "to be dressed in a pan over

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a fire;" what is there in this to exult in, or to fasten to a child for life! Who would deliberately trade a birthright of freedom for a mess of fish or a dish of fried potatoes!

The writer's own grandfather, at one period in his life, spelled his name "Fry," doing so for the reason that the English people of the county mispronounced the Frey spelling and thus he lost trade because the people asked for Fray or Free instead of Frey. His descendants, however, without any certain knowledge of the original spelling, resumed the "e," and all of them retain it to this day. It would be an appropriate tribute to the founders of the family if those who use the "shorter and uglier word" because their father used it before them would return to the orthography justified by the meaning of the name and used by the bearers of it in the fatherland and the first two generations in this country.

### OTHER FREYS.

The writer has been unable to gain any positive knowledge of the Freys in the Old World outside of those hereafter given as his ancestors. The remark of Mr. Smyser, heretofore referred to, proves that the name has not died out across the water; in fact, one of the participants in the first aviation race from Paris to Rome was "a German named Frey:" showing that the same spirit which led so many to seek a new land still moves one of them to conquer in a new field. Whether any of the family has acquired wealth or fame in any way in foreign lands he is unable to say.

Of Freys in the United States there are many, and some of the name were here early in our country's history. A Heinrich Frey arrived in America in 1680<sup>2</sup>, and there was another Heinrich Frey in New York state in its early days. There was an Englishman named Jacob Frey who came to New Jersey in 1681<sup>3</sup>, and Massachusetts had a George Frye as early as 1651<sup>4</sup>. For the benefit of such as may be interested in Freys not descendants of

It must be remembered that Philadelphia, though doubtless in those days the principal, was not the only, port of entry for immigrants, and it is not improbable that Freys arrived at other ports. Suffice it to say that the name is quite common through Pennsylvania, and probably not unknown in any state in the Union. We can not say that any of them have set the world afire by anything that they have done; but they have apparently all played their part in making up the bone and sinew of the country—the Common People.

The first United States Census, taken in 1790, and which contains only the names of heads of families, gives the following Freys in York County in that year:


### THE FREYS.

In the river townships of York County are quite a number of Freys, some of whom doubtless are descendants of Lancaster County Freys, and the others may be of the posterity of other sons of Tobias, the immigrant, than the one who is the subject of this volume.

There are quite a number of Freys in York who are descended from the Martin Frey hereafter referred to<sup>6</sup>. The descendants of Tobias<sup>7</sup> are also numerous in Dover and surrounding townships. In the Northern end of the county are Freys whose ancestors came from Berks after the Revolution, and there are also others who doubtless come from some of those in the above list.

Adams County has a number of Freys who the writer is inclined to believe spring from Conrad, the older brother of Gottfried, and others from a Samuel Frey, who may have been a son of Tobias, born after the latter's arrival in this country. At any rate, to attempt to identify all the Freys living in York County alone would involve a task too great for the writer and subject the publication of this volume to an unreasonable delay. Should some descendant of either of these collateral branches undertake the work he would earn the gratitude of all his kindred; but he would only then appreciate the toil spent by the writer on this publication.

### Explanatory.

HE size of this book was selected as being the most usual and convenient; the paper is of a good quality and calculated to wear well, that for the text being of an antique finish so as not to be hurtful to the eye, while that used for the illustrations is of a higher finish in order to bring out the details of the half-tone portraits. There is no method of illustration so true to life as the half-tone cut, in which the camera is used to faithfully reproduce the features. These illustrations are printed on extra heavy paper, giving a high degree of strength, and are sewed into the book in such a way as to insure their remaining an integral part thereof. In order to do this, illustrations do not always appear immediately next to the text of their subject; but as all portraits bear the name and number of the person illustrated there can be no difficulty in knowing to whom they belong.

### FEMALE NAMES.

The females mentioned in the genealogical part of this book are described by their maiden names, as otherwise their family connection with their parents would not be immediately apparent. Where married, the fact is stated and the husband's name given in the same paragraph, and their issue are of course given the husband's surname. Where illustrated, the maiden name appears in parentheses just before the married surname, so that whether searching for a portrait by the maiden name or the married name it can readily be found.

To avoid repetition, immediately after the "subject's" name is given date of birth and death, if deceased; then, if a man, occupation and residence; and, lastly, date of marriage, wife's maiden

name, date of birth and death. In the case of women subjects, date of birth and death are first given: then date of marriage, name, date of birth and death, occupation and residence of husband. In this way there is no confusion as to whom the various dates belong. Where any of these data are omitted it is because of inability to obtain them. Where no State is mentioned, Pennsylvania is understood, and where township only is given. York County is meant.

Throughout the book will be found references to subjects by name and number, or by number alone. These numbers refer to the subject's number, which number is fixed by the following scheme for the

DESIGNATION OF GENERATION AND PLACE.

One of the problems, and there are many of them, that confronts the genealogist, is the method of presenting the family roster so as to be intelligible to his readers. It should enable any one that can read to easily locate any member of the family, trace back the ancestors or follow down the descendants. A book that makes it difficult to do this is prolific of profanity, uttered or unexpressed, by those who refer to its pages for knowledge of the family.

The most usual way, so far as the writer has observed, is to print the name of the subject in heavy faced type, preceded by his number, and followed by his ancestors in parentheses, thus:

**236** Albert Frey Gallatin<sup>5</sup> (Albert,<sup>4</sup> Samuel,<sup>3</sup> George,<sup>2</sup> Gottfried<sup>1</sup>) b. May 15, etc.

The number 236 indicates that he is the 236th subject taken up. After giving an account of him, his children would be given a line each, thus

#### 1128 Edna May Gallatin.

1129 Mary Grace Gallatin, and so on.

The numbers given them are next in order to the children of the man who was No. 235 and who may have been an exceedingly distant relative of Albert F. Gallatin. When all the numbers between 236 and 1128 have been taken up, as 236 was, then 1128 appears in the large type and is properly disposed of. In short,

the book starts with number 1, numbers all of that generation consecutively, then in numerical succession follow all of the second generation, and so to the end of the work. The small numbers 5, 4. 3, 2, 1 represent the generation of Albert and his ancestors.

This method has the advantage of showing at a glance a subject's ancestors and his children; but to know more about the children or the ancestors involves quite a search throughout the book. In addition the repetition of the ancestral names consumes considerable space; yet without it the descent is unintelligible.

An improvement on this was the method used in the Spangler Families. Mr. Spangler used various sizes of type for the different generations, and corresponding numbers. thus:

### I. CASPER SPENGLER.

- I. JONAS SPENGLER
- I. MAJOR JOSEPH SPANGLER.
- I. JONAS SPANGLER.
- I. GEORGE SPANGLER.
- 1. John Spangler.

Then he followed each subject down to the end, before he took up the next. In this way, families remained grouped, and once you had located any branch there was no trouble in following out all the individual members. The only criticism on this method is that to find out a man's ancestors you had to go back through many pages, picking out the successively enlarged type.

The writer has made free use of Mr. Spangler's varied type method, and added thereto an original system of notation which he modestly considers the best yet devised for the purpose.

Gottfried Frey, believed to be the oldest  $son^{t}$  of his father, is distinguished thus:

His second child was

1652 SARAH ANN FREY. Her fourth child was16524 JOSEPH JESSE HUNTER. His second child was165242 MAUD ISABELLE HUNTER, whose oldest child is

1652421 Paul David Garver, and his oldest child, if named after his great-grandfather would appear as

16524211 Joseph Hunter Garver, while the first-born of Joseph might be designated

165242111 MAUD HUNTER GARVER.

In the case of large families, where there are more than nine children, the higher numbers appear in *italics*, to show that it is but one number instead of two. Thus 166112 designates the twelfth child of the first child of the sixth child of the sixth child of Gottfried.

In short, reading from left to right, each place of number represents a generation: each number denotes that child's place in the family of the number immediately preceding.

It is believed that after a little usage the names of the older members will soon be associated with their numbers, and so the family branch be at once recognized. All the children of George will know themselves to be in the 16s, and Adam's descendants will lay claim to the 18s, and so on.

Another guide lies in the fact that persons whose numbers differ only in the last figure are children of the same parent; a

difference in the next to the last figure means children of the same grandparent; and so forth.

This system is used throughout the book because it is believed to best answer the requirements of intelligibility and economy of space and time, and it is hoped it will meet with the favor of the readers of these records.

### THE ILLUSTRATIONS.

There is nothing so expressive as the human face, and, in the absence of personal contact, or knowledge of their lives, in no way can we learn so much of our fellows as through a study of their features. Especially is this so where the subjects are in middle life, where time has had the opportunity to write so much of a man's character in the lines of his face. It was with this purpose that the writer sought to secure as many portraits of descendants of Gottfried Frey as possible for this work. Naturally, portraits are expensive, though modern photo-engraving has reduced the cost very materially, at the same time giving more truthful likenesses than the often flattering tool of the wood or steel engraver, where the softening of a line here or there will entirely change the expression.


The portraits given in this work, with few exceptions, are the contributions of relatives of the persons presented, children, grandchildren or other loving ones joining in having the dear one's face perpetuated in this way. The rule has been to exclude every one not of Frey blood; but anyone of that blood, be it ever so diluted, was allowed in these pages. The portraits have been made uniform in style, so as not to be open to the charge of partiality, and of a character to make their cost within the reach of nearly every one. In a measure, they are typical of a family's interest in the work and of their regard for the subject shown. Wherever the least concern was manifest there was given the opportunity to make use of this method of contributing to the work and of paying respect to the memory of a loved one, and if some families or branches seem to be lacking in the matter of illustrations the fault is not that of the writer.

# finding of Gottfried.

N the writer's first attempt to find his ancestors the place first resorted to was the office of the Register of Wills of the County of York, Pa. The county was organized from a part of Lancaster in 1749; and the second Frey who seems to have died therein after its organization and left anything worth while administering upon was Gottfried Frey, on whose estate letters of administration were first granted to John Hay and John Welsh on May 21. 1782. Subsequently his will was found and probated on June 14, 1782. In the record he is described as of York township. As the writer had always understood that his forefathers had founded Freystown, which, at the time of this search was located in Springgarden township, the conclusion was reached that this was not the man sought, and the search stopped right there, partly for this reason and for the press of business affairs.

## Second Attempt.

When the second attempt was made, again was this same stumbling block found; but about that same time the writer awoke to the fact that Springgarden township was not contemporaneous with the organization of York County; but that in the earliest days all of Lancaster County west of the Susquehanna and above the Yellow Breeches was known as Pennsboro; while all below that creek was designated as Hopewell. A little later on there were two Hallams, Upper and Lower, carved out of Hopewell, which latter name was afterward restricted to the part of the county along the Maryland line, and from which many townships have been formed.

A little later York township, including the village of York, was formed from a part of Hellam, and in 1821 Springgarden township was cut out of York township. Thus, the question of residence was no longer contradictory, but confirmatory of the theory that Gottfried was an ancestor, giving the first link in the chain. Examination of Gottfried's will, which appears subsequently in these pages, shows that he had indeed laid out building lots and sold a number of them, and provided for the disposal of the income from the ground rents and the ownership in fee of those unsold at the time of his death. Still later it was discovered that Rowe's Atlas of York gives "Godfrey Frey's addition." Here was the second link in the chain of identification, the founding of the town of Freystown.

Gottfried's will names a Samuel Frey as one of his sons, and on the first blush the writer supposed this to be his grandfather; but recourse being had to the tombstone of the latter revealed the fact of his birth after the date of Gottfried's will, which of course showed that the Samuel in the will was not the Samuel of the tombstone. It was then thought that the latter was a son of the former, a theory which was effectually disposed of by the finding of the record of the baptism of the latter on the church books, as described in 16.

This will of Gottfried gives the names of his seven surviving children, among whom is that of George Frey. In 16 are given the reasons for believing that the George of Gottfried is the George who was the father of 167 Samuel Frey, thus conclusively fixing Gottfried as the American ancestor. The writer has noticed that other genealogies state the mere fact of connection between the various branches, without any presentation of evidence to show the truth of their assertions. This does not mean that he charges these writers with knowingly stating untruths; but he has always felt that, like the Missourian, he would like to be shown. The temptation to make ancestors, where none can be easily found, is almost overpowering, and so it is not strange that the query comes up, "How do you know?" Hence, all through this work, except

where the facts are of the present time, and easily susceptible of verification, the writer gives the evidence of the truth of his statements.

The first historical reference that could be found of Gottfried Frey was among a list of marriages celebrated by Pastor Stoever', in which appeared the following:

July 31, 1742, Godfrey Frey to Margaret Linn.

No reference to his parentage or residence is there given, and so the next problem undertaken was the effort to discover his ancestry. It was felt, however, that while such an attempt was being made it was well to search out his posterity, and the two lines were worked on simultaneously, the latter, from the very nature of things, going along more rapidly than the former. In fact, it was not until nearly all the work of locating his descendants as completely as it was felt safe to delay the publication of the book for had been done, that the progenitors of the bridegroom of 1742 were discovered.

# Bis Ancestry.

INDING the ancestry of Gottfried Frey was attended with the usual surprises and disappointments common to all genealogical researches; and in the end success followed the adoption of a course so logical that it is inexplicable why it was not tried at the very outset. But it seems that in many of the affairs of life we close our eyes to the apparent and seek for the hidden and difficult.

The fact that Gottfried Frev was married in York (then Lancaster) County in 1742 showed that he was either born in or came to this country prior to that date. Also, it seemed probable that if he was married here at that time, his parents would then be living in the county. Reference to the "Spangler Families" shows a Tobias Frey owning at least 450 acres of land one mile east of the Codorus Creek, which he sold to Baltzer Spangler for 30 pounds. This deed is dated April 4, 1747<sup>1</sup> and sets forth that the land conveyed was part of a large tract of 450 acres for which Tobias had a patent dated October 30, 1736. This was about the date when settlements were first authorized in this part of Pennsylvania, owing to the fact that the territory had been claimed by both Maryland and Pennsylvania; but there were settlers in York County around Kreutz Creek as early as 1729; a Martin Frey settled on the northeastern borders of the present city of York in 1734. It is likely that Tobias Frev settled on his tract some years before he could get a patent therefor, as did his cotemporaries.

Reference to early York County records showed that Gottfried Frey was guardian for Martin, a son of Martin Frey<sup>2</sup>, while an <sup>7</sup>Deed Book A, 543. 20. C. Docket A, 60.

older son of Martin's was named Tobias. The guardianship and the repetition of the name Tobias indicate a relation existing between Martin, the elder Tobias and Gottfried.

## LOOKING FOR TOBIAS.

The obvious thing to do was to search for the settlement of the estate of Tobias Frev, as a man who had had 450 acres of land in 1747 was likely to have some of it left at the time of his death. The York County records showing nothing of Tobias. Lancaster County, from which York was formed, was resorted to. Here was found a record of the granting of letters of administration on the estate of Tobias Frey, in the year 1748, to Godfrey Frey, administrator: the bond is dated June 15, 1848, and Jacob Beelmyer, of York, appears as bondsman. The inventory of the personal property filed sets forth a few hundred pounds of personalty, and then states that the "improvements, by agreement of the heirs, are for the use of the widow," whose name is given as Barbara. So far, so good; but here the trail is lost. There is no record of any account, any release, or any appointment of guardians, by which the children of Tobias Frev could be identified. The mere fact that Godfrey administered was not positive proof of sonship, since. by agreement, such an office might have been filled by a brother or one not at all related to the deceased.

Then the thought arose that as the "improvements" were left for the use of the widow there must have come a time when they were sold and the deed therefor would doubtless be executed by the heirs, naming them. Diligent search was made for a deed from the heirs of Tobias Frey, or from a combination of Freys: but nothing could be found. The abstracts of a title company of all deeds on record for lands in the township of "Hallam," where Tobias' tract was located, and in the townships of York and Springgarden, which, after their respective formation, included the tract, were examined; but no such deed or reference to such deed could be found. Even the modern "open sesame"—advertising—was resorted to without producing any results. Evidently the honest

old Germans who received their share of the proceeds of the real estate after it was sold were so well satisfied of each other's integrity that no release was given or recorded; and the purchasers of the property were so thoroughly convinced that the Freys would not attempt to sell it again that no deed was recorded, a measure of economy which, however satisfactory it may have been to them, proved exceedingly discouraging to the future genealogist.

One additional fact that seemed corroborative of the Tobias theory was the discovery that the name of Tobias' widow, Barbara, was also a part of the name of one of Gottfried's daughters, Julianna Barbara. As still further connecting Martin with the family was the discovery of a record in Lancaster County of Godfrey Frey being one of the bondsmen of the administratrix of Martin Frey, December 8, 1739.

On page 49 of "Rupp's 30.000 Names of German, Swiss, Dutch, French and other immigrants," in the very first list, being those who arrived in Philadelphia on September 21, 1727, in the ship "William and Sarah," the fourth name is Tobias Frey. The list describes these immigrants as Palatines, and gives only the names of the males above the age of 16. Presuming Gottfried to have been 21 when he was married in 1742, he would have been 7 years old when this ship arrived in America, and, consequently, even if a passenger with his (supposed) father, his name would not appear on the list. The one sure way of settling the question of paternity was the finding of a record of the name of Tobias' children, something that could easily be done, from the fact that Old World church records are faithfully and accurately kept, when once it was known where Tobias came from.

Describing the immigrants as Palatines, while safe enough as a general term, was of little assistance, as the Palatinate was a territory about 6.000 square miles in extent, with a population of over 1,000,000. The proverbial "needle in the haystack" would be more easily discovered than a man with no other means of location than that. The writer was told that a prominent York family learned of their native place by means of advertisements placed in German

papers offering a liberal reward to the German pastor who would find the family recorded in his parish records. This would probably have proved effective, but was too expensive a method. From one source the writer learned that an uncle of his had once read a Sunday school library containing a story about a Frey who lived in Alsace and believed that the family came from thence; but this was no more definite than the Palatine designation.

The Alsatian theory received some support from the fact that probably the first Frey in America. Heinrich Frey, who came to New York in 1675 and to Philadelphia in 1680, was born in Altheim, Alsace, in 1653. There is also another reference to Heinrich Frey which describes him as having been in Pennsylvania before the days of Penn<sup>3</sup>, and of subsequently returning to Zurich. Again, there seems to have been a Heinrich Frey in early days in New York state, who came from Zurich. A letter written to the American consul at Zurich brought the reply that there were no municipal records in that city of births or deaths prior to 1773.

There was a George Frye in Massachusetts in 1651—First settlers of New England 114; but as that did not fit with the immigration of Tobias in 1727, no search was made in that direction.

With such intangible clues, and being busily engaged in tracing the posterity of Gottfried, the writer did nothing definite toward ascertaining the pioneer's ancestry until the latter part of January, 1911, when the idea came to him that since Tobias was a passenger on the same ship which brought to America Hans Casper Spengler, there was a bare possibility that these two might have been fellow-townsmen. With but little hope of finding such an easy solution to the problem, a letter was addressed to the Evangelical Protestant pastor of Hilsbach, Baden, which, more than a month later, resulted in a reply from that personage that the "name of Tobias Frey indeed appears on the records of our church," and for a modest sum a certified copy of the records of himself and his ancestors back to about the year 1600 would be duly sent.

It is needless to say that no time was lost in replying to this gratifying communication. After a little longer wait, due doubtless to the time taken in copying the records, came the following statement:

## FAMILY TREE OF TOBIAS FREY.

The family of Tobias Frey, according to notices in our oldest church records, probably came from Urdorf, in Canton Zurich, Switzerland, and evidently after the thirty years' war (1618-1648) settled in the city of Hilsbach, at that time belonging to the Palatine, now in Baden. Hilsbach now numbers 1.263 inhabitants, and is about 7 hours' journey (21 miles) west of Heidelberg.

In our records there appears as the oldest ancestor of the family

#### KASPAR FREY,

member of the Council in Hilsbach. His birth antedates the beginning of the records. In our oldest church records is entered only the date of his death, Sept. 5, 1688, his age being given as "eighty and odd years," so that he was born about 1605. His wife's name was Anna; also of her only the date of her death is known to us; died Feb. 28, 1688. She was then 75 years old; her birthday. therefore, is in the year 1613. This married couple's son was

#### HANS FREY.

Concerning his birth and death no notice could be found. He was twice married:

I. On the 20th of February, 1666, he was married at Hilsbach to Margarethe Schopff, of Weiler, at the foot of Steinsberg, half hour  $(1\frac{1}{2} \text{ miles})$  distant from Hilsbach. Then Hans Frey moved to Weiler, and became the ancestor of the Weiler line of the Frey family. Margarethe Frey, nee Schoff, died already, April 9, 1676, in childbirth, 34 years of age. She was, therefore, born in the year 1646. Of this first marriage of Hans Frey, four children can be traced:

- 1. Hans, born Oct. 12, 1666. Concerning him no further notice can be found.
- 2. Hans Jacob, born Sept. 12, 1669.
- 3. Hans Michael, born Oct. 6, 1678; died April 13, 1675.
- 4. Hans Michael, born Mar. 23, 1676, died May 29, 1676.

#### HIS ANCESTRY.

The branch of Hans Jacob Frey flourished in the male line in Weiler through five generations. It became extinct with the death of John George Frey on December 1, 1893. He left, of two marriages, three daughters, who are still living. The oldest one is in Hilsbach: the second in Waldangelloch, one hour (3 miles) distant from Hilsbach; and the youngest one married in Weiler.

II. On November 7, 1676, Hans Frey contracted a second married with Margarethe Volck, daughter of Vinegrower Wolf Volck, in Weiler. This wife died on December 5, 1701, 49 years old. She, therefore, was born 1652. Of this marriage likewise four children are traceable:

- 1. Hans Martin, b. July 1, 1677; died Sept. 4, 1678.
- 2. Hans George, born Sept. 25, 1681; died Jan. 17, 1691.
- 3. Tobias, born June 1, 1684.
- 4. Anna Katharina, born Jan. 29, 1689. Of her nothing is known.

#### TOBIAS FREY

was a wagoner in Weiler, and married on July 17, 1709, one Anna Maria Peters, of Eppingen, county seat, two hours (6 miles) distance from Hilsbach. To this couple was born, in Weiler, three children:

- 1. Conrad, born March 10, 1715.
- 2. Gottfried, born Aug. 4, 1721.
- 3. Anna Maria, born Dec. 6, 1722.

Since then the name of Tobias Frey has disappeared from our church records. Notices concerning his emigration to America are not to be found in our records.



The agreement of these statements with the corresponding entries in the church records of Hilsbach and Weiler is hereby certified.


So, thanks to the passport of Henry Spangler, which was faithfully preserved by his descendants, and is set forth in full in


the "Spangler Families,"<sup>4</sup> were revealed three ancestors of Gottfried Frey. The statement justified the inference drawn from the Lancaster records, that Tobias was the father of Gottfried. The only flaw is the fact that Tobias' wife was named Anna, while his widow is designated as Barbara: but a second marriage probably accounts for this discrepancy. The bond between Tobias, Martin and Gottfried can not be explained on the theory that had first been formed, that Martin was a son or younger brother of Tobias. It is probable that the Hans born October 12, 1666, who is set forth in the Hilsbach statement as "concerning him no further notice can be found," left Weiler and eventually drifted to America, or that a son of his named Martin was himself an emigrant; or Martin may have been a descendant of Hans Jacob, Tobias' older half-brother.

Letters addressed to the pastor of a Protestant church at Urdorf, in an attempt to trace Kaspar's ancestry, met with no reply.

From the German records given, it will be seen that the descendants of Gottfried Frey are interested in Hilsbach and Weiler, two German villages, now in Baden, only a mile and a half apart. Hilsbach is the parish town, the pastor conducting services at both places. The population of Hilsbach is stated in Rev. Greiner's letter: that of Weiler. in 1895 was 967. Gottfried Frey was doubtless baptized in the church at Weiler, an illustration of which is given. There is also shown the ancestral home of the Spenglers, of whom five sons and a daughter married Freys, 161412, 1632, 1635, 1636, 16715 and 167715.

# From Meiler to York.

ORN in Weiler on August 4, 1721, Gottfried Frey passed the first six years of his life as a German lad, during a time when the life of the German was anything but pleasant, especially in the war-swept country of the Palatinate. The horrors of the Thirty Years' War ending in 1648 had not been forgotten when in 1674 Turenne, the great General of Louis XIV. made the Palatine a solitude. Eighty thousand troops were suddenly hurled upon the unprotected territory, Heidelberg, Mannheim, Worms and twelve hundred villages were razed to the ground, and 40,000 inhabitants robbed of all they possessed. So complete was the work of destruction that on the last night of the French general's stay in the unfortunate district he himself had to sleep on a bed of straw.

A succession of wars, with brief intervals of peace, combined to make the lot of the Palatines extremely burdensome. Added to military oppression was fear of religious persecution, so that men looked longingly toward a land where there was freedom of conscience and rest from the wars of ambition and kingly pride. The spirit of the people is strikingly portrayed in the following letter. written by the father of Heinrich Frey to his son, who was one of the first German settlers in Pennsylvania. A copy of this letter, the original of which is in the possession of a German Historical Society, was furnished to the writer by Benjamin Bertolet, a lineal descendant of Heinrich Frey, who has spent years in tracing Heinrich's descendants, and recently successfully carried through a movement for the erection of a monument to the first Frey in America.<sup>1</sup>

JHeinrich Frey emigrated from Atheim, Elsass, in 1675, at the age of 22, and arrived in Pennsylvania before 1681.

#### LETTER TO AMERICA.

#### Heilborn, February 6, 1681.

### Dear Son:

Your letter from far away America reached us by the hands of the brave Captain Sanders, and it gave us great joy. And when, a few days later, the father of your true friend came to see us, our joy was beyond measure.

America, according to your writing, must be a beautiful land. We rejoice greatly that your home is with such good God-fearing people, and that the Indians in your community are peace-loving people.

Dear Henry, since you have been away from us the conditions in South Germany have been very much worse. The French have wrought much devastation, and this is pressing us very hard at this time, and besides this, we are now suffering the plague of high taxes.

Thousands would gladly leave the Fatherland if they had the means to do so. A merchant from Frankfort was with us last week, and informed us how along the Rhine a number of families have banded together and are planning to accept the invitation of an Englishman named William Penn, who recently visited this community, to settle in that beautiful land and there establish new homes.

After I had received the information I went at once to our pastor, whose parents live in Worms, on the Rhine, and begged him urgently to learn what truth there was in these reports, and to find out, if possible, if there would be any opportunity for us to join them and go to the New World. He then informed me that these reports were all true, and that he was informed by one who had inside knowledge that in a place called Kriegsheim, near Worms, many were preparing themselves to go to the New World. When I gave the good man your letter to read he was greatly surprised and said that you were on the land to which these emigrants were going.

It is the good providence of God that has shown these burdened people so glorious a land. We, also the Plattenbach family, are only waiting for a good opportunity when the dear Lord will bring us to you.

Your brother Peter is learning shoemaking, and will soon be free. America is the dream of Elizabeth, and Catharine, only six years old, asks us daily "Will we soon be going to our brother in America?"

Your dear mother, as also your brothers and sisters, greet you heartily, and pray to the dear Lord that He may protect and keep you. Your True Father,

Heinrich Frey.

The feeling of unrest and the desire to try their fortunes in the New World, set forth in the above letter, grew apace, and the tide of emigration from Germany to Pennsylvania attained such volume that the authorities in this State became alarmed, notwithstanding the fact that Queen Anne was herself active in inviting these settlers. "The Golden Book," so called because of its illuminated title page, contained a picture of that august lady, with glowing words of encouragement for the oppressed to come to England, to be sent from there to the English colonies in America.

The earliest German settlements were made in what is yet known as Germantown, though now in the corporate limits of the city of Philadelphia, subsequently extending back in what is now Montgomery and Berks Counties, several townships in these counties bearing German names. Later Chester county was invaded, and a large body of Mennonites from Switzerland and Germany settled at Pequa, now in Lancaster County.

"The Germans were principally farmers. They depended more upon themselves than upon others. They wielded the mattock, the ax and maul, and by the power of brawny arms rooted up the grubs, removed saplings, felled majestic oaks, laid low the towering hickory: prostrated, where they grew, the walnut, poplar, chestnut —cleaved such as suited the purpose into rails for fences persevered untiringly until the forest was changed into arable field. They were those of whom Governor Thomas said, 1738: "This Province has been for some years the asylum of the distressed Protestants of the Palatinate, and other parts of Germany: and. I believe, it may be truthfully said, that the present flourishing condition of it is in a great measure owing to the industry of those people; it is not altogether the fertility of the soil, but

the number and industry of the people that makes a country flourish." $^3$ 

## THE JOURNEY.

For these causes and to such a land Tobias Frey decided to leave the little town of Weiler and undertake the long journey to the New World. Doubtless in the way depicted in Heinrich Frev's letter, a number of families in Weiler and other towns in the neighborhood, united in sundering the ties which bound them to friends and fatherland, and took the eventful step which eventually transformed them from subjects of a German Elector to sovereign citizens of a great Republic. We know that Tobias had as companion at least one of his neighbors, in the person of Hans Casper Spengler, and the list given<sup>4</sup> may include other citizens of the little village in Baden. The list is headed by Rev. G. M. Weis, who was born January 23. 1700, either at Eppingen or at Stebbach, both towns less than fifty miles distant from Weiler. It is just possible that Weis may have been the pastor at Hillsbach, the church town for Weiler, or he may have gathered up a band of Germans to emigrate to the promised land. He became quite a famous pastor in America, and some of his descendants are living in York today.

The journey was doubtless down the Rhine on the slow flat boats of that time. Arriving at Rotterdam, passage was engaged on the ship William and Sarah, William Hill, master, which stopped at Dover, England, and then began the long voyage to America. A voyage of this kind, at that time, took about six months, and was both dangerous and uncomfortable. Crowded together in unventilated quarters, with poor food, many emigrants died on the way and were consigned to the bosom of the deep. Some unscrupulous captains actually lengthened the passage in order to make more money off the unfortunate passengers.

We know not what kind of a man was Captain Hill, nor how speedy and comfortable his boat; but on September 18,  $1727^5$ , the

port of Philadelphia, then the chief city of America. was reached. Notwithstanding the fact that they had been earnestly invited by Queen Anne's book and Penn's representations to come to this very city, they met with a very frigid reception when they landed. This was owing to the feeling of alarm that had arisen in the minds of the Pennsylvania authorities over the great influx of Germans into the State, which caused Governor Keith to remark to his council:

"That great numbers of foreigners from Germany, strangers to our language and constitution, having been lately imported into this Province, daily dispersed themselves immediately after landing, without producing certificates from whence they came or what they are, and, as they seemed to have first landed in Britain, and afterwards to have left without any license from government, or as far as they know, so, in the same manner, they behaved here, without making the least application to him or any of the magistrates. That, as this practice might be of very dangerous consequence, since, by the same method, any number of foreigners from any nation whatever, enemies as well as friends, might throw themselves upon us."<sup>6</sup>

Another timid one put it thus:

"Whose numbers from Germany at this rate, would soon produce a German colony here, and perhaps such a one as Britain once received from Saxony in the fifth century."<sup>7</sup>

Moved by these fears, the Council decided to require from all immigrants their signature to the following

## DECLARATION.

"We subscribers, natives and late inhabitants of the Palatinate upon the Rhine and places adjacent, having transported ourselves and families into this Province of Pennsylvania, a colony subject to the crown of Great Britain, in hopes and expectation of finding a retreat and peaceable settlement therein, do solemnly promise and engage, that we will be faithful and bear true allegiance to his present Majesty King George the Second, and his successors, kings of Great Britain, and will be faithful to the proprietor of this

Province; and that we will demean ourselves peaceably to all of his said majesty's subjects, and strictly observe and conform to the laws of England and of this Province, to the utmost of our power and the best of our understanding."

It was this action on the part of the authorities that preserved for future generations the list of over 30.000 immigrants from Europe to Pennsylvania, and makes it possible for their descendants today to find when their ancestors landed, and helps to trace out their family connections in the Old World. On September 21, 1727, this, the first body required to subscribe to the above Declaration, did so, the subscribers being confined to males over sixteen, and were then formally allowed to seek homes in the wide province before them.

The writer has been unable to discover just where Tobias Frey went after he had safely passed the fearsome authorities. There were doubtless Freys at that time in and around Germantown, and further back in Montgomery, Bucks and Berks counties. He has heard of a statement made by some of Tobias' descendants that they came from Berks County; but he found no records to verify it. The biographer of Heinrich Frey was unable to find among his records any mention of the names Tobias or Gottfried. It is not at all improbable that, with plenty of time on their hands, and with the approach of winter making travel difficult, that the winter of 1727 may have been spent by Tobias with the people of the same nationality, if not of the same name, in or near Berks County.

## Tobias' Settlement.

At this time the tide of travel, especially of the German immigrants, was principally through the Chester valley and the Gap into the Pequa valley, to Strasburg. Tobias may have been attracted to the Swiss and German settlement at Pequa, and spent some years there. But with the best land already largely taken up by the earlier settlers, and the virgin hills and valleys of what is now York county in sight across the Susquehanna, to be had for the

taking, it is not strange that he should soon find his way across the river into the Promised Land.

Just when he so crossed is not known;<sup>8</sup> but he was one of the settlers who, believing the Susquehanna to be the line, in 1732-34, took grants from the Governor of Maryland for their land, which they received free of taxes.<sup>9</sup>

Affairs, however, did not turn out as happily for them as they had been led to expect, as appears by the following petition presented by them to the President and Council of the Province of Pennsylvania.<sup>10</sup>

The petition of Most of the Inhabitants on the west side of Susquehanna River, Opposite to Hempfield, in the County of Lancaster, Humbly Sheweth,

That your petitioners, two or three years past (being many of us then newly arrived in America), & altogether Strangers to the Boundaries of the two Provinces of Pennsylvania & Marvland, were, by many plausible pretences and fair promises, persuaded to settle under the Government of the Latter, Supposing from what we were told that these Lands were within that Province, and that the River Susquehannah was the Division; But, after we were seated, finding the usage we received was very different from that to the rest of the Government, and what small substance we had was often made a prey to some Persons Impowered by them; And, tho' we Often made known our Cause of Complaint, could have no Redress, Nor the Promises which had been first made us, in the Least Regarded; Being also lately told by some in Power there, that we were worse than Negroes, for that we had no Master, nor were under the protection of any Laws, and since Informed by them that the River Susquehanna Could not be the bounds, as we had at first been told, but that an East and West Line could Divide the Provinces: and also observing that the People on the East Side of the said River, Inhabitants of Pennsylvania, who live much more to the Southward than we do. Enjoy'd their Possessions peaceably,



without any Disturbance or Claim from the Province of Maryland; Wee, from these Reasons, Concluded we had been Imposed upon, & Deluded to Answer some purposes of the Government of Maryland, which are not Justifiable, and might in the End tend to Our Ruin, and that we were not Settled within the true and Real Bounds of that Province, as we had been made to Believe; And from a Sense thereof, and of the wrong we were doing to the Proprietors of Pennsylvania, in living on their Lands (as we now conceive we are) without paying Obedience to the Laws of your Government, Unanimously Resolved to Return to our Duty. Your Humble Petitioners therefore pray you would Impute our Late Errours to Our want of Better Information, and would be pleased to receive us under the Protection of your Laws and Government, To which, for the future, we promise all faithful Obedience & Submission.

This petition was signed by forty-eight Germans, among whom we find the names of Tobias Fry (as the English translator wrote it). Martin Fry. and Tobias' fellow-Weilerite. Casper Springler (Spangler), showing that Tobias and Casper were still closely associated, and that the common name, if not a closer tie, bound together the two Freys.


Naturally, the Maryland authorities were displeased at this renunciation of allegiance by their former settlers, and steps were taken to disposses them of their newly-formed homes. This was just as logically resisted both by the settlers and by the Pennsylvania government, and the conflict is known as "Cresap's War," in the course of which some of the Germans were imprisoned by the Maryland authorities, and all of them suffered anxiety and hardships. In the end, the British government sustained the contention of Pennsylvania, and the present York County continued a part of that Province.

By this happy solution of the dispute. Tobias Frey remained the owner of 450 acres of land, which he, in his deed to Baltzer Spangler, describes as having received a patent for from the Penns October 30, 1736. A search at Harrisburg for the record of this patent revealed nothing. This land was located in the then town-

ship of Hellam, probably along both sides of the road to Stevenson's Ferry, now Prospect street and Mount Rose avenue, southeast of the City of York, some of it being in the present city limits. Less than two years before his death he sold 250 acres of it to Baltzer Spangler for thirty pounds (about \$150).

## TOBIAS' DEATH.

Because Tobias Frey had a tract of land near York it does not necessarily follow that he lived and died there. One of the oldest settlements in York county is in Windsor township, practically opposite the town of Pequa. in Lancaster county, and is known as Freysville. The name bears the best of evidence as to the identity of the early settlers, and the assessments and church records show Freys in this place at least as early as 1748.

In the cemetery of the old Lutheran and Dutch Presbyterian church of that village, in ground given for burying and church purposes by Conrad Frey, undoubtedly the son of Tobias, appear five time worn slabs of slate, marking the resting place of as many bodies, on which are barely discernible the following inscriptions:

## 1748 Elizabeth Frey; 1748 M C F : 1748 A N F: 1748 T O F; 1748 Migel Frei.

And near by this: Anna M. Frei 1748.

Did some epidemic strike all these Freys and wipe out perhaps the entire family, or was that the date of the erection of the stones marking the graves of those who had died at different times? The date would correspond with the year of Tobias' death, and his children may have erected these simple slabs to mark the graves without regard to the dates of death. The writer has often thought that the Anna M. Frey there buried might be the ancestress of all those detailed in this book, the orthography being the English attempt to spell the German name as it was pronounced.<sup>11</sup> As the oldest son (Conrad) resided at Freysville what would be more natural than to bury the father by the side of the wife of his younger days. The others may have been children of Tobias or

of his son Conrad. It is more pleasant to believe that this country "God's Acre" contains the remains of our pioneer ancestors than that their bones should have become scattered and lost under the progress of civilization which too often violates the grave when ground is wanted for modern improvements.

Tobias Frey died in the early part of 1748. This is presumed from the fact that Godfrey Frey took out letters of administration on his estate on June 15, 1748. The inventory filed set forth a small amount of personal property, and then states that "by agreement of the heirs the improvements shall be for the use of the widow Barbara." No record of this agreement could be found; nor is there any record of any disposition of the real estate after the death of the widow. Neither is there any account filed by Gottfried of his trust, so that the writer was unable to find the names of Tobias' children, being uncertain even of Gottfried's sonship until the discovery of the Hilsbach records.<sup>12</sup>

Of Tobias personally we know nothing save the above meager facts. That he was a man of enterprise is evidenced by his emigration from the land of his nativity to a far-off and unknown country. That he was fearless is shown by his refusing to remain in the settled regions around Philadelphia or Pequa: but entering on the lonely and thinly populated country across the Susquehanna, he remained there notwithstanding the oppressions of the Maryland authorities and the ravages of Cresap. He gave his children the opportunity to carve for themselves homes in a free land, with equal opportunities for all men and privileges for none. His grave may be unknown and unmarked: but his memory will live in the hearts of those of his blood who owe to him their existence in this Land of Promise.

## Bis Life and Death.

T was amid such struggles against the wilderness, wild beasts and men of Cresap's stamp, as just depicted, that young Gottfried grew to man's estate. The hardships of the voyage, the journey to Pequa, the clearing of the forests and the tilling of virgin soil, together with the constant alarms during the Cresap imbroglio and the Indian raids on the frontier, all tended to harden the muscle and the resolution of the emigrant lad, and wrought out the character which made him a man of affairs in those days of the pioneers, and earned for him the respect and esteem of his neighbors and acquaintances.

Whether, in those days when young men were taught trades, and when even girls were apprenticed to learn the mysteries of housekeeping, Gottfried was taught a trade, we do not know. Outside the fact of his birth nothing further is known until December 8, 1739, when he appears as one of the bondsmen for Mandlin Frey, who was the widow and administratrix of Martin Frey, as appears from the Lancaster county records. This indicates that he must have been the owner of some real estate, although the validity of a minor's bond may well be questioned. Then, as previously stated, comes the important fact of marriage on July 31, 1742, to Maria Margaretha Linn.

On September 26, 1737, there arrived at Philadelphia the ship Saint Andrew Galley, having on board 450 Palatines. One of this number was Peter Lin; there also appear other names familiar in York county history, such as Yost, Boeckel, Koch and Crone. Doubtless Margaretha was a daughter of this Peter Linn, and as in those days women were in demand, it was only a few years until she assumed her rightful place in life as wife and mother. It is a source of much regret to the writer that there is not in existence any portrait or even description of either of his greatgreat-grandparents; but they evidently were people of sterling virtues.

As before stated. Gottfried administered his father's estate in 1749; in 1753 and 1755 he served as a grand juror; in 1755 he was guardian of Martin Frey, one of the two children of the Martin Frey who was one of the Germans who revolted against Maryland rule; in 1750 was one of the guardians of Joseph Boyer's children; in 1771 was guardian of Peter Weverly: in 1773 he and his son Godfrey were Executors of Philip Peters' estate; and at various times he was appointed to positions of trust and responsibility, showing his reputation among his neighbors. Possibly the last public office he held was that of tax collector of York township in 1779.

### HIS REAL ESTATE.

On October 19, 1762, he received a patent for the following land, upon which he had doubtless settled some years before:<sup>1</sup>

"Beginning at a marked white oak by the road leading from York to Stevenson's Ferry, thence by lands of Baltzer Spangler North 59 degrees East 84 perches to a marked white oak; thence by lands of Jacob Heestand North 88 perches to a marked Hickory, and North 26 degrees West 180 perches to a marked black oak; thence by lands of Adam Deel and Michael Hain's heirs South 64 degrees West 364 perches to a black oak fallen; thence by lands of Martin Frey South 24 perches to a marked hickory and South 13½ degrees East 73 perches to a white oak fallen by the said road; thence extending the same East 231 perches to the place of beginning, containing 297 acres and containing the usual allowance of 6 acres per cent. for roads and highways."

Consideration 109 pounds and 5 shillings.

"Three full and clear fifths of all Royal Mines free from all deductions and reprisals for digging and refining the same, and also one-fifth part of the ore of all other mines delivered at the pit's mouth only excepted and hereby reserved, and also free right and liberty for the said Godfrey Frey, his heirs and assigns to hawk and hunt fish and fowl in and upon the hereby granted land and premises or upon any part thereof."

"To be holden of us, our heirs and successors, Proprietaries of Pennsylvania, as of our Manor, &c., in the County of York aforesaid, in free and common socage by fealty only in lieu of all other service, yielding and paying therefore yearly unto us, our heirs and successors at the town of York in said County at or upon the first day of March in every year from the first day of March last, one halfpenny sterling for every acre of the same, or value thereof in our current money, as the exchange shall be between our said Province and the City of London, to such person or persons as shall

from time to time be appointed to receive the same. And in case of nonpayment thereof within ninety days next after the same shall become due that then it shall and may be lawful for us, our heirs and successors or their Receiver or Receivers into and upon the hereby granted land and premises to re-enter and the same to hold and possess until the Quit Rent and all arrears thereof, together with the damages accruing by reason of such nonpayment and Re-entry be fully paid and discharged."

"With all mines, Minerals, Quarries, Meadows, Marshes, Savannahs, Swamps, Crippen, Woods, Underwoods, Timber and Trees, Ways, Waters, Water Courses, Liberties, Profits, Commodities, Advantages, Hereditaments and Appurtenances thereunto belonging, or in any wise appertaining and lying within the bounds and Limits aforesaid."

This tract extended from the present East Market street south to the present Prospect street, and from Brillinger's Lane (Harrison street) to the old borough line. See accompanying map. Judging from Gottfried's will, it was largely woodland, as some of it was still covered with timber at the time of his death. How slow, toilsome and unremunerative was the work of clearing it may be imagined from the fact that in 1769 the assessment shows that he had but seven acres in grain, and owned only two horses, three cows and six sheep.

As this portion of this volume was going to press, the writer conceived the idea that the absence of any evidence as to what became of the balance of Tobias Frey's land may be accounted for on the theory that Gottfried took it up. Though Tobias, in the deed to Baltzer Spangler described it as being patented, no record of the patent can be found in the office at Harrisburg. Discovering this defect, perhaps only after the death of the widow, when attempts may have been made to sell the land. Gottfried took steps to have that portion of the tract remaining unsold after the conveyance to Spangler, and which lay north of the road to Stevenson's Ferry, patented, adding to the 200 acres enough to round out the nearly 300 acres for which he received a patent. The land so patented adjoined on the West land of Martin Frey, the second, doubtless inherited from the first Martin Frey, the friend of Tobias above referred to. What more natural than that they should have selected adjoining tracts?

Confirmatory also of this theory is the further fact that though Baltzer Spangler had bought 250 acres which Tobias Frey

described as having received a patent for, when the former purchased some adjoining tracts he took out, in 1763, a patent for 450 acres. Why a new patent if the first was valid: and observe how close the date to that when Gottfried discovered the necessity of procuring a patent.

This explains why there is no evidence of any sale of Tobias' real estate, and also shows what Gottfried was doing in the interval between his marriage and 1762; doubtless working on his father's tract during the latter's lifetime, continuing working on it for the benefit of the widow, and after her death acquiring the same by agreement with the heirs and perfecting of the title.

Gottfried seems to have been the originator of the real estate business in the vicinity of York. As early as 1763 he laid out all of his ground fronting on Market (then High) street, into building lots. These lots began at a point nearly opposite the present Broad street, and extended to the present Harrison street, a distance of over 4,800 feet, along the then Great Road to Wright's Ferry, now East Market street, and running in depth Southwardly to Low (now King) street. There appear to have been 74 of these lots, with a frontage of 65 feet each, of which some were unsold at the time of Gottfried's death. All of them were sold subject to the payment of ground rents, to Gottfried or his heirs, a common thing at that time, when all land paid an annual ground rent to the Penns.

The first lot sold, apparently, was No. 12, to Mathias Sitler, on October 1, 1763, for a ground rent of 30 shillings, and which later was sold to Andrew Nebinger;<sup>2</sup> in 1765 lot No. 10 was sold to Joseph Updegraph,<sup>3</sup> and according to the description in the deed Lot No. 9 then belonged to Baltzer Zurnewalt, and No. 11 to Gottlieb Ziegle.

after he had secured a patent for his land and was secure against dispossession, he erected a stone house on the Great Road, which he occupied to the time of his death, and gave to his wife for use during her life, and after her death to his son Henry in fee. This house stood on a double terrace some distance back from the street, in a generous sized lot with an ample frontage on Market street, adjoining an alley on the East, and extending back to Low (now King) street. Through the courtesy of 16321 William Frey, who spent some of his boyhood years in the house with his grandfather 163, the writer is able to present to his readers a picture of the old homestead.

The house was a great one for its time, and had varied fortunes. After the death of Gottfried's widow it became the property of Henry Frey; Henry and his wife Susanna sold it to Peter Schwartz on January 14, 1790; Peter conveyed it to Jacob Kauffelt on April 25, 1796; and Kauffelt executed a deed therefor to Rev. Robert Cathcart on May 21, 1798.<sup>4</sup> Rev. Cathcart was pastor of the First Presbyterian church, and the house remained in his possession for 43 years, when he sold it to Thomas Hambly, a member of the York County Bar.<sup>5</sup>

Hambly received from Cathcart a large plot of ground fronting on Market street and extending to Low street. He laid out the western portion into building lots of 25 feet front, and sold at least two of them to Henry Kauffelt,<sup>6</sup> then on December 1, 1846, he sold 71 feet more to Kauffelt;<sup>7</sup> and on August 21, 1852, Sheriff George Albright sold the eastern portion, including the historic house, to Jacob Laumaster.<sup>8</sup> On July 23, 1853, Laumaster conveyed the plot to Henry Kauffelt.<sup>9</sup>

About the time of the Civil War it fell into ruins, being the scene of several political riots. The writer can well remember the feeling of awe with which he regarded its vaulted cellars, given

over to vermin. Finally the site, reduced to 44 feet front and 135 feet deep, was purchased by Charles H. Fry, and by him sold to John Miller on March 31, 1874.<sup>10</sup> and today there are erected on it two modern dwelling houses, the old well which once furnished sparkling water to Gottfried and his numerous family having fallen to the most ignoble use. The property is known as Nos. 606 and 608 East Market street. In a house erected on the highest point of the lot, about midway between High and Low streets, and facing on the original roadway east of the lot, lives 167663 Charles Blauser.

## HIS RELIGION.

Having been brought up by Lutheran parents. the writer took it for granted that his ancestors were Lutherans "from away back," and was very much surprised indeed to learn that Gottfried, though married by a Lutheran pastor, and having his older children baptized by the Lutheran pastors, was a charter member of Zion's Reformed church, on May 24, 1763, and doubtless died in that faith, as his later children were baptized by the Reformed pastors. From the Hilsbach records it appears that his forefathers were members of the Evangelical Protestant (the State name for the Lutheran) Church; but it is just possible that Kaspar, coming from Switzerland, was brought up in the Calvanistic faith. Whether Gottfried knew this, and there remained in him an inborn loyalty to the Reformed church, or whether he had some disagreement with the Lutheran pastor and joined the Reformed persuasion in the hopes of finding a more congenial spiritual adviser, is not known. In those days, to many people, the only difference between the two denominations was that the one said "Fauder unser," and the other "Unser Fauder," and so there was no great violence to former customs when the religious coat was changed. Doubtless he served his Maker just as conscientiously and faithfully in the one church as in the other. So far as the descendants are concerned it can

make no difference, since at this time there are those of his blood in probably every Christian cult of the day.

#### WAR RECORD.

Whether Gottfried himself took any part in the War of the Revolution, is uncertain. The records show that Godfrey Frey was Captain of a militia company from 1777 to 1783;<sup>11</sup> one of the militia who arrested British prisoners and brought them to the stockade; and Captain of second Company, 3d Battalion in 1782<sup>18</sup> but the dates 1782 and 1783, being after his death, make it more than probable that this refers to his son Godfrey. Being fifty-three years old at the outbreak of the Revolution, it is likely that he took no active part; but that in spirit and enthusiasm he was on the side of liberty can justly be inferred from the fact that the three of his sons able to bear arms were in more or less active service. The boy who knew of the oppressions of monarchial rule in the Palatinate was not likely to be slow in grasping at independence in Pennsylvania.

#### HIS LAST DAYS.

It was undoubtedly the existence or threatened approach of the illness that proved to be his last, that moved Gottfried, on the 8th day of February, 1782, to make the following

#### WILL:

#### In the Name of God Amen.

WHEREAS I lived to be old and also sick, yet in good understanding and faculties of mind therefore I call to mind my end and order as follows: My soul I commend to my Creator & Redeemer and my body to the earth in sure hopes that at the great Judgement-Day the same will be raised and united again with the soul. Therefore my desire is to be buried in an honest and Christian manner.

Concerning my worldly estate which I have acquired through the blessing of God I make the order and division in the following manner.

1-All my just debts and funeral expences shall be justly paid.

2—I bequeath unto my Wedded House-Wife Margaret her seat and Dwelling in my Mansion as long as she liveth. Further all the Grain in the Barn and on the loft. Further the Grain which is sown out for the ensuing year. Further all the meat which I had slaughtered for the use of the Family. Further the Hemp and Flax. Further her Bed with what belongs thereto. The Cash which I now have my Executors shall take into their

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Hands; But if perhaps my beloved House Wife shall for her or the 3 youngest children have need for some thereof: That, her and them, be given thereof. Further, Because I do give and bequeath unto each of my sons 50 Acres of Land, of my Plantation, Then my 2 youngest Sons Samuel and Henrich will be to have 100 Acres together: which my beloved House-Wife Margaret with them 2 Sons shall manure and (of the Produce thereof) thereof, live as long as they shall be with her; But when One or both of them shall go to learn Trades Then shall my beloved House Wife have the land Tilled by laborers, or for the half, by others, in Order that she may have her Maintenance and livelyhood. And when those 2 Children, Samuel and Henry shall arrive to their Years, to wit, to 21 years And will posses the land themselves That then my will is that they shall keep and provide for the Mother with all that she shall be in need of as long as she liveth and remains a Widow. Further I make over all the Rent of the Lots which I have laid out off my Land, after her Death the Rent to revert to Samuel and Henrich only. Further do I bequeath to her the Cloaths press. Further the third part of all the Kitchen Furniture whereof she has the choice to take what she will. What she has and what I have bequeathed to her, shall after her decease, all fall to the Share of Samuel and Henry only. Further I give and bequeath her a Cow, she has her choice. Further I give and bequeath to her also the sheep to enable her to Cloath her and the 3 youngest Children. My Children shall all Inherit and share alike as well of the Personal Estate that shall be sold as also what the Mother shall leave except what is, after her decease, expressly mentioned to the 2 Sons Samuel and Henrich or which was mentioned.

3—To my Eldest Son Gottfried I give and devise the 50 Acres of Land whereon he now dwells To him his Heirs and Posterity for Ever To do therewith what he will. He shall have nothing (especially, or) aforehand. For all my Children shall share equal, But he shall after my Decease Pay £100 Money of Pennsylvania to my Daughter Juliana & her Heirs. he shall have four years Time to pay the same every year £25. The first £25 within a Quarter of a Year after my Decease and so on every year until the £100 shall pe paid. Further of the Debt which he my son Gotfried owes to me £100 shall be abated and bestowed to him.

4—To my Son George I also give and devise 50 Acres of Land next to that which his Brother Gotfried has and Possesses To him his Heirs and Posterity also to do with the same what he will; But he shall also give and pay  $\pounds$  100 to my Daughter Elisabeth He also has 4 years time to pay the same, one Quarter of a year after my decease  $\pounds$  25, the following year also as much and so on till the  $\pounds$  100 be paid.

5—To my Son Adam I give and devise also 50 Acres of Land To him his Heirs and Posterity, also to do therewith how and what he will. NB. I have allotted and shewn each of them their 50 Acres where each of them shall have and take the same. He shall also give and pay £100 to my Daughter Elisabeth in the same Time and in the same sums as the former viz, every Year £25. Further I give and bequeath to him the Young Mare for his own.

6—To my Son Samuel I give and devise also 50 Acres of land To inherit and to have for his own To do therewith what he will. Further the House on the Street near mine where I live for Ever. Further one of my Sorrel Horses.

7-To my Son Henry I give and devise also 50 Acres of Land to inherit and have for his own, To do therewith what he will. NB. Those my 2 Sons Samuel and Henry neither can or dare Sell their land as long as their Mother liveth because they must maintain her out of the land. Further I give and devise to him the Stone House wherein I live for Ever besides all the Buildings thereto; But he must pay his Brother Samuel  $\pounds 50....$  2 Years next after he shall have arrived 21 Years. I also give him one of my Sorrel Horses. Further do I give to Samuel and Henrich Jointly the Waggon and Plough as also the Horse Geers for the 2 Horses and also all what belongs to the Waggon and Plough.

8—It is my will That Whereas my Son Adam hath had 6 yards Woolen cloth for a suit of Cloaths Therefore there shall be as much allowed to my sons Gotfried and George to be deducted out of the Debts which they owe me as the said 6 yards of Woolen Cloth is worth. My Son Adam shall live in the House which I gave to my Son Samuel untill he shall be 21 years old.

9-Whereas my Daughter Juliana at the Time she was Married received a Marriage Portion Therefore it is my Will that my Daughter Elisabeth shall have equal the same Wherefore I bequeath to her Forty pounds in Money; which shall be given into the Hands of my Wedded House-Wife Margaret and which shall be taken out of the Sales of the Personal Estate which after my Decease shall be sold. Of which my House-Wife shall procure for my Daughter Elisabeth that which she shall be in need of for her Marriage Portion. Further I do bequeath unto her 1 Cow which my House-Wife shall have in use as long as Elisabeth shall be with her.

10—It is my Will that my Sons who have Land shall keep good Middle Fences that no Damage may be done by Cattle To avoid Strife and Quarrels. Further that every one shall early in the Spring clean his part of the Water course and put in Fence so that each one may Water his share. Further It is my Will that they shall make Roads and allow each other, so that each may Hawl and go on his Land, as well Meadow as Upland.

11—Finally I order and appoint my two Friends, namely Mr. John Hay and Mr. John Welsch for Executors of this my last Will and Testament And impower them to make and give out of my Deed, Deeds to each of my Sons whom I have in this my last Will given Land, to wit, to each one for fifty Acres of Land. I recall and make Void all other Wills and Testaments and declare and confirm this for my, only. Right and last One.

Done York. d. 8. Febr. One thousand seven hundred and eighty two.

Signed, Sealed, plainly expressed and declared in  $\ensuremath{\mathsf{Presence}}$  of

CONRAD KISSINGER JOHANNES KOFFER

This will was written in German, and both it and the English translation, made by Jacob Billmeyer, are on file in the Register's office, at York. A facsimile of Gottfried's signature appears on page 20. To what extent, if any, he used the English language, is unknown. In his day all the services in the Lutheran and Reformed churches were in German, and the church records were in that tongue. So tenacious is the German blood that today nearly all his descendants of the fifth generation, including the writer, are able to speak, if not the pure German, the Pennsylvania Dutch dialect.

A little more than three months after the execution of the will, he breathed his last. The exact day of his death is not known, as in those days proofs of death were not recorded in the Register's office. In some way his will had become mislaid, and after a little time lost in search of it, letters of administration were taken out by John Hay and John Welsch on his estate. Possibly it was known to the family that these two gentlemen had been designated as Executors, and hence it was agreed that they should administer upon the estate. However, a month later the will was found, and on June 14 duly probated.

On September 13, 1787, the Executors filed their account, showing, among other matters, that £1794 of Continental and Commonwealth money had depreciated to £0 and 138. Patriotism was costly in those days. The account also showed the payment to Elizabeth's mother of the forty pounds set aside as her marriage portion. Their official acts closed with the conveyance to Henry of the 50 acres devised to him by his father.<sup>18</sup>

### HIS GRAVE.

Gottfried Frey was doubtless buried in Zion Reformed church yard, or perhaps in the Reformed burying ground on the West side of South Duke street, above Princess; but both of these places of sepultre have long since disappeared. It is alleged that those buried therein, and unclaimed at the time of the abandonment of the grave yard, have been buried in Prospect Hill cemetery: but there is no stone to mark Gottfried's resting place, if indeed there can be said to be such a spot. Like his fellow Weilerite, his grave is unmarked and unknown, and it is safe to say that none of his descendants even knew his name until this volume was begun. Even the founding of Freystown has been attributed by the York County historians to other Freys, and the only publication in which the writer has seen the origin of the town correctly stated before the publication of this work is in Rowe's Atlas of York, a work of very limited circulation.

Nothing can be said of his features or form. The writer had a German say to him that the finest men and handsomest ladies in all Germany came from Baden; but whether Gottfried came up to this standard is unknown. From what tradition says of his sons



they were men of medium or even short stature, brown-haired and dark-eyed. The positions of trust that he filled from time to time indicate that he was esteemed by his neighbors and acquaintances, and worthy of confidence. In short, he was the kind of a man who goes through life without blazing a fiery trail; but doing his work as it comes to him, loving his God and serving his fellowman. It has been a labor of love to make this effort to preserve his name and memory for his many descendants.

Gottfried's widow was still living on July 27, 1789, since she joined with Henry in conveying Lot No. 55 to 18 Adam Frey,<sup>14</sup> and her name appears on the assessment books during the years from 1782 to 1789; but she died between August 25, 1796, the date of the conveyance by Schwartz to Kauffelt of the stone house, in which her dower is reserved,<sup>15</sup> and May 21, 1798, when Kauffelt conveyed the same property to Cathcart, without mentioning any dower.<sup>16</sup> She was probably buried besides her husband, and the same carelessness on the part of the children or grandchildren that allowed his grave to be lost affected her last resting place.

### Ibis Children.

HOSE were the days when large families were not only the rule, but the desire. Where nearly everybody farmed, children were a help, not a burden, from the time they could help themselves. The land was plenty, and labor scarce; so the man blessed with children, who, thrifty and industrious himself, saw to it that the children were industrious so long as they were under the paternal roof, was generally able to leave to each of them a farm wherewith to begin life. Gottfried Frey's family consisted of the following children:

> Gottfried, b. January 12, 1744. Maria Catherine, b. July 22, 1745. Anna Maria, b. November 11, 1746. Bartel, b. August 20, 1748. Julianna Barbara, b. October 23, 1750. John George, b. August 13, 1751. Conrad, b. March 20, 1754. Joseph, b. January 26, 1756. Adam, b. August 14, 1760. Maria Elizabeth, b. November 15, 1763. Samuel, b. 1765. Heinrich, b. 1767.

The first nine of these were baptized in the Lutheran faith, and the dates of their birth are taken from the records of Christ Church. The baptism of Maria Elizabeth is taken from the records of Zion Reformed Church, while the dates of Samuel's and Henry's birth are calculated from the time when Gottfried's executors executed to them deeds for the land devised to them by their father.


#### HIS CHILDREN.

It will be noticed that three of Gottfried's daughters were named Maria, the German form of Mary. This was not at all unusual in those days when nearly all girls had "Mary" as part of their name, and all boys were "Hans" or "John."

These children did not all reach maturity. This is inferred from the fact that his will only mentions seven of them, and in those days it was deemed necessary to at least mention a child in a will to bar it from its share under the intestate laws. In his will he expressly mentions the desire that his children shall all inherit share and share alike, something that would not have occurred if there were any but those mentioned in the will. The children surviving him were:

> Gottfried (hereafter called Godfrey). Julianna Barbara. John George (hereafter called George). Adam. Maria Elizabeth (hereafter called Elizabeth). Samuel. Henry.

From the wording of the will it is evident that all of his children. excepting possibly Julianna. lived with or near him at the time of his death. It was with the idea of having them near, and having them remain in the vicinity to comfort his widow, that he in a measure divided his land among them prior to his death. (See map for location of the plots). How his wishes were carried out after his decease the sequel will show.

### Collateral Relations.

OUBTLESS there are many persons in York County and throughout the State who are also descendants of Gottfried Frey's father, as well as those recorded in these pages. The Hilsbach records show that at least one brother and one sister accompanied Gottfried to the New World, and as Tobias was only 43 years old when he landed in America, and married a new wife some time after his arrival on these shores, it is more than probable that there were more children than the three of European birth.

There was a Frederick Frey. of Windsor, who had a son Philip born March 23, 1753; Frederick might have been a son of Tobias.

There was a John George Frey who had a son John Martin born November 3, 1763. He also might have been a son of Tobias, and the man after whom Gottfried named his John George. John Martin is a replica of Tobias' oldest brother. Hans Martin.


There was a baptism at Blymeyer's church, on November 7, 1769, of Julianna Frey, daughter of Bernhard and Catharine Frey, at which the witnesses were Gottfried, Godfrey and Julianna Frey.

John Frey and his wife Magdalena had their son John baptized on February 21, 1762, and the witnesses were Gottfried and Margaret Frey. Witnesses in those days were more than mere acquaintances.

There was a Samuel Frey who appears in Adams County in connection with some Linns. How natural that a brother of Gottfried's should be found with his wife's relatives, and how far this goes to explain Gottfried's act in naming one of his sons Samuel. On May 26, 1769, there appears on the records of Zion's Reformed Church the marriage of Jacob Giesey and Eva Catharina Frey. Adam Geesey, of York, a descendant of Jacob Giesey, says that he was told by his father that there existed a relationship between their family and 1679 Reuben Frey. The writer can conceive of no way in which such a relationship could exist save in the fact that Eva Catharina was a sister or half sister (born probably in 1747) of Gottfried Frey.


Of the descendants of the known sister of Gottfried, Anna Maria, the writer knows nothing. Conrad had at least two children: John Peter, born November 28, 1750, who it is believed is the progenitor of some Adams County Freys. of whom two, Samuel F. and Harry, are at present living in York; and Conrad, born August 17, 1752, and living in Windsor township in 1784.

These facts and suppositions are given here for the benefit of any one who may feel inclined to take up the work of discovering the other descendants of Tobias, the Emigrant, and who, tracing his connection thereto, can claim to be a descendant of the man who came out of Urdorf.

# 11. Godfrey Frey.

## His Story.

ODFREY FREY'S name appears in his father's will as his oldest son. and from the records of Christ Church we find that he was born on January 12, 1744. The next record we find of him is that in November 25, 1767, he sold his locksmith establishment to Philip Casper Spangler.<sup>1</sup> References heretofore given indicate that he was Captain of the 2d Co., 3d Battalion Militia: and that he was one of the militia who apprehended British prisoners (deserters) and brought them to the stockade.<sup>2</sup> He acted in connection with his father as Executor of Philip Peters' Estate; and did the actual work while his father was Tax Collector. During these times he lived in York township (now the 12th Ward), doubtless on the north side of the present Prospect street, as is evidenced by the assessment books and by his father's will.

The death of his father opened a new era in Godfrey's life. The fifty acres devised to him were soon sold to George Lottman, as shown in the deed from Gottfried's Executors to George Frey, wherein one of the adjoiners is described as "lands formerly of Godfrey Frey. Jr., now of George Lottman."<sup>3</sup> Though assessed in 1782, in 1783 he has disappeared from the York township list. Where did he go?

#### HIS DEPARTURE FROM YORK TOWNSHIP.

In 1789 a Godfrey Frey appears on the assessment list of Cumberland township, now a part of Adams County, where a Samuel Frey, perhaps an uncle, was then living. The United

States Census for 1790 gives his name in Paradise township. York County, with three boys under 16 and three females in the family. Then, on March 26, 1795. Thomas Metzler, of Newberry township, in presenting a petition for an inquest of his father's estate, says that his mother "has since married Godfrey Frey.<sup>4</sup> In those days no widow was obliged to live long in her lonely state. The United States Census for 1800 places a Godfrey Frey in Dover township, the family consisting of one male over 45, one female over 45, and one girl under 10.

The first step, of course, was to look in the Register's office for any estate of Godfrey Frey; but his name was not to be found. Inquiry in the Adams County records proved equally futile. No search was made in Bedford County, probably because such matters are usually expensive, and also because the writer was so busy with two other sons of Gottfried that he gave little thought of Godfrey. So the question of finding any of his descendants was left in abeyance. Then occurred one of the strange coincidences that sometimes happen outside of story books and give color to the old saying that "Truth is stranger than fiction."

A young mining engineer in the Far West, probably in the leisure hours of evening, recalled some stories his grandmother had told him about an ancestor of hers who fought with Washington and who hailed from York, Pa., being the builder of the first Dutch Presbyterian church in that old town. Realizing that traditions become dimmed with age and finally entirely disappear, he thought he would do a little investigating for himself and find out how much of truth there was in the oft-told tale.

Knowing nobody in York, he addressed a letter to the Pastor of the Dutch Presbyterian Church of that city. The letter was received by the Pastor of the First Presbyterian Church of York, and by him turned over to the Librarian of the York County Historical Society, Mr. Geo. R. Prowell. Mr. Prowell, knowing the writer was engaged in the work of tracing the descendants of

Gottfried Frey, kindly handed the letter to him, and thus was started correspondence and personal visits which resulted in the discovery of the people whose names are recorded in this section.

#### RECONCILING TRADITION AND FACT.

To 11333 Mrs. Sarah Elizabeth Chaney, 11411 Mrs. Annie Virginia Waters and 11422 Mary Yeakle, the writer is indebted for what little information of Godfrey and his children he has been able to procure. Mrs. Chanev knew that her father was descended from Margaret Frey, and was able to give some information concerning the Koontz family. She also had heard of the tradition that Godfrev came from Freystown and was one of the builders of the Reformed church, which in early times was described as the Dutch Presbyterian church. There had also been told to her the story that Godfrey had fought with Washington, and one of her descendants referred to the fact that history told of a Colonel Fry who accompanied Washington to Fort Duquesne. Miss Yeakle modified this tradition by saying that it was not Godfrey, the father of Sarah Frey, but one of his brothers, who was the military man.

The story about the trip to Fort Duquesne, if true, would be fatal to the 11 theory, since 11 was only seven years old when Washington made the attempted journey to Fort Duquesne; but the name of the Colonel Fry who was to have charge of the expedition which never reached the fort was Joshua Fry, of Virginia, described by history as "an English gentleman of worth and education,"<sup>5</sup> a man old enough to have acquired a reputation, and answering Washington's own request that the command be given to an elder and more experienced soldier. It is hardly probable that Joshua had a brother who would have been a father as late as 1789, the date of the birth of one of Godfrey's children. Besides, Joshua is described as an "English" gentleman, whereas the father of Margaret and Sarah was of German speech.

Godfrey Frey, of York, fills the military tradition, as amended by the "brother" story, since 16 George Frey undoubtedly saw military service during the Revolutionary period: though not a trip to Fort Duquesne as Colonel commanding, and whether he personally saw or fought under Washington may well be doubted. Returning soldiers often garnish their tales for the benefit of admiring nephews and nieces, and these stories lose nothing by repetition and years, and so the actual war experiences of George Frey, be they much or little, may well have given rise to great stories of sacrifice and heroism.

After the foregoing paragraph was in type the writer was fortunate enough to have the opportunity to inspect a copy of the "Biography of Joshua Fry and Census of his Descendants," which is in the Congressional Library at Washington, D. C. The name Godfrey does not appear as a descendant of Joshua, and nothing seems to be known of his brothers. Hence, the connection of the Godfrey Frey, of Montgomery County, with the "fine old English gentleman" of Washington's time, is a myth.

The reference to the building of the first Reformed (or Dutch Presbyterian, as the Reformed churches were frequently called in those days) Church, is fulfilled by the appearance of the name of Godfrey Frey as one of the charter members of the Zion Reformed church, of York. This may have been either Godfrey or his father Gottfried, since both doubtless were much interested in the erection of the church of their faith.

The re-appearance of family names is always a sure indication of relationship. Godfrey Frey (of Montgomery County) had a daughter named Margaret, the name of 11's mother, and Margaret named her only sons Godfrey and George, the latter being the name of the younger brother of 11, who actually was a Revolutionary soldier and evidently the hero of the "soldier Uncle" stories.

Mrs. Waters was particularly strong on the tradition that Godfrey Frey had owned the land on which part of Freystown was built, and there was an interest in it for his descendants, as he had

never sold it. So strongly was this tradition impressed on the family that one of them asked the writer whether it was possible to recover any part of it at this time.

This, to the mind of the writer, is the most convincing proof of the identity of the Godfrey Frey of Montgomery County, with the 11 Godfrey Frey of York. We have seen that Godfrey Frey did own fifty acres of such land. There is no deed from him for any land on record, only the recital in a deed between other parties that the tract conveyed adjoined "lands formerly of Godfrey Frey, Jr., now of George Luttman." This was in the days of ground rents, and Godfrey may have thought he was selling his patrimony subject to the payment of such an annual rental, when he perhaps actually sold it outright. He evidently thought that legal proceedings would restore to him his property, a belief which with advancing years would become a settled conviction, to be told and retold to and by his descendants with the additions and exaggerations that always accompany tales of fortunes to come from past ancestors.

It is believed that all these circumstances, some slight in themselves and some of great weight, taken together, furnish irrefutable proof of the identity of the Godfrey Frey, of Montgomery County, as the oldest son of Gottfried Frey, the young emigrant. The common name and religion, the disappearance at one point and appearance at the other, the family names, the military brother, the church building, and, above all, the ownership of land in Freystown, far outweigh the tradition of connection with Joshua Fry, a tradition unsupported by any fact and flatly contradicted by time and the published biography of the man with whom connection was claimed. It is questionable whether many statements made in family histories of descent or connection with persons more than one hundred and fifty years ago are as firmly established by as competent and conclusive evidence as this assertion that the descendants of Godfrey Frey, of Montgomery County, Md., belong in a book of the descendants of Gottfried Frey, of York, Pa.

#### HIS CHILDREN.

From 11311 George Andrew Gilbert the writer learned that Godfrey Frey lived in Montgomery County. Md. The United States Census of that county for 1790 records Godfrey Fry in Montgomery County, Md., but mentions no township or district. In 1800, according to the same authority, he was the only male in the family, with one girl under 16, one under 26 and one female, doubtless his wife, over 45.

The Godfrey Frey of Paradise township, given in the census of 1790, and the Godfrey Frey of Dover township, given in the census of 1800, may have been identical. He may also be the same Godfrey who in 1804 had a daughter Catharine baptized in Zion's Reformed Church, and who married Thomas Metzler's widow.

On September 24, 1782, there was baptized, in Zion's Reformed Church, Salome, daughter of Gottfried and Margaret Frey. This could hardly have been a child of the first Gottfried, owing to his wife being nearly 60 years of age. It probably is the original form of Godfrey, and may refer to 11 Godfrey, or to the Godfrey of Paradise township. The fact that 11 Godfrey was then in York township has led us to count this Salome as one of his children.

In this connection may be mentioned the fact that Mrs. Waters has a faint recollection of the name Salome as belonging to the family. Her first impulse was that the girl known as "Sally" Frey, and who afterward married Charles A. Galezio, was really named Salome. This, however, is impossible, as the Salome baptized in York in 1782, as the daughter of Gottfried and Margaret, could not have been the Sarah Frey who was born in 1789. But it is highly probable that the name of one of her grandmothers' sisters was more or less frequently mentioned in Mrs. Waters' presence.

No other York County records of any children of this Godfrey Frey can be found. As above stated, the Census of 1800 gives him with one girl under 16, one under 26, and a female, doubtless his

wife, over 45. Mrs. Chaney and Mrs. Waters both have recollections (or rather, have traditions) of the names of four children, Mary, John, Margaret and Sarah, and Mrs. Waters said that according to what she had been told, there were quite a number of other children.

Both of these ladies are positive that Mary attained a great age, Mrs. Waters putting it at least 107, while Mrs. Chaney thought 111 was the correct figure. Mrs. Waters says that during the Civil War a message was received from Mary, who was then living in the West. and at that time she was about a hundred years old. According to this she must have been born about 1765, which fixes her status as the first child of Godfrey, since he was born in 1744.

Mary was twice married, first to a Mr. Porter, a man of means, who left her in comfortable circumstances. By him she had one child, a daughter named Elizabeth, who married a Mr. Lodge and moved to Ohio. The only additional fact known concerning Mrs. Lodge is that is was with her that Mary was living in 1865. Mary's second matrimonial adventure was not so fortunate, as her husband, a Mr. Heater, mismanaged both his affairs and her's, and finally carried her off to Kentucky, where she lived until after his death, when, as stated, she went to her daughter's.

Mrs. Waters is of the opinion that John was older than her grandmother, since his grandchildren were older than she. We have therefore treated him as the second of Godfrey's children, or rather as coming in somewhere in the fifteen years between Mary and Margaret. As no boy is mentioned as a member of Godfrey's family in 1800, it is likely that John was at that time the head of a family himself, and therefore was probably born sometime before 1778. This view is further borne out by the fact that this same Census of 1800 gives a J. Frye in Frederick County, between 26 and 45 years of age, with a wife under 26, and two boys and two girls, all under 10 years. The residence and children agree exactly with Mrs. Waters' recollection of the family.

#### GODFREY FREY.

According to her statement. John Frey lived about two miles from the present city of Frederick, on a good-sized farm, was married to a Miss Siars and had four children, William, Frederick, Mary and Elizabeth. Frederick went to Steubensville. Ohio, and of the others nothing is known save of Mary. She married a man named Brubaker, and had six children. Ann. Isabel. Sarah, William, Calvin and Isaac. Ann was married to William Witmore. At the time these pages were printed, nothing could be learned of any of the Brubakers.

Margaret, presumed to be born about 1780, is treated hereinafter as the third child, since any attempt to fix her number accurately is impossible, in the absence of any information concerning the possible issue between 1765 and 1774.

Between the presumed date of Margaret's birth and the known time of Sarah's advent comes at least Salome; perhaps others. As she evidently did not reach maturity (or both Mrs. Chaney and Mrs. Waters would have heard more definitely concerning her) she is not numbered in the subsequent record of Godfrey's children.

Possibly the "baby" of the family was Sallie, for at the time of her birth Godfrey was a man of 45, and there are no traditions of any children after her. She is hereinafter numbered as the fourth child.

Another circumstance corroborating the 11 theory is the fact that John Frey, son of Godfrey, of Montgomery, was a firm Presbyterian, and the Presbyterian Church, especially in those days, was simply the English speaking form of the Reformed Church. The faith of the charter member of the First Reformed Church at York was transmitted to the Presbyterian of Frederick County.

### CIRCUMSTANCES AND DEATH.

Nothing is known of Godfrey's financial circumstances. As before stated he was a locksmith by trade. since he sold his stock in 1765. He lived on his father's land some time before the latter's death, and in some way or other it got away from him. The assess-

ments of Montgomery county before 1800 are not in existence. The county records show no evidence of any conveyance of land to or from him, except a bill of sale for a small amount of personal property.

The date and place of his death are also unknown; though Mrs. Waters thinks he is buried somewhere near Washington. That this meagre sketch of him appears at all is due to the curiosity of the young mining engineer: that no more of him can be said is owing to the lack of any records or knowledge of where to search for any further information.

## 113 Margaret Frey.

T IS rather an inauspicious beginning of a book of the descendants of Gottfried Frey that is set forth in this first genealogical section. Not only was the finding of Godfrey himself purely a piece of good fortune, and not the result of any ingenuity or hard work on the part of the writer; but the names and number of the children of Godfrey are matters of doubt, and even after the children are located many of their descendants failed to furnish any information. This is deplorable; but the writer feels that he has done all that could be expected of him in the matter.

Margaret Frey has been placed as the third of Godfrey's children, because her second child was born in 1800, when she was probably at least 20 years old, thus fixing her birth before the year 1780.

Margaret married Jacob Koontz, who was a native of Amsterdam. Jacob was a blacksmith, but we do not know the day of his birth or death. They lived in or near Frederick, Md. Margaret's married life was comparatively short, as she died soon after giving birth to her second and third children, a pair of twins, in 1800. Her known descendants are:



ARAH ANN CATHARINE FREY, the fourth child of Godfrey, was born in Montgomery County, Md., May I, 1789. Somewhat to the surprise, if not annoyance, of her conservative German father, when she was but sixteen years old she married an Italian music teacher, Charles Antonio Cazemere Galezio, born at Turin, Italy, March 4, 1773. He was a highly educated man, having been fitted for the priesthood: but left Rome and came to America, where he secured a position of some sort in the Navy, serving under Commodore Decatur. He spoke seven languages, and acted as interpreter for some of the foreign Legations. Two years after marriage he was ordered on a naval cruise, and their first child was born at Sandy Springs. Montgomery County, Md., (presumably Godfrey's home) during the father's absence, and was three years old before she saw him. The other children were born at Frederick, Md., where, after a little over fifteen years of married life, Charles died, in 1821. His widow survived him until October 9, 1833. 



# The Married Daughter.

ULIANNA BARBARA FREY, the fifth child of Gottfried and Margaret, was born on the 23d day of October, 1750. Barbara was probably made a part of the girl's name in honor of her father's stepmother. Of her early life nothing is known; but it was doubtless that of a girl of that time, to assist in the household duties and to help in rearing the six children that came after her advent into the family. Those were the days of hard work, with little recreation; yet with all that Julianna found time to become acquainted with the young men of her neighborhood.

Immediately adjoining Gottfried Frey's farm on the East was the farm of Jacob Hiestand, whose oldest son, Abraham, found much pleasure in the society of his fair neighbor. The constant influx of emigrants made girls none too plenty, and so when Julianna arrived at a marriageable age Abraham made sure of the girl whom he had known since childhood, and of whose worth he felt perfectly assured. They were married by the pastor of Zion Reformed Church on September 14, 1771.

## VALUABLE ASSISTANCE.

The fact of Julianna's birth was found in the records of Christ Church, and her marriage was ascertained from a search of the Reformed Church records. Gottfried's will also mentions her marriage. A study of the Register's office gave the will of Jacob Hiestand and the name of Abraham as one of his sons: but the earliest obtainable assessment books of York County do not give an Abraham Hiestand. So, as in Godfrey's case, came the question, "Where did they go?" Further search revealed a will of an Abraham Hiestand, as far down as 1860, with a large amount of property, and a numerous family. The will itself, in its reference to children and grandchildren, indicated that the testator was somewhat advanced in years; but more conclusive than the references was the date of death, which showed that if this was the Abraham of Jacob he must have lived to be over 100 years old.

The writer for more than forty years has been well acquainted with John S. Hiestand, living a few miles East of York, and to him he repaired one evening for further light on the subject, not at all averse to the hope of finding that genial gentleman to be "in the freundschaft." But that idea was soon driven out of his mind when he was informed that the Abraham Hiestand of the will was not yet born in the year that Julianna married her Abraham.

However, the man who brought disappointment also carried good cheer. He told the writer that one W. H. H. Turner, of Hustead, O., had for over five years been hunting up the Hiestand family, and doubtless he could tell him something about Abraham Hiestand, if anybody could. So to Mr. Turner was the problem taken, and from him, and the people mentioned by him, was obtained what information is here given of Julianna's descendants. As in Godfrey's case, some answered cheerfully and tully, even volunteering information; others answered not at all. There was one particularly aggravating case, where one party demanded money as compensation for telling all she knew, which she assured the writer was a "lot;" but when a small sum was sent her she became as dumb as an oyster, keeping both the money and her "lot" of information. Thus is the work of compiling a family book made a thing of joy forever.

It seems that some time after their marriage there appeared in Shepherdstown, W. Va., Abraham Hiestand and Julianna Frey Hiestand. To this couple there were born at least two sons, John and Daniel. Daniel was not born until 1790, and it seems strange that in the twenty-eight years of married life there were not more

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
than two children. In fact, Mr. Turner has been told that there was at least one daughter, but no one seems able to give her married name, if she was married, or to locate any of her descendants.

Daniel is said to have been born in Washington County, Md., which lies across the Potomac river from Shepherdstown. Whether this indicates a removal or whether Shepherdstown was at that time the postoffice for that portion of Washington County the writer is unable to say. John's birthplace is unknown.

Abraham died in 1799, aged about 55 years, as he was over 21 years old when his father died in 1767. After his death Julianna went to Baltimore, doubtless because her brother Samuel was fiving there at that time, and died in that city. The time of her death and place of burial is unknown.

Both John and Daniel were the fathers of what in these days would be considered large families, and it is probable that the pages of this book would be considerably increased in number if the other children of Julianna could have been discovered; but the writer felt that in justice to his chances of finishing the work, and out of consideration for those who were awaiting its appearance he could not afford to wait any longer for what might never be found.

The same confusion of spelling the name appears here as with the Frey family. The writer has followed what he believes to be the better orthography, save in those few instances where he knows the other methods prevailed.



# 151 John Hiestand.

NOWING John to be the older of the only two children of Julianna about which the writer has been able to learn anything, he is here treated as the first child of 15. It is just possible that the word "knowing," used above, is too positive a term; but as John's first child was born about 1812, while Daniel was married in that year, it looks as if the former might be the elder of the two boys, although it doesnt' always follow that the elder child is the first married. The writer has adopted Mr. Turner's order of birth of the two children, believing that he had some good reason for putting them in this way.

About all that is known of John is that a number of his children were born in Hagerstown, Md.; that he moved to what was then called Franklintown (now Columbus) Ohio. in 1830, the trip being made in wagons. His wife's maiden name was Elsie Martin. When he died or where he was buried has not been ascertained, nor are either of these facts known concerning his wife.

There has been great difficulty experienced in getting information about his descendants. Much of the following, especially that part which only gives names, has been obtained from Mr. Turner, who is still compiling the Hiestand records, and doubtless will do so to the day of his death. The other information has been secured by writing to people whose addresses were obtained either from Mr. Turner or from some one of their relatives. It is given as the best the writer was able to do under the circumstances. So little data has been furnished that even the order of birth of his children is uncertain, the succession given by Mr. Turner being manifestly erroneous in some instances. As numbered herein it is approximately correct, and as there was such unwillingness on the part of John's descendants to give any information or assistance in the matter they have no standing to complain of mistakes or omissions. The oldest child of John Hiestand is believed to have been

ANIEL HIESTAND, placed by Mr. Turner as the younger of the two known children of Julianna, and therefore treated here as her second child, was born in Washington

County, Md., on Feb. 3. 1790. This information was obtained from 15292 Emily L. Hiestand, who personally knew her grandfather and furnished the writer the photograph from which the illustration of the widely known Methodist preacher was made. In early life he learned the trade of blacksmith, which he followed for many years. He was an earnest member of the Methodist church, and in 1840 was made a "local preacher" in that denomination, doing good work.

In 1812 he married Mary Koontz, daughter of Jacob and Mary Koontz, of Frederick County. Md., and their early married life seems to have been spent between the two parental homes, as the first child was born in Washington County, the second in Frederick County and the third and fourth in Washington County. About 1830 the family moved to Mansfield, O., where the remaining years of his life were passed in peaceful and tranquil service. His wife, born on Oct. 20, 1795, died at Mansfield, O., Sept. 7, 1875, and Daniel passed away Feb. 4, 1878.

Eleven children were born to them, as follows:

# The Byphen.

OHN GEORGE FREY, the sixth child of Gottfried, early in life dropped the "praenomon" John, in accordance with the spirit of the times and the country. The settlers arriving from the Fatherland were nearly all blessed with this peculiar custom of naming every boy John and every daughter Maria (Mary). Gottfried, though giving the "John" to but one of his boys, had three daughters bearing the name of Maria. Two of these died young, and the third was known as Elizabeth, having discarded the Maria.

## FINDING OF GEORGE.

There is in common use a character designated as a hyphen (-) which plays an important part in written or printed language. Whenever, at the end of a line, all of a word cannot be completed therein, the hyphen is used to connect the part at the end of the line with that at the beginning of the next.

Thus far has been given the story of the Freys from the man who crossed the border between Switzerland and Baden, to the founder of Freystown, including two of his children. But the connection of Gottfried Frey with the American born Freys treated in these pages depends almost entirely on the identification of the George Frey known to have been the husband of Mary Magdalena Ziegle, with the son George named in Gottfried's will; he must be shown to be the tie that binds Gottfried and his ancestors to the Freys of the present day.

As narrated in previous pages, the writer knew the name of his grandfather, having the honor of bearing it, and he discovered

the name of the man whom he afterwards knew to be his greatgreat-grandfather in the office of the Register of Wills of York County; but the link which connected the two was an unknown quantity for many years. He remembers well, in his boyhood days, of asking his father the name of grandfather, and great-grandfather, which were both given; but further than this his father could not tell him. When, forty-odd years afterward, he started on the present task, the conversation was recalled, but the name of the greatgrandfather had escaped his memory. Nor could he find any of the kindred that could shed any light on this subject.

Believing the Freys to have always been Lutherans, and knowing that German was their native tongue, the writer early turned to the records of Christ Lutheran Church, the oldest church in York, for information concerning his forebears. These records, for the first seventy-five years, are all in German, and the earliest ones hard to decipher. Genealogists owe a heavy debt to Mr. E. W. Spangler, who had these records translated and the translations deposited in the rooms of the York County Historical Society, thus not only making them intelligible to non-German seekers; but preserving a copy which would be invaluable in case of the destruction of the original by fire, an event not at all improbable, considering the fact that they are not preserved in fire-proof safes or vaults.

These records, as previously stated<sup>1</sup>, give the names of a number of the children of Gottfried Frey, among them being John George. In Gottfrieds' will<sup>2</sup> the John is dropped, only George being used. The church records, the will and various deeds' show conclusively that there lived a George Frey, who was the son of Gottfried; but it did not necessarily follow that he was the father of 167 Samuel, the writer's grandfather, although the place of residence and the Lutheran church membership seemed confirmatory of that fact. This latter confirmatory fact, however, was rudely destroyed when it was later discovered that Gottfried became a member of the Re-

formed church, his name appearing as one of the signers of the Reformed Church Articles on July 1, 1754.

Further on, however, these same Lutheran church records contain the following significant entry:

Samuel, b. Dec. 14, 1790; son of George and Magdalena Frey.

This settled, beyond controversy, the fact that 167 Samuel Frey was a son of a George and Magdalena Frey, the date of birth as given above agreeing within one day of the date of birth of 167 as calculated from the record on his tombstone, which gives date of death and age, the discrepancy of a day being readily accounted for by an error in substraction.

The mention of a George Frey in the will of Gottfried, and the fact that George was named by the church records as father of Samuel, naturally led to a search of the court records for anything connected with that name. From the Register's Office it is evident that however much real estate George Frey owned in his lifetime, at his death there was nothing for the courts to deal with. His name, in connection with any estate of his, could not be found, but in 1806 the name of Samuel Frey appeared on the index to the records, and reference to the proper book revealed the fact that he asked for the appointment of his brother Jacob as his guardian. Immediately following that statement is this:

Mar. 26, 1806. Jacob Frey, brother of Frederick Frey, an orphan minor child, son of George Frey, deceased, presented his petition asking for the appointment of a guardian of said minor, and the court appointed Gottlieb Ziegle as guardian<sup>4</sup>.

The name Ziegle at once raised the query as to his connection with the Frey family and what the reason for his appointment, rather than some one else. Reference to the Register's office showed the existence of the will of a Gottlieb Ziegle, and an inspection of that document led to the discovery that the testator's daughter Magdalena was married to George Frey. This explained why Gottlieb Ziegle (2d), an uncle of the minor, was appointed his guardian.

In the records of Zion's Reformed Church, of York, Pa., are found the following:

On October 6, 1776, was baptized a child of George Frey and his wife, Maria Magdalena, 6 Sept. 20, named Maria Magdalena. Witnesses: Gottlieb Ziegle and wife Barbara.

Born Feb. 23. 1782, Elizabeth, daughter of George and Magdalena Frey.

Jacob, baptized Nov. 14. 1784: born October 22. 1784. Parents, George Frey and Maria Magdalena.

Daniel, born January 11, 1786: son of George and Magdalena Frey.

The fact that Gottlieb Ziegle and his wife appeared as witnesses to the baptism of Oct. 6, 1776, is additional evidence that they were closely related to the young couple. The theory formed from the guardian appointment, the will and the Zion Reformed Church entries was established as a fact by certain additional court records.

In a subsequent chapter, under the title 161 Catharine Frey, is given the history of the discovery of the records pertaining to the estate of Gottlieb Ziegle, (2d), who died intestate and unmarried, whereupon his estate descended to his brothers and sisters, and the children of such brothers and sisters as were deceased. Among the names of his heirs appear those of the children of Magdalena Ziegle, married to George Frev: George, Jacob, Daniel, Samuel and Frederick Frey, and Catharine Metzel, Mary Grant and Elizabeth Weigel. Another record<sup>6</sup> names "Mary, eldest sister of Gottlieb Ziegle (2d), married to George Frey:" and the will of Gottlieb Ziegle (1st) mentions his daughter "Magdalena, married to George Frey."<sup>6</sup> As the writer had been told by his father that Jacob Frey was a brother of Samuel's, as the names of the other brothers as recalled by 16321 William Frey and 16735 Marcellus Frey agree exactly with those given in the above list as those of the sons of George Frey, and as the names in Zion's Reformed church record are also given, this was persuasive evidence of descent from George Frey.

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## Two Men or One? One Wife or Two?

But the discovery of Gottfried Frey, and the question of the relationship existing with the children of the former schoolmaster<sup>7</sup> led to the investigation of the identity of the son of Gottfried with the husband of the Ziegle girl. And in this connection the dual name of the maid tended to strengthen the idea that there were two Georges. There are on record five deeds executed by George Frev:

Deed dated April 11, 1776, from George Frey, yeoman, of York town, and Magdalena, his wife, for a lot on South George street, now known as Nos. 17 and 19. In the deed to George for this lot he is described as a "saddler, of York town<sup>8</sup>.

Deed dated May 6, 1783, from George Frey, of York town, Innkeeper, and Mary, his wife, for George's share of the real estate which he received from his father. Gottfried, thus establishing the identity of this particular George as the son of Gottfried<sup>9</sup>.

Deed dated January 6. 1785. from George Frey. of York town, Innkeeper, and Magdalena, his wife, for the western half of lot No. 58, property now known as Nos. 10 and 12 East Market street<sup>19</sup>.

Deed dated Feb. 23, 1787, from George Frey, of York town, with Innkeeper, and Magdalena, his wife, for Lot No. 199, now known as Nos. 138 and 144 South Duke street<sup>11</sup>.

Deed dated Feb. 11, 1797, from George Frey, of York township, (no occupation given) and Magdalena, his wife, for their interest (one-fourth) in the stone house between the house in which they lived in 1779 and the tavern stand on the corner. This stone house stood on the site of what is now No. 7-11 South George Street<sup>28</sup>.

From these deeds it would seem that there were three George Freys, so far as occupations were concerned. (or four, if we count the lack of an occupation), and two wives, a Mary and a Magdalene. But many a man, with a trade, gets the idea that there is easy money in innkeeping, and later finds that he has made a sorry mistake. Nor is it at all unlikely that Gottlieb Ziegle, himself an innkeeper, influenced his son-in-law in taking up the business.

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The German custom of calling all girls Mary<sup>15</sup> prevailed in the Ziegel family, since the only two girls were named Mary Magdalcna and Mary Dorothy. This we know from several records: the baptismal records of Maria Magdalena and Jacob Frey; in his will Gottlieb speaks of Mary Dorothy<sup>14</sup>; one record refers to<sup>15</sup> "Mary, eldest sister of Gottlieb Ziegel (2d) married to George Frey;" the last of the above cited deeds describes her as Magdalena, wife of George Frey; and the witness to the baptism of one of the children of Catharine Metzel ( a daughter of George Frey) was Magdalena Frey, while with another child of the same mother the witness was Mary Frey. Hence, the fact of the two different names appearing as the wife of the grantor neither shows a different George nor yet that he had two wives; but that Maria (anglicized Mary) Magdalena was probably most usually called Magdalena, and Mary was the name the more punctilious scrivener used.

It will be noticed that in all the above conveyances save the last George is described as of York town. The assessment books from 1775 to 1797 give the following:

In York township, George in 1778, '76, '82, '84, '85, '86, '88, '89, '95 and '97.

In York town, in '75. '78, '84, '85, '88, '89, '92, '93.

While it might appear from these assessments in two districts that there were two Georges, yet this could easily be explained by the fact of a man having property in the two places. Thus, in the very deed in which he is named as the son of Gottfried, and conveys his land in York township, he is described as innkeeper, of York town. From the recorded conveyances, and there may have been as many others that were not recorded, for there was much laxity in this respect in those days, it is evident that George handled some real estate in his time, and as he would be assessed wherever he had any of the soil it can readily be understood that his name might appear in different places in different years, or even in the same year.

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It is worthy also to note that while in 1789, according to the above assessments, there is apparently a George Frey in York township and also in York town, the U. S. Census for 1790 gives only one George Frey as head of a family in the entire county, and places him in York town.

So far as the writer has been able to discover there were only two lines of Freys in the neighborhood of York at the time covered by the above conveyances, that of Gottfried and that of Martin. The latter left only two sons to survive him, Tobias and Martin. Tobias, the elder, settled in Dover township. Martin, born in 1739, married Anna Maria Small; but evidently could not have been the father of a son who was married before 1773. In fact, according to his will, he had but one son, named Martin, and three daughters. It is against all probability that in a territory as sparsely settled as York town and York township there should have been two men by the same name, of the same occupation, and with wives bearing the same Christian name.

Two more things bear out this theory of the identity of the two Georges: Gottlieb Ziegle's land adjoined that of Gottfried Frey, and doubtless the matter of propinquity had much to do with the union of the two families. And from two descendants of 10 Adam Frey the writer heard the tradition of the relationship of that line to that of 16 George, a relationship which could only come about through a common descent from Gottfried.

Therefore, it was with perfect assurance that the writer bottled up the demon of doubt, and accepted Gottfried Frey as his greatgreat-grandfather, and the ancestor of the people whose names are recorded in this volume, feeling that this was not mere matter of assertion or belief, but actually established by incontrovertible evidence.

#### A GRATIFYING DISCOVERY.

After having accepted this theory, at first with much misgiving and later with more confidence as the various records above men-

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tioned were found, two years after the first steps were taken in tracing the other descendants of Gottfried Frey the writer was surprised and gratified to learn of a remarkable piece of evidence confirming what the foregoing had built up, and assuring him that three-fourths of the work spent in this volume was not resting on a foundation that might at any moment be swept away by the discovery that there were after all two Georges, that the line from Kaspar to Gottfried had naught to do with the children of Mary Magdalena Ziegle, and that there was no connection between Godfrey, Julianna and Adam on the one hand and George on the other.

Practically all the correspondence in the compiling of the information in this book was done on stationery bearing at the top a facsimile of the signature of Gottfried Frey to his will, which facsimile appears on the title page of this work. One day there came into the writer's office 161314 Robert F. Metzel, of Washington, D. C., and stated that he had in his possession an old Bible, which had belonged to his great-grandmother 161 Catharine Metzel, and that in it there was a piece of paper containing the signature of Gottfried Frey. Mr. Metzel was positive that the signature was the same as the facsimile on the letter head received by him from the writer. The Bible also contained a line "Jacob Frey's Bible," and the name Catharine Frey, written in German. There is also an entry giving the date of birth of Catharine Frey, something the writer did not have before.

There is nothing to show positively that this Bible ever belonged to Gottfried Frey, and as it contains no other reference to him, and gives no data concerning any of his family, it is not likely that it was used by him. The claim of Jacob Frey, a younger brother of Catharine's, that it was his, and her maiden name appearing in it, shows that the book was doubtless in the home of George Frey before Catharine's marriage, possibly it was presented to her by her grandfather (she was seven years old at the time of his

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death), which might account for his name being in it; or, it may actually have belonged to him, retained by his widow until her death, about 1797, and then came to Catharine as the oldest grandchild, or at least as the oldest grandchild living in or near York.

But whether ever in his possession or not, the fact of the leaf bearing his signature shows the close connection between Gottfried Frey and Catharine Metzel, and proves indeed that George Frey was the son of the immigrant from Weiler. Unfortunately, the leaf has been lost, so that no comparison of the two signatures can now be made.

#### Additional Evidence.

When these pages were being prepared the writer referred to the original records of Zion's Reformed Church to confirm what he had before gathered from the translations made by orders of Mr. Spangler, and thus found some of the records given above. But he also found two other significant entries:

Margaretha (wife of) Godfried Frey did 28 of September, 1773. (the writing here is unintelligible, but doubtless means presented for baptism) George Frey, son of John George.


On 6th of December was baptized child of George Frey, born 22d of November, 1778. Witness, Gottfried Frey, Sr., child named George.

Here appear Margaretha and Gottfried as interested in the baptism of two young Georges. Of course, it may be said that it is not denied that Gottfried had a son George, in whose children he would naturally be interested; but what became of that George if he is not the George who married Mary Magdalena Ziegle, and is it likely that again there would have been the coincidence of another George Frey having a son George about the same time that the husband of Magdalena Ziegle had a son George, for the year here given (1778) is just about the time that George, the eldest son (reaching maturity) of Magdalena Ziegle, must have been born, to fit in with the known dates of the births of her other children, and also about

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the time that the man who was the father of 1631 Charles Frey, born in 1801 and known to be a grandson of Magdalena Ziegle, must have entered into this world.

Surely only the most unreasonably skeptical can have any further doubts about the identity of the two men, and that the father of 167 Samuel Frey is really the son of Gottfried Frey, and is the hyphen connecting the known Freys, of which the writer is an humble member, with the heretofore unknown descendants of the man of Udorf. To believe otherwise is to violate all the inferences that naturally flow from the records and traditions presented.

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# Bis Life and Death.

EORGE FREY was born Aug. 13, 1751, either in the stone house, or in a more humble building occupied by Gottfried before he had acquired title to the land. His early

life was of course that of a farmer's son, in a time when farming was much more laborious than it is now; but later he, like his brother Godfrey, learned a trade, George making saddlery his choice, as is evidenced by his designation in the deed to him of the lot on George street.

#### HIS WAR RECORD.

Having arrived at the conclusion that there was but one George Frey in York during the period from 1751 to 1800, of adult age, it follows that anything relating to a man of that name from that place concerns the subject of this section. As this era covers the time of the War of the Revolution, the question naturally arose whether this ancestor was one of the brave men who won independence for the new Continent.

The proper place to go for information on this subject seemed to be the United States authorities at Washington, so an inquiry on this subject was duly made to the War Department. In due course of time came the reply that the name of George Frey did not appear on their records; but admitted that the records of that time were very incomplete, and advised search of the Pennsylvania records for further information.

From the Pennsylvania Archives we make the following extracts:

George Frey in list of soldiers "who received pay" in the Revolution; 5 Series, Vol. 4.

#### GEORGE FREY.

George Frey in Capt. John Ehrman's district as liable to military duty; 6 Series, Vol. 2.

George Frey in David Jamison's militia Regt.; 6 Series, Vol. 2.

George Frey in Capt. Wm. Bailey's company, June 14, 1776; 6 Series, Vol. 2.

George Frey was in Wm. Lindsay's company of militia from Dec. 8, 1781, to Feb. 7, 1782.

The name of George Frey appears as a member of Col. Henry Haller's Regiment, stationed at Newtown, Bucks County, Pa., in Jan., 1777; but the writer is unable to say whether it was this George or whether Col. Haller was a York County man.

In the Spangler Families, we find in the list of the men in Capt. Wm. Bailey's company, on June 14, 1776, these three names in immediate succession:

> George Frey. Gottlieb Siegle. Frederick Siegle.

Quite naturally. George and his brothers-in-law appear grouped like that.

Capt. Bailey's company, according to the Moravian Church records, existed in 1775, 1776 and 1777<sup>1</sup>. It became a part of the five battalions from York County that marched to Eastern New Jersey in 1776 to form the Flying Camp. On their arrival in New Jersey 400 of these men were taken to form two battalions, and the remainder returned home<sup>2</sup>. Subsequently 500 more York County men were added to the Camp. Just how long this Flying Camp was in service the writer is unable to say. They went as far as Elizabeth, N. J.

This Flying Camp, formed at the request of Gen. Washington, was to consist of 10,000 men, and was to be stationed in the Jerseys as a central force, ready to act in any direction. as circumstances might require<sup>3</sup>. It was under the command of Gen. Mercer, and

troops from its ranks were engaged in the battle of Long Island, and the minor operations around New York and in the retreat through New Jersey.

Whether George Frey and his comrades were members of the two battalions that remained with the Camp seems incapable of actual demonstration; but from the traditions about the soldier uncle and his heroic experiences related to and by the descendants of 11 Godfrey Frey, it is more than probable that the former saw actual service of a most severe kind, and may have seen the great General himself; this is undoubtedly so if he was a member of Col. Swope's battalion, which suffered greatly in the battle of Long Island. By Act of Congress the so-called militia were put on the same footing as the regulars, and men who enlisted and were willing to go and actually did go to the front, ready to do their full duty, are not to be lightly deprived of the honor due them as soldiers of the Revolution, even if not engaged in any great battle. Pretensions as to experiences that never occurred could readily have been discovered at that time, and the probabilities are all on the side of George Frey having served his country in its hour of need to the best of his ability and opportunity.

The term of enlistment for the Flying Camp expired in December, 1776. In April, 1778, we find George Frey was a member of Col. David Jamison's militia regiment<sup>4</sup>. As Conrad Frey, a member of this same regiment, was a pensioner as late as 1804, it could hardly be denied that he was a soldier of the Revolution, and if he, why not the other members of the same regiment. It is not known just where this regiment was engaged.

Perhaps it was the desire to be free to heed the call to arms that led George to sell his property in April, 1776, and then, when the urgency was great in June, of that same year, he was ready to go to the defence of his country without any anxiety as to the possessions he would otherwise have been compelled to leave in the charge of a young wife.

## As a Civilian.

No record of George Frey's marriage has been found; but as his first child was born before Sept. 28, 1773, it would seem that soon after reaching his majority he was united to the oldest daughter of Gottlieb Ziegle, whose land adjoined that of Gottfried Frey, the two families growing up together until such time as Ziegle moved into the property on the Square in the growing village.

Whether Gottlieb Ziegle opened his tavern on the southeast corner of George street and Centre Square before his daughter was married to George Frey cannot now be ascertained; but it is one of the coincidences of time that today two of Magdalena Ziegle's greatgreat-grandsons occupy offices in the building erected on the spot where her father's tavern stood. On another page are given illustrations of the old Ziegle inn and the present modern office building occupying the same site.

The George street property was purchased by George Frey Sept. 15, 1773<sup>5</sup>, and was doubtless the home of the young couple until its sale in 1776. After his return from the war it would seem as if he went into the tavern business, since in 1783, '85 and '87 he is described as an innkeeper. Possibly he kept the old Ziegle tavern, at the corner of George street and the Square, and which belonged to his brother-in-law, Gottlieb Ziegle, after 1779, the time of the death of the first Gottlieb. In his father-in-law's will George is devised the house in which he was then (1779) living, on paying the other heirs their share, but in 1805 this property, now 13-15 South George street, was owned by John Fahs, Sr. Just how George parted with it could not be ascertained, as no deed from him appears on record.

If we may draw any inferences from the considerations received for the different properties, George seems to have been retrograding financially, notwithstanding his fifty acres from his father's estate and the fact that his wife was heir to one-fourth of

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Gottlieb Ziegle's estate; and when, in 1797, he and his wife sold their interest in a stone house on George street, he probably parted with the last of his real estate, as there is no record of any other sales, nor was there any real estate left to be disposed of through proceedings in the courts at the time of his death.

1674 Emanuel Frey, a grandson of George, in a little sketch left of 167 Samuel Frey, speaks of the latter having been born in very humble circumstances, being compelled to assist in the support of his mother at an early age; indicating inability on the part of George to provide for his own. In fact, the latter days of the soldier seem to have been spent under clouds of adversity.

This same sketch seems to indicate that the family lived in a very humble home in Freystown. It is just possible that this property, the last of George's real estate, was sold by the heirs after his death, and that that is why guardians were appointed for the younger children.

There is no record of his death or place of burial. As the last child was born in 1792, and guardians were appointed for Samuel and George on March 26. 1806, his death must have occurred between these two dates<sup>6</sup>. Just why the guardians were appointed, if there was no estate to inherit, is not so evident, unless it was for the purpose of putting the younger children at a trade, for in those days the fatherless child had to have a guardian to act for him in the indenture of apprenticeship.

How long his widow survived George is also unknown<sup>1</sup>, (but she was not living in 1817, at the time of the Ziegle partition proceedings) and the place of her burial has not been found. Probably the old Lutheran burying ground, now occupied by the City Market, contains what yet remains of the dust of George Frey and Mary Magdalena Ziegle. Peace to their ashes.

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## HIS CHILDREN.

The children of George and Magdalena, as given by the records of Zion Reformed Church, were:

George, baptized Sept. 28, 1773. Catharine, born Jan. 3. 1775. Mary Magdalen, born Sept. 20, 1776. George, born Nov. 22, 1778. Elizabeth, born Feb. 23, 1782. Jacob, born Oct. 22, 1784. Daniel, born Jan. 11, 1786.

And in the records of Christ Lutheran Church. Samuel, born Dec. 14. 1790.

From the court record previously referred to, it is evident that there was still another child:

Frederick, born some time after 1792, since he was under 14 in 1806.

From these baptisms it would seem that the earlier children were baptized in the church of the father and grandfather, while Samuel, born after the death of the grandfather and possibly that of the grandmother also, was baptized in the faith of his mother, before her marriage. The influence of the mother is manifest in the fact that all the children, so far as could be ascertained, grew up in membership with the Lutheran church.

The discovery of a son of George, antedating the birth of Catharine, was not made until after much of the copy of this section, including the numbering of his descendants, had been prepared for the printer. As this child doubtless died before 1778, since the name George would not have been given to two living sons at the same time, he is not considered further in this work, and Catharine appears as the oldest child of 16. It is her story that is taken up in the next chapter of this genealogical treatise.

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OW this, the oldest child of George Frey, was discovered. and how her descendants were identified, is a story of patient research on the part of the writer, made all the more difficult by a stupid blunder. With no knowledge of the existence of any sisters of his grandfather, with no survivor of a preceding generation to question on the subject, and with the assertions of older cousins that they had never heard of such relatives, there seemed no way of proving their existence, to say nothing of tracing their descendants.

There were two reasons, however, that led him to believe he had possessed great-aunts. First, the strong probability that in the days of large families, where there were five sons there would surely be some daughters; and second, the statement of several of the older Freys that they were related to the Metzels and the Kolbs, one of them going so far as to specify the late proprietor of one of York's oldest hotels as in the "freundschaft," but admitting utter ignorance as to how that kinship was brought about.

The obvious thing to do was to tackle the problem from the other side, and so the daughters of Thomas Metzel were called upon. "Oh, yes; of course we are related!" "But how?" Ah, there was the rub! Jacob Frey (165) was recalled as "Uncle Jacob," and his wife as "Aunt Kitty," but the value of this statement was qualified by the admission that "everybody called her Aunt Kitty." The Kolb relation hinged on the Metzels, since Eliza Kolb was Eliza Metzel before the nuptial knot was tied. There was no recollection on the part of any living Metzel of the name of either of the parents of Thomas Metzel.

A visit to the widow of George Metzel, a nephew of Thomas, disclosed one new fact; the location of the house where dwelt "Grandmother Metzel" and her daughter. The house, a one-story log structure, of course has disappeared before the march of improvement; but the site is now know as 136 East Market street.

The relation spoken of seemed to the writer to have necessarily been brought about by the marriage of an ancestor of Thomas Metzel to a daughter of the Frevs, by the marriage of a sister of Thomas to a son of the Freys, or by his own marriage to a Frey. The latter was at once negatived by his daughters. Besides, such a marriage would have eliminated the relation with the Kolbs, who descended from a sister of Thomas. A marriage between one of George's sons and a sister of Thomas Metzel would only have produced a kinship between that particular son and the children of Thomas, yet descendants of four out of five sons of George asserted consanguinity with the Metzels. Evidently a Metzel young man had married a Frev girl. The only Frev girl of that period, that the writer had any knowledge of, was Elizabeth. for whose marriage portion Gottfried had provided in his will.<sup>1</sup> A marriage between her and Thomas' father would have made Jacob Frey and Thomas Metzel first cousins, and Thomas' daughters and Alex. J. Frey (1654) second cousins,<sup>2</sup> which is the relation the Metzel girls thought existed between them. This idea was further born out by the fact that the name Elizabeth was practically that of Mrs. Kolb and her daughter.

The next place to visit was the office of the Register of Wills, where a search was made for any of the name of Metzel. First came the record of the grant of letters of administration on the estate of George Valentine Metzel, on Oct. 14, 1803, to Catharine Metzel and Frederick Bonge.<sup>5</sup> This was a disappointment, as no Frey girl by that name was known. The filing of the personal account ended the record of that estate, with not a whisper of any

children. No other record of the death of George Valentine Metzel could be found, and there is no tombstone that marks his grave.

Thirty-six years later, on February 18, 1839, letters were granted on the estate of George Valentine Metzel to Thomas and Charles Metzel, and the same properly advertised. Now the scent is hot. Across the corridor to the office of the Clerk of the Orphans' Court, and soon there is seen the record of the the proceedings to sell the decedent's real estate.<sup>4</sup> Alack and alas! the unsympathetic page sets forth that "said George Valentine Metzel died intestate. leaving to survive him a widow, since deceased," giving no name. Here was a reference to the woman who was possibly the connecting link between the Freys and the Metzels, and yet not even her name appears on the record.

But it gave the names of Thomas' father, brothers and sisters. Surely some one living 80 years ago might have heard Mrs. Metzel's baptismal name, although it is easy to see how a man may be spoken of as George Metzel, while his wife is only known as Mrs. George Metzel. So there began a search among the oldest inhabitants, even to writing to one who had moved out of the city. Vain effort! Several remembered Mrs. Kolb and her mother, but no one knew anything of George Valentine Metzel, or his wife's christian name. Once more were his grandchildren appealed to, and then the statement was made that their grandparents were buried in the yard adjoining Christ Lutheran church. Thither hastened the scribe, to find that the chapel covered the spot where their bodies are supposed to lie, and though a visit to the cellar showed a few old monuments, there was no solution as to the name or date of birth of George V. Metzel's wife.

In the files of the York Gazette for 1839 was found the following entry:

DIED.-On February 15,1839, Catharine Metzel, widow, aged about 65 years.

Was she the widow of the George Metzel whose estate was administered upon in 1803, or the George Metzel of 1839? What was her maiden name?

A new complication arose from a story told by the daughters of Thomas Metzel, that after the death of their father's first wife, about 1830, his mother and sister kept house for him. Asked what George V. Metzel did while his wife and daughter were keeping house for another, even though that other was his son, they were at a loss to explain.

A wise genealogist will not confine himself to but one problem at a time; if he does, his task will never be finished. While looking for daughters of George, or a husband for Elizabeth, the writer ever had in view the question of the descendants of the other children of Gottfried. Adam had by this time been identified, and his children were being traced; but how about Godfrey, Samuel and Henry? Then was recalled the statement of a deceased uncle,<sup>5</sup> that Samuel Frey, son of George, had "inherited money from an uncle." To inherit from an uncle, means that said uncle died after one's parent, and childless. If this proved to be an uncle on the father's side, it would obviate searching for any descendants of that son of Gottfried. An entry was found of the appointment of guardians for minor children of George Frey;<sup>6</sup> but no intimation as to any inheritance from any estate. Judging from the statements of George's financial condition, contained in the paper already referred to, it is more than likely that these guardians were chosen for the purpose of apprenticing the boys to some trade. Baffled in the search for any inheritance from the Frey side, the mother's side was taken up, but no relative of hers died till long after the date of the appointment of guardians. Still in a halfhearted way the quest was continued, and then, in 1816, was found the death of Gottlieb Ziegle, the second of that name. Following up the record, there was found the entry that the administrator's account had been presented, and "as it appeared to the Court that nearly all the money had been paid to the heirs," the account was

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approved. At once reference was sought to the accounts, three of which were filed at long intervals, but none of them were found! It was like a *douche* of ice water, to be so near, probably, to the names of Magdalena Ziegle's children, and then have the door slammed in one's face!

But with the reaction came determination for a more thorough search. This was rewarded by the discovery of the petition for the sale of Gottlieb's real estate,<sup>7</sup> and this gave the names of his brothers and sisters and children of deceased brothers and sisters, and among the latter were the children of Magdalena Ziegle, George, Jacob, Daniel, Samuel and Frederick Frey, and Catharine Metzel, Mary Grant and Elizabeth Weigel. Subsequent instruments described Catharine as Catharine Metzel, widow.<sup>8</sup>

Here was the Frey girl who had married a Metzel; but which Metzel? As she was described as a "widow" as early as 1820, she was doubtless the Catharine who administered on George V. Metzel's estate in 1803; but who were her children? Who was the wife of the Metzel of 1839? How were the two George V.'s related to each other? Surely not brothers, since the names were identical. Neither were they father and son, as no daughter of George Frey could have been grandmother to Thomas Metzel, who was born in 1797.

It seemed inexplicable that while several of the older people interviewed remembered Thomas Metzel's mother, no one recalled anything of the father; yet, according to the petition for an inquest, filed within two months after the grant of letters in 1839, the widow was "since deceased."

For weeks and weeks this Metzel problem filled the writer's thoughts by day and his dreams by night. It made him feel that this genealogy business was not as easy as it looked, and instead of being simply a case of asking other people for information, it was a matter of digging relentlessly for it yourself. It looked as if the Frey book was going to be a miserable failure, more remarkable for what it omitted than for what it contained.

And then, one day, like a flash out of a clear sky, came the key to the riddle. There were not two George V. Metzels, but two administrations of the one estate!

Additional investigation revealed the purchase by George Valentine Metzel, at Sheriff's sale in 1803<sup>9</sup> of the very tract on which Eliza Metzel said her husband's grandmother lived in the '30s, and which was sold by George's administrators in 1839. It also showed the choice of Jacob Frey. brother of Catharine, as trustee and representative of the heirs of George V. Metzel to receive from John Coates, as representative of the Penns, a quit claim deed for this same tract. Lot No. 12. on payment of some rents which that astute gentleman alleged were yet due the former Proprietaries.<sup>10</sup>

It is evident that at George Valentine Metzel's death in 1803, the widow and Frederick Bonge sold the personal property to pay the debts and the funeral expenses—the account showed a balance due the administrators<sup>11</sup>—and then, with five orphan children in her charge, the oldest not over nine years. Catharine bravely faced the world, with nothing between herself and want save her two hands, but with a roof over her head. For thirty-six years she struggled along, the little money she received from the Ziegle estate about sufficing for Coates' exactions, and then, when she died on Feb. 15, 1839, the second set of letters of administration on George Valentine Metzel's estate was taken out by two of his sons.

This hypothesis solves all the members of the hitherto puzzling equation. It proves Jacob Frey to be indeed an uncle, not to Thomas' children, but to Thomas himself, and the latter's children are related to all the descendants of George Frey; it justifies the appointment of Jacob as trustee for the fatherless children of Catharine; it explains why there was no father in the way when Thomas Metzel's mother kept house for him; and it is

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no longer strange that people might remember the grandmother of 1839 and yet have no knowledge of the grandfather who died in 1803.

Now-a-days the Register's office shows time of death as well as grant of letters; and when a second set are issued the words *de bonis non*—"of the goods not" administered upon—are used. The absence of these things in the earlier period is the writer's only excuse for a blunder which destroyed his peace of mind for weeks, and which threatened, at one time, to cause the omission of a large and interesting family from these records.

Catharine Frey was born Jan. 3, 1775, according to the Bible heretofore referred to<sup>12</sup>, and the date in the Zion Reformed church, Jan. 19, 1775, is probably that of baptism. The date of her marriage to George Valentine Metzel, a tailor. can only be approximated by reference to the birth of her first child, in 1794. Her married life was but a few years, and she remained devoted to her children and faithful to her first love, living in the home George provided for her, except for the few years she kept house for her son Thomas, down to the day of her death, Feb. 15, 1839. Her children all reached maturity, and a prolific list of descendants follows:

1611 ANNA MARY METZEL, popularly known as "Polly" was probably born in 1794; d. before Apr. 3, 1839, as she was not living at the time of the partition of her father's estate. She married Thomas Rothrock, a tanner living on South Beaver street, York, who was born June 7, 1794. The date of his death is unknown, but as there were no children born after 1829, and this was not the era of race suicide, it is plausible that Thomas died in 1830. His paternal ancestors were:

Philip Rothrock, grandfather of Thomas Rothrock, came to this country from Gunnstadt in Pfaltz, in the Palatinate, in 1732, married Catharine Kuntz, b. 1720, and settled in Manchester township, near York. He sems to have been a printer by trade, as he printed the Continental money while Congress met in York. He was one

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of the Commissioners of York County in 1781<sup>18</sup> He died Feb. 28. 1803. leaving to survive him the following children: Jacob, John, Philip, Peter, George, Valentine, Benjamin, Joseph, Frederick, Catharine (married Bentz) and Anna Maria (married Meisenkop and afterwards Berry). In his will be mentions 260 acres of land which he owned in Rowan County, N. C., and it appears that some of his descendants are now living in that State.

His son Benjamin, against the remonstrances of his father and brothers, enlisted in Morgan's Virginia Rifle Company, as it was passing through York on its way to Boston. That he was never heard of afterwards is evidenced by the fact that Philip's will, twenty years later, provided for the payment of Benjamin's share if he should be heard of in a certain time.

John Rothrock, one of the sons of Philip, b. Feb. 18, 1744, was 2nd Lieutenant in the 5th Co., (Capt. Emanuel Herman), of the 2nd Battalion of York County Militia in the Revolution<sup>17</sup>. He was a saddler by occupation, and was first married to Dorothy Gump, by whom he had two children, John and Daniel. After her death he married Charity Worley, daughter of Francis Worley, the surveyor of Springetsbury Manor. The result of this union was nine children: Elizabeth (married Updegraph). Mary (married Fahs). George, James, Charity (married Test, one of whose grandsons was John W. Buckingham). Jacob. Henry, Thomas and Susan (married McCurdy). John lived on the northeast corner of Market and Penn streets and died Aug. 28, 1805. George and Henry Rothrock settled in Bellefonte.

The children of John W. Buckingham paid a rare tribute to the memory of Philip and John Rothrock, their great-great-greatgrandfather and great-great-grandfather respectively, when they had their bodies exhumed from the old Moravian Cemetery at the time it was abandoned, a few years ago, and reinterred in Prospect Hill Cemetery. It is an example that might well be followed by many others, whose ancestors' graves are neglected and eventually lost.

EFERENCE to the preceding chapter reveals the finding of the children of 16 George Frey, including the daughter to which this short chapter is devoted. Unlike Catharine's descendants, the name of Grant as a connection of the Freys was unheard of by the writer and unknown by any of his contemporary relatives. Nor were there any Grant families in the city or vicinity of whom inquiries could be made. For months this name rested upon his thoughts like a nightmare, and every one whom he thought might prove a source of information was asked about such a family. Remembering that this Grant woman would have been a first cousin to the children of Gottlieb Ziegle's brothers and sisters, and an aunt to the children of Catharine Metzel and the children of George, Samuel, Daniel and Frederick Frey, inquiry was made of descendants of the Freys, Ziegles. Metzels and Heckerts (Dorothy Ziegle having married a Heckert) for information on the subject, but none was forthcoming. The assessment book for York Borough for 1799 gave the name John Grant: but in 1801 it has disappeared therefrom. The records of Christ Lutheran church set forth the baptism of Charles Grant, son of John and Mary Magdalena Grant, born Feb. 15, 1799; but no other Grants appear thereon. Reference to the deeds set forth in 161 show that John and Mary Grant were both alive in 1830, and as the acknowledgements were all taken in York, presumably they lived in or near that town at that time. It looked like a failure, and then one day came the thought that there might be a later release or document from the Ziegle heirs to Lanius, the man who had acted as their attorney in the former transaction. No index was found

under the Zs; but under the Ls was an index from Charles Grant to Christopher Lanius, and reference to the record showed the execution of a power of attorney from Mary Grant, of Ligonier, Westmoreland County, to Charles Grant, of Abbottstown, Adams County, authorizing him to receipt to Christopher Lanius for the balance of her portion of the Ziegle estate<sup>1</sup>. This release was executed in 1847, and shows how long was the litigation over the distribution of that estate. But, more than that, it gave the residence of at least one child of Mary Magdalena Frey. Elated at this information, the writer met his brother-in-law in front of the Court House, and ever busy thrusting his affairs on others, knowing that said brother-in-law lived but five miles from Abbottstown, asked him if he had ever heard of any Grants at that place. "Oh, yes;" was the reply: followed by a promise to look the matter up and write. It never rains but pours: when the writer told this piece of good luck to the partner of his joys and sorrows he was astounded to hear her say: "Oh. yes: I knew a Hetty Grant!"

These two sources resulted in the discovery of the family of Charles Grant, above-mentioned; but no others of Mary's children could be traced. Henrietta Zortman, the Hetty Grant mentioned, and the only child of Charles Grant then living, asked about brothers or sisters. or parents, of her father, said "the family went away out West, as far as Pittsburg;" and she could tell nothing about them. Communication with a gentleman in Ligonier, whose daughter lives in York, revealed the existence of a Rosa Grant, but letters to her brought forth the statement that her father had always said he had no relatives in this country.

In connection with the search for the Grants occurred an incident which shows how necessary it is for one engaged in work of this kind, (although it is quite probable that this same doctrine applies to any work that is worth while) to neglect no opportunity to get information from any source, no matter how unpromising it seems. While speaking with the daughter of 16143

Charles Metzel (161431 Henrietta), he asked her the usual questions, including the one "Your mother's maiden name?" "My right mother or my stepmother?" "Did your stepmother have any children from your father?" "No." "Then I only want your right mother's name." And in this way was shut off the information that the second wife of 16143 Charles Metzel was 16217 Lydia Ann Grant, and for weeks afterwards the writer was worrying everybody about Grants, after having stupidly closed his ears to the information practically volunteered to him. If it had not been for the discovery of the release to Lanius the Grant connection would not have been obtained, although it was right at hand.

It seems highly improbable that in the twenty-odd years of married life of John and Mary Grant there was but one child born. Race suicide had not become fashionable at that age, and the women of that time were not depending on Greeks. Italians and other foreigners for the future inhabitants of America; but the writer has not been able to find any more Grants, and does not feel justified, considering the uncertainty of life, to further delay publication of this work in order to discover them, with the probabilities of ultimate failure at any rate. He regrets this exceedingly; but his regrets are tempered by the knowledge that all genealogists meet with similar experiences.

Over two years after the above-mentioned discovery of the existence of a Mary Frey, and the name of one of her children. **a** further search in the original records of Zion Reformed Church showed the following:

On October 6, 1776, was baptized a child of George Frey and his wife, Maria Magdalena, b. Sept. 20, named Maria Magdalena. Witnesses, Gottlieb Ziegle and wife Barbara.

Omitting the short-lived George for the reasons already given, to Mary Magdalena is assigned the place of the second of 16 George's children. Nothing further is known of her life, marriage or death, save that she was yet alive in 1847. Of her husband nothing is known but his name. This chapter closes with the record of the descendants of her son, Charles Grant.



## 163 George Frey.

EMORY often brings to the writer recollections of one of his earliest schoolmates, a boy about eighteen months older, named William B Frey, a sturdy lad who grew up into a promising young man, married and died in middle life, leaving one child to survive him. Through his acquaintance with the son the writer learned to know the father, and when this history was conceived, he turned to him for information concerning his line of Freys. Capt. William Frey, as he is generally known, received the writer's request in the most cordial spirit, stating that he had long wished some one would take up the matter, and cheerfully agreed to do all in his power to further the project.

From him came the first information of the names of some brothers of 167 Samuel Frey, of whom the writer had not heard, and confirmation of the relation of 165 Jacob Frey: but the Captain had no knowledge of any sisters of 167. He furnished the names of the children of 163, and instructions as to where their descendants might be found, and in many ways was exceedingly helpful in the preparation of this work. The sketch of the Gottfried Frey house, in which William Frey lived for a number of years with his grandfather, 163, furnished the basis for the illustration found on a preceding page, although the Captain was unaware of the fact that Gottfried ever lived in the house, or even that there ever was such a man.

George Frey, the oldest son of 16 George Frey, to reach maturity, was born, either in the settlement of Freystown or in the

village of York<sup>1</sup>, Nov. 22, 1778, as is shown by the Zion Reformed church records. He was a laborer by occupation, living nearly all his life in Freystown. In the war of 1812 his patriotic soul was aroused; he enlisted and started for the front; but peace was declared before he became actively engaged. For his services his widow subsequently received a pension from a grateful government. For a number of years he lived in the "stone mansion" of Gottfried's, which then belonged to the Hambly estate; but whether he was aware of the family connection with the old house we are unable to say. He died suddenly about 1849. His wife was Anna Mary Sleeger, who died about 1878, in her ninety-second year.

The influence of propinquity in marriages is strikingly illustrated in George Frey's family, as three of his children, George, Anna Mary and Leah, married three children of John Spangler, living in the same township, who was a great-great-grandson of Caspar Spangler, the emigrant, whose descendants are given in the "Spangler Families," and whose ancestors are traced back to the year 1150. Elsewhere is given an illustration of the Spangler house" in Weiler, Baden.

## 164 Elizabeth Frey.

NSATISFACTORY, indeed, is the record that must here be given concerning the third daughter of George and Mary Magdalena Frey. The name Weigel or Weigle is rather common in York County, and when the writer first

saw that the husband of Elizabeth was named Michael, he recalled a John M. Weigel in York, and at once sought him, believing that the M. might stand for Michael, and a family name be thus reproduced. But he soon learned that such was not the case; and this was only the first of a long series of disappointments. Letters were written, church records and court house searched, cemeteries visited and old residents called upon; but all in vain. No one had ever heard of a Michael Weigel.

There was one moment when it seemed that the secret might be revealed. A member of another branch of Weigels, who had been spoken to about the matter, came to the writer one day and said that among some old papers he had found the name of Michael Weigel; but a subsequent examination cast a grave doubt as to whether what had been supposed to be Michael actually was that name, and at any rate in the connection in which it was used there was nothing to indicate anything about the residence or family of the man.

As previously stated<sup>1</sup>, the petition for inquest m the Ziegle matter was the first source of knowledge of the existence of Elizabeth Frey and the name of her husband. Two years later her name was discovered in the original Zion Reformed Church records, which gives the date of her birth, Feb. 23, 1782, just a few months before the death of her grandfather Frey. The only record of her mar-

riage is the statement in the Ziegle proceedings that Michael Weigel was her husband. Of Michael all that is known is that he appears on the assessment books of Dover township in 1805, 1810, 1817 and 1818, his occupation being a weaver, and his taxable property a small house and lot and one cow.

The last of the Lanius deeds shows that Elizabeth and Michael were both living in 1830, and that is the last data that could be found about them. At that time Elizabeth was only 48 years old, and it was hoped that she had lived long enough after that date to bring her within the recollection of some one who might yet be living: but the hope was in vain.

The Zion Reformed Church records show the baptism of two children of Elizabeth and Michael Weigel,

Elizabeth Weigel, b. Dec. 14, 1804.

Susan Weigel, b. Apr. 9, 1806.

Doubtless, when these children reached maturity, they married, and thus, with the change of name, their identity as Weigels has been lost.

At the graveyard connected with Quickel's Church there is a tombstone erected to the memory of

George Weigel, b. Aug. 4, 1803: d. Sept. 27, 1842.

This man might have been a son of Elizabeth's, the name George lending color to this view.

16321 William Frey has a dim recollection that when he was but a lad, there came to his father's house a young man named Weige, from the neighborhood of the Conewago, who was said to be a cousin of some sort; but was uncertain about the first name.

This concludes all that can be said about this youngest daughter of George Frey. It is exceedingly disappointing, almost humiliating; but, in the absence of any assurance that further delay might produce fuller results, the writer is compelled to close this chapter and be content that he was able to preserve her name in this history of her brothers' and sisters' descendants, even although all trace of her own children is lost.

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# 165 Jacob Frey.

HY the writer was told the name of this particular one of his great-uncles, instead of any one of the other three, is unknown; but it is certain that it was the only one he had any knowledge of until after work

on this book was begun. Possibly the older members of his father's family may have known of others, but to him Jacob was the connecting link with the men of former days.

When the work of discovering his ancestors and relatives was undertaken, this name was recalled and inquiries made of older relatives and also of descendants of Jacob Frey. Such facts as could be gleaned are rather meager, and it is to be regretted that not more can be said about a man who succeeded in rising above the humble circumstances by which he was surrounded.

According to the records of Zion Reformed Church, "Jacob Frey, born Oct. 22, 1784, was baptized Nov. 14, 1784; parents, George Frey and Mary Magdalena."

When Jacob was about 12 years old his father died, and the circumstances of the family were such that he was apprenticed as a tailor, which pursuit he followed for many years. By thrift and economy he acquired property not only in Freystown but also in York, and owned the frame buildings on the lot on the southwest corner of Market and Duke streets, his son David conducting a printing establishment in the building on the Market street front and Jacob, and his widow after him, living in a house on the rear end of the lot along Duke street.

There was a Jacob Frey who went with York troops to Baltimore in the War of 1812; but it is impossible to say whether it was this Jacob or the one whose daughter 1651 married.

#### GEORGE FREY.

He was married Nov. 25, 1809, to Catharine Huber, b. Dec. 17, 1788, and he died Dec. 3, 1854. His widow survived him nearly 20 years, dying July 9, 1874. Their descendants follow:

1651 JOHN FREY. The writer has been unable to learn any more of this oldest son of Jacob and Catharine Frey than the bare fact that there was such a person, and that he left York and was never heard of afterward.

TILL retaining his predilections for the Reformed Church, and his commanding influence in the family, George Frey had his sixth child baptized in that faith, and on the records of Zion Reformed Church is found the entry,

Daniel Frey, son of George and Mary Magdalena Frey, born January 11, 1786.

No other mention of him has been found in any court house records or church books, and the writer is unable to say when he was married, when he died or where he is buried.

The first knowledge of him was obtained from 16735 Marcellus Frey, who spoke of him as a great-uncle, and knew that one of his daughters married a Wilhelm, and referred to some descendants then living in York. 16321 Frey also knew of a Daniel Frey. The inquest in the Ziegle estate is the only court record of Daniel Frey. A little additional information was obtained from Charles M. Wilhelm, a grand-son.

Daniel was a lime burner by occupation, resided in York, and was married to Margaret Stengel. Their descendants follow:



### 167 Samuel Frey.

LINGING to the faith of her childhood through all the years of her married life up to this period. Mary Magdalena Ziegle at last prevailed against her husband, whose marital influence evidently waned with his declining circumstances, and Samuel Frey, the seventh child of their union, was baptized by the Lutheran pastor of Christ Church, the record reading:

Samuel, son of George and Magdalena Frey, b. Dec. 14, 1790.

This is the man whose character and success, as related in a sketch written by one of his sons, made an impression on the mind of the writer that moved him to begin this work<sup>1</sup>, which has far outgrown its original intentions. With perhaps the most discouraging influences and environments of any of George Frey's children, he reared the most numerous family, gave two of his children a college education and died in better financial circumstances than any of his brothers. This was due to untiring industry, practical economy and abstinence from convivial habits that prove the downfall of so many careers that at the outset give the brightest of promises. Though tainted by inheritance of at least two generations, and with family examples all around him, through the restraining influence of a faithful yet determined wife he escaped the dangers of the cup and made for himself a reputation of which his descendants need not be ashamed.

From the sketch already referred to and from some records, it is known that Samuel was born in the village of Freystown and that his father died as the boy was "just out of infancy." So low

were the family finances that the mother eked out a living by selling ginger cakes and bread, and in early life young Samuel peddled his mother's wares through the streets of York.

"When he had but just entered his teens" his mother died, and the younger children were scattered among those who could give a home for their work. At first Samuel was placed with a man in Freystown who proposed to have him work at weaving in the winter and in a brickyard in summer; but the death of the benevolent gentleman put an end to this transaction. Then an uncle attempted to teach him the trade of gunsmith; to this Samuel did not take kindly. Then he was apprenticed for a term of five years to a shoemaker. Possibly it was for this that a guardian was appointed<sup>2</sup>. Whether the young man by this time realized that he simply was compelled to learn some trade to make a living or whether he took more kindly to this occupation than the others is unknown; certain it is that he became an adept at the art, learning it so well that at the end of his apprenticeship he set up in business for himself, and soon had several employes working for him. Though he made other business ventures which were much more profitable, he continued in the shoemaking trade for over twenty five years and taught it to at least one of his sons.

But Samuel saw other things besides leather and pegs, and when he was but twenty years old he married Anna Kissinger, daughter of Philip Kissinger, and a lineal descendant of Christine von Sitler, the daughter of that German Baron whose mythical fortune has lured contributions from many Pennsylvanians in a vain attempt to recover alleged millions. Anna was born May 3, 1790, and is the one grandparent whose kindly features the writer saw and can recall to this day.

Samuel married with thirty dollars in his pocket. To provide a home for his bride he bought a lot of ground on which was erected a small log cabin; but this only provided room for his shoemaker shop. So he purchased an abandoned still house, and used the  $\frac{2}{2}$ Page 115.

timber therein in the erection of an adjoining building for a home. This humble habitation was situated at what is now 666-672 East Market street, and, with some additions and alterations, was his home up to a few years before his death. The work on this house was nearly all done after shop hours, and the extra toil and exposure resulting therefrom brought on a chronic rheumatism, from which he suffered all through life, and which bowed his spine almost to the extent of a deformity. As the additions, one-story high, all fronted on the street, he facetiously termed it a "three-story house along the ground."

The final completion of a home started a train of thought in Samuel's mind which led to the purchase of several low priced tracts of land and the gradual erection thereon of cheap houses which were sold to people in poor circumstances on the installment plan. During his life time he built fifty such houses, and many a poor man acquired a home in this manner that otherwise would have had to pay rent all his life.

He also reached out into the country and buying tracts of socalled barren lands he cut the timber and used it in the burning of lime and brick, to which business he turned his attention after he abandoned the shoemaker's calling. After the wood was cut off much of the lime burned thereby was put on the land, and with its soil thus enriched a tidy profit was made on the sale of the originally barren tract.

In those days patriotism largely found expression in military ardor and the little York of that time had more active militia companies than the populous city of today. Samuel Frey was for years, notwithstanding his physical afflictions, captain of one of these companies, and was generally known by that title.

Samuel's family record gives several instances of intermarriage and the results of propinquity, in a little more varied degree than that of his cousin George<sup>3</sup> His second child, 1672 Cassandra, mar-

ried Jacob Ramer, and subsequently 1673 married Sarah Ramer. Jacob Ramer moved on a farm in West Manchester township, from which John Gallatin removed, and in the summer the Gallatins came to reap the grain sown the previous fall, at which time 1677 Anna Mary Frey was visiting her sister. The acquaintance there made resulted in her marriage to Albert Gallatin. Either at the wedding or soon thereafter 1677 Samuel Frey met Delia Gallatin, and three years later they were married. John Drayer went to Michael Boeckel's in Freystown to learn the tailoring trade, and he and young Boeckel married the remaining two of 167's daughters.

Samuel was esteemed by his neighbors to such an extent that he held several minor offices, and in 1851 was elected to the office of County Treasurer by the largest majority ever received up to that time by a candidate of his party; but on Dec. 5, 1851, before he could take possession of the newly acquired office, he died, in a house standing on the site of the present No. 713 East Market street, now occupied by 163225, leaving to survive him his widow and ten children. There are produced herewith illustrations of nine, of these children, and, in the absence of any portrait of his own, his features must be imagined from a composite group of these descendants.

His widow and a crippled son made their home with the oldest daughter to the day of their death. the widow dying Feb. 18, 1870, and the son (1674 Emanuel Frey) Nov. 7, 1871. Samuel's descendants, numbering more than any of his brothers and sisters or cousins, are given herewith:

Subsequently lived near Loganville, York Co., and later in York, where Mr. Gallatin engaged in the manufacture of cigars for a number of years, but retired from all business years before his death on October 25, 1895.

Some of the Gallatins have expressed the thought that they might be descendants of Albert Gallatin, the financier and statesman of the early days of the Republic, but this is impossible, because he was born in 1761, while John Gallatin, doubtless the grandfather of the husband of 1676, was the owner of land in Heidelberg township in 1787. His son John, who died about 1854, at Jefferson, aged at least 62 years, was the father of at least three sons and four daughters, the oldest son, if not the oldest child, being Albert Gallatin, the voung man who fell in love with "Polly" Frev the first time he saw her at her sister's house. The name Gallatin is said by a genealogist in the Pennsylvania German Magazine, to be a corruption of the Swiss Gallaudet, a theory borne out by the fact that among the Germans of his neighborhood the original John was indiscriminately called Golliday and Galladin, subsequently anglicized into Gallatin. Possibly the children of 1676 and 1677, though not descendants of the famous Albert, are sprung from another branch of the common Gallaudet tree.

Albert and Anna Mary were the ancestors of seventeen children, some of whom died unnamed. Such as were duly named and recorded in the family Bible, follow herewith:

# 168 Frederick Frey.

OUNGEST known child of George Frey, since there is no record of the appointment of guardians for any other of his children, under the age of fourteen, Frederick's very name was forgotten by the majority of his great-nephews until the discovery of it in the much-mentioned Ziegle proceedings. A number of the older relatives knew that there was such a great-uncle but thought the name was John, and from 16735 Marcellus Frey was obtained a complete list of Frederick's children. The family comprised four sons and four daughters, and four of these children soon drifted away from the home town. Two of these were known to have gone to Ohio; but in the absence of anything more specific in the way of address it seemed unlikely that anything more would be found out about them. How the information which is hereinafter given concerning one of them was obtained is detailed under the proper subject.

Frederick, from the fact that he was under fourteen on March 26, 1806, must have been born later than that date in 1792. As his father probably died in 1796<sup>4</sup>, he was born not later than 1797. He was married July, 1818, which is inferential evidence that he was born between 1792 and 1797 By occupation he was a brick mason, of considerable local reputation. He married Rebecca Kissinger, a daughter of Philip Kissinger and a sister of his brother Samuel's wife. He died about 1842, having spent all of his life in his native village of Freystown, now part of the city of York.

The tale of the finding of Charles' family reads like a story book. While the writer was engaged in looking up the descendants of 11 Godfrey Frey, he received a letter from 11423 Mrs. Charles R. Baird, in which, after the information about her own family as asked for, she says:

"Enclosed find a clipping. Are we related to this man?"

The clipping was evidently cut out of a program or souvenir booklet of some sort, and was an advertisement of E. L. Frey, Hardware, but without any address. The writer at once answered Mrs. Baird, stating that there were some Freys in Ohio, presumably, for whom he had been seeking for some time, and asked her to get the address, if possible. This was complied with by Mrs. Baird, and correspondence with Mr. Frey revealed the fact that he was the son of the Charles A. Frey who left York for Ohio before the war.

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As showing how information is often within our grasp, if we but knew where to look for it, Mr. E. L. Frey stated that his father was a member of a York lodge of Odd Fellows down to the day of his death, so that if the writer had but asked the secretary of the lodge the much sought-for address could easily have been procured.



### The Mindsor Township Line.

NLIKE the story of the identification of the two older sons of Gottfried, the difficulty in the case of this sixth son was not the question of deciding which of two men was a lineal descendant of Kaspar, but to establish beyond cavil that the one Adam Frey who appears in York County records in the last third of the eighteenth century and the first third of the nineteenth was the son of the pioneer lad from Weiler.

As previously stated<sup>1</sup>, the writer from boyhood was acquainted with 1957 Charles H. Fry, who was one of his earlier school teachers, and soon heard of a family tie between them, although how near he was never told. It is characteristic of the indifference existing among Americans as to their ancestry that no one seemed to know just how near or remote the connection was, and later on it seems that Charles doubted it entirely, as he was of the opinion that his father came from Berks county, secured a position with a Windsor township farmer, married his employer's daughter and founded that line of Freys or Frys, for both spellings have been used by this branch.

The danger of trusting entirely to tradition is forcibly illustrated in the experience of 1654 Alex. J. Frey, who, in a conversation with Samuel F. Frey, a descendant of the Adams county line, said: "We both come from Berks county people," a statement wholly incorrect, so far as Alexander was concerned, as Tobias, though he may have been in Berks county a year or two in the period between 1727 and 1729, was not of the Henry Frey stock which

figures largely in Berks and probably Chester and Lancaster county affairs: while the Adams county line is most probably sprung from a Samuel Frey who settled there before 1770 and who seems to have been a younger brother of Gottfried's, born after Tobias' arrival in America<sup>\$</sup>; or from John Peter, a nephew of Gottfried.<sup>\$</sup> This idea doubtless had its origin in the minds of both Alexander and Charles by reading in Pennsylvania history of the settlement of Freys in this country before 1681, forgetting about the Freys who came after that time.

The records of Zion Reformed church, at York, give the names of three children of Adam Frey, Henry, Regina and Daniel, in the period between 1786 and 1793. While there was a church at Freysville as early as 1771, it is possible that it was served by the York pastor, and the records he has left of his ministerial acts include those of the Windsor charge as well as of the York congregation, so there is no evidence from these records as to whether Adam lived in York or in Windsor township at the time of the birth of these children.

One fact tending to locate Gottfried's Adam is contained in the deed executed on July 28,  $1783^4$ , by which he sold his patrimony to George Stake, in which he described himself as of York township. In the deed<sup>5</sup> executed in 1789 conveying to him a lot in Freystown in trust for his son Henry, he is also described as of York township. In 1792 he is assessed with two houses in Freystown. As his name does not appear in the Windsor township assessment prior to 1795 it is a fair presumption that there was but the one Adam, and that he was Gottfried's son.

However, to base a genealogical connection on but one "fact," and that fact a mere inference, is skating on very thin ice, and the writer is happy to be able to record several other circumstances tending to strengthen the link binding the Windsor township line to the Weiler emigrant.

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In the deed executed by Gottfried's Adam to George Stake his wife is given as "Anna Mary." In the baptismal record of Henry<sup>6</sup> he is described as the son of Adam and Anna Maria, the German form of Anna Mary. Here is the same Christian name of the wife. Is it probable that there could be two Adam Freys living in adjoining townships, having wives bearing the same Christian name?

Another corroborative fact is that Adam Frey, the son of Gottfried, had a son named Henry, and that the Adam Frey of the Zion church records also had a son by that same name. But stronger still, the latter Henry, baptized Dec. 18, 1787, would doubtless be of age when the deed for the lot held in trust by Adam was executed by the former Henry on Dec. 13, 1808, in which he describes himself as "since arrived of full age"." Is it conceivable that there would be two men of the same name and born so nearly at the same time?

So much for the identity of the son of Gottfried and the father of Henry. Now, what became of him?

In searching the court records there was found the will of Adam Frey, of Windsor township<sup>8</sup>, in which he devised his property for life to his wife Anna Maria, and after her death to his children, Elizabeth, intermarried with John Hershner, and his sons, Henry, Daniel, John, Jacob and Adam. True, this omitted Regina and named other children than those found in the church records, but it was easy to believe that Regina might have died and the others been baptized elsewhere. So the next step was to show the identity of this Adam with the son of Gottfried, and then to find his descendants.

Inquiry was made of a resident of Windsor township as to the oldest Frey in that vicinity, and after some thought the name of Sclomon Frey, of Red Lion, was given. A correspondence was opened and a visit paid. "You ask me the name of my grand-

father," said Solomon; "but how should I know. I was young when he died. I remember of his coming to our house, but he was always spoken of as Grandfather Frey." "Well," said the historian, "there was a man named Adam Frey. who lived in this neighborhood, and who in his will names his daughter Elizabeth Hershner, and his sons Henry, Daniel, John, Jacob and Adam." "Why," said Solomon, "that was my aunt, and those were my uncles and my father Adam. And now I feel sure that my grandfather's name was Adam."

The name of the wife being the same, there were yet three points needed to establish the identity of Solomon Frey's grandfather with the Adam of the church records: the ages of Henry and Daniel, and the disappearance of Regina, of whom Solomon had never heard. He knew, however, that Henry had lived in Shrewsbury township, that Daniel's grave was in a private cemetery near Landis' Mill, in Springetsbury township, and that his grandfather and some of his children were buried in the old burying ground at Freysville. Daniel's grave, visited the next day, recorded his death and age, a calculation giving his birth on exactly the date furnished by the baptismal record. Later on, Henry's grave in the Lutheran church yard at Shrewsbury gave a similar agreement as to his birth.

A visit to the Freysville cemetery proved disappointing in that no tablet, however modest, revealed the resting place of the remains of Adam, and hence a comparison of his birth with the church record of the birth of Gottfried's Adam could not be made. Though Adam carefully erected slate tablets to mark the graves of such of his children who died in infancy, the children who survived him neglected this mark of filial duty, and it is impossible to say just what spot in "God's Acre" covers what little is left of the progenitor of this branch of Gottfried's descendants.

But if the Freysville cemetery failed to yield what would have been irrefutable proof of the identity of the three Adams, it furnished evidence through a modest little slab, nearly entirely sunk in the ground, that was almost, if not quite, as convincing, and which, taken

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in connection with all the other circumstances, finally and completely dispelled any doubt on the subject. A crumbling piece of slate, in characters barely decipherable, set forth the death of Regina, daughter of Adam Frey, on Aug. 12, 1803, aged 12 years, 10 months, 2 weeks and I day. A calculation showed her to have been born on Sept. 17, 1790, which did not agree with the date which the writer had copied from the church records, and it was thought that perhaps the amateur engraver had made a mistake in his calculations, but four years afterward, as this matter was prepared for the printer, a second reference showed that the date copied by the writer was that of her baptism, which occurred a little more than a month after her birth.

Just one more citation, and we will treat the question of identity as absolutely settled. Phoebe Neff, a granddaughter of Adam, says that her mother's family name was Mielhof. The witnesses to the baptism of Adam's oldest son were Philip and Regina Mielhof, which explains where Adam's second daughter received her baptismal name. This same Phoebe remembers that in her childhood days there were Freys residing along the Plank Road near York and on streets entering the town who were distant relatives of hers. Children of 1923 Charles Fry and 1925 Fmanuel Fry speak of traditions that they were related to descendants of 16 George Frey, while a reciprocal feeling has been expressed by the latter's descendants, but it has remained for the writer to clearly show just how this connection exists.

Take all these facts and traditions together and the conclusion that Gottfried's Adam went back to the country of his uncles and cousins is irresistible, and he who is still skeptical could not be convinced though one rose from the dead.

### Adam's Life and Death.

Very little can be said of the story of this man's life. Born on August 14, 1760, he doubtless worked on his fathers' farm until such time as he was apprenticed to learn the weaving trade<sup>9</sup>. Too

young to enlist with his brother George, his first military service seems to have occurred in 1781, when, from June 12 to 20, he was a member of a militia company which convoyed British prisoners from York to Reading<sup>10</sup>. From July 8 to Sept. 8 of the same year he was a member of Peter Ford's company, according to the same authority. This is all the record obtainable of his military service.

Just when he married Anna Mary Mielhof is unknown, but, judging from the birth of Henry, his second child, in 1787, he was probably unmarried at the time of his father's death, but married before the execution of the deed to Stake. Phoebe Neff says her grandparents came from Maytown, Lancaster county; but as Adam was living in York township in 1781 when he was a militiaman, and was already married in 1783 and living in York, it is evident that if anybody came from Lancaster county it was the Mielhofs, for Philip, one of the witnesses to Henry's baptism in York county, was himself the father of a child baptised soon after by the same pastor<sup>11</sup>.

Adam first appears on the assessment books of Windsor township in 1795, and was a farmer therein down to the time of his death. His life seems to have been that of the average citizen of those days. In religion he followed the faith of his father, being a member of the Reformed church at Freysville, while his wife belonged to the Lutheran communion at the same place.

Just when he died is uncertain. His will is dated April 9, 1836; but was not probated until July 3, 1846. As he left his estate to his wife for life, the difference in these two dates may show that the wife survived him during this time or that the will was made several years before his death; but the former is the more probable supposition.

It may still be possible that some of the older inhabitants of Freysville could point out where Adam Frey is buried. If so, his



descendants, ere it is forever too late, should fittingly mark the spot of the ancestor who in troublous times and darker days did his part in preparing the way for the liberty and civilization of the present era.

### HIS CHILDREN.

The names and dates of birth of the children of Adam and Anna Mary, as hereinafter given, were found in baptismal records or on tombstones, except in the case of Elizabeth, of whom neither record nor monument can be found.

While Adam's signature, most intelligibly written to his will, shows that he used the "e," some of his descendants lapsed into the "Fry" spelling of the name. It is herein spelled "Frey," unless where there is positive proof that the shorter and corrupt form was used by the bearers thereof.

### 191 Elizabeth Frey.

ARLY in his search the writer found this entry in the records of Zion Reformed Church, under the head of marriages: Mar. 16, 1806. John Hershner—Elizabeth Frey.

This was made a note of, and allowed to slumber for some time while the work of connecting George with Gottfried was more vigorously pursued. But in genealogical research, as in all the other pursuits of life, variety always adds to the interest of the work, and when apparently insurmountable obstacles arise in one line it is well to turn to another branch and continue the pursuit of the elusive descendants, both living and dead, for often the former are as uncommunicative from choice as the latter are of necessity. By this change the mind appears to regain acumen to finally discover the hidden things which at first seemed to defy discovery.

It was during a period when the question of one or two Georges seemed incapable of positive determination, and when the writer was uncertain whether he was a descendant of the founder of Freystown, that the problem of the identification of the ninth child of that estimable gentleman was taken up, as previously related. The will of 19 Adam Frey named Elizabeth Hershner as one of his daughters, and 1983 Solomon Frey stated that the children of Elizabeth Hershner, of Cross Roads, were his cousins.

In the absence of any positive information, the writer has placed Elizabeth as the oldest of Adam's children, for the reason that her oldest child was born in 1807, while the first child of Henry was not born until 1808. Again, Adam Frey was married at the time he executed the deed for his share of his father's estate in 1783, and as Henry was not born until 1786, it is very probable that Elizabeth was the child born between the time of marriage and the birth of Henry.

The Hershner, (or Hershinger, as Elizabeth's father-in-law seems to have written it<sup>1</sup>) family were early settlers of Windsor township. Lorentz Hershner died there in 1779, and John Hershner moved to Hopewell township and died there in 1814, doubtless early in life, as he left only a son John and widow Catharine to survive him. John succeeded to the family acres, and it was there that Elizabeth reared her six children. Through the misfortune or dishonesty of a close friend, for whom John became surety, much of the original domain was lost, but John's widow declared there was more than enough land left, and lived in the old homestead until her death about April 20, 1864,<sup>2</sup> when nearly or quite eighty years of age.

F THIS first son of Adam Frey the writer was able to learn but a few facts. According to the records of Zion Reformed church, he was baptized December 18, 1787; according to his tombstone in the church grave yard at Shrewsbury, he was born December 3, 1787.

When he was yet quite young, his father bought for him a lot of ground in Freystown,<sup>1</sup> probably as a sort of atonement for the 50 acres that had so improvidently been sold, but on December 13, 1808, when Henry became of age, he in turn disposed of the paternal provision.<sup>2</sup> In this deed Henry writes his name in German, "Heinrich Frey;" but some of his descendants unfortunately dropped the "e."

He was married some time in 1807 to Mary Smith, who was born August 17, 1790, and died July 22, 1857. Most of their married life was spent in Shrewsbury township, where Henry carried on the trade of coopering, and where he finally died January 30, 1859.

As previously stated,<sup>8</sup> the will of Adam Frey gave the names of his surviving children. Solomon Frey said that his uncle Henry lived in Shrewsbury township. The assessment books showed a Henry Frey in that township, and the writer had a recollection that in his youth he had heard of Freys living in the township related

to his family. 1985 Samuel Frey said that a Charles Frey, formerly a manufacturer in Glen Rock, was a relative. Through correspondence with 19222 Adam Frey, and a conversation with W. W. Graham, of Red Lion, the names of Henry's children were obtained, and, as in other instances, by dint of asking questions, writing letters and personal visitation, all but a comparatively few of his posterity are given herewith:

## 193 Regina Frey.

OVED, doubtless, by a desire to perpetuate the name of his sister-in-law, Adam gave his second daughter a name quite uncommon at that time and in that community. Not for many years, however, was the name destined to be heard, for born September 17, 1790, Regina passed away August 12, 1803. How her name proved an irrefutable fact in showing the connection of Adam with Gottfried has already been related.

Her tombstone, a rapidly disappearing piece of slate in the old cemetery at Freysville, York County, is the only one the writer ever saw which, in giving the age of the deceased, stated it in years, months, weeks and days.

## 194 Daniel Frey.



ANIEL, the second son of Adam Frey, having left no descendants, there was scarcely any one from whom anything of his life's story could be learned. He was born September 9, 1793, this fact being evidenced both from the records of Zion Reformed Church and from the tombstone in a private burying ground near Landis' mill, in Springetsbury township, that marks his last resting place. How the correspondence of these two records proved a link in the chain identifying Adam Frey, of Windsor township, as the son of Gottfried Frey, of York township, has already been told.

Daniel was married, his wife's Christian name being Sarah; but they had no children. He was a laborer by occupation, and much of his life was spent near the place where he is buried. He died March 7, 1859.

# 195 John Frey.

EMEMBERING the German custom of calling every boy "Hans," "Johannes" or "John," and coupling with it another name as a distinguishing appellative<sup>1</sup> Adam named this third son John and emphasized it by stopping with that.

John is the man whom an erroneous tradition<sup>2</sup> represented as coming from Berks county and finding work with a Mr. Haines, living near Freysville. He may have been employed by Mr. Haines and it is true that so favorable an impression did John make that he won the affections of Julia Ann Haines, his employer's daughter, and reared a large family of sturdy children, proving himself the most prolific of Adam's children, and his descendants in number are second to Elizabeth's in Adam's line.

Little can be said of his history. Born on May 17, 1796, he married Miss Haines about 1818, followed farming, lived all his life in Windsor township and died Dec. 29, 1861. His remains rest in the Freysville Cemetery.

### 196 Adam Frey.

IKE HIS father before him, and like many rathers both before and after him, Adam Frey wanted a son bearing his own name, and when the sixth child saw the light of day, and proved to be a "man-child," it was called Adam. But man proposes and God disposes, and the young Adam, born April 26, 1800, died August 6, 1803, just a few days before his elder sister Regina, and possibly of the same malady which cut her off just as she was entering her "teens," thus bringing to an untimely end the story of the boy who it had been hoped would carry his father's name down to succeeding generations. He is buried in the family lot in the Freysville cemetery, his tombstone furnishing the only information that could be secured concerning him.



### 197 Jacob Frey.

ERHAPS this Jacob Frey owes his name to the fact that his uncle. 16 George Frey, had a son named Jacob. Be that as it may, when Adam's wife presented him with his seventh child it was duly named after the shrewd and sometimes unscrupulous Israelite. Born May 3. 1803, the child grew to maturity, being a farmer by occupation. He married Mary Musser, who was born September 29, 1809, and, spending the greater part of his years in Windsor township, died on February 28. 1858, and is buried near Yorkana. His wife survived him many years, dying February 6. 1891.

### The Anmarried Daughter.

ERY MEAGRE, indeed, is the record of the daughter for whom Gottfried set aside a marriage portion in his last will', and which portion his executors paid to her mother, because when they were ready to relinquish their trust this daughter was still in a state of single blessedness.

Maria Elizabeth, subsequently named Elizabeth, the tenth child of Gottfried and Margaret Frey, was born Nov 15, 1763, and was living a few years after her father's death. More than that the writer is unable to tell. There is a record of Elizabeth Frey marrying John Hershner, but that was a niece and namesake of Gottfried's daughter. There is also a record of an Elizabeth Frey marrying a Mr. Fishel in 1806, but at that time 110 Elizabeth was forty-three years old, and the presumption of marriage is very weak.

At any rate, after an intermittent search of four years, the writer is compelled to close this page without any further knowledge of her or any descendants, if any there were.

### The Baltimore Tradesman.

EAVING the home of his childhood, the County and State where his grandfather, father and uncle played the part of sturdy pioneers, stoutly resisting the encroachments of the wilderness, the savage Indians and the civilized landpirates from across the border<sup>1</sup>, this seventh son of Gottfried deliberately entered the enemy's country and spent the mature years of his life as an honest and industrious inhabitant of the Monumental City.

The writer has been unable to find any record of Samuel Frey's birth. At the time of his father's death he was under age and on June 11, 1782, when John Herbach was appointed his guardian, the petition states that he was seventeen years of age<sup>8</sup>. On April 4, 1787<sup>5</sup>, being then of full age, he received his fifty acres devised to him by his father; in this deed he is described as house carpenter, of York township. On March 19, 1789, he purchased a revisionary interest in the Freystown lots from his brother Henry<sup>4</sup>. On May 17, 1793, Samuel Frey, "house carpenter, of Baltimore," and Anna, his wife, sold some Freystown lots<sup>5</sup>. Subsequent conveyances<sup>6</sup> locate him in Baltimore, but the wife's name does not appear in the acknowledgement. All of these deeds set forth his relation to Gottfried, leaving no doubt of the fact of the hegira of 111 Samuel to Baltimore.

It was the discovery of these deeds that led some of his grandsons to believe that 167 Samuel Frey came to York from Baltimore,

but they evidently overlooked the fact that the Samuel born in 1791 could not have made conveyances in the period from 1787 to 1795.

It will be recalled that the Hiestand tradition is that Julianna Frey, in her widowhood, went to her brother in Baltimore<sup>7</sup>, and Samuel seems to have been the only son of Gottfried who lived in the Monumental City.

When reference is made to the Baltimore records the result is ambiguous, to say the least. Samuel Frye, carpenter and joiner, leased some ground in Howard's addition to the city and made some conveyances of parts thereof, at various times between Dec. 3, 1796, the date of purchase, and May 8, 1848. The name is written Frey and Frye, indiscriminately.

Finally on April 29, 1853, a Samuel Frey devises his estate to his wife Belinda, and his son John. In the sale of his property there is mentioned a lot of "cabinet ware."

If the last named party is Gottfried's Samuel he lived to the ripe age of 88 years. Also, he must have had two wives, as the early deed names Anna and the last will gives Belinda as his wife's name. The York church records show three children born to Samuel and Anna, all before the removal to Baltimore:

Elizabeth, b. Aug. 25, 1789. Samuel, b. May 23, 1701. Anna, b. Apr. 17, 1792.

Perhaps the Samuel of the 1853 will was the son born in 1791. At any rate the task of tracing out this line in a large city threatened to take more time than the writer could devote to it, and it is left for other hands to do this work, if anyone sees fit.

# 112 Benry Frey.

### The Twelfth Child.

OUNGEST of Gottfried's children, Henry Frey, who was fifteen years old at the time of his father's death!, has left such a scant record that the writer has been unable to find any trace of his posterity, if any there were. Receiving his patrimony of 50 acres on July 7. 1788<sup>2</sup>, in a little over a year he had disposed of nearly all of it<sup>3</sup>, including his interest in ground rents<sup>4</sup>, and finally all his interest under his father's will<sup>5</sup>. According to one of Samuel's deeds<sup>6</sup>. Henry became financially involved and the Sheriff assisted him in the disposition of his property. There was a Henry Frey and wife Barbara who sold a tract of lard in Newberry township<sup>7</sup>, the signature being the German "Heinrich." but outside of the identity of the wife's name Barbara, there is nothing to show that he was Gottfried's son.

No record of any children of Henry has been found. That he was twice married is evidenced by the deed of Sept. 18, 1789, to Gottlieb Ziegle<sup>8</sup>, which gives Susanna as the wife's name, and the conveyance of Jan. 20, 1791<sup>9</sup>, which names Barbara as the happy helpmeet.

The deed of Jan. 14. 1790<sup>10</sup>, describes Henry as a tanner. An assessment book some years later gives a Henry Frey, distiller, in York township, and the writer was told by a resident of York that he had a recollection of a tract of land, with an old distillery, situate south of York, back of the reservoir, which had been owned by a Henry Frey, but no record of its conveyance, and no settlement of Henry Frey's estate, could be found. The length of time already consumed in the preparation of this book, and the number of descendants of Gottfried who have passed away since the work was begun, warns the writer that if he wants to finish it and to deliver it to those who have shown the greatest interest therein no longer delay can be tolerated, especially in the absence of any hope of further results.

HEN page 304 of this book had gone through the press, and the writer was congratulating himself that the end of his labors was in sight, an incident occurred which, though delaying publication, cleared up what

had hitherto been a perplexing mystery and added an important branch of Gottfried Frey's progeny to this work.

The death of a number of cotemporary Freys while this record was in preparation showed the writer that, if it was to be read by one of the men who had been of much assistance and gave substantial encouragement thereto, and who was then in his eightieth year, further delays were dangerous. So one day the unbound sheets were taken to 16321 William Frey for his perusal. In conversation the writer expressed his regret at having been unable to find any information concerning the children of 164 Elizabeth Frey, although he had made many inquiries during the past four years.

"Why," said the captain. "I can tell you where you can find some of them. Go to Lydia Strickler, in Freystown. Her mother was Andrew Tyson's wife. When I was a fourteen-year-old lad I worked at Tyson's, and she said to me, 'You and I are cousins; my mother was a Frey.'"

Further inquiry brought forth the assertion that Mrs. Tyson's maiden name was Weigel: and while the captain was ignorant of the Christian names of Mrs. Tyson's parents, he was certain that before her marriage Mrs. Weigel was a Frey and some relative of his.

Of course, such a clue at least deserved investigation, so within a few hours Mrs. Strickler was interviewed. She believed they were related to the Freys, but had no knowledge as to how the relationship was brought about. She referred the writer to Mrs. Gotwalt, in whose possession, or in that of one of her sons, was the old Tyson Bible.

The Bible referred to gave the Tyson family complete, including the maiden name of the mother and date of birth; but it shed no light on the Christian names of her parents. From Mrs. Gotwalt the writer received the names of Mrs. Tyson's sisters and where to find some of their descendants. Jacob Welty furnished a record of the birth and whereabouts of Mrs. Hauer and Mrs. Beaverson. These two latter were positive about the Frey connection, Mrs. Hauer stating that 1673 Israel Frey was a first cousin of her mother's, a statement which could only be correct if Mrs. Weigel was 164 Elizabeth Frey; but while both. after suggestion, thought the grandfather's name was Michael, neither was at all positive about it.

It remained for Mrs. Leader, another grandchild, to say, without previous suggestion, that the grandparents' names were Michael and Elizabeth. Taken in connection with the fact that Cassandra, Rebecca and Jacob (a brother who moved West) were born after the time given by the church records as the date of Elizabeth's birth, and the positive claim of relationship, the writer believed himself safe in treating these people as descendants of Elizabeth Frey.

But it was through the history of a third Weigel girl that the element of uncertainty was entirely removed. All of the grandchildren above named spoke of an elder sister named Eliza, who according to Mrs. Hauer was eight or ten years older than her mother, and who had at least one child living in Wrightsville. To this child, Mrs. Samis, the writer repaired, and there he was shown a family record of the Seyples, in which appeared this entry:

Elizabeth Weigel, born Dec. 14, 1804.

An entry exactly agreeing with that on page 180, the church records above referred to.

Thus, beyond peradventure, was revealed the line of Elizabeth Frey's descendants. Susan evidently died in her youth, since the grandchildren knew nothing of her. The son, Jacob, moved to Erie, and in the limited time remaining, nothing could be found of his descendants.

Elizabeth's last days seem to have been rather sad. It is uncertain whether she died before or after her husband; but there is a tradition that her children had both stepfather and stepmother, and sure it is that in early life they were "bound out" to neighbors. She died in an old house in what was known as the "Alms House Woods" in Springetsbury township; but where her remains are interred is unknown.



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## 112 Henry Frey.

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### Introductory.

N Thanksgiving Day, 1923, the author of this book was surprised by receiving a call from 1121021, Mrs. Alice G. Hornby, who informed him that she had for some time been engaged in looking up Heinrich Frey, who was her great-grandfather, who emigrated from Lancaster county to Crawford county. While

in the Philadelphia Public Library she came across a copy of the first edition of this work and a perusal of its contents, especially the similarity of dates and the name of Henry's wife as there given, and that as contained in the family Bible, led her to believe that Henry was the twelfth child of Gottfried, whom the writer had dismissed with but a single page. See *Ante* 308.

There was an apparent discrepancy between the Lancaster county, from which the old Henry records said the family emigrated, and the fact that Henry and Barbara did sell land in Newberry township, York county, and a tradition in the family that they had lived on the banks of the "Yellow Breeches," which runs between York and Cumberland counties; but this can be explained on the theory that they went from York to Lancaster before they went West, and also by the fact that York county was carved out of Lancaster in 1749. The similarity of names of husband and wife, and of the date of Henry's birth, as assumed from a conveyance to him (*Ante* 62) and the record in the family Bible (*infra*) has convinced the the author that the family actually belongs in this book and he has placed them here with much satisfaction.

Much credit is due to the indefatigable labors of 112119 Henry Frey, 1121021 Mrs. Hornby, and 112124 Miss Jean Frey, for what follows herewith. The addition of this history in this volume was made possible by the fact that not all the printed sheets had been bound in the first edition; but the fact that the illustrations had all been used, accounts for the absence of many of them in this edition.

### The Story of Benry.

INISHING a full dozen children of Gottfried and Margaret Frey, Henrich Frey was born March 10, 1767, at York, Penn. A half orphan at fifteen years of age by the death of his father in 1782, he choose the trade of "tanner," and followed it all his days. He combined this with that of shoemaker for his family and his neighbors.

Receiving his patrimony of fifty acres after 21 years of age, when values had depreciated following the Revolutionary War, he found himself obligated by his father's will, 1782, to his mother and sister, Elizabeth, who were to receive certain cash payments from Henry. Also he must pay his brother Samuel 50 Lbs., two years next after he should have arrived at 21 years of age, March 10, 1788.

At this time, 1790, \$250.00 was not so easily obtained. Henry would have to sell his property to raise the money he must pay over to the family and by the conditions of the Will, he was expressly forbidden to sell any part of it, "while his mother liveth." So the Court was obliged to step in and help him get the cash out of the property he inherited. As his mother died after August 25, 1796, (see Deed Book 2N, pp. 313, March 17, 1789) he gave to his brother Samuel a reversionary deed to Freystown lots. (See Deed 2F 540). Here no wife is mentioned. A Deed, Sept. 18, 1789, is given by Henry and his wife, Susana—Deed Book FF. 239, York Co., Records, York City, Pa.

She must have died shortly after, as he was married to Barbara Baumgartner before Jan. 14, 1790, as shown by Deed FF 362, Court Records, York Co., Pa. They jointly gave a Deed, Jan. 20, 1791, Deed Book 109.

Barbara Frey was a half orphan and was bound out to a family who were not good to her, so she ran away, and was married to Henrich Frey, before she was of age, July 7, 1790. She was born July 7, 1772, as given in the old bible; and copied by her daughters, in their family bibles. She lost her father after he had served through the Revolutionary War. One brother only survived—John Baumgartner—at least that is all ever mentioned.

The writer believes that Henry and Barbara lived with Gottfried's mother until her death, after which on March 17, 1796, they bought a farm along the Yellow Breeches in Newberry township, which they sold later. The only intimation that they ever lived in Lancaster county arises from a return in a state record of taxes against a Heinrich Frey in Manor township, but there were Frey's in Lancaster county that were not descendants of Gottfried.

When her twelfth son was born, Barbara named him Henry for his father and her father, so we have been told. She was unique in her family arrangements, living as she did, with her younger children in a house apart from the larger one where the family fed, slept, and worked. She kept one daughter with her to teach her how to take care of a baby.

Of their family of nine sons and seven daughters, fourteen raised families. Thirty-three grandsons and fifty grand-daughters, thirteen living January, 1925. Twenty-six families of the Frey name, and thirty-eight Department of Public Instruction

families of grand-daughters; 132 great grand sons; 99 great grand-daughters; 228 fourth generation are known to be living and over 100 of the fifth generation, making 600 descendants in 1925.

Upon the one elder son, John, devolved the duties of farming, as Heinrich worked ever early and late over his "last" and leather, and tanning. They kept sheep and raised flax, and the spinning at home was done by expert women spinners of the settlement, until the daughters were old enough to learn the art. The daughter Elizabeth, became known as an expert weaver.

As each child was married the parents helped the young couple to start on a little farm of their own, every daughter, as well as every son, receiving a portion of land or its equivalent in money and each were given a cow. He attended regularly the services in Frey chapel Sabbath day and unidweek prayer meetings. His children helped other neighboring centers larly the services in Frey chapel Sabbath day and midweek prayer meetings. His children helped other neighboring centers to organize and conduct to organize and conduct Sunday schools. All were singers.

#### How WE FOUND OURSELVES

"Seeing America First," by automobile, was the means of bringing Mrs. Alice G. Hornby, 1121021 to meet her mother's people at Linesville, Pa. She learned of a Henry Frey who was interested in looking up the family and at once took steps to get in touch with him.

112114 Jacob's son, 1121149 Henry Frey, b. 1850, was the youngest. grandson of Henrich and Barbara. Lived many years near them on his father's farm. Horse raiser and dealer. Later he moved to Salem, O., and was a wood worker in the shops of Salem.

A poem now and then, from his pen, showed his interest in life. He began looking up his Frey relatives about 1914, and received many letters from many sections of U. S. When in 1923 he invited to his home Mr. and Mrs. W. J. Hornby, they found he had gathered much interesting information, which he requested Mrs. Hornby to help him arrange systematically, which was enlarged on after more definite data had been obtained from the widely scattered relatives the records took on definite form in Oct. 1924, on Mrs. Hornby's second visit.

Early in Jan. 1925, Henry died, leaving the work for Mrs. Hornby to finish. She appealed to members from each of the 12 families interested, and with their hearty co-operation, the work of compiling the records went forward. At the second Frey reunion, in June, 1925, the matter was discussed of placing our records in the Book of "Gottfried Frey, Ancestry. and Posterity," by S. C. Frey, of York. A copy was passed about for inspection. Portions of special interest were read by Nervie Frey Shaw and Hugh A. Frey was requested to act as Treasurer and Mrs. H. A. Frey, as Secretary.

They assisted Mrs. Hornby to fill in all data so far collected into the records of each family of Henry and Barbara, took these records to Miss Jean Frey, teacher and writer, with the request that she complete the copy and prepare it for the publisher. This arduous task she undertook and at the third reunion, July 5, 1926, presented the records for addition, and correction, which followed at greater length than was anticipated, making

a much larger volume than had been planned. September 10th, found the copy in the hands of the publisher, still incomplete, but everyone desiring his book before Christmas time.

After the records were taken to Jean Frey, 1121234. Mr. and Mrs. Hornby took a copy of the first edition of this book to Frey descendants in California. Colorado, Iowa, Kansas, Nebraska, Oregon and Washington, gathering information and soliciting orders, meeting with success in both lines, making possible this addition to the story of Gottfried Frey. The desire for accuracy necessitated the sending of proofs, even as far as the Pacific Coast, delaying the publication, and, in some cases such proofs were not returned. Therefore, let every one bear with a smile whatever mistakes or omissions are found, and consider it well worth while, to be lined up with so worthy a family of Pioneers—carryiny the spirit of Luther—far from the homeland on Alpine slopes—even as it has been under the guiding hand of Providence that the truth should be carried unto the uttermost parts of the earth.

### DOCUMENTARY EVIDENCE

The first Frey Reunion, at Linesville, was held at the Frey Chapel, Oct. 11, 1923, and second on the "homestead" June, 1924. Previously, a "get together" call brought 26 to a banquet table in the house where Burbara lived after Henrich's death. He insisted on living in his own log house all his days, though Simeon's house was in the same yard, and a welcome extended.

### OPENING THE TREASURE BOX

At the first gathering in the home, now Belle Frey Baker's, an old time wooden box was produced, its contents spread out for inspection, and the original deed for 200 acres, 1803, saw the light of day, once more. It was recorded 1805 at Meadville, the county seat of Crawford, Co.

## PART COPY OF DEED

This Indenture, made the fifth day of February, 1803, between John Field, William Cramond and James Gibson, trustees of the Penn. Population Co., of the one part, and Henry Fryes assignee of Joseph Hayes, of Crawford Co., state of Pennsylvania of the other part. Whereas, Joseph Hayes on the twenty fifth day of August, one thousand, seven hundred and ninety seven (1797), agreed with the president and managers of said company, for the time being, for the purchase of the following tract of land, situated in the County of Crawford, as aforesaid, and bounded as follows:

Beginning at the northeast corner at a Buttonwood tree containing two hundred acres, and allowance of 6 p. c. for roads etc.—be the same n ore or less—and Joseph Hayes hath since bargained, sold, assigned and conveyed to the said Henry Frye, all his estate, title, rights and interest of, in said agreement and contract and tract of land to have and to hold the same to the only proper use, benefit and behoof of said Henry Fryes, his heirs and assignees—and the said Joseph Hayes convenanted one year from date, Aug. 25, 1797, to erect house fit for habitation of man, and clear and fence at least 8 acres of land, all of which Henry Fryes allegeth he hath done, for which and the money consideration of one hundred dollars receipt acknowledged.

The deed to Henry Frey's 200 acres in Crawford Co. Pa.—is made on "Parchment," 17 inches square. The official seal of Crawford Co. pressed on 1 3-4 in. sq. of paper over 3 red wax wafers—on outside of deed beside Recorder's statement, given by William Foster, for Patrick Farrelly, Dept. Book C—Page 52—1805 A. D. Second day of December, "Recorded in the office for recording deeds, and for the county of Crawford in our book C, page 52, the second day of December in the year of our Lord one thousand eight hundred and five. In testimony whereof I have set my hand and seal of office William Foster for Patrick Farrelly, Revr.,

### HENRY FREY'S WILL

I, Henry Frey of the Township of Conneaut, in the county of Crawford, and state of Pennsylvania, being somewhat feeble in body, but of sound mind and memory, do make and ordain this my last will and testimony in menner tollowing, to wit.

I give and bequeath to my wife, Barbary, all my personal property and money or money obligations to be used for her support if needed after my death. And should there be any, of the same remaining, after her decease, that remainder to be equally divided among my heirs.

I will all my Real Estate consisting of one hundred acres of land, with the appurtenances there-unto belonging to my son, Simeon, to be his to all intents and purposes in law and equity upon the condition of his paying five hundred and flfty dollars, to be paid in five equal yearly payments, without interest, to be paid in trade or land at a fair appraisal, the first payment to become due one year after my decease, or in case my wife Barbary shall survive me, then the first payment to become due one year from her death. The said sum of five hundred and fifty dollars to be divided equally among my following named children, viz: John and Samuei Frey, Polly Turner, Nancy Potter, Barbary Meeker's Heirs and Mary Ann, the widow of my sen, Joseph, deceased, who will be entitled to but fifty dollars having received fifty dollars heretofore. The remainder of my children: Catherine Graham, Martha Spofford, David, Jacob, Henry and Enoch having received their portion per their receipts.

I do hereby appoint my sons: Jacob and Enoch, executors of this my last will and testament. Thereby revoking and making void all and every other will at any time heretofore made by me and do declare this to be my last will and testament.

In witness whereof I hereunto set my hand and seal this seventh day of October, 1845. Signed, sealed and delivered in the presence of Joseph Brown and Edwin Brown.

### BIRTH RECORDS

Another old time paper was found to contain records of birth of first four children, in German Script. We here discover the dates corresponding to change of residence of the family of Heinrich and Barbara to Newberry township, "Yellow Breeches Creek," Deed Book 2O, page I, dated March 17, 1796. Henry Frey bought 49 acres, 81 perches, signed Heinrich Frey, Barbara Frey. This same property sold April 6, 1800. Hence the probability that these first four births occured in the home at York left to Henry by his father, Gottfried.

### The Exodus

In Spring of 1800, Heinreich and Barbara Frey, with seven small children, started over the mountains into the wild western lands, over the original "Penn Highway." It was a long journey and the roads were mere trails. They took with them cows and sheep, and as a result went very slowly. All but the smallest children walked most of the way, driving the animals. At night they camped by some stream and cooked their evening meal of wild game and corn mush, and at daybreak they were making ready to go on. Riding in the wagon or an oxcart, was not comfortable, for it had no springs and the way was rough. But Henry and Barbara were forceful and resourceful and so they arrived safely in Western Penn., near the Ohio border. Henry bought 200 acres of land from Joseph Hayes, with six acres already cleared, on which was a small log cabin. They built another log house and barn and began their new life.

Soon after coming to Crawford Co., they were both converted to Methodism and walked 40 miles to be immersed in Lake Erie. In 1818 a church was organized in Henry's house, later meeting in a log school house built on a corner of the land given to the community for educational purposes. Services were conducted by itinerant M. E. preachers. If none came, Heinrich talked. One Sunday one of the children objected to going to church through the storm. "Why don't you talk here?" he asked. "You would not get the habit of going to church," was the wise answer.

Frontiersmen were so often terribly brutal and wicked that the home training of the Freys seems remarkable for its simple virtue and refinement. In 1848 a frame structure was built for the Frey church. Heinrich, the father, gave the land. Samuel, 10th son, gave, and hauled, a large part of the selected lumber; Lewis Frey, son of Heinrich's son, Henry, sawed and prepared the lumber. Everybody gave willingly and everybody took candles to light the church or gave wood to heat it. All the Freys attended. They were a godly family, clean living and honorable.

At the third reunion, on July 4, 1926, the Freys once more filled their church and listened to Theodore Frey preaching a splendid sermon.

In York county, Heinrich and Barbara had spoken Pennsylvania Dutch. When they reached the new home they told the children they must speak English and made them do it. "You are Americans," they said, again and again. "You must talk as Americans talk." Heinrich taught himself to read English by comparing his English with his German Bible, a difficult task. He was a determined man. Public schools were not yet established and the Freys desired schools. There is still in existence the following agreement. Hiring William MacFayden (Faden) to keep private school.

Seven of these men were of the Frey family.

As the children grew they were taught to work. The girls were older than the boys. Each boy baby was given to one of the girls, who raised it under the mother's watchful eye. They raised their own flax and linen and made their own clothes, coloring them with butternut, willow, madder and indigo. When the boys grew up the farm work was divided among them, while the father tanned leather and made shoes. Work was systematized to the last degree. Almost nothing was bought. Maple sugar or honey was used for sweetening. Canning was unknown. Fruits were dredged with maple sugar and dried or made into preserves. Wild game. Wild turkeys were plentiful. Wild passenger pigeons gave variety. roosted by millions in Pymatuning Swamps. They brought home bags full and the women fried them partly, laid them down in great crocks and covered them with lard. They were delicious in winter. Simeon was a great hunter.

As they grew up they made homes of their own in the woods, clearing the land as their inther did. They were real pioneers; it was in their blood. One after another packed his belongings into a wagon and started west. They were pioneers in Ohio, in Indiana, in Illinois, in Michigan, in Iowa and in Missouri and now they are scattered from coast to coast. Most of them are farmers. There are a few preachers and lawyers and bankers, many teachers, and a great many engaged in business. We have found no criminals in our search. We are a family of decent, selfrespecting common people, such as Lincoln described: "God must have loved the common people; He made so many of them."

ATHARINA FREY, whose birth July 10, 1791, we find recorded by her father in German script, "under the sign of the scales," was lovingly called "Aunt Katy," and was widely known for her good deeds, fairness and efficiency. During her father's last illness, he requested that she come home to bake bread for him in

the old brick oven. Her home is still a hospitable roof where dwells her grandson, Sheldon Graham. Her husband, Robt. 

OHN FREY, b. Sept. 30, 1792. d. Dec. 1, 1846. M. Hannah Meeker, Linesville, Pa. The eldest son of Henrich and Barbara; a born pioneer. York Co. in the early days was heavily timbered. Probably his home on Yellow Breeches Creek, Newberry Twp., was a substantial loghouse. He with his parents and his

sisters, left York Co. about 1800, and travelled across the ints. westward, over the Penn Highways to Crawford Co., where he, at the age of 8 yrs. begun to be his father's right hand man. Tending the sheep and cows. Early in life, dependable, living near his father. After his marriage, his 9 ch. were born, before 1846, when he turned his face and his family to go farther west, assigning his interest in his father's estate to Simeon, for \$500. They traveled the old Joliet road thru Ohio, Indiana and Illincis, reaching Mc-Henry Co., Ill., Sept. 1846, all were affected by malaria. So they turned back to prairie lands of Indiana; at Valpariso John was so ill, they tarried, and kindly western frontiersmen, lent a helping hand, but John's work was o'er; he died Nov. 17, 1846. His widow and children, through the influence of James Williams, were taken into the hearts and homes of the Hoosiers, helped to secure good lands, and soon became independent. A good colony of these Frys may now be found in or about Hebron, Ind.

John Frey was a member of the 133d Penna. Militia, entering the army January, 1813, and being honorably discharged March 1, 1813, at Erie, Pa. His widow was granted a land warrant March 15, 1858.



AD AND SIMPLE is the story of this third child of Henry. "Born under the sign of the crab," so her father has recorded her birth on Dac. 18, 1793. She was the second of "mother's helpers" on the Pilgrimage across the mountains. In early life she was engaged to a patriot of 1812, who died for his country,

Elizabeth was noted for her fine weaving of linens, as well as wools. She lost her "Sweetheart" with "Perry on Lake Erie," and she remained true to his memory until her death on May 3, 1832.

OLLY FREY'S birth is recorded in a fine German script: "This summer cause to us, the Babe Matta, born June 18, 1795, under the sign of the scales." "Justice tempered with mercy," was the rule of her life. When five years old, she was one of the 7 children travelling westward over the mountains from York to Crawford County. Subsisting chiefly on milk from the cows, that hauled the oxcart in which they rode. July 26, 1817, she became second wife of Jesse Turner, b. Apr. 11, 1782, in Mass. They spent their lives on a farm near Pierpont, O. Polly died Jan. 4, 1875, "Aunt Polly Turner," lovingly called. Many stories are told of her prowess in the wilderness. She transplanted the pine trees, seen in picture of her son 17243, from the old homestead, to her own home in Ohio. Many stories are told of her prowess, in piloting a group of singers thru the woods to a new Sunday school, needing help of the Frey singers, to leading the cranberry pickers into the Pymatuning swamp, killing 27 rattlers, one day—"so they all say." 11241 POLLY TURNER, b. 

Felling trees daytimes to saw at night, sleeping the half hour while the saw passed thru the log. Keeping "batch" in an old log house, until he married, June, 1832, Emily MacFayden, b. June 14, 1805, whose mother Eleanor Graham, and father William MacFayden both came from Scotland. Married in Phila. about 1800, and settled near Conneaut lake, 7½ mi. S. E. from Linesville, 1840. Samuei Frey builded a new frame house for his family. After his wite died 1868, he moved with his children to Page Co., Iowa, where he lived on a farm until his death, 1888, near Clarinda, Iowa. 

The most he ever received for teaching was \$40.00 per month and boarded himself. Taught school near Springboro for one term, one term at Conneaut Center and the Lynn schoolhouse for two terms. Attended Allegheny College, Meadville, Pennsylvania for two years. Was licensed to exhort when he was about 22 years of age and he was ordained as local deacon at Youngstown, Ohio. First appointment was at Woodcockboro. The next circuit was at West Williamsfield, Ohio. Was recommended at the Erie annual conference as a suitable candidate for conference and soon after migrated to Michigan and the presiding elder forwarded his recommendation to the presiding elder in Michigan. In the year 1867, he traded his farm in Ashtabula County, Ohio, for land in Newaygo County, Michigan. April 18, 1867, started for Michigan in a prairie schooner, driving to Cleveland, Ohio, thence by boat to Detroit and then by prairie schooner to the new home, arriving there about April 30th. A log house of one room was on the land, in which he lived two summers. Later he built a frame house and in later years added an upright. He traveled the Berlin circuit for one year. Ashland two years and traveled several places in Michigan, Wisconsin and Oregon.
