NICHOLAS FAIN THE EMIGRANT

The Fain Family name is found spelled in various ways. Fain,, Fane and Fayne, for instance. All these branches have, however, a common origin in France.

The Inquisition and persecution in France drove the Fain Family to Ireland for safety about 1685.

Nicholas Fain, a member of this family, was born in Ireland about 1730. He married about 1752, Elizabeth Taylor, who was born in England about 1754. ~~They emigrated~~ ³⁴ to America and settled first in Chester County, Pa., where their children were born. They moved to Virginia and then to Washington County, N. C., now Washington Co., Tenn. In Ireland, they belonged to the Episcopal Church but in Tennessee they were Baptists. Their descendants are many of them Presbyterians.

The family has a remarkable military record as Nicholas Fain served in the Revolution with at least five of his seven sons, Samuel, John, William, Thomas and Ebenezer. One son, David, was killed by Indians and the seventh and youngest son, Reuben Fain, is credited by tradition with Revolutionary service although no proof of his service has as yet been found. It is a well known fact however, that in Washington and Greene Counties (now Tennessee) hundreds of young men served under Sevier and Shelby and other officers though their names were never entered on any roll. It is therefore more than probable that Reuben Fain, seventh son of Nicholas and Elizabeth Taylor Fain, did serve in the Revolution. The record of these seven sons, does not complete the military achievement of the family for the only daughter,

Elizabeth Fain, married Andrew Evans who was a Revolutionary soldier. The family has, therefore, the unusual record of the father, five sons and the only son-in-law in the battle of King's Mountain while the father and the seven sons served in the Revolution.

Nicholas Fain's service is proved by the Revolutionary Army accounts in the State Auditor's Department, Raleigh, N. C. Vol. I. No. 1-6. The following special certificate paid into the comptroller's office by John Armstrong, Book 3, page 332. Nicholas Fain, 27th of June, 182-7-14.

Nicholas Fain bought 130 acres of land on Wolfe Creek, on the South Fork of the Holston River in Washington Co., Va., January 29th. 1774. This was before he moved to Washington Co., N. C. He died at his home on Knob Creek, Washington Co., N. C., about 1785. His widow, Elizabeth Taylor Fain, was living in 1795.

Nicholas and Elizabeth Taylor Fain had eight children, seven sons and one daughter.

Hundreds of well-known people are descended from the pioneers, Nicholas and Elizabeth Taylor Fain. Every effort has been made to complete the descending lines, or at least to make them so clear that some names, which have been omitted because it was impossible to secure data, can be easily connected.

I. SAMUEL FAIN

I. Samuel Fain, eldest son of Nicholas Fain and Elizabeth Taylor Fain, was born January 20, 1753. He accompanied his parents in their removal from Pennsylvania to Virginia and thence to what is now Tennessee and he served with his father and four brothers in the Revolution. He was in the battles of Point Pleasant and King's Mountain. Proof of his service is found in Summer's History of Southwest Virginia, page 155, Ramsey's Annals of Tennessee, page 116, Spear's Prominent Tennesseans, page 218, and North Carolina Official Records.

There appear in the Revolutionary Army accounts in the State Auditor's Department, Raleigh, North Carolina, Vol. I., No. 1-6, the following special certificates paid into the Comptroller's office by John Armstrong, No. 3321, Samuel Fain, 27th June, 1782-5, and No. 954, Samuel Fain 12th June, 1783-6-6.

Samuel Fain married, about 1777, Rosanna McMahan, daughter of John McMahan, of Washington Co., N. C. She was born in Chester Co., Pa., about 1755.

(1). John Fain, son of Samuel and Rosanna McMahan Fain, was born April 30, 1778. He died October 11, 1852. He married December 12, 1812, Amelia S. Gillespie, born February 14, 1794, died February 21, 1864. She was the daughter of Captain Thomas Gillespie, a Revolutionary officer, and Agnes Orr Gillespie. Their children were:

(A) William Deaderick Fain, son of John and Amelia Gillespie Fain, born Sept. 14, 1813, died Sept. 13, 1883, married March 4, 1845, Elizabeth C. Moore, born November 5, 1823, died July 26, 1847. They lived at Stone Mountain, Ga. Their daughter, Elizabeth Amelia Jane Fain, married George Parrot, of Atlanta, Ga. and had four children: (a). William Marcus Parrott, born October 5, 1868, died young; (b). Mary Gilbert Parrott, born June 21, 1872; (c). George Theodore Parrott, born August 1, 1874; (d). John Parrott, born March 9, 1876, died young.

(B) Thomas Gillespie Fain, son of John and Amelia Gillespie Fain, was born May 20, 1815. He died in Dandridge, Tenn., 1890, unmarried.

(C) James Harry Fain, son of John and Amelia Gillespie Fain, was born August 21, 1817. He died, unmarried, August 20, 1836.

(D) Nancy Fain, daughter of John and Amelia Gillespie Fain, was born September 20, 1819; died December 11, 1820.

(E) Samuel Nicholas Fain, son of John and Amelia Gillespie Fain, was born October 1, 1821. He died June 2, 1893. He married June 6, 1847 his cousin Sallie G. Fain, daughter of Richard Fain. She was born February 10, 1838 and died June 19, 1812. They lived in Jefferson Co., Tenn. They had five children: (a). Eliza Amelia Fain, born April 28, 1868; (b). Mattie Gillespie Fain, born November 3, 1870; (c). John Richard Fain, born December 1, 1873; (d). Fannie Russell Fain, born August 7, 1876; (e). Bessie Rhea Fain, born October 26, 1878.

(F) Martha Gillespie Fain, daughter of John and Amelia Gillespie Fain, was born February 26, 1824; she died February 14, 1863. She married December 9, 1846, Leonard Gansevoort Ross, of New York.

Leonard Gansevoort Ross was a native of New York State, the son of Colonel Theodore Ross and Elizabeth Richards Gansevoort, a daughter of Judge Leonard Gansevoort, Jr., who was judge of the court of Albany, New York for many years, and served as Paymaster in the Revolutionary War. Theodore Ross, his father, was Colonel of the 15th Cavalry, New York State Militia in the War 1812, and member of the State Assembly from Essex County, New York, the 27th 28th and 29th sessions. Theodore Ross was the son of Daniel Ross III of the Ancient and Noble House of Ross, Rosshire in the Highlands of Scotland.

The children of Leonard Gansevoort Ross and Martha Gillespie Fain Ross were:

They had five children: (1) Albert Ross, (2) Robert Ross, (3) George Ross, (4) Clara Ross, who married Charles Deondof, of California, (5) Mabel Ross, who married Vernon Gould McCann of California.

(c) Amelia Fain Ross, born February 6, 1853; died July 26, 1906. She married O. B. Havis, but had no children.

(d) William Brazelton Ross, born January 1, 1853; married August 20, 1892, Lulu Pollard, of Florida. They had five children: (1) Lieut. Charles H. Ross, U. S. Navy; married 1925, Helen Stewart, of Portland, Oregon, (2) Ollie Lea Ross, born August 6, 1893; married August 16, 1922, Charles Alfred Gibson, of San Francisco, Calif., (3) William Brazelton Ross, junior, born November 16, 1896, (4) Katherine Ross, born June 28, 1898; married March 5, 1920,

Lieut William D. Dadd, U. S. Navy. They have a son, William Charles Dadd. (5) Louise Ross born July 25, 1900, married April 3, 1927, Eugene Bradley Evans, of Oakland, Cal.

(e) Leonard Gansevoort Ross, junior, born January 31, 1857; died November 18, 1920. He married Lulu Martin, of Atlanta, Ga. They had two children: (1) John Pew Ross, (2) Willie Theo Ross who married Alfred Guinn. They had two sons.

(f) Theodore George Ross, born February 18, 1859; married Effie Hayworth, born 1855. They had one son, Theodore George Ross, junior, born January 14, 1904 in Baltimore, Md.

(G) Elizabeth Isabella Fain, daughter of John and Amelia Gillespie Fain, born February 26, 1826, died July 23, 1858. She married June 6, 1849, John King, born December 4, 1819. They lived at King's Point, near Chattanooga, Tenn. They had three children:

(a) Amelia King, born March 20, 1850; died October 1871. She married June 21, 1870, John M. Gillespie and had one son, John King Gillespie, born September 1871; married October 24, 1895, Hortense Booth and lives in Knoxville. They have three children: (1) John King Gillespie, junior, who married Margaret McClellan. (2) Booth Gillespie, who married Emily Gilling, of North Carolina, (3) Hortense Gillespie.

(b) Mary Guy King, born April 8, 1852; married November 7, 1882, William R. Frye.

(c) John F. King, born February 6, 1866; died April 20, 1904; unmarried.

(H) Margaret Jane Fain, daughter of John and Amelia Gillespie Fain, was born April 12, 1828, died Dec. 4, 1877. She married July 25, 1854, Dr. Aaron C. White, born March 18, 1822; died August 19, 1874. They resided at Spring Hill, Tenn. They had five children.

(a) Rose White, who married John W. Cheers, and had four children: (1) Irene Mayes, (2) Margaret Fain, died young, (3) John W. Cheers, Jr., who married Elizabeth Moore of Florida, and had two children, Elbridge Wharton Cheers and Jane Cheers; and (4) Rose White.

(b) Dr. John Fain White married Caroline Harrell, of Memphis, Tenn., and had one son, John Fain White, who died in infancy.

(I) John Newton Fain, son of John and Amelia Gillespie Fain, born July 17, 1830, died March 18, 1890. He married August 10, 1854, Maria L. E. Moore, born February 28, 1837, died May 25, 1860, daughter of Col. William Moore. They had a child, Maria Fain, who died unmarried. John Newton Fain married August 13, 1865, the sister of his first wife, Mattie E. Moore, born July 3, 1842, died June 21, 1872. They had children; Flora Fain, who married Dr. M. Z. Crist, of Atlanta, Ga., and John W. Fain. John Newton Fain married a third time but had no children by his third marriage.

(J) George Alexander Fain, son of John and Amelia Gillespie Fain, was born November 12, 1832. He died January 4, 1901. He married July 21, 1854, Eliza Ruth Moore, born November 10, 1834, died November 18, 1908, daughter of Col. William Moore and his second wife, Mary Ann Earnest. They had nine children:

(a) Minnie Fain, born 1856, married Gen. Pickle, a distinguished lawyer of Knoxville, who was Attorney General of Tennessee for sixteen years, born 1845, died 1917. Mrs. Pickle lives in Florida.

(b) William Moore Fain, born 1858, married twice. He first married Lucie Estelle Meek of Dandridge, Tenn. His second wife was Lula Anderson of Ringgold, Ga. His children by his first wife were (1) Charles Moore Fain, married Jessie Colhoun and had Elizabeth Lucille, Margaret Col-

mack; they have one daughter, Katherine King Carmack who houn, and Mary Nell; (2) William L. (2) Elizabeth Fain, daughter of Samuel and Rosanna McMahan Fain, was born July 12, 1779. She died April 14, 1849. She married December 23, 1802, Josiah Clawson. of

Greeneville, Tenn., son of Samuel and Ruth Little Clawson. Their children were:

(A) Samuel Fain Clawson, born November 19, 1803.

(B) John Fain Clawson, born October 16, 1805.

(C) Ruth Little Clawson, born August 16, 1807. married Abner Frazier. Thier son, Capt. Samuel Abner Frazier, born January 29, 1840, died December 11, 1921. He was a distinguished officer in the Confederate Army. He married Annie Elizabeth Keith, of Athens, Tenn., daughter of Col. Alexander and Sarah Foree Keith. They had two children, Sarah Ruth Frazier and Alexander Keith Frazier, both of whom were elected to the Tennessee Legislature.

The First Woman Elected to the
Tennessee Legislature

Miss Sarah Ruth Frazier, a great-great-great granddaughter of Nicholas Fain, the Emigrant, was the first woman elected to the Tennessee Legislature after the passage of the Nineteenth Amendment.

(4) Isabella Fain, daughter of Samuel and Rosanna McMahan Fain, was born April 15, 1783. She married twice; married first, Josiah Temple; married second, David Holt. Isabella Fain died Oct. 25, 1852.

(5) Nicholas Fain, son of Samuel and Rosanna McMahan Fain, was born May 10, 1785. He died Feb. 24, 1830, near Columbia, Tenn. He married twice.

(6) Margaret Fain

(6) Margaret Fain, daughter of Samuel and Rosanna McMahan Fain, was born February 17, 1788. She died June 30, 1863. She married, 1863, Samuel Bicknell, born Feb. 17, 1780, in Jefferson County, Tenn. They had seven children:

(B) James W. Bicknell, born October 21, 1813, lived in Redwood, California, where he was a lawyer and a Judge. He died 1884.

II. CAPTAIN JOHN FAIN

II. Captain John Fain, the second son of Nicholas Fain and Elizabeth Taylor Fain, was born in Chester Co., Pa. in 1755. He was killed by Indians at Sitico August 8, 1788. His will was dated July 15, 1788. He served in the Revolution and was in the battles of Point Pleasant and King's Mountain. Proof of his revolutionary service is in Summers History of Southwest Virginia, Ramsey's Annals of Tennessee, Haywood's History of Tennessee and Spear's History of Prominent Tennesseans. John Fain bought 30 acres of land on Wolf Creek, on the South Fork of the Holston River, Washington County, Virginia. This was before the family moved to Washington County, N. C.

He married in 1781 Nancy Agnes McMahan, born in Chester County, Pa. August 17, 1763, died in Washington County, Tenn. in March 1842. She was the daughter of John McMahan. Their children were:

III. David Fain, third son of Nicholas Fain and Elizabeth Taylor Fain was born in Chester County, Pa. about 1756. He was killed by Indians near Crab Orchard, Ky.

Crab Orchard was a station on the "Wilderness Road" and it is now Crab Orchard Springs in Lincoln County, Kentucky. Many revolutionary soldiers, including Nathaniel Hart, were killed in the neighborhood. It is believed that David Fain was unmarried when he was killed. Some years later, his only sister, Elizabeth Fain Evans and her husband, Andrew Evans, moved to Kentucky and they found, near the place where he was killed, his silver knee buckles engraved with his name. These were kept in the family for many years. This information was given to the author in a letter from the late Fain Anderson of Washington County, Tennessee.

IV. WILLIAM FAIN

Christopher Cunningham and Colonels John Sevier and Carter, of North Carolina. He engaged in the battles of Musgrove's Mill, Woffords Iron Works and King's Mountain where he was wounded in the leg. He applied for pension March 11, 1838 while living in Georgia.
