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
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

FOREWORD

The Board of Chosen Freeholders of Sussex County and the New Jersey State Planning Board, as co-sponsor, are presenting this Inventory of the County Archives to the citizens of Sussex County and the State.

This publication should be of interest and value not only to the citizens of Sussex County, but also to students of governmental procedure, for in order to understand county government in general it is necessary to understand county government in an individual county. It may be said, however, that the county government systems of the several states vary profoundly, and that no two counties in the same state ever employ the same system with identical results.

The Historical Records Survey is engaged in revealing the vast documentary resources of this county, upon the basis of which more adequate history may be written. The task is stupendous, of course, but its basic value, indeed its outright necessity, has been recognized for more than a generation by our leading historians. Since the early years of the American Historical Association, established more than a half century ago, this challenge to inventory the historical resources of public archives has fired the imagination of historians and has led them to exert prodigious efforts to realize a comprehensive Nation-wide survey of records.

The question naturally arises as to the trustworthiness of these inventories. Tremendous difficulties are inevitably encountered in operating such a program, but the work has been so organized and supervised that the product of every worker is checked and rechecked and every editorial step is subjected to careful scrutiny. Thus the final product is so critically tested that the Survey produces inventories, the quality and reliability of which surprises even the most exacting scholars.

The Survey has already been able to stimulate better record-keeping in public offices. The mere existence of an inventory of the county records compels certain progress in archival administration, because increased demand for access to records must be satisfied. This fact is readily observable in counties where inventories have been made available. Furthermore, limitations of space have made it difficult for all the records to be preserved permanently, and this fact has resulted in the past in their haphazard and illogical destruction. In the future, a study of the inventories will make it possible to formulate well-considered and uniform policies for the preservation of records on the basis of their possible future value in governmental administration and in research. The present all-too-frequent shameful disregard or neglect of the public interest in basic records is being gradually overcome.

To insure the most perfect product possible, the Survey has secured the technical services of the most competent specialists in the various fields of its enterprise. These technicians are assisted by editorial personnel of proved ability and capacity. In each phase of work, an Assistant Project Technician functions as editor. All technical and editorial phases are coordinated by the Project Technician, who is the Consultant of the project. To insure maximum productive efficiency in editorial work without overemphasis of any single phase at the expense of others, all editors are jointly responsible to the Project Technician and to the State Supervisor, as well as to the Assistant State Supervisors in charge of editorial work. Each editor is relieved of all administrative detail in connection with the operation of his editorial unit, an editorial assistant being charged with administrative responsibilities.

As the main function of the Survey has achieved a competence in operation, more diversified activities have been undertaken, until the Survey now is engaged in the most comprehensive program of research in history ever attempted. This program has been successful, as is manifested by the finished products of its processes.

It has been my privilege to be the Field Supervisor in charge of the Survey workers who inventoried the records and gathered the necessary data for this inventory of the County Archives of Sussex County. This volume should stimulate interest in the historical background of the county, the description of which is based largely on primary source material. The precise, detailed description of the organization, structure, and functions of the county's governmental agencies will afford a better understanding of such matters to the layman. It will also serve as an archival guide to the requirements of day-to-day administration by the officials of the county, as well as to the needs of lawyers, businessmen and other citizens who require facts from the public records for the proper conduct of their affairs. This publication is so designed that it can be used for research in unprinted sources in the same way that one uses a library card catalog for printed sources.

PREFACE

The New Jersey Historical Records Survey Project was organized in February 1936 as a unit of the Works Progress Administration. It operates as a State-wide project under the local sponsorship of the New Jersey State Planning Board. The technical supervision of the Survey is exercised nationally by Mr. Sargent B. Child, Director. State administrative supervision is provided by Mrs. Eva H. Reda-Reina, State Director of the Community Service Programs. The Survey, in New Jersey, is under the additional supervision of Mr. R. C. Branion, Regional Director of WPA.

The Survey has as its objective the preparation of inventories of the municipal, county, State, and Federal archives in New Jersey and the publication of these inventories as guides to material of historical interest. In addition to these inventories, work is proceeding in the cataloging and calendaring of manuscript collections, the inventorying of church archives, and the transcription of some of the earliest public records. Additional features of this comprehensive approach to authentic historical source materials are found in the Survey's research in American imprints and portraits in New Jersey.

The Inventory of the County Archives of New Jersey will, when completed, consist of 21 volumes, one for each county in the State. The individual units are to be numbered according to their respective position in an alphabetical list of the counties. Thus, the inventory herewith presented for Sussex County is No. 19. The inventories of the State and municipal archives will be published in separate series.

The Survey is engaged in compiling the monumental Atlas of Congressional Roll-Calls: An Analysis of Yea-Nay Votes, mapping, with analyses, roll-calls, and index of all the yea-nay votes in the Congress of the United States from 1775-1932. It is continuing the collection of the Messages and Papers of the Presidents, i. e. the messages, communications, proclamations, executive and administrative orders of the Presidents since January 21, 1937, bringing up to date the original compilation initiated by the Survey in New York. It maintains a cumulative list and index of all Presidential Executive Orders of the Unnumbered Series now containing entries for over 1,400 such orders. It is preparing a handbook of the federal district and circuit courts, consisting of maps showing the evolution of their jurisdiction, tables of all times and places of meeting, and complete rosters of their judges. The legislative ordinances of the Continental Congresses and the Congresses of the Confederation are being compiled for the first time, in a format based on that used in the United States Statutes at Large. Revised and up-to-date rosters of all members of the Congress of the United States from 1789 to date are also in preparation, and compilations of Presidential Executive Orders and Proclamations for twelve special topics, including Passport Regulations, Consular Regulations, Wildlife Conservation, Alien Entry Regulations, and National Forests, are being assembled in order that this valuable and useful material may be made available to the public in its most usable form. All these work phases are being handled by the Congressional Vote Analysis Unit.

The Survey is also engaged in preparing a comprehensive statement of the general laws regarding county government, to be entitled <u>County Government in New Jersey</u>. It is expected that this forthcoming publication will serve as a handbook on the organization, structure, and evolution of county government in New Jersey, and will make it unnecessary to repeat certain items of general information in the various inventories. The office essays in this volume are, therefore, limited to information on the creation of the office and its present status, the manner in which it is filled, the term of office, and a brief statement setting forth the major duties or functions of the office.

Work on the survey of the records in Sussex County began in December 1940 and was completed in March 1941. The field work was supervised by George Decker, assisted by the local staff. The recheck was made by Allyn G. Jackson, Entry Department Supervisor, aided by Ellsworth D. Hatfield, Harry Heller, Howard Stillwell, and William Hull. The entries were prepared and edited by Mary C. HcMullen, Ellsworth D. Hatfield, Bart J. Steib, and Frank C. Fenner under the supervision of Allyn G. Jackson.

The historical sketch was written by John J. Oliver under the direction of James Moceri, Essay Supervisor. The essay on the housing, care and accessibility of the records was written under the direction of Jean L. Saville, Essay Supervisor. The county office essays were prepared under the supervision of William Yacavone, who also wrote the governmental organization and court essays. Local data assembled by field units for use in the editorial office was collated by workers under direction of Caulder B. Perryclear. Maps and charts for this inventory were drawn by kobert Carlson, draftsman. All legal citations were checked under the direction of Thomas P. Chichi, Legal Research Supervisor. The entire inventory was compiled under the supervision of Elmer Swan, State Editor.

All editorial activities of the Survey were conducted under the technical direction of Louis A. Lupton, Assistant State Supervisor. The inventory in final manuscript form was edited in the central office in Washington by Guy P. Timboe, essistant editor, and further reviewed by Mabel S. Brodie, editor in charge of public records inventories.

The various volumes of the inventory of State, county, municipal, and church archives of New Jersey are distributed without charge to Government offices, libraries, and historical societies in New Jersey, and to major universities, libraries, and depositories throughout the Nation. It is planned to make complete extracts of the historical sketches, governmental organization essays, and maps and charts of all completed county and municipal inventories for distribution to high schools of New Jersey; and also to make them available to other educational institutions, both within and beyond boundaries of the State of New Jersey.

This inventory could not have been completed but for the cooperation of Sargent B. Child, Director, and of the officials of the County of Sussex. The editorial staff of the New Jersey Historical Records Survey also expresses its gratitude to Robert W. Allan, State Administrator, for his personal service and attention which were of inestimable aid in the production of this inventory and for the continuance of the survey under local sponsorship.

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HISTORICAL SKETCH

Introduction

Sussex County, situated in the extreme northwestern section of New Jersey, presents a sharp contrast to the great industrial and metropolitan region around Essex and Hudson Counties not only in social and economic life but in physical geography. Of a total area of 531.32 square miles, comprising 338,393 acres of land surface, 136,538 acres are still in forest. (1) Some 12,428 acres of wild forest land along the Kittatinny Ridge have been purchased by the State and converted into the Stokes State Forest. (2)

The western section of the county is in the Appalachian Zone, known here as Kittatinny Valley and Mountain. (3) Slates, limestones, and sandstones of Palezoic origin underlie the surface soil in this zone which extends southwesterly from Orange County in New York. (4) A great variety of mineral deposits have been discovered in this region; 123 different minerals are found in the Hamburg-Franklin section alone. The deposits at Ogdensburg and Franklin, consisting chiefly of zinc, iron, and manganese oxides, have a world-wide importance. (5)

The eastern third of the county is almost entirely in the Highlands, which extend in the same southwesterly direction as the Kittatinny Mountains. Composed mainly of granite and gneiss, the Highlands form part of the oldest geological strata in North America. Deposits of magnetite, though of negligible commercial importance, are also found in this area. (6)

Sussex County might well be called the "Switzerland of America", for its mountains and more than 60 lakes provide a playground for thousand of visitors every year. Hundreds of cottages dot its 6,000 acres of lake area, while its State parks are a veritable mecca for campers and other devotees of outdoor life. Lake Hopatcong, the largest of these

lakes, extends into Morris County. Other of the better known lakes include Swartswood, Culvers, Mohawk, and Wawayanda, the latter being the site of a Y. M. C. A. camp for boys. Small streams, which annually attract hundreds of fishermen, also are found within the county's boundaries. Thus, Sussex plays an important part in New Jersey's role as one of the Nation's great year-round resort communities. (7)

Settlement

There is considerable variance of opinion as to where the first permanent white settlement in Sussex was located. (8) A group of enterprising Hollanders, primarily interested in exploiting the mineral resources of the region, built the "Old Mine Road" through Sussex County from their settlement in what is now Kingston, New York, to the Pahaquarry mine holes in Warren County. It is not definitely known, however, whether any remained to settle in Sussex after the English concuest of New Netherland in 1664. (9)

Captain Schuyler, who had found no white settlement in the Sussex region when he visited it in 1693, (10) received a patent for 1,000 acres in this area in 1697. (11) In the same year the colonial government of New York, which also claimed possession of some Sussex territory, granted a patent for 1,200 acres to Jacob Codebec, Thomas Swartout, Anthony Swartout, Bernadus Swartout, John Tys, Peter Ginar and David Jamison, who had already occupied this land, purchased previously from the Indians. (12) In the early wears of the eighteenth century numbers of Hollanders and Huguenots, possessing such family names as Cortright, Van Auken, Westbrook, Decker, Kuykendal, Westfall, Cole, and Davis, made their way from Ulster and Orange Counties in New York to the upper Delaware Valley on the Sussex side and settled in the vicinity of Port Jervis. (13) In 1730, surveyors employed by the Prwince of New Jersey wrote of a prosperous settlement in the upper Delaware Valley. (14)

What became known as the "Minisink Settlement," opposite the lower end of the "Great Minisink Island" in what is now Montague Township, was first settled by Johannes Westbrook and Simon Westfall. (15) Situated on the route of "Old Mine Road," it was, as early as 1650, a stopping place for men and teams carting copper ore from Pahaquarry to the Hudson. (16)

About 1741 John Peter Bernhardt, who had emigrated from Germany to Germantown, Pennsylvania, settled on the "Tehaenetcong" or Paulinskill near the present site of Stillwater. (17) Five years later, his son-inlaw, Caspar Schaeffer, purchased an adjoining tract of 150 acres from John Reading and Samuel Green. (18) The Wintermutes, Snovers, Swartswelders, Staleys, Merkels, Schmucks, Snooks, Mains, Couses, and other Germans soon followed them in the settlement of the valley of the Paulinskill. (19)

After the close of the French and Indian War, Sussex County was populated by large numbers of Puritans who had originally settled in Long Island and in Orange County. They numbered among others the Greens, Hunts, Blackwells, Blanes, Browns, Brokaws, Howells, Hopkins, Beegles, Townsends, Ketchams, Collards, Mills, Havens, Moores, Hills, Dentons, Cases, Knapps, Youngs, Smiths, Coes, Johnsons, Wallings and others. (20)

Organization

When Sir George Carteret and the four Quakers, Penn, Lucas, Byllynge, and Laurie, drew up the Quintipartite Deed on July 1, 1676 dividing New Jersey into the Provinces of East and West Jersey, the area which is now Sussex County was equally divided between the two in consequence of the partition-line that was drawn from the northwest corner of the Province to Little Egg Harbor. (21) In 1694 the Assembly of West Jersey assigned the western section to the jurisdiction of Burlington County. (22) In 1709 all the present area of Sussex came under the jurisdiction of Burlington when the General Assembly redefined the boundaries

of all existing counties. (23) The Sussex region formed a part of Hunterdon County from 1714, when Hunterdon was set up as a completely independent county, (24) to 1739, when the northern section of Hunterdon, which included Sussex, was set off as Morris County. (25) In 1753 all the land in Morris County north of the Musconetcong River was erected into the county of Sussex. (26) The severance of Warren County in 1824 from Sussex marked the only important change in the territorial jurisdiction of the county. (27)

The "Precinct of Minisink," extending from Carpenter's Point across the State line to the precinct of Goshen in New York, was the first local governing unit in the Sussex area. (28) Politically, however, the inhabitants of the "Frecinct of Minisink" came under the jurisdiction of the colony of New York. They voted in Orange County until their votes were transferred to Ulster County in 1701. These votes were restored to Orange County 8 years later. (29)

Even before Sussex County was formed from a part of Morris County the need for some form of municipal government was met by the organization of townships. New Town and Wallpack, which comprised all of the present Sussex area, were the first of these unincorporated local bodies. (30) Among the other early townships to be formed were Montague, erected in 1759 from Wallpack by royal patent; Sandyston, from Wallpack in 1762; and Hardyston, from Newton. (31) Vernon Township, taken from Hardyston in 1792, was the first of the present municipalities to be incorporated in Sussex County. (32) The townships of Frankford, Montague,

Newton, Sandyston, Wallpack, and Wantage acquired a legal status as a corporate body in 1798 by the incorporation of the inhabitants of all New Jersey townships. Hardyston Township was also incorporated in the same year. (33)

Boundaries

Prior to 1772, when the Assembly of New Jersey accepted the present northern division line between New York and New Jersey, the northern boundary of Sussex County had been a point of controversy for almost seven decades; some 210,000 acres of land were involved in the dispute. (34) Although the General Assemblies of the two provinces in 1719 confirmed the fixing of a partition line from a point at a latitude 41 degrees and 40 minutes north on the Delaware River to Gochecton or Station Point on the Hudson River, (35) a number of individuals holding New York land grants maintained that their patents included land that was legally supposed to be in New Jersey. (36)

In 1748 the Assembly of New Jersey laid before the Assembly of New York a modified boundary proposal embracing some concessions to New York. (37) The inhabitants of Orange County, using whatever influence they had with the Crown, had the proposal defeated. (38) In 1762, the board of freeholders of Sussex County, countered by laying claim to all

the territory embraced by the "Precinct of Minisink." The dispute was finally ended when a Royal Commission, to whom the two colonies had submitted the entire matter for arbitration, fixed the present boundary in 1769. (39)

The original boundaries of Sussex in 1769 extended along the Musconetcong River from its mouth in the Delaware River to Lake Hopatcong, from the latter northeast to the State line, thence to the Delaware River, following its course to the Musconetcong River. (40) In 1824, the southern section of the county was incorporated as Warren County and the new southern line of Sussex was made to run in a straight line from the mouth of the Flat Brook on the Delaware River through the northeast corner of the Hardwick Church property to the Musconetcong River. (41)

Courthouses

After Sussex County was set up in 1753, (42) the first court of justice was held on November 20, 1753 at Jonathan Pettit's log tavern in what is now the village of Johnsonburg in Warren County. (43) In 1754, the board of justices and freeholders of Sussex County met at the home of Samuel Green in Warwick Township in what is now Warren County (44) and made arrangements for a 3-day meeting to select a site for the courthouse and jail. (45) Although a small "Log Jail" was built on a site near Jonathan Pettit's tavern, where court sessions continued to be held four times a year from November 1753 to February 1756, (46) it was too poorly constructed for the "safe-keeping" of prisoners. (47) Later the courts were held at Thomas Woolverton's tavern, near what is now Huntsville in Sussex County. (48) The General Assembly, acknowledging the petitions of the Sussex people, authorized the building of a courthouse and jail in 1761 and ordered that the structure be erected on the plantation of Henry Hairlocker, within a half-mile of his residence, then the only dwelling in what is now Newton. (49)

The Board of Freeholders levied a tax of \$500 in 1762 for the construction of the building and followed the initial levy with additional taxes for the next few years until the total cost of \$5,600 was met. Although the jail quarters were completed in 1763, it was not until May 1765 that the building was opened for the holding of the county courts. Remodelled and enlarged by an addition in 1844, it was completely destroyed by fire 3 years later. (50)

In February 1847, the board of freeholders appropriated \$8,500 and the citizens contributed \$6,500 for the erection of a new building. A proposal was made at this time to have the county seat transferred to Branchville or Augusta but the board of freeholders turned it down by a vote of 14 to 12. Completed shortly after the funds were raised, the courthouse rem_pined practically unchanged until 1911 when fire destroyed nearly the entire second floor. (51)

Indian Difficulties

In 1755 and 1756 the General Assembly of New Jersey was obliged to pass acts to guard the northwestern frontier of Sussex County from the repeated incursions of the Indians. (52) In June 1758, Governor Bernard consulted with Governor Berry of Pennsylvania for the purpose of taking measures to end the bloodshed. On August 7,1758 a conference was held with Teedyescung, Sachem of the Delawares, to discuss means of bringing about an amicable settlement. At the final conference, held at Easton, Pennsylvania, in October 1758, the grievances and complaints of both sides were aired and liberally redressed. (53)

Revolutionary War

Although the English-born owners of the Andover Forge and Furnace were loyal to the Crown and abandoned their works at the outset of the Revolutionary War, (54) the majority of the furnace and forge operators threw their support to the cause of independence. They were greatly influenced in their course by Parliament's-opposition to any vigorous development of colonial manufactures. Parliament had particularly discriminated against the iron masters by prohibiting them from

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processing iron beyond the bar, or bloom, stage and from erecting mills for the slitting and rolling of iron. (55)

The opposition to English Colonial policy had become even more pronounced as that policy continued to obstruct the industrial and commercial development of the colonies. In 1770, the inhabitants and freeholders of Sussex County met at the courthouse to adopt retaliatory measures against New York merchants guilty of violating the Non-Importation Agreement of the American colonists. They passed a resolution expressing their "Abhorrence and Detestation" of these merchants and voicing their determination to divert down the Delaware the trade they had been giving to New York. (56) Provoked by the arbitrary methods of Parliament in taxing the American Colonies, the inhabitants and freeholders of Sussex County, meeting at the courthouse in Newton on July 1, 1774, protested against the imposition of taxes without their consent. It was resolved to name a committee to confer with representatives from other counties in a general "Congress of Deputies," (57) which convened at New Brunswick on July 23, 1774. (58) What has been called Sussex County's "Declaration of Independence" took place on May 10, 1775 when the board of freeholders ordered the sheriff to pay off the judges appointed by the Crown; this was, in effect, a notice of dismissal. (59) On October 20, 1775 the Provincial Congress, without consulting the Governor, organized, among others, the first regiment of Sussex County militia. (60) Later the Provincial Congress, issuing orders for the regulation of the militia, set up 2 regiments and 1 battalion in Sussex County and requested that the county furnish 5 companies of Minute Men of 64 men each (61)

In Sussex, revolutionary sentiment was crystallized in the organization of a county committee of safety as well as several township committees of safety. (62) In February 1776, The Provincial Congress asked Sussex County to raise 593 pounds of the 10,000 pounds required to

purchase war materials for Jersey troops. (63) The Provincial Committee of Safety, accepting the invitation of John Cleves Symmes, then in command of the battalion stationed in Newton, convened there from July 5, 1777 to August 21, 1777, after which it adjourned to Princeton. (64)

When, in July 1776, the Continental Congress requested the Provincial Congress to provide 2,000 men as the New Jersey quota for the battle unit known as the Flying Corps, Sussex furnished 2 companies of 64 men. (65) Washington, however, writing to the Governor on November 21, 1776, said "From Sussex Colonel Symmes had arrived, but his following was inconsiderable." (66) The Sussex militia was characterized by General Dickinson as "extremely unfriendly to the cause in general." (67)

The failure of Washington to hold the northern part of the State in the campaign of 1776 caused many Sussex people to lose all hope of ultimate victory. Deserting to the victorious British forces occurred all too frequently. (68) On October 15, 1777 Governor Livingston, who a week before called upon Burlington, Sussex, Monmouth and Middlesex Counties to furnish 2,000 militia, informed Washington that he had received no answer from Sussex to his appeal. (69) Despite the difficulty of recruiting soldiers in Sussex County, more then 1,000 Sussex men served in the Continental Army. (70)

Although the Tories were rather numerous in Sussex County, they could not render effective assistance to the British because of their remoteness from the royal outposts. (71) The large landowners, of whom the most prominent was Joseph Barton, were probably the most active in support of the Crown. (72) One of the most active officers in the New

Jersey Volunteers, the military organization of the loyalist sympathizers, was Lieutenant James Moody of Sussex County. (73) Despite their apparent strength in Sussex, numerous Tories lost their estates through confiscation as a penalty for their opposition to the American cause. (74)

Civil War

Shortly after the outbreak of the Civil War, the Sussex Bank of Newton and the Bank of Wantage offered loans of \$20,000 and \$10,000 respectively to purchase equipment for volunteers. (75) Although Captain G. Fitts was successful in raising a company of troops for 3 months' service almost immediately after President Lincoln's first call for volunteers, these men were never mustered into service. A large number of the men, however, enlisted later for 3 years in Company D of the Third Regiment. (76) The Second Regiment with Company B from Sussex saw action with the First New Jersey Brigade at Bull Run, at Gaines' Mill, at Manassas Junction, and at Crampton's Gap, also participating in the action at Fredericksburg, Chancellorsville, and Gettysburg. Sussex men in Company D of the Third Regiment saw action at Bull Run, at Cloud's Mills and at Gaines' Farm, Virginia. Another Sussex unit, Company I of the Seventh Regiment, fought at Williamsburg, Fair Oaks, White Oak Swamp, Chancellorsville, and Gettysburg. (77)

The Fifteenth Regiment, with Companies A, B, C, D, F, G, H, I, and K, wholly or partially composed of men from Sussex County, received its baptism of fire at Fredericksburg and later saw action in other important battles, suffering during the course of the war a loss of 1,455 men out of a total enlistment of 1,871. (78) The Twenty-seventh Regiment, with Companies A, D, H, and K recruited exclusively from Sussex, was mustered into service in September 1862. (79)

A majority of troops in Company A and practically all of Company B of the Harrison Light Cavalry were raised at the Cochran House in Newton in 1861 for 3 years' service. Generally known as the "Sussex

(80) The First Regiment of New Jersey Cavalry, consisting chiefly of Sussex County men in Companies A, B, C, D, E, F, G, H, I, K, L, and M, fought a number of engagements at Fredericksburg, Brandy Station, and Stony Creek. (81)

World War

National Guardsmen of Sussex County, mustered into the Federal service shortly before the entry of the United States into the World War, were assigned to the 29th Division, the "Blue and Gray," when it was organized in 1917. They fought their initial engagement in the Meuse and Argonne offensive and were marching on Metz when the armistice was signed. (82)

During the course of the war, 539 Sussex men were drafted into the army. (83) Most of them were assigned to the 78th Division, which was organized at Camp Dix on August 23, 1917. (84) Other men from Sussex County served in the 1st, 2d, 3rd, 4th, 5th, 27th, 77th, 79th, 80th, 82d, 87th, and 88th Divisions. (85) During the war, "home service" sections of the American Red Cross were organized in Hamburg, Layton, Bevans, Swartswood, and Newton. (86) The Lieutenant Charles A. Meyer Post No. 86 of the American Legion, was organized in Newton on August 17, 1923. (87)

Religion

The people of "Minisink Settlement," meeting with Dominie Mancius of Kingston in 1737, planned the establishment of four Reformed churches in the Delaware Valley. These were all chartered under the same title, the "Church of Wallpack." Two of the churches, one at Dingman's Ferry in Pennsylvania and the other at Layton in Sussex County, comprised the Upper Wallpack Reformed Congregation. The other two, one at Bushkill,

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Pennsylvania, and the other at Flatbrookville, were known as the Lower Wallpack Congregation. (28) John Casparis Fryenmouth, a young student of theology, was selected by the people to be their minister and sent to Holland to complete his education. He returned in 1742 to assume his duties in the congregation. (89)

The First Baptist Church of Sussex was organized in Newton in 1751 by a group of settlers originally from Newfield, Connecticut. This church was the nucleus of the Sussex Baptist Association, which was known after 1871 as the North Association of the New Jersey Baptist Convention. (90) Toward the end of the eighteenth and during the course of the nineteenth centuries many Baptist bodies were organized throughout the county. Other churches besides the First Baptist Church of Sussex which are currently active are the Hamburg Baptist Church, organized in 1798; the Lafayette Baptist Church of Lafayette, organized in 1830; the First Baptist Church of Newton, organized in 1835; and the Glenwood Baptist Church, organized in 1862 as the North Vernon Baptist Church. (91)

The Presbyterian Churches established in Sussex County during the eighteenth century reflected the Scotch and English backgrounds of many of the first settlers. The first of these churches was the Pepakating Presbyterian Church organized at the "Beemer Meeting House" in Beemerville about 1740. (92) The First Presbyterian Church of Wantage, originally organized as the Dutch Reform "Clove" Church in 1787, was incorporated under its present name in 1817, at which time its house of worship was erected. Other early Presbyterian churches include the First Church of Newton, organized in 1786; (93) the First Presbyterian Church of Stillwater, organized in 1771 by Lutheran and Calvinist German settlers on the Paulins Kill; (94) the First Presbyterian Church of

Sparta, organized and incorporated in 1786 as the First Church of Hardyston; (95) and the First Church of Hamburg, formed in conjunction with the Baptists in 1813 and constituted as a Presbyterian church in 1819. (96) In addition there are today Presbyterian churches in Andover, Beemerville, Branchville, Franklin, Lafayette, Stanhope, Sussex and Yellow Frame. (97)

Christ Church, which was established in Newton in 1769 and incorporated on August 15, 1774, was the first Protestant Episcopal Church in Sussex County. (98) There are today four other churches of this denomination, namely St. Mary's Mission in Sparta, Christ Mission in Stanhope, St. Thomas' Church in Vernon, and the Church of the Good Shepherd in Hamburg. (99)

The Irish and Scotch-Irish, attracted to Sussex as early as 1750 by the nascent iron industry, were the first Catholics to settle in Sussex County. (1) Father Ferdinand Farmer, a missionary priest, came to Sussex County in 1753 and again in subsequent years to give spiritual advice to his scattered flock. St. Joseph's Church in Newton, organized in 1885 by Father McMahon, was the first Catholic church to be built in Sussex County. (2) Today there are eight other Catholic churches in the county, all belonging to the Diocese of Paterson. (3)

In 1926 there were 9,445 church members distributed among the various denominations as follows: 839 Northern Baptists, 2,411 Methodist Episcopalians, 2,414 Presbyterians, 1,047 Protestant Episcopalians, 2,220 Roman Catholics, and 1,514 of all other faiths. (4) In 1940, 68 church bodies representing 12 denominations tended the religious needs of the Sussex citizenry. (5)

Education

What was probably Sussex County's first schoolhouse was one erected just prior to the Revolution in Wantage on a site originally owned by Capt. Abraham Shiner but at that time owned by his great-grandson, Jacob Hornbeck. Constructed of logs and no larger than 16 feet square, it was a primitive 1-story structure, with an open fireplace supporting a chimney made of sticks and clay. (6) Master Cooper, a stern disciplinarian, was the first teacher here. (7) A Moravian missionary, Joseph Shaw, taught school in the middle 1700's near his farmhouse on the banks of the Delaware River close by the old Wallpack Church. (8) Many schools, generally of log construction, flourished during the early part of the nineteenth century in Andover, Green, Hampton, Stillwater, and Wallpack Townships, as well as in the communities of Vernon, McAfee Valley, and Glenwood. (9) Although Sparta is said to have had schools at an early date nothing definite is known regarding them prior to 1816, when the "Old Frame School" was erected. (10)

The initiative of private individuals, particularly clergymen, did much to further the cause of education. In 1814 the Reverend Elias Van Beenschooten, pastor to the Dutch Reformed Churches of Sussex County, bequeathed \$17,000 for the education of "pious" young men studying for the ministry. (11) About 1825 the rector of Christ Church established a classical school in Newton. In 1833 William Rankin established an exclusive school at Deckertown, which came to be known as the Normal School of Sussex. The Mount Retirement Seminary, established in 1833 as the "Wantage Select School", continued to function successfully under the direction of Edward A. Stiles until 1865. (12)

A committee of the State Legislature, delegated in 1828 to study the condition of the schools in New Jersey, reported that there were more than 20 school districts in Sussex County having no schools and that more than 1,000 children here were completely deprived of instruction. (13) As the result of this committee's general report, the State Legislature took the initial steps in a State-sponsored universal education program by setting up a fund for common schools to be

distributed among the counties. In 1837 Sussex was given \$38,689 as its share of the "surplus revenue fund" that was distributed by Congressional authorization throughout the Nation for educational work in local communities. (14)

In 1853 there were 237 public schools in Sussex County, which then included all of Warren. (15) Despite the fact that, in 1860, there were 121 school districts with 125 schools and 176 teachers in Sussex County, the public educational program was still viewed with apathy by the local citizenry. Out of a total of 8,473 children between the ages of 5 and 18, an average of only 1,706 attended school daily. (16) From this it would appear that a considerable number of children were employed in agricultural pursuits, probably on their parents' farms. In 1870, however, the total annual appropriation for school purposes was \$46,911.09, or more than double that of a decade before. This was paralleled by a marked increase of 1,000 in the average daily attendance. (17) In 1867, Nathaniel Pettit of Nowton was appointed the first county superintendent of schools. (18) In 1870 the first modern school in the county was built on Halstead Street, Newton, at a cost of \$26,000. (19)

For the school year ending on June 30, 1901, the total annual appropriation was increased to \$74,377.18. (20) With a total enrollment of 5,413 daily attendance averaged 3,083. (21) By 1930, the cost of operating the county school had increased to \$747,308.68. (22) At the prosent time, there are situated throughout the county 4 high schools, 1 junior high school, 44 elementary schools, and 4 kindergarten schools, with a total enrollment of 6,715. The teaching staff consists of 256 members. The sum of \$945,115.61 was expended for the period 1940-41. (23)

Industry and Agriculture

Favored with a limestone soil excellently suited for the raising of many different crops, Sussex County has acquired some importance

agriculturally early in the eighteenth century, when it was described as producing "some wheat, pork and cattle," as well as lumber. (24) The first mills in Sussex were operated by farmers in conjunction with their farms. In 1741 or 1742, Caspar Schaeffer and his father-in-law, John Peter Bernhardt, settling in the vicinity of Stillwater, built what was probably the first grist mill in Sussex County, utilizing the waters of the Paulinskill for power. (25) In 1764, it was replaced by a more modern building with a headrace about a quarter of a mile long. Several years later the Marksboro Mill was built on the Paulinskill 2 miles north of Fall Mills. (26) About 1770 Peter Wintermute built the first fulling mill in the county a half-mile below Stillwater. (27)

In 1760 William Allen and Joseph Turner, who had acquired a tract of 11,000 acres formerly owned by William Penn, built the first blast furnace and forge in Sussex County and named it Andover in honor of Turner's birthplace in Hampshire, England. (28) At the outset of the Revolution the owners, who had pronounced Loyalist sympathies, closed the furnace. It was subsequently put in operation by the State Department of War under direction of Colonel Maybury. (29) After the cessation of hostilities it was closed again until 1847, when it was acquired by Hewitt and Cooper. (30)

Other furnaces and forges in Sussex were Allen and Turner's Furnace, built in 1763 on the Musconetcong Creek at Waterloo; (31) Franklin Furnace, built in 1770 on a stream issuing from Norman's Pond in what is now Franklin; (32) Hamburg Forge and Furnace, erected in 1792 on the Wallkill River and named after the German city of Hamburg, which then exported large quantities of ore to America; (33) Squire's

(35) At Sparta there were five forges, the earliest of which was erected in 1787, about a mile from Ogdensburg, by Robert Cgden. (36) Hany of the forges and furnaces were never very successful, rarely continuing in operation for more than a year or two at the most. (37) Hany of the forges and furnaces were foredoomed to failure because the mines which supplied them with ore were of a marginal character and therefore too costly to operate. (38)

Although isolated from the more favored avenues of commerce, Sussex County continued to grow at a leisurely pace. In 1830 it was reported to have 87 grist mills, 55 saw mills, 7 fulling mills, 3 furnaces, 28 forges, 18 carding machines, 35 cider distilleries, and 227 tan vats. (39)

In 1816, Dr. Samuel Fowler, who had just acquired the Franklin Furnace, started a series of experiments with a view to finding new methods for utilizing Franklinite ore. He succeeded in producing a zinc substitute for white lead. (40) The production of zinc ore and zinc concentrates is the most important industry in Sussex. The output constitutes a considerable portion of the world's supply of these products. The New Jersey Zinc Company, present owners of what was once old Franklin Furnace, employs some 900 workers at Franklin and 300 workers in its other plant at Ogdensburg. (41) Other industries involve the production of brocades and tie fabrics, in which 4,351 workers are employed; the dyeing, printing and finishing of silk and synthetic fabrics, in which 206 workers are engaged; and the manufacture of limestone products and silk goods. (42) In 1937, there were 29 manufactories

(42) Ibid., pp. 457, 458. in Sussex County, employing 830 workers and paying \$637,962 in total wages. The value of all products was \$2,858,479, of which \$1,493,374 was added by the manufacturing process. (43)

Sussex has offered few advantages for the development of industry beyond the exploitation of its mineral resources, but agricultural activities have assumed considerable importance in the economic life of the county. Sussex County is ranked as one of the leading dairy centers on the Atlantic seaboard, (44) and its dairy products are valued at more than \$2,000,000 annually. In some parts of Sussex 90 percent of the farm income is derived from the sale of fluid milk. Distribution of the local products in the New York, Philadelphia, Newark, and Paterson markets is expedited through the influential Dairymen's League, a cooperative organization to which most of the farmers belong. (45)

In 1930, Sussex County had 1,155 farms, which were valued at \$11,728,650. These farms, which average 142.9 acres in size, represent the highest county average in the State. (46) The area of all the land used for agricultural purposes in 1930 was 165,039 acres, 48.7 percent of the land in the county. (47) Of this total, 65,169 acres were delegated to crop land and 67,467 acres were in pasture land. (48)

At the present time there are in Sussex County 1,273 farms with an approximate land area of 174,823 acres, or 51.7 percent of the total land area. These farms, averaging 137.3 acres each, are valued at \$11,911,599. (49)

Newspapers

The publication of the first Sussex County newspaper was undertaken by Elliott and William Hunton in 1796. Issued weekly as the Farmers' Journal and Newton Advertiser, their journal was abandoned 3 years later. The Sussex Register, oldest of the present-day newspapers, was first issued in 1813. Under the guidance of Judge John H. Hall, it was strictly non-partisan in its political views for 22 years. Under the new editor, Benjamin B. Edsall, who supported William H. Harrison for president in 1836, the Register became the organ of anti-Democratic

sentiment. Colonel Grant Fitch founded the New Jersey Herald in 1829. (50)

Among early newspapers no longer in existence are the Sussex County <u>Home Journal</u>, a weekly started in 1850 by Joseph L. Purlow and published for only a few years; (51) the Sussex <u>Democrat</u>, established in 1858 by George R. McCarter and consolidated in 1861 with the New Jersey <u>Herald</u>, then owned by Henry G. Kelsey, at that time Secretary of State of New Jersey; (52) the Sussex <u>True Democrat</u>, a weekly started in 1863 and published for one year; (53) and the Sussex <u>Record</u>, a weekly published in Branchville for a little more than a year after its start in 1867. (54)

Newspapers now issued in Sussex include the Sussex County Ledger and Branchville Herald, a weekly published in Newton, (55) the Sussex Independent, a weekly published in Sussex since 1870, and the Wantage Recorder, a weekly established in Sussex since 1894. (56)

Transportation

During the early colonial period the economic growth of Sussex County suffered greatly from the difficulty traders had in reaching the area by overland routes. Fur traders, surveyors, and early settlers generally followed the course of the Minisink Trail. (57) The trail, which extended from the Indian settlements on the upper Delaware through what are now the towns of Hainesville, Branchville, and Newton in a southeasterly direction to Lake Hopatcong, (58) subsequently formed the

groundwork of what became the "Old Mine Road." (59) The road was built by a group of adventurous Hollanders interested in exploiting the mineral resources of the Sussex-Warren area, prior to the English conquest of New Netherland in 1664. (60) Little was done toward the development of an adequate system of roads in Sussex County until the close of the eighteenth century. At that time there were but three roads in northern New Jersey, each of which followed the course of a river valley. One of these extended from Phillipsburg through Oxford and Sussex and led northward to roads converging on New York and Albany. (61)

Because it was almost impossible to navigate up the Delaware River as far as Sussex County, rafts were the chief means used to transport the agricultural products of the county to Philadelphia and Trenton. (62) About a decade prior to the Revolution, Durham boats were put into service because of their adaptability to river navigation. (63)

The exploitation of the economic resources of the upper Delaware Valley led to the investment of a large amount of New York capital in New Jersey turnpikes during the nineteenth century. The Morris Turnpike, the first projected in the State, was chartered in 1801. When it was completed several years later, it provided a direct route from Elizabeth-Town through Morristown to Newton. (64) Other turnpikes which connected Sussex with the metropolitan area were the Union Turnpike, which extended from Morristown to Sparta; (65) the Paterson and Hamburg, which was chartered in 1806 to run from Aquackanonk Landing (Passaic) through Paterson to Deckertown (Sussex); (66) and the Deckertown and Newton, chartered in 1814. (67)

Although the New Jersey, Hudson, and Delaware Railroad was chartered as early as 1832 to construct a railroad from some point on the Delaware River to the Hudson River, (68) actual construction did not begin until 1870, when it was consolidated with the New Jersey Railroad

Historical Sketch

Company and the Sussex Valley Railroad. (69) The consolidated company became known as the New Jersey Midland Railroad.(70) It entered Sussex County at its northern border and wound through the county with stations at Deckertown, Hamburg, Franklin, Ogdensburg, and Snufftown. It was subsequently merged with the New York, Susquehanna, and Western, an affiliate of the Erie Railroad. (71)

The first railroad to start operating in Sussex County was the Sussex Railroad, chartered in 1848. (72) Promoted by Abram S. Hewitt and Edward Cooper to connect their iron mines at Andover with the Morris and Essex Railroad at Materloo, it was authorized by the State legislature to construct an extension from the Andover mines to Newton and to erect a bridge across the Delaware. (73) The main line was connected by feeders with Franklin Furnace in 1863, (74) with Branchville in 1868, and with Franklin in 1871. (75) The Ogden Mine Railroad, chartered in 1864, (76) was built to carry iron ore from Ogden Mine in what is now Sparta Township to Lake Hopatcong, where the ore was transferred to canal barges. The Central Railroad of New Jersey assumed control of the line in 1881. (77) Other lines operating through Sussex are the Lehigh and Hudson River Railroad, organized in 1869 as the Pequest and Wallkill, and the Lehigh and New England Railroad. (78)

Population

Sussex County had a population of not more than 500 or 600 in 1738 and as late as 1765 was considered as being definitely frontier land. (79) Following the settlement of Indian difficulties and the conclusion of the French and Indian har and the increased development of the agricultural possibilities of the county, the population grew rapidly in the next few decades. (80) The population of Sussex County, which numbered about 13,000 in 1776, had increased to 14,187 when the Revolution was

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brought to formal conclusion in 1784. (81) In 1820, 4 years before the Warren area was detached from Sussex, the county had the largest population in the State. (82) With the passage of a few years, however, it could not maintain this status and was soon out-distanced by the great industrial counties of the State.

The following table reveals how slightly the population of the county has fluctuated in the past century and a half: (83)



Census reports for 1940 credit Sussex County with a population of 29,632, a gain of 6.5 percent over 1930, which is well above State average. (84)



2. GOVERIMENTAL ORGALIZATION

Introduction

The State of New Jersey is divided into 21 political sections known as counties, each of which is a body politic, corporate in law, with important powers of self-government. The counties have in turn been grouped into six classes, according to population and geographical position, in order to expedite the enactment of legislation specifically applicable to the individual needs of each county. Sussex County is designated as a county of the fourth class. (1)

The present governmental structure of Sussex County, which was created as an independent political subdivision in 1753, before the Revolutionary War, (2) represents a combination of powers conferred upon it by the State, and those which have been legally assumed by the county itself through its quasi-legislative authority. The scope of government in the county has increased through the years to permit the addition of offices and courts necessitated by an ever-increasing county business. The functions of the various county offices include administration, recording, administration of justice, law enforcement, finance, elections, education, welfare, public health, and public works. A discussion of these phases of county management follows.

Administration

The administration and the supervisory control of all county property, finances, and public af airs are vested in the board of chosen freeholders, except where these powers are conferred by statute upon some other governmental agency. (3) Legal advice to the board is furnished by the county counsel. (4)

Recording

The recording of all documents relating to real and personal property is the function of the county clerk. (5) All wills, letters of administration, and related documents are filed by the surrogate in his office. (6)

Administration of Justice

The present judicial system of New Jersey can be divided into four general groups, with separate jurisdiction: Equity, criminal, civil, and probate courts. Exclusive jurisdiction in equity matters, with only a single exception, (7) is given to the Court of Chancery, a State court serving the counties by districts or vicinages. (8) Sussex County is a part of vicinage No. 1. (9)

Authority in criminal matters is assigned to several courts. Crimes of an indictable character, including treason and murder, are heard in the court of oyer and terminer. (10) All offenses committed within the county, save treason and murder, are tried in the court of quarter sessions, (11) and all cases triable in the court of quarter sessions may be adjudicated without a jury by the court of special sessions. (12) Original and appellate jurisdiction in both criminal and civil matters is within the purview of the Supreme Court. (13)

Matters involving civil jurisdiction, without regard for the amount involved, are heard in the court of common pleas; (14) and concurrent authority with the Supreme Court in all cases not involving criminal action is given to the circuit court. (15) Actions for debt and contract are also within the jurisdiction of the circuit court. (16) Civil actions in amounts not exceeding \$200, as well as landlord and tenant disputes, are heard in the small cause court, which is presided over by a justice of the peace. (17)

Probate actions and assignments for the relief of creditors are heard in the orphans' court, while jurisdiction over juvenile

delinquency and domestic relations is the exclusive function of the juvenile and domestic relations court. (18)

The custody and care of court records are delegated to the clerks of the various courts. The county clerk serves as the clerk of six courts, (19) while the surrogate acts as the clerk of the orphans' court. (20)

The records of the Supreme Court and those of the Court of Chancery are in the keeping of their respective clerks in the court offices at Trenton. (21)

The serving of all process, summonses, and writs of execution issued by the State and county courts is performed by the sheriff. (22)

The summoning of juries was at one time exclusively the duty of the sheriff, (23) but in 1888 the legislature created the office of commissioners of juries and appointed two citizens as commissioners. (24) The following year this act was repealed. (25) The present commissioners of juries hold office by virtue of a statute of 1913, (26) which provides that the sheriff and one duly appointed citizen serve in this capacity. (27)

The holding of inquests is the business of the coroner. (28) Investigations probing deaths which have occurred under suspicious circumstances are directed by the prosecutor of the pleas, (29) who also attends to the prosecution of criminals accused of violating State laws within the county boundaries. (30) Persons placed on probation by any of the various courts, and those ordered to make support payments in divorce decrees or separation actions, are supervised by the chief probation officer. (31)

Enforcement of Law

The enforcement of the law in Sussex County is the responsibility of more than one office. The detection, arrest, indictment, and prosecution of criminals are functions performed by the prosecutor of the pleas, (32) the detention and the custody of criminals are duties incumbent upon the sheriff, who appoints a jailkeeper for the management and supervision of the county jail, its officers, and inmates. (33)

The maintenance and the inspection of county weights and measures are responsibilities of the superintendent of weights and measures, who must see to it that State standards of weights and measures are observed in county or local trade. (34)

Finance

The equalization, revision, review, and enforcement of taxes in the county are functions performed by the county board of taxation. (35) The fiduciary responsibility and fiscal control of the finances of the county are delegated to the county treasurer, who is also charged with the receipt and disbursement of county funds. (33) The maintenance of a sinking fund is a duty which the treasurer shares with the director of the board of freeholders and the three resident taxpayers who compose the sinking fund commission. (37) Periodic auditing of county financial accounts is done by the State Department of Local Government at Trenton, since Sussex County has no county auditor.

Elections

The supervision and authority over all district election boards, and the selection of polling places for each election district, as well as the holding of all primary, general, and commission form of government elections within the county, are required activities of the county board of elections. (38)

Education '

The general control and supervision of free public schools in all the counties of New Jersey is exercised by the State Board of Education, which was established in 1846. (39) Its rules and regulations are enforced in Sussex County by the county superintendent of schools. (40) Nocational school training is under the exclusive management of the board of education of the vocational school. (41)

Welfare

The care and settlement of the poor in Sussex County is assigned to the county welfare board. (42) The management of the welfare home, and refuge for the indigent of the county, is the responsibility of the supervisor of the welfare home, (43) while the administration of poor-relief is the duty of the director of welfare. (44) The approval or refusal of grants for old-age relief assistance is the function of the county adjuster, (45) who is also responsible for the preparation of commitment papers for the insane, feeble-minded, epileptic, and those suffering from tuberculosis. (46) The burial of indigent soldiers, sailors, marines, and nurses is delegated to the superintendent of soldiers' burials. (47)

Public Health

Since Sussex County has no county board of health, the health program of the county is the responsibility of the municipal health boards, which function under the supervision of the State Board of Health. (48) Necessary medical treatment for the inmates of the welfare home is provided by the welfare home physician. (49)



Public Works

The responsibility for an adequate public works program in Sussex County is shared by several offices. The construction of roads, bridges, culverts, drains, and storm sewers is the duty of the county engineer, (50) the maintenance of same being the function of the county supervisor of roads. (51) The elimination of all mosquito-breeding areas in the county is the assignment of the mosquito extermination commission, (52) and the planting and care of shade tree on highways and in parks, that of the shade tree commission. (53)




CHART of GOVERNMENT of SUSSEX COUNTY

3. HOUSING, CARE, AND ACCESSIBILITY OF THE RECORDS

Four buildings located in the center of the town of Newton constitute the governmental headquarters of Sussex County. The four structures are the Administration, or freeholders' building, the Hall of Records, the county courthouse, and the County Service Eurcau, and in them are housed most of the county offices and records of the county government,

The oldest of the group is the courthouse, situated on the northwest corner of the intersection of Spring and High Streets. It was originally constructed in 1765, (1) and was remodeled in 1844. (2) Damage by fire necessitated extensive alterations in 1847 (3) and again in 1910. (4) The building is of stone construction, is two stories in height with a basement, and measures 75 feet in width by 56 feet in length. Colonial in design, it features six Doric columns across the facade. The roof is topped by a domed belfry.

The front part of the basement, on the south side, is occupied by the office of the Stream Survey Commission, a State agency, adjoining which is a record vault which houses many of the records of the county. On the first floor are located the offices of the sheriff and the prosecutor of the pleas; the grand jury room; and the Selective Service Draft Board. The second floor contains a large courtroom, which is flanked by the jury room and the judges' chambers.

The Administration Building is situated on the northern end of the "public green," directly across the street from the courthouse. Constructed in 1803, (5) it is a two-story stone building with a basement, and measures 48 feet wide by 37 feet deep. Its architecture is of colonial interpretation. A domed belfry surmounting the roof, and two Tuscan columns across the facade, characterize the structure.

In the basement of the Administration Building is a record vault that is used by many of the county offices. The entire first floor of the building is occupied by the combined quarters of the county engineer and the county supervisor of roads; the second floor contains the offices of the board of chosen freeholders and the county treasurer.

The Hall of Records is located on the southwest corner of Park and High Streets, and faces the "public green." It is a two-story brick

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fireproof building with a basement, and is southern colonial in design. Four Corinthian columns feature the front of the structure, while the roof is surmounted by an hexagonal columnated belfry, topped with a pagoda-shaped dome. The Hall of Records measures 73 feet in width by 50 feet in depth. Erected in 1930, (6) it is one of the most modern of the quartet composing the governmental group.

In the basement of the Hall of Records is the basement record vault of the county clerk; the entire first floor is occupied by the offices of the <u>county clerk</u>; and the second floor contains the quarters of the <u>surrogate</u>, the <u>county superintendent of schools</u>, and the <u>county</u> <u>board of taxation</u>.

The fourth county building, known as the County Service Bureau, is located at 18 Church Street. It is a one-story, brick structure with a basement, and was constructed in 1941.

In the basement are the administrative offices of the American Legion; the first floor houses the <u>county welfare board</u>, the Sussex County Extension Service, the Agricultural Conservation Association, the Sussex County Tuberculosis Loague and the Child Welfare Service.

The board of chosen freeholders occupies a large room in the eastern half of the second floor of the Administration Building. A low railing divides the room into two sections. One section is used for public hearings, the other serves as the office of the clerk of the board. Approximately 1 percent of the records of the board are filed in a safe located in the treasurer's office, across the corrider; about 24 percent are housed in metal and wooden cabinets in the freeholders' office; an additional 25 percent are kept in the record vault situated in the basement of the building; 24 percent are stored in the record vault located in the basement of the courthouse building; another 8 percent are located in a cabinet in the private office of the county engineer; and the remaining 18 percent are maintained in the county clerk's basement vault. They can be consulted by the public by arrangement with the clerk of the board.

The office of the <u>county clerk</u> consists of a suite of eight rooms in the Hall of Records. Seven rooms are located on the first floor and one is situated in the basement. A room on the western side of the first floor is used as a reception room for the public. This is flanked on one side by a workroom and on the other by the private offices of the county clerk and the deputy county clerk. Two workrooms are located in the rear of the floor. On the eastern side of the corridor is the county clerk's searchers' vault, immediately below which is a basement record vault. Approximately 46 percent of the records of the county clerk are

(6) Sussex County Freeholders' Minutes, June 27, 1930, see entry 1. kept in the basement record vault; about 51 percent are maintained in the county clerk's searchers' vault; and the remaining 1 percent are stored under the counter in his office and on a wooden shelf in the basement vault of the courthouse. The records of the county clerk are available for examination by the public.

All courts use the courtroom on the second floor of the county courthouse. The records of the orphans' court are filed with the surrogate, those of the Supreme Court and the Court of Chancery with their respective clerks in Trenton; the records of all other courts are kept in the office of the county clerk.

A three-room suite on the second floor of the Hall of Records comprises the quarters of the surrogate. The suite consists of a room used as a searchers' vault, a workroom, and the private office of the surrogate. All the records of this office, except one folder that is kept in the desk of the surrogate, are filed in the surrogate's searchers' vault on the second floor of the Hall of Records. These records are accessible to the public.

The records of the commissioners of juries are in the custody of one of the commissioners. About 5 percent are located in the basement of his store, 7 Main Street, Newton; and the other 95 percent are kept at his residence, 47 Woodside Avenue, Newton. Information concerning them may be obtained from the commissioner.

All the records of the chief probation officer are filed in a wooden bookcase at his home, 170 Spring Street, Newton.

No records are maintained by the county counsel.

The sheriff occupies a three-rcom suite located in the southwest corner on the first floor of the courthouse. One room is used as his private office, the others as the offices of his secretary and staff. Approximately 32 percent of the records of the sheriff are in a safe in his private office, 28 percent are maintained in metal cabinets in his secretary's office, and the remaining 40 percent are stored in the basement record vault of the courthouse. These records are not open for public consultation.

The offices of the prosecutor of the pleas are situated between the quarters of the sheriff and the room reserved for jurymen. All the records of the prosecutor are filed in metal filing cabinets located in his office. They are not available for public examination.

The current records of justices of the peace are maintained by the individual justices in their private offices. The records of justices whose terms have expired are in the custody of the county clerk.

About 33 percent of the records of the superintendent of weights and measures are on file in a deck and a bookcase at his home, located on Route S-31, Andover Township; the remaining 17 percent are stored on a wooden shelf in the basement record vault of the county courthouse.

The coroner keeps no records but files findings in inquests with the county clerk.

Two rooms adjacent to the office of the county superintendent of schools, in the Hall of Records, constitute the quarters of the county board of taxation. Approximately 23 percent of the records of this department are filed here in metal equipment, about 76 percent are kept in the county clerk's basement record vault, and the remaining 1 percent are stored in the basement record vault of the county courthouse. Application to examine these records may be made to the clerk of the board.

Two rooms on the second floor of the Administration Building compose the suite maintained by the county treasurer. One room is used as a private office by the county treasurer, the other serves as a record Approximately 11 percent of the treasurer's records are filed in room. metal cabinets and in a steel vault in his office; about 80 percent are stored in the basement record vault of the county courthouse; another 8 percent are maintained in the basement record vault located in the Administration Building; and the remaining 1 percent are kept by the freeholders in their office. These records are not open to public inspection.

All the records of the sinking fund commission are in the custody of the county treasurer.

The secretary of the county board of elections keeps the records of the board in his office on Main Street, Franklin. Information concerning them may be obtained from him.

The county superintendent of schools occupies a two-room suite on the second floor of the Hall of Records. One room is used as a workroom, the other serves as the private office of the superintendent. All the records of this office are maintained in metal cabinets in the superintendent's office. The records of the board of education of the vocational school are also in the custody of the county superintendent of schools.

The county welfare board is located in an office on the first floor of the County Service Bureau. The records of the board are filed here in metal equipment. They are considered confidential and as such are not accessible to the public.

All the records of the supervisor of the county welfare home are filed in his office at the welfare home, located in Hampton Township. The home is a two-story stone structure, originally erected in 1832 (7) and enlarged in 1873. (8) The records of this office are maintained here in metal filing cabinets and a steel safe. They are not available to the general public.

The records of the <u>county</u> <u>adjuster</u> are maintained in the office of the county clerk, who in Sussex County performs the functions of this office.

The <u>physician of the county welfare home</u> keeps all of his public records in his home at Stillwater, New Jersey. The public does not have access to these records.

All the records of the <u>superintendent of soldiers</u>^t <u>burials</u> are in the custody of the county clerk.

The <u>county</u> <u>engineer</u> maintains a suite of three rooms with the county supervisor of roads on the first floor of the Administration Building. One room is used as a drafting room; another, as a record room; and the smallest, as a private office. Approximately 1 percent of the records of the county engineer are kept in the basement vault of the county courthouse, an additional 94 percent are located in the drafting room of the engineer's office, and the remaining 5 percent are kept in steel cabinets in the engineer's private office. They are available for examination by the public.

No records are kept by the shade tree commission.

The <u>county supervisor of roads</u> shares the quarters of the county engineer on the first floor of the Administration Building. Approximately 35 percent of his records are maintained in metal filing equipment located in his office, 29 percent are housed in the basement record vault of the Administration Building, and 16 percent are stored on wooden shelving in the basement record vault of the courthouse building. The remaining 20 percent are kept in metal equipment at the department's road camp, located on Route S-31, Andover Township. Application to consult the department's records may be made to the county supervisor of roads.

All the records of the county fire marshal are kept by him in


his home, located on Morris Lake Road, Sparta, New Jersey.


The records of the <u>mosquito</u> <u>extermination</u> <u>commission</u> are filed in the office of its secretary, room 400, Sussex and Merchants' National Bank Building, Spring Street, Newton. Information regarding them may be obtained from him.



The records of Sussex County are, in the main, in good condition and are adequately housed. Roller-type shelving and modern index systems prevail in the department of the county clerk and the surrogate, and metal filing equipment is used in most of the county offices. 0fthe four county buildings, however, the Hall of Records and the County Service Bureau Building are the only ones which can be considered fireproof. It is therefore obvious that records filed in wooden cabinets, on wooden shelving, under a counter, or in office closets are not being accorded adequate protection, and it is recommended that steps be taken to remedy this condition. It is also noted that many of the records located in the basement vault of the courthouse are bundled and stored on wooden shelves. The installation of steel shelving or metal containers for the better accommodation of these records merits thoughtful consideration. It is recommended, in addition, that the old records of the justices of the peace be rebound. These records, located at the Hall of Records in the basement record vault of the county clerk, have been labeled, indexed, and arranged in an orderly fashion on steel shelving. While they are rarely referred to in current procedure, they possess definite historical value and should be preserved as far as possible. It is observed, also, that several county officers keep their records in their private offices or homes. From the viewpoint of proper protection from fire and other destructive agencies, the wisdom of this practice is seriously questioned.

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Explanatory Notes

<u>Title of Records.</u> Exact titles of records are written in solid capitals and enclosed in parentheses (see entry 10). If a record title is not descriptive of the contents of the record, an assigned explantory title (or explanatory words), written with initial capitals and enclosed in parentheses, has been added (see entry 2).

Dates. All dates used are inclusive. Missing records are indicated by broken dates.

Quantity. When two or more types of containers are considered in a single entry, the quantity is shown in chronological order, insofar as possible.

Labeling. Figures or letters in parentheses, following the number of volumes, file boxes, or other types of container, indicate the labeling. If no labeling is indicated, it may be assumed that there is none.

Discontinuance. Where no statement is made that the record was discontinued at the last date shown in the entry, it could not be definitely established that such was the case. Where no comment is made on the absence of prior, subsequent, or intermediate records, no definite information could be obtained.

<u>Prior or Missing Records</u>. The search for records not required by law was based upon the assumption that, unless there was evidence to the contrary, all records of a particular office should commence with the date of origin of that office in the county. In the case of legally required records, the assumption was that all record series should commence with the date of the earliest statute concerned with the particular record.

Indexing. All indexes to records, unless otherwise stated, are selfcontained.

Condition of Records. Records are in good condition unless otherwise indicated.

<u>Dimensions</u>. Dimensions are always given in inches unless otherwise indicated, and the symbol for inches (") has therefore been omitted.

Location of Records. When all or the majority of the records of an office have a common location, the location is indicated in the last sentence of the office essay instead of in each individual entry.

The location noted is that at the date of the final field check of the inventory, approximately 4 months prior to publication; therefore, the Historical Records Survey cannot guarantee that the record will be found in the location indicated in the entries.

Cross References. Title-line cross references are used to show the continuity of a record series which has been kept separately for a period of time and with other records for a different period of time. An example is that in entry 3: "January 8, 1935-August 18, 1936 in (Miscellaneous Financial Records), entry 420." They are also used to show all artificial entries, those set up to cover records which must be shown separately under their proper office even though they are kept in files or records appearing elsewhere in the inventory, as, for example, the title-line cross reference in entry 111: "In (Case Papers in Contested Elections), entry 236," or in those set up for a record which is never kept separately, but is found in two or more records of miscollanoous content, such as entry 18. In both instances, the description of the master entry shows the title and entry number of the record from which the cross reference is made as, for example, these words in entry 11 do: "Also contains: Bills paid, 1939, 1940, entry 18." Dates shown in the description of the master entry are only for the part or parts of the record contained therein, and are shown only when they vary from those of the master entry.

Separate third paragraph cross references from entry to entry, and <u>See also</u> references with subject headings or subheadings, are used to show prior, subsequent, or closely related records which are not parts of the same series.

I. BOARD OF CHOSEN FREEHOLDERS

The governing body of Sussex County in 1753, the year the county was established, was composed of a "board" of freeholders and justices of the peace. (1) In 1798, this group was incorporated as a "board of chosen freeholders," excluding the justices from its membership. (2) The board is now composed of three members, one of whom is selected by the membership to serve as director. (3) The members are elected by the people, one freeholder each year, for 3-year terms. (4) The board appoints its own clerk, who serves a term of 3 years. Any such appointee who has held this office continuously for 20 years can claim tenure of office. (5)

All property, finances and affairs of the county are under the jurisdiction of the board of chosen freeholders, except where statutory provision places such authority in another agency. (6) Its powers include the raising of money by taxation, (7) the issuing and selling of bonds to secure money for the building of county hospitals (8) and roads, (9) and the authority to convey, at public sale to the highest bidder, any county-owned real estate not needed for public use. (10)

II. COUNTY CLERK

The General Assembly directed the clerk of the court of common pleas to "record deeds and conveyances" in 1713. (1) The clerk of the courts of common pleas and quarter sessions was mentioned in court minutes in 1753 as the "clerk of the county". (2) The Constitution of 1844 for the first time officially designated the office of county clerk in New Jersey. He is elected by the voters of the county for a 5-year term. (3) He is the principal recording official in the county. All documents relating to the transfer of real estate, and mortgages, and instruments affecting title to personal property, are recorded in his office. (4)

The county clerk is clerk of the circuit court, (5) court of common pleas, (6) court of oyer and terminer, (7) court of quarter sessions, (8) court of special sessions, (9) and the juvenile and domestic relations court. (10) He is also the county adjuster, (11) and serves as secretary and treasurer of the Sussex county welfare board. (12) When the county board of elections sits as the county board of canvassers, he is the clerk. (13)





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III. COURT OF CHANCERY

The Court of Chancery was established in New Jersey in 1705, (1) as a result of Lord Cornbury's Ordinance. In 1844, the State Constitution designated the Court as a Constitutional Court, and it became one of the courts in which the judiciary of the State was vested. (2)

The present Court of Chancery is presided over by a Chancellor, whose term of office is 7 years. He is appointed by the Governor, with the advice and consent of the Senate. (3) The law provides for 10 Vice Chancellors, who are appointed by the Chancellor and are commissioned by the Governor for terms of 7 years. (4) For the convenience of persons engaged in litigation, the State has been divided into districts, called vicinages. Sussex County is in vicinage number 1. (5)

The Court has State-wide jurisdiction over all matters in which an equitable remedy is sought. (6) The following are some of the more frequent forms of litigation, over which the Chancery Court has jurisdiction: Divorce and nullity of marriage; alimony and support; (7) foreclosure of mortgage; (8) and appointment of receivers for insolvent corporations. (9) The records of the Court are maintained in the office of the Clerk in Chancery at Trenton. (10)

IV. SUPREME COURT

The Supreme Court began to function in Sussex County when the county was created out of Morris County in 1753. (1) The Supreme Court is a constitutional court and consists of a Chief Justice and eight Associate Justices, (2) who are appointed by the Governor, with the approval of the Senate, for terms of 7 years. (3) The Chief Justice, or any Associate Justice assigned by the Chief Justice to do so, may hold the court. (4)

The State of New Jersey is divided into nine judicial districts, each made up of one or more counties, (5) and a Justice is designated by the Supreme Court to preside over the courts in each judicial district. (6) Sussex County is part of the ninth judicial district. (7) The Supreme Court has both original and appellate jurisdiction in civil and criminal matters. (9) The records of this court are maintained in the office of the Clerk of the Supreme Court in Trenton.

V. COURT OF OYER AND TERMINER

A "court of over and terminer and general jail delivery" was legally organized in 1794 to try criminal cases and deliver the jails of their prisoners. (1) An act of 1898 shortened the title of this court to "court of over and terminer." The court is now composed of the Justice of the Supreme Court assigned to the circuit including the county, and the judge of the common pleas court. The Justice of the Supreme Court presides whenever present; otherwise, the court is held by the judge of the court of common pleas when requested to do so, in writing, by a Justice. (2) This court has cognizance of all crimes and offenses of an indictable or presentable nature committed in the county, and has authority to deliver prisoners from jail for prompt trial or otherwise. 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VI. COURT OF QUARTER SESSIONS

The court of quarter sessions became an integral part of the Sussex County judicial system, upon the creation of the county in 1753. (1) The court consists of the judge of the court of common pleas together with the Justice of the Supreme Court presiding over the courts of the county, who serves ex officio. The Supreme Court Justice presides when present. (2) With the exception of the crimes of treason or murder, indictments for which may be rendered in this court, but which are tried in the court of oyer and terminer or Supreme Court, the court of quarter sessions has cognizance and jurisdiction over all indictable crimes and offenses committed within the county. 

The person to be tried must address a written request to the prosecutor of the pleas of the county if he wishes to waive indictment and trial by jury. VIII. CIRCUIT COURT

The circuit court of Sussex County, as a court of original jurisdiction and of record, was established by a legislative act of February 14, 1838, (1) although a so-called circuit court had been established in 1799 as an auxiliary to the Supreme Court. (2) This court is presided over by the Justice of the Supreme Court assigned to Sussex County, or in his absence, by a circuit court judge appointed by the Governor with the consent of the Senate to serve for a term of 7 years. (3) The circuit court has county-wide civil jurisdiction concurrent with that of the Supreme Court. (4) In mortgage foreclosures, where all of the mortgaged premises are within the county, the court has the same jurisdiction and powers as the Court of Chancery.(5) The clerk of the court of common pleas is the clerk of the circuit. IX. COURT OF COMMON PLEAS

The court of common pleas was established in Sussex County at the county's inception, in 1753. (1) This court consists of a judge appointed by the Governor, with the consent of the Senate, for a term of 5 years. (2) The Supreme Court Justice holding the circuit in the county is an ex officio member of the court: (3) The court of common pleas has general jurisdiction over all civil suits and actions, regardless of the amount involved. (4) The court has also been vested with appellate jurisdiction. Appeals may be taken thereto from the decisions of police magistrates, justices of the peace, inferior criminal courts, (5) small cause courts, (6) and the State Department of Labor. (7) The county clerk is the clerk of the court. (8) For other records of the common pleas court, see entries 173, 179, 347.

The small cause court was established in Sussex County in 1903. (1) Each justice of the peace in the county is authorized to hold a small cause court, (2) and is empowered to hear all civil matters involving \$200 or less, except actions of replevin, slander, trespass for assault, battery, or imprisonment, or actions where title to land is involved. In addition, the court has jurisdiction in landlord and tenant disputes, and in actions of forcible entry and detainer. (3) The jurisdiction of the small cause court is county-wide. The orphans' court was established in Sussex County in 1784 by virtue of existing legislation. XII. SURROGATE

The first surrogate for Sussex County was appointed by the Governor in November 1753. (1) The surrogate, under constitutional provision, is now elected for a term of 5 years. (2) He is authorized to admit wills to probate and to grant letters testamentary, in cases where no objection is registered. (3) Fe may also preside at examinations taken for hearings of any cause in the orphans' court. (4) As clerk of the orphans' court, the surrogate has custody of the records of that court. XIII. JUVENILE AND DOMESTIC RELATIONS COURT

By a legislative enactment of 1929, this court was superseded by the present juvenile and domestic relations court. XIV. COMMISSIONERS OF JURIES

Ever since the creation of Sussex County in 1755, the selection of juries has been a function of the sheriff. (1) By virtue of legislation (2) the Chancellor, in 1914, duly appointed a citizen of the county to act with the sheriff, as a commissioner of juries. (3) Since 1934, the commissioner has been appointed by a Supreme Court Justice presiding in the county to act jointly with the sheriff for a 1-year term. (4) Forty days prior to the opening of the circuit court, the commissioners prepare and deliver to the Supreme Court Justice, lists of persons eligible for grand and petit jury duty. (5)

IV. CHIEF PROBATION OFFICER

As provided for in a legislative enactment of 1929 (1) a chief probation officer was appointed in Sussex County in 1931. (2) The judge of the court of common pleas appoints the chief probation officer who serves under civil service regulations. (3) The principal duties of the chief probation officer are to make investigations and reports as required by the courts; to supervise any persons ordered to make payments for support in a decree of divorce or legal separation; to furnish each probationer with probation conditions; to collect and disburse money, and to maintain complete accounts of his financial transactions for auditing purposes. (4) All records pertaining to this office are in the private residence of the chief probation officer.

XVI. COUNTY COUNSEL

A county counsel was appointed in Sussex County by the board of chosen freeholders in 1885, (1) in accordance with permissive legislation enacted the same year, empowering the freeholders to create necessary offices. (2) Prior to this time, the board hired private counsel to serve the county whenever one was needed. (3) The board of chosen freeholders has fixed his term of office at 3 years. (4) He acts as the legal advisor for the board, institutes suits for it, and defends the county against any legal action. (5)

XVII. SHERIFF

The first sheriff to function in Sussex County was appointed in 1753 by the Governor and Cormon Council. (1) The Constitution of 1776 provided that he be elected annually. (2) He is now elected by the people for a 3-year term, but by law may not succeed himself. (3)

The sheriff serves summonses, writs, and process of the county courts, (4) Supreme Court, (5) and Court of Chancery. (6) By court order he holds sales on foreclosures (7) and is delegated to make arrests, searches, and seizures. He also executes warrants of arrest issued by the Governor in extradition proceedings. (8) Court attendants of the county courts are appointed by the sheriff, (9) who also serves as one of the two commissioners of juries. XVIII. PROSECUTOR OF THE PLEAS

During the first 70 years following the inception of Sussex County in 1753, the Actorrey General of the State prosecuted violators of the criminal laws. (1) In 1823 the Regislature, in a joint meeting of the Council and Assembly, provided by statute for the mendatory appointment of a prosecutor in each county. (2) Suscex County named its first prosecutor in 1327. (3) By constitutional provision of 1844 he is now appointed by the Governor, with the consent of the Samete, for a term of 5 years. (4) The prosecutor is responsible for the detection, arrest, indictment, and prosecution of all persons involved in violations of the State criminal laws. (5) All the records of the prosecutor are kept in his office.

XIX. JUSTICE OF THE PEACE

When Sussex County was created in 1753, justices of the peace were appointed by the Governor. (1) From 1776 to 1844, the appointive power belonged to the Council and Assembly. (2) At present there are 27 justices of the peace resident in Sussex and they are elected from each municipal ward and township of the county for 5-year terms. (3) The justice of the peace presides over the small cause court, which has jurisdiction over civil cases involving not more than \$200. XX. SUPERINTENDENT OF WEIGHTS AND MEASURES

The first superintendent of weights and measures for Sussex County was appointed in 1912, (1) pursuant to legislation enacted a year earlier. (2) He is appointed by the board of chosen freeholders, (3) for an indefinite term under civil service regulations. (4) It is his duty to inspect, annually, all weights and measures used in trade within the county, employing legal standards certified by the State Superintendent of Weights and Measures, (5) and to institute proceedings against violators to enforce penalties. XXI. COROMER

The first coroner for Sussex County was appointed by the Governor and Council in 1753, pursuant to the Provincial Constituion of the General Assembly. (1) The New Jersey State Constitution of 1776 provided for the election in each county of one or more coroners for a 1-year term. (2) Subsequent legislation made provision for the election in each county of three coroners to serve 3-year terms, although they were not permitted to succeed themselves. (3) The coroner's duties are to ascertain the causes of all sudden, violent, casual or unusual deaths occurring within the county and, if necessary, to hold inquests. (4) In cases of unknown or unclaimed bodies, the coroner attends to the internent. (5) Upon the death or disability of the sheriff, the coroner is empowered to act as sheriff pending the election of a new sheriff, or during such disability. In these instances, by direction of the court, he serves writs and process of the various courts of the county. (6) For the coroner's records, see entries 201, 207.

XXII. COUNTY BOARD OF TAXATION

In 1902, the judge of the court of common pleas in Sussex County appointed a "county board of equalization of taxes," by virtue of a legislative enactment of 1900. (2) A statute of 1906 specifically provided for the appointment of a county board of taxation to supersede the previous board, (3) and such a board was established in Sussex in the following year. (4) The three members of the board of taxation are county residents appointed by the Governor, with Senate approval, for terms of 3 years. Only two members may belong to the same political party. (5) The board has supervision over all municipal assessors within the county and is empowered to review, equalize, (6) and increase or decrease assessed valuations of any property within the county. (7) On the first of April of each year the board dispatches the corrected, revised, completed and certified tax duplicates to the local collectors. The original tax lists remain in the office of the board as a public record. (8)

XXIII. COUNTY TREASURER

The first county treasurer, known as "collector" until 1920, (1) was appointed in Sussex County by the "board of justices and freeholders" in 1754. (2) The treasurer is now appointed by the board of chosen freeholders for a term of 3 years. (3) It is his duty to collect and receive all moneys due the county; to be custodian of all county funds, except where otherwise provided by statute; to disburse and pay out these funds on order of the board of chosen freeholders and to perform such other duties as may be assigned to him from time to time by the board. Every month he renders a detailed account of all property and moneys in his possession. (4) He is also an ex officio member of the sinking fund commission. (5)

XXIV. SINKING FUND COMMISSION

A sinking fund commission was first established in Sussex County in 1917 (1) as provided by statute. (2) Three resident taxpaying citizens, chosen because of their experience in the conduct and management of financial affairs, are appointed to the commission for terms of 3 years by the director of the board of chosen freeholders, with the approval of the board. These three shall hold no other public office. The director of the board of chosen freeholders, and the county treasurer, are ex officio members of the commission. (3)

The commission invests sinking fund moneys in United States bonds, or in bonds or negotiable notes or certificates of any county, municipality, or school district of the State. The maturing dates of these investments shall be such that there shall be money on hand to pay the several issues of county bonds as they become due, (4)

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XXV. COUNTY BOARD OF ELECTIONS

The county board of elections was established in Sussex County in 1895. (1) It consists of four members. (2) The chairmen of the two leading political parties each nominate a resident voter of the county annually for membership on the board of elections, whereupon the Governor commissions them for 2-year terms. (3) The board exercises supervision and authority over all district boards at all elections in the county, (4) and selects the polling places for each election district of the county. (5) In addition, it maintains full law and order during a meeting and can order the police to arrest persons refusing obedience to its lawful commands. XXVI. COUNTY SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

The office of the county superintendent of schools in Sussex County was established in 1867, (1) pursuant to mandatory legislation enacted the same year. (2) The superintendent is appointed by the State Commissioner of Education for a term of 3 years. (3) The primary duties of the superintendent are to exercise general supervision of public schools in the county in accordance with regulations prescribed by the State Board of Education. He makes periodic examinations of all the schools under his care and keeps the State Board of Education in constant touch with local conditions and requirements in education. (4) He renders an annual report relative to school matters to the State Commissioner of Education. (5) All the records of the superintendent of schools are located in his office.





XXVII. THE BOARD OF EDUCATION OF THE VOCATIONAL SCHOOL IN THE COUNTY OF SUSSEX

The board of education of the vocational school was established in Sussex County in 1937, (1) statutory provision for the office having been made as early as 1913. (2) The board is composed of the county superintendent of schools and four citizens, residents of the county for 3 years, who are appointed by the judge of the court of common pleas for terms of 4 years. (3) The board is empowered to buy school equipment, and make rules for the management of the vocational classes. The board of education of the vocational school insures the buildings used for vocational school purposes. The employees necessary for the efficient operation of its program are also under its jurisdiction. The board appoints as treasurer a person who has no affiliation with the board of education, and fixes both his salary and term of office. 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XXVIII. COUNTY WELFARE BOARD

The Sussex County welfare board was established in 1932 (1) as provided by law. (2) It consists of five citizens, two of whom are women, together with two freeholders and the county adjuster, who serves ex officio. The members are appointed by the board of chosen freeholders for terms of 5 years. They serve without componsation, except for necessary and actual expenses. The welfale board appoints a director and deputy airector, subject to the approval of the board of chosen freeholders. (3)

The principal functions of the welfare board concern the supervision of relief, the legal settlement of the poor, and the administration of olderage assistance. (4) The records of the board are kept in its office in the Hall of Records.



XXIX. SUPERVISOR OF COUNTY WELFARE HOME

In 1940, the board of chosen freeholders in Sussex County appointed an individual to act as the supervisor of the county welfare home. (1) Prior to that time, the welfare home was known as the "almshouse" and was under the supervision of a specially selected steward. (2) The supervisor of the welfare home is now annually appointed to his post by the board of chosen freeholders. (3) He has direct management of the home, supervises its business administrations, and is responsible for the welfare of its inmates. He maintains case histories of all his charges and also keeps records of all the reports of the welfare home physician.



XXX. COUNTY ADJUSTER

An act of the Legislature in 1916 provided for the appointment of a "commissioner in lunacy," the appointment to be made by the judge of the court of common pleas, with the advice and consent of the board of chosen freeholders. (1) In compliance with this legislation, such appointment was made in 1917. (2)

In 1919, the Legislature changed the title of the office to county adjuster. (3)

XXXI. PHYSICIAN OF THE COUNTY WELFARE HOME

He was then known as the almshouse physician, (1) a title which remained unchanged until recently, when the almshouse became known as a welfare home. This official is now designated as the physician of the county welfare home, and is appointed by the board of chosen freeholders for a 1-year term. (2) It is his duty to attend the welfare home at least once a week, and oftener if necessary, to examine the inmates, and administer such medical and surgical aid as is required. (3) His records are kept in his private residence.



(3) He is charged with the duty of providing proper interment for the bodies of all honorably discharged and indigent soldiers, sailors, marines, and nurses who have given wartime service for the United States. (4) He is also responsible for the erection of headstones and the proper care of the graves. (5) All the records pertaining to this office are kept under the counter in the county clerk's office.

XAXIII. COUNTY ENGINEER

Sussex County had its first county engineer in 1909 (1) in compliance with an act of the Legislature of the same year. (2) To facilitate inter-county cooperation in road construction, an act concerning roads was passed by the Legislature in 1912, and the term of office of the county engineer, originally 3 years, was increased to 5 years. (3)

The board of chosen freeholders appoints a qualified civil engineer to the office of county engineer. Before taking office, he makes and subscribes to an oath that he will faithfully perform the duties of his office, and he gives bond to the board of chosen freeholders. In conjunction with the State Highway Engineer, the county engineer provides the board of chosen freeholders with certificates of completion of road contracts so that payment by the county may be made, and advises the board as to partial work done in conformity with contracts providing for installment payments. 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XXXVI. COUNTY FIRE MARSHAL

The first county fire marshal in Sussex County was appointed in 1932, (1) by the board of chosen freeholders, which exercises such powers conferred upon it by statute. (2) The fire marshal is chosen annually by the board of chosen freeholders. Under the instructions of the board of chosen freeholders he acts in an advisory capacity to all municipal fire companies within the county, conducts investigations to eliminate fire hazards, and makes remedial recommendations to the board of chosen freeholders. With the freeholders' approval he regulates the use, storage, sale and disposal of inflammable or conbustible materials; and makes provision for the protection of life and property from fire and explosion. In addition, he provides for the removal or destruction of any building wall, chimney, or structure which is dangerous to life, or property, or which might tend to extend a conflagration. The records are kept at his home.

XXXVII. THE MOSQUITO EXTERMINATION COMMISSION

A mosquito extermination commission for Sussex County was first established in 1912, (1) as provided by law. (2) Six members, three of whom must be persons who are or have been members or employees of boards of health, are appointed for 3-year terms by the Justice of the Supreme Court presiding over the county. The Director of the State Experiment Station and the State Director of Health serve on the commission as ex officio members. (3) The primary duty of the commission is to locate areas infested with mosquitoes and to endeavor to eliminate such breeding places. (4) The mosquito extermination commission did not function in Sussex County between October 29, 1913 and September 18, 1929; (5) The records of the commission are located in the secretary's law office.



XXXVIII. COUNTY LOAN OFFICE COMMISSIONERS (Defunct)

County loan office commissioners were instituted in Sussex County in 1778, (1) 4 years after the passage of special legislation providing for their appointment in the county. Two loan-office commissioners were chosen by the county board of justices and freeholders to serve for an indefinite term. (2) To qualify for the position, it was mandatory that each commissioner take an oath of office and post bond to insure faithful performance of his duties. (3)

The commissioners, as a corporate entity, were empowered to sue and be sued. It was their primary function to lend money for which they accepted mortgages, bonds, and other securities as collateral. (4) An annual accounting of all transactions was submitted to the justices and freeholders until 1798, and thereafter to the board of chosen freeholders, the succeeding governing body, (5) until 1885, when the loan office ceased to function. (6)
