## INTRODUCTORY.

---

This investigation was begun to gratify a curiosity long had concerning the early history of our family, and to while away the weary weeks of convalescence from typhoid fever. Curiosity was amply gratified, and others becoming interested, it was urged that the facts be put briefly in print. Gradually the circle of interest widened, and ere we knew it the work assumed its present form. Other engagements unexpectedly permitting, it has been delayed from time to time, and we have done what we could. Others might have accomplished more—we only wish they had. Others could have done it better—if they would; but the lot fell on us. We have given the facts and figures as given to us. There will be errors; you will correct them. There are omissions; you will supply what is missing. Other generations are coming on; let them be added.

The name *Baker*, originating, as it does, from the trade, and having nearly the same pronunciation in several languages, is quite a common one. We may be sure that the founder of our name was a baker by trade, whether he was the "chief baker" whom Pharaoh hung, or some other. The English extraction of our ancestors is evident, were there no other proof, in the physical type of the earlier generations. From what we have seen and heard, we have formed the idea that a representative man of them would be tall, stalwart, inclining somewhat to corpulency with increasing years, having hair and a beard with a slight shade of red, eyes of gray or neutral tint, a complexion somewhat florid, and a general dignified appearance. Of course the physical features, as well as other characteristics, are now well nigh lost, as such, among the numerous intermarriages of later generations.

The exhortation of *Edward* (1) to his family, in his will, to "*live peaceable and pious lives*," most aptly describes the general character of his descendants. They are generally reliable, practical and useful members of society, serving faithfully in their sphere and generation, and training up children to fill their places. If few have risen to fill high public stations, it is also true that few have fallen below respectability. They have been cursed neither with poverty nor great riches, but have found that happy mean for which Agur prayed. Being law-abiding, peaceable citizens, we find no criminal among them. With rare exceptions they have been temperate, anti-slavery, and Republicans. Generally they have been orthodox church members, and we know of several instances in which the father has lived to see all of his large family members of the same church with himself. In

ered they are mainly Congregational or Presbyterian. Most of them have been and are farmers, industriously cultivating their own soil, such as are called successful. Nor has success been wanting in other vocations. The family, home ties are quite strong, and we hear of little discord or alienation. On the whole, it would seem as though the promised blessing had descended to the latest generation. We have no armorial bearings to display. We have even omitted high-sounding titles, as such, except to mention their existence. We have tried impartially to characterize the family as we have learned it; not for the public, but for ourselves.

There are many thanks due those who have so ably assisted us, but they are too numerous to mention here. In particular we would mention, however, the labors of Hon. Osmyn Baker, of Northampton, Mass., who, some twenty years ago, or more, entered upon this same project, but was prevented by other engagements from carrying it through. His memoranda were quite valuable, giving many important facts, as well as furnishing the ground-work for further researches. Also, Mr. Thomas K. Baker, of Springfield, Mass., for his indefatigable zeal in procuring eastern genealogies, and bringing to light branches, trace of which was almost lost. There are also many (say 160) to whom no thanks are due, who have not so much as answered our letters of inquiry.

We now present the result of these labors, believing it will be interesting and profitable to young and old of present and future generations. We have found it especially so when studied in connection with American history. Let the reader follow these generations, associating with each the events of which they were the witnesses, and see them leaving the Old World for the New; their early struggles for a bare existence; follow them through their mastery over their savage foes; through their rough pioneering; through the dark days of the Revolution, and through their subsequent prosperity; note their joys and their trials, their hopes and their fears. Place yourself in their midst, and remark the quaint customs of the olden time; their manner of thought, of speech, of dress, of worship, of amusement, of life in all its every-day phases, and it will not only make a reality of history, but will introduce to you your ancestors as they really were. It will be seen that an individual is but a link in the chain of humanity; that a lifetime, at the longest, is as an hour on the dial; and that whatever we would that the generations past had done for us, it is our duty to do for those to come.

Virgil relates of the "pious Eneas," that when the flames were sweeping to destruction the ancient city of Troy, he shouldered his venerable old father, Anchises, and taking his little Iulus by the hand, he brought them to a place of safety without the walls. Even so would we rescue from oblivion the name and memory of our forefathers, not forgetting the little ones. All these were honored in their generations. Many of them have left a name after them, and some there are who have no memorial—who are gone, and their children after them—but they are not forgotten. "Their bodies are buried in peace, but their name liveth forevermore." All honor, then, to the fathers who begat us. Bring filial reverence, pious gratitude, and lofty veneration to hallow their shrine, while we pay our vows to those who in turn shall succeed us.

## EXPLANATORY.

---

In the arrangement of such a mass of names and dates in their proper connection, we have aimed to be as clear and unmistakable as possible, well-knowing that by far the greater part of those interested are wholly unused to deciphering genealogical tables. It is impossible to arrange it so that all may be seen at once, but time and patience will unravel it all. We have combined from other plans, and our own suggestions, the following arrangement, and have tried to adhere to it closely, unless otherwise noted.

The figures before *CAPITALS*, without brackets, from 1 upwards, are the *serial numbers*, in regular order. The like numbers, in brackets, wherever found, refer to that serial number in its order, where more will be found concerning the name joined with it.

The small *exponential figure* at the end of, and above each name, is the number of the generation, and will materially assist the reader to distinguish the children and grand-children, and degrees of relationship in many cases.

The names of heads of families in the series, are given in *LARGE CAPITALS*. The first name of the wives, and the last name of the husbands are given in *SMALL CAPITALS*. The names of their children are in *italics*, and their grand-children in the common type, unless otherwise noted.

The heads of families, as indicated by the *serial number*, are all *Bakers* by birth, unless the second name appears. Of course, in

the female lines of descent, it will be necessary to watch closely the father's name.

We have endeavored to keep those families most closely related, as nearly together as possible, and, except in a few instances where convenience required it otherwise, have given all names in the order of age, so far as known.

It will be remembered that the *serial figures in brackets* are only for reference; as, when following the head of a family, it refers to the parent; when before a child's name, it refers to his place at the head of a family, there being a reference both ways; and unless so referred, the name does not appear elsewhere. To illustrate, turn to "9 JOIN<sup>2</sup> (7)." The (7) refers you to "7 Timothy<sup>2</sup> (1)," his father, which in turn refers you back to "1 Edward<sup>1</sup>." Or, going forward, you find "9 JOIN<sup>2</sup> (7)" had a son marked "(37) John<sup>1</sup>." Turn to 37 and you find 37 John<sup>1</sup> (9) with his family, and further references through the branch in like manner. A little practice will make it all quite plain.

We have used only few abbreviations, as b. born; d. died; m. married; res. resides and resided; ch. child or children; d. s. p. died without issue; ae. age; and others in common use. Had ch. means either that they have had children, or now have children. If there is some uncertainty at times, it was from the want of information on our part. We have given all that we know of the family, so far as it comes within the scope of the work. If any one has anything further, we should be glad to know of it.

The general divisions of the book, for convenience, are indicated by the running title at the top of the page. We have not been able to invent an index which would be simpler than the text itself.

*Edward*, embraces his descendants through the third generation, except his son John, and Thomas, son of Timothy<sup>2</sup>.

*Thomas*, embraces all the descendants of Thomas son of Timothy<sup>2</sup>.

Then follow the sons of John<sup>2</sup> (9) in order, viz: *John*(37); *Noah*, (47); *Aaron* (102); *Elisha*, (108); *Elijah*, (119); *Stephen*, (125).

*John of Dedham*, was the son of Edward (1) and this division gives his descendants.

## BAKER GENEALOGY---EDWARD.

---

1. *EDWARD BAKER*<sup>1</sup> was the emigrant ancestor of the family whose genealogy is herein set forth. He was an Englishman, a farmer, and settled on the south side of "Baker's Hill," in Saugus, (then Lynn) Mass., in the year 1630. Undoubtedly he came hither in the large fleet under Gov. Winthrop, which sailed from England in April, and arrived at Boston and Salem in June and July, 1630. This fleet consisted of eleven vessels, and brought about 1700 colonists. "Some of them were from the western part of England, but the greater number from about London. On their arrival they began to make settlements in the pathless woods." Mr. Dudley says that some of them settled "upon the river of Saugus." Lynn was first settled only the previous year by five families, and this year received the large addition of fifty persons, with their families. Research has failed to bring to light *anything* concerning him prior to his arrival in Lynn. The hill<sup>a</sup> to which his name was first given, has known no other, and yet stands, "rock-ribbed and ancient," an enduring monument to the God-fearing, liberty-loving and hard-working pioneer who gave us this goodly heritage.

He was admitted a "Freeman"<sup>b</sup> March 14, 1638. All that is known of his wife is, that her name was JOAN, (Jane) and that she died April 9, 1693.

a. "Baker's Hill" may be seen near the Saugus branch of the Eastern Railroad, two or three miles from Lynn, towards Boston.

b. Before a man could vote or hold office, he must be made a "freeman," by the General or Quarterly Court. Prior to 1661, he must be a member of the Congregational Church. Then, by a Royal order, it was modified so that a certificate of their being correct in conduct and doctrine, from a clergyman, was sufficient to entitle them to these important privileges.

In 1657 he removed from Lynn to Northampton, Mass., only three years after the settlement of that town, where he had several grants of land from the town, purchased several lots besides,<sup>c</sup> held important town offices, and remained many years, "respected and influential." In later years he settled his sons, Joseph and Timothy, there, and returned to Lynn<sup>d</sup>, where he died March 16, 1687.

Mr. Newhall<sup>e</sup> says, "The will of Mr. Baker is dated 16th October, 1685, and having previously provided for some of his children by deed, not all of them are named in it. He exhorts his family to live peaceable and pious lives, and desires for himself 'a decent funeral, suitable to his rank and quality while living.' " His burial-place is unmarked and unknown. None of his lands are in the hands of his descendants. He had five sons and <sup>one</sup> daughter<sup>2</sup>, viz:—

c. Edward's estate in Northampton lay on the south side of Elm street, beginning near the junction of Prospect street with Elm, and extending westward. The evidence is satisfactory, though not strictly legal, that the original home lot and residence of Edward was on the south side of Elm street, opposite the junction of Prospect street. He left it to his son Timothy, who in turn left it to his son John. From a written statement made by Abner (43) in 1851, it appears that John left it to his son Stephen (125), who lived on the place indicated till he sold out and removed to Chesterfield. The same statement says "Edward (1) had the three corner lots next to the Clarks." That would make it probable that Edward and his sons, Joseph and Timothy, lived on the three corners at the junction of Prospect street with Elm street, and the elm standing in the triangle would be pre-eminently the "Baker Elm." "Baker's Hill," near Florence, and "Baker's Field," as laid down on the old maps, are both, probably, parts of the estate. We can find no documentary evidence in relation to it.

d. We are unable to account for his return to Lynn. His circumstances in Northampton seem far preferable every way.

e. History of Lynn, by Abouzo Lewis and James R. Newhall, 1865. It is a very interesting work, giving many curious details of early pioneer life. We were unable to find the Will, else we should insert it entire.

f. It may be of interest to explain, that prior to 1742, funeral expenses were often very large, there being furnished by the estate, mourning apparel, gold rings, gloves, wines and liquors in a very lavish style. In one instance 3000 pairs of gloves, and 200 gold rings were given away at one funeral. In 1742 a law was passed prohibiting all but six pairs of gloves to the bearers, and one pair to the minister.—*History of Haddam*, p. 248.

g. This is probably the order of their ages, from comparing the dates of marriages and births. Possibly he had another daughter, Elizabeth. The Lynn records say that "John Witt and Elizabeth Baker, was married the 14th day of January, 1676," and gave their family. The presumption, however, is against it. Perhaps, also, there were other children who died young. Nearly all the town records of Lynn, for the first fifty years or more, having been lost, we have no means of knowing more than these. It may be that Edward was older than Thomas; he appears to be named before him in his father's will. It seems that the two latter never had much to do with the rest, and were lost sight of more than a hundred years ago. It was nearly so with John at Dedham, which was owing, probably, to the distance apart, and the difficulties of making journeys in those times.



2. *JOSEPH*<sup>2</sup> (1) b. —, m. *RUTH*, dau. of Dea. William Holton, Feb. 5, 1662-3. He went with his father to Northampton in 1657, and settled there. He and his eldest son, Joseph, were killed by the Indians while at work in his field, ("Baker's Field") October 29, 1675. His children were *Joseph*<sup>3</sup>, b. Jan. 20, 1664, and killed Oct. 29, 1675; *Ruth*<sup>3</sup>, b. May 6, 1668, (m. Ebenezer, son of Alexander Alvord, of Windsor, in 1692, and had ch., Ebenezer<sup>4</sup>, b. 1693, and d. young, Joseph<sup>4</sup>, b. 1697, Mary<sup>4</sup>, b. 1699, Noah<sup>4</sup>, b. 1701, *Ruth*<sup>4</sup>, d. March 4, 1706). *Mary*<sup>3</sup>, b. Sept. 5, 1670. *Samuel*<sup>3</sup>, b. Sept. 11, 1672; *Joseph*<sup>3</sup>, b. Jan. 25, 1675-6<sup>a</sup>, (posthumous). Nothing further is known of this family, and probably there are few, if any, descendants.

3. *MARY*<sup>2</sup>, (1) b. April 1, 1642, d. Dec. 1, 1719, m. Nov. 7, 1662, George, son of William SUMNER, of Dorchester, Mass., (son of Roger, of Oxford, Eng.) They had ch., *Mary*<sup>3</sup>, b. 1663, *George*<sup>3</sup>, *Samuel*<sup>3</sup>, *William*<sup>3</sup>, *Ebenezer*<sup>3</sup>, *Edward*<sup>3</sup>, *Joseph*<sup>3</sup>, and *Benjamin*<sup>3</sup>. Her hus. George lived in Milton, Mass., and was a deacon. He d. Dec. 11, 1715, ae. 81. Of the sons, *Edward*<sup>3</sup> had a son, Increase<sup>4</sup>, who was the father of Gov. Increase<sup>5</sup> Sumner, Gov. of Mass. from 1797 to 1799. The descendants of this family are quite numerous and honorable. Their genealogy may be found in full, in the New England Historical and Genealogical Register, April No., 1854.

4. *THOMAS*<sup>2</sup> (1), b. 1653. For the curiosity of those who do not delve in musty records, we copy *verbatim et literatim* from the Lynn Records, Book 1, page 2.

"Thomas Baker and Mary Lewis Was Married the 10th of July, 1689.

Thomas, Their Sonne, Was Born the 11th of August, 1692, and died the 2 of Sept. 1692. *ae 22 day*

Hannah, their daughter was Born the 17th day of Aug., 1693.

Mary, their daughter, was born the 15th of July, 1695, and dyed

<sup>a</sup>. By the old style the year began the 25th of March. In 1552 it was changed to the 1st of Jan. Accordingly, Jan. 25 was 1675 by the old style, and 1676 by the new style, expressed by 1675-6. We have given the dates in all cases as we have found them.

the 11 of Aug., 1695. Abigall, their daughter, was born y<sup>e</sup> 25th

his wife, as an addicion to page y<sup>e</sup> 2.

Thomas, their Sonne, was born the 14th of September, 1697.

Thomas, their Son, departed y<sup>e</sup> life, Oct. 27, 1697.

(5) Thomas, their Sonne, was born the 26th of May, 1699.

Abigaill, their Daughter, was born the 19th day of July, 1701.

Mary, their Daughter, was born the 19th day of May, 1706.

Ruth, their Daughter, was born the 12th day of Jan., 1707-8.

John, their Son, was born y<sup>e</sup> 27 of August, 1710.

John, their Son, Departed this life the 4 of March, 1710-11."

Thus ends the record. Thomas<sup>2</sup> it seems settled in Lynn. On  
the 13th of Nov., 1675, he, with fourteen others, was drafted in  
Lynn, to serve in "King Philip's war." He was in the Narragan-  
set fight, as appears from his affidavit<sup>1</sup>. He also killed two wolves  
Feb. 28, 1698, and received the bounty of 20 shillings each. He  
was also a member of "y<sup>e</sup> Ancient and Honorable Artillery Co.," in  
1694. It is somewhat singular that no farther trace of his descend-  
ants can be found, except the children of his son Thomas.

5. *THOMAS*<sup>3</sup>, (4) b. May 26, 1699. In the Lynn records  
among the "intentions of marriage," is "April 20, 1729, Thomas  
Baker and Rebecca Kelsey, both of Lynn."

"April 26, 1727, Mr. William Taylor, for and in behalf of the  
overseer and guardian of the said Rebecca Kelsey, forbids the banns  
betwixt Mr. Thomas Baker and Miss Rebecca Kelsey, which was  
entered April 20, 1729." Which shows that "the course of true  
love" didn't always "run smooth" in those days. They were equal  
to the emergency, however, for we find in Book 3, p. 191, that  
"Thomas Baker and Rebecca Kelsey were married May 10, 1729,

1. The following affidavit was signed and sworn to, by Thomas Baker, at Lynn, 8th of June,  
1730, before Theophilus Burrill, J. C., and is recorded in Middlesex Registry. Andrew Town-  
send was drafted with him:-

"The deposition of Thomas Baker, of Lyn, in the county of Essex, aged about 77 years, Tes-  
tifieth and saith:-That I, being well acquainted with one Andrew Townsend, of Lyn afore-  
said, for more than 55 years since, and do certainly know and very well remember that the  
sa<sup>d</sup> Andrew Townsend was a soldier in the expedition to the Narragansett, under y<sup>e</sup> Command  
of Capt. Gardner, and that he was in y<sup>e</sup> sa<sup>d</sup> Narragansett site, and in sa<sup>d</sup> site rec'd a wound in or  
about the year 1653."

by Mr. Joseph Whipple, minister of the gospel in *New Hampshire*, as by an attested copy appears." Their ch. were *Rebecca*, b. Feb. 28, 1729-30; *John*, b. Oct. 19, 1731; *Thomas*, b. Nov. 15, 1733, d. Dec. 3, 1733; *Thomas*, b. Dec. 25, 1734; *John Kelsey*, b. Jan. 16, 1736-7; *Rebecca*, b. Feb. 14, 1738-9; *James*, b. March 5, 1740-1; *Abigail*, b. March 2, 1742-3; *Anna*, b. March 23, 1745; *William*, b. April 9, 1747; *Mary*, b. April 28, 1749; *Daniel*, b. April 15, 1751; *John*, b. May 16, 1753. This is copied from the Lynn Records, and no further trace appears.

6. *EDWARD*<sup>2</sup> (1), b. —, m. *MARY*, dau. of Capt. Thos. Marshall<sup>1</sup>, of Lynn, April 7, 1685. He was made a "Freeman" in 1691; was an Ensign of Militia. His children were *Mary*, b. 24th April, 1686; *Edward*, b. 19th April, 1688, d. April 21, 1688; *Sarah*, b. 18th Jan., 1688-9, d. Jan. 29, 1688-9; *Sarah*, b. 13th Jan., 1689-90; *Rebecca*, b. 1st Oct., 1692; *Edward*, b. 4th Jan., 1694-5, d. 26th Jan., 1694-5; *Edward*, b. 16th July, 1696; *Ruth*, b. 15th Aug., 1698, d. 3d Sept., 1698; *Ruth*, b. 7th July, 1699, d. 11th May, 1703; *Elizabeth*, b. 29th March, 1702, d. 7th May, 1709; *Joseph*, b. 9th Nov., 1704; *Marshall*, b. 5th March, 1707-8.

This information is all from the Lynn Records, and we can find nothing more<sup>2</sup>. From the deaths among the children, it looks as though the descendants were few, if any. *Some. Jan. 1721. His son, David Brigham, b. 1721. His son, Samuel, b. 1721.*  
*Timothy*<sup>2</sup> (1), b. 1647, through whom the greater part of this family, so far as known, are descended. He was settled by his father in Northampton, and lived on Elm street<sup>4</sup>. He

J. The Captain was "a venerable old hero of Cromwell's war," and kept the "Blew Anchor" for more than forty years, presiding with all the frankness and hospitality of "a fine old English gentleman."

K. In Lynn Records, Book II, "Intentions of marriage" which were required to be published two or three weeks before marriage. We give those of the Bakers, hoping they may lead to further discoveries. All are at liberty to guess who they were. We don't know:

Jan. 21, 1727-8, John Potter and Mary Baker, both of Lynn.  
 Sept. 11, 1709, Ebenezer Baker, of Lynn, and Mrs. Anne Hall, of Boston.  
 March 2, 1714-15, John Baker, of Topsfield, and Anne Perkins, of Lynn.  
 Jan. 14, 1715-16, Nathaniel Potter and Rebecca Baker, both of Lynn.  
 Aug. 10, 1717, Ebenezer Baker, a stranger, and Mrs. Sarah Baker, of Lynn.  
 July 12, 1717, Thomas Cheever and Mrs. Mary Baker, both of Lynn.  
 Oct. 29, 1720, Theophilus Farrington and Hannah Baker, both of Lynn.  
 March 30, 1729, Hugh Floyd, of Boston, and Mary Baker, of Lynn.  
 Oct. 20, 1722, John Newhall, and Abigail Baker, both of Lynn.

It appears elsewhere that Ebenezer and Sarah Baker had a son, Hollister, born in 1718.

L. We presume the dwellers in Northampton have a more lively sense of gratitude toward that generation for planting those elm saplings, than for almost anything else. They are now magnificent old trees. One of the largest, standing at the junction of Prospect street, was pointed out as the "Baker Elm," which, tradition says, was planted by this Timothy Baker. It is a monument to his memory more enduring than stone, and has already outlived all other material traces of him.

was a leading character in town, often "selectman," often on important committees, both of town and church. He was dignified as "Mr."<sup>m</sup> from the first, afterwards becoming "Ensign," then "Lieutenant" of the "Train-band." He was made a Freeman in 1676. He m. (1) GRACE, dau. John Marsh, of Hadley, Mass., and granddaughter of Gov. John Webster, of Conn., Jan. 16, 1672; had ch., *Grace*<sup>s</sup>, b. 1673, d. Feb. 10, 1673; and *Timothy*<sup>s</sup>, b. 1675, d. in infancy. His wife, GRACE, d. May 31, 1676. Soon after, he m. (2) Mrs. SARAH Atherton, wid. of Rev. Hope Atherton<sup>a</sup>, of Hatfield, Mass., and dau. of "Lieut." (and Dea.) John Hollister, of Wethersfield. Had ch., (9) *John*<sup>s</sup>, b. Feb. 3, 1680; (10) *Thomas*<sup>s</sup>, b. May 14, 1682; (8) *Edward*<sup>s</sup>, b. Nov. 12, 1685; *Prudence*<sup>s</sup>, b. May 14, 1687; *Deliverance*<sup>s</sup>, b. Nov. 13, 1689, d. 1710.

The final record is, "30 Aug., 1729, Lieut. Timothy Baker died." His wife, Sarah, d. Dec. 8, 1691. Both were probably buried in the Old Burying Ground, in the vicinity of "Shop Row," Northampton.

8. *EDWARD*<sup>s</sup>, (7), b. Nov. 12, 1685, m. HANNAH MUMF, of Springfield, Sept. 15, 1730. Had two daus., names unknown, and no sons. He resided at Northampton, and d. March 4, 1758, "having fully sustained the good standing of the family in his native town."

9. *JOHN*<sup>s</sup>, (7), b. Feb. 3, 1680, m. June 1, 1709, REBECCA, (b. Nov. 22, 1687), dau. of Dea. John Clark, and grand-dau. of William Clark and Elder John Strong, of Northampton. He settled on the old homestead, on Elm street, in Northampton, and became one of the most influential men in town. He had an active, vigorous, and very religious cast of mind, such as characterized his father and grand-father. It is said that the Bakers and the Clarks,

At the time settlements began in New England, the people of Old England, below the nobility, baronets and knights, and above the plebeians, were "Esquires," and "Gentlemen," and bore the title of "Master," or "Mister." In New England, only this class and those becoming dignitaries here, were allowed that title, and the people would have been shocked to hear a common man called "Mister." Times are changed since then. Military titles were especially in high repute, and the least was preferred to church or official titles. "Goodman" and "good-wife" designated common people in respectful manner.—*Hist. of Hadley*.

whose families were here connected, together maintained a regular family prayer meeting for a great number of years, until the families were scattered too widely. And very rarely indeed will you find so large a family, all of whom were so devotedly religious as were his children<sup>o</sup>. He was universally known as "Capt. John Baker." He d. Jan. 8, 1762. His wife d. June 9, 1774. Their burial-place is unknown. Their children were,

10. *THOMAS*<sup>2</sup>, (7), b. May 14, 1682. His was a life of bold adventure and lively romance, closing under the shadow of misfortune. It is given at length, in the "Otis, &c., Genealogy," published in the N. E. His. and Gen. Register, 1851<sup>o</sup>, together

*o*. "Capt. John's" family were quite remarkable. The value of proper christian training and example is observable. All of them stood forth through life, as prominent christian men and women, and filled full their measure of usefulness. Physically, the men were tall and large. Truly, "there were giants in those days." They were from six feet upwards in height, large-framed and powerful. That they were healthy and vigorous is clear, from their longevity, the six brothers whose ages are known having averaged upwards of eighty-two years each. "Aunt Sally," wife of Sydenham, (son of Stephen 125) relates to us her recollection, that "when she was 13 years of age, (1802) and living in Stephen's family, the four brothers, Noah, Aaron, Elisha and Elijah, together visited their brother Stephen, at Chesterfield, Mass. A lasting impression was made on her youthful mind by the circumstance that they all wore 'big, curly wigs,' and were such a jolly set of old men"—they being then from 70 to 83 years of age. "They were very affectionate towards each other, and very devoted in religion." They were used thus to visit each other frequently till death called them one by one away.

with his descendants, so far as known, up to 1851. We are at liberty to use this, and have condensed from it our account. He was known as "Capt. Baker." Being an adventurous character he had no "local habitation," except his father's in Northampton, till after marriage. He gives briefly a part of his story, in his petition to the General Court, as found in the archives of Massachusetts. This petition is dated at Brookfield, 6th of June, 1718, and represents "that he was a soldier under Capt. Welles, and was taken prisoner at the 'Deerfield massacre' in Feb., 1703-4; that he lost his arms and part of his clothes, and was carried captive to Canada; that he escaped from Montreal the next summer, in order to come home and give intelligence of an expedition against these towns, under Chevalier Boncour; that he was retaken, and the Indians made preparations to burn him alive, but he got out of their hands and ran to the house of one Le Clair, who ransomed him by advancing five pounds, which he promised to repay. He was put in irons by order of the Governor of Canada, and made a close prisoner four months. After which he was a prisoner at large, until he escaped a third time, and got safe to his country. He prayed for an allowance, and the General Court granted him ten pounds."

It is said that on this last escape, "he and his three companions were entirely without food, only such as they gathered from the desert through which they had to travel. They were on the point of giving up, when they prayed some deliverance might appear, and behold, a large bird, such as they had never before seen, fell before them. This they instantly seized, tore in pieces and ate without cooking."

About 1712, Capt. Baker, with a scouting party of thirty-four men, passed up Connecticut River and crossed to Pemigewasset River. He there discovered a party of Indians, whose Sachem was called Walthernummus, (chief of the Pequakets) whom he attacked and destroyed. Capt. Baker and the Sachem leveled and discharged their guns at each other at the same instant. The Indian's ball grazed the Captain's left eyebrow, but did him no injury. The Captain's ball went through the breast of the Sachem; he leaped four

or five feet high, and fell "stone dead." The Indians fled to the river; the Captain pursued and destroyed every one of them. The Captain lost no men. They plundered the wigwams of what furs they could carry away, and burned the rest. Capt. Baker took for his trophies the richly decorated blanket of the Sachem, his powder horn, and all his various trinkets, and they are still (1851) among his descendants. This took place at the confluence of a small river with the Pemigewasset, (between Plymouth and Campton) which has ever since had the name of "Baker's River." Capt. Baker and his men went to Boston and applied for the scalp bounty. On the 10th of June, 1712, the General Court allowed them 40 pounds, and wages from March 24 to May 16, 1712.

It was not long after this that he fell in with his future wife; and her experience was no less adventurous than his own. She was CHRISTINE, dau. of Richard Otis, of Dover, N. H., ancestor of the family from whose genealogy we extract this. On the night of the 27th of June, 1689, the Indians attacked the settlement at Dover, slaughtered 22, carried 29 captives to Canada, and burned most of the buildings. Richard Otis, with one son and one daughter, were killed, and his wife, with this daughter, then an infant of only three months, were carried to Canada and sold to the French. The priests took the daughter, baptized her Christine, and educated her in the Romish faith. She passed some time in a nunnery, not, however, taking the veil. At the age of 16 she married a Frenchman named Le Beau, and became the mother of two or three children. Her husband died about 1713. It was soon after 1714, that Capt. Baker was attached to a commission detailed by Gov. Dudley, under Col. John Stoddard and John Williams, for the purpose of negotiating for the release of prisoners, and to settle certain other matters, and went to Canada. He became deeply interested in Madame Le Beau, and overcoming a strong opposition on the part of her mother, (who had married again) the priests and others, he effected her release. But she was not allowed to take her children. She endeavored to get them afterward, but was unsuccessful. She returned with Col. Stoddard to Mass., renounced the

Romish faith, and several months after (date not known) she married Capt. Baker. Though their first child was born in Northampton, they first settled in Brookfield, Mass., where they remained till 1731. There he took a prominent position, and was the first Representative in the General Court, from Brookfield, in 1719. In 1727 he was tried for blasphemy, before the Superior Court at Springfield. The charge against him was as follows:—"There being a discourse of God's having, in his Providence, put in Joseph Jennings, Esq., of Brookfield, a Justice of the Peace, Capt. Baker used the following words;—'If I had been with the Almighty, I would have taught him better.'" Verdict of the Jury—"Not guilty." This Jennings was Representative from Brookfield for some years, and perhaps a rival of the Captain. It seems his headstrong, daring spirit continued till middle life or after.

About 1731, misfortunes came. His health and strength failing, probably, (for he was "past his labor" in 1735), he sold his farm to a Col. Sheldon, considered good at the time, but he failed before paying. Being now bankrupt in strength and means, and with a family of seven children, mostly dependent upon him, we find him at Mendon in 1732; at Newport, R. I., in 1733; and removed to Dover, N. H., about 1735. The time of his death is not known, but it was prior to 1753. Tradition says he died of the "lethargy," at Roxbury, where he was on a visit to his cousins, the Sumners (*vide* 3). His wife petitioned the General Assembly in 1735, for permission to keep a public house on the "contry road from Dover Meeting House to Cocheeco Boome," setting forth briefly her past and present circumstances; "that her losses are trebled on her; first, the loss of her house, well fitted and furnished, and the lands belonging to it; second, the loss of her New England substance in her last journey to Canada; and thirdly, the loss of her children. And now, your petitioner, having a large family to support, and by the changes and chances of fortune here is reduced to very low circumstances; and her husband is past his labour," etc. Her petition was granted, and she opened her "House of Entertainment," and kept it many years. She brought up and educated her family, and



fitted them for useful and honorable lives. She d. Feb. 23, 1773, at the good old age of 84 years. Capt. Baker's children were,

Bean enlisted in the French war, (and distinguished himself at the capture of Louisburg) and went to Dover as his rendezvous, where he met with Mary Baker, whose mother, Christine, it will be remembered, was keeping a hotel there about that time. After the war, business again called him through Dover, and he renewed the acquaintance, and ere long made her his wife. They resided at Epping until about 1771, when he went to Bow, N. H., where he was at the time of the Revolution. He was one of the first in that struggle for liberty. He was a Captain of Militia, and was one of the most active and efficient officers in obtaining recruits, and furnishing supplies for the army. He was with Stark at the battle of Bennington; also, with his sons Ebenezer and Benjamin at the capture of Burgoyne. The hardships and fatigue of that campaign laid the foundation of a disease of which he died the following summer, aged upwards of 50 years.

Mary, his wife, died in Conway, Feb. 6, 1826, lacking 10 days of being 100 years of age. She could see to thread a needle without glasses, to the last day of her life, and but for her wonderfully retentive memory, and that of her grand-son, Col. Benjamin Beau,

the "Otis Genealogy" could hardly have been written. They had 5 ch., viz:—

He was one of the very first to serve his country on the battle-fields of the Revolution. His experience was so interesting we can't omit it:—"On the morning of the Battle of Bunker Hill, he went to the hill at the command of Col. Prescott, to labor upon the breastwork, and was in the redoubt, slightly thrown up, commanded by Gen. Warren, where the enemy aimed his heaviest and most fatal guns. He had his gun shot off in his hand, and *thirteen* balls fired through his clothes, only one of which injured him, and that but slightly. In the scarcity of ammunition, he was engaged in *throwing stones*, until the enemy entered, and then he was pursued as he took a circuitous route to his pack, which he had stowed away in the morning. The pack, however, had been stolen during the engagement, and he contented himself with carrying from the hill his Captain's overcoat, which had been abandoned. He was at the capture of Burgoyne, and one of a scouting party that captured fifty-four Indians. He served eighteen or twenty months in all, at different times, but enlisted for longer periods, and was honorably discharged at the request of his father, that he might assist in taking care of the family, in the absence of his father and brother. Soon after the close of the war, and the death of his father, he removed, with his mother, from Bow, to Conway, N. H., where he died March 3, 1846, in his 91st year. His 8 children were,

He served through the whole war of the Revolution. At Bennington, he was in the staff, and commanded a party who were ordered into the rear of the enemy's breastwork, and there carried it at the point of their bayonets.

**21. MEHITABLE BEAN<sup>s</sup>**, (18) b. 1761, m. Hubbard Colby, of Eaton. He d. 1826. She d. 1828. They had 6 ch., viz:—

(2) **TAMSEN**, wid. of John Twombly, and dau. of James Chesley. Col. Otis Baker was a member of the Provincial House of Representatives at Portsmouth, N. H., 1768, 1770-1-2-3, and also in 1775, when the Provincial Government was abandoned. December 21, 1775, he was chosen Representative to the Revolutionary Legislature, at Exeter, which resolved itself into an independent State Government, and elected him one of the Judges of the Court of Common Pleas, which office he had held under the Colonial Government from 1773 and so continued to hold it, until he was elected a State Senator in 1785, which latter office he held two years. He was one of the N. H. Committee of Safety from 1776 to '77, and succeeded Col. John Wentworth, in command of the old 2d N. H. Reg't, as Col., by which title he was afterward known. He d. Oct. 27, 1801, ac. 75. His wife d. Nov. 6, 1801, only ten days after, ac. 72. He had, in all, 9 ch., 2 by 1st wife. They were,

He represented Dover in Legislature in 1807-8-9-10-12-14-15, and was Senator in 1818-19-20. He was b. at Haverhill, Mass., Oct. 2, 1752, and d. at Dover, Jan. 28, 1826. Osmyn Baker writes:—"I have heard the late Judge Lyman say that he recollected him well, as one of the most prominent and eloquent, in the meetings of the people, in early Revolutionary times. Unfortunately he became a loyalist, and that shadow darkened many years of his later life." We are told he held some honorable office under the Colonial Government, and that may explain why he adhered to that side. He and his son Hollister are the only ones in the whole family, that we know of, who were not heartily for Independence. He resided in Northampton, and his tomb-stone is there. His ch. were,

Stephen, the last, but not the least of the sons of John (9) is described as a tall, straight man, six feet or more in stature, wearing a big sandy wig, with a long cue, high stockings, and tight breeches with knee buckles, and the rest of the costume peculiar to those days. He rather outdid his father, in having 8 sons and 1 daughter, who lived to an average age of over 75 years, and bore him 75 grand children. We are glad to say that the fashion of large families does not attach to the later generations. The 8 sons were tall, powerful men, averaging about six feet, and well adapted to pioneering. He lived on the place in Chesterfield, now owned by his grandson, William Baker, son of Oliver, about a mile west of the hill. He was a thriving, industrious farmer, and strictly religious, bringing up his large family in the same path, so that probably nine-tenths of his descendants have been and are members of the church, (mostly Cong. and Presb.) and in prosperous circumstances.

Not long after the close of the Revolution the tide of emigration set strongly toward "York State," and in 1801, Erasmus, first taken by it, came with Stephen ("Ensign,") Cole, and — Rhoades, to Lafayette, Otsego Co., N. Y., and settled on a tract on the hill just west of the village of L. There had been a few settlers in town previous to this, but the country was mainly an unbroken forest. Encouraged by his success Lemuel and Thomas followed in a year or two, settling on adjoining lands. The next year came Joseph, also locating on an adjoining tract, and, in 1805, Seth and Sydenham brought up the rear, buying of the others and adjoining lands and all went into pioneer life in earnest. The best part of those lands still remains in the hands of the Baker family. The other two sons, Thaddeus and Oliver, remained in Chesterfield, but their descendants have all left there except William, son of Oliver.

The secret of this extraordinary journey, we are told, was that he was smitten with the charms of one of Gen. Tupper's daughters, but it was "love's labor lost." The journey was accomplished with an ox team, through an unbroken forest mainly, where they had to cut their own road, with wild beasts and hostile Indians to guard against. Several anecdotes are told wherein the courage and intrepidity of the "Major" appears to advantage. They are told in so many different ways however, that we cannot give the facts. 2. The removal to New York of Stephen's sons was an important event with them, and under the circumstances, required no small amount of "pluck" and patient toiling. In those days Railroads and Canals were unknown. The State of New York was almost a boundless forest, with here and there a small settlement, or a log cabin, while the great West beyond, was almost unexplored. Even now it seems like romance, but we may be sure that in those days these were stubborn facts. It will not be uninteresting to later and future generations, to narrate as an instance, how a "moving west" was accomplished. This "change of base" was performed by Seth and his brother Sydenham, under circumstances quite favorable. We have an account of it from the widow of Sydenham, (165) "Aunt Sally," who is the only living representative that we know of, of the fifth generation.

In preparation for the journey, Seth bought at Chesterfield, a pair of horses and a new lumber wagon. The latter was properly covered in Emigrant style, and on the eventful morning, was duly loaded with the "chests," containing the clothing and such like, and the provisions cooked for the journey. On and among these were disposed the family, consisting of Seth and wife, their children, Quartus, Orril, Lewis, and Minerva, from 2 to 9 years of age, and Sally, (younger sister of Seth's wife, who married Sydenham 5 years after.) "Syd" was on hand with a hired horse team and wagon, which had been loaded with the household goods, and implements necessary to carry on business in their new forest home. Each had \$100 safely "salted" about his person, and "pluck" for anything. So on that bright Wednesday morning in Sept., 1805, they bid adieu to "the cot of their fore-fathers," and followed the "star of Empire," on its westward way. Their wagons were all their "bed and board," till on Saturday night they halted with joy the log cabin of their cousin Abner, (43), who had preceded them two years, and settled in Deerfield, Oneida Co., N. Y. Abner then had with him a family of ten or eleven children, from two years old upward, but opened wide his cabin door for these nine more; so there they rested over Sunday. "Aunt Sally" mentions with feeling, the recollection of two "savory cream pies," set forth at that Sunday's entertainment, a luxury beyond comparison. Moving again Monday morning, they reached LaFayette Tuesday night, having made the trip in seven days.

The whole party went into the cabin with Joseph (183), and in eight weeks, Seth, with an addition of one to his family, moved into a new cabin of his own. "Syd" returned with the hired team, and came on again. Seth bought 100 acres, "Syd" working for him till he married, and the pioneer's work went forward. He subsequently increased this to over 500 acres, all valuable land. He also raised a large family, all of whom are settled in LaFayette, except Harriet, and all are living who reached maturity, except Quartus. Morris retains the old homestead.

10. As the Bakers were somewhat partial to the Bryant family, there having been seven intermarriages, we subjoin a brief sketch. This family may have descended from a John Bryant of Scituate, Mass., 1639. We have no particular reason for believing it, except that the first Bryant who came to Chesterfield, Mass., came from Scituate with his son Benjamin, about 1762.—The father perished in the snow. Benjamin wintered in Northampton for two or three years, and was constable in 1762. His 9 children were, Asahel (who m. a Warren, sister of Ellis' wife) and had 3 sons and 4 daus., of whom Eunice, m. Stephen, (129).

George, who seems to have known some misfortune, had no fixed residence, and died unmarried, in middle life.

Four years in College developed gifts of a high order, and made him very dear to his classmates and comrades. Physically vigorous, elastic, active, athletic, a leader in all manly sports; in his temperament uncommonly cheerful, bright, hopeful; in all his views of life, kindly, charitable and true, with a future full of good promise he gave every indication of a long, happy and useful life. He went home after graduation, and there in his bright young years was stricken with fever and died in his father's house, Aug. 27, 1866."

2. Lemuel seems to have had a large portion of an adventurous spirit, which occasionally crops out in the family. We can find no trace now of any descendants, although there may be some. The letter referred to, was passed around among the relatives at the time, but is now lost. From those who read it I gather this statement: That at the time of this occurrence, the son (probably Horatio,) and the son-in-law (Duncan), were 22 and 21 years of age. That on their Texan farm, the son and Duncan went on horseback after the cows, taking their rifles; that the Indians came on their trail, and cornered them in a ravine, when they backed up against the rocks, where the Indians must attack them in front, and evidently resolved to sell their lives as dearly as possible. They were both large, powerful, athletic men, and in the vigor of manhood. From their position when found, it was evident they had fought desperately, having spent their ammunition and bent and broken their guns to pieces in a hand to hand conflict. When found, both were dead, Duncan probably having fallen early in the fight, and the son pierced all over with arrows, lying where he had fallen, with six or seven dead Indians around him. Duncan was scalped, but the son's head was skinned, as was their practice on killing a "brave."

## OTHER BAKER FAMILIES.

In our researches we have found that the *Bakers* are not *all related*, as many have supposed. If there were "three brothers" of the original settlers as tradition hath it, we are unable to select. We take from "Savage's Genealogical Dictionary" the most prominent names of those *Bakers* who appear to have emigrated hither early. 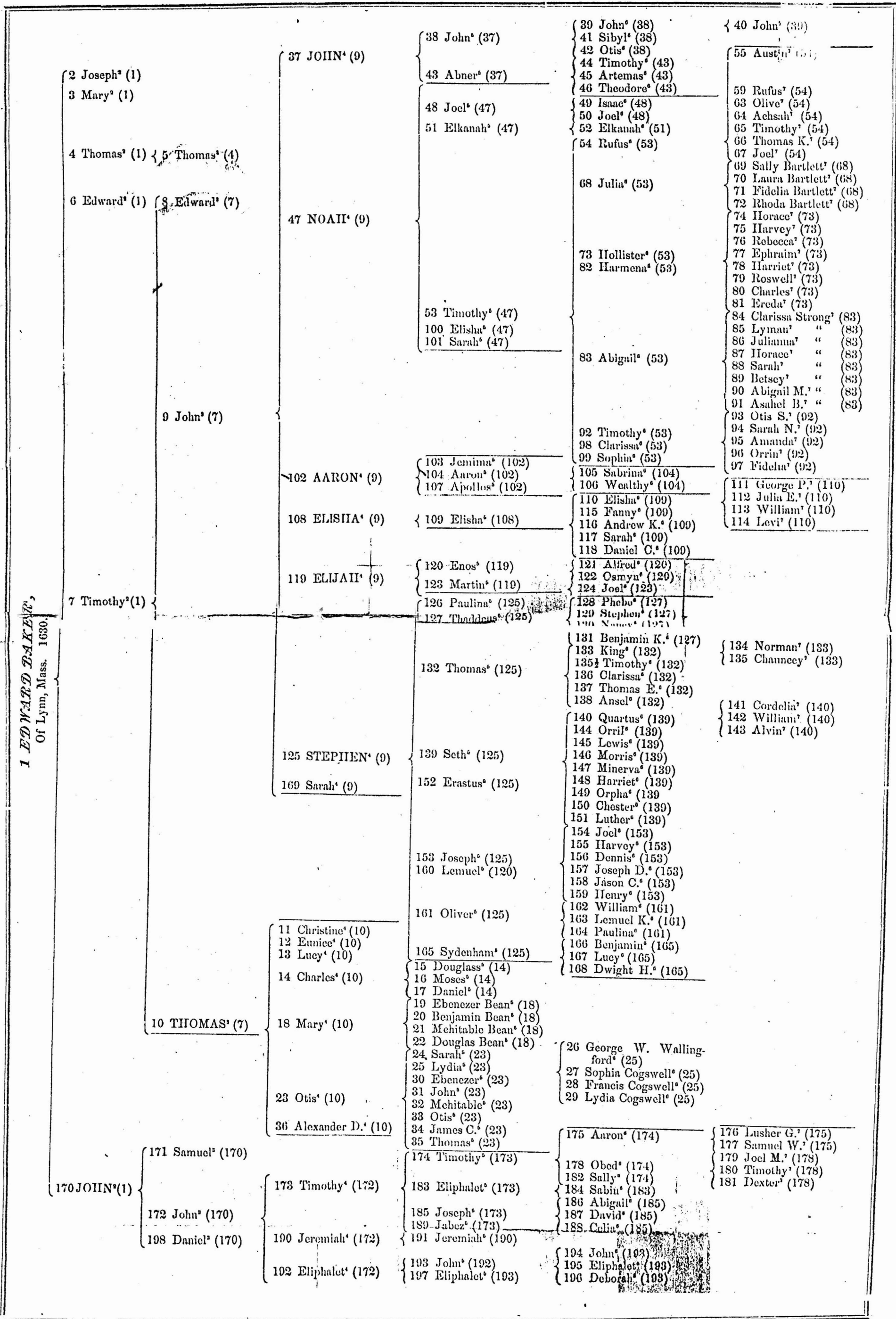
