# INTRODUCTION

In response to a desire to learn more about this branch of the Brewer family, researches were begun in 1894, and, gradually collecting material as leisure afforded, quite a quantity of manuscript was collected. The aim has been to make as correct a genealogy as possible, as far as has been attempted, but not to assume that all the Brewers are represented, for several are not mentioned, because they did not seem to be in this line. For instance, in Essex Co., England, was found a John Brewer, citizen and grocer of London. who died 4 Sept., 1631, will proved 13 May, 1636. He was the son of Thomas. His wife was Mary Butler, their children John, Roger and Margaret. He wills a large quantity of land in Virginia to his wife and children. This may possibly be the much-soughtfor ancestor of our first John, who has not as yet been certainly found. The time, etc., would make it likely, but not sure. The name of Brewer comes from the same origin as Brewster, and is sometimes in the same document spelled differently, often Bruer, and found in Essex and Suffolk Counties in England.

In this country the family seem to be in Worcester, Weston, Watertown, Cambridge, Sudbury and vicinity, later in Maine, Sudbury was settled in 1639; was colonized as Marlborough. Incorporated as Sudbury in 1660.

Worcester was laid out "eight miles square." In 1778 the General Court committee for Worcester "thought possibly, with proper industry and effort, Worcester offered support for sixty families." The census for 1900 gives the population as 118,421 on less than half of the "eight miles square."

The writer would here express her gratitude to those who, in any way, have enabled her to make this work more reliable and helpful. She is especially grateful to Mrs. S. # BREWER GENEALOGY

The earliest ancestor of this branch of the Brewer family seems to be Corporal John<sup>1</sup> Brewer, who married Anne of Cambridge. Where he came from originally has not been learned. We find him in Sudbury, Massachusetts, early, for on the Sudbury records the birth of the oldest child John<sup>2</sup> is recorded as born 10 Oct., 1642. There are four other children, but as they have no further interest for us we do not trace their history.

This John (1) seems to have been an early and influential resident, active in military service, intrusted with the care of wills and other legal documents, etc. He appears at the General Court 11 Oct., 1676, as a petitioner in behalf of himself and other residents of Sudbury for redress on account of losses sustained by Indians on 21 April, 1676. He received  $\pounds 200$  as his share.

# SECOND GENERATION

2. John<sup>2</sup>, son of John (1) and Anne, was born in Sudbury 10 Oct., 1642, died I Jan., 1690, married Elizabeth, daughter of Henry<sup>2</sup> Rice, eldest son of Deacon Edmund<sup>1</sup> Rice, who was one of the earliest proprietors of Marlboro, and owned land in the eastern part of Sudbury; probably settled there about 1691. The son Henry married in Sudbury I Nov., 1643, Elizabeth Moore, daughter of John Moore and Elizabeth (Whale) Moore of Sudbury. The Brewer family seem to have been interested in churches, for Corporal John Brewer is mentioned as making propositions for a new church in Sudbury, 10 Jan., 1688, and they were accepted.

The Middlesex Probate Record (No. 1624) grants the adminstration of the estate of John<sup>2</sup> to his widow Elizabeth Brewer, I Jan., 1690, and the estate is divided 27 Mar., 1693.

#### THIRD GENERATION

- Lieut. John<sup>3</sup>, son of John (2) and Elizabeth, born in Sudbury 29 Sept., 1669, married first Hannah Jones. Have no list of children if there were any.
- 3. John<sup>3</sup> married 5 July, 1693, Mary (said to be a sister of first wife Hannah), daughter of Josiah Jones of Weston and Suffrana Haynes, daughter of Walter and Elizabeth Haynes of Sudbury. This John<sup>3</sup> is called Lieut. Brewer; he must have received his title during the Indian Wars. Lieut. Brewer, 5 Feb., 1699, bought a farm in Weston or Watertown Farms, sometimes called Farmer's Precinct and sometimes Lieut

Jones' Co. Precinct. Weston was incorporated 4 Jan., 1737. He died 5 May, 1709, and is buried in the Farmer's Burying Ground, Watertown.

His widow, Mary (Jones) Brewer of Weston, was allowed to keep a public house 15 Dec., 1716. Received her license 9 July, 1717.

She administered her husband's estate, "Suretys Messrs. Josiah and Jeames Jones, 'ye widow brothers.'" On 21 April, 1719, part of the estate is granted to John Brewer, the eldest son, to Josiah, second son, and to Daniel Brewer, the third son; two brothers-in-law are also mentioned. See Middlesex Co. Probate Records, No. 1625.

The inventory of the estate amounted to  $\pounds 598.5s$ . 8d., including farm, 216 acres of other lands, a sawmill and grist-mills. These mills were probably in what is now Waltham (then Watertown), and were for seventy, if not one hundred years, all there were in this vicinity.

In Middlesex Deeds, Vol. 38, page 140, is recorded 13 June, 1729, John Brewer, Hopkinton, husbandman, and Josiah Brewer of Weston, blacksmith, and William Brewer of Weston, blacksmith, Nathaniel Allen, husbandman, and Lydia, his wife, Joseph Merriam and Mary, his wife, and Submit Brewer, children by birth or marriage to John Brewer, late of Weston (or Watertown Farms), sell land in Concord to Daniel Brewer (probably a brother), "being part of the dower of widow Mary Brewer, deceased, relict of John Brewer."

In Smith's History of Newton, page 52, in 1697: "Voted, that Lieut. John<sup>3</sup> Brewer of Sudbury be employed as master-workman, on the second building

of the 1st Church, Newton [what is now 1st Cong'l Church, Newton Centre]; this building was completed in 1698. Voted,  $\pounds 200$  for carrying on the work, also for a vane to be provided for the turret of the house. Voted, That the vacant room on the north and east side be for pews for the women. Voted, That seats for the boys be made in the northeast corner of the house." In 1796, "Voted, To have a stove to warm the meeting-house, and that the Deacons could have liberty to sit out of the deacon's seat if they chose." The *first* building was erected in 1660 and was standing in 1717. Since then, four others have been built and the *sixth* is to be begun in 1903.

During the summer was stationed at Prospect Hill. He resigned 16 Nov., 1776.

Col. Brewer enlisted 19 Oct., 1778, for eight months. He was Colonel of Regiment of Worcester and Middlesex Counties. William Buckminster, Lieut.-Col., Nathaniel Cudworth was Major, "all of whom did excellent duty in battle." Lieut.-Col. Buckminster born 15 Dec., 1736, in Framingham, died 22 June, 1786. He was wounded at Bunker Hill, 17 June, 1775.

John (15) Brewer was a private in Capt. Aaron Haynes Co. under Col. Jonathan (11) Brewer and was at Bunker Hill and wounded.

the Old South Church, 17 May, 1762, and when it was completed he bought pew 52 therein. In June, 1770, he with his brother John (15) and sister Mary (14), wife of Dr. William Crawford, came to Maine, at what is now South Brewer.

In 1774 he with his brother John (15) and brother-in-law, Dr. Crawford of Fort Pownal (now Fort Point), began to build a saw-mill on Segeunkedunk stream. Dr. Crawford sold his one-fourth part of the mill to Col. Thomas Goldthwait, a native of Chelsea, Mass., but now of Fort Point, 12 Nov., 1774. A grist-mill was begun but not finished; Joseph Mansell, millwright from Scituate, Mass., was employed to build the mill.

After the Revolutionary War was over it was finished in 1783-4. Col. Josiah (13) was Colonel of Lincoln Co., Penobscot Regiment. His name is on the list of officers of the Massachusetts Militia, chosen by Legislature, 3 May, 1776, commissioned 20 July, 1776, also on pay-roll for services from date of entry to I July, 1779. All the families were driven from Brewer by fear of the British soldiers in 1780. He was truck-master at Fort Halifax on the Kennebec River, in what is now the town of Winslow, Me. He was allowed  $\pounds$  500 worth of merchandise or stock. These truck-houses were places "where articles, principally necessaries, with a few gewgaws" were to the amount of  $\pounds$ 1,000 to  $\pounds$ 1,500 purchased in Boston every year, at 13. III. wholesale prices, and sold at only enough advance to cover cost, allowing ten per cent for waste. The masters were usually chosen by the General Court, special regard being had in regard to men of "greatest probity, patience and discretion; whose characters and manners were likewise acceptable to the natives. The situation was in a few years so desirable, that it was sought by men of distinguished reputation and influence." He returned after peace was declared in 1783, and was Justice of the Peace for Lincoln Co., Brewer then being in that county. Col. Brewer lived on the point near the mouth of the Segeunkedunk stream. He was the first Colonel of any Massachusetts troops, east of the Kennebec River. He certainly had command of the Penobscot soldiers during the Revolutionary War. He and his wife both lived to be seventy-five years of age. She seems to have died in what is now Orrington. "They were buried in the old Orrington burying-ground, near the first meeting-house, but when that ground was abandoned and a new one set apart some kindly hands removed their remains to the new ground. There are two small slate grave-stones, near the fence overlooking the Penobscot River, in a most inconspicuous place for one of the founders of the town, and probably one of the most noted in the town." The will of Mrs. Brewer was made 9 May, 1816, and proved 15 Aug., 1816.

Rev. Enoch Mudge was executor and was given one-third of the estate. She gave to John (15) Brewer's (his brother's) children "each a decent pocket Bible; to her niece, Abigail Prentiss, heir, she was the widow of Dr. Nathaniel Prentiss of Roxbury, Mass., and to the heirs of Eliza Giblen (widow of Samuel Giblen of Marlboro, Mass.)." Col. John (15) and his son Josiah (13) were appraisers of the estate.

- 14. VI. Mary<sup>5</sup>, dau. of Josiah (7), born 17 Nov., 1736, married Dr. William Crawford of Fort Pownal, now Fort Point. Maine. He was the son of Dr. Robert and Mary Crawford, was born in Worcester, Mass., 1730, graduated from Princeton 10 Oct., 1755, received degree (A. M.) from Harvard 1761. Dr. Robert was the first physician of Worcester. Dr. William served as chaplain in Abijah Willard's Regiment and as surgeon in Gen. Ruggles' Regiment. She died at Castine, Me., 21 Feb., 1836. From an obituary notice in the papers is this, "died at Castine, Mrs. Mary<sup>5</sup> (Brewer) Crawford, at the age of one hundred years and five months, relict of Dr. William Crawford who was surgeon and chaplain in army of Gen. Wolfe and was attached to his staff at the time of his (Gen. Wolfe's) death at Quebec."

They came to Maine in June, with his brother Josiah<sup>5</sup>, and sister Mary<sup>5</sup>, wife of Dr. William Crawford. They began to build mills in Brewer Village (now South Brewer) in that "Col. Brewer was a decided patriot vear. and suffered much during the Revolutionary He was in some ways one of Brewer's War. most distinguished ancient citizens." He was very active in the war. He several times visited the British commander, Gen. McLean, at Castine in 1779 in the interests of the inhabitants, and obtained assurances "that if the inhabitants would mind their business and be peaceable they should not be disturbed in their persons or property." Gen. McLean was a man of noble character, but Capt. Mowatt, who followed him, was a different man. He proceeded up the river and threatened Capt. John<sup>5</sup> Brewer " to run him through with his sword because he carried away in the cartel Capt. Ross, who was in command of one of our armed vessels." Dr. Downing, a surgeon of the fleet, dressed the wounds of several men at Capt. Brewer's residence.

When they were required to take the oath of allegiance they rebelled, and thereafter were so harassed and worried that they could not live there. The British tore down one of the Brewer houses. The situation became unbearable, so much so that Capt. Brewer sent his family and small effects by Major George

Ulmer to Camden. He got his cattle across the river and joined stock with John Crosby and others and drove them to Camden. Then he took the family to Worcester, where they remained until after peace was declared. They returned in 1783.

It is said "that at the time of the Penobscot Expedition that Capt. Brewer went into the fort at Castine and examined it, and then gave those on board the fleet all the information they could desire, 28 July, 1779, but they would not accept the story and were defeated."

His military record is this: He was private in Capt. Aaron Haynes' Company, in Col. Jonathan<sup>4</sup> Brewer's Regiment, enlisted 15 May, 1775, muster-roll dated I Aug., 1775. As Capt. Haynes' Company came to Concord from Sudbury 19 April, 1775, and followed the British to Charlestown, he would be at Concord and Bunker Hill. His name is in the company return rolls dated 6 Oct., 1775, at Prospect Hill.

He was captain of Militia Company No. I on Upper Penobscot, in Col. Josiah<sup>5</sup> Brewer's Regiment, 20 July, 1776.

Later made Colonel Fifth Regiment of Massachusetts Militia, resigned in 1797. In Oct. 19, 1778, the town of Sudbury appointed men to make a complete list of the muster-rolls of the services of each person in the war with Great Britain. John<sup>5</sup> Brewer's name is on the list. His share was  $\pounds 40$ .

As a specimen of the ancient regimental orders of this time is the following:

#### REGIMENTAL ORDERS.

Adjutant Levi Bradley :

Sir: — You are hereby required to give orders to the commanding officers of the First, Second and Fourth Companies of Militia in my regiment to call these companies together on Tuesday, the 6th day of October next, to be on the Parade, precisely at ten of the clock in the forenoon with good firearms and powder, as the law directs.

The place appointed for parade is on Col. Josiah Brewer's point of land, near my house.

You are likewise requested to notify Col. Shute, Maj. Robert Treat and Quartermaster Treat to meet at time and place aforesaid also. A general invitation to all the officers' wives of the regiment, together with the officers of the Third and Fifth Companies, to meet if they see fit for information and recreation.

In obedience to this you will oblige your humble servant,

JOHN BREWER,

Colonel of the Fifth Regiment of Militia. Orrington, Sept. 5, 1789.

> "The Militia has always been considered by our wisest men to be the best defense of a Republic." "For it uniformly embraced all able-bodied men between 18 and 45 years." "Originally, when fire-arms were scarce and expensive, only about one-third were permitted to arm themselves 'with a good pike, wellheaded corslet, head-piece and sword,' and youth between 10 and 16 were requested by Legislature in 1645, to exercise with small guns, half-pikes, bows and arrows on training days."

These days before the Provincial Charter were six, after that, four days.

Col. Brewer<sup>5</sup> was appointed postmaster 11 Oct., 1800, and held the office until his death, nearly twenty-five years later. The desk he had in the office was used by his successor, Capt. Daniel Shedd, for many years.

During the family's absence from Maine certain parties had bought of Massachusetts the whole of what was ancient Orrington, now Orrington, Brewer and Holden. The settlers knew nothing of the sale by which they were sold out.

They deputed Col. John<sup>5</sup> Brewer and Simeon Fowler, Esq., to go before the General Court and protest, and they did the business so well that the grantees surrendered their deed and allowed the court to convey to Brewer and Fowler 10,864 acres in 1784 for £3,000 in joint notes.

Orrington, the fifty-third town in the state, was named for Orangetown, Maryland, but by a mistake in spelling in the act of incorporation, it became Orrington 21 March, 1788.

Brewer was the one hundred and ninetyfirst town in Maine, and the name was in compliment to Col. John<sup>5</sup> Brewer, one of the first settlers from Worcester, at first called New Worcester or Plantation No. 9, later Orrington, until set off as a separate town 22 March, 1812. In 1816 there were 86 dwelling-houses. It is now under city government.

The first church was founded 9 Sept.,

1800. Six men and six women met with a deacon in a dwelling-house, and made preliminary plans for a church. Although religious privileges were enjoyed previous to 1786, the church was not built until 1800. Rev. Daniel Little doing some missionary work, he was ordained 10 Sept., 1786, and it was voted to build a church, but it was not built. When it was built "naturally the men who were able to advance money for land were the ones who would found churches and furnish the money to pay for them. Those were the days of Col. John<sup>5</sup> Brewer, Col. Eddy and others."

Rev. James Boyd commenced preaching in 1800, and a church was organized and first known as the Orrington Church. He was ordained 9 Sept., 1800.

"What Plymouth Church was to New England this church was to the Penobscot valley." The members were scattered, living in what is now Brewer, Eddington, Holden and Orrington. In 1800 there were nine houses in the vicinity.

Her builders at once set a crew of carpenters to finish it off as quickly as possible, and she took 132 men to the gold fields, the first of the "forty-niners." Among the carpenters was John F. Chambers, who also furnished them with twenty-four live ducks for the captain's table (Capt. Joseph Nickerson). Probably Daniel Brewer, his brother-in-law, was also one of the carpenters.
