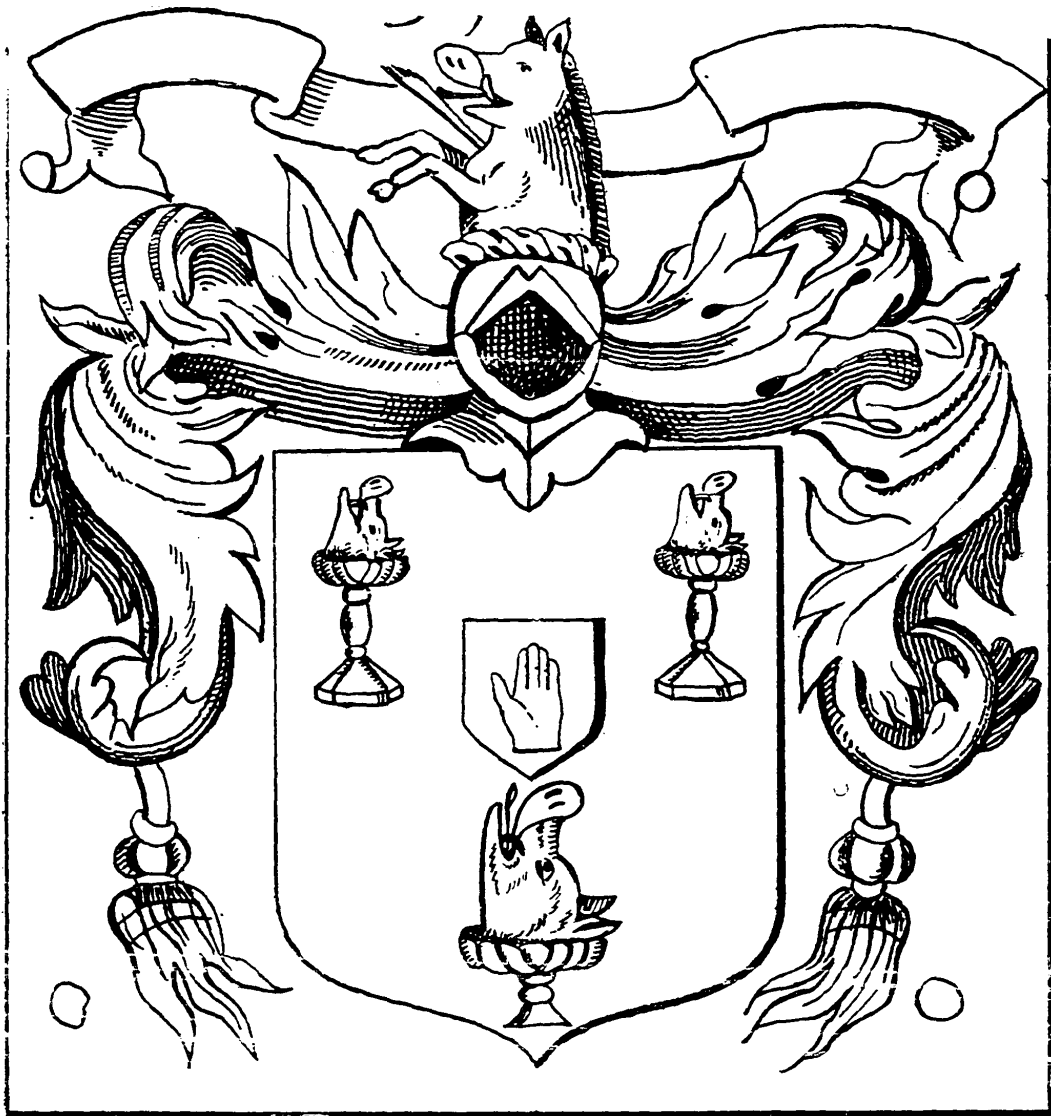

of Bowles Family.

In 1609 the London Company sent 500 men to the Colony of Virginia.

In May 1610 John Bowles arrived with Lord Delaware. He returned to England in ship "George" in 1612 and came out again in 1621, with Sir Francis Wyatt, who arrived in Jamestown with 1200 planters. He settled at Warwick Cove, removing to Elizabeth City county prior to 1641. He was granted many acres of land as shown by his will probated July 1, 1664, leaving to his son, John, of Elizabeth City county, planter, plantations, houses, slaves and ship "Amelia".

Sir George Bowles, the Lord Mayor of London, was among the members of the Virginia Company in 1620.

In 1678 there was a Philip Bowles in Warwick County.

In 1701 there was a Revered Doctor Charles Bowles in James City.

About 1719 a John Bowles moved to New Kent Co., copy of the original patent is in Virginia Land Office. He had grandsons: (1) Benj., (2) David, (3) Thomas, (4) John, and (5) William, and a granddaughter, Eliza Bettie, who married Capt. Wilton Caulfield.

(1) - In 1745, Benj. and wife, Nancy, moved from New Kent to Hanover County. Among the sons of Benj. were: (a) David, wife Winnie, who owned much land. (b) Zachariah, who was soldier in Continental Army enlisting in Col. Sheppard's Riflemen with Sgt. Thomas Philip Bowles, and then into Col. Charles Harrison's Regt. of Artillery, from which he was honorably discharged Jan. 10, 1780. He died Feb. 1, 1829. Stephen L. Bowles, Adm. Zachariah engaged in farming on Chickahominy River in Hanover County, but sold his farm to Thomas Bowles in 1784. His wife, Eliza, was from King William County. They had children: John, born in Hanover County, Matthew Bowles and Joshua Bowles born in Albermale County 1800. (c) Benjamin, great-grandson of John Bowles and son of Benj. and Nancy, married Miss Harris. He was a Baptist preacher. Was wealthy, owning land in Hanover, Henrico and Goochland counties. His will is dated Sept. 29, 1812; proved Oct. 2, 1815 and names children:

(2) - David married Ann Patterson and had sons: Nathan, Peter and daughter, Selia, who married Joel Hardenburg, and Mollie, who married Walter Guney.

(3) - Thomas married Sarah by whom he had Thomas and Jesse and one daughter, name unknown. Thomas, Sr. disappeared in the woods.

(4) - John married a Welch lady named Sarah Knight, according to one tradition. He left children among them being John who served as private in Rev. War from Goochland County, Va. He was born June 8, 1743, died Aug. 5, 1836. Married Elizabeth Curd Dec. 2, 1764. They had children:
 Benjamin b. Oct. 5, 1765, m. Frances Strange of Fluvanna County.
 Mollie m. Thomas Bowles moving to Ky. where both died soon after. Mollie b. Dec. 13, 1767.
 Sarah Waddie b. Feb. 7, 1769, m. Mr. Glenn of S.C.
 Nancy b. Oct. 18, 1771.
 Betsy Price b. Dec. 20, 1774, m. Mr. Glenn of S.C.
 John b. Feb. 13, 1776.
 Charles Knight b. June 5, 1787; d Feb. 10, 1860.
 Married Lucy Price Jackson of Louisa Co. Va. Nov. 15, 1807. She died Mar. 6, 1855. They had 13 children.

(5) - William, grandson of John, died unmarried.

It is believed that Knight Bowles b. Hanover County, Va. May 8, 1744; d Feb. 14, 1820, was brother of John V. He served in Rev. War. Married (1st) Feb. 19, 1767 to Sarah Curd. Children by Sarah Curd:
 Molly b. Dec. 13, 1767.
 Nancy b. May 7, 1770.
 Anderson b. about 1774 - Chief Justice & High Sheriff Hanover Co. Va. 1820-32.
 John b. Feb. 17, 1776; d. 1816.
 In 1841 - 349 acres land in St. Martin's Parish, Hanover Co., were transferred from Anderson Bowles to Nancy T. Bowles for life. In 1848 she received from John Richardson Estate 431-1/2 acres adjoining N. T. Bowles Estate for life. In 1849 both tracts were transferred to Anderson Bowles Estate.
 John married Aug. 21, 1810 Susan DuVal Ellis and had two sons:
 (a) Richard Key Bowles b. Nov. 10, 1811 died unmarried Feb. 1885.
 (b) Augustus Knight Bowles b. June 29, 1814; d. Mar. 10, 1883. Married Elizabeth Blayden Anderson April 18, 1843. 11 children.
 Knight Bowles m. (2nd) Miss Wood and had Judge Drury Wood Knight Bowles who m. Elizabeth Richardson. They lived in Bowlesville, Fluvanna Co., Va., and had a number of children.
 According to Mary Bowles of Richmond, Va., Anderson Bowles m. Eliza Perkins, dau. Abraham Perkins and Betty Williams. They had 9 children: Richard Curd

Bowles m. (1st) Kate Turner; (2nd) Mary Higgason. Jesse Turpin Bowles m. (1st) Catherine Bowles (2nd) Frances Williams. Eliza Bowles m. Richard Perkins. Lucy Bowles m. Oly Brown. Susan Ellis Bowles m. Charles Ellett. Nancy Knight Bowles m. a Griffin. Sallie Bowles m. a Radford. A. P. Bowles m. Betsy B. Richardson and Mary Bowles m. Tom Perkins, being his second wife.

Thomas, grandson of Thomas and Sarah, and great-great-grandson John 3, had children: William believed to have married Samantha Tyler of Charles City Co. Va. He served in French and Indian Wars, Military Certificate 783.

Charles, 2nd son Thomas and wife, was soldier in French and Indian Wars and received land grant.

Henry, 3rd son Thomas received Land Grant 1111.

Thomas Philip Bowles (called Philip) died about 1800. Married in New Kent Co. in 1769 to Sarah Bacon, daughter Langston Bacon. Lived on Hanover side of Chickahominy River. Believe he served first as Sgt. in Rev. War, later being promoted to Lt. and leaving the regiment Nov. 1, 1780; serving 2 yrs. 10 mo. Served in Col. Shepherd's Riflemen. Is called Thomas in his own and also his father's will. His father's will filed in Henrico Co. names only "sons Thomas and Jesse and daughters Sarah, Roselenda & Christianna Winn". Executors John Winn, Jr. and Thomas Bowles. Will dated Nov. 19, 1783, proved Jan. 5, 1784. Sarah Bacon went to Missouri with her son, John, and died in 1833. Their children were: (1) William b. 1772, m. Valencia Branch of Hanover Co. on May 24, 1802. Died in Covington, Tenn. 1826. 11 children. (2) Thomas 4th son Thomas Philip and Sarah, b. Dec. 29, 1773 according to Douglas Register - Mrs. Kelley of Richmond, Va. says Nov. 2, 1781. He married (1st) on Sept. 21, 1803 Rebecca Williamson, dau. of John Williamson of Henrico Co. who died 1821; m. (2nd) Sallie Rawlings Jan. 25, 1825, dau. Col. Rawlings of Spottsylvania Co. Va. In 1839 moved to Mo. with wife and all children by last marriage. Both died there few years later. His son, Lyddall, had settled in Mo. in 1835 returned to Va. and accompanied his father out in 1839. (3) John, a Baptist minister, married Elizabeth Longan in Henrico Co. Va. Feb. 10, 1812 owning farm on Chickahominy River which sold in 1816 to his cousin, Thomas, son of Benj. Bowles. John moved to Missouri about 1821, taking his mother with him. He first settled near Glasgow, Mo. and later moved to Dade County, Mo. Children were: Philip Weber Bowles m. Margaret Jane Wilson. Both died about 1870 leaving a family. (W.H.Jenner, St. Louis, line). John m. Susan Stockstall (sister of wives Edwin and Thomas Bowles). Moved to Texas about 1882 where both died. Had 4 boys and 3 girls. Edwin Bowles m. Catherine Stockstall, sister Susan and Huldah. Both died 1900. 2 sons. Benjamin Bowles m. Marietta Priddy of Henrico Co. Va. about 1839. Benjamin came to Mo. with John Price Williamson Bowles who m. Louisa Priddy in 1835, settling Dade Co., Mo. Thomas Bowles m. Huldah Stockstall - 9 children.

The children of Thomas Bowles and Rebecca Williamson were: John Price Williamson Bowles b. Apr. 24, 1814, m. 1835 to Louisa Priddy of Henrico Co. Va. In 1839 moved to Mo. After Louisa's death J.P.W. Bowles m. Melvina Carter in 1859 dau. Capt. Carter of Richmond, Va. Lived in Dade Co. Mo. Children of P.W. Bowles by Louisa Priddy were:

Lyddall Bacon Bowles, son Thomas Philip Bowles and Sarah Bacon, b. April 15, 1783 Hanover side Chickahominy River. Married (1st) Dec. 14, 1805 Elizabeth Burton Smith, b. Jan. 4, 1783; d. Feb. 19, 1821, dau. Capt. Obideak Smith of Henrico Co. Va. and Betsy Burton. Children by Elizabeth were:

Lyddall Bacon Bowles m. (2nd) March 17, 1824 Sally Waller Price b. Mar. 18, 1796; d. July 9, 1835, granddaughter Rev. Wm. E. Waller. They had 4 children:

Martin Smith Bowles, son Lyddall Bacon Bowles and Elizabeth Smith, married Lucy Glazebrook Cross of Hanover Co. Va. in 1832. They are the grandparents of Mrs. Effie Bowles Kelley of Richmond, Va. who helped Mr. Farquah compile "History of Bowles Family" in which a full description of Bowles family will be found.



The Bowles name is of both Saxon and Norman origin, and dates back to 449 A.D. altho not plainly until 400 years thereafter. The name is found on ancient records in various forms: Bolla, Bello, Boel, Bowle, Bowls, Boles, Bolles and Bowles. Families bearing this name were found at early dates in English countries of Lincoln, Kent, Nottingham, Hereford, Berks, Wilts, Middlesex, Suffolk, Warwick, Leicester, Northampton, Stafford, Oxford and London, and were of landed gentry and nobility of Great Britian.

Arms - "Azure, three standing bowls argent, out of each a boar's head or". (Taken from Burke's "General Armory" 1884).

Crest - "A demi boar, azure, armed, hoofed, and bristled or, pierced through the chest with an arrow gold, headed argent".

THOMAS BOWLES of Hanover Co., Va.

Bowles-Holman
1761-1839 1762

Thomas Bowles, (believed to be son of Deborah), of Hanover County, Virginia, born February 9, 1761, died December 7, 1839 at Bowles farm on Chickahominy River in Hanover County, Va. and is buried there by side of wife, the burial plot being within few yards of house. This farm now owned by a Mr. Cauthorn, being sold after death of Sue Bowles, a great-granddaughter, who died June 1942.

Thomas Bowles married Sarah Holman who was born Jan. 6, 1762. He gave age as 72 when applying for pension August 6, 1832. Thomas enlisted August 8, 1777, served as Sergeant in Captain Gideon Johnson's and Mob-eel's Companies, Colonel Thomas Marshall's Virginia Regiment - was engaged in battle at Hampton and was discharged August 12, 1780. Pension Certificate No. 6811 issued March 6, 1833. Parents, place of birth and family not mentioned, but gave residence as Hanover Co., Va., when he enlisted and he lived there when applying for pension. Pension Certificate states "pensioner left no widow, but the following children: Nathaniel V. Bowles, Peter A. Bowles, Thomas T. Bowles, Joseph Bowles, Elizabeth P. Bowles, Ann W. Bowles, and Sarah H. Toler, wife of Elijah R. Toler". Letter from 3rd Auditor's Office dated 10th June 1841 to Jos. F. Bowles, Goodalls, Hanover Co., Va., remitted \$31.23 arrears of pension for benefit of children of deceased.

For services in Revolutionary War, Thomas Bowles was issued Bounty Warrant No. 2546 as follows: "Council Chamber 19th Feby 1784 - I do Certify that Thomas Bowles is entitled to the proportion of Land allowed a Serjeant of the State Line who served 3 years". Signed by Thomas Meriweather and Benjamin Harrison. A warrant for 200 acres issued to Thomas Bowles. It is believed this warrant was never used, as in 1858 Joseph I. Bowles of Marion County, Mo., wrote his cousin, Joseph Farrar Bowles (son of above Thomas Bowles) trying to find out regarding Land Warrant of his uncle.

There were three Thomas Bowles in Hanover County, Va., in 1782 paying land taxes. It is not known how they were related, if they were. The above Thomas Bowles was related to Webbers possibly thru the Holmans as there is a letter dated 1847 from Mary Holman Webber of Tenn., mentioning an Uncle Joseph Holman and John H. of Virginia. She had a brother, John W. Webber of Mt. Pleasant, Tenn., a sister, Betsy who lived close, having at least two

children, Elizabeth who had 7 children and Benjamin who had 4 children. Thomas Bowles also had a niece, Sarah J. Head, wife E. Head, who moved from Virginia to Yazoo County, Mississippi. Sarah J. and E. Head were married in Hanover Co. Va. 29th November 1830. E. Head died prior 1841.

Nephews of Thomas Bowles in Marion County, Missouri were Augustus Bowles, died March 1889, buried Emerson, Mo., Joseph I. Bowles and Quincy Bowles. They were born in Kentucky, children of Isaac and Mary Bowles who were born in Virginia. 1850 Census shows Isaac b. 1785, Mary 1787, Augustus 1819, Joseph 1827, and Quincy 1830. The family burial plot is on a farm south of Emerson, Mo., and the old stones show Isaac Bowles died July 1, 1852, 65 years; Mary Bowles died August 10, 1871, age 87; Susan Bowles Henderson died May 4, 1872, age 50; and Jociephine Bowles Lafon, died 1851, age 20.

Certified copy of Thomas Bowles will (possession of Inez Bowles) as follows:

"I, Thomas Bowles, of the County of Hanover, being of sound mind, do ordain this my last Will and Testament.

1st- I give unto my two Daughters, Ann Winn Bowles and Elizabeth Pledger Bowles one-half of my household and kitchen furniture and one-half of my stock of every kind.

2nd- I give unto my son, Joseph Farrar Bowles, the remaining one-half of my household and kitchen furniture and the remaining half of my stock of every kind to him and his heirs forever.

3rd- I give unto my two Daughters, Ann Winn Bowles and Elizabeth Pledger Bowles and my son, Joseph Farrar Bowles, my tract of Land on which I now live in the County of Hanover, during the natural lives of my two Daughters, Ann Winn Bowles and Elizabeth Pledger Bowles and at the Death of my two Daughters, Ann Winn Bowles and Elizabeth Pledger Bowles, I give the whole of the said tract of Land to my son, Joseph Farrar Bowles, and his heirs forever.

4th- My wish and desire is that my Daughters, Ann Winn Bowles and Elizabeth Pledger Bowles and my son, Joseph Farrar Bowles, remain together on the said Tract of Land and keep my stock of every kind and household and kitchen furniture together for their common support, But if my Daughters, Ann Winn Bowles and Elizabeth Pledger Bowles and my son, Joseph Farrar Bowles shall think proper to separate, I give the Land in the forks of the Creeks on which my house is situated to my said Daughters, Ann Winn Bowles and Elizabeth Pledger Bowles and half of my household and kitchen furniture and half of my stock, every kind, and to my son, Joseph Farrar Bowles, the remaining part of my tract of Land on the east of the swamp, and the remaining half of my house-

hold and kitchen furniture and the remaining half of my stock of every kind and at the death of my said Daughters, Ann Winn Bowles and Elizabeth Pledger Bowles, the whole of my said Tract of Land is to go to my son, Joseph Farrar Bowles, and his heirs forever. If my Daughters, Ann Winn Bowles and Elizabeth Pledger Bowles should survive my son, Joseph Farrar Bowles, they are at liberty to dispose of the half of my household and kitchen furniture and the half of my stock of every kind as they may think proper but if my son, Joseph Farrar Bowles should survive my Daughters, Ann Winn Bowles and Elizabeth Pledger Bowles, then the whole of my household and kitchen furniture and all of my stock of every kind are to go to my son, Joseph Farrar Bowles and his heirs forever.

If my Daughters, Ann Winn Bowles and Elizabeth Pledger Bowles and my son, Joseph Farrar Bowles, should agree to sell the said Tract of Land on which I live, then one half of the money arising from such sale is to be given to my said Daughters, Ann Winn Bowles and Elizabeth Pledger Bowles to buy them a home and the other half to my son, Joseph Farrar Bowles and his heirs forever. Whatever money I may have at my death and all that may be due me I want appropriated to hire a hand to work in the Crop for the common support of my Daughters, Ann Winn Bowles and Elizabeth Pledger Bowles and my son, Joseph Farrar Bowles and to no other purpose.

I give unto my Daughters Sally H. Toler and to my sons Nathaniel V. Bowles, Peter T. Bowles, & Thomas T. Bowles each one dollar.

Lastly, I appoint my son, Joseph Farrar Bowles and my friend, John L. Bowles, Executors of this my Last Will and Testament.

Given under my hand the 3rd of October 1833.

At a Court of Monthly Session held for Hanover Court, at the Courthouse on Tuesday the 27th of January, 1840 This Last Will and Testament of Thomas Bowles, dec'd. was proved by the Oaths of Jesse Puryear and Charles T. Toler, the Witnesses thereto and is ordered to be Recorded.

Bowles-Puryear

Nathaniel V. Bowles, second son Thomas Bowles and Sarah Holman, born July 8, 1784, and believed to have died after January 1851. Nathaniel married (1st) Miss Jane Puryor or Puryear, 30th child of Hezekiah Puryear of Goochland Co., Va. They moved to Kentucky and had 9 children: (1) Sarah Ann Bowles b. Nov. 7, 1812; d. April 17, 1827. (2) Amanda F. Bowles b. Sept. 27, 1815; d. May 7, 1839. (3) Oscar F. Bowles b. Oct. 2, 1817; d. Oct. 6, 1845. On Sept. 4, 1845 m. Ann Allen. He taught school and farmed near Warren, Ky. (4) Elizabeth Virginia Bowles b. Sept. 4, 1820, on Nov. 24, 1842 m. Robert Moore, living at Edmondson Co., Ky., and later moving to Cass County, Mo. Had at least 3 children: (a) Mary Jane, (b) Joseph and (c) Benjamin Moore. (5) America S. Bowles b. Oct. 27, 1822; on Oct. 12, 1843 m. Eli W. Owens, nephew of Col. Gardner of Virginia. They had 8 children: (a) Elizabeth Jane, (b) John, (c) Oscar, (d) Edwin, (e) Fanny, (f) Theo, (g) Amanda, (h) Nathaniel T. Owens b. 1863; d. 1943 - lived one mile from old Bowles farm; address Glasgow, Ky. (6) Mary Frances Bowles b. Sept. 21, 1825, d. Sept. 30, 1846. On Oct. 24, 1844 m. George Davenport, living at Bowling Green, Ky. One daughter born Sept. 23, 1846. (7) Joseph P. Bowles b. Oct. 8, 1827 m. Evalyn Jones. (8) Christopher Columbus Bowles b. Apr. 27, 1829 m. Carilla Morrell. (9) Selina Jane Bowles b. Dec. 6, 1831 m. Joseph Huffman and had at least one son, Christopher Huffman who was Clerk Benton County Court, Arkansas number of years.

Elizabeth P. Bowles 3rd child Thomas Bowles and Sarah Holman, b. Sept. 4, 1786; d. Aug. 7, 1860 unmarried, at home of brother, Joseph Farrar Bowles, and is buried there in family lot short distance from house.

Ann Winn Bowles, 4th child Thomas Bowles and Sarah Holman, b. Jan. 5, 1788, hung herself in upstairs room one Monday morning over religion - date Aug. 12, 1864. She also lived at Bowles farm and is buried there.

Peter Tinsley Bowles, 5th child Thomas Bowles and Sarah Holman, b. March 27, 1791 Hanover Co. Va. To date very little has been learned of Peter Bowles. In old letter from Sarah Bowles Toler (sister) to her brother, Joseph, in Hanover County, Va. dated 1842 she mentions Peter as living not over 30 mi. from her, on a farm and having children and grandchildren. A grandson of Sarah Toler, (J.E.Toler) remembers hearing of an "Uncle Peter and Aunt Polly".

Henry H. Bowles, 6th child Thomas Bowles and Sarah Holman, b. Oct. 7, 1793 Hanover Co. Va. Only mention made that could apply to Henry was in letter written by Nat'l. Joseph Farrar Bowles

Joseph Farrar Bowles, ninth and youngest child of Thomas Bowles and Sarah Holman, born Hanover County, Va., June 3, 1802; died November 10, 1886. On October 11, 1827 m. Sarah Farrar Henley b. March 6, 1802; d. November 5, 1886. Both buried in family lot close to house on Thomas Bowles farm. The front part of the house was built prior to Civil War, John Bowles, a son being one of carpenters. There are still stains on wallpaper in front room caused by meat hid in attic during the Civil War. There is a fireplace in each of rooms with possible exception of kitchen. A center hall separates parlor from living room. Part of walls and fireplaces of old summer kitchen and slave quarters still stands. The slaves were given to Sarah by her father. The land slopes from house down to road and to Chickahominy River. It is told that during the War Joseph Bowles was able to save many of his fine horses by having slaves hide them in the swamps. It is believed Sarah Henley had at least two brothers - Robert and William, and two sisters, Nancy and Charlotte. In the 7th Census, page 379, West District, Hanover Co., Va. Joseph F. Bowles, farmer, is shown age 47, b. Virginia, wife, Sarah, 47, b. Virginia. In 9th Census, (Beaver Dame Depot) Joseph Bowles, farmer, is 68, wife, Sarah is 68, both b. Virginia. In Hanover Court House is copy of will of Joseph Farrar Bowles.

"I, Joseph F. Bowles, of the County of Hanover, and State of Virginia, being of sound and disposing mind and memory, do make this my last Will and Testament in letter and form as follows, towit:

1st - After my decease I desire that my executor, hereinafter named, shall sell such of my personal property as he may think best be spared and pay off all my just debts and funeral expenses.

2nd- I loan to my beloved wife, Sallie, after paying my just debts, etc., all of my estate, both personal and real, so long as she remains my widow and at her marriage or death, I give these same to my son, William E. Bowles, and my daughter, Harriet A. Bowles, upon the following conditions, viz:- so long as my daughter, Harriet A. Bowles remains single and chooses to remain with my son, Wm. E. Bowles, I desire that she shall have a home and support but if she marries she is to have a featherbed and furniture, and at my wife's death she is to have \$50. in money to be paid her by my son, Wm. E. Bowles. And I also desire after the death of my said wife, Sallie, that my son, Wm. E. Bowles, shall pay each of my married daughters, towit: Sarah E. Snead and Rebecca F. Minter \$50. each, or their heirs in case of their

death and to each of my sons, viz: John M. Bowles, Joseph H. Bowles, Peter T. Bowles and Eli Mc Bowles, I give \$1. each.

3rd - I desire that my son, Wm. E. Bowles, shall have two years to pay the legacies above named to his sisters without interest thereon. My desire being to provide a home and support for my daughter, Harriet A. Bowles, while single and to remunerate as far as I can my son, Wm. E. Bowles for the services he has rendered to me and his mother by remaining with us and assisting to render a comfortable old age and infirmity.

4th - I hereby nominate and appoint my son, Wm. E. Bowles, executor to my last Will and Testament and desire that he may be allowed to qualify without giving any security.

WITNESS my hand and seal this 28th day of March, 1870.

Joseph F. Bowles"

Signed and acknowledged as the last Will and Testament of Joseph F. Bowles in our presence and in the presence of each other this 28th day of March, 1870.

The Hanover Court House was built 1735, county being formed 1720, and is situated on a hill overlooking the valley of Machumps' Creek, - this creek being named for Indian by that name who rendered the Colonist many services. Within the walls of his historic building Patrick Henry -

"The forest-born Demosthenes

Whose thunder shook the Philip
of the Seas"

on December 1, 1763, made his great speech for the people in the "Parsons' Case". Near this spot April 12, 1777, Henry Clay, "the Mill Boy of the Slashes" was born.

In the old Tavern just across the road from the Court House, Lord Cornwallis had his Headquarters in May 1781. Here on May 27, 1862, was fought the Battle of Hanover Court House, between Gen. Porter's Corps of McClellan's Army and Confederate Forces under Gen. Branch.

Upon the velvet carpet of the Court Green arises the Confederate Monument inscribed: "Hanover-To her Confederate Soldiers and to her noble Women who loved them, 1861-1865", with the names of 1464 of her heroic men of the great War between the States.

Bowles, a cousin of his father, until his marriage on Dec. 20, 1860 to Artamecia C. Samuel, b. Jan. 28, 1844, d. home her daughter, Alma, s. Emerson, Mo. August 8, 1905. Artamecia was dau. Leroy Samuel and Sarah Moore (see Samuel history). John and Artamecia (Artie) lived on farms in both Marion and Lewis Counties, Mo. owning a part of old Samuel farm in Lewis County where John died. Dear Joseph:

This is to inform you that through mercy I am permitted once more to write you a few lines informing you we are all well. The Lord has been pleased to spare us all. We have all been sick last fall and I was most seriously sick. I was for some weeks I could not get out of bed. Sally she had almost Violent Influenza but she was hard to make believe it was anything but a little Cold.

My Lou Jackson was also very sick. He is now going to school in Tennessee.

Jenny is somewhat of a Banker. She has very considerable hard money which she has made by washing at a dollar a dozen, and raising fowls. Fowls are worth 50 cents a piece the year through and chickens from three to four and six Bits a piece and eggs from two to six Bits a dozen. This is a fine country from negros, they can all have plenty of money if they will just only behave themselves. They are proud and dressy. Negros are worth as much a month as they are a year in Virginia for instance such a Boy as Lac at \$15 dollars a month by the year and clothes and Lewis \$300 a year. Money has been abundant until a short time since it has all disappeared and gone and many of the most wealthy Planters must be ruined. There is on Spec-- in circulation at all. I hope that times are not so hard in Virginia. If I live I want to go out this summer and enter me some land. From the information I have I expect to see as good a Body of Land as the sun ever shined on. I should like to have some of you out here. It would be for your good. You are all wasting your time for no profit.

I hope this finds you and family well and your father and all enjoying all the Blessings this life can afford. Present our best love to Mr. Bowles, Susan and Lucy. We hope they are all well and doing well and if it shall be decreed by Providence that we never meet in this world again the Lord incline us all to be prepared to meet in another and better world.

Present our love to Mr. Tinsley, Mr. Mosby, Brother Barrett White and Sister Anny and family and say to Barrett I think often of him. Present our respects to the Miss Cottmans and all enquiring friends not forgetting Charley Childers and family and old Cousin

Jenny and may the Lord bless and prosper you all and all of us, I remain

Dear Joseph:

Your kind letter dated the 2nd March last was received yesterday. You are the only one that ever think it worth while to write to us, it gives us great pleasure to hear from you at all times - the death of our poor old mother we are truly sorry to hear. But according to the course of nature it was what we might reasonably expect, peace be to her memory while her body moulders in the dust - for - "Blessed are the dead that die in the Lord, they rest from their labor and their works do follow them" and I suppose our two sisters, if we may be permitted to use that expression, will not write to us anything about the death of their mother. It may be their attention is so engaged investigating ***** to prompt them how to act with due prudence and discretion. It is hard to die at the feet of Jesus. We are too prone to be engaged in arranging the things of this world and giving advice to those that little care for or thank us, and neglect to make spiritual preparation for another and better world from whence no traveler has ever returned. I have to ask the favor of you for such information and all that you can give me respecting the contemplated arrangement and final disposition of the estate, when and how they intend to dispose of it, and who has the control management and possession of the property, what new discoveries has been made in Mr. Bowles' will - whether them that can get possession of the property are not the lawful owners or whether it is right to divide it as willed or not. Of course all the wise men in the State have been consulted. I am sorry for Lucy's lop of the negroes (which was it) the measure we measure out to others we are to receive. Is Doctor Carver the Prime Minister yet? I hope you will be particular in giving me all the information you can - then we will conclude how our interest will be best attended to. I am truly sorry for John Nash, he ought to

have more regard for his character and the character of his family.

This leaves us all enjoying good health. We have all had general good health since the first summer (then I was truly sick). The negroes are all fat, well and healthy. Zachariah is prime minister at a livery stable in this place at a hire of \$25. dollars a month by the year. It is truly amusing to see the consequence in giving orders to the rest of the hands about the place. All my negroes are above wearing shoes in winter - nothing but boots. If I don't get them, they get them themselves. Ned I get \$25 dollars a month - Lewis I was getting \$40 dollars a month but I have taken him home to attend to horses and drive wagon. Simon a Carpenter I get \$50 dollars a month by the year. I let him hire his time. Jenny and Eliza I have for cooks. We are keeping boarding house. I get \$25 dollars a month without lodging. I own 4 good lots in Manchester 75 by 150 feet each with a good house and stable on two of them corner lots. The other two make us a good garden. We raise abundant of vegetables for our use and to spare. All vegetables sell high. Salad at least a dollar bushel. Peas are worth 4 Bits for half a bushel in the hules, chickens 4 Bits a piece - Eggs from 3 to 4 Bits a dozen - Butter fresh generally 4 Bits a pound. Figs large enough to roast whole 12 Bits or \$1.50 cents apiece. We raise plenty of poultry and hogs for the use of our private family and to spare.

My lots I bought them principally for cash and bought them low. I gave \$2750. for them with a good house on one with four rooms and two galleries and kitchen. My property is all paid for except \$600. which is due in one and two years, which I can pay now if I choose. The Lord has blessed us since I moved here with wealth that I had not when I came. My negroes have money here more abundant than I had in Virginia. Jenny gets a dollar dozen for all the washing she can do. There is a great quantity of first rate land yet in this State that can be got at Government price. A man near town can make a fortune by attending market. The land sells high near market. I should be glad if you were in this country well fixed with your family as I could enjoy your company. The people has learned wisdom at last - they now raise corn instead of buying it. Corn is worth 75 cents a bushel. I have laid in a plenty of good corn to last me.

I am happy to hear that you were all well and doing well and hope this finds you all and all relations and friends well. Give my best respect to your father and your sisters, to Brother White This, Mr. Franklin This, F. Griffin, Sr., to the Miss Cochrans, to Doct. Minter family say to the Doct we are doing as well as we have a right to expect - to Fleming Brown and family, to old Cosin Jane Apperson and to all our relations and enquiring friends, Salley is fat and healthy and joins me in also sending love to you all, and may the Lord bless you all and if we never meet again I hope we shall meet in another and better world. Salley desires to be remembered to her sisters and to all the negroes on the plantation.

Jenny, Lewis and Zachariah request to send their best love to you all and all the neighbors generally and to your father particular, to all the negroes belonging to the estate and say this is a good country in which to live. Jenny sends her love to her Miss Lucy and Susan and says her Miss Lucy must write her word whether Mana ever got over her spell of sickness and wishes her to write how all the neighbors are and who has died in the neighborhood since she left and let her know what has become of all of Mrs. Aylett's people.

Dear brother:

I take this opportunity of writing to you to inform you that myself and family are well and hope these few lines may find you and yours enjoying the same

blessing. Dear brother, I have nothing of importance to write you. I received your letter dated 20th of September last with a check on the bank of Paris in it, which I exchanged for the full amount with a man that lived near the place by the name of W. G. Clay that passed through this neighborhood last fall with a drove of hogs to the south. He returned back in January and gave me the amount in money which was 30 dollars and sixty-two cents, and said if the draft was not good he would write and let me know. You wished for me to give you a receipt for the check which I shall do in this letter.

Brother Nathaniel's family are well as far as I know at this time. His wife died last September after suffering many years, has left this world of sorrow and gone home and no doubt this day she is praising God in paradise.

Oscar L. has gone to Orleans with tobacco. I have nothing more to write. Give my love to your family and write to me when you get this.

I gladly make use of the present moments as they pass swiftly by to let you know that I have not forgotten you though I am in a distant land. I often think of you and were circumstances so arranged as to place me at your house I would think myself happily situated for I could converse with you until perhaps you would think my tongue moved by steam supplied by gas, but for the present my pen must suffice though limited as I am being a resident of Tennessee.

I will say that I am pleased with the soil and that a law has been passed for erection of a dock and navy yard at Memphis situated on the Mississippi, about 20 miles from us which will enhance the value of our property. I deem it expedient to say no more about the country as brother DuVal is going eastward thought I would drop a remark respecting his society. It is generally refined.

I have more associates than I have time to visit of either sex. I was at a celebration of American independence the 4th day of July last, where I saw perhaps 3000 persons and though 12 miles from home there were so many of my friends there that I failed to see many of them and like many other places where I go there were hundreds of the fair sex like so many jewels adorning the place, ever the essence of society though it may seem strange for me to speak of the ladies in such strains and yet meeting the toils of life single handed yet I am in hopes that the time will soon come when one for beauty and modesty like Sarah of old, together with wisdom and prudence combined, will give me her heart and hand at the marriage alter, but pardon my digression if you please.

We have a good deal of talent here although a good portion of it is used for party and political purposes. The politics of the day interest the old and young - a United States Bank, the tariff, and the annexation of Texas is the main subjects of discussion, together with the views of Mr. James K. Polk and Henry Clay, the nominees for the presidency.

But before I drop my pen I must say something about my Master's cause. As is customary I have reserved the best for last of all subjects. My heavenly Father and his Son stand preminent and of all subjects Christianity is first when I look through the looking glass of truth and view the goodness of God and ** love of his son, I am ready to say with the poet, "come life, come death, come what will, his foot-steps I will follow still", but after an attentive examination of the scripture and a close observation of mankind I see that there are persons whose conduct is lamentable, first I see a class that have the Bible in their house, and hear the gospel proclaimed yet refuse obedience to God, a second class who desire to be a Christian, but having been educated in error they know not the means of salvation and they are de-

prived of that peace which the saved of the Lord enjoy, a third class who professed obedience to the Lord and are in many things commendable but in many other things prefer to believe and practice as their teachers say, next a fourth class come to view men who profess to be called and sent of God to preach the gospel but who besides *** declare the whole*** of God recommended and teach many things contrary thereto leading poor deluded mortals into Egyptian darkness. Alas, alas, for the present age of the waste, superstition and prejudiced have caused a weighty edifice but I hope the time is not far distant when its pillars shall be shaken by a stronger arm than that of Sanson, even Jehovah, even now is the vast torrent of truth sweepings its foundation and ere long it will fall as with a boom of destruction and O that the soldiers of the Esop may girt themselves with the habiliments of war they not being casual but mighty through God to the pulling down of strong holds. May they be expert by practice so weld the spirits two edged as to lay the enemy of Christ in humble submission at his feet until the civilized world with the savage nations shall praise one vast anthem to his praise; for these things I pray, for these things I plead, and never let us practice or believe anything else however plausible it may seem. We have a ** saith the Lord for it and let us not be weary in well doing knowing that he that labour shall not labour in vain. I must come to close saying that I am well at present and have enjoyed good health since I left Virginia though I had an attack of the bilious fever last fall excepted. Give my love to all inquiring friends and accept the same yourself. Do write me, Cousin, and write me all the news in that country. Be sure and write and you will much oblige your affectionate Cousin and brother in the faith.

Dear Uncle;

I embrace the present opportunity of writing to you, a duty which I feel I have too long neglected, for as well as I remember it was in spring of '41 when last I wrote you by request of my Uncle who has gone to eternity. There has been many changes here since that time and I have experienced many sorrows, my kind and indulgent Mother Departed this life in August 1841, which was the severest affliction I have ever met with, But when we take into consideration her great afflictions and the bodily sufferings, she endured & when reflect on the bright evidence she left to her surviving friends that all was well we should rather rejoice that our loss was her gain & endeavor so to live that we may when called hence meet her in that blessed abode to part no more.

The present season has been very sickly and perhaps more cases of Fever have occurred than I have ever known & many too have terminated fatally, many cases, too of chills and ever in some families from six to twelve have been down at the same time though I think it is now pretty well over & the health of the people in generally restored, so that with the exception of the Measles which are in some families people are at this time generally well.

I shall now touch a little on the subject of Politics, there has been an unusual excitement in this State on account of the Presidential Election and both parties have made great exertions in favor of their respective Candidates, both parties have had Barbacues & other meetings and were addressed by their ablest Speakers, though the Whigs I think went too far in extolling Henry and trying to sing him into the chair at the White House and crying down Jimmy Polk as only a 33rd rate Lawyer, but it has given me pleasure to learn that Jimmy Polk & George M. Dallas are to be our next President & Vice-President. I am, therefore, satisfied that that noble instrument devised by the wisdom of our forefathers, viz; the constitution will be preserved & that we will have no United States Bank to grind the face of the poor and pamper the rich & am in hopes that before the 4 years shall expire we shall have the Star of Texas to add to our Banner.

But enough of this, I now wish to speak a little on the subject of Marriage, and I have 4 weddings to report that have taken place in father's Family since I wrote to you. First Virginia married in November 1842 to Robert Moore & is living in Edmondson Co. 12 mi. from Father and has one Daughter named Mary Jane after her Grandmothers. America married in October 1843 to Eli W. Owens who was formerly a Resident of Virginia & is a Nephew of Col. Gardner. She also has a daughter and has named her Elizabeth Jane, & thirdly Father has married a second time strange as it may

appear to you. He married in June last a Miss Polly Clayton, a maiden Lady near his own age, fourthly, Mary Frances Married on 24th of the past month to George Davenport of Warren Co. & is living in Bowling Green, and fifthly your humble Servant is getting in favor of annexation, when the treaty will be signed, he cannot say.

I am now the oldest child of my father living. After I was 21 years of age I taught school 3 years, farmed two years and went twice by flat boats to New Orleans & am now engaged again in teaching school in Warren, 10 mi. from where I was raised. I visit my father every week or two, who has now but two children living with him, Joseph & Selina Jane, the youngest of the family. Christopher Columbus is clerking in a store for a man of the name of Settle. Joseph has been afflicted with the Rheumatism since July & has not been able to walk until very recently, & now is only able to go on Crutches. Aunt Mary, the Widow of Uncle Thomas, is still living at the same place & were all well a few days ago, her two eldest children, Jane & Peter are married. I have not heard a word from Uncle Peter for the last five years and am very anxious to know where he is and what has become of him & should have written to him long since, but know not where to write, as informed me in his last letter he expected to remove beyond the Rocky Mountains & I saw a man in New Orleans from Missouri who stated he had left, but could not tell where he had gone.

Write to me as soon as this comes to hand and direct your letter to Rocky Hill, Barren County, Ky. My sheet is full & I am sleepy. Good night, Uncle Jo.

Dear Uncle and Aunt:

It is with no small degree of pleasure that I undertake for the first time to write you a few lines in answer to your letter to Cousin Elizabeth Holman, which bears date the 12th November last, informing her of the health and circumstances of her relatives in Va. and also the misfortune which befel my sister, Ann, with many other occurrences that have taken place in my old neighborhood since I left.

I went to see Aunt Elizabeth on Thursday last, and must acknowledge that I was somewhat surprised to see what a change had taken place since I last saw her. She has reduced in flesh, and what is more remarkable she has lost all her teeth and it would seem that her gums has worn down to the jawbone, she is very sensible that her mind is impaired, and I think it has been caused in the excessive use of opium, which she still has to use. She let me know that she lacked nothing of a temporal nature to constitute her happy in this life, but was at times in doubt respecting

a future state of existance, but unworthy as I am, I endeavored to sooth her disponency and point her away to the Savior of mankind, who has said come unto me all ye ends of the earth, and be ye saved, for I am God and besides me there is none other.

Her children and grandchildren we think are well and doing well. John Emerson's family I think are all in Missouri (I had forgotten Labor he has joined himself to the Abolitions let him alone). R.K. DuVal's sons with exception of young Robert is doing well, one of his daughters is not. Mrs. Gorin is living at the place where R.K.D. died, with her son, Rowan Gorin doing badly. William the youngest is sprightly, but of no particular consequence.

I will now write you a few lines in answer to the request paid me in your letter to Cousin Elizabeth, for I did not know that I had a friend east of the Allegany mountains until I saw my name in the letter referred to. I am still living at the place I first purchased, and in a tolerable degree of health, though in constant pain more or less. I have not entirely recovered from a spell of billious pneumonia which came near removing me from the stage of action, altho it so pleased my Benevolent parent to leave me a little longer here on earth, for what cause I cannot tell.

I am a singular being and you will think so no doubt. In the first place for the sake of my Aunt Morning I will write about my children, and let politicks alone. Sarah Ann Bowles born Nov. 7th 1812 - Died 17th April 1827. Amanda F. Bowles born 27th Sept. 1815 - Died 7th May 1839. Oscar F. Bowles born Oct. 2nd 1817 - Died 6th Oct. 1845. Elizabeth Bowles born Sept. 4, 1820, Married 24th 1842. Amrica S. Bowles born October 27th 1822 Married October 12th 1843. Mary F. Bowles Sept. 21 1825 Married Oct. 24th 1844, Died Sept. 30th 1846. Joseph P. Bowles born October 8th 1827. Christopher C. Bowles born April 27th 1829. Selina Jane Bowles born Dec. 6th 1831, making nine in all, leaving five living. Oscar died Oct. 6th 1845 one month and 2 days after he was married. I am now living alone with only one daughter my youngest, Selina. Christopher is living in Glasgow, as clerk in store at \$300. per year. Joseph has crop with me the last two years but is now about to leave and where for I do not know. The married girls are living in adjoining county, one with 3, the other with 2 children. America having lost her youngest a son, each had 2 daughters and a son, Mary's husband died in March and she in September, leaving an infant daughter 13 days old, who has been raised up to this time with her grandfather and mother. She is very sprightly and could we now have her and keep her she might make a splendid woman, but my hopes in that respect are all

blasted, it is about 30 miles to where they live and Selina and me went and brought her home in November, and a few days since they sent and took her away. I am now poor and always have been so but I sincerely thank him who is Allwise and Incomprehensible that I, nor any of my family that sojoined with me ever lacked for any of the necessaries of this life, altho it has caused me to exert every power of body and mind to live independent of the cold hand of charity, for what is life without light, and what is heart without head, and what is a head without instruction, therefore in order to be useful in this life I gave all that I could spare from the support of my family to informing the judgment of my children and by so doing they have been enabled so far to make their way through life under no embarrassment as to language and manners, which I esteem far preferable to riches for to hear a person speak grammatically and place their words in their proper place it would promote them more in company than a pocket full of dimes and a head and heart void of understanding, And as a proof of what I now know I will refer you to the case of my brother who died in Huntsville, Alabama. Before he died he had run through nearly every cent of his property, except a small gold watch, a set of silver spoons, his clothes and a small debt which was owing to him which he willed me. The watch and spoons he gave to Amanda, which his will in my house will abundantly show, well, they took umbrage of me thinking I had deprived them, without making themselves acquainted with the facts, and have never from that day written to me or any of mine which was the reason I was doubtful of having a friend on the east side of the mountains, but now I know that I have I rejoice that I can introduce myself to you and Aunt Morning, one that I loved in youth, and still love her in my 67th year. I also love Aunt Elizabeth Holman and always did. Time and paper fail or I would write more, my love to all my friends but especially to you and yoursand Aunt Elizabeth Holman.

PS-I find that I was mistaken in Robert being the son of R.K.D. he is the son of Geo. Gorin and as this may be the last time that I shall be permitted to enjoy the same blessings *** I cannot conclude this letter without telling you that Selina and myself are in reasonable health, for which I do sincerely thank the Lord my Heavenly Father, and I do beseech you all to intercede with the good Lord in my behalf, nothing more but shall ever remain your truly disconsolate but most affectionate nephew.

Dear uncle and aunt, not having entirely filled up my paper and being alone as I generally am on every Sabbath day and believing that in all probab-

ility that I shall not remain much longer here below, and having mentioned previously all my family, except the one I thought most of than any other person on earth, I cannot conclude without mentioning her precious name to you at this time, I mean my dear Jane. She and Amanda were both taken with the consumption about the same time. Amanda lived about 18 months, and my wife at least four years. They both died in the triumph of faith, and in hopes of a blest Immortality beyond this veil of tears. Oh! that I could see you face to face and exchange sentiments with you in this world, but that is out of the question. I pray that we may all meet again - farwell my friends. Send this letter to Sister Ann if you please.

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Mr. Bowles - Dear Sir: Florence, Mo. Apr. 7, 1852.

I would inform you that I and my family is well and hope that these lines will find you and yours enjoying the same blessings. My brother and his family are also well. Times here are tolerable. Pork is worth 7¢ pound. Corn 12 bbl. Wheat 50¢ horses from 50 to 100 dollars - oxen from 40 to 60 dollars.

I would like to know who Elizabeth Toler married. I have 3 children - 2 girls and a boy, James H, Susan and Mary Elen.

The money that you have in your hands that is coming to me after taking out your part for your trouble I want you to send me a check on St. Louis bank. By doing so I can get my money without any trouble. Please write as soon as you get this.

Dear Sir:

After my respects to you all I will inform you I received your letter you sent me. We are all in tolerable health at this time. I have been unwell for six or eight days and one of the children is right sick now. Crops is good and everything bringing a good price. It is tolerable healthy here at this time. Wheat is worth 50¢, bacon 6¢.

Elijah's family is not well. They have some of them the chills and fever. I can inform you that my mother is dead. She died about the last of June. The widower boales and family is well so far as I now know.

I will tell you about that money. I want you to try to get a draft on the St. Louis bank if you can and if you can't on St. Louis, on New York for the money and send it in a letter to me. Direct your letter to Florence post office, Morgan County, Mo. I can inform you that I did not receive your letter

you sent me from Negrofoot. You wrote you put one in the post office there. I want you to write to me when you get this letter and let me know how you all are, and write whether you know anything of William Hutchinson or not and what he is doing so no more at present but I remain your sincere friend until death. Sary and myself send our respects to you all.

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Jos. F. Bowles Warren, Marion Co. Mo. 1858
Dear Cousin:-

I have been thinking for a long time that I would write you a few lines that you may know that we have not ceased to remember you and your family. At this time all are well as common. Gustavus has been comparatively well since he returned home until the cool weather has set in, when he has been growing worse. We will perhaps take him to the Assylum next week where we hope he may be cured in a short time. Cousin John is about taking his hogs to market. He will not do as well in selling his hogs as he thought from the fact that he bought before the hard times commenced. He could have sold at one time for six dollars per hundred and made money but now he can't get more than four dollars. In other things he has done well since he came to Mo. I think he is well satisfied to stay with us and I think you ought to advise him to remain here so long as he does well. And about his moral character you may rest content. He has conducted himself in such a manner that will meet your approbation. I would also say to you that it would be better for the rest of your sons to come west as I feel satisfied that they can do better here than in Virginia and will say that if Eli will come to Mo. in the spring that I will aid him all I can to make a start. There is plenty of the best land he can rent for a mere trifle and raise a crop in the summer and sell it or buy stock and feed it, and then he can work at his trade the balance of the year and so do well. I might say that it would not be well to persuade Cousin John to return to Virginia as it would take near all he has made to go and come when that amount would enable him to operate more largely during the next year. It is true we all like to see those who are dear to us but I think you ought to make a small concession of parental feelings when it would be beneficial to their temporal prosperity. As for myself I like to see all who

are related to me prosper and do well.

I would like to ask of you any information you may get in relation to the land warrant belonging to Uncle Thomas Bowles. I have had the Department at Washington City examine but it seems only to reveal the greater mystery. It appears that a Warrant was granted to Thomas Boles or Bowles, No. 12394 for 160 acres of land in the state of Illinois. In examination this land we find it is owned by a settler now in possession who claims to have bought it from Thomas Bowles of Kentucky. We have written to Ky. and find that there is a Thomas Bowles living in Ky. who is quite an old man and I suppose was in the war of 1812. By further examination of the files in Washington City we find another man by the name of Thomas Boles or Bolls, a private in Spencer's 29th Div. Infantry, giving him a Warrant of 160 acres of land located in Arkansas. These are all the Pattents granted to the name of Bolles found at the Department, so you see that it is veiled in mystery. We would like to know if the Pattent which Uncle Thomas had that was lost was ever found and if not found is there any possibility of finding it. If we could find the Pattent which he lost the mystery that now covers it would be cleared away. If Uncle Tom did get a discharge and a Warrant of 160 acres of land was granted him it seems a great mystery that nothing can be learnt. The Pattent belonging to Uncle Thomas was brought to Missouri in 1835 I think by Wm. Durrah, a man you knew. It was then carried back to Ky. to Aunt Evans by him. Aunt Evans then sent it back to Uncle Tom by a Mr. Smith but he died before he got home and this is the last we know of the Pattent and then who is this Thomas Bowles in Ky. We have written them and find him to be the man. If you have any information as to this matter or if you can get any we would like to be put in possession of the facts. Please answer this as soon as you can and believe me as ever, your cousin,
Jos. I. Bowles.

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Following is part of an old letter found among other old letters in home of Sue Bowles of Hanover, Co. Va. a great-granddaughter of Thomas Bowles.

"The 4 Companes stade at this place quiet until Monday nigh July the 4 when their was an alarm in camp. About 10 oclock scouting Party went out to assertain the facts. this expedation was under the Command of Leut Linsy of the young Guard. this alarm was fals. Father & Uncle Robert Henly pade us a visit July the 2nd. Wednesday night there was another alarm in camp. And other Party went out this was under the Command of Leut. Vanderson of the young Guards. this was fals. Our Camp was quiet untill Monday night July the 8 when the camp was alarmed about 12 oclock in the night. this proved fals. We were then permitted to remane quiet the ballance of the time we stade at this Place. The 4 Companies left Gove Wharf Sunday

July the 21 for Kings Mills to gain the other 6 Companies that was their. We reached their about 2 oclock (torn out). On that day the Battle of Manassa was fought.

Those 4 Companies that went to Kings Mill remaned quiet until the 19 of June when those 2 Companies from Spottes joined them that was the night that those 4 Companies left Gove Wharf. After that they were quiet no alarm in camp. When those 4 Companies joined them at Kings Mill they were all together for the second time since we left Richmond. We were then under the Command of Col. G. P. August.

The Regt. remaned here nothing of interest happening. Sunday the 4th of August we took up a line of march we left our tents and the sick behind. We left our Camp at Kings Mill about 1 oclock. Col. Stuart was in command we march about 12 miles and halted for the night. the Place that we stoped at was Lees Mill. We got to the place about 11 oclock in the night. We started the next morning quiteearly the next place that we (torn out) rnich Courthouse. (rest of letter torn off)."

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Hanover, Va., June 28th, 1883.

To John Bowles, Marion Co., Mo.

Well, John, as I am spared to this time I am going to try to write you a letter which I never expected to do, but as I can't do nothing else I will try and write. I am so afflicted from my head to my feet. I am ruptured - have kidney and bladder infection and am swollen. Have a breaking out around my eyes so I can't see only in the sunshine, but thot I would try and write to you for the last time for have a feeling I can't be here long. I have been here much longer than I expected. I have the planks for my coffin, sent and got the nails and the lampblack and spoke to the man to make it and a man to dig my grave. There is so much vanity here when the dead is buried.

John, there is only six persons in five or ten miles of here that is very old. Charles Toler is eighty. Your mother and myself is eighty-two, the oldest couple I reckon that is in the country. There is older people than we but not as old a couple. Then comes Jesse Harlowe - ninety. John Snead between eighty-five and ninety, so I don't expect there is many couples as old as your mother and me. We was married the eleventh of October 1827 so wehave been together fifty-five years. Your mother is feeble, but she gets about and does more for her age than anybody I ever saw. She will go in the garden to work as I can't. She will sit down to knit and she won't sit but a few minutes before she is up and gone again doing something, she ought not to do. She has a good appetite.

Well, now something about the crops. The prospect for corn is the worst I have ever seen here. The

rain and the cold weather in the spring that prevented plowing until the weeds and the grass got such a hold that it could not be got in order before the dry spell set in and the ground got so hard that Billie never finished until a few days ago and harvest is come on and what will become of it I don't know. The winter oats that stood the winter is good. The spring oats is tolerable good.

John, I got a letter from Mack a short time ago. He is moved to Illinois. He lives in a valley on the Wabash river in a little village called Hutsonville. He has 44 acres of land in the bottom that raise 75 to 100 bushels of corn to the acre. He rents out his land and works his trade. He says his family is tolerable well except Leonard. He hasn't been able to do anything for twelve months. Thinks he is a little better now. Alphious is in a telegraph office and has the management of the office.

John, I want you to write me a long letter and let me know if you is the owner of land and if you are clear of debt, and let me hear from Quince and Joe Bowles. I doubt if you will be able to read this but you must guess at what you can't read. I can't read a heap myself. I have to write on my lap and with a pencil. Did not think I could write with a pen.

John, Henry and Peter's families are well ** Henry was here last Sunday - he comes real often. Peter scarcely ever comes. Fanny and her two youngest children are here. Minter is at the same place he was when you was here. Phil Snead family is well as common. Betty ain't never well but keeps up. I reckon you heard that Alice was married to Robert Holman. He is John Holman's second boy. Woody wrote to your daughter. I reckon she told the news of Mivin.

Well, John, they tell me that Richmond has improved more than any place in the country. I haven't been there for five years or more. Fanny says tis been more than five years. I haven't heard a sermon preached in five years. John, death is a solemn thing, but it don't scare me. I think of it often. I know that we will all have to go when our time comes, let it be long or short.

Well, to fill out my paper I will write about Billy's youngest child, Susan Farrar, she is the best and the smartest child I think that I have ever seen - the most industrious and the most truthful. She is small but she wants to help do everything she sees the women do, wash and iron small things, sets the table, wash dishes, works in the garden, knits good, sews and can read and write. She is in her sixth year but Woody has taken a great deal of pains with her and I think that they love each other as well as they can. She gets her everything she wants that she can no matter what it is. Well, I must stop bragging or you will think so, too.

This is the last.

Dear Brother, Sister & all:

I will try to write as it has been so long since I have written. I know you all think hard of me and you have a right to. When I got your letter I thought I would write soon but put it off and kept putting off from time to time. I am all alone today. Billy gone to church, Till, Jemmie and Sue gone to see Mrs. Waldrop. Mary is staying in Richmond with Fannie. I spent most of the winter in Richmond have been busy since I came home fixing and weaving me a carpet - have finished and put it down. It is real pretty for rags. I am now fixing for flannel. I was to have it in spring. I have so much to do in the fall such as canning and fixing up for winter. Jimmie has bought a lot the west end of Lee St. had him a house built expect to move in the 15th of June. I am glad they have a home of their own it is so bad to be moving from place to place. Edd is learning the carpenters trade is very good workman we think he will be one of the best. His health is very good since he has been at work. Frank is not very strong. He is not in any business. I haven't been to Brother Henry's and Peter's since last June - haven't seen them for sometime. I spent the day at Phill's some weeks ago. They are having a room put on their house. Bettie's health is better than it has been for years. Phill's and Florence's health is poor. Alice has another little boy, his name is John Boles after his grand-pappy.

We will be scarce of fruit this year owing to the cold spring we had, so much last year we had ** all summer late in the fall put up about 100 gal. for vinegar. We are haven a cole damp spell at this time it makes the little chickens cry so much. We have about 100 chickens & 50 ducks on the yard. Have some very near large enough to eat if any of you all will step in I will give you fride chicken & roast duck. Farmers are backward with thare crops owing to the cool and wet weather, our garden is looking tolerable well. I will be so glad when we have vegetables I am so fond of them. I get so tired of nicknacks. We have the finest lot of hogs we have had for years if nothing happens we will have plenty of meat for another year. Have three cows that are fresh will have plenty of milk in a few weeks.

Mrs. Belle Nash comes over every few days wants to hear from you all sends love. Mrs. Caroline Ellis and Aline are ded. Aline left 2 little girls. Mortimo is living in Richmond is making money and living in state. Fanne lives in Baltimore I don't know how she is getting on. Mr. Tom Harlow is in very poor health has been for the last year - isn't able to do anything stays with Cousin Jessie, they are all alone except anyone they keep. Mr. Parrish lives at his home all by himself. Mollie, his Daughter died this winter left eight children. Sarah's

health isn't good, she is living in Richmond, is her mother over again about work. I guess she will die trying to work.

Mr. John Harlow has been helping Billie build a cook room this spring, is looking well and aslively as ever loves to tell funny things as well as ever. Sarah is looking badly comes over often and stays several days at a time. Says you all must write to her - sends love to all. Tell Alp to write to her. Write me word who he married - send me her picture, tell her she must write to her old Aunt - she would like to see her and also Alp.

Anne Cole lives in Richmond, is doing well, has one grown son one Daughter three small children. They are very pretty. Cofah Jones married Hicks. They live in Richmond has one little girl, lost the oldest. Beatris is at home comes to see us often, her health isn't good. Budlives with his Pap works on farm. Cousin Sarah Tommerson has lost her eye sight can just tell night from day. Cousin Adaline is very feeble. Annie lives with them and takes care of them. Billie married Mary Satterwhite lives up near Mr. Leeks old place. Cousin Bob stays with him. Mary married Ballard at West Point. Marthy married Sam Leek live at the old place with Mr. Mollie.

I reckon you all will get tired of trying to read this letter so I will close with much love and remain your Sister & Aunt.

In 1850 there were 4 Bowles head of families in Marion County, Missouri, namely, Dabney A; Benj., Owen and Isaac.

The Dabney line is as follows: Steven Bowles came to Maryland from Dover, England in 1620. He had sons: Jessie and David, both born in Maryland. Jessie Bowles, son of Steven, had sons, Steven and John Bowles both born in Maryland. John Bowles was Captain in Rev. War of Henrico Mil. in 1777. Steven Bowles, son of Jesse Bowles and brother of Capt. John Bowles, married a Hughes. They had 4 children: Joseph, William, Hughes and David, all born in Maryland. David moved from Maryland to Virginia and married a Nelson. They had 7 children: William, Mary, John, Jesse, Steven, Betsy, and Nelson Bowles. Jesse, son of David and Miss Nelson m. Elizabeth Martin. They moved to Kentucky where David died 1823. Had 11 children: Thomas M. Bowles, Benj. Bowles, Dabney Martin Bowles who m. Bertha Tyler, Nancy Bowles who m. John Thomas, Harriet Bowles who m. Francis Thomas, Jesse, Sally who m. Wm. P. Brown, Palmelia who m. John Bozarth, Jr., Millicent who m. Abner Bozarth, and Susanna who m. another brother. All three couples married at LaGrange, Mo. The 11th child, Mourning m. a Nichols. After David's death, Elizabeth Martin Bowles moved from Kentucky to Missouri in 1825 with all children. Dabney Martin Bowles who m. Bertha Tyler on 1832 was b. 1802 and Bertha b. 1817. They had 12 children: Margie E. Bowles b. 1834 m. May 7, 1856 Wm. Loudermilk; Mary A. b. 1836; Benjamin B. b. 1838; James J. b. 1840; Susan A. b. 1841; Wm. H. b. 1843; Dabney b. 1845; Joseph H. b. 1847 moved to Knox County, Mo. - Narsiper? (female) b. 1849; Franklin b. 1851 m. a Collins; Douglas b. 1853 m. Milly Scott and Alice b. 1859 m. Charley Scott.

The Benjamin line is as follows: Benjamin P. Bowles of Marion Co. Mo. b. 1800 in Kentucky, occupation farmer, whose mother was Elizabeth b. in Va. 1774, and shown as living with Benj. in 1850, age 86. Benjamin's wife was Bervilla b. 1812 in Kentucky. They had at least 7 children: Sarah H. b. 1831 in Missouri; John T. b. Mar. 7, 1832 in Missouri d. Feb. 15, 1912, m. Catherine Banks b. Jan. 19, 1832 d. Sept. 19, 1912, b. Emerson, Mo. Had at least 4 children: Ellen b. 1855 m. Kit Banks, William b. 1862 m. a Scott, Thomas b. 1864 and Eva b. 1867 m. Cully Sanford. Warren H. Bowles, son Benj. and Bervilla b. Aug. 5, 1836 d. Sept. 25, 1907, m. Zilla b. Nov. 18, 1840. They had Edgar Bowles who m. Jennie Moore (see Moore-Samuel history), dau. Warren Moore and Margaret Harris. They

had dau. Beulah, who m. Ike Patterson, Highway Engineer of Illinois. Benjamin and Birvilla had also - Thomas T. Bowles b. 1838; Benj. H. b. 1840, Mary A. b. 1842 and Martha E. b. 1845, all in Missouri.

To date, no information to be had on Owen Bowles. Isaac Bowles is described in first part of Bowles history.

Below I bring more up-to-date line of my good friend, Mrs. Chester Bowles of St. Louis. This line is given in Farguh's "History of Bowles Family"

Gideon Bowles of Oxford, England was merchant in Dublin, Ireland, 1752. The oldest son, John, m. Eleanor, granddaughter Sir William Parsons. Five of their sons came to Virginia. John, son John and Eleanor went to Winchester, Va. before 1800. His son, Jacob, had son, James Avery Bowles b. Apr. 27, 1843 Winchester, Va. m. 1868 Isabella S. Swartz, New Market, Va. After marriage went to live Berryville, Va. where first child, Walter Winchester Bowles b. Feb. 23, 1869, d. Nov. 15, 1944 in hotel Poplar Bluff, Mo. while on business trip. He m. Virginia, only dau. Marion Grove and Eliza Taylor Doyle of Natural Bridge, Va. Chester and Virginia had two sons: (1) Walter who is m. and lives San Francisco, Calif. and has dau. Carol b. May 19, 1933. The second son, Robert, served in France during World War 1 and died tumor of brain from effects of war.

Hanover County, Virginia was created from New Kent in 1721 which in turn was taken out of York in 1654, which formerly had been known as Charles River, one of the original shires into which the colony of Va. was divided in 1634. Hanover was named for Duke of Hanover, afterwards George 1 of England, or from the Prussian province and city belonging to him. Hanover County embraces 512 sq. mi. - is a long county, distance of approximately 60 miles. The county is divided into three magisterial districts: Ashland, Henry and Beaver Dam Districts. In 1790 the population of Hanover County was 14, 754. The first clerk of County Court was James Claytor whose tenure of office dated from 1720. He was followed by Augustus Graham who was clerk 1735-1740. While there is no record of the names of early settlers, there is evidence that Hanover County was settled by white men as early as 1610.

Ashland was known as Slash Cottage until 1855. Slash Cottage began 1845-8. Ashland was named for Ashland, home of Henry Clay.

Beaverdam was named Bouvoir Dam for a Frenchman who once owned the place.

Negro Foot has many stories to account for its strange name.

The word 'Anna' is an Indian word which means river, hence North Anna or river and South Anna or river. Chickahominy means "Hard Corn eaters".

"Lakewood" or "Old Bowles" home route #1, near Ashland, Va built about 1780-1800. Owners: George Bowles, D.Colavita, Durette Quarles. This interesting old story and a half brick building is of English bond and L shaped. Has 6 rooms with many fine fire places of heart poplar mantels. Doors are five panel, heavy heart pine with heavy whip-sawn frames. Troops of both armies crossed this farm during the war between the States and there is an old slave burial ground with many markers.

HANOVER CO. VA. LAND TAXES

In 1782 there were 3 Thomas Bowles in Hanover Co., Va. paying land taxes.

A - Thomas of Turkey Creek (in west end of county) 510 acres 1782. In 1801 Thomas' land went to - John 300 acres and Anderson 210 acres. In 'Bowles Book' John and Anderson are shown as sons of Knight Bowles. (Could it be Thomas Knight Bowles?)

B - Thomas & Jerminah of Taylor Creek (see wills of this family), paid taxes on 211 acres in 1782. In 1795 increased to 510 acres. In 1804 Jerminah had dower of 173 acres - Thomas Est. 346 acres. In 1809 Estate decreased to 248 acres. Peter gets 167 acres - Mary 52 - Isaac 40 and Thomas 2-3/4. In 1812 Isaac sells his 40 acres. In Thomas 2nd's Will 1833 (son of Thomas & Jerminah), he leaves estate to sisters: Mary & Chrischania - if dead to his brothers: Davy, Isaac & Iray. Elizabeth Bowles died Nov. 1803 leaving wearing apparel to sisters: Polly (Mary), Christiana & Emelia and property to Christiana.

C - Thomas (son of Debora) in 1782 paid taxes on 183 acres and until 1805, when sold 33 acres to Ford, leaving balance of 149 acres, which he was still paying on in 1820. In 1813 this land is described as 16 mi. sw Court House.

D - John (Jolly Tar) 600 acres in 1782. In 1789 bought 100-3/4 acres from Mr. Kizer. In 1797 becomes John Estate. In 1798 land decreased from 700 acres to 229 acres. Benj. receives 199 acres and Jermina Wade 172. In 1800 the 229 acres go to Jeffree Bowles. In 1801 Jeffree increases to 260 acres. In 1804 sells 100 acres to Geo. Bowles. In 1806 Jeffree had 365 acres. In 1807 only 165 acres. In 1810 Thomas F. Bowles gets 125 acres from Jeffree Estate which plus the 100 acres he had, makes 225 acres. In 1812 Sarah gets 2 acres from Benj. making her 42 acres adjoining Thomas - 2 mi sw Court House. In 1815 Land Tax Book gives Sarah 42 acres 8 mi. sw Court House. Sarah pays taxes on 42 acres in 1816 and then disappears from tax list. In 1815 Thomas F. Bowles has 346 acres but in 1816 only has 130 acres.

- E - John (wheelwright) 150 acres in 1782. In 1805 bought 100 acres from Wm. Pollard. In 1809 sold 150 acres to Thomas P. Bowles. In 1813 has 100 acres and in 1815 has 170 acres 16 mi. sw C. H.
- F - Benjamin (Beer Garden) 150 acres in 1782, plus 60 acres in 1783. Another 60 in 1796 making 310 acres. In 1798 gets 199 acres from John (Jolly Tar) making 509 acres. In 1807 gets 2 acres from Jerminah Wade making 511 acres. In 1809 Benj. has 479 acres adjoining Richard Glazebrook 10 mi. sw Court House. In 1815 to 1820 is Benj. Estate 429-3/4.
- G - Mary - 190 acres 1782 until 1812 when Thomas P. Bowles gets same.
- H - Hezekiah 145 acres in 1782. In 1783 buys 36 $\frac{1}{2}$ acres from Elijah Bowles of Carolina. In 1803 181 acres to son, Hezekiah. In 1804 by his wife 230 acres total 410 acres. The following letter written by Dr. James Russell Hawkins, husband of Sarah Adeline Bowles, dau. Lyddall Bacon Bowles, was loaned to me by Mrs. Kelley of Richmond, Va:

"On Sunday morning, 23rd day of January 1825, it being a rather cold and disagreeable day and threatening a snow, Uncle Thomas Bowles with his daughter, Marie Bowles, and his neice, Sarah Adaline Bowles, left home for a trip to the County of Spottsylvania. To Uncle Thomas it was a matter of great importance, the Tuesday following being the day fixed upon as the day of his marriage to Miss Sallie Rawlings. The party had not left more than two hours before there came up one of the most severe snow storms that was ever known in that region, it was indeed a genuine snow cyclone. When we left home the calculation was to make the trip through that day but such was the severity of the storm and heavy snow drifts that it was with great difficulty that they could make any progress at all, the snow in many places having drifted to the depth of six or eight feet and by 8 o'clock that night they had only traveled about 15 miles, had just crossed the Newfound River when the horses so much fatigued by the trip refused or failed to move another step. Fortunately for the party, they were near the residence of Mrs. Nelson, a most excellent old lady, and well known to them. The carriage driver was sent to advise Mrs. Nelson of the situation of the party and in a short time her carriage driver with her horses were sent to their relief. They soon reached her house where they were most hospitably treated, gave them a hot supper, comfortable lodging and after an early breakfast gave them a start on their journey. After breaking the way the whole distance they reached Grandfather Waller's about 8 o'clock that night. This was not very far from Colonel Rawlings with whom the intended bride lived. Tuesday night, January 25, 1825, the marriage took place.

On Wednesday night, Eliza Price, Maria Bowles and Sarah Adaline Bowles went to Mother's (Mrs. Joseph Hawkins, who was Ann Parker Robinson), fifteen miles to attend my sister Mary's wedding which was to come off on Thursday night, but did not take place until the next morning. After the wedding the whole party went up to the infare, a grand party at Charles Morton's mother's an immense growd had gathered. The day was spent in dancing and frolicking generally. The next Saturday, Miss Price, Maria Bowles and Sarah Adaline Bowles (who was sister to Martin S. Bowles) went down to Grandfather Waller's and on the following

morning, Sunday, Uncle Tom Bowles and his party left for home, where they arrived about night, all delighted to reach home after having encountered many dangers and difficulties on their trip to Spottsylvania.

On the second day after the return of the wedding party, it being Tuesday evening, February 1st, I was sitting alone in the parlor about twilight feeling quite disconsolate. Miss Sarah Adeline Bowles walked in and took her seat on the opposite side of the room and remarked that she was sorry to see me look so sad and asked why it was so. My reply was that she might easily guess and proceeded to say that I was thinking of renewing the suit in which I had on two occasions been defeated, which I did and asked her if she had not come to the conclusion to reverse her former judgment in my favor. Her reply was that after mature deliberation upon the subject she had concluded to decide the case in my favor. So the matter ended in that on March 10th, 1825 we were married at her father's home (Lyddall Bacon Bowles). Her home was on the Chickahominy Henrico side of the dividing line and his father's (Thomas Philip Bowles) home was on the Hanover side of the Chickahominy Swamp where Lyddall Bacon Bowles was born April 15, 1783. The Thomas Bowles house is still standing, over 200 years old."
