EGOTISM.

As a member of the committee, the labor of arranging the matter and superintending the publication of this pamphlet, devolved upon me. It was my purpose originally to print in full the historical sketch read by me at the Bisbee gathering, to be followed by the records of the descendents of Charles Bisbee, but after giving the subject careful thought, it seemed a better way to commence the Bisbee Records with the first American ancestor and bring them down to the present generation. This change has involved a great amount of additional labor and no little expense, but it will be of much more permanent value, and on the whole much more satisfactory. The records are not so complete with respect to dates as I could have desired, but they are as nearly so as it was possible to make them. A genealogy of all the descendents of Thomas Bisbee would require a large volume and contain several thousands of names. I have followed the trunk line down through several generations, dropping out names all the way, because the scope of the present undertaking would not admit of their being carried along. My aim has been to trace these lines until they diverged into Maine, and to follow them here, in order that all the descendents of Thomas Bisbee in this State may be able to trace their ancestry in an unbroken line, to their emigrant ancestor.

The delay in bringing out this pamphlet has been very vexatious and trying to me, but it has been owing to causes over which I could have no control. Over two years have elapsed since the gathering was had at Sumner, and at that time it was thought we could print the proceedings in six weeks. The delay is no fault of mine.

The small amount subscribed to defray the expense of publication has rendered it necessary to abridge the pamphlet somewhat more than was desirable. A more complete account of the proceedings at the family gathering, such as an abstract of the speeches delivered on the occasion, and the names and ages of all those who were present would be interesting, but this required space and involved expenses which had not been provided for. I also found it necessary to abridge somewhat the records of the descendents of Charles Bisbee, by leaving out in most cases the fifth generation, in order to keep the size of the pamphlet down to correspond with the amount pledged for defraying the expenses of publication.

A FAMILY GATHERING.

On the 9th day of June, A. D. 1874, there was a gathering of the descendents of Charles Bisbee at the old Bisbee homestead, in the town of Sumner. It could hardly be called a reunion, for few of those who assembled there on that day had ever met there before, and many of them had never before met anywhere. The invitation was given out by Cupt. Lewis Bisbee, grandson of the patriarch, who now lives at the old homestead and cultivates the paternal acres. The invitation was extended to all connected with the family, either by marriage or consanguinity.

The weather was threatening in the morning, which probably prevented some from coming, but about a hundred and fifty of all ages had assembled before noon. A large portion of them came from towns in the immediate vicinity, and a few from more distant places. The second generation from Charles Bisbee, consisting of his seven sons and two daughters, had long since passed away, but a few of the third generation were present, still more of the fourth, some of the fifth and one of the sixth.

The forenoon was spent in introductions, in looking over the old homestead and in social intercourse. At noon a picnic dinner was spread on the lawn in front of the old house. After dinner the company divided into groups or tribes, and it was found that seven of the nine children of Charles Bisbee were represented by their describents. Each separate group was photographed by an artist, who was present for that purpose.

The company then assembled in the finely shaded and nicely kept cemetery situated near by, where repose the ashes of five generations of Bisbees. An organization was effected by the choice of Capt Lewis Bisbee as chairman. Remarks were made by the chairman and by Hon. Sidney Perham and George D. Bisbee, Esq. A brief sketch of the Bisbee family of New England was read by the writer of this sketch, commencing with the emigrant ancestor and tracing the family down to those who were assembled on this occasion, comprising ten generations. At the close of the exercises it was voted that a committee be raised to prepare and cause to be printed an account of the meeting, and a genealogical sketch of the descendents of Charles Bisbee, and Capt. Lewis Bisbee, George D. Bisbee and Wm. B. Lapham were appointed the committee.

The day which proved to be one of June's loveliest, was very pleasantly spent, and towards night the company separated and returned to their respective homes, feeling that the occasion had been one of interest and profit.

Charles Bisbee, the common ancestor of those who assembled on this occasion, was born in Bridgewater, Mass., in 1726. He married Beulah, daughter of Rowse Howland of Pembroke, probably a descendent of Arthur Howland of Marshfield, and subsequently moved to Pembroke. At the close of the Revolutionary war, in which the father

and his two oldest sons, Elisha and Charles, had taken part, there was an extensive emigration from the Old Colony towns to the wilds of Maine, or to the "Eastward," as it was then called, and Charles Bisbee, senior, was among the number of those who emigrated. He bought land of Benjamin Darling of Hanover, Mass., in a township in Maine, then called Sharon, afterwards Butterfield, and finally incorporated in 1798 by the name of Sumner. In the summer of 1783 he visited his land and put up a cheap tenement for his family. Buckfield had then been settled about seven years, but Sumner was a wilderness. Bisbee returned to Pembroke and spent the winter and in the following spring set out with his family for their new home. They sailed from Scituate harbor in a packet, and landing at Yarmouth, proceeded through the wilderness to Sumner on horseback, arriving on the 5th of Jnne, 1784. He selected his land with good judgment, and with the aid of his seven stalwart sons he soon cleared him up a good farm. He suffered all the privations and hardships incident to pioneer life, lived to see his children comfortably settled around him, and to enjoy the fruits of his toil, and departed this life June 5, 1807, it being the twenty-third anniver sary of the arrival of the family in town. His wife, Beulah, died Sept. 1, A. D. 1816.

The nine children of Charles Bisbee grew up to man and womanhood and all of them were married and had families. Their children settled in Sumner and the adjoining towns, and their grandchildren are widely scattered, many of them having made their homes in the far West. A rec-

ord of some of these families may be found in the last part of this pamphlet.

The following letter, the original of which was obtained from Miss Lydia Ford of Hanson, Mass., who is a daughter of William Ford, may be of some interest in this connection. The letter was written by Elisha Bisbee, the oldest son of Charles Bisbee, and is directed to William Ford, whose wife was a Howland and a sister of Beulah, the wife of Charles Bisbee:

SUMNER, APRIL 29, 1803.

Dear Uncle:—I embrace this opportunity to inform you that we are all well as common. I have nothing new to write. It is a general time of health here. We have had a very moderate winter and as forward spring as we have had since I lived here. Bread and meat are plenty and cheap, and labor bears a very high price, and is not to be had at any rate. I was at the widow Child's lately; all well. The Judge of Probate has done very extraordinary by the widow; her dower would fetch twelve or fifteen hundred dollars, at least, and the Doctor's estate is likely to come out much better than was expected.

I have not had a line from you this many a day, and have done looking for any, but I am in hopes that my scribbling may stir you up so that I may know how you and our relations fare there in that old worn out country, and pray don't miss any opportunity of writing to me, as I shall take it very hard if you do.

We have had a very exceeding snow storm here. It began on Friday, the fifteenth of this instant, (April,) early in the morning, and grew hotter and hotter until Sunday, about noon, when it abated. The snow fell eighteen or twenty inches deep, and there is some of it to be seen now. It was far the smartest storm we have had for the winter past.

Our two oldest girls have got married and each of them have a boy. They married men of property, and are in a way to live if no misfortune overtakes them. Remember me to all that may inquire. Joshua Ford's oldest daughter is married and has got a boy.

BISBEE FAMILY RECORDS.

Thomas Besbedge,* the common ancestor of the New England Family of Bisbee, was one of those persons who came to New England soon after the landing of the Mayflower pilgrims, in order that they might enjoy more perfect religious freedom. There are many circumstances which go to show that he was a man of some wealth and. position in the old country, and a man of influence in Plymouth Colony. The records show that he sailed from Sandwich, England, in the ship Hercules,† John Witherly master, with his wife, six children and three servants, and that he landed at Scituate Harbor in the spring of 1634. He had certificates from Thomas Warren, Rector of St. Peters' at Sandwich, and from Thomas Harmon, Vicar of Hedcorn, of his conversion and conformity to the orders and discipline of the church, and that he had taken the oaths of allegience and supremacy. He became a member of Lothrop's church, the first gathered at Scituate, and was chosen one of its first deacons. He remained in Scituate

but a short time, for in 1638 he bought a house of Wm. Palmer in Duxbury and moved there. In 1643 he was chosen Representative from Duxbury to the General Court. was one of the grantees of Seipicon, (now Rochester,) but the grant was not accepted, and Mr. Bisbee subsequently moved to Marshfield, where his name appears on a petition to the General Court. He afterwards moved to Sudbury. where he lived several years and died March 9, 1674. His will, dated Nov. 25, 1672, bequeaths all his houses and lands in Hedcorn and Frittenden, Old England, to his grandson, Thomas Brown, and makes two other grandsons, William and Edward Brown, executors. The name of the wife of Thomas Bisbee does not appear upon the records of Plymouth Colony, which are equally silent respecting three of his children. They may have died unmarried, or perhaps there may be an error in the record which gives the number as six.

stock. He built the first mill in Woodstock, situated on the brook near Abel Bacon's house. A store and public house on a small scale were afterwards erected near, and the place was distinguished by the name of Woodstock Corner. Mr. Bisbee sold the mill to Samuel Stephens and bought John Nason's farm, where he lived a few years, keeping a small store for the accommodation of the town. He moved to North Woodstock in 1821, and was the first settler in that part of the town. Here he built a gristmill and shingle-mill, and resided here while he lived. After the incorporation of the town he was moderator of the first town meeting. He was a man of intelligence, though of marked peculiarities. - 42. Beza Bisbee was married to Betsey Marshall by Rev. John Briggs in 1800, and died Sept. 3, 1804, aged 25 years, 5 months. His wife was the daughter of Capt. Thomas Marshall of New Bedford. Children:

Bisbee, was lost at sea Jan. 11, 1859.
- 43. John Bisbee went to school in Kingston, where he was under the instruction of Rev. Martin Parris, and a classmate of Rev. W. A. Drew of Augusta. He graduated at Brown University, entering a year in advance, and always kept ahead of his class. In the language of one of his classmates, "he took to learning as naturally as a duck to the water." He graduated with the highest honors, and studied law in Taunton. He was always a serious,

thoughtful man, and preferred the ministry, and having embraced Universalism he commenced to preach in Brookfield, Mass. He afterwards went to Hartford, Conn., and finally accepted a call as the successor of Rev. Russell Streeter, in Portland. He came there in July, 1827. While there he made his mark as a talented and eloquent speaker. He married Miss Ruggles of Hardwich, Mass., who subsequently married a Mr. Bugbee of Plymouth, Mass. They had two children. Rev. Mr. Bisbee died in Portland, after an illness of eight days, March 8, 1829, very much lamented. The Bisbee fraternity of Portland, perpetuates his memory. He delivered the first occasional sermon before the Maine Convention of Universalists, at its organization in 1828. Mr. Bisbee had some striking peculiarities, physically as well as mentally. His hair and beard on one side of his head and face were nearly white, on the other dark; one of his eyes was hazel, the other pale blue. When he became a man he contrived by hair dves to color both sides of his hair alike.

Mr. Bisbee's widow is said to be now living in her second widowhood in Plymouth. Of the two children I know nothing.

NOTES.

We have stated in another place that Rouse Bisbee (35) was a person of marked peculiarities. The following little anecdote will illustrate this. While residing at North Woodstock, a dispute arose between him and a local preacher familiarly known as "the elder," who worked at blacksmithing, about the ownership of an anvil. The anvil had changed hands several times, each party taking it whenever he had an opportunity. Mr. Bisbee grew weary of this by-play, and one day when "the elder" had carried off the anvil, he walked into the shop of the latter and without

commencing a war of words, he simply placed a stick which he carried in his hand against the forge, and walked out without saying a word. The stick was an elder sprout, not of the sweet variety, but of the other kind, and this was Mr. Bisbee's method of showing the minister the kind of "elder" he considered him

John Bisbee (32) was not over-scrupulous respecting his dress or personal appearance, though he was in comfortable circumstances. The following story related of him may or may not be true. It is said that on one occasion, clad in home-spun, he went to Portland with a lead of furs which he found it difficult to dispose of without taking his pay in goods. He urged that he must have some money to pay his taxes, and finally the dealer closed the bargain by promising to pay him money enough for that purpose. Mr. Bisbee then stepped out and called in the collector of Sumner, who happened to be in the city, when it was found that the entire amount he was to receive for his furs was insufficient to cancel his taxes. The dealer acknowledged the corn and paid over the money.

Hopestill Bisbee son of Hopestill (21) settled in Middleboro', Mass., where he married widow Betsey Purrington, whose maiden name was Clark. He had two sons viz: Hopestill and Alden; their posterity is in Middleboro' and vicinity.

As a race the Bisbee's are distinguished for their mechanical ingenuity, and especially for their skill in working iron and steel. A larger per cent. of them are blacksmiths than of any other family I know, except perhaps the family of Leonard.

Elisha Bisbee, probably (12), was one of the petitioners to the General Court in 1735, for a grant of land in the District of Maine, afterwards incorporated as Gray.

In the Genealogy of the Lewis Family it is stated that Daniel, only son of Rev. Daniel Lewis, married Sarah, daughter of Elisha Bisbee (5) of Hingham.

Rev. J. H. Bisbee wrote the Ecclesiastical History of Worthington, Mass.

In his will Thomas Bisbee, (1) the emigrant, directed that his body should be buried at the East end of the church in Sudbury

APPENDIX.

ELISHA BISBEE, ESQ.

The following communication from Ellis Ames, Esq., of Canton, Mass., to the Old Colony Memorial, contains some facts respecting Elisha Bisbee, Esq., (12) and his descendents, which are worth preserving here. We believe that Mr. Ames claims to be a descendent. We omit the first part of the communication, which relates principally to other matters.

In the full of 1848, the writer fell in with Mr. Benjamin Bisbee of Stoughton, then 89 years of age, and inquired of him from whom he was named; to which he replied, from his uncle Benjamin Bisbee. who was killed at the battle of Lake George in 1755; that his uncle Benjamin and Samuel Bisbee, his father, were sons of Elisha Bisbee, Esq., of Pembroke, who died in 1737; that his uncle on departing for the army after his enlistment, went up to the window of his brother Samuel's house and requested that if he (his brother) should have a son born, to name him Benjamin, and that he was named accordingly at his birth; that by one Packard of North Bridgewater, who was in the same company with his uncle Benjamin, he was told that his uncle Benjamin Bisbee was slightly wounded in the leg, and was thereby thrown into convulsions and died about sunset of the day of the battle, of the lock-jaw; and that he. Packard, buried him near a tree, which he marked with the initials of his name. On the decease of Mr. Benjamin Bisbee, in October, 1849, a biographical sketch of him was prepared, which was published in the January number, 1850, of the New England Genealogical Register, on pages 99 and 100, in which the account of his uncle Benjamin Bisbee having been killed at the battle of Lake George, and his being named after him, is narrated. His fellowsoldier and his brother and his connections thought that he died of lock-jaw, induced by the slight wound he received, and do not seem to have been aware that his death was caused by a poisoned bullet.

On looking into the account of the administrator, (his brother, Samuel Bisbec,) in the well-known handwriting of Shepard Fiske,

Esq., of Bridgewater, allowed in the Plymouth County Probate

Court, January 2, 1758, we find this item, viz:

"To a journey to Boston (and time in waiting on the Province treasurer) to receive the wages due the estate," being the item for services in collecting the back pay of the government. This account was allowed by John Cushing. Esq.. Judge of Probate for Plymouth County, who was also at the same time a Judge of the Supreme Court of Massachusetts, and who was the father of Hon. William Cushing, afterwards Chief Justice of Massachusetts, and subsequently for twenty-one years one of the Judges of the Supreme Court of the United States, and who was commissioned Chief Justice of the United States.

Let us see more fully who was this Benjamin Bisbee, who was killed at the battle of Lake George, Sept. 8, 1755.

Elisha Bisbee, Esq., of Pembroke, was a lawyer, who was born in Hingham and moved to Pembroke, and represented that town in the General Court about ten years, the last year being the political year 1736—1737.

Upon examining the grave-stones in the old burying-ground in Pembroke, we find one with the following inscription, to wit:

"Here lies ye body of Elisha Bisbee, Esq., aged 49 years & 12 days. died March ye 13th, 1737."

He was buried beside the grave of his son, named after him or for him, as appears by a small grave-stone, with this inscription, viz:

"Elisha, son to Elisha & Sarah Bisbee,
"Aged 5 years & 2 months.
Died August 20, 1723."

Beside him also was buried his own mother, as appears by a gravestone larger than that over his own grave, with this inscription, viz:

"HERE LIES THE BODY OF MRS. MARY BISBEE, WIFE TO ELISHA BISBEE, OF HINGHAM, GENTL. DIED APRIL 16, 1737, IN THE 82D YEAR OF HER AGE.

Sarah, the widow of Elisha Bisbee, Esq., subsequently married Mr. Josiah Williams, of West Bridgewater, the great-grandfather of the late Hon. Reuel Williams of Maine. Josiah Williams died in 1770, his dwelling-house still standing in a good state of preservation. Upon her second marriage to Mr. Williams, as his second wife, her sons, Benjamin and Samuel, moved with her to West Bridgewater, and from that place her son, Benjamin Bisbee, enlist-

ed into the Provincial army in the spring of 1755. Samuel, the brother of Benjamin, moved from West Bridgewater to Stoughton in 1764, and there lived and died in the way 1800.

in 1764, and there lived and died in the year 1800.

Elisha Bisbee, Esq., practiced law and attended Court in several counties, his name appearing as counsel on the record. He was the identical person appearing at the bar in Worcester in 1732, of whom the late learned Joseph Willard, Esq., in his history of the bar of Worcester County, seems to have known only enough to head the list of the ancient lawyers at that bar with the name of

"Elisha Bisbee, 1732."

Elisha Bisbee was a member of the General Court of so much consequence as to have been, at one time chairman of the Committee of the House of representatives on the important subject of the Governor's salary, when, on account of the interference of the King and his ministers on that subject, the Province was much agitated. That Elisha Bisbee had business in Wercester County appears by the fact that, at the time of his decease, he owned lands in the town of Hardwicke, in that county as seen by his inventory, wherein is this item:

"LAND IN LAMBSTOWN, £25;"

for we familiarly know that the territory of Hardwicke went under the name of Lambstown until it was incorporated by the name of

Hardwicke on January 10, 1739.

Elisha Bisbee was last elected the representative to the General Court from Pembroke, at the spring election of 1736. He took his seat as such at Boston at the opening of the first session on the last Wednesday of May, 1736. The first session adjourned on July 6, 1736, to Sept. 8, 1736, and was further adjourned by the Proclamation of the Governor to Nov. 25, 1736, when the Legislature assembled and continued in session until on February 4, 1737, when it adjourned to the 13th April, 1737, before which time, by Proclamation from the Governor, the General Court was dissolved and the members discharged from any further attendance.

That Mr. Bisbee was active, the first session, notwithstanding he was sick of a settled consumption, is evident, inasmuch as, on the 4th day of June, 1736, he got through the House a grant to the town of Pembroke of one thousand acres of unappropriated lands of the Province for the use of that town, "the better to enable

them to keep a grammar school therein."

We would like to see a full biographical sketch of Elisha Bisbee, Esq., and some account of his genius and talents; but, doubtless, it is too late to attempt it. Numerous legal documents have we seen in his hand-writing proving his skill as a draftsman, and the records of the Courts in Plymouth, and other counties, show that he often tried causes at the bar, from which it is necessarily inferred that he had forensic skill, and was of the first class of the lawyers of the day.

We copy from the original in our possession, a letter written by him to his wife, while attending, as the representative of Pembroke, the June session, 1736, of the General Court at Boston, which shows the nature of the sickness with which he was then afflicted, and of which doubtless he died the March following:
"My Dear:

These with my love come to let you know that I hope in about ten days to see you; God willing. As to my health I can say but little about it; but am much as I was When the weather is very hot I lie by, and when the air is thick I dare not go out, but am as careful as I can. I have got on a stomach plaster again; I hope it is of some service. I shall, I think, bring you some flax and cotton wool, but they are very dear. Flax I cannot have under two shillings and five pence and take a good quantity. As to sheep's wool, don't neglect to go to John Little, Esq, claim his promise, and tell him you must have what you have occasion for, &c. Give my duty to my mother, my love to my children, sister and all friends, which, in haste, is all at present.

From your loving husband, ELISHA BISBEE.
Beston, June ye 4th, 1736. To Sarah Bisbee."

The grave-stones show that his aged mother survived Mr. Bisbee but thirty-four days. Probably her death was hastened by grief for the death of her son, in whose family she, a widow, was then living. With what affection he regarded her the letter above bears witness.

The month of August and the first week in Sept. 1755, were a sad time in Massachusetts and throughout the English Provinces in North America. Braddock's army had been utterly defeated on the 9th of July previous, and our frontier settlements for hundreds of miles were by reason of that defeat abandoned, and the inhabitants had fled eastward, losing their property; in dread of the tomahawk and scalping-knife. Indeed at that time it was seriously apprehended by some of our ablest men that the entire English settlements in North America might be subverted and extinguished by the combined efforts of the French and Indians. The victory at Lake George was hailed with great joy as a set-off to Braddock's defeat, and revived the drooping spirits of the people.

This article cannot be devoid of interest in that we thereby learn the pedigree and the home and connections of a brave soldier from Plymouth County, who fell in battle, "at the crisis of a nation's peril," and who is worthy of grateful remembrance; and we are glad that the author has mentioned his name, (although misspelled in the printing*) and so given occasion for bringing his name out from obscurity to the notice of succeeding generations dwelling in the vicinity of his birth and residence.

^{*}Mr. Ames here refers to a published account of the battle, which speaks of the wounding of one Brisbee, which should have read Bisbee.

RECORD MADE BY HOPESTILL BISBEE, Jr.

The following brief record was made by Hopestill Pisber, Jr. (21) of Rochester, Mass., and is still preserved in the tamely at well be noticed that he is not correct in all points:

"I moved from Plympton to Rochester, Mass., in 1771. My father's grandfather came from the North of England, he and his wife in their younger years, and settled in Marshfield or Scituate. They had two sons, John and Hopestill.* John had six sons and two daughters. His sons' names were John, Elijah, Aaron, Elisha, Moses and Hopestill; the names of his daughters, Martha and Mary. Hopestill was a lawyer, and called the honest lawyer. I do not know whether he had any children. My father Hopestill was born April 16th, 1702 old style, and died March 17th, 1784, Haunah his wife, daughter of Wm. Churchill of Plympton, born Oct., 23, 1707, died Oct. 26, 1797. I was born May 20, 1741."
