NO attempt has been made in this Record to carry out all lines. From Deodatus Curtis (1), only one line of descent has been followed until Eleazer Curtis (29) is reached, then, all his descendants, as far as possible, are given.

When a descendant has married and has children, this is indicated by an asterisk before the name where given under that of his parents, indicating that a more complete record will be found in the next generation.

When a descendant has married, yet has no children, all of his record will be found under that of his parents.

If our emigrant ancestor Deodatus Curtis (1), was related to others of the same name who came to America, the relationship has not been established.

There is more or less truth in tradition, but in passing it on verbally from generation to generation, the accuracy of some of the details suffers in the telling.

There is little of the data, gathered from public records, the best authority, that corroborates this tradition, probably written one hundred and forty or one hundred and forty-five years after the emigrant ancestor, Curtis, mentioned in it, landed in America, though it is safe to assume that the fundamental truths are still there.

The Tradition is supposed to have been written by Major Eleazer Curtis (22), and a copy given to each of his children. It is found in all branches of the family. In it he refers to the emigrant ancestor in such way, that it would indicate he was his gr-gr-gr-grandfather, while the data herein recorded, makes him his gr-gr-grandfather.

Some other person added the account of Major Eleazer Curtis' (22) illness and death and the names of his children. Perhaps it was Amasa, son of Milton Curtis (32), as he had a copy.

The Tradition as here given, was written by Rev. Charles D. Curtis (51), who had become interested in the history of the Curtis family, though he did not state where he obtained it. It may have been related to him by his uncle Walter Curtis (41). He began with the Tradition; the journey of the family to Ohio; the children of that family and the record of his own brothers and sisters; this was as far as he had gone with the narrative at the time of his death.



## THE CURTIS FAMILY TRADITION

Some time in the Sixteenth Century, (it was the Seventeenth Century), my great-grandfather's father, his father was a native of London, England; was a weaver by trade; was a third proprietor in the island of Barbados. Together with his two partners, he sailed to take possession of the said island, but on the voyage there arose a dispute between the three partners and the others gave Curtis a dose of poison, which would have ended his life had it not been for a sore on his heel, caused by getting an anchor in during a violent storm, which carried away three masts and caused a total wreck.

By the help of jury-masts they made land at Martha's Vineyard, where Curtis lingered a few years and died, as supposed, from the effect of the poison. He left two sons; one went to sea, the other went to Massachusetts Bay where he lived and died. He had three sons; one went to Virginia, one to Vermont and one to New York state.

The latter Curtis had four sons; the eldest, whose name was Eleazer, went to Farmington, Conn., from there to Hebron, Conn. He had a son named Eleazer, who also lived in Hebron. Further this record sayeth not.

The above was written by Eleazer Curtis, the grandson of the one that settled in Farmington, whose father's name was Eleazer. He settled in Warren, Litchfield County, Conn. He was appointed Major in 1778, the War of the Revolution, served two campaigns; the last, at Ticonderoga, where he was taken sick, went home and died of the dropsy.

He had five sons: Eleazer, Milton, Augustine, Lysandar and George Washington; also two daughters: Clarissa and Matilda or Mercy. Of these, Clarissa married Daniel Smith; Matilda married Deacon Salmon Sackett. (The end of the "Tradition".)

For a hundred and fifty years the Curtis family had been in the vanguard which was opening up the new continent. Their migrations had been from Braintree to Swansea, Mass., now Bristol, R. I.; from Swansea to Lebanon, Conn.; the part which is now Columbia; from Lebanon to Kent, Conn., now

Warren. Up to this time the immigrant had always been a son, but at Warren one generation had paused, that of Major Eleazer Curtis (22), and it was his son Eleazer (29), who was the immigrant to the new Ohio country.

Soon after the arrival of this family at Marietta, Washington County, Ohio, the Indian war broke out and they were compelled to live for five years in garrisons. As there was little money in circulation in the new country, Eleazer Curtis (29) got into debt as attested by the many notes redeemed by his sons Walter and Horace Curtis years after his death.

After the Indian war closed, the Curtis family moved on to the farm which had been purchased in the Newbury settlement, on the Ohio River near Little Hocking, Ohio; and now began the hard work of clearing the land for cultivation. Five years later occurred the irreparable pioneer tragedy—the death of the head of the family at the age of forty-two, leaving a widow and eight children, the oldest, eighteen years of age and the youngest, an infant: yet, with the true pioneer spirit they carried on and with the aid and advice of their mother, they continued their father's work. The inventory of his estate shows that it was appraised at \$2,011.35, a part of which was 256 acres of land, valued at \$1,600.00.

Thirteen years after the father's death came another break in the family, the death of the mother at the age of forty-eight. The cause of her death was evidently contagious, as her sister, Mrs. Abigail (Starr) Hoyt, who had come to help care for her, contracted the same disease and died three days after the death of her sister. Mrs. Hoyt was the widow of Benajah Hoyt, a pioneer of Hockingport, Athens County, Ohio, four miles below the place where the Curtis family had settled.

In time, Walter Curtis (41) the third son, became sole owner of the farm. He also added to it by purchase; and here he lived, and died in his ninetieth year. Five generations have lived there. The last one of the family to own it was Harry P. Curtis (128), who sold it in 1928.

After the death of Walter Curtis (41), his nephew, Rev. Charles D. Curtis (51), paid him the following tribute:

"His natural life measured the history of Ohio to the National Centennial, (he died in June 1876), and with the prominent facts in this history, during the long period, he was familiar.



"Though the schools were very inferior during his early life, and books few and difficult to procure, yet such was his desire for intellectual culture, that he accumulated a wide range of historical facts and scientific principles, and being a diligent reader, a close observer, and an acute thinker, he possessed a very reliable judgment in all matters of business. One of the elements of his intellectual strength was a remarkable memory; his ability to relate facts and incidents, especially of the early life of the state and to quote maxims and poetry illustrative of the subject under discussion, rendered his conversation particularly attractive.

"His was naturally a philosophic mind and he delighted to explain facts in nature, especially such as are of practical utility in the pursuit of agriculture, and even to the close of his long life he kept himself posted in all that pertains to human progress and reform.

"He was an ardent lover of his country and was remarkably familiar with the political history of the nation. The various administrations seemed to stand before his mind in bold relief. But he was especially familiar with and interested in the early history of Ohio, often dwelling upon its rapid growth from a small settlement at Marietta to a great and prosperous state; all within his recollection.

"In party politics he was formerly a Whig and latterly a Republican, and though very positive in his political views and preference, was always ready to denounce dishonesty in high places, in all its forms and degrees even in his own party. National morality was, in his esteem, essential to National prosperity. This high regard for public honesty rendered him deservedly popular as a public official, and during the long period which he served either as Associate Judge, or County Commissioner, or State Legislator, he left no cloud upon his fair reputation."

We are also indebted to Rev. Charles D. Curtis (51), who interviewed his uncle Walter Curtis (41), during the latter part of his life, and left a copy of the many things his uncle related, from which selections are here given which concern the family, the only account of any of the migrations.



## RECOLLECTIONS OF PIONEER LIFE

*By Honorable Walter Curtis*

I was born in the town of Warren, Litchfield County, Connecticut, September 20, 1787. On the 8th of September, 1791, my father, Eleazer Curtis, and my mother, Eunice (Starr) Curtis, with five children; Stephen Guthrie, wife and one child, with three unmarried men, viz: Truman Guthrie (brother of Stephen), Lysander Curtis (brother of Eleazer), and ( ) Tollman, started from Warren Township, Litchfield County, Connecticut. The transportation outfit consisted of two wagons, one drawn by two horses, one by four oxen.

Our destination was Marietta, Ohio. We crossed the Hudson at the town of Hudson, using poles to push our scow, which held the wagons and party. We forded the Susquehanna at (near) Carlisle, the wagons jolting over the boulders in the bottom of the river.

In Carlisle, I was placed upon a rocking-horse and was so interested with the toy that the party left me and sent back to find and bring me on the journey.

After leaving Carlisle, we upset one of the wagons and further up the mountains, we found a large rattle-snake, over which we drove our wagons to destroy it.

After a tedious journey of several weeks duration, over new and almost impassable roads, we finally reached the headwaters of the Ohio at a point on the Youghiogeny, then known as Simrell's ferry, now McKeesport.

At this place we sold the horses and one yoke of oxen with one wagon. We purchased a flatboat about fifty feet long, half-covered, in the bow of which we placed one yoke of oxen and some fat hogs. Aft, under cover, were the families and furniture. This boat was rowed by oars projecting from the inside.

As we journeyed down the river one cold day in November, we drifted in too close to the Virginia shore (now West Virginia), when a tree hanging over the bank caught one of the projecting studs, and tore a plank off and the water rushed in, when my father caught up a feather bed and stuffed it into

the hole. Stephen Guthrie cut the stock loose and knocked off a plank so they could jump into the river. The women and children were put out through a hole made in the side of the boat for dipping up water, and placed in a canoe by Lysander Curtis. Tollman, becoming frightened, jumped upon the tree and being heavily clothed, fell into the river and was drowned. The day was cloudy and cold. The boat swung around to the shore without sinking. Colonel (Ebenezer) Zane, who was below at Fort Wheeling, hearing of our distress, came up with men and took all down to the fort where every thing was done for our comfort.

Having repaired the boat, the next object was to hunt up the stock which had strayed off into the woods; this caused a delay of nearly two weeks; we all re-embarked and floated down to Marietta. (They arrived late in November.) Here we left our boat and went into the garrison on the river (Picketed Point). The winter was cold and dreary. . .

The point being flooded (March 1, 1793), my father moved to a point back on high ground, now called McKee's addition, where we lived in the cabin of William Hart. After residing two winters here, my father moved to the garrison at the foot of Blennerhassett Island, called "the lower garrison" (Goodale's garrison). My father went into a blockhouse with Major (Oliver) Rice where the people all had the smallpox. (Epidemic was in September, 1793.) Here we were all sick from the effects of what was then called inoculation; my brother Benajah never recovered fully from the effects of this sickness. Here Horace was born (August 7, 1793). . .

When the early settlers came to this country there was peace. When the Indian war broke out, they left the location where they intened to live and constructed garrisons. One of these was opposite Newbury Island—this name was given by persons from Newburyport, Massachusetts. . .

After the massacre of a family at Newbury (March 15, 1792), it was thought the frontier too extended for defense, and the one at Newbury was abandoned, the pioneers distributing themselves among the other garrisons. After the lapse of about two years, a number of young men having come from the east, it was thought best to occupy again the abandoned garrison, which the Indians, contrary to expectations, had not burned. . .

The abandoned garrison was reoccupied by several fam-

ilies; among them were those of Stephen Guthrie and Eleazer Curtis (29); Truman Guthrie was one of the "single men." These three men had farms on Newbury bottom and living in the garrison they could now work on them.

The garrison was in the form of a parallelogram, containing about an acre. It was situated on the banks of the river, the long side fronting the river. The river side was defended by high pickets, placed on the verge of the bank and leaning out. In the center was a gate and passage leading down to the river; in the corners were two blockhouses two stories high, with port-holes, enabling the occupants to sweep the fronts with their guns. The residences were one-story buildings placed in a straight line on the back of the grounds, with interstices filled with pickets.

From this enclosure the men went forth to their work in companies, with their implements and their guns. Their work was on the lands constituting the first bottom; their sentinels were on the second.

My father was custodian of ammunition. I frequently saw him distribute it, but do not know where it was obtained. (Perhaps it was here that Eleazer Curtis (29) was given the title of "captain," a courtesy title, which is on his gravestone). . . .

After the treaty of Greenville (by General Wayne, August 5, 1795), the pioneers remained in the fort until the following spring, when they went on their farms. Now commenced the hardships incident upon the settlement of a new country.

The hominy block and the handmill were the only means of crushing the grain for bread. . . . The cooking was done before the open fire of the cabin. . . . The clothes in those days were made principally of deerskin and flax. . . . The woolen cloth was made by washing and carding by hand, spinning on the big wheel and weaving in a hand loom. . . . The tables were made by splitting timber into slabs and dressing it into boards, and making these into the desired shapes. The bedsteads were made by placing low posts on the floor and laying slats from these to a crack in the side of the cabin. A board, placed upon pins in the logs, was the receptacle for the pewter dishes and wooden trenchers. The gun was hung upon hooks fastened to the wall. The floor was of puncheon or boards and was destitute of carpet.

The shoes were made by placing the foot upon a rawhide,

with the hair side up, when, the skin was cut round and the sides gathered upon the instep and secured by a thong; these were brogues. The mocassin was made of dressed deerskin and a beautiful covering for the foot, but unfit to wear except in the forest.

Amid these privations there was much social enjoyment. During the garrison life, parties went in canoes from one to the other, and amused themselves by dance and song. The repasts were of wild turkey, deer and bear. . .

Eleazer Curtis (29) came down to the farm (from Newbury garrison), in the spring (1796), for the purpose of making sugar (maple). He built his cabin at the east end of where the residence now stands. He moved (the family) down in the same spring. It was not then certain that the Indian war was over.

He built his house in 1798. (This was) the second house (one built near the river by Bull brothers, of whom Curtis purchased, was the first), was eighteen feet wide and twenty-four feet long, was made of poplar logs which were hewn after the building was put up. It was two stories high, three windows of twelve lights, eight by ten glass, in the front of the upper story and two in the lower. The chimney was of brick and in the west end. The door was at the east end and opened into a hall, and the stairs near the door. The upper story was divided into two rooms. This was one of the best houses in the settlement. It was chinked with stone and pointed with lime mortar. Here the family lived happily as in a palace. . .

The old farm was cleared up as best they could. The logs rolled up with a long chain and yoke of oxen; these were of great use and value to the family. They were turned out at night and driven over to Mustapha Island where they pastured; they became so accustomed to this that finally, they went voluntarily and were found there in the morning and driven back. This saved the time and trouble of hunting for them in the forest. . .

About the year 1798, my father was clearing land back of the hill. I was sent to the spring near by for drinking water; while dipping up water, I heard an animal walking in the woods, looking up, I saw a beautiful bay mare going towards the east. I ran and told my father, who went across the hill and caught her; this was the first horse owned in

Newbury. Two or three days later she disappeared and could not be found, until one day she was discovered in Truman Guthrie's cave, having fallen in and could not get out. About two years after, she swam the Ohio River and was taken up on Hughes River in Virginia (West Virginia), and brought back to Newbury. The mare had undoubtedly been stolen by Indians near Clarksburg (West Virginia), taken out near Chillicothe (Ohio), and was endeavoring to reach her old home. It was one of the remarkable cases of animal instinct, when we remember that Ohio was at that time a vast wilderness.

*Sickly Season, 1801*

There was a large pond on the Joel Oakes farm (in Newbury); around this was a thrifty growth of trees. These were felled into the pond, and during the warm summer, bred a miasma that prostrated the whole neighborhood with bilious fever. Mr. Isaac Morse, who was a Revolutionary soldier and had built a cabin on the hill back of the Curtis farm, made himself especially useful to the Curtis family, by nursing the sick and bringing pure water from the spring near his cabin. He washed the infected clothes. Eleazer Curtis (29) died the first of September. His physician laughed at his remark that he should die, which was made as he walked the floor looking at his purpling nails. He died at the age of forty-two years. . .

Our grandfather and mother were members of the Congregational Church and entertained the minister. They maintained family worship. (This doubtless refers to Major Eleazer Curtis (22), Warren, Conn.)

Joseph Guthrie made the tombstones for our grandfather, Major Eleazer Curtis (22), which were displaced by the modern marble. (This was in the Warren, Conn., cemetery. Joseph Guthrie, of Litchfield County, Conn., and Athens County, Ohio, was the grandfather of Almira Guthrie, the wife of Walter Curtis (41); he was also the father of Truman and Stephen Guthrie, members of the party from Connecticut to Ohio.)





## FIRST GENERATION

1. DEODATUS CURTIS<sup>1</sup>, supposed founder of this branch of the family in America, left England in 1639 or 1640. The following are the records found of him:

“Deodatus Curtis, planter, Braintree, bought land in 1640.”

—Ref.: *Pioneers of Massachusetts*. Pope.

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“Thomas Brownell of Mount Wallaston als Braintree Planter, sells to Deodatus Curtis of Braintree, aforesaid planter, for £38 One house and one garden and six acres of arable land in Braintree aforesaid parcel of the lands heretofore of Edward Raynsford of Boston with the appurtenances to him and his heirs forever.

“Thomas Brownell is to Deliver unto the said Deodatus soe many feet of planke & board as will make up the boards in the house 1000 foot presently—lying foure foot square to the said house. The land is bounded on the common on the west part (,) on the land of goodman Best on the east (,) on the lands of goodman Dawson on the north (,) and on the lands of Nathaniel (blank) on the south.”

—Ref.: *Thomas Lechford's Notebook*.

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In 1645, twenty families, most of them of the Church of Braintree, petitioned the Court to begin a plantation at Shawomet.

Deodatus Curtis was one of the petitioners.

“4th 10 mo. 1651. The sale of Dudatus (sic) Curtises land sold to Thomas Barritt.

“This day Martin Sanders & ffrancis Eliot made acknowledgement of the Sale of the Land which was lately Goodman Curtises which he sold to sd. Martin Sanders and ffrancis Eliot which the sd. Martin Sanders & ffrancis Eliot have sold now to Thomas Barrit being seven acres more or less lying next to Thomas Burt on the West side & next the common

one (sic) the south side & next Barnabas Derrifall of the north side & next Nathaniel Herman one the east side & in the presence of these men the sd. Martin Sanders & ffrancis Eliot doe acknowledge ourselves fully satisfied by the sd. Thomas Barrit & in witness hereof the sd. Martin Sanders & ffrancis Eliot have set our hands."

No record found of the sale to Martin Sanders.

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DEODATUS CURTIS<sup>1</sup>, married Rebecca (        ). No record found. Children, born at Braintree, Mass., taken from the Vital Records:

\*2 Solomon Curtis<sup>2</sup>, son of Deodatus Curtis and his wife Rebackah, born, 8th June, 1643.

3 Ruth Curtis, the Darter of Deodatus Curtis and his wife Rebeckah, was born 8-11-1647.

The date of the landing in New England of Deodatus Curtis, supposed to be the emigrant ancestor of this branch of the family, as he is the first of whom we have record, was not found, nor did a genealogist in London, England, find any record of him by searching Kent County wills from 1630 to 1650. According to the family tradition the emigrant ancestor came from Kent County.

Referring to the "Bill of Goods belonging to Deodatus Curtis," ref.: Solomon Curtis (2), he may have left England in 1639 and was on the island of Barbados, July 20th of that year.

Another supposition is, that Nathaniel Long acted as his agent in Barbados in 1639, and Deodatus Curtis, arrived in 1641, as "barbing you and carriage for you" would indicate his presence.

Or, he may have been carried out of his way and landed on Martha's Vineyard, as the tradition states, though proof has not been found. This may account for his presence in Braintree, where he purchased property in 1640.

Then, in 1641, he may have sailed for Barbados to look after his plantation there. In time he returned to Braintree, where two children were born to Deodatus Curtis (1) and Rebecca, his wife, 1643 and 1647.

Or, he may never have been on the island and Nathaniel Long acted as his agent there. It is all conjecture.

His affairs in Barbados were not settled until 1690, forty-nine years after the last date in the "Bill of Goods," when his son Solomon Curtis (2), then living at Swansea, Mass., now Bristol, R. I., obtained depositions to prove he was the son of Deodatus Curtis (1), in order to obtain the 'goods' in Barbados. Ref., Solomon Curtis<sup>2</sup>.

Barbados was settled in 1625. This was a period of great unrest in England and many colonists emigrated to the island about 1630.

Curtis had interests there fourteen years after the first settlement.

There is a book, "The History of the Island of Barbados," in the Cincinnati, Ohio, Public Library, by Richard Ligon, 1673, who visited the island in 1647. This contains a map of the island showing the plantations and the names of the proprietors; two plantations are owned by Curtises, but, unfortunately for us, only the surname is given.

As has previously been stated, the marriage record of Deodatus Curtis (1) and Rebecca ( ) was not found, nor is his death recorded in the Braintree V. R. He probably died in 1647 or '48 as—"Joseph Arnold and Rebecca Curtis m. 8 June, 1648," and, "Rebecca Arnold, wife of Joseph Arnold, d. 14 August, 1693."—Braintree V. R.

In "Pioneers of Massachusetts," Pope states that "Rebecca Curtis (widow?) m. June, 1648, Joseph Arnold." The interrogation mark indicates Pope was in doubt about her being a widow.

"The Genealogical Dictionary of First New England Settlers," has this: "correction: that she was a sister of Theophilus Curtis," who was a son of Henry and Jane Curtis of Braintree, yet no Rebecca in this family is recorded in Braintree V. R., so Pope was probably right that Rebecca Curtis was a widow.

"The last child recorded to Deodatus and Rebecca Curtis, in the Braintree V. R. was Ruth, b. 8, 11, 1647. This entry appears in the record after that of 'Willom', the first child of Joseph and Rebecca Arnold, and immediately preceding that of 'Joseph', another son. It looks as if Joseph Arnold had recorded the birth of a five-year old stepdaughter." Ref.: Boston Transcript, Genea. Dept., 9-7-1926.

Another son of the Arnolds was "John, b. 6, 29, 1655."  
Proof that Rebecca Curtis who married Joseph Arnold, was  
the widow of Deodatus Curtis, and that the above named  
John Arnold and Solomon Curtis were half brothers, will be  
found in the deed for land at Bristol. Ref.: Solomon Curtis<sup>2</sup>.

## SECOND GENERATION

2. SOLOMON CURTIS<sup>2</sup>, b. at Braintree, Mass, June 8, 1643; d. at Bristol, or Barrington, Mass. (now R. I.), April 20, 1712, ae. 69 yrs. He m. at Braintree, "4m., 11d., 1673," PRUDENCE GATLIVE, who d. at Bristol, Nov. 10, 1727, ae. 76 yrs., dau. of Thomas and Prudence ( ) Gatlive.

The birth of Solomon Curtis<sup>2</sup> is the first entry under births in Braintree Vital Records. He and his wife were buried at New-meadow Neck, Barrington, R. I. Ref.: N. E. Register, v. 48, p. 443.

About 1681, Solomon Curtis (2) and family removed from Braintree to Swansea (now Bristol, R. I.), Mount Hope Neck, then in the Massachusetts colony, where his name appears in the list of those attending the first Town Meeting, September 1, 1681.

Mount Hope was where King Philip had lived. The country was open for settlement when the Indians were driven from that locality after King Philip's War.

Solomon Curtis (2) was surveyor of highways, Swansea, 1683-1703; took the oath of fidelity to be "loyal to our Lord King Charles," May 21, 1684.

Bk. 1, p. 106, Bristol Co., Mass. Deeds, Taunton:

Whereas divers Variances . . . had moved . . . between Mr. John Saffin & Sollomon Curtis both of Bristol in New Eng'd respecting ye bounds between ye Meadow Lands of ye Mr. John Saffin & ye uplands of sd. Sollomon Curtis on Mount Hope Neck where ye sd. Sollomon Curtis Dwells . . . ye sd parties by their mutual . . . consent have . . . bound each to other by obligations bearing Date ye eight Day of September 1690 in ye sum of one hundred pounds . . . to . . . keep ye award . . . and judgment of us (viz.) John Woodcock William Carpenter & Sam'l Bullock of Rehoboth & Caleb Eddy of Swanzey . . . for ye full ending of sd Differences . . . Doe now make . . . this . . . award . . . in manner and forme following (viz't) from a stake set by us in ye meadow between ye bounds of . . . sd Mr. Saffin & William Howard & from thence to a dry white oak markt & from thence to a green horbine

markt . . . until it come to a Spring or Cove . . . to a stake  
neare . . . Mr. Nathan'l Paines line . . . this sixteenth Day of  
September Anno Dom one Thousand six Hundred & Ninety.

The following bill of goods and depositions are concerning  
Deodatus and Rebecca Curtis and their son Solomon<sup>2</sup>. The  
bill of goods corroborates the family tradition that the emi-  
grant Curtis sailed from England for Barbados or had inter-  
ests there. Just why nearly 50 years elapsed before anything  
was done about the property in Barbados remains a mystery.

Barbados, July 20<sup>th</sup> 1639

Does not this deed give us sufficient reason to believe that Rebecca, widow of Deodatus Curtis (1), did marry Joseph Arnold? That Solomon Curtis (2), b. at Braintree, Mass., 8th June, 1643, one of the grantees was her son by her first husband and John Arnold, b. at Braintree 29, 2, 1655, the other grantee was her son by her second husband and the two "brothers" purchased the land on Mount Hope Neck?

"Martha, third wife of Solomon Curtis, d. June 1, 1763." Ref.: Lebanon, V. R. (Abigail was probably the mother of all his children.)

About 1719, Solomon Curtis (7), and family removed from Swansea (now Bristol, R. I.), to Lebanon, Conn. (now Columbia), where they were pioneers. Here Abigail, wife of Solomon Curtis, joined the church in 1727.

June 4, 1719, "Solomon Curtis and Joshua Phiney, both of the town of Swansea, Bristol Co., province of Massachusetts Bay," purchased 205 acres, "lying partly in the township of Lebanon and partly in the township of Hebron." Ref.: Lebanon deeds.

Solomon Curtis (7), purchased and sold other tracts of land in that vicinity as late as 1750.

The estate of this grandson was divided into eight parts and settlement made Aug. 2, 1771, to the heirs of Solomon Curtis (7), viz: To "Deodatus Curtis (14), ye eldest

son two parts or double portion; one part each to Eleazer Curtis (15); to Mary (16), wife of Linsford Mory; to heirs of Nathaniel Curtis (18) dec'd.; to Prudence Curtis (20); to James Sims<sup>5</sup>; to Simeon Curtis (19)."

R.; that of Simeon is reckoned from the date of his death, "1779, ae. 58").

He may have died in youth.) Simeon Curtis<sup>5</sup> (1746-1805), (Simeon<sup>4</sup>), was a private in a company of militia under Capt. He m. at Lebanon, Conn., Sept. 23, 1735, MARY DUNHAM, b. (abt.) 1715, "at Hebron, Conn.," (as her son Eleazer (22) stated in Warren V. R. on recording her death but did not give date of her birth); d. at Warren, April 10, 1788. She is supposed to have been the dau. of Elisha Dunham of Mansfield, Conn.

He purchased land in Lebanon, June 12, 1732, which he sold Aug. 15, 1747. Between 1740 and '50 he removed his family to Kent (now Warren), Conn., where the first settlement was made in 1737. He and Lemuel Taylor had purchased land together in the new town of Kent. An exchange of land by deed was made, Curtis exchanging other land for Taylor's share in the Kent property. At that time they were both of Kent. This deed was acknowledged by Taylor at Lebanon, May 2, and recorded June 27, 1748. "Mary, wife of Eleazer Curtis, joined the church (at Warren) by letter from Lebanon, Jan. 2, 1757," soon after its organization.

Some genealogists claim that Mary Dunham was a dau. of Daniel Dunham<sup>3</sup>; (Jonathan<sup>2</sup>; John<sup>1</sup>. Descendants of Eleazer and Mary (Dunham) Curtis at Warren, Conn., claim she was a dau. of Elisha Dunham.)

He m. at Warren, Feb. 7, 1759, MARY CARTER, b. at Hebron, Conn., April 14, 1739; d. at Warren, Oct. 2, 1805, daughter of Thomas and Sarah (Gilbert) Carter. She m. (2), April 2, 1789, JOHN BROWNSON of Warren, who d. April 2, 1813.

The following inscriptions are taken from the gravestones of Eleazer Curtis (22) and Mary Carter, his wife, in Warren cemetery:

Maj'r Eleazer Curtis  
Who deceas'd Oct. 1, A. D., 1788  
in the 52d yr. of his age

Eleazer Curtis (22) owned and lived on the farm at Warren which is still known as "Above all," because it is situated on the level top of a high hill. There is a well in the garden which is said to have been dug by him.

He joined the church at Warren by profession, March 20, 1764. In 1770, the Assembly established "Eleazer Curtis, Jr.," ensign of Second company or train band in the town of Kent; member of a committee protesting against shipment of goods from Europe, 1771; established lieutenant of train band, Kent, 1771; received donations for poor of Boston,

1774; authorized by Jonathan Trumbull, Governor of the Colony of Conn., to raise a company of one hundred men for the defense of the Colony, 1 May, 1775; Deputy from Kent 1779-80; chosen clerk at first town meeting 27 June, 1786, when it was set off from E. Greenwich. At his request the new town was named for Gen. Joseph Warren who fell at Bunker Hill; surveyor of highways also tithing man, 1787; delegate from Warren to Convention at Hartford, Jan. 1, 1788, which ratified the Constitution of the United States where he voted "aye." Ref.: Hollister's History of Connecticut, vol. 2, p. 613.

Eleazer Curtis's (22) Revolutionary War service taken from the records, Adjutant General's Office, Hartford, Conn.:

"Connecticut Men in the Revolution," p. 61. Continental Regiments, 1775. 7th Company Captain Eleazer Curtis, Jr., of Kent, Commissioned May 1, 1775. Discharged, Dec. 1775; in Fourth Regiment, Colonel Benjamin Hinman, which was raised on the first call of troops, April-May, 1775 and recruited mainly in Litchfield County. Upon the surprise of Fort Ticonderoga, May 10, 1775, Governor Trumbull ordered this regiment to march as soon as possible to secure that post and Crown Point against recapture. The regiment reached Ticonderoga in June and took part in the operations of the Northern Department until expiration term of service, Dec. 1775. Regiment suffered much from sickness. On p. 537, same book, appears the following: Colonel Enos' Regiment. On the Hudson, 1778. Major Eleazer Curtis, Jr., appointed for said regiment.

Eleazer Curtis (22), took part in the battle of Danbury, Conn., and caught General Wooster, as he fell from his horse, after he was wounded. (Family tradition.)

Will of Eleazer Curtis (22).

Heirs named in the will:

To wife Mercy (Mary), all household goods except desk; the use of part of the house and some livestock; the use of all this as long as she remains a widow; son Milton to provide for her in sickness and health during her widowhood, he to have the use of her third and stock; sons Eleazer and Augustine having received their share of the estate in land, by deed, gave each five shillings; son Lysander, land and half of farming tools, he to pay Clarissa £13 when she comes to age of eighteen years; to son Milton, land and half of farming tools,

livestock and desk, he to pay Clarissa £4 when she comes to the age of eighteen yrs.; Milton appointed executor. Dau. Marsey Matilda having received her portion, gave her ten shillings; dau. Clarissa to receive £40, to be paid in such things as she may want when she comes of age, to be paid by her brothers Eleazer, Augustine, Lysander and Milton; to son George Washington (a minor), land, he to go to trade at fourteen years of age and Eleazer (29), was appointed his guardian. There were three Eleazer Curtises living in Warren during the Revolution, viz: father, son and grandson; this has caused some confusion. They were Eleazer Curtis (15), the father too old for service; his son, Major Eleazer Curtis (22), who is entered on the rolls as "Eleazer Curtis, Jr.," and the grandson Eleazer Curtis (29), entered on the rolls simply as "Eleazer Curtis."

Donations for the Poor of Boston:

This was occasioned by the Boston Port Bill, passed by Parliament, closing the port of Boston, which caused much hardship "as a large share of the people depended in one form or another upon the trade of the place for employment. This brought bankruptcy and ruin upon men of business and suffering upon the laboring poor." Ref.: Charles Hudson's History of Lexington, Mass., vol. 2, p. 107.

When Eleazer Curtis (29) removed to Ohio, Silas Curtis (28) was appointed guardian of George Washington Curtis (38).

After the death of Major Eleazer Curtis (22), his sword and powderhorn became the property of the eldest son, Eleazer Curtis (29); they were taken to Ohio. Their present whereabouts mentioned elsewhere. (See Nos. 137 and 405.)

29. ELEAZER CURTIS, 3d<sup>6</sup>, b. at Warren, Litchfield Co., Conn., Oct. 20, 1759; d. in the Newbury settlement near Little Hocking, Washington Co., Ohio, Sept. 7, 1801. He m. in Fairfield Co., Conn., Nov. 7, 1782, EUNICE STARR, of Ridgefield, Conn., b. Aug. 15, 1766; d. in the Newbury settlement, May 6, 1814, dau. of Samuel and Ann ( ) Starr. They were married by the Rev. Samuel Camp, pastor of the Second Congregational Church, Ridgebury, Conn.; on the same day her sister Hannah Starr was married to Eleazer Taylor of Danbury. (Ref.: Early Connecticut Marriages, Bailey.)

Eleazer Curtis (29), subscribed £12 to the church at Warren, 1790.

Eleazer and Eunice (Starr) Curtis with five children, left Warren, Sept. 8, 1791, for Marietta, Washington Co., Ohio. An account of the journey will be found in "Recollections of Pioneer Life," by their son Walter Curtis (41).

He died intestate: Oct. 7, 1802, Mrs. Eunice Curtis came before the C. C. Pleas (now Probate), and "prayed and prayed that the administration of the estate of Eleazer Curtis, late of Belpre tp. (Washington Co., Ohio), might be committed unto her."

The estate was appraised at \$2011.25. There were 256 acres of land valued at \$1600.00. It must be remembered that this family had been but ten years in this new country, five of which had been spent in garrisons, as the Indians were hostile, and to have acquired that much property in a few years, shows industry. The farm had to be cleared of a heavy growth of timber, the Ohio River bottom land being covered with large sugar maples.

The first burial in the Newbury cemetery, was that of Mrs. Eunice (Starr) Curtis. Her husband and infant daughter had been buried, with other pioneers, near the river bank, a short distance above the garrison; in 1825 they were transferred to lie with the wife and mother. The inscription on Eleazer Curtis's (29) gravestone is: "Captain Eleazer Curtis."

The title was probably one of courtesy, given him in the Indian war.

Eleazer Curtis (29) was one of Washington's soldiers at Valley Forge, 1777-78.

His Revolutionary War service taken from the records, Adjutant General's Office, Hartford, Conn.:

"Connecticut Men in the Revolution," p. 49; Eleazer Curtis, private, enlisted May 4, 1775. Discharged, Dec. 18, 1775, Captain Noadiah Hooker's Company (officers of this company from Farmington and Bristol). In Seventh Regiment, Connecticut Line, Colonel Heman Swift, which fought at Germantown, Oct. 4, 1777, and suffered some loss. Wintered at Valley Forge, 1777-78, and on June 28 following present at battle of Monmouth. P. 467: Eleazer Curtis, private, discharged, September 4, 1776, probably marched August 12, 1776, in Captain Joseph Carter's Company, in the Thirteenth Regiment of Militia, at New York, in 1776. P. 501: Sergeant Eleazer Curtis. Time of marching, March 30, 1777. Discharged, May 16, 1777, in Captain James Stoddard's Company, Colonel Noadiah Hooker's regiment.

39. ELEAZER STARR CURTIS<sup>7</sup>, b. at Warren, Conn., Sept. 13, 1783; d. near Hockingport, Athens Co., Ohio, Aug. 3, 1856. He m. in Washington Co., Ohio, June 24, 1812, ESTHER KNOWLES, a sister of the husband of his sister Clarissa (45), b. in Cape May Co., N. J., May 9, 1785; d. near Hockingport, Oct. 4, 1857, dau. of James and Martha (Smith) Knowles. The Knowles family was originally of Haddam, Conn. James Knowles' Revolutionary War Record: He was an artillery artificer. Eleazer Starr Curtis (39) and wife are buried at Hockingport.

For a few years after his marriage, they resided on the home farm in the Newbury Settlement, Washington Co., Ohio. Between 1817-20 he purchased a farm on the Big Hocking River, near Hockingport; here he lived and died. While living in the Newbury garrison, then a lad of eleven or twelve years of age, he took his turn standing guard on a big stump, while the men worked.

In 1810 he had taken a boat load of produce to New Orleans, La., where they arrived April 20th. He wrote his brother Walter (41), that they had found a very bad market and after sending some money home to be paid to different persons," he would have but twenty dollars left, to get from this Soddom. He had the opportunity to ship on a vessel to Pensacola, Fla. When he returned he would start for home where I shall stay very content."

Fitted for college at the Ohio University, Athens, and was graduated from Marietta College, at Marietta, Ohio, in 1849. He studied Theology at Lane Seminary, Cincinnati, and was graduated in 1855. From 1855 to 1859, he taught the High School at Avondale, Ohio. From 1859 to 1866, he ministered to the Congregational church at Belpre, Ohio, and the Presbyterian church at Constitution, Ohio. He was President of Farmer's (later Belmont) College, College Hill, Ohio, from 1866 to 1872. From that date he made his home at the old homestead near Hockingport. From 1878, until his death, he ministered to the church at New Matamoras, where there is a tablet to his memory.

Curtis (40) and wife are buried at Marietta.

Major John Clark, b. at Quincy, Mass., in 1767. In 1791, with wife and one child he removed to Westmoreland Co., Pa.; then to Marietta in April 1796; he was major of militia; sheriff of Washington Co., Ohio, 1803-10; high sheriff and

served subpoenas on witnesses summoned to the Aaron Burr trial.

Jason R. Curtis (40), opened a hat store in Marietta in July 1808, the first manufacturer and tradesman in this line of business in the town, continuing in the business until 1825. In 1818 he associated in partnership with James Dunn, for whom he named a son.

His War of 1812 service: He was aid-de-camp of Governor R. J. Meigs of Ohio, with rank of captain. The following is evidence of his loyalty when all were not loyal, as given by his son William F. Curtis (54):

"Marietta, Nov. 12, 1812.

Exchange \$252.00.

Sir, at ten days sight of this my second of exchange, first of same date and tenor unpaid. Pay to Jason R. Curtis, or order Two Hundred and Fifty-two dollars, it being for services as Aid-De-Camp to me (in organizing the First Army of Ohio in the service of the United States) from the 10th of April 1812 to the July following.

Signed, R. J. Meigs, Governor of Ohio.

Secretary of War."

41. WALTER CURTIS<sup>7</sup>, b. at Warren, Conn., Sept. 20, 1787; d. in the Newbury settlement, near Little Hocking, Washington Co., Ohio, June 27, 1876, in his 90th yr. He m. in Washington Co., Ohio, Feb. 3, 1819, ALMIRA GUTHRIE, b. in the Newbury settlement, Dec. 12, 1800; d. there May 13, 1880, dau. of Stephen and Sally (Chappell) Guthrie. The date on his gravestone that he "came to Ohio in 1792," is incorrect. He and his wife are buried at Newbury. The Eleazer Curtis (29) and the Stephen Guthrie families came together from Litchfield Co., Conn., to Washington Co., Ohio, in 1791 and settled on adjoining farms in the Newbury settlement. An account of the journey will be found in Walter Curtis's "Recollections of Pioneer Life."

Walter Curtis (41), purchased his father's farm from the other heirs and added to it by purchase; one eight-acre lot was drawn in the name of Alexander Hamilton. Here he lived and died. He erected a substantial brick house in 1827-28, just west of the original log house, all the material being made upon the premises; native yellow pine was used for the woodwork and lime for plaster was obtained by burning mussel shells gathered on Mustapha island, near by in the Ohio river. Mrs. Curtis boarded the workmen and at the same time wove fifty-seven yards of linen sheeting, made and sold one-hundred and fifty pounds of cheese, besides what was consumed by the family of twelve.

Walter and his bro. Horace Curtis (44), were partners in the keel-boat business, carrying freight between Pittsburgh, Pa., Charleston, Va. (now W. Va.), and Cincinnati, Ohio. Walter Curtis was at Kanawha Salt Works, near Charleston, Va. (now W. Va.), when apprised by a friend of the family, of his mother's death, also that of her sister, Mrs. Abigail (Starr) Hoyt. They had died of a contagious illness; both were dead and buried before he received the notice.

He often walked home from Louisville, Ky., after disposing of the boat as well as the cargo of produce. He was associate judge 1824-37; representative in the state legislature 1837-38; county commissioner and justice of the peace.

She m. in Washington Co., Ohio, Nov. 17, 1816, DR. COLUMBUS BIERCE, b. at Cornwall, Conn., March 8, 1791; d. at Circleville, Ohio, April 4, 1844, son of William and Abigail (Bell) Bierce. Both are buried at Circleville.

Mrs. Mary (Curtis) Bierce (42), was always called "Aunt Bierce," by her relatives. She reared her niece, Lucy Knowles (88), after the death of her mother.

Columbus Bierce was graduated from the New York Medical College in 1816. He decided to return to the "Ohio Country," to practice his profession. He had previously visited there, having taught school in Newbury, near Little Hocking, Ohio, and was intimately acquainted with the Eleazer Curtis (29) family, subsequently marrying one of the daughters. He located at Athens, Ohio, where he practiced medicine for twenty-six years, then retired and removed to Circleville, Ohio, in 1843, where his son resided. He was a member, also the secretary and the "Censor on Chemistry," of the "Medical Society of the third District of Ohio," which examined "Candidates for the practice of Physics and Surgery in Ohio," October 9, 1817. He was elected councilman of Athens, March 5, 1827, and the council elected him its president.

(2), Dr. Athler of Wilkesville, Ohio. Benajah Curtis and his first wife are buried at Gallipolis.

Benajah Curtis (43), first located in business in Marietta, removed to Gallipolis the latter part of 1814. Here he served as sheriff of Gallia Co., 1826-27; he was appointed postmaster at Gallipolis, June 5, 1841, and held other offices there. His will was presented for probate March 22, 1850, drawn Nov. 8, 1845, in which his wife was made sole executrix. The estate consisted of a farm in Jackson Co., Ohio, and property in Gallipolis.

HORACE CURTIS<sup>7</sup>, b. in Goodale's garrison, Belpre Tp., Washington Co., Ohio, Aug. 7, 1793; d. at Little Hocking, Ohio, Dec. 25, 1871. He m. in Washington Co., Feb. 7, 1819, LYDIA COLE, b. near Rochester, N. Y., Jan. 1, 1796; d. at Little Hocking, April 5, 1863, dau. of John and Lydia (Townsend) Cole. They are buried in the Newbury cemetery, near Little Hocking.

The John Cole family came to Little Hocking about 1816.

Horace Curtis (44), was the first of the Eleazer Curtis (29) family born in Ohio. He was postmaster at Little Hocking almost 50 yrs.; also kept a general store. He wrote the following sketch of his life. The house he purchased was built by Nathaniel Sawyer about 1798, and is in excellent condition today:

"I, Horace Curtis, was born August 7, 1793, in Belpre garrison, nearly opposite the foot of Blennerhassett's island, in Major Goodall's house. He was taken prisoner by the Indians in March (1793) before my parents moved to Newbury.

"My father died in Sept. 1801, my mother in May 1814. My sisters and self lived in the homestead till the spring of 1816, when I built a keel boat and went on the river; my first trip was from Blennerhassett's island to Pittsburgh, Pa., with a load of corn for which I got 33 $\frac{1}{3}$  cts. per bu. for carrying it. Continued in this business for six years.

"In 1820 I bought the property at Little Hocking; I moved there 7th of March 1825, where I have lived 47 years.

"I have gone three times in my younger days from Newbury to Devol's mill, five miles up the Muskingum river. My first trip was with my brother Walter. The first night we slept under a large sycamore tree on the Ohio side, about opposite the middle of Hutchinson's island. I made two other trips to the same mill, one in a pirogue, the worst rogue in the world. The last trip I made in a keel boat and was absent from home ten days. I have gone a number of times to Bingham's mill on Federal creek, a distance of 22 miles by water." This mill was in Athens County, Ohio.

The following account of the life of Wm. F. Curtis is taken from a local newspaper, written at the time of his death:

"Wm. F. Curtis, shortly after the death of his father, went to Little Hocking, Ohio, and entered into the employ of his uncle, Horace Curtis, a merchant in that place, and remained there as clerk several years. Returned to Marietta and entered in the mercantile business with the late Col. John Mills, including the business of transporting produce down the Ohio, and Mississippi rivers. Then continued the business by himself. During this time he was an instigator of, and procured the charter for the First National Bank of Marietta and was the first cashier of the institution. Later he and John Newton, organized the Union Bank. From 1864 to 1866 Mr. Curtis represented the Fourteenth Ohio District in the State Legislature, and originated the bill which established the Children's Homes in different counties in Ohio. He was Treasurer of the Washington County Monument Association for many years and by his excellent investments as Treasurer, was largely instrumental in procuring the erection of the Soldier's monument in the City Park. He was a member of the City Council.

"Before the days of the National Bank he acted as a banker for a large number of trading men up and down both sides of the Ohio River and never lost a cent by reason of the trust imposed in his fellow men."

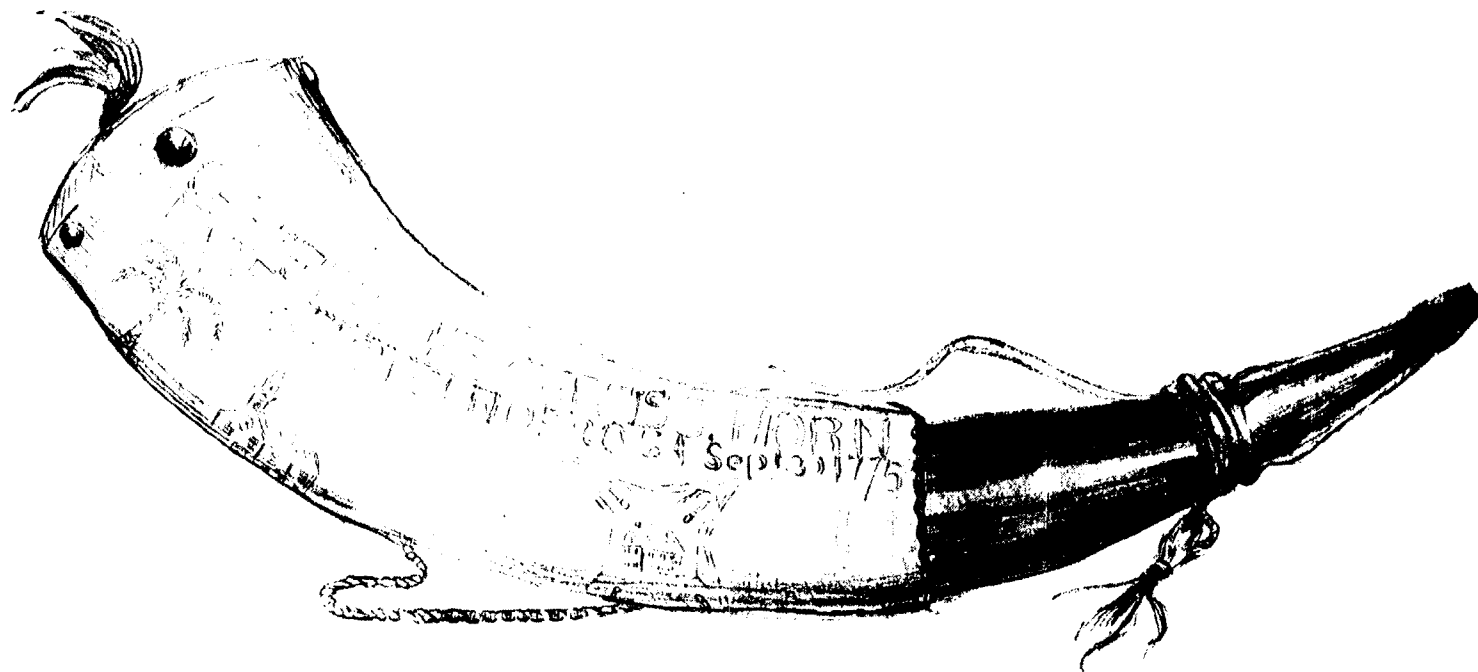

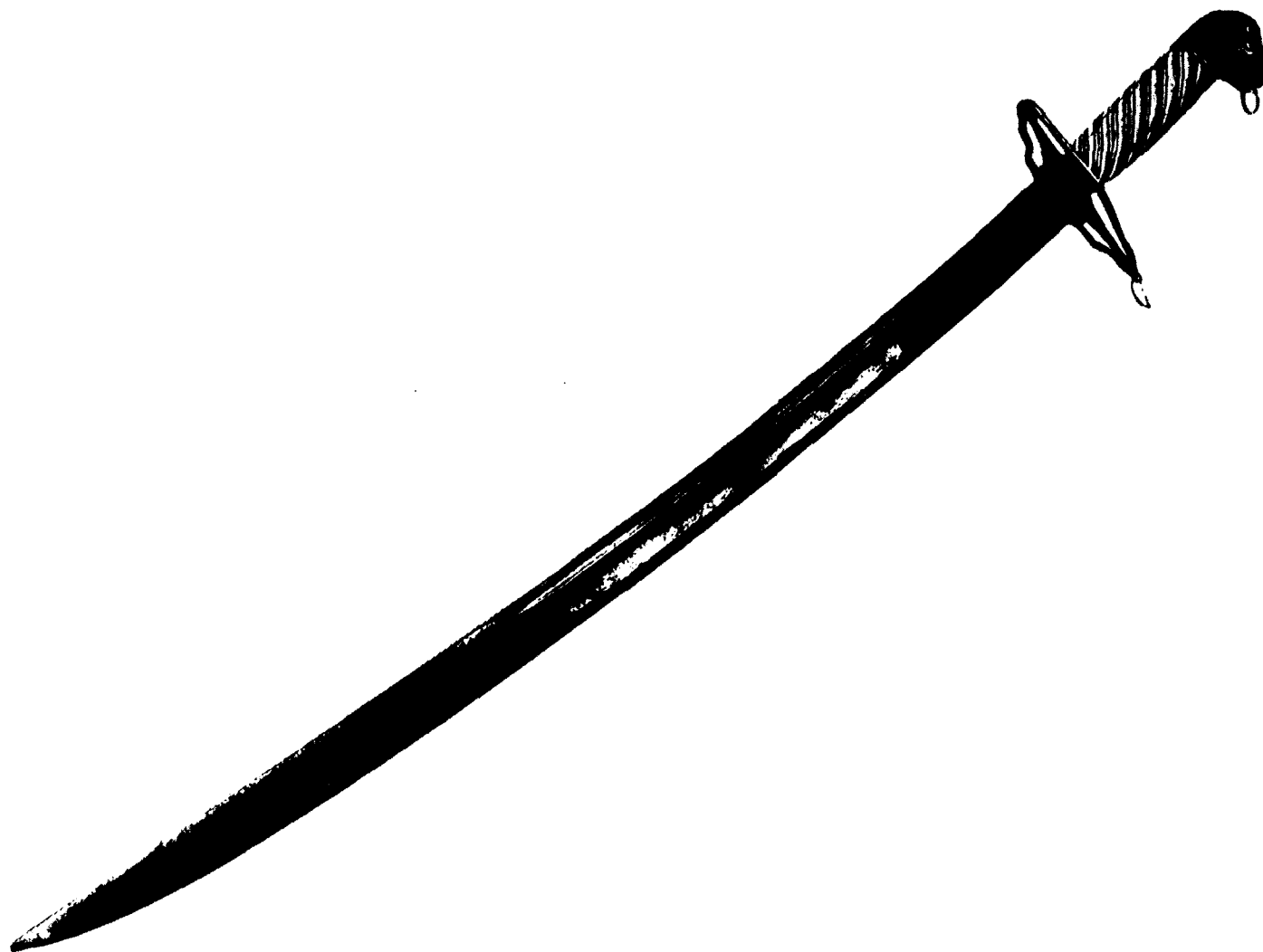

Do for myself my Heirs executors & Administrators Covenant with the sd Eleazer Curtis 3d his Heirs & asigene that at & untill the ensealing of this presents I am well Seized of the premises as a good indefeasible estate in fee simple & have good right to sell the same or dispose of it in manner & form as is above written & that the same is free from all incumbrances whatsoever—And furthermore I the sd Eleazer Curtis jun Do by these presents bind myself & my Heirs forever to Warrent & Defend the above given & granted premises to him the sd Eleazer Curtis 3d his heirs and assigns against all Claims & Demands whatsoever in witness Whereof I have hereunto set my hand & seal this 27th Day of March in the year of our Lord one thousand seven hundred & Eighty two.

Mrs. Stephen Guthrie was Sallie Chappell (1770-1818), dau. of Capt. Amos and Sarah (Slosson) Chappell, his wife; she was born in Sharon, Conn.; died in the Newbury settlement, Washington County, Ohio. Their oldest child was Laura Matilda Guthrie, b. at Litchfield, Conn., June 25, 1789; d. at Pomeroy, Ohio, Oct. 1, 1875; she m. Amos Dunham. She was the "child" who accompanied her parents from Connecticut to Ohio in 1791.

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30. The Homer Curtis family removed from Warren, Conn., to Waverly, Ill., in 1837; they traveled across country to Pittsburgh, Penn.; then by steamboat down the Ohio and up the Mississippi rivers to Alton, Ill. Here their goods were stored in a warehouse in which was the printing press of Elijah Parish Lovejoy—abolitionist. When he was killed by the mob attacking the building, his blood stained the Curtis possessions.

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257. CAPTAIN HENRY STARR CURTIS, was decorated with the Soldier's Medal for heroism, May 30, 1945, at Huntsville Arsenal, Huntsville, Ala.

Ref.: "The Patriot," the camp newspaper May, 1945. The act: "On Sept. 4, 1944, during a plant accident that fatally injured a fellow officer and seriously injured a civilian superintendent, Captain Curtis retrieved a fallen gas line plug, replaced it in the line, stopping further gas escape. Capt. Curtis was a half mile from the plant when the alarm sounded, and arriving on the scene he realized action must be taken and voluntarily chose himself. During repair operations the plug had been removed from the line by mistake and had fallen into a storage pit filled with high concentration of deadly phosgen; he knew the concentration in the pit was greater than the capacity resistance of his gas mask. Also: Captain Curtis has twice previously been commended for quick thinking: He once raced down a loose box car and tying on brakes prevented a crash. On May, 1944, he was cited for removing a defective bomb from a plant."

SAMUEL STARR<sup>4</sup> (son of sec. wife), b. perhaps at Danbury, in 1700, d. there Dec. 29, 1744. He m. ABIGAIL DIBBIE; after the death of Samuel Starr, she m. Joseph Waller of Milford, Conn. She d. July 24, 1791, ae. 88 yrs. bur. at Warren, Conn.

SAMUEL STARR<sup>5</sup>, b. July 28, 1732, perhaps at Danbury; d. Oct. 18, 1770; he m. April 1, 1762 Ann ( ); b. Nov. 5, 1731; d. at Ridgefield, Conn., July 24, 1788. She m. (2) Aug. 28, 1776, Jachin (sic) Benedict of Bethel, Conn.

EUNICE STARR<sup>6</sup>, b. Fairfield co., Conn., Aug. 15, 1766; d. in Lower Belpre tp., Washington co., Ohio, May 4, 1814; she m. at Ridgefield, Conn., Nov. 7, 1782, Sgt. Eleazer Curtis, b. at Warren, Conn., Oct. 20, 1759; d. in Washington co., Ohio, Sept. 7, 1801. She named her second son Jason Ralph for her stepfather.
