Redemptioners were persons who sold their services for a term of years, usually five, in order to secure passage to this country.

Enormous tracts of land in America were granted him by the king—territory which now comprises the states of Georgia, Alabama, Hississippi, the Carolinas and Louisiana. He spent a fortune having this vast territory explored and called it "Carolana", in honor of his sovereigns. Later, he exchanged this vast domain for other territorial grants in New Jersey. New York, and northern New England. His eldest son, Col.Daniel Coxe, colonized New Jersey. Biog.in Pennsylvania Magazine of History, vol. 7, pp. 317—337. There also may have been a brother JOSEPH, and a sister, CATHERINE, but as yet (1931) this is not definitely established. The coat of arms reproduced in this volume has been traced by

the College of Arms, London, Eng., to a family named Smith, of Bedford.

No pedigree of the Smith family is recorded there, however.

The above inscriptions are written on the fly leaves of some old books which belonged to John Cox, Sr., of Rhinebeck, New York.

He had sons named Thomas, David and Joseph, but whether these inscriptions were by them, or by possible brothers is undetermined.

The original inscriptions, with a number of other books, pictures, Bibles, etc., belonging to the family, are now in the possession of the New York Historical Society, New York City.

John Con, Sr's prever book and Jutch hible are in the H.Y.Dicecton Library, 416 Lafayette St., N.Y.C. There was a ship in the anglish Royal Navy maned the "Miward" which was in commission in 1814-15, and an "Miward and John" in a commission in 1757-9. Muster rolls, if still in existence, have not been examined.

One member of a later generation of this family whose life is worth sketching was HENRY FOSTER COX, b.New York City, June 20, 1813;

m. Jane Westcott.

He, a son of Jameson Cox, the deputy postmaster, etc., went to California in the gold rush of 1849, and was made the first postmaster at San Francisco.

During those early days, he was compelled to improvise mail boxes made of cigar boxes for the merchants. He was quite an artist, and made a sketch of a line formed at the windows to get their mail when the boat came in. This was a regular occurence. Sometimes a fight started when someone shoved another out of the line, and it was during one of these combats he made his drawing. It was preserved for many years at Pioneer Hall, San Francisco, but unfortunately was destroyed in the earthquake and fire of 1906.

He died in New York City, leaving no children.

Jameson Cox, the sheriff, justice of the peace, etc., had a large family of children.

one of his sons, THOMAS BOYD COX, b.N.Y.City,Dec.8, 1794; died in Mayana, Cuba, Feb.25, 1822. He was m., Merch 15, 1815, in N.Y.C., to Mary Corham, who d.Jan.18,1825.

One of Jameson Cox's grandsons was THEODORE SHERRY COX.

B. N.Y.C., Feb.23, 1822; died in New Orleans, Sept.17, 1841.

It has not been learned whether either of these left any children.
