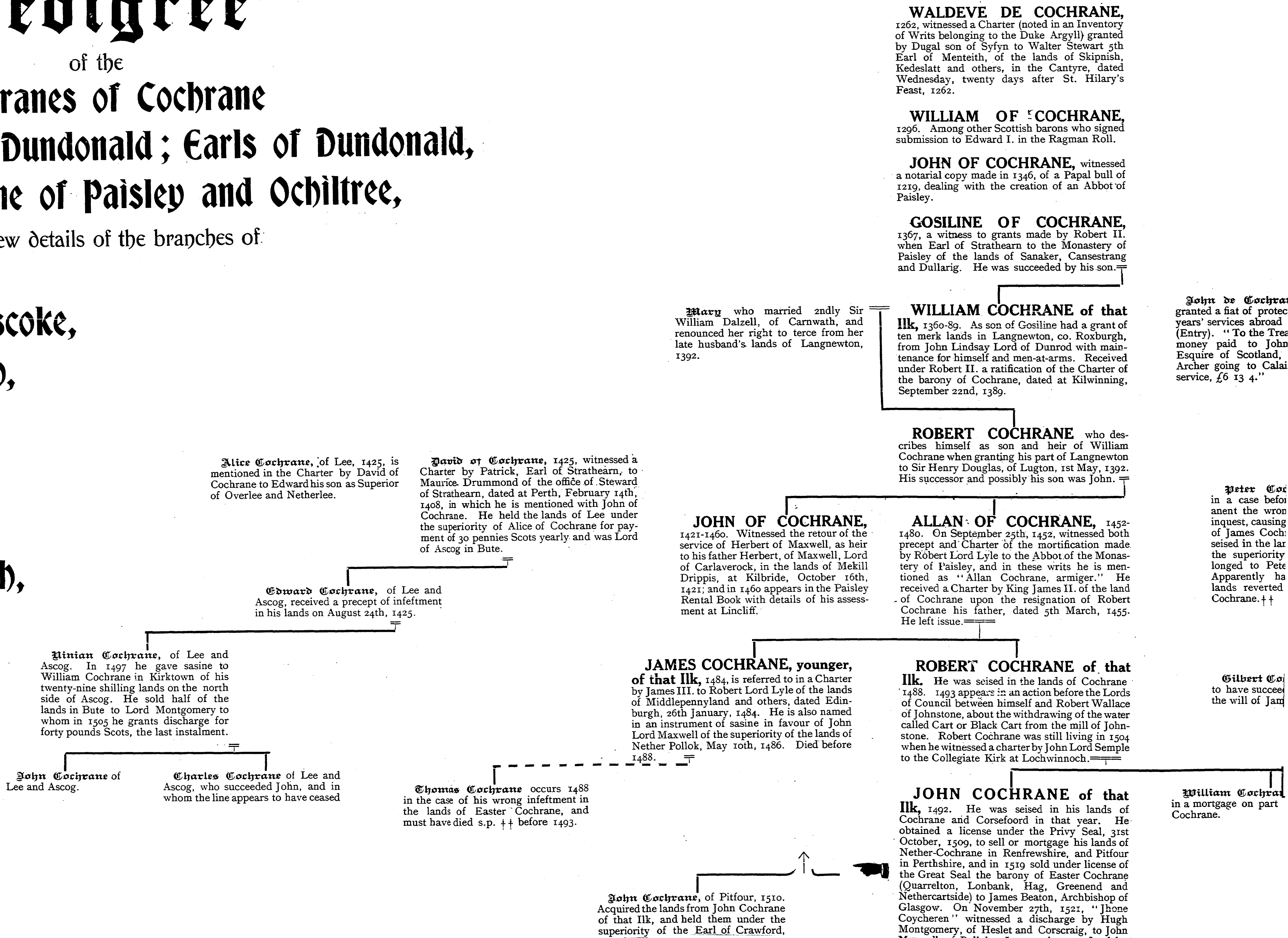

WALDEVE DE COCHRANE, 1262, witnessed a Charter (noted in an Inventory of Writs belonging to the Duke Argyll) granted by Dugal son of Syfyn to Walter Stewart 5th Earl of Menteith, of the lands of Skipnish, Kedeslatt and others, in the Cantyre, dated Wednesday, twenty days after St. Hilary's Feast, 1262.

WILLIAM OF COCHRANE, 1296. Among other Scottish barons who signed submission to Edward I. in the Ragman Roll.

JOHN OF COCHRANE, witnessed a notarial copy made in 1346, of a Papal bull of 1219, dealing with the creation of an Abbot of Paisley.

GOSILINE OF COCHRANE, 1367, a witness to grants made by Robert II. when Earl of Strathearn to the Monastery of Paisley of the lands of Sanaker, Cansestrang and Dullarig. He was succeeded by his son.

WILLIAM COCHRANE of that Ilk, 1360-89. As son of Gosiline had a grant of ten merk lands in Langnewton, co. Roxburgh, from John Lindsay Lord of Dunrod with maintenance for himself and men-at-arms. Received under Robert II. a ratification of the Charter of the barony of Cochrane, dated at Kilwinning, September 22nd, 1389.

ROBERT COCHRANE who describes himself as son and heir of William Cochrane when granting his part of Langnewton to Sir Henry Douglas, of Lugton, 1st May, 1392. His successor and possibly his son was John.

ALLAN OF COCHRANE, 1452-1480. On September 25th, 1452, witnessed both precept and Charter of the mortification made by Robert Lord Lyle to the Abbot of the Monastery of Paisley, and in these writs he is mentioned as "Allan Cochrane, armiger." He received a Charter by King James II. of the land of Cochrane upon the resignation of Robert Cochrane his father, dated 5th March, 1455. He left issue.

ROBERT COCHRANE of that Ilk. He was seised in the lands of Cochrane 1488. 1493 appears in an action before the Lords of Council between himself and Robert Wallace of Johnstone, about the withdrawing of the water called Cart or Black Cart from the mill of Johnstone. Robert Cochrane was still living in 1504 when he witnessed a charter by John Lord Semple to the Collegiate Kirk at Lochwinnoch.

JOHN COCHRANE of that Ilk, 1492. He was seised in his lands of Cochrane and Corsefoord in that year. He obtained a license under the Privy Seal, 31st October, 1509, to sell or mortgage his lands of Nether-Cochrane in Renfrewshire, and Pitfour in Perthshire, and in 1519 sold under license of the Great Seal the barony of Easter Cochrane (Quarrelton, Lonbank, Hag, Greenend and Nethercartside) to James Beaton, Archbishop of

John de Cochrane, 1370,^a was granted a fiat of protection during two years' services abroad for Edward III. (Entry). "To the Treasurer of Calais, money paid to John Cograne, an Esquire of Scotland, and his vallet Archer going to Calais in the King's service, £6 13 4."

Michael Cochrane superior of Easter Cochrane. Died before 1488. Married Eupheme Erskine.

Peter Cochrane, 1488, occurs in a case before the Lord Auditors anent the wrong service of a brief of inquest, causing Thomas Cochrane (son of James Cochrane of that Ilk) to be seised in the lands of Easter Cochrane, the superiority of which lawfully belonged to Peter (2nd January, 1488.) Apparently had no issue and the lands reverted to John Cochrane of Cochrane.††

Gilbert Cochrane does not appear to have succeeded, but is mentioned in the will of James his Uncle, 1571.

Helen occurs in the will of her Uncle James, 1571.

Michael Cochrane, of Barbauchlaw, occurs in the same assize. He was seised in his lands on the resignation of his father, 2nd August, 1558, under a charter granted by John Maxwell, of Calderwood, the superior, which lands were to be held for half the service of one archer in the King's host.

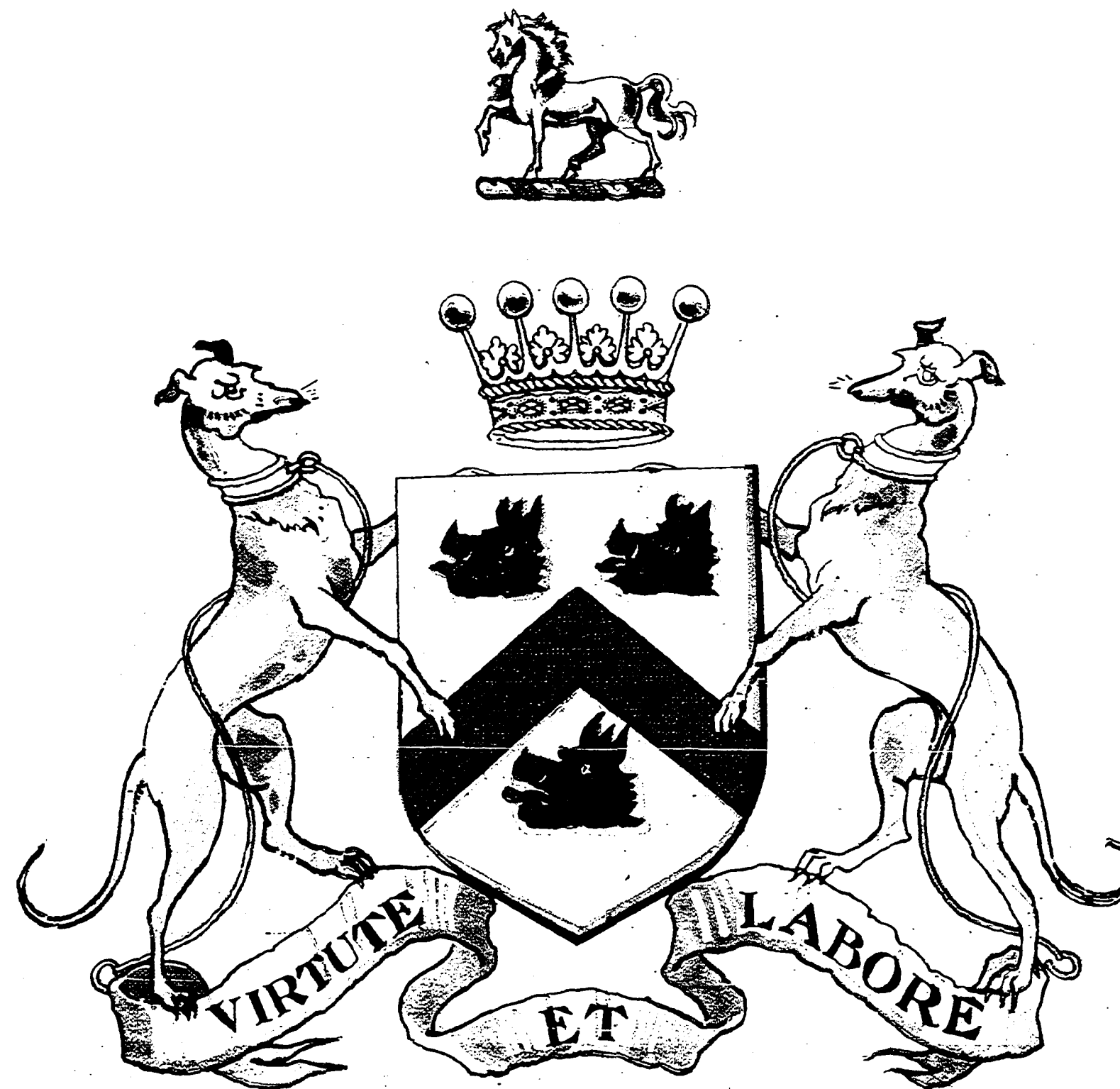

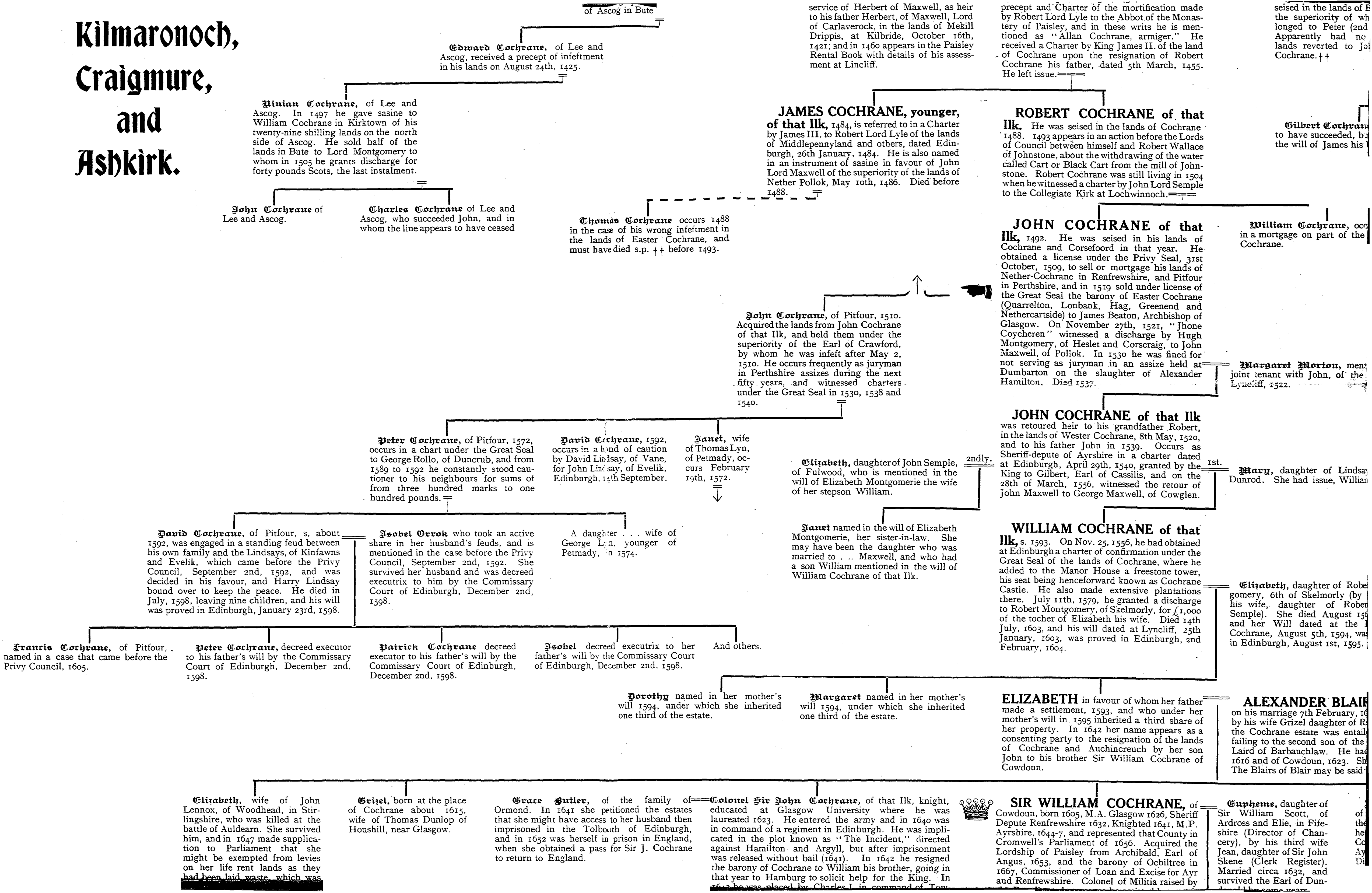

He received a Charter by King James II. of the land of Cochrane upon the resignation of Robert Cochrane his father, dated 5th March, 1455. He left issue.

ROBERT COCHRANE of that Ilk. He was seised in the lands of Cochrane 1488. 1493 appears in an action before the Lords of Council between himself and Robert Wallace of Johnstone, about the withdrawing of the water called Cart or Black Cart from the mill of Johnstone. Robert Cochrane was still living in 1504 when he witnessed a charter by John Lord Semple to the Collegiate Kirk at Lochwinnoch.

JOHN COCHRANE of that Ilk. 1492. He was seised in his lands of Cochrane and Corsefoord in that year. He obtained a license under the Privy Seal, 31st October, 1509, to sell or mortgage his lands of Nether-Cochrane in Renfrewshire, and Pitfour in Perthshire, and in 1519 sold under license of the Great Seal the barony of Easter Cochrane (Quarrelton, Lonbank, Hag, Greenend and Nethercartside) to James Beaton, Archbishop of Glasgow. On November 27th, 1521, "Jhone Coycheren" witnessed a discharge by Hugh Montgomery, of Heslet and Corscraig, to John Maxwell, of Pollok. In 1530 he was fined for not serving as jurymen in an assize held at Dumbarton on the slaughter of Alexander Hamilton. Died 1537.

JOHN COCHRANE of that Ilk was retoured heir to his grandfather Robert, in the lands of Wester Cochrane, 8th May, 1520, and to his father John in 1539. Occurs as Sheriff-depute of Ayrshire in a charter dated at Edinburgh, April 29th, 1540, granted by the King to Gilbert, Earl of Cassilis, and on the 28th of March, 1556, witnessed the retour of John Maxwell to George Maxwell, of Cowglen.

WILLIAM COCHRANE of that Ilk, s. 1593. On Nov. 25, 1556, he had obtained at Edinburgh a charter of confirmation under the Great Seal of the lands of Cochrane, where he added to the Manor House a freestone tower, his seat being henceforward known as Cochrane Castle. He also made extensive plantations there. July 11th, 1579, he granted a discharge to Robert Montgomery, of Skelmorly, for £1,000 of the tocher of Elizabeth his wife. Died 14th July, 1603, and his will dated at Lyncliff, 25th January, 1603, was proved in Edinburgh, 2nd February, 1604.

ELIZABETH in favour of whom her father made a settlement, 1593, and who under her mother's will in 1595 inherited a third share of her property. ALEXANDER BLAIR, her cousin, who assumed the name of Cochrane on his marriage 7th February, 1601. He was the 3rd son of Alex. Blair of that Ilk, by his wife Grizel daughter of Robert Lord Semple. Failing heirs of this marriage the Cochrane estate was entailed to Alex. Blair's brothers successively, whom failing to the second son of the then Laird of Fulwood, whom failing to the then Laird of Barbauchlaw. He had a Charter of Cochrane, 1601, of Auchincreich, 1616 and of Cowdoun, 1623. Sheriff-Depute of Renfrewshire, 1623, and died 1641. The Blairs of Blair may be said to be represented by the Earl of Dundonald.

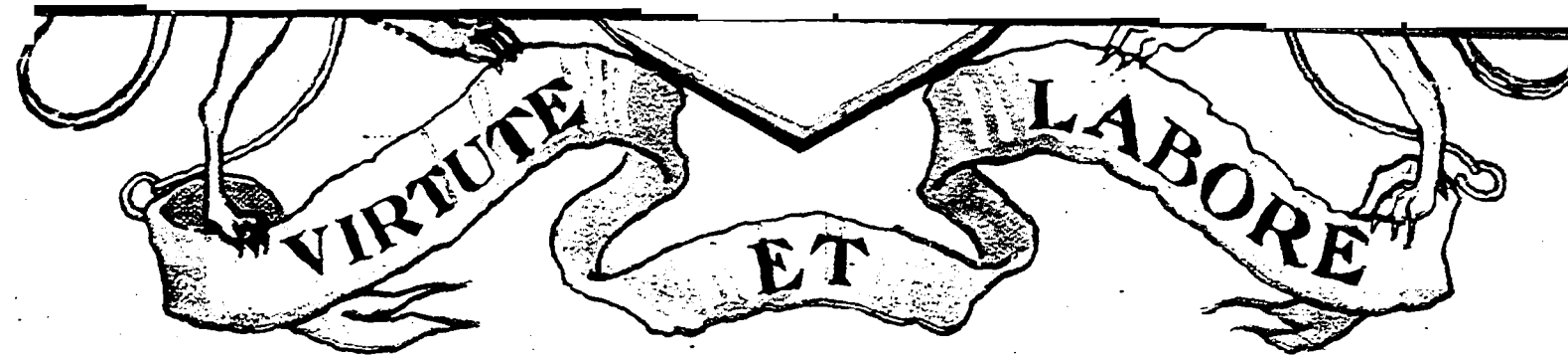

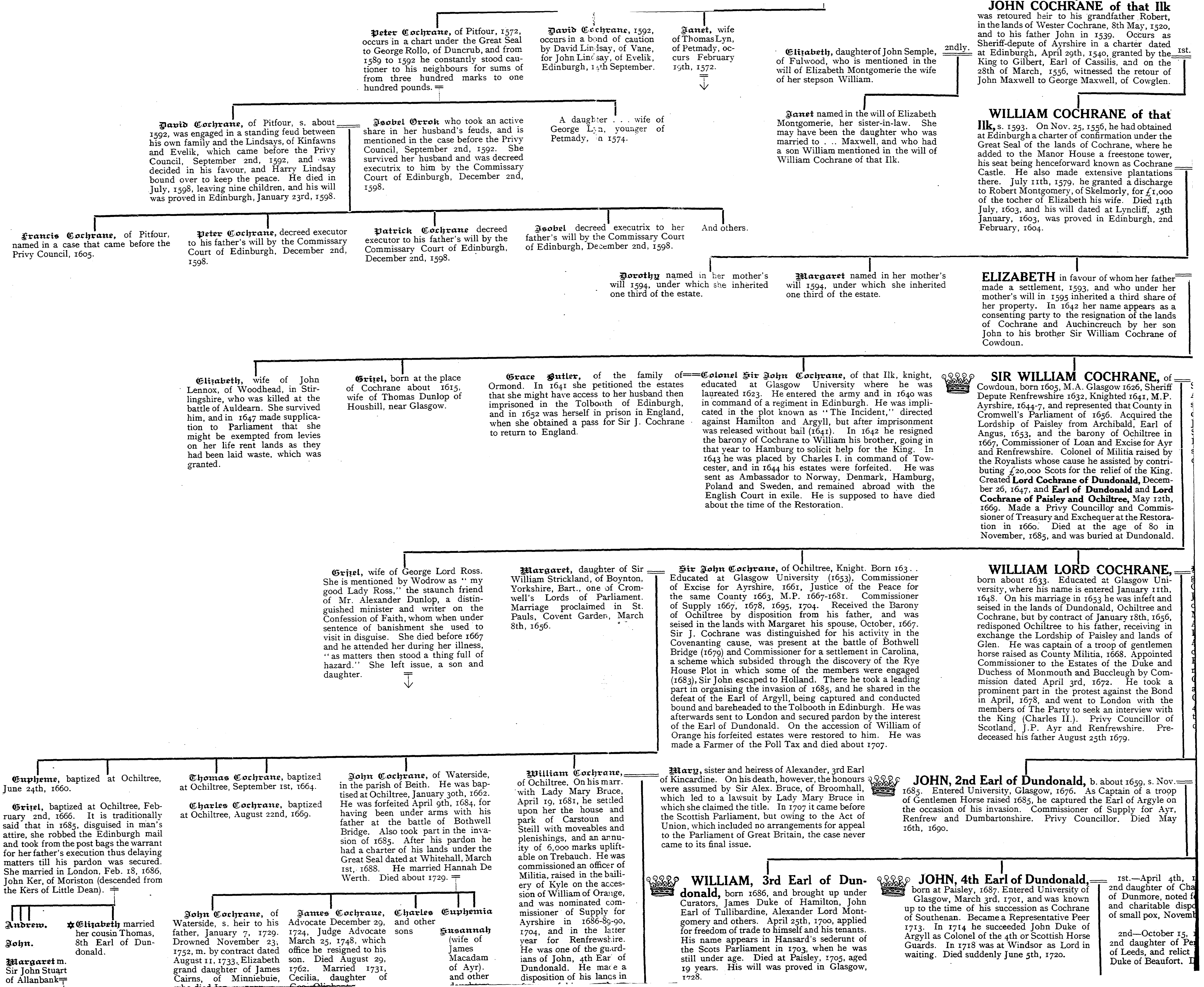

SIR WILLIAM COCHRANE, of Cowdoun, born 1605, M.A. Glasgow 1626, Sheriff Depute Renfrewshire 1632, Knighted 1641, M.P. Ayrshire, 1644-7, and represented that County in Cromwell's Parliament of 1656. Acquired the Lordship of Paisley from Archibald, Earl of Angus, 1653, and the barony of Ochiltree in 1667, Commissioner of Loan and Excise for Ayr and Renfrewshire. Colonel of Militia raised by the Royalists whose cause he assisted by contributing £20,000 Scots for the relief of the King. Created **Lord Cochrane of Dundonald**, December 26, 1647, and **Earl of Dundonald and Lord Cochrane of Paisley and Ochiltree**, May 12th, 1669. Made a Privy Councillor and Commissioner of Treasury and Exchequer at the Restoration in 1660. Died at the age of 80 in November, 1685, and was buried at Dundonald.

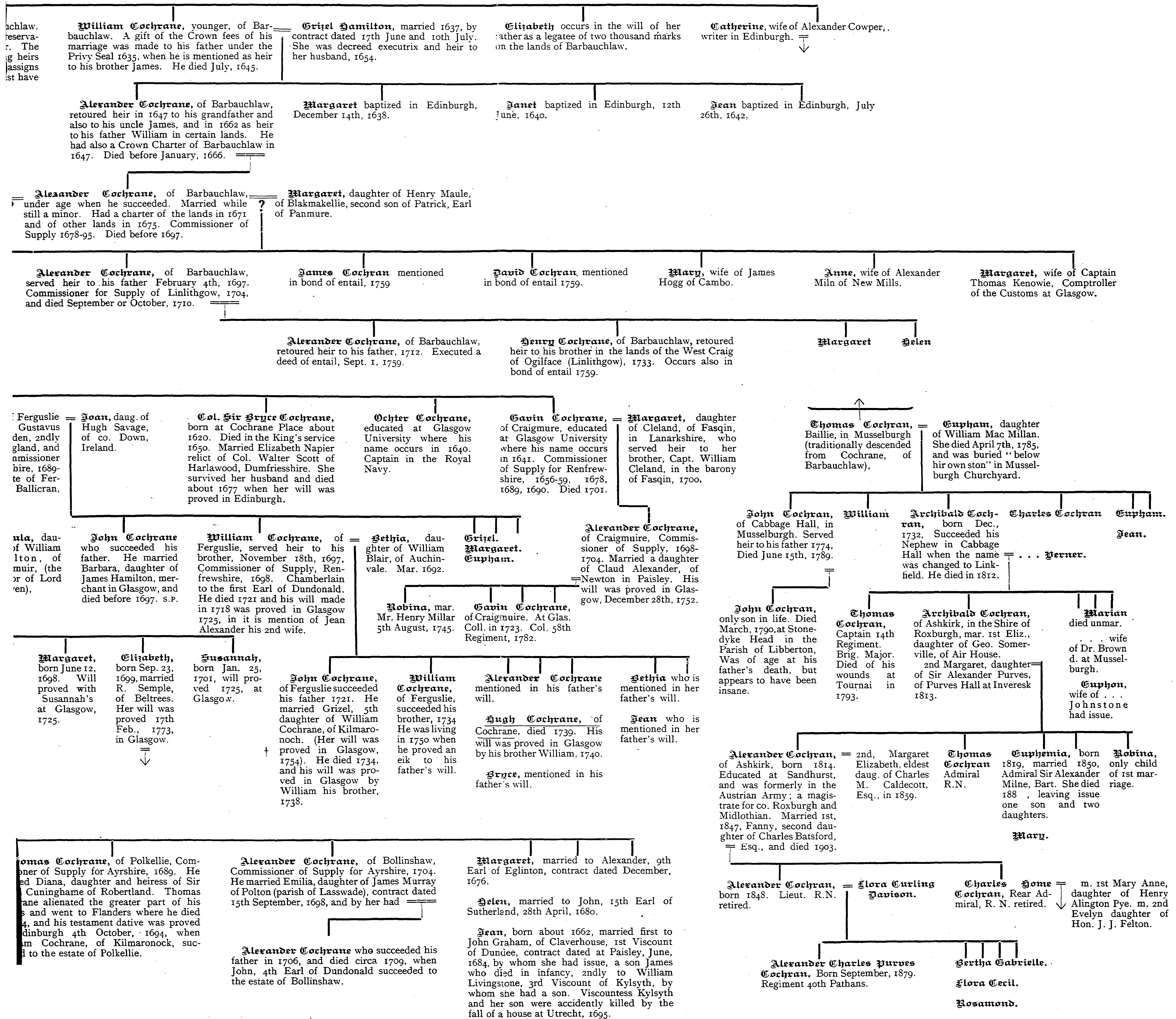

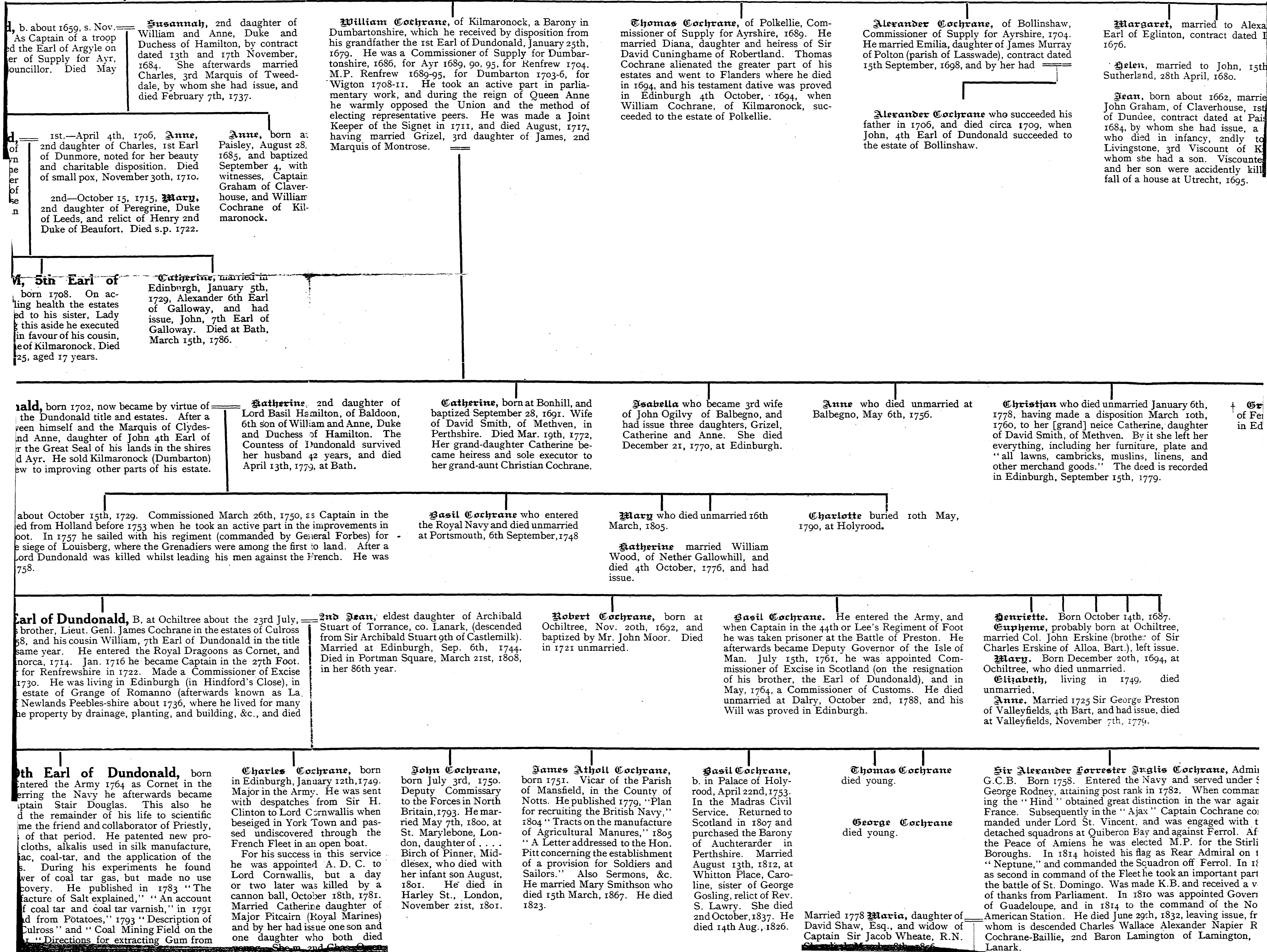

THOMAS, 6th Earl of Dundonald, born 1702, now became by virtue of a clause in the original entail, heir male to the Dundonald title and estates. After a law suit in the Court of Session, 1726, between himself and the Marquis of Clydesdale (afterwards 6th Duke of Hamilton), and Anne, daughter of John 4th Earl of Dundonald, he was granted a Charter under the Great Seal of his lands in the shires of Peebles, Lanark, Renfrew, Dumbarton and Ayr. He sold Kilmaronock (Dumbarton) in 1729 to the Duke of Montrose with a view to improving other parts of his estate. He died at Paisley, May 28th, 1727.

Catherine, 2nd daughter of Lord Basil Hamilton, of Baldoon, 6th son of William and Anne, Duke and Duchess of Hamilton. The Countess of Dundonald survived her husband 42 years, and died April 13th, 1779, at Bath.

Catherine, born at Bonhill, and baptized September 28, 1691. Wife of David Smith, of Methven, in Perthshire. Died Mar. 19th, 1772. Her grand-daughter Catherine became heiress and sole executor to her grand-aunt Christian Cochrane.

Isabella who became 3rd wife of John Ogilvy of Balbegno, and had issue three daughters, Grizel, Catherine and Anne. She died December 21, 1770, at Edinburgh.

William, 7th Earl of Dundonald, born about October 15th, 1729. Commissioned March 26th, 1750, as Captain in the Regiment of Scots Hollanders. He returned from Holland before 1753 when he took an active part in the improvements in Paisley. He afterwards joined the 17th Foot. In 1757 he sailed with his regiment (commanded by General Forbes) for Halifax, and the next year proceeded to the siege of Louisberg, where the Grenadiers were among the first to land. After a month in the trenches before the fortress Lord Dundonald was killed whilst leading his men against the French. He was 29 years of age and died unmarried July 9, 1758.

He entered the Royal Dragoons as Cornet, and became Fort Major in Minorca, 1714. Jan. 1716 he became Captain in the 27th Foot. He was returned member for Renfrewshire in 1722. Made a Commissioner of Excise for Scotland, April 17th, 1730. He was living in Edinburgh (in Hindford's Close), in 1745. He acquired the estate of Grange of Romanno (afterwards known as La Mancha), in the parish of Newlands Peebles-shire about 1736, where he lived for many years greatly improving the property by drainage, planting, and building, &c., and died there June 27th, 1778.

ARCHIBALD, 9th Earl of Dundonald, born January 1st, 1748. Entered the Army 1764 as Cornet in the 3rd Dragoons, but preferring the Navy he afterwards became midshipman under Captain Stair Douglas. This also he relinquished and devoted the remainder of his life to scientific pursuits in which he became the friend and collaborator of Priestly, Watt and other scientists of that period. He patented new processes of preparing sail cloths, alkalis used in silk manufacture, British gum, sal ammoniac, coal-tar, and the application of the latter to ships' bottoms. During his experiments he found out the illuminating power of coal tar gas, but made no use of this, his greatest discovery. He published in 1783 "The present state of the manufacture of Salt explained," "An account of the qualities and uses of coal tar and coal tar varnish," in 1791 "Letters on making bread from Potatoes," 1793 "Description of the Estate and Abbey of Culross" and "Coal Mining Field on the the Frith of Forth," 1801 "Directions for extracting Gum from lichen or tree-moss," and 1807 patented improvements in spinning machinery. He died in Paris, July 1st, 1831.

Charles Cochrane, born in Edinburgh, January 12th, 1749. Major in the Army. He was sent with despatches from Sir H. Clinton to Lord Cornwallis when besieged in York Town and passed undiscovered through the French Fleet in an open boat.

For his success in this service he was appointed A. D. C. to Lord Cornwallis, but a day or two later was killed by a cannon ball, October 18th, 1781. Married Catherine daughter of Major Pitcairn (Royal Marines) and by her had issue one son and one daughter who both died young. She m. 2nd Chas. Owen Cambridge and d. Oct. 24, 1835.

John Cochrane, born July 3rd, 1750. Deputy Commissary to the Forces in North Britain, 1793. He married May 7th, 1800, at St. Marylebone, London, daughter of . . . Birch of Pinner, Middlesex, who died with her infant son August, 1801. He died in Harley St., London, November 21st, 1801.

James Atholl Cochrane, born 1751. Vicar of the Parish of Mansfield, in the County of Notts. He published 1779, "Plan for recruiting the British Navy," 1804 "Tracts on the manufacture of Agricultural Manures," 1805 "A Letter addressed to the Hon. Pitt concerning the establishment of a provision for Soldiers and Sailors." Also Sermons, &c. He married Mary Smithson who died 15th March, 1867. He died 1823.

Basil Cochrane, b. in Palace of Holyrood, April 22nd, 1753. In the Madras Civil Service. Returned to Scotland in 1807 and purchased the Barony of Auchterarder in Perthshire. Married August 13th, 1812, at Whitton Place, Caroline, sister of George Gosling, relict of Rev. S. Lawry. She died 2nd October, 1837. He died 14th Aug., 1826.

THOMAS, 10th Earl of Dundonald, born at Annsfield, in the parish of Hamilton, Lanarkshire, 14th December, 1775. He entered the Navy as a midshipman on the "Hind," 1793, and later on served on the American Station under his uncle, Admiral Sir Alexander Cochrane, eventually joining the Mediterranean Fleet, where he served under Lord Keith and Lord St. Vincent. During his thirteen months command of the little sloop "Speedy" he took upwards of 50 vessels; the capture by boarding of the Spanish Frigate "El Gamo" of 35 guns and 315 men by the sloop "Speedy" of 45 men was one of his daring exploits when in command of this little vessel. Later he commanded the "Pallas" and "Impérieuse," and with these vessels fought many actions against great odds and made valuable prizes. Elected M.P. Honiton, 1806, and M.P. Westminster, 1807. In Parliament his main object was to draw attention to naval abuses; he thus gave great offence to the Admiralty and was again ordered out to the Mediterranean. In 1809 he successfully attacked the French Fleet, then in the Basque Road, by means of fire and explosive ships, and for this service was made K.B.; but arriving in England his opposition to a vote of thanks to Lord Gambier drew upon him the censure of the Admiralty and he was placed on half pay. In 1814 he was the victim of a political intrigue, which accused him of association in a Stock Exchange plot to raise the price of stocks by spreading rumours of the death of Napoleon. For this he was imprisoned, fined, and deprived of his honours, but the fine was paid by his constituents, and on being re-elected M.P., Westminster, he escaped from Kings Bench Prison and took his seat in Parliament. In 1819 he accepted the command of the Chilean Navy then at war with Spain, and by his brilliant services swept the Pacific of the Spanish Navy and secured the freedom of Chili and Peru. In 1823 he entered the service of Brazil, then struggling for freedom against Portugal, and by various dashing exploits destroyed the Portuguese ships of war, and by this means was mainly instrumental in securing the independence of Brazil. In 1825 he returned to England, and shortly afterwards took service with Greece then engaged on its war of independence; he commanded the Greek Navy and rendered valuable service to the cause. He succeeded to the Earldom in 1831, and after the accession of William IV., he was restored to his rank in the English Navy and gazetted to the position he would have occupied had he never been removed. In 1848 at the age of 73 years he was appointed to the command of the North American and West Indian Squadron. He returned to England in 1851 and devoted the remainder of his life to perfecting his "secret war plans" and to scientific investigations. He was made Rear Admiral of the United Kingdom in 1854, and elected Hon. Brother, Trinity House in the same year. He died on the 31st October, 1860, and was buried in Westminster Abbey.
