

INTRODUCTION

I have for some years wanted to pass on to the Cady Family what information I have gathered about their ancestors that might interest them. This pamphlet is far from complete, but I fear that if it is not sent out now it never will be. It is better for you to have it as it is than for me to try to bring certain parts up to date, and to get the dates and information that are now missing.

The base of the facts about the Cady Family comes from "Cady Genealogy. Family of Nicholas of Watertown, Mass." published by Orrin Peer Allen, Palmer, Mass., 1910 of which I have a copy. The frontispiece is missing so I have no additional facts about its publication.

The ancestry of Ida Wise Cady (Mrs. Fred C. Cady, 1859-1944) comes from a book lent me by Mrs. Edna Timme, of Lake Delton, Wis., a cousin and very dear friend of Mrs. Fred C. Cady, entitled "William Ricketson, William Ricketson, Jr. and Their Descendants" by Grace Williamson Edes, privately printed, Boston 1917, Volume 1. Mrs. Edes wrote Mrs. Timme that she expected to have a second volume printed, but we do not know of it.

Mrs. Edes wrote Mrs. Timme from Cambridge, Mass., March 3, 1918 as follows: "You may be interested to learn that the sister of your great, great grandfather John Ricketson, Abigail Ricketson (b. 1719) for whom Abigail Ricketson Denton, was doubtless named, became the ancestor of Mrs. Hettie Greene Robinson, the richest woman in America." (a dubious distinction. ESC)

Various members of the family have helped me, contributing dates and information.

1. We have no certain knowledge of the locality in England whence Nicholas Cady came to this country, but the following may be a solution to the matter.

A Nicholas Cady came over, a minor in 1630, with William Knapp, as a carpenter's apprentice. We know that Nicholas was a carpenter, as was William Knapp, who came from near Bury St. Mary, County Suffolk, England, where he left his daughter, Elizabeth, who had married; and as there were Cadys at Stoken Stein in the same county at that time, it is quite reasonable to suppose that Nicholas Cady, a younger son, might have been bound out as an apprentice to Knapp, as was the custom of the time, and that he might have been allowed to migrate with his master to America, as many another scion had done. We know that Nicholas was very intimately connected with the Knapp family for some years before his marriage with Judith, the daughter of William Knapp; which fact adds force to the supposition that he might have been a member of the family as an apprentice. The very first undoubted record we have of him is a partnership with John, the son of William Knapp, Oct. 8, 1645, when Wm. Potter of Watertown sold Nicholas Cady and John Knapp his house in Watertown and 17 acres of land.

Nicholas Cady married Judith Knapp about 1648. William Knapp died August 30, 1658, aged about 80, and his will lists Judith, wife of Nicholas as one of his heirs. In 1652 Nicholas Cady took the oath of fidelity with others. Dec. 24, 1667 Nicholas Cady, carpenter of Watertown, exchanges house and land at Watertown with John Clary, carpenter. He must have removed to Groton in the early part of 1668 for we find that on Sept. 10, 1668, Nicholas Cady of Groton, planter, and his wife Judith, sold to G. Lawrence, six acres of land in Watertown and five acres of meadow in Cambridge.

December 10, 1671 Nicholas Cady was surveyor at Groton. In 1676 the town of Groton was assaulted by the Indians and burned. He with others probably sought refuge in the garrison.

January 9, 1679 Nicholas Cady conveys to his daughter Judith, now the wife of Alexander Rouse, for and in consideration of the natural affection and parental love for her, eleven acres of land in Groton.

June 8, 1680 he was chosen surveyor. December 1680 he is mentioned among lists of heads of families. In 1681 he paid tax of 18s 2d, only one person in Groton paying more. So the record of his life in Groton goes on, buying, selling, paying taxes, etc. He was chosen constable in 1685, and in 1673 and 1675 fence viewer.

On May 16, 1712 John Gady, husbandman of Groton sells several parcels of land describing them "with one-half ye town rights formerly Nicholas Cady's, deceased, or now mine the Sd John Cady's."

We have no record of the death of Nicholas Cady or his wife Judith; but doubtless their last days were spent in Groton, and we infer from the above that Nicholas Cady lived with his oldest son John, to whom fell a goodly portion of his father's limited estate. We also learn that he had deceased prior to 1712. Nicholas Cady resided near Cady's Pond, named for him, located about a mile southeasterly from the village of Groton, on the Boston road.

> He bought land in Dalton, Mass., in 1779 and in Hinsdale, Mass., in 1805. He assisted in building the Baptist Church in Hinsdale in 1797, and became a deacon of that church. He had service in the Revolutionary war as follows:

Private in Capt. Zebulon Norton's Co., Major Caleb Hughes' detachment from Berkshire Co.; enlisted July 11, 1777, discharged July 27, 1777, service 16 days. Also in Capt. John Stevens' Co., Col. John Barnes Berkshire Co. Regt; enlisted Sept. 6, 1777, discharged Oct. 2, 1777, service 16 days with Northern Army. 3 children by first marriage, 8 by second marriage.

Dr. Seldon Cady's wife, Hannah, escorted parties to Europe very successfully, knowing the business and several foreign languages. In her absence they had a housekeeper.

William Ricketson, born ---; Married 14 May 1679. Elizabeth Mott, daughter of Adam and Mary (Lott) Mott, born 6 August 1659, died 1723; died 1, March 1691.

> William Ricketson was an Englishman and a Quaker and is supposed to have come to this country to avoid persecution on account of his religious faith. He settled first at Portsmouth, R.I. where he hired a house of Giles Slocum who mentions in his will "five acres of land, with one small tiniment on it, laying in the Towne of Portsmouth in R.I. and now in the occupation of Will Rickinson house carpenter.

19, 12th Mo. 1682 the proceedings of the town meeting at Portsmouth show that "William Ricketson had presented a petition to set up a water mill for publick use" and on 4th 11th mo. 1683 William Ricketson's name was "propounded" as a freeman of the town .---- Apparently William Ricketson moved to Dartmouth before 1684, as their third child was born there in that year, and at Dartmouth he built the beautiful old house on the upland meadow whose walls and chimneys were still standing in 1906. Facing south on the upland, it commands a fine sweep of view, bay and good old New England country. The sunset softens the time-worn shingles and the crumbling stone of the massive chimney with its crude pilasters. Within. in spite of its pathetic desolation, the brave old beams and fine wood work bespeak an early New England Craftsman at his best. "The wedding room, in which Rebeckah Ricketson was married to John Russell (Wm Ricketson's eldest child) with attractive corner beaufet and great fireplace in the simplicity of its appointments was in accord with the Friends------Up winding stairs, in the great chamber above was a chimney piece (now in the Rooms of the Old Dartmouth Historical Society), called by experts the first of its time now extant in Massachusetts. Clambering up to the loft to watch the last rays of the setting sun upon the hills, the river and far off islands you feel your ancestor, William Ricketson, builded well. Elizabeth Mott Ricketson, his wife, came from Portsmouth, R.I. where her parents were well-known Friends. Her grandparents, first comers of the Motts, had been members of the Church of Reverend John Eliot, Apostle to the Indians. In 1694 Elizabeth Ricketson was one of the two women named in the confirmatory deed to the proprietors of Dartmouth."

As has been shown by the preceding extracts, William Ricketson was a carpenter and a skilful workman as well. The old house must have been quite a mansion for those early days, with a square room on either side of the front door and corresponding chambers above. Part of the original estate, the land lying on Buzzards Bay, at the head of Apponagansett River, in Padanarum Village, now called South Dartmouth, has passed down through seven generations of the name, and William Ricketson's descendants have their summer home there. This little point of land, jutting out into Buzzard's Bay, is designated on the maps as Ricketson's Point; and it is a picturesque fact that in Almejas Bay on the Pacific Ocean another Ricketson's Point is named for a descendant of William Ricketson's son Jonathan.

He lived in the family homestead on the farm at Dartmouth (now Westport), Mass., the house which had been built by his father William Ricketson. 9 April 1756 he sold part of the land to his son Abner but the deed was not signed until 12 October 1763 when it was signed by Jonathan and "Alys", evidently an error. William Resseguie was a rockblastor and laborer, Residence: Stormville, Duchess Co., N.Y. John Dyson was a weaver and lived until 9 April 1860 in Glenham, N.Y., when he moved his family to Excelsior, Sauk County, Wisconsin. His wife Lydia was a very remarkable woman. Left a widow at 19 with three babies, as her son Mr. Lewis Denton Resseguie writes me, it was a hard struggle to keep the wolf from the door, and as if her own family were not a sufficient burden she cared also for the children of her sister Sarah Wise, who had been deserted by their worthless father. She had ten children of her own, two of her daughter's and three of her sisters, so that at one time there were nineteen, all in one small house. Mrs. Dyson was a member of the Dutch Reformed Church. We are greatly indebted to her son, before mentioned, the late Mr. Lewis Denton Resseguie of Brooklyn and to her granddaughter, Mrs. Timme of Delton, Wisconsin (born Sanford, daughter of Ellen Dyson Sanford) for help with this branch of the family.

No dates concerning the Daniel Wise family can be found in the Poughkeepsie Records. Mrs. Wise lost the sight of one eye from an accident in childhood and became nearly blind during the last part of her life and her left arm was paralyzed from blood poison caused by a pin prick in her hand. Her husband was a widower when he married her. His chief claim to remembrance appears to have been that he was called "Beau Brummell" and on his wife's death he obligingly presented their children to her niece, Amanda Resseguie, who with her mother, Mrs. Dyson, brought them up. Having thus relieved himself from family cares, he vanished from sight. He was a laborer, and having been at one time employed on a government job at Key West, Fla., was obliged to depart thence precipitately in order to avoid arrest. He is supposed to have ended his career at Poughkeepsie, N.Y.

Amanda Resseguie Camack' took all three children at the death of her Aunt Sarah Denton Wise. After her husband Ward and the oldest of the children, Rhoda, passed on, she was no longer able to care for Sarah Ida and Lewis. Lewis Denton had loaned his parents a sum of money when they moved West and they were not having an easy time trying to live in the wilderness. Then Lewis said, "Lydia, you take the children and care for them and I will call the loan paid." Years later Ida Wise Cady always said that Aunt Lydia had remarked that there was always enough for two more children on the farm. So they came to Wisconsin to live and were always called Camack', never Dyson, and only used the name of Wise after they grew up. Aunt Lydia Dyson was the "Aunt Lydia" to whom Ida Wise Cady always referred as the source of all wisdom and kindness. She was very good to the children.

Amanda's second husband was John Adey. He visited in Green Bay about 1900. Ida went back East for one visit of about a year before she married in 1879. Amanda may have been ill while she was there as she was never very strong. Her health slowly grew worse and it developed in T.B. The doctors advised a change of climate so John closed his affairs in the East and went out to Arizona and took up a ranch. Amanda, in a very weak condition, made the long journey alone, and lived only a month after arriving. John always said, "If I had only known what I know now, I would have driven over land, just a few miles a day, and then the change might have cured her, but it was too great a change in too short a time." John and another man buried her on his ranch. They were all alone with

no neighbors.

The Cady farm and the Dyson farm joined fields - just a half mile between the homes, each on a four corner of the roads. When Mrs. William Cady passed on, leaving her husband Frank, Fred, Seldon and Sarah, Grandmother Dyson took over the baking for the family; as they were already baking for another family of motherless children, bread baking was a daily task. There was a great friendship between the two families.
