In the spelling where the surname began with "A" or "Ah" the letters "A" or "Ah" frequently were written in the lower case; e.g. aDaughhetee and ahDaughhetee.

In the spelling where the surname began with "O" seldom was the apostrophe used to separate it from the balance of the name; e.g. Odethey and Odothey.

One can well imagine that these men, some of whom had their original "brogue" or "burr", to which they had added an acquired southern dialect, would have difficulty in making their names understood by those who transcribed the records for them. It is surprising that the "guesses" at the spelling so generally expressed the pronunciation.

We should understand that names encountered and spelled as indicated do not always belong to this family. On the contrary, the list contains well known surnames which have an established standing wholly apart from this family. Names such as Dogget, Doty, etc., are not to be confused with this line, but unfortunately, men and women of this particular family were found living in the same counties at the same time when these other families were represented, yet careless recording and spelling left a trail of confusing records which have been difficult to separate, and made the task doubly hard.

For the reason that early records spelled the name with an "ah" or "o" preceding it, the compiler believes the deduction is correct that earlier generations originated in Ireland in the O'Dogherty family.

Such changes are frequently encountered in many families. They arise from various causes. Generally, there has been some official record such as a land grant, deed, indenture, or military record which altered the spelling, causing the family to adopt the changed spelling to conform to the official record.

Then too, some member of the family may discover, after research into earlier records, the correct spelling and adopt it for his or her family, thus creating a variation from the spelling used by collateral kin.

(100) _____ DAUGHITY-or some variation thereof, born _____;
died _____.

The compiler has developed no information concerning this progenitor of the men listed as his sons. He may not have come to America, but the compiler believes he was transplanted, probably as an indentured servant; that he served out his passage time, and probably passed to his reward before he had acquired property.

We treat this man as having been in Northumberland County, Virginia, although we have not a single record to show he ever came to America, much less to Virginia, or to Northumberland County in Virginia.

We have not yet found data which satisfactorily prove the relation of the men we treat as his sons, but the County records show that these men were in Northumberland County as contemporaries; that they were married men and that some of their children were born there. The name was uncommon in Virginia, and rare in the early records of Northumberland.

The name was not uncommon in Maryland, and it, of course, is a name found frequently and with honorable mention in Ireland, Scotland, England and Wales.

Some living descendants hold to the belief--founded upon the tradition of their particular branch of the family--that the family did not come from Ireland, but from Wales. The compiler, knowing the sincerity of their belief, is not disposed to argue that point. He believes, however, that the family descended from Irish ancestors, although the line may have moved through Wales or even Scotland.

Due to the lack of information concerning this man, no attempt is made to discuss his immigration, transportation or the probable date of his arrival. We skip 100 numbers to make allowance for insertion of information developed later.

We identify this man as the first definitely known of the Northumberland County, Va., Daugherty families whose names appear in the early records of that county spelled Daugherty, Daughity, Daubety, Dauty, Doherty, O'Doherty, O'Daugherty, Dougherty, Doughity, Dorty, etc.

He married ANN _____.

He died and left a will in Northumberland County, Va. It is important that this be set out herein so as to get the line straight.

Will of NEALE DOHERTY

Made November 8, 1722 ; Proved August 10, 1725 (8/15/1724 ?)

Northumberland County, Va.

1718 to 1725

In the name of God Amen, I Neal Doherty of Northumberland Co., in Virginia being in good health of body and of sound & perfect mind and memory (praise be therefor given to almighty God) do make and ordain this my present last will & testament in manner and form following: (That is to say)

First, and principally I commend my soule into the hand of Almighty God, hoping through the merits, death and passion of my saviour Jesus Christ to have full and free pardon & forgiveness of all my sins and to inherit everlasting life, and my body I commit to the earth to be decently buried at the discretion of my Exor hereafter named; and as touching the disposition of all such temoral Estate as it hath pleased almighty God to bestow on me I give and dispose thereof as followeth:

1st I give and bequeath unto my son John Doherty (sic) and his heirs for ever this peice of land whereon I now live containing to 50 acres and 2 head of cattle and my great gun.

Secondly, I give and bequeath unto my son James Doherty and his heirs forever my plantation at the head of Preslys Creek containing my estimation 50 acres. Provided that the said James shall not molest nor in any case hinder my daughters Ealse, Mary, Ann and Elizabeth Doherty from working and making crops of Tob. and corn on the said plantation during their single life.

Thirdly, I give and bequeath unto my daughter Ealse Doherty one bed and furniture thereunto belonging.

Fourthly, I give and bequeath unto my daughter Mary Doherty one bed and furniture thereunto belonging.

Fiftly, and Lastly, I give and bequeath unto my well beloved wife Ann Doherty the use of all the remaining part of my personal estate during her widowhood and at the expiration of her widowhood or life to be then equally divided among all my children and I do hereby make, ordaine & constitute and appoint my true and well beloved wife the said Ann Doherty to be my sole Exctrix of this my last will & testament.

August 18, 1725 - - - Order Book 7, 1720 to 1729 at page 185-186

"The last will and testament of Neal Doherty dec'd was presented to the County by Ann Doherty executrix of the last will and testament of the said deceased being proved by oath of Jno. Smith one of the evidences to the said will and on the said Ann's motion and giving security for her faithful admin certificate is granted her for obtaining a probate thereof in due form."

And at page 186

"Upon the motion of Ann Doherty Execx. of the last will and testament of Neal Doherty dec'd, Charles Nelms, Sam Nelms, Joseph Humphreys and Henry Rider or any three of whom being first sworn by the next justice are appointed to meet sometime before the next court and appraise the said dec'd's estate in money and ordered that the Execx. as aforesaid exhibit an inventory thereof upon oath to ye next court."

September 15, 1725 - -Order Book 7, 1720 to 1729 at page 191

"An inventory of the estate of Neal O'Dorty was presented to the court by Ann O'Dorty executrix of the dec'd and is admitted to record."

September 15, 1725

"Sept. the 15, 1724 this inventory, the estate of Neale ODorty deceased was exhibited into Northumberland County Court by Ann ODorty execx. of the said deceased and is admitted to record (Record Book 20, page 146 - Reported by Samuel Nelms, Charles Nelms, Henry Rider). The total was 60 £ 4s 6 pence. Head of inventory spelled name "Neale O'Daughity". Index spells the name Neales Doarthy."

The same inventory is reported at page 17. Name in caption spelled Neale O'Daughity; name at bottom spelled the same way. (R.B.20, page 7.)

The earliest records thus far located on this man are the fragmentary ones found in the book known as the "Register of St. Stephen's Parish, Northumberland County, Virginia". On mutilated page 4 of that register appear these entries:

The compiler believes the first entry refers to the birth of his eldest son, John, and so records him. It seems probable that the second entry refers to the birth of his daughter, Elsie, and she is so recorded. Her name may have been Elsie, Eliza, or Elizabeth, with her family nickname used in the will.

Strangely enough, a search of ^{NORTHUMBERLAND} ~~Westmoreland~~ records did not disclose any land granted to, deeded to, or patented by Neale Doherty. Neither did we find him as a grantor on any deed.

It seems probable that he was transported into the colony, perhaps as an indentured servant who served out his time in payment for his transportation.

No record was found to show the family name of his wife, Ann, nor was any record found of her, as his widow, after she presented his inventory September 15, 1725. Her identity may have been lost by a subsequent marriage.

The personal property part of the estate willed to her "during her widowhood and at the expiration of her widowhood or life" was to have been divided among all the children of Neal, but no official record was found of any such division.

(102) WILLIAM DAHERTY (sic), born ____ 1680; died ____ 1711.

The following records are believed by the compiler to refer to this man:

July 20, 1687 - - - William O'Doherty (sic), then seven years of age, was bound to James Nipper until he reach three and twenty years. Nipper agreed to give him one year schooling, and to do all possible to keep William at his books during his leisure time. The record in Northumberland Co., Va., Order Book 4A, page 398 reads:
 "William O'Doherty being seven years of age is by this agreement bound to serve James Nipper, his heirs, executors or administrators until he attains the age of three and twenty years; ye said Nipper allowing him all things necessary for an apprentice during ye said term and to give him one year schooling after the expiration of two years, to commence from after this time, and during the time he shall serve after the said one year schooling to the intent he may improve himself in reading, the said James Nipper hath engaged himself to do his utmost endeavor at leisure time to keep him to his book."

June 20, 1711 - - - The following appears in Northumberland Order Book 54, page 739:

"Upon the motion of Thomas Gill administration granted him on the estate of Wm. DOWEDOUERT (sic) he giving security for his administration according to law."

Also on the same page:

"Richard Wright, Geo. Kisham, Thos. Webb, Wm. Wildy, John Lanteger, any four of them are by the court appointed to appraise the estate of William DOWEDOUERT (sic) sometime before the next court being first sworn by the next justices, and ordered that Thomas Gill, administrator of the said DOWERT (sic) exhibit an inventory of appraisement thereof to the next court upon his oath."

July 18, 1711 - - - In the same Order Book: "Thomas Gill, administrator of Wm. DOWEDOUERT (sic) this day in court exhibited an inventory of the said DOWERT (sic) estate on his oath and the same is admitted to record."

July 18, 1711 - - - In Northumberland Co., Va., Record Book 18, page 17 shows "William DOWY'S (sic) inventory returned July 18, 1711 pursuant to order of Northumberland County Court of June 20, 1711. Inventory takers met at house of Thomas Gill and after being sworn by Col. Peter Presley took the inventory. Very little was listed. It was signed by Dick Wright, Wm. Wildy, Thomas Webb and John Lanteger or Lanketon."

From these limited records the compiler is convinced that they refer to this son. It would appear that after his apprenticeship he married and that he had one child.

From St. Stephen's Parish Register, page 6 the following record is taken:

"Mary DAUGHTY (sic) daug'r to Wm. born April 25, 1704."

No record of his importation has been found, and the compiler believes he was born in Virginia after his father had been brought in.

The Thomas Gill who administered his estate was evidently the one who left a will in Northumberland Co. in 1739.

A Richard Wright left a will in Northumberland in 1720.

A William Wildy left a will in Northumberland in 1726, and the Wildy family intermarried with the Daughty family in that county.

A Thomas Webb left a will in Northumberland in 1721.

No record of any will of James Nipper was found. He may have left Northumberland to come to rest in some Virginia county where the records are not complete. The only James Nipper will found listed in Virginia prior to 1800 was James Nipper in Brunswick Co., Va., in 1794, certainly too late for this man.

No record was found of any will by a man bearing a name such as John Lanteger or Lanketon. The name may have been John Lancaster who died in Northumberland, intestate, in 1738.

The sale record on this man in Northumberland Co., Va., is that appearing on page 36 of St. Stephen's Parish Register where this entry appears:

Wm. Dauty, son to Jervis, born January 16, 1708.

The compiler believes this man headed toward that part of Virginia where reports indicated that more and better land was available. His route lay in a Northwesterly direction, if we are to judge from the later records of his descendants.

Unquestionably this man and his family was in the movement of the Irish and Scotch Irish mentioned by the late Fairfax Harrison in his great work "Landmarks of old Prince William", and it is in Prince William where next we meet this family as we shall see in connection with his descendants. It is believed that the Prince William Records mentioned under (160) Jarvis may have referred to this man, (103) Jervis.

One record was found in the official records of Northumberland County, Va., which we indentify as belonging to this man. However, there are several entries in St. Stephen's Parish Register which seem to belong to him.

Obviously the two entries on pages 37 and 38 of James refer to the same man despite the two methods of spelling.

The names on page 134 seem to refer to the same children as those listed under the same Christian names on page 38. Of course there is a difference of ten years (1724 vs 1734) in the year of birth of Sarah Daughity and Sarah Odothey, but the compiler has no doubt but that the year should have been 1734. In the case of Hannah Daughity vs Hannah Odothey, the dates exactly check making it clear beyond any reasonable doubt that the entries are duplicates despite the variation in spelling.

The sole official record thus far found which the compiler believes belongs to this man is that contained in Northumberland Co., Va., Record Book 19, page 297 where John O'Daughity (sic) reported to the court with John B. Baker on a writ of Livery and Seizen. Evidently he was acting as an officer of the court, or as a sheriff, a deputy or a constable. This was December 18, 1722.

The compiler believes this man died or left Northumberland about 1750. It should be observed that no record was found which could be identified as belonging to him in Northumberland County, Va., showing:

1. Any will, administration or inventory.
2. Any land grants or patents.
3. Any deeds for land as grantor or grantee.
4. Any deeds of gift.
5. Any deeds of trust.

Under the will of his father he was given the home place of his father containing 50 acres, 2 cattle and his father's great gun.

In an earlier compilation entitled "Daughetee, Daugherty, etc., Families of Southern States" this compiler included family No. 2 which included numerous records of a John and James Daugherty in Frederick and adjacent counties in Virginia. It seems probable these men may have been from this line, although proof is lacking at present.

(111) JAMES DOHERTY (sic), born C1700; died 1776.

This man, whose name later was generally spelled "Daughity" apparently remained in Northumberland, and became the succeeding head of numerous descendants there. It was the common practice for each family to have children bearing the Christian name, James, so that it has been practically impossible to segregate and separate each record of a James Daughity so as to identify it as belonging to this particular man.

The compiler believes the records justify the deduction that he was twice married and had two groups of children, one group from each marriage.

We treat him as the James Daughity who left a will in Northumberland Co., Va., made 10/2/1763 and proved 3/16/1771, and terminate his records in conformity therewith.

The following records probably refer to this man.

From St. Stephen's Parish Register.

Page 38.

Betty Daughety, daug'r to Ja's, born March 13, 1744.
 Sarah Daughety, daug'r to Ja's, born October 27, 1745.
 John Daughety, son to Ja's & Mary, born March 7, 1748.

Page 39.

His (probably William) Daughity, son to James, born February 27, 1756.
 Toulson Daughity, son to James & Betty Daughity, born March 5, 1763.
 Samuel Daughity, son to James & Elizabeth Daughity, born June 16, 1766.

From County records in Northumberland County.

- April 8, 1733 - - At Page 79 Order Bk. 9, 1729 to 1737 appears this entry:
 "Thomas Ains orphant of John Ains deed is hereby bound apprentice to James Daughity and to his heirs until he arrive at the age of twenty one years in consideration where the said James Daughity oblige himself to find him sufficient dyet cloathing and lodging during the said time and to learn him to read and write and the trade of a shoemaker for the due performance whereof Yarrat Hupplet with the said James Daughity enters into recognizance each of five thousand pounds of tobacco to be paid to the justices of the peace for the county for the use of the said orphant in case of the said James Daughity or his heirs not complying with his or their duty to the said orphant according to the act of assembly in that case made and provided."
- April 19, 1733 - Order Bk. 9, 1729 to 1737 at page 32 a suit by Matthew against James Daughity was dismissed.
- August 16, 1733 - Order Bk. 9, 1729 to 1737 at page 111 is a reference to a judgment obtained by James Daughity against the estate of Luke Hill for 325 pounds of tobacco. This was ordered paid and the amount with costs came to 197 + 200 or 397 pounds.
- May 16, 1734 - - Order Bk. 9, 1729 to 1737 at page 151:
 Suit of James Daughity vs. Benjamin Brown was dismissed.
 Suit of James Daughity vs. John Hudnell, James D. got judgment for 371 pounds of tobacco.
 Suit of James Daughity vs. Thomas Walker dismissed.
 Suit of James Daughity vs. William Cooper, James D. got judgment for 438 pounds of tobacco.

Apparently this man resided in St. Stephens Parish during his entire lifetime. The prevalence of other James Daughitys, Daughertys, etc. makes it difficult and practically impossible to segregate and identify all of his records, but we list the following as probably belonging to (111) James Daughity.

- 10/31/1751 - - - -He acquired 400 acres of land from John Hobson.
- 12/24/1751 - - - -He deeded back to John Hobson 345 acres of the 400 he had acquired from him. This left in his possession 55 acres about which we have later records. This 400 acre deed was acknowledged by John Hobson in the General Court of Virginia according to the recital in the later deed. The deed for the 345 acres described it as on the John Hobson's Mill Swamp and that it adjoined land of Joseph Robinson, Charles Fallin, Richard Chicister and Joseph Ball. (Record Bk. 2, pages 90-91.)
- 3/15/1756 - - - - He was given power of Attorney by Thomas Cottrell. (Record Bk. 3, pages 308-9, Recorded 6/10/1756)
- 4/11/1757 - - - - He deeded 50 acres of land to Joshua Helms, Jr. This land was on Helms Neck in St. Stephens Parish, Northumberland Co., Va., not far from Christian Creek, and adjoined the land of Robert Davis. (Record Bk. 4, page 52.)

- 2/8/1762 - - - - He was mentioned as "my friend" in the will of John Hobson.
(Record Bk. 5, page 455)
- 8/8/1763 - - - - He was awarded judgment in the following order:
"Judgment upon petition to James Daughity against Daniel Neal and Frederick Wilbey for Twenty-five shillings and six pence due by bill which is ordered to be paid with interest from this day and costs." (Order Bk. 1762-1766, page 190)
- 5/10/1765 - - - - Evidently the preceding judgment was not paid, for a later order concerning it read as follows:
"The depd. Wilby not being arrested, this suit with respect to him is discontinued and the other depd. Neal that he cannot gainsay the plts. action. Therefore it is considered by this court that the plt. recover agst. the said depd. Neal the debt in the decl. mentioned amounting to £8..6..8.. together with his costs by him in this behalf expended. And this depdt. in mercy see. But this judmt. (The costs excepted) is to be discharged by the payment of Four pounds three shillings and four pence and one hundred and thirty-two pounds of tobacco—with lawful interest thereon to be computed from the 10th day of May 1765 till the time of payment."
(Order Bk., 1762-1766 at page 596)
- 6/9/1766)
6/12/1766) - - - - He with John Wornum ~~had~~ had up for consideration an application for the establishment of a mill. His application came before the court which summoned a jury to lay off and ap raise the land. The records of the award is in Record Bk. 6, page 661)
6/14/1766) The order accepting the report of the jury appears in Northumberland Co. Order Bk., 1762-1766, pages 612 and 621 as follows:
"Upon the petition of James Daughity and John Wornum for leave to build a mill on Hobson's Swamp in this county and to have an acre of land belonging to Sarah Edwards (now in possession of Robert Edwards) laid off and valued for the purpose of building the sd. mill--It is ordered that the Sheriff of this county do summon a jury of Twelve Freeholders of the vicenage to meet to upon the land petitioned for, who being met and duly sworn before a magistrate or the Sherriff do diligently view and examine the sd. land and the lands--adjacent thereto on both sides The Run, which may be affected or laid under water by building such mill, together with The Timber and other conveniences thereon; and report to the court--"
At page 621 of the same book the record continues as follows:
"A report of an acre of land to build a mill for by James Daughity and John Wornum, was this day (14th July 1766) returned and ordered to be recorded."

- 11/2/1768 - - - He was listed in the poll list of St. Stephens Parish, Northumberland Co., Va., and there was also a James Daughity, Jr., in the same list. He identify the latter as a nephew of James Daughity, and not as his son for his son (183) James D. was only about 13 years old at the time. His nephew (142) James Daughity in this compilation was then 35. (Record Bk. 7, pages 410, 416 and 420)
- 1770 - - - - - He reported as an executor of the will of John Hobson. (Record Bk. 8, page 45)
- 3/11/1771 - - - - His will was presented for probate in Northumberland Co., Va. It is here set out in full:

Item. I give to my son James Daughity the plantation I bought of John Hobson to him and his heirs forever. Provided my wife will agree to take her dower out of that I have given to my son James but if she refuses so to do then I give & bequeath to my son John Daughity all my land to him and his heirs forever.

Item. I give to my wife Betty Daughity & to each of my children that is not already married & to ever of them one feather bed & furniture one cow & calf two pewter dishes one sow & pigs & one ewe & lamb to make them equal to what I have given my daughter Betty Warron to them & their heirs or assigns forever -----

Item. My will & desire is that the two negroes that I sent to my daughter Betty Warron do order that they shall be brought back viz/ Solomond & Isaac & appraised with the rest of my estate & that then two negroes Solomond & Isaac with all the rest of my negroes & all my other estate that I have not already given to be equally divided between my wife & all my children & to them & their heirs forever. Except my wife's negroes then my will & desire is after death may be divided among my children as afores.

Item. My will & desire is that my daughter Sarah Daughity shall have liberty to work her negroes on the land that I have given to my son John Daughity & to live upon the land herself during her maiden life.

lastly I constitute & appoint my friend William Parker & my son John Daughity & Toulson Parker to be my Exeers. of This my last Will & testament in Witness thereof I have unto set my hand & affixed my seal this 2nd day of October 1768

At a court held for Northumberland Co., the 11day of Mar. 1771 This last will & testament of James Daughity dec'd, was presented in court by John Daughity & William Parker, two of the Executors therein named, who made oath thereto according to law, & being proved by the oaths of Richard Walker, & Hannah Walker, witnesses thereto was admitted to Record on the motion of the Exe's. Giving security, certificate is granted therefor obtaining a Probate thereof in due form.

The will was ordered probated and the estate appraised as shown in Northumberland Co., Va., Order Bk., 1770-1773, page 73. William Eskridge, James Sims, William Cornell and Elisha Marcus, or any three of them, were ordered to appraise the estate and slaves in Current Money, and to present the inventory and appraisal to the Court. At page 81 of the same book the report was made, and at page 183 the appraisal appears.

March, 1771 In Order Bk., 1770-1773, of Northumberland Co., Va., page 74, James Daughity, orphan of James Daughity, deceased, chose William Parker as his guardian; Toulson Daughity, another son, chose Toulson Parker; and Samuel Daughity, a third minor son, chose John Daughity.

In the division of his estate as recorded in Record Book 8, page 326, the following heirs are named:

Betty Norman

John Daughity

Thomas Schoolfell, who wed Sarah Daughity

William Parker, guardian of James Daughity

Toulson Parker, guardian of Toulson Daughity

John Daughity, guardian of Samuel Daughity

The same record explains the method employed in allowing for schooling and that James Daughity lacked one year of schooling while Toulson and Sarah had none.

Record Book 8, page 329 reports the account of John Daughity as guardian of Samuel.

From the foregoing the Compiler deduces that (111) James was twice married as follows:

The compiler inclines to the belief that this child may have left Northumberland County with her uncle Jarvis Daughity, and that she married John Fishback in Prince William in lieu of (131) Mary as written up.

- (130) WILLIAM DAUGHTY (sic) born 1/16/1703; died _____ 1760.

The first record of this man thus far discovered after his birth record in Northumberland Co., Va., is where he appears in Frederick County, Va., and acquires 100 acres of land under an indenture dated 3/30/1745. The land was by lease and release from Jacob Funk.

It seems important that certain of these identifying records be copied in full so as to establish certain facts of record. Therefore we insert a copy of the "Release". The "Lease" so closely corresponds to the "Release" that its

inclusion is not deemed essential. It should be understood that Frederick County was in what was known as the Northern Neck of Virginia and included in the vast empire claimed by Lord Fairfax. It was not his custom to deed in fee simple, but to give "leases" and "releases" under which the other party to the transaction acquired a limited right to the land.

The lease generally preceded the release by one day. The descriptive recitals in both were either identical or substantially so. Therefore, it seems sufficient to give the citation reference to the lease record, and to include a full copy of the more important releases. We have endeavored to follow their spelling regardless of errors--phonetic or otherwise.

In 1739 a petition was filed by inhabitants of what was later Frederick Co., Va., asking the establishment of a new county, etc. It contained neither ADAUGNETEE, DAUGHNETEE nor similar name, although several Funks signed. This may indicate that the DAUGHNETEES were not yet residents in that section. This list is printed in the SARICHT FAMILY, an interesting Genealogy.

It is to be noted from the above document that:

1. (1) WILLIAM DAUGHETEE'S name in the document is spelled DAUGHADAY.
2. That he was a resident of the Parish and County of Frederick at that time.
3. That he was a farmer. This implies he was farming prior to that date, and probably in that county.

Jacob Funk has released to William TIDWELL 100 acres of land 4/17/1744, which was the land adjoining that of William Daughetee. (Frederick Co., Va., Deed Bk. 1, pages 86 and 87.)

The next record thus far found of William is dated April 3, 1753, Frederick Co., Va., Order Bk. 4, page 453. This shows that Jervis Dougherty, William Dougherty, Christopher Homes (Holmes?), and Joseph Homes were duly sworn and met to appraise the estate of Alexander Clement, deceased.

No report of the appraisal has been found of record.

January 3, 1755 William O'DOUGHERTAY (as spelled in Order Book) with Chas. Buck, George Bowman and Isaac met to appraise the estate of Jacob Funk, deceased. (Frederick Co., Va., Order Book 7, page 345)

April 8, 1758 William DOWADAY (as spelled in Order Book) filed a petition as plaintiff against James RAMEY. William did not appear, so that case was dismissed. (Frederick Co., Va., Order Bk. 8, page 25)

The next record we find of this William is where he acquired 100 acres from William French and wife Winnifred of Prince William Co., Va., September 4, 1759.

This land was located in Frederick Co., Va., adjoining the land acquired by William Daughetee. French had acquired it from Jacob Funk, Jr., who, in turn acquired it as an heir in the settlement of his father's estate. Only the release will be copied.

In the copied releases we have found William acquiring three pieces of land, and have found his name spelled differently in each of them: Doughday, Adoughhetee, and Dougherty, respectively.

We have found no deed, lease, contract or other legal document of record and signed by this William, hence we have no way of knowing his personal way of spelling his name.

June 3, 1760 his widow appeared in court in Frederick County and prayed for letter of Administration of administer the estate of her late husband, who died intestate. There were granted her and her sons Gervas (Jarvis) and William signed as her securities. (Frederick Co., Va., Order Bk. 9, page 55.)

The same day the court appointed as appraisers of the estate: Charles Bush (Buch), George Brink (Bounds), Robert North and Leonard Mornsby. (Frederick Co., Va., Order Bk. 9, page 56.)

A report of the appraisers was made August 3, 1760. A copy is included to indicate the number and nature of his personal property.

Thus far we have been unable to find any further report of either on the sale of personal effects or on the distribution of the estate.

Dying intestate as he did, his eldest son fell heir to his land as will be later disclosed. It may be that a further report on final distribution of the property may appear in the records of Dunmore-Frederick County. Their location in Frederick County was in that part which fell into Dunmore County when it was formed from Frederick County in 1772, and which was renamed Shenandoah County in 1778. These records have not been given a thorough search so far as order books are concerned.

The only record thus far found of William or his widow, Sarah, in Shenandoah Co., Va., follows:-

Sarah Adougherty, plaintiff vs. John North

Suit for 16 pounds. Defendant says he owes the bill. The court rules that he pay all costs and interest at 5% from June 30, 1771 on 7 pounds 16 shillings. Plaintiff agreed to stay execution until July next.

Trial justices were: Burr Harrison, Franklin Slaughter, Joseph Pugh, Abraham Keller, Jonathan Langdon and John Tipton.

From these records the deduction seems justified that (130) William, despite the several variations in the spelling of his name, is one and the same man. The official records very definitely "tie" him into these records by documentary evidence.

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(131) MARY DAUGHMETEE, born _____; died A1735. We list Mary as a probable sister of William, and think it probable she was the Mary DOARHERTY named as the wife (second) of John FISHBACK in Prince William County, Va. The will was made March 11, 1735; proved March 19, 1734-5. (Prince Wm. Co., Will Book C, page 23)

This marriage is mentioned in the Fishback Genealogy (The Fishback Family, by Willis Miller Kemper, 1914.)

There is a probability that it was (120) Mary who married John Fishback.

No effort will be made to list descendants from this wedding, as they are already covered fully by the above mentioned genealogy.

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(142) JAMES DAUGHITY (sic), born March 8, 1730; died 1806.

In earlier consideration of this man the compiler expressed the belief that he had left Northumberland County, Va., and that he may have been one of the several James Daughitys, Daughertys, etc., whose records appear in the compilation "Daughetee, Daugherty, etc., Families of the Southern States."

Later consideration seems to justify a change in this earlier deduction. The compiler believes this man and his brother (145) John Daughety (sic) both remained in Northumberland County. This compilation has been changed to reflect this belief.

We believe the following records refer to this man:-

11/24/1768 - - - A James Daughity, Jr., was in the Poll list of Stephen's Parish, Northumberland Co., Va. There was also a James Daughity in the same list. We identify the latter as (111) James Daughity. Although (111) James had a son James Daughity who was properly James Daughity, Jr., this son was not born until about 1755, hence was too young to appear in a 1768 Poll list. This James, son of James, is listed herein as (153) James Daughity. By

By the time he was old enough to be listed in a Poll list, his father had died.

For these reasons we deduce the James Daughity, Jr., listed in 1768 was (142) James who was the son of (110) John; a nephew of (111) James and a first cousin of (153) James.

- 2/10/1753 - - - -He acquired 35 acres from John HUDNALL. This land was in St. Stephen's Parish and adjoined lands of WOOLRIDGE SMITH and THOMAS HARDIN. (Record Book 2, page 228)
- 4/11/1757 - - - -It is believed this was the James Daughity who deeded 50 acres on Nelms Neck, adjoining Robert Davis, to Joshua Nelms. We believe this was the man for the reason that no wife signed with him. (111) James had a wife at the time and (153) James was an infant.
- 8/10/1773 - - - -He deeded to his brother (145) John Daughity 52 acres. This land adjoined the land of William Hudnall, Eben Nelms and Samuel Harding. His wife, Elizabeth, signed the deed with him. (Record Bk. 10, page 356) This may have been (153) James.
- 11/8/1783 - - - -His land was mentioned in a deed from Joseph Hudnall to Jane Humphries. (Record Bk. 12, page 104)

The Compiler believes it was (142) James Daughity who died and left a will in Northumberland County, Va., made January 10, 1795; proved November 10, 1806. (Record Book 17, page 480)

From his will we learn that his wife was named Elizabeth, but we have no clue to her family name.

We deduce from the disposition made of his realty and chattels that he had no children, but numbers are reserved.

(145) JOHN DAUGHETY (sic) born August 6, 1739; died 1808.

In earlier consideration of this man, the Compiler expressed the belief that he had left Northumberland Co., Va., and that he may have been one of the several John Daughetys, Daughetys, etc., whose records appear in the compilation "Daughatee, Daugherty, etc., Families of Southern States."

Later consideration seems to justify a change in this earlier deduction. The Compiler believes this man and his brother (142) James Daughety (sic) both remained in Northumberland Co. This compilation has been changed to reflect this belief.

We believe the following records refer to this man:-

- 8/19/1767 - - - -He made a prenuptial contract with Moses Williams. Under this contract (145) John Daughety was to marry Elizabeth Williams, daughter of Moses. In consideration of this marriage Moses Williams agreed to give John Daughety, Jr., one negro boy, "Rhodes" the day of the marriage and one negro girl, "Agatha" upon the death of Moses Williams. This agreement was recorded 3/14/1768 in Record Book 7, page 196.
- 4/21/1773 - - - -He sued James Webb for trespass. (Order Bk. 1773-1778, p.97)
- 1/31/1788 - - - -He deeded with his wife "Betty" 60 acres to Joshua COCKARELL or COTTERILL. The land was on SPANN'S MILL POND adjoining land of NICHOLAS ROBINSON and on the road known as HACK'S NECK ROAD. (Record Book 14, page 164)

We believe this man to have been the John Daughety who left a will in Northumberland County, Va., made January 10, 1795; proved December 12, 1808. One strong item of evidence to support this belief is that (142) James Daughity had his will made the same day, so that the belief seems justified that the two brothers planned their affairs so as to devise their property as was done.

(145) John Daughety's will is here set out in full: (Record Bk.18, page 73)

Will of (145) John Daughety

In the name of God amen, I John Daughety of North^d County and Parish of St. Stephens being in perfect mind and memory, do make and ordain this my last will and testament in manner and form following (to wit) - - - - -

Item. I give and bequeath to my son James Daughety and his heirs and assigns forever, the land whereon I now live--

Item. I give and bequeath to my sons William and James Daughety my personal estate to be divided equally between them.

Item. I leave William and James Hudnall my whole and sole executors of this last will and testament. In testimony whereof I have hereunto set my hand and affixed my seal this 10th day of January 1795.

At a court of monthly session held for Northumberland County at the Courthouse on Monday, the 12th of December 1808. James Hudnall relinquished his right of executorship of the within will of John Daughety decd. Whereupon the same was proved by the oath of the said James Hudnall who also made oath that the name of Wm. Hudnall subscribed to the said will, and who is since dead was subscribed by the said William in his presence whereupon the same is ordered to be recorded.

Although the records are not wholly clear on this the compiler believes this (145) John Daughety was the man who married Nancy HUGHLETT, widow in Northumberland Co., Va., April 8, 1799. This may account for the fact that no mention was made in his will of any wife.

He believe, further, that Nancy Hughlett was born Nancy Conway, daughter of Richard Conway of Alexandria. She seems also to have been related, by descent, to James TOLSON. References to her share in their estates will be found under (190) James Daughety.

The foregoing deduction may be wholly wrong, and it is submitted tentatively and in the hope that later facts will clarify the record.

(152) JOHN DAUGHETY (sic) born March 7, 1748; died 1810.

- 8/10/1778 - - - -He acquired 52 acres from his brother (153) James Daughity and wife Elizabeth. (Record Bk. 10, pages 332 and 356) Apparently he retained this until his death. This may have been (145) John.
- 1779 - - - - - - - He identify him as being the John Daughity serving with the Virginia Navy as did his brothers (153) James and (155) Toulson. (See AUD a/c 1779-80-319 in Virginia Archives)
- 1782-1784 - - - -He identify him as the John Daughety listed in the so-called "First Census" of Virginia as follows:
(St. Stephen's Parish)
1782 - With 6 whites and no blacks.
(Northumberland Co.)
1784 - With 4 whites, 1 dwelling, 1 other building.
- 1782-1810 - - - -From the earliest tax list (1782) until 1810, a John Daughety (Tax lists, Land) was listed in the land tax lists with 52 acres of land. Undoubtedly this was this man.
- 1782-1810 - - - -From 1782 to 1805 a John Daughety is listed. More than one (Tax lists, Personal) appears, so identification is difficult.

- 153 -

(153) JAMES DAUGHITY (sic), born 01755; died March 27, 1830.

The following official records of Northumberland Co., Va., are believed to refer to this man:-

- March, 1771 - - - -He was minor surviving his deceased father and he chose William Parker as his guardian.
- 1773 - - - - - - - He chose Thomas SCHOOLFELL as his guardian. This guardian had married his half sister, Sarah Daughety (sic). (Northumberland Order Book 1770-1773, page 469)
- 4/10/1780 - - - -His brother (155) Toulson Daughity's estate, from their father, was being administered by TOLSON Parker who died. Then (153) James Daughity was chosen as Toulson Daughity's guardian. (Northumberland Record Book 11, page 44)

- 9/2/1791 - - - - He acquired from Presley Thornton and wife, Elizabeth, 114 3/4 acres. This land was on Hacks Neck at the head of a Mill Pond of Comsay's. It adjoined Joshua Cockrell and William Webb. It was described as part of the land conveyed unto James Daughity, William F. Williams, and Thomas G. Blackerby, July 26, 1791. (Northumberland Record Book 14, page 529)
- 1795 - - - - - In Northumberland Order Book 1790-1795, page 199 appears this entry:
 "On the motion of James Daughity for leave to turn a road, ordered that William Helms, William Corbell, Joshua Cockrell and Heli Widdy or any three of them be appointed to view, on oath, the said road, & the way the said James Daughity proposes to turn the same, and to report to the court the comparative conveniences and inconveniences that will result as well to the Public as to individuals if such road shall be turned."
- 11/18/1795 - - - His land was processioned. E. Helms was present. The land was described as "on the south side of the road that leads from Northumberland Courthouse to Fairfield's Church."
- 11/1/1798 - - - - He acquired 55 acres of land on Little Wicomico River from Walter Anderson. This had formerly belonged to (111) James Daughity, father of James, and had been willed to (153) James Daughity. As shown above, (153) James had deeded the land to his brother (152) John Daughity under date of 8/10/1778. (Record Book, Northumberland Co., No. 10, page 356)
- 11/19/1798 - - - He deeded to Walter Anderson "One Moity" of Mill site land on Little Wicomico River. The land had originally been deeded to his father, (111) James, by John Hobson 10/31/1751. This deed was recorded in the General Court of Virginia. It originally consisted of 400 acres. (111) James D. then deeded back to John Hobson 345 acres, retaining the 55 acres which he willed to (153) James Daughity. As shown above, (153) James D. deeded this to (152) John, his brother, under date of 8/10/1778. (152) John deeded the land to Joshua Cotterell January 31, 1788. (Record Book 14, page 164)
 As shown next above, the land was acquired by Walter Anderson, who deeded it to (153) James 11/1/1798. (Record Bk. 10, page 356). Apparently (153) James was preparing to leave Virginia for Tennessee and was disposing of his Virginia land. (Northumberland Record Book 15, page 538.)
- 11/28/1798 - - - He deeded 114 3/4 acres to Spencer Wise. This was the identical land which he had acquired from Presley and Elizabeth Thornton 9/2/1791. (North. Rec. Bk. 14, page 529 and Rec. Bk. 15, page 539)
- 10/15/1803 - - - He was residing in Davidson County, Tennessee when he made a deed of gift of a described lot of land in Tennessee on the East Fork of Stones River. This was land which he had acquired from Redman D. Barry. The property was deeded to his son (200) William Ball Daughity. (Northumberland Co. Record Book 17, page 102)

(153) James had service in the Revolutionary War in the Virginia Navy. He served as a Midshipman in the Protector (Galley) from January 19, 1777. He was a Lieutenant Captain August 27, 1778, as shown by the Journal of the Navy Board. He continued in service until after September 10, 1779, as shown by his pension record. (From History of Virginia's Navy of the Revolution, by Robert Armistead Stewart). His name in the Navy record appears as Daugherty, Daughity, and Daurity.

Although he moved to Tennessee he apparently returned to Northumberland County, Virginia, where he remained until his death in March, 1830.

From his war records, his deeds, his will, and the records of the administration of his estate the list of his children is compiled.

His will was made 3/27/1830; proved 5/10/1830. (R.B.26, page 295). The slaves were divided as shown in R.B. 26, pages 427-429.

A complete copy of his will follows:

In the name of God Amen I James Daughity being in perfect sence and memory calling to mind the certainty of death make and ordain this my last will and testament in form and manner as follows, in the first place I leave and bequeath to my beloved wife Elizabeth Daughity all of my estate for the support of her and family during her life or widowhood and at her death or marriage I give unto James B. Daughity, one negroe girl, Sarah Ann, in the next place I give unto Rebecca Wildy one negroe girl Viner, and unto her mother Jane Wildy one negroe James, and it is my desire that the balance of my negroes at the death or marriage of my wife should be equally divided among all of my children that is to say, James B. Daughity, Baladan B. Daughity & Jane Wildy, and I also give unto Aurlous, son of Samuel B. Daughity, eighty dollars when collected out of my estate which is now in the hands of William A. Yord of Rutherford County in the State of Tennessee, and the balance of my estate to be equally divided among my three youngest children, James B. Daughity, Baladan B. Daughity & Jane Wildy as witness my hand and seal this the 27th day of March in the year of Our Lord one thousand eight hundred and thirty in the presents of

- Page 31 - - - - - "Admon of the estate of James Daughity decd. heretofore granted to the Sheriff & now revoked granted Samuel B. Daughity--oath admon^d. bond & security given."
- Page 31 - - - - - "Or'd. that Master Com^v. Tho. S. Sydnor settle Joseph Ball's ac^ol. of his admon of the estate of James Daughity and report."
- Page 213 - - - - - "Or'd. that it be certified that it appears to the satisfaction of the court that Wm. B. Daughity, Saml. B. Daughity, Jas. B. Daughity & Jane Wildy wife of Jas. A. Wildy brothers & sisters of Belden B. Daughity who died under the age of 21 years & Elizabeth Daughity mother of the s^d. Baladen B., which said Baladen was one of the sons of Jas. Daughity decd."
- Page 275 - - - - - "Satisfactory evidence was adduced in court to prove that James Daughity who married the half sister of Wm. Humphries, by whom he had one child, which child & the mother of the same are both dead & the s^d. James is the only heir at law in fee to the said Wm. Humphries late a private in the 5th Regiment of Infantry of the U. States." (This order entered 10th June 1833.)

In Northumberland Co., Va., Order Book, 1835-44 at page 6 appears the following record:

"Ordered that it be cert^d. that James Daughity a Lieutenant in the Va. State Navy, revolutionary war died about the 27th day of March 1830 & estate & that he his will is on record in the county court clerk's office of this county & that Saml. B. Daughity adm^r. is now living in the state of Mississippi." (Date - 6th Feby. 1836)

 Parker. (R.B. 11, page 44)

A Samuel Daughity wed Sally Wildy March 14, 1825, in Northumberland Co., Va., with Jeremiah Wildy as her guardian, but the compiler believes this was a later Samuel, probably (207) Samuel S. Daughity.

(157) CORNELIUS DAUGHITY, born c1740; died c1765.

We list him as a probable son, but with no information to prove it.

He is reported as having married Eliza Bessick in October, 1764.

His estate was inventoried in 1772. The following appears in Northumberland Co., Va., Order Book for 1770:

"On the motion of Thomas Jones who made oath according to Law, certificate is granted him for obtaining Letters of Administration of the estate of Cornelius Daughity decd., he the said Thomas together with John S. Woodcock, his surety, having entered into and acknowledged bond for the due admon. of the s^d. Decd^{ts}. Estate." (Date not given, but about 1st Jan. 1765)

In Northumberland Co., Va., Order Book 1762-6 at page 500 appears this entry:

"The petition of Cornelius DAUGHORTY against Griffin Williams is dismissed."

(160) JARVIS DAUGHETEE, born c1722; died 1814.

He was married at least twice: I Elizabeth _____, before ____.
II _____.

He was the eldest son of (130) William. From the fact that he gave bond, as shown below, in 1743 indicates he was over 21 at the time, so his birth is shown as before 1722.

To make the record as comprehensible as possible we list such of the official records of Jarvis as seem essential.

Not only is his family name subjected to variations in spelling, but his christian name appears spelled as Jarvis, Jervis, Jervise, Garvis, Gervas, Gervis, etc. It is believed by the compiler that the proper spelling is Jarvis, and that the name probably came from some intermarriage between a Daughetee male and a Jarvis female. It is not impossible that the wife of (130) William was named Jarvis. It also is possible that Sarah may have been a second wife of (130) William.

The first record thus far located on this Jarvis Daughhete was dated May 23, 1743. On that date Jarvis AEDOGGARTY went security on a bond for the administration of the estate of James French in Prince William County, Va. (Prince William Co., Va., Will Book C, page 423) The inventory was submitted July 25, 1743 by Gervase Adaughete and William French. (Prince Wm. Co., Va., Will Book C, pages 425, 426.) The compiler is inclined to the belief this may have been this man's grandfather (103) Jervis or Jarvis.

In the will of James French, made November 2, 1741; proved March 23, 1743, Leonard Hornsby and John Metcalf were designated as executors. They "refused the burden of executorship." Thereupon, William French and Jarvis Daughhete qualified to administer the estate and gave the bond referred to above. This, too, may have been (103) Jarvis.

Apparently French had only his widow, Elizabeth, his daughter, Mary Ann, and his son, William. The son received the home plantation. (Prince Wm. Co., Va., Will Bk. C, pages 423, 425, 426 and 446 to get full official information)

Note that Leonard Hornsby mentioned as an executor later appears in Frederick County, Virginia, as one of the appraisers of the estate of (130) William Daughhete in 1761. This suggests some possible relationship between the Daughhete and Hornsby families. (Frederick Co., Va., Order Bk. 9, pp55,56)

A further fact is this: there exists in Prince William Co., Va., a poll list of those who voted there in 1741, and the candidates for whom they cast their vote. A search of that list failed to disclose any Daughhete or similar name.

It should be here noted that the name signed to the bond was Jarvis a Doughity, but in recording it the clerk spelled it as DOGGARTY. The fact of this mixup is the subject of comment at page 409, Vol. I, The Washington Ancestry.

It seems proper to here call attention to the fact that this William French was the one who later acquired land in Frederick Co., Va., which he sold to (130) William Daughhete. Also, that the widow of James French was named Elizabeth. It seems probable the families were closer than mere neighbors, and it might be that Elizabeth French may have become the Elizabeth Daughhete, first wife of Jarvis. (Note that (795) William Daughhete was a partner of a John French in Estill Co., Ky., almost one hundred years later.)

There was a Richard Jarvis in Prince William County. It is possible the two families intermarried in that county, but there are no marriage records available at this time.

(160) Jarvis first appears in Frederick County at the same time his father (130) William appeared of record. At that time he acquired 100 acres of land from Jacob Funk who also sold land to (130) William. We record this lease and release, but insert a copy of the release only.

April 3, 1753 - - Jarvis Dougherty, William Dougherty, Christopher Homes and Joseph Homes were sworn and met to appraise the estate of Alexander Clement, deceased. (Frederick Co., Va., Order Bk.4, page 452.)

April 3, 1753 - - He was made overseer of the road from TIDWELLS FORD to the road leading to Chester's Hay Botton, in the place of Wm. Tidwell. (Frederick Co., Va., Order Book 4, page 453.)

Oct. 4-5, 1756 - - He leased and released to Henry Funk the 100 acres of land which he had acquired from Jacob Funk in 1745. The lease and release were accepted for recording October 5, 1756. (Order Book 7, page 124.)

We give the following references of recording and set out a copy of the release, but not the lease.

It is to be noted that the name in the body of the deed is spelled Doughaday, which was the spelling used in 1745 in the deed of release to Jarvis; and that the deed is signed Gervas aDOUGHETEE. Now this is a book record by the County Clerk, and not an original record. As a rewritten record it should be accepted subject to the errors in transcribing; and with the further understanding that the land originally was released to GARVIS Doughaday.

June 3, 1760 - - -Jarvis appeared in court with Sarah, widow of his father, (130) William. He signed as one of her securities on the bond given by her as administratrix of the estate. (Frederick Co., Va., Order Book 9, page 55.)

Jarvis, being the eldest son of (130) William, fell heir to all the real property of his father who died intestate. Of the three pieces acquired by (130) William, his father, he apparently retained the one piece of 160 acres acquired by (130) William from John Funk the year before his death.

The other two adjoining pieces of 100 acres each, acquired by (130) William from Jacob Funk, and William French, were consolidated by Jarvis and leased and released by Jarvis to (161) William his brother under date of August 4-5, 1760. This record follows:

October, 1765 - - It was ordered that JERVAIS ADOUGHERTY and 160 acres of land be added to the list of tithables: (Frederick County, Va., Order Book 13, page 18.)

This is the last record thus far found of Jarvis in Frederick Co., Va.

Jarvis Doughhetee appears in the land tax records of Shenandoah County, Virginia, from the earliest available record of 1782 to his death. In each case he is shown with 160 acres.

In the personal property lists he also appears with similar name variations. In 1792 his sons, John and Josiah, have presumably come of age and are listed with him. In 1794 Josiah and Elijah are listed with him. (It is to be noted that Josiah is not named in the will and probably died between 1794 and 1812.)

Through all the variations of spelling it is to be noted that the name in 1805 was spelled exactly as the spelling used by the Kentucky branch of the family.

In 1782 and 1785 state census he appears with his name spelled JER-VICE ADAUGHERTY.

In the 1810 Federal Census of Shenandoah County, Va., at page 214, the name of Garvy Docketty appears. He was shown as over 45 and at his home was one female between 16 and 26.

There seems to be confusion in these Durkins names. It appears that Sarah Daughhetee married James DURKINS according to family records given. (131) WILLIAM DAUGHNETEE, born ____; died A1794. He married Margery _____. It is not know if this was his first and only marriage or a second one. "Marjery" Daugherty was in the Monongalia County, Va., tax list in 1796.

Few records of this man have been found in Frederick County, Virginia.

- 8/5/1760 - - - - - He acquired the 200 acres of land from his brother (160) Jarvis. (Frederick Co., Va., Deed Book 6, pages 18 and 19). This record has already been fully covered under (160) Jarvis, and need not be repeated here.
- 8/5/1760 - - - - - He seems to have been the William who was one of the appraisers of the estate of Jacob HOFFMAN, (HOFFMAN), (Frederick Co., Va., Will Book 2, page 413).
- 12/3/1761 - - - - - He was ordered to pay 470 pounds of tobacco to a witness. (Frederick Co., Va., Order Book 9, pages 356 and 357 - Case of William Dougherty vs. John Bowman).
- 10/3/1765 - - - - - It was ordered that William DOHERTY and 200 acres of land be added to the list of tithables in Frederick Co., Va. (Order Book 13, page 19).
- October, 1791 - - - Case of William Daugherty vs. Isaac Zane, dismissed with costs. (Order Book 23, page 212). It is not clear what he was doing in Frederick County at that time.

No later record of him has been found in Frederick Co., Va.

Being a younger son, he did not fall heir to any of the land when his father died intestate in 1761.

(161) WILLIAM DAUGHETEE appears in the land tax records of Shenandoah County, Virginia, from the earliest available record of 1782 to 1794 when he sold his land, and not thereafter. In each case he is shown as having 200 acres.

In the printed so-called "First Census" of Virginia, designed to replace the destroyed 1790 Federal Census, they reprinted the State Census or tithe lists of certain counties of Virginia for the years 1782 and 1785. The lists for Shenandoah County are included for both years. He appears therein as follows:

1782 - William Adoughethy
 1785 - William Adoughethy

He did not appear in the Monongalia County, Va., Lists for 1782 or 1785.

It is believed he moved to Monongalia County from Shenandoah about 1787; but he seems to have been in Monongalia prior to that year for the purpose of selecting lands, and establishing the required proof of "improvement and cultivation."

The destruction of practically all the county records in Monongalia in 1796 leaves us with only fragmentary records prior to that date.

He appears to have settled in the Dunkards' Bottom District, then in Monongalia County, Va., along the Cheat River. Dunkards' Bottom was a tract of fine land on the east side of Cheat River, 22 miles from the mouth of Cheat River, and about 47 miles southwest of Fort Cumberland. It should not be confused with Dunkards' Creek which is a tributary of Monongalia River, and not of the Cheat River.

They located on a small stream crossing Dunkards' Bottom and emptying into Cheat River, and it still bears the name of DORITY'S RUN. There also was a DORITY Post Office in the settlement.

The extensive holdings were where the present village of Albright, West Virginia, is located, and are about three miles northeast of Kingwood, County seat of Preston County, West Virginia. Preston County was formed out of Monongalia County, Va., in 1818. Both are now in the state of West Virginia.

We found no record of any grant made to cover this certificate in the Virginia land office, but there is evidence that William Daugherty acquired similar land in another location.

In Monongalia County Survey Book 4, page 211, there is record of 200 acres surveyed for William Daugherty, part of preemption warrant 1937 for 1000 acres, dated December 18, 1781; entered October 10, 1785, near mouth of Pringles Run. Assigner of James Morgan, Assignee of John Morgan.

In the Virginia Land Office in Richmond, Grant Book 34, page 380, June 27, 1786, shows a grant of 100 acres to William Daugherty, above the mouth of Pringles Run, on the West Side of Cheat River, adjoining Col. Wm. McCleery. Granted by virtue of L.O.T.W. 1937. It seems obvious this is part of the 1000 acre grant. However, the Grant Book at this entry bears this notation: "Delivered to Mr. Morgan January 19, 1836". No further details.

In No. 2 Land Entry Book 1783-1802 in Morgantown, Monongalia County, W. Va., we find these entries which undoubtedly bear on this 1000 acre grant:

Page 224. Wm. Daugherty enter 150 acres of the last warrant between Pringles Run and Cheat River on the River Hill. August 7, 1791, withdrawn.

Page 225. Wm. Daugherty enters 150 acres of the last entered warrant on the second point of the mountain above Pringles Run. August 8, 1791, withdrawn.

Page 252. William Daugherty assignee of John Morgan enters 200 acres, part of L.O.T.W. on preemption of 1000 acres, dated 13th December 1781, beginning about three quarters of a mile above the mouth of Pringles Run, between said run and Cheat River, and extending out from the River and Run for 2 $\frac{1}{2}$ miles. Withdrawn by order.

A William Dougherty had a claim for land in Monongalia County, Va. He must have died before October 6, 1793. On that day a Jarvis Dougherty and other heirs of William established the facts of their heirship. They were granted 354 acres in Monongalia County, Va., between Roaring Creek and Draper's Run. This was by virtue of an order of court pronounced October 6, 1793. (Va. Land Office Grant Book 37, page 491) dated 11/6/1797.

In the Surveyors' Record at Morgantown, W. Va., in Book 4, page 368, it is shown that a survey of the claim was made as follows:

Surveyed in compliance with a judging of a General Court held in Richmond the 6th day of October 1793--354 acres of land in Monongalia County for Jarvis Dougherty, Jane Eliot, wife of Abraham Eliot, Rebecca Dougherty, Money Dougherty and Elizabeth Dougherty heirs at law of William Dougherty, deceased, assignee of Samuel TETOR between Roaring Creek and Draper's Run, bounded as follows: (Then follows the description.)

William Dougherty, Senior, and Junior were listed as tax payers in Monongalia County, Va., tax lists from 1785 to 1796.

July 25, 1792 - William Daugherty and William Daugherty, Junior, signed a petition in Monongalia asking for the formation of a new county out of Monongalia and suggesting Thomas Butler and Andrew Ramsey as Justices. Thomas Butler was a neighbor of William Daugherty and John Daughetee, and Andrew Ramsey's daughter married another William Dougherty, son of Jarvis, (240) William in this record. This new county was not formed until 1818 long after the Daughetees had left that section. The new county became Preston County, formed in 1818.

In the History of Preston County, W. Va., (formerly Va.), at page 406 is the story of William who lived near what was later St. Joe, Preston County, and had a large amount of land. It recites the romance between William Daugherty's daughter Jane, and Abraham Elliott, whom she married. However, it incorrectly calls him William Elliott.

In a later History of Preston County by Morton, he attempts to tell of the same romance, but calls Jane the daughter of John Daugherty. It seems clear from the proof of heirship made by Jarvis, Jane, etc., she was the daughter of a William instead of a John, but the compiler believes she was the daughter of a William Daugherty, Jr.

(William seems to drop out of the personal property list after 1796, denoting probable removal about that time.) Later land tax records are as follows:

- 1812 - William got 1008 acres according to tax list at Charleston, West Va.
This shows the land to him from ALEXANDER SUITER. It was on Dunkard Creek.
- 1813 - William had 500 acres adjoining William Biggs on Cheat River; also 1008 acres on Dunkard Creek. There also is listed in 1813 500 acres on Cheat River for "Wm. Daugherty's Heirs".
- 1814 - William had 1008 acres. It shows "Residence Unknown".
- 1816 - William had land valued \$252.00. "Residence Unknown".
- 1817 - William (heirs) had 500 acres on Cheat River joining William Biggs, and 1008 acres. "Unknown".
- 1818 - William listed as "Unknown".

It has been practically impossible to segregate and identify the records of Northumberland County, Va., pertaining to this particular James Daughity. However, we here set out some which appear to belong to him:

Carbell or any 3 be appointed to divide the estate of Nancy Conway Goode and Rebecca Daughity in the hands of James Daughity their guardian and possess them therewith and report." (Northumberland Order Book 1808, page 61)

2/13/1809 - - - - Edward Goode gave a power of attorney to his "trusty friend James Daughity." The document recited: "That whereas by virtue of my marriage with Nancy Conway Daughity I am entitled to a part of the estate of Richard Conway, deceased, late of Alexandria, and that of James Toulson deceased, late of Northumberland and Commonwealth of Virginia, I hereby nominate and appoint my trusty friend, James Daughity, my full and lawful attorney for me and in my name to receive all monies or dues which shall or may be owing or due unto me from the estates aforementioned." (Northumberland Order Book 18, page 100)

5/8/1809 - - - - There appears the following report on the estates:

"Agreeable to an order of Northumberland County bearing date of 14th, November, 1808, we the subscribers met and settled the estate ... held by James Daughity, guardian Nancy C. and Rebecca Daughity for his said wards with their proportionable parts of said deceased's estate this 23rd day of February, 1809.

1809 - - - - - The children of James Daughity received part of the estate of their grandfather Thomas TOULSON. (Record Bk. 18, page 41)

The deed described the land as "being that part of the tract of land lately owned by the father of the said James and William Daughity which the said James inherited from his father aforesaid which land is now in the possession and occupation of him, the said William Daughity."

C1820 - - - - - In Northumberland Co., Va., Order Book 1795-1839 at page 246 appears this record:
 "James Daughity appeared before the court in discharge of his recognizance entered into on the complaint of his wife Winifred Daughity for a breach of the peace and sundry witnesses being sworn & examined it is considered that the said James Daughity be bound to keep the peace for 12 months in the sum of \$100 with 2 surety in the sum of \$50 each, and that he stand committed until he give such surety & enter into such recognizance, whereupon he with Wm. Daughity & Jordan Haynie his sureties ent^d into recognizance accordingly."

From the foregoing the Compiler deduces that (190) James married at least once prior to his marriage to Winifred _____. The reference to the property which descended to Nancy Conway Daughity and Rebecca Daughity seems to indicate clearly these were his children, although he is referred to as "guardian". He probably was both father and guardian to his children after their mother's death.

Andrew Ramsey was the son of John Ramsey, who died and left a will in Monongalia Co., Va., made 3/26/1796; proved 8/1796. This will, for some reason, is recorded in Monongalia Co., Va., Deed Book 2, page 345, instead of the regular Will Book. The will named his sons: John and Andrew; his daughters: Rebecca, Gibbony, Mary Simpson and Hannah Haden; his grandchildren: Elizabeth, Rebecca, Ann, and Andrew Ramsey.

Andrew Ramsey, father-in-law of (240) William was in Monongalia 10/12/1793 when he had a survey of 500 acres of land. This land was granted to him under preemption warrant 1937 of 12/3/1781, the warrant being for 1000 acres.

(240) William Daughetee moved to Cape Girardeau, now in Missouri, but then in Spanish Territory. He is said to have located there about 1796. In "The Spanish Regime", by Houcks, it prints a copy of a Census of Cape Girardeau taken 11/1/1803. This shows that William and his brother, Elijah, were both there. (p 404). It also indicates he was a Captain of Rangers in the War of 1812.

In Volume 29 - PUBLIC LANDS - American State Papers - there appear the lists of land claimants in the Cape Girardeau District. At page 696 it is shown he received certificate 220 for 440 arpents of land, and certificate 221 for 240 arpents under date of April 21, 1809. The land was on Hubbles Creek. At page 622, he appears as claimant 153 claiming 400 arpents of land, but his claim was denied November 1, 1811.

In the 1803 Census referred to above William is listed as having 1 male, 1st class; 2 males, 2nd class; 2 females, 1st class; 1 female, 2nd class.

With William Daugherty came a brother-in-law, Samuel Tipton, who also married a daughter of Andrew Ramsey. The Tiptons and Daughertys were both in Frederick and Shenandoah Counties, Virginia.

It may be of interest to note that Andrew Ramsey is credited by historians as being responsible for the establishment of the first English school west of the Mississippi River. This was in 1799. (Vol. 5, p 296, Encyclopedia of the History of Missouri)

In the "History of Southeastern Missouri" published in 1888, there appears this article concerning this branch of the Daughetee family to which this man and his brothers belonged:

"The Daughertys who were of Welsh descent came to Cape Girardeau from Virginia in 1798 or 1799. They were Elijah, John and Abraham, brothers, and William, a half brother of the other three. All located a short distance south of the present site of Jackson on adjoining farms. William Daugherty married Elizabeth Ramsey, a daughter of Andrew Ramsey, Sr. He was a man of education, and, it is said, was an original abolitionist. He would own no slaves in his own right, and had around him only those inherited by his wife from her father's estate. His son, Ralph, married the widow of Joseph Frizel, and daughter of Col. George F. Bollenger. He became a man of some prominence in political circles, served several years as clerk of the County Court, and in 1828 was a Jackson elector."

William, with Elijah and John, was a member of the Spanish American Military Company in Cape Girardeau after he moved there. (p 192 Houcks, History of Missouri).

The Compiler does not know if this was the same man.

In the History of Shenandoah County there are several references to John Anderson. Whether these refer to this man is not known to the Compiler.

John Anderson bought lots in the village of Woodstock, Va., in 1814. (Shenandoah Co., Va., D.B. V, pp 66 and 150--Lots 37, 92 and 119).

In the 1785 printed list, so called "First Census", there appears John Dougherty with 4 whites in his family. (P36) There also appears a John Dorothy with 7 whites in his family.

9/14/1785 Patents 183 acres formerly claimed by William Biggs.

1786 - - John appears once.

1787 - - John appears once.

5/26/1787 - with 1 tithe, 3 horses, 3 cattle.

1790 - - John appears once - DOHERTY with 3 cattle

He appears no more in the personal property lists until 1799, and then only in one year.

1799 - - John appears once in the personal property list. The fact that this John was in Clark Co., Ky. 6/22/1795, when his daughter, Mary Ann, married William Horseley, causes the compiler to deduce that the 1799 John in Monongalia was another man. This (251) John was in Clark Co., Ky., 11/2/1801 when his daughter Rachel married. It is unlikely he moved back to Monongalia, then back to Kentucky. (251) John was in the Clark Co., Ky., tax list 6/10/1801.

In the History of Preston Co., Va., by Preston, it states that John Dougherty in 1776 settled at or near Dunkard's Bottom near Jacob Jones and Hugh Morgan (P 56). The same history says that the cabin of John Dougherty stood a little east of Albright, W. Va., on the John v. Crane farm. (P 342). This history, however, confuses children of John with children of William.

In 1798 John Daughetee (Dougherty) signed a petition with others asking a new county be formed from Monongalia Co., Va. This later became Preston Co., Va., in 1818.

A John Doherty was in Berkely Co., Va., tax lists in 1792, 1793 and 1794, but he doubtless was not (251) John.

While the family traditions indicate this man moved from Monongalia Co., Va., to Kentucky about 1801, records show that he was in Kentucky as early as 1795. It is probable he was there while Kentucky was still a part of Virginia.

A John DAUGHERTY was in Fayette Co., Ky., tax lists 1790 to 1792. The Compiler believes this is (251) John, for this would fit into his dropping out of the Monongalia Co., Va., tax lists in 1790.

A John DOHERTY was in Jefferson Co., Ky., tax lists 1789 to 1800, and a Senior and Junior appeared there in 1801.

(Clark County, Ky., was formed from Fayette and Bourbon Counties in 1792, so it may explain why he is later found in Clark. Estill Co., Ky., was formed in 1808 from Clark and Madison Counties. Thus it seems probable he shows in these county records without moving from his first location.)

- June, 1820 - - - -A report of the sale of the personal property of the estate of (251) John Daughetee was made in June, 1820 term of court in Estill County, Ky. (Will Book A, page 124) See details later.
- Sept. 17, 1827 - -A report of the settlement of the estate of (251) John Daughetee was made by Commissioners A. W. Quinn, Benj'n Strangham, (Straughan?) and Lewis Moore in settlement with William Daughetee in Estill Co., Ky. (Will Book A, page 313)

The only Census record available on (251) John is the 1810 Census of Estill Co., Ky. In it he appears as over 45. At his home are 2 males under 10, 1 male 10 to 16, 1 male 16 to 26, 1 male 26 to 45; 1 female under 10, 1 female 16 to 26, 1 female 26 to 45. (These ages do not account for all his listed children alive at the time)

In the 1820 Census of Estill Co., Ky., he does not appear, as he was dead in May, 1820. His widow, Nancy, appeared. She was over 45. At home were 1 male 16 to 18, and 1 male 16 to 26.

(251) JOHN DAUGHETEE died and left a will in Estill Co., Ky., in 1820. It is set out in full herein, so as to have it of record.

In the name of God, Amen; I, John Daughetee, Estill County, and State of Kentucky, being in a weak and low state of health, but of sound and disposing mind and memory and calling to mind the mortality of my body and the certainty of death, do make and publish this my last will and testament in manner and form following, to wit:

First: I will and bequeath my soul to God who gave it hoping for eternal life and happiness through my redeemer, Jesus Christ, and body I bequeath to the earth to be entered in decent Christian burial at the discretion of my Executors hereinafter named not doubting but I shall receive it again at the last day through the resurrection.

Secondly: I will and bequeath to my beloved wife, Nancy Daughetee in lieu of her dower one bay horse, name Sampson, and one hundred dollars in money so soon as the same can be raised out of my estate after my decease to her and her heirs and assigns forever and the aforesaid legacy it is my will and desire that she shall receive in lieu of her dower as aforesaid.

Thirdly: My will and desire is that all my just debts and funeral expenses be paid out of my estate.

Fourthly: I will and bequeath to my daughter Mary Ann Horsely and William Horsely, her husband, five shillings to them and their heirs forever.

5th: I will and bequeath to my daughter Rachel Arnold and Thomas Arnold her husband, five shillings, to them and their heirs forever.

6th: I will and bequeath to my son in law, William Meadows, five shilling to him and his heirs forever.

7th: I will and bequeath to my daughter Elizabeth Mark and Robert Mark, her husband, five shillings to them and their heirs forever.

8th: I will and bequeath to my sons, Moses Daughhetee and William Daughhetee, five shillings each, to them and their heirs forever.

And lastly, I will and bequeath to my son, Isaac Daughhetee, Thomas Daughhetee, Joel Daughhetee, and to my daughter, Sally Fisher, all my real estate with its appurtenances all the rest of my personal estate, goods and chattels, debts, &c., to be equally divided and distributed amongst them, to have and to hold the same to them and their heirs and assigns forever.

I hereby appoint my sons, Isaac Daughhetee and William Daughhetee executors of this my last will and testament, hereby revoking all other wills by me at any time heretofore made.

In testimony whereof, I have hereunto set my name and affixed my seal at my house on Cow Creek in Estill County, this 14 day of March, in the year of our Lord one thousand eight hundred and twenty.

The second wife of (251) JOHN DAUGHNETEE was Susan Parker. She was born 3/25/1764, daughter of Nathaniel Parker. He lived in Baltimore Co., Md. He later located in Hampshire Co., Va. Still later he moved to Tennessee where he died.

She was a sister of the famous Elder John Parker who was born in Baltimore Co., Md., and enlisted for Revolutionary War Service in Culpeper Co., Va. After the War, he moved to Georgia. From Georgia, he went to Tennessee, where he remained until his father's estate was settled, then moving on to Illinois, settling first in Crawford Co., and later in Coles County.

In Coles County, he applied for and received his Revolutionary War pensions.

From there he moved with his family to Texas while that was Mexican Territory. His son, Daniel Parker, was the organizer of the first Protestant Church ever established in Texas.

Elder John Parker's family was attacked by Comanche Indians in May, 1836, several killed, and some carried into captivity.

Their terrible experience has been told at length in published books and articles and will not be repeated here.

His age was shown as between 26 and 45 years. He was named as one of the heirs in the will of John Daughetee, his father-in-law, in 1820.

His Census entry of 1820 shows at his home three males and two females all under ten years of age. We have no information as to which, if any, of these children were from his marriage to Telitha Daughetee.

A William Meadows was shown in the 1810 Census of Estill Co., Ky., next to an Israel Meadows. One male and one female under ten were listed at his house. No adult female was shown. We deduce that he had been married previous to his marriage to Telitha Daughetee in 1810.

William Daughhetee appears in the 1830 Census of Clark County spelled DOUGHERTY; in the 1840 Census of the same county, spelled DOHERTY; in the 1850 Census of the same county, spelled DOUGHERTY.

He was in the Estill County, Kentucky, tax lists for 1811, 1812, 1815, 1816, 1817, 1818, and again in 1825.

He enlisted in the Kentucky Militia September 18, 1812, under Capt. Jas. White, Col. De Jarnett, but was discharged October 7, 1812, due to illness. (see Pension Dept. S. O. 28368). He did not see active service. After his brother John Daughhetee took sick, he cared for him. After John died, William took over the land he had contracted to buy. He was at one time partner in a mill with one John French. It is alleged he was assaulted by French, who wielded an ax and that William Daughhetee never sufficiently recovered to properly look after his business affairs. He died at the home of Perlina Daughhetee Cottman Kendall, near Log Lick, Clark Co., Ky.

At this time (1931) only one of his children survives. She is a wonderfully fine lady of 84, and her character portrays splendid breeding. She was (1343) Catherine Kaney, residing in Terre Haute, Indiana.

MISCELLANEOUS DAUGHTERY RECORDS IN NORTHERN NECK

2/27/1765 - - - - Enoch Daughity or Doughty made a will. It was recorded in Old Rapahannock Co., Va., 1/14/1677, in Will Book 2, pages 51 and 52. That is now in Essex County, Va. It was also recorded in Lancaster Co., Va., in W.B.5, page 28. It mentions but does not name his children. Francis Doughty and James Phillips were empowered to sell all lands and chattels for "my children" and "their heirs." The will mentions a brother--not named--who resided in Stafford Co., Va. Evidently this man resided in Lancaster, but had land in both Lancaster and Rapahannock Cos.

James Daughity appears in the Northumberland Personal Tax Records of 1782-1805 inclusive. Another man bearing the same name appears from 1782-1792 inclusive and is shown as James Daughity Junior in 1786, 1794, 1795 and 1799. A James Daughity, Senior, appears in the years 1795-99 inclusive.

John Daughity appears in the Northumberland Tax Records from 1782-92, then skips to 1797, running to 1800, then skips 1801 and runs from 1802-05 inclusive. Another John Daughity appears from 1782-93, then skips to 1797 and runs to 1800, then runs from 1803 -05. John Daughity Senior appears in the years 1794-96 and again in 1799. John Daughity Junior appears in the years 1794-96 and again in the years 1801-02.

Samuel Daughity appears in the years 1787-88 in Northumberland County.

Toulson Daughity appears in the Northumberland records for the years 1785-88 inclusive.

A Samuel Daughity appears in the Northumberland Tax Records in the years 1804 and 1805 inclusive.

In the land tax records from 1782-1813, James and John Daughity appear each year during that period; sometimes more than one of each name appearing.
