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It is my firm belief that the Doty-Lawrence line goes back to the Mayflower. By 2020, the 400th anniversary of the landing, I hope it will be accepted, for that is the date set by the Massachusetts Society of Mayflower Descendants to include in one vast work every descendant of all the passengers aboard the Mayflower.

In Chicago, there was formed in 1928 the institute of American Genealogy. Its aim is:

....to compile one alphabetical master index to include family data of the head of every family..... manuscripts, charts, court and cemetery records available down to the Federal Census of 1790.

In the spirit of patriotic service it was agreed to make these indexes accessible to the public.

For these two reasons it seems worth while to stand ajar our ancestral doors. I wish to thank all relatives and friends, especially William F. Hoehn, who have so willingly helped me to do so.

"Dotey, Doty, Dote, or Doten - Edward, Plymouth.
 Came in Mayflower 1620, a London youth in the service of Stephen Hopkins.
 Was one of signers of the solemn compact in Cape Cod Harbor, Nov. 11th, and
 was with his master in the shallop that in December following discovered
 Plymouth Harbor.

The entry on the Colony record is:

"6th of Jan'y, 1634/5 Edward Doty and Faith Clarke were married."
 Faith Clarke was born 1619, and was at this time but sixteen years of age,
 was the daughter of Thurston Clarke and Faith, his wife. They came to Ply-
 mouth from Ipswich, England, in 1634 in the "Francis". Besides their daugh-
 ter Faith they had two sons, Thurston Jr. and Henry.

Edward Doty and Faith Clarke had children all born at Plymouth.

Edward b. prob. 1637, John b. 1639/40, Thomas b. prob. 1641, Samuel b. prob.
 1643, Desire b. 1645, Elizabeth b. prob. 1647, Isaac b. Feb. 8, 1648/9, Jo-
 seph b. Apr. 30, 1651, Mary b. prob. 1653.

Edward Doty died at Plymouth Aug. or Sept. 1655.

In 1678, Samuel Doty of Piscataway was licensed to marry Jane Harmon of the
 same town. 1682, his name is in list of freeholders. From 1678 to 1696,
 his name appears in frequent deeds as a purchaser of lands in this vicinity.
 Samuel Doty's cattle mark appears on the town records of Piscataway, though
 not dated, appears to have been made before 1686. In all the records of
 whatever nature, state, county, town, church or private manuscripts in which
 Samuel Doty's name appears in New Jersey, it is never spelled as Doten. It
 is written in various ways but never with the termination of "en". It is
 true that the three generations of descendants of Samuel Doty in New Jersey
 did adopt the name Doughty and their descendants have in some few cases kept
 the name, the great majority however, returned to the original spelling
 "Doty."

The records of Somerset Co., New Jersey, unfortunately extend back no fur-
 ther than 1783, all previous to that having been burned during the Revolu-
 tion. More than once during the Revolutionary War Piscataway found itself
 in the track of contending armies. The people of the surrounding country
 were obliged to billet the troops and furnish forages. This occasioned
 much distress, of which Piscataway had its full share. Gov. Livingston, in
 a speech before the Assembly in 1777, declared that the English soldiers,
 while in New Jersey "warred upon decrepit age and defenseless youth, des-
 troyed public records and private monuments, etc."

"In the village of Basking Ridge aged members of families were found whose memory helped to furnish many details, but nothing previous to Revolutionary times.Later, however, an examination of some documents in the possession of the State Department at Trenton showed the existence in 1675 to 1715 of a Samuel Doty of Piscataway, but nothing to show his origin..... A thorough search through all the town, country and church records of the vicinity of Piscataway failed then to furnish more, and the missing records between the years 1710 and 1783 seemed to have been lost forever, when an old manuscript in the most accidental way appeared, it being held in the family of Joshua Doughty, Esq. of Somerville New Jersey, who did not esteem himself a Doty, and having been written about 1825 from memory of an aged lady, who had studied the genealogy.

It was as follows.....written by Miss Susan Doughty, before her death in 1825.

"Samuel Doty my great-grandfather lived at Piscataway.

His children were Samuel, Moses, Daniel, John, Thomas, Ebenezer. Two girls Joana and Mary.

Nathaniel Doty, brother of Samuel, children were Jacob, Nathaniel, and Jane."

This manuscript fortunately furnished the evidence that connected the Samuel Doty of Piscataway with the existing families in various parts of the State, but still gave no trace of his origin. This was found later at Plymouth, Mass. in a deed where in he conveys the land that he received from his father's will Edward Doty, and the fact he emigrated to New Jersey..... The solution was very gratifying, for had not that valuable manuscript been found it would have been difficult on any plausible theory to convince the thousands of descendants of Samuel Doty now scattered through the Southern and Western States that they could ever have their origin in the Edward Doty of the Mayflower.

Samuel Doty was a farmer. He married late in life at the age of thirty-five, and yet there is no indication of an earlier marriage, and certainly not of any other issue. He lived to a great age (1643-1715) longer than his father or his brothers, it is probable that the warmer climate of New Jersey conduced to this, for his posterity have been noted for longevity.

It is evident from the record that he was intelligent, industrious, and thrifty, a man of ability and authority

A consist member of the church. The sterling character of his children and their uniformly upright and christian lives, show good training on the part of their parents; and that patriotism was one of the virtues inculcated is evident by the services of his immediate descendants in the Indian War of 1750 and the Revolutionary War."

His name is found among the early Freeholders of the settlement of Piscataway, N. J. in 1682.

"Samuel Doty and Jane Harmon were married Nov. 15, 1676. The entry on the register of Piscataway is so indistinct that the name might be Hinnon or Horman, but it is plainly given in the marriage license as Harmon.

The Town Register is incomplete; the names and dates as given above are not entered together, and it is possible that the names of John and Nathaniel have never been written on the register, or if so written, have been by accident defaced. For, the existence of John and Nathaniel and their descendants is as well established by tradition as any of the others. Nathaniel was probably the youngest and the thirteenth child.

Nathaniel Doty, prob. son of Samuel and Jane Harmon born at Piscataway, about 1707/8, his name is not mentioned on the register of births etc. at Piscataway, but the tradition and record so frequently referred to of Miss Susan Doty, mentions Nathaniel as brother of Samuel Jr., and others and gives the names of several of his children. Nathaniel Doty, probably removed early to Mendham, Morris County, New Jersey, where his children were living at the close of the Revolution."

There is some evidence that Nathaniel Doty Snr. lived in Mendham Township Morris Co., N. J. at least as early as 1766. The record book of the Presbyterian church in Mendham--Minutes of the Board of Trustees--Aug. 21st, 1766 to 1856--has an entry on page six under date of Aug. 21, 1766 naming Samuel Doty as collector of the minister's salary, and Nathaniel Doty Jr. as one of the men on the committee for "seating every man for the year." The name Nathaniel Doty appears as collector again in 1776, in 1781 and in 1788 but Nathaniel Doty Jr. does not appear in these records again.

Most of the information concerning the early generations of the Dotys was obtained and copied from the "Doty-Doten Family," by Ethan Allen Doty. For fuller information see his book pp. 8, 9, 10, 27, 29, 277, 278, 281, 282, 283, 291, 301, 324, 374, 375.

Samuel Doty's will, recorded at Trenton (Lib. A. p. 59) was made Sept. 18, 1715 and was recorded the 8th of Nov. 1715. It is written as follows:

"In the Name God Amen: the 18th day of September in the year of our Lord 1715 I Saml Doty Senor of piscataway in the county of Middx. and province of New Jersey yoeman, being very sick and weak in body, but of perfect mind and Memory, Thanks being given unto God therefore, calling unto mind the mortality of my body, and knowing that it is appointed for all men once to die, do make and ordain this my last will and testament: That is to say, principally, and first of all, I give and recommend my soul unto the Hands of God that gave itt, and for my body, I recommend it to the earth to be buried in Christian like and decent manner, on the descretion of my exectrix nothing doubting butt att the General Resurrection I shall receive the same again by the mighty power of God. And as touching such worldly estete wherewith it hath pleased God to bless me in this life, I give devise and dispose of the same in the following manner and form ----

Imprimis, I giye and bequeath to my well beloved son Saml. Doty five Shillings----

Item. I give and bequeath to Jane my beloved wife whom I likewise constitute make and ordain my only and sole Exectrix of this my last will and testament all my goods and Chattles by her freely to, possessed and enjoyed by her, her heirs and assigns forever. hereby utterly disallow, revolk and disennul all and every other former----- wills, Legacies and Exectors by and in any ways before this named, willed and Cogneated. Ratifying and confirming this and no other to be my last will and Testament. In Witness whereof I have hereunto set my hand Seal this day and year above written.

Note.

A Town Book which gives the names of Mendham Township officers and reports on collections and payments made for the "town" beginning 1753 shows on page five under date Dec. 22, 1756 "Nathaniel Doty paid his fine for killing a deer to Cory, 1 L, 3 s, 8 p.; Micajah Dote paid his fine for swearing to Cory, 0. 3. 6. In 1766 the town paid Nathaniel Doty for keeping Joanna Ayers of Phila. 1. 12. 1. ; the town paid Nathaniel Doty Jr. for keeping Hannah air's child, 3- . - 2. date 1767. On Apr. 16, 1779 paid to Nathaniel Doty 22. 10. 0. for keeping Daniel McCordeys wife and child. Feb. 15, 1781 paid Nathaniel Doty for ospin (keeping) John Thorn. Credit to the Doty tavern tax to the poor 2. 0. 0. for 1788 and to the Doty and Founce (?) tavern credit for 4. 0. 0. Payments were made to Nathaniel Doty in 1785 and 1792.

There is a legal document which shows that Nathaniel Doty Jr. (Jur.) of Mendham and Jacob Doty of the same place, were held bondmen for L 500. March 18, 1767 for the estate of John Doty late of Mendham aforesaid yeoman. In the same paper Nathaniel Doty Jur. is named as "Eldest Brother and administrator."

The signature of Nathaniel Doty Jr. (blotted) appears on indenture between Ezra Woodruff and Samuel Cozad of Mendham dated 24 Aug. 1775. (The original document in possession of W. Hoehn.)

In another Mendham Township book Nathaniel Doty Jr. was Overseer of the Poor in 1762, also in 1781 when the town voted to raise 20 pounds in specie for the poor; Nathaniel Doty and Samuel Loree were overseers of the poor in 1790 In the book of Strays Jan. 11, 1764 Nathaniel Doty Jr. took up strays; Nathaniel Doty and Henry Doty reported strays Feb., 1782. Another book shows reference to Nathaniel Doty as late as 1793.

Note.

Jacob Doty was a Revolutionary soldier; minute man in Morris Co., New Jersey Militia. He married Zeraiah _____. He died in 1793.

The Doty and Clark homes were near each other on the road from Water Street (Brookside) to Walnut Grove (Mt. Freedom). In the Morris Co., Mortgages, Book C page 138 is this entry:

Jacob Doty to Nathaniel Doty--dated 28 May A. D., 1787--for all that tract of land in Mendham, Beginning at a heap of stones on the north side of Road that leads from Morris Town to Suckersunny Mine ----- Containing 11 3/4 acres -- It being for the payment of 100 pounds by the 20 May ----- etc. Recorded 3 July 1787.

A note at the side states: "Canceled 13 Oct. 1806.
Nathaniel Doty."

Deeds are on record as late as 1796 from Nathaniel Doty to his son Henry.

*In the Doty-Doten Book page 301 it reads "it is probable Nathaniel Doty died shortly after 1796, "while the Palladium of Liberty, Aug. 28, 1810 under #127 states; " At Mendham on Sat. Last, Mr. Nathaniel Doty (died) in the 80 year of his age." This date is more accurate according to the following letter in the possession of Mr. W. F. Hoehn, East Northfield, Mass., and given to him by Mr. Henry Spencer Clark.

Oswego, N. Y.
Oct. 29, '83.

"Mr. Clark yours Rec'd. All I can say is my grand father Doty was named Henry Doty he died before my recollection Nathaniel was my great grand father. I can remember well attending his funeral at Uncle Wm. Pools he was a very fleshy man and helpless, for sometime before his death was kept two weeks at a time first at my fathers then at Pools until his death and was buried at Mendham as I remember attending the funeral. Any thing of the family I know not as for any Nathaniel Senior I know not the above is all I can recollect of them."

Why do we mourn departing friends

This indenture made this sixth day of April 1796 between Nathaniel Doty Junr. of Mendham in the County of Morris and State of New Jersey and Henry Doty of the same place on the other part witnesseth that the said Nathaniel Doty Junr. for and in consideration of the sum of two hundred pounds lawful money of the state of New Jersey in hand paid to him the said Nathaniel Doty Junr. have sold to said Henry Doty all tract of land whereon he the said Doty now dwells situated in the Township of Mendham, County of Morris, State of New Jersey.

Beginning in line of William McHenry's land in all about one hundred acres with all the houses, out houses, orchards, barn, stables, waters, waterways and profit, priviledges or advantages in anyway thereunto belonging or in anyways appertaining To have and to hold to the proper use, and behoof the said Henry Doty his heirs, Executors, administrators and assisns forever.

According to the Doty Book p. 301, "Nathaniel Doty volunteered at the opening of the Revolutionary War, and with his brother, Jacob, became a member of the company of minute men that was raised in Morris County for the New Jersey militia." A question has been raised whether Nathaniel Doty (Jr.) was a soldier in the Revolutionary War, he being too old at the time. However his age would not prevent him from serving in the war as a "wagon-master", of which there is some evidence. This seems probable from the following letter written by George W. Lawrence to Henry S. Clark

Oswego, Nov. 15, 1883

As regards to the funeral of great grandfather (Nathaniel Doty) I remember well and the large straight back chair he used to sit in..... According to some circumstances I mentioned to my father just before his death; of his ironing a wagon at Jake Smith's and the hired girl led me to carry his dinner. He said I was about three years old and many other incidents I remember of my boyhood days. This is all I can write at present."

Nathaniel Doty Jr., deeded his farm to his only son Henry C. in 1796 located in Mendham Township, for L 200.

Wit. Daniel Lawrence and Joanna Johnson. Recorded in Morristown Court House Deeds.

They lived on the old road to Walnut Grove at Dickerson's Corner. Henry Doty's will made Mar. 15, 1798 gives his estate to his wife Mary who was his sole executrix, and bears her signature. He also included his two daughters Abigail Pool and Sibbel Lawrence in his bequests. The will was proved at Morristown Mar. 26, 1798.

Bible Record of Abigail and William Pool

In a letter headed Newburg, N. Y., 8th Oct. 1898 from Mr. Henry Clark to W. F. Hoehn he writes, "A grandson of Henry Doty told me that all the old Doty deeds were years ago left with a Morristown lawyer in a suit about some land of Doty - Pool and the deeds were never returned (now lost)."



A quilt of solid colors, brown on one side and turquoise blue on the other, quilted with heavy blue thread of matching color is now (1940) on display in the guest room of Washington's Headquarters, Morristown, New Jersey.

The following is a copy of a letter pertaining to the quilt:

Morristown, N. J.
May 28, 1941.

Dear Miss Lawrence:

Thank you for your interesting letter of May 22 regarding the ancestry of Mary Loree Doty and Mrs. Mary B. Washburn. The quilt which Mrs. Washburn donated, on display in the Ford Mansion guest room, is one of the finest items on exhibit and always attracts attention when visitors are viewing that room.

The Washington Association of New Jersey presented its collection to the U. S. in 1933, the year Morristown Nat'l Historical Park was established by an Act of Congress. The quilt comprised part of this collection and the Washington Ass'n record describes it as a "Hand woven linen bed quilt, woven and quilted by Mrs. Mary Doty formerly of Morris Co., N. J. Presented by her great-great grand-daughter, Mrs. Mary B. Washburn of New York City. 1903. Accession number 689."

Note. Daniel Lawrence and his sons George and William are buried in Oswego, N. Y. where they went to get the railroad ties used in the construction of the first railroad from Jersey City to Newark. The ties were of red cedar from the Canadian forests brought to Oswego where they were sawed and shipped via canal to Albany and Hudson River to New York. Red Cedar ties proved to be a failure and they were soon replaced by chestnut.

A record of Daniel Lawrence death is in the Bible of William Y. and JuliAnn (Lawrence) Trimmer, in the possession of Miss Marjorie Swackhamer, Long Valley, N. Y. (1940)

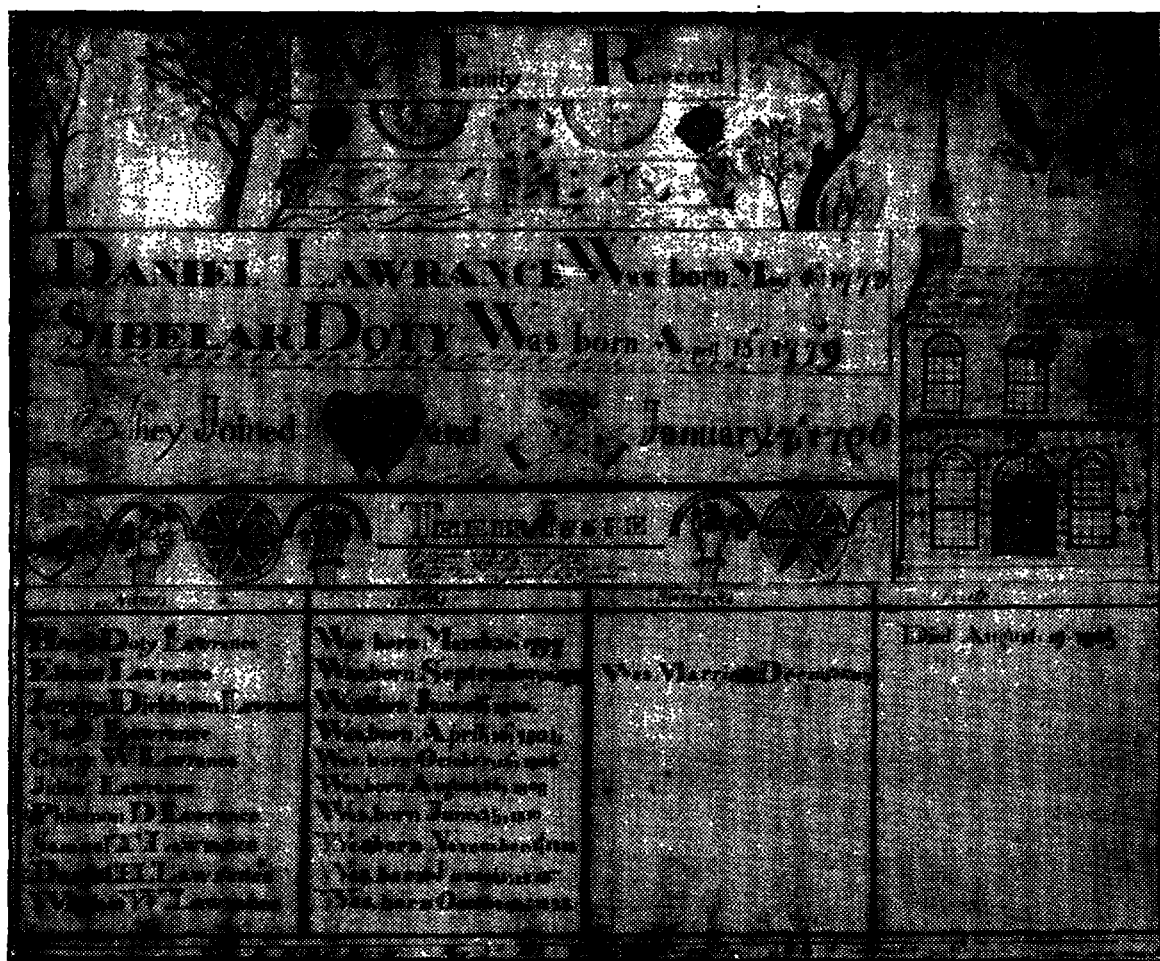

That cedar ties were used in building the New Jersey Railroad and Transportation Company between Jersey City and Newark is seen in one of the entries made on the balance sheet of the company's books on November 30, 1836 and published in the American Railroad Journal on February 4, 1837.

Among the expenditures listed in the construction account of this pioneer railroad was the payment of \$5,000.14 to "Lawrence & Whitney for cedar ties." Unfortunately, however, there is nothing to further identify the members of this firm nor indicate where the cedar ties came from.

The New Jersey Railroad and Transportation Company was the first of the major railroads in northern New Jersey, and the first section of it was opened from Jersey City to Newark in September, 1834, with horse-drawn equipment. The cedar ties were used because of the difficulties arising from the marshy character of the land over which this section of the railroad was built. It was a hazardous and costly undertaking, but the railroad proved successful and was extended a few years later to New Brunswick.

Together with the Camden and Amboy Railroad, the New Jersey Railroad and Transportation Company became a part of the United Railroads of New Jersey in the late 60's. These lines were absorbed in 1871 by the Pennsylvania Railroad and paved the way for the latter's entrance to New York City.

The original pen sketch of the Lawrence Family Record is now in the possession of Charles T. Lawrence, Roselle Park, New Jersey (1940). It has been handed down from father to son for five generations. Mr. Platt speaks of it in his History of Dover, p. 394, as a "specimen of artistic penwork."

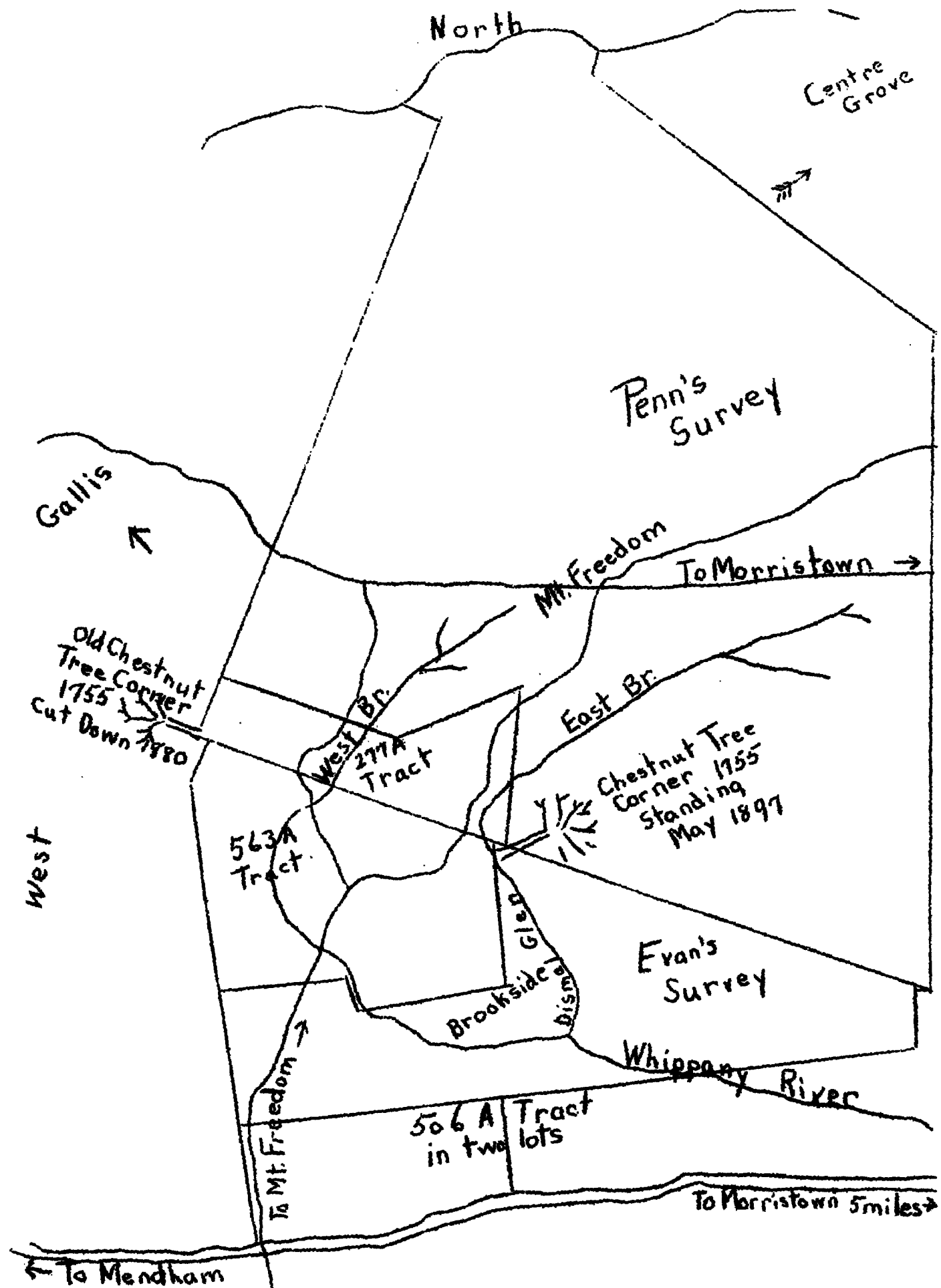
The wording, which is indistinct in the picture, reads:

THE BIRTHPLACE

Daniel Lawrence and his family lived on the Chester-Dover Road, N.J., where he built a stone house and barn on the northwest corner of the 277 acres bought from Henry Clark in 1796, taken from Penn's survey.

Even though the exterior of this old stone house built by Daniel Lawrence in 1796 has been remodeled, additions added and covered with stucco, the main part of the house is still the same as when built in the eighteenth century.

The large hall with its wide stair-case and original front door, transom and window lights is an interesting study of early architecture. The fire-place with the cup-beard, one side is the style of the same date.

Another interesting feature is the thickness of the partitions, being twelve to fourteen inches through, while the floors are made of trees split in two.

In this substantial old house Daniel Lawrence's children were born, as were those of his son, Samuel.

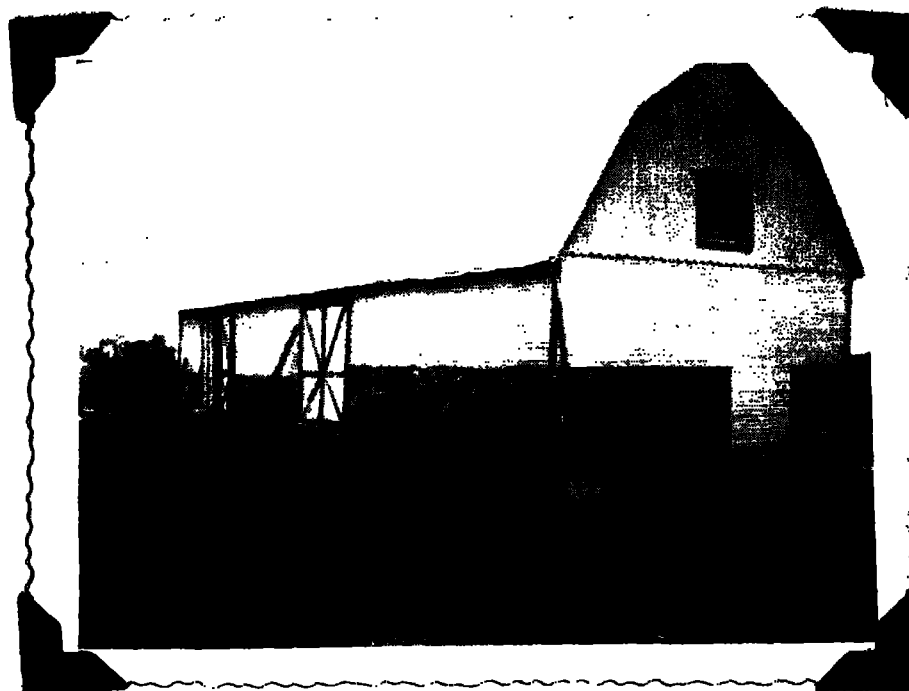

The old stone barn on this property was built about 1796. It might well be called the manger of Methodism in this vicinity as it was used for religious services when the circuit preacher came around once or twice a year. Charles D. Platt speaks of it in his "History of Dover," pp. 361, 354¹/₂, 506. "The big stone barn larger than the house, was the most convenient and capacious place of assembly in those primitive days, (about 1799) before any church edifice was erected. Seats were rigged up by laying planks over boxes and blocks of wood, and the preaching went on right over the heads of the cattle in the cow barn below.

Mr. I. W. Searing of Dover, N.J., says his parents first met and got acquainted at the services in this strange synagogue."

Picture of barn in Mr. Platt's book on page 354¹/₂ identified by Mrs. William Francisco as belonging to Daniel Lawrence. She remembered it very well as she returned many times with her husband (William T. Lawrence) to his boyhood home to "go cherrin'."

The story of this barn is also told by Alonzo B. Searing in Platt's "Dover Dates 1722 - 1922." P. 55.



Note.

The barn now standing was built after the original one was destroyed by fire in 1914. It is twice as large but rebuilt on the old stonework.

This barn is pictured in a booklet "100th Anniversary of Methodism in Dover, N.J."

Sibelar Lawrence died at the home of her daughter, Mary Thompson, and is buried in the Methodist Church yard at Flanders, Morris Co., N.J. Her daughter, Jemima, is buried in the same plot.

Research of legal documents in the surrogates office in Morristown, N. J. are consistent in dates and addresses with the Daniel H. Lawrence "merchant."

In an interview with authorities, of the Green-Wood Cemetery, at the New York Office, 170 Broadway, it was learned from the records that Daniel H. Lawrence residence was given as the Buckingham Hotel, New York, where he died Dec. 20/21, 1880, aged 64 years. According to the inscription on the monument his wife "Mary Howell", died Feb. 6, 1868, aged 49 years. There is no record of a second wife being buried in the same lot.

Since Daniel H. Lawrence did not dispose of his lot #4830 Sec. 97, in his will, an affidavit has been signed by Ethel V. Lawrence and filed in the New York office giving any of his heirs (or next of kin) a claim to eight graves in Green-Wood Cemetery, Brooklyn, New York.

..... "Mr. Thompson shall be paid if he will have a little patience untill we get to Oswego which I expect will be the first part of May before we can get ready to come. I do expect that Elias Thompson and wife will come with us. I want you to take every necessary care of yourself that you possibly can and try to get well..... We expect Mr. and Mrs. Trimmer here today, if the weather is not too severe. Philamon's wife is here this week with us.I have no more particulars to write at present only a few words to Fanny Cole. My dear sister* I hope you are making some progress in Divine Life..... most truly, sister* Fanny we all have Trials and Disappointments.I hope you may stay in the village until I come unless you can do a great deal better in some other place. I hope if George returns that you will live agreeable Together and make for each others happiness this is my desire and Sincere Prayer. Our best wishes to you all!"

Letter of a Civil War Soldier to His Sister

Somerset Ky, May 12, 1863

Dear Sister Aletta

Not receiving any letter from you for some time past but supposing you would yet be glad to hear from me and have a just reason for not writing I thought I would occupy a few passing moments in letting you know where I am and how I have been since last I wrote. We are now close by the town (above named) within six miles of the Cumberland River I was quite sick with the diarea for about ten days while we lay at Stanford but have gained strength a considerable since I came here and begin to feel quite well again I think the fault was in the water it is much better here I dont think I am as heavy by 20 lbs. at present as when I came to the Regiment So you can judge for yourself whether I have been sick or not. As I told you before I am now a private and have occasionally to stand guard I have only stood two days since I came in the service and dont expect to stand any more as my time is most out. My turn came yesterday and last night I was broke of my rest so I think I have a good reason to beg an excuse for my dullness in this letter I had one good nap on the grass with my blanket over me for a covering and my cartridge box for a pillow we live in small shelter tents & carry them on our back when we move, it puts me in mind of taking up our bed and walk. We live principally on hard-tack coffee and meat. I boarded myself almost entirely while I was sick but begin to draw my rations regular with the rest now. When the regiment left Stanford for the Cumberland river there was about 13 left behind sick, myself with the rest & a lucky thing it was I think for me for I suppose you have heard before this of the accident that happened the 27th in crossing the river after they had chased the Rebs. & drove them some distance. They had to cross in a shallow boat which was not fit to carry over 40 but I understand there was about 55 put on at once when the accident happened, the boat was drawn across by 3 men who became unable to hold the rope that was stretched across the river & letting go the boat tipped upon one side & threw nearly all into the water 33 were drowned from our regiment & the three boatmen. We lost 7 from our Co. Capt. J Alexander & his Orderly Sergt Wiggins from Dover where among the number. Those from our company were John McPeck Andrew Young from Flanders he was some relation to Eunice, Punch Stephens and his brother Charles Ed Doland from Drakeville Andrew Willis that fellow with a mustache that you Joe Corwin & Em Trim had so much sport with at Clanceys visit the other one you did not know. I will not attempt to give the particulars here as they will no doubt be given in the papers. Those that saw it say it was a horrible sight & never wish to see another such. There was strong talk some time ago of this Regt. going home in May & recruiting to come out again as the 27th but that is played out I dont think we will get home before the 19th of June as we were not sworn into the U S service until that day (in Sept.) Should I get home all safe then I shall be pretty well satisfied to stay or travel in any other way besides having a pass to go a few rods from my resting place. Last night our Chaplain preached a funeral sermon on the subject. You will find his text in I Cor. 15: 25, 26 verses. I received a letter from a friend at Dover stating that John and Job had both been sick with the Typhoid fever but were getting well again did not say where they were. I wrote him one letter but have received none from him since he left Auburn N. Y. I must now close hoping to see you soon at your home remember me in your prayers.

"Johannes Lorentz (Lawrence) came over in the "second emigration" of Palatines or Germans in 1710 and is found in New York at that date. There is a German family bible now in the possession of Mrs. John M. Lawrence of Brooklyn N. Y. which contains the record of the family of the emigrant, Johannes. It also contains the record of baptism of John's children."

The following letter written by Mrs. John M. Lawrence to W. F. Hoehn gives more detail of this Bible mentioned in Mr. Chambers' book.

At his death it was given to his eldest son (my husband) and is now owned by my eldest son, who does not live in Brooklyn and who would not part with it and I think would not be willing to have it on exhibition and as I shall be away from home for the Winter will not put you to the trouble of calling as I could give you no further information and have no photographs.

It is probable they lived "in a large two-story frame house on the road from Center Grove to Succasunna Plains", as stated in Mr. Platt's book, "Dover Dates 1722 - 1922." p. 55

The landmarks as given in the deeds of the "land distribution" to Daniel Lawrence's children (~~as provided in his will~~) dated Jan. 23 A.D. 1840 and found in File Doc. 36 - 21. Orphans Court, Morristown, N. J. Court House are a help in giving the location of Silvanus Lawrence's home. The deeds read "Beginning at stone in fork of road in front of dwelling house the late Tavern stand of Silvanus Lawrence deceased there to a rock leading toward Mendham" again "Beginning at the stone in the old Succasunna Road being 2nd corner of the whole tract.".....

That Silvanus Lawrence was an inn-keeper seems probable since his home is spoken of in a deed as a "Tavern stand." It is also described in "Dover Dates" page fifty-five as a "hotel where town meetings had been held." On the same page Mr. Platt writes--

"It was in his home (about 1799) that we have the first account of any established place of worship for Methodist in Randolph Township. The society later built a more suitable stone house on the crossroads, to be used as a meeting house and school house, The name "Lawrenceville" was inscribed over the doors."

In an old book of ear-marks for Mendham Township Book 1. p. 41. Silvanus Lawrence is named as Surveyor of Roads, Judge of Appeals and Overseer of Roads. 1795-1805.

In the year 1877 Samuel T. Lawrence wrote to Henry S. Clark the following:

"Silvanus was my grandfather's name and he married Jemima Dickerson but no record is known of their births, marriage or deaths."

The marriage of Silvanus Lawrence to Jemima Dickerson on Dec. 30, 1770 is recorded by Jonathan Elmer in the Presbyterian Church Records of New Providence, N. J.

That Silvanus Lawrence died prior to 1841 is quite certain.

In an issue of the Jerseyman of Aug. 31, 1831 there is an obituary notice which reads, "In Randolph on the 16th inst Mr. Sylvester Lawrence, aged 86 years." Probably an error was made in the Christian name.

LAWRENCE (continued)

In a letter from the Adjutant General, Trenton, New Jersey, pertaining to Daniel Lawrence as a soldier in the War of 1812 is as follows:

"The records of this office are of a purely military character and seldom show any items of personal or family history. This is especially true of the War of 1812."

"In view of the foregoing; there is given herein all information pertaining to the name mentioned above."

Daniel Lawrence - enrolled as a Private, Capt. Zachariah Roselle's Company; enlisted at Elizabeth, N. J. May 3, 1813, for five years; discharged at Greenbush, New York, May 9, 1815, close of the war.

Note.

It is probable Daniel Lawrence, (son of Silvanus) was a soldier in the War of 1812. Since a deed shows that his parents lived at one time in Elizabethtown, N. J., for some reason he may have enlisted from there, instead of his own Township. Copy of deed on next page.

Philemon Dickerson born in Great Yarmouth, England came to Salem, Mass. on the "Mary Ann of Yarmouth", July 1637. Mary Payne came in the same ship.

He was admitted a freeman of the town of Salem in 1641.

He went to Southold L. I. about 1648 or prior to 1651. He was a land owner and a successful tanner. Peter, his son was enterprising and a tanner like his father. In Sept. 16, 1675 he had 20 acres of land, 8 oxen, 23 cows, 40 goats, 14 swine, of the value of L 250.

In 1686 Naomi Mapes, who at that time was eighteen years old, was mentioned in her father's will as the wife of Peter Dickerson. In the same year Peter Dickerson's family was given as three males one female.

Also I give unto my wife foure cows, and all my goats, with all my mouvable goodes that is within my house. And also my crop of corne, and my swine; this I give my wife forever. And the rest of my cattell to be disposed of to my two da ters Elizabeth Dickerson and Mary Dickerson, when they come of the age of one and twenty: Also my will is that my tow oxen and my tow steeres yt my sonn Thomas and my sonn Peter have them, provided my wife have the use of them during her life or widowhood, and after that they to be devided between them.

I give to my sonn Thomas fourteene acres of land at the North Sea, which I bought of John Batlye.

Also I do give all the rest of my land at North Sea, and at Corchaug to my three sonnes. As also my house and homelott after my wife's decease, or in case she marry, then to be divided equally to my three sonnes.

I do also make my wife Mary Dickerson sole executor of this my last will.

Peter Dickinson and his wife Sarah (Brainard) lived in a well built stone house in Springfield, New Jersey. The house was situated in the section now known as Milburn probably near Wyoming Avenue. It was torn down in the early part of the twentieth century and some of the stones are said to have been used in the building of a bridge in Milburn.

An oil painting was painted of the Dickinson homestead by Sarah A. (Dickinson) Shaffer while it was still standing. The picture is now in the possession of Mrs. W. J. Hallock, of Summit, New Jersey.

When Mrs. Shaffer (great-grand-daughter of Peter and Sarah Dickinson) was an elderly lady she was interviewed by a newspaper reporter and the following is quoted from his paper. It is unfortunate the date and name of paper is unknown.

"The first meetings of the Springfield Methodist Church were held in the kitchen of the old Dickinson homestead which was capable of accommodating one hundred persons. In this house were Mrs. Shaffer was born, wounded Revolutionary soldiers were carried in and cared for during the battle of Springfield."
(The house was sometimes known as the old stone fort.)

The original name Map or Mapp, Maps is of Welch origin meaning "navigator." Walter Mapes was born on the border of Wales about 1138. He was in the court of King Henry. In 1196 he was appointed Archbishop of Oxford. After that no further trace of him is found. No doubt the reason is for several centuries following William the Conquer little attention was given in preserving Public documents.

John Mapes of Feltham in Norfolk England the most remote ancestor from whom any considerable number of the present generation in America are able to trace descent, was doubtless of the same family, but his birth did not occur until nearly two centuries after the time of Walter Mapes.

CLARK

"Henry Clark (a Scotchman) came to Suffolk County, L.I. Ronkonkoma, leaving wife and child with relatives he went in search of land on which to settle. Went west via Elizabeth to Morristown. Followed up a branch of the Whippany River and found a spring on a plateau with water power near by, made a clearing, built a log house, then returned to move out his family. (Year abt. 1728). For some years after they settled, there was only a foot path to Mendham which contained one family and Morristown three. No record of his first purchase of land is known but the date is fixed by other facts. In 1734 he built a frame house by side of log cabin and put an iron knocker on the door, bearing date. About 1750 assisted by son and sons-in-law, built dam and saw mill at head of glen. This dam yet standing firm. (1892)

Item I Give and Bequeth unto my three Daughters Namly Joanna, Mary and Elizabeth to each of them thirty pounds light money to be paid them respectively as they come of age by my Executors hereafter named and in case either of my three daughter above named Should Dye before they come of Age That, her or their Legacy be equally Divided between the Survivours or goes to the Survivor.

Ann Margaret Schenkel died prior to the year 1765. Her father Leonard Nochbers mentions her in his will dated, 1765 as "late wife of Henry Schenkle."

Elizabeth Bercott, 3rd. wife of Henry Schenkel, emigrated to America in 1749 from the River Rhine. She is said to have been maid of honor to Queen Anne. This seems improbable since she was not of Queen Anne's generation, however the honor may have been given her at birth, since her father, Thomas the eighth, Earl of Pembroke was exceedingly active in the court during the reign of Queen Anne.

Although Henry Schenkel's will was recorded in 1770, in which he mentions his sons by name and "my four youngest daughters" it was not until 22 years later his estate was settled. The following heirs are mentioned as copied from the original document filed in the Morris Co. Surrogates office Box 6, Doc. 9.

There were seventy-eight names in number and nearly all autographs were in German. The names Henrig Schenckel and Matthias Trimmer also appear on the original document.
