PREFACE.

THE following pages have not been hastily written, but are the result of patient and thoughtful research. Care has been taken that no statement should be made without proof of its correctness. Numerous books and records have been consulted and untiring efforts made to obtain the facts. One object of the writer was to trace the lineage of the Dunbar family back to the original progenitor, or head, and then follow the line of descendants down to the present time. The line of descendants for which he had particular regard was that which embraced Earl George Dunbar and Robert Dunbar.

In his research for facts that would be of interest, the author found that the ancestors of Earl George Dunbar extended back many generations from him, and that they for a long time had an entirely different name. The following pages contain the name of the original head, and also the changes of the name and how it came to be used as the name of a man.

It is believed that much interest will be found

DUNBAR GENEALOGY.

THE name of Dunbar, or rather the last syllable, was in use more than one thousand years before the Christian era.

A historian,¹ speaking of Kennethus, says: "He drove out the Picts, distributed their lands among the soldiers, and gave many places and countries new names; and all the country from which the Picts were driven was called Fife, from an eminent person, whose name was Fifus, and Baroduma, who was so called from a great man whose name was Bar."

Although the name Dunbar appears very early in history as the name of a place, it was not used, I think, as the name of a person until after the following letter of Alexander.

ANNO 1244. — LETTER OF ALEXANDER, KING OF SCOTLAND: —

To all who shall read of the faithful, directing that, among others who shall serve with good faith and love, the King of England, is named Patrick, count of Dunbar.

After this the name was applied to persons as well as places, as in the following passage: "This Earl Patrick Dunbar, after having served his king and country for some years, was influenced by the zeal of those times and engaged in the Crusades."

The Dunbar family during a period of more than three hundred years — from 1250 — occupied a very conspicuous place in the political, social, and military history of Scotland.

There were three families who held the title of Earl of March, or Merch, — Dunbar, Stewart, and Douglas.

George Dunbar II, born in 1360, at his father's death, in 1416, became tenth Earl of Dunbar and fifth Earl of March, or Merch.

This earl was much in favor with the regents during the absence of King James I, and with the king himself for several years after his return. It is about this time that he is spoken of as "possessing immense wealth." He had no sooner entered upon his fortune than he was employed as a commissioner to treat of the king's release, whereby he was liberated upon paying forty thousand pounds. On the marriage of King James he made twenty-two knights, of whom George Dunbar was one. Hitherto this family of Dunbar had been held in the greatest favor; but this was changed about this time, for on the twelfth of March, 1425, the king at Parliament in Perth caused Earl George Dunbar to be imprisoned on suspicion. The king seized upon the Castle of Dunbar, and, having called a Parliament, caused the title of Earl George to be forfeited, confiscated his great estate and annexed it to the Crown.²

"The Camden, in his Britannica, says: posterity of Gospatrick, besides very large possessions in Scotland, held the barony of Bengely in Northumberland. But in the reign of King James I, George Dunbar, earl of March, by authority of Parliament and upon account of his father's rebellion, lost the proprietary and possession of the earldom of March and the seigniory of Dunbar. It was provided by the laws that the father's transgressions should succeed to the children, lest at any time, being heirs to their father's rashness as well as estate, they should, out of vain opinion of their power,

plot against the prince and country." So notwithstanding we are regular descendants of Earl George Dunbar, who was at one time "immensely rich," we shall not fall heirs to a fortune in Scotland.

The Scots, though weakened by divisions among themselves and jealous of the prince they supported, had assembled an army with which Charles entered England; Cromwell followed, attacked, and defeated the royal troops. That battle ruined, for the time, the royal cause. The nation was now divided into many parties, and multitudes of the people had become weary of agitation and change and desired the revival of the monarchy. Fears of popery were increased by the marriage of the king with Catherine of Portugal, a Catholic princess. The condition of political affairs throughout the entire country was unsettled and afforded no promise of permanent peace.

It is not difficult to see why so many at that time inquired "if there were not in all the world a spot where there were fewer kings and wars and murders, and more peace and happiness and real prosperity; and turned their thoughts to, and sought, 'the land of the free.'" With others, three judges — Goff, Whally, and Dixwell — fled to New England; and it was about this time that Robert Dunbar left Scotland.

From the Scots' Charters and the Register of Kelso, it appears that the Earls of Dunbar and March were descendants of Gospatrick, earl of Northumberland. After Northumberland became a province, the earls were only official and provincial and not hereditary, and they were often changed at the pleasure of the sovereign.

The most ancient histories of England and Scotland reveal that our progenitor, or head, lived before the conquest of England by William, duke of Normandy.

His name was Crinan. He was born in 970, and was Saxon of Northumberland.

His son Maldred was born in 1000. This was the Maldred who was the progenitor of that great and honorable family of the Nevils, of which ancient history so frequently speaks.

His son Earl Gospatrick I was born in 1025. His name, in full, was Waldeve Gospatrick. He married the daughter and heiress of Patrick Dunbar. His family register:—

"My wife, Algithe.

"My children: Dolfin, born in Northumberland, in 1050; Waltheof, born in Northumberland, in 1055; Gospatrick, born in Northumberland, in 1060; Ethelreda, born in Northumberland, in 1065."

Earl Gospatrick II was born in Northumberland, England, in 1060, and taken into Scotland with his father in 1068, and at his father's death succeeded him as Thane of Lothean, and afterward became the first earl in Scotland.

Earl Gospatrick III, born at Dunbar, Scotland, 1100, was second Earl of Dunbar.

Earl Waldeve, born at Dunbar, Scotland, 1130, was third Earl of Dunbar.

Earl Patrick I, born in 1160, at Dunbar, Scotland, first son of Waldeve, became fourth Earl of Dunbar at his father's death in 1182.

Earl Patrick II, born 1185, at Dunbar, Scotland, first son of Patrick I, was fifth Earl of Dunbar.¹

Earl Patrick III, born in 1210. He mar-

ried Christiana, daughter of Robert Bruce, lord of Amandale, and by her had a son, born in 1235, at Dunbar, Scotland, who was Earl Patrick IV. He was the first whom we find styled Earl of March.

Earl Patrick V, born 1265, at Dunbar, Scotland, first son of Patrick V, was seventh Earl of Dunbar and second Earl of March.

Earl Patrick VI, born 1300, at Dunbar, Scotland, was eighth Earl of Dunbar and third Earl of March.

Earl George I, born at Dunbar, Scotland, 1330, was ninth Earl of Dunbar and second Earl of Merray.

Earl and Knight George Dunbar II, born in 1360, was the tenth Earl of Dunbar and fifth Earl of March. His brother, Patrick Dunbar, "was a hostage of the king, and lived for some time at the Court of St. James. His uncle, Sir Patrick Dunbar, of Beil, was murdered with King James I, 1437."

Thus "the distinct line of the ancient and great family of Dunbar, earls of Dunbar and March, became extinct."¹

Besides the descendants, as given in the ¹Rebellion in Scotland. preceding pages, there are several branches from the parent stock that should be noticed.

And the first is, Earl of Morey; Earl John Dunbar, who was born in 1332, at Dunbar, Scotland. He married Lady Margery Stewart, daughter of King Robert II of Scotland. "And that king, by his charter of the ninth of March, 1372, gave the earldom of Morey to this John." Earl Thomas Dunbar, son of John; Earl Thomas, son of Thomas; Sir James Dunbar, son of Thomas; Sir Alexander Dunbar, son of James, born at Dunbar, Scotland, 1405. "He married Isabel, daughter of Alexander Southerland, of which marriage all the families of the name of Dunbar now (1811) flourishing in Scotland are descended."

DUNBAR, OF GRANGE HILL. — Ninian Dunbar, born in 1575, was the founder of the family of Dunbars, of Grange Hill.

The names of his sons were Robert, David, and William. His descendants became quite numerous.

DUNBAR, OF KIRK HILL. — David Dunbar was born in 1613. He settled in Kirk Hill, and from him most, if not all, of the families descended.

Among his descendants are found the names of John, Rev. Robert, Rev. Sir William, who was fifth Baronet of Nova Scotia. Besides the above there have been about five hundred of his descendants whose names have passed into history.

DUNBAR, OF KINKORTH AND DURN. — Sir William Dunbar is the first named among that settlement, which became numerous. They were also very enterprising. He was born in 1615.

DUNBAR, OF HEMPRIGGS. — Born in 1750, and was the progenitor of the Dunbar family of Hempriggs and North Scotland.

His sons were Alexander, John, and William. His descendants have been very numerous, and the most of them that are now living reside at Hempriggs and North Scotland.

The last one of his descendants mentioned in history was William C. Dunbar, who was born July 20, 1844. The Dunbars of Hempriggs were the male lineal descendants of the elder branch of the Dunbars until they failed in Sir Patrick Dunbar, the third baronet of their line.¹

After that the regular line in this family can not be reliably traced in history.

The reader will observe that, from Earl George Dunbar, who was born in 1360, to Robert Dunbar, who was born in 1630, a period of two hundred and seventy years, — no name of any of our ancestors is recorded in the regular line during that time. Now it appears in the "Rebellion of Scotland" that his uncle, Sir Patrick Dunbar, of Beil, was murdered with King James I, in 1437, and that "the distinct line of the ancient family of Dunbar, earls of Dunbar and March, became extinct."

But in the account given in history of one of the branches of the parent stock, "Dunbar, of Grange Hill," it appears that Ninian Dunbar was born in 1575, and it is probable, though not certain, that Robert Dunbar was a son of Ninian Dunbar; in fact, it says he had a son by the name of Robert.

As to the origin of the Dunbars, the regular line of descendants, and the reason for

the belief that Robert Dunbar was a descendant of Earl George Dunbar in the regular line, the reader, with the facts presented in this genealogy, is as well prepared to form an opinion as the compiler.

From the diary of Rev. Peter Hobert, the first settled minister at Hingham, Massachusetts, 1635, it appears that Robert Dunbar, Francis McFarland, and John Magoon came from Scotland and settled in Hingham in 1655.

The opinion generally prevailed in Hingham that Mr. Dunbar brought money enough with him to begin life without embarrassment, as for years there were but two men in the place who paid a higher tax.

Where he was married and what his wife's surname was, the compiler has not been able to ascertain.
