### COMPENDIUM OF NOTES.

HE object in issuing this compendium is to bring before the notice of all interested in the subject an exact statement of all I know concerning the family, and by its absence what information I still require, for it would be very difficult to compile a satisfactory history from such meagre details as I yet possess.

Whenever I write to persons likely to be able to assist me with more information their first enquiry is of course as to the extent of the facts I have gleaned and what field I have covered in my researches. Is is thus plainly to our mutual advantage that all these facts be printed. This course also tends to preserve the references to where full information may be found, and in the event of my proposed history not being able to appear, which I hope will not be the case, a future author, if such should appear, will be able to commence where I have left off, and so save the overlapping inevitable in such cases.

I shall be extremely obliged to my readers for any information about the Dwelly family not in the following pages. I especially want to know—

1 Meaning and origin of the name Dwelly?

2 Any ancestors of John Dwelly who was living at Kelston, near Bath in 1743. Where did he and they come from?

3 Connecting links to join up some of the chart pedigrees given herewith, and so make it possible for me to trace all living Dwellys to a common ancestor.

4 Birthplace and parents' names of Charlotte Lucas,

(whose name is entered as Lucas in her husband's handwriting in our family bible and in the War Office records, but Luckey in marriage register) who married Qr. Mr. Thomas Dwelly, Coldstream Guards, 25 June 1803 at St. George's Hanover Square, London.

5 Ancestry of Lt. & Adjt. Robert Dorrell, 4th. Foot, killed at Guadelope, 1758.

There is a family tradition of the descent of the Dwellys from the baronial family of De Welles, and for a hundred years at least, this tradition has been regarded by us as a fact that could be easily proved and three generations have used the De Welles crest.\* Up to the present I have neither been able to corroborate nor disprove the connection between the two names. I append the full arms of De Welles, so that if any Dwelly should happen to possess a seal, piece of plate, &c. bearing it, a clue might possibly be found to assist further research.



While pursuing my enquiries, I discovered an ancient deed in the Public Record Office, London, with seal complete, a most artistic gem to the genealogical antiquary, which I hope to reproduce in my history. It is about 1260, and the deviced on the seal is a bird flying and looking backwards.

I have just completed my index to the Somerset marriage registers published by Phillimore & Co., (except vols. 9 & 10 which I hope to start shortly,) and I shall be prepared to exchange two references of any surname for every reference of the name of Dwelly that is new to me.

### THE NAME DWELLY.

The first undisputed use of Dwelly as a surname I have come across is John Duelye, mentioned in Close Roll, 1229.

The cases of Roger de Doueliz or de Duuelie show from the *de* that Duuelie was simply the place-name Dowlish Wake, given in Domesday as Douelis.

It is quite possible, even probable, that the descendants of Roger and the other de D.'s if any, were called after their birthplaces, or some other place they were well known to be connected with. Fixed surnames were very rare at that early date.

Bardsley says D'Oyly is probably derived from Ouilli-de-Bassett in the canton of Falaise—written Oillei in the 11th. century—where the family originated. He does not give *Dwelly* under any of its modern spellings, although it appears in the Hundred Rolls, and he quotes them frequently under other names.

Albert Welles, the author of "History of the Welles family," published in New York in 1876, derives the names Welles, D'Oyley, &c. from the above mentioned Ouilli. D'Ouilli seems to me more like Dwelly than any of the others.

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### BIOGRAPHICAL NOTES

Roger de Duuelie, who is also mentioned as de Doueliz (*i.e.* Roger of Dowlish Wake, the latter being written as Douelis, Doules in Domesday) was a witness to many charters, &c. during the bishopric of Reginald bp. of Wells (1174—1190,) Being referred to as "Master," he probably held the degree of M.A.

William de Duueliz, Eustace de Doueliz, and Hugh de Doueliz, his brother.

all witness another charter during the same bishopric (1174—1190.) Full copies of these charters appear in the Report of Historical MSS. Comm. on the MSS. in Dean & Chapter Library, Wells.

Robert Duole of Walford, mentioned in Close Rolls 17 John (1215.)

John Duelye, mentioned in Close Rolls, m. 14 13Hen. III. (1229)

Robert de la Doule, mentioned in Close Rolls, ?13 Hen. III. (?1229) p. 168.

Eustace de Doveliz, and his wife Elena held Wikeburg (? in Somerset) in the time of Hen. III. & Edw. I. He is also mentioned in Patent Rolls 1229 as Eustace de Douelis.

Sir (i.e. Revd.) William de Douile (c. 1231.) One of the witnesses to a grant by Thos. la Warre, lord of Rolveston to the canons of Bruton, see Bruton cartulary, Somerset Rec. Soc. vol. viii, p. 31. In Charter Rolls 25 Hen. III. (1241) Brecon we find "Moreover, the said Walter restores to the said monks &c. the bounds running to the head of Duvelys and thence to Tuchlarduvelys, so that within these metes the monks shall have free pasture &c. Where are these two places, and have they any connection with the name Dwelly ?

Edmund Duulle (temp Hen. III.) son of Alan the clerk )clerici) of Thurlestun, Suffolk. A grant by him to John de Sancto Georgeo of Ipswich, of land in Thurlestun. Wit. Wm. de Pesehale, Martin the clerk of Hakeham, and others, named. [Fine scal with legend " SIGILLU EDMUNDI FIL ALANI" attached. No. of deed in Record Office A3907 Suff.] John de Vallibus or Vaux was interested in Thurleston in 15 Edw. I. and held a manor and certain fees and lands in the parish. It is now joined with Whilton.

Robert Dwelle (1260) A grant by him to Allan Justus for land in Thurleston, Suffolk, called le Hesdland. May, 44 Hen. III. A3814 in Record Office.

Nicholas Duelle of Thurlestone. Feoffment by—not dated but temp. Hen. III.—to Sir (Rev.) Alex. de Sprouton perpetual vicar of the church of Thurleston, and Margery de Bonges late wife of Martin Justus, of a messuage with buildings in Thurleston next the road from Thurleston church to Ipswich. Rent 4d. A10,895 in Record O.

William de Doueliz (c. 1260) mentioned in an indenture being a release by Wm. Perys of Wrokesdale to Hugh Lacok, clerk, of his right in the land, &c. which Isabel late the wife of Robt. de Holte held in the manor of Lacok at at Wyk, with reversion to himself on the said Hugh's decease; rent during the life of Wm. de Doueliz, a pair of gloves of the price of 1d. and thereafter 10/-. No. A9412 Wilts. in Record Office. Robert Dweyle, (c. 1256) juror for hundred of Stodfold, Wilts, see Hundred Rolls.

John de Deuelys (1261) appears in a suit relating to the manor of Licheham Devon in De Banco Rolls 45-46 Hen. III.

Alexander Douylle (c. 1270-1280) held land in Tackele, co, Oxon in time of Hen. III & Edw. I.

William de Doueliz, (c. 1273) was one of the witnesses to a grant by Thos. de Reyni to the canons of Bruton of half a virgate of land in Charlton FitzAdam. Bruton cart. Som. Rec. Soc. viii, 45-6.

Richard Dwelie (1276) of Stodfold, Wilts, juror, see Hundred Rolls. Called Dunely—misprint for Duuely—in Placita de quo waranto (pleas.)

Richard Douuile (Ricardus de Hoyville) certified pursuant to a writ tested at Chipston 5 March as one of the lords of the township of Spilsbury & Thorstane, Fullwell, Ditchley, Chadlington, Estend in the co. of Oxford (1280-1) 9 Edw. II.

Robert Duyley (1284-5) holds "Wallingford in villa de Pushull" co. Oxford. Placita quo war. 13 Edw. I.

Richard Dwelie (1285) was among the jurors summoned by the escheator in 1285 at an inquisition made before the sheriff of Wilts regarding land in Erchefurte. see Hundred Rolls. Did he leave male issue?

John de Duaylles (1285) holds Boggebrok of the king in capite see Hundred Rolls.

Richd. Dwelye (1294) witness to owner of land in Fenny Sutton, Wilts, see Hundred Rolls. ? Descendants. Thomas de Dylewe, manucaptor of John Coykyng, burgess returned for Leominster (1295-6.)

Henricus de Dyluwys, Dylewyshe. Inquis. P. M. Edw I. No. 64 in B. Museum, p. 59.

Walter de Dylewe (1305-6), manucaptor of Thos. de Rodyng, burgess returned for Leominster.

Nicholas Doghulle (1311), mentioned in Patent Rolls, memb. 17d.

Ralph Dwole (1315) mentioned in Patent Rolls, m.24d.

Ralph Duylly (1324) Protection granted to, for one year to go beyond the seas on the king's service with Edmund Earl of Kent.

Robert Dwole,<br/>Walter Dwelie<br/>Robert Dwole,(1327-8, appear in an Exchequer<br/>Lay subsidy for the sums of 6d.,<br/>8d. and 22d. respectively for<br/>Som. Rec. Soc., vol. 3.

Franche Count Duilly, (M. ét en 1331) Fasée d'or et de gu. de huit piéces. Armorial général précédé d'un dictionaire des termes du blazon, par J. B. Reitstap, vol. 1.

Alexander Deweyle (1331), deputed by the king's serjeant and chief butler to discharge his office in the port of Yarmouth, Isle of Wight.

Nicholas Duele (1338), mentioned in a writ to Bishop Ralph. Witnessed at York. 26 Oct. Som. Rec. Soc. ix

Thomas Duelye (1341-2), grant of land in Erchesfunte. see Rot. orig. in cur. sacc. ab., rot. 43. Thomas Doulissh (1378) was prior of Plympton, co. Devon. Patent roll, memb. 27d.

William Dewalle (1390), was summoned on 17 June to answer touching a trespass in Suffolk.

Joan Duylle (1391) wife of John Waschipp the king's esquire, confirmation of a grant of a house to, at Gravebery, co Bedford for their lives.

Richd. Dwalle, (1537-40) will among Rutland wills at Northampton. Litchborough 142.

Donatus-y-Dwylle (1551) June 22. Grant of English liberty to, see Patent & Close rolls Chancery Ireland, 5 Edw. VI.

Owen Dwelleghe, (1558-1603) Pardons, from Cal-Una Dwyle, endar of Fiants of the reign of Morish Dwolie, Q. Eliz. Pub. rec. of Ireland.

John Dwelly, was Port-reeve of Langport, Somerset, in 1595, mentioned in Subsidy roll 1593, Communicants' list 1619, and Town charter 1617. In 1628 his (?)widow pays £3 in Subsidy roll. In 1650 the churchwardens of Langport received 20/- for "Dwelly's barn" and in 1652 £1 for "Dwelly's plot." Where was he born, and did he marry Sidwelle Michell? Have you any knowledge of any other Dwellys connected with Langport?

Robert Dwelley of Taunton, yeoman, servant to Capt. Arthur Savedge. In will 12 Apr. 1596, (P.C.C. 72 Drake) he leaves £48 to his friend Magdalen Purnell, and £4.10/to the poor. No relatives are mentioned.

John Dwallye, 1603, appears in an Index of returns of aliens in London 1509—1603, ii 149. Huguenot Soc. Publications. "Dwelley" occurs in Signet bills in Record Office 1603-1624. Warrants March 1611, and March 1613, and License April 1615.

John Dwelly of Rappes, Ilton, tailor, in will (P.C.C. 107 Meade) dated 1618, mentions two daughters Mary and Maudleyn, daughter Catherine Towell, sons John D. and William D., and wife Alice D.

The name Dwelly does not appear at all in Chancery Proceedings bills and and answers filed in the reign of Chas. I.

Sarah Dwelly 1650, appears in Dougal's unclaimed money Register, p. 103, 212 §4.

Agnes Dwelly, mentioned in Town survey of Langport of 1659.

Gyles Dwelly of Hardington, in will 1660 (P.C.C. 208 Nabbs) mentions brother Robert, kinsman George Dwelly, and wife Anne D. Robert Dwelly is also spelt Dwellie. Bequeathed his bible to wife Ann, if she were with child at time of his death, it was to be at her disposal, otherwise to remain in brother Robert's possession. Can this bible still be found? I am very anxious to see it.

Aaron Duelle (alias Turvally) of Middlesex, will 1662 in P.C.C. (7 Laud.)

William Dwelly or Dwellie, the younger of Durston, in will at Taunton P.C. 1664 mentions father William Dwelie, mother Elianor Dwelly, brother George, brotherin-law Robert Chappell, sister Mary Chappell, and wife Elizabeth, executrix. John Dwelly appears as a witness to the will of one Matthew Vanstone of Taunton Magdalene in 1673.

William Dwelly of Clyst St. Mary, tailor, in will 1701 in Exeter P.R. (Clyst St. Mary) mentions son John D., grandchildren, (sons of John D.) John and Richard, son Humphrey D., grandchildren (ch. of Humphrey) William, Susannah and John, dr.-in-law Elizabeth, wife of Humphrey.

Henry Dwelly senr. of Curry Rivel, will 1705 in Taunton P.R. mentions wife (no name,) son Henry, daughter Mary Hankins, chil. of Mary Hankins Mary, Robert, Sarah and Susanna, son-in-law Francis Pettin, grandsons John D. and Jonathan D., and granddr. Elizabeth Dwelly.

George Dwelly of Hardington in will 1712 (Wells P.R. 99) mentions son George, son Robert, dr, Joan, grandsons John Dwelly, George Dwelly and Robert. Bequeathed house in Hardington, south part to George, and north part to Robert.

Elizabeth Duelly alias Gibbs, joint admx. of Robert Gibbs of Woodbury, Devon, 7 Sep. 1712. see Worth's Devonshire wills.

Charles Dewailly, French architect (1729-1799,) see Chalmers' Biog. Dict. 32 vols. Lond. 1812-17, also New Biog. Dict. by H. J. Rose, 12 vols. Lond, 1848.

John Dwelly of Exeter, tailor, will 1736 (Exeter D. P. R.) mentions cousins John Carne of Ottery St. Mary and Thomas Eustace, T.E.'s wife—no name given—and his dr. Sarah Eustace, sister Susannah wife of Geo. Mortimore and their six children whose names are not given, apprentice Isaac Pyke, and friend Nicholas Pope of St. Sidwells, weaver. Bequeathes tenements and hereditaments to sister Susannah Mortimore.

Edward Dwelly of Durston in will 1743 (Taunton P.

R.) mentions grandson Robert Curry, daughters Ann Curry, and Katherine Applebee wife of Emanuel A. yeoman, and wife Dorothy. Bequeathed house, garden, smith's house, warren and kennel to wife, and at her death to Katherine Applebee.

Robert Dweely of Hambridge, Curry Rivel in will 1761 (Taunton P.R.) mentions children Betty, Margaret, Robert, Thomas and Abraham all "Dweely," sister-in-law Hannah Dweely's children, and young Jonathan Dweely.

George Dwelly of Yeovil, coachman, in will 1767 (99 Wells P.R.) mentions wife Rebekah, dr. Mary Dwelly, brothers Robert and Richard, nephew Roger Purchass, sister Mary Cox, master John Oto Goodford. Bequeathes dwelling houses in Henford and gardens and orchard belonging to same to wife during her lifetime and widowhood, after that to dr. Mary and legitimate issue if any, failing that, to brother Robert for life and at his death to nephew Robert Purchass and his heirs for ever.

Robert Dwelly clerk of Parish Church of N. Curry. ? born 1752 and died 1790.

Quarter Master Thomas Dwelly (1775-1850) Entered Coldstream Guards, 1797, promoted Qr. Mr. 1812. Services: Holland1799, Pitton, Wulmenhuysen & Limenen. Bremen 1805. Siege of Copenhagen Egypt 1801. Peninsular 1809-12, Passage of Douro and Cap-1807. ture of Oporto, Salamanca, battle of Talavera, Busaca, Fuentes d'Onor, Siege of Ciudad Rodrigo, batt. of Salamanca, Capture of Madrid, Siege of Burgos. Served 40 years 157 days with the colours, ret'd on half-pay 1837, d. 1850 in Vincent Sq., Westminster. I want particulars about his wife's people. Her maiden name is entered in family bible in his handwriting as well as in Regimental records as Charlotte Lucas, but the marriage register of St. George's, Hanover Square gives Charlotte Luckey.

Robert Dwelly of Durston, tailor, will 1776 (Taunton P.R.) mentions niece Catherine Curry, kinswoman 'what relation?) Betty Applebee, her sister Catherine Applebee and her brother John Appleby, nephew Samuel Dwelly and his children, one of whom was James, nephew William Dwelly and his 3 daughters, Thomas Parson's children by Margaret his wife née Dwelly, and Robert Dwelly parish clerk of North Curry. (what relation were last two to testator.)

William Dwelly, 1777—1865, builder, b. at Bow, Devon. Had a brother also a builder at Plymouth, family said to have come from Bridport. Was he a first cousin of Richard D. who m. Mary Lampeer and d. at Plymouth 1846?

Robert Dwelly, farmer, b. c. 1781, supposed in the neighbourhood of Tiverton. There was a fire in the house he occupied in Barrington in 1837. d. at Barrington.

Thomas Dwelly (1782—1854) late of Sherston Magna. He was in the excise, and meeting with an accident in the execution of his duties, he was obliged to resign. He and his wife conducted a private school in Sherston Magna after his accident.

James Doually, d. 1782. Admn in P.C.C. Gostling.

James Doually, d. 1789. will in P.C.C, Macham.

John Dwelly, d. at Kelston 1792. Came to Kelston in connection with the building trade. Where did he come from? Married Ann [-----?] who was buried at Kelston 1805, aged 87.

Richard Dwelly of Exminster, yeoman d.1793. Adm. (Exeter D.P.R. Exminster admn.) names 5 children Elizabeth, Mary, Susannah, Richard and John. Name spelt Dwelley in admn. note attached to this document, the *e* being ad ded afterwards. Richard Dwelly, seaman of H.M.S. Valiant, bachelor Admon. [P.C.C. Oct. 1799] mentions father Richard D.

Elizabeth Dwelly b. 1803, dr. of Wm. D. born at Bow 1777, had two husbands, John Ogalbe married at Plymouth and John Andwins married at Barnstaple, and left three children, Elizabeth [Mrs. Oliver] now living at Bideford, Emma and Charles Henry. Were these children by first or second husband?

Thomas Dwelly Harrison, gardener, born 1803, son of Ann Dwelly, who married Geo. Harrison. The house he lived in at Kelston was pulled down and the present school erected on its site, but the old porch is still standing.

Thomas Edward Dwelly, 1808—1873, engraver, apprenticed to Thomas Short, Haberdasher of the City of London, 6 May 1823. Clerk in Cox & Co's, Army Agents, for many years.

William Dwelly of Hambridge, Curry Rivel, died 1810 will (Taunton D.P.R.) mentions sister Mary Dwelly, nephew James Pleacie of Moorlinch, and wife Betty Dwelly.

William Dwelly, born about 1819 in Tottenham Court Road, London. Had two cousins who were clever needlewomen and lived in Bond Street, and an uncle John Valentine Dwelly who held property in Turnstile, Holborn. Any particulars of any of them will be welcome.

Robert Rush Dwelly 1823—? Master of Lunatic Asylum at Stone, Dartford, Kent.

William Dwelley died 1826. will in Bristol D.P.R.

Jacob Edmund D'Welly, 1829—1884. Always wrote his surname thus, it is so in marriage register. Said his brother used a crest, what crest cannot as yet be traced. Used to speak of a John Dwelly but did not mention his relationship, also said he had a cousin in Somerset House [?Dwelly,] his brother Robert once called on him. Was he born in or near Nailsea?

John Holmes Dwelly (1817—1874.) Prosecuting counsel for Inland Revenue. Compiled a revision of the licensing laws, in consideration of which his widow was awarded a Civil List Pension.

Thomas Edward Dwelly, [1831—1893) Educated at Christ's Hospital, Hertford and London. Some months in a land agent's office conducted by a Mr. Donaldson. From there he proceeded to the office of Messrs. Cox & Co., Army Agents, where he remained until within a few months of his death, only enjoying the pension awarded him for a very short period. His widow received a pension from the clerks' widows' fund till her death.

Richard John Dwelly (1833—1901) Served many years in the office of Cox & Co., Army Agents. Many years in 2nd. South Middx. R.V. holding rank of sergeant at the time of his transfer to Middlesex Engineers.

Robert Dwelly, b. 1852, now living at Chard, coachbuilder. Alderman for many years.

Henry James Dwelly L.R.C.P., M.R.C.S., (1843--1888) Major 1st. City of London Artillery. A well known and successful exhibitor of pigeons at the Crystal Palace and other shows. Most skilful in his profession, and the esteem in which he was held in the neighbourhood in which he lived was graphically demonstrated by the immense crowds that attended at his funeral. A full account appeared in the S. London Observer & Peckham Times 18th. Apr. 1888. Particulars wanted with dates and places at which he exhibited, and the prizes he was awarded. Geo. Augustus Frederick Dwelly (b. 1845) Served in Union Bank of London, Prince's St., for 40 years, and now retired on a pension at Ewell, Surrey.

William Dwelly, (d. 1850) will in Bristol D.P.R.

Dr. James Henry Dwelly. Is this the Dr. Dwelly who lived at Streatham Common, Surrey about 1890, and who was said to bear a strong resemblance to Robert Rush D. of Dartford ?

Edward Dwelly, F.S.G., (b. 1864) bank clerk, lexicographer and publisher. A detailed account of his life appeared in the *Celtic Review*, Jan. 1909, and London *Daily Express*, 25th. Aug. 1911, where full particulars of the production of the Illustrated Gaelic Dictionary, for which he was awarded a Civil List Pension of £50 per annum, will also be found. Joined Queen's Westminster R.V. July 1881, transferred to London Scottish Nov. 30 1881, 5th. V.B. A. & S. Highrs. 30 July 1887, and 1st. V.B. Seaforth Highrs. (Gairloch) 3 June 1891. Corp. Piper 1894. Served in office of Cox & Co., Army agents for 10 years (1881-1891.) Now living at Fleet, Hants.

Rev. F. W. Dwelly, M.A., (b. 1881) late curate of St. Mary's Windermere.

### American members

of the Family.

Most of the information about members of the family in America has been obtained from the genealogical notes compiled by Hon. Jedediah Dwelley, Hanover, Mass., for the History of the town of Hanover, pub. in 1910.

Mrs. Woodman, Fall River, and Mr. W. H. Dwelly of Boston, have also given considerable assistance.

Abner Dwele (1700—1732.) At the first important Annual town meeting of Hanover, held 2 Mar. 1727, he is mentioned as one of two drivers, and as one of a building committee of three who were to let out the meetinghouse to build. It was to be 48ft. long, 38ft. wide, and 19ft. high between the joists, and to be completed by Oct. 1, 1728. He appears as Abner *Dwelly* at the time of the incorporation of the town. He was a selectman in 1730 and 1731. He died in 1732 by falling from a load of hay, his wife having predeceased him. He probably built the house on Elm Street, near Broadway, Hanover, now owned by L. Vernon Briggs, M.D. He made a non-cupative will in which he provided that the widow Bristow should have enough to purchase her a mourning gown.

Abner Dwelly (1733-1803) His children given in chart, but do not know if they are by 1st. or 2nd. wife. This family moved first to Western Mass., and later to Washington co. N.Y. Descendants numerous. Shall be glad to hear from any of them. He served in Revolutionary war; can details of his services be had? Lieut. Abner *Dwellie's* co. Mass. Bay Militia exped. to Manchester pd. Dec. 19, 1777, is mentioned in *Cleveland Family*, 1899, p. 2271. Abner Dwelley, (1758-1826) Served in Revolutionary war. Details of services wanted.

Avis Dwelley, d. at Hanover, 1831, aged 90.

Benjamin Dwelley. Mentioned as one of the shipcarpenters employed in building the brig *Dedalus* in 1800, and the ship *Garland* in 1801, also in building the brig *Fame* and the ship *Fame* in 1801. Uncle to Capt. Nathan Dwelley and great uncle to Robert E. Dwelley of Hanover. (see History of Shipbuilding on North River, Boston, 1889, Briggs.)

Chas. H. Dwelley (b. 1842) Resides in house on Union st., built about 1730 by Joseph Curtis.

Daniel & Deborah Dwella, mentioned as father and mother of Elizabeth Graham b. Canajoharie, N. Y., Oct. 12. 1799, d. at Jackson, June 27, 1886, who m. David Cleveland (d. 1851) at Hebron, N.Y., Dec 28-9, 1820.— Cleveland Family.

Geo. C. Dwelley. joined the army for three years for service in the Civil War in 1861.

George Russell Dwelley, (1829-1907) Resided at and died in Arlington, Mass. He was a graduate of Harvard College in 1853 in the same class as President Eliot, and wrote a poem for the celebration. Was Town clerk & Town treasurer in 1857. Served on School Committee in 1857 & 1859. His life work was that of a High-school teacher and School Superintendent. Author of "a tribute to the Hanover Academy."

Hosea Dwelley enlisted for three months' service in Civil War, 1861.

James H. Dwelly about 1812 owned a house near the second dam erected by Mr. Reed above the mouth of Rocky Run Brook. Jedediah Dwelley (b. 1698) resided at corner of Green and Pine Streets in what is now Norwell.

Jedediah Dwelley, Scituate, (b. 1737, m. 1763) was a soldier in the French war. Details of services wanted.

Hon. Jedediah Dwelly, (b. Feb. 28, 1834 in Hanover where he has always lived.) Educated in the public schools and at the Hanover Academy. At the age of 25 he was chosen selectman of his native town, and served in that capacity for 30 years. During the Rebellion he was Chairman of the Selectmen, the youngest chairman in the For 12 years he was a member of the school com-State. mittee and was such when the high school was started. He was one of the committee under whose direction the present town hall was built. For nine or ten years he was special County Commissioner, and County Commissioner for 27 years, the greater portion of that time being the chairman of the board. Under his official care the Plymouth Court House was enlarged and remodelled, the jail built, the Brockton Court House built, and more roads and bridges built than under any man who ever held the office. He was a member of the several boards of commissioners to build, start and foster the Truant school at Walpole, for the counties of Norfolk, Plymouth and Bristol. He was representative to the General Court in 1865 and senator from this district in 1873 and 1874. No man who has lived in the town has been so long and so intimately connected with all that is best for the town and its interests. -History of the town of Hanover.

Capt. John and Hannah Dwelly mentioned as parents of Hannah Reade b. & d. at West Bayleston, Mass., who married as his first wife Laton (or Lotan) Cleveland at W. B., Mar. 27, 1823. He died at W.B. Aug. 28, 1875, aged 78—*Cleveland family*, i, p. 817. John Dwelley (1693-4-1743) resided in Scituate. Father and 4 children died the same year.

Joseph S. Dwelly enlisted July 18, 1864 for one year's service in Civil war.

Joseph Dwelley (1813-1868) resided on Main st. Hanover in the house constructed by himself and now occupied by his grandson, J. Howard Brooks.

Joshua Dwelly of Tiverton (died c. 1759); his wife Elizabeth died c. 1771.

Joshua Dwelley(1735-1761) resided in Hanover, first on Hanover street on Woodward Hill, then on corner of Main and Union streets. He was a soldier in the Revolutionary war. Details of his services required.

Joshua Dwelly purchased a house (about 1763) at corner of Main and Union streets, probably built about 1715 by Benjamin Curtis. He and his descendants have owned it to the present time.

Joshua Dwelley (1766—1847) resided in Hanover on Union street, where John H. Dwelley now resides ; his children were born in Hanover.

Joshua Dwelley junr. was employed in 1826 to construct a town house "31 feet wide, 39 feet long and 11 feet between the joists."

Joshua and Deborah Dwelly mentioned as parents of Ruth Ann Baker, born at Salisbury, N.Y. Aug. 30, 1828, who married Ira Cleveland, Dec. 4, 1854—*Cleveland jamily* vol. iii, p. 2005. Lemuel Dwelley (1764—1846) was for many years connected with the Curtis forge and associated with Geo. Curtis in the anchor industry ; he sold his interest to Curtis in 1839. Selectman 1827—4831. One of the committee chosen in 1823 to consider the subject of a poorhouse.

Lemuel Dwelley of Hanover married Ruth daughter of Benjamin Bailey (born about 1800)—Bailey genealogy.

Mrs. Mary Dwelley. In the early history of Hanover nearly all the clothing was made from the wool sheared from the sheep or the flax of the farmer's own growing. The author of the History of the town of Hanover remembers when Mrs. Mary Dwelley spun the yarn and wove the cloth which she made into a dress wearing the same for years.

Dr. Melzer Dwelley of Ashburnham, moved with his wife to Hanover in 1797 to the house on Hanover street now occupied by Alpheus N. Chamberlain, where he died. He practised medicine here until his death, Nov. 20, 1828, at the age of 57. His skilful services were in great demand for miles around. He is said to have left descendants in South Boston and Ashburnham. I shall be pleased to hear any new facts from or about any of these.

Captain Nathan Dwelley (1797—1882) was captain of the Hanover Rifle Co. for a time and resided in a house that stood on the location of "Hotel Josselyn." The Company was formed about 1816, and formed part of 2nd. regt. 1st. brig., 5th. div., Mass. militia.

Percy W. Dwelley lives in his father's house on Union street, built about 1730 by Joseph Curtis, and purchased by his ancestor Lemuel Dwelley.

Pearce Dwelly, whose wife was named Rose, was living in Tiverton in 1802, and later at Sloansville, Scholarie co., N.Y. Richard Dwelley probably came from England with his father John, was in Lancaster, Mass. in 1654 and in Hingham about 1660. He went to Scituate in 1665, and his farm was on the road leading from the Third Herring brook to the harbour, about a mile north of the former. He resided in the house formerly owned by Capt. Seth Foster, but now owned by Henry D. Smith, which house he probably constructed. He was a soldier in King Phillip's war (an Indian war) in 1676, and received a grant of land for his services between Comet's mill and the Plymouth road. He had a meadow at Till's Creek, which is subsequently known as "Dwelley's creek." He died May 27, 1692.

Richard Dwelley (born 1659-60) Winser's History of Duxbury 1849 incorrectly gives Elizabeth Simmons as 2nd wife of this Richard instead of his father.

Richard Dwelly of Scituate left certain lands to his sons Joshua and Samuel adjoining the land of John Dwelly. A document dated 29 Jan. 1712, in possession of Mrs C.B. Woodman, Fall River, speaks of said Richard Dwelly as "late deceased." Joshua was living in Swanzey (a few miles from Fall River (on opposite side of the Taunton river) in 1712. Another deed, also in possession of Mrs. W., records a transfer of land in Swanzey from one John Alger, a blacksmith, for the sum of £30 to Joshua Dwelly, Aug. 25, 1713. He moved later to Tiverton.

Richard Dwelly, great grandfather of Mrs. C.B. Woodman, Fall River, was a resident of Tiverton as late as Aug. 1, 1791, and died in Maulins, N.Y. He was a constable in Tiverton in 1784.

Richard Dwelly appears in 1666 in a list of constables for Duxbury—*Winser*, p. 81.

Robert E. Dwelley (born 1825) Resides on Broadway, Hanover, near the Corners in house constructed by himself where Alonzo N. Josselyn has kept a hotel for the last 12 years. He celebrated the 60th. anniversary of his wedding in July, 1908.

Samuel Dwelle (born about 1729) of Sunderland in 1757, was in Deerfield, Mass. as early as 1770. He held 9 lots in the division of Conway, containing over 1,300 acres. He died in Con. 1816, married in Canton, Elizabeth, daughter of Stephen Billings. A "widow Dwelley" who died Mar. 1800, aged 92, was probably mother of Samuel. —History of Deerfield, Sheldon, 1896, vol. 2, p. 2.

Sarah J. Dwelly died 1893, aged 87.

William Dwelley lived in Hanover, Mass., near the junction of Elm street with Broadway in 1748.

## MISCELLANEOUS NOTES

which might possibly supply clues to further information.

Kidwelly was the surname of a few persons residing in Wiltshire in the 15th. and 16th. centuries, having a goat's head for their crest, and no doubt taking their name from a place in Caermarthenshire, but I have not been able to find any connection between either this castle, town or surname and Dwelly or DeWelles.

Welleys, Waleys, Wallis, Walsh, Welsh, Welch, Walls' &c. were names used by several families in S. Wales from the 13th. to the 15th. cent. They are different forms of one name, and mean *foreigner*.

The name Duuelie as written in old charters, would doubtless be frequently transcribed Duvelie, which would introduce a number of new forms with a very slight alteration in sound or spelling, among others Develie and Devile. If the forms Dewell, Duell, Dewall, Devyll, de Daivill, Wele, Welly, Wellys, &c. are the same name, I have many notes connected with them.

The place-name Dowlais, Monmouthshire, has been written Dowlas, Diueleys, Dyueleys and Byueleys

There is a place-name Dowally in Ireland, which probably has the same derivation as Dowally Perthshire, dubh-alla, *black rock*.

D' Evile lived in Yorkshire in 16th. century.

Sir John Deyvile was at Battle of Boroughbridge,1322 It is spelt De euyle in original roll. His arms were a lion rampant on groundwork of fleurs-de-lis, and there may a relationship to De Welles, or a connection between them and De Welles. Sir John Deyvill, at battle of Falkirk, 1298, had arms with a number of fleurs-de-lis in its composition and may have been related to the last. Ansele Deyvile (De Vile) is in Hen, III. Roll.

Domesday for Somerset mentions Geoffrey de Valle, and Walter de Dowai.

William Douvile or D' Ovile and Hugh D' Ovile are mentioned by Collinson in 26 Edw. I. and 19 Edw. II., in connection with Christon, Somerset.

Robert Dolle nominated as one of the Attorneys of England of Nicholas, Abbot of Mont St. Michael in Normandy, Nov. 20, 1335. Pat. Roll, 9 Edw. III. m. 15, Newcastleon-Tyne.

Matilda de Oylly (Dorset,) Dominus de Doyli, Henry de Oyly, de Oyli, Doyli, Doyly, Doyly or Doyl (Oxf) in Hundred Rolls. John de Oyly (Staff) Placita de quo w. Juliana Dovle 1379, Poll tax W. Yorks. Johannes Doyle and Alicia his wife 1379, Poll tax, W. Yorks. Katherine Doylle do. 1643—buried Francis Doyley, St. Peter's, Cornhill, John Doly (Soms) 1 Edw. III. Kirby's Quest.

A long account of Robt. D' Oiley (1066) who came over from Normandy with Wm. I. and his descendants in Dugdale's Baronage concludes "they mostly held lands in Oxfordshire till they were inherited by two heiresses in 17 Hen. III. the elder of whom had a son Thos. Earl of Warwick, who paid his uncle for relief of the lands descended to him.

Robt. de Ylie (de Oilli, Sheriff of Oxf.) was witness to a charter 1068 by King Wm. I.—Domesday Studies, Eyton.

John Dwythye de Wynford and Alice his wife, probate of will in Stowgummer, 23 Sept. 1535—Wells Wills,p.198. John & Alice Dully marr.—Genealogist, i, 249.

Wm. Dovell, last abbot of Old Cleeve, Somerset.

The curious surname of Doel evidently a corruption or De Dourle, which is found in an old Malmesbury deed. Probably also the Doels are connected with the ancient family of Dewell or De Wale, possessors of property in Bremelham during the 14th. and 15th. centuries. Roger Dewell was a yeoman in Norton Bavent, 1609—Guppy's Homes of Family Names.

John de Vallibus (or Vaux) was interested in Thurlestone (Suff) in 16 Edw. I. and held a manor and certain fees and lands there. Was he connected with the E., N. and R. Duelle who sold land in Thurleston, see p. 5, above? Albert Welles, author of "the History of the Welles family" says—*Euille* or *Welles* bore the same arms with slight variations and bears the same analogy to the discerning eye. The name ramifies in many directions—Valibus, Welles, Lee, Millburn, Molbeck, Mollineux (or Miller,) D' Everaux, Wassa, Washbourn (afterwards Washington,) Burn, Hurtburn, Heburn, Waterton, Waters, Beck, &c.

One ancestor of the Welles family was named *Everaux* or *Euille* (a spring or water) in Normandy and originated also the root of Vernon (from *ver*, a spring) Richard de Welles or Euille took the name of Welles in England.

The Roll of Battle Abbey contains the name of this ancestor of the Welles family "R. de Euille." Everaux has the precise meaning of Euille or Welles, the name of the family of Hartburn, Durham, and that of the Warwickshire family Wyllys. The origin of the Welles family of Lincolnshire, barons by summons to Parliament, was in the Vaux (Baux, Bayeux or de Vallibus) family of France. It was founded in England after the Conquest by Harold de Vaux (a near connection of William the Conqueror) and his three sons. Barons Hubert, Ranulph and Robert, who were all surnamed de Vallibus. The descent is through the younger son Robert, whose grandson William had four sons, Robert de Dalston, baron, Adam and William de Welles, Lincolnshire 1194, aud Oliver de Vallibus, prior of Pentney Abbey.

So far, I have not been able to find definite authorities for above statements. Can any reader oblige? Mr A. Welles' MSS. were dispersed at his death in America some years ago, and I have been quite unable to trace any of them although most anxious to do so. It is quite possible if any of them could be recovered that authorities for some of the statements made might be found marked on them. Any information as to their whereabouts will be gladly received.
