THE AUTHOR'S PREFACE

Pride of ancestry and love of genealogy are worthy traits of any civilization. They foster a spirit that develops the best to be found in the human soul. Savages are ignorant of pedigrees, and are without lineage. We must turn to the enlightened of humanity for a record of the earth's activity and a history of her people.

But a genealogy treats of but one branch of her many people. In this volume, the author desires to enroll the several branches of the Diehl families of this country, in an accurate and permanent manner. In compiling this work, I have found Diehls in nearly every state of the Union. The original ones almost invariably came from various sections of the Vaterland. To assemble data from such a large scope of widely situated locations is no easy task. Most of it must be done by mail — by patient and persistent correspondence.

Old family Bibles of other centuries were hunted for records, assessment rolls dug out of the dust, inscriptions of names and dates from the mountain slabs of century-old cemeteries copied, ancient court house records transcribed, the archives of Historical Societies and State Departments ransacked, and the oldest living representative of his community consulted, that this enterprise might succeed. To each and every one, from ocean to ocean, who has in any manner contributed to this success, I am under the most lasting obligation. Valuable and repeated assistance came from Mr. U. G. 

Samuel Diehl and Descendants.

In the pioneer days of the early colonists, very little attention was given to history or geneology. Daily physical necessities and protection from the natural elements of the climate and the deceifful treachery of savages, engaged their constant efforts. But civilization and enlightenment have advanced; and we are all now more or less prone to pry into the dim vistas of the past. It is unfortunate that so little record of the earlier Diehl ancestry is at hand. But let us preserve to all future generations the history we do have.

Samuel Diehl, progenitor of one of the prominent branches of the numerous Diehl families in America, was born in 1740, and resided in Loudon County, Virginia, where most of his children were born, quite a number of years. His wife was a Miss Ritchey. He did service for the Colonies as a soldier in the Revolutionary War. In 1784 he and his family, his mother-in-law, Mrs. Ritchey, and Philip Diehl and George Diehl, came up into Bedford County, Pennsylvania, and settled in Friend's Cove. Samuel and Philip soon became owners of good sized farms. George operated a distillery several years. Eventually the latter two disappeared from the county, leaving no known record of their destiny or descendants. Samuel stuck to the soil, as have thousands of his industrious progeny in the generations since. He died on his old home farm near Ott's Mill, in 1828, and is buried in the old grave yard on the Bowser farm, now owned by William Beegle.

John Diehl was born on the old homestead, near the Brick Church in Friend's Cove, Bedford County, Pennsylvania, June 21, 1796, and at maturity married Mary Magdalena Koontz, who was born in that community April 2, 1801 and died March 7, 1865. He was in politics a Whig, then a Republican, and all of their family members of the Reformed Church. Two of the sons, Joshua and Samuel, were volunteers in the Union army during the Civil War, the former in the 8th Ohio Cavalry and the latter in the 55th Pennsylvania Volunteers Infantry. Ten of the 13 children married and raised respectable families, many of whose members occupied prominent and useful positions of trust. Mr. Diehl died May 10, 1870.

I. Henry P. Diehl was born in Friend's Cove, Bedford County, Pennsylvania, July 12, 1825, and is possibly the oldest Diehl in this section at this time. He taught the Swamp School, near his home, where he has always lived, five successive years. Nov. 22, 1849, he united in marriage with Martha J. Smith, who was born in the Cove, July 27, 1831, Rev. Matthew Irvine officiating. He was extensively identified with the agricultural, financial, political, social, and religious interests of the community. As school director, auditor, and Democratic county committeeman, he served many years. He has been an earnest worker in the Reformed Church three-quarters of a century, serving most of that time either deacon or elder and serving a number of years as teacher and superintendent of the Sunday school. He has represented the church in her higher ecclesiastic judiciaries. He help organize the Friend's Cove Mutual County Fire Insurance Company and was its president for seventeen vears.


I. Catharine Diehl was born in Friend's Cove. Pennsylvania, March 6, 1820, and died at Loysburg, Pennsylvania, Dec. 17, 1890. She was married to John Dittmar, a saddler and harness maker, of Lovsburg, Feb. 10, 1848, Rev. Matthew Irvine officiating. Mr. Dittmar was born May 17, 1819 at Oberoorschutz Fritzlar, in Kurhessen, Germany, and came to this country to escape military service in the fatherland, in 1835. He was an earnest, faithful worker in the church from his youth, and loyally supported the Reformed Church during his long and useful career. With an unaffected but sincere piety, he was a genuine Christian, humility being one of his strong distinguishing characteristics. For nearly two generations he furnished the whole countryside for miles around with good home-made harness and saddles before the advent of the present day factories. Two of his sons, Revs. David Nevin and Henry Franklin, were honored and efficient ministers of the Reformed Church. A daughter, Anna L., occupied the position of Matron in a Presbyterian College for Women at Charlotte, South Carolina, from 1898 to 1904.

II. Levi Henry Diehl (Nov. 28, 1821-May 28, 1906) and Harriet Whetstone (June 4, 1824-March 6, 1907), daughter of Jacob and Agnes Whetstone, natives of Bedford County, Pennsylvania, were married by Rev. George Liedy, in Friend's Cove, near Bedford, Pennsylvania, June 12, 1845.

In 1840 Mr. Diehl assisted John May, a prominent mer-

chant and farmer, of Rainsburg, Pennsylvania, as an all round clerk in the store, postoffice, and on the large farm. These were the days before postage stamps, when a mileage rate was charged on each letter, and the mails were carried over mountain roads on horse-back or by stage-coach, between towns and villages. He also taught rural school a few years, and conducted evening singing school at school houses. He farmed a couple of years east of Everett, near M'Graw's Crossing. Later he purchased 400 acres iron ore land between Hopewell and Bloody Run (now Everett) which he improved, and it was afterwards known as the Half-Way House, now owned by John Greenawalt. He was a stockholder and helped build the Bloody Run and Hopewell Plankroad in 1857, which afterward went into the hands of a receiver as an unprofitable venture. In connection with clearing, burning lime, building, and farming, he engaged considerably in the lumber business, a couple of years in partnership with J. B. Harris and J. B. Williams. Here he was secretary of the township school board and successfully helped establish our free school system.

In 1863 he exchanged this farm for 280 acres in southwest Iowa, and moved to Snake Spring Valley, on the old Ritchey farm, which was his home two years. In 1865 he sold this (known as the Stone House property) and took his family west, taking possession of a farm which afterward grew to a half section, near Summum, Illinois. Here he helped build the first church in that community, under the pastorate of Rev. George Weber. He was a life-long member of the Reformed Church; a liberal supporter of her institutions, and a Sunday school worker for three-quarters of a century. As a delegate he represented the church at many of its classical and synodical meetings.

As a master of Woodland Grange, he was a strong factor in the Patron of Husbandry movement here forty years ago. He was an active member of the Masonic fraternity, in politics a Republican always, and with Mrs. Diehl belonged to the Order Eastern Star. In 1886 they retired from the active duties of the farm to a home in Astoria, Illinois, where some twenty years later they both, within the space of a few months, obeyed that final summons that comes to all.

- IV. David Diehl (April 13, 1825-April 16, 1907) lived all his long and useful life in Friend's Cove, except four years which he lived in Bedford, Pennsylvania, when he was sheriff. He was elected to that office on the Republican ticket in 1884, by an overwhelming majority, at a time when the party was in the minority. His deputies were M. I. Diehl and William Eiholtz. He was a consistent member of the Reformed Church, serving a long number of years in the consistory, either as elder or deacon. He was a charter member of Rainsburg Lodge, I. O. O. F., which he represented at the Grand Lodge several times. He also was a member of the Encampment at Bedford. On

V. John Diehl (March 10, 1827-April 22, 1914) of Friend's Cove, and Mary A. Ritchey (April 17, 1831-Aug. 16, 1894), of Bedford township, Pennsylvania, were married at the Reformed Church parsonage, Bedford, Pennsylvania, on St. John's Day, June, 1850, by Rev. Henry Heckerman, the coremony being witnessed by the Hon. John Cessna and wife. He was a most genial man and usually had a good word for every one he met. He helped build the First Reformed Church at Manns Choice and was an efficient deacon for many years. In his earlier manhood days, when there was a demand for barrels in which to ship flour from the home mills to the leading markets, he followed the cooper trade. Later he turned his atention to farming, which he followed until he retired from the active duties of life. Of eight brothers he was the last survivor.

VI. Joel Diehl was born near the Brick Church in Friend's Cove, Bedford County, Pennsylvania, March 11, 1829, and as soon as old enough learned the cooper's trade. He followed making barrels for several years, most of the time for Hartley's Flour Mill, at Willow Grove, east of Bedford. In those days all the wheat not used for seed was ground in the home mills, located along every mountain stream, and the flour not consumed at home went to the great markets in new barrels. Consequently the cooper shop was an annex of the flour mill.

He married Elizabeth Anne Overaker of that community. In 1864 they removed to Lacross, Wisconsin, where he was connected with a prominent lumber company many years. Five of the children graduated from the high school and the boys all have prominent positions.

VII. Joshua Diehl (March 7, 1831-April 15, 1862), of Friend's Cove, Pa., in his youth developed a remarkable ability to do more than one thing, and do it well. He first learned to be a saddle and harness maker under the instruction of his brother-in-law, John Dittmar, and soon became an adept as a workman. He then followed daguerreotyping a couple of years at the time when photography was just making its appearance. In the late '50's he went to western Ohio and engaged in the nursery business, which he followed until the breaking out of the Civil Rebellion. Sept. 14, 1861, he enlisted in the 8th Ohio Cavalry, Troop 4, and on account of his skill as a saddler, was elected to the position of Saddle Boss. In a skirmish near Murfreesboro, Tennessee, in scaling a deep ravine, his horse fell, injuring him so that he lived only a few days. His remains lie in the National Cemetery at Murfreesboro, Tennessee.

VIII. Elias S. Diehl was born in Friend's Cove, Bedford County, Pennsylvania, March 6, 1833. After a term at the Rainsburg Seminary, he taught school a few years in winter, while farming in summer. The author of this volume was one of his pupils at the John's Branch and Piper Run schools, in Hopewell township. 

John Adam Diehl was born in Wurttemberg, Germany, in 1700, and brought his family to America in 1731, settling near York, Pennsylvania, when it was but a hamlet. He purchased of an English agent a timber tract of three hundred sixty acres for £12 (Sterling), and converted it into a productive and valuable farm. Loyal to his religious profession, he helped establish the first Lutheran church in that section. His descendants as a rule are neted for their industry, enterprise and thrift. They are usually found on the moral side of every great issue. As farmers, mechanics, merchants, and in transportation, commerce, the several learned professions, and all other useful avocations in life, they are exemplary citizens.

In 1735 Mr. Diehl built a flouring mill on a branch of Codorus Creek, a mile from the present York city limit. It was successfully operated by generations of Diehls 145 years, when it was sold to Samuel Hively & Sons for \$3,000. It has been improved recently by the addition of \$3,500 worth of new machinery and repairs. It is one of the many old landmarks of this section.

About the year 1805 the family moved to the southern part of Adams County, and settled near New Oxford, Pennsylvania, where Mr. Diehl purchased a large tract of several hundred acres of choice land extending along the Gettysburg Turnpike, and reaching from the village to the bank of the Little Conowago. A small grist mill was included in this purchase, which was later remodeled and greatly improved by Peter Diehl, the new owner. In those days banking was in its infancy, and commercial credit, as now conducted, but little used in the rural districts. The good old gold and silver were usually kept in a chest, or in an old stocking, or in a jar under the bed, or stuck out of sight in crevices and secure places in the walls. In paying for this good property, Mr. Diehl put a half bushel of silver into a leather saddle-bag, placed it on a faithful horse, mounted and rode southwest from the old home near York to the new one, at New Oxford, Pennsylvania. At the end of the long and tedious trip, the horse was found to be chafed and blistered raw from the weight and friction of the heavy coin.

The mill, which has been known as "Diehl's Mill" for over a century, was destroyed by fire in 1857, but was rebuilt and greatly enlarged and improved in every way, the next year. It is a commodious four and a half story stone and brick structure. By inheritance and purchase, this property descended to three sons. Daniel got the mill with its adjoining fifteen acres. The farm was divided, and became the property of George and Jacob Diehl.

XII. JOSEPH RITNER DIEHL, named after one of the state's most efficient governors, was born June 3, 1838, near Diehl's Mill, near New Oxford, Pennsylvania. After his common school course he completed his studies at Dr. Pfeiffer's Academy, at New Oxford. In 1854 he clerked for W. D. & A. S. Hines, a year, and then three years for Aaron Heagy. After that he learned the miller's trade with his brother, George W. Diehl. In 1860 he returned to merchandising with Mr. Heagy. March 4, 1862, he married Catharine Slagle and began their domestic life in the old Diehl mansion, where he took charge of the mill near by. After the death of his father, in 1863, he purchased the mill, which he managed successfully for many years. They were members of the Lutheran Church, he being a member of the council twenty-five years. Mr. Diehl has been director and clerk of the school board many years. He was a Republican, and in 1884, as a candidate for county commissioner, was defeated by a small majority, in a strongly Democratic county. He was a useful and influential citizen. His death occurred Jan. 3, 1899.

The old mill, in the hands of the Diehls some one hundred ten years, still stands as a monument to the industry, enterprise, integrity, skill, and worthy effort of a noble race. It is an old landmark on the banks of the Conewago, facing the old Philadelphia and Pittsburg Turnpike, which is now the new trans-continental Lincoln Highway. From a small pioneer grist mill it has grown to the present five-story stone and brick structure, which we have the pleasure of illustrating, as the frontispiece of this work.

Accept these lines here, written by Prof. Louis Diehl, many years ago, and set to music:

WATER THAT HAS PASSED.

Listen to the water mill,

Through the livelong day.

How the clanking of the wheel

Wears the hours away.

Languidly the autumn wind

Stirs the greenwood leaves;

Binding up the sheaves;

And a proverb haunts my mind.

As a spell is cast:

"The mill will never grind

Elliah F. Diehl, of Leesburg, Indiana, was born March 13, 1841, in the old homestead near New Oxford, Pennsylvania, in the picturesque regions of the Gettysburg country. The winter months of his young farm life, for a few years, were spent in the home school. Later he took a course in Dr. M. D. G. Pfeiffer's Collegiate Institute, giving him a broader and grander view of life. His ambitions led him westward, where the fertile soil and hospitable people of Kosciusko County, Indiana, arrested his attention. Here he industriously farmed in summer and taught school in winter—two of the noblest and most necessary professions. The western fever struck him again and landed him in northwest Missouri, near St. Joseph. Here he taught school and wrestled with the ague a winter. Leaving that miasmatic section he returned eastward again. In August, 1862, he enlisted in Co. B., 138th Regiment, Pennsylvania Volunteer Infantry, and served in the Army of the Potomac. But there were lasting attractions in Indiana. Sept. 19, 1867, he married Mary Annie Berst, who was born June 17, 1848, in Kosciusko County, Indiana, and whose paternal grandfather, Conrad Berst, was born at Strassburg, Germany, in 1779, and came to America in 1798. XV. MIRIAM DIEHL was born Sept. 24, 1845, in the old homestead near New Oxford, Pennsylvania, and married Jacob Heltzel, June 4, 1871. He is one of eleven children of his parents, Daniel and Elizabeth (Voglesong) Heltzel, whose ancestry came from the Palatinate and from Germany. His life was made up of clerking, teaching, justice of the peace, census enumerator in 1880, and other official positions in his district. He is a manufacturer of exclusive children's shoes for the wholesale trade. They adhere strictly to the faith of the Reformed Church. Five of Mr. Heltzel's brothers were in the Union Army during the Civil War.

XVI. Rev. Samuel Albert Diehl A.M., the youngest of a family of twenty-one children, was born in the old homestead, at New Oxford, Pennsylvania, Nov. 13, 1847. He graduated from Pennsylvania College, Gettysburg, Pennsylvania, in 1872, and from the Lutheran Theological Seminary of the same place, in 1875. In the same year he was ordained to the holy

ministry by the West Pennsylvania Synod of the Lutheran Church, at Newville, Pennsylvania. Sept. 2, 1875, he united in marriage with Mary Jane Hamilton, daughter of William Hamilton, a farmer and grain merchant of Gettysburg, Pennsylvania. Her brother, Calvin Hamilton, was a veteran of the Civil War, and served twenty years as superintendent of the National Cemetery at Gettysburg.

By his efficiency and energy as a preacher and pastor, Brother Diehl has made a splendid record in each of his five pastorates, during nearly forty years of faithful service for the Master. His first field was the Upper Franklin charge, in Cumberland County, Pennsylvania, where the membership doubled and the benevolences tripled in ten and a quarter years. His second charge was composed of four churches, situated some five to fifteen miles of each other, at Woodsboro, Maryland. During his six and a quarter years service here, two new church edifices were erected, an old church debt liquidated, four hundred seventy-one new members added, and a new congregation organized with thirty-one charter members, at Walkersville, Maryland. His third pastorate was at Salem, Westminster, Maryland, which he served ten and a third years, and to which five hundred fifty-nine new members were added during his incumbency. Here, also, was erected a fine and commodious church by the "Leister" people, to accommodate the growing congregation of worshipers. At Bendersville, Pennsylvania, he served his fourth pastorate, seven and a half years. To this flourishing charge five hundred twenty-six were added. He is now faithfully and successfully serving his fifth charge, two congregations — one rural, and the other urban, at Hanover, Pennsylvania. He is president of the Hanover Ministerial Association, and has been president and secretary of various conferences, and served as a delegate to General Synod in 1889 and in 1909. An aggregate of two thousand fifty souls is the result of his ministerial and pastoral work, with the hope that they all in due time may be gathered into the Church Triumphant.

Milton Schaeffer was born on a farm near Westminster, Carroll County, Maryland, Nov. 21, 1853, and died Sept. 13, 1902. In the years 1886-7-8 and 1895 he was the efficient mayor of Westminster. In 1897 Governor Llownds appointed him school commissioner, and he was president of the Board. In 1898 he was postmaster, at the time of the inauguration of the rural mail delivery system, which was first tried out in Carroll County, and which proved a success mainly through his great knowledge of mer and the topography of the county. At his funeral, A. W. Machen, of Buffalo, N. Y., said: "I am present not only because of the friendship that existed between us, but also as a representative of the Postoffice Department of the Government, where he was held in high esteem for his great service in connection with the rural free delivery system. The experiment of rural free delivery was made in Carroll County, and upon its success or failure depended the fate of the system. That it was a success is chiefly due to his knowledge of the country, his aptitude for handling men, and his wonderful executive ability. The Department knows and is grateful to him for this aid, and as a mark of appreciation for his great service, I am here as its representative."

I. Col. Charles Sanford Diehl, only son of Carl Francis and Amanda Dewey Diehl, was born at Flintstone, Maryland, Aug. 8, 1854. He was educated in the public schools at Ottowa and Wenona, Illinois. In *The Index* office at the latter place he learned the printer's trade. Sept. 9, 1879, he married Ellen Watson Chandler, daughter of Henry B. and Sarah Ellsworth Chandler, of Chicago.

He published "Our Boys" in Chicago, 1871 to 1873. From

1873 to 1883 he was on the staff of the Chicago Times, and acted as staff correspondent in the Custer Indian campaign in 1877; in the Nez Perce campaign in 1878, and in the Ilges Indian campaign against the Sioux on the upper Missouri, the winter of 1878-9. In 1883 he entered the service of the Associated Press, as day manager of the Chicago office, and was superintendent of the Pacific Coast Division from 1887 to 1893. From 1893 to 1911 he was assistant general manager, with headquarters at New York and Chicago. In 1899 he was general manager of the entire service, during the transition period, when the corporation was changed from Illinois to New York. During this long period he was in general charge of the finances and the handling of the news of this great service. He superintended the reporting of the Spanish-American War, having under his control five dispatch boats and a highly trained staff of writers.

In 1874 he organized the First Regiment of Illinois National Guards, and filled all the grades up from second lieutenant to lieutenant colonel.

In 1911, in company with H. L. Beach, also of the Associated Press, they purchased *The Daily Light*, the leading evening newspaper of the Southwest, at San Antonio, Texas.



He was in the drug business forty-four years, and by honorable and upright dealing made the plant the leading pharmacy in the city. His career was consistent, honorable, and useful, and he contributed a worthy share to the prosperity of Buffalo. He was systematic, persistent, and far-sighted in all his undertakings, and his success was the legitimate result of fair dealing and uniformly upright methods. At the time of his death, Jan. 15, 1908, he was vice-president and director of the German Insurance Company and the Buffalo Commercial Insurance Company, and director of the Savings Bank, all of Buffalo. He was a zealous and honorable member of the Masonic fraternity, being affiliated with Queen City Lodge, A. F. & A. M., also a Knight Templar, a member of Hugh DePayen Commandery. In 1859 Mr. Diehl married Louise A. Smith, daughter of Philip A. and Charity (Knott) Smith, of Buffalo. Issue:

In 1869, May 5, he married Caroline Trautman, of Steinseltz, Germany, where he was visiting the home of his mother, Magdalena Zimmerman-Diehl, in that hamlet.

He was major and surgeon of the 65th Regiment N. Y. S. N. G. from 1870 to 1878. For forty years he was on the attending and consulting staff of the Buffalo General Hospital, and is at the head of the staff of the Buffalo Deaconess Hospital. He has been chairman of the school board, member of the Civil Service Commission, and many other honorable positions. From 1897 to 1901 he was mayor of the city, and was the prime mover of the Pan-American Exposition, which was held in Buffalo in 1901 and attracted world-wide attention. It was at this Exposition that President McKinley was assassinated, and Mayor Diehl was one of the escorts of honor which accompanied the remains to Washington, D. C., and to Canton, Ohio, for burial.

He is still engaged in the practice of medicine, and is probably the best known physician in the city, having had an exceptionally large practice among the German-Americans.



Henry Whetstone I

Our remotest known ancestor was Henry Whetstone; but we have not a line of history or even a tradition of his origin or destiny. His four sons, all at one time, were residents of Bedford Co., Pa., living in Friends Cove. They were stalwart men, and have left a large number of prominent useful, enterprising, industrious descendants.

In Pennsylvania's U.S. Census report for 1790, are these:

The immigrant ancestor of the Dichl families of Franklin and Adams Counties, Pa., of whom John A. Diehl of Marion, Pa., is a worthy member, was John Frederick Diehl. Born in Germany, Jan. 5, 1743, he sailed on the ship "Snow Squirrel" for America, from Rotterdam Oct. 21, 1761, landing at Philadelphia. He settled in Butler Township, Adams County and was the wealthiest man in that section.

In 1789, he built a large brick farm house, and later a flourmill, sawmill, fullingmill, and an oilmill on Conewgo Creek. A stone slab on the front gable of the stonemill had this inscription: "F. DIEHL, 1808."

He belonged to the German Baptist (Dunkard) Church, and mar. (1) Mary Harley. He d. May 13, 1816, and his body buried in the family lot on the farm. Later, John A. Diehl, one of his great great grandsons enclosed the lot with a substantial steel and concrete fence.

Abraham Diehl and Descendants

I

ABRAHAM AND CHRISTINA DIEHL with three young sons, moved from Lancaster County, Pennsylvania, to Rockingham County, Virginia, in 1779. Rockingham County marriage records indicate that he was a son of an Abraham Diehl. Between 1779 and 1782, there were at least two Abraham Diehl's living in Pennsylvania, as shown by the tax records in Vol. XVII of the 3rd Series, Pennsylvania Archives, and by the Militia records in Vol. VII of the 5th Series, Pennsylvania Archives. The 1790 Census Report for Pennsylvania lists "Abraham Teel" on page 92 and "Abraham Deel" on page 95, both in Dauphin County which was formed from Lancaster County in 1785. One of these Abraham Diehl's lived in Lebanon Township and was the son of Jacob Diehl. It is quite probable that Abraham I was the son of this Abraham and the grandson of Jacob.

Egle states on page 334 of his "History of Lebanon County" that Jacob Diehl of Lebanon Township died in 1779 leaving his wife Elizabeth and children as follows: 1. Christian, 2. Abraham, 3. Catherine, 4. Anna Marie, 5. Judith, 6. Elizabeth, 7. Soloman, 8. John, 9. Samuel. The marriage of Jacob Diehl and Elizabeth Knies is listed on page 664 of Vol. 8, 2nd Series, Pennsylvania Archives, as having occurred in the Philadelphia German Reformed Church on April 22, 1737. Since no Jacob Diehl is listed by

Rupp or the Colonial Records between 1727 and 1741, he must have come to this country prior to 1727. This Jacob Diehl is listed by Morgan Edwards as a member of the little Swatara Brethren Church in 1770, and he may have come to this country with the first group of the Brethren, or Dunkers, in 1719. Abraham I was a member of the Brethren Church.

No definite information has been found regarding the other Abraham Diehl who lived after 1779 in the part of Lancaster County from which Dauphin County was formed in 1785. He may possibly have been a son or a grandson of the Abraham Diehl who came over in the "Saint Andrew" in 1734.

On April 16, 1804, Abraham I bought 640 acres of land near Cross Keys, Rockingham County, Virginia, from Hugh McCaley. The documents in this transaction bear the name of Jacob Diehl as a witness. This Jacob appears to have been a brother of Abraham. He married Polly Cook in 1807 and is mentioned in the Augusta County records as living in Ohio in 1819.

Abraham I died about 1825 and is buried on the old farm now owned by Mr. B. B. Miller. The old house built about 1804 is still standing in excellent condition.

Jacob Adams

[&]quot;Diary of Jacob Adams, Private in Company F, 21st O. V., V. I." in Ohio Archaeological and Historical Quarterly, Vol. XXXVIII, No. 4. (October 1929) pp. 627-721.

Jacob Adams was born in Hancock County, Ohio, March 30, 1842, the fifth child of Paul Adams, Jr., and Margaret (Diehl) Adams. His father was the son of Paul Adams, Sr., and his wife Abigal and was born in Columbia County, Pa., April 28, 1811. Of the Adams ancestory nothing further is known except that the family came from Ireland. Paul, Sr., was not a man of wealth and a common school education was, with difficulty, afforded the family. A friend undertook to educate Paul, Jr., for the ministry (Presbyterian) but unfortunately the benefactor died before the education was completed, and making no provision for him he was forced to quit school and took up the profession of teaching for a livelihood, which he followed, together with farming.

In 1832 he married Margaret Diehl, daughter of Christian and Julianna Diehl. She was born in Columbia County, Pa., June 6, 1808. To this union were born eight children: Mason, Sarah Elizabeth, Martha Jane, Paul Philetus, Jacob, Margaret Maria, William, Hannah Adaline.

The Dichl family came to America in 1727 from near Coblentz. A very interesting incident in the life of Peter Diehl, father of Christian Diehl, is that during the French and Indian War he was captured by the Indians and lived with them ten years. The story is that while living near Tulpehocken, in Berks County, the mother, wife of John Diehl, left her four year old son, Peter, in care of a six year old brother while she went to the spring to do some washing and charged if they saw an Indian coming they should go into another room and crawl under a bed with curtains all around the bottom, which they did when they saw an Indian approach. But the four-year old said he wanted to see a red man and came out and the Indian grabbed him and carried him away in his arms to the Indian village on the Susquehanna river, near the present city of Wilkes Barre, where they kept him until he was twelve years old. Later moving down the river to the Indian village of Mahoning, near where the town of Danville now stands. where he spent two years.

When the treaty with the Indians was made, all stolen children were to be brought to the Wheat Sheaf Tavern, in Philadelphia, and all parents of stolen children were notified to go there and claim their own. Peter's father went to identify his son. The boy had grown so and lost his native tongue, so that the father

could not recognize him and he went back home without his son. The next time the mother went along. She sang some lullaby songs that she sang to the boy when he was a child; he seemed interested and looked up and smiled; she then looked at his left hand where had been a scar she remembered and found him to be her long lost son. The boy did not recognize his parents so readily. He wanted to go back and live with the Indians and they had quite a time to keep him at first, but in time he quieted down. many Indian traits. When grown up, he married a Miss Foust; they left home on horseback over the mountains for Mahoning, the place where he lived with the Indians for two years, near which he bought a farm known as the Old Diehl Home, now owned by the state of Pennsylvania, on which is located an insane asylum. Peter (p. 721) Diehl had service in the Revolutionary War, where, on account of his early training and knowledge of the Indians, he was of valuable service to the American cause as a scout."


HIGHLAND PARK

Detroit, Michigan was founded in 1701, when the whole lower peninsula was the home of the Pottawatamies. It was only an Indian trading post on the Detroit River, when Highland Park, some six miles north-west was an insignificant Indian village. Both had a future, and have grown to remarkable proportions.

Detroit eventually spread out westward from the river, and in less than two centuries, surrounded the village, and still continued to grow. Each original town retained its own municipal government. At present, it is impossible for the stranger passing thru there to know whether he is in Detroit or Highland Park, when in that section, until he seeks definite information.

In the decade preceding the U. S. Census of 1920, the city more than doubled its population and got quite near the million class. Highland Park was nearly 50,000, and shut out from any possible new territory, is about at her limit, unless she adopts the sky-scraper craze. Among her municipal buildings, I visited her Court House in 1925.

Harry L. Diehl who was Principal of the Manila H. S., in the Philippines, one year, and Secretary to Judge Trent of the Supreme Court one year, 1915-1917, and later overseas in the World War, was Associate Justice one term in the Highland Park Court.
