PREFACE TO THE 1958 EDITION

The 1935 edition of Estabrook genealogy was written on the assumption that Elijah of the Saint John River and Valentine of Sackville were brothers. In September, 1951 I went down to Providence, R.I. and examined the records of the Rhode Island Historical Society on Power St. These were very complete for the family of Thomas Estabrook of Swansea. Elijah could not have been Valentine's brother. Who then was he?

On December 7, 1952 I received a letter from Mr. Donald P. Wright, Librarian at Haverhill, Mass. enclosing a copy of an entry in the Middlesex Co. Probate Records (1st. Series) v. 24, p. 157 which proved that Elijah Estabrook of Lexington and Sherborn, grandson of Joseph of Concord, had a son Elijah, born in 1727 or 1728. This opened up a completely new line of research, back to its beginnings in America.

William Booth Estabrook states in his introduction to his "Genealogy of the Estabrook Family", published in Ithaca in 1891 that two brothers, Joseph and Thomas, - the latter being much the younger, were born in Enfield, Middlesex Co., England and came over to Boston in 1660. Joseph graduated from Harvard in 1664. He was made a freeman at Cambridge, Mass. in 1665 and in 1667 was ordained as colleague to the Rev. Peter Bulkeley, minister of the church at Concord, Mass. It was probably after this appointment that Thomas got his farm at Concord. Probably Joseph made his home there for some time. He was married in 1668 to Mary Mason and had a large family. He died at Concord Sept. 16, 1711.

Thomas married Sarah Temple at Concord, Mass. May 11, 1683. He had several children. He died at Concord Jan. 28, 1720-1.

Now come those tiresome conjectures and coincidences which work havoc in a genealogy. There was a Thomas Estabrook, who with his wife Sarah was one of the original settlers in Swansea, Mass. He was admitted as an inhabitant February 12, 1669. He died there and was buried in the Kickamuit Cemetery Warren, R.I. April 11, 1713. He had numerous descendants.

Mrs. Justin Williams, of Freeport, Maine sent me the following:

THE FAMILY IN AMERICA

Thomas Estabrook (recorded also Estabrooks) and his wife Sarah appear on the records of Swansea, Mass. soon after its incorporation from Rehoboth in 1667. His home prior to settlement in Swansea is not known. Possibly he was one of that little company of pioneers that came to this country in 1663 from Swansea, Wales, under the leadership of the Rev. John Myles, founder of the Massachusetts town of that name.

Other genealogists have had three brothers.

In August, 1958, Mrs. Beverley Brooks of Somerville, Mass, sent me the following:

From "History of Westminster, Mass. by Wm. Sweetzer Heywood" 1728-1893.

Pg. 635

ESTABROOK

"This name was known in Wales as long ago as 1413, and in Holland under the Dutch form - ESTENBRUGGE - at an even earlier date.

"It did not appear in this country till 1600 when three brothers, born in Enfield, Middlesex Co., England, came hither to make themselves a home.

"One of them settled in Swanzey, Mass, another in Concord, and the third,

Joseph, already prepared for college, entered Harvard and graduated in 1664."

However this gives two of the name of "Thomas" in the same generation, which is rather unlikely.

According to Saint John River tradition, James Estabrooks of Sackville, who was for a long time Member of the New Brunswick Assembly, was a cousin of Elijah the Preacher of the Concord families. James was a son of Valentine who was a great grandson of Thomas of Swansea. The cousinship is interesting but very distant. It links the Enfield family with western England

where the Liège Flemish family first settled. Just why Joseph's father went to Enfield is uncertain, but Devon was a very unhealthy place for a well-to-do Puritan around 1640. Charles I made Exeter his headquarters for a time in his war against parliament.

The Estabrooks of Concord are descended from Thomas brother of the Rev. Joseph. Joseph's sons were mainly ministers, though his eldest son, Joseph, was a farmer, with a farm at Lexington. It was Joseph the Second's youngest son Elijah, born Aug. 25, 1703, who married Hannah Daniell of Sherborn on Oct. 1, 1724 and became the father of Elijah of Haverhill and the Saint John River.

There is no record of Elijah Sr.'s family from 1724 until Sept. 29, 1734, when their daughter, Hannah, was born in Sherborn. Tradition on the Saint John River said that Elijah and his wife Hannah went to England after their marriage; but returned in 1730, spent a short time in Rhode Island, and then went to Sherborn. This would account for Elijah Jr.'s birth not being recorded in Sherborn.

Elijah Sr. died Dec. 1, 1740. His widow married Joseph Burrill in Newbury on Feb. 9, 1743-44. He owned a house and a ship-building plant in East Haverhill (Rocks Village), where they lived. Several of the children of her first marriage followed their mother to Rocks Village; among them were Samuel, Elijah and Submit.

Elijah Jr. married Mary Hackett of Salisbury Nov. 14, 1750. He enlisted in the Provincials in 1758; fought at Ticonderoga, and joined a contingent to Halifax where he visited Cornwallis. He returned to Haverhill, joined the Maugerville settlers, and so we came to the Saint John River.

During the winter and spring of 1957 I received a large amount of material relating to the descendants of Elijah Jr. in Maine from Mrs. Justin Williams of Freeport, Mr. Herman Estabrook of New Limerick and Miss Margaret Estabrooke of Portland. Also from Mrs. Thelma Winslow of Freeport.

It is with the desire to have the record as complete and correct as possible that I have revised the 1935 edition.

For material relating to the Sackville family those interested may refer to the unrevised edition.

The Estabrooks of Concord are a pioneering and ministerial family with three hundred years of New England Puritanism and another hundred years of Flemish and English Calvinism behind them. Their journey up the Saint John River began at Sheffield and Portland Point. As land was made available they moved up river, clearing farms, building homesteads, schools, churches, roads and bridges, marrying and burying. They have left their mark from Partridge Island to Grand Falls, and westward to the borders of New Hampshire. To them truly belongs the admonition:

"The land must be cultivated with the new spring".



BELGIUM

BELGIUM AND LIEGE

The early history of Belgium parallels that of England in many respects:

In the first millenium B.C. both countries were held by the Celts; both were conquered by Caesar and Roman civilization was introduced. In both countries the German invasions in the fifth century A.D. drove the Celts into the forests and highlands. Christianity was reintroduced into both countries at about the same time: St. Augustine went to Canterbury in 597 and St. Amand to Chent in 610. He died at Tournai in 661.

Charlemagne, who became king of the Franks in 768 made Aachen the capital of his territories north of the Alps. It was second to Rome in importance, From 813 to 1531 the Emperors of Germany were crowned there.

The Franks in Belgium ceased to be known as Franks and were called Dietschen throughout the Middle Ages hence Dutch. In the southern part where Celtic civilization survived the Belgo-Romans were called "Wala", hence Walloons.

Liege is about fifteen miles west of Aachen at the junction fo the Meuse and the Ourthe, and was German. At first it was merely a convenient stopping place on the way to Aachen. In the 6th century St. Monulf founded a chapel there for the benefit of travellers. St. Lambert was murdered there about 705. St. Hubert (706-727) built the church of St. Lambert and made it the seat of an archbishopric. It was attached to the diocese of Cologue. In the tenth century its university became famous under renowned scholars. Besides theology, grammar, rhetoric, and poetry, music and mathematics were taught in the city which could boast of being a "Northern Athens".

In the thirteenth century coal-mining was developed and was followed by large-scale iron working. This industry required capital which was supplied by the bourgeoisie, who exercised a restraining influence on the guilds. The restraint was emphasized by the power of the prince-bishops who kept the inquisition out of Liège and dominated the nobility.

After the Reformation the town became strongly Calvinist. Charles the Fifth (1519-1556) determined to extirpate heresy. He issued "Placards" from 1523 on. The "Placard" issued in 1550 was very severe, and was enforced strictly by de la Marck, the Bishop of Liège. Charles abdicated in 1556 and his son, Philip II (1556-1598) sent the Duke of Alva from Spain to suppress heresy. The Netherlands rose in revolt in 1568. Over one hundred thousand people, chiefly intellectuals and skilled workmen, left the country. The Estambrugge-Yandels were among these.

Elizabeth gave Norwich as headquarters for Flemish weavers; but the people of Liège were metallurgists and so they went chiefly to Devon and Cornwall.

Liege at the time of its foundation was purely Germanic and remained German-speaking until the Austrian Hapsburgs gained control of the country. Then French began to infiltrate and the town gradually became bilingual.

THE NAME "ESTAMBRUGGE" IN FLANDERS

The name "Estambrugge" occurs in two different sections of Flanders, — Ghent and Liège.

In Ghent there was a clan d'Estanbrugge to which the following refers:

THE ESTANBRUGGE FAMILY IN GHENT (Translation by Dr. Joseph C. Doherty)

Estauberg (d') or Estaubrugge was the name of one of the confederate nobles, although there are few accounts of him. Apparently he belonged to the family (-clan) d'Estambrugge, to which Oliver d'Estambrugge, who was appointed bailiff of Ghent in 1387, belonged. It has also been surmised that this *Heer (of. German Herr) van Estambrugge was a brother of the Count Van Ligne. If this is so, he subsequently broke away from the confederates, inasmuch as he assumed, in the latter part of 1566, command from the National Militia of a hundred Cavalry for the defense of Brussels. (Cf. te Water, Confederacy of the Nobles; Dll, bl 386-387)

*the person referred to is the one mentioned in the first three lines.

THE ESTANBRUGGE FAMILY IN GHENT

Estauberg (d') ook Estaubrugge geheeten was een der verbondene Edelen, omtrent wien weinig berigten bestaan. Misschien behoorde hij tot het ges(c)hlacht d'Estaumbrugge, waartoe behoorde Oliver d'Estambrugge in 1387 tot Baljuw van Gent aangestelf. Er wordt ook vermoed dat hij heer van Estambrugge ent broeder des Graven Van Ligne was. Als dit zoo is, dan heeft hij zich spode dig van de bondgen ooten afgescheiden, want deze outving op het laatst van 1566 het bevel van de Landvoogdes over hondred ruiters ter bewaring van Brussel. (Zie te Water, Verbond der Edel, Dll bl 386, 387) (From Biog, Woordenboek, v. vi E E p. 234)

THE ESTENBRUGGE YANDELL TRADITION OF LIEGE

In the middle ages a number of families of the name of Yandell (variously spelled Yendall, Yondel, Yendel, etc.) lived in Flanders in the neighborhood of Liège. They were German Flemings (Dietschen). The main body of the family lived on the west side of a stream; but a considerable number lived on the east side at the end of a bridge. These were called the Estenbrugge-Yandells or briefly "The Estenbrugge".

At the time of the Reformation (about 1517) these people became Protestants. As a result of the religious wars and the activity of the Spanish Inquisition during the latter half of the sixteenth century they were obliged to leave the country. A large group went together and settled in western Devon. Some of these used the name Yandell and some the name Estenbrugge, which gradually became Anglicized into various forms of Estabrooks.

Colonel Edmund P. Easterbrook of Washington, D.C. who was Senior Chaplain of the United States Army until his death in 1933, wrote me that a circle drawn with its centre in Western Devonshire and a radius of fifty miles would contain most of the Anglo-Dutch Estabrooks.

Hubert Samuel Easterbrook, Attorney at Law, Torquay, Devonshire, brother of Col. Edmund Easterbrook, was interviewed by Mrs. Theodore Estabrooks and also wrote me that the Estabrooks were farmers of Somerset and Devonshire and were of Dutch descent. So evidently the tradition survives in this family.

In the Estabrook Genealogy, compiled by William Booth Estabrook and published in 1891 by Andrus and Church of Ithaca, there is a record (page 234) of the descendants of John Esterbrook. It states that the Estabrooks were Flemings. John Esterbrook lived and died near Liskeard. Cornwall. I wrote to Canon Leverton of Liskeard and he wrote back that the family had come to Liskeard from Ashburton on Dartmoor, Devon. This family settled in the New York area 1832-1858. They are the pen manufacturers.

The Yandells (Yondels) in America came from West Devon and Somerset. There were Yondels in Swansea, Mass. in 1732. George Yondel on May 5, 1733, published his intention to marry in Boston Elizabeth Alcock. Paul Yendel married in 1762 Lydia Vale of Boston.

Some Yandells settled at Springfield, N. B., near Hatfield's Point, on the upper part of the Belleisle, a tributary of the Saint John River. William Yandell is buried at Hatfield's Point. He died Jan. 7, 1861 aged 79. He married Maria Trenholme of West-

morland Co. and got land at Springfield. Most of this family went back to the states; but one group retained a summer home, called "Idyll Hour" at Hatfield's Point. Mr. William Edward Yandell of Brooklyn, N.Y., died here suddenly on June 30, 1949, aged 71. He was the son of John and Mary Ann (Ganong) Yandell. He was survived by one son, Murray of Huntington, N. Y. Two brothers, Edward and Frederick, both of Boston, and three grandchildren.

Mr. Byron Yandell, belonging to this family, was in the same class as I in the St. John High School in 1900. His mother, who was a widow, was a teacher in the High School and very much interested in family history. He told me that the Estabrooks and Yandells were all the same people and Dutch; but that the Estabrooks got their name from living on the east side of the river.

Mr. Byron Yandell died suddenly in New Bedford in 1933. His wife wrote me that an old aunt told her that their branch of the family came from Wiveliscomb, Somersetshire, which is about 15 miles N.F. of Tiverton.

Mr. William R. Yandell, President of the Richards - Wilcox Company of London, Ontario, wrote me on Mar. 26, 1946 that he had been to visit his grandfather in Tiverton, Devon, Eng. He said there were a large number of Yandell families in that neighborhood. As for the spelling of the name - his grandfather said it had an "e" and an "a" and it didn't matter where you placed them so long as they both got in.

Mr. Henry Estabrooks inherited the homestead of his father Stephen Potter Estabrooks at Swan Creek. Mrs. Stephen Potter passed her old age with them. She was a daughter of John, son of Elijah Senior. Elijah died at the home of John. He used to tell his grandchildren stories of old times. He said the Estabrooks had been Yandells and were Dutch. He said that they came from Liège. It was he who kept the Journal of the French-Indian War. The father and mother of Mr. Henry Estabrooks were first cousins.

Dr. Praissard, from Alsace, who taught German to a group of High School teachers for a time about 1936 in Saint John was quite excited over my Flemish descent. Apparently certain Estabrook families have flourished in Hanover and Holland for a long time; but he was not very much interested in "Yandell" although he said that he had read the name in history.

COAT OF ARMS

This is a reconstruction of an Estabrooks coat of arms described in heraldic terms as follows:

(The Americana, Col. 13, page 189, 1919) Arms: - - "Azure, a fesse or, between three boars' heads, couped at the neck argent, crined of the second". Crest - - "A boar's head as in the arms".

The coat of arms here given is described in Riestap, Armorial General, pg. 631 as "Estbach - Suisse".

Estrix de Terbeck (French Geny), Estbach, Arm. Gen.

Decorative, but historically a doubtful possession.

NATIVE ESTABROOKS IN ENGLAND AND SCOTLAND

I am indebted to Wm. Booth Estabrook for most of this material which he sent me in a letter dated Aug. 31, 1931.

Brook, Brooke: From residence near a stream. Its Mediaeval forms are Ate-broc, Attebroc, Attenbroke, etc. afterwards softened to A-Broke and pluralized to Brooks and Brookes.

Ostre or Eastre, an old Teutonic divinity.

Atte, at or near, is old Mediaeval form of East or Est, Old Cerman Ostrapure, 9th century.

English Easterbrook (See Teutonic name system by Ferguson, p. 303).

In the 13th century the lands and barony of Foveran were possessed by Robert the Bruce on William Strabrook (Robertson's Index, p. 1), a member of an old Aberdeen burgess family - who in 1329-31 and again in 1333-34 was provost of that city. (Kennedy Annals and Munroe's Provots pp. 4 & 5)

The Brookes of Ufford, Co Suffolk, Eng. were descended from William de la Brooke, owner of the Manor of Brooke co Sumerset, who died 1231. (Noble and Gentle Men - from Patronymica Brittania by Shirley)

The Appendix to Wm. Booth Estabrook's Genealogy contains the wills of a number of priests of the name of Estabrook in western Devonshire in the fifteenth century, among which is the following:

The earliest known appearance of the name is in the archives of Newton, Wales, where it is set down that "Thomas Estbrok was ordained "accolytus" in the church of St. Mary Major in the city of Exeter 18 Sept., 1395. He subsequently became sub-dean of Exeter Cathedral in 1417. The will of Richard Estbrok, Vicar of Okehampton, Devon, is recorded 5 Dec., 1413 (Wm. B. E.)


Note: William Booth Estabrooks lived and worked in Albany. After his death his widow lived in Schenectady.

THE FLEMISH FAMILY IN ENGLAND

The Estabrook - Yandell families were familiar with the mining industry in Liège. When they emigrated to England they naturally went to that part of the country where the knowledge would be of use.

Five hundred years or more before Christ the Phoenicians were sailing to Cornwall and Devon for tin used in the manufacture of bronze. The Romans continued the trade. When trade revived after the dark ages Tavistock was the centre of an important mining district.

Mr. Hubert S. Easterbrook, Attorney-at-Law, Torquay, Devon, wrote me that a circle with centre west Devon and a radius of fifty miles would contain most of the Estabrooks of Flemish descent. The map shows the district so mentioned, I used Okehampton as the centre.

The Flemish Estabrooks first settled around Dartmoor. One member of this family lived in Ashburton. He moved his family to the neighborhood of Liskeard. In connection with this family Wm. Booth Estabrook has recorded, "They were miners and tinstreamers in Cornwall and have always been renowned for courage and adventure". They were Quakers by religion. His son, John, was born in Liskeard in 1731.

John's son Richard established a book and stationery business in Liskeard. The sale of quill pens was part of his trade, His son Richard was interested in this side of his business. He came to America about 1858 and developed the manufacture of steel pens at Camden, N. J.

It is interesting to think that Esterbrook pens may owe something of their excellence to the metallurgy of Liège.

Mr. John G. Eastabrook of Plymouth wrote me (July 10, 1923) that his grandfather, Samuel, was born at South Tawton. Devon, came to Devonport - then Plymouth Dock, when a young man, established a business which his father, Samuel, had inherited and he after him; but as he was an old man with no family he had sold out.

In Wm. Booth's Genealogy it is recorded on page 220 that William Estabrook, born 1765, came from Tiverton, Devonshire to Middleton, Conn. about 1796. He left behind a brother Richard who had a hardware business in Tiverton. William was a ship carpenter.

THE ESTABROOKS FAMILY OF SWANSEA, MASS

The Genealogy of Wm. Booth Estabrooks, on page 254, contains the following:

"Thomas Easterbrooks was one of those who freely signed the agreement made between Mr. Willett and the church in Swansey Feb. 12, 1669 on admission as an inhabitant".

Swansea was incorporated from Rehoboth in 1667. The residence of Thomas prior to Swansea is not known, but it has been suggested that he may have been one of the company of pioneers who came under the leadership of Rev. John Myles to Mass, from Swansea, Wales, in 1663.

Swansea, Wales, has been called "the metallurgical centre of the world." Copper has been smelted there since the time of Elizabeth. The Earl of Warwick brought Flemings there about 1100 A.D. to help garrison the castle.

It would be natural for some of the Liege family to gravitate to Swansea, Wales. Thomas, who was great grandfather of Valentine Estabrooks of Sackville, may have been a cousin of Joseph I of Concord.

 - (3b) William (1) son of Thos. (2) and Eliz. Thurber, born June 30, 1724. Married Abigail Martin Nov. 1, 1747. Died 1753. She married Jonathan Cole Mar. 2, 1756, and moved to Sackville 1763. (Swansca Records)

THE ENGLISH ANCESTRY OF JOSEPH OF CONCORD (MASS.)

Joseph A. Joseph has been assumed to be the name of the father of Joseph and Thomas of Concord, Mass. The family must have been of some consequence, for his son Joseph received a preparatory education for college and in those days only the higher classes were educated.

It seems rather odd that Joseph A. should have been living in Enfield, Middlesex, when his son Joseph I. was born in 1640. However the civil war was raging and Devon was the headquarters of Charles I. It would have been a very unsafe place for a wealthy Puritan. Enfield was famous for its fine estates. It had also an excellent grammar school. It was only twelve miles from London, the stronghold of the Parliamentarians.

When Charles II came to the throne in 1660 the family may have returned to the west. The father was still wealthy for he sent Joseph I to Harvard and later supplied Thomas with the means to buy his farm and build his homestead at Concord, Mass. Another son is said to have gone to Connecticut.

Possibly other children remained in Devon. Elijah I and his wife probably visited these in 1725-30. The Yandells who came to Swansea, Mass. in 1730 came from Wiveliscombe in Somerset.

Joseph A. was a cultured Puritan. He was financially independent and enjoyed country life in the English tradition. His American descendants for several generations retained the same outlook.

Children: 1. Joseph. 2. Thomas. 3. (?) Connecticut (4 & 5) (?) Devon.

FIRST GENERATION IN AMERICA

THE CONCORD/LEXINGTON ANCESTORS OF ELIJAH (2)

(JOSEPH (1): JOSEPH (2): ELIJAH (1))

Concord, Mass., which was to be the first home in America of the Flemish Estabrook Family, was founded in 1635 by a group of colonists under the Rev. Peter Bulkeley who came from England expressly for that purpose. The colonists purchased from the Indians six square miles of land with the present Monument Square as the centre.

On the eastern side of Monument Square rises a hill. On this colonists built their first church and located their first burying ground. Against its side they built their rude shelters for the first winter. At its foot was the first village road.

Peter Bulkeley, their leader, was well suited to his task in many ways. He was stem and autocratic by nature — qualities which so impressed the neighboring Indians that in one of the wars their chief forbade his tribe to take part, declaring that the White Leader had too much influence with the Great Spirit.

However he was not so fortunate in dealing with his own countrymen. Some of the Concord colonists resented his arrogance so much that they migrated in a body to Connecticut. I have wondered if the third Estabrook brother may have joined this group.

(1) Joseph Estabrook I arrived in Boston in 1660. Possibly his brother Thomas accompanied him then or he may have joined him later. Their father may have arranged that Joseph's share of his estate should go into his college course while Thomas should have means to buy and equip his farm.

Joseph entered Harvard and graduated in 1664. He was made a freeman at Cambridge, Mass. May 3, 1665. In 1667 he was ordained as colleague of the Rev. Peter Bulkeley, minister of the church in Concord, Mass., and on Mr. Bulkeley's death, 1696, became pastor of the church, continuing in that office until his death Sept. 16, 1711 at the age of 71 years, when he was succeeded by John Whiting (H. C. 1661). On May 20, 1668, he married at Watertown, Mass. Mary, daughter of Captain Hugh and Esther Mason of that place. She was born Dec. 18, 1640.

He was a man eminently fitted for his office. His appearance carried with it so much dignity that people were induced to love him as a friend and reverence him as a father. These distinguished traits in his character obtained for him in the latter part of his life the name of "The Apostle".

His salary at Concord was £80 of which £40 was to be paid in money and £40 in grain. March 12, 1681, the town voted "that every householder that hath a team shall carry yearly one load of wood to the minister; and every other householder or votable person shall cut wood one day for the minister; and that the wood be equally divided to the ministers as the selectmen shall appoint."

Of his death the Boston "News Letter" of Sept. 18, 1711, says:

"This day was interred in Concord the Rev. Joseph Estabrook, minister of the gospel in said town for about 44 years (and many of them was colleague of the famous Mr. Bulkeley). He was eminent for his skill in the Hebrew language, and a most orthodox, learned and worthy divine; of excellent principles in religion, indefatigably laborious in the ministry, and of holy life and conversation."

(Shattuck's History of Concord, W. B. Estabrook's Genealogy).

The Church in which Rev. Joseph Estabrook preached was the church on the hill near the centre of the old burying ground. It was the one first crected by the colonists. After his death the congregation decided to build a larger, more convenient edifice; so down near the square in 1712 they built the beautiful colonial building which was to witness some of the most stirring events of the American Revolution.

Children: Joseph; Benjamin (Harvard 1690, Minister at Lexington, Died 1697); Mary; Samuel (Harvard, 1696, Minister at Canterbury, Conn. 1711-1727); Daniel; Ann.

Signature: Joseph Estabrook — Boston, May 27, 1697.

Note: Thomas Estabrook, younger brother of Joseph, born in Enfield, Middlesex, Eng. came to this country with him in 1660 or perhaps later; bought a farm at Concord; married Sarah Temple at Concord, Mass. May 11, 1683. He died in Concord Jan. 28, 1720-21. She died Nov. 29, 1726.

SECOND GENERATION IN AMERICA

(2) Joseph II, born in Concord, Mass. May 6, 1669; married (1st.) Dec. 31, 1689, at Cambridge Farms, Massachusetts, Melicent, daughter of Henry W. Woods of Conn.; she died at Concord March 26, 1692, and he married (2nd.) Hannah, widow of Joseph Loring, daughter of John Leavitt of Hingham. Hannah Loring had a daughter, Submit, by her first husband who married Joseph's son, Joseph III, by Melicent Woods in 1713 and thus brought the name "Submit" into the family.

Joseph bought a farm in Lexington in 1693. It was quite near the Green on the Lexington-Concord Road. He was highly respected, commanded a military company, was town clerk, treasurer, assessor, selectman and representative to the General Court. He was also engaged to teach the first man's school in the town.

He died at Lexington Sept. 23, 1733.

Children, born in Concord and Lexington - Joseph III, John, Solomon, Hannah, Melicent, Elijah.

Note: Hannah, born Aug. 2, 1698; married May 23, 1717 to Joseph Frost of Sherborn, where she lived all her married life. She died there Mar. 15, 1756.

Joseph (the Third) had a slave, Prince Estabrook, whom his son Benjamin inherited. This Prince and Benjamin's son, Joseph (the Fourth) were present at the fight on Lexington Common April 19, 1775. Prince was wounded. Joseph had a very narrow escape and aided in carrying the wounded to his father's house nearby. His father had taken his wife and small children to a safer place about a mile away. See Addenda.

PRINCE ESTABROOK

In August, 1937, Mr. Archibald Estabrooks of Haverhill, Mass, stated to me that a Mr. Estabrooks who lived in Fitchburg, Mass, said that the Estabrook who went to New Brunswick was a brother of the owner of the negro slave Prince Estabrook of Lexington who became famous in the Revolutionary War.

Prince Estabrook belonged to Joseph Estabrook (III) of Lexington and later to his son Benjamin.

Joseph (3) was brother of Elijah who was born in Lexington in 1703 and died in Sherburne Dec. 1, 1740. This Elijah's eldest son, Elijah, born 1727-28, was thus confused with his father as it was he who came to New Brunswick in 1763.

Prince Estabrook had really outstanding courage and ability.

THIRD GENERATION IN AMERICA

(3) Elijah, son of Joseph (2) and Hannah (Leavitt) Loring, was born in Lexington. August 25, 1703. On October 1, 1724 he married in Boston Hannah Daniel of Sherborn, Mass. They were married by Mr. Thomas Prince, Presbyterian. (Boston Marriages 1700-1751 page 119). She was born April 6, 1702 at Sherborn, daughter of Robert and Hester Daniel. Robert was son of Samuel Daniel, who was son of Robert Daniel, who settled in Watertown. Mass. previous to 1636.

The place of residence of this family is unknown between 1724 and 1734. There is a tradition on the Saint John River that Elijah Junior was born in England and that the father brought his family back to America (Rhode Island) in 1730. (See Estabrooks-Palmer Records).

Elijah Senior and his wife probably went to the early home of the Flemish family in Devon or West Somerset or possibly Swansea. The first Yandells are mentioned in Swansea, Mass. in 1731. They arrive in Boston at about the same time. They are said to have come from Wiveliscombe in West Somerset. Possibly they accompanied Elijah Senior on his return. Also a hint of connection between the Swansea (Mass.) family and the Concord family is suggested. Thomas Estabrook the Third of Swansea had a son Valentine, born Sept. 13, 1725. Valentine was one of the original Committee for the Township of Sackville, 1762. Elizabeth (Estabrooks) Palmer in her records, which are very accurate, says that James, the son of Valentine and long a member of the House of Assembly in N. B. was a cousin of Elijah the Preacher, son of Elijah of Haverhill. This could refer only to Devon relationship.

Mrs. Elizabeth (Watson) Estabrooks, wife of Abraham Estabrooks (son of John and grandson of Elijah) who established a fruit business in Saint John lived to be nearly one hundred years old. Her early married life was spent on a farm at Swan Creek which had been part of his father, John's property. Elijah helped John, who was his youngest son by Mary Hackett, clear his farm and is said to have died there. Elizabeth absorbed Estabrooks traditions and declared that she knew more about the Estabrooks than they did about themselves. She was a very fine-looking, keenminded old woman when I went to see her, about 1903. She said that Elijah of Haverhill was born in England and was a noncommissioned officer (sergeant) in the army. This lady was "Aunt Betsy Abe" to the family.

Elijah Senior possibly had his family in Rhode Island from 1730/31 to 1734 when he removed to Sherborn, Mass., where his wife's family lived and also his own sister, Hannah, who was the wife of Joseph Frost, a very dependable citizen. Elijah Senior's health may have been failing. He died in 1740.

Rumors of this sojourn in Rhode Island probably caused Stephen Harris Estabrooks, who wrote the records for William Booth Estabrook beginning on page 242, to state that Elijah Junior was born in Rhode Island. Stephen has no account of the Concord connection.

Elijah of Haverhill was very well versed in Flemish traditions. His father and his mother may have received these stories during their English visit. But the venture was very unfortunate from a financial point of view, an experience which many Loyalists were to repeat later. Elijah Estabrooks the First died intestate Dec. 1, 1740 and his assets were meagre. His relations in Sherborn, and in particular his brother-in-law Joseph Frost, looked after the family. His widow, Hannah, married Joseph Burrill in Newbury on February 9, 1743/44. He owned a house and ship-building plant in East Haverhill (Rocks Village) where they lived. Her children by her first husband Samuel, Elijah, Submit and (possibly) Hannah arrive in East Haverhill (Rocks Village) as a result of this marriage.

Children of Elijah Sr. and Hannah Daniel:

- (1) Mary, born 1725 (?) in England. Married Ebenezer Stone in Sherborn April 11, 1752.
- (2) Elijah Jr. (No. 4) born 1727/28 in England.
- (3) Deborah (born 1729?); married Jos. Frost Jr. in 1753 in Sherborn. He died about 1760, leaving son John in seventh year.
- (4) Submit, born 1730/31. Place uncertain. Married Aaron Sargent in East Haverhill Nov. 16, 1757. Her eldest son was named "Elijah". The Sargents lived in Canterbury, N. H.
- (5) Hannah, born Sept. 29, 1734 in Sherborn. Possibly she went to Haverhill, never married, and is the "Easterbrooks-Hannah" mentioned among the householders in Haverhill in 1798.
- (6) Joseph, born Aug. 10, 1736. (Storekeeper at Montague, Mass.?)
- (7) Samuel, born Nov. 27, 1738; in March, 1757, he is on the muster roll of the third foot company of Haverhill (east) enlisted to attempt the conquest of Canada. He was a ship-wright and bought Burrill's property on Jan. 12, 1761. He married Hannah ———. Their son Samuel was bp. E. Haverhill (Rocks Village) Church Nov. 7, 1762, m. Hannah Silloway of Haverhill, June 16, 1784, d. Haverhill May 7, 1793 aged 32 years. Their children were:

- 1. Hannah, b ————; m. Capt. William Ayer, d. E. Haverhill Dec. 29, 1874. Their daughter Lydia, spelled down John G. Whittier.
- 2. Joseph b. 17 May, 1786, d. E. Haverhill 24 Feb., 1861.
- 3. Abigail, b. 12 Nov., 1788; m. David Elliott June 7. 1812. d. F. Haverhill May 8, 1870. She was a fine old lady. (Mrs. Coté was their granddaughter. I met her in Haverhill.)
- 4. Samuel b. 20 Mar. 1792; died West Newbury 16 Dec., 1882.

(The above information was furnished by Donald Wright of Haverhill from vital records and inscriptions in Greenwood Cemetery, East Haverhill.)

(8) Aaron, born Mar. 20, 1740/41. In 1773 Aaron Easterbrook was hired to teach school for ten months in Montague, Mass. Possibly the same. Everts Hist.

Note: There was a Lieutenant Samuel Estabrook, who owned a house in Swetts Lanc, Rocks Village, in 1780. I cannot locate him. He bought the Silloway house in 1813.

Also a Samuel Estabrooks of the "Bay of Honduras" had a son, John, who was christened in St. Paul's Church, Newburyport, Nov. 21, 1802.

FOURTH GENERATION IN AMERICA

FIRST ON THE SAINT JOHN RIVER

(4) Elijah Estabrooks Jr., son of Elijah (3) and Hannah Daniels

On page 21 of Wm. B. Estabrook's Genealogy there occurs the entry under the family of Joseph and Hannah (Loring) Estabrook: (Born in Lexington, Mass.)

16. Elijah, born Aug. 25, 1703, (possibly) married about 1733 in Sherburne, Mass. to Hannah ———. For children see 88-91.

On page 242 of the same book:

Descendants of Elijah Estabrooks (of Haverhill)

First Generation

1. Elijah Estabrooks, born in Rhode Island; married at Hayerhill, Mass. Nov. 14, 1750 Mary Hackett, etc.

There is no suggestion of any connection between the two entries in Wm. B's genealogy; but a note introduced in the New England Genealogical Society Edition in Boston called attention to the reference:

"Elijah Easterbrook and Hannah Daniel by Mr. Thomas Prince, Presbyterian, Oct. 1, 1724 (Boston Marriages (1700-1751) pg. 119)"

This left ten years of married life unaccounted for until Hannah is born in Sherborn Sept. 29, 1734. It introduced the possibility that Elijah of Haverhill and the Saint John River might be a son of Elijah of Lexington and Sherborn. The tradition of five years in England and the birth of Elijah of Haverhill there fitted in very neatly.

In August, 1937, I went down to Haverhill. Mr. Archibald Estabrooks there told me that a Mr. Estabrook who lived in Fitchburg, Mass, told him that the Estabrooks who went to the Saint John River was the brother of the man who owned the slave Prince Estabrook. Benjamin Estabrook owned Prince at the time of the fight on Lexington Green; Benjamin was the son of Joseph the Third who was a brother of Elijah of Lexington and Sherborn. Elijah the First died young and it seemed quite possible that a son of the same name might have inherited the tradition.

That Elijah the First had a son of his own name was proved beyond doubt by a letter which I received from Mr. Donald Wright, Librarian at Haverhill, on Dec. 9, 1952.

50 So. Pleasant St., Bradford, Mass. Dec. 7, 1952.

Dear Miss Estabrooks:

After a visit to the Probate Offices at Cambridge, I can definitely tell you that Elijah Estabrooks of Sherborn, Mass., had a son Elijah. Here is the information I copied as found in Middlesex Co. Probate Records, (1st. series), v. 24, p. 157:

"Middlesex

S. S. Guardianship to Elijah (at his own Election) a minor in his nineteenth year of age son of Elijah Estherbrook late of Sherburne in said County Dec'd. Is Committed to Joseph Frost of Sherburne aforesd. Gent. who hath given bond £500.

Witness my hand and scal of office. Dated at Cambr, the 14th, July 1746.

S. Danforth J. Probt."

Figuring the age of Elijah Jr. as given above, he must have been born in 1727 or 1728. Personally, I am convinced that this is your Elijah, although I suppose a professional genealogist would not consider this proof enough.

It is worth noting that Joseph Estabrooks, brother of Elijah, Sr., married Submit Loring and that Hannah Estabrooks, who married Joseph Frost, the guardian of Elijah, Jr., had a daughter Submit. This tends to make me feel that the Submit who married in Haverhill was a daughter of Elijah, Sr. The records of Cambridge, unfortunately do not reveal a thing about the children of Elijah, Sr., as he died intestate. I copied the inventory of Elijah, Sr.'s estate and will try to get it typed in time to give it to you when I am in Saint John during Christmas week.

From the Middlesex Co. Probate Records (1st. Series) v. 22, p. 497, I found the following:

"Middlesex, December the 15th., 1740.

Administration of the estate of Elijah Estabrooks late of Sherbon (sic.) in sd. County dec'd. Intestate, is committed to Joseph Frost of Charlestown in sd. County Gentleman.

Per Jona. Remington J. Prob."

I hope you get as much pleasure from this data as I did in being able to get it for you.

Yours sincerely,

(Signed) Donald P. Wright.

The foregoing letter and traditions satisfactorily prove that Elijah Estabrooks of page 242 in Wm. Booth Estabrook's Genealogy, who came from Haverhill to the Saint John River was the son of Elijah on page 21 of the same book who was born in Lexington, and the line of descent is thus established.

Between 1734 and 1740 Elijah Junior must have been in Sherborn with the family. After his father's death his uncle, Joseph Frost, probably looked after him. The formal guardianship assumed in 1746 was probably a surety for him on going out into the world.

Elijah soon found his way to Haverhill, His mother was there and there was plenty of work in connection with ship-building. He was admitted to the Second Church (Congregational) at East Salisbury on March 4th, 1750. On November 14, 1750 he married Mary Hackett of Salisbury. The marriage was performed at Haverhill, Mass.: but is recorded in the Second Church at Salisbury.

The family evidently lived in East Haverhill from 1750 to about 1757 as the baptisms of the first three children are recorded in the Fourth Church (Congregational): Hannah, bapt. Aug. 25, 1751; Molly, bapt. Mar. 18, 1753; Elijah, bapt. May 23, 1756. Apparently Elijah moved to Boxford, adjacent to Bradford, about 1757, for baptisms of two of his children appear in the records of the Second Church (Congregational) in Boxford: Samuel, bapt. Dec. 11, 1757; Ebenezer, bapt. Sept. 9, 1759.

Elijah's wife, Mary Hackett, was born in Salisbury Aug. 1, 1728, daughter of Ebenezer and Hannah (Ring) Hackett, Her family were ship-builders.

The diary of Elijah Estabrooks is a record of his experiences in the army during the years 1758-59-60. He was in Captain Israel Herrick's Company of Colonel Jedediah Prebble's Regiment of Provincials during 1758 on Lake Champlain and gives an account of Abercrombie's fiasco at Ticonderoga. He came out of the army Nov. 7, 1758 and re-enlisted Apr. 6, 1759. He was sent to Halifax where he remained until Nov. 25, 1760. During this time he became a sergeant. His family remained in Boxford.

I am indebted to Mr. Douald Wright, Librarian at the Haverhill Library, for records of births around Haverhill.

The last entry in Elijah Estabrook's diary dealing with his Nova Scotia experiences is interesting:

"Nov. the 25th day, 1760: We embarked on board the ship and the 27th day we went out to sea and about noon we had like to be east away and we put into Halifax again - and laid there until the second of December and we then put to sea again - and the 13th day we got into Boston - and the 15th day I got home to my family."

During the next two and one-half years Elijah Estabrooks made preparations to remove his family to the Saint John River. Governor Lawrence of Nova Scotia was urged by the Lords of Trade and Plantations to re-people the lands vacated by the French with settlers from New England. Colonel McNutt went through the Essex County section of Massachusetts urging men to better their fortunes. In the Newbury-Haverhill district a group organized and decided to examine the situation. In the winter of 1761-62 the Governor of Massachusetts appointed Israel Perlev in charge of twelve men in the pay of Massachusetts to make a snowshoe journey through the wilderness from Maine to the Saint John River. Hugh Quinton was one of this party. (Hugh Quinton's Diary. N. B. Museum — Archives). Elijah Estabrooks also was one of this group. They went by boat to Machias and made their way by trails until finally they descended the Oromocto River. The Township of Maugerville, twelve miles long and twelve miles wide, was laid out in lots early in 1762. On Wednesday, the 6th day of October 1762, the signers of the agreement met at the house of Daniel Ingalls, inn-holder in Andover, at 10 o'clock to draw their lots. (Raymond, "The River St. John" Pg. 280 et seq.)

Early in 1763 Elijah Estabrooks moved his family to Halifax and then to Cornwallis, intending to leave them there until he had prepared for them in the Maugerville Township. He crossed the bay and joined Israel Perley's party which was going up the river to occupy the land. It is said that he took his son, Elijah, a boy of seven or eight years, with him to see the country.

When they reached the township Elijah found that his lot was under water. This must have been a great disappointment. He decided not to use the lot and returned to Cornwallis.

During the next two years Elijah was apparently exploring the possibilities of the new land. Tradition says that he paid a visit to Sackville, where Valentine Estabrooks had settled. However his heart was apparently set on the river. On the 18th of October, 1765, Elijah Estabrooks entered the employ of Simonds and White at Portland Point.

Ven. Archdeacon Raymond in his "Pioneer Days at Saint John" (Published in the Telegraph, Apr. 1919) writes regarding events of 1769:

"An Imaginary Old-Time Meeting of the Board of Trade"

"The decision to proceed with the local improvements was arrived at by the Portland Point Board of Trade after full discussion at a meeting held in the store of Simonds and White, all the members being present. Practically the board consisted of James Simonds, and James White with William Hazen and

Leonard Jarvis corresponding members, and Samuel Peabody, Elijah Estabrooks and Jonathan Leavitt as executive committee and consulting members."

In the summer of 1769 the Reverend Thomas Wood, a clergyman of the Church of England, visited the River Saint John. At Portland Point he held service on Sunday, July 2nd, and baptized John and Abigail, children of Elijah and Mary Estabrooks. Possibly Sarah also was baptized at this time.

In Bill's "History of the Baptists" it is stated that Rev. Elijah Estabrooks (the Preacher) was brought up very strictly by his parents in the Anglican faith. This is inaccurate. Elijah was Congregationalist and died before the Baptist movement reached the river. His children — John, Abigail and Sarah were baptized by the Anglican missionary Rev. Thomas Wood, but that was a matter of form.

In 1773 Elijah Estabrooks made an agreement with Wm. Hazen and James Simonds to settle in the Township of Conway near the mouth of the river, Hazen and Simonds guaranteeing him a deed of 250 acres of land. An old return or census dated August 1, 1775 shows that he had cleared and improved seven acres of land and built a log house.

The lot granted to Elijah Estabrooks was No. 5, next to the ship-building plant and possibly included modern Market Square. The lot next to him, No. 6, was granted to his son-in-law, Zebedee Ring.

Hazen and Simonds were anxious to place settlers on the land because it was in danger of being escheated.

The business in which the trading company was engaged at this time was quite extensive. The fur trade was the most important. Three-fourths of this was in beaver skins and a beaver skin became the unit of value in barter. In exchange the Indians took powder and shot, blankets, needles, thread, beads, buttons, clothing, jewellry, etc.

For the white inhabitants the trading company kept everything from a needle to an anchor.

In addition to the fur trade the company conducted an extensive business in fishery, and shipped the salted fish to Boston and the West Indies. The lime industry was another matter which engaged their attention and coopers were sent from Newburyport to make hogsheads for shipping. There was also a saw-mill. Houses had to be built, roads cut, forests cleared and shipping maintained both to New England and on the Saint John River.

The American Revolution first made itself felt on the Saint John River in the month of August 1775 when a party from Machias, Maine, entered the harbor in a sloop, burned Fort Fred-

erick on the Conway side and captured a brig in the harbor loaded with provisions for the British troops in Boston. The inhabitants of Conway took to the woods to avoid the depredations of the marauders.

This was the first act of aggression in the Bay of Fundy and produced a great sensation; but the experience was repeated many times and must have been painfully reminiscent of the Indian raids on Haverhill in the early years of its existence. White assailants were quite as rapacious as Indians in their looting. The fact that many of the river folk sympathized with the American cause had little influence on the privateers.

In 1776 an expedition was sent against the English at Fort Cumberland on the Chignecto Isthmus where Lieut. Col. Goreham was in command but it was beaten off and returned to the river. Major Studholme's report shows that Elijah Estabrooks (Junior) was one of those who accompanied Hugh Quinton on this expedition.

In May, 1777, John Allan, one of the most determined of the American sympathizers, set out from Machias with 43 men in four whale boats and several canoes. They arrived at Musquash Cove on the 1st. of June, crossed the river at Indiantown, made their way to Portland Point, and took Hazen, Simonds and White prisoners. They spent some time on the river before leaving. After this experience Simonds moved up the river to Sheffield where he had bought a section of land between the Maugerville township and Loder Creek from the Morris grant. Here he built a log cabin on the bank of the Saint John and lived there nine years. Elijah Estabrooks left Conway at the same time and settled on land which was part of the Spry grant at Gagetown on Grimross Neck.

Elijah Estabrooks' family was growing up and leaving home. Hannah married Zebedee Ring in Salisbury in 1772. They settled next to her father in Conway and in 1777 moved to Sheffield. Mary married Samuel Hart of Maugerville in 1773. Elijah married Mary Whittemore in 1777 and after a brief period in Jemseg settled just below James Simonds on the river. Ebenezer married Maria Fletcher in 1782 and settled near his father on Gagetown Neck. Still at home were Joseph (aged 15), Sarah (ag. 13). Abigail (ag. 11), John (ag. 9) and Deborah (ag. 3).

The rugged life proved too much for Elijah's wife, Mary Hackett and she died in 1778. She was probably buried in the Garrison graveyard as it was the oldest Protestant graveyard in this part of the country and Elijah himself was later buried there. She had impressed her children as a woman of courage and resource and "Mary Hackett" is a name found frequently among her descendants.

Regardless of sentiment a family needed a woman at its head. Archilaus Hammond, himself an ex-soldier, had settled in the Gagetown area before Elijah moved there. The Hammonds came trom Marblehead. His sister Sarah was baptized there Oct. 21, 1739. On Sep.t 24, 1764 she married James Oakes. They moved from Marblehead to Cornwallis and quite possibly encountered Elijah and Mary Estabrooks there. By James Oakes she had four children. James, Benjamin, Sarah and Christopher, the latter born in 1773. Probably James Oakes Sr. died about the same time as Mary Hackett. Sarah, his wife, brought her small family to Gagetown and married Elijah Estabrooks on Dec. 17, 1778. There were two children by this marriage: Elizabeth (Betsy) born Oct. 30, 1779 and Hammond, born Jan. 29, 1783.

In the year 1765, at the close of the Seven Years' War, enormous tracts of land, called Townships, were granted in the Saint John River valley to officers and government officials. The arrival of the Loyalists in 1783 led to most of these grants being escheated excepting where settlers were in actual possession.

Governor Part decreed that such lots as were occupied by old inhabitants of the country should not be appropriated by Lovalists without paying for improvements. A commission was appointed to assess values. The following report is of interest in this connection:

Report of the Commission to Investigate Pre-Loyalist Settlements.

For Gagetown, June 30, 1783.

Elijah Easterbrook has a wife and eight children, a log house with two rooms and about twelve acres of land cleared. Came from Cornwallis about 16 years past; settled at the mouth of the river and says he was drove up by the rebels.

For the Township of Conway, July 8, 1783.

Elijah Easterbrook settled in consequence of an agreement with Hazen and Simonds. Cleared and improved about seven acres of land and built a log house which is now fallen to decay, said Easterbrook moving up the river on account of the danger of his situation. Had lived on it eight years.

Governor Carleton and his Council continued the policy of Governor Parr after the formation of the Province of New Brunswick. Elijah Estabrooks' house was valued at £10 and his improvements at £48. Walter Chase, the Loyalist on whose grant his land was situated, was unwilling to pay this amount and Elijah was confirmed in possession of his land in 1784. This was Lot No. 5, Grimross Neck. However, the Loyalists were determined to get rid of pre-Loyalists and Elijah found things very unpleasant.

Actual riots took place and some belligerents were put into jail. Elijah applied for a new allotment. He got some sort of compensation in Cambridge, receiving one-half of lots 25 and 26. His sons, Ebenezer (25) and Joseph (26) received the other halves. Elijah Estabrooks Junior was granted one-half of lot 3 at Jemseg, Parish of Waterborough and lot 32 on the intervale.

Archelaus Hammond moved to Kingsclear at the same time. He received one lot there and his eldest son received another.

The lots in Cambridge were beautifully situated on a ridge overlooking the Jemseg at its entrance to Grand Lake. The Garrison graveyard was just over the fence on a slope stretching down to a creek.

Elijah with his family and two married sons, Ebenezer and Joseph moved to these lots in 1787. Apparently Elijah left the management of his lots mainly to his Oakes step-sons and his wife. He himself spent much of his time with his eldest son Elijah and John his voungest son by Mary Hackett in Canning.

John was seeking to establish himself. He had no love for the water-soaked intervale and early in his married life moved across the river to land just above Swan Creek. He built the first frame house in that part of the country.

Elijah Estabrooks thus spent his old age close to all his children. His younger daughters were married: Sarah, married John Marsh on July 15, 1790 and lived in Canning; Abigail married Wm. Harper in Canning in 1794: Deborah married Moses Clarke Jr. in August 1796; Elizabeth married Martin Olts, Jr. on Mar. 29, 1796. They lived first at French Lake and then on Nashwaak.

Elijah remained hale and hearty to the last. Mrs. Abraham Estabrooks, who married his grandson, said that he used to tell tales of old times to his grandchildren. She said there were two things that he used to pray for: one was that he should never be sick and the other was that he should die at his work. He used to pound up grain for chickens in a mortar. One afternoon after working for a while he lay back in his chair and covered his face with his hat. His grandchildren, who were playing around, thought that he was asleep: but when they went to waken him for supper they found that he was dead. He was buried in the Garrison gravevard at Jemseg.

Elijah died intestate. By a deed dated Aug. 11, 1796 and signed by all his sons and daughters with their wives and husbands his estate was given to his widow. Sarah. This was probably drawn up on the day of his funeral.

His chief assets were the two half lots in Cambridge. His widow sold these to her sons James and Benjamin Oakes in 1803. James had married Rachel Olts July 7, 1792. The Oakes men probably lived there until 1813 when they sold the lots to Archelaus Purdy and moved up to Carleton County. The Estabrooks men sold theirs about the same time, and moved up to Wakefield, Carleton Co. Some of the Oakes men went on to Ontario. I have often wondered if the renowned Sir Harry may have been a descendant.

Possibly Sarah (Oakes) Estabrooks is also buried in the Garrison gravevard.

When I tried to locate the place of Elijah Estabrooks' burial, Mr. W. A. Ferris, an old woodboat man, wrote me on Oct. 4. 1932 that he had been up to Jemseg and met a Mr. John Gunter, Mill Cove, Grand Lake, Queens Co. R. F. D. 16, who remembered playing in the Garrison graveyard when a boy with some fragments of a gravestone which when put together spelt "Elijah Estabrooks."


The following summer my brother George took his wife along with mother and me up to Mill Cove where we got Mr. Gunter who took us to the Garrison graveyard and showed us the approximate spot of Elijah's grave. I took several snaps of the place. The graveyard was on Jefferson Dykeman's farm. The graves were clearly defined but the stones were gone. Elijah's grave was about ten feet straight in front of the entrance. The tombstone had a curved top and the name clearly cut. (Mr. Gunter).

Note: In 1951 I went through this section but the place is growing up. (F. C. E.)

(5) Hannah, born in Haverhill, Mass. Aug. 14, 1751. In 1772 she married Zebedee Ring in Salisbury who was born Mar. 2, 1750 and died in July, 1825. He came to Portland Point from Salisbury and settled near Elijah Estabrooks in Conway, and subsequently removed to Sheffield. He was a ship-builder and followed that business in connection with farming for a living. He and his wife were strict Presbyterians. She died July 13, 1837.

An interesting story given me by Mr. James A. Estey of Saint John was that Mr. Ring had a share in building the Croton waterworks in New York and his name is on a tablet there. Mr. Estey had a gold pen belonging to him with his name on it. His daughter Ethel inherited this. Mr. Estey also had the Ring family Bible.

Children of Zebedee and Hannah (Estabrooks) Ring:

Theophilus, born Feb. 13, 1773; died July 15, 1824.

Mary, born Aug. 8, 1776; died Mar. 12, 1817.

(6) Mary, born in Haverhill, Mass. Mar. 9, 1753. In 1773 she married Samuel Hart of Maugerville, In the original granting of land on the Burton side of the river, according to Bedell's Survey. Samuel Hart received lot number 8, which John Estabrooks afterwards bought. This was about 1784. John Estabrooks sold this land to his son Abraham who sold it to Stephen Watson. Mary Estabrooks Hart died after 1789 and before 1795.

- (8) Elijah, born in Haverhill, Mass. on May 16, 1756. In 1777 he married Mary Whittemore who was born in 1761 and died May 13, 1824. They lived in Canning. On Sept. 15, 1800 Elijah Estabrooks was ordained pastor of the Baptist Church in Canning (then Waterborough). This was the first Baptist Church on the Saint John River and he was its first pastor. A description of this ceremony is contained in the Estabrooks-Palmer Records. An account of the life of Elijah Estabrooks Jr. is given in Bill's "History of the Baptists". See also Raymond's History, pg. 329. In 1808 he obtained land on Little River. He died Sept. 26, 1825. He is buried at Upper Gagetown. His tombstone was erected by contributions from the various congregations which he served.

He was universally beloved and respected. He worked his farm during the week and supported his family. On Sunday he fulfilled his duties as pastor.

Note: Elijah Jr. gave lots off his land to his sons as they married. These were confirmed at his death. The first lot over the border of Queens-Sunbury went to his son John. The second house was double and went to Joseph and Jarvis. The third section was a half lot and went to Charles. The fourth section also a half lot, went to Jesse. Charles Estabrooks kept a store and the post office. The tannery was opposite Jesse Estabrooks' place.

Descendants of Elijah Estabrooks Jr. are eligible for membership in the D.A.R. and the S.A.R. The following is taken from the "Massachusetts Soldiers and Sailors of the Revolutionary War", v. 5, p. 156:

"Easterbrooks, Elijah Jr. Private, Capt. Jabez West's Co.. Col. Jonathan Eddy's Reg't.; enlisted Nov. 14, 1776; discharged Dec. 16, 1776; service 1 mo. 5 days, company raised in Cumberland, N. S. Roll sworn to at Boston."

- (9 Samuel, baptized at Boxford, Dec. 6, 1757. There is no record of him in New Brunswick. Rumor said that he died young; but possibly he was left behind with grandparents in Haverhill. I have left number 31 for a possible line of descendants.
- (10) Ebenezer, baptized in Boxford, Mass. Aug. 28, 1759. He married Maria Fletcher before 1783. He settled on Gagetown Neck but was dispossessed by the Lovalists in 1785. He settled for a time on his grant in Cambridge (½ of lot 25); but by 1796 he was living in Lakeville, Sheffield. He was one of those who signed the covenant of the Church at Waterborough Oct. 20. 1800. This was the occasion of forming the Baptist Church. He moved to Lincoln about 1808. In the same year he received land on Little River. On Dec. 25, 1813 Ebenezer Estabrooks and a number of others applied to be dismissed from the church at Canning to join in forming a Baptist Church in Fredericton. This was the beginning of the Brunswick St. Baptist Church, In 1816 Ebenezer Estabrooks took up a large farm in Jacksontown. Parish of Wakefield, Carleton Co. where he died about 1851. About 1814 he married a second time; his second wife was Charlotte Ann Lounsbury, born 1782, died 1860. After his death Charlotte lived with the Ridcouts.

(The name "Lucretia" remains in this family to the present day). They probably lived on lot 26 in Cambridge which he shared with his father Elijah. This land was obtained in 1787.
- A Miss Lucretia Estabrooks, living in California, said she had two cousins by the name of "Lucretia", but that they were the last of the name. She said all three of them had the same birthmark a little nitch in the lobe of the left ear.

In 1796 he obtained land in the vicinity of French Lake, Sheffield, In July, 1800, he was appointed deacon of the Baptist

Church which was being formed in Canning. In 1808 he obtained another grant of land at Little River. About 1816 he and all his sons moved to Carleton County. They obtained grants of land in Waterville, in Wakefield about four miles from Hartland and in Brighton. This Brighton settlement became known as Rockland and later as Coldstream. It was on the Becaguimac River and was also sometimes called "Becaguimac." Estabrooks families remained here for several generations.

After Joseph Senior's wife died he went to live with his son Samuel at Becaguimac. He died there about 1840.

She married John Marsh at Canning July 15, 1790. He was born in 1758 in Fairfield, Conn. and was a Loyalist, who received a grant of land in West St. John. He was one of those who signed the covenant of the Church at Waterborough Oct. 20, 1800. He obtained land near Fredericton. He and his wife were among those dismissed from the Canning Church to form the Baptist Church at Fredericton in 1813. She died in Fredericton Jan. 2, 1844.

Children: Thomas Lothrop, Elizabeth, Charles William, John Lothrop, Elijah, George.

(13) Abigail, born at Portland Point, Dec. 28, 1766. She was one of the children baptized by Rev. Mr. Wood on his first visit to Saint John July 1, 1769. She married William Harper at Canning Aug. 7, 1794. On Sept. 1, 1810 dismission was granted to Abigail Harper from the church at Canning to join the Baptist Church at Prince William. Their farm was above the barony near the Ingraham farm. It is now abandoned. She died there.

Children: Edward, William and others.

(14) John, born at Portland Point Jan. 22, 1768. He was baptized by Rev. Mr. Wood July 1, 1769. On Dec. 20, 1792 he married Catherine Ebbett in Sheffield. Her family were Dutch Loyalists. She was born May 3, 1775. She was a short, very energetic woman. John Estabrooks obtained a large grant of land in the original grant out near Lake Maquapit, Parish of Sheffield in 1809. On Dec. 18, 1797 he bought land near Swan Creek in the Parish of Burton (lot no. 6) from James Webber. He evidently

had worked this land prior to buying it. He continued buying land in this vicinity until he owned a great deal. He built the first frame house in this section of the country. It now forms the ell of the old homestead. It was here that his father, Elijah Estabrooks, died. John Estabrooks occasionally acted as an itinerant Baptist preacher, travelling around the country on horseback. He died Feb. 2, 1861. His will is in the record office at Oromocto. His death is commemorated in a poem in "New Brunswick and other Poems" published by David Palmer in 1869. Catherine, his wife, died July 26, 1865. They are buried in the Upper Gagetown Cemetery.

(15) **Deborah**, born in Conway, which is now West St. John Aug. 14, 1774. In August, 1796 she married Moses Clarke Junior in Canning. She was one of those who signed the covenant of the church at Waterborough Oct. 20, 1800. They lived for a time at Wickham, but had difficulty in getting a clear title to their land. Then they moved to West Isles, Charlotte Co. Possibly they went from there to U.S.A. Nothing further has been ascertained.

THE CLARKES

Moses Clarke Senior came from Yarmouth in 1776. In 1785 he petitioned for land in Gagetown. John Glasier wanted to know what compensation he should pay to Moses Clarke Sr. for improvements made on land drawn by Glasier. (N. B. Museum records).

(16) Elizabeth, born near Gagetown Oct. 30, 1779. Married Martin Olts, Jr. Mar. 29, 1796. They lived for a time on French Lake and then moved up to Penniac. Later they moved to Meductic.

They had several sons and daughters. Their descendants are in Woodstock, Fredericton and St. John. Martin Olts, a grandson, married Susan Wright b. Lower Jemseg, N. B. 1824; d. of James and Esther (Barnes) Wright. They had six children: (1) William Henry, who married Bertha Watters and lived in St.

John; (2) John, who kept a hotel (in St. John), but finally settled in the State of Maine; (3) Matilda Jane; (4) Phoebe (married Walter McDonald); (5) Ann (died young); (6) Esther (died young).

(17) Hammond, born near Gagetown, January 29, 1783. About 1805 he married Rebeckah Glasier, half-sister of Beamsley. Benjamin and Stephen Glasier.

Stephen, Benjamin and Rebeckah Glasier were among those signing the covenant of the Baptist Church at Waterborough (Canning) in 1800.

Rebeckah was probably somewhat older than her husband. The Glasiers owned a large section of land in Lincoln and evidently gave Rebeckah a small property there. Her children were born and grew up in Lincoln. Hammond was probably employed in the Glasier lumbering operations, and her sons also as they grew up. Possibly their tenure ended at her death.

Rebeckah died about 1838. Hammond and four of his sons decided to exchange lumbering for farming and migrated to Amity, south of Houlton, in Maine.

Apparently Hammond married a second time, a widow, Catherine Estabrooks. She had two daughters by her first husband: Elizabeth and Elzie.(?)

Hammond died at Amity in 1864. His son, Jedediah, inherited his farm.

They lived with John Estabrooks while their own house was being built, and their first child was born there. She was a very capable woman, but suffered with arthritis during the latter part of her life and was in bed twelve years before she died.

William Estabrooks knew the Bible and Pilgrim's Progress almost off by heart. He was baptized in 1812 in Waterborough. He died on his farm July 27, 1889. His son Leander inherited the farm and his family were living there when William died.

Elizabeth was keenly interested in these and told them to her children. Idella Hoben, the wife of her son Henry with whom Elizabeth lived in her old age, remembered these stories, and I got some of them from her particularly the Flemish tradition. Elijah Senior's diary of the Indian Wars was kept by his son Elijah Junior. Elijah Junior's son Jarvis kept his father's papers and his daughter, Elizabeth Estabrooks Palmer copied the old diary. So did Stephen Potter's son, Stephen Harris. Elizabeth died March 16, 1876. Her children are listed under Stephen Potter, No. 37. Nos. 171-176.

At that time there were only three stops between Okanagan Landing and Penticton, when he retired in 1914 there were twenty-two.

When Capt. Dave came to retirement age he built himself a fine house on a hill on the main highway. On the front of the third storey he built a bay window, modelled on the wheel-house of the "David Weston", so that he could sit there and watch boats go up and down the river.

Captain Dave had three little girls, who died one after the other, when they were about seven years old. One Sunday, when he and his wife were in church, a student-minister preached fervently on "Believe and be baptized" as a passport to Heaven. Mrs. Weston began to weep. Capt. Dave rose and faced the minister.

"If that Bible says that my little girls are in Hell I have no use for your religion and I shall never come into this church again."

Capt. Dave kept his word.

That was the end of infant damnation in one Calvinist Baptist Church.







HACKETT (SALISBURY LIBRARY)

Note:—A William Hackett signed a petition to Oliver Cromwell from Maine towns in 1656.

William Hackett, captain, of Amesbury and Salisbury, married Jan. 31, 1666-7, Sarah Bernard. He received common right in Amesbury 1667; signed a petition in Salisbury in 1680. He died Mar. 6, 1712-13. Sarah died Sept. 10, 1717. Children (1) Sarah, (2) John, (3) Mary, (4) Rebecca, (5) Katharine, (6) Ephraim, (7) William, (8) Judah; (9) Ebenezar, who was born Oct. 17, 1687, married Hannah Ring in 1710. He died Oct. 19, 1741. THE HACKETTS OF SALISBURY FROM THE HISTORY OF ESSEX COUNTY (MASS.) = pg. 1461

Note:—In August, 1937, I went down to Haverhill, Newburyport, and Salisbury. The information regarding the Hacketts and Rings was obtained in the public library at Salisbury. F.C.F.

William Hackett, 1777:—The Hacketts of Salisbury were scientific shipwrights and excellent mechanics whose ancestors were early engaged in this great industry in New England. They built many war vessels and also superintended the construction of many others in other places. These vessels are of historic fame, as are his build of merchant vessels of his time. His vessels were fine models, remarkable as sea boats, so termed and proverbial for their sailing qualities. The history of his ships would make an interesting volume of early shipping, both national and local.

The "Alliance" frigate was said to be the fastest sailing vessel of the navy. Her rate was 14 knots an hour.

H

HISTORY OF THE RING FAMILY

The Rings came from Marlborough in Wiltshire. Robert Ring, born probably about 1614, was the first in America. He came in the "Confidence" about 1638. He received land in the first division at Salisbury in 1640. He obtained fishing rights at Ring's Island in 1642. He married Elizabeth and had six children of whom Jarvis was the eldest son. He was born Feb. 1657 and married Hannah Foster Dec. 24, 1685. His second child was Hannah, born Mar. 3, 1688, who married Ebenezer Hackett in 1710.

Ш

THE HART FAMILY

Isaac Hart, born in 161+ in Scratby, Norfolk, Eng., came to America in 1636 as tutor in the family of Richard Carver. He married Elizabeth Hutchins.

Samuel, son of Isaac and Elizabeth Hart, was born in 1656. He married Sarah Endicott. He was a scaman. He died in 1730.

Jonathan, son of Samuel and Sarah Hart, was born Nov. 2, 1710. He married Mercy Hawks. They lived in Lynn until 1760 and then they removed with their four sons to Maugerville.

Samuel, son of Jonathan and Mercy Hart, married (1) Mary Estabrooks, (2) Clarissa Hammond, He died in 1814.

Aaron Hart, son of Samuel and Mary Estabrooks Hart, was born in 1788 and died April 26, 1866 and was buried in Dunfy graveyard, Kingsclear, near Fredericton. He was a farmer in Kingsclear and married Charlotte Estey. His children were Jarvis, born 1812: Aaron who married Catharine Dayton: Frances Ruth who married Gilbert Dykeman; Caroline who married Ebenezar Libbey; Richard E.; Mary E. who married Tillottson Libbey; Hannah Jane who married Henry Estabrooks; Sarah Ann who died young.

Jarvis, son of Aaron and Charlotte Estev Hart, was born July 12, 1812, at Kingselear, Hart's Island in the Saint John River near Fredericton was a part of his father's farm. Jarvis could not graduate from the University because it was not officially open to Baptists. He completed the course there but was not permitted

to take a degree, and this injustice led directly to the founding of the Baptist Seminary at Fredericton in 1835 of which Rev. Frederick Mills was principal and Jarvis Hart assistant principal. Mrs. Mills had an assistant in the "female department". Prudence Boardman Brown of Cambridge, Mass., to whom, July 11, 1839, Jarvis Hart was married. In 1841 he resigned from the seminary to conduct a private school in Saint John. In 1846 he took charge of Paradise Academy at Wilmot, Nova Scotia. In 1851 Jarvis Hart became principal of Horton Academy at Acadia where he spent 9 years. The honorary degree of M.A. was conferred upon him by Acadia College in 1856. In 1860 Jarvis Hart returned with his wife and eight children to St. John. He started a High School there with his children Charles and Jennie as assistants and later he was made principal of the girls' high school, in which capacity he served till his death in 1873.

The children of Jarvis and Prudence Brown Hart were: (1) Charles Frederick, born Aug. 23, 1840, professor at Vassar and Cornell, associate of Louis Agassiz, died in Rio Janeiro, Mar. 18, 1878, being then in charge of the geological survey of Brazil under the Emperor Dom. Pedro II; (2) Martha Jane, married Henry le Baron Hartt M.D. died 1870; (3) Charlotte Elizabeth died unmarried; (4) Sarah married Jas. Harrington; (5) Frances Anetta born Aug. 23, 1847, married George U. Hay, founder of the N. B. Educational Review; (6) George le Baron, born 1849, died 1913; (7) Prudence, born April 23, 1851, married Wm. Gilchrist, died Sept. 7, 1912; (8) Emma Florence Gertrude born 1855, married Charles A. Prichard.

THE FLETCHER FAMILY

David Fletcher was an officer in the army and had the right to a grant of two thousand acres. He went first to Westmorland Co., then moved with his family to Sheffield. James Simonds obtained from him his grant for two thousand acres in return for lands, etc. in Sheffield. Simonds applied the grant so obtained to a petition for land at the east end of the marsh in Saint John.

VI

THE MARSH FAMILY

John Marsh, Lovalist, b. 1758, came from Fairfield, Conn. He obtained land at West Saint John, but moved up to Sheffield. He married Sarah Estabrooks on July 15, 1790. He signed the covenant of the Baptist Church in Waterborough in 1800. He obtained land near Fredericton and he and his wife were among those dismissed from the Canning Church to form the Baptist Church in Fredericton in 1813. Their children were: (1) Thomas Lothrop, b. Sept. 20, 1791; d. June 16, 1793; (2) Elizabeth, b. July 9, 1793, d. Jan. 12, 1814; (3) Charles William, b. Oct. 20, 1794, d. May 7, 1867; (4) John Lothrop, b. July 12, 1796, d. May 31, 1859; (5) Elijah, b. Oct. 27, 1799, d. Aug. 21, 1821; (6) George, b. Dec. 25, 1802. (Descendants in Wellesley, Mass.)

John Lothrop Marsh married Sophia Miriam Beckwith on Oct. 10, 1824. Their children were: (1) Nehemiah Beckwith, b. 1826. died, leaving one daughter unmarried; (2) Amelia Elizabeth, married Wakefield Bailey, daughter, Mrs. Coleman in Moneton; (3) John Lothrop, b. Jan. 22, 1829 (Police Magistrate in Frederiction), daughter in Montreal and one daughter married a Powerschildren in Massachusetts; (4) Sophia Adelaide, b. 1832, married Havelock McLean, children: Hugh (the former Governor of New Brunswick), Arthur, Herbert, Maude; (5) Julia Louisa, b. 1834, married a Mr. Russell, a marine artist, several children; (6) Arthur b. April 29, 1837, went to Australia as an evangelist, has a son who is a minister; (7) Sarah Harriett, b. Jan. 2, 1842, married Jas. McIntosh, a miller of Kingselear, 8 children. (Mrs. Good's mother was one of these).

VII

THE HARPER FAMILY

(Children of William and Abigail (Estabrooks) Harper)

They had a son. Edward, who went to Boston. He gave the organ to the new Baptist Church which was dedicated in Frederiction in 1840. He was still living in Chelsca in 1880.

Another son (William?) remained in Prince William, and had two sons at least: (1) William, b. about 1839, was a carpenter in Prince William, married Suzanne Bain and had eight children; (2) John, who lived a while on the old homestead, married a Miss Saunders, and moved to the coast.

VIII

LAND TRANSFERS AT SWAN CREEK

(These took place shortly after the original grants were made based upon Bedell's survey.)

Note: Swan Creek is a corruption of the Maliseet "Shouankik", meaning "Cranberry Bog". The Indians still come there in the fall of the year to gather cranberries.

(Emma Estabrooks copied these for me from The Registry Office)

Dec. 18, 1797 John Estabrooks bought lot no. 6 from James Webber. Lot no. 7 was originally granted to Frederick Mabee. On Aug. 25, 1787 F. Mabee and his wife Lavinia sold lot no. 7 to Charles Powers. On Dec. 11, 1787 Charles Powers and his wife Mary sold lot no. 7 for 56 pounds to John Russell. On Nov. 8, 1788 John Russell and Patience, his wife of Burton, sold lot no. 7 to Anna Verner of Sheffield for 25£. Anna Verner was a daughter of Jervis and Anna Say. On May 15, 1793 Edward Verner sold lot no. 7 to Alexander Weeks. His daughter Ruth married Thomas Olmstead and they sold lot no. 7 to John Estabrooks for £60 on Mar. 30, 1798.

In 1811 John Estabrooks bought lot no. 8 from Sam Hart and also lot no. 9 for £350.

In 1825 John Estabrooks bought land from Dr. Cushi Hatheway adjoining James Taylor and Reuben Hoben Jr. He also bought land from Thomas Hatheway. This is probably Isaac Estabrooks' farm.

In Mar, 1827, John Estabrooks sold lot no. 9 of his land to William, his son, for about £300.

In 1830 Gideon Estabrooks bought land from William Atherton between Hollon Bridges and Widow Bell - 250 acres.

In 1833 William Estabrooks bought from Hollon Bridges hand between his own and Gideon Estabrooks - lot 10 - £200.

In 1843 Gideon Estabrooks sold his land to James Albert Estabrooks who sold to Whitehead Barker and moved to Carleton Co.

In 1852 Stephen P. Estabrooks bought lots 11, 12 and 13 from Whitehead Barker and Elizabeth his wife for £525.

In 1851 John Estabrooks for £200 sold to his son Abram J. Estabrooks the land known as the Hart lot no. 8. Abram afterwards sold this to Stephen Watson.

X

THE EBBETTS

The Ebbetts are said to be of Dutch descent, but there are Ebbetts in Scotland. They were Puritans and were mixed up in religious troubles. They were probably Loyalists.

XI

Notes Obtained by Bessie Babbitt from Mr. Tom Babbitt

Ebenezer Briggs, great grandfather of Russia Williams, died 1867 (?); buried in old Babbitt Burying Ground.

George Niles, brother of Henry and Herb Niles, was scalded when the Ann Augusta blew up so that he died. He is buried in the old Babbitt Burying Ground, also his mother.

Ebenezer Hatheway - grandfather of Frank Hatheway, is buried there. His widow married a Loder.

(Ebenezer Hatheway was the original grantee of this section according to Bedell's Survey).

The old Babbitt place, also the McCain place, belonged first to Hatheways. They sold the Babbitt place to John Hoben, who left it to his adopted son William. Thomas Babbitt bought it from him. The Babbitts got the McCain place from Enoch Lunt and sold it back to him again.

The big Babbitt house was built when Tom Babbitt (Bess's uncle) was 3 or 4 years old.

The school house was built in 1877. Babbitts got their organ the same year.

Providence Chapel was built by Thomas Babbitt, John Hoben and Nathaniel Cottle about 1833. They held meetings there till the church was built. Tom Babbitt was the last one of the original three left and he owned it alone. He gave it to the Temperance Society. They cut it into two pieces, put in a middle, and it became Temperance Hall. It was burned in 1921.

Granville Bell lived opposite the Hobens. He lived to be more than 100 years old. He is buried in the old graveyard.

Niles also lived opposite the Hobens.

Hoben's place was owned by D. C. Veber.

The Tan House was built by Tom Babbitt Sr. for Tom Nicholson.

Hatheway owned the vessels Union, Ann Augusta, Fawn and David Weston.

Enoch Lunt owned the vessels Heather Bell, Olive and Rothesav.

The Murrays - a family of several brothers in Scotland, The widow of one was "cut off" by the rest of the family. She came with her daughter Jennie to Canada, Jennie married Ed. Coy. Mrs. Murray married a Partlow. She was called the Scotch beauty.

Isaac Estabrooks' place was formerly larger. Part was sold to Tom Babbitt Sr.

Hannah Hill, daughter of Harriett (Estabrooks) Tapley-Hill (sister of Stephen Potter) grew up after her mother died at Stephen P.'s home. Her brother James Hill lived back of Sheffield at No. 18. He went to N. Y. and became very rich in railroads.

HISTORY OF THE OLTS FAMILY

In 1785 Martin Oltz Sr., a Loyalist, petitioned for land at Nashwaak above the falls for himself and three families. They were for a time at French Lake but later were at Penniac. He said that he was oppressed with a large family.

The Oltz (Hultz, Oltz, Ault, Alt) were German (or Dutch). One of their associates, Conrad Stinick, had been in a Hessian Regiment. Oltz had been settled in New Jersey or New York. His father, Henry, was listed as Lieutenant in "British officers serving in the army in America 1754".

XIV

THE TURNEYS OF SWAN CREEK

Thomas Turney Senior got his land at Swan Creek about 179° from — Webber. He was one of those who signed the covenant of the Church at Waterborough Oct. 20, 1800. He made his will and it was proved April 22, 1840. It was witnessed by Charles and George Estabrooks. He left his farm to his son Thomas Junior and bequests to his sons Amasa. David and Nelson, and to his daughters Martha, Mary, Jerusha, Lavinia, Elizabeth, Jane, Margaret and Ann who were evidently married. Amasa and Nelson are thought to have moved to Carleton County.

XV

THE BROOKS FAMILY

(1) William Brooks, born in England in 1610, came to Virginia in 1635 in the Speedwell; appeared in Massachusetts Bay Colony in 1653; died at Deerfield, Mass. 1688. He married Mary Burt. She died in 1689. (2) His son Benjamin, born 1671; died 1765. (3) His son Benjamin Jr. born 1693. (4) His son Abner, born Aug. 16. 1734 at Brookfield; came to Maugers Id. 1787. (5) His son Abner Jr. born June 23. 1783; married Hannah Estabrooks, daughter of Elijah Junior.

The family seat of the Brooks family is Whitehureh, Hampshire, England.

HISTORY OF THE COY FAMILY

Note: I am indebted for the following history of the name Mac Coy to Mr. W. J. Watson, Professor of Gaelic at the University of Edinburgh, F.C.E.

The name Mac Cov is Irish and is an anglicized form of Mac Aodha or MacAoidh, the former (Aodha) being the older form of the Genitive sing, of Aodh, the latter (Aoidh) being a later form used mostly in Scotland.

Aodh appears in Adamman's Life of Columba in the Latin form of Aidus, in old Irish it is Aed, Gen. Aedo; then in Middle Irish it is Aed and Aedh; gen. Aeda and aedha; modern Irish Aodh, gen. aodha. Aed means fire. In early Celtic it appears in Aedui, the name of the Gaulish tribe.

Edward Coy, grandfather of Nancy Jane and Mary Coy, came from Pomfret in Connecticut. The name was originally McCoy but the Mc was dropped by Edward Coy's grandfather owing to some mistake in registering property. Edward Coy married Amy Titus in Connecticut and had six sons and five daughters. The sons were John, Asa, Benjamin, Edward, David and Amasa who died of innoculation. Mary Bradley was one sister. Edward Junior was born in 1768, Edward Sr. was one of the original grantees of

Maugerville, his lot being opposite the head of Gilbert's Island. He was an active member of the Congregational church and one of the signers of the original church covenant. In 1770 he settled at Upper Gagetown under arrangements with Col. Wm. Spry. He sold his land at Maugerville to Moses Coburn. At the outbreak of the Revolution he moved his family again to Sheffield but returned to Gagetown in a few years and his section of the place became known as Coytown. His daughter Mary was born at Gagetown in 1771.

Edward Cov, Jr., married Jane Murray and had children: William, John, Matthew, Gershom, Edward, Nancy, Mary, Amy.

Jane or Jean Murray's mother was the widow of one of four wealthy brothers living in Perthshire, Scotland. At her husband's death his brothers cheated her out of her property and she came to New Brunswick. She said she had never put up her own hair until she was on board ship. She was called the "Scotch beauty". She married a Mr. Partlow in St. John. The chief of the Murray family of Perthshire is the Duke of Athole. His seat is Blair Castle, Perthshire.

Note: Elder Brewster who led the Mayflower Pilgrims married a Miss Cov. It is not known what connection she was of Edward Cov.

XVII

THE PALMERS

(SEE ESTABROOKS-PALMER RECORDS)

John Palmer, sergeant in the British army, was born in England in 1622. Moved to Rowley, Mass, in 1639, where he died June 17th, 1695. His son Francis also died in Rowley Nov. 11, 1695. John, son of Francis, died Nov. 24, 1763. Daniel son of John, moved to New Brunswick in 1763 and settled in Sheffield on the River St. John where he died in 1776. His son, Daniel, was born May 12, 1748; moved to Grand Lake in 1786 and died Feb. 11th, 1813. His wife's name was Sarah Whittemore, sister of Mary, wife of Rev. Elijah Estabrooks.

XVIII

HISTORY OF THE GILLIES FAMILY

Jesse Gillies, Aug. 6, 1753-Oct. 23, 1835, was a loyalist. He and his sister Leah came up with the Loyalists but the rest of the family were revolutionists and remained in the States. Leah Gillies married a Mr. Harding of St. John and was mother of Thomas Harding, M.P.P. for the city of Saint John; also George and William Harding.

Jesse Gillies married Elizabeth Sherwood, 1767-1847, of Lovalist descent, whose first husband was Weeden Fowler (1760-1791) by whom she had four children: Mary, born June 15, 1785, married William Wetmore 1802; Sarah, born Mar. 24, 1787, married Isaac Bonnell 1802; Ammon, born Jan. 25, 1789, married Mary Taylor; Elizabeth, born Dec. 24, 1790, married Capt. John David.

The children of Jesse Gillies and Elizabeth Sherwood were: Lydia Gillies, born Oct. 1, 1793, died 1829, married J. Davis. Leah Gillies, born Oct. 22, 1795, died 1833 or 1834, married John Hayes. Jesse Gillies, born Oct. 23, 1797, died Jan. 4, 1892, married E. Urquhart. Rachel Gillies, born Sept. 29, 1799, died Feb. 5, 1873, married Wm. Demrison. Jacob Gillies, born Oct. 2, 1801, died 1877, married Susan Gerow. Daniel Gillies, born Nov. 7, 1803, died 1807, never married. Joseph Gillies, born Sept. 14, 1805, died May 5, 1889, married Ruby Case. Deborah Gillies, born Sept. 5, 1807, died Aug. 14, 1876, married J. Estabrooks. Ruth Gillies, born Sept. 9, 1809, died Feb. 10, 1884, married Wm. Wetmore.

XIX

HISTORY OF THE HOBEN FAMILY

The first of this name in Canada were John Hoben and Anna his wife who were in Cornwallis some time previously to 1765 for on April 11, 1765, their son John was married to Mary Cone, daughter of Reuben Cone, the Reverend Joseph Bennett officiating. The children of this marriage were as follows: Anna, born May 23, 1766; John, born May 21, 1767; Reuben, born Aug. 1, 1769; Mary, born Mar. 1, 1771, Dorothy, William, Thomas, and Elizabeth, who married Dec. 16, 1790, John Rand, son of Caleb, son of John, son of Thomas, son of Robert (born 1599 in England and died in Charlestown, Mass. 1639.)

It is thought that the Hobens came from Connecticut. Tradition says that the first Hoben to come to America was a Roman Catholic priest from Kilkenny, Ireland. He came to New York. He fell in love with the daughter of the lord high sheriff, left the priesthood and married her. A descendant was John Hoben who came to Nova Scotia 1761. He bought a valuable tract of land at Sheffield Mills, Kings Co., Nova Scotia. There is a tradition among the Hobens of U.S.A. that the Irish Hobens were of Spanish descent, from one of Spanish armada wrecked on Irish coast.

THE CONE FAMILY

We know that in Haddaw, Connecticut, one of the original grantees in 1662 was Daniel Cone, born in England 1622, died in Haddaw, Connecticut, Oct. 24, 1706. His wife was Mehitable Spencer, daughter of Jared and Alice Spencer of Hartford, Connecticut, Their son Stephen Cone, born 1677, married 1702, Mary Hungerford, who died 1763. Their son Reuben Cone, born 1713 in Haddaw, Connecticut moved to Cornwallis in 1760. It was his daughter Mary who married John Hoben.

Reuben Hoben, born Aug. 1, 1769, John born 1767 and their sister Dorothy moved to the St. John River. John obtained extensive land grants.* He married a Miss Ebbett, but had no children. Reuben had a farm in Canning. He married Sarah Ebbett. Their children were Reuben II, Charles, Elizabeth (married Amos Plummer), Mary (married Enoch Lunt).

Reuben Hoben the 2nd. married Rebecca Hume (died 1877). Their children were Geo. (married Sarah Estabrooks); Mary (married Charles Gunter); Elizabeth Ann (married John Jones); Reuben (married Elizabeth Currey); John (married three times, moved to N.Y.); Martha (married Robert Davis); Rebecca (married Jesse Estabrooks); Joseph (married Elizabeth Estabrooks); Charles (married Elizabeth Plummer); Thomas (married Frances Babbitt); Sarah (married James Currie).

Reuben Hoben the 3rd., born 1821, married Elizabeth Currie 1846. He died April 18, 1877. She was born 1824 and died Dec. 1883. Their children were: 1. Arianna, born Aug. 29, 1847, married Cyrus Burpee Jan. 1869; died Nov. 1883. 2. John, born 1849, married Rebecca Coy 1880, died Jan. 1925. 3. Idella, born Oct. 18, 1851, married Henry Albert Estabrooks July 1869, died May 23, 1928. 4. Reuben, born 1853, married about

*John Hoben. It is said that he belonged to Gorham's Rangers of the Royal Fencible Americans. Some grants were at L'Etang(?)

1902 Alice MacDonald, 5. George William, born 1856, never married, died 1910. 6. Henrietta Rebecca, born Aug. 5, 1859; married Capt. Leander Estabrooks, Dec. 8, 1882; died Feb. 4, 1944. 7. Elizabeth Lavinia, born Aug. 9, 1862, married George Clowes Oct. 27, 1886; died 1937.

XX

THE ESTEYS

The first of the Esteys in America was Jeffrey Estey, a Puritan, who came to Salem in 1636. His son, Isaac, married Mary Towne. They lived in Topsfield near Salem. She was executed as a witch in 1692 and the family moved to Rowley. Richard, grandson of Isaac, was born in Topsfield but lived in Rowley. He came to the St. John River with the Maugerville settlers in 1763 and is ancestor of the N. B. Esteys.

XXI

THE BURPEES

The first of the Burpees in America was Thomas Burpee who settled in Rowley in 1639. Jonathan Burpee, probably a great grandson of the original settler, came to Maugerville in 1763 and was one of the first grantees.

XXII

NOTE ON THE PIDGEON FAMILY

William D. Pidgeon, married Sarah Eliza Lackey. Among their children were (Capt.) David and Margaret Ann.

Captain David's family included Burpee, Annabel (Simpson) and Lucretia, who was Capt. G. L. Estabrooks' first wife. Burpee was the father of Walter Pidgeon, the actor.

Margaret Ann Pidgeon married (1) David James Brown, by whom she had Sarah who was Capt. G. L. Estabrooks' second wife. Her second husband was J. C. Ferris.

ESTABROOKS FAMILIES IN CARLETON CO.

XXIV

THE BABBITTS

Edward Bobet was mentioned in the records at Plymouth in 1643. He was 16 years old then and was able to bear arms. He came from England. His eldest son was Elkanah I, who was followed by Elkanah II, and in turn by Elkanah III.

Daniel, eldest son of Elkanah III, came to Saint John with the Loyalists from Duchess Co., N.Y. in 1783. He brought his family with him. His eldest son, Daniel, was seven years old at that time. He moved to Gagetown and applied for land in Sunbury Co. in 1784. He spelt his name "Babbet" and was a blacksmith. He was twice married. Fourteen sons followed his body to the gravevard.

Daniel Jr. married Dorothy Hoben in 1797. His son John built the Babbitt homestead at Swan Creek. He married Hannah Elizabeth Wasson. Their children were James (who married Maretta Estabrooks), Thomas, Fred, Elizabeth and George who married Emma Hoben.

Page 32 Note 1. (Estabrook Families in America, Additional): Col. Edmund P. Easterbrook, Senior Chaplain of the United States Army in Washington, who died January 1933. His brother, Hubert Samuel Easterbrook, Attorney-at-Law, Torquay, Devonshire, was interviewed by Mrs. Theodore Estabrooks and also wrote me that the Estabrooks were farmers of Somerset and Devonshire and were of Dutch origin. He said that a circle drawn with centre in West Devon and a radius of fifty miles would contain most of the Dutch families.

Page 32 Note 2 (Estabrook Families in America:) James Easterbrook, born in 1798 in Buckingfastleigh, Devon, Eng. Married Elizabeth Bowden of Petty Harbor, Newfoundland, in the Anglican Church at Petty Harbor on Nov. 18, 1834. He died there on March 22, 1866. He was a farmer and had several children. A grandson, Col. C. A. Easterbrook, U. S. Army Ref'd, lives in Washington, D.C. (1959).

Page 126 No. 612 Note: William Estabrook (obituary), Funeral services were held Monday for William Estabrook, 80, of Amity, who died October 18, 1958, in West Enfield after a short illness. Born in Amity on March 10, 1877, he was the son of Thomas and Sarah (Clark) Estabrook.
