## EXPLANATION

Perhaps a word about the system that I have used would be desirable. I suppose that there are many methods of arranging the information in a book of this nature. The one that I used is not complicated. It seemed to me to be the most logical arrangement and also the easiest for the reader to follow.

In the system that I have used, a particular chapter will cover the people of a given generation. For example, all of the people of the third generation are discussed or mentioned in the fourth chapter. The families of brothers and/or sisters will be grouped together within the chapter, but the discussion of their children will be in the following chapter.

Let's look at a specific case. On page 4/9 we have:

108. b Martin Jan      5 b. Feb. 19, 1957

The number 108 is arbitrarily assigned. All of the individuals that lived beyond infancy will have such a number. Once a number is assigned to a particular individual, it stays with that individual throughout the book. It is a convenient and exact method of following lines from one generation to the next. The number of children are indicated alphabetically, Martin Jan is the second child, hence the "b" proceeding his name. The "5" following the name means that he is in the fifth generation. He was born on Feb. 19, 1957. Martin Jan's father is Mr. Joe Elling Terrett, fourth generation. The number assigned to Joe Elling Terrett is 56. His mother is Margaret Terrett, His grandfather is Otto Elling, and Joe Elling Terrett's great-grandfather is Frederick Elling of the first generation.



## CHAPTER I

### THE GERMAN ANCESTORS OF FREDERICK ELLING

The information that later proved to be helpful in establishing a starting point in Germany was obtained from the records of St. Paul's Lutheran Church in Monee, Illinois. The records of this church reveal that Friedrich Elling was born on Oct. 14, 1829, in Riepe, which is located near Dorfmark. Dorfmark is a village located 8 miles southwest of Soltau in Hannover Province. There is other evidence which indicated that Friedrich Elling was born in Bremen, Germany; however, it was subsequently established that this information was incorrect.

Referring again to the records of the St. Paul's Lutheran Church in Monee, Illinois, we find that George Friedrich Heinrich Elling was born on August 30, 1858 and died in infancy on June 16, 1860. His parents were George Heinrich Christoph Elling and Katharina (Franzen) Elling. Mr. Christoph Elling was born on Oct. 15, 1822 in Fallingbostel, Hannover Province, Germany. These church records were written in longhand, that was more German than English. I interpreted the name of the village to be Fallingbostel. My interpretation is probably incorrect. Information from records received later indicate that Mr. Christoph Elling was born in the small village of Mengebostel, which is located just on the edge of Dorfmark. Also, the records from Germany indicate that Christoph Elling was born on Oct. 15, 1821, instead of Oct. 15, 1822. One other discrepancy that should be pointed out at this time, the records in Monee indicate that Frederick Elling was born on Oct. 14, 1829. The certified copies of his baptism and also of his confirmation, list the date of his birth as Nov. 14, 1829.

In Sept., 1959, Mr. Adolf Elling, 24 L Street, Salt Lake City, Utah, gave me the following information regarding his ancestors.

His Great Grandfather —

Heinrich Jacob Elling, born Nov. 13, 1781.

His Grandfather—

Peter Johann Elling, born Aug. ...., 1825, at Riepe, Dorfmark.

His Grandmother—

Johanna Caroline Gorneman, born Oct. 19, 1813, at Northheim.

In response to my inquiries, several individuals over in Germany, contributed the information that they had, or were able to obtain. Because they have a direct bearing on this problem, and because each of them either assisted me in getting on the right track over in Germany, or confirmed information that I was able to obtain later from some entirely different source, I am sure that the following letters will be of interest to the reader.

Dear Mr. Elling

After asking my relations I'll answer to your letter of February 23, and to the letter from May 3, send to my father O. Elling, Bremen. (My father has died in 1954.)

I must tell you between our ancestors we cannot find both Georg Friedrich Christoph Elling, born on Oct. 15, 1822 and Friedrich Elling, born on Oct. 14, 1829.

Indeed the christian names we have also between them, but the birth-days and the years are not right. It is only the question, whether the personal data you have told are exactly.

To your information I'll give you the personal data of my ancestors:

My grandfather was

Fritz Heinrich-Friedrich Wilhelm Elling

born on Dec. 24, 1858 at Dorfmark

(Dorfmark is a little village in the district between the rivers Elbe and Weser in the province Hannover).

Two half-brothers of my grandfather

Christoph Elling

and Heinrich Elling

both born nearly 1850

have gone to Minnesota about 1884. Rather we have had never a connection with them or their descendants.

The father of my grandfather was

Heinrich Friedrich Elling

born on Jan. 23, 1821 at Jettebruch (5km nearly Dorfmark).

His three brothers were

Hans Wilhelm Elling

born ? died in 1845

Hans Jacob Elling

born about 1810-11

Heinrich Christoph Elling

born ? died in 1886.

This three brothers have not gone to the U. S. A.

After you now at the first time have told in your letter of May 3, that Friedrich Elling has lived in Dorfmark, it may possible that we can find somewhat if you are able to give another information.

I think I'll hear soon from you.

I'm interested to your family history and would be glad to receive a copy of your book.

Dear Mr. Elling:

In reply to your letter of June 30, I am sorry to inform you that the two gentlemen mentioned by you, Georg Friedrich Christoph Elling and Friedrich Elling do not show up in our Church Records.

Only in the Confirmation Register of the Year 1836 did I find the name Georg Heinrich Christoph Elling, born October 15, 1821. That would make the first and the last of the given names coincide with the one of the names mentioned by you, also the birth date is the same.

In the Birth Records I found the following information regarding the Parents of the above named (person):

Georg Heinrich Christoph Elling, son of the Tenant Heinrich Jacob Elling and his wife Catherine Magdalene, nee Kastens, at Mengelbostel (near Dorfmark).

A search in the Church Records is difficult, for one thing, the church records in those days did not contain an alphabetical register, and also, since no other information regarding the two Elling men is given, promising results of any search will be difficult. The church records contain all pertinent church functions, such as Christenings, Confirmation, Marriage and Burial. As long as any of these events and their particular date remain unknown, the only way to conduct any search would be to just look through all the records covering that certain period, a tedious undertaking, which may take several days, and possibly weeks.

Yesterday evening I am returned from Dorfmark and Fallingbostel. Ich think that the results are very good. To day I send jou:

- 1) 6 Certifications over jour ancestors Elling in Jettebruch. I have found them in the church-book and dictated the registerings to Mr. True, because much is to read difficulty.
- 2) 9 certifications of death cases from pastorate Walsrode concerning also jour direct ancestors. The contain very interesting accounts.
- 3) A chart of Jettebrock. The farm 211 belongs since centuries to jour  
130  
ancestors. 1876 was the possessor Heinrich Friedrich Christoph Elling, Vollhofer (= large farmer.) The house has the Nr. 5. Magnitude: 67 ha, 72a and 60 m<sup>2</sup>. To day Missis Irmgard Gevers, born Elling, possesses the farm. Would jou write to her? That all I have learnt through the Cataster-office in Fallingbostel, which has made for me the chart.
- 4) Two Photographs from the interior of the church of Dorfmark. Over this christening font have been baptized many of jour ancestors through centuries. I have bought them from Dr. Muller-Naumburg in Fallingbostel, the son of the famous politician Dr. Muller-Naumburg. The church of Dorfmark outside is not photographed.

Then I have visited Mr. Hans Stuhlmacher in Fallingbostel, the best man for the history of the country. His book, The Heidmark costs 300 till 500 DM, and his book, The Kreis Fallingbostel 40 - 60 DM, if one has the fortune, to find someone, who is willing, to sell the books.

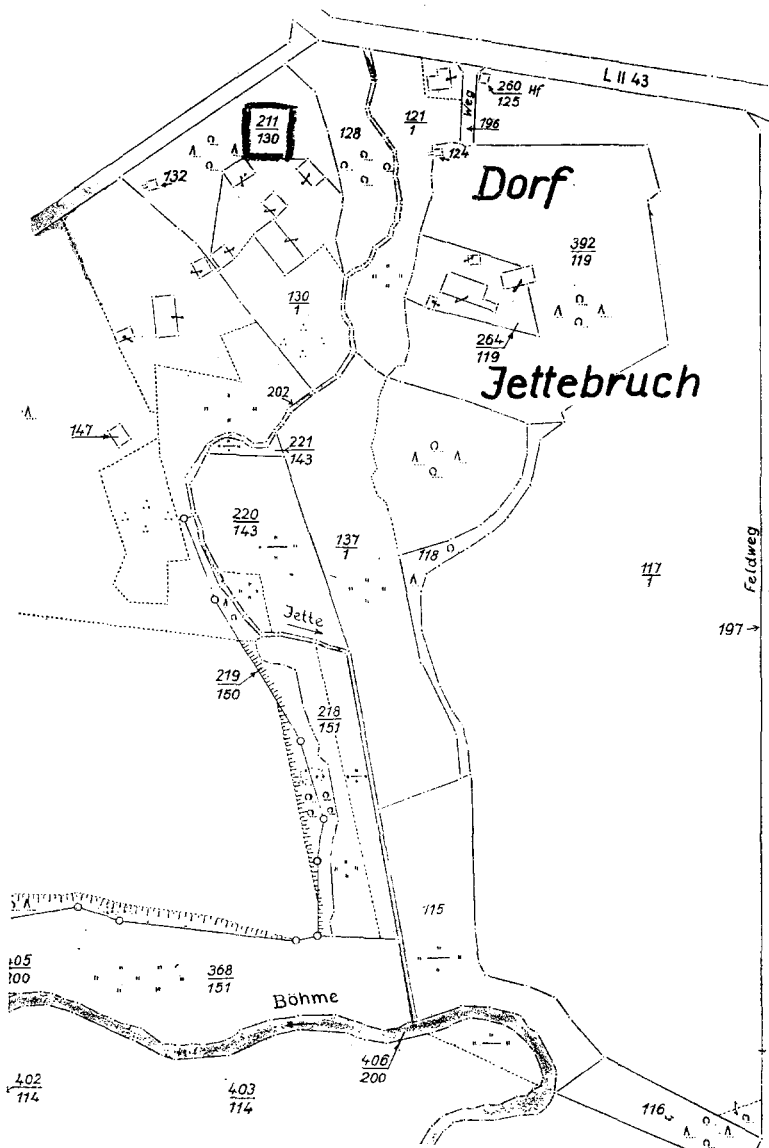

Every certification costs DM1 if with our without godparents and the duty for searching.



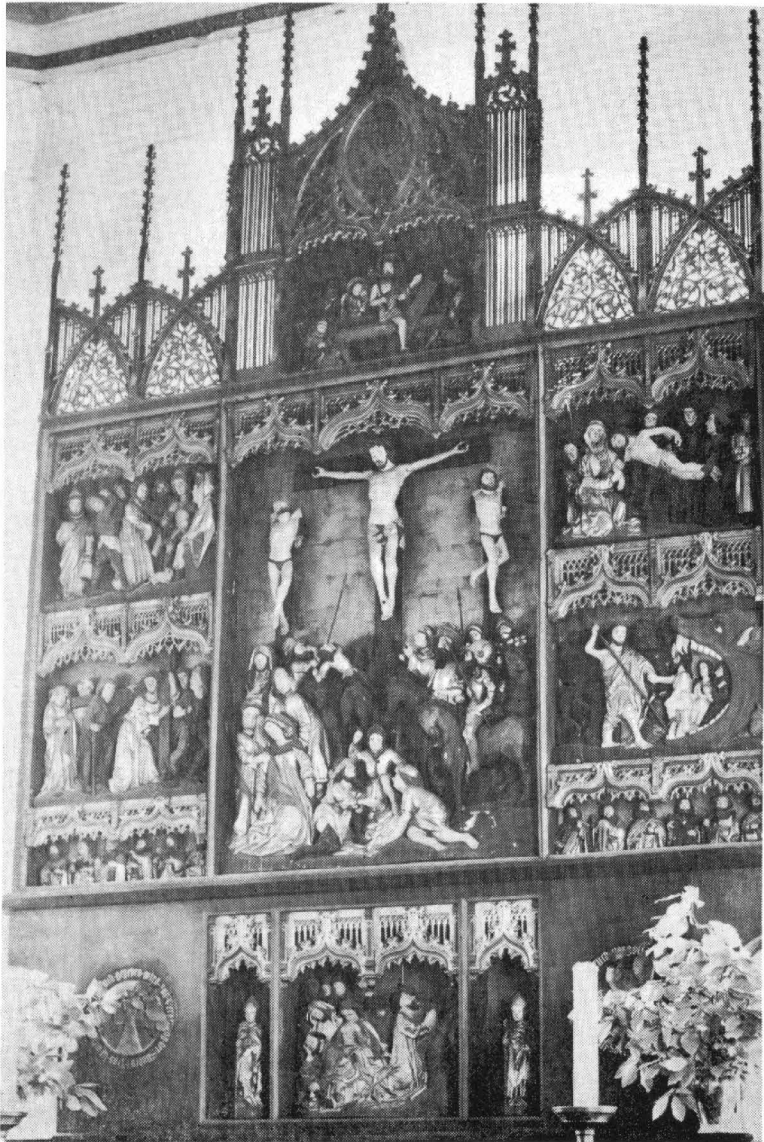

## GERMAN ANCESTORS

It was through the efforts of Mr. Oscar Hausbrand that we were able to prove, among other things, that the Friedrich Elling of Monee, Illinois, was christened Johann Friedrich Peter Elling, born at Riepe, on Nov. 14, 1829. The Christoph Elling of Monee, Ill. was christened Georg Heinrich Christoph Elling, born at Mengebostel, on Oct. 15, 1821. These two men were brothers. Their parents were Heinrich Jacob Elling and Catharina Magdalene (Castens).

It was from this point that Mr. Hausbrand was able to search out the earlier ancestors. The earliest reference pertaining to the family name of Elling that Mr. Hausbrand came across was in the book, "Die Heidmark" by Hans Stuhlmacher of Fallingbostel.

Extract from Book Die Heidmark by Hans Stuhlmacher, 1935.

"S. 105 r Schon im Jahr 1363 findet man in Walsrode den Namen Coneke Allinges (= Elling)."

Also in this same book: "Anno 1438 bought their liberty: Henneke Ellinges in Jettebrocke, Beke his wife, Geseke, Herman, Hennecke, Aleke, Gheseke and Metteke, their children, and Tileke, his brother, Geseke, the wife of him, and Aleke, their daughter."

No effort was made to establish a connection between these two Ellinges families and our ancestors. Reliable records for the period prior to 1600 are not easy to come by.

At the time that I decided to write this story it was to be the story of Mr. Friedrich Elling and his direct line descendents. That is why he was given the number 1 and his generation was referred to as the first generation. I had no intention to trace back earlier ancestors in earlier generations. As it was originally written we had about 100 Ellings, all of whom lived in the United States, covering 5 generations, all in a rather near and easily understood package. Now we have 170 Ellings, covering 13 generations. That portion of the book that deals with the Ellings that lived in the United States was already written, and much of it was set up in type before I had any information on the German Ancestors. This explains why the German ancestors are numbered (G - 1), (G - 2), etc, and the German generations are numbered 1 through 8. In the German numbering system (G - 22) Johann Friedrich Peter 8 Elling is the same individual as Friedrich 1 Elling, (1). This is the only instance where we have an individual appearing in both numbering systems.

If no children are listed it does not necessarily mean that they did not have any children. It means that we did not run across any record of any children.

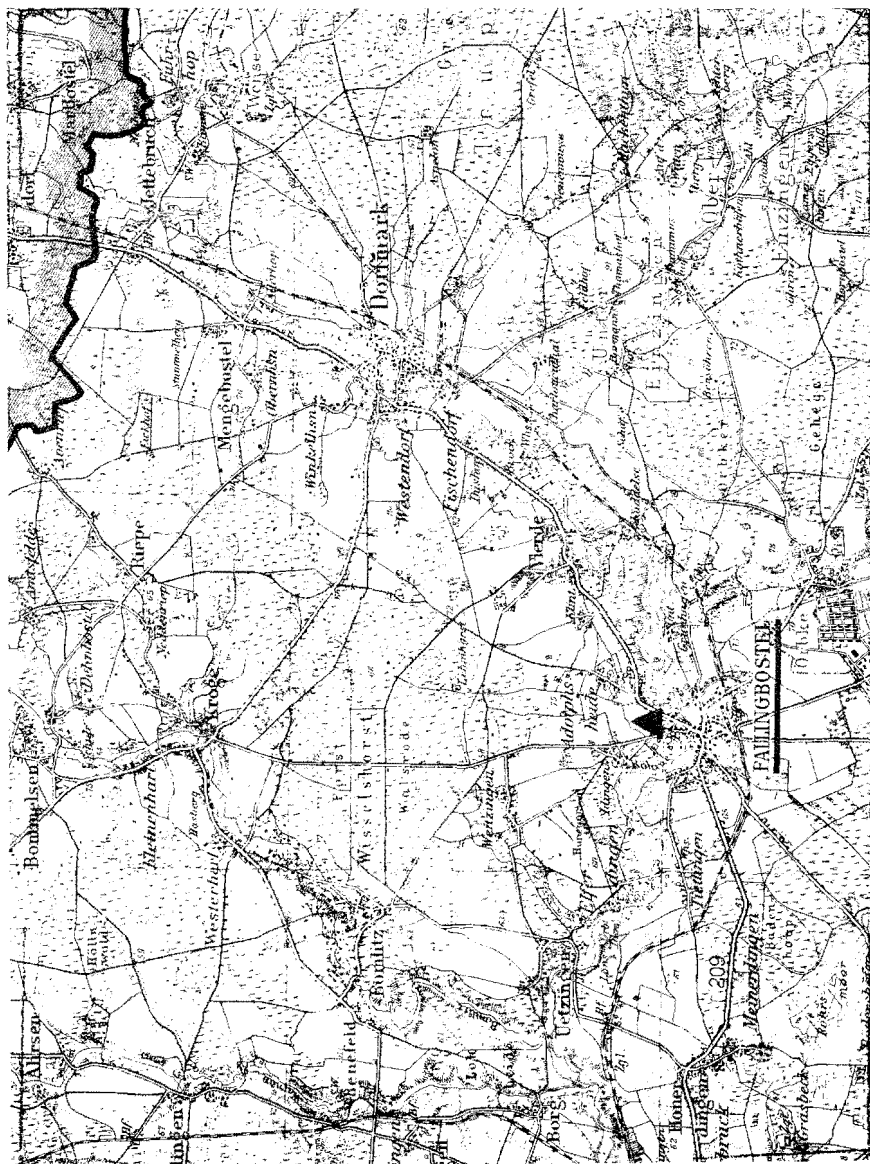
Albert 3 Ellinges, (G - 5) (Michael 2, HanS 1), son of Michael Ellinges was born on 2.p.Ep. 1662. The name of his wife unknown. They lived in Jettebrock. Albert Ellinges was buried on 13 Dec. 1720, age 59 years. His wife was born about 1669, was buried on 10 April, 1717, age 48 years.

Footnote - HanS 3 Ellinges, (G - 4), was still using this spelling of his name when his son Wilhelm was born in 1706. Albert Ellinges (G - 5), used this form of the name when his son Michael was born in 1703. When his son HanS was born in 1707 Albert spelled his name Ellings. In all of the records subsequent to 1707, that I have seen, the name is either spelled Ellings or Elling.

The date of her birth is not known exactly; however she was born in March, 1696. The date of their marriage is unknown. They lived in Jettebrock. She was buried on 6 April, 1749, age 53 years less 8 days. Michael Ellings died on 29 Nov. 1758, age 70 years, 8 months.

They lived in Jettebrock. Wilhelm Ellings died on 4 April, 1767, age 61 years, 8 weeks, and 4 days. Maria Engel Ellings died on 19 April, 1772, age 59 years, 12 weeks.

HanS 5 Ellings, (G - 8) (Michael 4, HanS 3, Michael 2, HanS 1), son of Michael Ellings, was bapt. 20.p. Trin. 1714. HanS Ellings married Maria Meyer of Eintlingen on 14 Nov., 1743. They lived at Jettebruch. Maria Meyer was bapt. on 18 p. Trin, 1718. HanS Ellings died on 5 June, 1765, age 51 years, 19 weeks. On 18 (?) April, 1766 the widow Maria Meyer Ellings married Hans Jurgen Kroeger of Jettebruch. Sometime between 27 Aug., 1756 and 6 March, 1759, HanS Ellings changed the spelling of his name from HanS Ellings to Hans Elling.

## CHAPTER II

### THE FIRST GENERATION

Frederick 1 Elling, (1), is the same individual as G - 22. Johann Friedrich Peter 8 Elling Friedrich Elling was born in Riepe, Dorfmark, Hannover Province, Germany, on Nov. 14, 1829; died in Cashion, Oklahoma on Sept. 3, 1912, buried at Cashion, Oklahoma. Friedrich Elling married on Jan. 5, 1857 at Monee, Illinois, Johanna Baker. It is indicated in a number of places that Johanna and her brothers and sisters were born in or near Sulbeck, Einbeck County, Hannover Province, Germany. Johanna Baker was born on Sept. 13, 1837; died in Cashion, Oklahoma on Sept. 23, 1919, buried at Cashion, Oklahoma.

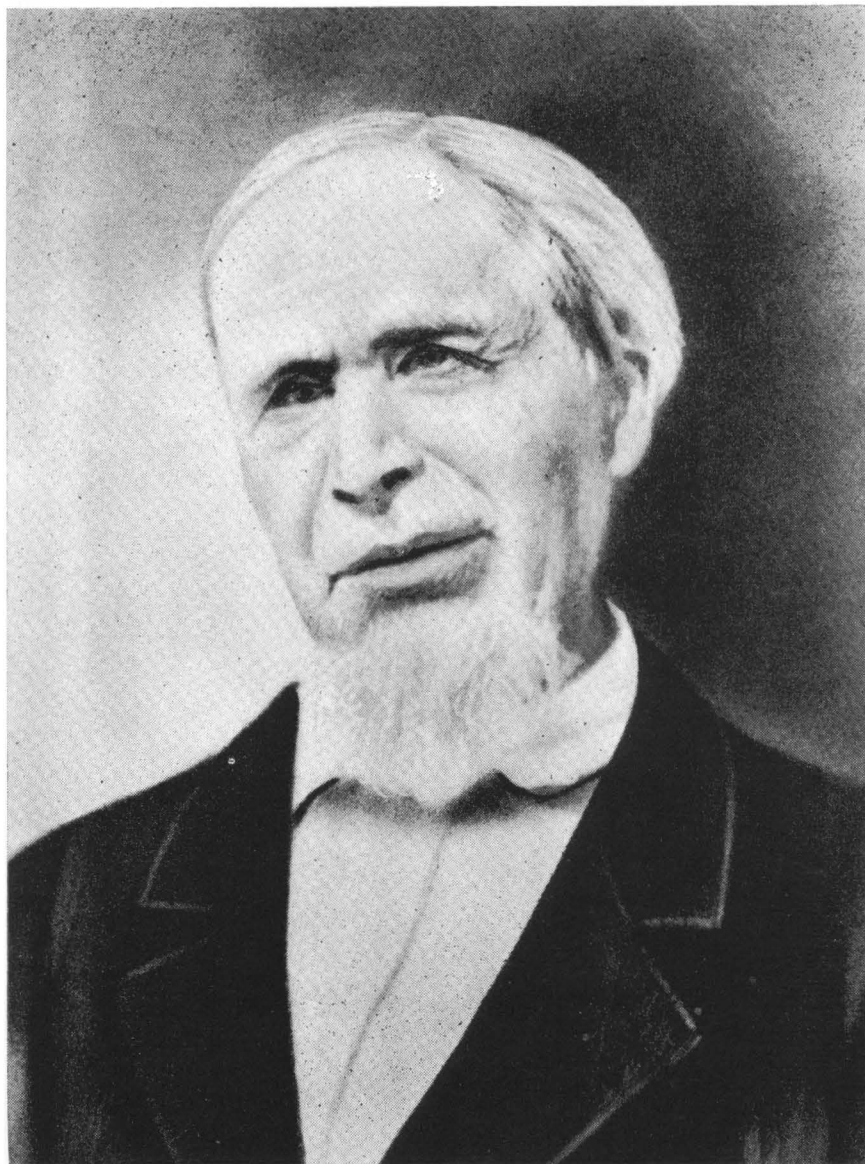
The name of Baker, at least in the nineteenth century, was unknown in Germany. Before coming to this country, Johanna and all of her brothers and sisters used the name of Bocker. Even as late as 1881, Mr. and Mrs. Elling wrote their names - Friedrich Elling and Johanna Bocker Elling, (note d). Johanna Baker was about thirteen years old when both of her parents were killed by an epidemic of Cholera. Johanna had eight brothers and sisters, the names of seven of them, not necessarily in order of age - Christoph, William, George, Louise, Georgiana, Henry and August. Henry Baker was in America at the time of his parents death. He went back to Germany and brought his brothers and sisters over to America. This would have been approximately 1856. The Bakers also came to Monee, Illinois. They must have stayed in Monee for a few years, the 1860 census records indicate that August Baker was a farmer in the vicinity of Monee, and it is believed that George Baker and Louise Baker spent most of their lives in or near Monee. William Baker was a harness maker and spent most of his life in Champaign, Illinois. Sometime after 1860, Christoph and Georgiana Baker came out to Leavenworth and Wyandotte Counties in Kansas. August Baker served in the Civil War and did not settle in Wyandotte County until about 1870.

For a period of approximately two years, when he was about 18 years old, Mr. Frederick Elling worked on a ship going between Germany and the United States. In the year of approximately 1854 he and his brother Christoph came to the United States to stay. It would be reasonable to suppose that Frederick and Christoph Elling came to the United States at the same time. Perhaps this information can be searched out at some later date. They undoubtedly took passage out of Bremen and arrived at New York City. Libraries quite often have passenger lists of ships that carried early settlers to America. It would be interesting to know the name of the ship, date of arrival, etc.

Mr. Christoph Elling and Katharina Franzen were married in Monee, date of marriage unknown. Katharina Franzen was from the village of Erfde in the German Province of Schleswig-Holstein. She was born in 1836. Christoph Elling and his family lived in Monee, Ill. until about 1874, when they moved to Chicago. Christoph Elling, like his brother Frederick, was a carpenter.

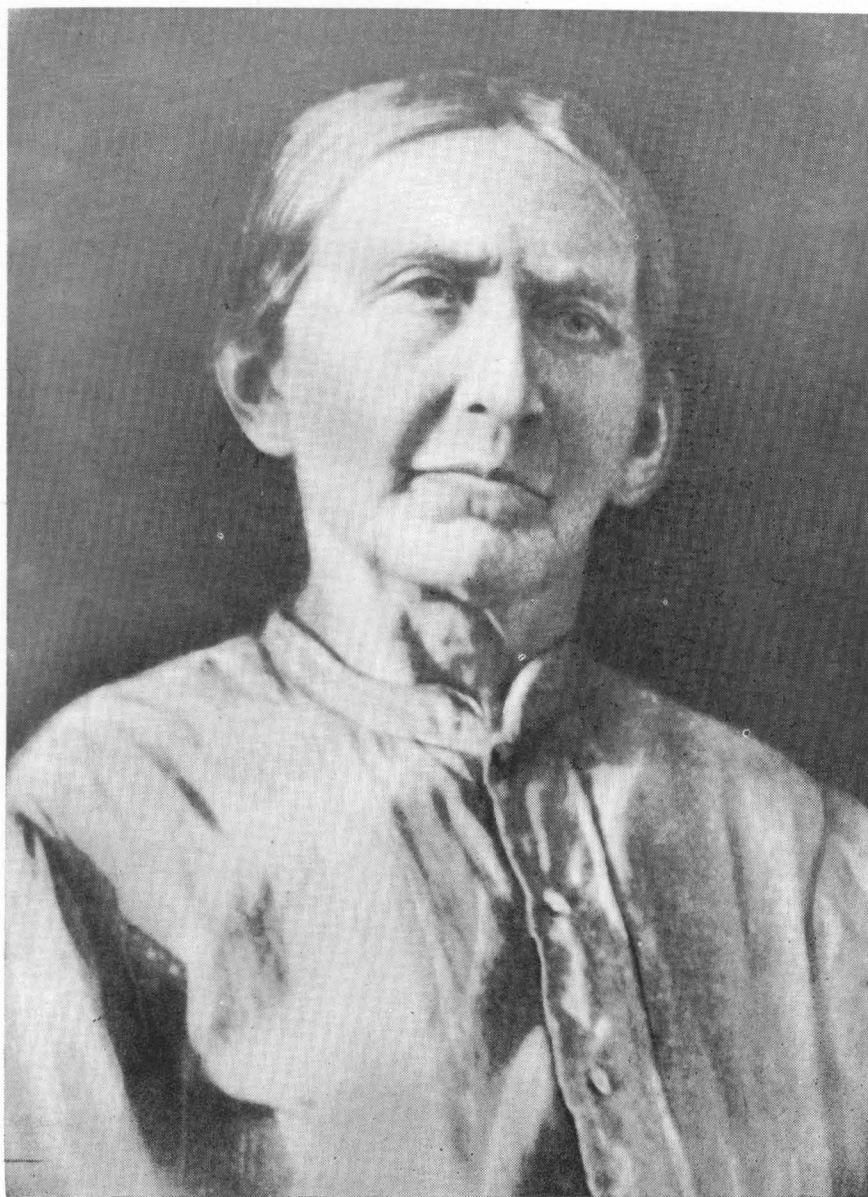

This is all the information that I have on the Christoph Elling Family. Christoph Elling passed away on April 5, 1877. The records of W. W. Fern and Sons, Undertakers, Chicago, reveal that Katharina Elling married a second time. The name of her second husband was Schmidt. Hannover, Germany is again mentioned in the records of W. W. Fern and Sons as being the birthplace of Mr. Christoph Elling, but they do not indicate whether they are referring to the town or the providence. Katharina Elling Schmidt passed away in 1919. Mr. Christoph Elling and his wife, Katharina, are buried in the St. Paul's Cemetery, Monee, Illinois. Mrs. Olive Elling, the widow of Christoph George Friedrich Elling is living in Chicago at 8709 South Morgan Street.

It would have been late summer or the fall of 1882 that the Frederick Elling Family came to Kansas. The original purchase of land near Valley Falls, Kansas, consisted of 160 acres that Frederick bought from John Fisher for twelve hundred dollars. It had no buildings or improvements on it and the Ellings lived with the Fishers until their household effects arrived from Monee. John Fisher and his wife Elizabeth had five children. In the year of 1882 the ages of the children would have been approximately as follows: Joseph 21, John 19, Louis 17, Ellen 13, and Martha 7. We will have occasion to refer to the Fisher Family later on; however, I should mention at this time that Martha, better known as "Mattie" married a Mr. Hilty. Mrs. Mattie Hilty is living at 913 Frazer Street, Valley Falls, Kansas. I am indebted to her for her assistance in getting some of this information together.

## THE ELLING FAMILIES

The farm was located about one and a half miles north of North Cedar, which is, or was, about five miles west of Valley Falls. There is not much left of North Cedar now, the railroad freight depot has been torn down. Sometime later Mr. Frederick Elling bought an additional 120 acres just across the road to the south from the original 160 acres.

Frederick had built and operated a gristmill in Monee. When they moved to Kansas this gristmill was dismantled and shipped out to Valley Falls. The mill as originally designed had twelve metal "stompers", which operated somewhat in the fashion of pistons hanging down from a crankshaft but without cylinder walls. There were I believe three crankshafts with four "stompers" hanging from each one. This arrangement apparently was not satisfactory and two grinding stones were obtained to replace the "stompers". The original design also had a small windmill mounted on the top. This small windmill was designed and geared in such a fashion as to turn the large windmill into the wind. This arrangement was used in both Monee and Valley Falls, but was later replaced with a large "tail-fin", twelve feet long and three and one-half feet wide. This tail and also the large "Dutch windmill" type blades that provided the power for the mill were made out of Blue Poplar.

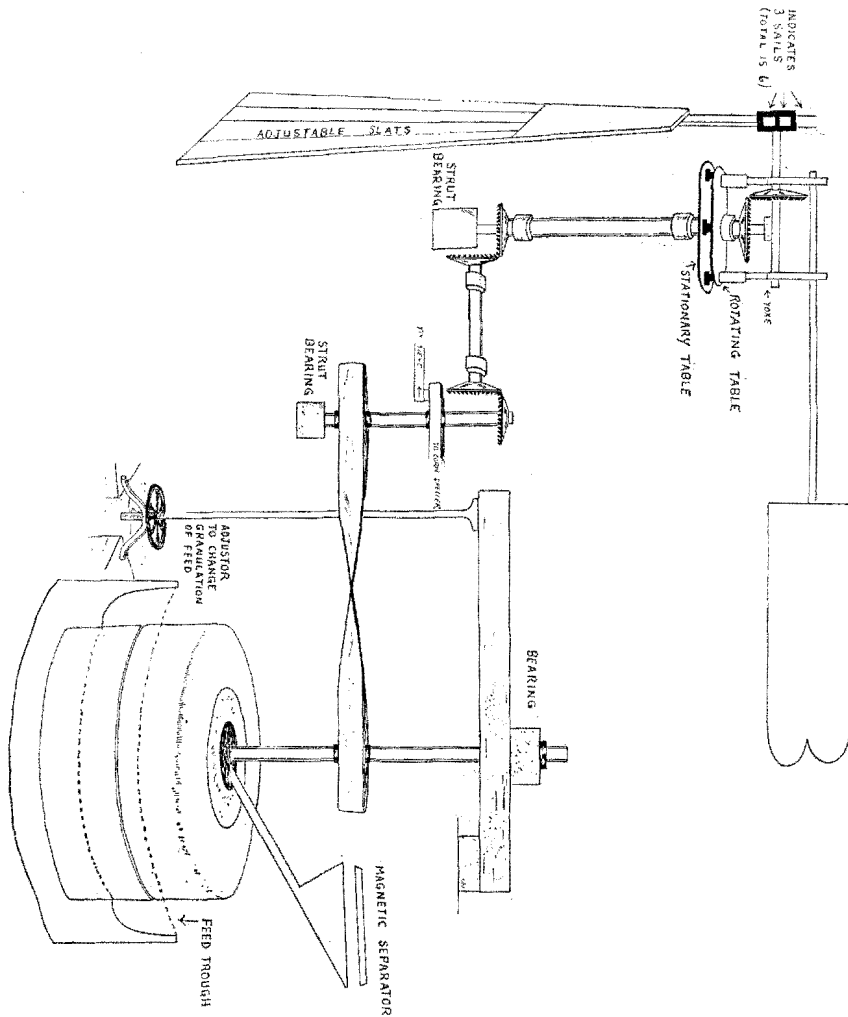
The six blades of the "windmill" extended out twelve and one-half feet from the shaft. The inner four feet of each blade was mounted in a fixed position; however, the outer six feet could be feathered to reduce the "bite" in case the wind was too strong. The shaft leading from the "windmill" was geared to a vertical shaft, 35 feet long, this was geared to a five foot horizontal shaft which in turn was geared to a four foot vertical shaft. On this four foot shaft was mounted a wooden pulley, five feet in diameter and seven inches thick. This large pulley rotated in a horizontal plane, and drove by means of a six inch leather belt, a smaller wooden pulley, likewise mounted in a horizontal plane. The distance between these two pulleys was sixteen feet, center to center. The vertical shaft of the small pulley transmitted the power to the upper grinding stone. This upper stone must have weighed approximately five hundred pounds. The bottom stationary stone weighed approximately eight hundred pounds. There was some sort of an arrangement which permitted the upper stone to be raised and lowered thereby changing the granulation of the feed that was being ground, also the upper stone, by means of a windlass, could be lifted out of position and to one side so that both it and the bottom stone could be re-dressed. Solid steel shafting, two inches in diameter, was used to carry the power from the "windmill" to the grinding stones. Altogether there was fifty feet of this shafting. The mill was also equipped with two large magnetic separators which prevented any scraps of metal from getting in between the grinding stones. Frederick Elling ground the feed for five cents a bag.

In 1902, sometime in the early part of the year, Frederick and Johanna Elling moved to Cashion, Oklahoma. They had a small house in the northern part of Cashion and also five acres of land just outside of Cashion.

### OBITUARY OF FREDERICK ELLING

Frederick Elling was born at Bremen, Germany, October 14, 1829, and died at Cashion, Okla., Sept. 3, 1912, age 82 years, 10 months, 19 days. Mr. Elling came to the United States in 1854, and lived in Illinois twenty-six years. Was married to Miss Johanna Baker January 5, 1857. To this union was born twelve children, of which three preceded him to the great beyond. In the year 1881 he and famiy moved to Kansas, where they lived near North Cedar twenty-two years, moving to Cashion, Okla., nine years ago, where he lived until his death. His wife, Mrs. Johanna Elling, and children, Mrs. Ricka Fisher, Mrs. Lee Wright, of Cashion; Minnie Elling, of Topeka, Kansas; Geo. F. Elling, of Valley Falls, Kansas; Bernard Elling, of Cashion, Okla.; Edward Elling, of Kansas City, Kansas; Otto H. Elling, of Lawton, Okla.; Albert Elling, of Bashor, Kansas; Carl Elling, of Nowata, Okla.; and Mr. and Mrs. Will Steinbeck, of Leavenworth, Kansas, were all present at the funeral to bid farewell to the remains of a kind and loving father.

Mr. Elling joined the Lutheran church at the age of 29 and has been a faithful member ever since.

## CHAPTER III

### THE SECOND GENERATION

Louisa 2 Elling, (2) (Frederick 1), daughter of Frederick and Johanna (Baker) Elling, was born in Monee, Illinois on Jan. 5, 1861; died in Leavenworth, Kansas on Nov. 9, 1907, buried in Leavenworth, Kansas. Louisa Elling married on Oct. 14, 1884 (?), probably at Denison, Kans., Philip Klamm. His parentage is unknown. Philip Klamm was born in Germany, in 1859; died Oct. 26, 1923 at Leavenworth, Kansas, buried in Leavenworth, Kansas.

Philip and Louise Klamm lived in Leavenworth, Kansas. Philip Klamm was a meat broker. He would buy from the packing house his assortment of meats which consisted of items such as liver sausage, smoked sausage, salimi, smoked herring and cold sliced ham. His stock would be loaded on to a horse drawn delivery wagon and he would take off. He sold primarily to restaurants and saloons. He undoubtedly had many opportunities for a sociable glass of beet or a shot of whiskey. But he also had a route to cover each day. He was his own boss. He did not let the social aspects of the situation interfere with the business at hand.

George F. Elling married on Nov. 13, 1889, at North Cedar, Kansas, Anna Sills. Anna Sills was born in 1869, died 1949, buried at Valley Falls, Kansas.

The following article appeared in the Nov. 16, 1917 issue of the Farmer's Vindicator, a weekly newspaper published in Valley Falls, Kansas.

### DEATH OF GEORGE ELLING

"After a short illness, George Elling died at his home in Valley Falls Sunday morning, surrounded by his wife and near relatives. Wednesday two weeks ago, he returned home from the Eldorado Oil fields where he had been working with Johnny Dodge, not feeling well, "tired and sleepy," he said.

He grew worse and a physician was called. The patient was found to be suffering with a severe attack of typhoid. While is was generally known that he was seriously ill his death brought a shock to the community.

George F. Elling was born at Monee, Illinois, December 5, 1862, and died at Valley Falls, Kansas, Nov. 11, 1917, aged 54 years, 11 months

and 6 days. With his parents George moved to Valley Falls, Kansas, in 1882. They located on a farm a few miles north of North Cedar. He was married to Anna Sills, at North Cedar on November 13, 1889. To this union was born one daughter, who died in infancy. Only six years ago they moved to the city of Valley Falls where he was engaged in the lumber and implement business for awhile.

He is survived by his aged mother at Cashion, Okla., where several members of the family located after the death of the father, and five brothers and three sisters, Bernard Elling, Mrs. Ricka Fisher and Mrs. Anna Wright of Cashion, Okla., Minnie Elling of Topeka, Ed J. Elling of Kansas City, Kansas, Otto H. Elling of Lawton, Okla., Albert H. Elling of Basehor and Carl G. Elling of Parsons, Kansas.

His father and one brother, August, and two sisters, Mrs. Louisa Klamm and Freda Elling, preceded him in death.

He was a member of the Lutheran Church and an Odd Fellow, and in the community where he lived so long he leaves a host of friends to mourn his sudden departure.

The funeral was held from the home Tuesday afternoon, Dr. Holmes Dysinger of Atchison conducting the services in the presence of many friends. The Kendall quartette sang "A Perfect Day" and "Nearer My God to Thee", by request. After the sermon the Odd Fellows, attending in a body, took charge of the remains over which they rendered the service of that order, at the grave. The burial was in the Rose Hill Cemetery on the anniversary of their wedding 28 years ago.

The members of his family, except his mother, who was not able to come so far, and brother Otto, attended the funeral, besides some other relatives from abroad. The bereaved wife and all have the sympathy of many relatives and friends."

I have been told that Mrs. Anna Sills Elling married a Mr. Albert Herbert of South Dakota a few years after the death of Mr. George Elling. I have no definite information on this matter. She is buried beside Mr. George Elling in the cemetery at Valley Falls, Kansas. The stone reads.

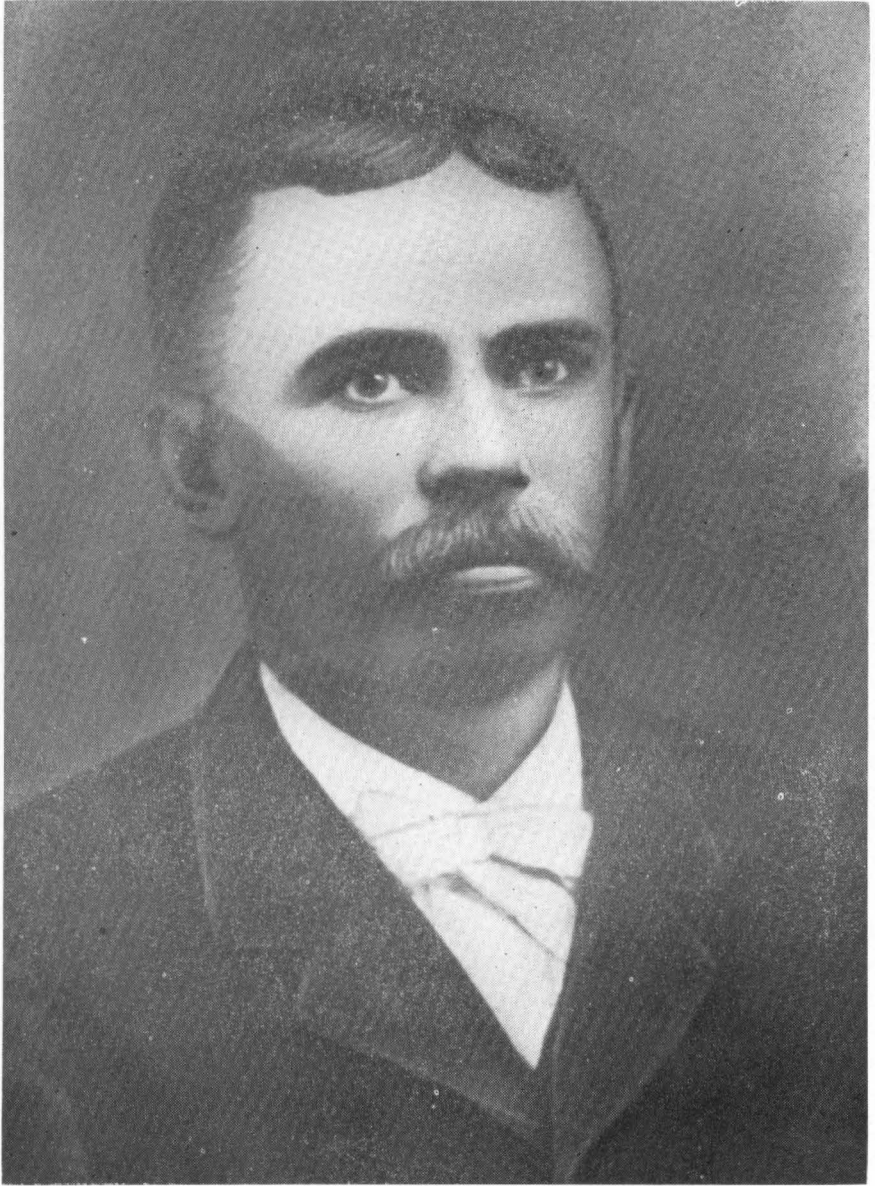

Bernard Paul Elling would have been about 25 years old when he left the home place in Valley Falls and went to Oklahoma. I do not know the exact year that he went to Oklahoma, but his children have informed me that it would have been either in the spring of 1889 when the Oklahoma Territory was opened for homesteading, or within a year or so of this date. Bernard's homestead was located three miles northeast of Cashion. He was a hard worker, but also a neat and meticulous farmer. His rows of corn had to be absolutely straight. He would sight along the rows and if there was a bend or crook in the row, the offending corn plants would be chopped out. Like his brother, Edward, Bernard played the violin.

Amelia Elling was a good example of so many of the women that pioneered the Oklahoma Territory. She worked hard, but she also found time to take an active part in church and neighborhood affairs. She was never too busy to sit up with a sick friend or to help them out in their time of need. She enjoyed quilting. Somehow or other Amelia Elling found the time to make a quilt for all of her children and the earlier grandchildren.

After living on the original homestead for a number of years, Bernard traded it for another quarter section of land located just across the road to the south of the Lee Wright farm.

Mrs. Amelia Elling passed away on Dec. 15, 1944. Mr. Bernard Elling passed away on Dec. 22, 1950. To the members of this family Christmas Time will bring forth memories of previous happy occasions, but each member of this family, whether he or she mentions it or not, will also, at Christmas Time, be reminded of some other occasions that were not so happy.

Ricka 2 Elling, (5), (Frederick 1), daughter of Frederick and Johanna (Baker) Elling, was born in Monee, Illinois on Oct. 14, 1866; died in St. Joseph, Missouri, on Aug. 20, 1956, buried in Valley Falls, Kansas. Ricka Elling married on March 18 1888, possibly in Holton, Kansas, John Ulrich Fisher, son of Mr. and Mrs. John Fisher of North Cedar, Kansas. John Ulrich Fisher was born on July 17, 1862, died May 20, 1906, buried in Valley Falls.

It will be recalled that when the Ellings arrived in Valley Falls, Kansas from Monee, Illinois, they stayed with Mr. and Mrs. John Fisher and their family. Mr. and Mrs. John Fisher had five children - Joseph, John, Louis, Ellen and Martha. So it should come as no great surprise that one of the Fisher boys would marry one of the Elling girls. John Ulrich Fisher married Ricka Elling.

For a period of several years, John Fisher and his family had rented a farm located three-quarters of a mile south and two miles west of North Cedar, Kansas. In the year of 1905, John Fisher bought a 108 acre farm not far from the place that he had been renting. During the course of the winter of 1905-1906, he built a new house and put up other improvements on the farm that he had recently acquired. On May 20, 1906, John Fisher had gone down to the farm to nail the last of the shingles on a new hen house. The Fisher Family had not yet moved into their new home. Actually the house was not completely finished. The following newspaper articles relates the circumstances and events that subsequently took place.

### A TREACHEROUS TRIGGER JOHN FISHER ACCIDENTALLY SHOT BY HIS BEST FRIEND SUNDAY WHEN THE SUN WAS LOW

*At Fisher's new house they were trying Jas. Green's new hammerless gun when the fatal shot was fired.*

A shocking tragedy happened on Cedar last Sunday.

At his new farm house in Jackson County, two miles west of North Cedar, John U. Fisher was accidently shot and killed, instantly, with a hammerless double-barrelled shot gun in the hands of his best friend, Otto VanGaasbeek, Sunday afternoon about 5 o'clock. The full charge of shot passing through the flesh of his left arm entered the left breast at the heart. He dropped to his knees, for a moment, fell forward and expired without uttering a word, though he seemed to try to speak, in death the smile on his face remained.

The news of the sad and terrible accident reached here about sundown, in a telephone call for undertaker Schuler. The coroner of Jackson County, Dr. Darlington at Denison, was promptly notified and early Monday morning summoned a jury and witnesses to the scene of the tragedy. After a hearing of the testimony in the case the jury consisting of Corneal Coleman, Mat Brown, Dan Coleman, John Renfro, F. A. Cannady and C. P. Johnson, returned a verdict to the effect that the deceased came to his death by the accidental discharge of a new hammerless gun in the hands of Otto VanGaasbeck.

How the accident happened and the circumstances leading up to it are here briefly recorded. Johnny Fisher had about finished building a nice house on the Hoxie farm he had purchased a few months ago, and intended to move into it this week. That Sunday morning he had shown the new house to his aged mother. The old home is about 40 rods away. In the afternoon he and his neighbor, Otto Van, were on the premises when Jas. Green, an engineer at Waddel's saw mill near by, came along and joined them, being on his way to Otto's to show him a new hammerless gun with safety lock.

After examining it awhile Fisher proposed they try it and see who could put the most shot in a tossed block or part of board. Otto tossed the block and Fisher made the first shot, a good one, putting more than 20 shot in the wooden "bird". Then Otto essayed to try his marksmanship on a similar target which Johnny went to toss up. With gun in hand, Otto awaited the pleasure of Johnny to cast the "bird", when from oversight, or lapse of caution, the trigger was pulled and the gun prematurely discharged just as Johnny was stopping to pick up the target at close range and - the awful deed was done! He had depended on the safety lock which Johnny had failed to reset, or did not realize that the other barrel was loaded as he was used to regular target shooting and the rule of only loading one barrel at a time for safety. The sudden change from joy to sadness palled on Otto. From the impression to the realization of the killing of his boyhood friend a sense of horror overcame him and his mind became almost unbalanced over the heartrending, terrible homicide, and for days his mental and physical condition was lamentable. He brooded over it in silent remorse. For his peace of soul he would willingly exchanged places with his friend. But it was purely an accident. He could not help it, now.

John U. Fisher was born in Leavenworth City, July 17, 1862. At that time his father, who died on Cedar a few years ago, was in the employ of the Government, freighting to Ft. Scott, Ft. Smith and other points.

March 1st 1888, he was married to Miss Ricka Elling. To them two daughters were born, Tura, age 17 and Fay, 15, who with his wife, mother, two sisters, Mrs. Wm. Duncanson and Mrs. John Gillies, and Brother, Joseph, survive him.

Truly death leaves a shining mark for Johnny as everybody called him, was kind and good natured. He was loved and respected by all who knew him for the sunshine in his soul.

The funeral was held from the home Tuesday morning at 10 o'clock, Rev. Herbst, of Effingham, officiating. The remains were laid to rest in Rose Hill Cemetery near this city.

The bereaved family have the sympathy of many friends. He carried a comfortable sum of Life Insurance." a

A short time after the death of her husband, Mrs. Ricka Fisher and her two daughters, Tura and Faye Eva, went to work and finished their new home. They painted the outside of the house, varnished the inside woodwork, put up the wall paper and put on the finishing touches, which really amounted to a great deal of good hard work. They moved into their new home.

Mrs. Ricka Fisher, with the help of her two daughters, ran the farm for a year. The following year, on February 26, 1908, Tura Fisher married David Harrison Renfro. Mrs. Ricka Fisher and Faye Eva moved to Meriden about this same time. David and Tura Renfro stayed on the farm. Mrs.

Ricka Fisher did not stay in Meriden, Kansas for more than three or four years. When she learned that her father, who was living in Cashion, Oklahoma, was in failing health she went down to Cashion to be with her parents. After the death of Frederick Elling, Mrs. Ricka Fisher, in all probability, stayed on in Cashion, Oklahoma to be with her mother. Mrs. Frederick Elling passed away on Sept. 23, 1919.

Mrs. Ricka Fisher came back up to Valley Falls. David and Tura Renfro had long since left Mrs. Ricka Fisher's farm, but she continued to retain ownership of it and had been renting it out. It was about this time that many banks were closing their doors and Mrs. Ricka Fisher was one of the many victims of the era. She lost all of the money that she had been able to accumulate up to that time. She took a position as a housekeeper for an aged widower for the salary of \$5.00 per week and room and board. Most of this wage she saved over a period of years, and then, when most women would have been content to ease up and start taking things easy, Ricka purchased a rather large and old house in Valley Falls. About all that it could boast was one electric light cord coming down from the ceiling in the middle of each room. She divided this old house into small apartments which, in those days, were known as housekeeping room. As the income permitted she modernized the house and in due time each apartment had modern lighting and plumbing facilities. From the income of this remodeled property and her farm, she was able to provide for her maintenance.

Among the happy recollections of Faye Alpha, granddaughter of Ricka, - "The times I stopped to see her after school and we spent many hours at the piano, playing and singing the good old fashioned church songs together," "Rock of Ages", "Let the Lower Lights Be Burning" and so on. Until her eye sight failed her in her late 80's, you could often hear her playing the piano as you approached the house.

"One of the fine lessons she taught me was - "It isn't what you make that counts - it is how you spend and what you save." I'm confident her words of wisdom and her preservance in the face of hardships were great examples to her daughters, my mother Tura, and my aunt Faye Eva. In their way they have handed down Grandmother Ricka's teachings and examples to my generation.

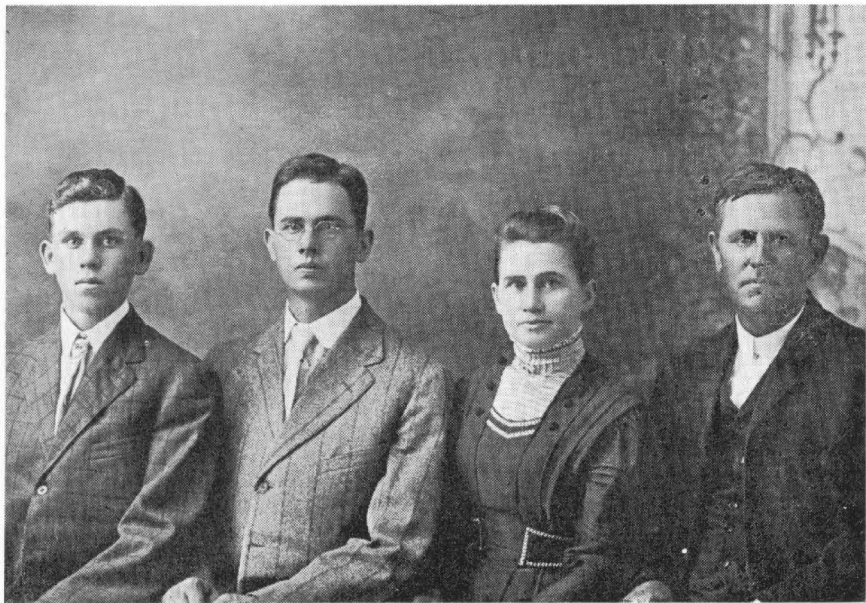

Anna Georgia 2 Elling, (6), Frederick 1), daughter of Frederick and Johanna (Baker) Elling, was born in Monee, Illinois on Oct. 19, 1868; died in Guthrie, Okla. on Sept. 16, 1953, buried in Cashion, Okla. Anna Georgia Elling married on Sept. 5, 1888, at Leavenworth, Kansas, Albert Lee Wright. I have not been able to obtain the names of Albert Lee Wrights' parents, the date when he was born or the name of the town in which he was born. Albert Lee Wright died Nov. 15, 1930, buried in Cashion, Oklahoma.

Albert Lee Wright always went by the name of Lee Wright. He entered Oklahoma territory, along with 50,000 other people on April 22, 1889. This was the date when the Okla. Territory was opened for homesteading. He located three miles southwest of Cashion, Oklahoma. Anna did not go into the Oklahoma Territory with her husband. After Lee Wright had gone to Oklahoma, we would be pretty safe in assuming that Anna lived in Valley Falls, Kansas until after her first son, Harley was born. She then joined her husband on the homestead. This arrangement also gave Lee Wright a few months to build a house in which to live in. As I understand it all of the original homesteads consisted of 160 acres. Somewhere along the line, Lee Wright purchased an adjoining 160 acres.

#### ANNA G. WRIGHT

Anna G. Wright was born at Monee, Ill., Oct. 19, 1868; died at the Guthrie Hospital Sept. 16, 1953, at the age of 84 years, 10 months and 28 days. She was the daughter of Frederick and Johanna Elling.

She was confirmed in the Lutheran Church on April 2, 1882.

On Sept. 5, 1888 she was married to Albert Lee Wright at Leavenworth, Kansas. He preceded her in death Nov. 15, 1930.

Mr. Wright made the run into Oklahoma on April 22, 1889. She joined him a few months later on the homestead three miles southwest of Cashion.

Minnie Margaret 2 Elling, (7), Frederick 1), daughter of Frederick and Johanna (Baker) Elling was born in Monee, Illinois, on Nov. 26, 1870. Minnie Elling never married. She died in Topeka, Kansas on Dec. 7, 1957, buried in Valley Falls, Kansas.

When I was a youngster between ten and twenty years old (1930 - 1940) I didn't know very many of my father's brothers and sisters. I can recall that I had met Aunt Ricka and Uncle Ed and Aunt Rose. I'm sure that, at one time or another I had met most or all of them, but at that time, baseball and football were more important than aunts and uncles. I have lived to regret the poor judgment that I exercised when I was a boy. I have learned more about the Elling Family in the last year than I had in the previous thirty years. You will have noticed by now that all of the emphasis in this book has been placed on the first and second generations. I have tried to include all of the information that I have, so long as it is in good taste and worth while insofar as it reflects the personality of the person concerned. I know that there is a vast amount of information about the Ellings of the second generation that rightfully belongs in this book.

As a boy, I had "met" a number of my other aunts and uncles, but I "knew" Aunt Minnie. She was a lady that possessed considerable "spark". I cannot conceive a situation in which, if Aunt Minnie was present, there would be such a thing as a lull in the conversation. She wasn't the talkative, chatter-box type, she was just alive, vibrant, happy and full of ideas. I rather guess that when with people of her own age - she just plain wore them out with all of her excess vitality. I suspect that she had a grain of determination in her make-up. If she wanted to do something the chances are pretty good that she went right ahead and did it. I recall picnics in Gage Park in Topeka with Aunt Minnie. She would have been no less than sixty years old at the time. I don't recall that she was domineering with her nieces and nephews, but a youngster of ten or fifteen years of age stood less chance of pulling off some mischief with Aunt Minnie around than he would have when he was under the close scrutiny of his own parents.

Minnie Elling worked for the Crosby Brothers Department Store in Topeka. The following notice appeared in the Dec. 8, 1957 issue of the Topeka Daily Capital newspaper:

### MISS MINNIE ELLING

"Miss Minnie Margaret Elling, 87, of 521 Huntoon, died Saturday in a Topeka nursing home. She was born at Monee, Ill., and entered the nursing home May 14, 1953. Miss Elling was a retired seamstress.

Surviving are two brothers, Ed Elling, Kansas City, and Carl Elling, Manhattan, and a number of nieces and nephews including Mrs. Mildred Ratz, Valley Falls.

Services will be at 9:30 a.m. Monday at the Wall-Diffenderfer Mortuary. Burial will be in Valley Falls Cemetery."

Edward Jerry 2 Elling (8) (Frederick 1), son of Frederick and Johanna (Baker) Elling, was born in Monee, Illinois on May 8, 1873. Edward Jerry Elling married on September 4, 1918 at Kansas City, Missouri, Rose Abeline Shelton Bates. Her maiden name was Shelton. The names of her parents is not known. Rose Abeline Shelton was born on Sept. 4, 1883; died in Kansas City, Kansas on April 6, 1958, buried in Elmwood Cemetery, Kansas City, Mo.

It is in the records of the St. Paul Lutheran Church in Monee, Illinois, that Edward Elling was born on the date indicated above. Both Frederick and Christoph Elling were quite generous when it came to naming their children. Sometimes it appears, that the idea was, the more names the better. And here we have a son that does not even have a middle name. Edward did what he could about the situation by informally adopting the middle name of "Jerry".

Edward Jerry Elling should have been a farmer, he would have been a good one. He might have been a farmer had it not been for circumstances, which at the time were important, but now fifty to sixty years later it might seem that maybe they were mere happenstance. Edward helped out with the farm work at Valley Falls. As near as we can figure it out from my many visits with Uncle Ed, he helped out on the home place until 1899. In 1900 Edward share-cropped 80 acres of corn, on a 50-50 basis. He did quite well, and would have been happy to have continued the arrangement but the man with whom Edward had the share-cropping arrangement did not own the land. He had leased it, and his lease had run out. The following crop year, 1901, Albert was busy farming the land that he had rented. Carl had gone to Manhattan to go to College. Farm help was scarce, so Edward farmed the home place. Before the next crop year rolled around Frederick and Johanna Elling had sold the farm in Valley Falls and had gone down to Cashion, Oklahoma. Edward Elling worked around Valley Falls and Leavenworth for about three years when he received word that his brother Carl Elling was in a Kansas City Hospital. This would have been the fall of 1904. Carl Elling was in Kansas City taking care of preparations for his trip to Cuba when he came down with pneumonia. Edward Elling learned of this while working in the vicinity of Leavenworth. He finished up the job and then came on down to Kansas City on the North Western Railroad. On the train Edward met Mr. Meyers, who had a creamery in Kansas City, Kansas. He told Edward to drop around and see him after he had gotten settled in Kansas City. At the time Edward did not think much about it, but after a couple of weeks he went over to the Meyers Creamery to see Mr. Meyers. Mr. Meyers offered him a job of analyzing and keeping records on the in-coming milk. Edward took the job. That is the story of how Edward Elling happened to settle down in Kansas City, Kansas.

Edward worked for Mr. Meyers until about 1911, when he got typhoid fever. While Edward was in the hospital, two Elling girls, Rose and Lotta, came to see him. They lived on a farm just west of Concordia, Missouri. So far as I know they were not related in any way. After recovering from

typhoid fever Edward Elling went to work for Larson Brothers Wholesale Grocery. He left Larson Brothers and started working for The Armour Packing Co. sometime between 1920 and 1925. He worked at Armour until about 1940.

On Sept. 4, 1918, Edward Elling married Rose Abeline Shelton Bates. Rose Abeline Shelton was born probably in New York or Massachusetts. She married Mr. Edward Bates in the East before they came out to Missouri. Rose and Edward Bates lived in Kansas City, Missouri until his death on April 4, 1914. Mr. Edward Bates is buried in Elmwood Cemetery, Kansas City, Missouri. Rose is buried beside her first husband. Edward J. Elling passed away Oct. 3, 1960, buried in Elmwood Cemetery.

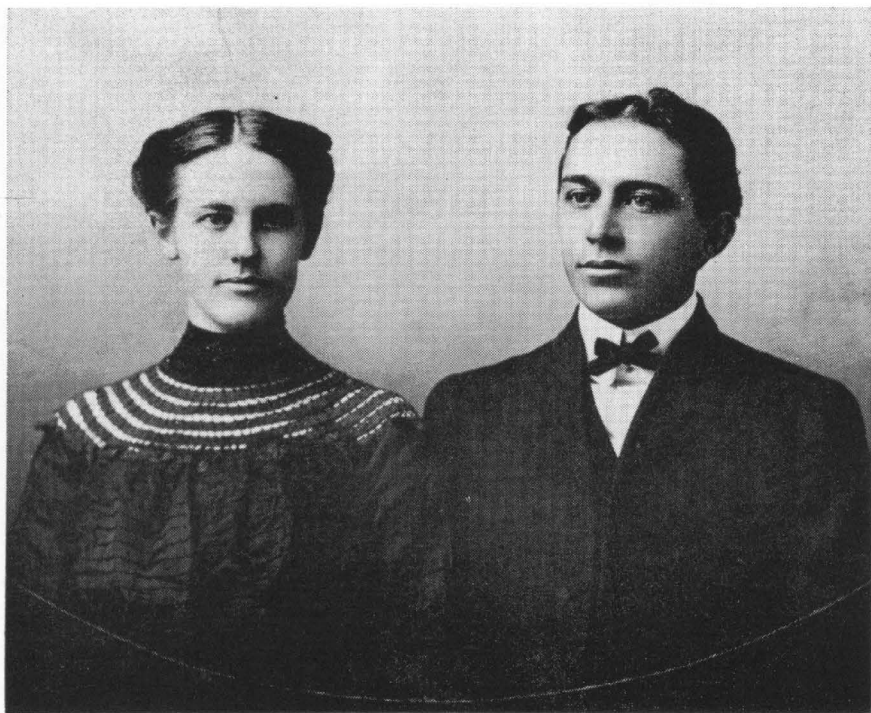

Otto Henry 2 Elling, (9) (Frederick 1), son of Frederick and Johanna (Baker) Elling, was born in Monee, Illinois on Sept. 2, 1877; died at Lawton, Okla. on May 10, 1948 buried in Pecan Cemetery, Lawton, Okla. Otto Henry Elling married April 11, 1904 at Lawton, Okla. Hellen Mae Pool. Hellen Mae Pool was born at Bedford, Iowa, on Feb. 3, 1884; She lives at 2704 Cornell, Lawton, Oklahoma.

"Otto Elling at the age of 19 on Sept. 15, 1896, decided to go to Kansas State College at Manhattan, Kansas. He enrolled there with only the schooling provided by the small country school in Jefferson County. This school was located five miles west of Valley Falls, Kansas and one and a quarter miles south of the Elling farm. Otto never attended high school but by working at farm labor to pay his college expenses and studying diligently he graduated and was presented with a diploma from Kansas State. Otto is to be commended for unusual determination to get a college education by means of his own efforts to work by the hour to meet the college financial obligations as well as to meet the scholastic requirements. After attending college for one or two years Otto was forced by illness to drop out for a year. But the next fall he was back in Manhattan determined to get on with the business at hand. In the years around 1890 to 1900 not many young men reared on farms entertained thoughts that a college education was worth the time, money and labor involved to get it. Otto Elling was one of the first from the Valley Falls area to give it a trial."

After graduating from Kansas State College in 1901, Otto went to Oklahoma. He was working with his brother-in-law, Lee Wright, near Cashion, Oklahoma. One day when they were threshing grain someone mentioned to Otto that he should take a chance on drawing a place in southwestern Oklahoma. He agreed that this sounded like a pretty good idea. His luck was with him on this particular day. His number was in the twelve hundreds, (1246 - ?). Then came the task of going down & selecting a number of quarter sections so that he could give the officials the legal description of the land when his number was called. He had his choice of various quarter sections that he had looked at previously. He chose one of the better quarter sections as indicated by the presence of numerous buffalo wallows. Otto homesteaded this land, which was located near Lawton,

Okla., for approximately three years. During this time he found it expedient to work for Lee Wright for a few months in order to get together sufficient cash to put in the necessary improvements.

On one occasion Otto Elling had been away for some time, in an effort to earn enough money to pay the fee for claiming his quarter section. When he returned he found that a claim jumper has settled down on his land. Had he been delayed a short time or had he been a little less determined to own a farm in that area Otto might have lost his claim. As it was, the claim jumper was ousted and the Elling name became well known in that community.

On April 11, 1904, Otto Elling married Hellen Mae Pool in Lawton, Oklahoma. Shortly after their marriage the Otto Ellings went up to Hays, Kansas, where Otto had accepted a position with the Ft. Hays Experiment Station. Their first two children were born at Hays, Kansas. After about three years Otto quit his position at the Experiment Station and took a job at the Rockefeller Ranch in Kiowa County, Kansas. He worked for the Rockefeller Ranch for a period of somewhat less than a year. In 1908 the Otto Elling family went back to their land west of Lawton, Okla.

From what I have been able to find out there was a fair amount of musical talent in the Elling Family. It is highly doubtful if Otto or any of his brothers or sisters ever took any music lessons, but Otto had a natural talent for music. He played the accordion and the harmonica and he did a very good job of it. While on the subject of music, Otto's brother Edward played the violin, his brother Carl played the harmonica and his sister Ricka played the piano.

Albert 2 Elling, (10), (Frederick 1), son of Frederick and Johanna (Baker) Elling was born in Monee, Illinois on Nov. 24, 1878; died in Basehor, Kansas on April 27, 1951, buried in Glenwood Cemetery, Basehor, Kansas. Albert Elling married on Jan. 24, 1906 at Basehor, Kansas, Cora Ellen Way, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. George Irving Way of Valley Falls, Kansas. Cora Ellen Way was born in White Church, Kansas on Jan. 10, 1886.

Albert Elling in 1901 and 1902 rented land and farmed it. Father and Mother Elling, Albert, Edward and Minnie Elling were still living on the home place in 1901 and part of 1902. In late April or early May of 1903 (note a) Albert went to Birmingham, Kansas to operate the skimming station. He was there for three years and then Meyer Sanitary Milk Co. (note b) transferred him to the skimming station at Wallula, Kansas. It note b - This name from old photograph.

would probably be more correct to refer to these plants as "creameries" or "milk separating stations". Meyer Sanitary Milk Co. in Kansas City, Kansas the firm that Edward J. Elling worked for from 1904 to 1911, owned the skimming stations in Birmingham, Wallula, Lansing, Basehor & probably many others in northeastern Kansas. These stations operated as follows: The man in charge of the station was responsible for receiving, weighing and testing the incoming milk for percentages of butter fat. He had to keep the records on the quantity of milk received from each farmer. The farmers were paid for their milk at the end of each two week period. The skimmed milk was sold locally, the cream was shipped in by rail to Meyer Sanitary Milk Co.

The power for the cream separator and the other equipment was supplied by a steam engine, which also, conveniently maintained a supply of hot water for washing up the containers and other equipment. The milk, in 5, 10 and 15 gallon milk cans, was picked up at the various farms by the "milk hauler", who took it into town in his horse-drawn wagon.

Albert Elling married Cora Ellen Way on Jan. 24, 1906, at Basehor, Kansas. They continued to live in Wallula, Kansas until 1912. Their daughter, Rose Ruth was six month old when they moved to the farm one mile west of Basehor, Kansas. The farm west of Basehor consisted of 80 acres although for several years they rented an additional 90 acres. About 50 acres of the 80 were under cultivation, the balance being pasture land for the dairy cows. Albert Elling looked after the crops, dairy cattle, pigs and small orchard. Mrs. Cora Elling took as her responsibility the chickens and the garden. She had no trouble selling the eggs and tomatoes to the people in and around Basehor.

Mrs. Cora Elling continues to live on the farm. She has one of the neighbors taking care of the crops and heavy work on a share crop basis.

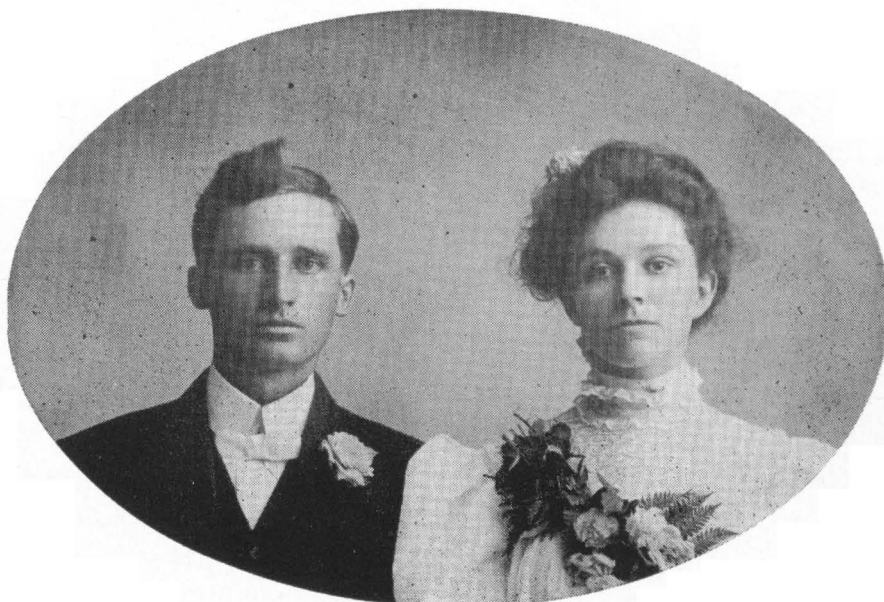

Carl was the last of the Elling children to be born in Monee, Illinois. As near as we can tell, the Elling Family left Monee, Illinois for Valley Falls, Kansas in 1882. Carl Elling left Valley Falls in 1900 to go to school at Kansas State College. After graduation in the spring of 1904 Carl Elling got a job with the Cuban Government to take about 24 head of assorted livestock to Cuba. The animals, beef cattle, hogs, sheep, goats and etc. were bought throughout Kansas and Missouri for shipment to Kansas City. After being down with pneumonia for a couple of weeks, Carl, on the first of January, 1905, left Kansas City and took the livestock to New Orleans. The livestock was loaded into a ship and they were on their way to Cuba. We have Carl Elling's word for it that he didn't particularly enjoy his first two or three days at sea; however, he was not alone in his misery. His animals got sea-sick too.

He spent two to two and a half years in Santiago, Cuba. In 1907 he came back to Manhattan as assistant professor in the Animal Husbandry Department at Kansas State College for two years. At about 1909 Carl went back to Cuba. He was in charge of the livestock on a large plantation at Cienfuegos. He came back to Manhattan in 1910.

In 1908 while he was in Manhattan in the Animal Husbandry Department Carl bought the home in Manhattan. In 1910 he bought a 160 acre farm just out of Nowata, Oklahoma. He still owns and manages this farm, although it is a little bigger than 160 acres now. The ranch now consists of 2,000 acres. He was primarily interested in raising livestock, beef cattle in general, and Herefords in particular on the farm at Nowata. There were always a few animals around the place in Manhattan.

On August 9, 1911 Carl Elling married Mary Mudge of Manhattan. After their marriage Carl and Mary Elling went to Cashion, Oklahoma for a visit with Frederick and Johanna Elling, and then by covered wagon they went to the farm near Nowata, Oklahoma. They lived on the farm until October 1, 1914. On this date or shortly thereafter, Carl Elling started working for the Extension Department of Kansas State College. His first position was District Agent at Parsons, Kansas. They stayed in Parsons until November 16, 1917 or 1918 when they moved to Manhattan. Carl Elling continued to work for the College as an Extension Specialist, spending most of his time traveling throughout Kansas holding meetings and classes on various phases of livestock production and also judging at state and county 4-H fairs.

Sylvia Mae Elling, (14) (Bernard 2, Frederick 1), daughter of Bernard and Amelia (Bernhart) Elling, was born in Cashion, Oklahoma on April 21, 1904. Sylvia Mae Elling married on March 1, 1929 at Kingfisher, Oklahoma, John Forbis, son of Mr. and Mrs. Edward G. Forbis of Cashion, Oklahoma.

Sylvia Mae Elling on more than one occasion has had visions or dreams that portended future events. In the Fall of 1923 Sylvia was dating a boy, Frank Bredel. She undoubtedly had known him for a number of years. Sylvia had two cousins, brother and sister who had married a sister and a brother of this Frank Bredel. Sylvia and Frank were engaged to be married in April, 1924. In early January, 1924, Sylvia had her first vision or dream. It was a vision of seven angels, all moving along in a line. Now this is itself is not too unusual, I imagine a great many of us have had dreams of one sort or another concerning angels. The novelty here is the last angel in this line of seven angels was Sylvia's boy friend, Frank Bredel. At the time she mentioned this vision to Frank and others, but none of them, including Frank, thought a great deal about it.

Three weeks later, January 26, 1924, on a Sunday evening, Sylvia and Frank had been to church. After the services Frank took Sylvia home and then went home himself. He stayed home only a half an hour or so and then he went over to the house where he was living at the time. He was living alone in this house, fixing it up. He and Sylvia were going to live in this house after their marriage. Early next morning he went out to feed the cows. It was his custom to take his shotgun along just in case he had the opportunity to shoot a crow or two. They were something of a nuisance and liked to help themselves to the feed that was put out for the cows. Just exactly what happened nobody knows for sure. Presumably he leaned the shotgun up against the manger, barrel up. Somehow or other the gun went off, killing Frank Bredel. Later that day they found him half in and half out of the manger.

On March 1, 1929, Sylvia Mae Elling married John Forbis. They lived on his father's farm northwest of Cashion, Oklahoma. On another occasion, this would have been about 1933, Sylvia Mae Forbis was in the later stages of pregnancy with her third child, when she had another vision. On this occasion, she told me, it was a vision and not a dream, she was not asleep at the time. The picture that she received was a long funeral procession. It appeared to be about a half a mile long. Now it was Sylvia and her baby that were in the coffin at the head of this long funeral procession winding its way slowly up the hill. Sylvia was happy and pleased to look back and see all of those cars.

Sylvia did not mention this vision to anyone until three weeks later just before the baby was to be born, she told her husband about it. The baby was born dead. Sylvia, as we all know, is still very much alive. At the present time Sylvia is living at 13 West Main St., Edmond, Oklahoma.

## CHAPTER VI

### THE GERMAN ANCESTORS OF THE BAKERS

Johann Christian Boecker (G-40), was the son of Christoph Boecker who married Maria Hedwig Traupe. Johann Christian Boecker married Engel Rosine Luise Ducker of Ohlendorf in the year of 1794. She died in Sulbeck on 28 April 1810, age 31 years. In 1811 Johann Christian Boecker remarried, the name of his second wife, Johanna Catharine Elisabeth Bode. Johann Christian Boecker died in Sulbeck on 29 Nov. 1819.

Johann Christian Ludwig Bocker married Henrike Justine Schluter on 21 Nov. 1826, at Stockheim. Henrike Justine Schluter was born at Sulbeck on 24 Oct. 1808, baptized on 30 Oct. 1808 at Stockheim.

### THE ANCESTORS OF HENRIKE JUSTINE SCHLUTER

Johann Andreas Schluter, (G-42), ancestors unknown, lived in Sulbeck. Johann Andreas Schluter married in 1765, Dorothea Sophie Hesse. Dorothea Sophie Hesse was born in Druber, the daughter of Christoph Hesse. At one time, Johann Andreas Schluter was a burgomaster or mayor of the village of Sulbeck.

Johann Justus Gerhard Schluter, (G-43), (Johann Andreas Schluter), son of Johann Andreas Schluter, lived in Sulbeck. Johann Justus Gerhard Schluter was born in Sulbeck, baptized in Stockheim on 15 July 1769. He married on 12 June 1800, in Stockheim, Dorothea Margareta Seelen, daughter of Casper Seelen of Druber. Dorothea Margareta Seelen was born in Druber, baptized on 16 Feb. 1779. She died in Sulbeck on 12 Sept. 1850, age 70 years, 10 months and 27 days. Johann Justus Gerhard Schluter died in Sulbeck on 3 July 1841.

## CHAPTER VII

### THE FIRST GENERATION

In this section of the book, it will be noticed immediately that in some branches of the family I have been unsuccessful in obtaining even the most fundamental information. Take for example the first individual listed in this section of the book, 1. Christoph I Baker. I have not been able to locate any of his descendents, and lacking information regarding the dates of birth, marriage and etc. on this branch of the family a search of old newspaper files and of the county and state records would be a slow process with little assurance of finding authentic information. All of the information presented in this book is correct to the best of my knoweldge. In a book of this sort, if there is any question as to the accuracy of any of the information it is either printed, with qualifications, or it is left out entirely.

The first generation Bakers came from Sulbeck (two dots over the "u"), Einbeck County, Hannover Province, Germany. The thoughtful reader will take a second look at that last sentence. There has been, in the course of writing this book, three or four questions of primary importance to the author. A considerable amount of time, effort and a multiplicity of different aproaches have been used in an effort to find the answers to these questions. The name of the village in Germany where the first generation Bakers were born and raised was one of these questions.

The name, Baker, is not a proper name in Germany. The German form of this name is Bocker, with two dots over the letter "o". Bocker without the dots over the "o" is an entirely different name. While it is incorrect, I have used the form "Bocker" without the two dots over the "o" in order to save typesetting costs.

#### AUGUST BAKER a

"August Baker is one of the original settlers of Wyandotte County, Kansas, coming here in 1870. He was born in Germany on April 21, 1842, being the sixth of nine children born to Chris and Hannah Baker, also native Germans. The subject of this sketch, at the early age of eight years, was so unfortunate to lose both his parents, their deaths being caused by cholera, which terrible epidemic swept Germany during the year 1850. In August, 1856, when only fourteen years of age, he emigrated to the United States, settling with an older brother, Henry, who now resides in Champaign County, Ill. He also resided in this county until the opening of the Rebellion when he enlisted in the First Illinois Light Artillery, under Capt. Chaney, who resigned at Jackson, Miss., and was succeeded by Lieut. H. H. Burton. His regiment was a member of the sixteenth Army Corps. under Gen. John A. Logan, whose fortunes he followed until the closing of the war. The principal engagements in which he took part were Memphis, Corinth, seige of Vicksburg, Jackson, and those battles in which Sherman participated in his famous march to the sea. His regiment was sent to Missionary Ridge to reinforce Gen. Grant, and served in the left wing of this battle. He then went to Knoxville, Tenn., where Gen. Burnside was surrounded by Gen. Longstreet, after which he went to Chat-

tanooga, where he remained until his regiment received orders to go to Chicago to be mustered out of service. They passed through Indianapolis, Ind., where they were banqueted by the citizens, receiving their first good dinner in three years. While at Atlanta, Ga. on July 22, 1864, he and his entire company was captured by the Confederates. He was driving a piece of artillery at the time of his capture, but after remaining in the hands of the Confederates a short time, he became tired of being shot at by his own comrades, and he and a fellow-driver, named John Singleton, managed to escape, and hid in a ditch until the Union army advanced, when they were rescued from their dangerous position. After being mustered out of the service, Mr. Baker came to Fort Leavenworth, Kas., and hired out as a teamster to Smith and Lambert, hauling Government supplies to the soldiers at Fort Union, Colo., which place they reached in July, 1865. He then quit the company, and with twenty-three other teamsters started for California, but after a twelve days' march were surprised by the Indians, who killed and scalped two of their comrades and stole their mules. Becoming disheartened at these misfortunes, they returned to Fort Union, and after spending some time as a herder, Mr. Baker went to Fort Lyons, Colo., where he remained until the spring; then becoming assistant wagon boss, he took a train to Kansas City, Mo., where he received his discharge and returned to Chicago. Here he enlisted in the Twentieth United States Infantry, and went to Norfolk, where he was uniformed and sent to Richmond. He joined his regiment at this place, after which he was sent to New Orleans, and was promoted to the position of provost-sergeant. After remaining there six months he went to Baton Rouge, thence to Shreveport, where he, with his regiment, took the train for Marshall, Texas. While there, he was appealed to by the people of Boston, Texas, for protection from the depredations of Col. Baker and his gang of desperadoes. The subject of this sketch was then sergeant, was given command of some men, and although he and his men surrounded a saloon in which Baker was, he succeeded in making good his escape on a mule which he had stolen, after having shot a man named Titoos. Baker afterward captured a train of supplies, after killing three of the four men on the train, but as he made his headquarters in the canebrake, it was found impossible to effect his capture, although a company of calvarymen hunted the country for miles around for two weeks. He was afterwards shot by his brother-in-law, at Orton Bros.' Circus, which was held at Boston, Texas. The band of desperadoes entered the tent, began shooting right and left, and riding in the ring, cleared the tent. The soldiers secured their arms, and in their attack of these men succeeded in killing three, and captured four more. The latter were secured in jail, but the following morning, as the jailer went to take his prisoners their breakfast, they shot him down and escaped. They were pursued by our subject and his men, but would not surrender until another of their number had been killed. The troops stayed at Boston for seven months, notwithstanding the threats received by them from the friends of the dead men. They were then ordered to Fort Ransom, Dak., where the Indians were troublesome, and here Mr. Baker remained until August, 1869, when he was discharged and returned to Illinois. He then went to Nebraska to engage in farming, but while on his way to Leavenworth to purchase a team and supplies he had his money stolen from him at St. Joseph, and for a time was compelled to hire out. He worked here until the following fall, then bought a team and a mower, having received

some aid from his Illinois friends, by the sale of some land. He cut grass and harvested that summer and fall, after which he went to Fremont, Neb. and on August 5, 1870 was married to Miss Mena Falke, a daughter of Henry Falke. She accompanied her husband to Wyandotte County, Kans., and here they purchased some land and settled down to farming. They now own 160 acres of fine farming land, on which is erected a new house, good barns, fences, etc. They have a family of four children; William, Chris, Frank and August. Mr. Baker is a Republican, a member of the Farmer's Mutual Benefit Association, and is president of the same at Rock Lodge No. .... He and his wife and children are members of the Lutheran Church of Leavenworth, and for the last three years he has been trustee of his township, and was treasurer for two years. He is an upright gentleman in every respect, and is a worthy citizen in his community."

## OLD BUSINESS MAN IS DYING b

### SIXTY-FIVE YEARS OLD

---

### MR. WILLIAM H. BAKER THIS AFTERNOON IS SINKING RAPIDLY AT THE HOSPITAL

---

"Word from St. Joseph's hospital at 3:30 this afternoon stated that Mr. William H. Baker, who has been a patient there for some time, is sinking rapidly, and the end is not more than a few hours distant. While his condition has been critical for several days, it was not until this noon that it was apparent that he was dying. His family; relatives and many of his close friends are at the hospital this afternoon at his bedside.

"Mr. Baker is one of the best known business men in the city, having been in the harness and saddlery business on North East street for the past twelve years. His sudden sickness was a surprise to his friends, and relatives as he has always been of healthy constitution. His place of business has been closed for the past two days on account of his serious illness and late this afternoon the word was received of his dying condition. Last Sunday night he was attacked with a stroke of apoplexy and the next morning was removed to St. Joseph's hospital, where he has rapidly grown worse.

### BORN IN GERMANY

"Mr. Baker is of German descent, having been born in Hanover, Aug. 17, 1844. His parents died during the cholera plague while he was very young, and at the age of nine years he came to this country with his older brother, who settled at Champaign. While a boy he learned the harness maker's trade in the shop of George E. Hessel, of Champaign, now deceased. In 1859 he married Miss Mary Witt (possibly Vitt) of Champaign and to the union were born five children all of whom are living.

### LOCATED HERE IN 1891

"In 1891 Mr. Baker moved to this city and opened a harness shop just north of the city hall which has run ever since. On January 4, 1905, his loving wife passed away, after a short illness.

"Mr. Baker has two brothers and one sister, who also came to this country from Germany. These are August Baker, who lives in Kansas City; George Baker of Whitehall, who returned yesterday to his home after visiting his brother a few days; and Mrs. Fred Myer, a sister of Maunee, Ill. His five children all live in this city. They are Mrs. Thos. H. Ramage of South McLean Street, Mrs. B. H. Hayes, Mrs. J. W. Savage, Miss Gussie, at home and Frank W. Baker.

"The death of Mrs. Baker here a few years ago was the occasion of much sadness among the Bloomington friends of the family, as well as old-time acquaintances in Champaign. She was buried in the latter city."

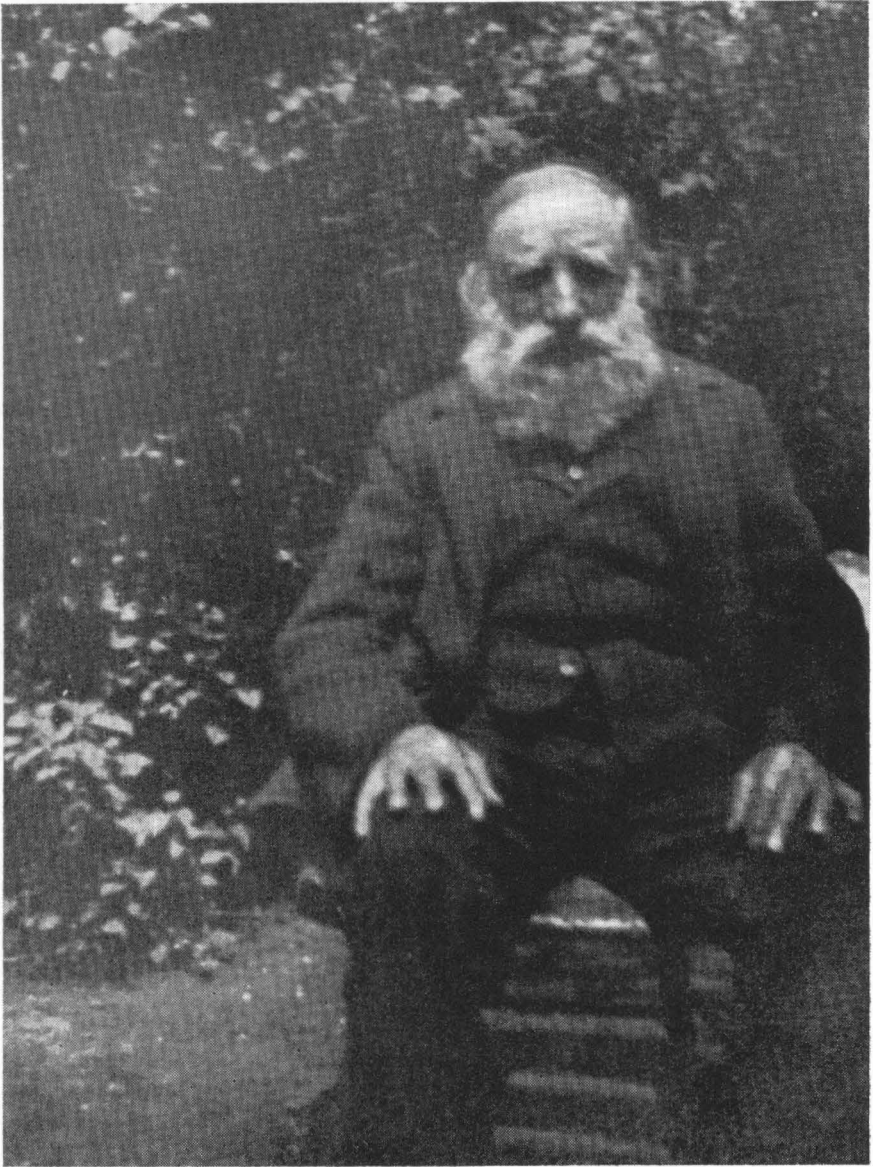

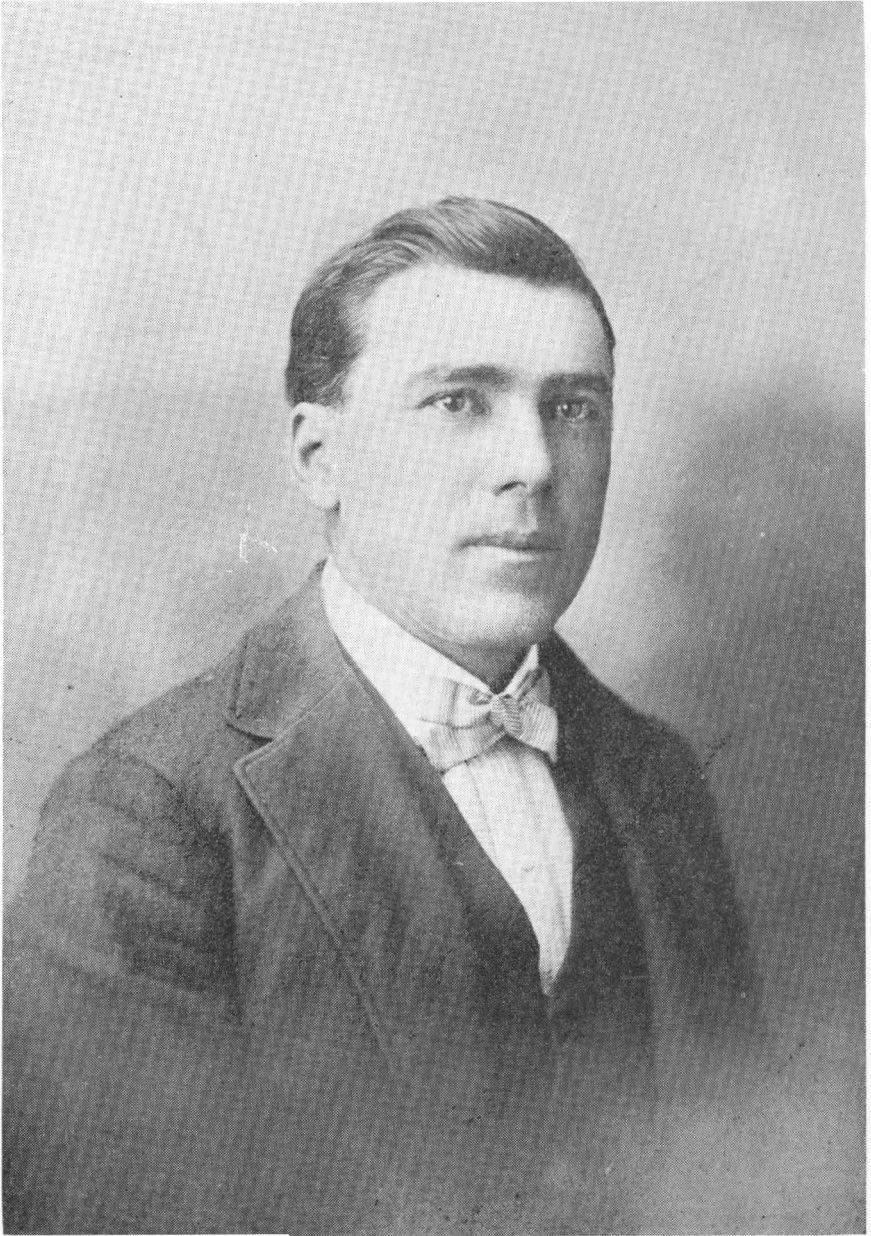
"Mrs. Anne Regan, 37 years old, died at Cushing Hospital yesterday afternoon from Bright's Disease, from which she had been suffering for a long time.

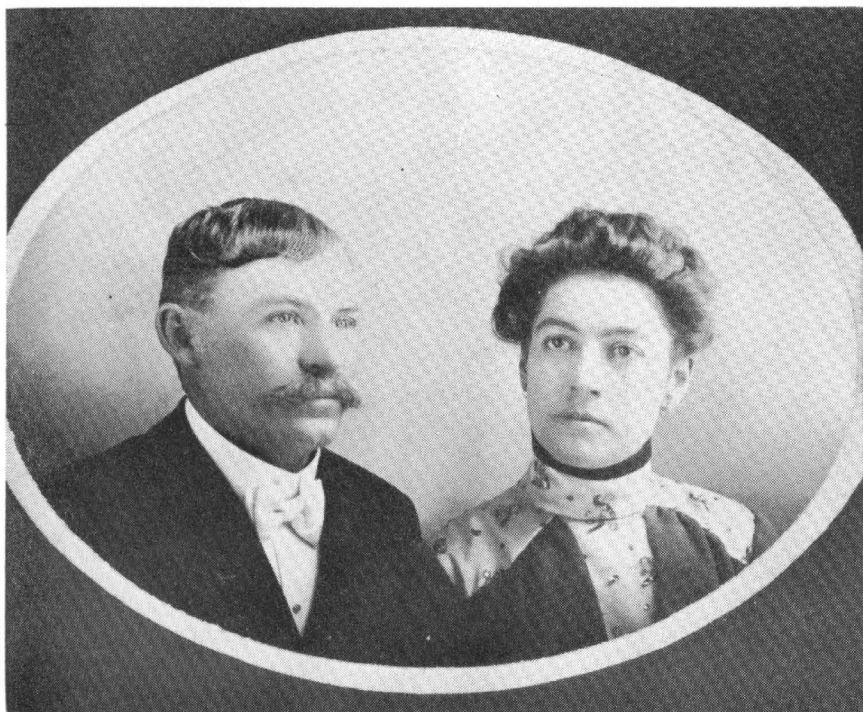

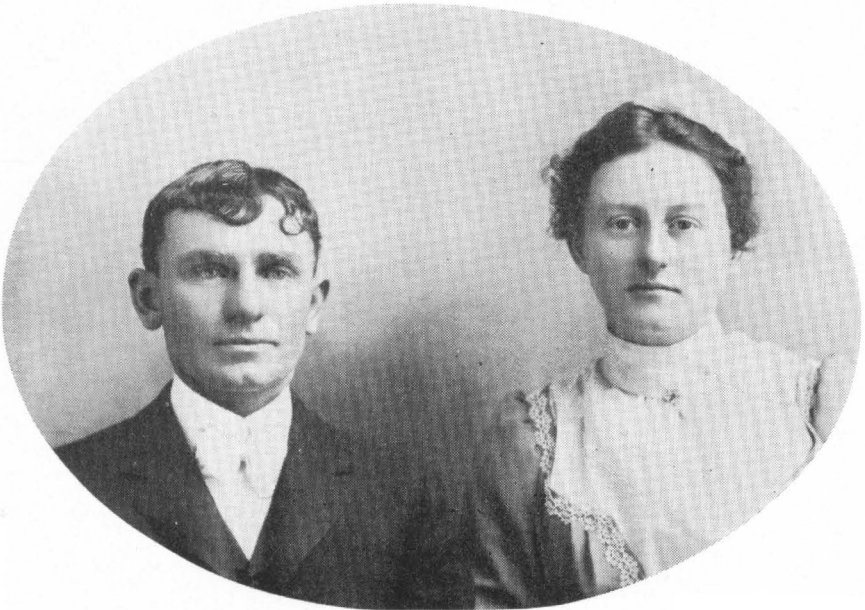
