(Author's note—I, with Mrs. L. P. Bradley, rode 20 miles in a buggy to Van's Creek Church and organized a W. M. S. in 1908 (79 years after Willis Eavenson was one of its deacons) knowing nothing of the above connection; learned later that Dozier Thornton, my G. G. G. Grandfather, Rev. Soldier, built up that Church about 1803 and was its pastor nearly 40 years, until his death, 1843.)

Eavenson fell from the end of the steps of the "cook-room" while watching Jep Bond cross swollen branch; he lost his balance, and fell, sustaining injuries that proved fatal. Norman, Elbert Co., in the home of her grandmother, Mariah Turman Hall. Capt. John William Eavenson, a Mason, enlisted in the Confederate Army as a volunteer under Capt. John Thornton in 1861, Co. F, 38th Ga. Regt. Infantry as Sgt., at Elberton, Ga. First went to Savannah, then to Virginia.

In 1862 he was in Jackson's Division with Gen. R. E. Lee as Commander. He was taken sick and in hospital during Richmond Battle; he was in forced march from Rappahannoc to Manassas Junction and was at the Capture of Manassas Junction. Then ran into the Federal Cavalry and soon defeated them; retreated thence to 2nd Manassas Battle; fought part of 2 days and won the fight August 1862; then pursued the Federal Troops through Maryland; came back to Virginia through Petersburg Valley; was taken sick and carried to hospital; recovered and took train at Lynchburg; got off at little station to get water; the train left him and he had to walk all the way to Staunton. On his way, he came to a tunnel a mile long; while he was in the tunnel he heard a train coming and lay down on the outside of the track and let the train pass on over him; he went back to the army and was in the 2nd Fredericksburg fight; was wounded December 13, 1863; while turning around to speak to the Captain, a ball struck him in the back of his left shoulder and came through the front; he was taken to hospital and given furlough home. On his way home, he lodged in the Bennett home, Fayetteville, Ga., in which his daughter, Mrs. W. N. Bailey, later resided.

Afterwards he was found disabled for field service; went into Cavalry State Service as First Lieutenant in 1864; then promoted to Captain. He was then sent out into the mountains of Georgia to take up deserters; was taken sick with chills and fever, sent to private house; the family had to refuge; they went all day and could go no further, so lodged all night in a negro house; resumed march next day. Went to Atlanta to help hold it; then to Macon and to hold Double Bridges over Flint River; was defeated and returned to Macon. Surrendered April 1865; on his way home he learned that Lee had surrendered.

He was discharged at Hartwell, Ga., May 15, 1865, in Co. G, 3rd Ga. Reserves, as Capt. in Blount's Battalion by General Brown. His daughter, Mrs. Strickland, secured him a Cross of Honor from the Union Springs, Alabama, Chapter, United Daughters of the Confederacy, Jan. 19, 1921. Six members belong to that chapter on his record; also six mem-

bers in the Children of Confederacy on his record. On his record, and his Grandson's World War Record, Mrs. Strickland secured a Cross of Service through the same Chapter, U. D. C., and presented it to John Glen Strickland, Nov. 11, 1924. (He was the Grandson of J. W. Eavenson and the son of Mrs. Strickland.)

He joined the Concord Methodist Church (Elbert Co., Ga.) at the age of 15 or 16, and has been Steward and Sabbath School Teacher over 50 years. He is a farmer and retired merchant, and still active at 92. He is the first man in Georgia to hold membership in the Sons and Daughters of the Pilgrims.

His decendants number 107; 12 children—52 grandchildren—43 great-grandchildren and 1 great-great grandchild.

U., Eastern Star, Service Star Legion, American Legion Auxiliary, Ladies Confederate Memorial Association, United Daughters of the Confederacy, United States Daughters of 1812, Daughters of the American Revolution, Colonial Dames of America, and Sons and Daughters of the Pilgrims. She has been president of most of the women's organizations of her church; was Associational Superintendent 16 years. Was officer in O. E. S.; served in patriotic orders in the following capacity—Pres. of U. D. C.; Pres. of W. C. T. U.; Cor-Secy. D. A. R.; Local Pres., State Pres., and State Historian of Service Star Legion; also Registrar, Rec. Secy., Member Natl. Board of Directors and Natl. Chrm. of Ceremonial and Recorder of Founders Honor Roll. After the death of her husband in Union Springs, Ala., 6-28-1926, she returned to Georgia in order to care for her parents and was re-appointed Organizing

Governor for Georgia by the National Governor, Mrs. O. W. Kulling, in 1928; in 1929 attended the National Convention in Washington and was elected Capt. General. She organized the Georgia Branch in Winder, Ga., 6-18-1929, which was named the "Ralph Eavenson Division" in honor of her ancestor; she was elected State Governor two years and declining re-election, was made Life Honorary Governor, at the Convention in Atlanta, 6-18-1931. She is enrolled with "Who's Who" in Genealogy; sketched in Vol. 4, "Representative Women of the South," by Mrs. B. W. Collier; and on invitation from Harold K. Bowen, Governor General of the Sons and Daughters of the Pilgrims, of Iowa, and F. A. Virkus, Director of The Institute of American Genealogy, of Chicago, she has been listed with "First Families of America" in Volume V, Compendium of American Genealogy. A.; hard fighting for 20 days; left 7-14-1918, made forced march for Soissons, pushed the "Huns" back about 20 kilometers; went over the top with 75's about 4 kilometers from Verzy; after the Soissons-Rheims Drive, went to Pont-a-Mouse; stayed about a month (Quiet Sector); then to St. Mihiel Sector; took up a position about 1,500 yds. from trenches; went into position 9-12-1918; big barrage for about 10 days and wiped out sailant; then to Champaign 9-26-1918; drove the Germans across the Aisne; then 12th F. A. supported the 26th Div. Inft. for 20 days; 10-27-1918 went to Argonne and 2nd drive started 11-1-1918 and followed the "Huns" to the Rhine. John Glen Strickland was gassed 11-8-1918 and the Armistice was signed 11-11-1918.

MALIN

From the Family Bible and genealogy of the Smedley Family, 1682-1900, in the possession of Mr. George C. Malin, Malvern, Pa., the following is taken:

"Randal Malin of Great Barrow, in the Co. Palatine of Chester, England, was a purchaser of 250 acres of land in Pennsylvania, by deeds of lease and release, dated March, 1681. He was a Grand Juror at the Court held at Chester in October 1684, and a settler in Upper Province.

"His wife, Elizabeth, d. February, 1692. He then m. Mary Hollingsworth Conoway, widow of Thomas Conoway, and dau. of Valentine Hollingsworth Sr., of New Castle Co. He was recommended as a Minister 10-27-1725 and in 1727 removed with his wife within the limits of Goshen Monthly Meetings.

"By his first wife, he had:—Isaac, b. the latter part of May, 1681, and m. (1) Elizabeth Jones and (2) Jane Pugh; Jacob, b. 7-7-1686, m. Susannah Jones.

"By his second wife, he had:—Hannah, d. young; Hannah, b. 1-7-1695 or 6, m. Daniel Williamson Jr.; Rachael, b. 5-24-1702, m. John Cain; and Katherine, m. George Tate.

"Isaac Malin settled in Whiteland Township, while his brother, Jacob, remained in Upper Province, where he d. in 1727."

THORNTON**Royal Lineage—Chart No. 1**

The many references on this notable family are too numerous to mention; they may be found in most any and all libraries. It is a very old family, first called "Torentum;" then put down as "de Thorentone" in Cambridgeshire; meaning of the original name "Tun" given to one who resided in such a thorn tun.

It will be very difficult to give all the lineages connected with this notable family, but I have condensed and combined a few so as not to be too difficult and complicated; the first six generations were copied from the book of Mrs. B. L. Perry, Union Springs, Alabama; the remaining generations have been secured and compiled from many histories, encyclopedias and magazines, after verification. You will note the Saxon line continues through the 12th Generation and the Plantagenet line begins with the 20th and continues through the 26th generation. Some authors use the word "Duke" while others use "Count" for the same person.

Elizabeth Dozier, dau. of Eliza Dozier, supposedly widow of John Dozier, would be the Mark in question; yet it does not agree with later historical sketches of Dozier and his father Mark, which states his wife was Susanna Dozier, dau. of Leonard Dozier.)

Horton's Battalion, Blackwell's District**. He had land lottery grants in **Elbert Co., Ga.**, **Blackwell's District**. He d. 1834 in **Franklin Co., Ga.**

Doves Creek and **Van's Creek, Elbert Co.**, were his charge nearly 40 years.

About 1885, there was found in the ruins of an old fort near St. Augustine, Fla., the name "Marquis D'Ozier" and since the body of Huguenots fled to America and settled in that region, it is possible that Marquis D'Ozier is the original American ancestor of the name; however, this is a mere conjecture, but it is not without significance and in future investigations respecting the family it may prove valuable.

STRICKLAND

(The remainder of this book will deal with the lines of the author's husband, Alexander Hamilton Strickland.)

The Stricklands in England are said to be one of the oldest families in Westmoreland, living there 25 generations since 1066. The name is supposed to come from the original ancestor of the Norman host who reached out his sword and touched the sands of Sussex, when they landed, in 1066; hence the name "Stryke-land." Possibly later from Stirk-land, meaning "The pasture ground of your cattle called 'Stirks or Steere' in Moreland, Westmoreland Co., England, where the family had considerable possessions; originally lived in what is now known as "Great Strickland," a Parish in Westmoreland Co. The family was seated there 170 years before Sir Wm. Strickland built the castle Sizergh there, in 1300. Their coat-of-arms bore the Holly Bush over 3 escolloped shells, from the time of the Conquest of England. The coat-of-arms of the Boynton branch is quite different and bears a Turkey Cock in his pride on the crest.

A branch, Samuel and Agnes, settled in Ontario, Canada; she wrote "The Lives of the Queens of England."

One of the branch, Sir John Strickland, came from Scotland to Mass., 1629-30; later to Hempstead, L. I., the families moving later to Va., N. C., and Ga. John seems to have had an interesting career from 1630 to 1673, when he died at Jamaica, a widower. In 1649 Cromwell sent him as Ambassador to Holland. 19 Stricklands were members of Parliament before 1661.

Bellfield, at the navy mine depot, York Co., Va., was the seat of Edward Digges, who in 1655, became the second of the three Puritan Governors of Virginia, during the Cromwell regime. He was the son of Sir Dudley Digges, Master of Rolls under Charles I. He is noted for his effort to establish silk culture in the colony. He employed two Armenians to promote the industry. The Mulberry trees in the peninsula are living monuments to Gov. Digges.

His tomb on the Government Reservation was restored by Commander Alfred H. Miles. The second Bellfield dwelling was razed after the World War. Edward Digges purchased the plantation from Capt. West in 1650. Bellfield remained in the Digges family over 100 years.

HERNDON

The Herndons trace their name, through changes, from the Roll of the Battle Abbey, when it was "Heiroum", who went with William, the Conqueror, to Britian, 1066. He was the ancestor of the Family of "Herons", as they were later called, and the suffix "don" was used to distinguish one family of the branch from another. In 1193 a member of this family journeyed with Richard I to the Holy Land, for his escutcheon is carved on a stone gateway in the city of Rhodes.

The Va. Hist. Mag. has published this ancient history of the family which traces its ancestry back to Alfred the Great. In Lincoln Inn Chapel, London, England, is a copy of the Herndon Arms in a stained glass window.
