FOREWORD

Fifty years ago, in the autumn of 1903, from a great-uncle I first learned anything about my family back of my grandparents and developed a genealogical curiosity which has issued finally in the publication of this contribution to information about the family. Even for the first five generations, the information is still incomplete and subject to corrections, which it is sincerely hoped may be made, so that a supplement may be issued if practicable. It seemed better, however, to publish the material which we have rather than to wait for something more nearly perfect or until the much harder task of bringing the generations down to the present could be accomplished. Time is marching on:

Others have labored and we have entered into their labors. The only publication in book form known to the compiler is "The Families of Perkins, Fairfield and King" by William Morrell Emery, published by the Murdock Press in San Francisco in 1907, which deals mainly with the Kennebunkport line. A very few articles have been published in genealogical magazines and parts of various lines have been traced in books and articles dealing, with other families. In the library of the Maine Historical Society there is an anonymous manuscript entitled "JOHN FAIRFIELD" which gives a great amount of information about the Kennebunkport branch down to the tenth generation. It would be interesting to be able to identify the author.

Major tribute should be paid, however, to Mrs. Alice Fairfield Moody, late of Portland, Maine, whose final general manuscript on the Fairfield family is also in the library of the Maine Historical Society. For almost thirty years she labored indefatigably on collecting data on her own and hor husband's various ancestral lines, which are now gathered in two closely written manuscript volumes in the possession of her son, Edward Fairfield Moody of Capo Elizabeth, Maine. In the process, she amassed scores of notebooks of her own, embodying research not only into printed material but also into the original records of town clerks, probate courts and registers of deeds. In addition, she had a collection of letters and other materials going back to 1864 which represented the genealogical interest primarily of three people in the New Boston, New Hampshire, line, which inherited most directly the Wenham traditions.
These three were: George Henry⁸ Fairfield of Camden, N. J. (John Baker⁷
John⁶ Capt. Matthew⁵ Josiah⁴ William³ Walter⁹ John¹); his father's
cousin, Abigail Fairfield⁷ (Crombie) Stephens (Betsey⁶ (Fairfield)
Crombie, Capt. Matthew⁵), who carried on a lively correspondence with him in the 1860's; and Mildred Britton Fairfield (William Bonnaire Josiah W. John Capt. Matthew), his younger cousin to whom he passed on in the 1890's all his information, and who herself made additional extensive investigations. All of this unorganized material was turned over to me by Edward Fairfield Moody and its riches are not even yet exhausted.

In addition, too great a number to mention individually of contemporary Fairfield descendants have supplied Mrs. Saam and myself with additional family lines and other information. To all of them we are grateful and record our thanks even though they are not listed by name. The published vital records of most of the Massachusetts towns down to 1859 have been of invaluable assistance and it would be marvelous if

other states could follow the example. Our own research has taken us along the familiar fascinating ways that make genealogy as interesting as a combination of detective stories and jigsaw puzzles - into overgrown old cemeteries, the vaults of town, county and state records, and even up into the hayloft of a Maine barn to investigate the old trunk in which reposed all that remained of the genealogical inquiries of a Fairfield whose wife is supposed to have burned up everything else of the sort at his death after a lifetime of understandable but misguided impatience with this profitless pursuit. In the case of the compiler, it has led on to interesting visits and contacts in England, Holland and Germany in the effort to verify the tradition of descent from Huguenot Beauchamps. The reader who does not know the joys and frustrations of this tantalizing pursuit has missed one of life's most interesting experiences. He will not understand that the publication of this volume is unsatisfying and will remain so until it is possible to trace the line back to England and the continent and to bring the record down to the latest baby of the thirteenth generation.

Although responsibility for the final form of this volume rests solely with me, the attainment of even this stage would have been quite impossible without the constant collaboration of my sister, Alice Katherine Fairfield Saam, to whom any credit should go in equal if not greater proportions. For the past quarter-century we have worked, puzzled, queried and achieved together in a partnership which I hope will make possible in a shorter time the publication of the second volume. With the cooperation of all those interested, that section of the jigsaw puzzle should be completed before we have to pass on the torch to others. As that time draws near, one reads again with appreciation the words from Abigail F. C. Stephens, then sixty-six years old, to George H. Fairfield:

"My dear sister Mrs. M. has been suddenly called from earth, to join the innumerable multitude of our Risen Ancestors 'where she will see and hear and know, all we desire and wish below.' She was deeply interested in this subject of Genealogy and has gone to the original Sources for information. O, that she would impart it to us, who are still groping after Truth, in doubt and uncertainty."

One final word of appreciation and recognition is richly deserved. The processing of this manuscript into its mimeographed form has been possible only by the loyal and devoted service, over and beyond the call of duty, of my administrative assistant, Ruth Tipton, who has given many days outside of office hours with a personal interest and concern that is beyond remuneration.

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Hints on Use of Book

If you know the given name of the Fairfield you are looking for, turn immediately to the Index of Fairfield Descendants, the last one, where you will be helped to identify the one you are seeking by the generation number, the names of the places with which he was associated, and in the case of married women, by her married surname. The page number and the identification number will guide you to the entry in the body of the book. The page number listed second will give most information about the person.

If you are looking for an encestress whose married surname you know, turn to p. 66ff. for the index of surnames of husbands of Fairfield women. The given name and identification number will enable you to find the page number in the Index of Fairfield Descendants.

If you know the maiden name of some one who married into the Fairfield family, and want to find what Fairfield she married, turn to p. 63ff for the index of surnames of wives of Fairfield men. Turn to the Index of Fairfield Descendants for the page number.

If you know that your Fairfield ancestors came from a certain town, you will find listed in the Index of Places (p. 68ff.) under that town the first names (and married surnames) of all Fairfields known to be associated with that town.

If you are trying to identify your Fairfield ancestor who served in the Revolution or a person listed in the 1790 Census, turn to the Special Indexes.

The number in parenthesis preceding the name of a male Fairfield child indicates that he had descendants, and will be found in the next generation before his name without parenthesis.

In Generation V, the grandchildren are given only for daughters who will not appear in Volume II under Generation VI.

As you get used to the book, you will find the <u>different colors for the</u> <u>different generations</u> helpful in locating persons by use of the identification number, without going back to the index.

Notes on Other Fairfields in America down to 1790

The Family of "Daniel the Half-Dutchman", who was a contemporary of John Fairfield in Salem and Boston and who may have been related, died out soon after 1700 as far as descendants named Fairfield were concerned. Daniel Fairfield of this line was at sea when his father's will was drawn in 1708 and is not mentioned again. His mother, Ruth (Hawkins) Marshall Fairfield, died March 9, 1715/6. Grace , the daughter of Daniel , married John Howell on December 23, 1719. Family names of other descendants include Sowther, Parker, Hallom, Ellis, Goddard, Eaton and Howell. My manuscript compilation of all known data on this line is on file in the library of the New England Historic Genealogical Society and may also be obtained from me.

A David Fairfield, a "free white male of 16 years and upward", listed in the 1790 Census returns from "Berwick, Cumberland, Franklin, Germany, Hamiltonban, Heidelberg, Mount Pleasant, Mountjoy and Straban townships" in Pennsylvania may have been the David Fairfield (originally Fairfoul) who is stated to have emigrated to America from Dublin in 1747 and who was related to the Canadian family descended from Richard A.F. Fairfield of Hinchinbrooke, Ontario, and also to the family of "Rebecca West" (the pen name of Cicily Elizabeth Fairfield of England). The Fairfields in the Middle West who trace their ancestry back to Pennsylvania may be descended from this David, since their tradition mentions a similar origin.

Other Fairfields before 1700 The following persons mentioned in various records before 1700 have not peen identified in relation to the line of John Fairfield of Wenham:

A Richard Fairfield, said to have been a lawyer in Suffolk County in 1637.

John Fairfield and Anphillis his wife of Newport and Westerley, Rhode Island, whose records appear in connection with the Huguenot settlements from 1655 to 1689, when he deeded to Widow Mary Babcock all of his estate in return for lifelong care. They appear to have had no descendants by the name of Fairfield, although this widow Mary Babcock may have been a daughter.

A Daniel Fairfield in Easthampton, Long Island, in 1655, who might have belonged to the line of "Daniel the Half-Dutchman"

An Edward Fairfield listed in the garrison at Black Point (Scarboro, Maine) in 1676 in some publications, stated by Libby in his Concelogical Dictionary of Maine and New Hampshire to be a misreading for "Hounsell."

A Matthew Fairfield who was allowed costs of 4 shillings in Salem Court, March 20, 1672, in his case against Lott Conant of Boverly, who was presented for "attacting" said Matthew, unidentifiable unless it was a missake for Matthew Edwards, the nephew of John Fairfield, from whom he inherited property.

A William Fayerfield, said to have merried Abigail Osborn in 1691 in Fairfield, Conn., probably Fairchild.

Other Fairfields between 1700 and 1790

A Charles Fairfield who married Elizabeth Raymond in Boston on May 24, 1738, has not been identified.

A <u>Mehitable Fairfield</u>, said to have married Joseph Phippeny in Stratford, Conn. in 1759, may also have been a Fairchild; otherwise, unidentified.

A Nebo Fairfield, a Negro slave of William Fairfield of Boston, who married Phillis Whitney, Free Negro, in Boston on January 3, 1765. He was later freed and was baptized in the First Church on March 29, 1772. No children of Nebo and Phillis are reported; but from 1782 to 1790, five children of "Nebo and Susannah" were baptized in the First Church. He is probably the "Ebo" who appears in the 1790 Census, with five in the family, the only Fairfield listed in Boston at that time.

Peter Fairfield, private, listed among Revolutionary pensioners in Connecticut, but almost certainly the Peter Fairchild of the Connecticut Line Regiments. (Connecticut is the only state where a Fairchild is mistakenly called a Fairfield, Usually, the reverse is true!)

A William Fairfield, who died in 1758 in Spottsylvania County, Virginia, when bond was given by the administrator of his estate, John Sutherland. It would be tempting to identify him with William Fairfield of South Kingston, Rhode Island, who is lost track of after 1741; but that William would seem to have been alive although "out of the province" of Massachusetts when his father's will was probated in 1770. He may have been the father of an Elizabeth Fairfield, whose marriage to John Butt was recorded in Lower Norfolk County, Virginia, on July 29, 1765, also unidentified with the Wenham family.

FAIRFIEID COATS-OF-ARMS

The New Boston-Saco Coat-of-Arms

Crozier's General Armory gives a Fairfield coat-of-arms as: "Gules, a lion rampant, crowned, or"; and a crest: "On a mount vert, two doves billing ppr." No authority is given for the description, and so far no English book of heraldry has been found which gives such a coat-of-arms.

However, such a coat-of-arms was in use in the Fairfield family as far back as 1785. Two sisters, daughters of Parson John⁵ Fairfield of Saco, Maine, about that time embroidered coats-of-arms in which such a lion appears. One, Mary⁶ (later Titcomb), started to embroider on black velvet a coat-of-arms in which she quartered the lion with another device, possibly that of her

mother. The embroidery was never finished, probably because she was married the next year and had eleven children, but in its unfinished state was in the possession of Miss Elizabeth Clement of Needham, Mass., when I saw it. Her sister Betsey⁶ (later Scammon and Storer) embroidered the lion alone. That was in the possession of Dr. Mark Hopkins Ward in Newton Highlands when I saw it. A younger cousin, Mary⁶ (Fairfield) Cochrane born in 1786, who spent a number of years after 1809 in the home of Parson John with her mother, his third wife, wrote George H. Fairfield in 1864: "As to the Coat of Arms, I know nothing of it, only that there was such a thing in existence. What became of it, I do not know. The principal figure in the arms of our family is a Lion Rampant."

That letter was written because a little earlier, Mrs. Abigail Fairfield (Crombie) Stephens wrote to George: "Your Grandfather John inherited from my Grandfather Matthew what was supposed to be the original Coat of Arms of the family, as it had the title 'Beauchamp' printed on the back. I remember it well, as it hung in an upper parlor in the house...." She later insisted that the only inscription (on its face) was "Fairfield". From the family of her first cousin, Fairfield Wilson of St. Johnsville, N. Y., she borrowed for George a copy of the original, which had been made for her Aunt Hannah (Fairfield) Wilson, his father's first wife. George wrote to Mildred Britton Fairfield in 1891: "I also got the old Coat of Arms - supposed to have been lost - I had a 'Chinese' copy made of it - and two, more perfect copies in a heraldic sense, made: one for myself and one for Josiah W. (Fairfield)." Two years later, in 1893, he reported a call from Joseph B. Fairfield of Suffield, Conn.

In 1936, Mrs. Bernard L. Sutton of Suffield, Conn., wrote me that her father, Joseph B. Fairfield, "secured two copies of Fairfield Coat-of-Arms from a Mr. George Fairfield...., one of which was said to be of French origin, the other English. He had the French one painted, which has a blue shield. I believe the English one (evidently the 'Chinese' copy-WCF) has a red shield. He always liked the family tradition of their being French Huguenots." The reason I identify the "English" one on red with the "Chinese" (exact) copy of the original is that Mrs. Moody's papers contained a description by a Chas. J. Lukons of Philadelphia, dated July 16, 1866, of "The Armorial Bearings of the French, English and American Family of Fairfield." In this description, the shield is blue and the motto is given as "Sous le nom de Beauchamp." Since Mrs. Stephens insisted that only the name "Fairfield" had appeared on the original, it would appear that the copy which Mr. Joseph Fairfield had painted, and which hung on the wall of Mrs. Sutton's home in 1936, was the "more perfect copy in a heraldic sense" which George Fairfield had made by Lukens. If so, the original was a lion rampant on red, with only the name "Fairfield" on it. (Unfortunately, the copies made in Philadelphia were locked in a safe to which Mrs. Sutton did not have the combination in 1936, so that it was not possible to verify this inference.)

The importance of this point is that in the years after the Revolution, a father and son by the name of Cole went around New England with books of heraldic plates from England, furnishing the new democratic aristocracy with "family coats-of-arms" of the same family names without regard to whether or not the New England families had any claim to them. Two characteristics of these Cole coats of arms are two green branches outside of the corners of the shield and a scroll on which is inserted, instead of the usual motto, "By the name of ______ (whatever the family name happened to be.) IF the original, the less "perfect copy in a heraldic sense" lacked these two

features, there is some ground for the belief that this coat of arms goes farther back than the Coles and so may really represent a valid tradition. Such a coat of arms for a Beauchamp family in either England or France has yet to be found. However, hope springs eternal:

Other Coats of Arms

English plates do have at least two versions of a "demi-sauvage enchaine", the crest mentioned by Fairbairn and Burke as belonging to a Fairfield family. This is the upper half of the burly body of a heavily bearded "savage" with chained arms uplifted. This has been used on the Abbey Memorial in Enfield, Connecticut. There is no known connection with any Fairfields in America.

A coat of arms with three parrots and the motto "Loquendo placet" appears as a Fairfield coat-of-arms and in fact is used by the Irish Fairfield family of which Rebecca West is a member. It is properly the coat-of-arms of the Fairfoul family of Scotland, a pun on the name, and is one of the pieces of evidence supporting the belief that this Fairfield family was originally Fairfoul and changed its name in Ireland, probably for religio-political reasons.

A coat-of-arms with three acorns in the typical Cole style is found in Minneapolis without any indication of its connection with known Fairfields.

The device of the Schönfeld family in Germany, which may be descended from French Huguenots who migrated to East Prussia about 1572 and translated their "de Beauchamp" into "von Schönfeld" (I know a member of that family), is the "ragged staff" of the Beauchamp Earls of Warwick.

OLD AND NEW STYLE

"At the time of the first settlement of New England, the English people began the New Year on the 25th of March, Annunciation (or Lady) Day. Any dates between January 1st and March 25th appearing on the original records of those times should have one year added. Later, a new form of designating the year was adopted; the first time it was used by the General Court of Connecticut was 'this 20th day of March, 1649/50',-1650 by our present reckoning. This style prevailed about one hundred years, and the date of all the months of the year should be carried forward, between 1600 and 1700, ten days; between 1700 and 1752, when the English government changed their dates from old style to new style, there should be eleven days added."-Henry R. Stiles.

JOHN FAIRFIELD OF WENHAM AND HIS DESCENDANTS

John Fairfield had land in Charlestown in 1638 by which others (including George Bunker) bounded their property in the Charlestown Book of possessions (Boston Record Commissioners' Report, Volume III, pp. 3-4, 26, 28, and 40), although his own land was not recorded, probably because before the registration was completed in 1639 he had moved to Salem and sold the Charlestown property to some one else who registered it in his own name. Had liberty from the town to buy John Baker's house, 1638. Tradition in some branches of the family says that he came over to Massachusetts in 1635; this is so far undocumented. Salem Court Record of July 16, 1639, says: "John FFairefeild desires accommodation" and on Dec. 23, 1639, he was granted land, 80 acres for a farm, "10 acres of which to be meadow". He later bought 18 acros from William Fisk, and had "house (and) ground" in co-partnership with Joseph Batchelder. Admitted to Salem Church, August 25, 1639; freeman, May 13, 1640; the Enon area in which his land was situated was set apart as the town of Wenham on "ye tenth day of ye third month anno 1643" (Nay 10, 1643 old style). On a later survey, part of his eighty acres proved to be in the part of Ipswich known as Ipswich Hamlet, now called Hamilton.

In 1641, John Fairfield presented at court the nuncupative will of Frances, then wife of Robert Hawes, and in the court proceedings, he is described as "brother Fairfeild". Her first husband was Robert Edwards, aged about 22, who came on the "Hopewell" from London in 1635. By him, she had two sons, Robert Jr. and Matthew Edwards; and by Robert Hawes, her second husband, a son Thomas. In a deed given February, 1658/9, Matthew Edwards speaks of "Uncle John Fairfield, deceased". It therefore seems practically cortain that Mrs. Frances () Edwards Hawes was his sister, a Fairfield. She mentions in her will a "sister Ellin Hilles in Old England". These may prove clues to help trace the connection in England, although so far they have drawn only a blank. John Fairfield was again in court in 1641 and again in 1643. On September 9, 1646, he signed an inventory of the estate of Widow Mary Hersoin of Wenham and the original document has his only known autograph (see frontispieco). The inventory of his estate was taken Dec. 23, 1646, and his will was probated July 6, 1647 (see pp. 2-5).

- (2) This account would appear to be that of Peter Palfrey in settlement of his wife's (Elizabeth Knight Fairfield Falfrey) estate on her death. If so, it would set the date of her death roughly two years and five months after her marraige to Peter Palfrey. On July 7, 1647 she still swore to inventory as "Elizabeth Fairfield". By December, 1649, according to Matthew Edwards, she was dead. This would look as if Walter (about 14 in 1646) stayed with his mother only five months; John (about 5 in 1646) stayed with her only two years; and Benjamin, six months old when his father died, stayed with her the full two years and five months until her death. Walter Fairfield was a leading figure in the life of Wenham: member of jury at County Court of Salem, June 25, 1667; served on committees in Wenham as early as Nov. 8, 1667; kept an "ordinary" at Wenham, licensed 1680 and 1686 (an evidence of public trust in those days); treasurer and constable, 1676; selectman several times, 1668-1709; sergeant, 1683 and Ensign, 1695; representative to General Court in 1692 and 1700; moderator of town meeting, Wenham, 1706-1709; signed petition to the king, 1675 and represented Wenham 1689 in moves to secure restoration of the Massachusetts Bay Charter and of the General Court, after restoration of William and Mary. Called "yooman" and "turner". Involved in many litigations, some involving rather violent outbursts of language and action, and one "for detaining or not requiring his servent John Bescon to attend the publich worship of God on the Lord's Day". The probate of his estate from 1723 to 1726 is recorded in Essex Probate records. Joined Wenham Church on April 25, 1718, aged 86:

Sarah Skipper seems almost certainly to have been the daughter of William Skipper, rector of Thorpe by Wainflete, who apparently joined the Puritan movement and was in Massachusetts by 1640. He was the great-grandson of Richard Skipper of East Kirby, who m. Audrey Grynne before 1492, the daughter of Ralph and grand-daughter of Richard Grynne, whose heiress she was in 1492. Owned land in Sutton, April 15, 1726; in Oxford, 1728; and bought land in Lexington, March 25, 1731, for ±660; 1740 sold land in Lexington for ±700 (witnessed by John Hancock and John Hancock, Jr.); (probably) bought land in Cold Spring (Belchertown) in 1741, where his son Walter⁴ "of Hatfield" had bought land in 1737, and transferred this land to his son Stephen⁴ whose son Thadeus⁵ sold it in 1780. This land was described in both cases as on the Hadley line and was in the part of Belchertown now adjacent to Granby.

The identification of various members of the Fairfield family with Ipswich as well as Wenham becomes clearer when it is remembered that the original Fairfield homestead assigned by Salem turned out to be "partly in Wenham and partly in Ipswich" when proper surveys were made, and that later that part of Ipswich, called "the Hamlet", was set apart into a separate parish and town called Hamilton. It is therefore possible that Walter's last four children, described as born in Wenham, may have been born in the same house as his first nine children, described as born in Ipswich, or at least born on the same farm. In this latter deed, he is described as "of Muddy River" (now Brookline). In 1695, he was taxed in New Castle, N. H., where his wife's family had important holdings. March 12, 1693/4 he deeded to William3 Fairfield (114) "about sixty acres of upland and meadow in Wenham", inherited by his father John from John. Thus, apparently, he wound up his interests in Wenham and Ipswich. In 1695, he was taxed in New Castle, N. H. where his wife's family had important interests. In Nov., 1694, he rode post from New Castle to Boston on Thomas Dearborne's horse, impressed for 8 shillings. "Confirmed a deed in Essex Co, in 1703 which was originally signed in 1693/4" (Oliver Jay Fairfield). His son John was apparently baptized in Wenham in 1706/7 while his parents were on a visit there. No further facts have been discovered prior to Elizabeth's second marriage in 1718. His son, John4, was the founder of the Kennebunkport line of Fairfields, to which a large number of present-day Fairfields belong.

Skipper Fairfield bought land in Sutton, Sept. 9, 1729. William³ Fairfield of Wenham transferred to son Skipper "all my farm in Sutton", Sept. 25, 1730. Dec. 3, 1730, "Skipper Fairfield of Wenham" sold to Jonathan Dunnel of Lynn for £150 150 acres in Sutton. June 30, 1747, "Skipper Fairfield of Sutton, yeoman, and wife Rosanna" sold his farm there. March 26, 1748, "Skipper Fairfield of Sutton" bought land in Glocester, R. I. and thereafter purchased other plots until Sept. 14, 1757.

Beginning with August 11, 1762, Skipper deeded land to his three sons, perhaps when they reached a certain age, or in the case of the first two, after their marriages and in lieu of a will, as there is no probate record. On the first date, he deeded to Abraham Fairfield, his son, "husbandman" "for and in consideration of paternal affection that I have and do bare toward my son Abraham and for his more comfortable settlement", 160 acres of land with one dwelling house, etc. On August 13, 1764, he made a similar deed of 135 acres, dwelling house and other buildings, to his son William Fairfield, using similar language of "goodwill and paternal affection". On December 14, 1768, he made a similar deed with similar language of 130 acres to his son John Fairfield. This is his last recorded deed, and probate records contain nothing about the administration of his estate. The sons below are listed in order of these deeds.

Walter Fairfield appears in Hatfield records first at the time of his marriage (see note under 13, Samuel Fairfield). It is possible that he went there in connection with the property of his brother, Samuel, who may have d. as late as 1736. On Aug. 12, 1737, "Walter Fairfield of Hatfield, cordwainer", bought land in Belchertown, of which he sold at least part on Dec. 12, 1748, to "Daniel Fairfield of Oxford, Mass." (probably Daniel (11841) but possibly Daniel (1184)) and to James Town of Oxford ("Land adjaining Daniel Fairfield's land"). On May 25, 1761, Walter Fairfield and others were chosen road surveyors in Belchertown. It is stated by Dr. William F. English of Hartford that a grant of land in Lyme, N. H. was made to Walter, presumably by Governor Wentworth. The grantees' index of "Deeds Recorded at Secretary of State's Office, Concord, N. The known facts about this William are tentalizingly meagre in view of the fact that he is probably the ancestor of the Canadian family of Fairfields now centered in Collins Bay, Ontario. He was the only surviving child of his father's first wife, Elizabeth Sweetser, who died of smallpox in 1721. Dec. 4, 1729 (or April 12, 1729), his father William gave bond as his guardian as heir to the land of his grandfather, Benjamin Sweetser of Malden. On October 21, 1741, "Wm. Fairfield, Jr. of So. Ringston, R. I., bricklayer" sold his share of that land for 190 to Joseph Wilson of Malden. That is the last that can be learned of him, as he appears in neither the probate nor the register of deeds of Kingston, R. I. orenywhere else. In the will of his father, dated May 7, 1770, and approved May 29, 1770, he gives to his "six children - namely William, John, Elizabeth, Esther, Sarah and Ann, all the residue and remainder of my Estate" etc.; but interlined the words: "But in case my Son William nor his heirs should not then make any demand in seven Years from this date, then what I have already given and which he stands charged within my Books is to be infull of his shre in my Estate." On October 30, 1770, at the preliminary accounting of the estate, John Kneeland, Samuel Downe and Jonathan Brown were appointed to make distribution of the balance. When they reported on the distribution (Dec. 7, 1770, Suffolk County Probate Records Vol. 69, pp. 397-400), William was included in the distribution, including a share in one of the houses. The distributors state that they had first notified Capt. Giles Harris "who is specinted by the said Judge of Probate to represent the said William Fairfield the Son, who is now out of the province." This sounds as if his whereabouts at that time was a mystery to the court and to his family. His brother, Rev. John (1144x), in his diary reports his trip to Boston in connection with his father's estate, but breathes never a word about William⁵. Where was he?

In 1761 or 1762, a Capt. Jonathan Willard (b. Roxbury about 1720; in early life for many years an inhabitant of Colchester, Ct.) went to Pawlet, Vermont and made some clearings on the land of which he was one of the original grantces under a grant from the governor of New Hampshire, dated Aug. 26, 1761. It was a speculative invostment, and he listed the names of a number of his old neighbors in Colchester, from whom he later bought their claims. A William Fairfield was the second settler in town, and apparently purchased rights as a grantee from Willard or some one else, as he was prominent in the proprietors' meetings and at one time moderator. He was still in good standing as late as March 18, 1777; but was among those tried as a Tory in April, 1777, and apparently all his property was confiscated, although by order of the Council of Safety, Oct. 3, 1777, his wife was allowed to regain two yearling colts which had been taken, and on Feb. 18, 1779, she was allowed the use of two fifty-acre lots for the support of herself and family. This William Fairfield served throughout the rest of the war with Jessup's Rangers, and as a consequence at the end of the war sought refuge with his family in Upper Canada (Ontario), where he was compensated by a generous grant of land, and is honored in Canada as a United Empire Loyalist.

Family tradition in Canada is that the family was connected with the Massachusetts family, and one member stated that Governor John Frinfield of Maine (1144x11) was a cousin, as he would have been if this family was descended from William, brother of Rev. John, the grandfather of Governor John. However, children of the Fairfield of Pawlet were born in Pawlet and Ontario from 1769 to 1791, when this William would have been 73 years old, a possibility but improbable. Therefore it seems necessary to postulate another generation in between, and to call the United Empire Loyalist William, if indeed he is in the family. Assuming that he is and that the family tradition of his brothers is correct, there would be children as appear below.

*The name "Sabra" is suggested for William⁵'s wife because of the fact that the name occurs as the name of a daughter in two Fairfield lines at a point which would have made them (ex hypothesi) granddaughters of William⁵ and his wife. This looks like more than a coincidence.

A Jonathan Fairfield, not otherwise identified, was a private in the Revolution in Rhode Island, in 1776, and in a Mhode Island regiment, in February, 1781, or later (Vital Record of Rhode Island, Vol. 12, "Cowell's Spirit of '76 Index", pp. 115 and 217. It may also be significant that a Sabra Fairfield was b. March 23, 1795 and died on March 6, 1838, as the wife of Robert H. Dean, b. Dec. 18, 1794 and living in Burrillville, R. I. There were also marriages of a Cynthia Fairfield (Nov. 20, 1808) and of a Martha Fairfield (Oct. 8, 1815), who would have been born before 1800; and also the record of the birth-date of a Candace Fairfield, wife of Olney Fairfield, who herself was b. Sept. 1, 1813. It would therefore appear that there was in Rhode Island a Fairfield family which might have been descended from William of So. Kingston, and from Jonathan6. So far, no further light on this family has been discovered. There was also a Capt. Nicholas Fairfield with wife Betsey, who lived in Wrenthem, Mess, just ecross the border from Rhode Island, and who lad children born from 1813 to 1824, and who is not related to known lines.

John⁵ was a graduate of Harvard in 1757, and then held several parishes in Maine and Massachusetts before being "settled" as pastor of the Saco (Pepperrellboro) church on Oct. 27, 1762. Hamilton), including numerous incidental references to members of his own family, including various cousins.

Matthew⁵ marched to Lexington and Concord with Captain Billy Porter's Company of Wenham minutemen and became Lieutenant in Captain Barnabas Dodge's Company and then Captain in Col. Calvin Smith's (late Wigglesworth's) Regiment of the Continental Army until October 22, 1777, when he resigned. He was sent to quell a Tory rebellion in New Hampshire, found friends there at New Boston, and in 1785 moved his family there. NEW BOSTON, N. H. soon became the center of the main Fairfield family line, and the records of the family, including those of William³ at least, were taken there, possibly by Benjamin⁶ (114xii51) or his mother upon the death of Dr. Joseph W. in 1808, when she moved to New Boston. Benjamin⁶ still had two leather trunks full of these records in 1864-65, when they were inspected by Mrs. Abigail Fairfield Crombie Stephens, who took some of them with his permission. These are now lost.


A Nathaniel Fairfield felled first trees and built first cabin in New Boston, N. H. The births of his children were recorded in Wenham and Ipsvich, and Revolutionary War record shows Nathaniel as resident of Ipswich. In 1790 Census, listed at New Boston. 1792-1797 Tabitha was called "spinster" by her father in legal documents, a designation not unknown for married women under certain circumstances. It is possible that they had separated by that time. This is probably the Nathaniel Fairfield with one son under 26 listed in the Vermont 1800 Census at Lutterloh (now Albany). In 1798, Isaac Perkins Fairfield of "Craftesborough" Vermont, and Jacob Fairfield of Craftsbury quitclaimed all rights in the personal estate of Joseph Cogin (except to the heirship of the widow's dower) on behalf of their wives, Hannah and Ruth respectively, of Amherst, New Hampshire, where Tabitha Fairfield had bought land in 1797.

FAIRFIELD FAMILIES IN ENGLAND (prior to 1660)

Almost nothing has been published in America on families in the British Isles from whom the families of Fairfields in the United States and Canada may be descended. Volume 31 of the Essex Institute Collections has a short article on the Fairfields of Leek Parish, Staffordshire, England, in which Putnam's Magazine Volume 6, page 186 is quoted. Banks' Topographical Dictionary has the statement that Daniel Fairfield, "the half-Dutchman" of Salem and Boston, came from Norvich, England. Dexter, in "The England and Holland of the Pilgrims", gives information concerning a Daniel Fairfield who was with the Pilgrims in Leyden, from Colchester, England, the son of a James Fairfield. He was married in Leyden in 1618 and apparently died there before 1626, when his widow (nee Rebecca Willett) married Thomas Jepson. He had sons named John and Daniel in 1622. No other references published in America have been found by the compiler.

The writer spent a limited time in England in the summer of 1948, following initial correspondence with Fairfields in the United States and Canada about their English origins, and with Fairfields in England whose names had come to him in various vays. With the time at his disposal, he was able to visit only London and Colchester, but spent many hours in the Library of the Society of Genealogists, where he was able to consult a considerable variety of indexed material and some unindexed material in published parish registers and directories. Obviously it would be possible to spend an unlimited amount of time in research in the unindexed registers, especially if one were to try to cover those of places where there were no known Fairfield records. However, it seems worthwhile to make available what he has found that may have a bearing on the ancestry of John Fairfield of Wenham.

The Name

The name Fairfield appears to be a simple English name. The tradition of several branches of the main Fairfield family in the United States (descended from John¹ Fairfield of Wenham, Massachusetts, first mentioned in Charlestown, 1638) is that the family name was originally Beauchamp and that they were a French Huguenot family which came to England before the Massacre of St. Bartholomew's. This clue led to the discovery of the Fairfield names in the "Dutch" church at Colchester, which included refugees from the Lowlands, Walloons as well as Flemish. Associated with them were persons by the name of "Schoonevelde" and probably also "Skoronfyld", which looks like an English clerk's attempt to record the guttural pronunciation of "Schooneveld". In conversation with a German acquaintance named Schönfeld, reference was made to the identity of the name with that of Fairfield. The illuminating reply was that his "German" family was not originally German, but was a French Huguenot family named Beauchamp which had emigrated to East Irussia because of religious persecution! In the Channel Islands the names Fairfield and Beauchamp are said to be used interchangeably. French-Canadian Beauchamps coming to the United States have changed their names to Fairfield. A Fairfield found in London explained that the family name had been originally Schönfeld (changed in 1914-15 for obvious reasons); that the family had been in Holland for several generations; but that it had come "originally" from Germany. This gentleman (Fairfield" alias "Schonfeld") showed a signet ring with the Schonfeld coat of arms, and

mentioned various places where it was found in Germany. He professed to be entirely ignorant of any possible French or English Beauchamp connection; but the coat of arms turned out to be that of the Beauchamps, Earls of Warwick, a "ragged staff" which was incorporated into the arms of Richard Neville, Earl of Warwick (the "King maker") when he married Anne Beauchamp, the last heiress of the Beauchamp line, who brought him the earldom!

Still another problem arises from statements in the book "The Norman People and their Existing Descendants in the British Dominions and the United States of America" published by Henry S. King and Company, London, 1874. The anonymous author made a thorough study of changes which had taken place in the names of Normans, primarily retainers of the nobility in the Norman Conquest, including changes in initial letters and in terminations as well as other modifications in the process of becoming Anglicized. After citing examples of standard changes which he had established by identity of armorial bearings, such as Granville into Greenfield, Blonville into Bloomfield and Fauville into Fallowfield, he lists other names which by analogy he believedoriginated in the same way, such as Somerville into Somerfield, Wateville into Waterfield and Fierville into Fairfield. (p. 76). Later, in an alphabetical sories of Norman names and families from the London Post Office Directory, he lists:

"Fairfield or Fierville. Lovel, Ralph and Roger de Fiervilla of Normandy, 1180-1195, MRS.". (MRS is the abbreviation for Magn. Rotul. Scaccarii Normanniae in the Memoires de la Societe' des Antiquaires de la Normandy.)

There are thus at least three possible origins for the name of Fairfield. It may be of English or Saxon origin, possibly with an original meaning different from its prima facie one. It may be an Anglicized transliteration of a French original, like Fierville or Fyervyll (see Giles Fyervell, locksmith, born in Lysycaux in Normandy, in Westminister Denizen Rolls, July, 1544-Hug. Soc. Vol. VIII, p. 89). Or it may be a translation of the equivalent French Beauchamp, German Schönfeld, Flomish Schoonevelde, Dutch Schooneveld or even the Scotch Campbell, said to be abbreviated from "Campobello." It is entirely possible that in a country like England which has received so many persons coming from the Continent, foreign names might have been assimilated to existing Anglo-Saxon names, as Canadian Beauchamps have translated their names into Fairfield when they came to the United States.

Topographical

Putting together all the material now available, Fairfield records or allusions are found in London, (including Surrey and Hertfordshire), Berkshire, Cambridgeshire, Essex, Lancashire, Leicestershire, Norfolk, Nottinghamshire, Oxfordshire, Staffordshire, and Warwickshire. (Some of these are after 1660.) Place names are as follows:

London-Bermondsey, Bishopsgate, Bunhill, Deptford, Eastcheap, Essenden (Herts.), Holborn, Lambeth. Southwark, Streatham, Tooting Graveney, Whitechapel, Bride Lanc, Durweston Street, and Welleck Street.

Chronological

The earliest Feirfield mentioned was found in an abstract of a will copied by J. H. Bloom, Esq. among the manuscripts of the Society of Genealogists (listed in Prerogative Court of Canterbury Wills, Vol. 1, p. 197). In a will dated November 23, 1487, John Fayrfeld of "Stretcham" disposed of an estate comprising lands in "Lokkynges, Berks; Ardington, Berks; Totynge Graveney and Stretcham" "which were John Grene the tehement called Nichelas lands called Holdenso" which were willed to his wife Joane, and other property willed in various ways, with residue to his wife and "Master Edmund Munvyll clerk for souls health." Apparently no descendants survived him.

In 1521, a Richard Farrefeld was mentioned in the will of his cousin, Richard Dale of Cambridge.

In 1546, a Wm. Feyrfeld was listed among those taxed in Leek, Staffordshire.

In 1560/61, a Robert Fairefield of the City of London left property to his uncle, Henry Fairefield; and in 1562, a Henry Fairefielde of the City of London, "Gent.", left property to his relict, Christina Fairfelde.

In 1563, a William Fearefielde, a servant with William Abram, was buried at St. Mary's, Woolnoth London.

From 1587 to 1605, a William ffeyrefeld or Fayreffield appears in the Quarter Sessions Rolls of Staffordshire, and on other documents as witness. Variant spellings of the name in the records are: Feyrfeld, Fayrfeld, Ferefeild, ffeyrefyld, Ferfeeld, Fearfild, Fearfyld, Fairefelt, Feyrefeld. It may or may not be the same man. In 1587, 1588, and 1588/9, he was summoned as "late of Leeke, victualler" or "late of Leeke, tippler", but from 1592/3 to 1601 he was licensed as an alekeoper at Leeke almost every

year. In 1604, a Wm. Fairefelt, husbandman, was surety for John Fynney and James Banne, victuallers; in 1605, a Wm. Feyrefeld was surety for John Fynney and Timothy Cooke; and in 1605, Wm. Fairefelt of Milne St., yeoman, was licensed to keep an alehouse in Leeke. In the same period, in 1594, a Thos. Fairefelt (Fairefeld) was twice listed among the alekeepers at Uttoxator, twenty miles more or less south of Leek.

In 1592, a Christopher Fayrefeild was buried in St. Botolph's, Bishops-gate, London.

From 1590 to 1600, we find a group of names in Colchester. In 1590, Svghter and Petter Skorenfyld were listed among the "Dewchmen in the North Ward, generally baymakers and gardeners" and also as "spelers, Duchemen." Wm. Skorenfeld appears in the same list. On February 29, 1596, a Willem van Schoonevelde was received as a member of the Dutch Church in London, coming there with attestations from Colchester; and on August 1, 1596, a Willem van Schoonevelde "v. Ruerne" married "Jossynken Neve Janssens v. Gendt." In 1597-98, an Outer van Faierfeld was listed as an alien in Lexden, Colchester; and in 1600, William Farfield (St. James Parish), Pieter Schoonebelde (Trinitic Parish) and Pieter van Furfeild of Lexden were also listed as aliens. (Incidentally, the Daniel Fairfield from Colchester who was married in Leyden in 1618 and described as "Daniel Jacobusson" i. e. son of James, was spelled "Ferfelt" in the Dutch records.)

In 1597, a John Fayrfeilde of St. Saviour's Southwarke, butcher, made a will in which he mentioned his wife Joane Fayrefyelde, and his daughter Joane, but no sons.

In 1601, Ezekiel Fairfieldwas buried in Deptford, London. In 1604 a John Ferfield is listed in Volume IX of the P.C.C. Wills (60 Harte) as having made a will but the index gives no place.

In 1607, a Jas. Fearfield was buried in Bermondsey, London and in 1610, an Anne Fairefield (Feirfeild), a widow, was buried in Whitechapell, Middlesex.

There then follows a long list of Fairfields (mostly standardized as "Fearfeild" or "Fearfield") in and around Leek, Staffordshire, beginning with the mention of Francis, Richard and John Fairfield in the will of Thomas Pillsbury of Roach Grange in his will dated October 20, 1608. On March 3, 1612, a John Fairfield of Holm Mylne, Leek, yeoman, in his will mentioned his wife Isabel, his grandchild Elizabeth Hibbarde, and his godson, John Fairfield. The will was witnessed by John Fairfield, Jr., Nicholas Fairfield and Nicholas Fairfield, Jr. (The two Nicholases do not appear again in any record.)

The first parish register of Leek, 1538-1634, is lost, thereby making it impossible to connect the Fairfields in the quarter sessions entries of the sixteenth century with those in the parish records of the seventeenth century. Several families emerge in these later records. On April 30, 1634, Anne Fearfeild married H. Bearda. In 1635, an Elizabeth Fearfeild, the daughter of Tho. and Ellen Fairfield, was baptized. The following February, 1635/1636, a William Fairfield married an Anna Watson, and later records show children born to "W and Anne Fearfield of Bridge end" as follows:

John Fearfield bapt. 9 January 1638/9
Anne Fearfeild bapt. 14 March 1641
"Fearfeild of Bridge end infant" buried 8 May, 1643
William Fearfild bapt. 13 May, 1644
Tho. Fearfield bapt. 16 Dec. 1646. (buried 1 Feb. 1648)
Richard Fearfeild bapt. 28 Nov. 1648

A Mary Fearfield, daughter of W. and Mary Fairfield of White's Bridge, was baptized 18 Dec., 1636. The names of this W. and Mary do not appear further in the Leek records, but the wills of a Wm. Fairfield and Mary his wife were administered in Osgathorpe, Leicestershire, in 1639-40.

Various Johns need to be distinguished. A John Fearfeilde of "Beggarsway" was buried on 16 Aug., 1638. A John Fearfield and Joan Booth were married 2 Feb., 1640. He apparently was the John Fearfeild of Overhulme to whom the following children were ascribed:

Mary Fearfeild bpt. 29 Jan. 1642/43 Jane Fearfeild bpt. 29 July, 1648 Martha "dau. of John and Joan Fearfeild of Ouhulme" bapt. 4 June, 1649

(The will of John Fayrfeild of Overhulme, Leeke, Staffs, was probated 1653/4.)

A John Fairfield married Dorothy Gent on May 30, 1642. Margaret Fairfield, daughter of John and Dorothy Fearfeild was baptized January 27, 1642/3. After May 21, 1643, the signature of "Jo. Fearfeild de Leek" appears among those signing the register of the parish church. The will of "John Fairfield of Leek yeoman" (listed as Dec. 10, 1646) mentions:

Brother William Fairfield (of Bridge end - see above)
his son John
Brother Richard Fairfield
Sister Marie Watson (? - see below)
Wife Dorothie
Daughters Margaret
Rebecca
Mother Elizabeth Fairfield

Rebecca Fearfeild, the daughter, was buried on February 11, 1647; and John himself was buried on February 13, 1647. (After February 26, 1647, there is a notation in the register "Time of Plague" and on June 6, 1648, where usually there would be the signatures of the Vicar and four wardens, there are only the signatures of the Vicar and one warden, with the notation "rest perished.")

On September 19, 1644, Mary Fearfeild married Wm. Walton. (It would appear that either this should be the "Watson" above or vice versa, as it would appear to refer to the sister "Marie".)

(Note: The writer stopped with page 84 of the Leek Parish Register (unindexed) in the Staffordshire Parish Registers series and made only a spot check every 10 years through 1690, finding no Fairfield entries in 1659/60, 1670, 1680, and 1690. A careful study of all the pages after page 84 might be of interest to English Fairfields, but would probably throw little light on settlers in America.)

On July 5, 1635, a Mary, daughter of Daniel Fairfield, was baptized in St. John Maddermarket, Norwich. This is the note on which Banks in his "Topographical Dictionary" bases the statement that Daniel Fairfield of Salem and Boston, "the half-Dutchman", came from Norwich. This would seem to be confirmed by the fact that a "Mary of Daniel Fairfield" was buried in Boston, Massachusetts Bay, in the "5th month" of 1639. As was frequently the custom when a baby with a desired name died, a 'Mary of Daniel and Elizabeth Fairefield" was recorded as born "7th day 5 months 1643." So far as can be found, the last male descendant of this Daniel Fairfield was Daniel³ Fairfield, born Boston December 1, 1680 and died after June 16, 1708, when his father's will was drawn and when he was therein described as "my Son Daniel Fairfield who is now Absent at Sea." No further record of him or of his death has been found. The only child of this Daniel mentioned in his father's will was a daughter, Grace, who married John Howell, Boston, December 23, 1719. This is so far the only link between Fairfields in England and in Massachusetts Bay Colony, and apparently the male line ceased with this Daniel3, so that there are no Fairfields living today who are descended from him.

"Essex Ship Money Subsidies" for 1636 lists a Benjamin Fairfield at Sutton, Essex; and records that Luke Feyerfild of St. James Parish, Colchester, was taxed on lands.

Further entires of the Colchester family seem to be:

1610-"Reb. Fairfield and Jos. Drake m. Colchester, Bot."

"Sus Fairfield and Jn Wede m. Colchester, Peter"

"Lucas Fairfield and Gra Brignell m. Colchester, Mary Walls"

1627-"Malachy Fairfell and Mary Cornwall m. Colchester, Terling"

1633-16 Aug. "Grace Outer als Fairfield" dau. of Luke Baptized at St. James Parish, Colchester

1650-Luke Fairfell and Emm Harlow m. Colchester, Leon"

1659-"Luke Fairfield made his will" (Calendar only - PCC VIII f. 195)

In 1658, a Benjamin Fairofeild of Rayleigh, Essex made his will (PCC VIII p. 210, f. 221).

Returning again to London, we find the remaining Fairfields prior to 1660 noticed as follows:

- 4 Feb. 1626 William Sanckey and Anne Farfeild, both of St. Mary Woolnoth married in that parish.
 - 1635 William Fearefeild and Margaret Bishop Married at St. Botolph's, Bishopsgate.
- 16 Feb. 1636/7 Rob. Fairefield and Eliz. Wilson banns in London (no parish given; in 1663-6, a Robt. Fairfield on Bride Lane paid hearth tax).
 - 1638 Elias Fairfield paid ±7 rents and tithes in the Parish of St. John the Baptist.

Summary

In summary, then, this study shows that there were Fairfields in London and its vicinity before 1487 and in Staffordshire by 1546. These may have been descendants of Normans by the name of Fierville or Fyervyll. The name

may have been taken by Saxons, and have an entirely different meaning from its present obvious English one. Both these dates, however, antedate the coming of the first Huguenots in the reign of Edward VI (1547-1553) who gave them the church in Austin Friars, Broad Street. Flemings had come to England in the reign of Edward III (1327-1377) and settled in London, Kent, Norfolk, Devon, Somerset, Yorkshire, Lancashire and Westmoreland. With the increase of persecution in France and the Low Countries, Flemings and French alike came across the channel in great numbers, and plied a great number of skilled trades, including the making of "sayes and bayes" and of shoes. By far the largest proportion of the Protestant exiles settled in London. "Tottenham is turned French" was reported to be a proverb in the beginning of the reign of Henry VIII. It is therefore not impossible that these Fairfields were recent immigrants who had translated rather than transliterated their name. It does not seem to me probable.

The case is different in Colchester. There Outer van Faierfeld, William Farfield and Pieter van Furfeild were listed as aliens, in a community of mixed Flemish and French immigrants. The Flemish form of the name, Schoonevelde, appears. In the Dutch Church in London, a Beauchamp, Johannes f. Jan." was baptized on 15 Nov., 1646; he was probably the son of "John Beauchamp" who was received into membership in the Dutch Church, Austin Friars, on Wednesday, September 5, 1646, on the strength of a letter from the Consistory of the English Reformed Church in "Amstelredam" and whose wife, Sophia de Wolff, was also received on Thursday, September 13, 1646. Earlier, a William van Schoonevelde was received into membership on the basis of attestations from Colchester; and married a girl from Ghent. (Unfortunately, the earliest records of the Dutch Church in Colchester, prior to 1645, are missing, probably as the result of the occupation of St. Giles' Church (where it worshipped) by Parliementary troops in connection with the siege of Colchester in 1648.) These data are not sufficient to prove the American Fairfield family tradition that the family name was originally Beauchamp; that the family was Protestant and fled from France before the Massacre of St. Bertholomew (August 23, 1572); and that it translated its name into Fairfield before John Fairfield came to America. However, they do portray a milieu in which all these things may easily have been true, and give no evidence to confute it. It therefore seems to the present writer probable that although we cannot document the belief, John Fairfield of Charlestown, Salem and Wenham originated in the Huguenot colony in England. From the fact that both he and his sister Frances (Edwards) (Hawes) seem to have had considerable means at the time of their deaths, it is perhaps more probable that they came from London than from Colchester, even though Daniel Fairfield who was with the Filgrims in Leyden was from Colchester.

Note: It may be a matter of interest to English Fairfields that there was another John Fairfield in the early days in New England, who was made a freemen in Rhode Island in 1665 and in 1660 was one of the original purchasers of Westerly, R. I. He apparently died without issue after December 26, 1689, when with the consent of his wife he deeded all his estate to a Mary Babcock on condition that she would "maintain me and my wife with sufficient meat, drink, clothing, washing and lodging during our lives." His wife's name was Anphillis or Anfillis.

There is also a still unconfirmed statement that there was a Richard Fairfield who was a lawyer in Suffolk County (Massachusetts) in 1637.

However, all present day Fairfields in America who can trace their ancestry here back to the Seventeenth Century have proved to be descended from John of Wenham.

- Notes

 1. All known (and probable) descendants, male and female, are included by their given names through the sixth generation; but full information is given only for the first five generations.
- 2. Following each given name is the "generation number" (e.g. John²) and then the "identification number" (e.g. 114x2) which indicates the line of descent in order of seniority, i. e. 114x2 is the second child of the tenth child of the fourth child of the first child of John¹. Small Roman numerals are used for children beyond the ninth child, so that each digit (or Roman numeral) represents a generation. In the very small number of cases where two Roman numerals have to follow each other, they are separated by a hyphen (e.g. xi-xvi). An asterisk (*) indicates that so far as known, the person died without issue, although not necessarily unmarried.
- 3. In the case of married women, the married surname in parenthesis follows the numbers.
- 4. Following the preceding data, there will be found the towns or cities with which the person was associated, ordinarily in the order of chronological mention in records, but each town is mentioned only once. Omission does not prove that the person did not have connection with a given town, since there may have been omissions in the body of the book or in indexing, or in recording data. (A person who lived in a town without being born, married or dying there, or having property, or leaving a will, or misbehaving sufficiently to get into court records, or being a member of a church such a person may have left no trace in surviving records; and many town records are notoriously incomplete.) For the complete list of persons connected with a given town, so far as known, see the Index of Places. If no state is given, the assumption is that the town is in Massachusetts.

How to use this Index

- 1. The page number is given <u>before</u> the name. Where there are two numbers, in the case of men with descendants, the second number gives fuller information, including his children.
- 2. Where the index gives several persons with the same given name, e. g. Abigail, the names of places with which each was associated will often furnish a clue to the right person.
- 3. In the case of Fairfield women, their married names will give additional clues.
- 4. The generation number tells to which generation the person belonged. The years covered by the several generations are approximately:
