This pamphlet owes its existence to the interest felt in his ooth year by Mr. Thaddeus Fairbanks in the family history, and it was the first printed record of the large Fairbanks family. The first eight pages have been rewritten, the rest is made up from the sheets printed in 1885. He died April 12, 1886, honored and beloved. With very few exceptions all in America who bear the name Fairbanks or Fairbank are descended from Ionathan Fairbanke who came from England with his family in 1633. The name is spelled variously in the ancient documents, (see Appendix), oftenest with a final "e" which made like "s" has been generally so read, and in like manner "Sowerby" has been read "Somerby."

The order of the present arrangement is primarily by generations; then those of each generation are arranged by families, placing first those of older sons. In any generation the sons of each family in the order of their ages are designated by capital letters in alphabetical order; those of the first generation by the left hand letter, those of the second by the second and so on. So in the fourth generation three letters appear, indicating the great grandfather, the grandfather and the father of the person before whose name they stand, and in any generation the letters before any name make evident at a glance the whole line of that person's ancestors, and his relation to every other whose name appears in the book.

Acknowledgements are due to Rev. Hiram F. Fairbanks of Milwaukee, and to Mr. Robert Fairbanks of London for their most successful investigations, bringing to light the early history of the family: also to Prof. Arthur Fairbanks.

There is an old tradition in England, but without proof, that the first of the sur-name came from Scotland, the name perhaps varied from Firbank and Fairbairn or translated from Bello Monte, the name of a Crusader's family that disappeared as Fairbanks appeared. The earliest documents containing the Fairbank name date from the time of Edward IV, soon after A. D. 1461. In that reign we find William Fairbanke, Edmund Fairbanke the Elder and Richard Fairbanke evidently near relatives, holding much property in Sourbie and the hamlets around, in the hill country on the borders of Yorkshire and Lancashire. "Rycharde" in his will refers to "my fader in Kendal, as I was borne," and there in the Lake region is a group of farms named "Fairbank" Near Sowerby now a councillor Christopher Fairbank and his brother David are in business at Rochdale. Their grandfather Christopher moved from Sowerby some hundred years ago, and his father used to speak of his "uncle Jonathan who went to America." Halifax is four miles from Sowerby, and many of the Fairbank name are living there and in the villages around. From the Court Records of lawsuits and transfers of leased land, (leased for all land was held, owned by the king, "lord"), from the recorded wills and from the Parish Records of births, marriages and deaths we are able to trace the line almost certainly from William to Jonathan, as follows.

WILLIAM FAIREBANKE, born about 1455, died 1518.

"1492, 8th, Henry VII, William Fairbanke took land of the soil and waste of the lord, in Sourby to hold according to the custom of the manor."

"May 18, 1498, 13th, Henry VII, William Fairebank, a tenant, surrendered a close called Wyplufroide in Warley into the hands of the lord." And

In 1503 "one messuage, and 22 acres of land to John Turnour." "1514, 6th. Henry VIII, Johannis Haldeworth et Willelmus

Fairebanke electi sunt ad officium prepositi."

JOHN FAIREBANKE, son of William, born about 1480 died 1551.

"1504, 19th, Henry VII. Edmund Fairebanke surrendered one rood of land with the buildings thereon, lately taken from the waste, in Soureby, to the use of John Fairebanke son of William Fairbanke, and the heirs of his body lawfully begotter."

"1506, 22d, Henry VII. William Faerbaink surrendered all his estate and term of years not yet elapsed which he had in 17 a. of land and meadow called Brigbothame, and one croft called Pigilcroft in Soarbie to the use of John Faerbaink, sou of said William and his assigns during that term."

"1524, John Fairebanke one of the 'feofees' of the will of John Wodde."

GILBERT FAIREBANKE, son of John, born about 1505, died Mar. 3, 1577-8.

"1526, 19th, Henry VIII. John Fairbanke surrendered Brigbotham" &c. "to the use of Gilbert Fairebank, son of the aforesaid John Fairebank, and the heirs of his body lawfully begotter, rendering therefor yearly 48s. 9d."

"1550, 5th, Edward VI. John Fairbanke and Gilbert Fairbanke, son and heir of the said John, surrendered one messuage, one garden, and the moiety of one barn, and one croft called Laithecroft, and two closes of land and meadow called Overholme and Natherholme to" &c.

"1569, 11th, Elizabeth. Gilbert Fairebank would not pay the stipend of the minister or curate of the Chapel." "Fined 12d."

"JOHN, son of Gilbert Fearbank of Soarby, baptized May 6, 1547." Parish Register.

Gilbert Fairbank in his will dated 1577 mentions "George Edward," "John, Willm, Hughe, Agnes, also Elizabethe" as "children of myne, p'vided for" "who have had suche pte and porcon of my goods as I was able to give them, so that they may not nor oughte to chalance anie more," but he gives something to each of their children.

John was Constable in 1587 and 1595, and Juror in 1589 and 1595.

The Parish Registers show

born doubtless that year, but the Thornton Parish Register just there is mutilated.

The name Jonathan does not appear earlier in any of these records.

The will of John of Thornton divides his goods to "wife Elline," "sonne Jonathan, daughters Marie, Susanna, and Abagail," and grand-daughter Sara Crooke." "And it is my will and mynde that George, Michael and Jeremie, my sonnes, shall have noe part of my goods, for that I have and do intend sufficientlie to preferre them with my lands." So it appears that Jonathan was free to leave the country, while his younger brother George, whose will we have. (A. D. 1650, Appendix) is interested to remain. JONATHAN ffAIREBANKE came from Sowerby Bridge in the West Riding of Yorkshire in 1633. In 1636 he settled in Dedham, built the house which he had brought ready framed of oak from England, received small grants of land from the town in 1641 and later, and died there Dec. 5, 1668. His house is the larger middle section of the triple house now standing. —married May 20th, 1617, Grace Smith, Warley, Eng.

6. Jonathan. Will probated, Boston, Feb. 14, 1671. RICHARD FAIREBANKE probably came in the "Griffin" with his wife Elizabeth. He was admitted to the first church in Boston "in ye 8'th moneth, 1633," and "in ye 9'th moneth, Elizabeth Fairebaucke."

He was made freeman "by ye generall courte" May 14, 1634; was a man of some distinction, keeper of the Village Inn.

By the Governor and Company of Massachusetts Bay, March 12, 1638, was "aloued to sell wine and strong watr for the town of Boston;" and again in 1646 as a "man of good report and ability toe manage yt calling, if he shall be willing to take it." April 13, 1635, "att a generall meeting upon publique notice" he was "intreated to take the cows to keeping that are upon the neck;" in 1636 he was "chosen to serve of the pettie jury;" and in the same year was elected hog reeve to see "that every inhabitant among us forthwith ring and yoake their swine;" in 1637 was made "fould keeper:" also was allotted three and twenty acres of land. The same year he was disarmed for dangerous heresy "concerning the opinions and revelations of Mr. Wheelwright and Mrs. Hutchinson." but seems not to have continued long in disfavor. Nov. 9'th, 1639. he was appointed first post master for the whole colony, receiving "all letters from beyond the seas, or that are to be sent thither" and "allowed for every such letter a penny:" in 1642 was appointed to arrange for selling milk, and in 1643 was elected "sur, veyghour of the highwayes in this neck," In 1645 the book of possessions shows that he owned a house and garden on the east side of High street, where the Blue Anchor tavern was kept later. not far from Congress street, and a garden on the other side of Washington street, near where Music Hall now stands, reaching through to the common, also five acres adjoining the south side of the common, and four acres from Chambers street northeast to the river.

In 1830 he invented the Fairbanks' scale. having a platform supported at its corners by such a combination of levers that a load placed anywhere upon it will have its weight accurately indicated upon the scale beam. Later he patented the arrangement, now universally adopted in all refrigerators, of placing the ice higher than the article to be cooled, and the courts decided that he was the original inventor, entitled to the broad claim. He also patented steam-heating apparatus. For improvements in scales he has received thirty-three patents. Besides many medals from various exhibitions, he received at the Vienna world's fair exposition the highest honor given to any American and was made

a Knight of the Imperial Order of Francis Joseph. From other foreign countries he has received recognition as the inventor of standard scales. He has been an active promoter of religious and educational interests, having provided the buildings and most of the endowment of the St. Johnsbury Academy.
