

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GEORGE HUBBARD.

GEORGE HUBBARD, from England, was in Wethersfield 1636; was a deputy to the General Court in 1638, and repeatedly afterwards; removed to Milford 1643, thence to Guilford 1650, from which place he was deputy to New Haven in 1654-5-7-8-9-61-2 and -5. After the union of the two colonies he was deputy to the Legislature of Connecticut, 1665 and '66. Died, January, 1683. He was also repeatedly appointed Commissioner, with magistratical powers.

His children were, 1, JOHN; 2, DANIEL; 3, WILLIAM; 4, MARY, wife of JOHN FOWLER; 5, SARAH HARRISON or MORRISON; 6, ABIGAIL, wife of Humphrey Spinning; 7, HANNAH, probably wife of Jacob Melyne or Melyen; and 8, ELIZABETH, unmarried, but she became second wife of John Norton, of Guilford. GEORGE BARTLETT.

GEORGE BARTLETT, from England, of Guilford 1641; of Branford 1649; married, Sept. 14, 1650, Mary, daughter of Abraham Cruttenden; had, 1, ELIZABETH, born March, 1652; 2, MARY, Feb. 1, 1654; 3, JOHN, Nov. 9, 1656, who

died under 3 years; 4, HANNAH, Nov. 5, 1658; 5, DANIEL, Dec. 14, 1665; 6, ABRAHAM, Feb. 19, 1667; and 7, DEBORAH, 1668. He was lieutenant, deacon of the church, and was deputy to the New Haven Legislature 1663-4, and to the Connecticut Legislature 1665. Died Aug. 3, 1669; and his widow died next month. ELIZABETH married, Aug. 29, 1677, ABRAHAM FOWLER; Mary married, July 10, 1673, Nathaniel Stone; and Deborah married, Mar. 16, 1687, John Spinning. P. 4.

ABRAHAM CRUTTENDEN, from England; of Guilford 1639; brought wife, MARY, and one or more children, from England: died January, 1683; had, probably, 1, ABRAHAM; 2, ISAAC; 3, MARY; 4, ELIZABETH; 5, HANNAH; 6, DEBORAH; and 7, THOMAS, who died, unmarried, Feb. 8, 1698; MARY married GEORGE BARTLETT, and died Sept. 11, 1669; Elizabeth married John Graves; Hannah married George Highland; and Deborah died Apr. 24, 1658, probably unmarried.

JOSEPH BALDWIN.

THE BALDWINS were numerous in and around Aylesbury, Buckinghamshire, for several generations prior to 1639. They were of repute there, and among them may be mentioned Chief Justice of the Court of Common Pleas [time of Henry VIII.] who resided at Aylesbury. The sons and widow of Sylvester Baldwin came from the vicinity of Aylesbury, and settled at Milford, Conn. The other Baldwins, who were among the early settlers of Milford, may have been relatives of Sylvester.

I. JOSEPH BALDWIN, from England, was one of the free planters in Milford 1639; had then wife HANNAH. About 1663 he removed to Hadley, Mass; was there in 1666. For his second wife he had ISABEL NORTHAN, widow of James; she had been widow of a Catlin, and came from Newark, N. J. For his third wife he took ELIZABETH, widow of William Warriner, of Springfield.

II. His children were, 1, JOSEPH, born 1640, settled at Hadley; 2, BENJAMIN, born 1642, removed to Newark, N. J., perhaps was one of the proprietors of Durham;

3, HANNAH, born 1642, married Jeremiah Hull of New Haven; 4, MARY, born 1645, married John Catlin, of Arthurkill, N. J.; 5, ELIZABETH, baptized 1646, married James Warriner, of Springfield; 6, MARTHA, born 1647, married John Hawks, of Hatfield; 7, JONATHAN, born 1649, Feb. 15; 8, DAVID, born 1651, lived in Milford; 9, Sarah, baptized 1653, married Samuel Bartlet.

III. Sergeant JONATHAN, born Feb. 15, 1649-50; baptized in Milford 1650; was in Northampton 1668—probably went with his father to Hadley before that; returned to Milford and died there in 1739, in his 91st year. He married first, before Oct. 3, 1675, HANNAH, who died the 9th of June, 1693; second, THANKFUL. His children were, 1, JONATHAN, baptized Feb. 1, 1679-80, lived in Milford; 2, JOHN, born May 22, 1688, alive 1728; 3, JOSEPH, baptized Nov. 29, 1685, removed to Newark; 4, HANNAH, born 1689, died soon after; 5, DANIEL, born March 3, 1688-9, of Milford; 6, JOSHUA, born Jan. 24, 1691, of Milford, died April 20, 1758; 7, ABIGAIL, baptized 1695, married Joseph Tibbals, who removed to Durham and was deacon of the church there (he died Oct. 14, 1774, in his 88th year); 8, HANNAH, baptized 1696, married, Jan. 6, 1723, JOSIAH FOWLER, and removed to Durham (she died Dec. 10, 1776, in the 80th year of her age, and was buried in Northford); 9, NOAH, baptized Nov. 30, 1701; 10, PHEBE, born Nov. 6, 1704, unmarried 1728; 11, EZRA, born December, 1706, died March 4, 1783, in the 76th year of his age, was deacon of the church in Durham, and lived near the mill upon Allen's brook.

Hannah Baldwin, the wife of Josiah Fowler, had among the first settlers of Durham, EZRA, a brother; ABIGAIL, a sister, the wife of Deacon Tibbals; JAMES, the son of JOSEPH, Jr., a cousin; BENJAMIN, probably an uncle, was one of the proprietors of the town. P. 6.

ROBERT ROSE.

ROBERT ROSE, from England, came from Ipswich, in the county of Suffolk, England, April, 1634, in the ship *Francis*, John Cutting, master, to Massachusetts Bay, and

sojourned for a while at Watertown, and about 1637 removed with his family, and many others of that place, to the new settlement of Wethersfield, Conn. His family, when he embarked from Ipswich, was there entered as follows: "ROBERT ROSE, aged 40; his wife, MARGERY, aged 40; his children, 1. John, aged 15; 2. Robert, aged 15; 3. Elizabeth, aged 13; 4. Mary, aged 11; 5. Samuel, aged 9; 6. Sarah, aged 7; 7. Daniel, aged 3; 8. Dorcas, aged 2." There were certainly two other older children, JONATHAN and HANNAH, mentioned in Robert Rose, Sen.'s will.

Robert Rose, Sen., was chosen constable at Wethersfield in the General Court at Hartford, 1641-2-3. His situation became difficult there from his opposition to Rev. Henry Smith, which involved him in prosecutions and fines, and soon after, 1644-5, he removed with other Wethersfield men to the settlement of Branford.

In the first recorded division of meadow lands there, on the first page of Vol. I. of Branford records, under date of July 7, 1646, his name appears the eleventh on the list, next after that of Samuel Swaine, and next but one after that of Rev. John Sherman, the pioneer minister, and in quite a number of similar divisions his name appears distinctly as "*Robert Rose.*"

In 1648 he had 3 acres in his home lot, and 32 a., 13 r., arable, and 13 a., 21 r., of meadow.

He died early in 1665, and his will was duly presented at a Particular Court there held, April 4, 1665. The bequests in his will are as follows:

"*Item.* I give to my son Jonathan £100.

"*Secondly.* When all my debts are paid, then I give to my wife $\frac{1}{2}$ part of my whole estate.

"*Thirdly.* I give to my son Jonathan £5 more.

"*Fourthly.* I give to my dau. Hannah £10.

"*Fifthly.* I give to the church in Branford £6, 13s., 4d.

"*Sixthly.* All of the rest of my estate to be divided into 8 equal parts amongst my 8 *other* children; that is, to each a like portion, but my son John and my daughter Mary and my daughter Elizabeth shall have but £20 of that

part that falls to them, but the rest of that part shall be given to their children."—*N. H. Prob. Rec.*, Vol. 1, part 2, p. 7.

His inventory was £826, 09s., 7d., a large estate for those times, and perhaps the largest in the settlement.

May 18, 1663, there was an appraisal of all the houses of Branford, and the house of Robert Rose was appraised at £40—the highest of any in the village; Samuel's was appraised at £2 and Daniels at £3. Robert Rose, Sen., was a man of respectability and piety, and his gift to the church at Branford was considerable, and showed his appreciation of the duties of religion.

Robert Rose, Sen., emigrant, Ipswich and Branford; died 1665; married, in England, Margaret; second, Elizabeth Potter, widow of John Potter, of New Haven, died at New Haven 1677. 1, Jonathan Rose, born about 1611, in England (of Branford); 2, Hannah, born 1614 in England; 3, John, born 1617, of Branford and East Haven; 4, Robert, born 1619, settled in Stratford; 5, Elizabeth, born 1621; 6, Mary, born 1623; 7, Samuel, born 1625, settled in Newark, N. J.; 8, Sarah, born 1627; 9, Daniel, born 1630, settled in Wethersfield; 10, Dorcas, born 1632, married, Daniel Swayne.

JONATHAN ROSE, son of Robert, emigrant, settled in Branford, died 1684; married Deliverance Charles, daughter of John Charles, died ——. 1, John Rose, born —, of Branford; 2, Jonathan, born —, of Branford; 3, Samuel, born —, of Branford; 4, Lydia, born Sept. 20, 1671.

THIRD GENERATION—JONATHAN ROSE, SECOND.

JONATHAN ROSE, Jr., Branford, died July, 1736; married Abigail Foote, Aug. 15, 1697, who died July, 1739. 1, Jonathan Rose, born Aug. 15, 1698; 2, David, born Dec. 6, 1700; 3, Jacob, born March 20, 1702-3; 4, El-nathan, or Nathan, born Jan. 26, 1704-5; 5, Daniel, born

JACOB ROSE, son of Jonathan, Jr., North Branford, died — —; married, Dec. 27, 1733, Ann Dudley, daughter of Joseph D., of Guilford, died Sept. 1, 1767. 1, ANNE ROSE, born Sept. 20, 1735, died May 10, 1798 (married CALEB FOWLER, Jan. 10, 1759); 2, Chloe, born Nov. 14, 1736 (married Elizur Burnham, Aug. 19, 1712, of Wethersfield); 3, Mary, born April 1, 1738 (married John Hubbard, Sept. 20, 1769, of North Guilford, who died March 25, 1781—second, James Beard, Esq., December, 1781, of Derby, Conn.) died — —, — —; 4, Billy, born Jan. 13, 1739–40; 5, Reuben, born July 16, 1744 (married Lucretia Meigs, Jan. 3, 1772, daughter of Jehiel M.) died — —, — —; 6, Lucy, born April 4, 1743 (married Edward Mulford, of North Branford) died — —, — —; 7, Rebecca, born July 5, 1745, died Aug. 30, 1827 (married Timothy Eliot, of North Guilford, May 26, 1772, who died April 17, 1809).

WILLIAM DUDLEY, from England, died March 16, 1683; married Jane Lutman, Aug. 21, 1636, at Oakley, in Surrey, died May 1, 1674. 1, William Dudley, born June 8, 1639; 2, Joseph, born April 24, 1643; 3, Ruth, born April 20, 1645 (married John Whittlesey, June 20, 1664, Saybrook); 4, Deborah, born Sept. 20, 1647 (married first, Ebenezer Thompson, June, 1671, of New Haven, died August, 1676—second, Thomas Scranton, 1677, of Guilford, died November, 1711).

JOSEPH DUDLEY, son of William, emigrant, Guilford, died June 3, 1712; married Ann Robinson, Oct. 6, 1670, daughter of Mr. Thomas Robinson, of Guilford. 1, Joseph Dudley, born June 17, 1671; 2, Benjamin Dudley, born June 17, 1681; 3, Caleb, born 1673; 4, Joshua, born Dec. 17, 1674; 5, Miles, born Dec. 17, 1676; 10, William, born 1678; 7, Mary, born 1680; 8, Anne, born 1687, died April 27, 1687.

JOHN WEBSTER.

JOHN WEBSTER, the progenitor of a large family of that name in Connecticut, was from Warwickshire, in England. He was one of the original settlers in Hartford, and one of the founders of the Republic of Connecticut. From the formation of the Constitution in 1639, to the year 1659, he was chosen to office, and, as a magistrate or judge, he assisted in administering the government, from 1639 to 1655, when he was elected deputy governor, and in 1656 governor. In the three following years he was chosen first magistrate.

In consequence of a long controversy in the church of which Mr. Stone was pastor (for an account of which see Collections of the Connecticut Historical Society, Vol. II., page 51), John Webster and his sons, with a number of their friends, determined to purchase a large tract of land in Massachusetts, and remove with their families. The agreement for this purpose was dated at Hartford, April 18, 1659, and signed by fifty-nine persons, belonging to Hartford and Wethersfield, including one or two from Windsor. The tract of land which they purchased included the present towns of Hadley, Amherst, South Hadley and Granby, on the east side of the river Connecticut, and Hatfield and a part of Williamsburg on the west side. John Webster's name stands at the head of the list of

subscribers: the agreement is also signed by Robert, his son. This agreement is also recorded on the records of Hadley.

In the same year, 1659, the signers, or some part of them, entered upon the work of preparing the settlement in Hadley. John Webster went, probably to assist, or superintend the laying out of the roads and other business, but he lodged in Northampton. There he was taken sick, and made his will, which is dated June 25, 1659. This will is recorded on the probate records of Hampshire county, and a copy of it was in the possession of Noah Webster. It is witnessed by John Russel, Jr. (minister of Hadley), and Eleazer Mather (minister of Northampton).

Mr. Webster recovered from that sickness and was appointed one of the judges of the court, or, as he is called, a commissioner. The judges of the court were John Webster, John Pyncheon and Samuel Chapin. The court was held alternately at Northampton and at Springfield. On the 26th of March, 1661, a court was held at Northampton, and Mr. Webster was present, and he, with others, took the freeman's oath before Mr. Pyncheon and Mr. Holyoke, who was recorder. But Mr. Webster died on the 5th of April, and undoubtedly was buried in Hadley, according to a direction in his will. Dr. Noah Webster, when he resided in Amherst, erected a monument to his ancestor in the Hadley burying ground.

John Webster's consort was named Agnes; and as her husband by will gave her the use of the house and lands in Hartford during her life, it is probable that she remained in Hartford after his death and died there. The house of John Webster stood on the east side of the highway, running north and south, on the east side of the hill on which stood the house of the late George Wyllys, and his house was nearly east of the Wyllys house.

The children of John Webster were, 1. ROBERT; 2. MATTHEW, of Farmington, died July 16, 1655; 3. WILLIAM, of Hadley, married Mary Reeve, died about 1688; 4. THOMAS, of Northampton, married Abigail Alexander, died at Northfield, 1686; 5. ANN, married John Marsh, died June 9, 1662; 6. ELIZABETH, married William Markham; 7. MARY, married Mr. Hunt.

SECOND GENERATION—ROBERT WEBSTER, SON OF JOHN.

ROBERT WEBSTER, born in England, removed from Hartford to Middletown. He represented Middletown in the General Court, in the following years: 1653-4-5-6-7-8-9. At the organization of the town in 1651, or 1652, he was chosen recorder. He continued at Middletown until about 1660, when he removed to Hartford. He married, about 1652, Susanna, daughter of Richard Treat, of Wethersfield, and sister of Gov. Robert Treat. He died in 1676. His widow died in 1705.

His children were, 1, JOHN, born Nov. 10, 1653; 2, SARAH, born June 30, 1655; 3, JONATHAN, born Jan. 9, 1657; 4, SUSANNAH, born Oct. 26, 1658; 5, SAMUEL; 6, ROBERT, 7, JOSEPH; 8, WILLIAM; 9, MARY, married Thomas King, of Hartford, died Sept. 27, 1706; 10, ELIZABETH.

THIRD GENERATION—JOHN WEBSTER, SON OF ROBERT.

JOHN WEBSTER, born at Middletown, Nov. 10, 1653; removed to Hartford, married Sarah Mygatt, daughter of Jacob Mygatt, of Hartford, and of Sarah, his wife, daughter of Hon. William Whiting, one of the first settlers of Hartford, and of Susannah, his wife. Jacob Mygatt was son of Deacon Joseph Mygatt, who, likewise, was one of the first settlers of Hartford. Mr. John Webster died Dec. 6, 1694-5, aged 42.

His children were, 1, JOHN; 2, EBENEZER, born 1689; 3, JACOB, married Elizabeth Nichols, died in 1728; 4, DANIEL, baptized Oct. 1, 1693; 5, SARAH; 6, ANN; 7, ABIGAIL, married Jacob Merrill in 1710.

FOURTH GENERATION—DANIEL WEBSTER, SON OF JOHN.

DANIEL WEBSTER, of Hartford, born in 1693, was twice married: first to Miriam Kellogg, widow of Abraham Kellogg, deceased, of Hartford, and daughter of Noah Cooke, of Northampton, Mass., and of Sarah, his wife, daughter of Joseph Nash, one of the early settlers of Hartford, about 1719; she was born Sept. 30, 1690, and died ——. —, —. Second, to Hannah Bird, widow of Jonathan

Bird, deceased, of Farmington. Capt. Daniel Webster died Dec. 21, 1765, aged 72; Dr. Noah Webster remembered his funeral. Mrs. Hannah Webster died Oct. 17, 1776.

His children by his first wife were, 1. DANIEL, born Feb. 16, 1720. 2. NOAH, born March 25, 1722. 3. ZEPHANIAH, born June 1, 1724, died in March, 1761; he left two sons, Bavi and Zephaniah, who died in middle life. 4. ABRAHAM, born Jan. 17, 1727, died in 1751. 5. MIRIAM, born Oct. 21, 1759; married first, William Sedgwick, by whom she had Sarah, William, Timothy, and Isabel; second, Mr. Marsh, of New Hartford; she died at a great age, in West Hartford. 6. DANIEL, born Sept. 4, 1731, and died by palsy in 1783; he left two sons, Daniel and Asahel, and one daughter; Daniel died in Hartford, in middle age, leaving children; Asahel first settled in Putney, Vt., and afterwards removed to Ohio. 7. Elihu, born Nov. 1, 1733, who died in youth.

FIFTH GENERATION—NOAH WEBSTER, SON OF DANIEL.

NOAH WEBSTER, of Hartford, born in 1722; married, Jan. 12, 1749, Mercy, daughter of Eliphalet Steele, of the same town, grand-daughter of Lieut.-Gov. William Bradford, and great grand-daughter of Gov. William Bradford. Mrs. Mercy Webster died Oct. 5, 1794, aged 67. Noah Webster, Esq., died Nov. 9, 1813, aged 92.

Children: 1, MERCY, born Nov. 8, 1749; married John Kellogg Belden, and died Aug. 11, 1820. 2, ABRAHAM, born Sept. 17, 1751; married first, Merrill, of New Hartford; second, Dorothy Seymour, by whom he had children—Rachel, Eunice, Sophia, Dorothy, and a son named Seymour, who died in the army, in the war of 1812-14; he afterwards married Eunice Childs, of Deerfield; he died in Sullivan, N. Y., Aug. 4, 1831, nearly eighty years of age. 3, JERUSHA, born in 1756; married Joel Lord, of Salisbury, who removed to Danby, in the State of New York; she died Feb. 21, 1821; her children are Chester, Harley, and Jerusha; the latter married the Rev. Mr. Parker who went on a mission to the Flathead Indians.

4, NOAH WEBSTER, LL. D., author of Dictionary; married Rebecca Greenleaf, of Boston, Oct. 26, 1789. 5. CHARLES, born Sept. 2, 1762; married Betsy Woodruff, by whom he had children: Charles, Elson or Nelson, and Woodruff. By a second wife, Mrs. Wilkinson, he had Elizabeth and Jonathan; Nelson was midshipman in the ship commanded by Capt. Eliot, in the engagement on Lake Erie, and conducted himself so gallantly as to be promoted on the spot.

SIXTH GENERATION—NOAH WEBSTER, SECOND.

Noah Webster, LL. D., the well known lexicographer and publicist, born Oct. 16, 1758; married Rebecca Greenleaf, of Boston. Oct. 26, 1789. Mrs. Webster, born May 27, 1766, died June 25, 1847, aged 81. Dr. Webster died May 28, 1843, in his eighty-fifth year.

1, EMILY, born Aug. 4, 1790, married to William Wolcott Ellsworth Sept. 14, 1813.

2, FRANCES JULIANA, born Feb. 5, 1793, married to Chauncey Allen Goodrich, Oct. 1, 1816.

THE GENEALOGY OF THE
WIVES OF THE CHAUNCEYS,
IN ONE LINE FROM
PRESIDENT CHARLES CHAUNCEY.

ELDER JOHN STRONG, from England, was born in Taunton, England, 1605. He emigrated to Massachusetts in 1630, and settled with others at Dorchester. He afterwards resided at Hingham, and in Taunton, whence he removed to Windsor, Conn. In 1659 he removed from Windsor to Northampton, Mass. How he obtained his office and title as Elder John Strong, will appear by the following quotation from the church records at Northampton:

“After solemn and extraordinary seeking to God for his direction and blessing, the church chose John Strong ruling elder, and William Holton, deacon. They were ordained 13:3mo:’63” (or the year beginning then in March, June 13, 1663, O. S., or N. S., June 24, 1663), “the elder by the imposition of the hands of the pastor” (Rev. Eleazer Mather), “and Mr. Russell, of Hadley—the deacon afterwards, by the imposition of the hands of the pastor and elder.”

He married for his second wife ABIGAIL, daughter of Thomas Ford. He had two children by his first wife, and sixteen by his second. 1, JOHN STRONG, born in England in 1626; died at Windsor, Conn., Feb. 20, 1698, aged 72. 2, An infant, that died in Dorchester, Mass., in 1630, a few months old. 3. THOMAS, born in 1633, died Oct. 3, 1689.

WILLIAM JUDSON.

WILLIAM JUDSON, from England, emigrated in the year 1634 to this country; resided at Concord in 1635; moved to Hartford in 1639; in 1644 resided in Stratford, and was engaged that year in making collections for the infant college at Cambridge. A few years later he removed to New Haven, where his wife, Grace, died in 1659, and on the 8th of February following, he married Elizabeth, widow of Benjamin Wilnot, and died July 29, 1662. His children by Grace were, 1, JOSEPH; 2, JEREMIAH; and 3, JOSHUA, all born in England.

JOSEPH JUDSON.

JOSEPH JUDSON, of Stratford, Conn., was married to Sarah Porter, daughter of John Porter, of Windsor, in the same State, October 24, 1644. Mr. Joseph Judson died October 8, 1690, aged 71. His widow, Mrs. Sarah Judson, died March 16, 1696, aged 70.

She was born in 1665, and died November 3, 1717, aged 62. 2d, To ANN STEELE, widow of JAMES STEELE, late of Wethersfield, Conn., deceased, November 20, 1718. Capt. James Judson died February 25, 1721, aged 71 nearly. His widow, Mrs. Ann Judson, alias Steele, died in Wethersfield, 1739.

NICHOLAS WORTHINGTON.

NICHOLAS WORTHINGTON, is said to have come from neighborhood of Liverpool, was engaged in the Cromwellian wars, probably on the side of Cromwell, and was made a freeman in Hartford in 1668. He married about that time, Sarah (Bunce) White, widow of John White Jr., and daughter of Thomas Bunce, of Hartford, who married a daughter of Capt. Thomas Bull, under whom he had served in the Pequot war. Nicholas Worthington settled at Hatfield, Mass., where his wife died June 20, 1676.

His second wife was Susanna, who, after his death, married Captain Jonathan Ball. Nicholas Worthington died September 6, 1683.

of Isaac Graves, emigrant from England, and widow of Richard Morton. They settled at Hartford, and about 1717 removed to Colchester, Conn., where she died March 22, 1742, and he died May 22, 1753.

WILLIAM WORTHINGTON, born December 5, 1695, at Hartford, eldest son of William Worthington, Esq., of Colchester, graduated at Yale in 1716, and was a Congregational clergyman ; he married, October 13, 1720, Elizabeth Mason, born May 6, 1697, at Stonington, eldest daughter of Major Samuel Mason of Stonington, by his second wife, Elizabeth Peck, and grand-daughter of the celebrated Major John Mason, of Norwich, who conquered the Pequots.—(*See Mason Family, v. R. H. W., 15 Gen. Reg. 118.*) They settled at Stonington, where she died January 1, 1725.

His Children by his first wife :

REV. WILLIAM WORTHINGTON.

REV. WILLIAM WORTHINGTON was born in Hartford, December 5, 1695. He was graduated in Yale College 1716. He preached for a time in Stonington, Connecticut. He was settled in Saybrook, West Parish, then called Pochaug, in 1726. He was the first minister of that parish, and was ordained in the dwelling house built for himself, but then unfinished, the people sitting on the beams and timbers to witness the ceremony. He died November 16, 1756, in the 61st year of his age, in the language on his grave stone, "much lamented by all who were happy in his acquaintance." He was a popular preacher and a most faithful pastor. His influence was eminently persuasive to love and good works, and was long visible after his death in the religious character of his people, and in the tone of feeling prevalent in the business and courtesies of private life. He preached the Election Sermon in the year 1744. The following is the title page: "The DUTY of Rulers and Teachers in Unitedly Leading God's People, Urged and Explained in a Sermon Preached before the General Assembly in the Colony of Connecticut, at Hartford, on their Anniversary Election, May 10, 1744. By William Worthington, A. M., and Pastor of a Church of CHRIST in Saybrook. Rom. xiii., 4. *For he beareth not the Sword in vain; for he is the Minister of God, a Revenger to execute wrath upon him that doth evil.*—Prov. v., 13.

"And have not Obeyed the voice of my Teachers, nor inclined mine Ear to them that Instructed me. New London: Printed and Sold by T. GREEN, Printer to the GOVERNOUR and COMPANY, 1744."

Text: Psalm lxxvii.; 20th verse. *Thou leddest thy people like a flock by the hand of Moses and Aaron.*

The Sermon is a logical, well written discourse. In his social and ministerial intercourse he was a gentleman of great blandness and gracefulness and urbanity of manner, attributes which he transmitted to many of his descendants. Some of his people said that they had but one thing against him, and that was, that "he walked as if he were a

proud man." But a Mr. Lay, seeing him walking in the woods with the same dignity and gracefulness of bearing as when in the presence of others, came to the conclusion that his manner in public "was natural to him."

His six daughters were celebrated in their day for their accomplishments. His mode of educating them was to keep one of them in succession at domestic employments with their mother, while the others he kept in the study with himself.

He died after a short illness. He felt somewhat unwell, and sent to his friend, the celebrated Dr. Jared Elliot, of Killingworth, for medical advice. In his absence a young physician came instead of him, who, in bleeding him, wounded an artery. The next day Dr. Elliot went to see him, and found him restless and feverish. In an adjoining room he uttered the impatient remark in respect to the blunder of the young practitioner, "the rascal, he has murdered my friend." This remark, overheard by Mr. Worthington, who had the greatest confidence in Dr. Elliot, had such an effect upon him that he immediately gave up the hope of life, and actually died soon after. Dr. Jared Elliot preached his funeral sermon, in which he speaks of him in terms of admiration as a useful minister, a beloved friend, and a wise and affectionate husband and father.

William Worthington, son of Rev. William Worthington, was born November 30, 1740. He was a member of the General Assembly of Connecticut, was a colonel in the Revolutionary army, and was distinguished for eminent personal qualities of body and of mind.

JOHN GALLUP, SEN., from England, of Dorchester, 1630, removed to Boston, 1632, with his wife Christobel, by whom he had four children. 1, JOHN. 2, SAMUEL. 3, NATHANIEL, and 4, JOAN, who married Thomas Joy. "He was a brave man, and left brave descendants."

SECOND GENERATION.

JOHN GALLUP, son of the preceding, born in England, was in Boston in 1637, served in the Pequot war, for which Connecticut made him a grant of a hundred acres; married

Hannah, daughter of Mrs. Margaret Lake, a widow, who resided at John Winthrop's; had 1, HANNAH, born August 14, 1644, removed to New London 1651, probably was of Taunton 1643, a short time, removed to Stonington, of which he was Representative October, 1665, and May, 1667. 2, JOHN, who became freeman 1673. 3, BENADAM, born about 1656. 4, WILLIAM, 1658. 5, CHRISTOBEL. 6, ELIZABETH. 7, MARY, and 8, MARGARET. 9, ESTHER, born July 21, 1653, who married, December 17, 1674, Henry Hodges, of Taunton; and 10, SAMUEL, who died probably unmarried. He was one of the captains killed in the great Narraganset swamp fight, December 19, 1675, the hardest battle of Philips' war, when eighty were killed and one hundred and fifty wounded, of which many died before relief could be had. His company had many killed and wounded. For an account of Margaret Lake, her daughter, Hannah Lake, and John Gallup, see Caulkin's "History of New London."

WILLIAM GALLUP, son of the preceding, born at Stonington; married, January 4, 1687, Sarah Cheesebrough. Had 1, MARY, baptized April 7, 1695. 2, HANNAH, April 24, 1698. 3, TEMPERANCE, May 25, 1701, and 4, SARAH; perhaps others earlier.

TEMPERANCE GALLUP, born February 1, 1701; married Rev. Wm. Worthington, September 20, 1726, died March, 1778, buried in Durham.

JOHN LAKE, married Margaret Read, daughter of Col. Edmund Read, of Wickford, Essex County, England, and sister of the wife of Gov. John Winthrop, of Conn. Had 1, HANNAH, who married John Gallup.

WILLIAM CHEESEBROUGH, from England, of Boston, born about 1594, came from Boston, Co. Lincoln, with wife Ann Stevenson, 1630, arrived in the fleet with Winthrop. He had married, December 15, 1620, Ann Stevenson, and they had, in England, 1, MARY, baptized May 2, 1622. 2, MARTHA, September 18, 1623. 3, DAVID, and 4, JONATHAN, twins, September 9, 1624; all died soon. 5, SAMUEL, April 1, 1627. 6, ANDRONICUS, February 6, 1629, (who died in two days, as did 7, JULIA, a twin child

the day before.) and 8, NATHANIEL, January 25, 1630. On this side of the water, they were among the earliest members of the first church of Boston, Nos. 44 and 5 on the list. He was admitted freeman May 18, 1631, and the same day his house was burned. Children in Boston baptized were 9, JOHN, September 2, or November 11, 1632, as the numerals for month and day are variously read, who died at Stonington, probably unmarried. 10, JABEZ, May 3, 1635, died young. 11, ELISHA, June 4, 1637, and at Braintree, born. 12, JOSEPH, July 18, 1640; and this year he was Representative. Soon after he removed to Rehoboth, where he was active 1643, and in less than seven years to Pawcatuck, where he was the earliest permanent settler in that part of New London called Stonington. This brought the Connecticut government to vindicate their territorial right, and very curious accounts may be read about the jurisdiction in Trumbull, Coll. Rec. I., 216-17: to the result, however, the judicious mildness of Cheesebrough led soon, and he was a Representative 1653, 5, 7, and 64, for New London or Stonington. He died June 9, 1667, leaving widow Ann, who died August 29, 1673. His son Joseph, under 12 years old, cut his leg with a scythe, and bled to death. Another sister, I think, may be found for him in the Boston list of members of the church, Sarah C., No. 78, and upon the margin is marked early death.

SAMUEL, Rehoboth, son of William, born in England, removed to Stonington with his father; by wife Abigail had 1, ABIGAIL, born September 30, 1656. 2, MARY, February 28, 1658, died at 11 years. 3, SAMUEL, February 20, or November, 1660. 4, WILLIAM, April 8, or 30, 1662. 5, SARAH, November 24, or December, 1633. 6, ELISHA, April 4, or August, 1667; and 7, ELIZABETH, January 6, 1669; all (except Mary) baptized at New London, of which Stonington was then a part in 1672; was made freeman 1657; represented 1665, 6, 70, and later years. He died January 31, 1673, and his widow married, June 15, 1675, Joshua Holmes. His daughter Abigail married John Avery; and Sarah married, January 4, 1689, William Gallup, both of Stonington.
