


Christopher Foster, styled a farmer with shipping list,

was made foreman at Boston April 17, 1637. In the same year he
was resident of Lynn, when in 1638- 60 acres of land allotted
to him. He came to Southampton in 1651. His son Nathaniel
removed to Huntington, L.I. and there resided.

Josiah Foster Jun- the Captains gave their respective companies the choice of the officers and all the spectators, through two companies all turned out voluntarily, and to a man appeared desirous to display a high degree of their American patriotism- and which is very extraordinary, in addition to those two companies a respectable number of Old Veterans of 76-took their muskets in hand, and joined the volunteers declaring to them that they would go with them-and help them with the arms and or with the same spirit that the last campaign crowned their arms with abundant success, and finally terminated in establishing the peace of the American Union.

Copy of letter from Mrs. Minnie Foster Lee, dated Nov.16th,1916-

"I should have written you before this**** I finally discovered it (the above paper) in an old trunk**** The paper is in my handwriting, evidently copied from an older one. Where it is or where Mother got it, I have no idea, nor who Lawyer Phelps was.

Aunt Melinda Lyons, Aunt Amanda Marsh and Uncle Bicknell, you remember. Aunt Ellen was the mother of Henry and Jerre Atherton. I have a dim recollection of George Lyons, writing to Mother, many years ago, asking for information about her family, and a still dimmer remembrance of her trying to trace the connection with the Bicknell family of Maryland.

I am sorry that I cannot tell you more, but Mother left Brattleboro when she was so young that even she was out of touch, for many years with the older members of the family who resided there.

The date of Mother's death is not given, but I'm under the impression that she (mother) was about eleven years old, which would make it about 1829.

New York, 4 April 1841.

My dear Uncle,

April fourth may be a strange date for me to head a letter with, in your estimation. I know it is the holy sabbath, the hours of which---are dear to my heart. Yet being under the necessity of keeping the hours today, on Daniel's account, who is not very well. I thought a few moments would not be mis-employed, in holding a little conversation with one of my kindred, onw in whose spirited welfare have felt the deepest interests. Yes Uncle however little regard, was manifested to your view for your souls best interest, by your unworthy nephew, yet let me say to you alone, anxiety deep has had possession of my mind in relation to your case.

I feel now, and have often felt for you: I feel that you are connected to me by the bonds of nature, I love you as a connection; as the brother of my dear departed father; as bone of my bone, and flesh of my flesh, -as an immortal being bound to the judgment bar of God, as possessing a soul, far exerting in value the worth of worlds; and destined to exist forever in Happiness and peace, or where there shall be weeping for ever and ever, In view of these facts my dear Uncle let me be allowed to say a few words, if by any means I may induce you to attend to the great subject now. Perhaps however it is unnecessary. You have been brought near the grave, as far as human judgment could perceive;

and maybe you have given the subject its deserved attention;
if not I pray that kind Providence that has restored you in such
good measure to health of body, that He will now cause you to
ponder well, for what you are preserved,), it is for some wise
purpose I do trust. But uncle if you are saved, it cannot be
through the influence of the prayers of friends alone. You have
a work to perform, and an important one it is. The great matter
rests between you and God. The Savior will be your advocate if
you secure his favor now, and will plead your cause in the hour of
need. Now, now is the accepted time and the day of salvation.
You have lived longer than I have, I know, and you may say I am
more capable of receiving advice than of giving. I am well aware
of that; and much more gladly would I do it: Yet I feel that I am
not placed on the earth, and made a partaker richly of God's
mercies, and live as a drone untill death comes. I profess love
to Christ and his cause, if I love it I shall strive to advance
it.- And O, what joy and consolation would it bring to my mind,
if all my dear connections had a part in the Great Salvation.
Heaven cannot bestow a greater favor on the children of men than
the holy spirit. This is promised to all who from the hearts
desire it. Do not my dear Uncle let the cares of this deceitful
world slide you along day after day, week after week, untill
your account is sealed, your course is run; and you find to
your dismay, the harvest is past and the summer ended, while your
soul is not saved.

If you have sinned long and with a high hand, break off your sins by righteousness, and your iniquities by turning to the Lord, and may God in his infinite mercy, who has borne long with you, and Jesus the good and kind Shepherd, who is willing to help you, like the prodigal to say I will arise and go to my Father. You have wandered into a far country and you know best how you have spent your time. God calls you to return. The heavy laden he calls. Come and I will give you rest. O, come Uncle John make the pearl of great price the object of the remainder of you life. I press not the subject to advance my interests, no I love your Soul's eternal destiny. Decide the great question, "Will I have this Christ or no"? If you need encouragement, I saw a man more advanced in years than yourself take upon him the vows of God before angels and men and sit down at the table of the Lord I heard him say in a prayer meeting a few days ago, That he requested the prayers of those who loved to pray in behalf of the temperance cause, "It has taken me from the gutter (I have been even there) it is doing much now in our city. I am trying to do something in the way. I feel that it is the cause of God. My brethren pray that I may be able to do something in this way." This is a very illiterate man. While he said this his wife sat beside him and copious tears of joy flowed down her cheeks, as she witnessed the hand of God in the case of her husband, who had been to her a brute, now sitting and clothed in his right mind. He is now prest. of a society formed through his influence. The sec. meeting about sixty of his old

associates, gave their names and honours to abstain from all that can intoxicate.

Uncle now in closing these few lines, let me ask one favour. I have and I well remember how ready you was to grant my little wants. Write me that you have given your name to the total abstinence pledge. Taste nothing that will intoxicate and you are safe from the drunkard's grave.

I have appointed myself a sort of unofficial historian of the Freethy family and would appreciate any information on your line: the children of David and Cynthia (Freethy) Willie and their children, etc.

Our son Vernon is getting married this coming June 10th and we had intended to leave for Maine on the 12th but unfortunately my wife, Marie, was run down by a 76 year old driver while shopping down town on April 11th and after spending a week in the hospital, now has her leg in a cast and will be unable to bend her left knee for at least 6 weeks, so it looks as if it will be around August before we can get away.

The information contained herein does not represent original research, but data and dates from the works of Savage; Banks; Pope; Noyes, Libby and Davis: and others, who must have had inexhaustible patience and a deep enthusiasm for their work.

The facts of Sedgwick and Brooklin, Maine, are based on the "REGISTER OF SEDGWICK AND BROOKLIN" by Chatto and Turner (1910) and from family records furnished by Mary Freethy Davis Irwin of Cornish, N.H.

* Probably of interest only to the Freethy family.

William Freethy was baptised in the Parish Church of St. Michael, Landrake, Cornwall County, England, (a very nice photograph of this fine old church attached to the manuscript from which this is copied), on August 22, 1612. It was a rule of the Established Church that infants be baptised within 3 days of birth, so that date can be considered approximately that of his birth, also.

At the age of 23, in company with his older brother Alexander ("Sander"), he left the Freethy farm in St. John's Parish, Cornwall County, sailing on the "Speedwell" (Narias Hawkins, Master) arriving at Richmond Island (afterwards Falmouth) and now Cape Elizabeth, Maine on April 26, 1635, where he and his brother were employed as fishermen for the Trelawny plantation of which John Winter was manager. On the same boat (which carried only 16 passengers) was Richard Trelawny who made a survey for his brother Robert who had obtained a patent for that region.

In 1636, William returned to England but came back the next year on the "Hercules" (William Chappel, Master) which arrived on February 13, 1637 after a trip of 10 weeks with 27 passengers among whom were several members of the Winter family. There is a record of William and his brother fishing on Stratton's Island but Alexander returned to England in 1638.

Without doubt William went along with him as on January 13, 1639 he married Elizabeth Barker of Plymouth, England.

Unfortunately the passenger list of the "Samuel" is missing but it can be inferred that he came back on that vessel arriving on November 17, 1639 as he completed his three year contract with the Trelawny Plantation in September, 1640, after promising to repay John Winter the 40 shillings which had been advances to his mother in England. It seems that he and his new wife moved to Portsmouth.

The "Province of Maine" was occupied by a very different type of Settler than the Pilgrims of Plymouth and the Puritans of Massachusetts Bay Colony. Both founders and settlers were from Devon and Cornwall Counties of seamen and adventurers, largely influenced by the opportunity to acquire land which was promised to emigrants in lots of one hundred acres each (almost a king's ransom in their estimation) of which they could be owners in simple fee. They cared nothing for dogma and religious reform and like their forbears, were sturdy, profane, none too fond of church going and impatient of too strict an enforcement of law and order, though under their own self-government a worthy effort was made to create a law-abiding community of an honest but often unruly people.

Therefore it is no wonder that on September 15, 1640 just after leaving the service of John Winter that William Freethy and a companion Henry Watts were fined 20 shillings (of which one half was remitted) "for carrying boards on Sunday" and in 1643 he was called up "for Neglecting the ordinances of God and refusing to live an orderly course of life."

In 1652 he was living in York, Maine which was originally called Agamenticus by the Indians and mariners; Bristol for a short time; in 1642 it was chartered as Gorgeana (in honor of Ferdinando Gorges); later called East York and for many years was known as "Old York" so long as New York was known as York.

William Freethy was among the 50 inhabitants who under duress that year signed the "Submission" to the "Government of Massachusetts in New England" when that government by force incorporated the "Province of Maine" (when from that time on it was merely a district of Massachusetts.) However when it came about to sign a petition to Cromwell that the change of government was satisfactory to the freemen of York he (not then/under ^{being} duress) was among the 27 who refused to sign.

On November 22, 1652 he took the oath as a freeman. Under the charter of Massachusetts Bay colony none were regarded as freemen or members of the body politic except such as were admitted by the General Court and took the oath of allegiance to the established Government.

He had a grant of land on Ferry Neck on October 31, 1651 he deeded some of his property to his son John and still other tracts to his sons Samuel and James on December 4, 1653 "with the consent of his wife Elizabeth" with reservations for their own and their mother's lives and both were living there as late as 1653 (he being 76 years old.) However on June 10, 1671 he had already given a piece of property to his son-in-law Thomas Holmes, husband of his daughter Joan. In 1684 at the age of 72 he was

appointed ferryman "over the other side of the River where John Stover once lived." The last record of William and Elizabeth (Barker) Freethy was a deed which they gave on April 24, 1688 and acknowledged the next day.

The children of William and Elizabeth (Barker) Freethy were:

(1) Joan, 1648, married Thomas Holmes 11 1671; he was killed by Indians January 16, 1690.

(2) John, born 1650, resided York; appraiser 1685 and received a town grant the same year; married Hannah Bray (born 1660), daughter of Richard and Isabella Bray of North Yarmouth. John died on May 4, 1692 and his widow married Richard Hazelton of Rowley, Massachusetts, on June 10, 1707, though on her record her name was given as Mary. She died on May 13, 1729 at the age of 69 years. Deeds show that John and Hannah had at least 3 children who were :

Joanna (born 1682) married Joseph Eane in 1703; Mehitabel who married Aquila Haynes in 1701; Jenima (born 1689) married Jonathan Spofford of Rowley, Massachusetts, on May 13, 1703 (they had 13 children).

(3) Samuel, born 1652; mariner, drowned November 24, 1685.

(Robert Elliott of Portsmouth was administrator of his estate.)

(4) James, born 1650; killed by Indians Oct. 14, 1690.

(5) Elizabeth, born 1657, who married (1) James Botts of Berwick; he was killed by Indians at Salmon Falls October 16, 1675; she then married (2) Moses Spencer of Berwick in July 1679; their first son was named Freethy Spencer.

James Freethy, son of William and Elizabeth (Barker) Freethy, was born at York in 1650 where he took the oath of allegiance as freeman in 1680 at which time he received a land grant. He married Mary Milbury, daughter of Henry Milbury of York. He had firewood grants with William Hones and William Wormwood.

James Freethy and William Wormwood, Lieutenant Arthur Bragdon, Thomas Bragdon and his son, Daniel Bragdon, were surprised by Indians while loading a vessel at Cape Meddick (a part of York Township) and all were killed on October 14, 1690. His widow married Nathaniel Blackledge in 1695 and died May 28, 1735.

Joseph Bragdon, a descendant of the above-mentioned Bragdon (now a man of 80 years in 1949) owns the Freethy farm overlooking the York River having purchased it from the heirs of Henry Freethy who is buried in the family burial plot in the meadow.

The children of James and Mary (Milbury) Freethy were :

(1) James, captured by Indians in 1692 and carried into captivity to Canada where he was listed as still being in 1710-11; nothing more is known of him nor of his after life.

(2) Mary, who married Andrew Grover in 1703; both living in 1735; they had 9 children.

(3) Hannah, who married Matthew Grover in 1704, she died Dec. 9, 1726; they had 11 children.

(4) Elizabeth, who married Robert Gray in 1706; he died in 1754; she still living.

(5) Joseph, born 1685; died 1758.

Joseph Freethy, son of James and Mary (Milbury) Freethy, was born in York in 1685 and died there in 1758. He married Jemima Hatch of Wells, Maine. Records of the First Church of Wells show that on June 23, 1706, Joseph Freethy "upon profession of Faith received Baptism" at which time he must have been 21 years old. In the final division of lands in York in 1732 he received 3 shares. His wife Jemima died before 1734 as he married Honor Stackpole, daughter of James Stackpole, by whom he had 4 children, on January 24, 1734.

The children of Joseph and Jemima (Hatch) Freethy were:

- (1) James, born June 14, 1712; must have died before 1736 as Joseph and Honor Stackpole had a child in 1736 whom they called James-see below.
- (2) Mary, born May 29, 1715;
- (3) Hannah, born April 29, 1718, married Nathaniel Bray
- (4) Joseph, born March 26, 1721, married Elizabeth Banks, Sept. 1745.
- (5) John, born Dec. 2, 1724.

The children of Joseph and Honor (Stackpole) Freethy were :

- (1) Jemima, born December 19, 1734;
- (2) James, born March 17, 1736; died young;
- (3) Samuel, born April 11, 1738;
- (4) Jacob, born 1740; died young.

Joseph Freethy, born in York, Maine on March 26, 1721, son of Joseph and Jemima (Hatch) Freethy, married Elizabeth Banks

(born December 20, 1724) daughter of Joe Banks (born February 27, 1696; died 1770) and Martha Winchester Cord Banks (born November 19, 1699; died March 17, 1731), in September 1745.

The children of Joseph and Elizabeth (Banks) Freethy were;
(1) Joseph, born 1754; died 1838; married Elizabeth Black;

Other children (?)

Joseph Freethy, son of Joseph and Elizabeth (Banks) Freethy, was born in York in 1754 and removed to Brooklin (then Sedgwick), Maine in 1765, as verified by chapter 150, Resolves of 1784, January session of the Commonwealth of Massachusetts, which states that at that date (1784) Joseph Freethy had been there 21 years. An analysis of dates will show that Joseph Freethy was either 9 years old when he left York or that he was born before 1754. He settled on Naskeag Point, the peninsula separating Blue Hill Bay from Eggenoggin Reach off the Penobscot River. During his lifetime he built three houses on the place each a little farther from the shore and also constructed several vessels which he named after his daughters. On February 13, 1777 he joined the Continental Army at Beverly, Massachusetts, serving 3 years as private and corporal. An inspection of the company returns of the Massachusetts line regiments shows that Joseph Freethy was at Valley Forge during the winter 1777-78 in Capt. Billy Porter's Company. After his release (February 17, 1780) from the Army he married Elizabeth Black (born 1763) the first

white child born in that region and the daughter of John and Abigail (Watson) Black who were among the first settlers. When Sedgwick was incorporated in 1789 he was elected Selectman (of which there were three) serving 2 years. He died May 7, 1838 and was buried in the family plot on the farm on Naskeag Point, marked by a monument furnished by the Government to all Revolutionary soldiers. His wife Elizabeth died in 1867 at the age of 104 years and was buried beside him.

Augustus Freethy, son of Alford and Nicinda (Carter) Freethy, was born in Brocklin, Maine, in March 29, 1832, and died in the same place in 1876. He married in 1857 Abbie Melissa Herrick, daughter of (Capt.) Shadrack Herrick (~~born 1556~~ of Sedgwick and Elizabeth Griffin of Ellsworth, Maine who was born in 1840 and died in 1894. Her descent goes back to Sir William Herrick (born 1556; Died 1652) a member of parliament, who was knighted by James I, King of England. The stained glass window on the left of entrance of the Baptist Church in Brocklin is a memorial to Augustus

and Abbie Melissa Freethy placed there by their daughter Mary Abbie David.

seamen, and Walter S. Lee of Sedgwick, boy. The J.W. Hale was bound
from Jacksonville, Fla., to New York, with a cargo of lumber, and
was capsized on the night of the 15th inst., in a heavy gale,

when she lost both masts and the boat, and the vessel filled with water. The captain and crew had been on the top of the house four days and a half. The captain's wife, Mrs. Anna Friend, was washed out of the cabin and lost."
