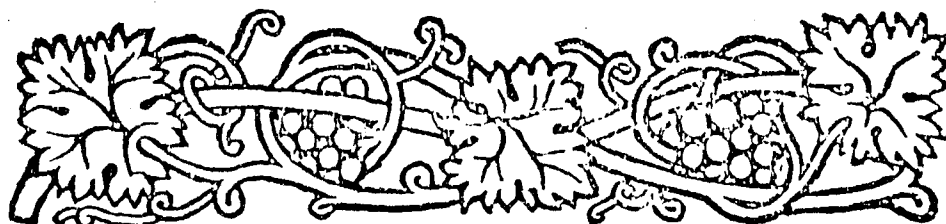

## PREFACE.

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THE Fullerton's talked for year's about a reunion, but time rolled on and no meeting was called. In September, 1895, Milton and William Fullerton called at the home of the writer; and, procuring twenty-five postal cards, we sent abroad <sup>them</sup> bearing the following:

"The descendants of James and Margaret Sharp Fullerton will hold a basket meeting in Milton Fullerton's grove, on Thursday, September 21st."

The day dawned bright and fair, and seventy-six persons gathered around a bountiful table—five per cent. being Fullerton descendants. After a day's enjoyment, officers were elected, committees were appointed, and the Fullerton reunion was decided to be an annual meeting. The writer was elected Historian, with able assistants (who so far have failed materially). My beloved brother, who so ably assisted me, being called to his long home in 1897. I have since been left to labor alone. I have by thorough research and diligent labor gathered together all the data possible. Finding the heirs of Thomas and Adam after a lapse of one hundred and

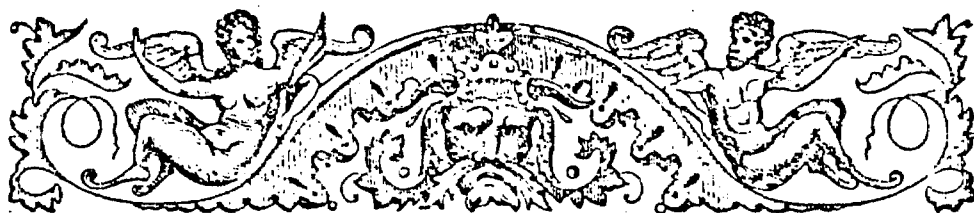
nine years. But with all searching, and writing of many letters, have failed to find the lost branch. Should this little book fall into the hands of any of them, I trust they may speedily make themselves known.

# GENEALOGY

OF THE

## FULLERTON'S AND SHARP'S.

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OUR ancestors, so far as we can learn, were Scotch by birth, and were driven from Scotland on account of religious principles. In collecting material for history, we find it impossible to obtain anything in this country prior to 1746. We are led to believe that our first ancestor here was Thomas Sharp, (his wife was Margaret Elder,) who, according to the records, had warranted lands in 1746. They were the parents of nine children, of whom one, named Mary, born 1749, married Alexander Fullerton, who died in 1778 or '79 during the Revolutionary war. [It should be stated here that there is difference as to names in the different branches of their descendants. The Missouri branch have it, from old papers and traditions, that his name was James, and that he married his cousin, Mary Robinson. Others say his name was James Alexander. The writer claims as given above the brackets, as will be shown further on.]

Alexander Fullerton married Mary Sharp in 1766. In 1768, he sailed from Belfast, Ireland, bringing with him his wife, his sister, Elizabeth, (who married a Mon-

roe.) and one son named Thomas, born August 4, 1767. They landed at Philadelphia and settled at Bridgeport, Pa.

He was a soldier in the Continental army, having enlisted under Colonel Washington. Having been captured by the British, he, with others, was kept in confinement for three months in an old sugar house on Long Island, and those dying there were buried on the beach. At length he was set at liberty along with twelve companions. For substance they were furnished with bread containing lime and ground glass, which caused the death of ten of them before they reached home. Of those that reached home, two died within a week, and he in ten days. He left to the care of his wife four sons, namely:

Thomas, born August 4, 1767, in Ireland.

Adam, born November 23, 1771. —

James, born July 14, 1773.

Alexander, born —, 1777.

After his death, his widow took her four sons and moved to Cumberland county, near where Carlisle now stands.

In 1789 she married again, becoming the wife of John McCune, and to them were born one son and one daughter. This daughter in course of time married William Colwell, and a few of their descendants are now residents of Lawrence county and attend our reunions.

About the time of Mary Fullerton's second marriage, three of her sons left the home nest, and from this point begins the divergence which has left her descendants in widely scattered localities in the United States.

Her eldest son, Thomas, born August 4, 1767, was married march 27, 1788, to Isabella McCune, born August 8, 1767. (This name may be McCown or McCowan.) There is a tradition that a brother of hers died in Scotland, about 1812, and left her a great fortune. She joined him in the transfer of lands as shown by Penn-

sylvania records. Not long after their marriage they moved to North Carolina. Later they moved to Kentucky, and finally went to Missouri, where she died August 4, 1831, and he about six years later, May 1, 1837. To them had been born eight children, viz.:

1. Robert, married (1) Jane Scott, (2) Mrs. Sarah Guiley.
2. William, married (1) Mary Watson, (2) —.

4. Mary, married David McAlister.

8. Margaret, married John McAlister.

From each of these sprang large families, and it would be almost impossible to trace their descendants, so widely are they scattered in the land.

Robert, the oldest son, born February 16, 1790, was married in Kentucky on June 8, 1813, to Jane Scott, born April 18, 1796, daughter of John Scott and Nancy Rodgers (who were captives for three years in their early life among the Pattawatomie and Miami Indians in the region now known as Ohio and Indiana). In 1818, with many other emigrating families, as the Scotts and Pharrs, they left Kentucky and went to Missouri, settling near the head of Buffalo Creek in Pike county, on 30th September, 1818. They brought with them the Cumberland Presbyterian faith and established Antioch camp-grounds near the present village of Cyrene. Here camp-meetings were annually held up to the time of the Civil war. The first Presbytery west of the Mississippi river was held at the joint home of Robert Fullerton and his father-in-law, John Scott.

William Fullerton and Mary Watson left a large family — David, Thomas, John, William, James and Robert, and Jane, who married Dr. Hayden and lived in Arkansas. Thomas was a Methodist preacher of note,

who lived in Wisconsin. Robert was living in Minnesota in 1879.

After Mary Watson's death, William Fullerton went to Tennessee, where he married again and had issue: three children.

John Fullerton and Nancy Ford had eight children. After her death he married again in South-west Missouri, and reared another family.

Mary Fullerton and David McAlister lived and died in Pike county. They had ten children. One son was named Porter, one of whose sons, William B., (commonly known as "Doc,") now lives in Kansas City, and another, James R., lives in Bowling Green.

Isabella Fullerton and Abner Boyd also lived and died in Pike county. She was born May 15, 1795, and he August 4, 1792. They were married October 24, 1816. They both died of Typhoid fever in 1844, she in August and he in September. There were born to them fourteen children, whose names are as follows:

Azel J. Boyd, born Nov. 21, 1817; died Dec. 10, 1885. Left issue.

Abner Weedin Boyd, born June 11, 1826; died Dec. 4, 1891. Left issue.

Levi W. Boyd, born Feb. 24, 1828.

Mary Jane Boyd (Richmond) born Oct. 16, 1829; lives Hannibal, Mo. Ten children.

Adley K. Boyd, born Feb. 23, 1831.



Margaret A. Boyd (Baxter) born Dec., 1832. No issue.

Jas. L. Boyd, born Nov. 1834.

Sam P. Boyd, born May 10, 1837; died Dec. 21, 1891.

Alfred C. Boyd, born Feb. 1, 1842. Lives near Louisiana, Mo. No issue.

Elizabeth Fullerton and Joseph Scott, (brother of Robert's wife) also lived and died in Pike county, near Cyrene, Mo. They reared a large family, among them being Thomas, Joseph, James, Mary (married Sweeny), Nancy (married Johnson), Martha (married Lindsey), and her son James.) Thomas is now (1900) Sheriff of Pike county), Elizabeth (married Tinsley), Isabella (married Clark).

Jane Fullerton and Josiah Boyd had many children, viz: Eliza (Wormington), Jane (Powers), Margaret (Dawson), living in Paris, Mo., in 1901. issue eight children), Isabella (Osborne), Robert, Thomas, Miriam (Hood), Rev. Harvey M. (now living at Weaverville, N. C.), F. J. and J. P. now (1901) living at Sarcoxie, Mo.

Margaret Fullerton was in captivity for three years among the Pottawatime Indians, had been scalped and had no hair on her head.

Margaret Fullerton and John McAlister went to Tennessee. Had five children when they left Missouri.

Going back now to Robert Fullerton and Jane Scott, we find there were born to them ten children: the two eldest in Kentucky, the others at or near Scott's Spring in Pike county, Mo. Their names, births, marital history and deaths are as follows:

1. John, born April 28, 1815; died in 1874. Unmarried.
2. Mary Elizabeth, born July 25, 1817; married Abram Fisher. No issue. Died 1890.
3. Thos. Elder, born May 27, 1820; died in early life.

4. Nancy Jane, born April 27, 1822; married Wm. Watts. Left issue. All dead now.
5. Robert Sloan, born Mar. 1, 1824; married in Oregon. Left issue. Died in 1900.
6. Isabella McCune, born Nov. 24, 1825; married Wm. H. Smith. Left issue. Died Sept. 7, 1887.
7. Joseph, born Sept. 1, 1828; died in infancy.
8. Babe—died.
9. Josiah, born Nov. 24, 1830; died unmarried in Oregon, Dec. 9, 1891.
10. Andrew Jackson, born Aug. 18, 1840; died in early life.

It is of interest to note that but two of the Fullerton name now remain of all the children and grandchildren of Robert Fullerton and Jane Scott. They are the sons of Robert Sloan Fullerton, and live in Oregon.

Their names are Robert Fisher Fullerton, born Dec. 29, 1857. Still a bachelor.

Wm. Jolly Fullerton, born Nov. 13, 1859; married but no issue.

Their sisters are Mary Isabella, born Sept. 24, 1861; married H. T. Grewell. Issue. P. O. Warren, Oregon.

Emma Irean, born April 9, 1866; married H. B. Duncan. Issue.

Isabella McCune Fullerton was married to Wm. H. Smith, a Virginian, on Jan. 15, 1850. He was born Jan. 13, 1821, and settled in Missouri in 1844. After their marriage they settled in Pike county, and there spent their lives, and are buried at the old Antioch

cemetery, she having died Sept. 7, 1887, and he Jan. 12, 1898. The latter part of their lives they spent at her father's old homestead, in the yard of which was still standing (1900) a log cabin built in 1832. Their children are:

Thomas Berry Smith, of Fayette, Mo., (to whom we are indebted for his very able and highly appreciated assistance in furnishing us with the record of the descendants of Thomas and Isabella McCune Fullerton) was born at Scott's Spring, Pike county, Mo., Dec. 7, 1850. His father was a Virginian. T. Berry was reared on a farm and enjoyed only the limited opportunity of country schools until his 17th year, when he was permitted to go to a High School at Clarksville, Mo. Afterwards (in 1869) he began a college career at Glasgow, Mo., and graduated in 1873. Since then he has taught, save one year, (1875 and 1876) which he spent in Chemistry at

Yale College. Since 1886 he has occupied the chair of Chemistry and Physics in Central College, Fayette, Mo. He has written much prose and verse, and issued in 1900 a volume of verse entitled, "In Many Woods," which was favorably received.

Of T. Berry Smith and Emma Marvin Newland, were born four children, namely :

Adam Fullerton, born Nov. 23, 1771, when he left home went first to North Carolina, thence to Jackson county, Georgia. His wife was Hannah Luckey. They were the parents of four children :

From Georgia, Adam Fullerton, with his family, moved to Bedford county, Tennessee, near old Berlin, on the waters of Duck river, where he died very suddenly on July 1, 1820. His widow Margaret, afterwards moved to Gibson county, West Tennessee. In 1826 she also was very suddenly called home while sitting in her chair conversing with friends.

Adam Fullerton's children are all dead. The last to be called home being John Sharp, who resided with his son, Dr. Henry T. Fullerton, in Kenton, Tenn., and died at this home on March 29, 1900, lacking three weeks of being eighty-seven years of age.

F. M. Boyle, the husband of Sarah Louise, is prosperous merchant, stock and grain dealer. His elde

son, Clarence, is a dealer in wagons and farm implements. His second son, Joseph, is at a business college at Valparaso, Ind.

Dr. Henry Thomas, eldest son of Adam Fullerton, married Ann Black, and resides at Kenton, Tenn. (To him we are very much indebted for the progress of our little book, he having ably assisted us in gathering history and furnishing the record of the descendants of Adam Fullerton.)

Dr. Henry T. Fullerton was in the Confederate army, wounded at the battle of Shiloh, and discharged from resultant disability. Graduated from Missouri Medical College, class of 1867. Has since been constantly engaged in the practice of medicine and loves his profession next to his kinfolk. As a recreation, raises Jersey cattle and fine poultry. Member of the C. P. church and a Royal Arch Mason.

When Mary Fullerton, nee McCune's three boys left their home, James, the third son, born July 14, 1773, remained with his mother, he being apprenticed to a distiller, completed his trade, which took him three years. That done, he took a trip west, landing at Beaver Point in 1793. Here he remained but a short time, returning home to work at his trade. In 1797 he again came west, settling this time on what is now known as the Old Fullerton Homestead, at the cross-roads. It is supposed that he here took up the usual tract of land



(640 acres) at that time a dense forrest. Here he cleared a small space and erected a cabin some 12x14, around which the wolves and other wild animals would howl.

One end of said cabin was a fire place. The floor was of puncheon and the roof clapboards, all prepared with but few tools. We find he obtained a deed for this land in 1801, given him by the government.

The latter part of this same year he returned to Cumberland county, where, on December 25, 1801, he was united in marriage to Margaret Sharp, who was born November 7, 1782, being now in her nineteenth year. Bringing her over the mountains to this rude home on horseback, she carrying for a whip a willow rod which she planted near the spring and it grew to be an immense tree, under who's branches her children and many of her children's children have played. Margaret Sharp was a daughter of James and Mary Sterrit Sharp, her father being a brother of Mary Sharp Fullerton. This proving what we have always been led to believe, that James Fullerton and Margaret Sharp (his wife) were full cousins. James and Mary Sterrit Sharp lived near Trenton, New Jersey.

We are told that during the battle on Christmas Day, 1776, the dishes in their cupboard rattled with the booming of the cannon. Her father, James Sharp, died April 12, 1812, aged 58 years. Her mother Mary Sterrit Sharp, dying on August 27, 1833, at the age of 76. Both lie in the Middle Spring church yard, Cumberland county, Pa. Their dates along with many others were taken from Rev. Moody's church record at that place.

Margaret Sharp had three sisters and three brothers. We find in Rev. Moody's record that he married Martha Sharp and Wm. McClelland at Newburg, Cumberland county, Pa., on April 9, 1808, they coming west and settling near Mt. Jackson, Lawrence county, Pa.

He also married Mary Sharp and Joseph Quigley,

June 9, 1808, they remaining in Cumberland county, where many of their descendants are still living.

Nancy Sharp was married to Dr. Hamilton, April 16, 1840. Robert Sharp and his wife, Nancy Robinson, settled west of Mt. Jackson. James, being the last to leave Cumberland Valley he located near Lacon, Ill., where he died a few years ago—the last of that generation.

It may interest some to know that Margaret Sharp was a very delicate and slender young lady. On her wedding day her husband could span her with his hands, her waist measuring just the same as his silk hat.

Before her death, which occurred on August 6, 1854, her weight was over three hundred pounds. The writer can remember seeing her sitting in a large rocker with both arms removed to give her room.

Her husband, James Fullerton, died seven years previous to her on December 26, 1847. Both died at the old home where they had spent all their married life and are laid side by side in Westfield church-yard. Margaret Sharp visited the home of her children <sup>but</sup> but once, in 1803, making the trip over the mountains on horseback, carrying Mary, her baby, on her lap, and bringing home with her a little colored girl, whom we, her grand children, always called black Lucy, who lived in the family all her life, dying at a ripe old age, and was buried at Westfield.

Old residents say that James and Margaret Sharp Fullerton were considered the most wealthy, most aristocratic and highly respected family in the county.

On their farm was erected the first cider and brandy mill where they made cider and most delicious peach brandy. To this couple were born eight children:

Mary, born November 14, 1802.

Margaret, born January 23, 1804.

James, born November 23, 1805.

Buthsheba, born December 29, 1807.

Robert, born February 4, 1810.

Alexander, born March 25, 1811.

John, born June 17, 1817.

Nancy, born November 27, 1822, and is living in good health at the present time.

Mary the eldest, died on May 10, 1856.

John the youngest son, died at the old home on December 13, 1836, at the age of nineteen. Both lie in Westfield.

Margaret the second daughter, remained at home for some years, becoming the wife of James Stewart on August 18, 1860. She died on July 22, 1886. Both are buried at New Galilee.

James Fullerton and Ann Dale Clarke were married on April 2, 1829. She was born at the old Clarke Homestead on October 11, 1804. They went to housekeeping in a log house on the farm where we held our first reunion, and both died in a large frame house which stood on the same spot, and both lie in Westfield.

Ann Dale Fullerton died January 20, 1862.

James Fullerton died July 27, 1884.

To this couple were born the following children :

In tracing history we find that the Fullerton's and Sharp's both left Scotland about the same time, while many Fullerton's are still to be found in Aberdeen, Scotland.

James and Mary Sterrit Sharp lived near Trenton, New Jersey, for history tells us that the battle that shook the town was fought on Christmas Night, 1776. James Sharp had a sister, Agnes, who married Moses Hemphill. He also had a brother John, who had a daughter Margaret, who married David White. They were the parents of four children, John, Margaret, James and Jane. This we are unable to follow further. This history and record, so far as we know, brings us to 1901, and here we close, trusting some one will catch the chain and keep up the history for years to come.
