

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PREFACE

An eight page genealogy of Stephen Flanders of Salisbury, Massachusetts, was contributed to the New England Historic Genealogical Register, April, 1873, by a descendant, William Prescott, M. D., of Concord, N. H. That genealogy was the nucleus of the present volume. As appears to be inseparable from amateur genealogies, certain errors were later found in it which have been corrected in the following subsequently published works. In "Old Families of Salisbury and Amesbury," Mr. Hoyt in 1897 corrected the ages of two of the sons of the pioneer. In 1915 the Vital Records of Salisbury were published, and those of Amesbury in 1913. The State papers of New Hampshire, Series of 1910, also threw more light on the subject, as did many town histories published from time to time in the past sixty years. The records of the Pension Bureau have also helped.

It was my original intention to include only descendants bearing the name Flanders and their children. A few lines of descent have been added on the distaff side, several of whose representatives have been of great assistance in the compilation, notably, the lines so carefully prepared by Mr. William A. Cole, of Rupert, Idaho.

It is to be regretted that the record of some families is incomplete. Discrepancies between dates as given and those in certain family papers and in genealogies of related families may, perhaps, be discovered, as it has been difficult to decide which of conflicting reports should be accepted.

Before the publication of this work it was my intention to make another visit to England to secure more information on the early home of the Flanders. This second trip has had to be post-poned. The collection of this data has, however, been placed in the hands of another descendant, who is on the high seas at the time of this publication. It is hoped to record the result of his research in a later volume.

A sense of deep obligation is here expressed to Mr. Harry Grant Flanders, of Chicago, for his constructive criticism and encouragement sustained throughout the year. Appreciation of the kindness of Mr. Lewis Flanders, of Brookline, Mass., is also expressed for his successful research into the ancestry of Governor Alvan Flanders, and of the courtesy of Miss Ella Flanders, of Franklin, N. H., in lending the letter addressed to her by Governor Benjamin Franklin Flanders, respecting the mythical Indian maiden spouse of the Puritan pioneer.

THE NAME ABROAD

IN ENGLAND

And the rush of the hosts I seem to hear, And see the tossing of plume and spear.

—WHITTIER.

When we speak of the Flanders family in England we refer to those of that sur-name wherever located and whether or not related.

As Stephen Flanders left England probably three centuries ago nothing definite is known of his family there, but as it is known that a number of the Planters of Salisbury in New England were from the Cathedral City of Salisbury, Wiltshire, England, we think he came from near there.

There are at least two sources for the present-day English family. First, Walter Beck de Flanders, a Norman knight, who came with Wm. the Conqueror. Second, Ferault de Falandres, a gentleman of the Court of France who accompanied the Princess Eleanor of Provence to England when she went to marry Henry III in the year 1239. The descendant of Ferault de Falandres (or Flanders) commanded the camp of the Royalists at the battle of Stamford in 1310. Later the representatives of this second line returned to live in France (Armorial de la France, Table des Familles Nobles, 1874).

The first line, that of Walter de Flanders, after a gap of a century, seems to appear at the Manor of Flandres (or Flaunders) in Warwickshire. This is the Stratford-on-Avon country, with Rugby and Coventry as interesting county towns. The Warwickshire family first appear in the person of Gerard de Odingseles à Flandres, Lord of Maxstok, in the year 1174. He married Basilla, the great granddaughter of Hugh de Lindsey (or Limsey), a Norman baron of the reign of King William the Conqueror. Gerard à Flandres had three sons, to each of whom one of his titles descended. Thus his eldest son William became Lord of Maxstok, the second son, Gerard de Odingseles, and the youngest, Hugh de Flandres, born about the year 1218

(From "The Lindeseie and Limesi Families of Great Britain," by John Wm. Linzee, 1917).

This Hugh de Flanders, County Warwick, is given by Sir Bernard Burke, in the General Armory, as the principal ancestor of the family in England, as follows:

Flanders (Flandres, Co. Warwick, temp. Richard II; descended from Hugh de Flanders, third son of Gerard de Odingsells, Baron of Makerstoke, Co. Warwick, in right of his wife, Basilla, dau. and heir of Geoffrey, Lord Lindsey, Baron of Makerstoke, temp. Henry II Visit. Leicester, 1619)

(Arms) Ar. a fesse gu. in chief three mullets sa."

Hugh de Flanders was born in Maxstoke Castle over seven hundred years ago, but the castle is still in use today, although not in the Flanders family, the recent proprietor being Thomas Dilke, Esq. This fine structure stands about one mile from the town of Solihull or Coleshill in Warwickshire, and is encompassed with a moat. At each corner is a hexagonal tower with battlemented parapet. The gates are covered with plates of iron and the marks of the discarded portcullis are still visible. In the walls of the court are yet remaining the caserns or lodgements of soldiery.

Hugh de Flandres had a son Gerard de Flandres. Gerard's son was William de Flandres, who married in 1291, Eleonora, dau. of John Bracebridge. There is thus a gap of 356 years between the marriage of Wm. de Flandres and the arrival in New England of his possible descendant, Stephen, some 285 years ago. As Stephen has over a thousand living descendants, the large number in England today may be accounted descendants of William.

The name in England is frequently encountered in Hunting-donshire and most frequently in Cambridgeshire where there were in 1890 as many by the name of Flanders as by the good old name of Jones (24 in every 10,000). A branch of the family, retaining the same coat of arms, changed the spelling of their name to Flaunders. Thus in 1402 Margaret, dau. and co-heir of John Flaunders (ar. a fess gu. in chief three mullets sa) of Co. Warwick, married Richard Whethill of Shepey, County Leicester. The name is included in Dooms Day Book (spelled

Flandren in Latin) which makes it one of the "old families" in the British Isles.

The crest on the coat-of-arms is that assigned to the family in "Fairbairn's Family Crests," the standard international reference work. The motto, "Patientia Vincit," is that of the family of Hugh de Flandres' mother. (See Frontispiece.)

In early times, before sur-names were in general use, the names le Fleming and de Flanders were used inter-changeably. Thus Baldwin le Fleming, 1124, had a grandson William de Flanders, who had a grandson Robert Fleming.

Capt. Claude Mortimer Flanders writes from his station in India: "The family tradition was that the family (Canadian) was originally English from Stoke Pogis (Essex I fancy). In fact I met a Flanders out here from there during the war." This is probable as Colchester is in Co. Essex and was the name given to the common land from which Salisbury was settled in America.



WHITTIER

To trace the ancestry of Stephen Flanders to its probable origin in the Low Countries seems impossible. The best we can do is to record the various traditions handed down in the family. The two following may serve as samples of many:

- (1) Stephen Flanders, the first, was picked up on a battle field in Flanders, Belgium, by a British soldier, and carried to Wiltshire, Wales, England. This child was named Flanders. He emigrated to Rocky Hill, Salisbury, Mass., now called Amesbury. He was the first and only one of the name who came to this country.'' (From unpublished Genealogy prepared by David E. Flanders of Alton, N. H., in 1894. Note: Salisbury, England, is in Wiltshire.)
- (2) My brother handed me a circular from you in reference to the Flanders family which is wrong. Dur-

ing the religious war in Belgium two brothers, who were high up in Court Circles were Protestants and knowing these were to be killed, escaped in Pork Barrels on a schooner to England and came to America and settled in New Hampshire. One of them married an Indian Princess. Stephen Flanders was my great grandfather and is buried in grave next to Daniel Webster in New Hampshire (from letter dated 1932 from descendant on the Pacific coast).

The General Armory states that The Earldom of Flanders is the fourth peerdom of France. In 1874 the head of the French family was Henry Raymond Hilaire Marie Ferault, Comte de Falandres, born in 1842. The French arms are D'azur, a une carpe d'argent, posee en fasce; au chief d'or, charge de trois roses de gueules. Supports: deux lions.

SALISBURY PLAIN

Having gone thus far afield, let us return to something relating more closely to Stephen Flanders.

The fine old city of Salisbury, Wiltshire, England, with its splendid Cathedral, is in strong contrast with the modest village of Salisbury, New England, with its population of 1666 persons in 1776, diminished to 1658 in the year 1910. On the other hand Salisbury Plain, New England, bears a strong resemblance to that of the same name in old England as instance the following:

Dear Mr. Taylor:

My son Carl has just returned from a business trip to London. He wrote me that while there he took a week-end trip to a little town in a fishing village. Enroute they passed through a considerable forest and presently came out into an open space and my son remarked that he should think it might be "Salisbury Plain" meaning like that in New England. The driver of the car who was a Commander in the English Navy at the time of the war turned to him and asked when he was there before,

and when told "never" said, "Well, by George, that is Salisbury Plain." Yours very truly,

The compiler, some years ago, rode across these same English plains on a bicycle. After leaving the Cathedral City the first point of interest was Stone Henge, built of great stones on end in a circle, by some prehistoric people. From here the road led off mile after mile through rolling land covered only with tall grass and wheat. The plains in New England contained this same tall grass which "grew so thick and high that a man or beast could not be seen five rods." The Indians burned it off each year so they could see to "kill the deer which resorted hither every spring to feed upon it" as described in the history of Amesbury, Mass.

In England a day's cycle ride is only 30 miles due to the succession of low hills and valleys. There are but few points of interest. The farm houses are further apart than in America and are built of masonry with thatched roofs. In one case the writer remembers a heavy stone wall with a thatch coping, a strange case of a frail material protecting a stronger one. In America the farm houses are all of clapboards with rived cedar shingle roofs. A saw mill was set up at Salisbury before the arrival of Stephen Flanders so he probably never occupied a log cabin. In both countries the chimneys are immense.

Along the river edge of these plains in America the first settlers found huge piles of clam shells which remained there for centuries. These, to the early settlers, were perhaps just as "prehistoric" as Stone Henge in England. Among these shells have been found arrow heads and bones. At another edge of the Massachusetts plain the pioneers found indications of an Indian village and this section of Amesbury is still known as "Indian Ground."

One of the characteristics of the marshy part of the plain today in Salisbury, Mass., consists of groups of piling, perhaps twenty in number, projecting about a foot above the ground. On these the hay cocks are stacked to keep them out of the wet. In a half hour's ride, hundreds may be seen.

WHITTIER LAND

Amesbury, Massachusetts, formerly part of Salisbury, was the place of residence of John Greenleaf Whittier. His tomb may be seen in the Union Cemetery not far from the head-stones of Jarvis and Benaiah Flanders. Whittier's birth place, at the neighboring town of Haverhill, is preserved as a fine example of the old time farm. This whole territory is now affectionately known as Whittier Land and is one of the most beautiful spots in America.

The Salisbury of Stephen Flanders' time has been sub-divided into the towns and villages of Salisbury Point (not near the sea), Salisbury Beach, Salisbury Plain and Amesbury, all in Massachusetts, and Seabrook and South Hampton in New Hampshire, as the province line cut through in 1741. Thus a man might have been born in Salisbury, married in Amesbury and died in South Hampton, and yet all these happenings might have occurred in the one homestead.

It is hoped that members of the family in this and succeeding generations, during some summer vacation, will make Salisbury their "Mecca." Here hot dog stands are not in evidence but fried clams may be bought every fifty feet along the main highway. Although the sea air seems agreeable, "tonics" are for sale everywhere. The train service (North Station, Boston) is not frequent and most busses do not take on and discharge passengers in the same state, so descendants are advised to go in their own cars.

BIOGRAPHY of STEPHEN FLANDERS

ARRIVAL, 1646

The night is falling, comrades mine,
Our foot-sore beasts are weary,
And through you elms the tavern sign
Looks out upon us cheery.

Among the thirty towns contained within the Massachusetts Bay Colony, the most northern was Salisbury, established October 7, 1640, from common land called Colchester and located forty miles along the sea coast above Boston, which latter was founded ten years earlier. Its town mark was what a century and a half later became our dollar sign (\$) with one vertical mark through the S.

Stephen Flanders arrived at Salisbury before March 8, 1646 (8-1m-1646 old style), as the birth of his son is recorded on that date. This is the earliest record we have of him. He was not at Salisbury in 1640 when a complete list of inhabitants was made and is still preserved. Some historians, therefore, "split the difference" and say he arrived in 1643. There appears to be no proper authority, however, for any date earlier than 1646.

It would appear that Stephen Flanders married before going to Salisbury and that his daughter Mary was born elsewhere. It is probable that these two events occurred in England, as the early vital records of Salem, Boston and Salisbury, are still preserved and contain no such record. It is reasonably certain that he came from England under an assumed name. Here again the lists of sailings are complete and contain no Flanders entry. Many Puritans adopted disguises to escape the religious persecution in England during the reign of King Charles I.

THE PURITANS

Scarce had the solemn Sabbath Bell Ceased quivering in the steeple, Scarce had the parson to his desk Walked stately through his people.

WHITTIER

It is pleasant to think of our ancestor as being a member of such a company. During the thirty-seven years of his life in Salisbury, he signed several petitions about village affairs, but only one, so far as can be ascertained, about church matters. This was a petition dated 29-3mo. 1658 to the General Court at Boston stating that the religious differences at Salisbury were not sufficient to warrant the appointment of a council, particularly as the townspeople did not care to pay for the board of the council "at Sam'l Halls." In two places it mentions "our Reverend Minister." It is signed by "Steven Fflanders." He could not have signed such a document if he had not been a Puritan. Another proof is his signing of the Oath of Fidelity to Cromwell's Puritan Commonwealth in 1651, being two years after the beheading of King Charles.

We may therefore "imagine our ancestors wending their way to church on each returning Sabbath on horse back, each husband with his wife seated behind and his matchlock slung to the saddle, ready for any emergency which might happen. Arriving at the little church, whose bell had proclaimed the solemn hour of worship, their guns were severally placed within the door ready for use." The General Court ordered "that the military officer in every towne shall appoint what arms to be brought to the meeting houses on the Lord's day and other times of meeting and to take order at farmes and houses remote, that ammunition bee safely disposed of, that an enemy may not possesse himself of them" (History of Amesbury).

Stephen Flanders was one of the last of the Puritans to arrive in America, as after 1643 their case was better in England and more returned to England during the next century than came over during that time.

The rigid standards they maintained may be judged from

the following, in the history of the neighboring town of Haverhill, Mass.

"Further be it ordained, that noe p'son shall take tobacco publiquely, under penalty of ojsvsd (eleven shillings, six pence), nor privately, in his owne howse, or in the howse of another, before strangers, and that two or more shall not take it together, any where, under the aforesaid penalty for evry offence" (1634).

THE PLANTERS

With corn-leaves waving freshly green
The thick and blackened stumps between,
Behind, unbroken, deep and dread,
The wild, untravelled forest spread.

WHITTIER

Pope's "Pioneers of Massachusetts" lists Stephen Flanders as a Planter of the Plantation of Salisbury but not one of the earliest settlers. In those early times a man who owned much property outside of a city was termed a Planter, whether he lived in Virginia or New England.

Legal documents prove this as follows: "Steven Flanders of Salisbury, Planter, for 50 shillings, conveys to Samuel Buswell of same town, husbandman, about 3 acres salt marsh in Salisbury, in ye general division toward Hampton, butting upon ye salt marsh of John Gill and mostly encompassed by little river, 13:11m: 1653. Acknowledged by Steven Flanders 11:12m: 1655" (From Essex Institute Historical Collection, January 1932).

Four years later "Steven Fflanders of Salisbury, Planter, for 35 shillings conveyed to Willi: Chandler of Newbury 3 acres of marsh in Salisbury, bounded by Merrimack River, etc. June 1, 1659, Witness, Anthony Somerby and Daniel Lunt. Acknowledged in court 10:2mo: 1660. Grantor's wife Jane released dower in court 8:2mo:1662" (From Essex Antiquarian for 1899, Vol. III).

"Steven Fflanders, sr., of Salisbury, Planter, for £5-3s.-6d. mortgaged to Mr. Rich: Cutt of Portsmouth, merchant, my 10 acre lot of upland near my dwelling house in S., being my proportion of the 500 acres granted by Salisbury to its inhabitants. Oct. 2, 1667. Wit: Thos. Bradbury and Henry Ambross. Ack:

Oct. 2, 1667 before Robert Pike, Commissioner' (Essex Antiquarian, Vol. VI).

He bought more land as follows: "Willi: Osgood of Salisbury, millwright, conveyed to Steven Flanders of Salisbury, Planter, 10 acre planting lot in Salisbury, formerly of George Brown, bounded by Willi: Brown, Sam'l Gatchell, Pawwaas River and Common land. Witness: Edw. Woodman and Philip Challis. Acknowledged and grantor's wife consented 10:2m: 1660" (Vol. III, Essex Antiquarian).

The first land he received however as a gift, or grant, for settling in the town. This was in 1650 and was a house lot of one and one half acres in the village. When Samuel Hall returned to live in England in 1657, Stephen Flanders bought lot number 31 of the Hall farm and sold it to Henry Green of Hampton in 1664.

He continued to buy and sell real estate until four years before his death he controlled four sections of commonage (about 50 acres), six sections of pasture; two sections of "broke-up land" and several meadows in addition to his village property.

Although not a rich man he was a steadily prosperous one, leaving a good estate to his six children.

GOODWIFE JANE

What moistens the lip
And what brightens the eye?
What calls back the past,
Like the rich pumpkin pie?

WHITTIER

Sometime in the year 1680 Goodwife Gatchell, the next door neighbor of the Flanders, went into her truck patch to get a pumpkin to make some pies. She had a pumpkin in her hand when suddenly she saw Jane Flanders walking through the Gatchell cornfield. These two were always ready to break a lance in wordy combat and Mrs. Gatchell called out "Gett of my ground thou pennycoinquick. I am sheure you com to stell my corn." This was too much for Jane Flanders who forthwith entered suit against Goodman and Goodwife Gatchell "for calling her vile names." Jane's evidence reads as follows (Records

of the Quarterly Court of Essex County, 1676-80): "Shee had a pumkeng in her hand she held it up and said shee would stave my hed with it, then i said if my cattell have stooid your corne your piggs have stooid (destroyed?) mine wheat; then she (Goodwife Gatchell) said com down: St: Donstan * * * * * * * This trial was referred to the next Hampton Court. This was the same rough period of the country depicted by Hawthorne in "The Scarlet Letter."

James Savage in his "General Dictionary of the First Settlers of New England" stated that Stephen Flanders had two wives, but no authorities are quoted nor details given. It may have arisen from the reference in his will to "the chest which was my wives" but this appears to be singular, possessive rather than plural. Later historians such as Pope in "The Pioneers of Massachusetts" mention only wife Jane.

In writing to Miss Ella A. Flanders who now resides in Franklin, N. H., Benjamin Franklin Flanders, Governor of Louisiana, added a postscript to one of his letters as follows:

P. S. Several years ago, I obtained from a Mr. Flanders who had come to New Orleans for health, his family record which commenced with Stephen Flanders and came down to and included my grandfather's family correctly as far as I know. The record was prefaced by a "Tradition that Stephen was picked up by an English soldier on a battle field in Flanders and taken to England" hence his name Flanders. That his name appears as one of the (incorporated) townsmen of Salisbury in 1650. That he married Jane a converted Indian maiden.

The Record doesn't say Salisbury, N. H., but I have always supposed that it was Salisbury, New Hampshire. The Record twice uses the name Jane without any surname. When I showed the Record to my older brother, Wardwell Clement Flanders, who died a few weeks ago aged 80, he said that he remembered to have heard the "folks" say, when he was a little boy, that the "Grandmother Jane's Indian name was Sandusky, or that she was a Sandusky Indian," he could not recall which. I sent a copy of that record to my cousin, Mrs. Hannah Wilmott, daughter of my uncle David Flanders who is still living in Grand Rapids, Michigan, aged 85, I think. She wrote me that she had heard when a child "that there was Indian blood in the family." I have no doubt of the fact.

You hence have for the beginning of the family, a battle

field in Flanders and a wigwam in America. If we could and should go back further in tracing our English, Saxon, Dutch and Norman blood we should find the strain within the historic era to have proceeded from cannibals.

This would be a pleasant addition to our history if it could be proved, as no less a person than Vice President Curtis traces his descent from the red men. However, in our case, there appears to be no foundation in fact for the story. She had a good command of the English language which she used liberally. She called Willi: Osgood "A foresworn wretch," not entirely to his liking. There was in fact so much use of English by Jane that the court admonished her "for making debate among neighbors and casting great reproaches upon several." In none of these numerous court records is there any suggestion that she was other than an English woman.

Jane Flanders died November 19, 1683, only a few months before the death of her husband.

THE CHILDREN

Cheerily on the axe of labor,

Let the sunbeams dance.

Better than the flash of sabre

Or the gleam of lance.

During the early part of June, 1679, the three Flanders boys took it into their heads to earn some money of their own. They accordingly set to work cutting a thousand hogshead staves for the West Indies rum trade. On the 18th of the month they proudly carried 1,100 staves to the loading place of Mr. Mudgett's ship.

But their satisfaction was short-lived as a neighbor, Nathaniel Ware, made his appearance with a constable and arrested all three boys. At the trial on June 28th it came out that they had cut at least some of the good oak staves on Ware's

land, when they thought, no doubt, they were operating on one of their father's several tracts.

The magistrate, probably John Eaton, whose daughter Martha the boy Philip Flanders was later to marry, seemed to find Stephen, Jr., meek and mild but probably had to take some argument from the younger boys. He pronounced judgment, with a twinkle in his eye, we may surmise, as follows:

"Judgement for the plaintive he to enjoy his staves... and said Steven was admonished for joining with his brothers and the others were fined."

All the children of Stephen and Jane Flanders married well. Stephen, Jr., married the daughter of Thomas Carter, a founder of Sudbury, Mass., and an early settler of Ipswich.

Philip married into the prominent Eaton family, his wife being the daughter of the Prudential man, John Eaton, and the niece of the Reverend Joseph Rowlandson, graduate of Harvard, only member of the class of 1652. Her aunt, Mary (White) Rowlandson, was a woman of distinction who wrote of the Indian customs observed during her captivity of several months in King Philip's War.

Mary married into the Favor family of whom we can learn but little. Sarah married the son of Thomas Newhall from England in 1630, and her descendants in and around Lynn, Mass., have been numerous where Newhall Street commemorates this family. Naomi married twice, her second husband being the son of Roger Eastman, ancestor of Daniel Webster. Her stepson graduated from Harvard in 1703 and travelled abroad. We find a granddaughter, Naomi Darling, by her first marriage and another, Naomi Eastman, by her second, as well as a great granddaughter, Naomi Carter, daughter of Lt. Winthrop Carter, all attesting the affectionate remembrance in which her name was held.

John, the youngest child of Stephen and Jane Flanders, married the granddaughter of that fine old Prudential man, William Sargent, from England to Virginia before 1633; Plant-

er of Ipswich, Newbury, Hampton and Amesbury in New England; and son of Richard Sargent, an officer in the Royal Navy.

FIRST OCCUPATION

For while he wrought with strenuous will

The work his hands had found to do,

He heard the fitful music still

Of winds that out of dream-land blew.

WHITTIER

We do not know what occupation Stephen Flanders followed in England but in New England he promptly became a herdsman. The History of Amesbury states, "A general meeting was held Feb. 18, 1650, and Steven Flanders was made a townsman on condition that he constantly keep the town herd of cows." As Keeper of the Herd he had authority to sue in the courts those who neglected to pay the fee, usually fixed at one pound of butter per cow, a pound of butter being credited at six pence against the annual fee of from 15 to 20 pounds of silver or its equivalent.

Time had not permitted planters to fence their pastures so the few cattle of the town were all turned in together on necks of land between the ocean and rivers,—the Taylor River in Hampton and the Merrimac in Salisbury. Thus in 1652 the Prudential men of the town proposed the following ordinance: "The great neck was ordered to be laid out as an ox common but to continue this year as an ox and cow common as before," having been used for oxen from August 1st to April of each year and for milch cows from September 15th to April. For some reason young Stephen objected to this and gathering his friends and neighbors together they entered a "Contre Descent" or dissent. This objection was acceeded to and "it was decided to give up Elder's Cove to a cow common which lay north of the little river toward Hampton."

At this time there were only 1300 cattle in all New England for an English population of 20,000 and their value had risen to great heights as the sea voyage of from ten to twelve weeks made it difficult to import the larger domestic animals. After a few years of this he turned more to the duties of a New England Planter with a plantation of his own.

Did the young herdsman Stephen Flanders ever dream of those honors to come to many of his descendants? Could he, in mind's eye, see the parade of Generals, Judges, Governors, Senators, Cabinet Minister and Ambassador in whom the blood of the Flanders family was to flow? We think perhaps he did.

DISTINGUISHED DESCENDANTS

And step by step since time began
I see the steady gain of man.
For still the new transcends the old
In signs and tokens manifold.

Although the descndants, distinguished and otherwise, will have their genealogy in detail in the proper place it is thought to be interesting to gather together in this Biography, certain outstanding facts.

Four of Stephen Flanders' descendants were governors of states or territories. This is very unusual as any student of American history will know. The distinguished four were: Hon. Alvan Flanders, governor of Washington; (2)Hon. Benjamin Franklin Flanders, governor of Louisiana; (3) Lewis Cass, governor of Michigan, and (4) Hon. Walter Harriman, governor of New Hampshire. Walter Harriman, whose mother was Hannah⁷ Flanders, was a partner in the firm of Pillsbury and Harriman, who kept a general store in Warner, New Hampshire. Both partners became state governors as Pillsbury was governor of Minnesota. Harriman was colonel of the Warner troops in the Civil War and was promoted for gallant conduct from Colonel to Brigadier General. He had served as a prisoner in Libby Prison.

The other descendant who rose to the rank of General in the United States Army was Lewis Cass, who led an expedition into Canada during the War of 1812 and was captured there.

Among the jurist descendants may be mentioned the Hon. Joseph R. Flanders, Judge of the court of Franklin County,

N. Y., and Henry' Flanders, Esq., of Philadelphia, author of "The Lives of the Chief Justices of the United States."

The members of the U. S. Congress were Alvan and B. F. Flanders, Congressmen, and Lewis Cass, United States Senator. Several by the name of Flanders have been state senators, among them the Revolutionary patriot, Senator James Flanders of Warner, N. H., and the late Senator William Wallace Flanders from Weare, N. H. A list too numerous to mention here have been members of various state legislatures, as there appears to be an ability for public service inherent in the Flanders blood.

This talent for public service showed itself conspicuously in the grandson of Sarah⁵ Flanders. Her son, Major Jonathan Cass, after serving at Bunker Hill as a private, aged 19 years, went West with his family to Ohio. His son Lewis, after making various treaties with the Indians, rose to be the National standard bearer of the party of Jefferson. As Democratic nominee he received 1,223,795 votes for the presidency of the United States, against 1,362,242 for General Zachary Taylor, Whig candidate, who was elected. Lewis Cass also served as Minister to France, Secretary of War and Secretary of State.

HIS ESTATE

In addition to the information regarding the grants he received and the parcels of land he bought and sold, the following data relates to his movable estate while he lived. At his death his estate of about 30 pounds gave 5 pounds sterling to each of his six children. If we remember that an English pound sterling three centuries ago equalled several hundred dollars today, we can see that Stephen Flanders left his children well provided for.

The first tax rate recorded against him is dated 1650 and amounted to three shillings nine pence for the annual rate, being 57th in a list of 61. He was then a newcomer and a young man. Two years later the records show an increase to two shillings eleven pence for the half year, being 45th in the list. Three years before his death his estate in Salisbury alone was appraised at twenty nine pounds eleven shillings. Previous to this he had given a substantial dowry to his daughter Sarah, and had

set up his two eldest sons on separate farms, this being before the youngest son married. In a tabulation dated 1681 certain items of the three farms were compared as follows:

trees twoo whereof I gave him form'ely & anothr next unto them out of my orch'd or shall oth'wise agree w'th my execut'r concerning them Also my will is y't if my son Stephen shall depart this life before mee y't his eldest son' Stephen Fflanders shall have w't I have bequeathed unto him in this my last will & testam't.

It'm: I give & bequeath unto my three daughters Mary Fflanders Sarah Newhall & Naomie Fflanders five pounds a piece, to be paid by my three fonns: Stephen; Philip & John, each of them to pay equally & alike w'thin twoo years next aft' my decease.

It'm: I give unto my daught'r Mary two good cows, & my trundle beditead, w't bedding; cov'rlid, blankets, fheets, boliter, pillows & whatio ever app'rtenanted and belong thereunto: as also one of my iron pots, & one wollen wheel & one linnen wheel at her own choyce as also twoo good sheep, & one hogg; and the chest w'ch was my wives.

It'm: I give unto my daught'r Sarah Newhall one cov'elid.

It'm: I give unto my daught'r Naomie, one good cow; one wollen wheel: one linnen wheel, & my iron fkillet & two fheep, & one hogg, and an old cheft & the box which was her mothers, & one cov'rlid:

It'm: I give unto my Grandchild Thomas Fflanders fon' to my fon Stephen one sheep.

It'm: I give all my Stock of cattle (not disposed of) to my fon John.

Finally I give & bequeath all ye reft of my eftate, houfing, lands, meadow, And all my eftate both movable & immoveable whatfoev'r not difposed of in this my last will & testam't (my honest & due debts & my funerall charges being first payed and dicharged) unto my son's Philip Fflanders & John Fflanders equally to be divided betwixt them whome I also make, constitute & ordaine joynt execut'rs unto this my last will & testam't, Always provided y't the f'd Philip & John doe joyntly & together carry on my occasions & mayntaine & take care of my estate & the conservm't y'e of & also lovingly, peaceably & tend'ly as becometh obedient & dutifull children maintaine & take care of my person in sichness & health as long as I shall continue in this vale of tears bothe ewually sharing in ye care, charge, & burthen y' of.

And in Confirment: of y' promises tobe my last will & testam't I have hereunto subscribed my hand & seale this fourth day of February Anno: Domini: One thousand six hundred eighty three, or foure.

Dr. Wm. Prescott stated in 1873 that this Stephen² Flanders died Oct. 6, 1744, aet. 98 years, 6 months and 26 days. Hoyt's "Old Families of Salisbury and Amesbury," published 1902, gives the death of his son, Stephen³ Flanders, as on Oct. 4, 1744. The later record appears to be the correct one. The health of Stephen² Flanders must have been poor at the time of his father's death, as the father did not make him an executor of his will and provided that in the event of the son's death before that of his father, the son's portion was to go to the grandchild. Stephen 3rd.

He was listed as a householder at Salisbury as early as 1677.

His houselot adjoined the homestead of his father, who left him a legacy of one barrel of cider, yearly, from the father's orchard, until Stephen, Jr., removed his three apple trees. He was Jr. until the death of his father and senior thereafter for the four years he outlived his father.

PHILIP² FLANDERS (Stephen¹), born July 14, 1652, at Salisbury, Mass.; died August 27, 1712, at S.; married Nov. 4, 1686, at Sal., Martha Eaton, widow of Benjamin Collins (who died 1683) and dau. of John² and Martha (Rowlandson) Eaton of Salisbury. (See preceding Biography.) She was born Aug. 12, 1648, at S., and died April 19, 1734, at S. Her father owned much real estate and was one of the Prudential Men of Salisbury. Her grandfather, John Eaton, came from England to S. in 1639/40 with wife Anne. He later removed to Haverhill, Mass., five miles up the Merrimack River. Philip Flanders signed the Norfolk County Petition in 1680 and was admitted a Freeman of Massachusetts by the General Court in Boston, 1690. He served against the Indians in 1702.

He appears to have had no children of his own but had two stepsons, John and Benjamin Collins. His will mentions Philip Feevor, perhaps a namesake, child of his sister Mary, and also mentions John Darling, son of his sister Naomi.

NAOMI² FLANDERS (Stephen¹), born Dec. 15, 1656, at Salisbury, Mass.; died July 4, 1718; married, (1st) — Darling; (2nd) April 4, 1699, at Salisbury, Benjamin Eastman, born 1652 in Sal.

No record of her first marriage can be found but this may be accounted for by lost marriage archives for the town of Amesbury from 1667 to 1685, a gap of 18 years. Her brother, Philip Flanders, in his will dated 1712, mentions "John Darling, son of my sister Naomi." "The Old Families of S. &. A." states that "she had a son John, b. Feb. 21, 1683 (s). It seems probable that 'John & Daniel, sons of' (as in Vital Records) should read 'John Darling son of' for we have seen no other mention of Daniel."

Her first husband was probably the John Darling garrisoned at Chelmsford, Mass., 1676, in King Philip's War.

Her second husband, Benjamin Eastman, was the son of the pioneer, Roger Eastman, who came from Langford, Wiltshire, England, in 1638, in the ship "Confidence." Roger Eastman was ancestor of the Hon. Daniel Webster.

Benjamin Eastman was a man of some standing in the community. He sent one of his sons to study at Harvard and later to travel abroad. Benjamin Eastman died Jan. 27, 1727/8, at South Hampton, and mentioned in his will "my second wife" (Naomi Flanders) "and the estate she brought me" (from "Old Families of S. & Ames.").

This would appear to exceed the 5 pounds sterling inherited from her father, so her first husband may have been well-to-do.

In 1763 he was selectman of B. In 1764 he was promoted from Ensign to Captain. In 1765 he built the first bridge across the Contoocook river, it being of the design known as "king post" truss.

COMMENT ON HEADSTONES

Every effort has been made to check up on all the headstones in the neighborhood of Salisbury. Some few have been found for those members of the family in the fourth generation. More are now to be recorded for the fifth generation. Many of the early stones in the old cemetery at the fork of the road in South Hampton are mere ragged teeth, without legible markings. In Amesbury, it is said that at the Golgotha burial ground on Mary Street—the first cemetery in the town—the absence of old headstones is because "as the living encroached upon and planted the ground, the stones were thrown into the convenient It is also said that "when the church was removed from Monroe Street (Amesbury) to Rocky Hill, the records were in some way lost." In the cemetery on Elm Street between Chestnut and Merrill Streets, Amesbury, every stone is clear and legible, and the yard beautifully tended. The Union Cemetery at Amesbury has some old stones (Jarvis and Beniah Flanders), and is a very large yard without any index as to plots, or so the superintendent reported in 1931. The burial ground at Salisbury Plains is rather rural. Here will be found Capt. John Flanders' grave. The Rocky Hill grounds occupy a beautiful site in Amesbury. The graves date from around the Civil War period. The three other grounds in Salisbury and Amesbury have very few Flanders graves. In South Hampton, N. H., the cemetery behind the town hall has several, but not very ancient. At Plaistow, N. H., the marble stones of several of the family are old and well preserved.

Witness: Nathaniel Flanders, Christopher Gould. Dated Aug. 6, 1764."

Ezekiel's wife Sarah may have died between Aug. 6, 1764, and Oct. 29, 1765, and he may have married (2) Mehitable Glidden as follows: "Mehitable Glidden of Brentwood conveys to John Glidden of B. all her interest in the estate of her father Richard Glidden, late of B., dated July 7, 1763"; on the same page with later date appears the following: "Mehitable Glidden, now Mehitable Flanders by her marriage, and her husband Ezekiel Flanders acknowledge above to be their free act, dated 29 Oct. 1765" (same reference book as above).

It appears reasonably certain that this was the John Flanders recorded in the History of Weare, N. H., as being the brother of Thomas and Jacob. His daughter Miriam was doubtless named after his sister. If his companion in arms, Jacob Flanders, was his brother, he (Jacob) must have been born after their parents removed from Salisbury, Mass.

John Flanders enlisted for 8 months in 1775, fought at Bunker Hill, June 17th of that year, and at Cambridge. He re-enlisted in Capt. Nathaniel Hutchins' 8th Co., Col. Joseph Cilley's 1st Regt., Gen. John Sullivan's Brigade, spent the winter at Valley Forge, crossed the Delaware with Washington and fought at Trenton and Princeton. At Gen. Sullivan's request he stayed in service after his term of enlistment had expired. From Sept. 1, 1778, to Feb. 4, 1779, he was sick in camp. On April 1st, 1779, he was granted a furlough by Col. Hazen. His discharge is dated Jan. 22, 1780. For service from March 26, 1777, to Jan. 31, 1780, he received 24 pounds (probably in coin) and 1200 pounds (probably in Continental paper money) ("Hist. Weare").

"Thomas was a ship carpenter and built vessels for the Government at Sheepscott river, Maine, as master builder. He built the first decked vessel on Winnepesogee Lake and the white oak frame can still be seen on the south shore. His home in Alton has a white oak frame.

He was a noted entertainer with his stories of war and witch-craft. He was a man of great memory. 5' 7" tall, high cheek bones and a flush of red in his cheeks. His weight from 130 to 135 lbs. He was once pressed to accept a major's commission but declined."

"This manner of dressing was according to the Continental Lines. Hat, wide brim and made fast on the sides of the crown; pants, buttoned around the hips — no suspenders — vest long and drawn over the pants; coat of Continental fashion with large brass buttons. He was a true friend of the Republic and fought under Washington at the Battle of White Plains, N. Y., 1776, also Battle of Trenton (2nd enlistment). Previously he was in the army round about Boston at the time and after the Battle of Concord & Lexington."

He "was buried in the n. west corner of the yard (Alton), with a small stone marking his grave with the letters T. F. on the top. The cemetery is on the west line of the homestead built previous to 1776 and in good condition."

The census of 1790 does not list Alton. It was part of Gilmanton. At Gilmanton there was Thos. Flanders, head of family of "1 male over 16 and 2 females," and there was Thos., Jr., with "1 male over 16, 2 males under 16." For Thos., see center No. 64.

REP. PHILIP⁵ FLANDERS (*Philip*⁴, *Philip*³, *Stephen*², *Stephen*¹), born June 22, 1746, at Salisbury, Mass.; died after 1815.

He removed from Salisbury, Mass., to Danville (Hawke formerly), thence perhaps to Salisbury, N. H. (Bakers Town formerly), and to Warner, N. H., before 1790. He was selectman of Warner 1796 and Deputy to the General Court from Warner in 1815.

It was doubtless this Philip Flanders who, after training in Salisbury, N. H., on May 27, 1776, joined the Continental Army to reinforce Washington at N. Y. In 1777 he enlisted from Salisbury, N. H., in Capt. Morrell's (1st) Battery of Col. Cilley's regt. of artillery. In 1780 he was in the 2nd Co. of Col. Cilley's (1st) regt. for which in 1781 he received wage of \$36.45. Feb. 14, 1781, he enlisted again from Salisbury, N. H., at New Britain (Andover), N. H., in the 6th Co. commanded by Capt. Simon Sartwell.

A Philip Flanders, Jr., in the census of 1790, at Warner, had a son under 16 years and a daughter.

SERG. ABNER⁵ FLANDERS (*Richard*⁴, *Philip*³, *Stephen*², *Stephen*¹), bapt. Jan. 19, 1755, at South Hampton, N. H.; died after 1840, probably at Concord, N. H.; married SARAH CHANDLER, b. Dec. 15, 1756.

When 3 years of age his parents removed to Concord, N. H. He signed at Concord March 14, 1776, the Association Test (see last page before Index). He enlisted July 20, 1777, with rank of sergeant in Capt. Kimball's Co., Col. Stickney's regt., and fought at the Battle of Bennington as follows: His regiment was ordered to attack the breastwork which the Tories had thrown up. Gen. Stark reported, "Soon after I detached the Colonels Hubbard and Stickney, on their right wing with 200 men, to attack that part, all of which plans had their desired effect. Our people behaved with the greatest spirit and bravery imaginable."

The call for volunteers for this great battle is interesting. "As soon as it was decided to raise volunteers, Col. Hutchinson mounted his horse and reached Concord on the Sabbath, walked up the broad aisle of the church while Mr. Walker was preaching. Mr. Walker paused in his sermon and said, 'Col. Hutchinson, are you the bearer of any message?' 'Yes,' replied the Colonel, 'Gen. Burgoyne with his army is on the march to Albany. Gen. Stark has agreed to take command of the New Hampshire men and if we all turn out we can cut off Gen. Burgoyne's march.' Whereupon the Rev. Mr. Walker said, 'My hearers, those of us who are willing to go better leave at once.' 28 men arose and left,' among them being Abner Flanders.

On July 11, 1780, he served in Capt. Aaron Kinsman's Co., From July 9, 1782, to Nov. 11, 1782, he served under Capt. Ebe-

nezer Webster in a company of rangers for the defense of the Western Frontier, service 4 m., 1d., rate per mile 3 pounds, number of miles travelled 70, amount rec'd 12.19.6.

By act of 1832 he received a pension of \$66.58 per annum, living at the time at the home of Nancy Hanaford.

Stickney's regt., Gen. Stark's brigade, July 20, 1777, for Bennington and Stillwater. His cousin, Capt. David Flanders, married Capt. Peter Kimball's daughter.) From July 22 to September 22, 1777, he served in the same regiment but in

Capt. Nathaniel Wilson's company. In 1778 he served under Capt. Ebenezer Webster in Col. Nichols' regt., Gen. Whipple's brigade, for the relief of Rhode Island.

During the War of 1812 Capt. Joseph Flanders from Concord, N. H., commanded a company in Col. McCobb's regt. of Maine and N. H. Volunteers, Jan. 24, 1813, being discharged at the termination of the war, June 15, 1815. There appears to be no other Joseph Flanders of the neighborhood of Concord of this date, unless it be center number 116, his cousin, also named Joseph. He resided for some time at Boscawen near Concord and was at Coventry, Grafton county, N. H., on Dec. 11, 1788, where he signed a document in company with his brother Onesipherous Flanders, a resident of Coventry. Thomas Stickney's regt., from Concord, when news of the evacuation of that fort reached them. Five days later in the same regiment, in Capt. Peter Kimball's company, Gen. Stark's brigade, he was in the Battle of Bennington and Stillwater. Capt. Peter Kimball was the father-in-law of Jesse's brother, Capt. David Flanders. He was not in the census of 1790 as the head of a family. He therefore died before that date or married after it.

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Capt. David⁵ Flanders (Dea. Jesse⁴, Jacob³, John², Stephen¹), born Jan. 19, 1758, at Boscawen, N. H.; died Dec. 31, 1842, at Franklin Falls, N. H., aet. 84 y.; married before 1790, Hannah Kimball, born Aug. 2, 1763, at Haverhill, Mass., daughter of Capt. Peter and Elizabeth (Thurston) Kimball, of Water St., Boscawen, and granddaughter of Col. Daniel⁴ Thurston.

The diary of Capt. Henry Gerrish states that on receiving word of the battle of Concord and Lexington he set out "Fryday 21, April, 1775," from Boscawen for Cambridge, Mass., in company with John and David Flanders. About two months later he (David Flanders) fought at the battle of Bunker Hill in Col. Stark's regiment as written into the History of New Hampshire by John M. McClintock, as follows: "The British troops landed at Charlestown beach and marched up the hill in three separate columns. The Fusiliers formed on the British right, in front of Stark's regiment which was stationed on the extreme left of the American forces. The late Captain David Flanders, who was a private in Capt. Joshua Abbott's company, stated that his 'company was located down on the Mystic Beach,

wholly unprotected by any defence in their front. That the column of the Fusiliers did not deploy until they passed Abbott's company, therefore they were out flanked by us, hence we had a good chance to pick off their officers. This chance we improved, as we could distinguish the officers by observing the swords in their hands and that they had occasion to use them in urging their men into the fight.'" At Bunker's Hill the Fusiliers' loss was so great that it was said only one officer remained to tell the story.

David Flanders re-enlisted in Capt. Edward Everett's co., Col. Bedell's regt., and fought at the battle of Bennington, where his brother Jesse also fought but in another company.

He lived in Boscawen on Water street at the corner of the road leading to Great Pond, near Bradley Atkinson's residence. His cousin Ezekiel lived on the same street. In the census of 1790 he was at Dorchester, N. H., head of a family of "1 male over 16 y., and 2 females." On May 2, 1822, he was commissioned a captain at Concord, N. H. On June 1, 1840, he was residing at Franklin Falls, N. H., aged 83 years, at the home of Amos Hoyt, perhaps his son-in-law.

In 1776 he signed the Association Test at Boscawen. (See last page before Index.) On April 21, 1775, two days after the battle of Concord and Lexington, he set out, as a Minute Man, for Boston, with Capt. Henry Gerrish. (See Capt. David⁵, No. 106.) In September of that same year volunteers were called for to join Benedict Arnold's attack on Quebec, "an expedition attended by terrible hardships, resulting in failure, the capture of nearly all of Gen. Arnold's command and the death of Gen. Montgomery. For this expedition Dea. Jesse Flanders, John Flanders, Jr., and Nicholas Davis enlisted from Boscawen in Capt. Henry Dearborn's co., and were captured in the attack on Quebec." While in prison John kept a diary which has been in part preserved. Much of it is in cypher, the key to which has been found. On March 29 he wrote "boutat hist imew Eware desint omakeo uras capeas w Ecouldg oto ti" which being translated reads "About this time we were designing to make our escape so we could go to Ticonderoga." day he wrote "tha yfound don tour desin eand dw Ewar ethratne du st opu tu si niron st ha y pu tal E Sar gen sta ndc april si nirons" meaning "They found out our design and we were threatened to put us in irons. They put all the Sargeants and Corporals in irons." On April 1st he wrote "I was put in irons with the rest of my company and many others." (Hist. Bosc.).

In 1809 Lt. John Flanders, who objected to the mingling of the church in affairs of civil government, took a hammer to town meeting and during the prayer hammered on the hinge of his pew in the gallery under pretence of repairing it.

In the census of 1790 at Bosc, he was head of a family of "1 male over 16 yr., 3 males under 16 and 3 females."



ASSOCIATION TEST 1776

or Articles of the Declaration of Independence signed in New Hampshire by men of the name of Flanders, as recorded in New Hampshire Misc. Rev. Documents, Series of 1910, Vol. 30.

"April 12 to Aug. 28, 1776. We, the subscribers, do hereby solemnly engage and promise that we will to the utmost of our power, at the risk of our lives and fortunes, with arms oppose the hostile proceedings of the British Fleets and Armies against the United States."

Boscawen: Jesse, John, Jacob, Ezekiel, Enos, Jesse, Jr., Joseph.

"This is to certify that the within Declarations have been offered to the Inhabitants of Boscawen and unanimously Signed Excepting one (vix): Aaron Flanders, Refused to Sign the Same."

CONCORD: Richard, Abner, Richard. (Also recorded in History of Concord.)

DANVILLE (formerly Hawke): Isaac, Asa, David.

GILMANTON: Thomas. (Also recorded, Hist. Gilmanton.)

NOTE:—Thirteen years later the census of 1790 contained 60 heads of families in New Hampshire by the name of Flanders. The above written list accounts for 33 of these.

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
