FLRRI3

Those of this name derive from Henri de Ferrers-a great Norman-English lord-who came Ferriere de St. Hilaire in Normandy. He took part in the Conquest of England by William of Normandy in the year 1066-his rank in the army was Master of the Horse. His arms bore six horseshoes-argent-on a field sable.

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FERRIS

- II. Zechariah Ferris (Ferrers) son of Samuel of Reading, England, came to Charlestown, Massachusetts. November 17, 1673 he married Sarah Blood, daughter of Richard and Isabel (----) Blood of Lynn, Mass. She was born April 1648. Zechariah was admitted to the church at Charlestown January 23, 1675-6. He served in King Philips War in 1676. He removed to a place in Connecticut, called Pequonnock--later known as Stratfield, now the City of Bridgeport. "His letter was read and accepted by the Church at Stratfield Sept. 9, 1705." In 1710 he enlisted in the expedition against Port Royal--Queen Anne's War--from which he did not return. His will executed Aug. 14, 1710 was probated April 15, 1711. It is on file and his signature may be seen at Fairfield, Conn. The will is in part as follows: "I, Zachariah Ferris Sen. of Stratfield in the County of Fairfield Colony of Connecticut in New England being by divine providence going forth in the present expedition against the Common enemy att Port Royall" etc. The inventory of his estate-- of Zachariah Ferris deceased"--was taken April 16, 1711. The last item read "Wareing apparell that he carried with him" and "Wadges yet due."

Zechariah Ferriss removed from Charlestown, Mass. to Groton where his name appears on the list of heads of families 1680 "Zechariah ffars." Thence he went to Stratfield, now Bridgeport, Conn.

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III. Zechariah Ferriss, born July 7, 1674, at Charlestown, Mass. married Sarah Reed of Stratford, daughter of William and Deborah (Baldwin) Reed in the year 1699. About 1710 they removed to New Milford, Conn. He was one of the twelve original founders of the town; was treasurer for a number of years, when the taxes were paid in various kinds of grains. Chosen town surveyor in 1713, his signature is attached to the certificate of survey of one hundred deeds of town record. He died early in the year 1750. His wife and four of their children joined the Society of Friends; David, Benjamin and Hannah became eminent speakers among the Quakers.

"Memoirs of the Life of David Ferris, An Approved Minister of the Society of Friends, Late of Wilmington in the State of Delaware" written by himselfrevised and corrected from the original manuscript-Philadelphia-Merrihew & Thompson's Stearn Power Press-Merchant Street above Fourth-1855----Notes from introduction-author unknown-"David Ferris, the

subject of the following Memoir, was the son of Zachariah and Sarah Perris, late of New Milford in the State of Connecticut-His grandfather, Samuel Perris, came from Reading, in England, and was one of the early settlers of the Massachusetts Colony. David's parents had a family of eight children of whom he was the third. When a large family of children are remarkable for the propriety of their conduct, or become greatly useful in society, it is almost always found, on a close inquiry, that their mother has been eminently qualified by her piety and other virtues, for the important concern of education. That such was the character of David Ferris's mother is evident, as well from tradition as by authentic documents yet extant in the family. In a short account of his parentage written many years after her death, by her son benjamin, he says, "My mother lived several years after my father's decease. She was of the Puritan sort of people-a woman of great understanding, and well read and versed in the Scriptures and other good books; -of extensive knowledge, and having a memory to exceed most persons that I ever knew. She was of a pious and religious disposition, being like Mary of old, who, as our Lord said, had chosen that good part that should not be taken away from her. Her exemplary conduct and behaviour made a deep impression on my mind when very young, even when not more than nine or ten years old." ---- David Ferris died at Wilmington Del., Dec. 5-1779 aged 73 years.

Further extracts from Maempirs of the Life of David Ferris": David (as above, moved to Wilmington, was 84 years a minister among Friends...He mentions visiting and attending the meeting at Oblong and staying there with his brother Benjamin and in company with Wm. Russell and Paul Osborn Went to the North River and crossed on his way home. He also speaks of visiting his old home in New Milford and staying with his brother-in-law Dobson Wheeler (his sister Hannah's husband) also mentions his sister Sarah Abble and mentions his brother Joseph's family. Joseph did not join with the rest the Society of Friends. The Friends Meeting House at Oblong (near quaker Mill) was built on land of 2 personshalf owned by a Russell-the other half by a Ferriss.

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IV. <u>Benjamin Ferriss</u>, born Nov. 10, 1798, married <u>Phebe</u> <u>Beecher of old Milford Nov. 6, 1728</u>. She was daughter of Eleazer and Elisabeth (Peck) Beecher of Milford, Conn. About 1732 they removed to Oblong, Dutchess County, New York, and settled at a place now called Quaker Hill. Benjamin was a Quaker preacher of prominence in the Meeting. He and his family were among the few Quakers who were zealous friends of the American cause in the Revolutionary War. Phebe (Beecher) Ferriss died June 13, 1775. Benjamin was living in 1794.

V. Reed Ferriss, born at New Milford, Conn. aug. 16, 1730, lived at Quaker Hill (Oblong) Dutchess Co., N. Y. married about 1751 Anne Tripo; undoubtedly she was daughter of James and Anne (Cook) Tripp of Oblong, formerly of Dartmouth, Mess. Reed became an extensive landholder, owning large tracts in Washington Co., N.Y. Ferrisburg, Vermont was named for him. It was originally part of New York state. In the autumn of 1778 a large portion of the continental army was encamped in the vicinity. The old Cuaker Meeting house, built in 1765 and still standing, was used as a hospital for the sick and wounded soldiers. The 12th of September General mashington arrived and he remained here with the army until the last of November. Reed Ferriss died March 30-31, 1804. his wife lived to be 97, and tradition says she rode ten miles to attend the funeral of her son 4dmond when she was 96 years old.

The home of Reed Ferriss was Headquarters of General George Washington 1778. It is said that the trial of Gen. Schuyler was held in this house.

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VI. Warren Ferriss, born Feb. 19, 1763 at Quaker Hill, Pawling township, Dutchess Co. N. Y. married first about 1787 Ruth Taber, born April 1, 1768, daughter of Thomas and Antherase (Pearce) Taber of Pawling, N. Y. They removed to Glens Falls, Washington Co. (now Warren Co.) N. Y. Ruth Taber Ferriss died sometime prior to 1793. Warren married second Kesiah Hawley. He was a prominent man in the community, holding many civil and military offices. In the year 1806 he was appointed Brigadier General of Militia in Washington Co. by Governor Morgan Lewis. His tombstone in Glens Falls Cemetery, removed from the first burying ground which the march of improvement obliterated, records the death of "Gen'l. Warren Ferriss who died March 26 1813; aged 50 years." The stone is a slab of purest statuary marble. Above the inscription a weeping willow droops over a mortuary urn, exquisitely carved. When seen by the Compiler in 1896 the stone was as glistening white and the cutting as clear as if carved but a short time instead of nearly a century ago.

I think the name Elma should have been almy, as that was a family name of some intermarriages. He did not know that at the time, and died before we could interchange much information.

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VII. Angus Ferriss, son of Warren and Ruth (Taber) Ferriss, of Glens Falls, N. Y., married <u>Sarah Gray</u>, daughter of <u>Jabesh</u> and <u>Ruth</u> (<u>Norton</u>) <u>Gray</u>. She was born Jan. 28, 1785; according to family tradition she was three years older than her husband. A deed executed by him Nov. 21, 1808 shows that he was of age and single at that date. They removed to Erie, Pennsylvania, where he was engaged in furnishing supplies to the United States army when he died, the day of Perry's victory on Lake Erie, Sept. 10, 1813 (less than six months after the death of his father), leaving a widow and two infant children. Mrs. Perriss went to Buffalo, N. Y. where she married second Joshua Lovejoy, Aug. 13, 1815, as second wife. He died Sept. 5, 1824. She died at her home in Buffalo Aug. 28, 1864, aged 79 years.....mong other interesting reminiscences, Mrs. Lovejoy often told her grand-children how she attended the grand reception given to General Lafayette when he visited Buffalo in 1825. Mrs. Lovejoy and her daughters Sarah and Louise, whom she outlived, are buried in Forest Lawn Cemetery.

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VIII. Charles Drake Ferriss, born Dec. 5, 1812, of Buffalo, N. Y., married May 5, 1834, at Clarence, Erie Co., N. Y. Hester Ann pivins, daughter of Thomas Jr. and Amanda (Beach) Bivins, of Clarence. In 1836 Charles D. Ferriss joined the Texans in their struggle for independence, and was aid-de-camp to Gen. Sam. Houston at the battle of San Jacinto. In after years the State of Texas acknowledged services by a grant of 960 acres of land. Mr. Ferris was a brilliant writer of prose and verse. In 1842-3 he was associated with ". S. Chadbourne in editing the Western Literary Messenger, a weekly paper, and in 1844 was assistant editor of the Buffalo Courier. For several years he was employed in the Buffalo Post Office. He died at sea 1850. His wife died at Buffalo aug. 11, 1895, aged 80 years, and is buried in Forest Lawn Cemetery. Charles Drake Ferris was named for a friend of his parents, not a relative. He dropped the final letter from the name "Ferriss" as it was written by his ancestors.

> The descendants of Reed Ferriss living in Glens Falls and Troy still retain the ancient spelling.

I COOKE

I. Francis Cooke, born in England, exiled from his native land for religion's sake, went to Holland, was a member of the Separatist Congregation under the saintly Pastor Robinson and one of the noble band who were to become immortal as the Pilgrim Fathers, who came to Plymouth, Mass. in the Mayflower, December 1620. Francis Cooke married at Leyden, Rolland, June 30, 1603, Hester Mahieu, daughter of ---- and Jenne Mahieu of Canterbury, England. She is spoken of as "Hester the Walloon"; -- a congregation of French Huguenots was permitted to build a church at Canterbury by Queen Elizabeth. They were called Walloons. Francis Cooke brought his son John, s-bout ten years of age, on the Mayflower. His wife and other children came in the "Ann" 1623. Francis Cooke "lived to see his children's children have children." He died April 7, 1663, aged above eighty. Francis Cooke was the seventeenth signer of the Compact.

From Boston Transcript, Oct. 31, 1904. Genealogical Note #637:

"At the Gemeente Archief (Official Archives) Leyden, Holland, to which building the records of the Pilgrim Fathers have been removed from the Stadhuis, or City Hall, under date of June 30, 1603, is the following:

"Franchoys Couck, a jongman" (a single man, one who never married), "from England, a woolcomber, accompanied by Philip de Veau and Raphael Roelandt, as witnesses, was married to Hester Mahieu, a young dochter, from Cantelbuch, England, and she brought her mother, Jenne Mahieu, and her sister Jenne Mahieu as her witnesses:"

As found by the Keeper of the Records of the 'Official Archieves, August £4, 1904, for the son of Cinrella Cooke (Constant, Captain Peter, Deacon Nicholas, Nicholas, Walter Cooke of Reymouth, Mass.) my kinsman; who has the Keeper's copy of this record officially stamped."

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II. John Cooke, born in Holland, came with his father to Plymouth, Mass., on the ship Mayflower Dec. 1620. He married March 28, 1634, at Plymouth Sarah Warren, daughter of Richard and Elizabeth (----) Warren. He was a member of the Plymouth military company 1643. Representative to the General Court 1638-9, 1641-4, 1647, 1655-6. Was a deacon in Plymouth Church for many years. Was one of the first purchasers of Dartmouth, Mass. Joined the Baptist Church, became a preacher. Was five times deputy to the Gen. Court from Dartmouth. Died there Nov. 23, 1695, the last male survivor of the Mayflower passengers.

ALDEN

I. John Alden came to America with the Pilgrim Fathers in the ship Mayflower, landing at Plymouth, Mass. Dec. 21, 1620. He was born in England 1599, and died at Duxbury, Mass. Sept. 12, 1687. He married Priscilla Mullins (or Molines) who came on the Mayflower with her parents William and Alice (----) Mullins, and her brother Joseph. Her parents both died soon after they reached Plymouth. John Alden became one of the most influential and prominent men in the Colony. He was for many years First Assistant or Deputy Governor, Treasurer, Commissioner of War, etc.

John Alden joined the Mayflower Pilgrims at Southampton. He was a man of importance in Plymouth, and later removed to Duxbury, where he died, the last survivor of the signers of the Compact. Priscilla probably died sometime previous, as she is not mentioned in his wills or settlements.

John Alden was a member of Captain Standish's militia company

Her grand-daughter Bradford is a grandmother.

PECK

Paul Peck, born, it is supposed in Essex Co., England I. about 1608, although Paul himself deposed in 1632-3 concerning the nuncupative will of Widow Barding giving his age as about sixty. He came in the ship "Defence" in 1635 to Boston; in the next year he removed with Thomas Hooker and his party to Hartford. He was made a proprietor of the town of Hartford by courtesy in 1639-40, with liberty to cut wood on the common lands. He became a citizen of considerable prominence. He was Surveyor of Highways in 1658 and 1665, selectman in 1661, 1668, 1673, chimney viewer in 1667. In 1691, Apr. 23, he was chosen with Joseph Easton and Joseph Olmstead as one of the Deacons of the First Church of Christ in Hartford, an office he held until his death. At the same meeting when Paul Peck Senior was chosen deacon, Paul Peck Junior was "judged incorrigible in his sin of drunkenness, and was excommunicated." Paul Peck, Senior, died Dec. 23, 1695, according to the Hartford record. He left an extate of L536, 5 shillings, which he disposed of by will. Hartford Probate Records, Vol. 5, page 217, original will of Paul Peck, Sen., is filed. His wife Martha ---- survived him (maiden name not given.)

He lived in the West Division of Hartford, now the town of West Hartford, where he died in 1724-5; he married Elizabeth, daughter of John Baisey. He left no will and his children's births are not recorded in Hartford, but we know their names from an agreement found on the Probate Records. This agreement was dated Feb. 6, 1724-5, and the original is on file in the Probate Office, but was apparently never copied into the books of record.

Agreement (original on file in the Probate Office at Hartford, Conn.) reads as follows:

"Whereas our honored father, Paul Peck decd. leaving some estate not disposed of by will we agree that the moveable estate shall pay the debts as far as it will pay, and we will set over to our brother Paul Peck one acre and $\frac{1}{2}$ of land commonly called Peck's Island. And if the $1\frac{1}{2}$ acres of land will not pay all the debts, then we, the heirs of this estate, do oblige ourselves to pay to the aforesaid Paul Peck every one of us an equal part of what debt shall be remaining. And we agree that our brother Paul Peck shall have a double part of the estate, and the rest shall be equally divided amongst the rest of us. And make choice of Jonathan Butter and Thomas Hosmer, with the aforesaid Paul Peck, to make an equal distribution of the aforesaid land as soon as the water will allow of measuring the land. In confirmation of the above agreement we have set to our hands and seals this 6th day of February 1724-5.

JOHN BIDWELL.

John Bidwell, though a proprietor by "courtesie of the town," must have been very welcome, for no man whose surroundings were half-hearted could have found the courage to own a tanyard on an island in Little River, and his own six saw and grist mills, three at Hartford, one at East Hartford, one at Wethersfield, and one at Middletown, working them successfully. This was not all, for from 1655 to 1661 he was chosen chimney viewer, another evidence of his acceptability, and this office was no sinecure, representing a whole fire department, under the usual restrictions of the period, when every man, woman and child constituted a board of investigation.

John R. and his wife, Sarah, a daughter of John Wilcocks, of Hartford, were original members of the Second or South Church, February 12, 1670.

SECOND CHURCH.

The cause for separation in the church, which founded the Second or South Church, had been slowly growing for years. Mr. Hooker's administration had been an eleven years' truce to ecclesiastical hostilities, simply because the hand which guided was competent and well beloved.

The majority rule in the after dissensions was high-handed, little heeding the feeble cry of the minority, which grew and strengthened until with the advent of Rev. John Whiting, in 1660, and Rev. Joseph Haynes, in 1663, both sons of men prominent in the history of early Hartford, the discussions being renewed with force, the tension too strong for endurance snapped, the Second Church sprang into active being and John Bidwell and Sarah, his wife, found content with Mr. John Whiting as their pastor, continuing their congregational beliefs, and refusing to hold communion with Mr. Haynes.

THE NEW COVENANT.

The new covenant must have been satisfying to their faith. It was probably written by Mr. Whiting, and is still

in use by the church. John Bidwell died in 1687, leaving a large family of children, all enterprising citizens.

In May 1776 a regiment was ordered to be raised in Connecticut for the defense of the state "to be subject to join the Continental army if so ordered by the Governor". Benias (Barnias) Beach was one of the soldiers enlisted in this regiment in Captain Bezaleel Beebe's Company. About the first of November 1776 thirty-six picked men from Capt. Beebe's company under his command were sent to Fort Washington to aid in its defense. The Fort was captured by the British Nov. 16 1776 and its gallant defenders forced to surrender and become prisoners. Barnias Beach was sent to New York and confined in Livingstone's Sugar House. On the 27th of December an exchange of prisoners took place. Of Captain Beebe's company, thirty-six men, four were killed at Fort Washington, of the thirty-two made prisoners so dreadful had been their treatment that only twelve were able to sail for Connecticut. Six, among whom was Benias Beach, died on the way home, a martyr to the cause of American liberty.

"ONE HUNDRED YEARS AGO TODAY"

(Article from "Sunday Times", Buffalo, N. Y. August 15,1915)

Marriageable women were at a premium in Buffalo 100 years ago, and the advent of attractive widow Ferris made quite a ripple in social circles.

She was the relict of Angus Ferris, of Erie, Pa., and was accompanied by her two little boys, Warren and Charles, aged four and two respectively, and thereby hangs a tale of frontier life with a strong local color.

Sarah Gray Ferris, better known as Sally, was the daughter of Jabesh Gray, who when 16 years old was a member of General Herkimer's Body Guard. She being born in strenuous times, was full of daring, and when asked in marriage by Angus, only son of General Warren Ferris of Glens Falls, she took him for better or worse. When their first child Warren was two years old, Angus Ferris started on a long journey to the western part of New York State, and en route their second child, Charles Drake, was born.

Upon reaching Buffalo, it was found to be seething with frontier anxieties and pressing on to Erie, Pa., Angus Ferris became connected with the United States Commissary Department. Purchasing two vessels, he operated them on Lake Erie in accumulating supplies for the army, and while in the midst of a successful career, he sickened and died on the 10th of September, 1813, just as the news of Perry's victory was received.

In the autumn of 1814, Mrs. Ferris came to reside in Buffalo, which was just arising from its ashes, and here met Joshua Lovejoy whose lovely young wife had been so foully murdered by Indians, when Buffalo was burnt on December 31, 1813.

The original Lovejoy house stood just south of Mohawk Street, on Main Street, and we preseume that Joshua Lovejoy had rebuilt it, and with his son Henry, then 14 years old, was residing there.

The tragic death of his wife was still deplored. On the day, so fatal to their happiness, William Dorsheimer tells us, in volume 1 of the publications of the Historical Society, "Mrs. Lovejoy was in her house on the present site of the Phoenix. The night before her husband had mounted his horse and taken his trusty rifle and gone to the Rock to make such defence of his home as became a brave man.

"'Henry,' said the bold-hearted woman to her little son, 'You have fought against the British, you must run, they will take you prisoner. I am a woman, they will not harm me.' The lad flew into the woods. His light foot falls had not faded from the mother's ear when a score of Indians rushed into her house and commenced to sack it."

Thus it happened that Mistress Sally Lovejoy was alone in possession of her home, as was her friend, Mistress St. John, directly across Main Street, neither woman believing that the enemy would reach the village.

Several vivid accounts exist of the death of Mrs. Lovejoy written by eye witnesses, one being that of Mrs. Sidway, a daughter of Mrs. St. John's who had obtained the especial protection from the British authorities.

Unwilling to leave her home and her lares and penates, Mrs. Lovejoy was killed on her door sill, being struck down by a tomahawk wielded by a drink-crazed Indian. On January 1st, the charred remains of plucky Mrs. Lovejoy were discovered amid the ashes of his home by Joshua Lovejoy, defender of his country and pioneer patriot.

The Lovejoy name from this time became historical, Joshua Lovejoy having come here in 1807, and what more natural than that 100 years ago we find the following announcement of his marriage in the Buffalo Gazette of August 15th:

"Married--In this town, by Judge Oliver Forward, Joshua Lovejoy to Mrs. Ferris."

To them were born several children, one Louise, becoming Mrs. Lars Sellstedt, who died while yet a bride. Later on Joshua Lovejoy built a fine brick mansion on Seneca Street, east of Michigan Street, and while in New York in 1824 he died aged 52 years.

George Ferris and Mrs. Arthur Austin of Buffalo, who are children of Charles D. Ferris, and Miss Emma L. Lovejoy of Buffalo, who is a daughter of Henry Lovejoy, link the present with those pioneer days of 100 years ago in a manner that is most interesting to the student of Buffalo history.

IV.

WARREN ANGUS FERRIS

Warren Angus Ferris, eldest son of Angus and Sarah (Gray) Ferris, and brother to Charles Drake Ferris, had a good education, for the times, and acquired the civil engineer's profession. At the age of twenty, apparently through pure love of adventure, he engaged as a trapper for the American Fur Company, of which John Jacob Astor was the head, and for six years roamed in the wilds of the west and northwest. He entered the Yellowstone country, followed the Clark and McKenzie trail to Oregon, and penetrated into California long before the first gold discoveries. He was one of the earliest explorers of the wonders of the Yellowstone region, and the first one who put into print a trustworthy description of them. Hunters had told of the geysers, but they were generally disbelieved; and not until many years afterward was the account furnished by Ferris verified for popular credence.

This first printed description of the geysers of Yellowstone is to be found in an old periodical, "The Western Literary Messenger," published by J. S. Chadbourne & Co. of Buffalo, N. Y. in 1842-43, page 12, No. II, July 13, 1842, under the title "Rocky Mountain Geysers; Extract from an Unpublished Work Entitled 'Life in the Rocky Mountains.'" Two or three other articles from the same pen followed in subsequent numbers, -- "The Chanion of the Colorado", "Indian Chivalry," etc. On Jan. 11, 1843, the chapters of the book itself are regularly begun. Under the general heading "Wild Western Scenes" in the title proper: "Life in the Hocky Mountains", and then follows: "A diary of wanderings on the sources of the Rivers Missouri, Columbia and Colorado, from February 1830 to November 1835, by W. A. Ferris, then in the employ of the American Fur Co."

A month after the appearance of the geyser article in the "Western Literary Messenger", the same article was printed in the "Wasp", a Mormon paper of Mauvoo, Ill., which apparently appropriated it without giving credit for its source.

Speaking of "Life in the Rocky Mountains" Olin D. Wheeler says: "The matter itself is intensely interesting, worthy of republication, and gives a dramatic picture of trapper life among the mountains seventy years ago. It relates to the same period covered by Bonneville's Adventures, by Irving, refers to meeting that man's expedition, and is really, to many of us, a more vivid narration than that of Irving, being at first hand and by a man of keen observing powers and of literary ability."

After his return from the western wilderness, W. A. Ferris settled in Texas, where he did much public work in his professional capacity. He is supposed to have been an officer in the Confederate Army and to have died in Dallas, Texas, in 1872.

THE "HARD CIDER CUP"

During the "Log Cabin and Hard Cider" Campaign of 1840, the Buffalo Harrison Club announced that a hard cider cup, made of silver and worth \$25, would be awarded to the author of the best Harrison campaign song. There were twenty-six competitors. Certain verses beginning "Hurrah for the hero" were judged the best. Their author was Charles Drake Ferris, --an ardent advocate of the opposing political party!

"That the best song should have been written and the prize secured by a hard-shell democrat was probably gall to the club, and very tickling to all of the author's political stripe." (Buffalo Courier.)

However, the cup turned out to be made of pewter, and "if it cost more than \$1.50, engraving included, a good price was paid." The seriously announced excuse for this was that the funds of the Harrison Campaign Club were so low that they could do no better.

The hard cider cup is in the shape of a cider barrel and is of generous size. On the front is engraved the picture of a log cabin with a veranda of saplings, two barrels of cider are to the left of the door, the American flag flies from a pole in the yard, and the owner of the cabin is plowing in the rear. On the right side of the cup is inscribed a couplet of the song for which the prize was given:

"Hurrah for the hero
Whose fame is unstained,
Hurrah for the hero
Whose guerdon is gained."

On the left side is this inscription: "Presented by the T. L. C. A. of Buffalo to Charles D. Ferris for the Harrison Prize Song, 'Hurrah for the Hero." Log Cabin, July 25, 1840."

This cup, along with the letter of award, the manuscript of the poem, and the printed music, was presented by George W. Ferris to the Buffalo Historical Society January 24, 1887.
