The President's Thanks and Certificate of Honorable Service

To *Private William C. Galbreath* 135th Regt Illinois Vol Infantry

Whereas the President of the United States has made the following Executive Order, returning Thanks to the VOLUNTEERS FOR ONE HUNDRED DAYS, from the States of Indiana, Illinois, Iowa, and Wisconsin, to wit:

Executive Mansion,

Washington City, October 1, 1864.

The term of One Hundred Days, for which VOLUNTEERS from the States of Indiana, Illinois, Iowa, and Wisconsin volunteered under the call of their respective Governors, in the months of May and June, to aid in the recent Campaign of General Sherman, having expired, the President directs an Official Acknowledgment to be made of their Patriotic Service. It was their good fortune to render efficient service in the Brilliant Operations in the Southwest, and to contribute to the Victories of the National Arms over the rebel forces in Georgia under command of Johnson and Hood. On all occasions, and in every service to which they were assigned, their duty as Patriotic Volunteers was performed with alacrity and courage, for which they are entitled to, and are hereby tendered, the NATIONAL THANKS, through the Governors of their respective States.

The Secretary of War is directed to transmit a copy of this Order to the Governors of Indiana, Illinois, Iowa, and Wisconsin, and to cause a CERTIFICATE OF THEIR HONORABLE SERVICE to be delivered to the Officers and Soldiers of the States above named, who recently served in the Military Force of the United States as Volunteers for One Hundred Days.

Now, therefore, this Certificate of Thanks and of Honorable Service is conferred on *Private William C. Galbreath* in token of his HAVING HONORABLY SERVED AS A VOLUNTEER FOR ONE HUNDRED DAYS

WILLIAM E. GALEENER ANSWERS THE FINAL CALL

Vienna Citizens Mourn the Loss of One of its Oldest and Most Loved Citizens.

No death has occurred in Vienna that was more unexpected and caused more genuine regret from our entire people than that of W. E. Galeener. For a man of his years Mr. Galeener was an exception. Hale, hearty, pleasant, jovial, good natured, quick of wit, a good story teller and one who enjoyed a good joke, and best of all, a Christian gentleman. All these and genuinely human and every inch a man, and now so suddenly gone. It is awful to contemplate. Never in his life afraid to meet his fellow man and at the end just as brave when the time came to meet his God. His was a life of full measure, and now that he has gone, his family and friends may rejoice that his life was prolonged to the full measure, by reason of strength, going the full four score years. He reared a family provided a good home, the children all having reached their majority and taken upon themselves the duties of life, and all of them honorable is the greatest heritage any man can leave.

He was a Christian for more than fifty years, and a greater part of that time, while he lived at Tunnel Hill, was the leader in every church move and to him was due that the church lived and prospered. After coming to Vienna, his interest in church work continued and he was never happier than when in his pew at the church.

Last Friday was the twenty-fifth anniversary of his marriage, and about fifty of his friends gathered at his home to celebrate the occasion. It was a surprise to him, but he entered into the spirit of the occasion and was the merriest, happiest one present. On their leave taking, all sang "God be with you till we meet again" and his voice was one of the fullest in the crowd.

William Elwood Galeener was born in Warren county, Ohio, Oct. 30, 1840, died May 8, 1922. He was the son of Stephen and Nancy Galeener, and was the second of 12 children, six of whom lived to be grown. He moved from Ohio to Central Illinois in 1857, then to Southern Illinois in 1865.

He enlisted in the Civil War at the age of 20 and was a member of the Vienna Post, G. A. R.

He moved to Vienna and established the Vienna Nursery in 1869, shortly after which he was married to Miss India Perkins, daughter of Eliza and Capt. Wm. Perkins. Seven children were born to this union, of whom six are living, one having died in infancy. Those living are: Claude of Oklahoma City; Mrs. Amy Miller of Calxico, Cal.; J. Halbert of Sikeston, Mo.; George E. of Vienna; Wm. Kenneth of Marion, and Mrs. Frank H. Carter of San Diego, Calif. His wife died in 1896 at Tunnel Hill, where they were living at the time.

He leaves two sisters and two brothers, Mrs. Emma Finley of Cobden, Mrs. Alice Flick of Browns; C. S. Galeener of Eldorado and Frank Galeener of Delta, Mo. All were present at the funeral except the latter who was prevented by sickness. He also leaves fourteen grandchildren and friends innumerable to mourn his death.

They again moved to Vienna, and in 1897 he was married to Mrs. Clara Chapman. He was a member of the M. E. Church, and the I. O. O. F. and Masonic Orders.

He was the founder of the Vienna Nursery Co., an enterprise that is the pride of every citizen of Vienna and which is one of our most profitable businesses, giving much employment to labor and it is one of the most widely known enterprise of its kind in Southern Illinois. He was senior member of the firm at his death, his son, George E., being associated with him under the name of W. E. Galeener & Son. One of his greatest pleasures was in the development of tree and plant life.

He was a citizen of our county for 50 years and lived an exemplary Christian life. He joined the church in early life, and was noted for his loyalty and liberality. He was loyal and patriotic, and was ever ready to lend a helping hand to any movement that was for individual or public good. He was a kind father and devoted husband and a man that will be greatly missed, not only by his family, and church, but by the community at large.

Funeral services were held at the home in the north part of the city Wednesday, May 10, 1922, at 2:00 p. m., conducted by Rev. L. S. McKown of Robinson, Ill., a former pastor of the M. E. Church of this city, a special friend of the deceased, assisted by Rev. W. W. Kemper. Rev. McKown seemed to be at his best, and his remarks were very impressive and consoling. Interment took place in the family lot at the Fraternal Cemetery, under the auspices of the Masonic lodge with their beautiful ceremonies, followed by the Vienna Post, G. A. R., with only ten old veterans present to perform the last sad rites.

The following relatives from out of town attended the funeral: Mr. and Mrs. C. S. Galeener, Eldorado; Mrs. Maggie Hamilton and three children, Eldorado; Mr. and Mrs. Elwood Finley, daughter, Miss Helen Finley, and son, Holden, Cobden; Mrs. Laura Hood, Harrisburg; Harry Galeener, Delta, Mo.; Mrs. Alice Flick, Browns; Mr. and Mrs. J. H. Galeener and 3 children, Sikeston, Mo.; Mr. and Mrs. W. K. Galeener and 2 children, Marion; Mr. and Mrs. L. W. Whitlow, Metropolis; Harry Adams, Chicago; Mr. and Mrs. Sam Chapman and daughter, Marion; Russel Adams, Kansas City, Mo. The floral offerings were beautiful and profuse.

This was one of the largest funeral processions in the history of the city. Relatives and friends came from far and near to pay their last tribute to their relative and friend.

His good clean life and happy disposition will live on and on in the hearts and minds of the people of this county.



PERKINS

Captain William Perkins was born in 1819 in Kentucky. His mother being a widow his opportunity for an education was limited. He started out to make his own way at the age of nineteen. On coming to Illinois he worked on a farm for twenty-five cents per day. After his marriage, by farming and working for others, he accumulated enough to buy a farm two miles east of Vienna. He later sold the farm and turned his attention to milling in partnership with A. J. Kuykendall. When the Civil War came on he assisted in raising a company which was incorporated in the fourteenth cavalry, and was made Captain of Company G. He served four years, and took part in many battles. He was seriously wounded in an engagement near Macon, Ga., and taken to a farm house. When he recovered sufficiently to be out on crutches, he was sent to Andersonville prison. Within a few months he was exchanged and was soon discharged on account of his disability. In 1866 he bought what has been known since as the Perkins house and operated it as a hotel as long as he lived. He was elected sheriff in 1868. He married Ellaz, 1840 (see Simpson). Captain Perkins died 1892.



Dear Sir :-

Yours of the 23rd is at hand. I left Madison Fri. morning the 21st to go as I supposed to Detroit Mich. but brought up here. I will probably remain here until discharged from the service which I hope will be very soon, if done in accordance with the late order of the secretary of war which I have no doubt you have seen ere this. We must have been at Indianapolis at the same time or met on the road as I arrived in Chicago at 1.00 A.M. Saturday. I ~~arrived~~ like this place better than Madison in some respects we fare a great deal better here than we did there. We get every

thing that a reasonable soldier can ask for. Some men will find fault if they had all the delicacies of a first class city hotel. Yesterday I visited the City. Saw the funeral cortege arrive & pass through the city to the court house. I never saw so large a crowd of people before. It was a solemn sight to behold. Men women & children weeping & all eager to see. The crowd upon the walks were swaying to & fro. At times it seemed impossible for a person to keep his feet under him. A person might about as well be in a hay press. The hearse prepared for the occasion was elegant. It was a platform 7 by 11 feet seven feet high supported by pillars arched at each side and rear, covered with black velvet. An elevation of about 18 inches in the center large enough to set the coffin upon with the inscription Lincoln on each side and

drawn by ten black horses
 plumed & draped, with a
 negro leading each horse.
 The escort was grand. Two
 veteran reserve corps Regt
 with a brass band at their
 head. A regt of infantry
 with martial music at its
 head. In the rear of the
 hearse was two hacks with
 the friends of the Presi-
 dent. Mrs. Lincoln was not
 along. Then followed 12
 Generals all mounted on
 black horses. The proces-
 sion when formed was at
 least 4 miles in length
 beside thousands upon
 thousands in the street.
 Well Vane I ~~must~~ will
 not expose my ignorance
 further in trying to des-
 scribe the scene. I am not
 in very good trim for writ-
 ing. I volunteered to get
 up at 12 & sit up with the
 sick. I awoke with a
 dreadful headache which
 makes me very stupid.

My health is improving
some. I recd a letter
from your aunt yesterday.
Her health is quite poor
