FAMILY BACKGROUND

Gray

Authorities differ as to the origin of the name Gray or Grey. Some hold that it originated as a designation of personal appearance, in which case it might have derived from the Old English "graeg" meaning "aged," or the ancient Saxon animal name "Gre," a badger. Others maintain that it derived from the place of residence of early members of the family.

Supporting the latter view is the fact that the family name in ancient Normandy was De Croy, later altered to De Gray or De Grey and that certain branches of the family, at least, claim descent from Rollo, Chamberlain to Robert, Duke of Normandy, father of William the Conqueror, who obtained by grant from his master, the castle and honor of Croy in Picardy.

One John de Gray is said to have gone into England with William the Conqueror in 1066. Anchetil de Gray (or de Croy), "one of the companions in arms of William the Conqueror," is recorded in the Domesday survey as holding extensive grants of land in Oxfordshire and elsewhere. From Anchetil de Gray, the extinct ducal houses of Suffolk and Kent, the baronial houses of Gray and Warwick, and the houses of Dorset, Tankerville, Stamford, and others trace their descent.

Henry de Gray, whose ancestry is uncertain and who is erroneously supposed to have been the forbear of all Greys, acquired the manor of Thurrock, County Essex, in 1199. By his wife Isende, daughter of Hugh Bardolph, he had three sons, Richard, John, and William, who became the progenitors of the families of Grey of Caduor, of Wiltan, of Ruthin, and of Sandiacre.

Hawise de Grey, whose husband's name is not certainly known, was the ancestor of another line of Greys. She was the mother of Walter de Grey, archbishop of York, who acquired the property of Rotherfield, Oxfordshire (previously held by Anchetil de Grey, heretofore mentioned) and transferred it to his brother Robert de Grey. Robert's great-great grandson John de Grey became Lord Grey of Rotherfield in 1338 and was the ancestor of the Greys of that line.

The Greys of Harwick are an old family in County Northumberland, celebrated for their military achievements. They trace descent from Sir John Grey, Knight, of Berwick, living in 1372, who had a son, Sir Thomas Gray, who died in 1402, leaving issue by his wife Jane, daughter of John Mowbray, Duke of Norfolk, of Sir John Grey of Heaton, Sir Thomas Grey of Werke, William Gray, Bishop of London in 1426, Sir Henry Grey of Ketteringham, and Matilda Grey.

The Grays of Kinfauns Castle, Perthshire, Scotland, claim descent from Anchetil de Grey through Sir Andrew Gray of Chillingham, County Northumberland, who was rewarded in 1306 by King Robert Bruce for faithful services with the grant of a manor and lands in Counties Perth and Forbar. From this Andrew Gray was descended Sir Andrew Gray of Broxmouth, who had, by his first wife, Janet, daughter of Sir Roger de Wortimer, a son Andrew, born about 1390, who was created

Lord Gray of Gray about 1452. From this branch of the family are descended most of the bearers of the name in Scotland and Ireland.

Henry Grey, Duke of Suffolk and third Marquis of Dorset, married Frances Brandon, by whom he was the father of Lady Jane Grey (1537-1554), whose tragic history is well-known.

It is generally believed that all British and American bearers of the name derive from a common ancestor who lived prior to the Norman Conquest.

Our pioneer ancestor, Isaac Gray, was born February 26, 1785, but whether on the Isle of Wight or the mainland is uncertain. Our only knowledge of him before coming to America is that he married Sarah Hawkins of Portsmouth, had some connection with Sir Leonard Holmes, and felt that the New World offered greater opportunity.

He may have belonged to a family named Gray whose chart appears in the Harleian Society publications (Hampshire), Vol. 64, p. 96. Proof could not be obtained without extensive search of records at Carisbrooke. In this chart dating from 1544:

Hawkins

The name Hawkins is a place name deriving from the town of Hawking, near Folkestone, Kent, England. The present county of Kent corresponds to the Anglo-Saxon kingdom of Kent founded by the invaders Hengist and Harsa 450-455. The word Hawking is doubtless of Anglo-Saxon origin. Names derived from it appear in ancient records in the various spellings of Hawking, Hawkings, Hawken, Hawkens, Hawkin, Hawkins - the last form most generally used today.

There is on record a grant of land to one Osbert de Hawking in the reign of Henry II (twelfth century). Andrew Hawkins, a descendant of Osbert de Hawking, settled at Nash Court in Kent, which estate he obtained by marriage with an heiress of the Nash family in the time of Edward III (fourteenth century). Descendants of Andrew moved westward to Plymouth and Tavistock, Devonshire. John Hawkins was the owner of large landed estates near Plymouth before 1480; his cousin William Hawkins founded the Tavistock line.

John's son and heir, Captain William Hawkins was a prosperous freeman of Plymouth and founder of a family of Devon shipbuilders and skippers, more closely related occupations then than now. He thrice represented Plymouth in Parliament. He established English trade with the South Seas and made several voyages to Brazil. Hakluyt in his voyages describes him as one of the principal sea-captains of the west parts of England. He had two sons, William and John.

The second Captain William Hawkins was commander of a ship in the fleet fitted out by him and his brother against the Spanish Armada in 1588. He was Governor and Mayor of Plymouth in the latter part of the sixteenth century. His son William sailed with Sir Francis Drake to the South Seas in 1577 and served as lieutenant under Edward Fenton in an expedition to the East Indies and China in 1582.

Admiral Sir John Hawkins (Hawkyns) led a brave and eventful life. He made two voyages to the Guinea coast, captured negroes, and smuggled them to the New World. These brought him reputation and he was granted a coat-of-arms with a negro, chained, as a crest. After another voyage to Vera Cruz, he helped fit out the fleet and served as rear-admiral against the Spanish Armada. For this he was knighted. He was the principal administrative officer of the English navy during the latter part of his life. He died at sea off Porto Rico, November 15, 1595.

Admiral Sir Richard Hawkins, son of Sir John, was familiar with ships and the sea from his earliest childhood. In 1585 he was captain in Sir Francis Drake's expedition to the Spanish Main. In 1588 he commanded a queen's ship against the Armada. In 1590 he served with his father's expedition to the coast of Portugal. In 1593 he sailed for the West Indies, the Spanish Main, and the South Seas. He was captured and sent to Spain where he was imprisoned, first in Seville and then in Madrid. Released in 1602, he returned to England where he was knighted in 1603. He was made vice-admiral of Devon, which was no sinecure with the coast swarming with pirates, and served till his death in London April 17, 1622.

Descendants of both branches of the Devonshire family emigrated early to Maryland, Virginia and South Carolina.

Our ancestress, Sarah Hawkins, did not belong to the Devonshire family. She was born in Portsmouth, a seaport of County Hampshire June 16, 1792. Her family seems to belong to the same tradition and doubtless trace back to the same ancestors. She had three brothers who were shipbuilders for the government. One of them was captain of a ship and went to sea. Which one of three shown in the first page is he is not known. One of the others, named William, never married. The pictures were taken in Landport, a part of Portsmouth. Research in local records would be necessary to trace family connections. The times have not been favorable for that.

Westward Ho!

Isaac Gray was living at Arreton on the Isle of Wight, England, when he decided to come to the United States. Late in the fall of 1829, he and his oldest son Richard left for New York City, where they spent several months considering where to make their future home.

Meanwhile, his wife, Sarah Hawkins Gray, and their six other children awaited word to join him. Epidemics among both man and beast swept the island and two of the children took smallpox. Mary Ann, next to the baby, did not survive, and there is a record of her death in the parish church of St. Mary-the-Virgin at Carisbroke, about two miles from Arreton.

In the late spring of 1830 Sarah brought the five children overseas, and the reunited family proceeded out to Rush County, Indiana. Here another child, George, was born, Sarah taught school, and Isaac became a citizen. They waited before moving from Rushville, Indiana, to Quincy, Illinois, so that Isaac and Richard might cast their first presidential votes for William Henry Harrison.

They came overland with wagons and ox-teams, reaching Quincy during Christmas week of 1836. This growing new town was in the Military Tract, a grant of land in the fork of the Illinois and Mississippi rivers, made by Congress in 1816 to soldiers of the late war. After twenty years much of this fertile land was available to others.

Isaac chose land on the prairie back of the bluffs of the Mississippi, the farm now adjoining Coatsburg on the East. It still remains in the family, belonging to Richard's grandson Ray. Here Isaac lived till his death December 21, 1855, following a fall from a horse in a winter storm.

This was irony as he had been an outstanding horseman all his life. On the Isle of Wight he had led the hunts organized by Leonard Holmes for his guests from the mainland, in the old forests said to date back to the Conquest. In Illinois he had covered a large territory as veterinarian in addition to his own farming. Older members of the family at Coatsburg remember a picture of him on horseback, a tall military figure; but all efforts to find the picture prove unavailing.

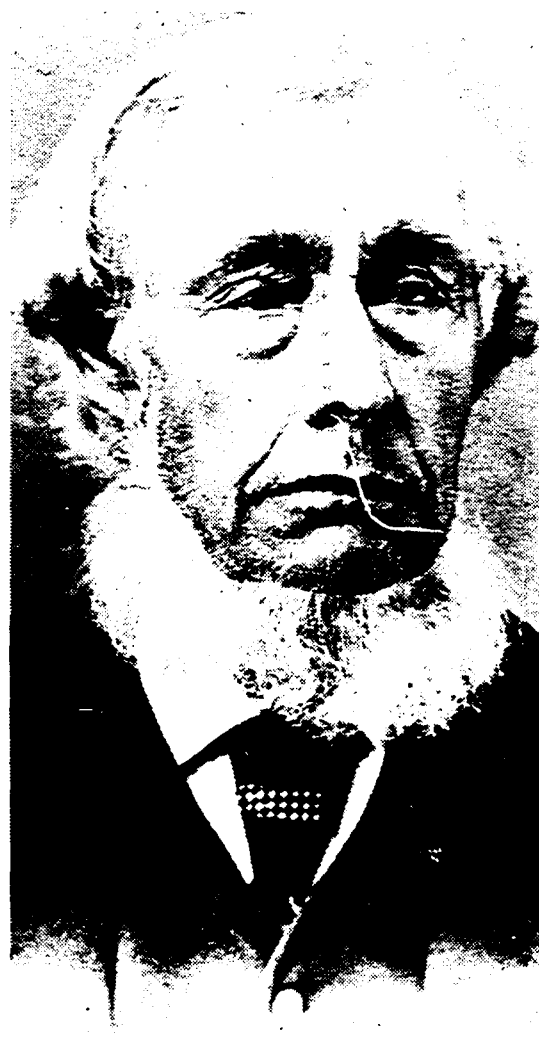
Sarah continued to live on their farm until she went to make her home with her oldest daughter Lavinia. A Quincy newspaper account of her death reads: "Died, at the residence of her daughter, Mrs. Stephen Booth, near Paloma, Adams County, Illinois, September 20, 1883, Mrs. Sarah Gray, aged 91 years, 3 months, and 4 days. Sarah Hawkins was born at Portsmouth, England, June 16, 1792. At the age of 22 she was married to Isaac Gray whose death occurred in 1855 and whom older settlers remember. She was the mother of eight children, six of whom are now living her remains were laid away by those of her husband in the cemetery at Coatsburg."

As there was no cemetery in Coatsburg at the time of Isaac's death, Richard donated a corner of his own farm, adjoining the village on the north, for that purpose. At the end of his long life of almost ninety-four years he was laid to rest beside his parents. Later his son George made a donation from the same farm, which still remains in the family, to enlarge the cemetery.

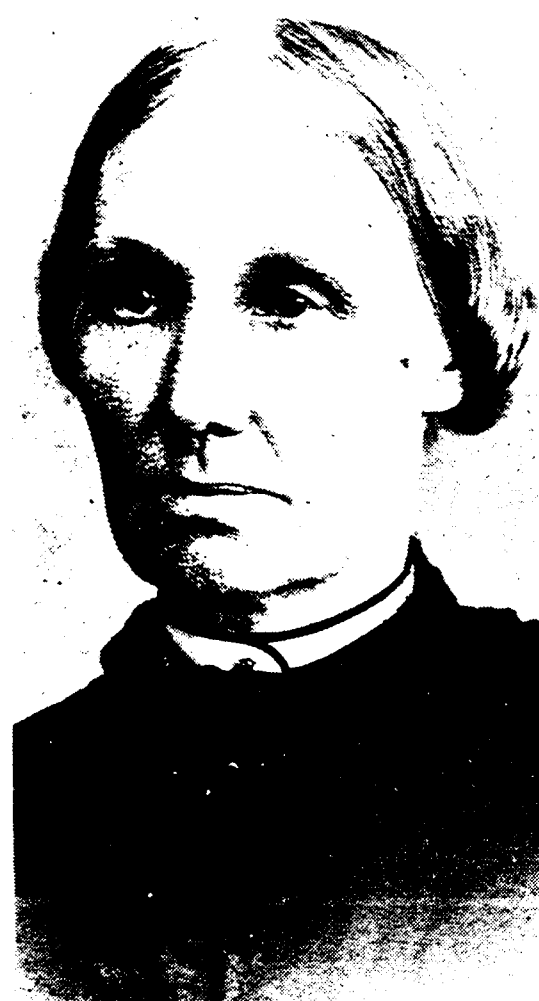

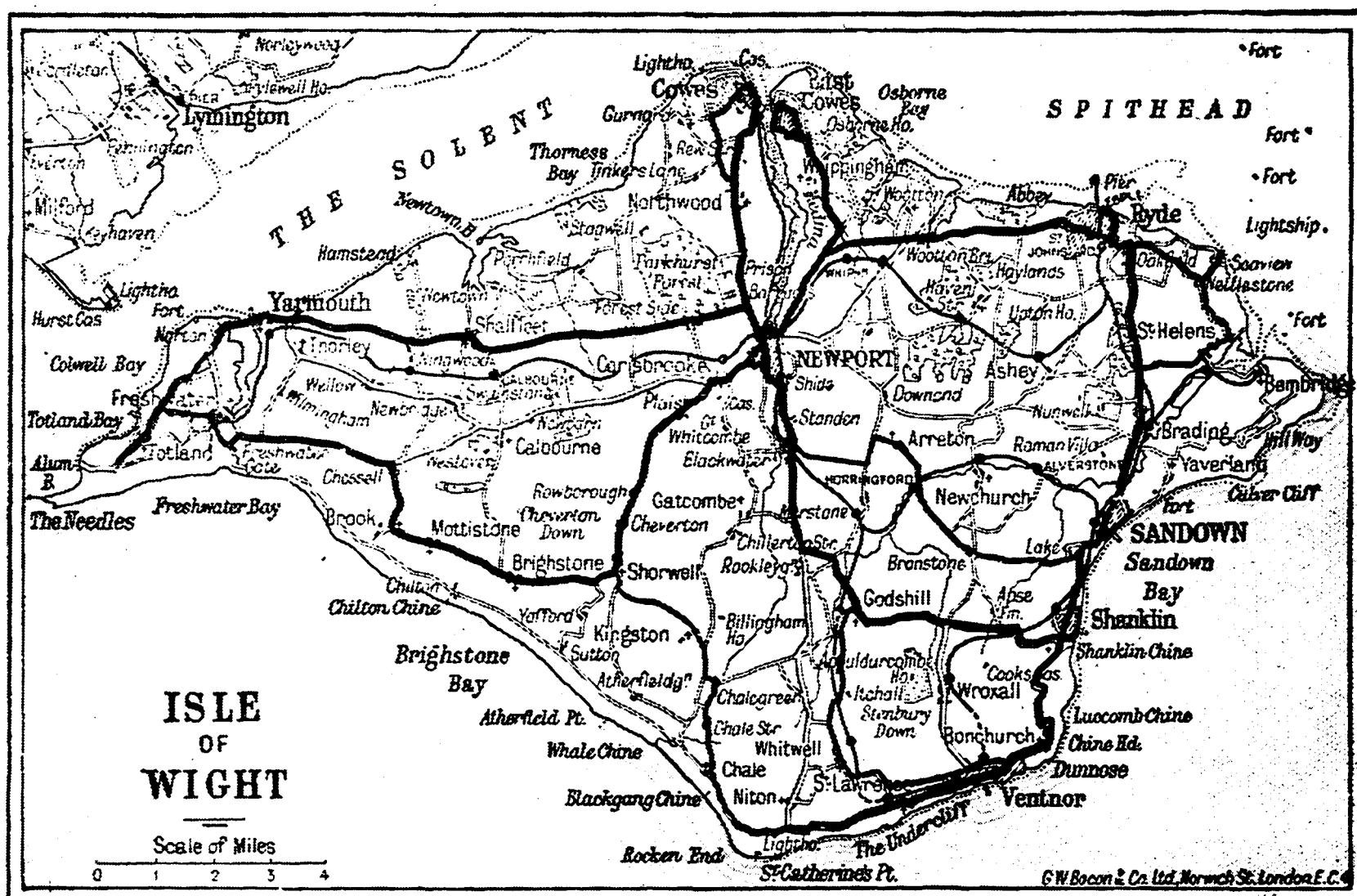

Richard's participation in historical events after his settlement and marriage to Sarah Hart was indirect. For instance, after the Black Hawk War when the Indians were driven out of Illinois across the Mississippi there was renewed activity in the lead-mines of northwestern Illinois and southwestern Wisconsin. Early prospectors were followed by substantial people from various parts of the country. A number from Adams County went up the Mississippi to the mines on Fever River, near Galena. One of them, John Bass, met death by accident in the mines, leaving a wife and small children. Richard, whose wife had died leaving small children, and who had known Elizabeth Reaugh before her marriage, went up to Fever River, brought her back and married her. Thus their family was started with two sets of children to whom was added a third.

Likewise, Richard did not volunteer for the Civil War, feeling his duty lay nearer home. On August 12, 1862 Maria Gray's young husband, W. H. Henderson, and Frances Bass's young husband, A. W. Howell, enlisted at Quincy in Co. F. 78th Regiment of Illinois Volunteers (Infantry). The girls remained at home until after their soldiers' return in 1865, emaciated and sick from imprisonment in Andersonville.

Lavinia Gray married Stephen Booth of another pioneer English family which had settled at Paloma, west of Coatsburg. They lived on a farm south of Paloma. After her husband's death, Lavinia made her home with her daughter, Mrs. John Dickhut, and at her death she was laid beside her husband in the cemetery at Paloma.

Caroline Gray and her brother Wallace went up to the Fever River country with the others from Adams County. She met and married Bernard Lynch, who landed in the United States from Ireland in May, 1841, and went to the lead-mines at New Diggings, Wisconsin. They lived at Holy Cross, Iowa, northwest of Dubuque and are buried there. He went to California during the Gold Rush and did well there. On his return they moved to Dubuque and he took out first citizenship papers March 4, 1864.

Maria Hollier Gray married Joseph W. Elliott, had one child Susan, died, and was buried in the old cemetery south of Coatsburg toward Columbus. When Elliott re-married, Sarah Gray took her grandchild to rear. On one of his visits to his mother Isaac Gray II took Susan home with him to Stillwater, Minn. to help care for his children. Apparently all trace of her has been lost.

Wallace Gray met and married Electa M. Slayton, daughter of a family from Utica, New York, who had been attracted to Galena by the prosperity of the lead-mines. He brought his wife home to Adams County where they lived on a farm near Paloma. Interested in raising fine stock, especially horses, he decided to move to Iroquois County, south of Chicago, where conditions were considered favorable for handling imported Belgian horses. After years of successful activity, he and his wife moved into Chebanse for their last days and final resting-place.

Isaac Gray went up the Mississippi river to Stillwater, Minn. where he was in charge of steamboats on the river. When and why he made this move is not known. He married in turn Elizabeth Shaesby, Caroline Bradford, and Dorothea Klinck. When and why he moved from Stillwater to a farm near Alexandria, South Dakota, is not certain. After some correspondence with his youngest brother George, Isaac and his family went out to Hydesville, California for a visit with him in 1889.

While there he decided to make his home in Eugene, Oregon, because of school advantages for the younger children and moved there in January, 1890. This was his last home and final resting-place with his wife Dorothea.

George H. Gray went to California during the Gold Rush, settled in Humbolt County, married Martha Creighton, and prospered both in this world's goods and the esteem of men, as had his older brothers. He brought his wife and several members of his family back to Adams County to see his old home and visit with relatives, a few years before his death. When, later, his wife passed on she was laid to rest beside him near their home at Hydesville.

"Mr. Bernard Lynch whose death occurred April 5, 1892, was born in Cavan Co., Ireland in 1819. In 1841 he emigrated to America, settling in New Diggings, Wisconsin where he married Miss Caroline Gray in 1845, who survived him with six children, all residents of Holy Cross, Mrs. C. L. McGovern, Mrs. M. A. McGovern, Margaret, Julia, Walter, Peter. In 1850 he moved to Dubuque, Iowa, and in 1856 to Holy Cross where he resided till his death.....With earnest toil he struggled with all the disadvantages of pioneer life till success crowned his efforts, for at the time of his death he was possessed of considerable wealth which he divided among his heirs....."

"Mrs. Bernard Lynch, an old resident of this county, died at the family residence on Alta Vista Street (Dubuque) at 11:45 o'clock Monday morning, aged 88 years. She was born in the Isle of Wight, England, January 9, 1819, coming to America when a young woman, and settling in this county many years ago.
