

#### FRANCIS GRISWOLD

1

FRANCIS. Came to New England and settled at Cambridge, Mass., where he had a land grant 1636. He was also proprietor at Charlestown. Freeman 1645. Served as town drummer. His wife was Mary, whom he married in England, and whose family are unknown. His family connection is also unknown, but it has been thought he had some connection with Edward, Matthew, or Michael, of Connecticut, but we have no proof of this. He died in Cambridge, there recorded, Oct. 2, 1652. The *History of Cambridge* relates, Francis died at Charlestown, Oct. 2, 1652, leaving two daughters. Had a land grant of 2 acres for his work and services among the soldiers.

Mary married (2) WILLIAM BULLARD, b. about 1594, who came to New England about 1636. He was witness to the proving of a will 1638 (Suffolk Probate I-15). Son of William and Grace Bignett of Suffolk, England. Settled first at Watertown, later at Dedham, Mass. About 1653 removed to Cambridge. His will July 5, 1679, gives his age about 85 years; d. Dec. 23, 1686. William and Mary were members of the church in Cambridge 1658.

Francis Grissell, to whom reference is made in the calendar of state papers (Minutes of a Committee for Providence Plantation), as having applied in England from July 1635 to Feb. 1636, for remission of the cost of transportation for himself and wife to New England.

b. England. Came to Dedham, Mass. 1645. His brother Joshua was in Dedham 1643 and was sent to England in 1644 with a testimonial from the church, and when he returned brought two brothers, John and Joseph, who settled in Bristol county. John was received into the church in Dedham May 16, 1652; freeman 1654, and appears as a witness to the will of John Lamson of Dedham Dec. 15, 1660. Apr. 13, 1673 he and his wife were admitted into the church at Charlestown. 1678-79 he was chosen as one of the tythingmen. She d. in Charlestown Jan. 9, 1690/1.

ELIZABETH<sup>2</sup>, b. Cambridge, Mass. (Francis<sup>1</sup>); m. May 13, 1655, Jonah Palmer, s. of Walter and Ann. Resided in Rehoboth, Mass. She d. Bu. Feb. 11, 1691/2.

Jonah m. (2) Nov. 9, 1692, ABIGAIL (Carpenter) TITUS, wid. of John, who was bu. Apr. 16, 1789/90. She was the daughter of William Carpenter, b. Apr. 9, 1643, Weymouth, Mass., who m. John Titus 1659, who m. (1) Rachel and who served in King Philip's war.

Jonas Palmer came to America with his parents and lived at Charlestown, Mass., until 1655; removed to Rehoboth. Inherited 1/2 of his father's estate. His will, Taunton, Mass., Probate, proven July 6, 1709.

#### **EDWARD GRISWOLD**

EDWARD. Born in England, 1607; m. there about 1630, Margaret, whose family name and parentage have not been disclosed; neither have we actual records of his birth and marriage.


About Aug. 17, 1639, Rev. Ephriam Huit arrived in Windsor, Connecticut with his company and immediately entered upon his labors assisting Rev. John Warham.

Rev. Huit had been pastor at Knowle and Wroxall, Warwickshire, England, Wroxall being a part of Kenilworth Parish. He was a writer of note upon religious subjects and a powerful preacher of the Puritan faith; he was censured for his non-conformity and silenced by the Bishop of Worcester, which, no doubt, was the moving cause of his organizing his company and for his removal to New England. Edward and Matthew Griswold were members of this company, and for this reason it had been thought that the records of Knowle and Wroxall would disclose some clue to the parentage of our ancestors, but thus far they are silent.

Edward was of the sturdy intellectual type and speedily became prominent in the affairs of the new community, exceedingly active, and was frequently mentioned in colonial records. Served as deputy to the General Court Aug. 18, 1658-Mar. 14, 1660, and May 15, 1662-Mar. 11, 1663. In 1659 he built the Old Fort at Springfield for Mr. Pynchon. Also served as J. P. He was granted land at Poquonoc but he did not remove there until after the title of the Indians had been fully extinguished, 1642. But he was resident there with two other families, John Bartlett and Thomas Holcomb, in 1649. His home stood near the highway at the top of the hill; had 29 1/2 acres bounded mostly south and west by Stony Brook; east by the river. His sons George and Joseph inherited the homestead.

In 1663, with his son John, Edward removed to Hammonassett, later called Killingworth.

The present Clinton, Conn., is the original Killingworth; Main Street is the identical ground where the first settlers took their home lots. These were surveyed in 1663 by Byron Rossiter of Guilford. Edward was one of the first settlers and doubtless suggested the name from Kenilworth Parish in England, and

was the most prominent man in the new settlement and must be given full credit for first organizing this community. He was its first deputy to the General Court.

Among the names entered as planters by the committee we find Edward Griswold, Samuell Buell, and Jonas Westover, and in 1669 these were recorded as freemen.

Edward was largely instrumental in organizing the first church and was its first deacon. Frequently served on important civil matters, his services, counsel and guidance evidently much sought. Served on the committee to establish a Latin school at New London.

Ancient land records on file at the office of the Secretary of State, Hartford, Conn., show land grants in favor of Edward; one of 200 acres; another of 100 acres given by the town of Killingworth; he was a large land holder showing the spirit of those English settlers to accumulate large land holdings.

Margaret died Aug. 23, 1670, and is buried in the Congregational cemetery at Clinton, Conn., her gravestone marked "M.G. 1670" is the oldest monument. However it does not show or indicate the patient devotion nor the hardship endured in that vast wilderness in rearing her family.

Edward married second, 1673, SARAH BEMIS, widow of James Bemis, constable of New London, who died in 1665. She was the daughter of John and Rebecca (Bemis) Dimond.

Edward died in his 84th year, his burial place being unknown, except it may be in the vacant space next to that of Margaret.

GEORGE<sup>2</sup>, b. England, 1633 (Edward<sup>1</sup>); m. in Windsor, Conn., Oct. 3, 1655, MARY HOLCOMBE, daughter of Thomas and Elizabeth, who came from England to Dorchester, Mass., and removed to Windsor 1635. Mary d. Apr. 4, 1708. George made his home in Poquonoc 1649 where he purchased land from the Indians. Poquonoc then was about six miles from Windsor and those families venturing out to this settlement had no protection from any danger that might come or from the Indians; however, from the records, we find this family was never molested. Probably from the fact that he dealt honestly with the Indians and treated them fairly, they respected him; he was known to be of kindly disposition. Made freeman 1669; was a large land owner and a man of high respectability. A sturdy active citizen, but did not aspire to political office. Died Sept. 3, 1704. His estate, Hartford Probate, Vol. VII, 108; Vol. IX, 10, 11; Manwaring, II, 70. Inventory Oct. 2, 1704. An agreement made by the widow and children for the settlement of the estate is recorded. This agreement also mentions his grand-daughter Abigail Griswold and daughters Mary Cooley and Deborah Moore. 1685 he was mentioned in Windsor Patent. 1676 contributed to the poor of other colonies. 1679 had a warehouse on the north side of the Rivulet near the ferry. Trade with England and West Indies.

The will of George, b. 1665 (Manwaring Hartford Probate, III, 560), becomes important as a reference in that it mentions a number of the family and especially it seems to link the families of Edward and Michael by its reference to Jacob Griswold. Will dated Nov. 25, 1746.

I, George Griswold, of Windsor, make this my last will and testament: I give unto my cousin Hezekiah Griswold the whole of the lott that I now live upon, with all the buildings and appurtenances thereof; also the pasture on the west side of the street, likewise the whole of my round swamp; also my will is that the said Hezekiah have my two lots in Indian field and also my island; likewise to said Hezekiah have all my part in the corn mill; also that he have one half of my moveable estate. I give unto Peletiah Griswold my south lott in the fourth meadow during his natural life and after Peletiah's death my will is that the same lot return to the above Hezekiah Griswold. Also that the said Peletiah have one half of the last division of land laid out to me in the town


commons during his natural life, and after Peletiah's death my will is that it shall return to my cousin John Griswold. I give unto Joseph Bernard all my land in the quarrey field. I give unto George Griswold, 2nd of Windsor, my north lot in the fourth meadow. I give unto Jacob Griswold my wash brook lott. I give George Griswold, son of Daniel of Bolton, my right in the equivalent land. I give unto Isaac Griswold the other half of the last division of land laid out to me in the town commons, together with Peletiah Griswold to be divided between them, viz., Peletiah and Isaac. I give Zerviah, Sgt. George Griswold's wife, the other half of my moveable estate, together with Hezekiah Griswold to be divided between them. I appoint my cousin Hezekiah Griswold sole executor.

All the legatees mentioned in the above will were his first cousins except Isaac and Jacob. If it be true that Edward and Michael were brothers then Isaac and Jacob would be second cousins. However, Isaac of Windsor might have been the one intended and he would have been a third cousin. But we find no Jacob in the Edward branch, and George having mentioned his cousins through the will it might be his mention of Jacob would be a strong conjecture of the relationship of the two families.

FRANCIS<sup>2</sup>, b. in England, 1635 (Edward<sup>1</sup>); m. about 1652. His wife seems to be unknown. Several authorities have stated she was Mary Tracy, daughter of Lieutenant Thomas Tracy and this has been carried from time to time by different writers and compilers as a fact. There seems to be no daughter Mary listed in the record of Thomas Tracy's children, and continued research has not solved this important point (See Fam. No. 26).

Francis was a man of capacity and enterprise. First settled in Windsor and Poquonoc, Conn.; thence to Saybrook, and later to Norwich where he made his permanent home. He is listed as one of the first proprietors of Norwich. Very few records of Norwich are in existence previous to 1660. One of these is a notice of a town meeting Jan. 7, 1655/6, at which Francis was present.



An exceedingly active citizen; deputy eleven years, 1660-1671. Appointed on the Court of Commission 1662. Lieutenant of trainband. Died 1671. He and his wife were buried in the old Post-Gager cemetery, over which there seems to have been a continued controversy between the town authorities and the friends of the historic who desire this cemetery be left undisturbed.

The birth of his children were recorded, first four in Saybrook, others in Norwich.

An interesting letter written by Benjamin Brewster to his brother-in-law concerning Francis which shows that the folk in early times were as keen on business as those of a later date:

Loveing Brother Wetherill

My love comended to you with my sister if Gorge and you dele for his cow then yo must make a very puntuall barginn with him for he is trading with severall for hur goodman Grissill expects the cow and therefore if you dele make aright with him and when he comes up let him make delevere of the cow to me for you and dele thus for prise that what the buccher will gife that you will give; and if you dele then send me word what your mind is whether I shall hur or not and you take butter you may have som Now rest.

SARAH<sup>2</sup>, bapt. Kenilworth Parish, England, 1638 (Edward<sup>1</sup>); m. (1) in Windsor, Conn., Nov. 10, 16—, Samuel Phelps, s. of William of Simsbury, b. 1625, who d. May 15, 1669. They settled in Poquonoc where he had a grant of land. Assisted in building the Old Fort at Springfield, Mass. His will, Hartford Probate, III, 65; Manwaring, I, 225, mentions Sarah, widow; and children Samuel, Sarah, Timothy, Mary, William, John, Ephraim, Abigail, and Josiah.

Sarah m. (2) in Windsor, July 21, 1670, NATHANIEL PINNEY, s. of Humphrey from Dorchester, Mass., becoming one of the settlers of Windsor. Nathaniel was b. Dec. 1640, bapt. Jan. 2, 1641, at Windsor, and d. there Aug. 7, 1676. Mentioned in town records Feb. 15, 1668/9, payment for two years "setting in the yeard," which meant doing guard or sentinal duty in the meeting house yard during divine services. Presented for freemanship May 9, 1667; oath Oct. 10, 1667. Tax list for 1675 showed that he had a family and a horse. His estate, Manwaring Probate I, 225; inventory Sept. 4, 1676, mentions Sarah, widow; children Nathaniel, ae 5; Sarah, ae 3.

Sarah m. (3) William Pratt, s. of John III, and Hannah (Sanford) Pratt, who m. (1) Mary, prob. Mary Cadwell, and (3) Amy Pinney, b. Oct. 6, 1704, daughter of Nathaniel. William was bu. Center Churchyard, Hartford, Jan. 19, 1753. Amy was bu. June 10, 1772. His home was in front of State House Square, Hartford. Served as constable 1729. His estate, distribution, State Library, Hartford, Conn., mentions Amy Pratt, widow; children, Zachery, Mary Norton, Mabel Webster, Martha Drake, William, Joseph, Esther, Hannah, Sarah, and Susannah Pratt.

ANN, ANNA (HANNAH)<sup>2</sup>, bapt. June 19, 1642 (Edward<sup>1</sup>). While at present we have no direct proof that the following record is correct, circumstances and the records thus far assembled, would tend to show the almost certain proof. Search has not revealed the birth of any Hannah Griswold who could have been the wife of Jonas Westover. In view of the fact that Anna and Hannah were easily, and were very frequently confounded in the records, usually by mistake in the sound of the name, it has been thought that the only person possible would be Ann or Anna, daughter of Edward. Hence all the records that have been found are placed here.

She m. Windsor, Conn., Nov. 19, 1663, Jonas Westover, s. of John, who d. in Simsbury Jan. 15, 1708/9. Farmer. Removed to Killingworth with Edward Griswold and Samuel Buell. Made freeman of Windsor 1658; of Killingworth 1669. Took his home lot next to Samuel Buell and near that of Edward. Members of the first church in Killingworth. Children recorded, first in Windsor, the others in Killingworth. There were others recorded in Simsbury, where he evidently resided later in life:

Vol. I, 195. "This Courte frees Jonas Westover and his security for appearance and good behavior."

Vol. III, 214. Petition in this Court by Jonas Westover and others for abatement of common fence laid upon them by the Committee in Symsbury, May 1697.

The will of Jonas Westover, Sen. Simsbury, Sept. 20, 1702; d. Jan. 1708/9.

I, Jonah Westover, Sen. being very sicke, do make this my last will and testament. I give to my wife 10 pounds out of my personal estate; also the house and household goods that are necessary for her use during life; also 1/3 part of my land to her order during life; also all my land that I stand possessed of, I give to my two sons Jonah and Jonathan, to be equally divided between them; also my housing, after their mothers decease. I Timothy Phelps of Windsor, being very aged yet retaining a good measure of understanding and memory, do make this my last will and testament: Imprinis. I give, devise and bequeath all my estate whatsoever, both real and personal to my three sons, William, Cornelius and Samuel, to have, hold and improve the same in trust for the use of my wife during her natural life, and after her decease my will is, and I hereby do give and devise all my housing and lands with the appurtenances to my sons, Timothy Phelps, William Phelps, Cornelius Phelps, Samuel Phelps, Nathaniel Phelps, and heirs of Joseph Phelps in room of their father, to be equally divided into six equal parts, provided always, and it is my will that they pay and make up to their sisters, Sarah, Hannah, Ann, and Martha, my daughters, or to their heirs and to the heirs of my daughter Abigail, deceased, 48 pounds as money apiece; and my will is that what they have already rec'd. as entered upon my book shall be reckoned as part of sd. summs and my 2d. son and the heirs of my son Joseph shall pay their sisters and their heirs above mentioned in equal proportion, except that the heirs of Joseph shall pay 4 pounds more than an equal proportion, and my son Cornelius 4 pounds less than an equal proportion. And my will further is, that my wife shall have the free disposal of all her wearing apparel at her decease, and that my grandson Samuel Filer shall have

half of that bequeathed to the heirs of my daughter Abigail if he liveth with me so long as I live, or till he comes to the age of 18 years. I appoint my wife Mary and my three sons, William, Cornelius and Samuel, to be executors.

In the name of God, Amen, the 8th day of June, in the year of our Lord one thousand seven hundred and twenty, I Samuel Buell of Killingworth, Imprimis, in the county of New London, in New England, being weak in body but of perfect mind and memory, thanks be given unto God therefor, calling to mind the mortality of my body and knowing that it is appointed for men to die, do make and ordain this my last will and testament, that is to say, principally and first of all: I give and recommend my soul into the hands of God that gave it, hoping through the merrits death and passion of my savior Jesus Christ to have full and free pardon and forgivness of all my sins and to inherit everlasting life and my body I commit to the earth to be decently buried at the descretion of my executors hereafter named, nothing doubting but at the Resurrection I shall receive the Lamb again by the mighty power of God and as touching such wordly estate wherewith it hath pleased God to bestow in this life I give and dispose of the same in the following manner.

First I will that all those debts & duties as I do owe in Right or Consience to any person or persons whatsoever shall be well & truly \* \* \* & paid or ordained to be paid in Convenient time after my decease by my Executors hereafter named.

Item I give and bequeath to my well beloved son Samuel Buell sixteen acres of my Roastmeat Hill Land. Further my will is that the rest of my estate at my deceas shall be divided as followeth, that is to say: my son Samuel, John, William, David, Peter and Benjamin shall have an equal part of my estate and my daughters Mary & Hannah shall have two thirds So much as one son; and further my will is that my grandson Nathaniel Porter shall have an equal part with my daughters upon condition my sd. grandson gives to my executors a general acquitance and discharge upon all amounts between him and my sd Grandson or his administration and myself relating to my debts or demands whatsoever. Further my will is that each child's part as aforesd shall be computed with what they have already had and further my desire is that in dividing as aforesd my son Samuel shall have the Remainder of my Roastmeat Hill Land as it shall be apprized; and further my desire is that the dividing as aforesd my son David Buell shall have my house & lot with the buildings and orechargd upon it as it shall be apprized; and further my desire is that in Dividing as aforesd my son Benjamin shall have all my meadow that is in the further quarter as it shall be apprized.

Item I do hereby ordain constitute and appoint my Sons Samuel Buell and John Buell and David Buell to be executors of this my last will and testament; and do hereby revoak any other former Will or Wills.

Joseph Griswold, Windsor. Inventory Nov. 29, 1716, by Daniel Griswold, Sen. Thomas Griswold, and Joseph Barnard. Will dated Sept. 6, 1716 (Hartford Probate, IX, 106; Manwaring, II, 392).

The last will and testament of Joseph Griswold is as followeth:

I give to my wife Mary 40 pounds out of my moveable estate, prised as money, and 1/3 part of my lands during her natural life. I give to my son Joseph Griswold, and my son Francis Griswold all my lands which lyeth southeasterly of my son Matthew Griswold and southeast by Wilson's land they to divide it equally by the acre. I give to my three sons, Joseph, Francis, and Matthew, equally betwixt them, all my lands at Salisbury Plain which I bought of Mr. Mather. Also I give to my three sons all my land in the quarry Field. Also I give to my son Francis one acre of meadow land near the south end of the fourth meadow. I give

to my son Joseph all the remainder of my lott. Also I give to my two sons, Joseph and Francis, all my land on the neck on the east side of the river. Also, I give to my son Francis, 20 foots square of land which the town gave me, a little below Windsor Ferry. Also, I give to my son Matthew, my part of my land which was my father Gaylord's lying near Rocky Hill near the upper end of town. I give to my son Joseph the small parcel of land by Naughtsock, bounding southeastwardly by his own land and northwestwardly by Matthew Griswold's land. Also I give to my son Matthew Griswold all my lands which my house stands on, all my housing and barn and meadow adjoyning as it bounds southwestwardly by the highway, all the upland and meadow down to the fence near the Naughtsock and the land bounding southwestwardly by his own land and northwestwardly by George Griswold's land. Also I give to my son Francis 1/3 part of the apples in my new orchard, from my house to the foot of the first hill for the first five years after the date hereof. Also I give to my two daughters, Mary, the wife of Joseph Gillette, and Abigail, the wife of Josiah Phelps 25 pounds apiece out of my moveables to be prised as money. I give to my grandchild Sarah Gillette 5 pounds out of my moveables. And the debts due me which are likely to be recovered are to be reckoned as moveables. Note: That what my daughters has formerly had is not to be reckoned in the above said legacies. If there be any overplus of moveables than pays what is above written it is to be divided thus—my wife to have 1/3 of them and the remainder to be divided equally among all my children. I appoint my son Joseph Griswold and my son Francis to be executors of this my will, with my wife.

burial after this life at the descretion of my executor hereinafter named, in hopes of a joyful resurrection to life eternal thro Jesus Christ our Lord. For my worldly goods and possessions, I do devise, bequeath and dispose of them as followeth; my funeral expenses and just debts first paid. Imprimis: I give unto my dear and loving wife Bathshuah one third part of all my lands, tenements, buildings, mills, and hereditaments whatsoever, to be her and her assigns during the term of her natural life as her dower, and one third part of all my goods and chattels to be her own and at her own dispose forever. I do hereby give, grant and devise unto my sons Samuel Griswold, Joseph Griswold, Benjamin Griswold, Daniel Griswold, and Walter Griswold, the other two thirds of my lands, tenements, buildings, mills, and hereditaments whatsoever, and reversion of one third part of lands, tenements, buildings, mills, and hereditaments whatsoever devised for life to my loving wife, to have and to hold to each an equal share to them and their heirs forever. Saving that my son Samuel Griswold shall have that two acres of land I have given him by deed of gift over and above and more than an equal share with each of his brethren, my sons. above mentioned, to him and his heirs forever. I give and bequeath to my two daughters Dorothy & Martha Griswold, to each of them, fifty pounds as money; to my daughter Bathshuah twenty and two pounds as money besides what she already has of me and to my daughter Lucy ten pounds as money besides what she already has of me. All these legacies to my daughters to be paid out of remaining two thirds of goods and chattels and credits and all of residue of my goods and chattels and credits what is above disposed of and bequeathed, my will is that it shall be equally divided to and among my seven daughters, Mary Avery, Margaret Chapman, Hannah Crane, Bathshuah Clark, Lucy Ball, Dorothy Griswold, and Martha Griswold, and if this legacy shall not amount to ten pounds as money to each of my said seven daughters so much as to make up the legacy ten pounds to each of my said seven daughters. I do appoint and constitute my loving wife Bathshuah Griswold, my son Samuel Griswold, and my son Joseph Griswold, executors of my last will and testament. I give unto my beloved wife Deborah Moore, 1/3 part of all my moveable estate forever, and also the use and improvement of 1/3 part of all my real estate during her natural life, and also the use and improvement of all the lands and buildings given unto my son Thomas, in this my will, until he shall arrive at the age of 21 years, provided she keep the buildings in repair and maintain the fences inclosing the lands. I give unto my son Thomas my home lott and the buildings thereon standing, and the 3 acres in Bowfield lying at the west end thereof; also my pasture on the east side of the country road (3 acres) being part of my father's home lott; also my little meadow lott, 6 acres, and also 4 acres in the Great Meadow, bounded west on the Rivulett, and also my lott at a place called Garson, 45 acres, bounding west on the country road; also my Mill brook lott that I bought of John Graham, 17 acres; also all my land lying in Torrington, being a right I bought of my brother, Josiah Moore; and also 1/5 part of all the common and undivided land belonging to me in the Township of Windsor, with my saws and two best broad axes, and all my other necessary shop tools, all of which shall be set out to him by my executor hereafter named, when he arrives at the age of 21 years.

I give unto my daughter Abiah 60 pounds at inventory price out of my moveable estate and 1/5 part of my common and undivided land in the Township of Windsor, and 1/4 part of my Town commons division that is already laid out, and also 1/4 part of my lands lying in Barkhamstead.

I give to my daughter Keziah 60 pounds at inventory price, 1/5 part of my common and undivided land, and 1/4 part of my Town commons division, and 1/4 part of my land at Barkhamstead.

I give unto my daughter Deborah 10 pounds beside what I have already given her, also 1/5 part of my common and undivided land, and 1/4 part of my Town commons division, and 1/4 part of my lands at Barkhamstead.

Thomas died in 1685, his estate administered and the court ordered distribution. The children who shared in the distribution were John, Thomas, Jonathan, Miriam, Solomon, Daniel, and Samuel.

His services qualify his descendants for Societies of the Colonial Wars and Colonial Dames.

Jonathan was also a man of great worth and was held in the highest esteem. First town clerk of Preston, Conn., 18 years. One of the fifteen persons named in the Act of 1686 creating the

town. The first lieutenant of the trainband. Served as J. P. until his death. Selectman 1698; deputy 1699, 1700, 1710.

In July 1676 two hundred Indians surrendered themselves to the Plymouth Governor and were pardoned, with the exception of those who were concerned in the slaughter at Clark's. These were put to death (*Baylies History*). Colony records give the name of these Indians and states that they were decapitated.

William was an active and enterprising man having extensive operations in lands as appears by colony records. Engaged with others in making tar; 1684 engaged in fishing; 1697 received a grant of land from the town of Plymouth. Deputy 1674, 1680, 1681. Selectman many years.

Hannah d. 1687, ae 29. Her inscription in Burying Hill. "Here lies ye body of Mrs. Hannah Clark, wife of Mr. William Clark, dec'd Feb. ye 20, 1687, in the 29th year of her age."

He m. (3) ABIAH WILDER, daughter of Edward and Elizabeth Ames of Marshfield, Mass.

In the name of God, Amen: the sixth day of February, A.D. one thousand seven hundred and thirty nine, I, Daniel Clarke, of Killingworth, in the county of New London, and Colony of Connecticut, in New England, husbandman, being of perfect mind and memory, thanks being given unto God therefor, calling into mind the mortality of my body and knowing that it is appointed for all men to die, do make and ordain this my last will and testament (that is to say) principally and first of all: I give and recommend my soul into the hands of God that gave it and my body I recommend to the earth to be buried in decent burial at the descretion of my executor, nothing doubting, but at the General Resurrection I shall receive the same again by the mighty power of God and as touching such worldly estate wherewith it hath pleased God to bless me in this life, I give, devise, and dispose of the same in the following manner & form, my just debts and funeral charges being first paid.

Imprimis: I give and bequeath to Bathsheba, my dearly beloved wife one third part of my moveable estate to be at her own dispose forever. I also allow my said wife the use and improvement & profit of one third part of all my lands and a room or two in my dwelling house to improve for her comfort and to improve the land and house so long as she remain my widow, I give and bequeath unto my three natural sons, Daniel, John, and Thomas Clarke, all my lands, (not before disposed of) each of them their equal part of plowing land, mowing land and pasture lands, to be equally divided amongst them by freeholders, (computing quantity and quality); if my sons cannot agree to divide sd lands

amongst them, which lands I give to my sons and to their assigns forever.

I give to my daughter Mary Bayley ten pounds of my moveable estate over and above what I had given her before.

I give and bequeath unto my two younger daughters, Bathsheba and Ruth, all the remainder of my moveable estate which I had not before given away, to be equally divided betwixt them, viz: Bathsheba and Ruth.

And I do hereby constitute, make and ordain, my well beloved wife Bathsheba, and my son Daniel Clarke executors of this my last will and testament, and do hereby disallow, revoke and disannul all and every other former testaments, wills, legacies, and bequests executed by me in every way named wills and bequests, ratifying and confirming this and no other to be my last will and testament.

Therefore calling to mind my own mortality and knowing it is appointed to all men once to die and altogether uncertain how near my time of departure may be, do make and ordain this my last will and testament, that is to say, principally and first of all, I give and recommend my soul into the hands of God who gave it, hoping for the mercy of God through Jesus Christ unto eternal life, and my body I commit to the earth to be buried in decent Christian burial at the descretion of my executors, hereafter named, nothing doubting but at the General Resurrection, I shall receive the same again by the mighty power of God. And as touching such worldly estate wherewith it has pleased God to bless me in this life, I give and dispose of the same in the following manner and form.

My just debts, funeral and other necessary charges being first paid out of my moveable estate.

Imprimis: I give and bequeath to my beloved wife Dorothy Hand my negro man and one third part of the rest of my moveable estate, to her her heirs and assigns; and instead of dower I give and bequeath to my said wife Dorothy the improvement of the western half of my dwelling house and of one third part of my homestead land on both sides of the river, excepting only of what is commonly called \* \* \* orchard; as also one third part of my sluice meadow, so-called, during the term of her natural life. My will is that my sister, Huldah, whose first husband's name was Zechariah Smith shall have ten acres of my plan'd lot at the woods end at the most southerly corner running northerly one hundred and sixty rods; easterly ten rods, as her part of my

father's eighteen acre right, and I give it to her, her heirs and assigns forever.

My will is that if my son Janna Hand, who some years past went away on a voyage to sea, be yet alive and shall return home again, all the rest of my land in Guilford shall be equally divided betwixt him, and my two other sons, Joseph and Daniel Hand; only allowing to my two sons Joseph and Daniel the benefit and advantage of the labor they shall de upon said land; and I do hereby give all my land in Guilford, except the ten acres, to them, their heirs and assigns forever.

But if my son Janna be dead and return no more, my son Joseph Hand shall have all my land at the woddy end & Walnut Hill, except said ten acres; my land at the horse pond and my salt meadow at the island, and my will is that the same shall be for the use and improvement of him, his heirs and assigns immediately upon my decease and remain so till my said son Janna return home, if ever he do return; and if he never return, I give the same to him, his heirs and assigns forever, together with the barn upon said land.

I also give my son Joseph Hand the improvement of one third part of my old orchard from my decease to the year one thousand seven hundred and seventy. But then my will is that if my son Joseph possesses and inherits these legacies he shall pay annually for ten years, the value of ten pounds lawful money in calf or neat cattle per annum to his sister Esther Hugens; to the payment whereof I do subject him by my will.

I give and bequeath the fruit of my orchard called Peter's orchard to him during the term of the life to be improved at the descretion & direction of such person to whom he shall belong.

My will is that my son Daniel Hand shall pay annually for ten years the value of ten pounds lawful money in calf or neat cattle per annum to his sister Dorothy Hand and he shall have znd possess immediately upon my decease all my homestead land on each side of the river, except my wife's third part. Mentions further his daughter Esther Hugens.

In the name of God, Amen, Walter Griswold, of Saybrook, in the county of New London, and Colony of Connecticut, in New England, being of sound mind & memory through the goodness of God, yet calling to mind my own mortality, do make and ordain this my last will and testament and do hereby \* \* \* all other last wills and testaments heretofore made, and first of all I give my soul to God, the father of spirits, hoping for acceptance in and through the Son of his Love and my body I give to the earth to be decently buried according to the descretion of my executors, hoping for an interest in the first resurrection, and touching such wordly goods which God hath blest me with, I dispose of in manner following, viz.:

Imprimis: My debts being first paid, I give and bequeath unto my loving wife Sarah one third part of my estate, both real and personal to her use during her natural life and no longer.

I give and bequeath to my three sons, viz.: Walter, James, and Edward, all my lands and rights in lands of every sort and houseing to be equally divided between them.

I give and bequeath unto my daughters all my moveable estate, viz.: Hannah, Martha, Sarah, and Mary, to be equally divided between them.

I give and bequeath unto my daughter Hannah thirty pounds in money of the old tennor to be paid by my three sons equally, viz.: ten pounds by each of them as they shall come to age of twenty one years, and I do appoint George Chapman and my wife Sarah to be my executors.

In witness whereof I have hereunto set my hand and seal this 3rd day of April, in the eighteenth year of His Magesties Reign, Anno Domini, 1745.

Samuel is said to have been a little above medium height, eyes and general complexion light, and a man of genial disposition, but of great industry.

The Griswold family of Simsbury are said to have built a mill on the site of Tarrifville in the old days, and it was called Griswold Mills.

Samuel met his death by accident from a fall while he was preparing a back log for the fire. Died May 6, 1777.

Item I give and Bequeath unto my daughter Elizabeth fifty pounds money to be paid to her within two years after my decease by my Eexcutors out of my estate.

Further my will is that after my just debts, Funeral Expense and the Legacies mentioned in this will be Respectively Paid, all the remaining part of my estate both real & personal shall be equally divided between my three sons, Isaac, Zaccheus and Jacob to be to them and to their heirs and assigns forever.

Item my will and Pleasure is that my son Isaac Gillette & Zaccheus Gillette shall be the only Executors to this my last will & Testament and I appoint them thereto and in witness of what is above written I have hereunto set my hand and seal this 24th day of December, Anno Dom. 1762.

Namely, to my son Nathan, I give and bequeath my house and barn and Fifty acres of land, being situated in said Lennox, and is the farm on which I now live; I also bequeath to him all the farming tools of which I am now in possession; I also Will and direct my son Nathan to pay my son Oliver 11 pounds, 10 shillings lawful money in addition to 13 pounds 9 shillings and 8 pence which he had already received out of my estate, and that he pay to said Eber 11 pounds 10 shillings in addition to 6 pounds which he has received of my estate, and that he pay to Eli 6 pounds 18 shillings in addition to 10 pounds 12 shillings which he has already received, as aforesaid, which legacies Nathan is to pay to his brothers Oliver, Eber ad Eli within three years after my decease as their full portion out of my estate; and I do direct that the expenses of my funeral shall be paid by my son Nathan.

I give and bequeath to my daughters, Jerusha, Hannah, and Asenath all my household furniture to be equally divided between them, according to quantity and quality, immediately after my decease. My eldest daughter Tuilet, has already received her free proportion of my estate.

I also direct a looking glass, one bed and bedclothes and pewter, the property of my late wife, be given to her daughters in equal proportion, and that the children of said daughter deceased shall have her mother's share. This my last will and testament I make the day and year above mentioned, whereupon I set my hand in the presence of the witnesses who were present when I signed the same.

In the name of God, Amen, I, Jabez Darte, of Hartford, in the county of Hartford, and colony of Connecticut, in New England, being in a comfortable state of health and of sound and disposing mind and memory, thanks be to God therefor, calling to mind that my life here upon earth is uncertain, do make this my last will and testament in the manner and form following, that is to say, first and principally, I commend my Soul to God who gave it, in the hope of the full pardon and forgivness of all my sins through the merits and rightousness of Jesus Christ, my Lord Redeemer, and my body to a comely Christian burial in hopes of a blessed resurrection. And as to the estate God hath given me I give order and dispose of as followeth, viz.

Item, and further I give my two sons Joseph Darte and Levi Darte all the rest of my estate both real and personal that hath not heretofore been mentioned to be equally divided between them, provided the sd. Joseph and Levi pay to each of their sisters, viz.: Bathsheba Darte, Sarah Darte and Dorcas Darte, each of them, the sum of ten pounds within two years after my decease, viz.: to Bathsheba ten pounds; to Sarah ten pounds, and to Dorcas ten pounds; and if either of my two youngest sons, viz.: Joseph Darte and Levi Darte should die without issue, then his part of the estate to go to the surviving brother or his heirs.

White served in the Northern Department and while there wrote a letter home of which the following is an extract:

"Fort George 10 Aug. 1776. Although at a great distance from you yet I have an opportunity which I gladly embrace to let you know something of my circumstances since I came from home; but where and how to begin I am at a loss for the time is short in which I have to write. I have been into Canada as far as Three Rivers, 90 miles above Quebeck, which is two hundred and seventy eight miles from this place, and on the march we underwent an unknown deal, both by fatigue and want of provisions; also by the smallpox so that we have undergone almost everything but death. But thanks be to God I and my son all in comfortable circumstances at present. Our business for some days past has been making coffins. I counted the graves Saturday night the 10th. of August and there were 130 graves and sundry have two bodies in them, and tis more than 30 days since the first was buried there. Although death is so frequent tis minded among the greater part of the soldiers no more than among a herd of cattle which makes it the most doleful to behold."

## MATTHEW GRISWOLD

MATTHEW. Came to New England 1639 with Edward Griswold and Rev. Ephraim Huit, and eventually arrived in Windsor, Conn., but did not long remain there, having become an agent of Lord Fenwick, removed to Saybrook, Conn. Received a grant of land 1645 which became the foundation of a large fortune.

Matthew was a typical Englishman, hardy and venturesome, and with a lusty desire to accumulate large land holdings and a vigorous method of accomplishing it. Full of energy and was held in high esteem by the early settlers, and he was counsellor and friend to all. He possessed very largely those traits of physique and character, so often met with in men of the Griswold Clan. Large community spirit, genial and easy-going, yet forceful when required. A man of powerful build and used his strength in the combat with the wilderness to found a home and fortune. It is said he was exceedingly kind and gentle in his family.

Old Lyme was first settled in 1664 as East Saybrook, and Matthew was the pioneer and its first settler, which was set off from Saybrook in 1665, and he was one of the signers of the Articles of Separation. This was in an age when distinctions of rank and caste were held in severe respect, and Matthew, by his constant contact with the more aristocratic families, through his association with Lord Fenwick, became more or less embued with this, and the family of Griswold being constantly in the public eye gradually became part of the leading families. However the family were devoted to the public cause and exercised all their powers to build a substantial and lasting community.

Matthew built a log cabin. One of his Negro men occupied it and it became known as "Blackhall" or "Blak's Hall," and doubtless this is the origin of the name Blackhall which has come down to the present time as a name for the ancestral estate.

The early houses built upon Blackhall lands have entirely disappeared. The oldest house now standing was built in 1796 by Matthew fifth. It is an exact reproduction of an earlier house built on the same spot by his grandfather Judge John.

Matthew was a lawyer, but by trade a mason and he furnished the stones for many of the graves of the early settlers. There is a receipt dated Apr. 1, 1679, registered at Saybrook for 7 pounds sterling "paid M. Griswold in pay't for tombstone of Lady Alice Boteler (Lady Fenwick), late of Saybrook." He also furnished the stone for his father-in-law Henry Wolcott which is almost intact after all these years. That of Lady Fenwick, by reason of its removal from the point where the railroad crosses to its present site has sadly lost its ancient symmetry. And no stone marks his own grave nor do we know exactly where he was buried. There are records which lead us to believe in all probability that he was buried in old Saybrook cemetery. Although he removed to Lyme he retained his connection with Saybrook church as a member until his death, and from the church records we find that he was brought thither for interment. During his lifetime he presented to the church the first silver cup used in the observance of the Lord's Supper. The inscription upon it is: "S.C. ex dono domini Matthai Griswold." The S.C. evidently is the initials of Sacramentales Calix.

Matthew had many views far in advance of his time and concerning the rights of women was one of them.

There is an ancient deed Apr. 23, 1663, Hannah or Anna Griswold, wife of Matthew, has a portion of meadow land in Windsor Great Meadows—"Twelve akers more or less—" this comes to her as part of the portion that fell to her by the last will and testament of her brother Christopher Wolcott out of his estate which was to be divided among his relations, and this parcel of meadow is allowed by her husband Matthew Griswold to be recorded and made over to Anna, his wife, "to remain to her and to her children and her dispose forever."

Matthew served as deputy 1654, 1667, 1678, and 1685; also as J.P. Was trusted with many important affairs of the Colony in its struggle with those matters which always beset the formation of a new community.

He was married Oct. 16, 1646, to Anna Wolcott, daughter of the first Henry Wolcott, of Windsor, who emigrated from England and was the ancestor of the Wolcott family in America; son of John Wolcott of Tolland, England, bapt. 1578. Came in the ship Mary and John and was made a freeman on the first day of the first General Court, Oct. 19, 1630, in Boston. Anna came over with her sister and youngest brother after the family were settled. She was living in Sept. 1700 when she and Abraham

Bronson were summoned before the court at New London as administrators of the estate of Matthew. She probably died before May 1701, when he was summoned alone. We have no record of her death and the place of her burial is unknown. Matthew died at his home Sept. 27, 1698.

Thomas spoke of him "as a man of strong character, a man of eminent piety, and as having been eminently useful in the Indian Wars." Capt. Thomas is said to have been much feared by the Indians, both for his daring in attack, and from his apparent invulnerability and supernatural

protection from their best-laid plans for his death or capture. His tombstone in Longmeadow "Here lies interred the body of Capt. Thomas Colton, who departed this life Sep. the 30th 1728, ae 77. Prov. 7."

Matthew III ran away to sea. At Jamaica he was pressed into the naval service; then served on a privateer, where he narrowly escaped death, and the man who stood next to him was cut to pieces with chain shot. He was then captured by the French and put ashore in the Bay of Honduras where he was taken by a party of Spanish Indians, carried 600 miles with his hands tied behind his back and cast into prison. After six months was released and sent to Spain on a galleon. On the voyage he very nearly died from tropical fever. From Cadiz he went to a port in Portugal where he found a ship for Newfoundland. Eventually he reached home and died age 24, a victim of his terrible experiences.

The estate of Matthew III, May 3, 1716, mentions brothers Samuel, John, George and Thomas; sisters Sarah, Deborah, Mary and Patience.

#### LETTER OF MATTHEW TO PHOEBE

## "Deare Heart.

Tender of my most unfayned and Intyre Love to you, hoping you are in good health, etc., although my present abilities of body and mind will nott allow mee to Write Largely unto you as I shod be glad to do, yet having this opportunity I was desirous to trouble you with a line or two—a little to Remind you of the

unexpected \* \* \* unheard of \* \* \* which I have mett with. In the management \* \* \* motion of marriage mad by mee unto yorselfe which \* \* \* so very strange that I am at a great Loss \* \* \* of mind to think what the good pleasure of the Lord \* \* \* as to a fynale Issue; though this I must saye, if I thought you had not Reall Love and Affection for me, I should then think it rather my Duty to desist than to prosed; but as yet I am nott. nor cannot bee convinced that It is so, for, as God and thy owne conscience knows very well when I was fully come to a conclusion in my owne minde never to give myself nor you any farder Trouble in this matter, you<sup>r</sup>selfe were pleased to tell mee that unexpected (though welcome) news, that you could not beare the thought of a fynale Separation; and since when you were last att ou' side of the River, you told mee the same thing, besides many things which you have in discourse told divers of voure owne best frevnds which gave them grounds to conclude that you had special Love for my person. If I had thought that these things had been false I must have Judged of \* \* \* to the \* \* \* which would have commanded a period to all proceedings of this nature; but eonty I believed thee and accordingly concluded that hee which had Incindled this Love in Thee would increase It, and in his good time bring us together in the Relation of man and wife, and hereupon gave my affections their full scope, concluding not only that I mite, but that it was my duty to Love her intirely for whose sake I should forsake Father and mother; and, as I tould you when I last spake with you, I shall not at this time Release any promise (and you to mee, I should not suffer for yor sake) which has past between us, though I cannot desire you should proseed to Joyne yourself In marriage with mee on the account of pittee. I desire to look to God who is able to give me \* \* \* to all his gracious promises which wold be matter of comfort \* \* \* (for so they are \* \* \* I would desire youed not forget how willing I have been, according to my capacity and opportunities; so then in kindness and in a way of Requital faure mee with some Lynes. I shall not enlarge att present, but desiring that the Good Lord would graciously guide us to that which may tend to his glory and our own everlasting peace, I take leave and Remain thine, and thine only, in the bonds of Intire Affection.

The clouds of misunderstanding must have blown away and they were married and lived a happy frontier life ever after.

Matthew was a large powerful man, possessing the physical characteristics of the early Griswolds in a large degree; gentle, as his letter indicates, but aggressive and forceful.


The records show his fighting qualities when occasion demanded. There appears of record in the Court of Assistants, 1687-1715, p. 302, 330, on file in the office of the Secretary of State, Hartford, Conn., the following presentation against Matthew Griswold.

"Matthew Griswold of Lime being bound over to this court to answer to a presentment made against him for an high breach of ye peace which is as follows, Viz: Lime July 14, 1713, J. Will<sup>m</sup> Lee, Constable of Lime do make presentment to Justice Ely of Mr Matthew Griswold of Lime, for this day feloniously assaulting of Henry Morris, contrary to ye Peace and hath with a churn Half wounded ye sd Morris in ye head which wound is judged mortal and that ye sd Morris hath layn speechless three hours. The sd Griswold appeared at this court according to his bond and pleads guilty.

Whereupon this court has considered that ye so Matthew Griswold shall pay a fine of twenty pounds in money to ye public Treasury of this Colony and ye charge of his Prosecution which is allowed to be in ye whole 10-0-2 and that he give bond with two sufficient sureties in ye sum of 100 pounds money for his peacable and good behavior until ye Superior court to be holden at New London in March next and to be committed until ye sentence be fullfilled and that he pay unto ye so Henry Morris for ye hurt and damage done him ye sum of 16 pounds in money Ex<sup>n</sup> granted for ye 16 pounds. Sept. 25, 1713.

Matthew Griswold discharged from his bond March 24, 1713/14.

ELIZABETH<sup>2</sup>, b. Lyme, Conn. (*Matthew*<sup>1</sup>); m. in Lyme, Conn., (New London rec.), Oct. 17, 1670, John Rogers, s. of James and Elizabeth (Rowland) Rogers, b. New Milford, Conn., Dec. 1, 1648.

James Rogers of New London, 1637, one of six men from Saybrook under Capt. John Underhill, who took part in the Pequot War.

The marriage rite of Elizabeth and John was performed by Matthew, accompanied with the formality of a written contract and dowry, the husband settling his farm at upper Mamacock upon the wife, in case of his death or separation from her during life.

In May 1675, after two children were born to them, she appeared to the General Court for a divorce grounding her petition, not only upon the heterodoxy of her husband (that of founding a sect called Rogerene Quakers), but upon certain alleged immoralities. The Court, after a delay of nearly a year and a half, granted her petition.

Mr. Rogers was greatly incensed at the decision of the Court. He lived a single life about twenty-five years and then married Mary Ransford. She is reported to have been a servant, whom he had bought and probably of the class of persons called Redemptionists. Mr. Rogers would not be united in marriage by any minister or magistrate, and proposed to his intended that they both go to the county court room while the court was in session, and there publicly declare their marriage intentions, to which she agreed. He leading the bride by the hand, entered into the presence of the assembled court, and there requested the whole assembly to take notice that he took the woman he held by the right hand to be his lawful wife. The bride also assenting.

This connection was, however, an unhappy one, violent quarrels afterward arising. Mr. Rogers was compelled to apply to the court. In 1703 the court declared the marriage invalid. She afterwards married Robert Jones of Block Island.

In 1714 Mr. Rogers was again married to Sarah Cole, of Oyster Bay, L. I. He d. of smallpox Oct. 17, 1721 and was buried upon the bank of the Thames river within the bounds of his farm, where he had set aside a place of sepulcher.

Mamacock farm, the home of John Rogers, extended on both sides of the Norwich road about two miles from New London, from the small rocky peninsula of that name a short distance northeast of the station stop on the railroad at present called Harrison, and bordered some distance by the Thames river.

The central portion or Mamacock proper was originally a grant to Rev. Mr. Blinman. The burial place was crossed by the railroad in later years and partially destroyed, and it has almost totally disappeared, only five legible stones yet remaining. That of John Rogers cannot be found. The buildings have disappeared and the entire place is given over to the elements and presents a scene of entire desolation.

The estate of John Rogers, including the Mamacock farm, was inventoried June 30, 1722, at 110 pounds.

This farm and the home shown by the drawing are interesting to us as the home of Elizabeth Griswold for a time and as the birthplace of her children.

He inherited many of the fundamental traits of the Griswold ancestry. Tall, light complexion, genial, and of great physical strength. T.S.R. Old Lyme Cemetery. "Sacred to the memory of John Griswold, who, after having sustained the Public offices of Justice of the

Peace and of the quorum for many years, dep<sup>d</sup> this life Sept. 22, 1764, in the 74th year of his age."

MATTHEW<sup>4</sup>, b. Lyme, Conn., Mar. 25, 1714 (John<sup>3</sup>, Matthew<sup>2</sup>, Matthew<sup>1</sup>); n. in Lyme, Nov. 10, 1743, his second cousin, Ursula Wolcott, daughter of Gov. Roger and Sarah (Drake) Wolcott, b. Windsor, Conn., Oct. 30, 1724, which marriage reunited two of the leading families by a new tie of blood.

Matthew resided in Lyme the greater part of his life. His natural abilities were considerable and varied and he seemed to develop them without the aid of others. Admitted to the bar 1743. 1761 began his public career as Representative from Lyme in the General Assembly, a position he held until 1759 when he was chosen as a member of the Council. Supported the Colonial cause in the Revolution. Head of the Council of Safety. 1769 began a period of 15 years' service as Deputy Governor, which in effect was Chief Justice of the state. Governor 1784/86. Presiding officer constitutional convention.

While he was conspicuous in public life he was naturally diffident and shy. Had only his own abilities as preparation for his public career.

Gov. Talcott in 1739 "for loyalty, courage and good conduct" appointed captain of South trainband. 1766 Gov. Pitkin appointed him major 3rd regiment.

Extract from funeral sermon: "In this and in all the offices which he sustained, he distinguished himself as a faithful servant to the public; and the whole tenor of his conduct was happily designated with fidelity, integrity, uprightness, and a high regard for the good of his constituents."

Retired to his farm and lived a quiet peaceful life until his death.

A letter from Gov. Matthew to his son Matthew while he was at Yale.

Lyme, Nov. 8, 1779.

Dear Son.

Thro' Divine Goodness wee are all in usual health—I have herewith sent you a Thirty Dollar Bill to purchase a Ticket in the Continental Lottery in the Third Class; I suppose they are to be had in New Haven of Dea. Austin: I wish you good Success with it. If they are not to be had in New Haven, you will Enquire and purchase one Elsewhere. If there be no chance to purchase one, lay up your Money, and keep it safe—I hope you will pursue your studies with Dilligence and Industry—But above all keep Holy the Sabbath Day and pay all Possible Regard to Religion; a virtuous Life is the only Foundation upon which you can depend to be comfortable here and Happy in the Coming World—the joy of your Friends and a Blessing to the World.

Matthew evidently possessed a strong religious character and it is well illustrated in the following letter written to his. father-in-law Roger Wolcott in reference to the death of his daughter Hannah.

Lyme, Dec. 16, 1755.

# Hond Sir:

Death has with violent hand taken from us our Eldest Daughter a Dear and Tender Child who on account of some Amiable Quallitys which I imagine appeard to her in an uncommon degree with a most Exemplary and Dutiful Behavior not only Rais<sup>d</sup> the Expectation but Extremely Endeared her to her Parents; but alas our towering hopes like the Flower of the Field are all cutt down at one blow; upon my return from Windham about 24 hours before her Death she appeard in a Calm and Serene Temper of mind Signified she had made her Peace with God Used the words that he was Sweeter to her than all ye world yt She was free to part with Father and Mother and Everything here and was willing & not afraid to die; She appeared to Retain a Composed Temper of mind and her Reason to the very last. A little past the Middle of the Day the Symptons of Death appeared. She appeared very Sensible View<sup>d</sup> her finger nails Sundry times; I suppose to Satisfie herself whether she was Dying; then Desired a Prayer might be made which being done, her friends Standing Round her not being able to Refrain Weeping—after Some Time turning her eyes Round upon them and once in a Special Manner and of her own accord without Shedding a Tear & without any other seeming Disorder but only some difficulty to speak bid us Rejoice her Speech faild and after some time without ye least token of Repining at her condition or anxiety of mind, like a Tender Lamb Resign<sup>d</sup> her breath and so fell a victim to the King of Terrors; Indeed the Satisfactory Account she gave how she had Seen Herself a Sinner and of the Love of God manifested in her Soul and a sense of her Love to God and Willingness to part with ye World with the Surprising Unshaken fortitude of mind with which she was Carried Thro the agonies of Death afford us unspeakable Comfort, but to Human Nature ye blow is violent and ye wound Deep. Parting pain is sensible & piercing. I beg your prayers to Almighty God that wee might be Supported under this bereaving Stroke and not Murmur or Repine at the Dispensation of heaven, and so by Such Undutiful behavior make this chastisement a new occation of sin.

Matthew did have at least two romances. He first paid court to a lady of Durham. At that time he was merely a good-looking young farmer and she wished to hold him in reserve, hoping to get a better offer from a young doctor. "I would like more time to consider the matter" she said, when he asked for a final decision. "Madam, you may have a life time," he replied and departed. And this proved true for she never married, a hard lot in those days. Meantime, his cousin, Ursula Wolcott, of Windsor, had heard good accounts of him as a rising young man with a handsome house and property. Pretty, vivacious, and matrimonially enterprising, she arranged a visit to his mother in Lyme. There she saw Matthew and approved of him, but he was backward and silent. When she met him about the house she roguishly inquired "what did you say, Cousin Matthew?" He invariably replied, "Oh, nothing." As the end of her visit drew near she grew bolder. Turning one day on the long stair, she demanded, "What did you say, Cousin Matthew?" "I said nothing," he replied. As he mounted slowly behind her, Ursula stood smiling and blocking the way, "Well, it is quite time you said something." The matter was happily settled then and there.

His inscription Old Lyme: "This monument is erected to the memory of Matthew Griswold, Esq., late Governor of the State of Connecticut, who died on the 28th day of April, in the year 1799, as 85 years and 28 days."

His estate, June 13, 1798, mentions sons John, Matthew and Roger; daughters Mary Ann Lane and granddaughter Ursula McCurdy.

Her inscription Old Lyme: "Mrs. Ursula Griswold the amiable consort of Matthew Griswold, Esq., late Governor of the state, departed this life 5th day of April, 1788, in the 64th year of her age."

In the family Bible of Dea. John Griswold, their son, is recorded that she died in the night in a "very sudden and surprising manner" like her mother Sarah (Drake) Wolcott.

Phoebe is said to have been very talented and accomplished, took a prominent part in her husband's ministry, and possessed mental endowments far superior to most of her sex. Keen of wit, brilliant, of great courage and firmness, and yet of much sensibility and kindness of heart.

The story is told of his preparation of a sermon and she had so mixed the sequence of the pages that he was utterly confounded when attempting its delivery, And she very innocently enjoyed the situation. It is not reported what was said after church services were over.

The following very interesting letter written by Mr. Parsons

to his son gives a very clear insight into the character of Jonathan. Dear Child:

I am very glad to hear by yours of ye first and 10th. instant yt your health is restored and pray God to give yo a heart to serve him in newness of Spirit. Sorry am I to find ye chhs are thrown into confusion, and ye more so, as I understand much of ye controversy is whether ye children of those Parents who do not come to ye Lord's Table shall be baptized or not? My judgment is yt or Chh has a right to deny Baptism to those children whose parents openly profess good principals & lead a moral life, even tho' they do not come to ye Lord's Table, & I am very sorry. Dr. Bellamy & others have stirred up strife abt ye matter. I think they may be easily answered, and were I a minister in your Colony I believe I should think it my duty to enter ye List; I am pursuaded if the Separatists from Mr. Edwards, had an able Leader, Mr. Edwards must either be convinced or removed. Mr. Bird is not his match & perhaps those that separate yt do not desire him, if he was, I should be loth to stand in special connection with a particular church that goes into yt new scheme. The like controversy gave great disturbance to ye protestant church about 150 years ago, but was happily calmed by some able Pens.

You write yt one Samuel Parsons from Martinco desires to know from wt part of England our ancestors came. I will tell you as near as my Memory enables me (as I have no records of the matter but what I heard from my Parent), I suppose my Great Grandfather Parsons came from Great-Torrington, about 20 or 30 miles from Tiverton, and not far from Exeter. He came over and brought my Grandfather Benjamin Parsons and other children about 130 years ago, perhaps 140. I believe ye record of my Great Grandfather and Grandfather might be found, either at Great-Torrington or Tiverton & by ye means it might be known whether we & Samuel Parsons are descended from one stock. My Great Grandfather Marshfield came from Exeter, and brought my Grandfather when he was about 4 years old. My Grandfather Marshfield's name I think was Samuel, and my Great Grandfather's name Josiah. They came over about the same time with my Great Grandfather Parsons and his family. I should be glad if the history of the families could be traced back as far as those yt first came over, for it might be of service to some of their Descendants.

I intend to keep my office by head Quarters where the post meet which will be in or near the city, and if is apparent danger, to move my Family a little way into the Country. Our city is now Fortifying; every street is strongly Barracadoed and entrenched, and Batterys in every part of the city and they are making a Strong Fortification on a Hill behind the city and opposite to it on Long Island. We are intrenching and Forming a Strong Redoubt. Some thousands of the citizens and Army are employed every day at the Works; which makes them go on very rapid. Some of the troops from Boston are arrived here and many more expected. We will have a large army here soon, which I hope will be able to repell the Forces which Britain may send."

Jonathan of this sketch was wealthy and distinguished, and resided at New London, in the Chesterfield Society. Served as colonel of the Third Regiment of Connecticut militia at the time of Arnold's raid on New London in 1781, and was censured for

not taking a more active part, and was cited for court martial for not leading his regiment forward and preventing the enemy from sacking and burning New London. He was acquitted with honor. Colonel Latimer served in several campaigns against the French upon the northern frontier and during the Revolution was much of the time in the field. With his seven sons Colonel Latimer removed from Montville, Conn., to Tennessee about 1790. He died on the journey and was buried at the place of death. The sons settled in the country, and were the ancestors of numerous descendants. The early Latimers were noted for their height and stalwart muscular frame.

Borodell Dennison was the daughter of George and Mrs. Mary (Wetherell) Harris, and descendant of George Dennison and Ann Borodell. George Dennison was a most distinguished civilian and soldier. After the death of his first wife he returned to England and served as a soldier in several battles, was wounded and taken prisoner. The romantic story is told of his being nursed back to health in the home of John "Brodil" of Cork, Ireland, a gentleman of wealth, whose only daughter Ann was the angel of mercy in his sickness and subsequently married him and came to America. It is said she was a most beautiful woman.

Settled in Norwich, Conn., and commenced his brilliant carreer and soon acquired distinction as an able advocate and vigilant public officer. Few men have ever acquired a greater reputation at the bar than he. 1794 he returned to Lyme. Elected as a Federalist to represent his district in the national House of Representatives; re-elected five times. To quote from published biography: "He was placed in the front ranks for his ability and profound judgment and distinguished for his powerful talents in forensic discussions or debate and the independence and decision of his conduct."

1807 Judge of the Supreme Court, two years; Lieut. Governor, two years; Governor 1811. Died Oct. 25, 1812.

To quote again from his biography: "Taken by death in the prime of life and in the midst of a career which has been seldom equaled. His death was sincerely and generally lamented. Few have been more universally esteemed and loved; deserving and receiving the highest honors his state could bestow."

He is said to have been a very handsome man, large flashing dark eyes and commanding figure.

He was impressive by his promptness of mind, his keen penetration of the matters before him and his inflexible integrity.

No amount of honor bestowed or public adulation could swerve his mind from his own fireside and his family. Through his life he always gave the impression of the true husband and father. To quote from a letter written by him to Fanny from Philadelphia, Dec. 8, 1797:

"I do not know how it comes to pass but I grow more weary of residing in this City than ever—every novelty has fled—and nothing remains but a dirty smoky noisy City without a single charm to recommend it—and when I turn my eyes upon the purity of my native air, and the pleasures of my own fireside, with half a dozen rosy cheek'd children and their mother around

it, I am almost disposed to curse myself for a blockhead for following a Phantom, when such real pleasures are within my reach yet such is the fatality which attend us—ever striving for something not in our possession, & looking forward to attainments which please at a distance, we often neglect those substantial enjoyments which can only reward our ambition merely because they are in our possession."

His letters constantly show a tender love and affection, a longing for his family. Clearly they show that his honors were unsought, but felt it a duty to his people, his friends and the country at large, to serve them.

To quote again from one of his letters: "For my part, I have so little ambition left, that with a snug fortune I shou'd be very well content to bid eternal adieu to Courts, legislatures and offices—and in simplicity and retirement, spend my life in Philosophical contentment.

I have somewhere heard or seen, either a Text of Scripture or prayer saying—God keep you in his Holy keeping."

Fanny d. Dec. 26, 1863, as 97. Devoted to the memory of her husband she had remained a widow for over fifty years.

I made last Saturday in Company with Mr. Francis to Mrs. Powell a celebrated Widow of this City—The Company was not very numerous consisting principally of the cousens and other relations of the family—

Mrs. Powell appears to be about fifty years old and is really a woman of uncommon understanding, & has paid great attention to books—but and you know there is a but belonging to almost every discription—a learned woman I believe is extremely apt to know that she is learned, and of course rather inclined to entertain her Company with too much science—I do not say this for the purpose of depreciating the Wisdom of the Ladies—God forbid that I should be so impolite as too hint a thing of this kind—but it is very certain that I was thoroughly entertained with the good ladies science—principally Politicks—and as I paid very great attention—(which you know is the way to please the Ladies) I was highly honour'd by the attention of the Lady, being placed next to her at the table, and fed with everything which was rich and luxurious—for which you may be assured I made more \* \* \* than I can well relate—on the whole I was very well entertained—I partook of a very good dinner, and having very soon learnt to foible of the Lady—viz Vanity which perhaps is not too uncommon with the Sex, I really became soon very much at home, & very much at my ease—To be serious and to do justice to the Lady. I must say That in my opinion few women can be found possess'd of more Science or more vigorous understandings, and although her manners are not such as to induce a reasonable man to fall in love with her (at her age) at first sight yet they are sufficiently open & friendly to convince you that you are welcome to eat at her table & drink from her Glass-

So much for a saturdays visit to a Widow—and you may be assured that I wou'd not have given you so much of it had I found anything of value to have fill'd up my paper—but since the great question about the Treaty is closed we are as still as the grave & are winding of the ordinary business with great celerity, and I presume by the close of the month we shall break luck—perhaps at an earlier day—

A six months absence is certainly attended with many serious evils, but feeling new spirits from the prospect of soon seeing an end to our present labours, I am inclined to make the best

of it, & to say that it is likewise attended with many valuable consequences—it sharpens up a relish for home, which nothing else can give, & teaches us to prize domestick enjoyments according to their just value, & it prepares us to experience a day of pleasure which is worth many days of Pain—remember me affectionately to the little flock—

### HIS WILL

In the name of God, Amen:

This 18th day of March Anno Domini, 1789, I, Dyar Throop, Esq., of East Haddam, in the county of Middlesex, in the state of Connecticut, in New England, being in the fifty first year of my age, of sound mind and memory do make this my last will and testament. First and principally I commend my soul to my God that gave it and my body to be buried in a decent manner according to the custom of the country at the time of my decease, and as to my wordly estate, my will is, that it be disposed of in the following manner, viz:

That my funeral charges and debts be paid out of my personal estate.

I give devise and bequeath to Phebe my faithful and beloved wife the use of my dwelling house and all my lands lying in said East Haddam during her natural life. I also give to her two cows, twelve sheep, my saddle horse, side saddle, and all the household furniture of every kind, excepting the household furniture I have lately bought at New York, one half of which I give to my said wife and the other half to my sisters equally to be divided. I also give to my said wife one hundred pounds lawful money to be paid out of my personal estate, and whereas, my said wife have lately sold two certain pieces of land lying in Lyme in the county of New London, and given a deed with warrantee thereof to his Excellency, Matthew Griswold, Esq., of said Lyme, for somewhat more than three hundred pounds, L.W. and whereas there is a clause in my wife's father's will giving said two pieces of land to all my wife's sister's children to be equally distributed among them in case my wife should dve without leaving issue of her body lawfully begotten;—Now in case all my wife's sisters shall and do give full acquittance of all their pretended right to said lands to his Excellency, Matthew Griswold, Esq., his heirs or assigns or any other way fully secure my estate from said warrantee, then and that case I give three hundred pounds L. money, the purchase money of said lands to my said wife forever. But in case they refuse to do it or any other way fully to secure my estate, then I give the use of said three hundred pounds to my said wife, for and during her natural life. And after my decease, my will is, that said three hundred pounds to be given to and equally distributed amongst said children on condition that they give acquittance as aforesaid or any other way secure my estate from said warrantee.

I give to my brother Benjamin Throop of Bozrah, Esq., my sword, my gun, one half of my wearing apparel, one third of my land lying in said Bozrah, to him and his heirs forever, to be taken off from that part of my land which adjoins to his, the said Benjamin.

I give to my brother William Throop, of Bozrah, aforesaid, the other half of my wearing apparel and the residue of my land which lies in said Bozrah, to him and his heirs forever.

I give to each of my sisters, to wit: Elizabeth, Sibel, Abigail, Sarah, and Octavia, a sett of large silver table spoons to be pur-

chased and delivered to each of my said sisters by my executrix hereafter named within eighteen months after my decease.

I give to Dan Throop, the eldest son of my brother Benjamin Throop, Esq., my silver tankers.

I give to Dyer Throop Hinckley, the eldest son of my sister Elizabeth all my right and title in and to the Philogrammation Library kept in Lebanon.

I give Oramel Hinckley the second son of my sister Elizabeth one half of my law library.

I give to my nephew Dyar Throop son of my said brother Benjamin one hundred dollars to be paid him by my executrix within eighteen months after my decease.

- \* \* \* Ogden Moseley, Esq., my case of pistols in testimony of my esteem, he being my brigade major.
- \* \* \* Gates Brainard, Daniel Chapman, son of Colonel Chapman, Jared Spencer, Daniel Lyon, Esq., the other half of my law library to be equally divided between them; also to each of them an enameld mourning ring to be delivered to each of them by my executrix within eighteen months after my decease in testimony of my esteem.

I give to James Dyar Chapman, son of Doct. Zachariah Chapman, a mourning ring to be delivered as aforesaid.

I give unto Mary Rolo, a girl that I brought up from a child, in consideration of her faithfulness and obedience one hundred and twenty Spanish milld dollars upon the express condition that she marries with my approbation or is unmarried at the time of my decease to be paid her by my executrix in two years after my decease.

The rest and residue of my library either divinity history or books of amusement, I give to my said wife Phebe, and all the rest and residue of my estate either real or personal I give and devise to all my brothers and sisters and their heirs forever to be equally divided between them.

And of this my last will and testament I appoint my beloved wife Phebe sole executrix.

This I ratify and confirm to be my last will and testament. In witness whereof I have hereunto set my hand and seal this 18th day of Mar. 1789.

The following letter is one written by Dyar Throop to his wife Phebe while he was serving in the Revolution.

### Dear Phebe:

I take this opportunity by Mr Higgins to let you know that I am in health tho much worried, the duty being very hard ever since we took the highths in Dorchester. We are obliged to be on duty every two or three nights. I have an offer of going into the Continental Service on the establishment but have not determined to accept, as the Service is disagreeable to me—have this hour received Orders to move my lodgings tomorrow morning (for which I am very sorry) as those that we have now are very comfortable; but in the army nothing is stable; we know not one hour where our lodgings are to be the next; the Enemies fleet has all the appearance of a departure and it is thought the Army are really agoing, but I have my fears that it is only a faint of theirs; and if it is, I suspect they may give us a trimming yet; for the General is ordering the Troops fast for New York; What will be the event I know not—Whether it will be best for my horse to be sent by the first of April or not I am not determined for I know not but that we shall be desired to Stay longer; but I rather think I shall want him about that time—a line from you my dear, would be acceptable not having had one Since I came from home.

# MICHAEL GRISWOLD

MICHAEL. Much argument, speculation, and conjecture has been spread upon the records as to whether any relationship existed between Michael, Edward and Matthew Griswold. Extensive search has been made through the years and the compiler of this record has added to that search without result. It has been generally thought they were brothers but at the present time no authentic proof has been found to determine this question or support that theory. In fact, the records and circumstances rather tend to the contrary. Edward and Matthew were much alike in figure, ability, disposition, and business acumen; while Michael was very much unlike the general make up of the other two.

Search has been going forward in England to determine this and other questions but thus far nothing has been found.


Michael came to New England; mason by trade and yeoman in rank. Owned lands in Wethersfield as early as 1640. Was the only freeman of the name in Wethersfield in 1659. Served as constable, assessor and appraiser of land. He was never prominent and apparently did not seek to be, and did not reach the success in life that came to Edward and Matthew. He evidently had the confidence of his neighbors; a steady individual, content to ply his trade, yet ever ready to assist in the community welfare. He was associated with Emanuel Buck in business for a time. Had a home and two acres on New street, which street was abandoned 1660, so that his home was located as shown by the illustration facing on what is now Garden street.

Conn. Historical Society Collections, XXII shows he served on jury, and page 196, Oct. 9, 1658, he was fined twenty shillings for taking up and selling a horse that was not his own.

General Court record, Feb. 23, 1659, he was freed from training but was to maintain watch and ward. John Riley in his will, May 13, 1674, Hartford probate records, mentions "my cousin Michael Griswold."

The records name ANN his wife, but who she was, her parentage, and the date of marriage has not been determined. It is to be presumed from the date of the birth of his first child that they were married in the Colony.



## HIS WILL

In the name of God, Amen, I, Isaac Griswold of Killingworth, in the county of New London, and Colony of Connecticut, in New England, finding my health and strength to decline and being sensible of my frailty and mortality, yet through Divine Goodness at this time, of sound mind and memory, do now this twenty-second day of May, Anno Domini, one thousand seven hundred and twenty-three, make this my last will and testament, Imprimis:

I will and bequeath my soul into the hand of God, my merciful and faithful Creator, hoping for acceptance through the merrits and moderation of Jesus Christ, my dear and sufficient redeemer, and my body to the dust, to be buried as my executor shall order, hoping for a glorious resurrection, and as touching such goods and wordly estate with which God hath been pleased to bless me, and after just debts & funeral defrayed I dispose of will and bequeath as followeth:

I give and bequeath to my beloved wife one third part of all my moveable effects that shall be found at my decease and to the use and improvement of all the remainder of the moveable effects during her natural life, and what shall remain, that is to say, two thirds that she has the improvement of, at her decease, I give to my son Isaac. I also give to my loving wife the use and improvement of the house and homestead where I now dwell and the improvement of one third part of the other old improved lands, if she hath need of it.

I will and bequeath to my oldest son Michael Griswold the

Item: I will and bequeath to my daughter Hannah Griswold my house and Home Lot where I now dwell and to the heirs of her body, and for want of issue to Return to her Brothers and Sisters and to the heirs of their bodies, also Twenty pounds which I order that her Brother Isaac to pay her.

Item, I will and bequeath to my daughter Elizabeth Hull fourty acres of land \* \* \* to Layout in the Next Division upon my Property to her and to her heirs of her body and for want of issue to her Brothers & Sisters and to the heirs of their bodies, as also fourty pounds to be paid to her by her Brother Isaac. For due execution of this my Last Will & Testament I do hereby constitute & appoint my two sons Michael & Isaac to be my executors and do Order my son Isaac to pay to his sisters the legacies above mentioned.

Signed Sealed Pronounced & Declared to be my last Will & Testament in the presence of Witnesses.

I, Jacob Griswold, Sen. of Wethersfield, do make this my last will and testament: I give my son Josiah Griswold the whole of my lott lying in Newington Parish in that tier of lotts called the half-mile tier, containing 29, 1/2 acres butted east on commons or highway and also west, north on the heirs of Capt. Robert Wells, and south on a highway to be to him, my son Josiah and his heirs forever. I also give to my son Josiah 3 1/2 acres of land lying in the south part of Wethersfield in the Great Meadow, butted east on a highway, west on land of my son Josiah Griswold, north on land of Ephriam Williams, and south on land of the heirs of Ephalet Dickenson, with this condition that he, the sd Josiah Griswold pay and make out these sums following to the persons next mentioned: To the heirs of my oldest son John, deceased; to Jeremiah, to John, to Hannah, a daughter to Thankful, another daughter to Mabel, another daughter. (Amounts follow each name.) Also that my said son Josiah pay to my eldest son now surviving, Jacob Griswold 35 pounds to complete his portion. My son Ebenezer has already been advanced in portion and settlement as appears by record, equal with his brethren. To my son Ephriam I give 8 acres of land, part of my homelott, butted east on a highway, west on my son Josiah's land, north on land of Michael Griswold, and south on common land. I give to my eldest daughter, Mary Ellis, 110 pounds to be her portion of which she hath already received 100. I give to my daughter Sarah 110 pounds in moveable estate, of which she has already received 75-18-11. I give to my daughter Esther 110 pounds of which she has already received 77-04-09. I give to my daughter Lydia 110 pounds in moveable estate of which she hath already received 66-02-08. I appoint my son Josiah Griswold to be sole executor. Jacob Griswold.

Very little is known of this James, but there could be no other of the Guilford family of Hill, having a wife Sarah, at a sufficiently early date except him.

Resided at Homonoscit. Associated with Obediah Wilcoxon and others in a petition to the General Court at a session Oct. 10, 1695, to permit them to assist the ministry at Kenilworth, as Guilford was some five miles farther from their dwellings than Kenilworth. This petition was granted.

Records do not fully disclose the birth of their family; only three have been found; no doubt there were others.

MICHAEL<sup>2</sup>, b. Wethersfield, Conn., Mar. 7, 1666 (*Michael*<sup>1</sup>); m. May 12, 1692, ELIZABETH BURNHAM, daughter of William and Elizabeth (Loomis) Burnham, who d. Sept. 9, 1741.

The Burnhams were one of the most respected families in Wethersfield. William was a son of Nathaniel who was a member of a Troop of Horse in Windsor, Conn., and served in King Philip's War.

Michael was a mason by trade; served as collector of taxes and chimney viewer; drew land 1694; appointed ensign of south trainband 1710. This Michael is without doubt the builder of the present Michael Griswold House in Wethersfield. There has been considerable conjecture as to the age of this house. Some have placed its construction in about the year 1730. Michael received this property by will 1684. It is hardly likely that he would have waited until he was sixty four years old to make any improvement desired. The present house, without doubt, was constructed about the home of Michael I, or an improvement upon that ancient home. We must surely give this house a much earlier date. It was the home of Michael II. The records disclose no other.

Michael died July 24, 1742, age 76. T.S.R. Wethersfield cemtery. The date of death and burial place of Elizabeth are unknown.

I, Michael Griswold, of Wethersfield, being far advanced in years, do make this my last will and testament:

I give to my son Stephen one acre of land lying on the north-ward side of my homelott, butting northerly on my son Stephen's home lott. I give my sons Caleb and Elisha, my land lying on the west side of the highway near my home lott, being 9, 1/2

acres to be divided in equal proportion between them. I give my son Jonathan all my right share or interest in and to the commons and undivided lands lying within the bounds of the township of Wethersfield, and 25 pounds in money. I give to my son David my best Bible. I give my sons Jonathan, Caleb, and Elisha, all my wearing apparel to be divided equally between them. I give my son Caleb 15 pounds in moveable estate. I give to my son Nathaniel 30 pounds in moveable estate. I give to my son Joseph my loom and bedd and furniture. I give to my daughter Elizabeth, the wife of Zachariah Bunce, 5 pounds in moveable estate. I give to my daughter Ann, the wife of \* \* \* 20 pounds in moveable estate. And if any of my moveable estate be left or remaining after my debts, funeral expenses and legacies are paid, I give the same and all of it to my said daughter Anne. I do hereby appoint my sons Caleb and Elisha Griswold executors.



THOMAS<sup>3</sup>, b. Wethersfield, Conn., Jan. 11, 1673/4 (*Thomas*<sup>2</sup>, *Michael*<sup>1</sup>); m. May 9, 1697, Sarah Bradley, b. Oct. 17, 1676, daughter of Stephen and Hannah (Smith) Bradley.

Stephen Bradley, founder of the family came to New Haven, Conn. 1639, and his son Stephen settled in Guilford. A man who became prominent almost immediately. In the "War of William

and Mary" he was appointed ensign of Dragoons for New Haven county 1690. Lieut. Stephen Bradley was deputy to the General Court, 1692, 1693, 1694, 1696, 1698, 1700, 1701. Held the highest positions of trust Guilford could give, a worthy man who served them faithfully.

Thomas was a blacksmith and came to Guilford 1695, either at the request of the settlers or upon a private enterprise. He was given no grant of land and the records show he made no purchase until about 1725 when he established a home at Nut Plains. Where he lived in Guilford settlement is unknown. He may have lived on "Crooked Lane," State street, near or with Stephen Bradley. The home he established has long since disappeared. He was a steady citizen but never prominent, a man among men, content to forge the iron for himself and his neighbors who battled the wilderness and laid bare the forests for the plow.

Thomas d. Oct. 19, 1729, aged about 56 years. No special epitaph marks his passing. He was buried on the Guilford Green with other early settlers and his grave marked by a simple finely carved sandstone monument; when it was determined to clear the Green of monuments and obliterate the cemetery, the gravestone of Thomas, with others were removed to the church. The records show it was finally removed to the premises of George Griswold, on Boston street, where it has lain for perhaps a hundred years. His gravestone has recently been found but is almost illegible and much worn. The inscription "Here lyeth ye body of Mr. Thomas Griswold who died Oct. 19, 1729 aged about 56 years."

Michael Griswold of Wethersfield. Died Apr. 20, 1731. Inventory May 11, 1731 by Michael and Jacob Griswold and Nathaniel Burnham. Will dated Apr. 2, 1731 (Hartford probate, Vol. XI, 102).

I, Michael Griswold, 2nd, of Wethersfield, do make this my last will and testament: I give unto my son Benjamin my homestead, about 11 acres of land with house and barn and orchard thereon standing, except improvement of 1/2 of said lands, buildings and orchard, which I reserve to my wife Mary during her widowhood; also except blacksmith shop and tools thereof, and the ground which said shop covers which I reserve for my son Michael during the time he shall see cause to uphold and work in sd shop, and no longer; and also one acre of land across the highway near said homestead, which I purchased of my brother Samuel Griswold, and lying next to the homelott of George Northway, excepting the use of said acre which I reserve for my wife during her widowhood; and also two acres of land lying in the great meadow in Wethersfield which I purchased of Eliphalet Dickinson; he, said Benjamin paying upon my decease to my daughter Prudence the sum of 20 pounds money or equivalent thereto. I give to my son William Griswold 1/2 my lott at Newington and lying on the north side of sd lott there, and my desire is that my said wife, upon my decease, do by deed of gift convey to sd William the 1/2 of my lott that I hold in her right at Besitt Plaine, viz. the north side of said lott; but in case my said wife

shall neglect or refuse to convey sd half of said Besitt Plaine, then my will is that she pay to said William out of my moveable estate what the said land shall be valued at upon my decease. I give to my son Michael Griswold the other half of my lott at Newington, lying on the south side of sd. lott, and my smith shop and tooles, and also the use of the ground it covers, while the said Michael shall uphold and use the same, and also my pacing mare. # SAMUEL'S WILL

I, Samuel Griswold, of Guilford, in the county of New Haven, in the Colony of Connecticut, altho I am now sick and weake, and expect to move out of this world in a short time, yet since through Divine Favour I have my reason, therefore think it my duty to make my will and settle my affairs.

But principally and first of all I recommend my soul into the hands of my merciful creator hoping for a glorious resurrection.

I will and bequeath to my loving wife Mary Griswold the use and improvement of the one third part of all my buildings and lands during the term of her natural life and I give and grant to my said wife to be at her own free dispose the third part of my moveable estate. My will is that what grain & provision that I leave shall be for the use of my family and not be inventoried and my will is that my executor thereafter named shall sell my old oxen and so much of the price or value of them as may be found needful to supply my family with grain till the next crop cometh in, with what I have above given to my family shall be improved by the executrix to purchase graine with for the families use and the remainder of the price of sd. oxen shall be answer as far as that will go my just debts.

I will, give and grant, to my son Samuel Griswold and to his heirs forever, my dwelling house and barn and the one half (being the north side of the lands I live upon and is bounded west by the highway and east by the Homonosett river; northerly by Hezekiah Griswold and southerly by the remaining half or part of said lands).

I will, give and grant, to my son Jared and to his heirs forever, ten acres of that land (to be the south end thereof), that I bought of Corp. Samuel Buell (being in Killingworth bounds), and the remainder of sd. parcel of land, I give and grant to my sd. son Samuel, and to my sons, Nehemiah Griswold, Jeremiah Griswold, Moses Griswold, John Griswold, Manus Griswold, Aaron Griswold, to them and my sd. seven sons and their heirs forever, to be equally divided between them, my sd. seven sons.

I will give and grant to my sd. son Nehemiah & his heirs forever, three acres of land lying on the west side of the highway joining on the north by the land that is or was Searsaros, and easterly by the sd. highway.

I will give and grant to my sd. son Jeremiah and his heirs forever my field of land lying eastward of the house that Mr. How lately sold to William Bartholomew; it containeth about seven acres, more or less, and is inclosed round with a fence.

I will give and grant to my sd. son Moses, and to his heirs forever, my next field that adjoineth that which I have given to Jeremiah and containeth about seven or eight acres and is bounded easterly by the fence that incloseth.

I give and grant to my sd. son John, and his heirs forever, my next field & adjoineth on the north to that I have given my son Moses, and containeth about seven or eight acres and is also bounded by the fence that incloseth it.

I will give and grant to my son Manus, and his heirs forever, my lot at the place called the straights.

I will give and grant to my son Aaron, and to his heirs forever, the other one half or part of my land where I dwell, to be bounded northerly by that which I have given to Samuel, and easterly by the said river and westerly by the highway & southerly by Ephriam Squires land.

I will give and grant to my sons Nehemiah, Jeremiah, Moses, John & Manus, and to their heirs forever, my piece of land containing about six acres, more or less, lying in Killingworth bounds & adjoineth to sd. river on the western side thereof to be equally divided between them, sd. Nehemiah, Jeremiah, Moses, John & Manus.

As to my daughter Mercy Crane, I have already given her the portion that I intended for her and I do confirm to her those goods I have heretofore put into her possession and which she now hath.

And I do hereby appoint my wife Mary to be sole executrix of this my last will and testament and do order that she shall pay my debts out of my moveable estate.

The following episode in the life of Jacob has frequently been published but this record would not be complete without it.

Captain Jacob being alone in a field about one mile west of the court house at Litchfield, two Indians suddenly rushed upon him from the woods, took him, pinioned his arms and carried him off. They traveled in a northerly direction, and the same day arrived in some part of the township now Canaan, then a wilderness. The Indians kindled a fire and after binding their prisoner hand and foot, lay down to sleep. The Captain fortunately disengaging his hands and feet, while his arms were yet pinioned, seized their guns and made his escape into the woods. After traveling a short distance, he sat down and waited until dawn, and although his arms were yet pinioned he carried both the guns. The savages awoke in the morning and finding their prisoner gone immediately pursued him; they soon overtook him and kept in sight of him the greater part of the day, while he was making his way homeward. When they came near, he turned and pointed one of the pieces at them; they then fell back. In this manner he traveled till near sunset; when he reached an eminence in an open field about one mile northwest of the present court house, he then discharged one of his guns, which immediately summoned the people to his assistance. The Indians fled and he safely returned to his family.

The last will and testament of Capt. Jacob Griswold, of Litchfield, in the county of Litchfield, and Colony of Connecticut, in New England, which I make this 22nd day of June, 1768, as follows:

In the name of God Amen, I being now in reasonable common health considering mine age and sound in my reason through the goodness of God who has continued ye same, but considering the mortality of my body, not knowing how soon I shall put off my earthly tabernacle and those temporal blessings that God has bestowed on me, moveth me to make this my last will and testament in ye following manner and form.

First I commit my soul to God through our Lord Jesus Christ and my body to ye earth to a decent burial hoping at ye resurrection of ye just that both soul & body shall be united in Glory; as to my temporal estate that God has blest me with, I give and bequeath after my just debts and funeral expenses are paid in ye following manner.

First I give and bequeath to my beloved son Elijah Griswold

one half of an undivided right of land in Litchfield and two acres already granted on said right of ye last division not yet laid out, and my wearing apparel, my great Bible and my \* \* \* and my cyder mill for his own forever.

Secondly, I give and bequeath to my three daughters or their heirs, viz: to Eunice, ye wife of Capt. Solomon Buell, and Anne, formerly ye wife of Jacob Woodruff, Esq. and to Mary, formerly ye wife of Elisha Kilborn, all my moveable estate excepting what I have already given away to my son Elijah, which shall be equally divided in three parts; to Eunice, one part; and ye heirs of Anne, one part; and to ye heirs of Mary, one part, which shall be their own forever.

Thirdly, I give and bequeath to my beloved grandson, Jacob Griswold, my dwelling house and barn and twenty six acres of land where my sd house and barn now standeth, ye whole of said lot, providing said Jacob Griswold shall pay all my just debts, which if he shall faithfully do, then ye land & buildings shall be his own forever; furthermore my will is that my son Elijah Griswold shall be executor of this my last will and testament, and all other wills formerly made by me are void and this my last will and testament, I do acknowledge to be my last free will.

Mary was descendant of James Olmstead, the Puritan ancestor, who came to Boston 1632; removed to Quincy and later to Cambridge, Mass., where he had a home on Harvard street upon the spot or very near to what has been called the "President's House," and was the second piece of land acquired by Harvard College. He was one of the twelve men selected to examine the lands on the Connecticut river and became one of the original proprietors of Hartford; his name appears on the Founders Monument.

Nicholas his son served in the Pequot War and received a grant of land for his services.

Samuel was a farmer in East Haddam and by his will 1744 gave his daughter Mary the negro girl called Patience.

Hezekiah settled at a place called Black Rock, then in East Guilford, and about one mile northward from the present town of Rockland, in Madison; cleared a farm from the forest of about 32 acres where he made his home. The compiler was fortunately able to locate this old farm, the old cellar place, and the old road cut through this farm to connect the old county road, approximately the present route 79 from Madison to Durham, with Cohabit, now North Guilford. This road has practically disappeared as well as the old home and barn. The last house built was destroyed by fire more than forty years ago. Almost the entire farm was covered with timber until destroyed by fire in recent years.

Hezekiah owned other lands in this vicinity and in 1753 sold out his holdings for 4,000 pounds and removed to Ponsett in Haddam.

Black Rock received its name from a very large dark colored rock about thirty feet high and covers the ground about fifty feet square, almost a single stone, under which was a considerable cave. In the early days this rock was an Indian camp ground.

Records disclose that Hezekiah held large land interests during his life, a shrewd and intelligent trader, and accumulated a snug fortune. Information is unattainable to show when or where he died or what disposal was made of his property.

"Samuel Nettleton of Totoket doth testify upon oath taken before the Governor the 4th day of Nov. 1647, that he bought a pair of shoes of Goodman Meges of New Haven, russed, closed in the inside at the side seams, for his wife, she put them on, on the Lord's day and the next third day morning they were ripped the soales being good, neither shranke nor hornie that I could perceive, and he also testified that for and in consideration of satisfaction from Goodman Meges he expecteth a new pare." A committee was appointed to whom some of the shoes sold by Goodman Meges were given for examination, with orders from the court to take those shoes aside and viewe them well and if there be cause to ripe some of them that they may give unto the court according to their best light the cause of this damage, they did so and returned this answer:—We apprehend this—that the leather is very bad, not tanned nor fit to be sold for serviceable leather, but it wrongs the country and we find the workmanship bad also, first, there is not sufficient stuffe put in the thread, and instead of hemp it is flax, and the stitches are too large and the threads not drawn home, and there wants wax on the thred, the aule is to bige for the thred. The court proceeded to sentence and ordered Goodman Meges to pay 10s. as a fine to the jurisdiction with satisfaction to every particular person as damage shall be required and proved. Others had testified to the badness of shoes bought of Goodman Meges.

In 1778 this part of Vermont was raided by the British, Tories and Indians, burning the homes and capturing the able-bodied

men. This family was taken, but the elder Griswold was released, no doubt owing to his advanced age; also Doctor, the youngest, who traveled to a place of safety barefoot, over rough trails, in the bitter weather of November. The others were taken to Quebec, John, Jr., never returned and his ultimate fate is unknown. After about two years the others were released and returned to their home, entered the army, and later were largely instrumental in the development of New Haven and Waltham, Vermont. It is also said that the elder John was drowned in Lake Champlain previous to the raid. Also that John the younger was sent to Ireland.

There is a record of a certificate of survey 600 acres at Fort Ann, Sept. 22, 1789, and also on Apr. 16, 1792, a proposal of Ephriam Grissel to buy 300 acres in Westfield (now Fort Ann). The census of 1790 shows him with wife and one child.
