PREFACE.

In offering to the present generation of the Goodrich Family the disconnected and fragmentary memoranda of their English History contained in Part One, no apology is deemed necessary, other than what is contained in the correspondence which serves as an Introduction. It is simply to preserve what remains as the result of many years of patient labor and much expense, by Rev. Hiram P. Goodrich of St. Louis and his associates, from further loss; and to furnish a nucleus around which may be gathered, in subsequent parts, such additional information as may be had from other laborers in the same field.

From promises already received, we confidently expect, in season for PART TWO, copies of the engravings of "THE OLD GOODRICH CASTLE", mentioned as contained in "Bonas' Itinerancy" and "Gentleman's Magazine".

The publishing committee will be very thankful for such suggestions, criticisms, and additional information as may be furnished in season for the next number, which will contain memoranda of WILLIAM GOODRICH of Wethersfield, Conn., his wife SARAH (Marvin), with four generations of their descendants. It is expected that this PART Two will be issued during the month of September, of the present year.

INTRODUCTION.

To H. C. GOODRICH, Esq., No. 70 Ogden Place, Chicago, Ill.; and L. S. GOODRICH, Esq., Sup't Warner Iron Company, Warner, Hickman County, Tenn.

Gentlemen:—At your request, I have prepared, and herewith submit, a statement showing reasons that would seem to warrant the effort now being made to collect and arrange in suitable form for preservation, "A History of the Descendants of Ensign WILLIAM! GOODRICH, who married SARAH MARVIN, at Hartford, Conn., October 4, 1648, and settled at Wethersfield; also a statement of the material now in hand for that purpose.

During the year 1861, I was employed by Mr. Henry B. Goodrich, formerly of Brownhelm, Lorain Co., Ohio (son of Henry B. Ezekiel L. Zacheus Capt. Zacheus Richard Capt. Ephraim? W.lliam¹), but then a resident of Chicago, to make a list of his Goodrich relatives. Among the many valuable memoranda furnished by my patron, was a large collection of MSS. gathered by Rev. Hiram P. Goodrich (Benjamin D. Benjamin Benjamin David William¹), an Episcopal clergyman of St. Louis, who, with his father, Benjamin D. of Pittsfield, Mass., had spent a portion of the last seventy years in collecting these memoranda; having twice visited England for the purpose.

As no attempt had been made to arrange the mass of material (a portion of which was in Latin), the work was much larger than was anticipated. By the kind assistance of Rev. Wm. Barry, then secretary of the Chicago Historical

Society, the work was completed, in manuscript form, to the satisfaction of Mr. Goodrich; who, after examination, said: "I would not take a thousand dollars for my copy, if I could not get another." The English history of the property belonging to the family extended back to the year 807, and the traditionary accounts were, generally, quite well sustained by public and family documents.

The identity and connection between the English family of County Sussex and that of William and John Goodrich of Wethersfield, Conn., was so clearly established, by documentary evidence, that the representatives of the Wethersfield branch received property left to them by will of an uncle in Sussex as early as A.D. 1677. Quite a number of the lines of descent from William of Wethersfield were brought down into the present century.

In the month of October, 1862, this man, Henry B. Goodrich, was murdered, while on his way to St. Louis. Rev. Hiram P.6 Goodrich of St. Louis also died the same year; and as his only son was said to have enlisted in the Confederate army, there seemed to be no one to whom the MSS, could properly be returned. They were carefully packed, and the package marked "Papers belonging the Estate of the late Hiram P. Goodrich of St. Louis, Mo.—In care of the Chicago Historical Society, until called for." They were undoubtedly destroyed by the Great Fire of October 8-9, 1871.

What became of the manuscript book, compiled for Henry B.⁸ Goodrich, is unknown; but as it is understood that his family returned to Brownhelm, Ohio, shortly after his death, it is supposed it was taken there.

Fortunately, a very full abstract or digest of the St. Louis MSS, was made on the books of the compiler, which, being at his residence at Oak Park at the time of the fire, escaped destruction.

My own especial interest in the descendants of William' Goodrich arising from the fact that my mother's mother, Ruth Goodrich (Elisha: Elisha: Allen: Folm: William'), and

also my wife's mother, Rebecca⁵ Goodrich (Fohn! Allen! Fohn² William¹), were among his descendants, led me during the intervening twenty years (1862–82) to continue adding such memoranda as I met with.

The liberality and interest of Col. Charles Goodrich Hammond of this city, whose mother, Frances Goodrich (Foling Capt. Foling David Capt. Ephraim William,), was of the same family, enabled me to thoroughly review my collection.

I must say that, in this review, I was very agreeably surprised to find the dates and other facts given in the original St. Louis MSS. so uniformly corroborated by more recent publications, in which members of the Goodrich family are mentioned.

In view of all these facts, I was much pleased to receive, during the past few weeks, several letters from persons of the name, suggesting that an effort be now made to publish the "Goodrich-Family History", or, at least, so much of it as will secure from danger of loss the material now in my possession.

In reply to these letters, I have suggested that if any work be now published, it be arranged on the plan of my "Towne-Family Memorial"; that is, in Three Parts. Part Onc—The English history of the family. Part Two—WILLIAM GOODRICH of Wethersfield, and four generations of his descendants, bearing the name Goodrich. For this Part, my memoranda now gives 9 children, 5 sons and 4 daughters; all married, but 1. 46 grandchildren, 27 males and 19 females; all married, but 8. In the next or 3d generation of the descendants of the emigrant William, I find the names of 104 sons and 67 daughters; but the marriage of only 84 have yet been found.

Of the 4th generation, my memoranda includes only 203 sons and 146 daughters; with 135 marriages. These figures give an aggregate of 575 names for "Part Two", but as most of the 4th generation were born before or during the Revolu-

tionary period, there is a probability that most of those bearing the name Goodrich, in this country, may find the names of their grandparents in these lists, if they are descended from "William" of Wethersfield".

It is proposed to publish *Parts One* and *Two* separately, in pamphlet form; to be followed by other *Parts*, as fast as the necessary information can be obtained, and the interest manifested will warrant.

As soon as a publication committee shall have been organized, notice will be given by circular, and subscriptions invited.

Blanks, suitable for sending information, will be furnished *free* to all applicants of the name Goodrich, or whose mothers or grandmothers have borne that name.

GOODRICH FAMILY.

PART ONE.

HISTORICAL MEMORANDA.

Collected by Rev. HIRAM P. GOODRICH of St. Louis, Mo. Copied, March, A.D. 1861, by EDWIN HUBBARD, Chicago.

THE GOODRICHES of England belong to an ancient Saxon family; much more ancient than the date of the Norman Conquest, for, at that time, it was widely dispersed, and its members in possession of titles, lordships, houses, and lands.

The destiny of the more noble and wealthy branches of the family is now unknown. Like all others, we may suppose, they were driven from their possessions, and their lands confiscated to the Crown and parcelled out to the followers of the Conqueror. The possessors of Goodrich Castle in Wales, an ancient royalty of which some notice will be given; of Castle Goodrich and Goodrich Manor at Wigorn (Worcester); of Goodrichton in Norfolk, with manorial rights; of Goodrichlea (The "Doomsday-Book", Edward III., mentions it thus: "The Forest of Kyneford, between Dereford and Goodrychleye,") are lost and unknown in history. of less wealth and more humble position, as Goodrich de Torkessay, Goodrich de Newham, Goodrich de Cullenai, Goodrich Dassifer, Goodrich May, and Goodrich cum Barba, held all or a portion of their possessions and are enrolled in the Doomsday-Books. From the number enrolled as clergy,

we might infer that the loss of their estates drove many of them into the Church; either through the serious state of mind, induced by misfortune or as a refuge from the degradation of poverty and dependence.

More than sixty of the name of Goodrich are found in the rolls of the "Doomsday", most of them as small landholders under Norman lords. These will be appended here in chronological order, with interpolations, of other historic authority, as it may occur.

The "Exon Doomsday" preserved in Exeter Cathedral, consists of three original manuscript rolls of returns made by the commissioners of William the Conqueror, at the time of forming the general survey of the kingdoms. It includes Cornwall, Somerset, and Devonshire. "In Gelingcha hundreda Godricus Venator, tenuit I Virgam,"—in Gelingcha hundred Goodrich the hunter held I rod. "In Brumsella hundr. Godricus, I hidam,"—in Burnsella, hundred Goodrich, held I hide of land. "Colvins ht. I. mans' g' vocat' Offerion di eq' tenuis Godric — Denesburga. Attestant. Hama."—Colvin possessed one place, which is called Offerion; through whom Goodrich held also Denesburg. Attestant Hama." P. 446, &c., &c., 21 entries.

The "Doomsday, Winton"; made under Henry I. to ascertain the lands of Edward the Confessor, who reigned A.D. 1042. It was made between the years 1107 and 1128, and it has several entries.

In the "Doomsday-Book", made by order of William the Conqueror, A.D. 1086, and deposited at Winchester, are many Goodriches. The rotule hundredorum from Henry III. to Edward I., kept in the Tower of London, has "John Goodrich raised a certain wall across the king's highway, Prosshelade to Newham." P. 50, vol. 1. "Ambrose, son of John Goodrich, held one house in Newham, which descended to him by inheritance from the death of the said John, his father, which the same John inherited from the death of Thomas, his father." P. 372, vol. 1.

The following is found in Ingulph's "History of the Abbey of Croyland", and whatever may be thought of the value of that work, as to charters recited, and historical events recounted, its history of its own abbots is doubtless correct. After the destruction of the Abbey by the Danes, under Harold and Sidroc, in the year 870, in the times of Ethelred and Alfred, Ingulph says: "By the consent of all, the venerable Father Godric, though very reluctant, and making great opposition thereto was elected abbot". The abbot for the next four years was harassed with fines and confiscations, by the king of Mercia, till that kingdom ended, and Alfred reigned over both that and Wessex. In the reign of Edmund, A.D. 946, weighed down with extreme old age, Godric, abbot of Croyland, died."

In the Rotule, Henry VIII., are named, A.D. 1509 to 1546: "Thomas Goodricke, Rector of Hogely, Lincoln. Sir John Goodryke, Knight, Huntingdon.

Thomas Goodrycke, Parish of Bowdon, Maj.

Anne Goodryke, Prioress of Greenfield, Lincoln.

Dr. Henry Goodriche, Rector of Hothfield, Kent.

John Godereych, Preb. of Herbson, Stafford.

John Goderidge, Vicar of Clewdon, Somerset.

William Goodrich, Rector of St. Martin, Outerfield, Lond. Richard Goodrich, Comm. of Poor, Parish of St. Nicholas, Gloucester"

Of historic references to members of the family, the earliest is the legend of St. Godric, who was a native of Walpole, in Norfolk, and was warned in a vision to settle near Funchal Abbey, on the Weir of Durham, where he practised foolish austerities, and died A.D. 1170. See Mavor's "Universal History".

In Robert Hogg's "Legend of St. Cuthbert", reprinted at the end of Dixon's "Historical and Descriptive View of the Country of Durham", we are told of a St. Goodrich, that, in his younger days, was a pedlar, and carried his moveable shop, from fair to fair, upon his back, and used to visit Landisfarne, much delighted to hear the monks tell wonders of St. Cuthbert, which so influenced his devotion that he undertook a pilgrimage to the holy sepulchure; and by the advice of St. Cuthbert in a dream, repaired again to the Holy Land, and washing his feet in Jordan, there left his shoes, with a vow to go barefoot all his life after.

A.D. 1500, Thomas Goodrich (or Goodryke), of the Norton-lea family, was an English prelate, and native of Lincolnshire, was admitted pensioner of Benet College, Cambridge, about 1500; became fellow of Jesus College in 1510; commenced 1514; was elected Bishop of Ely in 1534; and died in 1554. He is said to have favored the Reformation and to have had some share in compiling "The Book of Common Prayer", and likewise, the "Institution of a Christian Man". But he was sufficiently lukewarm, in the cause of the Reformation, to hold his office in the reign of Mary.—See "Crabbe's Universal Hist. Dictionary".

From the "Coliana", selections from the manuscripts bequeathed to the British Museum, by Mr. Cole, is the following notice of Bishop Goodrich: "In the fifth year of Edward the Sixth, when the Marquis of Northampton was sent, with the order of the Garter, to Henry II., King of France, Bishop Goodrich was joined in commission with him, and at the investiture the bishop made a speech to the king, to which the Cardinal Lorraine returned answer, in the king's name, with all thankful acknowledgments for the honor of the order. As Bishop Goodrich had gone all lengths in King Edward's Reformation, his meeting with the Cardinal Lorraine must have been an awkward affair, and how the right-rev, bishop behaved is not particularized, especially, as there was a solemn mass sung at the investure, at which were present the Cardinal Lorraine and Chatillon."

"Fuller's Worthies of England" says, "He was often employed as embassador, was bishop of Ely 20 years, and was made lord chancellor of England by Edward."

In the "Monthly Magazine", vol. 14, 1802, are some lines

on this Dr. Goodrich, Bishop of Ely, and Master of St. John's, Cambridge:

"Et bonus, et dives, bene junctus et optimus ordo, Præcedit, bonitas, frone, sequentur opes."

Or as it is rendered in "Fuller's Worthies",

"Both good and rich, well-joined, best ranked indeed, For grace goes first, and nent doth wealth succeed."

Fuller says, "Thomas Goodrich was the son of Edward Goodrich, and Jane, his wife, of East Kirby, Lincolnshire, D.D., in the University of Cambridge. He died May 10th, 1554." "In 1579, Richard Goodriche, Esq., was high sheriff of


Yorkshire."—See "Crabbe's Universal Hist. Dictionary".

GOODRICH CASTLE.

"A.D. 1204. In the year 1204, Goodrich Castle was, by patent, conferred on William Marshall, Count of Pembroke and Earl Strigul. He married Isabel, daughter of Richard de Clare (Strongbow), 1201. In 1209, his eldest son William succeeded, and died 1231. Richard, the 2d son, succeeded, and died 1234. This line became extinct in 1245. In 1247, it was probably conferred on William de Valence, the brother of Eleanor, daughter of Count of Provence, and queen of Henry III., who was in Wales with an army in 1245. 1323. Aymer de Valence and wife Maria, held Goodrich Castle, and Goodrichton in Norfolk. This line become extinct in him

"1371. Elizabeth, wife of Richard Talbot, held Goodrich Castle, Hereford. 1425. John Earl, of Salisbury, held Goodrich Castle and Lordship, with royal liberties.

"1706. Henry de Grey, of Ruthyn, Marquis and Earl of Kent, was created Vicount Goodrich or Hereford."

"Gentleman's Magazine", 1802, says: "It had circular towers from the square bases at the corners."

The following, from a letter of C. A. Goodrich, dated June 25th, 1855, to W. H. Goodrich, New-York City, 1859:

"The original name was Goderic, that is, Eric, with the name of the Deity prefixed, which was not uncommon among the early Saxons. You see the same Godwin, and other names. In Doomsday-Book (a list of taxable persons in

England soon after the Conquest) the names Goderic and Godewin occurs perhaps a hundred times, and in all the middle and southern counties of the kingdom. The persons bearing the name were of all ranks in society, from the highest class of nobility, through bishops, priests, deacons, franklins, down to farmers, stewards, huntsmen, and day-laborers.

"I doubt if there is another name in Doomsday-Book more full than this. At a still earlier period, the name of Godericu *Dux*, as one of the witnesses to a grant of abbey lands, by the Danish king, Canute.

"Earlier than the time of Chaucer, before our language was completely formed into English, we find a short poem or hymn by one of the name, who was connected with a monastery.

"Goodrich Castle was probably erected soon after the Conquest (possibly before), as a point of defence for the west of England, against the incursions of the Welch. It stood on the banks of the River Nye, in Herefordshire; and, at a very early period, passed, perhaps by marriage, into the hands of the celebrated Talbot, Earl of Salisbury, who captured Joan of Arc. In Shakespeare's Henry V. he is mentioned as Lord of Goddig or Godrig. In the time of Henry VIII., the bishop of Ely was Dr. Goodricke, one of the leading men of the Reformation.

"This was the general spelling of the name at that time, and there is now a family of the name in Yorkshire, who have lived on the same estate for eight generations, with the title of baronet. Their coat of arms is the same as ours. Goodrich Castle was occupied by the caveliers during the war of Parliament against Charles I., but, after a long siege, was taken by assault, blown up, and destroyed. Its ruins are still among the most striking in England.

"There is a village named Goodrich, three or four miles from the castle, which was undoubtedly the seat of the clansmen, when the lords of the castle were in the height of their power. It has now about 800 inhabitants. There is no doubt but John and William Goodrich of Wethersfield, 1640, came from this quarter, probably in connection with the Rev. Mr. Prudden, a Puritan divine, who had preached in that neighborhood, and came to New Haven and Wethersfield about that period."

COAT OF ARMS:

GOODRICH (as borne by Rev. Chas. Goodrich, rector of Bitterring, Parva, County Norfolk). Or, two lions passant, between ten crosses crosslet, Sa. Crest, a demi-lion rampant, holding in the paws a cross crosslet, Sa.

GOODRICH, Selong Grove, County Essex. Or, seance of crosses crosslet, a lion rampant, Or. Crest, a demi-lion rampant, couped, Or, holding in the dexter paw a cross crosslet, as in the arms.

THE GOODRICH FAMILY IN AMERICA.

There were at least five original settlers of this name in New England, previous to 1650, vis.:

WILLIAM GOODRICH of Watertown, 1636. Wife Margaret. Died at New Berry, before April 3d, 1647.

JOHN GOODRICH of Watertown, 1637. Probably brother of William, above.

RICHARD GOODRICH of Guilford, 1639.

JOHN GOODRICH of Wethersfield, 1643. Married, 1645, Eliz, Edwards, and died 1680.

WILLIAM GOODRICH of Wethersfield, 1643. Married, 1648, Sarah Marvin, and died 1676. Brother of the above.

Besides these five above mentioned, there were several others, who were probably emigrants from England, and whose relationship (if it existed) to any of the above can only be inferred from a similarity of the names of their descendants. Of these may be mentioned John of Boston, member of the artillery company, 1640. A tailor, admitted to church, 1642; freeman, 1642; wife Prudence, son Joseph, 1642. Robert of Boston, who kept a coffee-house. Wife Mary. He died 1717, aged 72. Bartholomew of Branford,

1677, then signed the plantation and church covenants; died 1695 6. The last named, Bartholomew, was very probably son of Richard of Guilford, but no positive evidence has yet been found.

The late Rev. Hiram P. Goodrich of St. Louis, Mo., who has probably done more toward tracing out the "Goodrich family" than all the rest of the name combined, says in a letter, dated "St. Louis, Mo., Sept. 29th, 1857," addressed to Mr. Ephraim F. Goodrich, Madison, Lake Co., Ohio: "I send you, dear sir, a bald outline of our lineage. There are four Goodriches found in Connecticut in 1642 to 1667. The one latest named is Bartholomew of Branford, the father of a very numerous and highly respectable race, has descendants there, in New-York City, in western New York, and especially at Lockport; in early times they were farmers and ship-builders. Another was Richard, one of the first settlers of Guilford, 1640. He had a son John before 1672. Of this line no more is known; but as Bartholomew had his first children baptized at Guilford, and as John, the eldest of the two, who settled at Wethersfield, 1643, came there from Guilford, we suppose them all to have been of the same family, somehow—the how I hope yet to discover"

That John and William of Wethersfield were brothers, is fully established; and the English locality of their family also fairly presumed, will appear from the following extracts, furnished by Henry B. Goodrich, Esq., now of Chicago, Ill., which were furnished to him by Wm. W. Goodrich, Esq., of New York, September, 1859. "From private controversies, vol. v., page 239, secretary of state's office, Hartford, Conn. Will of the Rev. Wm. Goodrich, Hedgessett, in the County of Suffolk, England:

"In the name of God, Amen. I, William Goodrich of Hedgessett, in the County of Suffolk, clerk, being through the mercy of God of sound mind, and good health, and disposing memory, do make and ordain this my last will, in manner and form following. *Imprimis:* I give unto Rebecca,

my living wife, all my messuages wherein I now dwell, in Hedgessett aforesaid, with all the houses, out-houses, and gardens, lands and appurtenances thereunto belonging, to hold to her assigns, for and during the term of her natural life, she keeping the same from time to time in good repair; and, after my said wife's decease, I give the same messuages, tenements, houses, out-houses, gardens, orchards, and appurtenances thereto belonging, unto Joseph, the eldest son now living of my brother John Goodrich, and his heirs forever. But in case he dies, and have no issue from his own body. I give the aforesaid houses and lands, with all their appurtenances before mentioned, or not mentioned, belonging to me in Hedgessett, to my brother's next son, Jonathan, and his heirs; and if he also be dead before my wife, and have no natural issue of his body, I give the appurtenances named, or not named, belonging to me in Hedgessett, unto my brother John's eldest daughter, and her heirs, that shall be then living. Also, I give unto Rebecca, my loving wife, all that Coppyhold Close, called by the name of Robbetts, containing by estimation seven acres, more or less, lying in Chilton Hamlet, in Slow Market, in the County of Suffolk, holden on the manor of Dagworth cum sorrels, to hold to her and her assigns for and during the term of her natural life, and after my said wife's decease, I give the aforesaid close, with all the appurtenances thereof, to John, the eldest son of my brother William Goodrich, and his heirs forever. Also, I give unto Rebecca, my wife, all the closes mortgaged to me by John Tilicott of Bavton, now deceased, for fifty pounds, and seized upon by me for the lack of the payment of the principal.

"All these closes, as they are mentioned in the indenture made to me, with their appurtenances, I give to the said Rebecca, my wife, during the term of her natural life; but in case the land be redeemed, and the fifty pounds paid, with the interest that is, or shall be, due to me, my will is that my wife shall have the interest and improvement thereof toward her maintainance during her life. But my will is, that after her decease, that all the closes of the aforesaid John Tillicot, mortgaged to me, and seized upon by me for want of payment of the aforesaid principal, shall descend to John Goodrich, the eldest son of my brother William Goodrich, and his heirs. But if redeemed, I will and devise to the aforesaid John (Goodrich), and to his heirs, after my wife's decease, fifty pounds, of lawful English money, in the room of the land;

and whereas I have sundry sums of money abroad in several hands, I will and devise concerning the same that my said wife shall have the interest and improvement thereof toward her maintainance during her life. But my will is, that ,the aforesaid fifty pounds, in case paid, and the aforesaid land of John Tilliott be redeemed, and, besides that, an hundred and fifty pounds more I have abroad, to be well secured by my wife, within three months after my decease; the above-named fifty pounds for the use (....) forenamed John Goodrich, eldest son of my brother William (Goodrich), and his heirs (.....) forever; out of the hundred and fifty pounds, after my wife's decease, I will and devise one fifty pounds to the above said John, eldest son of my brother William Goodrich, and his heirs forever; and as for the other hundred pounds. I will and devise the same unto Joseph, the eldest son of my brother John Goodrich, and to his heirs forever; after the decease of my wife. And do farther will that whenever Mr. John Tillott's land be redeemed, and the fifty pounds. paid in, that the said fifty pounds shall be put out for the better improvement of my wife's maintainence; but no part or parcel of it, but by, and with, the consent of my kinsman, Henry Bull, senior, of Bury, Malster, and John Goodrich, eldest son now living of my cousin Robert Goodrich, Hawleigh, Chirurgeon, and after the same manner shall the hundred and fifty pounds before mentioned be disposed of for the maintainance of my said wife. No part of the same to be put out, or altered out of the present hands where it now is, but by, and with, the consent of Henry Bull of Bury and John Goodrich of Hawleigh, that so the principal sum may be preserved for the aforesaid John Goodrich, eldest son of my brother William Goodrich, and his heirs, and Joseph Goodrich, eldest son of my brother John Goodrich, and his heirs; and in case of her disposal of the said two hundred pounds, or any part thereof, without the consent of the aforesaid Henry Bull and John Goodrich, then I will that my said two brothers' children, Joseph and John, or their heirs living, shall immediately from and after such disposal have and enjoy the two hundred pounds, according to my mind and purpose above said, either of them their appointed part and share. And it is further my will that my said wife do, before she enjoy any benefit of this my will, first enter into a bond of four hundred pounds to the said Henry Bull and John Goodrich, that her executors and administrators shall

pay to the above-named Joseph and John, within three months after her decease, the two hundred pounds, in case the land of John Tillicot be redeemed and the principal paid; or else one hundred and fifty pounds if they shall come so soon out of New England to receive the same, or by sufficient or undoubted authority they send for the same, or else so soon as they shall send for it. Item. It is my will that all the overplus of my estate, either goods or money, or household stuff, or chattels whatsoever, shall be to and for the use and benefit of my wife, and at her disposal, to whom I give the same, and constitute and appoint the said Rebecca. my wife, sole executrix of this my last will and testament. and I nominate the said Henry Bull and John Goodrich supervisors thereof. Also, my mind and will is, that John Bull, reader, of Bury, in the parish of St. James, and the son of Henry Bull, aforesaid, these books named by mine own hand in the margin of my will, which my executrix, after my death, shall deliver to him. In witness of all this, I, the said William Goodrich, have to this my last will and testament, contained in sheet of paper, set my hand and seal, dated the 12th day of May, in the year of our Lord, 1677.

"WILLIAM GOODRICH."

[Books on the margin are omitted.]

"From BURY, ye 16th of July, 1678.

"COZEN GOODRICH:—This is to inform you that your brother William Goodrich is dead. He died in Hedgessett, near Bury, in the County of Suffolk, and left no children. The sum of his last will and testament is this: He has given to his wife all, during her natural life, and, after her decease, he has bequeathed to your relations as follows: to Joseph, the eldest son of his brother John, he has given his house and grounds at Hedgessett, above said, and one hundred pounds in money, if the said Joseph shall then be living; also to the heir of his body, lawfully begotten; and, for want of heirs, to Jonathan, the 2d son of his brother John, and his heirs; and if he also died childless, then the bequeathment is to descend to the eldest daughter of his brother John, and her heirs.

"He has also given one Coppyhold ground, in value near one hundred pounds, and 100 in money to John, the eldest son of his brother William, if he shall be living at the decease of his said wife, and otherwise it is to descend to William, the son of his brother William, and his heirs forever,

"All to be enjoyed after the death of his wife, whom he has appointed sole executrix, and engaged to enter into a bond of 400 pounds (before she has any benefit of this will), to perform the conditions of it; which bond is to be sealed to myself and one Mr. John Goodrich of Hawleigh, whom he has appointed supervisors, in order to the security of the 200 pounds above mentioned, which is abroad at interest, But how it shall be made strong enough to tie her from the embezzlement of it (if she should be so disposed), I know not, unless there be some deputation from the persons concerned. My desire, therefore, is that you would depute some • trusty friend, whom you may confide in, under the hands and seals of the persons concerned, to take such order for the security of it as they shall find expedient. Your brother was so careful of securing it, that in case of the widow's disposal of any part thereof, without my consent and the consent of Mr. John Goodrich, she should, ipso facto, be deprived of it, and the above-named Joseph and John should immediately enjoy it. I should have sent you a copy of the Will, had it not been too tedious; but the contents of it you have faithfully delivered. My wife is yet living, who was your cousin Jane Coates, and desires to be kindly remembered to vou.

"I am your affectionate and loving kinsman,

"HENRY BULL."

"November 13, 1692.

"COZEN GOODRICH:—Yours I received, inclosed in a letter, and your aunt is in good health. You desire me to send you two or three lines, who is appointed to look after your estate, in case I should depart this life before your aunt. My own

son John, a minister, and Thomas Winlock, my son-in-law, who married my daughter, are entrusted for this business of yours, who I know will be very faithful in mine and your concern. Thus hoping of your health and well being, as blessed be God I enjoy, is all at present.

"From your loving friend and kinsman,

"HENRY BULL."

"Bury, November 24, 1698.

"Brother John:—My kind love to you, and yours; this is to desire you to send to my Cousins, the Goodriches, to let them know their Aunt is dead, and was buried, the 18th day of this instant, November; and I will be glad to see them, and that they have their due. I have met with a great deal of trouble, and would be glad, if it please God to see them, for at this time. I am not well myself. But desire them that they may bring over with them a note from the Chief of the place, with such seal of the County, as they sent me to act for them, in Oct. 78. That they, or we, may have (no) trouble here; and this all at present, from your loving Brother to command.

Henry Bull.."

"Brother pray, if this letter come to your hand, and they come over to Bury, to send me your letter, that I may know they are the men concerned with me, for I know not any of them."

EXTRACT FROM CERTIFICATE.

"1703. May 20. William Warner, as about 57, and Thomas Wells, as about 41, both residents of Wethersfield, before Gov. Winthrop, that they were personally acquainted with John Goodrich, Husbandman, late of Wethersfield, deceased, and that he sometime had a son Joseph, and that said Joseph has been dead about 22 years, and died without issue, and that said John Goodrich, left another son Jonathan, who now is, (since the death of Joseph), his reported only surviving son, and that Jonathan aforesaid of Wethersfield, Tailor; claims certain estate lying in Hedgessett, Engfield, Tailor; claims certain estate lying in Hedgessett, Eng-

land. And that the said Jonathan, who was here present at the signing of this Certificate, being about the age of 38 years, is married, and has several children, and is the one alluded to.

EXTRACT FROM POWER OF ATTORNEY.

1803. May 18. Jonathan Goodrich, Tailor, of Wethersfield, one of the sons of John Goodrich, deceased, appoints Nicholas Hallam of New London, Mariner, to enter and take possession of his estate in Hedgessett, devised to him by will of late William Goodrich of that place.

1726. May. Administration on the estate of Ephraim Goodrich, late of Wethersfield, granted to Susannah, Widow, and William Goodrich of Litchfield.

Robert Goodrich was mayor of Harwick, Essex Co., England, in 1611.

John Goodrich of Wethersfield, Conn., Brother to the William Goodrich, who also settled in that town, and who is called "my brother" by Rev. William Goodrich of Hedgessett, County Norfolk, England, in the will as given in the preceding pages, was twice married: first, to Elizabeth Edwards, daughter of Thomas Edwards of Wethersfield, 1645; she died in childbed July 5th, 1670. Second, to Marv Stoddard, widow of John Stoddard, late of Wethersfield, deceased, and daughter of Nathaniel Foote, one of the first settlers of that town, 1674 (after his death she married Lieut. Thomas Tracy of Norwich, Conn.). Mr. John Goodrich died in April, 1680. Mrs. Mary Goodrich, alias Stoddard, alias Tracy, died, —. [For the descendants of John Goodrich, Sen., see future Parts; if called for.] As he had but two grandsons of the name Goodrich, both by his son Jonathan, viz: Jonathan, born February 1st, 1692 or 1693, and Moses, born July 19th, 1697, and only 2 or 3 great-grandsons, viz: Jonathan, born August 28th, 1741, and John, born April 11th, 1746 (sons of Jonathan), and perhaps Levi, born, 1741, son of Moses, while his brother William had 4 sons, who married and had 26 grandsons, born from 1684 to 1720. It will be readily seen, that nearly all the families of the name Goodrich may expect to trace their line to William of Wethersfield, if either. The descendants of the first John in the female branches, however, have been numerous and highly respectable, embracing the names of Rose, Reed, Wright, Fuller, Maynard, Walker, Hussey, Blood, and Treadway, principal families of Sudbury and Framingham, Mass.

"Ensign William Goodrich, one of the first settlers of Wethersfield, Conn., was married to Sarah Marvin of Hartford, Conn. (daughter of Mathew Marvin), October 4th, 1648, at Hartford (after his death she was married to Capt. William Curtiss, Esq., of Stratford, Conn., son of John Curtiss, one of the first settlers of that town, by whom she had no children, she was his second wife. Capt. William Curtiss, Esq., died Dec. 21st, 1702). Ensign William Goodrich died 1676, aged —. Mrs. Sarah Goodrich, alias Curtiss, died at Stratford, near the close of the year 1702."—"Goodwin's Notes," p. 69.

John Goodrich, second and eldest living son of Ensign William Goodrich, was born May 20th, 1653, and was married to Rebecca, eldest daughter of Capt. John Allen, mariner, March 28th, 1678, at Charlestown, Mass., by Mr. Danforth. "Capt. Allen had but two children, both daughters, Rebecca, who married her first cousin, John, son of Col. David, and Elizabeth, who married Nathaniel Blagrove of Bristol, Bristol Co., Mass."—"Goodwin's Notes."

"John Allen of Charlestown, came, perhaps, in the Abagail, 1635, aged 30, with wife, Ann, aged 30, from some part of Kent, joined the church, 22d of May, 1641, and admitted freeman, 2d of June after. By wife Sarah he had John, born Oct. 16th, 1640, baptized 30th of May, following; Sarah, born August 11th, 1642, died at 4 mos.; Mary, born Feb. 6th, 1644, and perhaps others, certain Rebecca before Samuel, who was born Nov. 29th, 1656, and Sarah again, May 11th, 1659, died at 2 mos. He was member of the artillery com-

pany, 1639, and in 1657 the richest man in the town; a captain and representative in 1668; and died March 27th, 1675. His daughter Mary married Jonathan Rainsford, and second, Joshua Hobart."—"Savage's Gen. Dict.", vol. 1., p. 32.

"Capt. Ephraim Goodrich, fifth child and fourth son of Ensign William, was born June 2d, 1663. He was twice married: first, to Sarah Treat, daughter of Richard Treat, Esq., of Wethersfield, May 20th, 1684, by Samuel Talcott, commissioner, she died January 26, 1712, in the 48th year of her age; second, to Jerusha, widow of Capt. Thomas Welles of Wethersfield, deceased, and daughter of Capt. James Treat of the same town, Dec. 25th, 1712, by Capt. Thomas Wells, justice. Capt. Ephraim Goodrich died February 27th, 1739, aged 76. Mrs. Jerusha Goodrich, alias Welles, died January 15th, 1754, in the 76th year of her age."—"Goodwin's Notes," p. 75.

"Richard Goodrich, eldest son of Capt. Ephraim and Sarah Goodrich, was born Feb. 27th, 1685. He settled in Glastenbury, Conn., but by deed from him to Thomas Welles of Glastenbury, dated in 1725, it appears that he was then residing at Middletown (probably in that part then called Upper Houses, now Cromwell). He married, May 18, 1709, Hannah, daughter of Dr. Charles Bulkley of Wethersfield, who was son of Rev. Gershom Bulkley. She died Sept. 23, 1720, æ. 30."—"Goodwin's Notes". He married, for his second wife, Mehitable, daughter of Samuel Boardman of Middletown.

Deacon David Goodrich, fourth son of Capt. Ephraim, born 1705; settled in Glastenbury; was married to Sarah Edwards, daughter of —— Edwards, February 13th, 1729. He died June 7th, 1779, in the 74th year of his age. His gravestone says, "Dea. David Goodrich, who, on the 7th of June, 1779, at his evening prayer, fell down in an instant, and never saw to make any motion after." She died May 11th, 1799, in the 80th year of her age. They had recorded to them on the Glastenbury records, the births of 6 sons and 5 daughters. For dates see *Part Two*.

Capt. John Goodrich, eldest son of Deacon David, born 1730; resided in Glastenbury; he married, in 1752, for his first wife, Prudence Talcott, daughter of Col. Elizur Talcott, by whom he had one son, John, born the same year. After the close of the French and Indian War, by the surrender of Canada to the English in 1760, Captain Goodrich married for second wife, Abagail Deming, daughter of Daniel Deming, Oct. 8, 1761, by whom he had two sons and 3 daughters. Capt. John Goodrich died October 12, 1774, aged 44.

John Goodrich, only son of Capt. John by his first wife, Prudence, born 1752; married, July 10th, 1779. Mrs. Eunice Atwater of New Haven, widow of Dr. David, and daughter of Andrew Thomson, by whom he had 2 sons and 3 daughters. The eldest of these daughters, Frances (or Fanny), born Dec. 19, 1780, married Chester Hammond of Bolton, Conn., born Nov. 25th, 1779, who was descendant in the sixth generation from Thomas Hammond, senior of Lavenham Co., Suffolk, England, who married Rose Trippe, May 14, 1573. Chester and Frances (Goodrich) Hammond were the parents of Col. Charles Goodrich Hammond, a well-known citizen of Chicago, Ill.

Copy of a letter from Hezekiah Goodrich of Norwich, Windsor Co., Vt., dated Sept. 20, 1837. The original loaned me by Mr. Henry B. Goodrich of Stockbridge, Mass., Sept., 1848.

"Dear Sir:—On my return from the State of New York, my kinsman Levi showed me a letter received from you last summer, the contents of which were pleasing, that some one of the name should undertake to trace the rise and progress of our family. I made the attempt some years ago, but my knowledge and opportunity were inadequate; yet, if any information I have received can be of any use to you, I shall be happy to give it. John and William were brought to America by their mother's brother, William Stillman. Their parents both died when they were young, and their uncle, Stillman, brought them up. Where they landed first, I know

not; they settled at New Haven the year you have named. John had a call to return, as a legacy was left him by the oldest son. William settled in New Haven, had 4 sons as you state. David was the branch from which I sprung. He was born at New Haven, June 11th, 1666 (4). grandfather, Josiah, was born in Wethersfield, June 15th, 1690 (5), had Josiah, my father, born August 22d, 1717, died Jan. 25, 1806. His brothers were, Samuel and Aaron, and one sister, by his first wife, Sarah Porter, two by his second wife, David and John, the account of whom you have received from Levi. My father had 2 sons and 2 daughters by his first wife, Grace Grant of Tolland, to wit, Eleazer, born Feb. 22d, 1743, died Sept. 13th, 1822. Sarah, born August 18th, 1746 (still living). David, born May 8th, 1748, died Feb. 16th, 1827. Elizabeth, born May 19th, 1751, died Oct. 19th, 1803. Hezekiah, born June 30, 1754, died Aug. 10th, 1756. First wife died April 7th, 1756. My father married the widow Mary Porter, June 30th, 1756, and had by her, Hezekiah (the writer of this), born May 10th, 1757, now living. Josiah, born Dec. 22d, now living. Mary, born May 27th, 1760, died Sept. 1st, 1767. Ruth, born June 18th, 1765, died April 21st, 1796. Charles, born Nov. 14th, 1767, died Aug. 14th, 1775. Mary, born Sept. 18, 1770, died Aug. 7th, 1775. Eleazer, my oldest brother, had 4 sons and 6 daughters. David had 5 sons and 3 daughters. My brother Josiah had 2 sons, I daughter, now living. I never had but one child, a daughter, now living in the State of New York. As to the posterity of William, the first settler, his two grandsons went to the East; one settled in Lansingburgh, and the other in Woburn, which have spread the name through the East. Many of them begin to spell the name Goodridge; I have seen some of them, and find they originated from the same stock. Some of Col. David's sons settled in Great Barrington, from whence they spread through the State of New York and Vermont, and the fact is, the name is now so numerous, it is impossible to trace it up to the present generation; but there is no question that all the name in America from the *Old Stone Castle*, now standing in South Wales, or was, in 1796, known by the name of *Goodrich Castle*, which has stood more than a thousand years. A captain from a vessel from England of the name of Goodrich was in New Haven about 40 years since, who said the *Castle* was still *firm*, that the name of Goodrich was almost gone in Great Britain

"I am of the opinion that the origin of the Welch nation came from Jacob, surnamed Israel. There is an account of a family, settled in Phenicia, who fled from Shalmaneser (or one of the conquerers of Israel). They lived there some time, and increased, but troublesome times came on, and they all removed at once into Gaul, or France, and remained there some time, at length they all, with one accord, removed into South Wales, and built them a strong castle, to defend themselves against the petty chieftains on the island. They practised many rites, and ceremonies, and customs of the Jews, in particular, not to join their sons and daughters in marriage to surrounding nations. They inhabited there till they made one chief, called David, an interesting man, who was an exceeding good man to the poor, and very rich, and called by the poor class, David, the good man, and the higher class, the rich man, in their language, which words, put together in our language, made Goodrich.

"Thus we derived our name, which is seldom found on the earth, except in North America, especially in the western parts of the State of New York. In almost every town and village I have found some of the name, and most of them originated in Connecticut.

"The most of Col. David's sons settled on Connecticut River, 63 years ago. I found shoots of the name in Haddam, Chatham, Glastenbury, and Wethersfield, My great uncle, Charles, lived in Pittsfield, and my uncle, Benjamin, in Egmont; my father lived in Pittsfield, but when he removed from there I was only 10 years old.

"As to the correctness of the name Goodrich, I believe there are but few names in America that have stood so long, and become so numerous, that have escaped being punished as a criminal, but never have I heard or known of one of the name of Goodrich convicted of a capital crime. They are not of the richest class of people, but very comfortable, generally possess a handsome property. Seldom rise to the highest office in the state, but often employed in public trusts, in state, county, church, and military concerns. I have been a representative, captain, magistrate, and deacon myself. The whole race, as far as I am acquainted, appear to be honest, quiet, peaceable, and good citizens. I must draw to a close, as my kinsman, Levi, expects to add something to yourself. I shall, therefore, hand this over to him to finish, hoping you will make all reasonable allowance for my inaccuracy and blunders, for you will see I am in my 81st year. I never had the privilege of school. I was carried to Pittsfield when I was but 6 years old; no school there, and thence into the wilds of Vermont at 10 years old; no school there; but what little learning I have, I got from my parents' rainy days, and that light enough. Learning is very natural to the name.



INTRODUCTION TO PART TWO.

THE following additional information in relation to the old Goodrich Castle and Goodrich Court in South Wales has been received since the publication of Part One:

A record of the Goodrich Family was partly compiled and arranged by the late Rev. Hiram P. Goodrich of St. Louis, Mo.; a work for the proper execution of which he seems to have been admirably qualified, and upon which, as a labor of love, he expended years of investigation, toil, travel, and much treasure; twice crossing and recrossing the Atlantic. As the result of these labors was seriously damaged by the great Chicago fire, October, 1871, the following letter or statement which he furnished Judge Aaron Goodrich of St. Paul, Minn., may aid or interest such as seek to restore, so far as may now be possible, that which was so unfortunately destroyed.

ST. LOUIS, Oct. 8th, 1855.

DEAR SIR:—I received yours a few days since and thank you much, for your mention of Josiah and Samuel Goodrich enables me to correct an error of copying and to unite the lists.

I can give your line back from Josiah on the testimony of Weathersfield Records.

William Goodrich and Sarah Marvin, both born in England, and married 1648; had nine children:

Of these, Josiah had many children, of whom Josiah and Hezekiah lived near Hanover, N. H.; Eleasur, David, and Hezekiah I know not where. Samuel, next to Aaron, married Elizabeth Whiting, and had:

According to Weathersfield Records, the first Goodrich there was William, who bought Thomas Uffoots' (?) right in 1646; his brother John, who settled first at Guilford, came there later. Tradition there says they were orphan children, brought to America by William Stillman, their mother's brother.

Beside our stock, Richard Goodrich of Guilford, 1640, whose line I can not trace far; Bartholomew of Branford, 1667, whose line I have; John and William Goodridge of Boston, 1637 and 1640, whose line through the sons Joseph,

Jeremy, and Benjamin I have. The Virginia Goodriches are partly of our line and partly not yet traced. A branch of them were the only Tories of our name in the Revolution.

I am still collecting materials for a complete lineage of all the Goodriches, but I know not when I can publish.

I think we are Saxon and not Norman, for I find Goodriches from the eighth century down, and have gathered two hundred names out of the "Doomsday-Book", made by the Conqueror, 1080. Goodrich Castle, in Wales (now Goodrich Court), "was given to the Earl of Pembroke as early as 1204, and must have been taken from our family before that.

* I am not unmindful of the labor incident to the preparation of this valuable contribution to our family record, yet it should tell of the origin, names, achievements, and sufferings of a line reaching beyond the field of Hastings. If such a record be now possible, it can only be produced by the employment of much skill and research. As no man knows the grave of Harold, "the last of the Saxon kings," who fell fighting for the altars and fires of Britain, who shall say where the uncrowned sons of Godwin sleep, or determine the amount of blood and treasure contributed by the House or Castle of Goodrich? They too were Saxon-loval to Harold and his cause. William would blot from the memory of the land the names of its bravest defenders, placing in their stead those who furthered his designs; of these the historian was permitted to write; thus we learn that Elizabeth, daughter and heiress of Gilbert, Earl of Shrewsbury, married Henry Grey, eighth Earl of Kent; and in 1706, Henry Grey, twelfth Earl of Kent, was created Viscount Goodrich, of Goodrich Castle, and in 1710, Duke of Kent. His descendant, the Right Honorable Frederick John Robinson, was created Viscount Goodrich, April 25th, 1827. Thus does an ancient Saxon fortress confer dignity upon the descendants of the victorious Norman,

Verily---

"The Norman came with iron hand,
And from our fathers reft the land."

GOODRICH COURT AND GOODRICH CASTLE.

These structures should not be confounded. In December, 1862, I visited both. GOODRICH is admirably situated near the Wye, four miles southwest from Ross ("here dwelt ye man of Ross") and six miles northeast from Monmouth. Here was born "Harry of Monmouth." An ancient stone cross, a

church with a history, and a cemetery containing sepulchral monuments, from the shields of which time has long since blotted the names they were raised to commemorate, will attract the attention of the curious visitor.

Near Pencraig House you obtain a combined view of GOODRICH COURT and GOODRICH CASTLE. The former is a palace or residence, modern in point of years, yet of a baronial or castellated type, standing upon commanding and finely-chosen grounds near the Wve. It was the seat of the late Sir Samuel Rush Meyrick, LL. D., by whom it was built with a seeming disregard of cost. It is enriched and adorned by a collection of ancient arms and armor, the most costly, curious, and instructive ever gathered and possessed by one man. This collection was made by LLewelyn Meyrick, Esq., LL.B., S.A., costing the labor of a life, coupled with the expenditure of much treasure. These precious gatherings are placed within walls which seem to mock the ravages of time, and were admirably arranged by Sir Samuel. (He arranged the ancient arms in the Tower of London at the instance of the government.) The preservation of these arms and armor is made a perpetual trust. Thus do they rest from their labors with a reasonable prospect that their works may follow them. Should the spoiler come these gems may yet live in the admirable descriptions of Doctor Meyrick and the faithful illustrations by Joseph Skelton, F.S.A.

The CASTLE is one of the most picturesque and attractive of the ancient remains which abound in this part of the island:—

"A gentle hill its side inclines, Lovely in England's fadeless green, To meet the rapid stream which winds Through this romantic scene."

S. C. Hall says: "Goodrich Castle is the relic of a noble fortalice, and would seem (seated on the topmost height of a hill that overlooks the rapid river, and aided by its broad moat which time has not yet filled up) to have been impregnable; it was not so. Whatever its ancient glory may have been, it was doomed to fall before the persevering energy of the troops of the Commonwealth, and 'the eighty barrels of powder' which 'the Commons voted' as auxilaries to their officer, Col. Birch. He found the work, however, notwithstanding the added succors of 'battering cannon—two monster pieces', and 'six granadoes', by no means easy, for the garrison, under brave Sir Richard Lingen, kept him 'without' from the 22d of June to the 3d of August, 1646, which so exasperated the assailants that they refused to recognize a 'white flag for parley', insisted upon 'unconditional surrender', and made prisoners of war the Governor and all his troops, with their arms, ammunition, and provisions." After a thorough inspectation of the fortress

"From donion keep to turret wall,"

I turned from its half-shaded and ivy-covered ruins, with its story of a thousand 'years, and looked again on Goodrich Court, which, in all its grandeur and perfection, yet seemed to say:

"There is a power

And magic in the ruined battlement,

To which the palace of the present hour

Must yield its pomp, and wait till ages are its dower."

As the time for my departure drew near, my desire to remain increased. Recrossing the grounds, I approached a commanding position and took a last lingering look at the field. No strife was seen, no assault upon the fortress, no warrior frowned from its ruined battlements. Yet I remembered that in the olden time:—

"Here, above all, was a castle vigorously besieged; every spot in and about was the scene of a conflict, a flight, a pursuit; that where the slaughtered fell, there were they buried.—What is not burial-ground in war?"

There was no human being visible, yet I said farewell: stepped lightly upon the sod which, perchance, covers all that remains of some brave man who went down beneath the shock of battle. A moment later I stood upon the king's highway, which led me back to Ross.

This note to the statement of Dr. Goodrich is written at the request of parties possessing the right to command.

FOUR GENERATIONS OF THE DESCENDANTS OF WILLIAM AND SARAH (MARVIN) GOODRICH OF WETHERSFIELD, CONN.

"Sir Robert Southwell, sold Hardwick, Mch. 26, 1585, to THOMAS GOODRICH of Clifford's Inn, London, gentlemen.

"On the 15th of February, 1589 (thirty-first year of Queen Elizabeth), Goodrich, probably in consequence of some defect in the original patent, surrendered this property to her majesty, who, on the 4th April following, granted it to Richard Branthwaite of London, and Roger Bromley of Bagworth Park in the county of Leicester, Esqrs., by whom, on the following day, it was reconveyed to Goodrich. By his testament, dated 25th Oct., 1597 (proved in London on the last day of January, 1597-8), THOMAS GOODRICH willed that Margaret his wife should have, to her and her heirs, all his lands in Bury, and all his lands and tenements called Hardwick lands in Suffolk, with full power to sell the same at her discretion, to the intent to maintain herself and bring up her children, and to give them reasonable portions at their several ages of one-and-twenty years, or at their days of marriage; and also that she should, at her good pleasure, maintain her father and mother, and her brother Edward, in all things

necessary and convenient during their lives; and that his daughter Frances should remain with said father and mother. And all his goods and chattels he gave his wife for that intent, and appointed her sole executrix.

"In the forty-third year of Queen Elizabeth (Apl. 20, 1601), Margaret, widow of Thomas Goodrich, then the wife of John Bull of Hardwick, gentlemen, joined with her trustees in a sale of Hardwick to Thomas Stanton of Bury St. Edmund's, mercer."*

FIRST GENERATION.

I. i. William¹ Goodrich, b. ; m. Oct. 4, 1648, Sarah, dau. of Mathew and Elizabeth Marvin of Hartford, Conn.

Of William¹ Goodrich of Wethersfield, Conn., very little is known, with certainty, about our ancestor previous to the date of his marriage with Miss Sarah Marvin in 1648, except that he had an older brother, John, and the Rev. William Goodrich of Hedgesset in County Suffolk, Eng., calls them both "my brothers" in will. (See "Goodrich Memorial", Part One, p. 18–19.)

The effort of "Bond", p. 777, and "Goodwin", p. 69, to identify or connect these settlers at Wethersfield with those of the same name at Watertown, Mass., does not seem satisfactorily established; and the tradition so common, thirty years since, of their having been brought from England to New Haven by their mother's brother, William Stillman (see Part One, p. 26), does not seem to be any better proven; as the name Goodrich is not found on the New-Haven Colonial Records, and the only settler of the

name Stillman, found in New England by Hon. James Savage before 1692, was "George of Hadley, Mass., 1686." (See "N.-E. Gen. Dict.", Vol. IV., p. 196.)

"The Colonial Records of Conn." (Hartford) give us entries for John Goodrich, Nov. 10, 1643; juryman, Dec. 4, 1645; Mch. 4, 1646; and Sept. 7, 1648.

The first entry found on the Conn. Records relative to William¹ Goodrich is that of his marriage to Sarah Marvin in 1648; as he was not admitted as a freeman of Connecticut till May 15, 1656, we may suppose that he was a younger man than his brother John, who was married at Wethersfield in 1645. We have hitherto been unable to find the date of his birth or his age at time of his death in 1676. He was deputy from Wethersfield to the general court holden at Hartford, May 15, 1662, and also one of the grand jury.

His being called "Ensign Wm. Goodrich" in 1676, just after the close of King Philip's war, may justify the inference that he was in some way connected with that terrible conflict.

As it would be difficult to form a correct estimate of the character of a man without taking into consideration the peculiarities of the times in which he lived and the circumstances by which he was surrounded. (See Introduction to "The Foote Family. By Nathaniel Goodwin, Hartford, Conn., 1849," pp. iii.—iv.):

"On the banks of the Connecticut, twenty miles below its last rapids and forty miles above its mouth, at one of those graceful bends which the river makes while winding through meadows which it beautifies and nourishes, stands the ancient town of Wethersfield,—the eldest born of the many sweet villages which adorn this valley. To this spot, then known as Pyquag, the English colonist first turned his steps in or prior to 1635, attracted doubtless by its fertile soil, its pure and navigable waters, and its supposed facilities for internal trade in furs and other traffic with the Indians. And to this spot, one year later, came

a portion of that 'goodly company' who left the jurisdiction of Massachusetts and their newly-acquired homesteads and farms in Watertown, and other settlements in the neighborhood of Boston, in pursuit of territory 'further west', where they might 'better maintain their ministers', 'find larger accomodations for their cattle', and welcome 'more of their friends from England' who were suffering for the faith once delivered to the Saints. Among those who voluntarily placed a wilderness of one hundred miles between themselves and the settlements on the coast, and whose ashes now repose in the burying-ground on which the shadow of the first meeting-house fell, we find the names of Nathaniel Foote, Samuel Boardman, James Boosey, Enoch Buck, Clement Chaplin, Leonard Chester, John Deming, Robert Francis, John Goodrich, William Goodrich, John Hollister, John Nott, John Robbins, John Stoddard, Richard Treat, Thomas Welles, Thomas Wright, and others,—names which their descendants, and all the friends of civil and religious freedom should hold in everlasting remembrance. Some of their descendants, from generation to generation, have continued to reside on their ancestral farms and in the old town, whilst others early left the mother-hive for land 'still further west', until some of the same name and lineage are to be found in every State between the Atlantic and Pacific Oceans. Wherever they are to be found, in prosperous or adverse fortune, their hearts still fondly turn to this fountain-head of their family on this continent,—all proud to trace back their genealogy to the heroic age of New England, and to this quiet resting-place of their fathers on the banks of the beautiful Connecticut. To help all such who may claim the connection and lineage of William Goodrich, one of the first settlers of Weathersfield,—to illustrate the spirit and manners of the times in which he lived,-to exhibit some of the peculiar trials and sufferings to which he and his immediate descendants were exposed,—and to give brief biographical sketches of several of the name

who have left their mark on the age to which they belonged,—the following pages are devoted."

Also from "Historical Sketches of Meriden, Conn." By Rev. George W. Perkins, pastor of the First Congregational Church of that place, and afterward first pastor of the First Congregational Church of Chicago. This last-mentioned work being the outgrowth of a Thanksgiving sermon preached at Meriden from Psalms lxxx., vs. 8, 9, and 10; "Thou hast brought a vine out of Egypt", etc.:

"I have thus presented my readers with a few sketches of olden time. But I am well aware that the previous pages give a very imperfect view of the real worth of our fathers. For records and documents usually present only the bad or ludicrous side of human nature. The church, really holy and energetic, has but little business which goes on the records, though its members work like true men, and leave deep and permanent their mark on the community. But when offences and divisions and cases of discipline occur, these fill up the records. One who reads such documents, therefore, finds the evil which has transpired fully embalmed, while the remembrance of the good has perished or must be sought in other monuments. has it been with our fathers. Something which is bad or ludicrous, something defective or rough according to our views of civilization and progress, attracts our notice, and we insensibly form an unfavorable opinion of their character. I fear that these pages may be charged with fostering such a mistake. We ought not, therefore, to forget the true heroism, the noble conscientiousness, the farreaching sagacity of those stern men in the wilderness. who, in the midst of perils, discouragements, and poverty, laid broad and deep the foundations of New-England institutions. Let me, therefore, in conclusion suggest some thoughts which may serve to bring out more distinctly both their disadvantage and their excellencies.

"Let us go back one hundred and eighty years, and look at them and their circumstances on the spot where the

first village in the town was built. It is Sabbath morning; but how different from our Sabbaths. With the exception of that little spot where the village stands, the eye wanders over a wide wilderness and forest, in whose deep recesses the savage was then lurking. You look around for the church and see a little low building 28 by 24, and ten feet high, built of logs, without chimney or steeple. About twenty-five houses, small and low, make up the whole of the village. As the time of public worship approaches, each man steps out of his house with a loaded musket on his shoulder, and powder-horn, and shot-bag slung around his neck. The little congregation are soon gathered into the house of God, and the humble settlement is still, save the tramp of armed sentinels who pace backward and forward in the narrow space which they call a street. For there is war, not war a thousand miles off fought by hired mercenaries, whom we send away to butcher or be butchered, as the case may be, and whose marches and exploits just serve to make the newspapers interesting and exciting; but war around their own houses; war from savages who have conspired to exterminate the white man; war which may burst like thunder on their homes, and let loose the tomahawk and scalpingknife on their families at any moment.

"We will enter the church. There, on rough board seats, are about 60 or 70 men, women, and children, and on a little block or platform stands the minister. He prays for protection from the Lord God of hosts, and that prayer means something, when the next note they hear may be the warwhoop ringing out from the adjacent forest: and there is not a solitary house nor an arm to help them, nearer than Hartford or New Haven. He preaches: and the hopes of heaven, the consolations of religion mean something, when within their earthly horizon there is only wilderness, poverty, and war. The congregation looks poor and rough in their apparel, and there is sad meaning in the loaded musket on which each manly head is bent as he stands up for prayer.

"But there are manly and earnest hearts underneath that unpromising exterior, and there is the deep devotion of men who from their inmost souls honor God and feel their dependence on him.

"Mark the contrasts now. Look over that same land-scape and see on every valley and hill-top the marks of labor, wealth, and taste. Hundreds elegantly dressed—perhaps too much so—are crowding into a spacious church, where art has done its utmost to gratify the taste and promote the comfort of the worshipper. I wish I could say that all who lounge on these elegant and luxurious seats sent up as devout homage to God as went up from that old log-church. Luxuries and improvements which those old "planters" never dreamed of are lavishly scattered through our houses and over our town.

"Look again: you see a traveler starting from Hartford on his way to New Haven. He is on horseback, with heavy saddle-bags depending from the saddle, and perhaps with pistols at his saddle-bow. After passing Wethersfield, he drives into the forest where there is only a 'bridle path' cut out through the trees. Slowly picking his way among stumps and swamps, with now and then some trepidation as an Indian crosses his path, he reaches toward nightfall the old stone-house called Meriden, and is glad to find that its stout doors and shutters can resist all hostile attacks. The next morning, at early dawn, he commences another hard day's journey, and has hardly gone beyond the tavern-door, when he spies a troop of gaunt wolves upon Mount Lamentation, just returning from their night's hunt. He gets almost bemired in passing the swamp and unbridged stream at Pilgrim's Harbor, and about noon reaches the little settlement at Wallingford. In that day when mails and newspapers were unknown, but human curiosity was no less intense than it is now, the traveler was the news-bearer. So our horseman as he enters the street is quickly besieged with the towns-people, inquisitive for the most recent intelligence.

He tells them perhaps that a letter was received in Hartford but a week before he left, which had been brought through from Boston in three days. In this letter was the latest intelligence from Europe. The 'Sea-bird', after a quick passage of two months, had brought the news of the death of Charles II., and of the accession of James four months ago. He gives them the latest account of the elections in Massachusetts and Plymouth, which took place three weeks previous, and adds a few items about the state of the Indians and the arrivals of emigrants. But he must hasten on; so leaving the country people to digest their news, he proceeds, wades through deep sands and salt marshes, and by sunset of the second day arrives safely at New Haven.

"Contrast that journey with the telegraph which carries news from Boston to New Haven in less than a second, and the railroad-car which transports the traveler in one hour from Hartford to New Haven in what may be appropriately styled a flying palace.

"Contrast their poverty with our wealth, their inability for some years to build for a house of worship a log-cabin, such as any single journeyman now could pay for out of his own pocket without feeling it. Contrast their poor schools and poorer school-houses with our elegant school-houses and academies, where are the most lavish aids for the comfort and intellectual progress of the pupils. Let us look at these contrasts and be thankful.

"But while we may smile at some of the awkwardness and roughness of our fathers, let us remember that we have reached our present stage of progress because those fathers of ours were MEN, Christian men, New-England men. One hundred and eighty years ago, there was more of the outward adornments and indications of civilization in China than in Connecticut. But China has stood still, and Connecticut has made progress. Why? Becaue in Connecticut God had breathed into the souls of our fathers the breath of life—Christianity and all the invigorating

and elevating influences which ever accompany a true Christiany. Had they been vicious, heathenish, mean-souled, and degraded, we should now have been the ever-degenerating sons of a degenerate race.

"Back to the institutions which they founded, the character which they transmitted to their children must we trace the causes of the growth, intelligence, and wonderful improvement of the present day. Whatever is really valuable in Meriden now, stands out as the true history and the best monument of our fathers.

"Let us then this day, with grateful hearts, THANK GOD that such men lived and toiled before us; and embalm their memories by imitating their virtues."


As the compiler of this "Goodrich Family Memorial" is credited in the Preface to these pamphlets with having afforded valuable assistance in collecting material for them, he has felt more at liberty to make extracts than he might otherwise have done. We may obtain some idea of the comparative extent of the English settlements in our country at the time of the death of Ensign Wm. Goodrich, A.D. 1676 (one hundred years previous to the Declaration of Independence), from the following "map of Connecticut showing the Settlements in 1670."

This map, copied from the Meriden pamphlet, "is a mere outline only designed to show distinctly how few and feeble were the settlements in Connecticut at this time."

Natives of Connecticut will readily understand the names of the settlements from their location and initial letter. For the benefit of others, the appended exposition is given.

Could our ancestors of 213 years ago now take a seat in a palace-car on one of the trans-continental railways, and make the trip from ocean to ocean, would they not have a more vivid impression of the scope of the text than even the Israelites of the days of Solomon.

It had been intended to make several other extracts



from these pamphlets, but on attempting to make a selection, it was found so difficult to decide what to omit where all seemed to possess so much interest, that it was decided to present in "Part Two" only the conclusion of the "Meriden" pamphlet, pp. 97–103, and to express the hope that the "New-Haven Colony Hist. Soc." or some kindred institution may republish the whole, if they have not already done so. For a farther illustration of the times about the date of Ensign William's death, the following foot-note, by the compiler, is taken from the "Towne Family Memorial", pp. 23, 4:

"It is believed that very few of the present generation have any adequate idea of the terrible nature of the struggle that our ancestors were engaged in, at this time, for their very existence, as well as for home, and all that the word implies. There can be no doubt that it was the most severe and bloody war that this country was ever engaged in, taking into consideration the destruction of life and property in proportion to what was exposed to its ravages.

"Although it lasted but about one year, yet more than 600 men, women, and children fell victims to the bullet, the tomahawk, and the scalping-knife of the savage foe; more than 18 towns and villages were either entirely or partially destroyed and abandoned; more than 600 families were burned out, and so great was the suffering and destitution, that subscriptions were taken up, in many places, for their relief.

"Very few of those in this country who have recently so nobly and generously contributed for the relief of the suffering in Ireland, knew that they were repaying an obligation more than two hundred years old. Yet it is a matter of history that on the 7th of Aug., 1676, a vessel sailed from Dublin, Ireland, laden with provisions to the amount of several thousand dollars for the relief of the destitute in the colonies of Mass., R. I., and Conn. Those interested in a more full account of these matters, should

read the introduction to 'Goodwin's Foote Family'; and 'N.-E. Gen. Reg.', Vol. II., pp. 245-50.

"Verily, the Word of the Lord standeth sure: 'Cast thy bread upon the waters; for thou shalt find it again after many days', and 'Give a portion to seven, and also to eight; for thou knowest not what evil shall be upon the earth.' ECCL. XI., 1, 2."

It is not uncommon for compilers of genealogical works to hear expressions of surprise at the errors so often found in copies from ancient records. It may, perhaps, assist in removing a portion of such surprise, to give fac-simile copies of a portion of such records as published "By Authority of the State of Connecticut." (See "Colonial Records", Vol. I., p. 9, and p. 134.):

"The first day of May, 1637, Gentall Corte att "Harteford.

"It is ordered that there shalbe an offensive warr agt the Pequoitt, and that there shalbe 90 men levied out of the 3 Plantacons, Harteford, Weathersfeild & Windsor (vizt) out of Harteford 42, Windsor 30, Weathersfeild 18: vnder the Comande of Captaine Jo: Mason & in Case of death or sickness vnder the Comand of Robite Seely Leift, & the 'Idest Stieant or military officer survivinge, if both miscary.

"It is ordered that Harteford shall send 14 Armour in this designe, Windsor 6.

"It is ordered that there shalbe thh of good beare for the Captaine & Mr & sick men, if there be only 3 or 4 gallons of stronge water, 2 gallons of sacke."

"Deceber the first, 1645.

"Its Ordered, that the Plantation cauled Tunxis shalbe cauled Farmington, and that * * * Mr. Steele is intreated for the present to be recorder there, vntill the Towne haue one fitt among theselues."

It is ordered stated on the form of the state of the services of the sound of the services of

(Fohn Steel (Secretary, 1636_1639.)

From this specimen of Recorder Steel's chirography, and the fact that he was considered superior to any that the new town could provide among themselves, may serve to explain the difficulty of correctly reading such records when time-worn and faded.

The only other official mention of William¹ Goodrich that I have been able to find is the following from "Colonial Records of Connecticut", Vol. II., p. 17.:

"Mr. Samuel Wells is confirmed in the place and office of a Lieutenant to ye Train Band at Wethersfield; and William Goodrich, Ensigne.

"General Assembly at Hartford, May 11, 1665."

With regard to the wife of William Goodrich, Miss Sarah (Marvin), our information is more full and satisfactory. When Gov. John Winthrop, Jr., was fitting out his great fleet at London for the settlement at the mouth of the Connecticut River in the spring and summer of 1635, we find in one of the largest lists of passengers, dated April 15th: "Theis parties hereafter expressed are to be transported to New England, imbargued in the Increase, Robert Lea, master." In this list, numbering 77 persons, aged from 55 years down to 5 weeks, are found "Mathew Marvin, husbandman, 35; his wife Elizabeth, 31; sister Elizabeth, 31; and four children: Mathew, 8; Marie, 6; Sara, 3; and Hanna, æ. 6 mos."

He settled at Hartford, Conn., and little Miss Sarah, the 3-year-old emigrant, married our William¹ Goodrich in 1648; she being then in her seventeenth year. She survived her first husband some 26 years, and married, as second husband, Capt. Wm. Curtiss, Esq., of Stratford, Conn. (See "Coll. Mass. Hist. Soc., Vol. VIII., of the Third Series", p. 261; "Goodwin's Notes", p. 69; "Savage's Gen. Dict.", Vol. III., p. 164; and "Porter's Hist. Notices of Conn.", No. I., p. 121.

Elizur⁴ Goodrich, D.D., grandfather of Dr. C. A. Goodrich, an American clergyman and scholar, born in Wethersfield, Conn., October 26, 1734, died in Norfolk, Conn., Nov. 21 [22], 1797. He was graduated at Yale College in 1752, and was tutor there in 1755. So deeply interested was he in mathematics and astronomy, that in the busiest scenes of his subsequent ministry he rarely failed to calculate the eclipses of each successive year; and when the aurora borealis of 1780 made its appearance, he drew up one of the fullest and most accurate accounts of it ever published, with exact drawings of the auroral arch. Nov., 1756, he was ordained minister of the Congregational Church in Durham, in which office he continued till his death. He gave 14 hours daily to severe intellectual labor; was an accomplished teacher, having prepared some 300 young men for college and public life; and was also an active friend of the Revolution, preaching on the right of resistance, and urging his people to lay down their property and lives in the conflict. He published several sermons, and left behind him some hundreds of elaborate essays on difficult passages of Scripture.

He was also for a time mayor of Hartford.
