

THE HERRINGS

The Herrings, according to the earliest records, were Danish vikings. They gradually spread over England, Scotland and the North of Ireland. The following names are found used interchangeably in the American records, viz.: Herring, Herrin, Herin, Herren, Herran, Hearing, Herron and Heron. The first immigrants to this country of the name were Sir Edward Heron and Mr. Richard Heron (alderman), "gentlemen adventurers," who came to Virginia in 1620.¹

Other early immigrants were John Heron, who embarked in the ship "Expedition" from Gravesend, July, 1635, and was aged 20.² There was another John Heron, who came to this country in 1635 in the "Paul," aged 18, embarking from London. Then there was Jo Herring, in 1635, in the "Alexander," bound for the Barbados, aged 28. John Herring's name appears in Savage's Gen. Dic. He was engaged in 1687 in London in receiving conveyance from Judith, widow and executrix of Stephen Winthrop, as he proposed coming to this country (N. E.).

The above names, written so differently, have been recorded in the same document four distinct ways. It is quite common and usual to find the surname in the grants made out to Herron and find the party referred to sign his name Herring. There were a great many regal grants and patents to the Herrings, Herrons and Herons, in Virginia, North Carolina and South Carolina. In North Carolina they are dated as early as 1717.³ They

held many positions of honor in colonial and Revolutionary times.¹

Letters of Sir Thomas Herring, Archbishop of Canterbury, who was born 1693 and died 1757, and of Norfolkshire, England, state that he had four nephews who came to America. One of these was named William Herring and these were most probably the sons of the Archbishop's brother, William Herring. The Archbishop's Arms were three herrings haurient, etc. The crest a dove with a bishop's mitre, and with an olive branch in its beak. The motto: "*Dum spiro, spero*" ("Whilst there is life, there is hope").²


It is tradition that the Herrings of Pendleton County, South Carolina, first settled in Edgefield County and that they were of "Scotch-Irish ancestry" and "descended from the early Virginia colonists, and that William Herring and his four brothers fought in the War of the Revolution in the Battle of Cowpens, in South Carolina, under General Morgan, which took place January 17, 1781. In this engagement, William Herring was wounded in the right cheek. This injury caused the loss of his eye and eventually his death. He was granted 222 acres of land "situated in Ninety-sixth District, on a branch called Dry Creek, waters of Little Saluda." This grant was dated April 25, 1786.³ This was for 138 acres. Another tract was for 84 acres and was granted April 28, 1788, "on waters of Mine Creek."⁴ The first

He married Abigail Harrison, a descendant of the James River Harrisons. This family are said to be entitled to bear the same Arms, differing only in the crest, which is a boar's head holding in its mouth four arrows. These Herrings were given their Arms, etc., for saving the King's life while boar hunting. There were four brothers, and one of them lost his life in the encounter (ref. Dr. Burke Chrisman). Alexander Herring had issue: No. 1, John Herring; No. 2, Jesse Herring, killed in the Revolution; No. 3, Leonard Herring, who also fought in the Revolution, went West and had several children; No. 4, William Herring, made lieutenant in 1778, and qualified as captain October 24, 1780. He married Elizabeth Stephenson. No. 5, Bethuel Herring.

place described was called the "Mill Place." In 1790, January 27, he sold it to James Salter.¹ This land adjoined James Cox's place. The Coxes were closely allied to the Herrings.

William Herring and family then moved to Pendleton County, where he bought land from Samuel Dalrymple, December 27, 1790. The Herring names appearing as witnesses to this purchase were Jacob, Isaac and Ephraim Herring. This tract was 320 acres and is described as "lying on Generostee Creek, waters of Savannah River." This document is dated December 27, 1790. This property lies very near Anderson, the present county seat. In this transfer the name appears written as follows: Herron, Herren and Herrin, and is signed William Herring. In 1813 he had 1,000 acres surveyed for him. It lay in Oconee County, near the county line, and adjoined Elisha Herring's land. William Herring's will was made in 1812. His son Elisha was his executor. He died about 1819. The following properties he conveyed to his various children:

No. 1. To his son Elisha Herring, 80 acres "lying on waters of Big Generostee Creek," January 19, 1804.

No. 2. To his son Stephen Herring, 110 acres, conveyed September 1, 1801. This reads: "between William Herring of the County of Pendleton, State of South Carolina, planter, of the one part and Stephen Herring, planter, of the other part," etc., "all that plantation whereon Stephen Herring now lives, lying on the Generostee Creek, waters of Savannah River."

No. 3. His daughter married William Jolly and to him he conveyed 100 acres, August 11, 1811. This is also described as "on waters of Generostee Creek, close to fence of Elijah Herring's land, east side of Little Rocky Creek." The Jollys intermarry with the Herrings. They were evidently of French extraction; the name being originally Joulee. Daniel Joulee of St. James, Santee P., and Constant June, spinster, married March 13, 1783.² They took notable part in the Revolutionary War. His brother, John Jolly, married Sarah Palmer and bore the rank of lieutenant in 1780. He was killed that year or the following

either at Leighton's or Fairforest. Joseph Jolly was captain in 1776. Benjamin Jolly was major and died before marriage. William Jolly's will is recorded in Franklin County, Ga., where the Jollys and the Herrings later removed.

No. 4. William Herring conveyed to his son-in-law (?) Peter Keys 50 acres, January 20, 1807,¹ also "lying on waters of Big Generostee Creek, waters of Savannah River."

William Herring had another son, (No. 5) Elijah Herring.

No. 1. Elisha Herring was probably his eldest son, as his father appointed him his executor. Elisha conveys the same tract from his father noted above to his son (A) Francis Herring. From the estate papers, dated 1856, the following descendants of Francis have been collected. Issue:

No. 2. Stephen Herring was born January 7, 1768,² and married Rhoda Land—born September 29, 1775—daughter of Joseph and Sarah Land, of "Keowee Creek," Pendleton County. Joseph Land's will was made in July, 1803, and he left everything to his wife. The Lands were a family of gentle blood of Princess Anne County, Va., who moved to South Carolina a short while before the War of the Revolution. Lewis Land of Greenville County, S. C., was a pensioned soldier of the "Virginia Militia," born 1759. His will is recorded there and dated

September 12, 1842. Then there was Benjamin Land, a Baptist preacher, whose will is recorded at Anderson. He left his entire estate to his son James Land, who was born October 15, 1795. He married Permelia Jolly, born August 11, 1794. Issue:

- A. Gideon W. Land moved to Georgia, 1857. Issue:
 - (a) James S. Land, general agent of the Mutual Life Insurance Company of South Carolina, and others.

Another member of this family was Capt. John Land and he located on the Catawba River, at Landsford, S. C., prior to 1776. He was a leader of the Whig partisans and was killed by the Tories. Issue: A daughter, who married Silas Gladden, of South Carolina. Another daughter married Rev. Dr. Strange, of South Carolina, and his eldest son, Thomas Land, moved to Rutherford County, Tenn. Issue: Charles Land, a cotton planter. He went to Holmes County, Miss., and was the father of Judge Thomas Land, of Shreveport, La., who filled the office of District Judge and Supreme Judge of Louisiana. He died 1893. Issue: Judge J. R. Land, one of the District Judges of Shreveport, and A. D. Land, Judge of the Supreme Court of Louisiana, now living.

Stephen Herring owned 562½ acres in Pendleton County. After 1819 he sold his property and went to Franklin County, Ga., and still later in life to Fayette County.

Stephen Herring and Rhoda (Land) Herring had the following children:

E. William Herring, born March 23, 1799; married Sarah Moulder, October 1, 1818. She was born May 25, 1798, and died April 16, 1874. She was the daughter of Daniel Moulder and Katrina Pretzes (r); born May 25, 1753, and died August 22, 1834, in Fayette County, Georgia. They were married in Lancaster (or York), Pa. Both were foreign-born, of Holland, "near Oldenburg," Germany. Her Bible, which was printed in Dutch, was brought to Georgia, but was destroyed by fire prior to 1886. She was of noble birth and sole heiress to her uncle's estate subsequent to her father's death. She often visited him

at his "castle" and the following incident is tradition and is a tale that was told and retold among her descendants. As a little girl it was one of her childish amusements to watch the beggars who came for alms. Very often they assumed lameness on approaching the house. She could see, from the upper windows, in the distance, and if she found that was the case, the servants were notified and would then beat them off the premises and compel them to break into a run, exposing their deception. Being her uncle's sole heir, he opposed strenuously her coming to this country. However, after her father's death her mother was married again, to a Mr. Sheets, an engraver, who had planned to go to America. Naturally, the mother could not bring herself to part with her child, and when the uncle came to her home prepared with legal means to gain possession of her, Mrs. Sheets used strategy and successfully hid her in a wardrobe. The following day she was slipped aboard the vessel which brought the Sheets and herself to America. They located in Germantown, Pa., where the Moulders also settled. This family was also Dutch and foreign-born. The Sheets and the Moulders sympathized with the cause of the colonists in the Revolutionary War. Mr. Sheets offered his services to the Continental Government. They were accepted, and a printing press and engraving outfit for making Continental money was set up and run by him.¹ It became necessary for the two families to seek refuge at York, Pa., as the British had taken Philadelphia. In doing so the press and accessories to the printing or coining of the Continental money was moved there also for safety. It was then and there that Daniel Moulder and Katrina Pretzes were married. He belonged to the Dutch nobility. The name was von Moulder. This branch dropped the prefix after coming here. The branch, intermarrying with the Schuylers of New York City, retained the prefix. He sympathized with the cause of the colonists, "but his religious

convictions prevented his taking up arms." The Tories, knowing his sentiments, came into his home and ripped open the feather beds, scattering the contents to the four winds. After the Revolution they moved to Georgia, locating in Franklin County. Daniel Moulder's will is recorded there.¹

E. William Herring married Sarah Moulder in 1818.¹ They moved from Franklin County to Fayette County and reared a large family. She was a tiny-framed woman, and is remembered by a granddaughter as “a small, dainty old lady in her lace cap and silk dress.” She died April 16, 1874. William Herring was a cotton planter. He was a member of the Baptist church, and was noted for his remarkable tenor voice. When it was known by the church members that he would sing in the choir, people came for miles around to hear him. Later in life he moved to Marthasville (now Atlanta), and went into the clothing business. He died August 3, 1868. “One of Atlanta’s oldest and best citizens—Mr. Herring was one of the first merchants in Atlanta and aided largely in building up the city from literally the woods. He was a gentleman of strict integrity, reliable in all his dealings and kind to the poor. The writer knew him well before he left the county of Fayette, where he once resided.”² He was a man of principle and firm moral fibre. His attitude toward womankind was especially chivalrous and protective, and these qualities he sought to instill in his sons. In 1862 he bought a colonial home on Peachtree street from Mr. Henry Tarver, of South Georgia, who built it in 1860. It is said to have been the finest example of colonial architecture south.

(b) Augustus Moore Herring, born February 13, 1821. Supposed to have lost his life while prospecting for gold in California. He never married. In the Herring Bible his departure for California is recorded "March 13, 1850."

(c) Dr. James Wiley Herring lived in Thomaston, Ga. He was born August 5, 1823. He was a practicing physician all his life, and was over 80 when he died. He married Mary Worthy. Issue:

(d) Elizabeth Angeline Herring, born March 29, 1827; married December 8, 1843, to Dr. Nedom L. Angier. She died February 3, 1882, in Atlanta, Ga. She was an Episcopalian. The issue of this union were:

(g) William Francis Herring, born June 3, 1834, in Fayette County, Ga.; married November 5, 1861, Chloe Perry Conyers, born June 16, 1835, in Covington, Ga., at the home of her father, Dr. William Denson Conyers. Mr. Herring was a cotton broker, a member of the firm of Claghorn, Herring and Company, of Philadelphia, Pa., and Augusta, Ga. He amassed a fortune and retired from active partnership as a comparatively young man. He was an ardent supporter of free trade and a writer of force. His articles were widely read in the *New York Herald*, *Louisville Courier*, *Atlanta Constitution*, *New York Tribune*, *The Augusta Chronicle and Constitutionalist*, etc. The subjects he wrote upon were "Federal and State Taxation," "Currency and Cotton," and Free Trade. He was the first president of the Augusta (Ga.) Exchange, member of the New York Produce Exchange, and of the Cobden Club of London. He was a man of large experience; in the cotton business especially. Mr. Herring was deeply interested in attracting immigration to the Southern States and gave this subject considerable study while abroad, writing to the papers. He was endowed with an unusual intellect. His marked characteristics were his keen love of truth and justice, generosity, his great energy and his vivid interest in people and affairs of the day. He made many friends and easily. He had a winning geniality. His boyhood was spent in Fayetteville, Ga. After his death it was said of him, "that he stepped over no man's shoulders to attain his success." When retiring from the brokerage business he took his family abroad, where his children were educated. On his return he became a resident of New York city, and died at his home, 342 West Fifty-eighth street, November 24, 1886. Issue:

Xa. Dr. William Conyers Herring was born October 4, 1862, in Atlanta, Ga. He was educated in England. He was formerly associated with the German Hospital in New York city. He translated from the French, Dr. Andree Thomas' work on "The Cerebellum," and has written upon numerous other medical subjects. He is now a nerve specialist, having attained considerable success. He has his sanatorium at Hamburgh-on-Hudson, New York.

Xb. Chloe Herring, born May 4, 1865, in Covington, Ga.; married her father's friend, the noted Chief Justice Logan Edwin Bleckley, of the State of Georgia; born June 3, 1827, in Rabun County, Ga.; married 1893, in New York city. She was his second wife. He was called "the idol of the bar," having been endowed with a most brilliant legal mind. In 1887 he was appointed Chief Justice and held that office until 1894, when he resigned on account of overwork, but was ever afterward regarded by the people and the members of the bar as Justice Emeritus. He died March 6, 1907, at his summer home in Clarkesville, Ga. The State went in mourning and hung flags at half mast.¹



The North Carolina Herrings are said to be of two distinct origins, namely: those descended from John Herring, of Lenoir County, born in the North of Ireland, 1684; died 1760. These are the Herrings who intermarry with Sir William Whitfield's children.

Dr. H. D. Herring, of Concord, N. C., gives a curious tradition of the origin of his branch of the name, saying that it was once spelled Hellyn, and was a Welsh name. He says on account of the hatred existing between Wales and Great Britain, the Hellyns changed the name to Herrin on coming to this country, and located in Pennsylvania. There were three brothers. Two of these went further South. One settled in Virginia, and the other located in Duplin County, N. C. The Pennsylvania Herrings visited their North Carolina kin long after the Revolution.

THE CONYERS

There is scarcely an American family whose records are so filled with interesting traditions and adventures as the Conyers, of America—the scions of one of England's most notable families.

The head of this family were Earls of Shrewsbury and Barons of Sokebourne, of County Durham, descended from Roger de Coigniers, of Normandy, France, who came with William the Conqueror, to England, in 1066, and became constable of Durham in 1090.

There are many branches of this family—their court of arms distinguished by a due difference.

The Conyers, of the Carolinas, descend from a cadet branch, namely: the Conyers, of Hornby Castle, of Yorkshire. This court of arms was found among the court records on a document, after the signature of one of the Conyers' women, who, by the bye, it is tradition, are famed for their beauty, and their men for prowess in fighting.¹ The Conyers were powerful at one time in the history of England.² They are famed for chivalry, bravery and their unsullied honor.

The Yorkshire Conyers descend from the D'Arcys, de Greys, Nevilles, King Edward I of England, William the Conqueror, and Alfred the Great, and from the kings of France: Louis IV, Charles III, Louis II, Charles II, and Emperor Charlemagne.³ In America their deeds have been quite well recorded also. Mr. W. H. Ingram, of Sumter, S. C., whose mother was a Conyers, one day remarked to his uncle upon his small wrists. He replied, by saying: "Don't you know it is because you are from a line of ancestors who have wielded the sword for a 1000 years?" Dr. William Denson Conyers, of Covington, Ga., had great family pride and placed a high value upon good blood, often speaking of heredity in the alliances of his day. He was visited, during the Civil War, by an uncle of Mr. H. B. Conyers, of Clotskanie, Ohio, of the Virginia Conyers, and at once knew of the relationship which he said

was distant, but remarked that they were of the same parent-stock.

It is tradition that Richard Conyers, of Franklin County, N. C. (formerly Halifax County), whose wife was Margaret Arrendal¹ came from Bermuda. His daughter, Amybel, was born there. This has, however, not been established. It is quite probable the family in some previous generation did live there, as the Conyers name has been identified with Bermuda since its earliest history. Richard Conyers' father is said to have been the "ruler" of those isles. This has not been verified. Capt. James Conyers was a member of the Council in November, 1756.² James is mentioned as deceased in his father's will of date 1757, and also the following other children: Nathaniel, John and Dorcas. The father's name was Nathaniel, and he was of Warwick. Twelve "dining chairs" were brought to this country, which were owned by the "ruler of those isles," the sire of Richard. One of these is in possession of the compiler of these records.

X. Richard Conyers made a will in 1774.³ His last will was made on June 7, 1792, and was recorded at Louisburg, N. C. (Franklin County). The children and grandchildren named in it are:

The name is written in this will Conyard, Cunyard and Conyers.

Richard Conyers was granted 1,030 acres, of this 560 acres July 26, 1760, in Halifax County, described as "beginning at a black gum, Henry Jones' corner on the Mier Branch,"⁴ and 470 acres in Halifax County, "beginning at a red oak in William Park-

er's line." This was dated March 16, 1761.¹ He bought of William Simmons, in 1760, 150 acres, "lying and being in the county of Halifax, aforesaid, on the north side of Rocky Swamp, beginning at Tristram Drake's line," and on December 20, 1761, he bought 272 acres of William Parker, "beginning on William Parker's line at a white oak on Charles Harrington's corner."

In 1762 (December 21), he sold to his son, William Conyers, of Halifax County, for the nominal sum of £5, "one certain tract or parcel of land in the County of Halifax, aforesaid, beginning at Henry Jones' line at a pine," etc., "in Thomas Hill's line," etc., "containing by estimation 300 acres, be the same more or less."

On February 20, 1767, William Conyers sold this same tract for £65² ("Virginia money"), to Henry Jones. Now on November 25, 1791, "William Conyers, of Franklin County," the same person, sold to Samuel Mathews "182 acres, more or less, beginning at a red oak, Lee and Ellins' corner"; signed by William and Mary Conyers.³ Recorded at Halifax.

Richard Conyers was Captain in the Revolution. (Paid at Hillsborough Treasury Office, April, 1784, by Benjamin Sewell, Sheriff of Franklin County, to Richard Conyears £5 -2; Vol. 10, book 14, p. 27; also Vol. 7, book C-17, No. 757, p. 37, bundle 9 "list of specie certificates paid to Green Hill for the District of Halifax.)⁴ Captain Conyers is mentioned in a letter of Anthony W. White, Colonel Commanding, First Cavalry. This letter is dated "Halifax, July 26, 1780," and reads: "Captain Watts of my regiment will have the honor of handing you this with a copy of a letter from Captain Conyers, a order of the council of this State of Virginia and the order of the council of this State N. C.), by which you will see what we have to expect."⁵ He was also mentioned in another letter of the Hon. A. Maclaine, dated "Wilmington-

ton, June 9, 1783," to George Hooper. "I hope to see you shortly, and shall write in two or three days by Captain Conyers."¹

Richard Conyers died prior to 1792; his wife, Margaret, prior to 1769. Their son,

I. William Conyers was also a soldier of the Revolution, serving in Sumner County, S. C. (Account of claims exhibited with Comptroller's office, agreeable to resolve of General Assembly of North Carolina passed December, 1787; voucher No. 486. William Conyers, for military services performed in Sumner County, paid £1 17s 6d.² His name also appears in the old army account index and refers to volume 9, which is lost; therefore his rank cannot be obtained from this source. Very possibly, he was the Lieutenant Conyers referred to of the North Carolina Battalion.³ It is tradition four Conyers, brothers of William Conyers, fought in the Revolution. Ephraim was a pensioned (private) soldier, enlisting in York County, S. C. Joel *Coniby* was paid for services at Warrenton, N. C., in 1786.⁴ Several Conyers deeds are recorded there. This county was called Bute prior to being cut off into Warren, and still prior to that Bute was formed from Halifax. William Conyers lived upon a tract which lay on "Bear Swamp," which he probably received of his father, as the name "Bear Swamp" appears in one of Richard Conyers' transfers.

On July 15, 1776, previous, evidently, to his joining the army, William Conyers deeded over to his son, Ross Conyers (who was his only child by his first marriage), this parcel of 150 acres of land which lay upon "Bear Swamp."

William Conyers' first wife was Mary Ross, of Scotland, and was the daughter of James Ross, Sr., who settled in Franklin County.⁵

William Conyers' wife, Mary Ross, was living in 1792 (October 1). In 1796 (July 15) William Conyers deeded over "for the love and affection that I have for my son, Ross Conyers," a

number of slaves.¹ Late in life William Conyers married a very young girl, 16 years of age—Nancy ——. Of this union there were four children born, viz.:

No. 2. William Conyers.

No. 3. Polly Conyers.

No. 4. Sarah Conyers.

No. 5. Lucy Conyers.

The second wife, Nancy, and her children inherited 300 acres, bought of Nathaniel Yarborough, November 11, 1800, which lay on "Hillsborough Road."² It is told by descendants that he was commissioned to buy her white satin wedding slippers, and that his son and others saw them peeping from his pockets, which teased the old gentleman and he became quite angry at their amusement. His will is dated January 1, 1804, and in this document his son, Ross, is mentioned. He bequeathed to his wife, Nancy Conyers, and their children property in trust until their child, "Lucy, shall become 18 years of age."

No. 1. Ross Conyers was born December 9, 1768 (from his family Bible). He married Betty Denson, born December 8, 1768, daughter of William and Rebecca (Eley) Denson.³ About 1804 (probably after his father's death) Ross Conyers and family moved to Greene County, Ga., near Greensboro. He did considerable surveying for residents of North Carolina, among them Col. Jeremiah Perry, of Franklin County, N. C.⁴ He was a Baptist and died October 16, 1826, in Greene County, Ga.⁵ His estate was administered upon by his son, Bennett H. Conyers.⁶

The following is an extract from Ross Conyers' Bible, which gives their children in full: "Ross Conyers was born in the year of our Lord, December 9, 1768. Betsy Conyers, wife of Ross Conyers, was born December 8, in the year of our Lord, 1768."

A. Polly R. Conyers, daughter of Ross Conyers, and Betsy, his wife, was born Sunday night, November 21, in the year of our Lord, 1790.

panied them.¹ He bought land, December 23, 1822, "near a flourishing little village," Covington, Ga. In a letter he tells this, and that January 1, 1823, he commenced to clear the land. In this letter he wrote of his overseer leaving and being himself both overseer and medical practitioner.² In another letter he wrote of having returned from attending to his father's estate and was fortunate in getting the administratorship into his brother Bennett's hands. He was an intimate friend of Governor Gilmer, of Georgia. In another of being ordered out by the Governor "to survey land, a part of the new territory about which there has been so much noise." In one of January 2, 1827, he says: "the last Legislature of this State has given me another draw in the land lottery, which makes three draws. I am entitled to two as a citizen and a married man, and one for services rendered in the late war against Great Britain and the Indians."

Dr. William D. Conyers was a man of commanding figure and great dignity. He was a progressive citizen, interested in all forward movements of the day. "In the fall of 1831 there assembled at Eatonton, Ga., the first gathering of progressive and wide-awake men of affairs ever convened in Georgia for the purpose of discussing the subject of internal improvement, and the organized impulse created by the initial meeting, much of the development which has taken place in Georgia along industrial and commercial lines can be distinctly traced through delegates who were present from every part of the State. The main question to be decided was whether canals or railroads should be commended. Routes were reported for both, and at the same time a commission was appointed to bring the matter before the General Assembly and urge upon the lawmakers the importance of some definite course of action. On the motion of Mr. Irby H. Hudson, of Putnam, one of the most zealous of the promoters of this project, Hon. Thomas Stocks, of Greene, was made president of the convention. William Turner, Sampson W. Harris and William Wilkins were chosen seconds. On account of the vital bearing of the pioneer movement upon the subsequent fortunes of the Empire State the personnel of this important body is given in full. The

delegates in attendance were: from Newton County, William D. Conyers, Charles H. Sanders, Josiah Perry, Pike, John Neal¹ John B. Bird," and others.²

The little village of Covington, Ga., where Doctor Conyers lived, was incorporated as a town in 1822, and as a city in 1854. Some of the results of the preceding meeting referred to at Eatonton, Ga., came to fruition, soon after, for the Georgia Railroad was no longer a vision, but an accomplished fact in 1843. Dr. William D. Conyers was deeply interested in the project, and was instrumental in procuring the right-of-way. To quote Mr. Lamar Wright again, "The City of Conyers took its name about 1843 from Doctor Conyers, of Covington, Ga., who kindly and generously deeded to the Georgia Railroad the right-of-way through his property in Rockdale County and the land required for railroad purposes at the station. To perpetuate the memory of this distinguished physician, his name was given to the new county seat. Moreover, since Doctor Conyers was a most zealous advocate of temperance, the City Commission excluded by deed the sale of any intoxicating liquors within the corporate limits, which inhibition was observed in each transfer for years."³

An amusing little incident is related of the first train which was run over the road. Naturally, Doctor Conyers was one of those asked to go. When boarding the train, his friend Colonel Cunningham, also of Covington, who was bitterly opposed to the railroad passing through the village,⁴ waved him goodbye and called "Goodbye Doctor, I never expect to see you again." "Doctor Holcombe also was so opposed to the railroad passing through his land that he sold his extensive acreage to Doctor Conyers and moved off."⁵

It is tradition⁶ that the county Rockdale was also named in his honor, and there is a fact which gives this a touch of truth, namely, that "Rochdale" is connected with the English Conyers, and that Doctor Conyers was well known to have been called by

his intimates by the nickname of "Rockdale." Relating this recalls a story. Doctor Conyers owned a saddle-horse, named "Lary," and he gave this animal to a cavalry company which was raised in Newton County during the Mexican War. Before the company arrived at its destination the horses had to swim across a river, and "Lary" swam so well that the soldiers cried out cheering "Hurrah for 'Rockdale!'"

Doctor Conyers was a Methodist, joining the church after his marriage. He died at his home in Covington, Ga., and was buried in the family graveyard, where his wife and her sister, Tempie Perry (Williamson), lie. His wife was an Episcopalian, but changed her faith, becoming a Presbyterian. Their home was called "Natural Grove." The children of this union were:

Doctor Conyers' first wife died January 31, 1841. Late in life he married an old lady, Mrs. Amanda B. Slaughter. He died February 25, 1868. His second wife survived him.

C., and he mentioned their then youngest child "who is not yet named, but my wife is determined she shall bear the name of Chloe, after her sister." Having lost her mother when about six years old, she was brought up by a maiden aunt, Miss Rebecca Eley Conyers, who cared for her father's household and reared his youngest children. No French woman could excel her in sewing, nor anyone in her dainty housekeeping. She was very much beloved by her Perry relations, and her uncle, Dr. Algernon Sidney Perry, of "Cascine" and "Oakland," Franklin County, wanted to adopt her and her brother "Billy" (Maj. William D. Conyers), after the mother's death, but Doctor Conyers would not consent to it. She was educated in Salem, N. C., by the Moravians and finished

in Georgia. She is a fine Latin scholar and has a receptive, logical mind, assimilating knowledge easily, and has truly lived up to the old adage that one is "never too old to learn." When she was 70 years of age she learned the French language in one year, without instruction, sufficiently well to read works of the French authors in the original. She has a gentle, retiring nature. She was married to Mr. William Francis Herring, November, 1861, in Covington, Ga., at her father's home. For issue of this union see Herring genealogy.

(e) Maj. William Denson Conyers was Dr. William Denson Conyers' only son; born May 13, 1838. He enlisted in the Confederate Army as first lieutenant of the Lamar Infantry, one of the companies forming Cobb's Legion, which was composed of cavalry and infantry. He received his appointment as first lieutenant July 26, 1861, from Gov. Joseph E. Brown, under Adj. Gen. Henry Wayne and H. Anderson. He was acting lieutenant-colonel at the time of his death, which occurred near Spottsylvania Courthouse, Va., May 12, 1864.

The following copies of letters are offered. One gives an outline of his services to the Confederacy, and the other his character and the esteem in which he was held, for no Conyers bore this proud name more honourably.

"WINCHESTER, VA., September 10, 1864.

"MRS. C. P. HERRING,

"DEAR MADAM—Learning from your husband that you were a dear sister to my friend and valued officer, the lamented Major Conyers, I have thought that it would be some consolation for you to know how he was appreciated by his companions-in-arms. Attracted by the conspicuous gallantry of your brother at the battle of Chancellorsville, which was the first engagement of the brigade after I had taken command of it, we soon became intimate friends, and I can truly say that he was one of the best officers and purest patriots in my command. He fell, as you have learned, on the twelfth of May last, near Spottsylvania Courthouse, in one of the bloodiest battles of the war, and the last time I saw him he was in front of his command stimulating and encouraging them by his example. He was the embodiment of a

high-toned and gallant officer whose loss was deeply mourned by myself and the officers of the brigade. * * *

He took the command as lieutenant-colonel for at least a year prior to his death, as Lieutenant-Colonel Glenn was on the sick list or wounded.

“MY DEAR MISS MARY—It gives me pleasure to do you a service of any kind, and especially in this case, as it relates to so dear a friend and so admirable a soldier as W. D. Conyers. He was first under fire in action at Savage Station; then at Malvern Hills, both in Virginia; then at Crampton’s Gap, Md., where the Legion (Cobb’s Georgia Legion Infantry) was dreadfully cut up and he was captured. When he was in the battle of Fredricksburg, and with other troops held the position at the stone wall, who dealt such destruction to the enemy in that engagement; then at Chancellorsville, and same day at Salem Church, all in Virginia; then at Gettysburg, Pa., and Hagerstown, Md. Then the Legion came South—he with it—and was at attack on Fort Sanders, Knoxville, at Russellville, Bull’s Gap, Tenn. Then the Legion—he with it—was transferred to Virginia, and was in Lee’s army opposite Grant’s advance, and fought twice in one day at the Wilderness, and then two separate fights at Spottsylvania Courthouse, in the last of which he was killed; understand, besides what has been detailed above, there were quite a number of skirmishes, etc. For some time he was major, commanding the regiment; I was adjutant, and we were thus thrown together rather closely, both when in camp and in action. As a man, as friend and as a soldier, your uncle was everything that could be desired—truthful, honest and brave.

“At any time I can serve you in regard to matters relating to him, or in any other matter, it would be a favor to me to have you let me know.

“HENDERSON COUNTY, TENN., September 20, 1823.

“DEAR FATHER AND MOTHER—When I left your house in April, I expected to have stationed myself in South Carolina, but

having a desire to explore the western country, thought proper to shape my course to Chickasaw Purchase, Tennessee, where I now remain. I have traveled considerable in this Purchase, and I find it to be a desirable country; the land is of good quality and produces anything that is common for land in our country, and that to great perfection. The climate, I think, is healthy; the range appears to be inexhaustible; the water in the upland is of the best free stone, in the low land it is not so good. The crops in this country are very good; corn will be sold here this fall for 50 cents the barrel—those that — good land calculate 10 barrels per acre, on the average. After a travel of 1200 miles I reached Jordan Fuller's; it was on the last day of May. My route to this country was through South Carolina, Georgia, the Creek Nation, and the Alabama. I have traveled since I left your house the rise of 2000 miles, and expect in a few days to take a trip to the Arkansas country, the other side of the Mississippi, which will be a trip of 1000 miles. Bald has performed exceedingly well, and is now as fat as he was the day he left your house. Tell Aunt Polly Perry I stayed two nights with John C. Perry, in Alabama; and he was well. “JOEL CONYERS.”

In this letter he speaks of Miss D. Jeffreys, his sweetheart; Cousin Louisa Perry, Cousin Manda Green, Cousin Francis Strickland, William Perry, Thomas Crocker, and dear brother and dear sister.

There are a great many entries of the Conyers in the various parish registers of South Carolina, and many of these names are identical with the North Carolina names, viz.: Isabel Conyers, William Conyers, Richard Conyers. Isabel Conyers was the daughter of William Conyers, Esquire, of Edistoe Island; will dated 1744. Amy Isabel Conyers was a daughter of Richard Con-

yers, of Halifax County, N. C.; will dated 1792. William Conyers' name is found often. Richard Conyers was born 1734, son of William and Elizabeth, of St. Helena's Parish, S. C. Demry Conyers must be a corruption of Demeree. This family settled near the Savannah River, the dividing line between South Carolina and Georgia, in the State of Georgia, where several of the Conyers located. John Conyers and his brother, William Conyers, received grants on and near "Briar Creek," close to the Savannah River.

X. John Conyers, who lived prior to the above, married Mary Quarterman, July 5, 1717. Issue:

I. James Conyers, married Mary Mackintosh, December 18, 1744. He was granted a large tract of land in the fork of Black River Craven District, August, 1757. His will was recorded at Sumter, S. C., dated March 5, 1783. Although he was confined to his sickroom during the Revolution, he rendered valuable services to General Marion by correspondence. He had the following children:

Their home was called "Brewington Manor." There are a number of interesting legends of them. An attack was planned by the Indians on the white settlement, but failed. The old chief's daughter was infatuated, it is said, with the famous Capt. Daniel Conyers (the hero, no doubt, of many a girl's heart, for history records his bravery and daring as those of a true knight). She betrayed to him their intentions. Her father, suspecting, slew her for her disloyalty, casting her body into the spring of

“Brewington Manor,” cursing the women of the Conyers’ race. It is said that the Conyers women were frail as long as they drank from this fountain. Mr. John Witherspoon Ervin, a descendant, wrote a novel around this, calling it “The Accursed Fountain.” Some member of the family possessed a volume, which was presented to one of the elder Conyers by Voltaire, and contained his signature.

No. 1. Maj. James Conyers was a volunteer, and received his commission as captain of the Fifth South Carolina Regiment during the Revolution.¹ He died 1781. He fought in the battle of Round-O. His home was about four miles north of Brewington Bridge, on the road to Sumter, and on the hill of Black River. This home, later, came into the possession of the Nelson family through intermarriage. At the death of Major Conyers, his horse followed his body, led by his negro bodyguard, home. His will was made February 19, 1780, and recorded 1783. His wife was Susannah Nelson. He had two sons, namely: John and James. His will was, that John Conyers should be educated for college, and James was to receive his “small sword” and was to “be educated until he is master of the languages, and then is to be initiated into the Continental Army, if a commission can be obtained for him.”

THE HENDRICKS

The Hendricks were Brabantine Cavaliers, and came from the vicinity of Antwerp, in Holland. Their coat of arms is a deer in a forest of trees; their crest, a deer's head. The name signifies rich in hind or deer, or servants; from the Saxon word "hind."¹ The name is variously written, viz.: Hendrick, Hendricks, Henrick, Hendrich, Henrix, and Hendrix.

Forsan Van Deavorack Henrick, Sr., patented 214 acres in York County, Va., in 1666. Part of that county became New Kent. In 1720 part of New Kent County was formed into Hanover County, where the Hendricks of this sketch lived. King and Queen County was formed from Kent County in 1691, and King William County was formed from King and Queen County in 1701.

Hance Hendrick patented a total of 2173 acres in King and Queen County, King William County, Amelia County, Spottsylvania County; covering from April 25, 1701, to July 25, 1746.² In a patent of 400 acres in Amelia County, date June 6, 1728, it mentions that this Hance Hendrick was of King William County.³ Most of these tracts lay in "Pamunkey Neck," Pamunkey River, Hanover County.

X. John Hendrick, of St. Martin's Parish, lived near Taylorsville, on Little River, Hanover County, in what was called "Forks of Hanover." In 1784⁴ he conveyed property to his seven "beloved children." He died in 1802.⁵ Issue:

Joseph W. Hendrick inherited 213 acres in 1804, from his grandfather (X) John Hendrick's estate.⁴ In 1809, prior to moving to Kentucky, he sold this to his uncle, Col. James Doswell. Joseph W. Hendrick was born April 20, 1787, near the Old Fork Church, Hanover County. He married Mary Drummond Thilman. She was born October 15, 1787, in Goochland County, Va. She was a woman of great force of character. She was brought up in the Episcopal church, but became a Baptist. She was immersed by the Rev. James Creath. She was a daughter of the House of Thilman, who for many generations owned Hanover

Court House. Her father was Capt. Paul Thilman, and mother, Mary Doswell. He died October 2, 1786.¹ He was the sixth Paul Thilman in direct line of descent. His father, Paul Thilman, married Elizabeth (No. 1) Vivian, December 16, 1730; who was born October 14, 1718; baptized October 27. She had a sister, Frances Vivian, who died August 16, 1724. Their parents were Judœ Thomas Vivian, of King George's Parish. Appointed Judge, June 14, 1722. He was also made Sheriff in 1729. He married Frances —, great-granddaughter of John Payne.² Thomas Vivian had a sister and a brother, John Vivian.³ John Vivian, born August 28, 1681; married Elizabeth Thacker, June 19, 1712.⁴ Judge Thomas Vivian's sister, Margaret Vivian, married James Daniel, January 27, 1704. He died May 5, 1727. Another sister, Diana Vivian, married Judge Garrett Minor, of Middlesex County, October 17, 1706. She died April 16, 1718. He died 1720. Judge (I) Thomas Vivian's father was (X) John Vivian, who was made constable of Middlesex County, April, 1681, and Sheriff in 1719. His wife was Margaret.

Capt. Paul Thilman, who married Mary Doswell, was a member of the Hanover County Committee of Safety, appointed November 8, 1775.⁵ Mary Doswell was a sister of the noted Col. James Doswell, of New Market, Va., before mentioned in the land transfer. The Doswells and the Thilmans were French Huguenots, descended from refugees who came to this country upon the Revocation of the Edict of Nantes. Col. James Doswell greeted Lafayette upon his return to Richmond in 1824. Captain Doswell was a Revolutionary soldier of the Fourteenth Virginia Regiment; afterwards the Tenth. He married Jane Thilman. The parents of Col. James Doswell, and his sister, Mary Doswell (Thilman) were Thomas Doswell and his wife, Mary Drummond; married about 1744.

Thomas Doswell was the son of John Doswell, Jr., and Elizabeth Nutting, and John Doswell, Jr., was the son of John Doswell, Sr., and his wife, Catherine. The last two Johns were of York County, Va.¹ Capt. Paul Thilman and Mary Doswell had four children—John Thilman, who died a bachelor, and left his estate to his nephew, the Rev. John Thilman Hendrick, of Nicholasville, Ky., his namesake; Elizabeth Thilman, married a Harris; Nancy D. Thilman, married William Richardson. She lived and died on “Shockoe Hill,” Richmond, Va. They have many descendants. Mary Drummond Thilman married Joseph W. Hendrick.

(C) Rev. John Thilman Hendrick, born March 15, 1811, in Barren County, Ky. He went to college at Danville, Ky., and was licensed to preach in May, 1833. In a letter of 1895, he said: "My father moved to Kentucky about 1809 in the county of Barren, Glasgow, near where I was born (March 15, 1811), and lived until he moved to Nicholasville in the county of Jessamine, 12 miles from Lexington—the heart of the blue grass region of Kentucky. Here I was raised until I went to college at Danville, Ky. Here is where my mother and father were buried." He married—first time—Jane Elizabeth Bigelow, in Richmond, Va., September 29, 1834. She was a daughter of Joseph Bigelow and Agnes Nesbit, who was descended from the Blairs, Lees, and Gardners, of Scotland. After their marriage they settled in Millersburgh, Bourbon County, Ky. Doctor Hendrick supplied Doctor Stewart Robinson's pulpit of Louisville, Ky., for quite a while. He was pastor of the Maysville (Ky.) Presbyterian Church, where the congregation placed a memorial window in honor of him at his death. He was minister of the Presbyterian church in Paducah, Ky. There the major part of his life's work was done. He was much beloved, and after his death the con-

gregation had a memorial window placed in memory of his beloved and faithful service. Another memorial window to the Rev. Alexander Wheeler Campbell, who was the first Presbyterian minister of that church, stands side by side. Both of these were grandfathers of Mr. Calvin W. Hendrick, of Baltimore, Md.

Dr. John Thilman Hendrick was a well-known figure in the annals of the Presbyterian church. He died in Waco, Tex., in 1895. His memoirs are shortly to be published. The issue of his first marriage to Jane Elizabeth Bigelow were:

received his schooling, starting out at the age of 16 on an engineering corps to support his widowed mother.

He was engineer in construction of the Georgia Southern and Florida Railroad, and was city engineer of Macon, Ga., for five years. When he left Macon to make connection in New York, he was sent a petition by the citizens requesting him to remain with them. He was director of the St. Augustine and North Beach Railroad and also Macon Construction Company. After leaving Macon he went to New York, where he was made Engineer of Sewers and Drainage in constructing the New York subway. This work covered New York, Brooklyn and the Bronx. In 1905, he resigned this work, which was practically completed, to accept the position of Chief Engineer of Sewers, to drain the City of Baltimore. At the time this was the largest sewerage problem in the world, necessitating an outlay of \$23,000,000. He has been requested, and written innumerable articles upon scientific subjects, and delivered many speeches. Complimentary editorials have been issued in the *Baltimore Sun* and *Baltimore American*, etc., regarding them. He has also contributed to the *National Geographic Magazine*, *Engineering*

Record, and a number of engineering magazines abroad. In conjunction with this, his services have been so appreciated that he was made consulting engineer for all the city departments. He was a member of the Union Terminal Commission, and was appointed by the Governor of Maryland a delegate to the Drainage Commission of the State. He is a member of the Board of Governors of the Young Men's Christian Association of the Eye and Ear Hospital of Baltimore. He was made an elder of the "Old First Church" of New York City, when about 33 years of age, and also elected elder in the "Old First Church" of Baltimore upon his taking up his residence there. He has always been a consistent and devoted member of the Presbyterian church. He was made chairman of the National Society for the Prevention of Pollution of Rivers and Waterways. He is a member of the City Plan Commission of Baltimore. Was a member of the Smoke Abatement Commission and is president of the American Train Control Co., and member National Society of One Hundred. On the completion of the sewerage system, the Legislature created the position of Chief Engineer of the City of Baltimore, putting him in charge of all the city departments as Efficiency

Engineer to reorganize and improve conditions. In handling such large public improvements, his success has been due to his diplomacy and firmness, and his marked executive ability. He has a power of creating enthusiasm in men and bringing out their best.

He is a member of the Society of Colonial Wars, Maryland Club, University Club, Green Spring Valley Hunt Club, etc. He married Sarah Rebecca Herring,¹ November 29, 1892, at the residence of her parents, 342 West Fifty-eighth street, New York City. Issue: Three sons:

(Ia) Calvin Wheeler Hendrick, Jr., born October 19, 1893, in Macon, Ga. He died May 18, 1907, in Baltimore, although only 13½ years at his death. He had firm, unswerving principles, his schoolmaster saying that he was glad to have him in the school for the example to the other boys.

(Ib) Herring de la Porte Hendrick, born January 13, 1896, on Lenox avenue, New York City. Worked on Sewerage Engineering Corps in Havana, Cuba, when 16 years of



THE BODDIES

The large family of this name, identified with the history of North Carolina, from Colonial times to the present day, are descendants of William Boddie, of Isle of Wight County, Va. His great-grandson, Senator Nathaniel Boddie's home, "Rose Hill," was destroyed by fire, and it is tradition that his family record with court of arms were burned.

Nathaniel Boddie's grandson, John B. Boddie, son of Senator George Boddie, endeavored to rewrite a history of his ancestry, and did so in a diary that he kept in the year 1840. In this he states that Lieut. William Boddie, the grandson of William Boddie, of Isle of Wight County, was born in Westmoreland County, Va. This fact is a significant link between the immigrant Thomas Boddie who came to Virginia when 19 years of age in 1645. The patentee or party bringing him was Bartholomew Hoskins, of Westmoreland County.¹

The Boddies were an English family of Essex County. The name is derived from the word "boda." The meaning of this word was messenger. Boda was royal messenger to King William I of Normandy. Their arms: three halcyons; two palm staves crossed and crowned with a ducal coronet. Their motto: "By the strength of mind and body." They had ducal rank, but lost it.

The Boddies were a tall race of men—Lieut. William Boddie was six foot three inches, and his son, Senator Nathaniel Boddie, weighed 185 pounds. The first notice of William Boddye, of Isle of Wight, and his son, John Boddye, in America is found under the rent roll of Lord Baltimore in Talbot County, Md., in 1650 (August 6), for 200 acres, which was called "Body's Neck," and lay on Kent Island.²

Capt. John Boddy also came under Lord Baltimore's rent roll in 1676 (September 14) to 700 acres of land, lying on the south of Patapsco River and "on ye north side of Curtiss Creek." This was called "Body's Adventure."¹

William Boddy, of Isle of Wight County, Va.

X. William Body received patents to 6,700 acres of land in Isle of Wight County, Va., for transporting to the colony 127 persons. The first patent was dated October 20, 1661, and was to 550 acres of land upon Cypress Swamp.²

Another tract was to 3,350 acres, which was conveyed to him July 12, 1665.³ Five hundred and fifty acres of this was conveyed to him under the patent of October 20, 1661. This land was situated toward the head of Cypress and Western Branch.

The name in this paper is spelled Body. On April 26, 1684, he received a patent to 3,350 acres, situated in the lower Parish of Isle of Wight County, lying on both sides of the two great swamps of Cypress and Western Branch of Nansemond River.⁴ This was for transporting 60 persons. In this patent the name is written Boddy.

X. William Bodie, made his will December 17, 1712. It was recorded in the Isle of Wight County February 25, 1717. In it he bequeaths his entire estate to his "loving son, (I) John Bodye," "all my lands, houses, orchards and plantations, with their appurtenances, to him and his heirs forever, excepting my now wife, Mary, her third during her natural life, but in case my son (I) John should die without issue, without disposing of said land by will or otherwise, I give the said land to my daughter, (II) Elizabeth Matthews,⁵ and her heirs forever." He mentions, besides these, his grandsons, William and Thomas Brown, and their sisters. His daughter, (II) Elizabeth Mathews, is given "ten thousand pounds of good tobacco." (I) John Bodye is his

sole executor. The will of Mary Body, made January 17, 1727, was recorded at a court held for the Isle of Wight County, April 24, 1732. It commences in this fashion: "I, Mary Body, widow of the late, wife of William Body, deceased, of the Isle of Wight County," etc. She bequeaths her whole estate of goods and movables that she has with her, and all she has belonging to her "anywhere soever" to Thomas Drake,¹ her son-in-law. Other children mentioned are her daughters, (III) Mary Bragg, and (IV) Judeth Clark,² and (V) Sarah Joviner, who have already received their portion. Thomas Drake was sole executor of this will. John Bodye made his will March 10, 1719-1720, and it was recorded April 25, 1720, in Isle of Wight County, Va. To illustrate another form the spelling of the name took, this will commences as follows: "I, John Boddie, of ye Isle of Wight County, Va.," etc. "I do give and bequeath unto my son, (1) William Boddie, and my son, (2) John Boddie, all my land which I shall die seized of, in this manner and form as follows: yt. is to say for to be equally divided between my two sons, (1) William, and (2) John Boddie, and their heirs forever, and when they shall come to ye age of twenty and one years, and that ye dividing line between them shall run through ye middle of my Great Pocossin as near as can be, and that my son, (1) William Boddie, shall have ye lower part of ye lands where I now live, and my son, (2) John, ye outer part." Provision is made for their education. He gives one-third of his lands that he died seized of to his loving wife, Elizabeth Boddie, during her natural life, and the rest of the estate is to be divided into three parts—his wife and two sons to receive their third respectively. Between 1733-1734 these two brothers moved to Albemarle County, Bertie Precinct, N. C. They settled in St. Mary's Parish, Nash County, N. C., on "Peach Tree Creek," later known as "Sunny Creek." They bought and were granted large quantities of land dating back as early as 1734. The family record states that William's son, Nathaniel, was born in 1732, in Virginia. I have before me an indenture

made April 24, 1734, between "John Boddy, of the county of Albemarle, in Barter (Bertie) Precinct, in North Carolina, of the one part, and Thomas Woodley, of Newport Parish, of the Isle of Wight County, in the Colony and Dominion of Virginia, of the other part," to a tract of land at the "mouth of a small branch issuing out of the main swamp, being the head of the Western Branch of Nansemond River; thence running up to the said branch to an ashe, a corner tree between Robert Coleman and (1) William Boddy," etc. This was conveyed or transferred for the consideration of five shillings and a yearly rent of "one pepper corn on the last of said year, only if the same be demanded," etc. This indenture is signed (1) J. Boddey (seal), John Boddy, as attorney for Elizabeth Dawson (seal), John Dawson (seal).

I. After the death of John Bodye, in 1719, his widow married Col. John Dawson, of Northampton County, N. C., who was colonel of the regiment of that county. In his report of September 23, 1748, Colonel Dawson gives the name of "William Bennett, of Roanoke," as captain of the company in charge of 101 men under him. William Bennett's daughter, Mary, married William Boddie, who was lieutenant of the same company. There was also a William Bennett Ensign.¹

Col. John Dawson, was a member of the General Assembly from Bertie, January, 1734-1735.² In 1735 (January 23) he was appointed a member of a committee to examine into the public accounts and to report to the Upper House.³

Colonel Dawson and Elizabeth Bodye Dawson had two children—Henry and Mary.

Henry Dawson was member of the Assembly from Northampton, November 1766 to 1770. His wife, Patience, survived him. Their children were: John Dawson, Henry Dawson, Stephen Dawson, Mary Dawson, and Martha Dawson. Mary Dawson (Colonel Dawson and Elizabeth's daughter), married William Kinchen.

Col. John Dawson then married Charity Alston, daughter of Judge John Alston, who was baptized in 1673, in Felmersham, Bedfordshire, England, and came to Virginia December 1, 1673, as an infant, son of John Alston and Ann Wallis. He took up land in 1711 in Gates County, N. C. Colonel Dawson died in Northampton County 1761, and Charity, his second wife, died 1764.

No. 1. William Boddie probably was the eldest son of (I) John Boddie, as he is mentioned first in his father's will. He bought land in 1734, in North Carolina,¹ a few years earlier than (No.2) John, who bought in 1740.²

No. 2. John Boddie's descendants will be given first, as so little is known of them. His wife was born Elizabeth Jeffreys, daughter of Capt. Simon Jeffreys, who was granted with his son, Osborne Jeffreys, jointly, 1,000 acres 1735 (October 17), on Tar River.³

Her mother, Elizabeth's Jeffrey's, will was made June 20, 1742; recorded in 1743 (February Court).

John Dawson wrote a noncupative will for her, and it was proved February, 1743. In her will of June, 1742, she names her Hilliard children, viz.: Robert Hilliard,⁴ Sarah Hilliard, John Hilliard;⁵ her grandchildren Hilliard: William, James, Elias, sons of William Hilliard;⁶ Sarah, daughter of John Hilliard; grandson, Jacob Holland, son of Jeremiah. Her son, Osborne Jeffries (captain of Granville Militia, 1754), and daughter, Elizabeth Jeffreys Boddie. She was the wife of John Boddie, and is said to have inherited the hot and imperious blood of the Jeffreys.

In this above will, her grandchildren, John and Elizabeth Boddie, are mentioned. This grandchild, (A) John Boddie, married Miss Jane Toole, of Tarboro, N. C. The only known issue of this union was (a) Willie Wims Boddie.

(A) John Boddie was a private in the Granville County Militia October 3, 1771.¹ Solomon Alston was captain of this company. These troops were formed to protect the inhabitants against the Indians, as much feeling had arisen between the races issuing out of an affair of horse stealing by the Indians in Virginia from the white settlers, for which offense the settlers used drastic punishment by having the offenders hanged. So much friction resulted from this that it necessitated having troops at the frontier as far south as South Carolina.²

The Province of North Carolina was divided into two counties previous to 1728, and these counties again into precincts. The counties were Albemarle and Bath. Albemarle was separated into six precincts, viz.: Chowan, Perquimons, Currituck, Pasquotank, Bertie and Edgecombe. Bath, the other county, was divided into seven precincts: Bladen, Beaufort, Carteret, Craven, Hyde, New Hanover and Onslow.³ In 1734 a bill was introduced into the House and passed to establish that part of Bertie (which was created in 1722 a precinct) which lies on the south side of Roanoke River, into a precinct by the name of Edgecomb.⁴ In 1741 Northampton was formed. In 1777 Mr. Jones Johnston and Mr. Nathan Boddie, two of the members from the House of Commons, came to the House to see the amendment made in the bill for dividing Edgecomb, the amendments being made⁵ December, 1777.⁶

No. 1. William Boddie married in Virginia, Mary Bennett, daughter of William Bennett, of Surry County, Va., and probably granddaughter of James Bennett, whose will was dated December 30, 1745. He names these children in it: William Bennett, James Bennett and John Samuel Bennett, Martha Bennett, Mary Bennett, Sarah Bennett, Bridget Bennett; grandson, Thomas Bennett, son of William Bennett, was executor. The elder James Bennett, received a patent "to Peasehill" (305 acres)

April 29, 1692.¹ William Bennett came to Gates County and obtained a grant March 1, 1719, to 235 acres, which was part of Chowan Precinct, and also included parts of Bertie, Northampton, Tyrrell, Hertford, Washington and Martin Counties. He was a member of the Committee of Safety, for the town Edenton, Chowan County, 1775 (February 4). The North Carolina *Gazette* of February 24, 1775, contains proceedings of this committee.² He was also elected vestryman of St. Paul's Parish, June 19, 1776.³ He was elected one of a committee by the Senate to purchase provisions for the army,⁴ and was empowered to erect magazines for the storage of ammunition for the District of Edenton, February, 1779.⁵ It was May 8, 1778, that he was elected by the General Assembly to purchase provisions for the soldiers.

(1) William Boddie served as a lieutenant in the Northampton Regiment during the Spanish Alarm, 1747-1748.⁶ "Several alarms were made on the coast by Spanish invasion in 1741. Privateers took possession of Ocracoke Inlet, seized the vessels arriving, landed and destroyed the cattle of the inhabitants, and devastated the country. Vessels were sent out for the relief of the sufferers at a cost to the Province of more than £10,000. In June, 1747, the Spanish took possession of the town and harbor of Beaufort, and Colonel Lovick called out his regiment to dispel them. Maj. Enoch Ward was on duty with 58 men, when the town was taken on August 26, and the alarm continued until September 10, although the Spaniards probably departed earlier. The Spanish vessels were largely manned by negroes and mulattoes. In like manner there were two alarms on Cape Fear in the following year. It was early in 1748 that the Spanish cruiser made an attack on Brunswick, one of the vessels being blown up and destroyed. Maj. John Swann seems to have had direction of the defense. He turned over to Doctor Samuel Green several of

the Spanish soldiers who were wounded, and some were badly burned when the vessel was blown up. * * * It was from this vessel that the picture was obtained, which is still preserved in the vestry of St. James Church at Wilmington, N. C."¹ Another account of the affair is given in Volume 3, page 11. To quote from it: "* * * In 1747, several small sloops from St. Augustine, full of men, mostly mulattoes and negroes, their small draught securing them from the attack of the only ship-of-war on our coast. They landed at Ocracoke Core Sound, Bear Inlet and Cape Fear, where they killed several people, burned some ships and small vessels, carried off some negroes and slaughtered a great number of cattle and hogs. These practices were continued all summer of 1747 and led to the erection of several forts along the coast, one of which (Fort Johnson) still survives."

(1) William Boddie's name is also found among the militia returns of Northampton County in the Fourth Regiment of Foot, 1754-1755.² It appears that he was in the regiment of his step-father, Col. John Dawson, and that his father-in-law, William Bennett, was a captain³ in the same regiment. This has been noted before.

(B) Senator Nathaniel Boddie was the most brilliant of the family, and his service to his country extended over many years, and he served in many capacities. He was born February 22, 1732, at Estherton Cross Roads, Va. He married Chloe Crudup, his first cousin, daughter of Josiah Crudup and Mourning Bennett Crudup. Senator Boddie lived in Nash County, on Peach Tree Creek. His home was built in a grove of white oaks

of 200 acres. Afterwards it was built on a hill by his son, George Boddie, and was then called "Rose Hill." The old place burned the night his daughter was to marry Mr. Bell. George Boddie rebuilt again and his son, Nicholas Boddie, added to enlarging it in his lifetime. Senator Nathaniel Boddie died December 7, 1797, and was buried just outside of the town of Nashville. The first notice of him was in the Provincial Congress, which met at Halifax, April 4, 1776. This was the fourth meeting of the people in a representative capacity as opposed to the Royal Government.¹ Senator Nathaniel Boddie signed a resolution of secrecy and loyalty to America, Thursday, April 17, 1776.² He was one of the framers of the North Carolina Constitution and was a member of the House of Commons from Edgecomb County in 1777.³ The Colonial records are full of his able service. In 1778 he was a member of Senate from Nash County. He was Justice of the Peace for Edgecomb County, December 23, 1778.⁴ Nathan Boddie was present when the North Carolina Constitution was framed at Halifax, December 12, 1776, and at the Mecklenburg Declaration which took place May 20, 1775. The last notice I found of Nathan Boddie in the record was November, 1779. The deeds to the grants of the Boddies of Nashville, N. C., are from Lord George Carteret. The earliest in possession of the family is dated 1744. The deeds to Nathan run between 1760 and 1770. He and his wife had seven children, viz.:

THE PERRYS

The Perrys of Franklin County, N. C., are of English descent. It is their tradition the family came from Nancemond County, Va., and that there were seven brothers, who settled in Granville County about 1746. They are a reserved, proud race of people. They left Virginia as they were displeased at their father's second marriage. However, the Perrys followed the old English custom of inheritance of the eldest son, and it is tradition an elder son remained in Virginia. The names of these brothers were:

The Perrys were Royalists, and, with few exceptions, did not fight on the American side during the Revolution. However, they were distinctly military, serving prior and enlisting immediately after the Revolution. Six of these brothers' names may be found in the muster roll of Col. William Eaton's regiment, under Capt. Osbourne Jeffreys' command, October 8, 1754. These were: Jeremiah Perry, John Perry, William Perry, Francis Perry, Joshua Perry, and Nathaniel Perry.¹ These troops of 1754, raised to repel the Indian and French invasion, were the first troops raised by any Colony for service outside of its own borders.²

X. Jeremiah Perry is known to have had a son, Jeremiah Perry, as he sold one of the grants inherited from his father to his uncle, Burwell Perry, which is still in possession of the family.

XXXXXXXX. Burwell Perry, the youngest of the Perry brothers, was about 15 years of age when they came to Granville County, that part of which is now Franklin County. He received grants to 1,577 acres of land. One tract was to 360 acres, and was granted by Lord Granville October 28, 1752. It is de-

scribed as "lying on both sides of the Tar River."¹ Another tract was for 565 acres and dated July 28, 1761,² and it lay "on both sides of Cedar Creek" and adjoined John Perry's line. Another of 652 acres, dated July 28, 1761, "lay on the north side of Tar River."

The old Perry home was built on a tract of land which Burwell Perry purchased of Jeremiah Perry, who was the son of the senior Jeremiah Perry. He gave it to Jeremiah, Jr., and he sold it to his Uncle Burwell. This land has never been out of the Perry hands, of which they are very proud.

Burwell Perry's will is recorded at Louisburg, N. C., and is dated 1803. In this he bequeaths "to beloved wife, Elizabeth, plantation whereon I now live, on east side of Tar River," * * * "after her death to Son, Joshua," his heir. His other sons named were: Jeremiah, John and Burwell; daughters: Edith, Mary Elizabeth.

These Perrys were fond of fine horses, racing and sports of all kinds. The old racetrack a few years ago could still be seen, dimly outlined, and was pointed out to visitors. A number of English customs were still in use with them—such as placing the sideboard in the hallway where hospitality was freely dispensed. Friends and relatives were constantly coming and going. It was not uncommon for them to entertain as many as forty at a time. Friends were always gladly welcomed, but their greatest pleasure was having their cousins—some coming from Georgia, Tennessee and South Carolina, and remained months at a time, with them. Chloe Perry Conyers, wife of William Francis Herring, whose mother was "Betsey Perry," recalls one of those happy trips, which was taken about 1840 by her parents, herself and her brother, "Billy." They lived in Covington, Ga., and the trip was made in the family coach, a huge affair, which had steps that unfolded. The coachman's seat was outside the enclosed coach, which rested upon high springs. At the end of each day's journey they lodged at the nearest house, but always cooked their meals by camp-fire. She recalled being ferried over the rivers on rude floats.



I. Col. Jeremiah Perry, son and heir to Burwell Perry, was appointed captain in the standing army by Governor Johnson, 1781,¹ and afterwards promoted to colonel. He was born April, 1761, and died October 17, 1838. In 1785 he married Temperance Boddie, who was born 1767 and died June 9, 1850. She was the daughter of Senator Nathaniel Boddie, of Nash County, N. C. A little story is told of an incident that took place at her wedding. She was given a handsome silver-mounted side saddle, which was ordered from England by her half-uncle, Micajah Thomas, Jr., son of Micajah Thomas, Sr., who was councillor to King George II in 1769.² He was also Commissioner of Peace, appointed May 27, 1760, from Edgecomb County.³ The story goes that she rode home on this new saddle when a bride of 18 years. The groom, Capt. Jeremiah Perry, in the confusion of being newly-wed, put the saddle on the wrong way, much to the merriment of the assembled guests. Temperance Boddie lost her mother when a child, and at the age of 14 years kept house for her father and cared for the younger brothers and sisters. Her flax-wheel is still in existence and is owned by the author. The Perrys of "Cas-cine," possess a very good portrait of her. She must have resembled the Boddies or the Bennetts and not the Crudups, as one

can see by comparing the likeness with that of the Rev. Josiah Crudup. His portrait and Mourning Hilliard's are strikingly alike.

No. 3. Dr. Willie Perry, never married. He was born January 25, 1793, and died November 17, 1865. He was a man of strong character and exerted an influence for all that was fine and worth while. He was held in the highest esteem and admiration by all. No member of the family dared disregard his wishes. He had intense family pride. There are two good portraits of him extant, one taken in early manhood, which he gave to his favorite sister, Elizabeth Conyers (Mrs. W. D.), who went to Georgia to live. Dr. Willie Perry was a practicing physician and his "shop" was in Louisburg. His plantation ("Oakland") was about five miles from there and comprised 2,400 acres more or less.¹

No. 7. Elizabeth Perry was born February 10, 1798, married November 6, 1822, at "Cascine," Franklin County, N. C., five miles from Louisburg, to Dr. William Denson Conyers, of the same county. They went that same year to Georgia and settled in Covington, Newton County. She died January 31, 1841. I have a letter written by Ross Conyers, her husband's father, in which this trip is described. It is addressed to her father, Col. Jeremiah Perry. She was raised an Episcopalian, but later transferred her allegiance to the Presbyterian church. She resembled her brother, Dr. Willie Perry. Her eyes were dark blue and her eyebrows clearly penciled. The dark eyes and brows are said to have been a Perry trait.



THE CRUDUPS

This family of Halifax County, N. C., are said to be of Welsh origin. It is tradition two brothers—John and George Crudup—were sons of an English Baronet.

Mary Crudup, whose will was made February 1, 1760, and was recorded (March Court) 1761, at Halifax, was the wife of one of these. In this will mention of her son, (X) John Crudup, deceased, is made. He bought land in Halifax County March 13, 1745, "on south side of Beaver Dam Swamp." Mary Crudup in her will bequeaths her entire property to her grandson, (I) George Crudup, son of her son, John. Other grandchildren mentioned "being the children of John Crudup, deceased," were:

This will was witnessed in the presence of Nicholas Dixon (Dickens?). On March 21, 1764, (I) George Crudup made his will, which was recorded at the July Court. He bequeathed 250 acres whereon he was then living to his brother, (IV) Josiah Crudup. This property lay upon the south side of River Dam Swamp, and 280 acres belonging thereto, lying on "Pig Basket," was bequeathed to his daughter, Mary Crudup.

IV. Josiah Crudup, married Mourning Bennett, born 1725, daughter of Mourning Dickens and William Bennett, of Surry County, Va.¹ Nicholas Dickens (also written Dickons) owned land adjacent to above tract. Description of sale of this land is found in the records at Halifax, dated March 19, 1771.

C.¹ Micajah Thomas was also Commissioner of Peace for Edgecomb, appointed May 27, 1760.² The only issue of this union was Micajah Thomas, Jr., born 1757; died 1788. Nathan Boddie was his guardian. He married Ann Hawkins, of Warren County, N. C. She was the daughter of Philemon Hawkins, born 1717, in Gloucester County, Va., and Delia Martin, and granddaughter of Philemon Hawkins, of Gloucester County, Va., who settled there about 1700.³

Mourning Bennett Crudup Thomas married—the third time—a Mr. Smith. Her will was made May 12, 1778, and recorded in Nash County. Nathan Boddie, her son-in-law, and (IV) Josiah Crudup, her son, were appointed her executors.

THE DENSONS

The Densons were a Scotch family who were entitled to bear Arms.¹ William Denson, gentleman, came to this country in 1638 and settled in Isle of Wight County, Va.² He was a Quaker. He received a patent to 450 acres of land, which was dated September 6, 1661, and was described as lying on an arm of the "Western Branch of Nansemond River, called "Indian Creek." This was given to him for transporting nine persons to the Colony and lay in Isle of Wight County. In this instrument his name appears as "William Denson, gentleman," and there is a marginal note to this patent, that it was renewed in the said Denson's name by the order of the Quarter Court, March 27, 1661.³ It would appear that this tract had been patented prior to 1661. This property was in what was called Upper Norfolk, also called Nansemond County. This county was formed from Isle of Wight County in 1639-1640. Mr. William Denson was Burgess from Upper Norfolk in 1659-1660. The meetings were held at "James Cittie."⁴ He is also said to have been Burgess in 1650, which considered with the renewal of the patent is very probably true.

VI. "John Denson, ye son of Frances Denson, widdo woman, married Mary Brydell, ye daughter of Frances Bridell, of Isle of Wight County, the twelfth day of the ninth month, 1692."¹

VI. John Denson received a patent to 295 acres in Isle of Wight County, October 31, 1716. This acreage lay on "Black Water Creek"; and in 1713, 230 acres.² John Denson, Jr., received several patents—130 acres on south side of "Main Black Water Swamp," dated March 30, 1743, in Isle of Wight County. Another was to 400 acres in Southampton County, dated July 5, 1751. Frances Bridle received a patent to 422 acres, located on a branch of the Nansemond River in Isle of Wight County, dated January 20, 1679. John Denson died about 1743-1744.

No. 1. William Denson, son of John Denson, of Isle of Wight County, and Amy Small, daughter of Benjamin Small, of Nansemond County, Chief Justice in 1687,³ were married the twentieth day of ye twelfth month, 1723.

VI. John Denson seems to have married the second time, and to Mary Archdale, the daughter of Governor Archdale, of the Carolinas. His name, however, in all the Colonial records appears as John Danson. Their marriage took place in Pasquotank County, N. C., which is but a few miles from Isle of Wight County and Southampton County, Va. Governor Archdale, in 1708, conveyed his one-eighth interest as one of the Lords Proprietaries of North and South Carolina to his son-in-law, John Danson for £200.⁴ The Densons and the Archdales were both prominent Quakers. The marriage took place but 20 miles from the Densons of Virginia, and either John Denson or his son, William Denson, are known to have moved to North Carolina, the descendants settling in what was later Franklin County.

THE HILLIARDS

The Hilliards first settled in Kent County, Del., in 1680.¹ Mr. Badney, of England, says the head of the house was Major Hilliard, of the Barbados. The North Carolina Hilliards are then most probably descended from Robert Hilliard, who, with John Bridle, William Bennett, John Alston and Stephen Jeffreys were political exiles from England and sent to the Barbados and Virginia after Monmouth's Rebellion.² All of these names are interwoven with the Boddie and Denson lineage. Bridle settled in Isle of Wight County, Va.; William Bennett in Surry County, Va., later removing to Northampton County, N. C.; John Alston in Gates County, N. C., in 1711; and the Jeffreys also came to Granville, N. C. The Hilliards were famed for their brilliancy; the Jeffreys for wild daring. These families were all of England's gentle blood. Robert Hilliard was probably the father of (X) James Hilliard, who settled in Northampton County about 1700. He is said to have married Julia Nusum. One of his wives was Elizabeth, who after his death married Simon Jeffreys. Her (Elizabeth Jeffrey's) will was made June 20, 1742.³ James Hilliard and Elizabeth had the following children:

Leah Crafford Hilliard's¹ sisters were: Lucy Crafford, Elizabeth and Martha Crafford. Their father, Carter Crawford (probably Crafford) married—first—Sarah Swann. They had children. He then married Elizabeth Kearney. Carter Crawford's parents were Robert C. Crawford and Elizabeth Carter. She was the daughter of Mary Carter and granddaughter of William Carter, of London; born 1600, and his wife, Alice Croxan, born 1599, also of London. He died 1654. He had land granted to him in Surry County, Va., in 1638.²

1. Isaac Hilliard and his wife, Leah Crafford, settled in Nash County, N. C., about 11 miles from Rocky Mount on Swift Creek. There were 20,000 acres in the tract known as "Woodlawn." Their son (A) Isaac Hilliard married Mary Murfree. They built "Millbrook," and lived there until they moved to Tennessee. (B) James Hilliard, who married Mourning Boddie, lived at "Hilliardston," and raised a large family. Their son, (c) Isaac Hilliard, who married Lucy Hilliard (she was the daughter of John Hilliard and Betsy Tunstall, and granddaughter of Isaac Hilliard and Leah Crafford, and on maternal

side through Betsey Tunstall, granddaughter of William Tunstall and Betsey Barker). She is said to have refused the hand of Thomas Jefferson. A portrait was painted of her by Hogarth, which is in possession of a descendant—Mr. James Byron Hilliard, of Louisville, Ky. Her daughter, Virginia Tunstall, married C. C. Clay, both of whom were thought to have been implicated in the assassination of Lincoln. She wrote “A Belle of the Fifties,” describing her intercession at Washington for Mr. Clay’s release. Betsey Barker was the daughter of Thomas Barker and Ruth Vicary, a daughter of Ferebe Savage and Mr. Vicary. His first cousin inherited “Millbrook” from his parents, which was built by their uncle and said to have been the handsomest place in North Carolina. The old home of (No. 1) Isaac and Leah was inherited by their son, (C) John, who married Elizabeth Tunstall. In 1845 the old home was torn down and moved by James to within six miles of Rocky Mount, still retaining the name of “Woodlawn.” All that is left of the original “Woodlawn” today is the Hilliard graveyard, inclosed by a rock wall. It is 30 by 100 feet. The wall is 4 feet high and 2 feet thick. Not far away is the old rock spring, the walls of which were built in 1760.

His preliminary education was received from the home of his aunt and her daughter; Mr. and Mrs. John Buxton Williams, of Warren County, and from the "Oaks," the school of William Bingham in Orange County. Later, he entered the Chapel Hill University of North Carolina. He also studied at the University of Virginia. He chose agriculture as his life pursuit, in which he took a deep interest and sought to infuse into the farmers a spirit of progress and improvement. He lived continually at "Bracebridge Hall," the seat of his ancestors, except during the term as Governor. Before holding office as Governor he was County Commissioner for Edgecomb. He was frequently requested by the Commissioners to represent the State in conventions to the Farmers' Convention in St. Paul, 1886. He was a member of the board, managing the Agricultural and Mechanical College at Raleigh, N. C., and member of the World's Fair Commission, and an active member of the State Agricultural Society. He was the first president of the Sub-Alliance of Old Sparta, then president of County Alliance, and then of State Alliance, which last position he held as long as

the Constitution allowed. His name was often presented for high positions, but he invariably declined. His nomination for Governor was unexpected and unsought. Elected in November, 1892, by almost 40,000 majority, his term of office was from January, 1893, to January, 1897. He died at his home July 22, 1900. Governor Carr's paternal grandmother was Celia Johnston, daughter of Col. Jonas Johnston, who was severely wounded in the battle of Stons, June 20, 1779, while endeavoring to reach his home. Colonel Johnston also served in the Legislature and was a member of the Provincial Congress and in the House of Commons. Governor Carr's children were:
