OUR HARDING FAMILY

FOREWORD

In the beginning, the present work was intended to comprise only that particular branch of the Harding family to which the compiler's family belonged.

This attitude seemed selfish, as it would include but one family of the Revolutionary War ancestor, and would not prove of material help to the other descendants of Samuel and Love (Mayhew) Harding in joining the patriotic societies. It would also cut them off from their genealogy and "proof of their descent from the immortal Puritans".

There were fourteen children in the family of Samuel and Love (Mayhew) Harding. Thirteen of them lived to grow up, marry and be blessed with children.

There may be omissions of names and dates, but remember the vast number of branches which have sprung up from our family tree. The living members of the family will need to supply omissions and correct errors. To quote the words of the venerable author of the original work who recognized the imperfections of the records:

"To render aid the reader must banish mental laziness, prefer a work of love to cavils at imperfections, write plain and look for his reward in the acknowledgment and recollection of his service, and in the gratitude of posterity" --

The compiler of "Our Harding Family" has tried in every way to obtain the records. If anyone of the family is left out of the Genealogy, it is not her fault. Do not let any of the descendants reproach the compiler, or say "I belong to that family, why is my record not a part of it?"

ORIGIN OF NAME

Hardin is doubtless a Gothic word, as it is found in all the dialects of the Goths. The name was found very early in Europe; it existed in Germany, Scandinavia, and Britain prior to the establishment of the fuedal system, and for many centuries before the adoption of surnames and the formations of dialects in Northern Europe.

The Gothic tribes and especially the Saxons, seem to have delighted in the word, as though it had been their sobriquet of some successor of Wodin, or son of Thor, or significant of such martial qualities as they most admired. Perhaps commemorative of some historical event in which they gloried. For between the settlement of Hengist and Horsa in England A.D. 450 and the Norman Conquest, the name has been given to seven localities in Central and Southern Britain.

By 1086, when the Doomsday Book was written, Hardin had become common as a family name, and is recorded in the Latin of the period as Hardinus, Hardine, Hardineus and Hardingus. In the eleventh century coats of arms were given to men of that name.

In French, "hardi" derived probably from the Normans, signifies bold, courageous, daring, and stout-hearted.



HARDING COAT OF ARMS

The argent or silver shield signifies a clear conscience, and fame acquired through loyal service to his country. The bend is a decoration of honor, a scarf or shoulder belt -- meaning protection or defense of the country.

It also represents justice -- being blue -- the color of loyalty, "true blue" tells of the Hardings' faithfulness. The Martlett is a swallow without legs, always on the wing, with merit to raise themselves.

The Falcon is emblem of vigilence, eager and powerful in pursuit. Hardings evidently performed worthy exploits.

HARDING PIONEERS IN AMERICA

From "The Mardings in America", Wilber J. Harding.

Captain Sir Robert Gorges, a son of Sir Ferdinando, for his valiant services to the Crown during the Venetian Wars, was in 1623 appointed by the Council of New England "Governor of the Plymouth Country". Sir Ferdinando was styled the 'father of colonization in America' and received from the king a charter which constituted him a proprietor of Maine. Captain Gorges was given a grant of land on Massachusetts Bay.

The wife of Captain Gorges was Mary Harding, the daughter and heir of William Harding, Gent. Soon after his official appointment, Governor Gorges, with his wife and 'sundrie passengers and their families' started for the new world.

In the list of passengers, accompanying Mary (Harding) Gorges and the Governor, we find the names of John Harding, wife, and young sons, Joseph Harding, and Richard Harding and wife and infant son. Indications point that they were three brothers, and cousins of Lady Gorges. From the very earliest times there has been a tradition in the family of 'three immigrant brothers who came to America at about the time of the Pilgrim Fathers'. This tradition has been investigated and accepted as a matter of history and fact.

The History of the Harding family in America is a history of the pioneers. Among the first settlers in any part of the country there has been a Harding. Original settlers of Braintree, Massachusetts, of parts of Rhode Island, then to Connecticut, New York, Pennsylvania, and even farther west, to Minnesota have they traveled for a Homestead Claim. Their right as settlers they have contested against all obstacles, for a peaceful settlement.

Of the three immigrant brothers, Richard, Joseph and John Harding, Richard was the eldest. It is from Richard's line that Warren G. Harding, President of the United States, came.

The line direct is from John Harding, the head, born in 1567, died in 1637. In the Will of John Harding I, he granted Real Estate to his brother William, generally supposed to be the father of Mary Harding Gorges, and money and personal property to his sons, six in number, of whom three had migrated to America.

The first settlement in the New World was at Weymouth, the ancient Wessagusset of the Gorges party. The Hardings were 'Mariners engaged in the fisheries', Richard, John II, and Joseph.

The Joseph Line, The First Generation in America

Our Harding Family came from the Joseph Harding line. His name appears in the records as Joseph Harding of Braintree, Massachusetts. JOSEPH HARDING married MARTHE DOANE of Plymouth in 1624. He had abandoned the Governor Gorges party and removed to Plymouth.

Joseph and Martha (Doane) Harding had two sons:

- 1. John Harding born in 1625;
- 2. Joseph Harding, Jr. born in 1629;

JOSEPH I, the father, died in 1630; Martha, the mother, died in 1633. Martha committed her sons to the care of her brother, John Doane. John and Joseph, Jr. Harding completed their minority with their uncle, John Doane in Duxbury and Eastham, then returned to Braintree to occupy their patrimonial estate, of which neither the ignoring of their claims by Governor Gorges, nor the grant of Braintree to Boston, and the assignment of Braintree's lands to others had deprived them.

Second Generation in America -

JOSEPH HARDING II, son of Joseph and Martha (Doane) Harding, married Bethia Cook April 4, 1660. Bethia was the daughter of Josias and Elizabeth (Ring) Cook of Eastham, formerly of Plymouth, and one of the grantees of Little Compton. Joseph II was early admitted a citizen of Eastham, and there his 10 children were born.

In 1862, 700 descendants of the two brothers had been definitely traced, the greater portion of them from Joseph II and Bethia Harding.

Record of Joseph Harding II for Society of Founders and Patriots Joseph Harding II was one of the founders of Eastham, Mass.

His great grandson Samuel Harding, and his great great grandson, Samuel Harding, Jr. were in the Revolutionary War.

Third Generation in America -

JOSEPH HARDING III, son of Joseph II and Bethia (Cook) Harding, called Capt. Joseph, married Dinah Hedges, probably daughter of Tristram Hedges, prior to 1693. They settled at Monomit in s.w. quarter of town. He was Selectman seven years, Treasurer two years, and held other local offices.

In Annals of Eastham 1695 among the legal inhabitants are found the names of Joseph Harding, Josiah Harding, Maziah Harding, brothers.

Joseph Harding III became Lieut. of the Military Co. as early as 1702, and Capt. as early as 1706, holding same until 1715. Moderator of town meetings, 1718, 1720, 1735. He had interests in common lands and with Thomas Atkins bought of Josephus Quason in 1697 the interest of the latter in the Quason Lands in Harwich, later receiving 1/16th part of the division of these lands. He lived on the Neck southeast of Cockle Cove, then called Ragged Neck, the whole of which he owned at his death. Harding's Beach, which adjoins this Neck, was named for him.

Dinah died Jan. 28, 1738 or 39, aged 71 years; Joseph died early in 1745. His Will was dated Feb. 16, 1738 or 39, and proved May 8, 1745.

Oct. 1, 1730 Joseph III was appointed Administrator of the estate of his son Joseph deceased.

In the Will of Joseph III, proved May 8, 1745 the Homestead at Ragged Neck was left to his son Nehemiah, who was his Executor. His son Maziah had a homestead and land on each side of road leading out of Neck to the highway, bought by the testator of Samuel Taylor in part and of Michael Stewart in part.

SAMUEL HARDING, son of Samuel and Sarah Harding, was born in Falmouth, Mass. Sept. 25, 1766; married Love Mayhew of Martha's Vineyard Sept. 25, 1789. She was the daughter of Joseph and Love (Hillman) Mayhew and was born Feb. 26, 1772.

The family moved from Cape Cod to Brookfield, Vt. (Orange Co.) with five children, or between the years 1792-1800. In Vermont nine more children were born. In 1817 they moved to Pennsylvania, Sullivan Township, Tioga County. At this time Love Mayhew Harding wrote: "Where we now live, thanks be to God Who has preserved us hitherto. Praying that we may live more to His Honor and Glory than ever we have done," Love died Feb. 27, 1850; Samuel died April 16, 1850; both are buried in King Hill Cemetery, Old State Road, Mainesburg, Pa.



Service of Samuel Harding, Jr. for Daughters of the American Revolution

Samuel Harding, Jr., born in Falmouth, Massachusetts, Sept. 25, 1766, enlisted in the Revolutionary War in November, 1782 and served until December, 1783 under Capt. Turner and Captain Marshall, Col. Vose in the 5th and 1st Mass. Infantry respectively. He applied for Pension July 25, 1832, while a resident of Sullivan, Tioga Co., Pennsylvania at the age of 66 years. He was placed on the pension of Tioga County, Pennsylvania 1832, for service of private in the Massachusetts Continental Line.

He walked to Washington from Sullivan, Pennsylvania to claim his pension.

Shield argent, or silver, made of pearls when the arms are formed of jewels. This means that the Mayhew (Mayou), first bearer of the Arms, was a man of immaculate honor, a messenger of peace, studious and retiring. The chevron, like a roof, means that he protected his country. Black signifies that he did this with secrecy and great discretion. The birds are emblematic of mind or intellect, and of messengers eluding and beguiling the foe. The lozenges indicate marriage with a noble and wealthy woman, or descent on the maternal side from some titled house.

HISTORICAL SKETCH OF THE MAYHEW FAMILY

From C. E. Banks History of Martha's Vineyard

The name of Mayhew, as an English family name, is spelt in many ways, varying from Mayhowe to Mao. By the diversity and variety of the name the identity of Mayhew and Mao is taught. From this consideration a ray of light is thrown upon the derivation of the name.

One early occurrence of the name is found in Glover's Roll of Arms to date between 1245 and 1250. Herbert le Fitz Mathewe is there mentioned. The same Roll of Arms gives the clue to the origin of the name as a Christian name. Bardslay, in his "English Surnames" mentions instances of the name.

Shakespeare, in "King Lear" Act III, scene 4, says:
"The Prince of Darkness is a gentleman
Modo he's called and Mahu."

One, John Mayow, was Fellow of All Souls, Oxford. Richard Mayo became Chancellor of Oxford in 1503, and Bishop of Hereford in 1504. He died in 1516.

In the records of the Commissioners for the United Colonies, there appeared a letter, now in the Connecticut Archives, written by Governor Mayhew, sealed with Arms, which, upon examination, proved to be the Arms, with a mullet for difference, of the Mayhew family of Dinton, Wiltshire, a county family of considerable distinction. These facts, taken in connection with the bestowal by Mayhew of the names of Tinsbury and Chilmark on two adjoining towns on Martha's Vineyard, (the latter settlement having been originally chartered as Tisbury Manor), and the fact that Tisbury and Chilmark are adjoining parishes in Wiltshire, and separated by a few miles only from Dinton, made it quite evident that this locality was the one which should reveal his family connection.

Such Trades advance and never chance in all their Trading yet:

Though some deride they lose, abide, here*s gain beyond man's wit.

Thomas Mayhew was twenty-one years of age when his father died. This event placed upon him the necessity of individual responsibility. He became a merchant. He was bred in England, probably Southampton. This seaport was at that time an important commercial center in England and with Bristol ranked secondary to the great port of London.

As a merchant of a maritime port Mayhew became interested in foreign trade and in the colonization ventures. Mr. Matthew Craddock was among the great merchants of London and he became an early adventurer in this line of business, and was among the first to support the companies engaged in the colonization of New England. As a suburban merchant Mayhew often went to London. He became well known to Craddock and the business relations of later years were laid.

Tradition says Matthew married about 1619 Abigail Parkus, probably a daughter of the Parkhirst family, of which George Parkhurst was the first New England representative, and who settled in Watertown, Massachusetts.

Thomas Mayhew Jr. was the only known child of this early marriage. He was christened by the name of his father. It is not known when nor where his mother died.

The Massachusetts Bay Company in 1628 were actively promoting their new settlements at Salem and vicinity, and sending supplies thither. Their records at this time contained the following entry:

16 March 1628

Bespoke of Maro at $10\frac{1}{2}$ p yrd for beds and boulsters 20 bed tikes, Scotch ticking 3/4 broad and 2-1/16 long & $1\frac{1}{2}$ yrd wide; 11 yrds each bed and boulster.

Mass. Col. Rec. I; 35.

The sketch continues: In two years more Mayhew had determined to follow to New England the "beds and boulsters" and "bed tikes" he had sold to the emigrants for the latest English colony.

It was then Matthew Craddock made arrangements with Thomas Mayhew to go to New England and act as his representative in business matters and personally oversee his great interests in the Colonies.

Mayhew made his headquarters at Medford occupying the "Greate Stone House" which had been built for Graddock. Contemporaneous records place the year of Mayhew's emigration as 1631, the earliest record of Mayhew found in this country. It is supposed he took with him his wife and young son, though she may have died before his emigration.

Thomas Mayhew devoted the next three years to the services of his employer, attending to his investments and managing his maritime and mercantile interests in the colony. On May 16, 1634, Mayhew had evidently decided to "cast his fortunes" with the new country, and on this date was admitted as a freeman by the General Court. He was very actively identified with the political abd business life of the colony. He served on many committees, occupied various offices, was Representative to the General Court.

About this time Thomas Mayhew contracted a second marriage. It is claimed the marriage occurred in London, probably Mayhew had returned to England for business, and while there found a new wife. This second wife was Jane, the widow of Thomas Paine, her maiden name, family tradition gives, was Jane Gallion, Thomas and Jane (Gallion) Paine had two children, Thomas Jr., and Jane. Both were minors when their father died. Jane was the elder. Thomas Paine left considerable estate in England for his children.

In the New England home Jane Paine found a big step-brother, at that time about fifteen years of age. She was probably five or six years old. In Medford, Mass. two daughters, Hannah and Bethia, were born to Thomas Mayhew Sr. and his second wife.

Craddock, hard to suit, sent a new factor to New England to look after his interests. This terminated the business relations between Mayhew and Craddock; this was about 1637. Mayhew then removed to Watertown. Here he was also actively identified with the town and its affairs, he was chosen Selectman, and elected as Deputy to the General Court to represent his new home town in the Cononial Assembly.

A third daughter was born, Martha by name. In 1639 or 40 came a fourth and last daughter, Mary, born January 14.

Due to the scarcity of money, Mayhew had difficulties. In the midst of them came the great event which changed his future life; he had the opportunity to acquire the title and sovereignty of Martha's Vineyard.

While in Boston on business, Thomas Mayhew met James Forrett, agent of the Earl of Stirling of Scotland. Forrett was encouraging migration for the colonizing of the unsettled Islands of Nantucket and Martin's or Martha's Vineyard. Mayhew, then in his 50th year, accepted this as an opportunity of restoring his fortunes, and determined to purchase these Islands and start a new home, perhaps found a new Colony. For the Islands were situated without the lawful bounds of the territory of Massachusetts Bay.

Unforeseen objections arose. These Islands were also claimed by Richard Vynes, steward to Ferdynando Gorges. The controversy was settled by Thomas Mayhew entering first into an agreement for the purchase of Nantucket, and second for the purchase of the Vineyard and the Elizabeth Isles. Then Thomas Mayhew secured the rights as well from the Gorges interests, which authorized the aforesaid Mayhew to "plant and inhabit".

Thomas Mayhew now had three documents, one from Forrett, the agent of Lord Stirling, one from Richard Vynes, the steward of Ferdynando Gorges, also the Rights from the Gorges interests, According to Mayhew's view, however, there was still another party to satisfy, the aboriginal owners, the Indians. It is presumed that before Dec. 1, 1642, Thomas Mayhew Sr. made his first visit to the Islands, together with his son, and possibly others interested in the new territory and on this visit secured the required release.

Thomas Mayhew Sr. did not come to settle on the Island until 1646. Instead, the father turned over this venture to his son, as one of the patentees. Thomas Mayhew Jr. was then about 24 years of age. He was the local Governor of the new settlement until his father came.

It was a hazardous and lonesome task for Thomas Mayhew Jr. with his few pioneers cut off from communication with the distant settlers on the main-land. At this period there were probably not less than 3,000 Indians on the Islands, and it is doubtful if there were three dozen whites at the new settlement, and for ten years, too, following its purchase.

It was a delicate situation. The Indians of Noepe--the Indian name of Martha's Vineyard--were very savage. However, the peacable intentions of the English were in time made clear to the suspicious, and under the leader-ship and influence of the high-minded youth, who came ready to be their bemefactor, the natives ceased to be a menace, and always the two races lived in unusual harmony.

In 1646 the elder Thomas came with his family, with them, of course, were the step-daughter, and step-son, Jane and Thomas Paine. In 1647 Thomas Mayhew Jr. and the step-daughter, Jane Paine, were married.

The life of Rev. Thomas Mayhew Jr., during his residence of fifteen years on the Island of Martha's Vineyard, is interwoven with the story of the Indian Missions. He gave no time to other pursuits, and rarely left the Island on secular business. His father said of him, "The work was followed by him when 'twas bare with him for foode and rayment, and then indeede there was nothing in sight any waies but God's promises."

Thomas Mayhew Jr. had six children, Matthew, born in 1648, was the oldest, and John, born in 1651-2 was the youngest son and became a preacher to the Indians. Right here is a good place to mention that the Sacerdotal order continued unbroken upwards of 160 years. Adding to the first three already mentioned, John's son, Experience is the fourth, Experience son, Jonathan, the fifth, and Jonathan's brother, Zachariah,

When matters connected with the patrimony of his wife's brother, or the Paine estate in England demanded attention, it was considered necessary that Thomas Mayhew Jr. and Thomas Paine should go to England and settle the affairs permanently. Rev. Mayhew decided to combine this personal business with his own public labors, to give an account of the state of the Indians, and to advance by the most proper measures religion among them. To do this he decided to take with him one of the converts as a living evidence of the power of the Gospel of Christ.

Thomas Mayhew's absence was mourned in advance by his Indian congregations. He arranged a farewell meeting of his faithful followers. The legend is that he went to the most distant assembly of them where he held a service of worship and song, and gave them a parting injunction to be steadfast in his absence. His journey toward the east end of the Island became almost a triumphal procession. The Indians refused to consider this as a farewell and followed him homeward till he came to a spot on the "Old Mill Path", since known in song and story as the "Place on the Wayside" where hundreds of others were gathered.

A great combined service was held and the simple children of this flock heard their beloved sherherd give a blessing to them, and say the last sad farewells to them individually and as a congregation. It was a solemn occasion, long held in memory by all who participated.

Thomas Mayhew and his two companions departed from Boston for London in a ship, James Garrett, Master. Two ships sailed at the same time, John Pierce, Master of the other. The John Pierce ship reached her destination in safety; it was never known what disaster overtook the James Garrett ship. When this ship cleared the white receding shores of Cape Cod, in her outward voyage, and headed for the green pastures of Old England, it was the last seen of her, and of her distinguished passengers. Weeks and months passed by without tidings of Master Garrett; first came hope, then fear, then despair.

The "Place on the Wayside where Rev. Thomas Mayhew solemnly and affectionately took his leave of his Indians, became a hallowed spot. It is a part of the legendary lore of this spot that no Indian passed by it without

casting a stone into a heap there. This heap of stones grew to be a cairn, a great monument in remembrance of their absent leader.

This cairn is one of the historic places on the Island, and has been suitably made a permanent memorial by the Martha's Vineyard Chapter of the Daughters of the American Revolution of Edgartown, who on July 27, 1901 dedicated a bronze tablet, set in a large boulder and placed on top of the stone pile. The inscription on the tablet reads:

THIS ROCK MARKS THE "PLACE ON THE WAYSIDE" WHERE THE

REV. THOMAS MAYHEW, JR. Son of Governor Mayhew

FIRST PASTOR OF THE CHURCH OF CHRIST ON MARTHA'S VINEYARD

AND THE FIRST MISSIONARY TO THE INDIANS OF NEW ENGLAND

Solemnly and Affectionately Took Leave of the Indians

Who, in Large Numbers, Had Followed Him Down
From the Western Part of the Island,
Being His Last Worship and Interview With Them
Before Embarking For England in 1657,

Thomas Mayhew Sr. became supervisor of the work of converting the Indians when his son left for England. When no tidings ever came of the ship, then it was that the father, the Governor, at the age of seventy, determined to take his son's place and bravely began the study of the native language. Heroes are not all young men, although many begin very early to be heroic. This staunch missionary began preaching at the different plantations week by week in turn, sometimes walking twenty miles through the woods to meet his Indian congregation. The first Indian Church was organized in 1670, with a native pastor. There were then about three thousand native Christians upon the Island.

Mr. Mayhew kept on with his missionary work until he died in his ninety-third year, an unremitting worker, and a wonderful record. His grandson, John, became associated with the work and was active in it until he died in 1688. Then his son, Experience, took it up and continued in it for thirty-two years. In 1799 he translated the Psalms and John's Gospel-Two more mentioned elsewhere, Jonathan, and Zachariah, a family to be

proud of, and the family from which Love Mayhew, the wife of Samuel Harding, came.

For thirty years Thomas Mayhew had been responsible to none in his governing the Islands, the title for which he had derived from Lord Stirling and Sir Ferdynando Gorges. When he procured this title these Islands were without the bounds of Massachusetts Bay. Now Patents or Claims were shown to include all Islands, with the exception of Block Island, from Cape Cod to Cape May. Geography was little known in those days and a Claim was almost as good as a Patent.

As controversies arose Thomas Mayhew was "desired to bring" his Patents, Writings, and Other Papers to an interview with Governor Lovelace at the Conference held at Fort James, N. Y. in 1671. The most important business was concluded, and is best told in the records of that session of the Council:

"Whereas, Mr. Thomas Mayhew of Martin, or Martha's Vineyard, hath been an ancient inhabitant there where by God's blessing he hath been an instrument of doeing a great deale of good both in settling several plantacons there as also in reclayming and civilizing the Indians: for an Encouragement to him in the prosecution of that Designe and acknowledgment of his good Services: it is ordered and agreed upon that the said Mr. Thomas Mayhew shall dureing his naturall life bee Governor of the Island called Martin's or Martha's Vineyard, both over the English inhabitants and Indians, for the which he shall have a Commission."

The following is a copy of the Commission issued to him on this date:

"Francis Lovelace Esq. &c--Whereas I have conceived a good Opinion of the Capacity and Integrity of Mr. Thomas Mayhew to be Goovernour and Chiefe Magistrate of the Island Martin's or Martha's Vineyard to manage public Affayres with the Aid and Good Advice of the Assistants to be chosen there, and have thought fitt to Nominate Constitute and Appoint Mr. Thomas Mayhew to be Governor and Chiefe Magistrate of the said Island Martin's or Martha's Vineyard during his Naturall Life in the management of wch Employment hee is to use his best Skill and Endeavor to preserve his Majesties Peace and to keep the inhabitants in good order,

And all persons are hereby required to give to the said Mr. Thomas Mayhew such respect and Obedience as belongs to a Person invested by Commission and Authority from his keyall Highness in the office and Employment of a Governour and Chiefe Magistrate in the Island aforesaid. And hee the said Mr. Thomas Mayhew is duely to Observe and Obey such Orders and Instructions with are already given for the well governing of the Place or such other directions as from Time to Time he shall receive from mee: And for whatsoever the said Mr. Thomas Mayhew shall lawfully act or doe in Prosecucon of the Premises, This my Commission shall bee his sufficient Warrant and Discharge

Given etc. this 8th day of July in the 23rd year of his Majesties Reigne Annoq. Dni., 1671.

This Instrument was drawn in 1671. Mr. Thomas Mayhew lived until Saturday evening, Mch. 25, 1682.

In 16°1 the Island of Martha's Vineyard was annexed to Massachusetts.

THOMAS MAYHEW, baptised 1 April 1593 at Tisbury, England, was the Governor Thomas Mayhew of Martha's Vineyard, and was the first of the name and family in this country. Ancestry of Benjamin Hillman, Jr.

John Hillman, born 1651, came to America in 1667. The first definite knowledge we have of him is at Tisbury sometime between 1675-1678 when he became possessed of some land. This he sold in Jan. 1679. He went to Nantucket, Here he married Hannah, daughter of Edward and Judith Cottle about 1681. She was born in 1661 in Amesbury, Mass. He purchased land in Chilmark-Oct. 11, 1711. The births of 7 children are recorded, the 4th was Benjamin.

Benjamin Hillman was born about 1690; married Susanna, daughter of James and Hannah Samson of Dartmouth May 15, 1722. He removed to Dartmouth where he became an Inn Keeper, but returned to Chilmark. Benjamin died Apr. 22, 1745; Susanna died in 1761. Benjamin and Susanna had 7 children of whom the 4th was Benjamin Jr.

Our Mayflower ancestor was Henry Samson, the father of James Samson.

Benjamin Hillman Jr. was born in Chilmark July 31, 1727; he married for his first wife Love, daughter of Gershom and Mary (Manter) Cathcart Feb. 4, 1761. She was born July 13, 1725; she died before 1761. Benjamin Hillman, Jr. married (second) Abigail Manter Feb. 4, 1761; Benjamin died Sept. 1784. There were 14 children, eight of whom by his first wife. The first child was Love, born 1746. Love Hillman (4) married Joseph Mayhew (6).

MAYFLOWER ANCESTOR HENRY SAMSON

Henry Samson, a young English lad, came to America in the "Mayflower" with his cousins, Mr. and Mrs. Edward Tilley. Another young cousin, Humility Cooper, came also with the Tilleys.

Henry was too young to sign the Immortal Compact of Nov. 11 in the cabin of the Mayflower while at anchor in the harbor of Provincetown. According to Goodwin's Pilgrim Republic, page 184, Henry was but six years old.

Mr. and Mrs. Tilley died within the first year after arriving in America. Humility Cooper was returned to England soon after the death of her cousins, the Tilleys.

Henry Samson was enumerated in assignment of land in 1623, and the division of cattle in 1627. In 1637 he was admitted a Freeman of Plymouth Colony. He early removed to Duxbury, probably with the first settlers of the town. He was one of the original grantees of Bridgewater 1645, but did not remove hither.

Henry Samson married Ann Plummer in 1636, probably then was 21 years of age. He was Constable of Duxbury in 1661, "an office of high trust and responsibility and none were elected to it but men of good standing" Winsor.

A Copy of Great Grandmother Harding's Paper

Love Mayhew, born at Martha's Vineyard Feb. 26, 1772. Timothy Mayhew and Abiah (Tilton) Mayhew were her grandparents on her father's side. Benjamin Hillman and Love (Cathcart) Hillman on her mother's side. Joseph and Love (Hillman) Mayhew were her parents; they had four children, one son and three daughters. When Love was five years old her father enlisted in the Revolutionary War. He died in 1778-9. Her mother then married Micah Robinson, and had one more daughter.

Samuel and Love Harding moved from Cape Cod with five children and then (had nine more) moved into Pennsylvania in 1817, "where we now live, thanks be to God, Who has preserved us hitherto, praying that we may live more to His honor and glory than ever we have done."

This is a short and broken genealogy of your parentage by your-----in her fifty-seventh year.

The record of Joseph Mayhew, the father of Love, is found in the Massachusetts Archives (Rev. Rolls) Volumes 36-43-14-part 2--69-7-22.

Petition for more troops, Tisbury, Mch. 21, 1776. Committee for Chilmark, Joseph Mayhew, Uriah Tilton, Nathaniel Bassett. Vol. 1 p. 346.

Thirty-five citizens of Chilmark alone signed a petition for protection from falling into the hands of the enemy, Chilmark Jan. 27, 1777. Joseph Mayhew, Benjamin Hillman Sr. and Jr., Timothy Mayhew and others. Joseph Mayhew's efforts to further the cause of American liberty were checked at every turn by the Tories who lived in Chilmark.

The Council ordered Joseph Mayhew to deliver the ammunition to the commanding officer of the Fort at Dartmouth, and thus the last means of defense was removed. Page 366, Apr. 16, 1778. Joseph Mayhew with others were called "head Whiggs" by Brig. Joseph Otis. "The committeemen (of whom Joseph was one) were confined for having concealed a quantity of ammunition", this is a conjecture. It was during Grey's Raid.

Another note: A Committee of Safety for Duke's County was appointed by the Provincial Congress on Apr. 12, 1776 with Joseph Mayhew of Chillmark as chairman.

Samuel Harding, son of Samuel, was born in Chatham, Mass. Love Mayhew, daughter of Joseph Mayhew, was born on Martha's Vineyard. Samuel and Love were married in 1789 and lived on Cape Cod where their first five children were born. Between the years 1798-1800 the family moved from Cape Cod to Brookfield, Vt. and here nine more children were born.

The call of the West claimed them. Samuel and Love decided to journey into Northern Pennsylvania. Three of their children had married. Joshua, the eldest, after a stay in Vermont, returned to Falmouth, Mass., and in 1814, when 24 years of age, married Lucy Hatch and they went to Chatham,

Mass., to live. Sarah married Elijah Gaylord in 1813, they continued to live in Brookfield, Vt. until 1818, when they, too went into Northern Pennsylvania. Lucy married Jared Hyde in 1814, they remained in Vermont the rest of their lives.

In 1816 Samuel and Love, and their unmarried children, Baby Josia, but two years of age, drove from Brookfield, Vt. with an ox cart into Sullivan Township, Tioga County. An arduous undertaking in those early days to journey through Vermont, New York State, and into Penrsylvania, and here they hewed out a home from "God's towering hemlocks", and here Samuel and Love died and are buried in King Hill Cemetery, on the Old State Road, after living in Sullivan Township from 1816 to 1850.

Sullivan Township was organized in 1816. It was taken from Covington Township, and embraced the township of Rutland. When the township was organized, the early settlers, who were a number of Revolutionary soldiers, who had seen service under Gen. John Sullivan, gave the township the name of Sullivan in honor of their old commander. Settlements in the Township began in 1803. Familiar names to our Harding families are the names of these first settlers in Sullivan Township, their children marrying the Harding children. Among these people we find Palmers, Rumsey, Rose, Packard, Orvis, Welch, Dewey, Crippen, many families of Smith, Slingland, Schrader, Kelts, Doud, Gaylord, Richter, Hammond, Ashley, and many more,

Towns sprang up, with their stores, homes, churches, schools, sawmills, cemetery land was set apart, farms surrounding. The schools of those early days were subscription schools. The first school in the township was a log structure, and known as Dewey's School House. The first store was started by John Gray. Soon Timothy and Joseph Orvis opened a store on King's Hill. The Sullivan Postoffice was established in 1822, James B. Dewey was Postmaster from 1828 to 1848.

Most of the Harding family married and first settled in this part of Pennsylvania. Simeon was an exception; he settled in Michigan first, then in Minnesota. The grandchildren of Samuel and Love, many of them wandered to other States and towns. New York State holds many, Indiana and Illinois, and the four generations from the grandchildren are found in many states of the United States. This makes twelve generations of Hardings from Joseph, the first of our line to settle in America.

Joshua Harding taught school when a young man. He was born on Cape Cod and removed with the family to Vermont. He returned to Falmouth, Mass., where he married Lucy Hatch when about 24 years of age. By trade he was a shoemaker. He thought much of his books and music, but never had much money.

The family of Lucy Hatch were well-to-do. After marriage, Joshua and Lucy went to Chatham, Mass. to live, and there all of their children were born. Joshua continued his music in Chatham; he played the bass viol, and he played it in all the Churches at different times. Many of the Harding family were musical.

"Uncle Joseph Gould did some farming, not extensively, as this is not a specially farming district, his cows, horse, chickens, pigs, ducks, gardens and some grain foods was all. Aside from this he, with a company of men, engaged in the weiring business. His son, Oscar Mayhew Gould, kept on in his father's business of which he was a partner with the Company before he died. Oscar's son, Harold Gould, for sometime followed the same business. Now I think, he does different things in the fishing business around about the shores, Shell-fishing, Lobstering, Scalloping, etc. You see here on Cape Cod we live near the sea, and most of the men depended on its resources for a livelihood.

"Lucy Emma Gould was a partial invalid for more than 50 years. She was almost always at home. A very bright mind, and capable of filling a prominent place in life. She kept very well informed, but for the most part was a 'shut-in'. Her hand-work was exquisite. She was really an expert genealogist, and I know would be keenly interested in the work you are doing. She enjoyed facts in 'black and white', so to speak, and kept tab of many things.

"My father and several of his sons were sea men. Father, Sea Captain, went on foreign voyages until his health somewhat failed, then traded along the coast. He was one of the best pilots, so men said, that went out of Boston Harbor.

"One of Uncle Samuel's granddaughters married an Episcopal minister, who is now preaching in Brooklyn, N. Y. They have a daughter, Inez Frazer, who is quite a famous musician.

"After they married, Aunt Susan, Uncle Silas, my father (Walden) and Uncle Albert lived and died in Chatham. Now I am the only one living here. Cousin Silas is here part of the year. Uncle Samuel went as drummer-boy in the Civil War."

Dr. Joseph Mayhew (2) Harding, son of Joseph and Pamelia (Permelia?) M. Harding was born Feb. 2, 1828, at Sullivan, Pa. At twenty-five Ignace Jan Paderewski prevailed upon him to return to music and in the years that followed Mr. Daly became an associate of George Gershwin, the composer, who was a song-plugger when Mr. Daly met him and rose to an almost indispensable position on musical Broadway.

Mr. Daly was born in Cincinnati. His father, Capt. Bill Daly, two uncles, Bob and Dan Daly, and two aunts, Lucille and Margaret Daly, were all known on the stage. Dan Daly remained on the stage longer than other members of the family, and became a famous comedian. Lucille and Margaret Daly married Hap Ward and Harry Vokes, nationally known comedy team of the day.

At six William Daly began taking piano lessons, at first from the neighborhood tutor and later from Carl Faelton, one-time head of the Boston Conservatory, and his brother, Rheinhold Faelton. When he was twelve, the future conductor had already studied counterpoint, harmony and composition and was ready to give up music to prepare for Harvard.

At Harvard he was active in student activities and was a member of the track team. When he received his bachelor's degree in music in 1908 he vowed that he would never take another music lesson. As far as could be learned, he never did. From College he went West and started trucking freight. When this became distastcful to him he came to New York and in 1909, through the late Lincoln Steffens, obtained a position on the editorial staff of "Everybody's Magazine". In his new job he shared an office with Walter Lippman, columnist and writer, who was then writing for "Everybody's", Two years later, at twenty-four, Mr. Daly was conducting the affairs of the publication in the capacity of managing editor. In an adjoining room Sinclair Lewis was editing an adventure magazine.

Early Backer of Edna Ferber

While editing "Everybody's", Mr. Daly encouraged such writers as Peter B. Kyne and Edna Ferber. Miss Ferber sent one of her first stories to "Everybody's". At that time, though, Mr. Daly was not yet in a position to make his own decisions as to what the magazine purchased. He woted to accept her story, but was overruled. Another magazine gave her \$200. When she sent a second to "Everybody's", Mr. Daly was again overruled and he wrote her a personal note telling her to try "The Saturday Evening Post". She did and got \$500 for it. Miss Ferber's letters of appreciation for the personal interest which Mr. Daly took in her work remained among his proudest possessions.

A few years later, Mr. Daly, still a literary man, but already beginning to yearn for a return to music, conducted a choral number at a concert in Paderewski's honor. The Polish statesman-musician admired Mr. Daly's technique and advised him to abandon his literary career and become a musician. Through Paderewski's efforts he was appointed assistant conductor of the Chicago Opera Company, but when he was ready to take over his new duties the opera's season was cancelled and Mr. Daly was jobless. The World War had caused the closing of the organization.

He brushed up on his orchestrating and looked to Broadway for a living. He played piano in several Broadway orchestras. Charles Dillingham, the producer, soon took him in hand and as a result the musician Daly was introduced to Jerome Kern, George Gershwin, Lou Hirsch and other composers. Mr. Daly, in the years that followed, conducted and orchestrated numbers in

five Gershwin shows, and served in a similar capacity for Vincent Youmans, the late Florenz Ziegfeld, Earl Carroll, George White and other producers.

Had Hand in Many Ziegfeld Hits

"Sweet and Low", "Manhattan Mary", "Lady Butterfly", "Hold Everything", the "Scandals", "Wake Up and Dream" and other Broadway hits over a period of years were productions in which Mr. Daly either collaborated, wrote the orchestrations, conducted or performed all three functions.

As an N.B.C. conductor he was considered doubly valuable as one of the few men who could play and conduct both popular and high grade symphonic music. In 1931, as guest conductor with Albert Coates in an All-American concert by the New York Philharmonic-Symphony Orchestra, he led the musicians in a rendition of "A Rhapsody in Blue". The composer, Gershwin, was the soloist at the piano. Mr. Daly was a guest conductor a year later for the newly organized Musicians Symphony Orchestra.

His most popular program over N.B.C. network was the Voice of Firestone, featuring Richard Crooks, Lawrence Tibbett, Gladys Swarthout and other artists.

Mr. Daly died on Friday, Dec. 4. On Monday, Dec. 7, in the Firestone program, Richard Crooks, before his first song, announced the death of Mr. Daly, who hed been the conductor of the orchestra, and pronounced his eulogy.

Inheriting from his father, a well-known yachtsman, a taste for sailing, Mr. Daly spent most of his spare time in this sport.

Dr. Philemon D. Harding was an Allopathic physician. He was born in Tioga County, Pa. July 5, 1838. His father's name was Joseph M. Harding and his mother's maiden name was Pamelia M. Hayden. Both parents were American born.

Dr. Harding's education began in the district school of his neighborhood; as age advanced it was pursued in Dickinson Seminary, Williamsport, Pa. and afterwards at the Methodist College at Lima, N. Y. He received his medical education at Geneva Medical College and also has a degree from the Chicago Medical College.

He enlisted in the 140th Ind. Vol. Inf. in 1862 and served as Ass't. Surgeon during the summer of that year. Leaving the Army, he went to Goshen, Ind. and settled down as a medical practitioner. He has been very successful as a physician and now ranks among the better class in Elkhart County.

Dr. Harding, in the Spring of 1867, was married to Miss Mary E. Clifford, a graduate of the Northwestern University at Evanston, Ill. They are members of the Methodist Episcopal Church.

In Goshen, Ind., Dr. Harding and Dr. Heattake were partners.

Dr. and Mrs. Harding left Goshen about 1895. From here they went to Evanston, Ill., where Mrs. Harding nad property interests, and from there to Los Angeles, Calif. Dr. Harding died in California in 1919. Mrs. Harding died in 1923.

Dr. Harding was prominent in his profession and was highly esteemed. In 1886 he, as a Democrat, was elected Mayor of Goshen, when at that time political feeling ran high and Democrats around Goshen were scarce. Mayor of Goshen 1882-4 and 1886-1888.

V. Dr. Theodore Harding became an Eclective Physician. A distinctive point in this practise is the use of native medicinal plants, in other words, a physician called a Botanic Physician. An eclective physician is also one who rejects, perhaps, the knowledge gained by the experience of others and follows what he considers best in the way of medicine and medicinal treatment. A prominent feature in the Eclectives is the rejection of many mineral substances in medicine and substituting roots and herbs.

Dr. Theodore Harding lived in Minnesota near his brother, Simeon, in the early days of the territory, for six years. During the cold winters he would walk 20 miles on snowshoes to visit his patients. The cold was so severe that he wore, in addition to his overcoat, a heavy woolen blanket. In the folded center of this blanket a place was cut so he could put his head through, and he was thus protected, both back and front, from the severe cold.

In the Civil War Dr. Theodore Harding was a recruiting officer. The wide red sash the recruiting officer wore at the time of the Civil War was impressive to onlookers, especially to the youthful ones. His home was in Northern Pennsylvania, Canton, Bradford County.

"For 17 years he has labored incessantly to raise Cornell in the eyes of the most critical musical circles until he leaves her now ranking high in her estimation. Through the Festival Concerts and the Pre-Festival Concerts he has given the students, Professors and the citizens of Ithaca a rare musical education - one which few, if any, could find fault with, and which no one could experience and not feel greatly benefitted . . .

"From morning till evening he is busied with the various work which he must do as Director of the Glee Club, Professor of Music, and Director of the Festival and Pre-Festival Concerts, each of these undertakings is a whole job in itself.

"Up until last year Mr. Dann was an enthusiastic tennis player. Lately he has taken his diversion in riding, for he is an expert horseman.

"As a final commentary on Professor Dann we must remark on his habitual reserve. It may have been a bit difficult to penetrate this reserve and come face to face with the real Hollis Dann, yet it takes but a short acquaintance to perceive that as long as you play square and give the best you can he is one of your truest and most loyal friends. It is this quality, combined with a sincere admiration for his excellent capabilities which has endeared him to his intimates and acquaintances and make them regret his departure from Cornell."

Samuel Joseph Harding enlisted in the Revolutionary War at Falmouth, Mass. at the age of 16 and was a member of the 13th Mass. Regt. The ceremony of unveiling the bronze tablet was performed by Marion Heyer, a great-great granddaughter of Rachel Harding Orvis, in Wilson Grove Cemetery, Sumner, Iowa.

A letter dated Sullivan, Mch. 5, 1878 written to James Riley Orvis by Anson D. Finch, with a postscript by James B. Dewey, gives information of the Harding family:

Mr. James R. Orvis.

Dear Sir: Happening at Uncle James Dewey's this evening, was requested to answer your letter of recent date. But before proceeding further, will introduce myself.

If your memory serves, you undoubtedly will remember a red-headed urchin who lived at Judson Dann's in Canton at the time you were taking pictures there, some 22 years ago, by the name of Anson Finch. At that time I assisted you occasionally, doing errands, chores, etc.

Arriving to manhood's estate, I took it upon myself to provide for the comfort and happiness of one of your cousins, and married Loretta Harding, the sixth daughter of Dr. Theodore Harding.

You wish to learn of your relatives. Father Harding has been dead over seven years. Mother H. Lives with her children at Canton, Perry H. Harding, Mary, wife of Asa Pratt (now a widow), Melinda (widow of Anson Dann), Harriet Dann, Alice VanDyke, and Loretta (my wife) all live in Canton and wicinity. Helen, wife of R. C. Barrow, State Evangelist, Christian Church, lives in Tecumseh, Nebraska. Alvin Thomas has been dead six or seven years.

A letter addressed to Aunt Mary at Canton, care of Julia McClelland (her daughter) would reach her. Lorenza Thomas lives in Kansas, Hamilton on the old farm in Troy Twp. Charlie and Alvin lost their lives in the army. Harry Welch, died some four years. William Welch also dead. Cynthia, wife of Walter Dewey, lives near Alba, Bradford Co. Emmeline, wife of Levi Palmer, lives at Sevoy, Bradford Co. Have seen her within a year. Mary, wife of Chas. Palmer, lives in Sullivan.

Orvis some three years since and think his address is Bloomsbury, Northumberland Co. Pa. George and Elisha Orvis live on the old homestead. Russell Rose lives on your father's old place (17 mile ridge); Enos Rose lives on the old Rose homestead; Elliott lives on Jesse Orvis, Jr. farm. James M. Rose lives below Mainsburg. Uncle Fellows and Ethan Ashley dead a number of years, also T. Knowlton, also Sam Welch. Can't tell you about Husted.

Sanford Dewey at Mainsburg, James address, Covington, saw both today. All well. Presume you know where Emery lives. Addison address Gains, Tioga Co., Henry's address, Garfield, Pawnee Co. Kansas, Sarah the youngest, lives in Sullivan, address Covington.

Fannie is with her uncle and Aunt Dewey's. They are well as can be expected, considering their age. One of Henry's children is with them. They would be glad to see any of you, as I presume any and all of your relatives would at any time. Please remember them with kindest regards and be assured of their love and esteem.

I hardly know how to begin this letter, you will wonder at receiving it, no doubt. So I will tell you first who is the writer and my object.

My father is Samuel Harding, son of Joshua, who was a brother of your husband's mother.

We received a letter some time ago from Rosina Smith of Penna. which told us that Aunt Rachel was living. I fear she is not now. I have been filling out papers to join the Daughters of the American Revolution, as Great-Grandfather Harding served in that war. If Aunt Rachel is living, will you kindly ask her if her Grandfather Harding served in the war. I know her grandfather Mayhew did, but do not know the date of his birth and death. She may know. Is she a member of the D.A.R.?

It seems late to look up these things but I am very much interested. I have collected quite a few facts regarding the Harding family and Mayhew family, and if you are interested will gladly send you such as I have. My father is living at the age of 73; he would be glad to learn anything of Aunt Rachel.

Any information regarding her father would be gladly received. Will you kindly answer soon?

Mrs. A. D. Allen, Sumner, Iowa, to Mrs. Mary E. Baird, Compiler of the Records: "I send you these letters because of the names and addresses. The ones who wrote them are likely dead, but there may be descendants. It is going to

be a hard task to get the dates from the Eastern relatives. Grandma (Rachel) was the last one of her family to go, and she died in 1898.

1. James Riley Orvis married Lucy H. Heath Oct. 28, 1850. She was born in Frittenden, Kent Co., England, Sept. 12, 1829. She came to America with friends in 1836; she died Dec. 9, 1907; James died May 25, 1910.

James Riley Orvis was a pioneer photographer. In 1846, while teaching penmanship, studied portrait painting in New York City. From a professor in Yale College, James Orvis learned the then new process of daguerre-otyping, and obtained an insight into Chemistry.

As the art of making portraits developed producing the ferrotype, ambrotype, porcelain work, and lastly, the photograph, James Orvis mastered each new process. He built a car and both before and after his marriage he toured the State of New York making portraits.

Later he sold his car and moved to Illinois, locating first in Belvidere, and later living in Rockford, Springfield and other points, traveling and instructing photographers who were having trouble with the process. He did this also in Wisconsin and Iowa and settled in Fayette, Iowa in 1870, and at this time had few, if any, superiors among Iowa photographers.

In upper Iowa University at this time, there was no laboratory, and President McLean would bring his class in Chemistry one day in each week to the gallery to have Mr. Orvis help them in experimenting. Mr. Orvis continued his work until he was 75 years of age.

Lucy Heath Orvis did considerable writing during her life; many poems and prose, too, have been printed.

She has taught music for 60 years. She was a member of the Presbyterian Church and its organist for 12 years; is now a member of the U. B. Church.

Joseph Harding Orvis was born on his father's farm north of Sumner, Iowa. After the death of his father, the family moved to Sumner. He was educated in Sumner Public Schools and started on his own at the age of 16 studying pharmacy. He gave this up to learn telegraphy with a brother-in-law, M. E. Winn, who was stationed at Goldfield, Iowa in the fall of 1897. His telegraph work he started as a relief operator and agent for the B.C.R.& N. R.R. under Supt. W. P. Ward, and F.S. Spafford, superintendent to telegraph.

After four years of relief work as an operator and agent, which took him to about 45 different stations, he was made relay operator in Estherville dispatcher's office, and after one month, was made Train Dispatcher Aug. 1, 1902, which position he held until Jan. 1, 1931.

He has been elected City Treasurer, serving two terms so far and handles a news correspondence service for three daily papers and two news services.

When Mr. Orvis was promoted to Train Dispatcher, he was the youngest man in the service on the Rock Island, not quite 20 years of age, and when retired was fourth oldest in service on the first district, which embraced all territory, Chicago to Denver and Chicago to Kansas City, Sioux Falls and Minneapolis.

Mr. Orvis is a Royal Arch Mason, Presbyterian Church elder and former member 0.E.S. and White Shrine.

The era in which Mr. Orvis served in railways ervice was replete with change. When he entered the train dispatching service the Rock Island had just taken over the B.C.R.& N. property and there were numerous floods in the territory that year, 1902, the road losing 19 bridges and much track between Iowa Falls and Cedar Rapids, necessitating detouring every train moved between those points either via C.& N.W. to Marshalltown, thence C.G.W. to Reinbeck or over the Iowa Central from Marshalltown to Abbott Crossing.

While these were exceedingly trying times, there was much of drama and human interest constantly taking place to lighten the burden of restoring traffic to normal. One incident was when a large freight engine, considered too heavy for a weak bridge near Abbott Crossing, was ordered moved to Cedar Rapids at night. The engineer protested he was afraid the bridge was not safe to cross. The dispatcher working with Mr. Orvis told the operator at Iowa Falls to tell the engineer to get off at the bridge, cross to the other side and let the fireman start the engine, get off, and the engineer catch the engine on the opposite end, which they did.

Mr. Orvis was on duty the night that the Kaw River went on a rampage and Kansas City Union Depot was under 9 feet of water. The General Superintendent, H. S. Cable, at Cedar Rapids, made a frantic appeal for material to be sent to Kansas City, and Orvis had some difficulty convincing the local Division Superintendent, W. J. Lawrence, that there could be any such flood at Kansas City.

The old "Dakota" Division, as it was called, experienced a good many snow blockades and consequent tie-ups during Orvis' service. The worst blizzard and

tie-up on the Division probably since the road was built into this territory, occurred Feb. 9, 1909. Several feet of badly drifted snow blocked the main line Estherville to ---Falls two weeks before a rotary snow plow finally opened the line, and in the third week the Worthington Minnesota was opened with a double crew both for the two locomotives pushing the rotary and the rotary crew, so as not to violate the newly enacted 16 hour Federal Hours of Service Act, which, as it turned out, was a wise provision, as it required 25 hours to complete the 55 mile trip with the rotary.

As Mr. Klinger, Donald's father, was an Army man, Donald was taken in by a Captain of the French Army. During his visits in this house he met the daughter, Marthe Pioche, a charming and intelligent girl.

The soldiers were located in this vicinity two months, then they were pushed on toward the front slowly, until, when the Armistice was signed they were standing in the front line trenches. They were stationed all winter at Marac in the Vosges Mountains.

When able to come home he was given leave to go and marry the French girl. They returned to America, stayed with Donald's family 17 months, during which time he played the Church organ and began working on the Grand Rapids Press as a "cub" reporter. He continued working for this newspaper, becoming a legislative reporter for the State, which position he held when God called him Home.

His wife then taught private lessons in French and attended the University of Michigan until she graduated and got her degree. She now teaches in a girls' school in New York City.

James Babcock Dewey, son of Josiah 2nd, was born at Feeding Hills, Mass. His was the seventh generation from Thomas Dewey, and Thomas Dewey was also the ancestor of George Dewey, Admiral. Admiral George Dewey was the ninth generation from Thomas 1st, and in the direct line of William.

Biography of Philip Hastings Dewey.

Philip Hastings Dewey, son of Addison Dewey, now holds the office of Secretary of Internal Affairs at Harrisburg, Pa. He is a leading member of the Patrons of Industry, having twice served as Master of the Pennsylvania State Grange of that Order.

His education was received in the public schools of Gaines and Mansfield, Pa. At 18 he bought a farm of 200 acres, which he still owns. He has been an active and successful farmer, interested in forestation, having planted upwards of 20,000 pine trees on his farm. His methods have been adopted by his neighbors and by farmers more remote. For 25 years he was a lumberman, at Gaines.

In political service and in offices of the Grange it is difficult to estimate the value of Mr. Dewey's contributions to them. He was but 30 years old when he was elected to the office of Supervisor in 1897. The following year he was elected a school director and served until 1905. He served two

terms as County Commissioner and was then honored with the presidency of the County Commissioners Association of the State of Pennsylvania.

He was the first to hold office as President of the Supervisors' Association of the State of Pennsylvania. In 1921 Mr. Dewey was sent to the State Assembly at Harrisburg. There he accomplished much that was beneficial to the interests of his district and to the State.

A bit of public service of which Mr. Dewey is commendably proud had to do with his major part in the building of the first stretch of improved road in Tioga County, a section 10 miles in length.

Mr. Dewey has been a State Lecturer for the Grange and has delivered lectures pertaining to the Order before subordinate Granges in all parts of the State and Nation.

In 1922 Mr. Dewey wrote the resolution, adopted by the State Grange, for the erection and furnishing of a building at the State College to be used as a girls' dormitory. This building, said to be the finest on the campus of the State College, cost a quarter of a million dollars. At its formal presentation, on behalf of the State Grange, Mr. Dewey made the chief address and presentation to the State College.

Mr. Dewey became a Master of the State Grange in 1924 and was reelected in 1926. In 1927 Governor Fisher appointed Mr. Dewey to the office of manager of the State Workmens' Insurance Fund, with headquarters at Harrisburg. In 1930 Mr. Dewey was elected Secretary of Internal Affairs.

Mr. Dewey organized the Elk Run Telephone Company and served as its president for more than 20 years. He is highly placed in the Masonic Fraternity, has attained the Encampment Degree of the Independent Order of Odd Fellows.

Mr. Dewey is a talented musician. He not only performs with ability, but has organized and trained a number of bands. One of the bands that he taught included six of his own children, four daughters and two sons. He has been active in Church work, was superintendent of the Sunday School of the Gaines Baptist Church.

Jesse Smith and Annice (Worden) Smith were the parents of Isaac Worden Smith. They came on horseback to Soper. Town by way of Elmira in the year 1807 and lived with a family by the name of Soper. In the fall of 1808 Jesse Smith cut out a road in the wilderness, three miles South of Soper Town to the top of Rutland Hill, then called Jackson, and settled on the farm which Leon Reynolds now owns. He built a log hut with ground for the floor, bark for the roof, used a blanket for the door, blocks of wood for chairs, and a slab split out of a big log for a table.

The Jesse Smith farm was in the family for nearly a hundred years. Jesse lived there 63 years.

Isaac Worden was the first child of Jesse and Annis Smith and was the baby who with his father and mother spent the Christmas of 1807 in the wilderness with Oliver Campfield's family.

The top of Rutland Hill, where Jesse Smith lived, was 3 miles from Soper Town and was called at that time Jackson.

Another son of Jesse and Annis Smith was Morris Smith. He married into the Harding family. His wife was Matilda Carrie Gaylord, the eldest child of Sarah (Harding) and Elijah Gaylord. (Found under LL-I).

Before marriage Loretta Harding taught school.

Isaac Worden Smith was a farmer. It is also said of him that Isaac W. Smith could do most everything from pulling teeth at 5¢ a tooth to making caskets.

Saturday, Sept. 21. Went past the Insane Asylum. Left Kalamazoo \(\frac{1}{4}\) past 2 P.M. Got to Albion at 4 P.M., went to Dr. Tuttle. Drayage 25\(\phi\). Paid for gum arabic 25\(\phi\) to Charley T. Williams.

Sunday, Sept. 22. Went to cemetery and found my wife's grave; it is near the N.E. corner of the burying ground. Sad thoughts of the past. I shall soon follow her. May we all, Father and Mother and Children, meet and dwell together.

Monday, Sept. 23. Bot stamps. Went to Iry Wolcotts with Mr. Woods horse and buggy. Wrote to Smith and Carrie and Simeon.

Tuesday, Sept. 24. Went to Sophia's (at Homer, Mich.) with L. Jay Woolcott and wife.

Wednesday, Sept. 25. Staid at Alvah Hopkins. Called on Charles Doolittle.
L. J. Went home.

Thursday, Sept. 26. 13 minutes past 9 A.M. Took the cars at Homer for Albion, fare 50¢, time 25 minutes.

Friday, Sept. 27. Went to Cobbs.

Saturday, Sept. 28. (frost) Took trunk to depot 25¢. Went to H. Wolcotts.

Sunday, Sept. 29. Went to Cobb's and staid all night.

Monday, Sept. 20. Left Albion at $\frac{1}{4}$ past 7 A.M. Got to Detroit at $\frac{1}{2}$ past 11 A.M. Took G.W. at 12.03. Canada crackers 10¢. Got to Sur. Bridge at 9 P.M. Buffalo at 10 P.M.

Tuesday, Oct. 1. Got to Elmira at 5 A.M. Bot crackers and cheese 25¢. Bot tickets to Canton, fare \$2.70. Left Elmira at 8 P.M. Got to Canton, Pa. at 10 P.M. Went to P. H. Harding's.

When Grandfather Simeon and Grandmother Caroline Harding left Northern Pennsylvania they went to Stafford, N. Y. where Grandmother's relatives lived. Lathrop was the name. After Nov. 2, the entries in his Diary were not regular. Grandfather was not feeling well, had taken a card cold. From then on he bought medicine, saw a doctor, wrote irregularly in his diary.

There are no entries after Monday, Dec. 2. On the 19th he died, away from home and family and was buried on the Lathrop family lot near their home in the country. I visited Stafford in 1935 to locate Grandfather's grave. When the cemetery in Stafford was set apart, the Lathrop family were moved to the new cemetery. I was told my Gfandfather must have been moved also. He was not placed on the new Lathrop lot but I finally found his gravestone in the Stafford cemetery, beside the grave of a child, a Lathrop from some other family.

In this day we take our dead to the family lot so all will be together. It was not so in past years. Dolly Ann, the first wife, was buried in Albion, Mich., Grandfather in Stafford, N. Y. and Caroline, the second wife was buried in St. Charles, Minn.

Simeon Harding, son of Samuel and Love (Mayhew) Harding, was born in Brookfield, Vt. Nov. 20, 1812. When 3 years old, the family moved to Sullivan, Tioga Co., Pa. There were 14 children in the Samuel Harding family. When the move to Pennsylvania was made, three of the children, Joshua, Sarah and Lucy were married and did not at that time go with the others into Pennsylvania. Joshua had settled in Chatham, Lucy in Brookfield, and Sarah also in Brookfield. Later Sarah went to Sullivan with her husband, Elijah Gaylord and two small children, Matilda Carrie and Alexander Hamilton.

At the age of 19, Simeon married Dolly Ann Smith, a daughter of one of the Smith families in Sullivan. Her father's name has not been learned.

Simeon and Dolly Ann, after their marriage, went to Albion, Mich. Dolly Ann had a brother in Michigan by the name of John. As yet he has not been traced. Simeon and Dolly Ann settled on a farm in Sheridan Township, not far from the city of Albion. And here their eight children were born and here after 16 years of married life, Dolly Ann died when the baby Sarah was but 3 weeks old, and the oldest Child, Emily was but 13. Dolly Ann Harding is buried in Albion.

When a kindly neighbor offered to take the bayy and bring her up, Simeon

reluctantly let her go. Even one less did not help the problem of the growing children. Simeon decided to marry again, and married Caroline P. Moody June 14, 1847.

This left Emily, 13, Josiah, 11, Smith, 8 and Henry, 6. Simeon sold his farm and moved into Albion, where he and Caroline took

boarders for Albion Seminary. ***

Simeon had proved his worth to the community when on Mch. 7, 1838 he had been chosen as a delegate to help organize Eaton County. The convention, the first, was from three organized towns, and the delegates met at the log house of Jonathan Searles in Eaton Township.

Chester Phelps was the oldest son of Rev. Asa Phelps. He was born in Russell, St. Lawrence Co., N. Y. and came to Michigan with his parents in 1834. His early life was mostly spent in Battle Creek and vicinity, where he shared fully the trials and privations of early pioneer life. His advantages for education were very limited but well improved. He attended such of the rude district schools as were then available, and after attaining his majority he supplemented those advantages by attending Albion Seminary. He thus became, for his time, a fair scholar which enabled him in after life not only to conduct his business intelligently, but to instruct others as a teacher, and accurately to discharge, or meet public trusts that were committed to his care.

Mr. Phelps, in early manhood acquired a knowledge of the carpenter's and joiner's trade and in the employ of DuBois Hutchinson, one of the earliest builders in this vicinity, assisted in the erection of many of the earlier structures, buildings and bridges in Battle Creek and vicinity.

In the employ of John Champion and Warren B. Shepard he aided in the manufacture of the first lot of brick made and laid in this part of the county. In 1854 he emigrated to the then new state of Minnesota, where he secured from the government 120 acres of excellentland, and soon after married Emily Harding.

formerly of Albion, Mich. By their joint industry, the bit of wilderness which they had chosen for a home was made to bud, blossom, and bear ripened fruit.

The result of their union was a gift of four children, two sons and two daughters.

Days of darkness come into most lives. Mr. Phelps was no exception to the rule; sorrow came, disease laid a heavy hand upon him; then a longing to see friends of his youth and to look upon the scenes of his early life induced him to come again to Michigan. He came, intending to return home in a few months, but he continued to decline until his death. He died at the residence of his sister, Mrs. Lora Hungerford, Battle Creek.

The Memorial Home received both ladies and gentlemen, who on entrance were expected to pay a few hundred dollars to be raised, sometimes from relatives, friends or their Church. The Home then cared for them until death. The "Home for Little Wanderers" takes mostly children who have one living parent temporarily unable to care for them.

Mrs. Mary E. Baird, on the death of her husband, was appointed Second Vice President of The National Roll & Foundry Co., at Avonmore, Pa., an honorary office to keep the Baird name in the business which James B. Baird had organized and of which he was President and General Manager until his death.

Mrs. Baird is the compiler of "Our Harding Family", also of the family of John Fleming, Jr. and two more in the making, that of the family of Mr. Baird's mother, the Richardson Line, and that of his father, the Baird Line. A member of the Chicago Chapter, D.A.R., N. No. 237602.

James B. Baird learned the machinist's trade on the Rockford Water Power, Rockford, Ill. When the Rockford Bit Works moved to Kokomo, Ind. in 1888, James B. Baird went with them as Superintendent of the machine shop. In 1890 Mr. Baird became Superintendent of the Noblesville Machine Shop, Noblesville, Ind. Later he became a stockholder and General Manager in the Elwood Iron Works, Elwood, Ind. manufacturing tinning machinery. While connected with this concern he invented and developed devices used in the manufacture of tin-plate,

Mr. Baird was asked by Mr. W. T. Simpson to come to Riverside, a suburb of Cincinnati and change a Sheet Mill into a Tin Plate Mill. Mr. Baird had been interested in a business way with Mr. W.B. Leeds of the Elwood Tin Plate Co. and Mr. D. G. Reed, afterwards director of the U. S. Steel Corporation, both men at Elwood interested in Tin Plate.

After two years at Riverside a merger was formed whereby most of the Tin Plate companies were consolidated into a "Trust". Through Mr. Reed, Mr. Baird was called to Canton, Ohio, to be president and general manager of the Canton Roll & Machine Co. For ten years he served in this capacity in Canton. Subsequently he became interested in the Chester Tin Mill, Chester, W. Va., which later was also taken over by the Steel Corporation.

When the American Rolling Mill Co., of Middletown, Ohio, was organized, Mr. Baird with Mr. W. T. Simpson, Mr. S. M. Goodman and Mr. Lewis Wales, England, were the founders. In 1907 Mr. Baird promoted, financed and organized the National Roll & Foundry Co. at Avonmore, Pa. and became its President and General Manager, which position he held at the time of his death.

A few of the inventions Mr. Baird is credited with are a Saw-gummer, a Double Tinning machine, a water-cooled Standing.

THE MOVE FROM ALBION, MICHIGAN and Early Days in Minnesota

After 16 years of married life in Michigan, Dolly Ann Harding died. Simeon was left with six children, Emily, the oldest, was 13. Kindly neighbors offered to take the two youngest, Almond, who was 3 years old and the baby, Sarah Ann, 22 days. They were adopted by these neighbors, who moved to Homer, Michigan.

Even this did not solve the problem with four growing children, one 13, one 11, one 8 and one 6. In June Simeon married Carolyn P. Moody. She proved a wonderful mother, and the grandchildren, who later knew her, could rise up and call her blessed.

The farm in Michigan was sold and the family moved into Albion, where Simeon built a home and took pupils from the Seminary to board. He had bought one share in the Albion Seminary, paying for it on the payment plan. The Stock held a scholarship certificate which entitled members of the family to free tuition for 25 years. However, the family did not continue to live in Albion.

The urge came to Simeon to go West and pioneer. His plan was to go to Iowa, then a Territory. On the way they would stop in Belvidere, Ill. for a visit with Simeon's sister, Rachel Orvis. Simeon's family had one more new member, baby Carolyn, born in 1850.

En route Simeon met Judge Thompson, who was on his way to Minnesota. Before they reached Belvidere, Judge Thompson had persuaded Simeon to stake a claim in Minnesota, a territory also. Leaving his family in Belvidere, Simeon and Judge Thompson traveled on together to Minnesota, where they staked opposite claims. It was in May, 1854; Simeon prepared his lumber and logs for his house, but did not build then. He had to return to his family in Belvidere. Here Simeon rented a farm and for 11 months he and Henry worked it. The other two sons, Josiah and Smith were clerking in a drug store in Belvidere. Judge Thompson stayed on in Minnesota.

The following Spring Judge Thompson wrote Simeon his claim had been jumped. With his ox-team Simeon drove immediately to Minnesota to rescue his claim. He sold his ox-team to make a payment on his land and paid for it \$1.25 an acre, and thus he established a pre-emption claim, a claim prior to that of the man who had jumped the Harding claim.

There was no Homestead Law at that time; instead, one must build on the land, improve, and live a certain time. The man who had jumped the claim had built on the land, using the materials Simeon had prepared for his own log house. It was a case for arbitration. Two men arbitrated, Simeon paid \$15 to settle the jumper, ThenSimeon built his house, put a family in it to hold it, and returned to Belvidere for his goods. He and Henry, now lip years of age, drove to Minnesota bringing the household goods, the same goods they had brought from Michigan.

There is a little story connected with the loading of the household goods for the overland journey from Michigan to Belvidere. At the time there seemed no room on the load for the little red cradle, the cradle in which nine Harding babies had been rocked. It was hard to leave it behind, it was harder still to break it up, which the father decided must be done. He could not do it. He sent one son, then another, and finally the third. The boys found it as impossible as their father had. They turned from it. None of the three

would be the one to destroy the cradle which had belonged to each one in turn. It was simply left behind. It may still be in existence, still used, who knows? They did not have this problem to contend with when Simeon and Henry started from Belvidere.

There was a rocking-chair and a rag carpet and in the new country of Minnesota the rocking-chair was in great demand as it was the only one within miles. Dr. Theodore Harding, a brother of Simeon, who was the country doctor in the new country for 6 years, would borrow the rocking-chair for his patients. It was seldom at home. As for the rag carpet, it was the only one in that country and was a luxury.

Simeon, the father, with his son Henry drove with the household goods to Minnesota. His wife, with Emily and baby Carolyn traveled by train to Galena, where they embarked by boat on the Mississippi River to Winona, Minn. Here Simeon met them with his team and wagon and took them to the new log house, 30 miles from Winona, West. It was to Winona Simeon traveled once a week for mail and groceries.

At Simeon's request his wife had brought two kittens on account of the many mice and gophers in the new country. On the journey, Carolyn, the wife, carried them in a cigar box. When the journey started, the kittens did not have their eyes open, their meals consisted of milk and crackers. In Winona Carolyn was offered \$5 apiece for the kittens, however, she would not sell.

The new home, built of logs, consisted of one large room downstairs and one up. In one end of the large downstairs room a portion was curtained off for Carolyn and Simeon's bedroom. On the east side of the house very soon a lean-to with a stone fireplace was built. After that a log summer kitchen was added on the north side. On the west a frame addition was built. This frame addition proved to be a community center. One winter the first school in the township was held here. It was also used for the first Church services and the first elections.

In the log house Carolyn had covered the logs with curtain calico, and the ceiling with unbleached sheeting. The logs were completely covered, and visitors would say with surprise "I thought this was a log house".

On the wall of the log living-room hung a map of the United States and the Declaration of Independence. Josiah and Smith had found work in a drug store in Rochester, Minn. so the family were together often over Sunday. When Smith was at home, and it was time to draw a pail of water, he would look at the Declaration of Independence and soberly begin "When in the course of human events", then hurriedly said "it is time to get a pail of water", and out he would go to the well to draw it.

One winter Simeon kept 19 cows for a man who had driven them from Wisconsin to sell and could not sell them as the prairie fires had destroyed all the hay. Simeon had a big log barn and in this barn he kept the cows. On his weekly trip to Winona he learned the Winona Hotel was short of milk. The hotel proprietor and Simon figured out a way to cover this shortage. Simeon bought dozens of 10-quart pans, took them home, and when the cows were milked, strained the milk into these pans and put them on racks in the summer kitchen where the milk would freeze. Once a week he packed a large chest and several barrels with these pans of frozen milk and took them to the hotel in Winona when he drove in for his weekly shopping and mail. On reaching the hotel the pans were put on the kitchen stove to loosen the ice so the frozen milk would slip out. He repacked his empty pans into the chest and barrels and took them home to fill and freeze again.

When the first stages west from Winona needed a relay station, Simeon's house again proved a community center. One driver and four horses stayed at Simeon's. The stage drivers made a special pet of little Carrie. Ed Priest especially was very friendly to the little girl. He would ask Carrie to sing for him, and he would fill her pockets in her little gingham apron with pennies.

Simeon Harding, Jr., the youngest child of the family, was the first white child born in Olmstead County. He was born Dec. 24, 1855.

Candles had been in vogue during these early days in Minnesota. Smith Harding brought from Rochester, where he was working, the first kerosene lamp used in the log house and with it a big bottle of kerosene. Mother Harding was very much pleased with her present.

Simeon's house was a tavern for travelers who could not make Rochester, 20 miles away. Sometimes there were 30 in the home at one time.

The first wedding of the family was when Emily married Chester Phelps, Dec. 24, 1855. On account of the new baby, Simeon, born that day, Emily and Chester were married at Judge Thompson's, across the way, but the wedding supper was held in the log living-room. The new baby behaved very well, the guests did not even know of its arrival.

In 1862 the family left the log house and moved into St. Charles. That same year Simeon was elected Justice of the Peace.

Minnesota was a territory until May 11, 1858. The Constitution was drawn up in Saint Paul in 1857 and Simeon was a delegate to this Constitutional Convention and Congress passed the Enabling Act so the State could be formed. It was President Buchanan who proclaimed Minnesota a State. Simeon was Postmaster of St. Charles for 6 years, 1865-71 and gave up the Post Office when he and Carolyn started on the trip east from which Simeon did not return. He died in Stafford, N. Y. and there he is buried.

Josiah Harding, son of Samuel and Love (Mayhew) Harding, was born July 25, 1814; married Eliza Proven in 1838; she was born Apr. 22, 1820; Josiah died Aug. 26, 1891; Eliza died Feb. 10, 1895.

Josiah Harding before the Civil War was Inspector General of Pennsylvania State Militia. At the outbreak of the Civil War he was the first volunteer in Pennsylvania. The Archives at Harrisburg bear this out. He recruited and trained 600 men and was given a commission of Major General. His troops were stationed at Troy, Pa.

In an old History of Tioga County, Pa. the story goes: General Harding went to Harrisburg to see why the troops were not moved from Troy. He had occasion to step off the train and was seized by three men and kept prisoner for three days. He had on his full uniform of General, but was taken for a spy and was only released after word came from Troy. He returned home to wife and family to say good-by. His home was at Liberty. On his return to Troy Monday morning, he found his troops boarding the train, the result of a telegram "Send on the troops".

He was "Uncle Si" to all who knew him, a gunsmith, and worked at his trade until a short time before his death, when he lost his eyesight.

Charles H. Harding of the Harding Glass Company, manufacturers of window glass, Fort Smith, Ark. has been identified with his business for almost 60 years.

When 17 and 18 years of age, Charles H. Harding taught school. When 19 he married and clerked in a mining store at Arnott, Pa. for two years. Outside of these four years he has been identified almost entirely with the glass manufacturing business.

When a boy of 13 or 14 years old he started with the weekly wage of \$2.50. After he married he spent three years as an apprentice to become a window glass flattener, and this he followed, even after he became a tradesman, for 20 years.

In 1904 Charles H. Harding was elected manager of the Tuna Glass Company at Bradford, Pa. When, three years later, the gas failed at Bradford, a new plant of the Tuna Glass Company was built at Clarksburg, W. Va. and he managed this new plant for 10 years.

In 1917 the Harding Glass Company at Fort Smith, Ark. was organized, the controlling interest in which is held by Charles H. Harding and Wayne E. Harding, his son, and Frank L. Reese, his son-in-law.

The Harding Glass Company at Fort Smith has been appraised twice at nearly a million dollars. In the last five years they have developed their

own gas field, their own pipe line, have manufactured their own electricity and have their own water system. The plant covers $1l\frac{1}{2}$ acres and is the largest independent plant in the country. At the present time three more of the family are identified with the business, Charles Harding Reese, Frank Leon Reese, Jr. and the daughter, Adeline Reese as stenographer.
