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Preface

The emigrant and founder of the Hathaway family in America came to Boston about 1638. He was Nicholas Hathaway, from the vicinity of Ruardeen in the County of Gloucestershire, England. The Coat of Arms shows a powder-horn, the English Lion and a helmet, indicating that they were huntsmen and knights. In 1639, Nicholas was granted a lot within the limits of Braintree. He removed in 1639 or 1640 to Taunton where he became an extensive land-owner. He had sons John, Joseph and Jacob.

John, son of Nicolas, born about 1629, died at Berkley in 1705, married first Martha—who died after 1683; married second at Braintree, Ruth ——— Dyer, widow of Christopher Dyer. Ruth was born in 1643; died in 1705; buried in Fox Cemetery. In 1658, he, with two others, bought 400 acres in a part of Taunton which later became the town of Berkley. He purchased more land and became a man of great wealth. He was a deputy to the Plymouth General Court and served in King Williams War.

Berkley, near Taunton, the Plymouth Settlement, was the home of John² then Abraham³, then Shad-rack⁴. A marker erected by the Old Colony Historical

Society bears the inscription "Homestead of John Hathaway 1658-1705."

ABRAHAM

Abraham, born Sept. 11, 1652, son of John; died Aug. 23, 1725; buried in Fox Cemetery. He married Aug. 28, 1684 Mrs. Rebecca (Wilbore) Peirce, born Jan. 13, 1664 or 5, died Berkley, Aug. 27, 1727, daughter of Shadrack and Mary (Dean) Wilbore. Abraham was one of the owners of an iron works on Assonet river in Freetown. He was a soldier in King Phillips War and King Williams War. Resided at Berkley.

One of his ten children was:

SHADRACK

who married Deborah Kent, daughter of John and Abigail (Dudley) Kent. He died in 1721. One of his sons was

SIMEON, born 1719

Introduction

Beginning at this generation, the research is the work of the author. The following information was gathered from old family letters, wills, newspaper clippings, Bible records, Vital Statistics and correspondence with present-day descendants. Some of the data here given was published in the 1945 Year Book of the D.A.R. Supplemental papers for this Hathaway line and also Cass and Breckenridge lines have been verified and accepted by the National Society, D.A.R. Membership in the Daughters of Founders and Patriots of America may be had through this Hathaway lineage.

Descendants of Simeon Hathaway

110. Simeon Hathaway was the son of Shadrack and his wife, Deborah Kent, daughter of John and Abigail Dudley Kent. Simeon was born June 25, 1719. Simeon sold his property at Suffield, Conn., to his brother-in-law, Joshua Austin in 1753 and went to Farrington, Conn., then in 1770 to Bennington Vt. He married Deborah Austin, Nov. 11, 1742. They had twelve children. Capt. Samuel Robinson erected the first cabin at Bennington in 1761. Simeon became a 1st Lieut. in Capt. Robinson's Co.

Shadrack Hathaway⁴, his father died in 1721, and his mother, Deborah Kent Hathaway, re-married, in 1722, Jacob Hathaway Jr., (Nicolas¹, John², John Jr.³, Jacob⁴, Jacob Jr.⁵.) Deborah died in 1773.

(The above information came through correspondence with Mrs. Mary P. Herbert Assonet, Mass., member of the Hathaway Family Association, and with Myrtle Hathaway Fuller, Suffield, Conn.)

Simeon and his seven sons fought in the Battle of Bennington. One of them was Erastus.

Simeon became acquainted with Ethan Allen who was born in W. Cornwall a near-by town (to Tarrington) and probably thru this association we find them both in Bennington later, and active among the "Green

Mountain Boys" in their controversy over "Hampshire Grants." He is a minor character in Frederick van de Waters' historical novel "Catch a Falling Star." His brother Shadrack had an A.M. degree from Yale, so it is not likely that Simeon was the illiterate person the author pictured. All of them were of necessity "rough and ready" but not necessarily illiterate.

The Suffield branch of the family used the middle vowel e in spelling Hatheway for a few generations. All the tombstones in Freetown in the old cemetery by the church and also in "Old Forge" Cemetery spelled the name with an e. But later generations went back to the English spelling with an a.

Simeon was prominent in the trouble between New York and Vermont over boundry lines—was present at the Convention held at Windsor, Vermont, June 4, 1777, when 71 of the members were appointed as first Board of War in Western Vt.

110. Simeon, born June 25, 1719, died April 12, 1804, age 85. Deborah Austin Hathaway, born 1721, died Jan. 16, 1802, age 81.

These dates appear on the tombstones in the cemetery at Old Bennington.

119. Erastus^e, born Aug. 27, 1758, Suffield, Conn. Revolutionary soldier, married Anna Warner of Suffield, Conn.

120. Joshua^e—Nathan^e, Twins, born Aug. 13, 1761. Joshua was a Revolutionary soldier, married Elizabeth Lord. Nathan probably died young.

122. Silas^e, born June 23, 1763, married Tryphosa Jewett, went to St. Albans, died there, 1831.



112A. Anna, daughter of Simeon Jr.^e and Anna, married Samuel Breek Young, 1804. Registered Bennington Congregational Church. Children:

118. Betsey⁶ (Simeon⁵, Shadrack⁴, Abraham³, John², Nicolas¹), born Jan. 31, 1957, sister of Joshua⁶, married Josiah Brush, Bennington, Vt., 1773, according to New York Genealogical Record, 1936. Their children were:

119. Erastus⁶ (Simeon⁵, Shadrack⁴, Abraham³, John², Nicolas¹), born Aug. 27, 1758, Suffield, Conn. Married Anna Warner (John¹, John², Samuel³).

Erastus came to Bennington from Conn., with his father in 1770. He fought in the Battle of Bennington, Aug. 16, 1777, at the age of 19. The Warners were Suffield people.

He was at Cornwell Vt., at the age of 30 when daughter Lovice was born and at Swanton, Vt., age 41, when Anthony was born. 1790 and 1800 Census of Cornwall show Erastus living there at ages 41 and 42. Anthony's death record at Bennington gives his (Anthony's) parentage as Erastus and Anna, Swanton, Vt., children:

129. Anthony⁷ (Erastus⁶, Simeon⁵, Shadrack⁴, Abraham³, John², Nicolas¹), was born 1799, Swanton, Vt., died Bennington, Vt., 1863. He is buried with his

wife Betsey Haynes* Hathaway at Hinsdillville Cemetery, Bennington. Anthony's children all born in Bennington, were:

A Government pension granted Erastus gives proof that Anthony was Erastus' son. Vital Records, Montpelier, Vt. gives: "Anthony, died Dec. 30, 1863, at 64 years, 2 months, 19 days, born Swanton, Vt., the son of Erastus and wife Anna Warner."

*The Haines and Haynes, early families in N.H. and Vt. point to Samuel (born Eng: 1611, died Portsmouth, N.H., 1689) as first ancestor. He sailed from Bristol, Engl., 1635 on ship Angel Gabriel, which was wrecked off the coast of Maine in 1635. He settled in Portsmouth in 1650, an extensive land owner and one of the founders of the Congregational Church there.

131. Harry⁷ (Erastus⁶, Simeon⁵, Shadrack⁴, Abraham³, John², Nicolas¹), born in Bennington, Vt., married Ann Caine, came to Wis., as a young man, about 1860, lived in Beaver Dam, Wis. Children:

I. John⁸, married Janette Clason, Beaver Dam, moved to Milwaukee, where they lived the remainder of their lives. Janette died at age 90, May 5, 1943. She and John are buried at Oakwood Cemetery, Beaver Dam, Wis. Children of John:

B. Charles⁹—had children Phillip¹⁰ and Robert¹⁰.

C. Ethel⁹—who married Mr. Schroeder.

IV. Oscar⁸, son of Harry⁷, lived in Green Bay, Wis., wife, Mary. He owned and operated an ore-dock.

Agnes⁹ married Mr. Merriman of Marinette. During the early years of lumbering the Merriman family amassed considerable wealth. Agnes and husband now live in Pasadena, Calif.

Harry was killed in an automobile accident, with his wife in 1938.



120. Joshua⁶ (Simeon⁵, Shadrack⁴, Abraham³, John², Nicolas¹), a twin of Nathan, and son of Simeon and his wife, Deborah Austin was born Aug. 13, 1761, married Elizabeth Lord, Feb. 19, 1791. Joshua graduated from Yale in 1787. He went to Rome, N.Y., in 1795, was first treasurer of Oneida County, was postmaster 1808-1833. He broke the first ground of the Erie Canal. Their children:

145. Joshua⁷ (Joshua⁶, Simeon⁵, Shadrack⁴, Abraham³, John², Nicolas¹), born at Rome, N.Y., Nov. 9, 1810, went to Milwaukee, Wis., in 1835, thirteen years before Wisconsin was admitted to the Union and at a time when the population of the Territory was about 3,000. He was a Civil Engineer sent by the U.S. Government. He was a member of a committee, together with Kilbourn, Juneau and 18 others which drafted rules and regulations for county governments in this area. He purchased extensive real estate in Milwaukee, Kenosha and Racine, was one of a group influential in building the Watertown Plank Road, and who organized St. Paul's Church. He was for a long time a vestry man. The Hathaway home was at the S.E. corner of Broadway and Mason, the site now occupied by the University Building. He owned the Hathaway Building which was torn down when the Athletic Club was built on the site. When he died in 1863, he was accounted one of the wealthiest men in Milwaukee. He is buried in Calvary Cemetery, which he laid out, and where he reserved a plot. At the death of Solomon Juneau in Theresa, Joshua had Solomon Juneau's body brought to Milwaukee and buried on the Hathaway plot. Racine was laid out in blocks in 1836, the south half by Joshua Hathaway. A portrait of Joshua was painted by Durward and is still in the possession of the Hathaway family. Children:

Selections from "A History of Milwaukee"—a copy in Milwaukee Public Library.

"The census in Aug. 1836, showed the Milwaukee Land District, included the counties of Kenosha, Racine, Milwaukee, Ozaukee, Washington, Jefferson, Rock, Walworth, Green, Dane, Columbia and Dodge and had a population of 3000. It doubled in 1837."



"On the 27th of February, 1837, a notice was given in the Milwaukee Advertizer that a meeting of Milwaukee, Washington, Jefferson and Dodge Counties would be held in the Milwaukee Court House (a small frame building on the site of the second Court House) on March 13, 1837. A committee was appointed to draft rules and regulations: Kilbourn, Solomon Juneau, Joshua Hathaway and eighteen others. The rights of all were protected from invasion; an agreement was made with the U. S. Government to buy all available land from the Indians at \$1.25 an acre. Very little land was bought by outside speculation but was bought by men already established in the Milwaukee Land District.



"In 1840, there was a road leading north from Milwaukee, called the Green Bay Road—one S.W. called the Kilbourn Road and one South, the Racine Road."



"In 1847, Eldred, Crocker, Cramer, and Hathaway entered upon the construction of the Watertown Plank Road. It was four years in construction. Its effect upon prosperity was great."



"The Church Register (Episcopalian) 1869 states that the first ministerial service east of Mineral Point and north

of Chicago was held in the home of Geo. Dousman, in December, 1835, the Rev. Gregory, a visitor, officiating. In the spring of 1836, a group of men attached to the Church arranged to hold services in Mr. Hawley's office over a store on E. Water St. They divided the duties of layreader among themselves. The congregation was made up wholly of men. Crocker, Edgerton Gardner, Campbell, Rockwell Hatch, Hawley, Nichols and Joshua Hathaway were among the congregation. In 1838, a rector was obtained and the parish of St. Paul's was organized at a meeting at the Court House on Juneau Square. Hosmer, Hawley, Joshua Hathaway and Rockwell were elected vestrymen."



137. Jay⁷ (Joshua⁶, Simeon⁵, Shadrack⁴, Abraham³, John², Nicolas¹), born at Bennington, Vt., Jan. 29, 1792. His father was one of the early settlers of Rome, N.Y., and Jay was three when his parents moved from Bennington. Jay succeeded his father as postmaster at Rome and was treasurer of Oneida County, N.Y. for ten years.

137A. Franklin⁸ (Jay⁷, Joshua⁶, Simeon⁵, Shadrack⁴, Abraham³, John², Nicolas¹), was born in Rome, N.Y., July 12, 1818, son of Jay Hathaway and Jeruiah Cleveland. He went to Green Bay, Wis., when 17 years of age and worked as a surveyor. Later he laid out Madison, Wis. He returned East in 1836 engaging in surveys for the Genesee Valley Canal and also for the Utica and Syracuse Railroad. In 1843, he removed to Milwaukee, Wis., engaging in real estate with his Uncle Joshua. He went to Chicago in 1847, engaging in real estate there and was Cashier for Equitable Trust Co. He was a member of the S.A.R. He died at the

age of 82 and was buried in Chicago. His second wife was Clara Graham Hathaway. He had a son by his first wife.



146. Andrew^B (Joshua⁷, Joshua⁶, Simeon⁵, Shadrack⁴, Abraham³, John², Nicolas¹), was born in Milwaukee, Wis., the son of Joshua and Ann Janet; was educated in the East, graduating from Seton Hall College, South Orange, N.J. He married Julia, a daughter of Frederick Finney, who was one of a group which organized and built what is now the Soo Line Railroad. Andrew was secretary of the Wisconsin Trust Co. The last thirty years of his life were spent at Easton, Maryland. He had two daughters and three sons. One daughter was Mrs. John Barrett.

148. Sarah^B (Joshua⁷, Joshua⁶, Simeon⁵, Shadrack⁴, Abraham³, John², Nicolas¹), was born in 1851 and died in 1935. She was unmarried and lived on Ogden Ave., Milwaukee until that home was sold in 1935. Her estate named the six children of her brother John and the five children of her brother Andrew. She is buried in the Joshua Hathaway plot in Calvary Cemetery, Milwaukee. She was an Episcopalian, buried in the Catholic Cemetery which Joshua had laid out.

147. John E.^B (Joshua⁷, Joshua⁶, Simeon⁵, Shadrack⁴, Abraham³, John², Nicolas¹), brother of Andrew^B and Sarah^B had his insurance office in a building at the corner of Michigan and Main where the Chamber of Commerce now stands. Main St. is now Broadway. He and Andrew were both extremely conservative and disliked publicity of any sort. That is why you'll find no mention of them in old histories of Mil-

waukee, though they played quite a part in the development of the city. John moved to Coronado, California, late in life. He had six children.



132. Martin⁸ (Anthony⁷, Erastus⁶, Simeon⁵, Shadrack⁴, Abraham³, John², Nicolas¹), born in Bennington, died in Florida, 1895. He married and had two children:

134. Hiram⁸, (Anthony⁷, Erastus⁶, Simeon⁵, Shadrack⁴, Abraham³, John², Nicolas¹), married Mary Aikens, who died Feb. 15, 1875, in Bennington, age 40. He married second, Chester Thurbers daughter, who survived him. He died at Bennington, Oct. 6, 1889, age 56 years, according to Bennington Town records, Book 3, page 85. He had no children.

135. Martha[□] (Anthony⁷, Erastus⁶, Simeon⁵, Shadrack⁴, Abraham³, John², Nicolas¹). Letters show her girlhood was spent in Bennington. She married William Haynes, Middle Falls, N.Y., owner of a Leather-Board Company. She died Aug. 29, 1915, at Greenwich, N.Y. Her will names her husband, two nieces and two nephews.

136. Warner[□] (Anthony⁷, Erastus⁶, Simeon⁵, Shadrack⁴, Abraham³, John², Nicolas¹), born Sept. 27, 1831, Bennington, Vt., died Beaver Dam, Wis., March 18, 1897, buried in Oakwood Cemetery there.

He married Cornelia[□] Hinsdill, Oct. 18th, 1855 (Milo⁷, Daniel⁶, Joseph⁵, Joseph⁴, Isaac³, Barnabas², Robert¹). The family history is given in Hinsdale Genealogy by Andrews. Her mother was Julia Breckenridge. Warner graduated from Bennington Academy, went to Madison, Wis., as a surveyor where Franklin Hathaway had laid out that city, earlier. Returning East to marry, he then came with his bride to Beaver Dam Wis., working first as a surveyor, then a builder and dealer in real estate. He built the City Hall, Methodist Church, among other buildings. His home was on the site of the present Post Office. They had one son, Mylo Anthony.

153. Mylo[□] (Warner[□], Anthony⁷, Erastus⁶, Simeon⁵, Shadrack⁴, Abraham³, John², Nicolas¹), born June 6, 1861, at Beaver Dam, Wis., married June 16, 1887, at Wilmette, Ill., Anna Martin, daughter of William Davidson Martin and Myra McCoy Martin. Anna was born July 1 1864, at Oshkosh, Wis., died March 27, 1939, Wauwatosa, Wis. Mylo died Nov. 28,

1924. They are both buried at Oakwood Cemetery, Beaver Dam, Wis. Their children were:

154. Warner Hathaway^{1□} (Mylo⁹, Warner⁸, Anthony⁷, Erastus⁶, Simeon⁵, Shadrack⁴, Abraham³, John², Nicolas¹), born June 22, 1888, at Red Wing, Minn., lived at Beaver Dam, Wis., from the age of four until after his marriage. He graduated from the Mechanical Engineering course at the University of Wisconsin in 1912 and worked as an Industrial Engineer for many years. He was a member of the Board of Professional Engineers and Madison Technical Club, making his home in Madison, Wis. He died, Feb. 2, 1952, while vacationing in Sarasota, Florida. He is buried in the family plot at Beaver Dam, Wis. He was survived by his wife and two daughters, Mrs. Lionel Thompson, and Mrs. John Livingston. His wife was Mabel Smith of Beaver Dam, daughter of Charles Smith and Kate Shepard Smith. She was also a graduate of the University of Wis., in 1911 Class. They were married Nov. 12, 1913.

155. Enid^{1□} (Mylo⁹, Warner⁸, Anthony⁷, Erastus⁶, Simeon⁵, Shadrack⁴, Abraham³, John², Nicolas¹), born Jan. 22, 1890, at Red Wing, Minn., daughter of Mylo and Anna, resided at Beaver Dam, Wis., during school years, attended Wayland Academy, Rockford College and graduated from the Art Course of Milwaukee State College in 1915. She married Gordon Wallace Parks, son of Robert and Jane Wallace Parks, on April 20, 1918. Gordon was born at Green Bay Wis., Nov.

21, 1891, attended Purdue University where he studied Mechanical Engineering, was employed as Shop Schedule Engineer, C.M. & St.P. R.R., Milwaukee, at the time of his retirement. They lived for over thirty years in Wauwatosa, Wis., moving to Sarasota, Florida in 1951.

156. Doris¹¹ (Warner¹⁰, Mylo⁹, Warner⁸, Anthony⁷, Erastus⁶, Smeon⁵, Shadrack⁴, Abraham³, John², Nicolas¹), born at Beaver Dam, Wis., Jan. 5, 1918, attended public schools at Madison, and graduated from the University of Wisconsin Music Course with honors in 1940. She married Lionel Drew Thompson, Almond, Wis., April 5, 1941, a Mechanical Engineer employed by Fairbanks Morse Co., at Beloit, Wis. Their three sons are:

Betty¹¹ (Warner¹⁰, Mylo⁹, Warner⁸, Anthony⁷, Erastus⁶, Simeon⁵, Shadrack⁴, Abraham³, John², Nicolas¹), born at Beaver Dam, Wis., Aug. 11, 1920, attended public school at Madison, graduated from the Art Course of the University of Wisconsin, 1942, where she was a member of Chi Omega and Delta Phi Delta. She taught drawing in the public schools of Wisconsin Rapids, married Major John Waters Livingston, son of Mr. and Mrs. Ralph Livingston, Almond, Wis., Feb. 17, 1944, at Great Bend, Kansas. John attended the University of Wisconsin before enlisting in the Army Air Force in 1940. He received his commission in 1941, and was at Hickam Field dur-

ing the attack on Pearl Harbor. He saw action in the Pacific—received the Order of Purple Heart, returning to the States in Feb. 1943. He received his masters degree as Mechanical Engineer at University of Michigan, remained with the Army and in 1953 was made Colonel. Their daughters:

"Burgoyne with 10,000 troops marched southward from Canada . . . took possession of Ticonderoga on the second of July . . . After reaching Port Edward on the third of July, he sent out a body of Hessians to sieze cattle and provisions which the Americans had collected at Bennington. The Hessians were defeated on the 16th of Aug. 1777, by the Green Mountain Boys under Col. John Stark—about five miles from Bennington. On the same day, another British detachment was defeated by Col. Seth Warner.



The first church at Bennington—Congregational—

was established in 1762, under the leadership of Samuel Robinson. It was rebuilt in 1806 and much later, beautifully restored.



“Memorials of a Century”—an old and rare book by Isaac Jennings, published in 1869, embracing the early history of Bennington, Vt., and the history of the First Congregational Church, contains the names of Hinsdill, Bingham, Breckenridge, Haynes and Warner, all Hathaway family connections.

Franklin Hathaway, a son of the late Jay Hathaway, who was one of the most prominent of the early settlers of this city, died in Chicago at the age of 82 years. His great-grandfather, Simeon Hathaway and seven sons fought under General Stark in the Battle of Bennington. One of the sons, Joshua, graduated from Yale in 1787, came to Rome in 1795, was first Treasurer of

Oneida County, and was Postmaster of Rome from 1808-1833. He broke the first ground of the Erie Canal. Jay Hathaway, the father of Franklin, was Treasurer of Oneida County for ten years.

Franklin went to Wisconsin when 17 years of age. He was a surveyor and worked on the first map of the Territory of Wisconsin, and laid out the city of Madison. He worked in the engineering corps of the Utica and Syracuse railroad and was one of the passengers on the first train to pass through Central New York.

He had lived in Chicago since 1847. He is survived by his wife one son and two sisters, Mrs. E. C. Hayden of New York and Mrs. J. S. Dyett of Rome.

Copy of Obituary in Chicago Tribune in part:

In the Spring of 1843, he removed to Milwaukee, engaging in real estate with his Uncle Joshua. He came to Chicago in 1847 and was employed by the real estate firm of Ogden, Sheldon and Co. Then he went to Equitable Trust Co., as Cashier. He retired about four years ago.

He was a member of S.A.R.—Sons of New York and the Church of Our Savior.

The funeral takes place tomorrow at the latter church. Internment at Rosehill. He leaves a widow, one son in the East, and two sisters.

He was born in Rome, N.Y., July 12, 1818, of Vermont parents.

Breckenridge Lineage

James Breckenridge (father of Daniel, grandfather of Julia Breckenridge, who married Milo Hinsdill), was Lieut. of the First Military Co. formed at Bennington, Vt., in 1764, and was one of the three men who ruled the Convention of Dorset, Vt., on July 17, 1776, and one of the eight men, for whose capture, Gov. Tryon offered a bounty of 50 Pounds. He was a Lieut. in the French War.

He was sent to England in 1772 to ask relief of the Crown against the N.Y. claimant and government, his land being a part of the boundry line under dispute.

On his farm was born the future State of Vermont, and in 1774, he and seven others were ordered to surrender.

A convention was called at Dorset, Vt., the warrant of which was signed by James Breckenridge, Simeon Hathaway (see Hathaway Supplemental D.A.R. 334200) and Elijah Dewey. The convention was held July 24, 1776. Fifty-one delegates were present. The signed document read: "We, the subscribers of this district, engage at the risk of our lives and fortunes to defend, by

arms, the U.S. against the hostile attempts of the British fleets and armies."

Julia was the dau. of Daniel Breckenridge (b. 1769, d. Sept. 29, 1847, Bennington), and Hannah (b. 1773, d. Nov. 11, 1811, age 38).

Daniel had two wives, the first one Hannah, who had nine children according to an early (1811) newspaper called "Green Mountain Farmer." His second wife was Azubah Younglove, mentioned in his will.

Daniel was the son of Lieut. James Breckenridge, who was b. May, 1721, in Ireland. His father was a Scotch Coventer. James came to America with his father, James, at the age of six. They lived at Ware, Mass. Lieut. James Breckenridge moved to Bennington, Vt., in 1761. His wife was Mary Moore, b. 1724, d. Sept. 16, 1800. James died April 16, 1783.

Martin Lineage

The coat of arms of the Martins of Ross County, Galway, Ireland, was granted to Sir Oliver Martin by King Richard I, (1157-1199) in the Holy Lands during the Crusades. Sir Oliver was sole companion to Richard Cour de Leon during his captivity by the Saracens and accompanied him back to England. The Coat of Arms is recorded as in use in 1199 A.D. and is given in Burke's Landed Gentry, College of Heraldry, London.

The author's grandfather, William Davidson Martin, claimed descent from William Davidson and William Martin, who came to Virginia as "Merchant Adventurers" with the blessing of the Crown. During the years 1603-1609 they had purchased shares in a plantation on James River. Christopher Martin, later treasurer of the Mayflower, brother of William Martin and John Martin, came with them and was probably back in London before 1619. He then came with 66 adventurers and 35 members of the Leyden Congregation back to America with the Mayflower, intending to land at Jamestown, but losing his course, landed in Cape Cod Harbor. John Martin was included in the Char-

ter of the Virginia Company in 1609. Christopher died Jan. 18, 1621. No descendants of his have been located.

Years of research have failed in finding the connecting links to the Martin family of New Jersey and New England. It is hoped that others in generations to follow may complete the work here begun. It appears that descendants of William Davidson and William Martin moved up to New Jersey and then to New Hampshire.

The first Martin ancestor of whom we have definite knowledge is Samuel, show below.

This list of children was copied from the Martin family Bible. According to an old letter from Eliza Ann Martin Thompson there were thirteen children. She was the daughter of Nason Cass Martin, so undoubtedly knew.

The Davidson in William Martin's name came from Mary Davidson (b. 1785, who m. 1804, Samuel Center, b. 1781), who was the mother of Cynthia. William m. Myra McCoy in 1862 at Woodstock, Vt. They moved to Wisconsin where their children were born. They were Anna, Thomas, William (who died in childhood and was buried at Beaver Dam, Wisconsin), Allan, Josephine, and Abbie. William and Myra moved to Plainfield, N.J., about 1900, where he commuted to his office in New York. He spent his last years with his son Allan in Hartland, Vermont, where he and Myra are buried. He died at age 83. His wife's history is given under McCoy Lineage in this book.

Anna Martin⁴, daughter of William and Myra, b. 1864, Oshkosh, Wis., m. Mylo Hathaway of Beaver Dam, Wis., in 1887, had children Warner and Enid, d. 1939. See: Hathaway Lineage.

Josephine Martin⁴, dau. of William and Myra, b. 1878, in Wisconsin, m. Ernest Blakely, Concord, N. H., in 1912, no children. They lived later in Manchester, N. H., and Melrose, Mass., where he died, 1954. He is buried in Concord.

Abbie⁴, dau. of William Martin and his wife, Myra, was b. 1879 in Wisconsin, did not marry and died in 1918, Vineland, N. J.

McCoy and Hussey Lineage

Myra McCoy was born Cabot, Vt., 1842, m. 1862, at Woodstock, Vt., William Davidson Martin.

Myra's father was Rev. Wm. Horace McCoy, son of William who came from either north Ireland or Scotland, not earlier than 1800. Some of the family spelled the name McCoy and some McKoy.

Myra's mother was Johanna Hussey, b. about 1815, lived in southern N.H. Johanna assisted her husband as a circuit preacher. Johannas father was Mr. Hussey, b. 1790, who married Miss Sperry. Family tradition claims that Johanna descended from Christopher Hussey who settled the town of Hampton in 1638, was a purchaser of Nantucket in 1659, Justice of the Peace in Hampton, 1639, and a Deacon of the Quaker Church, buried at Hampton, 1685. He had m. in Holland and came to America in 1632 on the ship William Francis.

Myra and her husband, William Martin, went to Wisconsin in their early married life, and there, their children were born. They are both buried at Hartland, where the family of Allan Martin lived, all of his married life.
