# THE JOHN HAW GENEALOGY

## Preface

The purpose of the John Haw Genealogy is three-fold. It is set out as a memorial to our forbears. It is intended, through this presentation, that present and future generations will know their family history and become better acquainted with family members.

This is the first attempt of the writer to prepare a work of this kind. In the summer of 1961 the idea of a need for a family listing came as a result of a visit to cousins living in the Rainy River District of Ontario. The urgency of this need became apparent when letters came in from other relatives, requesting copies of the genealogy. As a result, most of the material was assembled in six months, with the co-operation of many of the relatives.

The format of the presentation was developed during the first three months of the assembly. The basic pattern of placing generations in vertical columns, and family sections in horizontal runs was considered to be a practical way to set the material in order. Once the reader becomes accustomed to the system, the material will be easy to follow, and references handy to locate. Blank columns and pages are left for future insertions by the owner.

In the gathering of the information, a standard listing was attempted. The following was asked for:— Christian names; year of birth; day, month, year, and place of marriage; full name of partner plus year of birth; mailing address; divorces; occupation of descendant; features of services and education (degrees.) For those who have passed on, the year of death; place of burial; and for the earlier generations a write-up of their respective lives.

Some have withheld complete information. Two requested deletions. This is regrettable. . . . For complete details, the reader is

referred to the respective Provincial Government Vital Statistics records, where such information is available to all who pay the required fee.

The presentation is in three parts. First is a lineage outline of the Watson family followed by a similar lineage outline of the Haw family. These sections are sketchy and incomplete and are given to enlighten the reader on lineage background. In these areas further research is in progress. The main section deals with John Haw and his descendants, and history stories connected with members of the family.

Copies of this book are not for sale. Printing and mailing costs are being financed by free-will donations from relatives and friends. All donations are placed in the "John Haw Genealogy Fund" held in trust by the writer. All John Haw adult descendants will receive their copy of this book without financial obligation. Copies will be distributed to descendent children on the request of their parents.

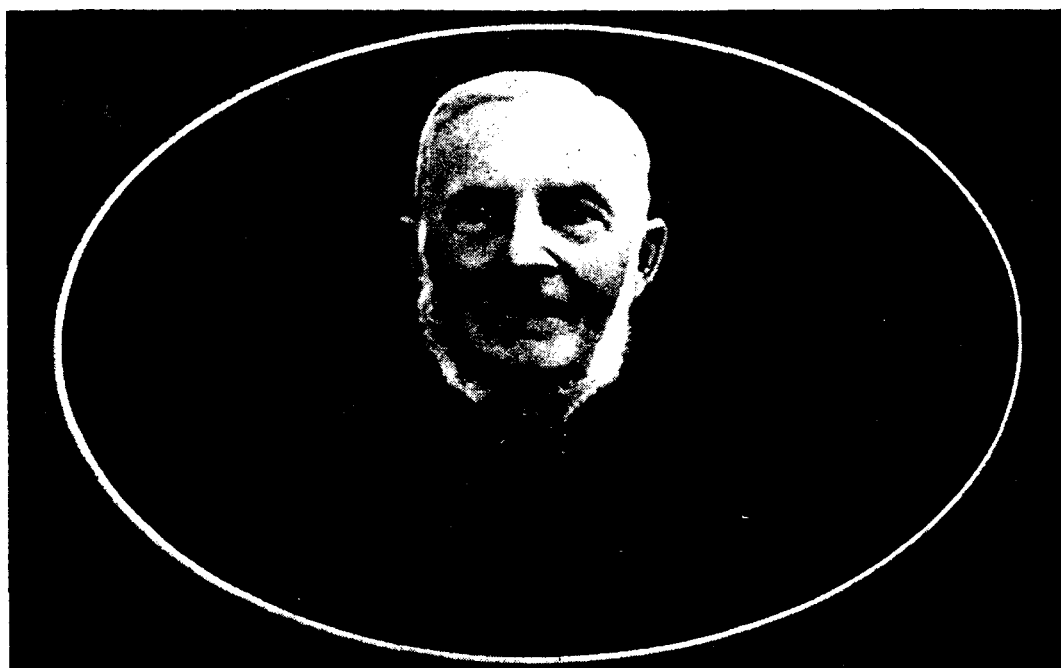

Mr. William Watson of 5738 Burns Avenue, Detroit, has kindly supplied the following:

"Pop Watson came from Yorkshire, England. He was a butcher by trade. All his family were born in England except Arabella, Mrs. John Haw, who was born in Ontario."

At the Brussels, Ontario, cemetery, and buried in the William Ainlay family plot is a Watson with the following inscription on his tombstone:—

"Memory of Robert Watson  
Died May 11, 1870.

Age 84 years, 11 mos. and 11 days."

It is conceivable this person may have been the 'Pop' Watson referred to above.

Mr. and Mrs. John Ainlay, 3330 Grant Street, Evanston, Illinois, U.S.A., have compiled, in 1954, an extensive genealogy of the Ainlay family and an interesting family history, containing a number of interesting facts about Ellen (Watson) Ainlay. From this history we gain the following: Eleanor Watson was born Feb. 7, 1812, at Scarborough, Yorkshire, England. Eleanor came to Canada with her parents when thirteen years of age. The Watsons lived in the Port Hope area. After Eleanor married, six of her children were born in Port Hope:

Eleanor's husband is described as being a surveyor, explorer, builder and founder of Ainlayville.

The Ainlay family came from Yorkshire, England, and settled in Port Hope in 1819.

Many family descendents are now living in Canada and the United States.

It may be of interest to note here the parents of James Smith who married Polly Ann Watson were Boltess Smith and Lavina Hollenbeck. This couple were U. E. Loyalists who moved to Canada from Pennsylvania and pioneered in Hamilton Twp.

## RESEARCH RE WATSON FAMILY LINEAGE

In recent months an attempt has been made by Thomas Rattle and the compiler of this book to establish Watson family connections with relatives in England; to determine definitely the names of the parents of this family who came to Canada in 1824 or 1825; and to learn more about Watson Family Lineage.

A copy of the telephone listings of Watson people in Scarborough, England was obtained. A letter of enquiry was addressed to over thirty Watson names living in Scarborough and area at the beginning of 1962. A number of replies to this letter were received. Some Watsons in England are quite interested in the project and are investigating the matter further. Churches have also been contacted for early family baptismal records.

This type of investigation takes time, and as we proceed with the printing, no definite proof of connections has come back to us. It is hoped some interesting family information may be revealed as a result of our efforts.

## OBITUARY OF

ELEANOR (WATSON) AINLAY

Wife of (A.2) William Ainlay

(Apparently taken from the Brussels newspaper of that time)

"An Old Resident Gone. — Saturday evening of last week an old and well-known resident, in the person of Mrs. William Ainlay, passed over to the great majority at the advanced age of nearly 80 years. The deceased was born at Scarboro, England, her maiden name being Eleanor Watson. She came to Canada with her parents when 13 years of age and located at Port Hope. She was united in marriage to William Ainlay, who died many years ago, and they resided at Darlington for a time, then moved to Logan Township, Perth County, and 39 years ago became residents of Brussels, then a howling wilderness. Thomas Halliday came about the same time, taking up the 100 acres on Morris side and Mr. Ainlay 300 acres on Grey side. Mr. Ainlay was here two years before the family and built his log house, the first one here, near the flax mill. Mr. Halliday's house was nearly

where the American Hotel now stands. Mrs. Ainlay's home was the stopping place for the public for years and the meeting house for the pioneer preachers until the school-house was erected on the lot where Watson Ainlay now resides. The subject of this notice might well be called the Mother of Methodism for in the Church, choir, Sunday School, etc., she was the moving spirit for years. She was the mother of ten children, eight of whom are living, as follows: Henry, of Arbanna, Illinois; John, of Nebraska; Mrs. Stacey of Denver, Colo.; Thomas, William and Watson of Brussels; Mrs. Murphy of Imlay, Mich.; and Joseph, of Listowel. Her illness was of brief duration as she was in her accustomed pew at the Methodist Church the previous Sabbath evening. Tuesday evening following she was taken ill with bleeding at the stomach, followed by paralysis and died as stated above. Mrs. Ainlay was preparing to visit her daughter at Imlay City and was about as well as usual. Her voice is silent in the earthly sanctuary but is chanting the hallelujah song in the church above. The funeral took place on Tuesday afternoon, Revds. Messers Salton and Paul taking the service. The body was

## RESEARCH

To date, our limited amount of research has revealed very little about earlier Haw families in England. The origin of the name, and how far it extends back into English history has not been determined. The names Haw; Hawe; Haws, etc., are probably of the same origin. Books have been published listing old family wills in England. For anyone interested in obtaining copies of old English wills in which the names Haw; Hawe; Haws, etc., are mentioned, listed, or referenced, the following is a source:

Mrs. Weldon H. Dodds, R. R. 1, Ridge Rd. E., Grimsby, Ont., has in her possession the marriage certificate of the above couple. Even when subjected to special tests by experts, it was impossible to decipher the place of the ceremony and by whom it was performed.

This family came to Canada about 1830, and settled in Hope Township, a few miles north of Port Hope, Ontario.

Joseph Haw died in Hope Township and is buried in St. Paul's Anglican Church Yard, Perrytown, Ont.

A story goes to the effect there were three brothers in this family. Two came to Canada, and one went to India.

This family section has pioneered in both Hope Township, Durham County and in Grey County of Ontario.

A complete history and genealogy on this family would be very interesting.

## A CANADIAN ENQUIRY.

A recent enquiry re family background, addressed to Haw listings in the telephone directories of Hamilton, Toronto, Montreal and Ottawa produced some items of interest. Approximately 50% replied to the enquiry. One reported family emigration from Ireland. Some had no record of their family origin. The most interesting return came from Hamilton. Four Haw families in Hamilton and one in Brantford stem from a Haw ancestor alleged to have come to Canada from Lincolnshire area, England, in the 1830's. Story has it that this Haw person was employed as a coachman in England by a wealthy family named Ryder. The coachman married the boss's daughter, and the couple came to Canada to escape family displeasure. They settled in the Troy-St. George area west of Hamilton, where the family carried on farming operations. This family has longevity characteristics and Christian names similar to our own family. There is a possibility of relationship here.

Born in the Village of Dale, Ont., Herman probably received his elementary education at the village school. He was about ten years of age when the family moved to a rented farm at Lot 29, Con. V, Hamilton Twp., and N.E. from Bethel Grove Church. Herman may have attended Bethel School, but in all probability he helped his father with the farm work from an early age. Before his marriage, he was employed in the Cobourg Crossen Car Shops as a carpenter. At the time of his wedding, he entered a partnership with Dan McFaul to work a large rented farm near Cold Springs (Lot ? Con ? Hamilton Twp.) It was at this farm where sons Stanley and George were born. Herman owned a share in a clover threshing machine and performed custom threshing in the area during the Fall and Winter.

In 1886, the McFaul-Haw partnership was dissolved. Herman, with his share of the assets, moved his family to Egremont Twp. in Grey County, and started farming operations on the George Haw farm, lot 23, Con. 18, and a short distance from the village of Dromore. As his family grew, Herman expanded his operations, and a few years later he owned two farms, rented two additional farms, all close together. The other ten children of his family were born at Dromore.

While in Grey County, Herman took an active interest in the community, and served on the local school board. In politics, he was a loyal, hard-working Liberal (Grit) and organized political meetings at election time.

It appears that Herman was an industrious worker, and ambitious to get things done. Neighbours remarked how Herman would be out working on logging operations in cold, stormy weather, when other men would sit in their houses. In 1900 he built a barn on the "Dixie" farm, and in 1905 he built a second barn on the home farm.

A call to the West attracted Stanley in 1905, and he left home for Saskatchewan on the harvester's excursion. Stanley started homestead activities 35 miles N.W. of Swift Current, now Battrum. Later George followed his brother to Saskatchewan, and Elsie went West in 1909. These moves started a family trend to go West.

In 1911, Herman visited the prairies and he was so impressed with the possibilities the prairies offered, he filed on a homestead of 320 acres, located about three miles South-West of what is now Pennant. He returned to Grey County in Ontario, sold one of his farms, left the other farm to his wife, and returned to Saskatchewan in 1912 to start farming his homestead.

In 1916 he bought another 320 acres, and in 1918 purchased a third parcel of 320 acres. His holdings consisted of:

The S.E. quarter, Sec. 15, Twp. 18, Range 17;  
The N.E. quarter, Sec. 10, Twp. 18, Range 17;  
The South half of Sec. 10, Twp. 18, Range 17;  
The West half of Sec. 31, Twp. 19, Range 16.  
All West of the third meridian — a total of 960 acres.

Herman farmed until 1925, sold his land to his son, Alexander, and retired to a new house in Pennant. Now his grandson, Delbert Haw is farming the homestead farm.

During this period, Jack went West, first to North Dakota, and later filed a homestead next to Stanley in Saskatchewan. Alex. and

winters George worked on logging operations and other winters he applied his skill at carpenter work. In the winter of 1955-56 George and his son Herman built a 27-foot fishing boat which Herman uses for salmon fishing. During his lifetime, George was also an excellent cook, and he was able to prepare meals that would be the envy of any woman.

Jim also went West in 1912, Eva left for the West in 1916, and Margaret moved to the prairies in 1917, after she was married, only to return to Ontario the following year. Ethel and Norman moved West in 1917.

From time to time, Herman came back East to visit his family, his sisters, brother, other relatives and friends. He always corresponded with his folk and maintained family ties.

Herman took to local politics, and from 1914 to 1916 served as councillor for Pennant Station, Sask. Next, he became reeve for the same municipality, and served in this capacity for ten years until 1926. In his political life, he was aggressive and worked for improvements in the form of good roads, telephone and power lines, etc. He still maintained his devotion to the Liberal Party, and later entertained 'Mitch' Hepburn, the dynamic Ontario Premier of the '30's, during one of the election campaigns for the Federal Parliament.

Following his retirement, he lived in Pennant in the summers, but spent many of his winters at the West coast. Following a lengthy illness in 1946, he sold his Pennant home and lived that summer with his son James and daughter-in-law Edna, where he was well cared for.

Even at 91 years of age, Herman still had plenty of 'drive.' The Swift Current, Sask., newspaper, "The Sun," had this to say on September 10, 1946:

"This prairie land produces some wonderful characters, and one of these is Herman Haw, widely known farmer of the Battrum district. Last Wednesday, September 4, Mr. Haw reached his 91st year and was the recipient of many congratulations. Mr. Haw never does mind anyone calling him 'Old Man', but he belies that nomenclature.

For instance, last Tuesday, the day before his 19st birthday, he drove his own car from Battrum to Beaver Flats, to visit his daughter, Mrs. T. W. McConnell. He was accompa-

The Historical Committee of Baptist Convention, Ontario and Quebec, McMaster Divinity College, c/o McMaster University, Hamilton, Ontario, reports no record of a Baptist Church at Dale (Bletcher's Corners) at any time, early or late. Probably no records of this early Church exist.

## WELCOME, ONTARIO CEMETERY

is located north of Port Hope and South-west of and adjacent to the junction of No. 2 and 401 highways.

John Haw's tombstone carries the following inscription:

"In memory of John Haw. Native of Lincolnshire, England. Born 1821; died Sept. 5, 1916."

## THE SMALL VILLAGE OF DALE

The origin of Dale goes back to very early settlement days. By 1798 start was made on Asa Danforth's roadway, 40 ft. wide, through the bush from York to Kingston. By 1800 the road was open for travel as far East as Hope Township. The Danforth road passed through what was later Dale.

Even before the Danforth road was opened, the location of Dale was on the Indian Ganarska Portage from Smith's Creek (Port Hope) to Rice Lake and North. This portage route became the first settlers' line of communication with the North. It was natural for a village to spring up at the cross-roads of early settlement communications. In 1818, Barnabas Bletcher operated a still in Hope Township, and Dale was probably the location. The same gentleman owned and operated a tavern at Dale. Later the Bletchers were prominent operators of a stage line northward from Port Hope, and for a time westward to Toronto. Dale, a small settlement North of Port Hope was long called Bletcher's Tavern. (The Valley of the Trent, by E. C. Guillet.)

nied by another daughter, Mrs. Martin Wilson of Durham, Ontario. The whole drive was approximately 100 miles. Not bad for a 91-year-old! Ten children of the Haw family are living. Mr. Haw first came to Pennant in 1911." One of Herman's nephews, on a visit to the West, relates an amusing story of back in the 'roarin' twenties', when the model T Ford car was the vehicle of the day. Herman drove a model T, and the story goes of how he would drive around the prairie field at harvest time, with a gun in one hand and the wheel of the car in the other, hunting gophers. Herman would dash about, slam on the brakes, producing a cloud of dust, take a pot-shot at his prey, and then off again after more victims. For a newcomer to the prairie from Ontario, this was highly amusing.

In late October, 1946, Herman left his prairie community for Vancouver. There he took sick and died in a Vancouver Hospital on December 1, 1946. The body was returned to Pennant for burial. There amid the snows of winter this grand old man was laid to rest.

He was given all the honours of a Masonic funeral. The United Church minister conducted the service at the church, with the church choir in attendance, contributing four hymns. A large number of relatives and friends attended the funeral in honour, in respect, and in gratitude for the life of Herman Haw. Interment was in Pennant Cemetery.

The following is from a Saskatchewan newspaper, probably the Swift Current Sun:

## "PENNANT HONOURS OLD TIMER HAW AT FUNERAL ON THURSDAY"

"On Sunday, Dec. 1st, at a Vancouver hospital, there passed away Pennant's oldest resident in the person of Herman Haw, pioneer and well-known farmer in his 92nd year. A few weeks previously he had gone to Vancouver to escape the rigors of the prairie winter

In 1824 or 1825, Arabella Watson's parents and family emigrated from Scarborough, Yorkshire, England, and are alleged to have lived at Dale. In 1840, William Watson, a brother to Arabella, acquired land, a 1/4 acre parcel, at Dale. Thomas Watson, another brother to Arabella, worked as a shoemaker at Bletchers' Corners, or Dale. Another mention is that William Britton, who married Rachael Watson sister to Arabella, lived at Dale.

An 1862 map of Hope Township listed Dale as 'Marysville.' The railroad from Port Hope to Lindsay, built in the mid-50's, passed through Dale. The present brick school building was built in 1874. The Northumberland and Durham Atlas of 1878 lists a hotel, school, blacksmith shop, a church (Baptist denomination), a post office, twenty or so houses, and a toll gate South of the village. With the passing of the stage coaches, the economy of the village declined, and nearly all the buildings of 1870 disappeared. Today, (1962) a few new homes, the brick school and two or three large oil storage depots are located at Dale. At the same spot present Ontario Highways No. 106 and No. 28 form a highway junction.

**BETHEL GROVE CHURCH AND CEMETERY**  
Located in Hamilton Township at the S. E. corner of Lot 31, Con. V. The Bethel School is located in the same Twp. lot and North of the church.

The following is reproduced from "the Bethel Grove United Church Sixtieth Anniversary leaflet, 1881-1941."

**"HISTORY OF BETHEL CHURCH" (in part)**  
"The little pine decked spot in Hamilton Township which we now know as Bethel Grove has been associated from the very beginning of the pioneer days with the educational and religious life of the community. The early settlers built their first log school here, and in it their children received not only educational advantages, but religious training."

months. He took sick soon after his arrival but rallied and was able to be out of hospital for a short time when he again took sick. The remains were taken back to Pennant and funeral services were held in the Masonic Hall there on Thursday afternoon. Rev. G. Hackney conducted the first service and the Masonic brethren, with Wor. Bro. John A. McLeod officiating, performed Masonic rites. Members of the Pennant United Church Choir sang a special piece, "No Night There." Pallbearers were Edward Housego, Alex. Smith, James D. Pirie, Elgin Valentine, Tom Moase and John A. McLeod. Interment took place in the Pennant Cemetery. There was a large number present testifying to the esteem in which the deceased was held, as there were also the lovely floral tributes. Conspicuous among the latter was the large pillow from the family and the wreath from the Mount Herman Lodge."

"Mr. Haw leaves to mourn his loss, two sisters, six sons and four daughters, thirty-seven grandchildren and eighteen great-grandchildren. He was born at Hope (Dale) Ontario, Sept. 4, 1855, and as a young man he farmed in Hope township (correction Hamilton Township) and later in Egremont Township in Grey County. He came West in 1911, and took up farming, proving himself a hard worker and successful farmer. For several terms he was elected reeve of Riverside municipality. Later he retired to a home he had built in the village. To the last Mr. Haw retained his clear-thinking mind, keen wit and profound interest in world-wide and district happenings. He could read and write without the aid of glasses. In politics he was a staunch supporter of the Liberal party. "Old Man Haw," as he often facetiously styled himself, was a familiar figure in the village and will be missed by many. Nathan Haw of Dundalk, Ont., came by plane to Regina to be present at his father's funeral."

Eva was born May 1, 1893, on her parents' farm at Dromore, Grey County, Ontario, and received her education at S. S. No. 14, Egremont Twp. After finishing public school she helped with the work at home and taught a class in Sunday School at Sackett's Corners for two or three summers. In the Fall of 1910 she went to Toronto to work. She liked the city life and except for occasional holidays at home, she stayed there until the Fall of 1916, when she went West to assist her sister Elsie who had at that time several small children. Eva liked the West and decided to remain there. During the next four years, she worked for a number of people in Swift Current and Pennant. On June 30, 1920, she married Ross Valentine. The couple made their home on a farm north of Pennant. To this union were born four daughters.

About 1925, asthma and hay fever started to give her concern. Each year the attacks became more severe and more frequent, and finally undermined her health. Eva died on August 20, 1940, in Swift Current Hospital.

Here, probably under the care of the Bible Christian Church, the first religious services were held. It is stated that John Little was converted during services held in the school house almost 100 years ago." (1840's)

"It was here too, that the first church was built. In 1861, with sacrifices that are now unrecorded, they built the frame church that now stands as the Sunday School room at the rear of the present structure. It stood close to the West line of the cemetery, and was moved to its present place and use about 1928. Though little remains on record of the years in which this church was used, we know that the congregation increased in numbers and in prosperity during the twenty years from 1861 to 1881, so that the new building became a necessity..

"Thus it was in 1881 that the present edifice was erected. — — — At this time Bethel was part of the Canton circuit. — — — In view of present building prices, it is interesting that the contract price of the building was for \$1750., and the total cost, equipped, was \$2400. Mr. James Smith and Mr. Sam Redpath were the contractors."

Victor Climo recently investigated to ascertain the existence of old cemetery and church records of the 1860's and 1870's and reports these old records at one time were stored in the church basement, became very dilapidated and were finally discarded and destroyed.

### THE VILLAGE OF BALTIMORE, ONTARIO

The village of Baltimore, located on No. 45 Highway, and approximately 5 miles North-east of the town of Cobourg, is an active, thriving country community. The village history goes back to pioneer days. In the 1880's it had its stores, flour mills, sawmill, blacksmith shop, post office, churches, school, etc., plus a number of houses. Recently a number of new, modern homes have been erected in and near the village.

THE VILLAGE OF CANTON, HOPE TWP.  
Canton is a much smaller place than Baltimore. The centre of the village is a small country store and post office. North from this centre by a half mile is a fair size millpond, dam and flour mill. East from this store is the Canton United Church and the Canton cemetery. A few scattered houses and a school house make up the village. Canton is much the same today as it was back in the 1890's, except that roads have been improved. The main change is the addition of the Hon. Vincent Massey estate and country mansion to the area. This large home was built in the 1920's, and Queen Elizabeth spent a week-end at Canton at the time of her visit to Canada in 1959. Canton is about five miles north of Port Hope.

## POST OFFICE LISTS OF LETTERS

The early town newspapers periodically listed names of persons for whom letters had arrived and asked these persons to call and pick up their mail.

The Port Hope Weekly Guide, March 10, 1860, prints a list of letters at the Port Hope post office as of March 1. In this list appears the name of John Haw.

## ONTARIO VITAL STATISTICS

The official recording of births, marriages and deaths in Ontario was started July 1, 1869. Before this date, recordings were private and haphazard.

## ARABELLA WATSON (182 ? -1867)

Very little information is available concerning Arabella Watson, John Haw's first wife. Arabella was born in Canada, we are told, and there is no available record of the date and year of her birth. It is assumed she was born at Dale, Ontario, sometime after 1825. She was the only child of 'Pop' Watson's family to be born in Canada. The only written record of Arabella was in the Haw family Bible, where her marriage to John Haw, on November 28, 1854, at Port Hope, is recorded. The inscription was made as late as 1887.

After her marriage, she lived at Dale, where five of her six children were born. Early in 1865, the family moved to the Israel Goheen farm, N. E. of Bethel Church, where her last child, Zillah, was born on April 30, 1866. The Peters family reports Arabella's death occurred eighteen months after the birth of Zillah, which would place the time of her demise into the Fall of 1867. The Township Assessment Rolls of that day names only the head of the family. The assessment of 1867, made probably in the Spring, lists eight in the John Haw household. The family was intact at that time. She is reported to have died from T.B., the scourge of the 1800's.

Where Arabella was buried is not definitely known. She may have been buried in the little Bethel Grove Church cemetery. The early burial records of this cemetery have long since been destroyed, and no record is available. Mr. Henry Rusk (brother to Susan Haw) of Port Hope, reports Arabella was buried in the Wesleyan Methodist cemetery, Pine St., Port Hope. Here again no records of this cemetery are available. This cemetery was removed in 1931, to make way for a school addition. Mr. George, retired undertaker, Port Hope, moved the graves to Port Hope Union cemetery. He reports the remaining tombstones, by 1931, were not decipherable. The plot in Union cemetery is marked by a monument with the following inscription:

"Sacred to the memory of the pioneers of Port Hope who were buried in the Wesleyan Methodist cemetery removed and reinterred in this plot. May - 1931."

Thus Arabella Watson lived, married, brought six children into the world and died prematurely, before her young family had a chance to know and to remember much about their mother. Today, very little is known about Arabella (Watson) Haw.

NOTE. The compiler of this history made exhaustive search of old Port Hope and Cobourg newspaper files located at the Toronto Reference Library; The Public Archives, Toronto; The Port Hope Evening Guide office; and the Cobourg Public Library, without locating any reference to Arabella.

## JOHN HAW (1821 - Sept. 5, 1916)

A native of Lincolnshire, England, John Haw was born in 1821. The town of his birth is not revealed, likewise the details of his home, his parents, or the earlier part of his life. He is reported to have been 26 years of age at the time of his arrival in Canada. This would date his arrival as 1847. He is alleged to have disembarked on United States soil, entered Canada by way of Niagara, walked to York (Toronto,) and then on to Port Hope. He was attracted to Port Hope by the fact of his uncle, Joseph Haw, had settled and lived in Hope Township several years previous. It is reported John Haw's first Canadian job was in a Port Hope saw mill. He was unable to read or write, and worked as a labourer.

## FIRST MARRIAGE IN 1854

John Haw married Arabella Watson in Port Hope on November 28, 1854. Witnesses to this ceremony were William Watson, a brother of the bride; and Wm.'s wife, 'Betsy' or Elizabeth (Haw) Watson, a daughter of Joseph Haw, and also first cousin to John.

The bride and groom first established their new home at Dale, on the south side of the Danforth Road, and west of the Corners, approaching the creek. Their property was adjacent to the Baptist Church property, and John paid 70 pounds for his holdings which included one acre of land. In 1856, he bought and added another half acre to his lot. The family lived here until 1865, and during this period, Herman; Phoebe; Millicent; Elizabeth and William were born. Millicent, unfortunately, was born physically defective, and required care all her 50 years of life.

Phoebe was born March 13, 1857 at Dale, in Hope Township. She probably received her elementary education at the Dale school. She was ten years of age when her mother died and being the oldest girl in the family, no doubt had to assist with home responsibilities. It is not certain whether she attended school after the family moved to Bethel area. With six children in John Haw's family, and four in the Wm. Watson family, there would be plenty of work for her to do at home, even after the re-marriage of her father. Phoebe was seventeen when her step-mother died, and it may be about this time she left home to work in Port Hope. She was employed for a period at Trinity College School in Port Hope as a waitress. Before her marriage she was also employed as a domestic in two or three Port Hope homes.

On February 22, 1883 she was married to John Hatherly at Baltimore, Ontario.

The family first farmed in Otonabee Twp., Peterborough County, for one year. They moved next to a farm in Douro Twp., Peterborough Co., until 1899. The next move was to North Monaghan Twp., Peterborough Co., on Lot 7, Con. II, until 1907.

The family farmed in Cavan Twp., Durham County, on Lot 17, Con. V, until 1923. The parents retired to Main St., Millbrook, Ont., leaving the farm to Irwin. Both lived in Millbrook for the remainder of their lives. Phoebe died in her 90th year and John died in his 80th year.

Phoebe was a good Christian woman. She looked after her home; cared for her family; worked hard; served her church as a teacher in the Sunday Church School, in the ladies' organizations; and was kind and considerate of others. She lived a lengthy, full, busy life.

John worked as a labourer, and wherever employment was available. Elizabeth reported how her father would take a cold lunch with him, walk into the woods, and cut cord wood all day long for forty cents.

## MOVE TO THE FARM

It was probably early in 1865 when John Haw commenced farm operations. He rented the Israel Goheen farm, located in Hamilton Township, north and a little east from Dale by about five miles. Here he made a start at farming which he followed through for the rest of his active life. It was here where Zillah was born in April 30, 1866. John gradually built up his stock and farm equipment.

## THE TRAGEDY OF 1867

John experienced his first major set-back in the Fall of 1867. We are given to understand that about this time Arabella contracted tuberculosis and died, leaving the distraught husband with his family of six small children.

## BETSY HAW

Elizabeth, or affectionately known as 'Betsy' Haw, had married William Watson and also lived at Dale. They owned property north of the Corners, and on the West side of the road. They were married probably in 1848 or earlier, and had four children: Polly Ann (1849) Zillah (?), George (1855) and William (?). Sometime before 1860, the father of these children William, had died of T.B., and Betsy had been left a widow to look after her small family. She mortgaged her property in 1860, probably to raise funds with which to live.

## SECOND MARRIAGE OF JOHN HAW

Betsy's oldest daughter Polly Ann Watson, married James Smith at Dale November 25, 1868. It was about this time John Haw married his widowed cousin Betsy, and took her and her children to his farm home to live. The date, place and particulars of this wedding have not been revealed and no record of the event has been produced. In 1869, the Hamilton Township Assessment Roll records ten persons in John Haw's family. These ten

The following is reproduced from a Peterborough newspaper report:

"Obituary. Mrs. John Hatherly. Millbrook, Dec. 26, 1946. "A private funeral was held on Monday at 2:00 p.m. for Mrs. John Hatherly (nee Phoebe Haw) who died on Saturday in her 90th year. Rev. G. C. R. McQuade conducted the service and interment was in Little Lake Cemetery. (Peterborough.) Previously living on the farm homestead, a short distance east of Millbrook, after her husband retired from active work, they moved to the village, purchasing the former William Mullen home on Main Street. A few years ago, Mr. and Mrs. Hatherly celebrated their golden wedding anniversary.

A member of St. Andrews United Church, Mrs. Hatherly was faithful in attendance preceding her last illness. For many years she was a teacher in the Sunday School, and was a member of the Women's Association and of the Women's Missionary Auxiliary, attending the meetings as long as she could.

Predeceased by her husband, the family surviving includes one son, Irwin, Millbrook; and three daughters, Miss Ethel at home, Mrs. Wm. Jones (Bertha) of Toronto, and Mrs. Stanley Jones (Mary) of Newtonville. There are five grand children."

(Lot ? Con. ?, Clark Twp) for four years. The family next moved to a farm at Zion, Ont., (Lot 34, Con. 4, Hope Twp.) where Mary lived out her life. Mary was afflicted with rheumatism, gradually getting worse and in later years she was unable to walk. She died with hypostatic pneumonia. A former minister of the family said: "Through the years, Mary was a patient, cheerful soul; and in spite of her suffering, maintained a bright outlook on life. She had a charming personality and her faith was truly inspiring."

probably were John Haw, his six children, Betsy, her son William Watson, and her daughter, Zillah Watson. Betsy's other son, George Watson, a boy in his 'teens, probably lived and worked away from home. Thus it seemed the best arrangement for all concerned, for John to marry his widowed cousin and combine the families into one household.

## 1874 — THE YEAR OF TRIPLE TRAGEDY

The family and farm life progressed under the new arrangements. However, the black hand of death struck the household in three, rapid, successive blows. Betsy's son William, contracted typhoid fever and passed away on August 28. Betsy next took ill from nursing and caring for William, and she died of typhoid on October 8. Twelve days later, on October 20, Zillah Watson, Betsy's daughter, also died.

The three deaths was a staggering blow to John Haw and his family. The loss of loved ones left great sorrow. The costs of sickness and funerals took all John's savings. His contemplated visit to England never was realized.

From here on, Elizabeth, with the help of others, took over the care of the household. Phoebe shortly after this took work in Port Hope. The family is believed to have lived on at the Israel Goheen farm until around 1880. During this time the children attended school and church activities at Bethel, located on the next sideroad west of the farm. They also often walked west into Hope Township to visit Haw relatives.

## THE MOVE TO BALTIMORE

Elizabeth reported she was nineteen when the family moved to the Baltimore area, to a second farm located at Lot 5, Con. 2, Hamilton Twp., and about a mile east from the village. It is believed the family lived here for ten years. Herman married in 1882, Phoebe in 1883; the rest of the family continued to live with and help their father. The young folk took an active part in Church and community life, and made a number of friends. The church records of the Baltimore Methodist

Born at Dale, Elizabeth spent her early childhood in that village. When about four years old, the family moved to a rented farm at Lot 29, Con. V, Hamilton Twp., and N.E. of Bethel Grove Church. It was at Bethel School and Bethel Church where Elizabeth received her elementary school and early religious training.

Following the death of her step-mother-cousin Elizabeth, still a young girl in her 'teens, had to assume the household tasks and responsibilities that went along with looking after her father's home, and assisting with the care of younger members of the family. Later, and still in her 'teens, she spent a short period in Port Hope learning the art of sewing and dressmaking.

As a girl she remembered Joseph Scriven, the author of "What a Friend we have in Jesus," preaching on the streets of Port Hope.

Until the year of her marriage in 1896, Elizabeth was housekeeper for her father. Her brother William and sisters Millicent and Zillah also lived at home. When nineteen years of age, the family moved from Bethel to Baltimore, where they resided for probably ten or more years. The last move was to the Mason farm at Canton.

From early age, Elizabeth was a constant, faithful worker and supporter of her church. She started to teach in the Sunday School at seventeen, and for about fifty years her interests were in this capacity. She served in the church schools at Bethel, Baltimore, Canton, and at Cobourg. In the latter years she was Sunday School Superintendent in the Cobourg Congregational Church. She also served her church in the Women's Association (Ladies' Aid) and the Women's Missionary Society.

Church were destroyed in a house fire in 1928 and the linking of family names with church membership rolls at Baltimore is no longer possible.

## THE MOVE TO CANTON

It is difficult again to date the final move of the John Haw family. 1890, or shortly after may have been the time of the move to the Mason farm located about two miles N.W. of the Canton store. As at Bethel and at Baltimore, the family members maintained their interest and activities in church and community life. In 1893, Zillah married. In 1896, first Elizabeth and then William married. John and daughter Millicent were left, but not alone. William took over the Mason farm, and his father and sister continued to live with him for awhile.

Later the father and daughter moved to the W. A. Peters home where Zillah looked after her aging father and her invalid sister for the remainder of their lives. Millicent died in 1910 and John in 1916. John was physically active up to the time of his death. He was always fond of the soil and kept his own special garden at the Peters home. It was called Grandad's garden. Before death overtook him, cataracts on his eyes dimmed his sight, but he continued to care for his garden, although he scarcely was able to distinguish between vegetables and weeds. He died on September 6, 1916.

The Port Hope Evening Guide of Thursday, September 7, 1916, records the following: "Died. Haw — at Canton, on Wednesday, September 6, 1916. John Haw, in his 95th year. The funeral service will be held at the residence of his son-in-law, W. A. Peters, Lot 13, Con. 4, Hope Township (Canton) on Friday afternoon at 2.00 o'clock. Interment at Welcome Cemetery."

She became a Life Member of the W.M.S. She attended Divine Worship regularly, usually twice on Sunday, in addition to Sunday School and Wednesday night prayer service. Elizabeth created a wonderful home atmosphere. Her quiet patience, efficiency, and her thoughtfulness of others set a fine example to all. At the time of her marriage, she took over the care of the Climo household. The family lived above the Climo store in the heart of Cobourg. Here she cared for the elderly, raised her own family, and looked after several in-laws when they became sick with fatal diseases.

In 1912, the Climo store was sold, and the family moved to the edge of Cobourg. Here Elizabeth looked after her home until stricken with a stroke in late 1939. The care of Elizabeth was too much for her husband. He died early in 1940. The home was closed, and Elizabeth lived with her sons for several years. All her life she had been a very active woman. Semi-paralysis stopped many of her activities, and when extreme care was required, she spent the last two years in rest homes. Elizabeth made many friends, and during her active years, kept in touch with relatives, friends, and loved ones. She was always willing to correspond, to visit, and to share with others many of the fine qualities she possessed.

The Port Hope Evening Guide of Friday, May 29, 1896, reports as follows:

## "A MAY WEDDING"

"A quiet wedding took place at the residence of Mr. John Haw, Canton, on Thursday, May the 28th, instant, it being the marriage of his daughter Lizzie, to Henry P. Climo, hardware merchant, of Castleton, formerly of Cobourg. The bride was assisted by Miss Myra Westington, of Bethel, and the brother of the bride, William Haw, filled the same office for

the groom. The ceremony was performed by the Rev. T. Brown, of Canton. After the congratulations, and the wedding supper had been partaken of, the bride and groom left for their new home in Castleton. We all join them in wishing them a happy, long life. Miss Haw will be greatly missed at Canton, as she had been an active and earnest worker in the Christian Endeavour, and a Sabbath School teacher. She was always willing to help in things that would advance Christ's Kingdom. May God's blessing go with her to her new home."

Note:— There was a sudden change in the Castleton business deal, and the above couple moved to Cobourg instead.

The Cobourg Sentinel Star reported the following late in January, 1952:

## "Mrs. H. P. Climo"

"The death of one of Cobourg's senior citizens, Mrs. H. P. Climo, occurred at Newcastle, January 18. Mrs. Climo was in her 91st year and had been a semi-invalid for 12 years. A daughter of John Haw, she was born at Dale, just north of Port Hope and came to Cobourg fifty-six years ago. Her husband predeceased her in 1940.

The John Haw family had come through hardship, sickness and premature loss of loved ones. The family was not materially wealthy. John Haw lived a quiet, useful life. The family members worked hard and were industrious to a high degree. Within the family there was a kind and loving feeling. This was exemplified through their lives by visiting, by interesting, regular correspondence, and by acts and deeds of kindness. They looked after and cared for their own families. Indeed they did not hesitate to care for the aged and infirm living in their homes. They went beyond their homes and served their community. Herman worked in political spheres, and gave leadership and direction in community affairs. Phoebe, Elizabeth, William and Zillah served their church faithfully and well, and all were teachers for many years in the Sunday School. At some time this family acquired an insight into the spirit of Christian living, and it so shaped and moulded their lives that they were able to share and to give much to others.

William was born at Dale, Ontario, and moved with the family to the Bethel area in Hamilton Township while still very young. His mother died when he was very small, and his step-mother also died when he was nine years of age. His formative years were spent on the family rented farm, Lot 29, Con. V., Hamilton Township, and N. E. from Bethel Grove Church. He received his elementary education at Bethel School, and as he grew older assisted his father with the farm work. He was in his mid-teens when the family moved to a second farm, Lot 5, Con. II, Hamilton Township, and east of Baltimore village. As far as we know, William spent all his single life at home, helping his father with the farm. Like other members of the family, William became closely associated with the church, and during his life was a teacher in the Sunday Church School and later became an elder in the Methodist Church.

Around 1890, the family moved a third time to the Mason farm, lot 15, Con. V., Hope Township, and N. W. of Canton.

In July, 1896, William married Susan Rusk, and took over the operation of the Mason farm. His father and sister Millicent lived with him for a period after the wedding. During his farming career, William and his family operated farms in Hope and Clark Townships. Most of this period, the family lived in the Starkville area. As the five sons grew up, they in turn assisted their father with the farm work.

William took an active part in community life. In addition to his church work, he served on local school boards, and was an active member of the Orange Lodge.

In the fall of 1928, William journeyed to Saskatchewan and spent three months visiting his brother Herman and family. A year later he became ill and was cared for, in Toronto, for a short period, at the home of his son, Kenneth. He regained his health and returned home. After Christmas, 1930, he became ill the second time and was taken to Port Hope hospital where he died on February 4, 1931. His ailment was hardening of the arteries. At the time of Zillah's birth the family lived at lot 29, Con. V., Hamilton Twp., and N. E. of Bethel Grove Church. Eighteen months after Zillah was born, her mother died from T. B. Her father re-married but the step-mother also died when Zillah was eight years old. Thus Zillah grew up in a home supervised by her father and older sisters and brothers. She received her elementary education at the Bethel area school, and as well as is known, lived at home all her single life, moving with the family to Baltimore and finally to Canton. Zillah and Wm. A. Peters were married at Canton on April 5, 1893. The Peters farm at that time was rented on a long-term lease, and the first five or seven years of married life was spent on the Hawkins farm, lot 11, Con. IV., Hope Township, and N. E. from the Canton church. Here Ewart was born. Before the year 1900, the family moved to their own farm at lot 13, Concession IV, Hope Twp., and west of the Canton village. Here Allan and Elsie were born.

This farm is now owned by the Hon. Vincent Massey and has been attached to his Batterwood estate where the Queen stayed in 1959, during her visit to Canada.

Zillah's father and sister Millicent lived for a while alternately on the Mason farm with William Haw and on the Peters farm with Zillah. Later she looked after her father and sister continuously until they died.

Zillah was a very busy person. She raised and cared for her own family; she looked after her invalid sister and her aged father; she looked after in-laws living in the home, in addition to all the farm duties and tasks of that day. Her volume of labour was large. Her accomplishments were performed before farm electricity was available, and before most present day push-button gadgets arrived to ease the burden of farm toil.

In addition, Zillah took part in church work. For a number of years she was a teacher in the Church Sunday Schools at Baltimore and Canton. Later she became Superintendent of the Canton School.

She was very kind and considerate of others. Nephews and nieces always liked to visit her home. Crowded as her day was with activity, there was always time for daily family Bible reading, prayer and worship.

In August, 1921, Zillah became ill and early in September developed typhoid fever. She died late in September after spending two weeks in the Port Hope hospital. She was beloved by all who knew her. Her funeral was probably the largest attended in the Canton area for many years. Her gravestone carries the following epitaph:

"One of God's noble women."

The following is reproduced from the Cobourg World of September 30, 1921:

## "THE DEATH OF MRS. PETERS"

"The death took place at the Port Hope Hospital on Wednesday of Mrs. W. A. Peters, of Canton, before her marriage, Miss Zillah Haw. She had been ill for a couple of weeks with typhoid fever.

A funeral service will be held in Canton church tomorrow afternoon at 2.00 p.m. Mrs. Peters has many friends throughout the district."
