A Norman Viking, who, during the reign of Charles, the Simple, king of France, as-
cend the Seine and captured Rouen. To secure peace Charles ceded to him the
province of Neustria and gave him his daughter, the Princess Gisèle, an marriage,
subject to the suzerainty of the king of France. See 44. He called his duchy,
Normandy, and assumed the title of Robert I., making his capitol at Rouen, 912.
He resigned in favor of his son William, 927, and d. 930.
12. **William**, "Longué Epée" (Longsword,) 2d Duke of Normandy, 927; m. Lady
Adele, dau. of Herbert, Count de Senlis. He was assassinated at the instigation
of Arnold, Count of Flanders, 943.
13. **Richard I.**, "Sans puer" (the Fearless,) 3d Duke of Normandy, 943; b. 933; m. a
dau. of Hugh, "The Great," Duke of France, etc., and his wife, Eldhild. See 59.
Another account says he m. Lady Gunora, dau. of Herbastus, a Danish knight.
His dau., Lady Emma, m. Ethelred II., "The Unready," King of England. See 80.
14. **Richard II.**, "The Good," 4th Duke of Normandy, 966; who d. 1027.
15. **Robert**, "Le Diable," 6th Duke of Normandy. He was suspected of murdering his
eldest brother, Richard III. By Arlette, a tanner's daughter, he was father of
William the Conqueror. He made a pilgrimage to the Holy Land, and died while
returning, at Nice, Bythania, 1035, without legitimate issue; but nominated his
son William his successor.
16. **William the Conqueror**, 7th Duke of Normandy, 1035. King of England, 1066-87.
m. Lady Matilda, dau. of Baldwin V., 7th Count Flanders. He d. Rouen, 1087. See 92.
17. **Henry I.**, "Beauclerc," Duke of Normandy, 1106; King of England, 1100-1135;
b. Selby, 1068; m. Princess Edith, dau. of Malcom III., Canmore, King of Scotland,
and his wife, queen Margaret. She took the Norman name, Matilda, or Maude.
He d. 1135. See 101.
18. **Pr'cess Matilda, or Maude**, m. 1st, Henry V., Emperor of Germany, who d. m. 2d, 1133
Geoffery Plantaganet, Duke of Normandy, 1144, and Count Anjou. She deposed
King Stephen and became Queen of England, 1141; and was in turn deposed by him.

19. **Henry II.,** Son of Geoffery and Matilda; Duke of Normandy, 1151; King of England, 1154-1189; m. 1152, Queen Eleanor, Duchess of Aquitaine, the divorced wife of Louis VII., King of France. See 107. He was first of the line of the Plantaganet kings of England. The admirer of "The Fair Rosamond." He d. Touraine, July 6, 1189, in the 58th year of his age.
20. **John,** "Lackland," King of England, 1199; m. 2d, Lady Isabel, dau. of Aymer de Taillefer, of Angouleme. He d. Newark, Oct. 18, 1216.
21. **Henry III.,** King of England. 1216-1272; b. Winchester, 1205; m. Lady Eleanor, dau. of Raymond de Barrenger, Count Provence, and grandson of Alphonso, King of Arragon and his wife, Lady Beatrice, dau. of Thomas, Count de Savoy. He died Nov. 16, 1272.
22. **Edward I.,** "Longshanks," King of England, 1272; b. 1239; m. 1st, 1252, Eleanor, dau. of Ferdinand III., "The Saint," King of Castile, who d. Dec. 28, 1290. See 104. m. 2d, Marguerite, dau. of Philip III., "The Bold," King of France. See 111. At his father's death he was in Palistine fighting the Turks for recovery of the Holy Land. While in Palistine, his wife, Eleanor, saved his life by sucking the poison from a wound of an attempted assassin. He fought Wallace and Bruce in Scotland. To retain Wales he caused his son to be born in Caernavon, and to be called Prince of Wales, which has ever since continued to be the title of the eldest son of the king of England. He was styled the English Justinian, from the excellence of his laws. He d. Burg-on-the Sands, July 7, 1307.
23. **Edward II.,** First Prince of Wales, 1284; King of England. 1307; m. Isabella, dau. of Philip IV., the Fair, King of France. See 112. The battle of Bannockburn was fought in his reign. A weak sovereign; he was deposed, 1327; and was murdered in Berkley Castle, Sept. 21, 1327.
24. **Edward III.,** b. Windsor Castle, Nov. 13, 1312; King of England, crowned Jan. 29, 1327. Although a regency was appointed on account of his minority, his mother, Queen Isabella, and her paramour, Roger Mortimer, Earl of March, held the chief power; until Edward assumed the government in 1230; siezed and hanged Mortimer and imprisoned the queen, Isabella. He was m. at York, Jan. 54., 1328, Philippa, dau. of William III., Count of Holland and Hainault. He had many wars with Scotland and France; won the victories of Crecy 1346, and Calais 1347. His son, Edward, the Black Prince, gained the victory of Poitiers 1356. The Order of the Garter was instituted, and the first English gold coin struck, and cannon began to be used in war during his reign. He d. at Shone, now Richmond, June 21, 1377.

25. **John of Gaunt**, 3d son of King Edward III.; Duke of Lancaster. The Wars of the Roses was began between the Houses of Lancaster and that of his brother the House of York. Before marriage he had a family of children by Catharine Swynford. m. 1st, Constance of Castile; 2d, Blanche, dau. of Henry Plantaganet, Earl of Derby; 3d, Mary de Bohun, dau. of Earl of Hereford.

28. **Margaret de Stafford**, b. 1435; m. Robert Dunham. See 124.
29. **Sir John Dunham**, b. Dunham-on-the-Trent, 1450. m. 1471, Elizabeth, widow of William Chaworth, and dau. of Sir Nicholas Browett. See 135. He d. Nov 9, 1525; she d. Mar. 17, 1501-2.
30. **Sir John Dunham**, b. 1474; m. Jean, dau. of Thomas Thorland. He inherited through his mother, Kirklington Manor, as heir of Sir John la Zouche. He d. 1502.

31. **John Dunham**, b. 1498; m. Aug. 15, 1522, Benedict, dau. of Adam Folgamshe and his wife Katharyne, dau. of John Leake of Southwell Dale, Derby. He d. 1545.
32. **Ralph Dunham**, b. Scrooby, England, 1526, m. Elizabeth, dau. of Baron Thomas Wentworth and wife Margaret Fortesque. See 142.
33. **Thomas Dunham**, b. about 1560. Lived at Scrooby. Through his mother's religious instructions he was inclined toward the Puritan reformers. His kindred, the la Zuches, Wentworths, etc., who were rigid members of the established church and powerful government officials, violently opposed the Puritans of Scrooby, to such extent that Thomas Dunham moved to London to escape persecution. He had sons: John, b. Scrooby, 1589, and Robert, b. London, 1605. The latter was transported to Virginia (America) 1635.

34. **Deacon John Dunham**,¹ b. Scrooby, England, 1589; m. Leyden, Holland, Oct. 17, 1619. Abigail Wood, who is supposed to have been distantly related to him. His relatives in England were rigid church men and violently opposed the Puritans at Scrooby, but he separated from the established church and joined the Puritans. It is supposed that he was among Brewster's Company who were arrested and imprisoned at Boston, England, for attempting to escape from England in 1607. By the advice of Brewster, Dunham assumed the name of John Goodman and escaped to Holland in 1608. By the same name he came in the Mayflower to Plymouth, 1620. Until recently it was supposed that "John Goodman" died at Plymouth the first winter, but it was not so. A lot of land was assigned to him adjoining that of his friend, Elder William Brewster, at Plymouth. Brewster, Bradford and Dunham, all came from Scrooby. The kindred of Dunham were influential government officials in England, and would probably have punished him if discovered, so he retained his identity until the death of King James. Among his kindred in England was Thomas Wentworth, Earl Strafford, Prime minister to King Charles I. About that period he resumed his proper name, John Dunham. He lived in Plymouth. Deacon in the church, 1633. Deputy to the first General Court at Plymouth, 1639. He d. Mar. 2, 1668-9.

35. **John Dunham**,² b. Leyden, Holland, 1620; m. 1641, Dorothy. He came with his parents in the Mayflower, 1620. Lived in Plymouth. Freeman, 1641. Grand juror and non-commissioned officer. 30 acres of meadow land northeast of Cook's Pond was granted to him Mar. 7, 1643. His father gave him six acres of land Jan. 16, 1647. In 1659 the Court granted to him and others land to be selected at Sconsett. In 1660 he was granted 30 acres on west side of the Nansket. Highway surveyor, 1661. In 1662 he was named as one of the first born (Pilgrims) who were granted land in Barnstable, Mass. He bought into "The Purchase" at Middleborough, Mass., 1673, and became an inhabitant there. In 1674, he was granted 30 acres of land. Representative 1673. He d. Wellfleet, Mass., 1692. Will dated Plymouth, Feb. 2, 1691; probated 1692.

36. **Mary Dunham**,³ b. 1642; m. Barnstable, Mass., Nov. 20, 1662. James,² son of James and Anne Hamlin. Supposed to have been born in England, and baptised St. Lawrence, Reading, Berkshire, Apr. 10, 1636. Farmer, lived first on his father's Coggin's Pond lot, Barnstable, 1702. Late in life he went to live with his daughter, Mrs. Hope Case, at Tisbury, Mass. Deputy to the Mass. General Court, 1705. His will dated Sept. 13, 1717. He died Tisbury, May 3, 1718. She d. Apr. 19, 1715. Her gravestone is still to be seen at Barnstable. 14 children. The genealogy of James and Mary (Dunham) Hamlin will be found in *The Hamlin Family* by Hon. H. F. Andrews, Exira, Iowa, 1903.

37. **Pepin d'Heristal**, grandson of Pepin of Landen. Duke of Austrasia. Mayor of the Palace under the Merovingian Kings of the Franks. Duke of the Franks, 687, and the real ruler of France. He fought the Moors in Spain. Wife, Plectrude. He d. Dec., 714.
38. **Charles**, "LeMartel," natural son of Pepin d'Heristal. b. 694. Duke of the Franks 719. Mayor of the Palace under Chilpric II. and Thierry IV. and the real ruler of the Franks. Fought the Moors in Spain. m. Lady Rotrude. He d. Crecy, 741.
39. **Pepin**, "Le Bref," b. 714. First Mayor of the Palace under Chilpric III., whom he dethroned 752, and became the first of the Carlovingian Kings of France. m. Lady Bertha, dau. of Charibut, Count de Leon. He d. St. Denis, Sept. 24, 768.
40. **Charlemagne** (Karl der Grosse). b. Apr. 2, 742. King of the Franks 768; Emperor of the West, 800. His empire embraced France, part of Spain, half of Italy, and most of Germany. He fought the Moors in Spain, and had many wars. m., 771, Lady Hildegard de Savoy and Suabia, who d. Apr. 30, 782. He d. Aix-la-Chapelle, Jan. 28, 814. The romance of Roland and Oliver occurred in his reign. His tomb is inscribed "Carlo Magno."
41. **Louis I.** "Le Debonnaire." b. 778. King of the Franks, 814; Emperor of the West, 816. m. 2d, Judith, the Fair Maid of Bavaria, dau. of Guelph, Count of Bavaria, He d. 840.
42. **Charles I.**, "Le Chauve," son of Louis and Judith, b. 823. King of the West Franks 843; m. 1st, Lady Hermentrude, dau. of Odo, Count d'Orleans, m. 2d, Richildis. He is supposed to have died of poison at Briosan, Mont Cenis, 877.

43. **Charles III**, "The Simple," posthumous son of Charles I, b. 879? King of France; crowned at Rheims, 893; m. Princess Elgiva, dau. of Edward the Elder, King of England. See 77. He was a weak, trifling monarch, and sought to dethrone Louis IV, Emperor of Germany, but was himself dethroned about 922. In 929 he was imprisoned by Herman, Count Vermandois, by whom it is supposed he was poisoned, and d. Oct. 929.
44. **Princess Giselle**, dau. of Charles "The Simple", m. Rollo, the Dane. See 11.

45. **Hengist**, King of Saxons, King of Kent, 457.

59. **Hugh**, "The Great," Duke of France and Burgundy, and Count of Paris and Orleans. Not crowned. m. Eldhild, dau. of Edward, "The Elder," King of England and Queen Elfleda. See 77. He d. 956.
60. **Hugh Capet**, King of France; b. 940; crowned 987; m. Princess Adele, dau. of William, Duke of Aquitaine. He d. Paris, Oct. 24, 996.
61. **Robert I.**, "The Pious," King of France; b. 771; crowned 996; m. 1st his cousin, Bertha, for which he was excommunicated, and he reluctantly divorced her, and m. 2d 1006, Constance, dau. of William, Count of Toulouse. He shared the throne with his father, 988-996, when he became king. Both d. Melun; he d. 1031; Constance 1032.

62. **Henry I.**, Son of Robert and Constance; b. 1005? crowned 1031; m. 1st a dau. of Conrad, Emperor of Germany, who died; m. 2d a dau. of Henry III., Emperor of Germany, who died; m. 3d Anne, dau. of Jaroslans, Grand Duke of Russia. He d. 1060. See 149.

63. **Cerdic**, First King of West Saxons, 519. He d. 534.
64. **Kenric, or Cynric**; crowned 534. He d. 560.
65. **Cheaulin**; crowned 560; reigned 32 years, and was dethroned by his nephew, Clearic, was banished, and d. in exile, 593.
66. **Cuthwin**; killed in battle with the Britons during the reign of his father, 584.

75. **Æuhelwulf.** m. 1st Osburga, dau. of Oslac, an English nobleman, and a descendant of Cerdic. m. 2d Judith, dau. of Charles I., "Le Chauf," King of France. See 42. No issue by 2d wife. He d. Jan. 18, 857 after reigning eighteen years. She m. Baldwin, 1st Count of Flanders, and became the ancestress of Matilda, the wife of William the Conqueror. See 85.
76. **Alfred the Great.** b. 849. He survived his brothers and became sixth King of England, 871; m. 869 Ealswortha, dau. of Ethelan, Earl of Lincolnshire. He d. Oct. 28, 901. She d. 904.
77. **Edward**, "The Elder," m. 1st, Ecquina, a shepherd's daughter: 2d, Elfleda, dau. of Earl Æthelme: 3d, Edgiva, dau. of Earl Sigelline. He was crowned 901, and d. 925.
78. **Edmund I.**, King of England, 941; m. Lady Elgiva. He was assassinated, 948.
79. **Edgar**, "The Peaceful," King of England, 959; m. 2d, Elfréda, dau. of Ordgar, Earl of Devon. He d. 975.
80. **Ethelred II.**, "The Unready," King of England, 978; m. 1st, Elgifa, dau. of Earl Thorad; 2d, Lady Emma, dau. of Richard I., "Sans Puer," 3d Duke of Normandy. He d. 1016. See 13.

81. **Edmund II.**, "The Ironside," son of Ethelred and Elgifa, King of England; m. Lady Elgitha, widow of Siegfrieth, a Danish Thane. He was murdered at the instigation of Eric, Duke of Mercia, 1017.
82. **Prince Edward.** "The Exile;" m. Princess Agatha, dau. of Henry II., Emperor of Germany. See 155.
83. **Princess Margaret.** m. Malcom III., Canmore, King of Scotland, 1057. See 108. He was slain in battle at Alnwick Castle, 1093.
84. **Princess Edith.** m. Henry I., "Beauclerc," King of England. See 17.

99. **Duncan**, King of Scotland. Killed by Macbeth, 1040.
100. **Malcom III**; Canmore, King of Scotland, 1057; m. Princess Margaret, dau. of Edward "The Exile," and his wife, Princess Agatha. See 82 and 155.
101. **Princess Edith**; m. Henry I., King of England. See 17.

102. **Alphonso IX.**, of Leon; m. Beringira, dau. of Alphoso, "The Noble," of Castile.
103. **Ferdinand III.**, "The Saint." He obtained the crown of Castile by the abdication of his mother, Beringira, 1217; and that of Leon by death of his father, 1230; and united the kingdoms. He fought the Moors. Founder of the university of Salamanca. He d. 1252. Canonized by Pope Clement X.
104. **Princess Eleanor**; m. Edward I., King of England. See 22.

French

105. **Philip I**; Son of Henry I. and Anne of Russia. See 62. King of France; b. 1052. Succeeded to the throne under guardianship of Baldwin V., Count Flanders, 1060. He imprisoned his wife, Bertha, and m. Bertrade de Montfort, wife of the Count of Anjou; for which both were excommunicated. His affairs were complicated with those of William the Conqueror. He d. 1108.
106. **Louis VI.**, "Le Gross," King of France. Succeed his father, 1108. He was engaged in wars with Engiand. He d. August, 1137.
107. **Louis VII.**, King of France, b. 1120. He divorced his wife, Eleanor, Duchess of Aquitaine, 1152; who m. Henry II., King of England; which occasioned wars between France and England. See 19. m. 3d Alice, sister of Thibault, Count of Champagne. He d. Sept. 18, 1180.
108. **Philip Augustus**; son of Louis VII. and Alice; King of France, b. 1165; m. 1st, Isabella, dau. of Count Baldwin of Hainault; m. 2d, Ingleberger, dau. of the King of Denmark, whom he deserted; m. 3d, Agnes de Meran, dau. of the Marquis of Istria. He accompanied Richard, Coeur-de-Lion to the Holy Land. He d. 1223.

109. **Louis VIII** , "The Lion," King of France, b. 1187; m. May 23, 1200, Blanche, dau. of Alphonso VIII, "The Noble," King of Castile. See 190. He invaded England made some conquests and was excommunicated; withdrew to France, 1217. Succeeded his father 1223, and recovered most of the English possessions in France. He d. Montpensier, Auvergne, Nov. 8, 1226.
110. **Louis IX.**, "Saint Louis," King of France; b. 1214. Succeeded his father 1226. his mother Blanche, was regent. He was declared of age 1236; m. 1234 Marguerite, dau. of Raymond Beranger IV., count of Provence. He made a disastrous campaign to the Holy Land 1248, and another afterwards in which he d. of plague at siege of Tunis, Apr. 24, 1270. Canonized by Boniface VIII., 1297. Life by Sire de Joinville.
