THE FAMILI OF BOURNE.

Near the middle of the 17th century, the first of the Bournes, consisting of two brothers and a sister, came from England to America, and settled about six miles from the town of Fredericksburg, Virginia. Unfortunately there appears no further information about this family except that one of the brothers reared a family in his new home in Virginia. One of these children was:

JOHN BOURNE, who inherited his father's place, which in the year 1734 he sold, and moved about 40 miles into Culpepper County, Va., and settled on the Rapidan River. This was at that time a frontier place, abounding with wild game, and well suited to one who must needs depend largely upon game for food until such time as land could be cleaned and crops raised,

JOHN BOURNE was married twice, first to a women by the name of Ramsey, by whom there were three children. After her death he was married to a woman by the name of Davis, by whom there were eight additional children.

1. SARAH BOURNE, first child by first wife, married Spencer ++++++++++ Branham and moved to Kentucky in 1795, bring ing with him a large family of children, and settled near Georgetown, Scott County. No further data on this family.

Francis Lowen, Jr., married his cousin Sally Hudson, and moved to the State of Missouri; Sally Lowen married John Perry, and they lived near Nicholasville, Ky.; Lucy Lowen married John Jefferies and had three children, two sons and a daughter, and died in 1837; James, William, Lewis and Polly Lowen were living near Nicholasville, Ky., im 1847; Polly had married William McBrayer, from whom she was divorced after having a son and two daughters. 8. and 9. There were two more sons, both dead at the time Daniel's letter was written, and their names were not stated.

FRANCIS BOURNE, came to Kentucky first in the year 1780, and explored the country around Boonsboro for about three months, where he killed many deer and buffalo. He was much pleased with the fertile lands and the beautiful scenery, but because of the menace from the Indians, he did not consider it prudent to bring his family at that time. Some three or four years later, with a party of about 300 others, he and his family made the journey to Kentucky, where he purchased 400 acres of land "in the new County of Jessamine," and made a permanent settlement. Daniel Bourne described the trip from Virginia to Kentucky, and the early years in their new home as follows:

"When we first settled in Kentucky, only five or six families then lived within the bounds of the new county of Jessamine, and they were far apart. Not a mill, nor any breadstuff to be had nearer than 25 miles, in Lincoln County. The Kentucky river to cross, with high cliffs to pass, which were at that early day a task not easily performed. The present generation knows nothing of the difficulties, privations, and dangers which were encountered and endured by the first settlers of this country.

The first work my father did, was to make a "hand mill", of limestone rock. He had brought picks with him for that purpose, knowing what we should want; and for four years this was our only dependence for meal and flour; and a very good makeshift it was for us. The neighbors for miles around were glad to have the benefit of this "handmill." At the end of four years my father and Brother William Bourne made a water mill, which is a fine mill even to this day.

The Company which came through the winderness with my father's family consisted of about 300 persons; mostly women, children, and negroes; not many guns, or efficient gunners, and no real Indian fighters among us. So that the whole company would have fallen easy prey to 15 or 20 Indians. But it so happened that while the Indians were killing and destroying emigrating companies both before and behind us, they did not discover or molest our defenseless company on the whole route. Our whole company, however, came very near starving to death, when the friendly settlers then living at the "Crab Orchard", heard of our situation, loaded some horses with meat and pumpkin-bread, and came to our relief. They met us about 83 miles from the "Crab Orchard", which place we could never have reached had it not been for this friendly and well-timed relief."

THE HOUSE OF HAY

In the year 1670, or thereabouts, a male child was born in the north of Ireland, to whom the name of MATTHEW HAY was given. He was the first of the name of whom I have found any record, and was the progenitor of a long line of descendants, of whom ELIZABETH HAY, my maternal great grandmother was one.

In the year 1700 Matthew Hay emigrated to America, bringing with him a wife and at least one son, MATTHEW HAY, JR., who was born in Ireland shortly before the family took ship for the new world. Matthew Hay settled in or near Philadelphia, Pa., and spent the remainder of his life there. The record does not disclose whether there were other children than Matthew, Jr., born either in Ireland or America, but I regard it as likely that there were others, as few of my ancestors ceased to multiply with the birth of one child.

MATTHEW (W) HAY, JR. grew up and remained in or near Philadelphia until he was 43 years of age. In 1743 he journeyed to Virginia and settled in Prince Edward County, where he remained until his death in 1784. The journey to Virginia was made in the company of a family of Galloways, presumably also Irish immigrants, and probably also neighbors or acquaintenances in the old country. Matthew W. Hay married Miss Hester Porter. Futher information of this family is missing, except that there was a son, WILLIAM HAY (I), and with him the record becomes more expansive.

WIILIAM HAY (I) was born in 1743 in Prince Edward County, Virginia, the year the family located there. He died Nov. 8, 1813, in Butler County, Kentucky, and is buried in a cemetery near Sugar Grove, which is believed to have been established on the land then owned PaEd.co.va. by the Hay family. He married Sarah Galloway, who was born in Ireland in 1746 died Dec. 15, 1822, and is buried beside her husband. Both the Hays and Galloways were of mixed Scotch descent, though for generations they have lived in the North of Ireland. Preston Hay, their grandson, says of his grandmother, Sarah Galloway Hay; "She was in many respects a remarkable woman. Her education was fairly up to the requirements of her day and station; she had a vigorous intellect and imperious will, and was well read on all subjects in which she was interested; these were principally the hist, ory of religious bodies.*** In all these respects she was a walking epitome of knowledge, and I can never read the "Heart of Midlothian" without thinking Scott had our grandmother in his eye when he drew the character of "David Deans". She was deeply imbued with superstitions and was a devout believer in ghosts, for she stoutly maintained she had seen them on more than one occasion. She was born seven miles from Londonderry, which she once visited on foot, the longest journey she ever made before embarking for America; that she never varied her dialect from that of the lowland Scotch, which all the latter branches of the family learned so thoroughly that when Burns' poems reached the Western country, they read and enjoyed them without a glossary; and that she never lost her eyesight, and could read the smallest print without glasses to the day of her death.

William Hay and Sarah Galloway raised a family of nine children, all but one of whom were born in Virginia. The family came to Kentucky in 1789, and James, the youngest child, was born there. The family settled first in Burbon County, Ky., and spent the first year there, in Kingston Station. The record does not disclose where the next seven years were spent, but in 1797 the family moved to Little Muddy, then in Logan County, now in Butler County, Ky. The chief incentive for that move appears to have been that BILLY EWING, an old neighbor and crony of William Hay before he left Virginia, had moved or was moving to that community. the Hays settled within 600 yards of the Ewings, "and the two families were as one, not only during the lives of the elders, but during those of the younger branches, throughout youth, manhood and womarhood, 'til death or removal separated them." (Preston Hay.) Rebecca Hay, William's youngest daughter, married William (Billy) Ewing, one of the elder Billy Ewing's sons.

Children of William Hay and Sarah Galloway.

The above family of nine represented about the average size family of those days, considerably larger than the present-day average. Preston Hay, son of William Hay above, writing from Jackson, Miss., in 1885, to his cousin Dr. C. D. Hay, son of Daniel Hay, at Hot Springs, Ark., has this to say on that subject: "They (his uncles and aunts) all speedily married as they grew up, and my relations on both sides being wonderfully prolific, I was surrounded on all sides by such groups of cousins as you never had. About the year 1815 there were thirteen children-bearing couples within an hour's ride of us, all uncles and aunts of mine, whose houses already swarmed or were beginning to swarm with children. Eleven was a favorite number, but two recorded twelve, and scarcely any fell below eight or ten."

(1) JOHN G. HAY (Sr.), eldest of the children of William

Hay and Sarah Galloway, born Oct. 8, 1774, in Virginia; died Mar. 10, 1815, in Butler County, Ky., buried in the Hay cemetery near Sugar Grove, Butler Co., Ky., alongside of his wife, Sallie Tyler Hay, who was born Dec. 8, 1781, died Aug. 25, 1852. To this union were born five children, two sons and three daughters. The eldest son, Vincent S. Hay, was born Nov. 22, 1808, and lost his life on Feb. 27, 1863, as a Union soldier in the war between the States, in an engagement at Chattanooga, Tenn. He is buried with his father and mother, though rumor has it that he was buried in the Chattanooga National Cemetery and later removed to his present resting place. John G. Hay, Jr., the youngest of the children, born 1814, died Sep. 2, 1833, and buried in the above cemetery, as is also a daughter, Cynthia A. Hay, born 1811, died June 12,

1836. Another daughter, Laura Hay, who married a Shotwell, but I have no further data on her, and none at all on the third daughter.

Preston Hay says that his uncle, John Hay, was feeble in both mind and body, but was the best educated of all the children, due to his being of school age before the family left Virginia. He was a School Teacher, and his preceptor in Virginia had been Sam Davis, Martha Patsy Davis' eldest brother.

- (2) POLLY HAY, second child and eldest daughter of William Hay and Sarah Galloway, was born in 1777, date of death unknown. In 1794 she married a Mr. Summers, by whom there were two children, Sallie and Robert. Summers died, and after a short widowhood, she married, in 1799, Moses Thompson, by whom she bore at least one child, a son, William, on Jan. 30, 1800.
- (3) ELIZABETH (BETSY) HAY and KATY, her twin sister, were born Dec. 30, 1779. Betsy, as she was commonly called, died August 27, 1840. A vigorous search for the place of burial, of she and her husband, James Davis Hill, has been fruitless. On Dec. 20, 1797 (or 1798) she was married to James Davis Hill, and they were my maternal great grandparents. For a record of their descendants, see James Davis Hill, in the section devoted to the Hills.
- (4) KATY HAY, twin sister of Betsy Hay, born Dec. 30, 1779, date of death not learned. She married Joshua Talbot in 1799. They were engaged before leaving Bourbon Co., but were not married until after they arrived in Logan County. A daughter, Nancy, married her first cousin, James Hill, son of James Davis Hill and Betsy Hay Hill. If there were other children, I have not learned of them.
- (5) DANIEL HAY, fifth child of William Hay and Sarah Galloway, born 1781, died 1853. In 1809 he married Priscilla Dobbins. His son, <u>Dr. C. D. Hay</u>, of Hot Springs, Ark., states that his parents raised a family of ten children, but unfortunately does not mention any of them by name. <u>Preston Hay</u> mentions a daughter, Polly, but I have no further data on

her, or any of the others. Daniel Hay was born in Virginia and came to Kentucky with the family. In 1814 he volunteered and was made Ensign of the Kentucky Regiment that was held as a reserve in the battle of Tippencance. In 1816 he moved to Illinois, where he helped to establish the town of Carmi, in or near which he lived until his death in 1853. He was a man of importance in his community and held several public offices, among which were that of Sheriff, U.S. Pension Agent, and Mail Contractor. His son, Dr. C. D. Hay, practiced his profession in Hot Springs, Ark. He prepared a "Memorandum of the family history of the House of Hay." To this and some correspondence between himself and his cousin Preston Hay of Jackson, Miss., in 1885, I am indebted for most of the data I have on the Hay family.

Dr. Hay mentioned one brother, <u>Carson Hay</u>, who he says spent four sessions of Congress in Washington, D.C. and who in 1858 was largely responsible for the passage of a law restoring to U.S. Pension Agents "the usual allowance of two per cent. on disbursements," after his father had held such office for six years without pay. It appears that the father had been Pension Agent from 1831 to 1842, but the pay was discontinued by Congress in 1836, and Daniel continued to serve without pay for the next six years.

Dr. Hay's "Memorandum" states that in 1820 his father removed to a farm five miles west of Carmi, "where his numerous family of boys learned to cultivate the soil, and were trained to habits of industry and economy," indicating that most of the ten children were boys.

Dr. Hay had a son, Eugene Hay, also a doctor, who also lived and practiced in Hot Springs, and another son, Lyman T. Hay, who was at one time President of the Hotel Men's Association of America, and was for many years President of the original Jefferson Hotel, of St. Louis, Mo.

Dr. and Mrs. Eugene Hay had two daughters, Mary Hay and Dorothy Hay. Mary was married in 1925 to Dr. D. B. Stough, II, and they have one son, Dr. D. D. Stough, III, who when this was written was with the Jackson Memorial Hospital in Miami, Fla. He was born in 1927. Dorothy Hay married A. J. Brown, and they have two children, whose names and ages I have not learned. The Browns live in Birmingham, Alabama.

Dr. Eugene Hay's widow, the mother of Mary and Dorothy, after his death married his medical partner, Dr. W. O. Forbes, and at last accounts she was still living with her daughter Dorothy in Birmingham.

(6) WILLIAM HAY (II), sixth child of William Hay and Sarah Galloway, was born in Virginia in 1783. In 1789, when six years of age, he came with the family to Kentucky. In 1804 he married Martha Patsy Davis, daughter of Temple Davis, a Tobacco Planter of Charlotte County, Va., who with her brothers and sisters had migrated to Kentucky as a result of their father's second marriage, to a woman of whom they heartily disapproved. I have little data on William Hay's life. He was a stone mason, and lived and died in Russellville, Ky. A house still standing on Main St., to which he had built a set of large stone steps, is said to be the house he died in.

To William Hay and Martha Patsy Davis were born eight children, as follows:

I have no data on Nancy D., John G., and Cardwell B. Hay. Of Preston Hay I know only that in the latter years of his life he lived in Jackson, Miss., and in 1885 he carried on a correspondence with his cousin, Dr. C. D. Hay, of Hot Springs, Ark., to which I am indebted for a great deal of the information on the Hay family contained in this report. I made strenuous efforts to learn something more about Preston Hay, but without avail. His letters indicated that he was a man of intelligence and education, and it was surprising and disappointing that there is no record of his life and descendants.

Samuel Davis Hay and William B. Hay, neither of whom married, went to Texas. Rumor has it that Samuel Davis Hay was once Attorney General of Texas, but I have been unable to verify this. In late life he returned to Kentucky, and spent the remainder of his life with his brother-in-law, Judge Thomas P. Wand, at whose home he died in 1888, and is buried in Cook's Cemetery, about two miles from Woodbury, Ky.

William B. Hay located at Woodville, Taylor County, Texas where he spent the remainder of his life. At death he owned a considerable acreage of land, all or partly timbered and lying adjacent to what later became one of Texas, oil fields. This acreage was probably not too valuable at the time of his death, and there being no near or nearby relatives, no settlement of the estate was made. Unauthorized persons later cut the timber, and when oil became a factor some of the Kentucky relatives made some investigation of ---the matter, but when this was written nothing of importance had resulted.

- (5) SARAH R. HAY, fifth child of William Hay, II, and Martha Patsy Davis, married Josiah Wade. There were at least three daughters: Martha Wade, married Ross; Bertha Wade, Married a Phelps, and Sally Wade, who married John Goodall, of Morgantown, Ky. I have no further data on the first two, but,

The first of my line of Tanners of which I have found a record, was my great, great grandfather,

BENJAMIN TANNER, a resident of the State of Virginia, and at least the latter part of his life, of Campbell County. The record does not disclose the date of his birth, nor where, nor the date of his death, but I assume that he died in the early months of the year 1829, as his will was probated in Campbell County, Virginia, in May of that year. Neither do I know when or to whom he was married, but he fathered ten children, as follows:

The order in which these children are listed is probably incorrect, but as I do not have the dates of their births, I cannot list them in the proper order.

Benjamin Tanner was evidently a man of considerable wealth, as by his will he distributed some 1464 acres of land, and probably also considerable goods and chattels.

I have no further data on the first nine children listed above, but BRANCH TANNER, the last of those listed, but probably not the youngest child, was born in 1780 and married in 1801 to Elizabeth Asher, daughter of John Asher, a Revolutionary Soldier, and his wife, Jane. Elizabeth Asher was a sister of John Asher, Jr., who married Branch Tanner's sister, Betsy Tanner. Branch Tanner was married a second time, but I have secured no data on that marriage.

To the union of Branch Tanner and Elizabeth Asher were born eight children, to-wit:

He was married Nov. 1, 1849, to Sarah E. Sweatt, daughter of Azariah Sweatt and Finetta Phillips, and a granddaughter of William Sweatt, a soldier in the Revolutionary War, and a Plantation owner in North Carolina and Tennessee. William Sylvester Taylor, who married Sarah Belle Tanner, daughter of James Freeman Tanner, was born near Morgantown, Ky., Oct. 10, 1853, son of Sylvester Taylor, a farmer and standing citizen of the community.

Largely self-educated, William S. Taylor taught school in Butler County at age 18; when 22 was elected Circuit Court Clerk. While Clerk he studied Law. He was twice elected County Judge, and in 1895 was elected Attorney General of Kentucky. In 1899 while still Attorney General, he was elected Governor of Kentucky, along with a full Republican Ticket, the first Republican Administration in about 30 years.

His Administration got under way, but early in 1900 the Democratic Legislature declared his election fraudulent, and that his Democratic opponent, William Goebel of Covington, was the legal Governor.

In the bitter period which followed, two Governments were set up, and as followers of both camps flocked to Frankfort, the Capitol, William Goebel was shot by a rifleman concealed in one of the buildings. Governor Taylor was accused by his bitter rivals of complicity in the murder. Realizing that at that time a fair and impartial trial could not be had in Kentucky, he fled to the State of Indiana. Governor Durbin of that State refused extradition. In 1919, Augustus E. Wilson, the then Governor of Kentucky, gave Governor Taylor a full pardon, and declared him blameless. However, Governor Taylor was then well established in the practice of law in Indianapolis, and had other interests there, so never returned to Kentucky, except for short visits. He died in Indianapolis in 1928, loved and respected by a host of friends.

I now come to that branch of the Tanner family in which I am directly interested, my grandfather.

The Virginia Tanners were of some wealth and prominence. There is a family legend that they were descended from Indian Princess Pocahontas, through the Branch and Glass families. Grandfather Tanner, and brothers, James Freeman and Woodson Tanner, and a friend, Arch Moore, walked from Lynchburg, Va., to Butler County, Ky., in 1837. His sister, Nancy Tanner, and her husband, Nathan Tanner, had come to Butler County, Ky. prior to that time, and Grandfather Tanner is said to have known when he reached their home because he recognized the handle of the axe lying in the yard.

The reason for that migration was that their mother had died in 1835, their father had remarried in 1836, and by 1837 Grandfather Tanner had developed such an intense dislike for his step-mother that he not only left home and came to Kentucky, but changed his politics from the family's customary Democratic to Republican, and remained a staunch and uncompromising member of that party through-out his long life. His brother, James Freeman, remained a Democrat, and as they also differed religiously, these two topics were warmly argued whenever the two were together. At the time he walked to Kentucky he was only 15 years of age -rather youthful for such a trip, but the youth of that day appear to have been capable of great effort and endurance.

The record does not disclose what he did after his arrival in Kentucky in 1837 until his marriage in 1843, when 21 years of age. After his marriage he farmed in the Quality neighborhood of Butler County. Later in life he located in Rochester in the same county, and made that his home until his death. At one time he and two partners bought and exported tobacco, but that venture was a failure, in which he lost most of what wealth he possessed at that time. Λt one time he must have been a building contractor, as it is said he and a partner built duplicate Courthouses in Brownsville and Morgantown, Ky. Later in life he was appointed Government Storekeeper-Gauger, and served a number of Kentucky Distilleries. After that, ill health and old age prevented further business activities, and he spent the remainder of his life at his home in the suburbs of Rochester, Kentucky.

Grandfather Tanner mostly devoted his attention to his business affairs, and left the management of the family to his energetic and capable wife; but on such occasions as it became necessary for him to exert his authority, he was a severe disciplinarian, and was implicitly obeyed.

Samuel Hill Tanner and his wife were both Methodists, and like the other members of the family, he was a Republican in politics. The McReynolds family into which he married was well-to-do, and prominent in the community. He was elected Sheriff of Butler County twice, in 1882 and 1884, which was a distinct dis-service to him, as it came near bankrupting him. His generous disposition would not permit him to press his friends and political connections for the fees due him, and he lost a great part of them.

In 1864 he enlisted in Co. A, First Kentucky State Guard, and served until mustered out in 1865. After his marriage in 1866 he began farming -- first in Logan County, later near Rochester, and finally in the Quality neighborhood, where he spent the remainder of his life. In 1952 his grandson, Frankel Tanner, who then owned and cultivated his grandfather's last farm, built a new home on it, of modern design and with all modern conveniences

"Uncle Jimmy", as he was known to me and his other younger relatives, was a sort of a plodder and never made a success of accumulating wealth, but he was a great success in obtaining and retaining the respect, friendship and love of all who knew him. A more pleasant, patient, good-natured and friendly man never lived. When a little boy I used to visit Rochester, where my grandparents and "Uncle Jimmy" lived. He operated a wagon drawn by a pair of oxen, with which he hauled the town's freight from the steamboat warehouse to the various stores. Sitting in front of the wagon and "driving" the oxen (as I thought) was one of the outstanding pleasures of my boyhood.. As a matter of fact, the oxen were extremely well broken and gentle, and knew their work far better than I did, so it is very doubtful if my "driving " had any effect whatever on their movements.

"Uncle Jimmy"s" hair turned white before he was twenty years old, and remained so throughout his life. In the latter years of his life, he bought a farm in Ohio County, and spent the remainder of his life there.

William Alexander Tanner, known to one and all simply as Willie or Bill, converted 400 acres of cut-over land, three miles up Green River from Rochester, Ky., into one of the best farms in that vicinity. It took an Herculean effort to

do it, but he was tall and strong, with limitless energy and determination, and accomplished what looked like the impossible. In the 1920s he sold the farm and moved into Rochester, where he engaged in the General Merchandise business, and was also a stockholder and Director of Green River Deposit Bank at that place.

At the time this marriage took place, my father was conducting a Gentral Merchandise business at McReynolds Hill, Logan County, Ky., with P. M. McReynolds as a partner. I visited, in 1952 and 1953, the spot where their first home stood, nearby where the mills and store were located in the long ago. All the business activities had of course vanished many years before, and the original home had been replaced by a new house.

Mother was a little less than 20 years of age when married, and my father was almost 37 -- a disparity which prevented between them that comradship which can only be achieved by husband and wife of more nearly equal ages, but it never interfered with the love, respect and devotion which each had for the other throughout their lives. He, being more mature, and devoted to his business affairs, did not enter into the social activities which her youth desired, and she did not have a feeling of complete intimacy with him. She spoke to and of him as "Mr. Young" throughout her life, never by either of his given names. As a wife and mother, friend and neighbor, there was never better than she.

children. This marriage proved a complete failure, from every standpoint. His health soon broke down, and a few years later he died, leaving his children completely orphaned. Thereafter they were at the mercy of their mother's relatives. Her sister Mary Nancy took the daughter, and her brother John Alexander took the son, and it is to their everlasting credit that these two orphans were well taken care of as the cousins with whom they lived.

Married April 4, 1906, to Elfie Wand, daughter of William H. Wand and Sallie Waddle. "Tom" Sweatt, whose father died when he was 13 years of age, thereafter lived with his uncle "Jack" Tanner until grown. He served two terms as County Court Clerk of Butler County, after which he was for 11 years Chief Deputy Collector of Customs in the Louisville, Ky. Office. After that he was Cashier of Farmers State Bank, Greenville, Ky., going from there to Lincoln Bank & Trust Co., Louisville, Ky., where he became one of its Vice Presidents and remained until his death. He was one of the best-known and best-loved men Kentucky ever produced. He had an astonishing memory for names and faces, and seemed never to forget anyone he had ever known, even if only casually or briefly.

His funeral service at Morgantown, Ky., was attended by a large number of friends and business associates from a wide area, and was broadcast from the Church - one of the first such broadcasts in the State.

To Thomas Walter and Elfie Wand Sweatt was born only one child, a daughter, Virginia Sweatt, on Oct. 6, 1908. She was married June 16, 1934, to Ben Rice Shaver. Sallie Hunt Evans suffered from childhood throughout her life from spinal curvature, on account of which she was always fragile and seldom well. Notwithstanding, she had an amiable disposition, and is a very lovely woman. She was an accomplished pianist, and taught piano for several years, when the care of the family did not require all of her energy. The family lived for a time at Rockport, Ky., and then at Louisville, where the husband was an employee of the Lincoln Bank & Trust Co., until age required him to retire.

John A. "Jack" Tanner had experience with L. Mendel & Co. in retail merchandising at Rochester, Ky., later engaging in that line of business for himself at Morgantown, Ky., which he continued to the end of his life. Six feet-four tall, muscular, with light grey eyes, he had a sunny disposition, and a host of acquaintenances, most of whom were his friends. One spring when he and I were in Louisville buying merchandise for our respective stores, a salesman took us up town for lunch. As we walked along Jack was greeting many men he met, some of them across the busy street. Finally the salesman said: "Jack, if I knew as many men in Louisville as you do, I would run for Sheriff."

"Miss Georgia", fell in love with her, and they were married. They located in Morgantown, where he was at various times engaged in the mercantile business, was elected Circuit Court Clerk, relocated at Rockwood, Tennessee., where he became Cashier of the Rockwood Bank & Trust Co., and continued until his retirement a few years before his death.

THE WITTS.

WILLIAM WITT, a French Huguenot who emigrated to America, was +++++++++++ m⁻ paternal great, great, grandfather. I have no further information concerning him. A son,

LEWIS WITT, was a veteran of the Revolutionary war, and the fath-::::::::: er of several children. While there may have been more than that, I have learned of four sons, to-wit:

- 1. Robert Witt,
- 2. Gordon Reese Witt,
- 3. Terry Witt,
- 4. Tine Witt.
- 1. ROBERT WITT, my great grandfather. The limited data I have = = = = = = on him is in some instances conflicting. One source gives his birth as 1765, another as 1768. The former is the more likely, as he enlisted in the Continental Army in 1780. He was born and lived in Bedford County, Va. until he came to Kentucky in 1811 or 1813. My father in his diary states there were nine children, but one applieation for membership in the D.A.R. lists 13, as follows:

 - 12. B ckie Witt,
 - 13. Naray Witt, married Eli Strode.

Robert Witt, Sr., married Nancy Reese on Aug. 19, 1790. He was a veteran of the George Rogers Clark Northwest Expeditions, --and campaigned throughout the West. He received in recognition of his services two land grants totalling 108 acres. I have no data on their location, value, or disposition. By 1834 he was in indigent circumstances, and spent the last 14 years of his life with his drughter, Elizabeth Caroline Young, my grandmother. He was paralyzed on his left side, and nearly or quite blind. These conditions were supposed to have been brought about by the hardships endured during his service in the Clark Expeditions. He was buried in the Martin Young family burying ground in Logan County, Ky.

Descendants of the children of Robert Witt, of whom only there of his daughter, Elizabeth Caroline, are known.

THE WITTS.

To these marriages were born three children; a daughter by the first husband, and two sons by the last husband:

- 1. Caroline Witt Ballard,
- 2. John Martin Young,
- 3. Henry Jefferson Young, my father.

Caroline Witt Ballard married twice: First John Terry Desper; second, Thomas Jackson Beasley. For a continuation of her record, please refer to the sections devoted to the BALLARDS, BEASLEYS, and DESPERS.

For a continuation of the record of Elizabeth Caroline Witt, please refer to JOHN JEFFERSON YOUNG, in the sections devoted to the Youngs.

ELIZABETH CAROLINE WITT came to Kentucky from Virginia with her father's family, when she was seven years of age. She was married to Aaron Ballard when 16 years of age, and to John Jefferson Young when 24.

Ballard, her first husband, was evidently subject to fits of dementia. One night she awakened with him standing over her with a drawn knife or axe, evidently intending to kill her. By gentle persuasion she brought him back to sanity, when he begged her for forgiveness and agreed to a separation, as she was afraid to live with him longer.

After the above affair he left the community and was never heared from again. On account of his apparent mental condition it was suspected that he might be hiding in the woods nearby, either being afraid or ashamed to show himself, or perhaps with the intention of making further attacks on his wife; and the woods were scoured for days, but he was not found and had evidently left the community.

Elizabeth is said to have been a very beautiful young woman. John J. Young, her second husband, when asked why he married a widow with a child instead of a maiden, gave her beauty as one of his reasons for doing so.

After her children were grown, she lived with her daughter Caroline until the latter died, than came to my father's home, where she spent the remaining eight years of her life, dying at age 87

OF GORDON REESE WITT, and TINE WITT, two of Lewis Witt's sons, I have found no data, but

TERRY WITT, the remaining son, married a Miss Gist of Hopkins = = = = = County, Ky., and fathered a daughter and two sons. The daughter's name I have not learned, but the sons were

Bernard Gratz Witt, born Aug. 12, 1847, died Jan. 9, 1929, ++++++++++++++++ married Lida G. Hopkins in 1871, and fathered the following three children:

- 2. Maria Gist Witt, born Aug. 25, 1875, died June 25, 1876.
- 3. Ann Stites Witt, born Sep. 18, 1878, died Dec. 8, 1952, married (date unknown) James L. Lambert of Henderson, Ky.

To the Lamberts were born two daughters:

1. Elizabeth Hopkins Lambert,

2. Lucie Hamilton Lambert.

Elizabeth Hopkins Lambert, born Sep. 25, 1908 married = = = = = = = = = = = (date unknown) Van Etten Bent of Jacksonville, Fla. They have a son and a daughter: Elizabeth Ann Bent, born Mar. 23, 1931, and James V. Bent, born Feb. 3, 1936.

Lucy Hamilton Lambert, born May 30, 1931, married (date = = = = = = = = = = unknown) George Stiggler, Jr., of Henderson, Ky. They have one son, George Stiggler, III, born Nov. 7, 1938.

Bernard Gratz Witt went to Henderson, Ky., when he was 19 years of age, and remained there until death. In 1914 he wrote my father that he came to Henderson in 1866, and had been engaged in business of Ohio Valley Banking & Trust Co., which he said was the largest financial institution in Western Kentucky. He stated that at that time he had been married 43 years, and had two grandchildren "Who are the delight of my approaching age." He died five years later.

The name of Hill or Hills was derived from the residence of its first bearers on or near a hill. It is found in ancient records in the various forms of Hil, Hille, Hyll, Hylls, Hylles, Hell, Hells, Hull, Hulls, Hilles, Hills, and Hill, of which the last form is most generally used in America today, and the next to the last is also frequently found. Families bearing these forms of the name appear to have been, for the most part, of the landed gentry and yoemanry of England.

One of the earliest lines of the family in England was that of Robert de Hill, who is believed to have gone into England with William the Conqueror in 1066. He was the father of Robert, who had a son named Robert, who was the father of Thomas of County Cornwall and William of Shropshire, of whom the last was the father of William, who had a son Thomas, who was the father of Thomas.

Thomas Hill of Cornwall, elder son of the third Robert, was the father of Thomas, who had John, who had William, who was the father of William, who had a son also named William, who was the father of William and John, of whom the last was the father of William, who had John, who had two sons, William and John.

William Hill, elder son of the before mentioned William of Cornwall, was the father of William, who had William, who was the father of William and Henry, of whom the last had a son named William and the first also had a son named William, who was the father in the early seventeenth century of a son named Thomas.

Another early line of descent is given as beginning with one Robert de la Hull of Shropshire as early as the year 1202. He had a son named William, who was the father of Hugh or Hugo Hull or Hill, who was the father of William, who had a son Griffith, who had Humphrey, who was the father of William, Ralph (ancestor of numerous Shropshire line), and Thomas, of whom the last made his home in London and was the father of Sir Rowland (Lord Mayor of London) and numerous others. William Hill, eldest son of Humphrey of Shropshire, was the father of William, Jacob, and Thomas, of whom the last was the father of George and John. The son George had a son Edmund, who was the father of John, who had Thomas and Edmund. The son Thomas was the father of, among others, a son named Humphrey, who was the father of, among others, a son named Leonard, who had issue in the early seventeenth century of Thomas, Edward, Andrew, Fabian, Leonard, Humphrey, Matthew, Richard, and several daughters.

While it is not definitely known from which of the many illustrious branches of the family in England the first emigrants of the name to America were descended, it is generally believed that

all of the Hills were of ancient origin and, in many cases, of common ancestry at a remote period.

One of the first of the name in America was John Hill or Hills of Plymouth, Mass., in 1630, who is believed to have made his home at Medfield in 1656. His children, by his wife Hannah, were Abigail, Samuel, John, Eliezur, Johnson, and Ebenezer.

The brothers, William and Thomas Hills, emigrated from Essex County, England, to Roxbury, Mass., in 1632. Thomas died in 1634 without issue. William removed to Hartford, Conn., and probably had no issue by his first wife, Phillis Lyman, whom he married in 1634. His second wife, the Widow Risley, was the mother of his sons, William and John; and his third wife, the Widow Mary (nee Warner) Steele, was the mother of Joseph, Benjamin, Susannah, Mary, Jonathan, Hannah, and Sarah.

One William Hill emigrated in 1633 to Dorchester, Mass., whence he later removed to Windsor, Conn. He was the father of Sarah and William, as well as possibly of others.

John Hill of Dorchester, possibly brother of the preceding emigrant William, emigrated to America about 1633 or shortly thereafter. By his wife, Frances, he was the father of John, Jonathan, Frances, Rebecca, Mary, Samuel, Hannah, Mercy, Ruth, Ebenezer, Israel, Martha, and Mehitable.

The brothers, Robert and John Hill or Hills, are recorded as having emigrated about 1635. They settled at New Haven, Conn. The younger brother appears to have left no issue; but Robert was the father of Abiah, John, Hannah, Ebenezer, and Nathaniel.

Abraham Hill settled at Charlestown, Mass., in 1636. He had issue by his wife, Sarah Long, of Ruth, Isaac, Abraham, Zachary, Sarah (died young), Sarah, Mary, and Jacob.

The brothers, Valentine and John Hill, came from London to Boston, Mass., about 1636. Valentine was the father by his wife, Frances, of Hannah, John (died young), Elizabeth, Joseph and Benjamin. By his second wife, Mary Eaton, he had further issue of John and Nathaniel. His younger brother John married Elizabeth Strong in 1657 and had issue by her of Joseph, Samuel, John and

Benjamin.

Joseph Hills of Charleston, Mass., in 1638 came from Malden, England, with his first wife, Rose Dunster, by whom he was the father of Joseph, Rebecca, Amy, Mary, Hannah, Gershom, Mehitable, and John. By his second wife, Hannah Mellowes, he had further issue of Samuel, Nathaniel, Deborah and Abigail. Some authorities believe, however, that the last two children may have been by his third wife, Helen Atkinson. It appears that Richard Hill or Hills of Charlestown in 1638, who was probably the brother of the preceding emigrant Joseph, died without issue.

Ralph Hill settled at Plymouth, Mass., about 1638. He was married in that year to Margaret Toothacre, by whom he had issue of Jonathan, Nathaniel, Ralph, Martha, and Rebecca, several of whom may have been born at Billerica, where he lived in the latter part of his life.

John Hill of Guilford, Conn., came from Northamptonshire, England, about 1646. By his first wife, Frances, he had John, Sarah, James, Elizabeth, and possibly others, and by his second wife, the Widow Catherine Chalker, he may have had further issue, although they do not appear in the records.

About 1648 Peter Hill came to Saco, Me., bringing with him his son Roger, who left numerous issue at Wells.

One John Hill or Hills of Dover, N.H., in 1649 had issue by his wife, Elizabeth, of a son named Benjamin, as well as possibly others.

Zebulon Hill (s) of Gloucester, Mass., about 1650 came from Bristol, England, and was the father of eight children, Joanna, Elizabeth, John, Philip, Zebulon, Mary, Abigail, and Sarah.

Luke Hill (s) married Mary Hoyt at Windsor, Conn., in 1651 and had issue by her of Lydia, Mary, Eleazer, Tahan, Luke, Abigail, Elizabeth and John.

The brothers Ignatius and James Hill or Hills came to Boston sometime before 1658. The first married Hannah Henchman in 1662 and had issue by her of Hannah, James, Ignatius, and Elizabeth.

Jonathan Hill of Portsmouth, N.H., and Warwich, R.I., before 1661 was the father by his wife, Mary, of Robert, Jonathan, and Henry.

Charles Hill was living at New London, Conn., in 1665, having been previously at Maryland, to which place he had come from Derbyshire, England. In 1668 he married Ruth Picket, who gave him four children, Jane, Charles, Ruth and Jonathan. He appears to have had no further issue by his second wife, Rachel Mason.

John Hill of Portsmouth, N.H., in 1665 was the father by his wife, Elizabeth, of Joseph, Nathaniel, and Samuel.

Another John Hill or Hills was living at Boston in 1668 and had issue by his wife, Mary, of Elizabeth and John.

Still another John Hill or Hills made his home at Saybrook, Conn., and was married in 1670 to Jane Bushnell, by whom he had at least one son named Samuel and probably others as well.

Thomas Hill (s) of Middletown, Conn., before 1678 was the father by his wife, Mary of Susannah, Elizabeth, Thomas, John, Sarah, and Mary.

About 1680 one Samuel Hill (s) resided at Portsmouth, N.H., and was married in that year to Elizabeth Williams, by whom he had issue of John, Elizabeth, Mary, Hannah, Abigail, Samuel, Sarah, Benjamin, and Joseph.

Many others of the name emigrated to America in the eighteenth century. Among them were Dr. Richard Hill, who married Deborah Moore of Maryland in 1720 and had issue by her of Richard, Hannah, Mary, Deborah, Harriet, Henry, Rachel, Margaret, Sarah, Milcah, and others as well; and Jabez Hills, who was married in 1727 at Wrentham, Mass., to Martha Metcalf. Their children were Joseph, Benjamin, Ebenezer and David.

The descendants of these and of other branches of the family in America have spread to practically every State of the Union and have aided as such in the growth of the country as their ancestors did in the founding of the nation. They have been noted for their piety, resourcefulness, courage, loyalty and leadership.

THE NAME AND FAMILY OF THE HILL (S)

Among those of the name who fought as officers in the War of the Revolution were Captain Baylor, of Virginia; Lieutenant Charles, of New Hampshire; Lieutenant Ebenezer, of New York; Captain Jeremiah, of Massachusetts; Lieutenants Philip and William, of Maryland; Major Thomas, of Virginia; Lieutenant William, of North Carolina; and Lieutenant Henry, of Connecticut.

Thomas, John, Robert, Humphrey, Edward, Samuel, Ebenezer, Joseph, Abraham, Nathaniel, Jonathan, and William are some of the Christian names most highly favored by the family.

A few of the many members of the family who have distinguished themselves in America in more recent times are:

> David Bennett Hill (1843-1910), of New york, Lawyer and politician.

Frank Alpine Hill (1841-1903), of Maine, Educator.

Henry Wayland Hill (1853-1929), of Vermont, Lawyer.

James Jerome Hill (1838-1916), of Canada and Minnesota Railroad Promoter and Financier.

Thomas Hill (1829-1908), of England and the United States, Painter.

Walter Bernard Hill (1851-1905), of Georgia, Lawyer and Educator.

One of the most ancient coats of arms of the English family of Hill or Hills, which is closely allied with the American branches of the family is described as follows:

(Burke, Encyclopaedia of Heraldry, 1884; Matthews, American Armoury and Blue Book):

<u>Arms.--</u>"Gules a saltire, vaire, between four Mullets argent." <u>Crest.--</u>"A demi leopard argent spotted of all colours, ducally gorged or."

Motto. -- "Per Deum et Ferrum Obtinui."

WHY YOU HAVE A FAMILY NAME AND WHAT IT MEANS TO YOU.

Primitive personal names doubtless originated soon after the invention of spoken language, although the date of their first use is lost in the darkness of ages preceding recorded history. For thousands of years thereafter, first or given names were the only designations that men and women bore; and in the dawn of historic times, when the world was less crowded than it is today and every man knew his neighbor, one title of address was sufficient. Only gradually, with the passing centuries and the increasing complexity of civilized society, did a need arise for more specific designations. While the roots of our system of family names may be traced back to early civilized times, actually the hereditary surname as we know it today dates from a time scarcely earlier than nine hundred years ago.

A surname is a name added to a baptismal or Christian name for the purpose of making it more specific and of indicating family relationship or descent. Classified according to origin, most surnames fall into four general categories: (1) those formed from the given name of the sire; (2) those arising from bodily or personal characteristics; (3) those derived from locality or place or residence; and (4) those derived from occupation. It is easier to understand the story of the development of our institution of surnames if these classifications are borne in mind.

As early as biblical times certain distinguishing appellations were occasionally employed in addition to the given name, as, for instance, Joshua the son of Nun, Simon the son of Jonas, Judas of Galilee, and Simon the Zealot. In ancient Greece daughters were named after their fathers, as Chryseis, the daughter of Chryses; and sons' names were usually an enlarged form of the father's, as Hieronymus, son of Hiero. The Romans, with the rise of their civilisation, met the need for hereditary designations by inventing a complex system whereby every patrician traced his descent by taking several names. None of them, however, exactly corresponded to surnames as we kmow them, for the "clan name", although hereditary, was given also to slaves and other dependents. This system proved to be but a tem porary innovation of the Western Empire by barbarian invaders brought about its end and a reversion to the primitive custom of a single name.

The ancient Scandinavians and for the most part the Germans had

only individual names, and there were no family names, strictly speaking, among the Celts. But as family and tribal groups grew in size, individual names became inadequate and the need for supplementary appellations began to be felt. Among the first employed were such terms as "the Strong", "the Hardy", "the Stern", "the Dreadfulin-battle"; and the nations of northern Europe soon adopted the practice of adding the father's name to the son's, as Oscar son of Carnuth and Dermid son of Duthno.

True surnames, in the sense of hereditary designations, date in England from about the year 1000. Largely they were introduced from Normandy, although there are records of Saxon surnames to the Norman Conquest. Perhaps the oldest known surname in England is that of Hwita Hatte, a keeper of bees, whose daughter was Tate Hatte. During the reigh of Edward the Confessor (1042-1066) there were Saxon tenants

in Suffolk bearing such names as Suert Magno, Stigand Soror, Siuward Rufus, and Leuric Hobbesune (Hobson); and the Domesday record of 1085-1086, which exhibits some curious combinations of Saxon forenames with Norman family names, shows surnames in still more general use.

By the end of the twelfth century hereditary names had become common in England. But even by 1465 they were not universal. During the reign of Edward V a law was passed to compel Irish outlaws to adopt surnames: "They shall take unto them a Surname, either of some Town, or some Colour, as Blacke or Brown, or some Art or Science, as Smyth or Carpenter, or some Office, as Cooke or Butler." And as late as the beginning of the nineteenth century a similar decree compelled Jews in Germany and Austria to add a German surname to the single names which they had previously used.

As stated above, family names may be divided into four general classes according to their origin. One of the largest of these classes is that comprising surnames derived from the given name of the father. Such names were fromed by means of an added prefix or suffix denoting either "son of" or a diminutive. English names terminating in son, ing and kin are of this type, as are also the innumerable names prefixed with the Gaelic Mac, the Norman Fitz, the Welsh ap, and the Irish O'. Thus John's sons became Johnsons: William's sons, Williamsons or Wilsons; Richard's sons, Richardsons or Richardses (the final "s" or "Richards" being a contraction of "son"); Neill's sons, MacNeills; Herbert's sons, FitzHerberts; Thomas's sons, ap Thomases (ap has been dropped from many names of which it was formerly a part); and Reilly's sons, O'Reillys.

Another class of surnames, those arising from some bodily or personal characteristic of their first bearer, apparently grew out of what were in the first instance nicknames. Thus Peter the strong became Peter Strong, Roger of small stature became Roger Little or Roger Small, and black-haired William or blond Alfred became William Black or Alfred White. From among the many names of this type, only a few need be mentioned: Long, Short, Hardy, Wise, Good, Gladman, Lover and Youngman. A third class of family names, and perhaps the largest of all, is that comprising local surnames -- names derived from and originally designating the place of residence of the bearer. Such names were popular in France at an early date and were introduced into England by the Normans, many of whom were known by the titles of their estates. The surnames adopted by the nobility were mainly of this type, being used either the particles de, de la, or del (meaning "of" or "of the"). The Saxon equivalent was the word atte ("at the"), employed in such names as John atte Brook, Edmund atte Lane, Godwin atte Brigg, and William atte Bourne. A vestage of this usage survives in the names Atwell, Atwood, and Atwater; in other cases the Norman de was substituted; and in still others, such as Wood, Briggs, and Lane, the particle was dropped. The surnames of some of the Pilgrim fathers illustrate place designations: Winthrop means "from the friendly village"; Endicott, "an end cottage"; Bradford, "at the broad ford"; and Standish, "a stony park". The suffixes

"ford", "ham", "ley", and "ton", denoting locality, are of frequent occurence in such names as Ashford, Bingham, Burley, and Norton.

While England enjoyed a period of comparative peace under Edward the Confessor, a fourth class of surnames arose -- names derived from occupation. The earliest of these seem to have been official names, such as Bishop, Mayor, Fawcett (judge), Alderman, Reeve, Sheriff, Chamberlain, Chancellor, Chaplain, Deacon, Latimer (interpreter), Marshall, Sumner (summoner), and Parker (park-keeper), Trade and Craft names, although of the same general type, were of somewhat later origin. Currier was a dresser of skins, Webster a weaver, Wainwright a wagonbuilder, and Baxter a baker. Such names as Smith, Taylor, Barber, Shepherd, Carter, Mason, and Miller are self-explanatory.

Many surnames of today which seem to defy classification or explanation are corruptions of ancient forms which have become disguised almost beyond recognition. Longfellow, for instance, was originally Longueville, Longshanks was Longchamps, Troublefield was Tuberville, Wrinch was Renshaw, Diggles was Douglas, and Snooks was Sevenoaks. Such corruptions of family names, resulting from ignorance of spelling, variations in pronunciation, or merely from the preference of the bearer, tend to baffle both the genealogist and the etymologist. Shakespear's name is found in some twenty-seven different forms, and the majority of English and Anglo-American surnames have, in their history, appeared in four to a dozen or more variant spellings.

In America a greater variety of family names exists than anywhere else in the world. Surnames of every race and nation are represented. While the greater number are of English, Scotch, Irish, or Welsh origin, brought to this country by scions of families which had borne these names for generations prior to emigration, many others, from central and southern Europe and from the Slavic countries, where the use of surnames is generally a more recently established practice, present considerable difficulty to the student of etymology and family history.

Those Americans who possess old and honored names -- who trace the history of their surnames back to sturdy immigrant ancestors, or even beyond, across the seas, and into the dim mists of antiquity -- may be rightfully proud of their heritage. While the name, in its origin, may seem ingenious, humble, surprising, or matterof-fact, its significance today lies not in a literal interpretation of its original meaning but in the many things that have happened to it since it first came into use. In the beginning it was only a word, a convenient label to distinguish one John from his neighbor John who lived across the field. But soon it established itself as a part of the bearer's inidviduality; and as it passed to his children, his children's children, and their children, it became the symbol not of one man but of a family and all that family stood for. Handed down from generation to generation, it grew inseparably associated with the achievement, the tradition, and the prestige of the family. Like the coat of arms -- that vivid symbolization VIII

of the name which warrior ancestors bore in battle -- the name itself, borne through every event of a man's life and through the lives of scores of his progenitors, became the badge of family-honor the "good name" to be proud of, to protect, and to fight for if need be. As the worthy deeds of the marching generations have given it dignity and splendor, it has become an institution, a family rallying cry, and the most treasured possession of those who bear it.

WILLIAM HILL of Prince Edward County, Virginia, is the first Hill in my line of whom I have found any record. The dates of his birth, marriage and death are missing, but on Dec. 15, 1770, he made his will, which was probated May 16, 1774, and it may be presumed that he had died earlier that year. The will lists seven children three sons and four daughters, as follows:

- 1. John,
- 2. Davis,
- 3. William,
- 4. Sarah Mitchell,
- 5. Judith,
- 6. Mary Thurman, and
- 7. Elizabeth Neal.

I assume that the first, third and fourth daughters were married, and their names in the will were their married names, as the other children were designated by their first names only.

John and Davis were each bequeathed 300 acres of land; William was given 200 acres, and in additon was to have the 140 acres willed to Martha Davis Hill, the wife and mother, at her death. Daughters Sarah Mitchell and Judith were each given 200 acres of land, but the other two daughters, Mary Thurman and Elizabeth Neal, were to be enriched by only one shilling each. As there is no explanation for these meager gifts, one is left to speculate whether it was due to other provision having been made for them, or for some other reason, including the possibility that their marriages were distasteful to the testator.

I have not found any other information about this family of Hills, with the exception of the second son,

DAVIS HILL, who was a Revolutionary soldier, and lost his life in that conflict. Dates of birth, marriage and death have not been found. He married Susannah Davis, daughter of Jeffrey Davis (q.v.) He made his will on April 9th, 1781, and it was probated in Prince Edward County, Virginia, on Feb. 18th, 1782, which indicates that he died in the latter part of 1781 or early in the year 1782. The will provides that all of his estate be "loaned" to his "Loveing" wife, Susannah, during her life and widowhood. When she died or remarried, the remainder was to be sold and divided amongst his children. By early 1796 Susannah had married Joel Maxey, and instead of the estate which had been "loaned" to her being sold and divided amongst all his children, as provided in the will, Joel Maxey obtained guardianship of the children, and he and Susannah retained possession of the "land devised to be sold." As the children were evidently all minors, this way of handling the estate was no doubt both morally and legally correct. Joel Maxey did distribute the estate in due course, and receipts to him from all of the heirs are on record, partly in Virginia and partly in Kentucky.

The children of Davis Hill were five in number, listed in the

will as follows:

- 1. Ann Hill, (married Billie Davis).
- 2. James Davis Hill,
- 3. Charles Davis Hill,
- 4. William Hill, and
- 5. Martha Hill, (married Ben Davis).

At page 264 of Prince Edward County, Va., Orphan Book, are recorded receipts from William Davis, husband of Anne Hill, and James Davis Hill, to JoelMaxey, for their parts of the estate of Davis Hill, dated Feb. 20, 1797.

Receipts from Charles Davis Hill, William Hill, and Ben Davis, husband of Martha Hill, are recorded in Deed Book 1, pages 190 and 191, records of Butler County, Ky.

As the Virginia receipts are dated 1797, and the Kentucky receipts are <u>recorded</u> in 1813, it is indicated that Joel Maxey followed the Hills to Kentucky some time between those dates. I have found nothing to indicate whether his wife, Susannah, came to Kentucky with him, or had died before he left Virginia. William Hill's receipt states his payment was "one negro boy" valued at seventy-five pounds, Ben Davis received a negro girl valued at eighty-six pounds while Charles Davis Hill appears to have received eighty-six pounds in cash for his part of the estate. The data I have accumulated on the Hill Family concerns primarily my direct ancestor, James Davis Hill and his descendants, with but little to say of the other children of Davis Hill, and I am therefore unable to follow through with the genealogies of these other children.

1 - 8 - 1813 bors, or at least known to one another in the Dominion State.

James Davis Hill was a farmer, Sheriff and Tax Commissioner of Butler County, and was the originator of the Ben Davis apple, for many years a very popular variety. His neighbor, friend, and brother-in-law, Ben Davis, conducted the selling of both apples and young trees, so the variety became known by his name rather than that of the originator. These facts were well known by his children, and were often told to us grandchildren.

To James Davis and Betsy Hay Hill were born 12 children - eight sons and four daughters, all of whom lived to maturity, and some of them to old age.

Little information has been obtained on several of these children, while on others and their descendants the data is volumnious. James Davis Hill's Bible, from which many dates were taken, contains some entries which cannot be positively classified, as it is not clear whose children, wives or husbands they were. I have included some which, while not certain, seem so probable as to be almost certain.

JOHN HILL, eldest of the children, was born Sept. 17, 1799, died Some of the children ascribed to them below are not certain, but the probability is so great that I have felt justified in including them. Those which are uncertain are indicated by andasterisk (*).

Zebulon H. Hill died Feb. 10, 1836. I have found no further information on John Hill and his descendants.

WILLIAM HILL, second of James Davis and Betsy Hay Hill's children, Morgantown, Kentucky, cemetery. Married Sept. 24, 1829, to Patsy Burk, who bore him seven children, as follows:

I have learned practically nothing of William Hill's life and work, and but little of some of his children, while on others and their descendants, there is much, indeed. These will be taken up in order, after the data on the other children of James Davis and Betsy Hill have been presented.

NANCY HILL, third child and first daughter of James Davis and :::::::::: Betsy Hay Hill, was born Nov. 8, 1803, date of death not learned. She was married three times: First on Dec. 27, 1825, to James Ferguson; second to _____ Cohran, and third to _____ Berry.

Five children were born to the first marriage with James Ferguson, and two by Cchran, as below. There were no children by the third marriage.

JAMES HILL, fourth child and third son of James Davis and Betsy Hay ;::::::::: Hill, born Aug. 5, 1805, died Oct. 31, 1869, married Dec. 3, 1829, to Nancy Talbot, his first cousin, daughter of his aunt Kate Hay and Joshua Talbot. There were three children born to this union:

1. Catherine E. Hill, born Dec. 15, 1832.

Died Dec. 12, 1837.

James Hill was born and raised in Butler County, Ky., where he served as Sheriff; later moved to Daviess County, and located in the Newman neighborhood a few miles west of Owensboro. I have been unable to secure much more information on him. He followed farming in Daviess County, as he had in Butler County. In his "book", which lists the dates of births, deaths and marriages of many of his brothers and sisters and other close relatives, there are entries in 1868 listing purchases made for raising a crop that year.

Davis Bartlett Hill was born, raised and married in Butler County, Ky., and the children were born there. He removed to Providence, Ky., but remained there but a short time, then settled in Dixon, Ky., where he spent the remainder of his life. He and his wife died there, only a few hours apart, and were buried in the same grave. Many others of this family are buried in the Dixon cemetery. In June, 1952, I made a trip to Dixon, and met a granddaughter and grandson of Davis Bartlett Hill; Mrs. Elizabeth Winstead and Charles Eugene Severin. Mrs. Winstead was then 83, and Mr. Severin was 80. Much of the data on this family was furnished me by Mrs. Winstead, who despite her advanced age was physically and mentally active, and an exceedingly pleasant person to talk to.

Nine children in all were born to him, six by the first wife, Malinda Ewing, and three by the second wife, Nancy M. Foster.

Daniel S. Hill was born in Butler County, Ky., where his first marriage took place, and all the children by that marriage were born. Soon after the birth of the last of these, his wife died, and in 1850 her moved to Hartford, in the adjoining County of Ohie, where for a time he operated a blacksmith shop. In 1862 he was elected County Judge of Ohio County, and three years later he died. His second wife, and several of the children, are buried in the old Hartford Cemetery with him.

nearby Woodbury, Ky., who later married Potter Palmer, the wealthy Chicago industrialist. She became a noted society leader and traveller, and so charmed Queen Victoria of England that she was given a standing invitation to live in Buckingham Palace. Her sister Ida married Frederick Dent Grant, son of the President and became the mother of Julia Dent Grant, the first child born in the White House. She married Michael Cantacuzene, a Russian nobelman, and they had three children - Michael, Julia and Bertha. When the Russian Bolshevik Revolution occured in 1917, they escaped from Moscow practically penniless and made their way to Chicago and the Palmers. From there they went to Sarasoto, Fla., where the Palmers had business, including a bank, in which Prince Cantacuzene was given employment. The Princess became a prominent social leader, active in a number of social and philanthropic organizations, opecof which my sister, Nellie, then residing in Sarasota, was a member. The Princess authored a book "My life here and there", published about 1930 by Scribners, New York, which gave a great deal of information about the Palmers and the Cantacuzenes, but is now out of print and unobtainable, unless a copy could be found by chance.

Sarah R. Hill, always known to the younger generation as "Aunt Sallie Watkins", bore ten children in eighteen years; soon after the birth of the last child her husband died, and she lived a widow for 49 years, being 92 when she died. Beautiful when young, distinguished looking in later life, intellegent, a forceful character throughout her life, she was one of the best-known and best-loved women of her time in Butler and Logan Counties. Her father died at her home, said to have been of a nightmare, but more probably of a heart attack. Her sister Nancy, then a widow, was on the point of going to live with her, when she fell and broke a hip, from which she died in a few days.

Polly Hill was a spinster and semi-invalid who eventually married Rev. Zachary Taylor, of Hartford, Ky., who was born in 1803, died in 1863, and is buried in Old Hartford Cemetery. He lived only six weeks after his marriage. Prior to his death, believing Polly was pregnant, he made a will leaving his entire estate to her. He had children by a former marriage who were nearly or quite grown, and when it developed that he was mistaken about the pregnancy, Polly agreed to a distribution of the estate between the children and herself, share and share alike. Polly placed her affairs in the hands of her nephew, Sam H. Hill, a prominent lawyer of Hartford, whose income was usually insufficient to satisfy the extravagant tastes of his wife and three daughters. She was never able to secure an accounting and settlement from him, or recover any considerable part of her estate. After the death of her husband, she went to live with her sister Catherine Hill Tanner, where she spent the remainder of her life. Polly is said to have contracted the illness, which made her a semi-invalid the rest of her life, by sitting on the bank of Green River when a girl waiting to see the first steamboat go by, while the "curse of" the women was upon her." At the end of her life she bequeathed all her worldly goods to sister Catherine, but as she had never received a settlement of her estate, Cathering received but little.

EWING HILL, eleventh child and eighth son of James Davis and Betsy :::::::: Hay Hill, born Aug. 30, 1821, date of death not learned. Married Mariah Cohran on July 5, 1844. I have learned nothing of his descendants, if any. He moved to Missouri, date or at what age unknown, but feel sure after his marriage. Later I learned that there was a son, Davis Hill, who lived in Palmyra, Mo. in 1885. Ewing Hill lived in Rich Prairie, Mo. I have heard that he was blinded by cataracts, but have no details.

SUSAN CATHERINE HILL, twelfth and last child, and fourth daughter Oct., 5, 1824, died Mar. 8, 1915, buried at Rochester, Ky., married April 6, 1843 to Alexander Branch Tanner. For the list of their decendants, see Alexander Branch Tanner, in the section devoted to the Tanners. Susan Catherine Hill, my grandmother Tanner, the youngest of the children and the only one of them I personally knew, after her marriage to A. B. Tanner, lived with him and their children in the Quality neighborhood of Butler County, Ky. on a farm. They later moved to Rochester, Ky., where she lived until the death of grandfather Tanner in 1906. Thereafter she lived With varher children and grandchildren until her death in 1915. ious of Grandfather Tanner did not bother himself overmuch with details of household and family, leaving such responsibilities to Grandmother, and it may be truthfully said that she was equal to them. In addition to bearing and rearing ten children (and for years taking care of her sister Polly, whom she said was more trouble than any of the other children), she was the practical head and business manager of the family, and was looked to and depended upon for help and guidance by many of her relatives and neighbors. These manifold duties and responsibilities had the effect of developing a stern and positive manner of speech, but underneath this stern

exterior lay a heart as soft and loving and helpful as could be found anywhere. Known as "Aunt Kate" to relatives, friends and neighbors, she was respected and loved by all. Many of her quaint sayings and doings were remembered and cherished by those who knew her, and she was looked upon and up to as one possessing unusually sound common sense and judgement. Excerpt from her obituary, written by Capt. N. T. Howard, Attorney of Norgantown, Ky., and published in the Green River Republican:

"Aunt Kate", the mother of ten, a mother to many boys and girls, filled her mission on earth and now lies down to pleasant dreams. She filled the allotted span, and still the call came not. Her words of wisdom dropped on youthful ears to aid them along life's pathway. Her rich sense of humor she displayed to lighten life's burdens or drive home a point in argument. A lover of "The Book", a consistent member of the Methodist Church for seventy-five years, her life radiated a religious atmosphere that was felt by all who were assiciated with her. A strong woman of the old school, she had not patience with the masculine tendency of her modern sisters, and concerning the extremes put forth by some of them she expressed herself in no uncertain terms. She is dead, yet the good she did will be like bread cast upon the waters, gathered throughout all time. She lived in the hearts of those who loved her; and those who knew her loved her. From the Celes-in tial City she can look back on earth and see the good she did move on. What other bliss could one desire?"

Robert Bruce Hill's second wife, Georgia Hill Sharer, became totally blind a few years after her marriage, yet continued to do a large part of her housework, such as cooking, washing the dishes, sweeping, etc. Asked how it was possible for her to do things without sight, she replied that it was almost necessary while her children were young, that she managed it then and had kept it up since. On a visit to their home, I did not notice for a while that she could not see, so nearly normal were her movements.

Preston Hay Hill was a man of accomplishments, and many of his descendants are persons of distinction. Born and raised in Butler county, Kentucky, he graduated from the Baptist Theological Semin-

ary, Louisville, Ky., practiced and preached that gospel, taught school and farmed in Kentucky. He was a member of the masonic fraternity, Russellville Lodge #17, F & A.M., Russellville, Ky. He took out a demit from that Lodge September 21, 1869; however there is no record of his rejoining the order elsewhere. About 1880 the family moved to Benton, Arkansas, later to Malvern, Texarkana, and Wilton, Ark., then back to Texarkana, where, except for a short engagement in busidess, he and his wife resided with their daughter, Maggie Hill Kuhn, until their deaths in 1899 and 1900 respectively.

While in Wilton, Ark., their son William Wade Hill died on March 4, 1894 after a brief illness, was buried in the First Baptist Church Cemetery, Wilton, Ark. On Palm Sunday, March 30, 1969 a dedication service was held in Wilton commemorating the 77-year history of the Church (1891-1968), and the new church building was dedicated. Recognition was made of the Hill family and William Wade Hill, who at the age of 17 years was the first person to join the Wilton First Baptist Church. He also was the first one interred in the cemetery of the Church at that time, which was March 5, 1894. Much credit for that dedication and recognition of the Hill family was due to the efforts of my good friend, Weaver Barkman, a poincer of Texarkana.

My first cousin Lois McChesney Freeman who has been so helpful in assisting me in the compilation of this genealogy, relates information given her by her mother, Minerva Annie Beatrice Hill McChesney, who recalls how in the early days her parents were practical and economical, especially her mother who was frugal in the preparation of food. One of her dishes was "prairie pie". She would crumble left-over biscuits in an iron pot, pour in milk and add a little sugar or honey then sprinkle the whole with cinnamon before hanging the pot in the fireplace to simmer. The children would soon smell the cooking meal and come into the house hungry for "prairie pie". Grandmother Hill could do so much with so little. Grandfather Hill did not possess but very little of this earth's wealth, in fact what little he had he would give to a needy person or family. He was dedicated and lived close to God. Grandmother Hill on the other hand with her saving and economical practice managed to feed her family, which seemed doubtful under the circumstances as Grandfather Hill did not care for money. He was endowed with that faith and service to God. Thus he leaves to his heirs that spiritual gift of honoring and worshiping God.

Lois, according to her mother, stated that the reason Grandfather Hill moved to Arkansas was because he was a Northern Sympay thizer with regard to the Civil War, as his wife's family owned slaves and resented his sympathies. Grandfather Hill was a school teacher and was quite a poet and composer of songs. He taught his pupils in geography with songs of the states such as "Capitol of Maine is Augusta on the Kennebec River. Capitol of New Hampshire is Concord" followed with a rhyme phrase throughout the remaining states of the Union. It is said that some of the parents of the pupils under Grandfather's tutelage objected to his method of instruction, however it can be said the pupils enjoyed it and all seemed to remember their geography lesson.

The name Hay which is the middle name of Grandfather Hill, I am informed by my mother Maggie Hill Kuhn, stems from the famous Hay family who were important people. History tells us that John Hay was Private Secretary to President Lincoln; Assistant Secretary of State under President Hayes; Secretary of State under Presidents McKinley and Roosevelt, and was offered Secretary of State under President Garfield. You may note in this genealogy that the Hill family were blood related to the famous Hay family.


Reading down vertically the first letter of each line, the sentence spells out "I LOVE THEE".

The above poem by Preston Hay Hill was copied from the original hand-written, spencerian style lettering, surrounded by a floral design scroll and capped with a dove, holding a leaf in it's beak. No date is shown on the original which measures 8" wide x 7"; however it was written prior to the marriage of Preston Hay Hill and Minerva Ann Yewell, his fiancee, which was August 10, 1870. It can be assumed the date was in late 1868 or early 1869. Preston Hay Hill was born May 31, 1837 in Butler County, Kentucky, and died June 5, 1899, and is buried in State Line Cemetery, Texarkana, Arkansas. He lived for 62 years and four days. Minerva Ann Yewell Hill was born in Kentucky, December 3, 1840, died December 1, 1900 - age 59 years, 11 months and 28 days. She is buried beside her husband in the John Kuhn burial plot, State Line Cemetery Texarkana, Arkansas.

The original poem is badly faded and an expert photographer managed to make a negative after six attempts to assure legibility. It is recommended that the copy of this poem be subjected to a well lighted view with the aid of a magnifying glass and the faint lines will show up and the entire poem may be read with ease.

John Kuhn worked for the Missouri Pacific Railroad for over 30 years and upon resigning in 1922 during the strike, engaged in a trucking and hauling business with his cousin George F. Platz. Louis Preston McChesney attended school in Wills Point, Texas, and finished the fifth grade before his father died, then he quit school to go to work for his family needed him. His family moved to Texarkana, Ark., when he was about 16 years old (1894). Because of his energy and work he applied for a job with a local plumber and was immediately hired, as the plumber noticed how the little old house his mother purchased was transformed into a neat home. When Louis Preston McChesney married, he was 20 years old, and he went into business for himself. He had his business letter heads printed "L. P. McChesney, Plumbing and Heating Engineer". He walked to his first work, carrying his tools in a bag. All it really takes for business success is ability, lack of fear, and work. That was his motto and he possessed all of these. Louis Preston McChesney was a man of vision and industrious.

In April 1907 he moved to El Paso, Texas, with his family of wife and three children, mother and sister. He continued his plumbing and heating business. In 1916 a group of business men in El Paso organized what they called a "Vigilante Committee" of which L. P. McChesney was a member. The mayor had been in office a long time, and there was vice and corruption all over the city. They decided that one of these members, Tom Lea, a lawyer, would run for mayor in a "clean up" campaign and several of the rest would run for councilmen. Tom Lea won the necessary votes, but L. P. McChesney did not. Instead he was active in the Masonic Order and the Calvary Baptist Church, being a deacon.

In 1923, the family moved to California in the Los Angeles area, (Alhambra), and then moved to Cardiff-by-the-sea, Calif., about January 1925. Everywhere his family lived, they were active in church work. His plumbing business thrived and much of his work was in the La Jolla, Calff., area, so they moved there in 1927 and rented the house bought in Cardiff-by-the-sea to some one else. While in La Jolla, he became a member of the Kiwanis Club and they helped to organize the Baptist Church there. In 1929 they moved back to Cardiff-by-the-sea and he joined the Rotary Club in Encinitas and later was elected president of the group. He was elected to the San Dieguito Water District and soon became its president and worked for more water and better distribution as president of the board for over 20 years. He received many awards from both Rotary and the San Dieguito Water District.

Louis Preston McChesney was ingenious and invented and devised many items. One of his early patents and inventions was the "Pronto Heater", a "U" shaped device that would operate from an ordinary wood-burning cook stove, and afford poor people a means of getting hot water cheaply. He was the first one to put a jacket around an ordinary water heater, and he called it the "Thermos Heater". He invented a wonderful clean-out fixture that could be taken out simply, instead of the old cumbersome way. His crowning invention and production was the "Drink-Master", an automatic device for watering chickens in pens. This device proved to be lucrative and profitable to his business, as well as servicable and demanding to the poultry industry.

When Louis Preston died as the result of a railroad accident in Cardiff-by-the-sea, Calif., the community lost a great valuable man and friend.

Colonel Francis Hill Kuhn, United States Army, retired, to whom I am indebted for the very complete data on this branch of the Hill family, ----" "On January 1953, Mrs. Maggie Hill Kuhn wrote a letter to her cousin, Charles William Hill of Morgantown, Ky., which is responsible for my obtaining the foregoing data on Preston Hay Hill family and descendants. Hearing of this letter, I wrote to her, asking for what data she might be able to supply, and she referred the matter to her son, Colonel Francis H. Kuhn, who provided practically all the foregoing information. At the time the above letter was written, Mrs. Kuhn was past 80 years of age, but continued to go back to her home in Texarkana each year when her sons went on an annual deer hunt in Texas, and stated she flies back to California, and does not tire. Pretty good, I'd say, for a lady of that age."

When first married "Tom" and his wife lived in Rochester, Ky., later at Evansville, Ind., and finally at Louisville, Ky., where he died. He was for many years a traveling salesman, in the "Green River Country". After his removal to Louisville he operated a General Store in a suburb area for a number of years, but retired from all business several years before his death.

"Tom", as nearly everyone called him, was well known to me in my youth and early manhood, and was a very good friend as well as a relative, despite the disparity in our ages. He possessed to a marked degree the friendly, affectionate disposition common to many of the Hills, and was loved by a host of friends.

There was some confusion as to some of the dates concerning this family of Hills. I obtained most of these dates originally from Mrs. Elizabeth Winstead, of Dixon, Ky., a daughter of Malinda Jane Hill and George W. Severin. Although at that time some 83 years of age, Mrs. Winstead was active and alert, both mentally and physically. Later Clyde M. Hill, of Los Angeles, Calif., son of John Dillard Hill and cousin of Mrs. Winstead, offered corrections to some of the dates, which I have accepted as apparently more trustworthy than those obtained from Mrs. Winstead, as some of her dates were given from memory, or from records which did not seem to be authentic.

Mr. Hill gave me the date of Tom Hill's marriage as 1876 (the first one, of course), which seems incorrect, as my sister

tells me she remembers him before he was married, and that he was a man well past boyhood when he married, instead of only 18.

Descendants of Samuel G. Hill, sixth child and fifth son of James Davis Hill and Betsy Hay, if any, are unknown to me. Descendants of Daniel S. Hill, seventh child and sixth son of

James Davis Hill and Betsy Hay, listed on Page 5.

- 1. JOHN W. HILL, born Nov. 5, 1835, died , married = = = = = = = Jan. 17, 1859, to Mary E. Stevens. To them were born three children, as follows:

 - 1. Antha E. Hill, born Dec. 14, 1859, married Frank Peyton. +++++++++++++++ The Peytons had five children to-wit:
 - 1. Portia Peyton, married W. W. Ericke, of 4012 Meade St., Denver, Colo., and they had one child, Antha Ericke, lived at Crossville, Ill.
 - 2. Florence Peyton, married Fred Dunning, 4050 Lowell Blvd., Denver, Colo.

 - 4. Larry Peyton, killed in first world war.

- 2. John Bennett Hill, born July 23, 1861, married in 1800 Samuel Hill, who became a teacher in Denver, Colo. University. John Bennett Hill moved to Colorado in 1890, and was killed by a runaway team.

John W. Hill was Captain of Company "G", 12th Kentucky Volunteer Cavalry in the war between the States, and lost his life early in that conflict, in the seige of Knoxville, Tenn. He is buried in the Knoxville National Cemetery.

His widow, on March 31, 1868, married Alexander Campbell Ellis, and bore him nine children, the two youngest of whom are still living in 1954, Z. Wayne Ellis at Sturgis, Ky., and Sam Hill Ellis, at RFD Hartford, Ky. Charles R. Ellis, a grandson, in 1954 was Mayor of Hartford, Ky., and engaged in farming and the coal and ice business.

- 3. ANN ELIZABETH HILL, born June 1, (or 4), 1839, died Jan. 30, = = = = = = = = = 1858, buried in Old Hartford Cemetery. There is some uncertainty about this daughter. James Davis Hill's Bible records the birth of "Ann E. Hill" on June 1, 1839 and her death on Jan. 30, 1858. A headstone in Old Hartford Cemetery is lettered as follows: "Dau. of D. S. & N. M. Hill. Born Jan. 4, 1839, Died Jan. 30, 1858." The foot stone has only the initials A.E.H. However, N. M. Hill (Nancy M. Foster Hill), Daniel S. Hill's second wife, and he were married in 1854, so this daughter could only have been by the first wife. These stones may have been erected some time after the death of Ann Elizabeth Hill, and the maker failed to receive accurate information for the engraving.
- 4. ANTHA B. HILL, born Feb. 15, 1841. No further data has been = = = = = = = found, but I have been told that she died about the same time as her sister, Ann Elizabeth Hill.
- 5. A DAUGHTER, not named, was born Apr. 15, 1843, and died the = = = = = next day.
- 6. SAMUEL E. HILL, the last of Daniel S. Hill's children by his = = = = = = = = first wife, Matilda Ewing, born Jan. 3, (or 30) 1844, died, 1904, buried in the John Lancaster Lot, Lexington, Ky. He was married (date unknown) to Naomi Baird, daughter of Judge Baird, of Hartford, Ky., and to them were born three daughters, as follows:

 - 3. Elizabeth Hill
 - Effie Hill married Dr. Frank O'Neal Young, of Lexington, Ky., and they had one child, a daughter, who married a Mr. Hampton, and they had several children, after which they separated.

- who divided his time between New York and Lexington, Ky.
- 3. Elizabeth Hill married John Lancaster, a wealthy real estate owner and merchant of Lexington, Ky. I don't believe there were any children. I met the Lancasters in 1897, while attending Business College in Lexington. He appeared to be much older than she, and I believe he was a widower when they married.

Sam E. Hill was born in Butler County, Ky., and was orphaned when he was a few months old, his mother dying that soon after his birth. His early boyhood was spent with his aunt, Nancy Hill Berry.. He received his education in Hartford Seminary, and became perhaps the best-known and most prominent of the Hills in Kentucky. At the age of 18 he enlisted in the Union Army in the war between the States, and was appointed First Sergeant of Company G. 12th Kentucky Volunteer Cavalry. When his brother, John W. Hill, who was Captain and Acting Major of the Company, was killed in the seige of Knoxville, Sam E. was elected Captain over the Lieutenant, with only two dissenting votes, and was later breveted Major. When elected Captain he was less than 20 years old, and was dubbed the "Boy Captain" on account of his youth. He participated in several important engagements during the war, afterward studied law, was elected to several offices, and was appointed Adjutant General of Kentucky. He was a successful lawyer, a fluent and impressive public speaker, and was one of the State's bestknown and best-loved men, having many loyal friends and admirers wherever he went. After his term as Adjutant General he located in Lexington, Ky., where he practiced his profession, and died.

- 7. LUELLA HILL, oldest child of Daniel S. Hill, and his second wife, = = = = = Nancy M. Foster, born March 23, 1855, died Sept. 6, of the same year, less than six months old.
- 8. ALBERT D. HILL, second of Daniel S. Hill's children by his second = = = = = = = = wife, born Apr. 14, 1856, died Sept. 23, 1856.

Both of the above children are buried in Old Hartford Cemetery, opposite Wayland Alexander Grade School Building, Hartford, Ky.

9. LOU HILL, the last of Daniel S. Hill's children, dates of birth, = = = = = death and marriage unknown, married Annie Hardwick, member of a prominent Hartford family at that time. She was born in 1862, died 1885, and is buried in the Hardwick Lot in Oakwood Cemetery, Hartford, Ky. Her husband is supposed to be buried with her, but I could not find his grave.

Galloway Hill, eighth child of James Davis Hill and Betsy Hay, died unmarried.

Robert Alexander Moore was a railroad man all of his active life, beginning with the L & N R.R. on its O & N Division as freight train brakeman when 19 years of age, and was conductor when 21. Later he was passenger train conductor on the I.C. R.R. Horse Branch and Owensboro Division. He retired in 1917 and made his home in Owensboro. His wife died about Aug. 1, 1953, after spending 22 months in the hospital on account of a broken hip. When I paid him a visit in Aug, 1953, he was 85 years of age, somewhat feeble, and greatly distressed over the illness and death of his wife. Said he expected to spend the remainder of his life with his son in Cedar Rapids, Iowa.

Ewing Hill, eleventh child and eighth son of James Davis Hill and Betsy Hay, located himself in Missouri, and no data appears to have come back about him or his descendants, except that there was one son, Davis Hill, who lived in Palmyra, Mo., in 1885.

Susan Catherine Hill, twelfth and last child, and fourth daughter of James Davis Hill and Betsy Hay, married Alexander Branch Tanner, and the record of her descendants will be found under his name in the section devoted to the Tanners.
