EXPLANATION.--The names having a plus mark (+) recur in the succeeding generation as heads of families. The small superior figures denote the generation.

## MAJOR TIMOTHY HATCH.

The first settlement of our family in this country was as early as 1635. The Plymouth Colony received rapid accession at that time from the mother country. They penetrated the surrounding wilderness, planted their homes, and founded new towns. About thirty miles south-easterly from Plymouth our immigrant ancestors settled, where is now the town of Falmouth. An old house which has stood more than a century and remained in possession of the family until a recent period is pointed out as "the old Hatch place"; and undoubtedly stands upon the ground of the original settlement. None of the descendants, however, remain in that town.

Thence, we trace our line downward to the State of Connecticut, whither several of that family removed at an early date, and settled in Tolland, Guilford, Windsor, and other towns near Hartford. Captain Zephaniah Hatch, whose exact succession has not yet been fixed, but is unmistakably clear as being from the Falmouth family, was a sea-captain and traded with the West Indies. He lived in Guilford, where he m. 1745, Johannah, dau. of Josiah and Hannah Chittenden. Josiah was uncle of Thomas Chittenden, the first governor of the State of Vermont. Of their fifteen children, five were b. in Guilford; and they then rem. to Oxford, in the same state. This was his residence the remainder of his life. Here he d. at upwards of eighty years of age. Here their son Timothy, who is the head of our branch, was b. in 1757.

Of the boyhood and early life of Timothy no account has been preserved. He entered the army at the commencement of the Revolution, and at the age of nineteen was in the battle of White Plains. In this conflict he was taken prisoner by the British, and suffered in the New York "Bridewell" prison the treatment of prisoners, which, though not so atrocious as that of the rebels in the late war, was very cruel. He was finally exchanged, but we do not find that he was in further active service. In 1778 he m. Ľučretia Rockwell and settled in East Hartford, Ct., where he lived several years, and where their first two children were b. About 1784 he rem. to Blanford, Ms., where he purchased a small farm, and lived about twenty years. Six children were b. in Blanford. He rem. to Hartford, Ct., where, in connection with his son Frederic W., he built a house on Pearl Street, opposite the old jail, which still remains in good condition. His wife Lucretia died Feb. 4, 1811. He m. 2d Lucy Bassett, who d. Feb. 11, 1817. third wife was Mrs. Lucinaa [Martyn] Danforth, widow of Daniel Danforth of Hartford. She was b. in Hadley, Ms., June 6, 1777, and d. July 3, 1853. By this marriage were three children, b. in Hartford. After his removal to Hartford he was occupied in active business pursuits—public business. mercantile, and exchange brokerage.

After the close of the Revolution he was a major in the militia, and at the time of the "Shay's Rebellion" was called

out for its suppression.

The character of Major Timothy Hatch would seem to partake largely of the elements ascribed to our Puritan ancestors—firm integrity, unbending adherence to principle, a strong will, persevering energy. These, united with good judgment, a mind of some cultivation and stored by reading, would naturally give him success in his undertakings and a prominent place in community. In public affairs he took a lively interest, and his name frequently occurs in the newspapers of that time in connection with public meetings of various sorts. In religion he was an Episcopalian, a member of Christ Church, Hartford. He lived to the ripe age of eighty-one, and d. June 10, 1838. He could count as his progeny at the time of his death, eleven children, fifty-five grandchildren, and twenty-three great grandchildren—a total of eighty-nine.

#### SECOND GENERATION.

TIMOTHY LINUS (2), b. in East Hartford, Ct., Mar. 12, 1779. He was about five years old when his father rem. to Blanford, Ms., and purchased a farm there. Young Timothy, during his boyhood, worked on the farm, attending school in the winter months, until he went and learned the hatter's trade, which business he afterwards followed. He m. Apr., 1800, Saran Walker Shepherd, a niece of Gen. William Shepherd, who was distinguished in the "Shay's Rebellion." Her ancestral relatives were among the leading patriots of the Revolution. She lived to the extreme age of ninety-five, enjoying until her last sickness good bodily health and a clear mind. Her home during the last part of her life was with her son Ossian L., and there she d. Dec. 3, 1876.

Their children were all born in the same house, and mostly educated in the same school-house. The boys learned farining, and more or less of their father's trade of hat-making. He d. June 23, 1853; and in the cemetery there his remains repose. Like his companion who survived him, he was an earnest, practical christian. His life of ceaseless industry was guided by a well-balanced mind. Issue:

URIEL CHITTENDEN<sup>2</sup> (3). b. in East Hartford, Ct., Oct. 21, 1780; m. 1803, Narcissa, cau. of Dr. Elnathan Beach, a distinguished physician in Cheshire, Ct. He studied law with Gen. Stephen R. Bradley, of Westminster, Vt., and after acquiring his profession, went to the town of Cavendish, Vt., where he was one of the early settlers. There he attained distinction at the bar and upon the bench. He represented the town fifteen years in the State Legislature; held for many

rears the office of Governor's Counsel, and also that of Judge of Probate. He rem. from that town about 1830, and after a short residence in Troy, and another in Guilford, he settled, in 1834, in the village of Felchville, in the town of Reading, all in Vt. At the last named place he practiced his profession about ten rears until failing health obliged him to relinquish it. The leath of his wife occurred Aug. 5, 1845, at the house of their laughter Mrs. Johnson, in Granville, N.Y. She was a woman of great excellence of character, displaying under all circumstances the loveliest christian virtues. Her death weighed neavily upon him, and his health gradually declined until his leath, June 19, 1848. A granite shaft marks their restingblace in Greenwood Cemetery, New York. "Theodore C. Grannis, formerly a resident of this village, died at his home in Brooklyn, on Friday last, of rheumatic fever. He was a native of Oneida County, N.Y., and came to this village about the year 1853, and established the Hamilton Exchange Bank, which went down in the great financial crisis of 1857. While a resident here he was active in everything that tended toward the improvement and advancement of our village and its surroundings. He removed from this village to New York City, in 1858. He was of a warm and genial nature, of modest and gentlemanly address, and a writer of no ordinary power."

A notice in the New York Times says:

"Mr. Grannis was a journalist of wide experience, who devoted many of the best years of his life to the profession which he adopted, not by mere accident in his early youth, but long after he had reached mature years, from choice. His work, which was done for many newspapers and magazines, chiefly related to art matters. He had skill with the pencil, himself, and an instinctive love of art for its own sake. He enjoyed the personal friendship of every prominent artist in this neighborhood, and spent a large portion of his few leisure hours in the studios and at the clubs which artists frequent. Mr. Grannis came to this city

twenty years ago, to engage in mercantile pursuits. He wrote for the journals and associated with artists while he was a tradesman, and for the last eight years he gave his whole attention to journalism. This is scarcely the place in which to speak of the private character of a man so little known to the public, but it may not be amiss to speak of his rare qualities as a friend, and his manly bearing in times of adversity. His memory will long be green among those who have known him and worked with him."

FREDERIC WINSLOW<sup>2</sup> (6), b. in Blanford, Ms., Aug. 1, 1789. At an early age he manifested a decided taste for learning. At twelve years of age his father placed him in a mercantile business which he soon left, preferring work with a farmer where he could have more leisure hours for study. He married/Frances Lowry Robertson, of Baltimore, Md., who d. about one year after their marriage, in Edenton, N.C. He m. 2d a daughter of Johne Teatherburn, of Baltimore, Md., and all his children were by this marriage. She d. in San Francisco, Cal., Oct. 12, 1864. From a sermon preached at his funeral in Grace Church, Sacramento, Cal., Jan. 16, 1860, the following is mostly taken:

Dr. Hatch was ordained a deacon in the Protestant Episcopal Church by Bishop Claggett, of Baltimore, Md., in 1810, at the age of twenty-one. His first charge was at Edenton, N.C., where he labored three years. He then returned to Maryland, and was ordained priest at Annapolis, by Bishop Claggett. He then took charge of the parish of Frederic, where he preached till 1819, when he removed to Virginia and labored in several churches known as the Fredericksville parish, residing at Charlottesville. During his residence here he had as a neighbor, friend, and parishoner ex-president Thomas Jefferson. Although a skeptic in belief, Mr. Jefferson was a regular attendant on the services of the church where Mr. Hatch preached, and was always ready and liberal in his contributions to Mr. H. personally and to his parish. There always existed a strong personal friendship between the two men, and when the ex-president died Mr. Hatch was at his bedside. Two years after his settlement in Charlottes-ville, he built for himself a house, and at that time received from Mr. Jefferson the following letter:

MONTICELLO, Dec. 8, 1821.

Dear Sir: In the ancient feudal times of our good old forefathers, when the Seigneur married his daughter, or Knighted his son, it was the usage for his vassals to give him a year's rent extra, in the name of an aid. I think it as reasonable, when our Pastor builds a house, that each of his flock should give him an aid of a year's contribution. I inclose mine as a tribute of justice, which of itself, indeed, is nothing; but as an example, if followed, may become something. In any event, be pleased to accept it as an offering of duty and a testimony of my friendly attachment and high respect.

Rev. Mr. Hutch.

Twice he was appointed on the "Board of Visitors" to West Point. With Presidents Monroe and Jackson he was also on terms of intimacy. His arduous labors in Virginia were blessed with great success, where infidelity had greatly prevailed and religion had been at low ebb.

In 1832 he removed to Washington, D.C., and officiated in Christ Church until 1836; and during this time he twice filled with honor to himself, the post of Chaplain to the U.S. Senate. In 1836 he removed to Poughkeepsie, N.Y., taking charge of a parish there. In 1843 he went to Wisconsin and took charge of parishes at Southport and Racine. In 1850 he went to St. Louis, and there preached until 1856, when he removed to California, where in four years he closed his earthly work and a ministry of half a century. During these four last years he displayed his characteristic energy and devotedness. Rev. Mr. Hill says, "Unselfish have been his labors as a missionary and teacher in this State."

He was one of the ripest of American scholars. In the classics he had few equals, and spoke several modern languages with fluency. Issue:

At that time the institution was in a depressed condition, and it was a question whether it could be sustained. He engaged in the work of its renovation with great energy and good judgment, resulting in excellent success, and in 1859 he was unanimously elected superintendent of the school, which from this time onward enjoyed remarkable prosperity. He took high rank as a reformer and educator, and continued till his death in this responsible and difficult position.

In May, 1852, he made a public profession of his faith in Christ, and united with the Congregational church, of which he was a deacon the last two years of his life. With remarkable cheerfulness and buoyancy of spirit, he constantly evinced a life of consecration to the service of the Master. Such qualities gained him a wide circle of hearty friends, and the

love and respect of the community.

In the domestic circle where he was always happiest, the best and loveliest traits were exhibited. At the age of fifty-five he was called away from the field of his extensive usefulness, and he died Feb. 7, 1874.

The scene of his death-bed was a fitting close of such a life. Calling his family, the officers of the Reform School, and other friends around him, he bade each farewell with affectionate parting words. He then led in repeating the Lord's Prayer, then himself repeated the hymn "Rock of Ages," and after pronouncing the apostolic benediction, he fell asleep in Christ. The trustees of the institution over which he had been fifteen years superintendent, gave public expression of their sorrow. A Meriden newspaper on the day of his funeral said: "To-day Meriden is wrapped in grief confined to no particular class or sect.
