Hart

8. EDWARD HART probably came from Braintree England Essex Co. to America in ship "Mary and John" in 1630. He is listed with Stephen Hart (probably Brothers) in the Thomas Hocker party. His name appears on list of freemen Boston 1634. He was granted land in Dorchester 1635.
EDWARD HART appears at Newtown Long Island 1648 among the families worthy of note. His was one of the families first to settle at Flushing and Edward Hart was a man of whom descendants may well be proud. He was one of the leading men of Newtown L.I. He was town clerk 1657 when that was the highest office. There were only 18 families who originally settled Flushing.
EDWARD HART issued a protest in 1659 signed it with 30 others. It was strong in its protest against the action of the Governor for condemning the Quakers as a heretic sect. This "Remonstrance" was sent to Gov. Stuyvesant for which Edward Hart was sent to prison compelled to submission and finally released.
It is believed Edward Hart's wife's name was Margaret. Their chn. were Edward, Elisha, Sarah, Margaret, Jonathan and perhaps others.
7. JONATHAN HARTT CAPT. served in King Phillips war. He settled in Rye abt. 1665. He was chosen townsman 1666; church warden 1710; Vestryman 1683-1711. His was one of the original 10 families of Rye, N.Y. He m. Hannah Budd.

Hart

JONATHAN HART served in the Revolution. He was a private in Col. Samuel Grako's New York Regt. Westchester Co. Pierre Van Cortland was also Col. of this Regt. East 3rd banner of Cortland regt. He served from 1778 to 1781.

JONATHAN HART lived in Stony Street Shrub Oaks (Yorktown) during the revolution.. His family was harassed by Tories who were hiding in the neighborhood. He is buried in the Methodist church ground and his grave bears a D.A.R. marker.

Fright Hart served in the Civil War. He was killed at Spotsylvania Court House. He was made Sergeant Co. "G" 6th regt. N.Y. Volunteers 59 regt. N.Y. Putnam Co. Dec. 27, 1862 by Col. Wm. H. Morris while at Fort McHenry.

Fright Hart was in command of the picket line. His Mother received a letter from his commanding officer stating that after being mortally wounded, Fright Hart raised himself on his crippled limbs and saved his comrades onward.

GEORGE F. HART enlisted as a private Sept. 20, 1861 Co. "F" regt. 59 N.Y. Volunteers Putnam Co.. He was discharged Oct. 24, 1862 because of loss of arm. He served 1 year 34 days. He was wounded at the second battle of Bull Run. Pension Cert. No. 10816

GEORGE PERCIVAL GARR served in the World War. \$3. 949.177 of Parris and Ontario Calif.. Enlisted Aug. 26, 1918 at San Bernardino for services. He was assigned to the 22nd Co. 6th battalion, 165 Depot Brigade the same day. He was transferred from this Co. on Sept. 26, 1918 joined the 1st Co. Coast Artillery, Coast Defense on the Columbia River, Ft. Stevens, Oregon Oct. 14th 1918 for officers training He was transferred to 8th Co. Coast Artillery, Coast Defense of the Columbia River Nov. 11, 1918. He died of broncho-pneumonia on Nov. 14th 1918 at Post-Hospital, Fort Stevens, Oregon.

LESTER BARKER COOKE served in the World War.

Jerome Hart son of John Hart b. 1833 & Nancy Hart, writes,--
Jonathan Hart (3) had a son named Hickson Hart who died young. He left one son Stephen Lounsbury Hart. He left 4 sons and 1 dau. He m. his 2nd cousin Georgiana Hart. They built a house in Stony St. but not the one we lived in. Samuel Hart built our house and lived there 30 years then my father bought it, I think in 1874. Both places have been bought by city people and fixed up very nice*.

Stephen Lounsbury Hart d. 1868 ae. 63. He was son of Hickson Hart and Mary Knowlton ~~of Bedford and Margaret Lounsbury of Carmel.~~ dau. of Robert Knowlton of Bedford and Margaret Lounsbury of Carmel. Soon after Stephen was b. his parents moved to Peekskill. His mother m. 2nd Lewis Bell of Ossining. Stephen was grandson of Jonathan Hart who gave him deed to the old Hart homestead in Stony St. The house was built by his great-grandfather Jonathan Hart who m. Hannah Budd. Stephen built the new house opp. the old one and took his bride there Xmas night 1861. She was Georgiana Hart dau. of Joseph Roake Hart of Stony St. and Jane (Drake Morgan) Hart dau. of Elijah Morgan & Nancy Lee. The Grand-mother of Stephen Hart was Rachel Field, w. of Jonathan Hart (3), son of Jonathan and Elizabeth Bloomer.

James Hart son of Jonathan Hart and Elizabeth Bloomer b. Mch. 23, 1776 d. Apr. 4, 1825 m. Sept. 1802 Ann Eliza Marie Roake b. May 14, 1784 d. Oct. 29, 1867 both buried at Shrub Oak. His son Stephen Allen Hart M.D. b. June 11, 1820 d. Feb. 22, 1842 m. Sarah Knapp b. Aug. 17, 1820 d. Oct. 1, 1912 m. Apr. 30, 1844. Their son was James Allen Hart b. Jan. 31, 1845 d. Jan. 25, 1923 m. Annie E. Hallock. Their dau. is Mrs. Sara Allen Hart Kipp of Ossining, N.Y..

John Coleridge Hart 1822-1878 was son of James Hart and Ann Eliza Marie Roake Hart. Other chn. were James Roake Hart, Henry, & Gilbert.

Records show Isaac Hart b. 1658 or 70 son of Samuel 1656-1730. Isaac m. Sarah. They had Jonathan m. Lidda Neale. Their chn. were Lidda b. 1671, Jonathan b. 1673, John b. 1675. This family seems to have no connection with the Edward Hart line.

Monmouth Hart's will made 1758 June 22, s. Sarah was then living. sons James, Joseph & Monmouth Jr, dau. Sarah & Anna. Sword and belt and ivory cane to Monmouth Jr. prov. 1761

Hart--notes

Austin's Rhode Island states,--John Gould m. Margaret Hart widow of Edward Hart. She d. 1871. Assume Margaret was wife of Edward Hart (8) Thus descendants may claim Goulds as step-ancestors.

New Eng. Reg. v. 33 p242 "Widow Jane Hart" petitioned the Govt. for aid stating she was ae. 70 and youngest surviving child of Edward Rosciter. Writer asks if she were widow of Edward Hart. New York Record v. 26, p. 170 there is a record that Joan Rosciter dau. of Edward Rosciter m. Nicholas Hart. He d. 1654 She d. 1685. No doubt this Joan was Jane.
There is no proof as to whom was the wife of Edward Hart but indications are that she was Margaret.

Abraham Hart son of Henscuth Hart and Rachel Bloomer m. Mary Coleman lived at White Plains, N.Y. Their son Ezekiel Bishop Hart served in the Navy during the War of 1812 and was killed.

Dr. James Harvey Hart son of Abraham was living in N.Y. city 1874

Thaddeus Raymond served in the Rev. with the 7th regt. Col Henry Luddington, Dutchess Co. Militia. "New York Men in the Rev." p. 151 His will made at Fishkill Sept. 23, 1830 mentions w. Abigail, Esther w. of John Sloat, Tanny w. of Annanias Bryant sons John, Thaddeus, Ira, Charles, Henry, Tanny, & Sarah Raymond and chn of deceased son Stephen. Records show that Thaddeus Raymond and w. Abigail made transfer of land 1826.

Ema Travis located the grave of Thaddeus Raymond at New Hackensack N.Y. marked Thaddeus Raymond d. 1832 ae. 82. ~~XXXXXXXXXXXXXXX~~ and that of his w. Abigail d. 1833 ae. 82. It will be seen by this that the dau. Hester b. 1781 could not have been the dau. of ~~HESTER~~ Abigail b. 1771. There must have been another wife first. Between the two graves is an unmarked grave which is probably that of the first wife. There is a church record of Mary Newman wife of Thaddeus Raymond uniting with the church. It is reasonable to suppose that Mary Newman was the first wife of Thaddeus Raymond.

The ancestry of Thaddeus Raymond has not been established. The will of Ephraim Raymond mentions eldest son Thaddeus and other chn Ephraim, Ebenezer, Samuel dau. Ann Fairchild & Mary Reed. Will prov. Bedford 1785. Thaddeus was b. 1750 and would have been only ae. 15 when this will was made which refers to Thaddeus as the oldest son. There were daus. married at this time. It is possible the girls were all older, but citations of the will as to minor chn. would have to be found to prove this. It is possible Ephraim was the grandfather of Thaddeus. There are many records among my files which may prove helpful if other data should be found and for the benefit of any who might work on this line Ephraim's ancestry is given here.

Robert Bloomer in 1673 bought land in Rye with w. Rachel

Robert Bloomer (2) constable 1697; towneman 1701-11 trustee until 1718 and again in 1729. In 1697 he was appointed on commission to lay out lands and properties & highways. In 1707 the town gave a brock to erect a mill. Bloomer's mill is now Park's mill. Robert was living in 1738 when he gave his grandson, Robert, son of Robert the house where his father lived with 45 acres of land.

Robert (6) d. 1738. His chn. were,--John, Joseph, Gilbert Robert.

John (5) is mentioned 1731-40 owning land north of Bloomer's mill. He was justice of the peace 1746

Joseph (5) is mentioned 1735-46

Gilbert justice of the peace 1746; town clerk 1751. lived at Rye Neck 1751 in house occupied by C. Keeler.

Abs. of Tills 1804 p. 4-- Gilbert Bloomer 1776 mentions w. Hannah also "son Gilbert Deceased" pccy. 1784

Gilbert Bloomer m. 1st Phebe Sherwood. m. 2nd Hannah Theal, by 2nd w. had Hannah who m. Jonathan Hart.

Records of New Rochelle 1690-1828 by Jeanne A. Forbes pp. 309, 320, 322 state Gilbert Bloomer Esq. "one of the judges of common pleas" 1785, 1783. p. 454 "New York Men in the Rev." p. 267 Westchester Co. Land and Bounty Rights Gilbert Bloomer 3rd regt. Col. Samuel Haight.

Ogden

John Ogden b. 1600 was Deputy Governor of Rye Colony 1674 assist-
ant-Gov. 1675.

John and Richard Ogden were early immigrants to Conn.. John the
elder bro. settled at Stamford as early as 1641. He was patentee of
Hempstead L.I. in 1644. Lived in Southampton L.I. 1656. - He rem. to
N.J. represented Elizabethtown 1st assembly N.J.

Richard bro. of John settled at Stamford. John and Richard 1642 made
arrangements with Gov. Keift of N.Y. to build a stone church for 2500
guilders. Richard moved to Fairfield bet. 1650-1660 and in 1662 en-
tered into a contract with the town to run a mill which had been erected
by Thomas Sherwood at town's expense on Mill river at Mill Plain now
known as Ferry's Mill. He erected a stone house near the mill. On Dec.
30, 1680 the town sold the mill to Richard provided he maintain
good corn mill on prescribed shares. His estate was valued 805 £
10sh. 6d.. This estate descended (mill, house & lands) to widow Mary
ohn Richard, John, David, Daus. Alice, wife of Daniel Ward.----- wife
of Daniel Neeky,-----wife of John Smith.

Other chn. of John Ogden were Judith, Joseph, David, & Elizabeth who

Slot

Jan Pieterse Slot and two sons Jan Jansen and Pieter Janssen came from Holland before 1639. Jan Pieterse m. 2nd in the Old Dutch church Harlem, N.Y. City 1685. He was schepan (deputy sheriff) at New Harlem from 1680-85 also town building master and sergeant or officer in command of the 1st military Co. of the new settlement of New Harlem. His sons Jans & Pieter were officers viz. cadet & corporal 2nd & 3rd companies formed later. Jan Jansen garrisoned an outpost at New Harlem, a barrier against the Indian raids. The Slots held office until the end of the Dutch rule. The family was one of the first 65 families to settle in N.Y. City and is said to have come from Holland nobility. They lived on Slot Lane then a cow path now one writer says is Wall St. another says it is now Beaver St.

Pieter Jansen's descendants settled in Rockland Co. N.Y., where Slotsburg was named. Jan Jansen's descendant's settled in Westchester Co. N.Y..

Manhattan 1624-1632 by Edward Van Winkle Sec. Secy. for the Holland Society, states,--Plantation of Jan Pieterse Slot who came to this country with Nicholas Beyer by way of Amsterdam from Holstein. This bowerie is described as being of 2 morgans (16 acres) of land situated opposite to bowerie no. E. He later operated a farm in Harlem near Van Zeulen's Hoeck. He was progenitor of the Slot Or Sloat family family in America. In 1680 he appears as senior member of the board of commissioners and later as chief magistrate. In 1662 he is listed as owner of Van ZeulenHoeck No. 7,849. 20/100

Fellstreu's Historic Homes and Institutions says,--The Slot farm was on the South side of Wall St. see p. 42.

The Sloat family is interesting in as much as it was one of the first 65 families to settle N.Y. City. It inter-married with the family of Dominie Bogardus who m. Anneke Jane. Bogardus was the first preacher of the Old Dutch Church and was the original owner of the Trinity church estate which has been in litigation for generations.

Woolsey

George Woolsey b. Yarmouth England, 1610 came to America in ship New Amsterdam from Rotterdam England with some of the Dutch immigrants in 1623 ae. 13 and landed at Plymouth. He and his father went into Holland as followers of rev. John Robinson all to escape religious persecution in England. They resided there a few years. George Woolsey was a trader or merchant and for a time a partner with Isaac Allerton of the Mayflower. In 1647 he purchased a plantation at Flushing, resided at Jamaica and died there. His will made 1691 mentions w, Rebecca, chn. George, Thomas, John, Daus. Sarah Hall Hallett, Mary Woolsey & Rebecca Wiggins. He is buried at Cyster Bay His grave has a stone marker.

Benjamin Woolsey father of George Woolsey came a few years later than his son tho the date is not known and little is recorded regarding Benjamin Woolsey.

Of Thomas Woolsey son of George Woolsey no records are found.

Josiah Woolsey. "New York Men In the Revolution" p. 210 gives Josiah Woolsey as a soldier under Capt. Marcus Hosenan. "2nd Westchester Co. Col Thomas Thomas.

Josiah Woolsey was taken prisoner by the British, confined to the "Old Sugar House Prison" where he died a prison martyr.

The old sugar warehouse stood until quite recently on Liberty St. N.Y. City and was used during the rev. as a prison. It is described as a building of thick walls with small opening similar to port-holes which served as ventilators. Nearly 1000 prisoners were confined there at one time. They lay on a layer of straw on the floor, under the most horrible condition, without air, heat or sanitary conditions. The men were driven mad by suffering hunger and starvation; disease broke among them; their feet were frozen and mortified; they prayed for the destruction of their enemy. Groups of 10 or 12 were allowed to stand for a period of 15 minutes at a time by an opening in the wall for a breath of air. Their food was wormy crackers ground, so rancid that they smelled rank. The men died of starvation, suffocation or disease. The dead wagon visited the prison daily, the bodies were piled on the wagon like sticks of wood then taken to the city ditch and dumped. A few of the bodies are said to be buried in Trinity church yard 5 or 6 in one grave. Such was the fate of Josiah Woolsey.

There is a monument in Trinity church yard on the south side of which reads,--

At a meeting of Citizens held at City Hall June 8, 1852,--It was resolved that the erection of a suitable monument with appropriate inscriptions by Trinity Church to the Memory of those great and good men who died whilst in captivity in Old Sugar House and were interred in Trinity Church yard in this city will be an act gratifying, not only to the attendants of this xxx meeting but to every American citizen,--

East side,--

Sacred to the Memory of
the brave and good men who died
whilst imprisoned in this City, for their
devotion to the cause of American Independence.

North side,-- At a meeting of the Rector, Church Wardens and Vestrymen of Trinity Church of this City, November 8th 1852. It was resolved that suitable Monument be erected by this corporation in memory of the officers and soldiers of the Revolution who died in British captivity in the City of New York. Many of whom are buried in the north part of Trinity Church yard opposite Pine Street.

Woolsey

Thomas Woolsey a near relative of Cardinal Woolsey. Cardinal Woolsey was indebted to his Royal Master King Henry VIII for his extraordinary elevation. He was born in the parish of St. Nicholas 1471. A modernized house near the church yard is pointed out as his birth-place. In college St. Seroby next to St. Peter's church may be seen a square gateway of brick with a stone tablet above bearing the Arms of Henry VIII. Ivy covers it's top; wear and tear of three centuries have rounded all it's corners, once sharp, edges and mellowed it's once bright red. It now forms the entrance to a steam engine factory. It is nearly all that remains in Ipswich to remind one of the great Cardinal whose native town this was. This site was intended by Cardinal Woolsey to build a Cardinal's college. XXXXXXXX The estates of 22 churches on their dissolution were given to Cardinal Woolsey to found a Cardinal's college at Oxford. Before this was accomplished Woolsey ceased to be a favorite with the King and nothing was done. In 1538 college revenues were suppressed and only a fragment remains to testify to Woolsey's regard for his native town.

Woolsey--Collateral.

George Woolsey 3rd b. Oct. 10, 1682 ran. abt. 1710-12 to Hopewell, NJ and settled on a farm of about 218 acres there, now Pennington, N.J. his original homestead in 1874 was in the possession of his gr-grandson Rev. George Woolsey. His will ex. Feb. 1, 1761 prov Sar. 11, 1762 mentions sons, Daniel, Jeremiah, Henry & Joseph and dau. Jemima, who with M. Noah Hart a cousin of the signer of the Dec. of Ind. Sarah Woolsey dau of Benjamin Woolsey and Abigail Taylor b. Apr. 17, 1719 m. Dec. 24, 1741 John Lloyd b. Feb. 9, 1711 son of Henry Lloyd who m. Col Melancthon T. Woolsey a gentleman farmer living at Lloyd's Manor. He was actively employed as commissary for the state of Conn. during the Rev.. She d. Sept. 5, 1780 ae. 41.

It will be noticed that Mary Brewster appears as the wife of Jonathan Owen. All efforts to locate Mary Brewster have failed so far tho it is hoped to establish this ancestry some time. Jonathan Owen was one of the organizers of Rev. Nathaniel Brewster's church on Long Island. Nathaniel had three sons who had families so it is fair to suppose that Mary Brewster was a granddaughter of Rev. Nathaniel Brewster. This esteemed man has been a subject of controversy by members of the Mayflower Society. Mr. Rowman now head of that society claims that Rev. Nathaniel was not a son of Rev. William Brewster, however descendants of Rev. Nathaniel claim to have proof that he was a son of the first wife. If this claim should be accepted and if it can be proved that Mary was a descendant of Rev. Nathaniel then the rest of this line may claim descent from Elder William Brewster.

Holmes

From Hist. of Westchester Co. N.Y..

Francis Holmes came from Yorkshire England to America. He was in Stamford 1630 later to Bedford, Westchester Co. His son John Sr. became one of the original proprietors of Bedford 1681. He had 6 sons & 2 daus. He d. 1720 ae. 90. His son John Jr. b. 1639 d. 1728 was for many years town clerk.

There is little doubt but that Hannah Holmes b. 1707 d. 1789 was a descendant of this family but it has not been possible to obtain records to know just where she belongs.

Note.--There are several names among those included in this work that are familiar on the list of Mayflower descendants. All searchers for records of ancestry hope to establish records of ancestry to the Mayflower, and it is the hope of M.H.S. to be able to make connections with one or more of the Mayflower passengers before this work is ended.

There is no proof but the indications are that Ebenezer Theall was son of Joseph.. Ebenezer's will mentions wife Anna, dau. Hannah, who was a widow in 1747 when father's will was made. Hannah later m. 2nd Gilbert Bloomer and had dau. Elizabeth b. 1751

Ebenezer Theall probably son of Capt. Joseph was no doubt born during his father's stay at Stamford. He had a son there 1712. In 1737 he gave his farm 120 acres at Budd's Neck to his eldest son.

She is referred to as bro. of John Briggs but it is not known what John Briggs is meant. She was b. 1600 so could not have been bro of John mentioned above. She d. Feb. 8, 1673 ae. 73

Rebecca (Briggs) Cornell was sitting by the fire smoking and a coal from her pipe or the fire burned her to death. On the strength of a vision which her brother John Briggs had in which she appeared to him and said,-- "See how I was burned with fire" her son Thomas was convicted and hung.

Rev. John Robinson was pastor of the church of Scroby which went into Holland to escape religious persecution. There they were dissatisfied and eventually sailed in the Mayflower ~~XXXX~~ for America. It was the intention of Rev. John Robinson to follow later with the older members of the congregation but he died soon after never realizing his desire. Two of his sons came to America in 1630 and many of the Robinsons in this country are descendants of the leader and organizer of the Mayflower party.
