This document was compiled by George S. Porter, Professional Genealogist, of No. 3 Washington Place, Norwich, Connecticut, from original records and public documents, and also from data furnished by Dr. D. J. Harris of Evanston, Illinois, and Mrs. Mary A. Ralston of Cheyenne, Wyoming.

Dr. D. J. Harris has visited Mrs. W. S. (Abbie R. H.) Fuller, No. 184 Spring Street, Saratoga Springs, New York, and examined a Harris genealogy prepared for her by E. N. Shephard, a professional genealogist. This record, so far as it is parallel, corroborates substantially the work of Mr. Porter. Mrs. Fuller is a granddaughter of Zadoek Harris (57).

The text prepared by Mr. Porter has been carefully revised and brought down to date (1909), as far as possible, from data furnished by various members of the Harris family, herein referred to. The appendices have been added in order to preserve certain valuable and interesting material which properly could not be placed in the body of a work of this nature, and in order to preserve the records (not printed elsewhere) of certain families related by intermarriage to this Harris group.

## HARRIS FAMILY

ARMS IN USE BY HARRIS FAMILY IN AMERICA.<sup>1</sup>

*Arms: Argent, a lion rampant sable,—over all a chevron ermine.*

*Crest: A falcon with wings expanded or.*

1. THOMAS HARRIS,<sup>2</sup> with his wife Elizabeth and their children, came to these shores from England, and were residents of Charlestown in the colony of Massachusetts Bay, in 1630. The next year the former had charge of the ferry between Boston and Winnisimet, which latter place became incorporated as Chelsea January 10, 1738. After the death of her husband, the widow Harris became the wife of Deacon William Stetson of Charlestown, who, in 1680, testified in court substantially to the above facts. son were admitted to membership in the Charlestown church March 22, 1633, in which town the former became a freeman of the colony June 11th, following. He joined the Artillery Company of Massachusetts in 1648, was chosen a deacon of the church in October, 1659, and served the town as a representative in the General Court of the colony from 1667 to 1671, inclusive. Mrs. Stetson died February 16, 1669-1670, soon after which, or August 27th following, the widower married for his second wife, and as her second husband, Mrs. Mary Norton, whose first husband, Capt. Francis Norton, was of Portsmouth in 1631 and of Charlestown as early as 1637, in which latter place he died July 11, 1657.

Deacon Stetson died April 11, 1691, without having had children by either wife so far as known. His will, which bore date April 12, 1688, mentioned, among others, John, Thomas, William and Daniel Harris, and Anne Maverick, relict of Elias Maverick, children of his first wife by her former husband, Thomas Harris.

## SECOND GENERATION.

2. ANTHONY,<sup>1</sup> of Boston for a time, became the owner of a house lot in Rowley. He married Elizabeth ———, was a member of the Artillery Company in 1644 and was a resident of Ipswich in 1648 and of Winnisimmet (Chelsea) in 1651. He died childless, December 30, 1651, leaving a will dated Winnisimmet, April 23rd, the year of his death, wherein he named his wife Elizabeth, his brothers Daniel and Thomas Harris and his

brother-in-law, Elias Maverick, the husband of his sister Anne. His will was presented for probate by William Stetson and Elias Maverick.

3. JOHN became a freeman of the colony May 26, 1647, was of Charlestown and for a time of Rowley, in which latter place he was possessed of a house lot. He married probably Amy ———, and became the father of several children.

4. WILLIAM of Charlestown and for a time of Rowley, where he was the owner of a house lot, married (1) Edith ———, and in a few years removed to Middletown, Connecticut, where his wife died August 5, 1685. He married (2) Mrs. Lydia (Wright) Smith, daughter of Thomas Wright of Wethersfield, in that colony, and widow of Joseph Smith of Middletown and subsequently of Wethersfield, and died in 1717.

5. (CAPTAIN) DANIEL of Rowley, married about 1648, Mary Weld, born in England, a daughter of Captain Joseph and Elizabeth Weld of Roxbury, and in 1652 removed to Middletown, Connecticut, where, in 1660, he was appointed to keep an inn. In 1661 he received his commission as lieutenant of the trainband, of which company he was soon promoted to the captaincy, became the father of a large family and died November 30, 1701. His widow survived him until September 5, 1711.

6. ANNE married Elias Maverick of Charlestown, who joined the Artillery Company in 1654 and died probably in 1684. His will of October 19, 1681, which was proven November 6, 1684, provided for his wife, three sons, five daughters, three grandchildren and Deacon William Stetson, his wife's stepfather.

7. THOMAS of Ipswich, had a house lot in Rowley in 1644, and may have been a resident of that place for

a brief period. He married November 15, 1647, Martha Lake,<sup>1</sup> a daughter of John Lake of Irby, England, by his wife Margaret, a daughter of Edmund Reade<sup>2</sup> of Wickford, County Essex; a descendant on her father's side in the thirty-first generation of Charlemagne, Frankish king and Roman emperor, by his wife Hildegard, daughter of the Swabian duke Godfrey; in the thirty-second of Pepin the Short, the first Carolingian king of the Franks; in the thirty-third of Charles, surnamed Martel ("the hammer"), in his time the real ruler of the Franks, and in the thirty-fourth of Pepin of Herstal, mayor of the palace under the last Merovingian kings, who died A. D. 714.

The widow, Mrs. Margaret (Reade) Lake, with her daughters Hannah and Martha, came to New England in the ship "Abigail," arriving on these shores October 6, 1635.

Thomas Harris was one of twenty soldiers sent against the Indians under Sergeant Howlet in 1643. He sold his lands in Rowley in 1652 to Thomas and Richard Holmes, and Richard Bailey, served as tythingman of Ipswich in 1667 and died in 1687. In his will<sup>3</sup> of July 16th, the year of his death, which was proven September 14th following, he bequeathed to his wife Martha, the executrix, his "house, barn, orchard, garden," etc., during her natural life, and left legacies to his sons John, William and Ebenezer.

His estate inventoried £576.11.03. Mrs. Harris, in a petition to the Court, in January, 1695, represented that she was the widow and executrix of Thomas Harris, deceased, who left sons John, William and Ebenezer, and

daughters Elizabeth, wife of John Gallup, and Margaret, wife of John Staniford.

The children Thomas and Elizabeth were mentioned in the will of their grandmother, Mrs. Margaret (Reade) Lake.

### THIRD GENERATION.

10. (SERGEANT) JOHN of Ipswich, born January 7, 1653, married January 8, 1685, Grace, a daughter of William and Grace Searle of that place, and died November 21, 1732. His widow survived him nearly ten years and passed away June 10, 1742.

11. ELIZABETH, born February 8, 1654, married in 1675, John Gallup.

12. MARGARET, born August 6, 1657, married prior to 1680, John Staniford of Ipswich.

13. MARY, born January 31, 1660.

14. WILLIAM, born December 10, 1661, married perhaps Sarah, daughter of Thomas Newman; died December 31, 1751.

15. EBENEZER, mentioned in his father's will, was born *circa* 1662, and married (1) September 15, 1690, Rebekah Clarke. They appear to have removed to Plainfield, Windham County, Connecticut, several years before its incorporation as a town in May, 1699, as the birth of their youngest child, Martha, appears on the Plainfield records under date of November 26, 1696, and as the death of Rebekah, wife of Ebenezer Harris, is recorded as having occurred June 16, 1699.

Ebenezer Harris married for his second wife, *circa* 1701, Christobel Crary, baptized with an older brother and a younger sister, April 30, 1682, a daughter of Peter and Christobel (Gallup) Crary of Groton, Connecticut, who were married December 31, 1677.

The following is an abstract of the first deed of land to Mr. Harris in Plainfield:

June 22, 1702, "John Winthrop of NewLondon in the Collony of conoectient and Wait Winthrop of Boston in the Collony of the massathusets Esqrs." in consideration of "three pounds currant silver money of newengland," deeded to Ebenezer Harris of Plainfield, "one twenty ackor lot lying and situate in the town of plainfield in the Quinabogue country."

The following abstracts indicate some of the other lands acquired by Mr. Harris:

March 2, 1703-4. "A Division of meadow Laid out to Ebenezar Harris being five acres and a quarter part of which is on the west side of the brook."

March 13, 1705, laid out to Ebenezer Harris  $1\frac{1}{2}$  acres, "being part of his first Division of twelve acres of plow land." Also 5,  $2\frac{1}{2}$ ,  $\frac{3}{4}$ , and  $2\frac{3}{4}$  acres.

March 6, 1707-8, laid out to Ebenezer Harris 41 acres.

"In the year 1709," laid out to Ebenezer Harris "Twelve acres of land in the common field in sd plainfield."

"In February, 1710-11, laid out to Ebenezer Harris 3 acres.

"The thirteenth hundred upon Equick hill weh Ebenezer Harris his hundred (Ebenezer Harris' hundred) by draft is bounded as followeth: begin-

ning at a white oak tree marked, and so running sixteen scor rods wosterly to a white oak tree marked, and from thence northerly fifty two rodds to a white oak tree marked, and from thence easterly sixteen scor rodds to a black birch tree marked, and from thence southerly fifty two rods to the first mentioned bound mark weh is the north bounds of the twelfth hundred, laid out and bounded by us

March 13, 1710-11, “Nathan Smith of Taunton, in the County of Bristol, in the province of the Massachusetts bay in newengland, husbandman,” in consideration of 100 acres of land to him secured, deeded to Ebenezer Harris of Plainfield, husbandman, land on Equick Hill in that place, numbered the twelfth hundred.

Dec. 27, 1711, the bounds of the twelfth lot on Black Hill, Plainfield, “which is Ebenezer Harris his lot,” were defined and recorded.

Dec. 29, 1711, Henry Stonors of Plainfield, in consideration of twelve acres of land in that place, deeded to Ebenezer Harris of the same town, a certain tract of land in Plainfield.

Ebenezer Harris died April 16, 1751, and his will of June 21, 1750, was proven May 14, 1751.

The following is a copy of that instrument:

“Jn the Name of God Amen This 21st Day of June 1750, J. Ebenezer Harris of plainfield jn ye County of Windham and Colony of Conecticutt being advanst jnto years and Weak jn Body yet of a Disposing mind: Thanks be to God therefor yete

Calling to mind ye mortality of my body and knowing that yt is appointed for all men once to Dye Do theire fore make this my Last Will and testament: and first of all J Recommend my sold jnto ye hands of God that Gave jt and my Body to ye Earth to be Decently buried at ye Dycrestion of my Executor jn Hopes of a Glorious Resurrection through ye merits of my Redcemer and as touching such Worldly Estate as it hath pleased God to bless me With in this Life after my gust Debts are paid J Give and Dyspose of ye same as followeth (viz)

J Give and Bequeath unto Christable my beloved Wife the dun mayer and Coult and one cow and six sheep and all my jndoor moveable Estate of What Kind so Ever to be at her own Dispose for Ever.

Jtem. J Give unto my son Ebenezer ye sum of five shillings.

Jtem. J Give unto my son Daniel all my Carpenters tools and joynors tools.

Jtem. J Give unto my son peter ye sum of five shillings old tenor.

Jtem. J Give unto my daughter sarah Bump ye sum of five shillings.

Jtem. J Give unto my daughter martha the Chest that Was her mothers and five shillings old tenor.

Jtem. J Give unto my daughter Elizabeth ye sum of five shillings old tenor.

Jtem. J Give unto my daughter Christabell ye sum of five shillings old tenor.

Jtem. J Give unto my daughter Ann ye sum of five shillings old tenor.

Jtem. J Give unto my daughter Mary ye sum of five shillings old tenor.



Item. J Give unto my Grand daughter mary Rude ye sum of five shillings, all to be paide by my Executor all in old tenor.

Item. J Give unto my son Nathan all ye Remainder of my Estate which sd Nathan J make ye sole Executor of this my Last Will and testament Rattificing and confirming this and No other to be my Last Will and testament. Signed sealed published pronounced and declared by ye sd Ebenezer Harris ye day and year above mentioned as his Last Will and testament jn presents of

Mrs. Harris survived her husband a little more than three years, and died September 17, 1754.

The following appears on the Plainfield probate records:

“Know all men by these Presents that We Josiah Bump and Sarah his Wife and William Parke and Christable his Wife and Stephen Rude as Gairdien to and for Stephen Rude his son aminor and ye onely Son and Heir to Mary Wife to sd Stephen and all of Plainfield Jn ye County of Windham Jn ye Colony of Conecticut and Ebenezer Adams and Elizabeth his Wife of Suffield Jn ye County of Hartford Jn sd Colony: Which Sarah, Elizabeth, Christable & Mary Ware ye onely Daughters of Mrs. Christable Harris Late Widow to mr. Ebenezer Harris of sd Plainfield Deceased and sd Christable sd Widow Js Now Deceased and sd Mary Js now Deceased and our Ever Hond mother Christable Deceased Left sum Estate to hur sd Daughters and Heirs and We Being Desireous to own and

take in our half Sister Martha Dow to Shair with us therein Excluding onely our sd Mothers Clothing: and ye sd Ebenezer Dow and Martha his Wife doth Consent Thereto: Therefore we all Mutually agree and Consent to ye following Condision & Divise that ye sd Sarah, Elizabeth, Christable and sd Stephen sd Minor to have ye Cloathing to ye amount of 85-13-0 old Tenor which is £21-8s-0d Each: and ye other to ye amount of £41 to Each which sum we to Each of us ye sd Sarah, Elizabeth, Martha, Christable and Stephen Guardiën to s minor have allredy Received: so that we ye sd Sarah, Christabell, Elizabeth and Stephen as Guardiën to sd Stephen aminor have Received £61-18s and sd Martha £45-14s which sums we have allredy Received Jnto our hands In Witness Whereof We have hereunto sett our hands and seals this 18th Day of November 1754.

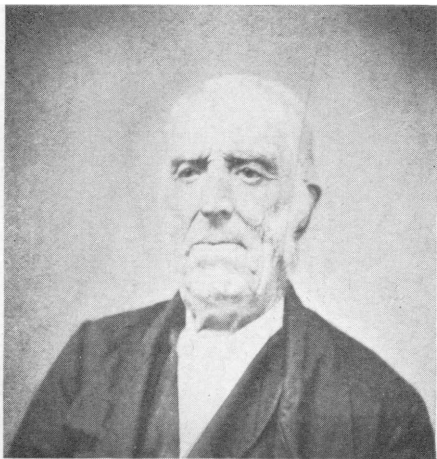

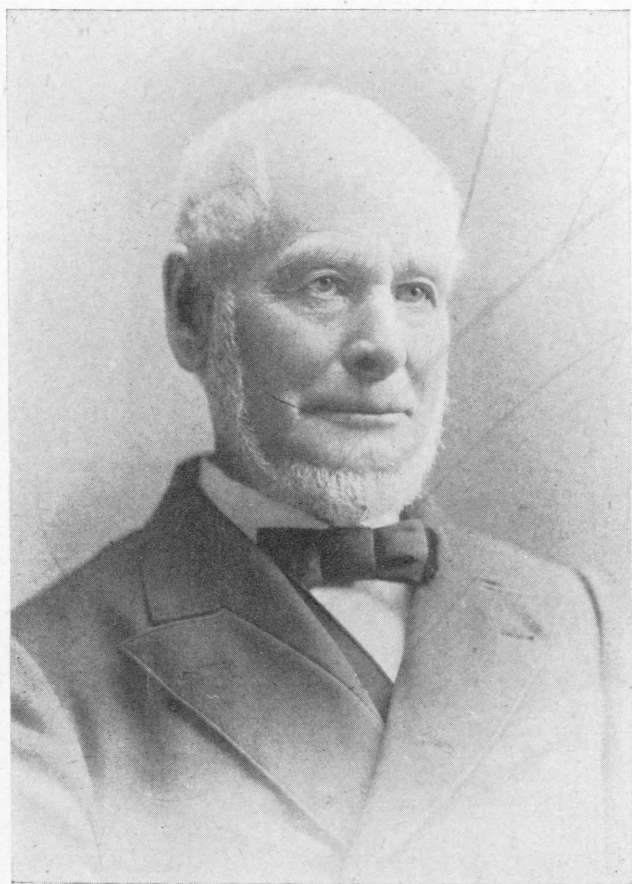

#### NOTE.

There was a tradition or belief held by Nathan Wait Harris (62), and others of his and the preceding

generation, that one *Peter Harris* was the first English ancestor who settled in America. Careful search has failed to reveal such an ancestor.

Mrs. W. S. Fuller of Saratoga Springs, with her father—Truman Harris—visited Becket, Massachusetts, and Plainfield, Connecticut, in 1878 for the special purpose of investigating the Harris genealogy, but failed to find such an ancestor, and the name Peter Harris does not appear in any of the published lists of the early settlers of New England. Mrs. Fuller is a trained genealogist and she believes that the above tradition had its origin in the fact that Ebenezzer Harris (15) married for his second wife Christabel Crary, who was a daughter of PETER CRARY. They named one of their children Peter (26).

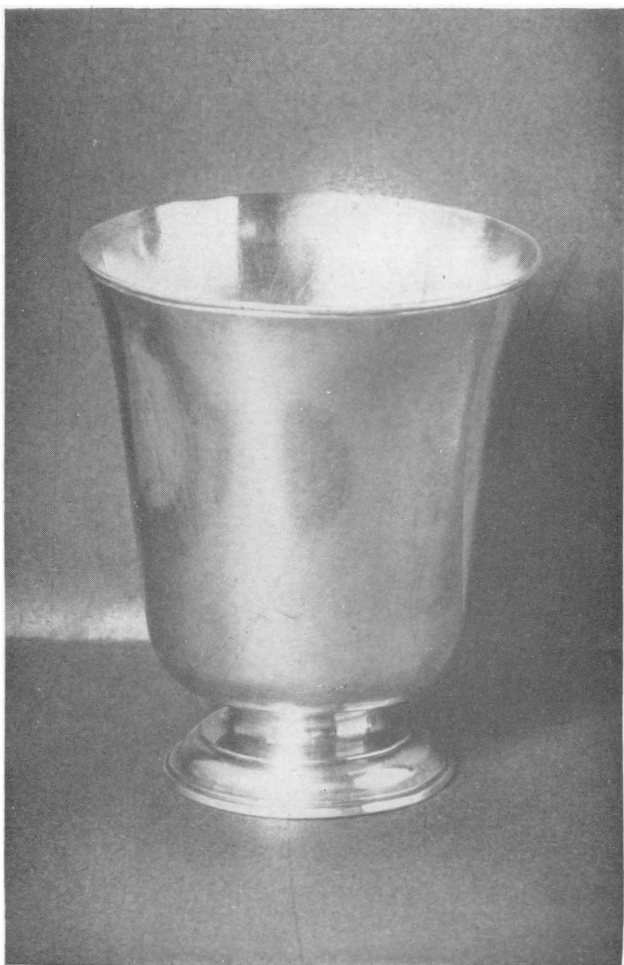

chusets Bay in N. england," 34 acres and 26 rods of land in Preston.

Daniel Harris married in Preston, for his first wife, November 18, 1726, Mary Bullard, by whom he had three daughters, and who died November 2, 1737-8. He married, for his second wife, March 7, 1738-9, Lydia Hill of Preston, by whom he had three sons and four daughters, and who died January 26, 1767. When a little over seventy years of age, or February 10, 1771, he married, for his third wife, Hannah Benjamin of Plainfield, Connecticut, by whom he had no children. Nine months thereafter, or November 25, that year, he died. There is no record of his will, inventory or distribution of estate, and the antecedents of his wives do not appear on the records.

21. RICHARD, baptized November 25, 1705, was published with Martha Foster, May 10, 1735, she being a daughter of Jacob and Martha Foster of Ipswich, in which place she was born the "16th of the 10th month 1710." At the time of the capture, James Harris secured a silver drinking cup belonging to General Prescott. It is now in the possession of his great-granddaughter, Mrs. George V. Wendell of New York.<sup>4</sup>

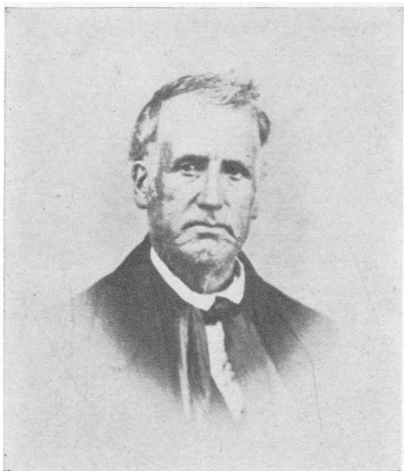

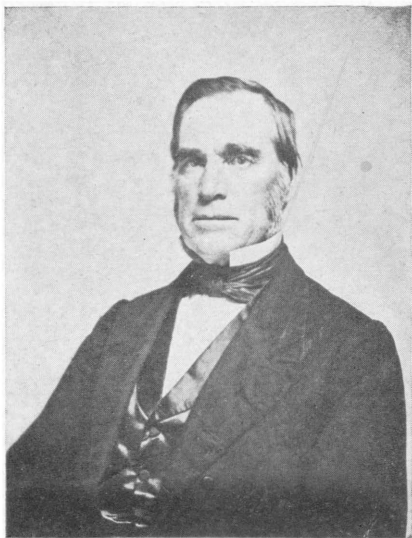

### ENGLISH ANCESTRY OF THOMAS HARRIS (1).

The English ancestry of *Thomas Harris* of *Charlestown* has not yet (1909) been definitely established. It has been assumed from statements in Savage's "General Dictionary of First Settlers in New England" and in the "New England Genealogical and Antiquarian Register,"<sup>1</sup> that *Thomas Harris* of *Charleston* came from the parish of St. Stephens, near St. Albans, ———, England. The parish records have been examined by an English expert; and the entries of the baptism (or birth) of a Thomas Harris and of the burial of Ralph Harris were found, as follows:

Since there were *three* persons named Thomas Harris who came to America about 1630—the other two settling in Rhode Island and Virginia—it remains to be proved that the above mentioned Thomas, son of Ralph

1. THOMAS COOKE, the elder, of Pebmershe, County Essex, England, ycoman, died in 1621, as his will of August 30, that year, was proven November 26th following. As his wife's name does not appear in that instrument, the inference is that she was dead at the time it was drawn. The following is an abstract of his will:

To the poor of the parish of Pebmershe, five pounds. To the poor of Alphanston and Lamarshe, in Essex, twenty shillings, (*i. e.* ten shillings each). These bequests to be distributed by the discretion of the minister and the most chiefest inhabitants of either parish. Five pounds more to the poor of Pebmershe as an increase of the stock of twenty pounds given to them by Mr. Hugh Clapham, sometime the minister of the same parish, to purchase a house or lands, &c.

To Thomas Cooke, my grandchild, my messuage, &c., called Goddard's, and all my lands, &c., which I late purchased of John Hilton, gent. and Mary, his wife, situate &c. in Gestingthorp and Little Mapsted, Essex, now in the occupation of John Clark or his assigns.

To my brother Lawrence Cooke and Robert Cooke, during their natural lives, to either of them, forty shillings apiece, yearly.

To Thomas Wiscoe the younger, my sister's son, five pounds.

To every of the children of my brother, John Cooke, deceased, my sister Wiscoe, and my sister Sawen, deceased, and my brother Lawrence, not before nominated and bequeathed unto, twenty shillings apiece.

To George Cooke, my grandchild, all such my lands, estate, interest and term of years which I have yet to come in lands, &c., in Lamarshe, Essex, which I late had by demise and grant of one Robert Beele of Lamarshe.

I do forgive unto Edmund Reade, my son-in-law, the three score pounds due unto me by his bill of 1 December, 1606.

To my daughter Elizabeth, now his wife, three score pounds in one year after my decease.

To my said daughter Elizabeth, and to Margaret, her daughter, now wife of John Lake, and to Susan, now wife of my son Thomas, to every one of them, one spur Raill of gold apiece.

To Samuel Reade, my grandchild, forty pounds, and every of the residue of my daughter Reade's children, unmarried, ten pounds apiece, to be paid within one year after my decease unto them or their father for them.

To every of the children of Thomas Cooke, my son, twenty pounds apiece.

The residue &c. to Thomas Cooke, the younger, my son, whom I make sole executor. If he refuse, then I make Edmund Reade, my son-in-law, sole executor.

I give to Martha Reade, now the wife of ——— Epps,<sup>1</sup> of London, my grandchild, ten pounds, in one month after my decease.

To Johane Gilot, my late servant, twenty shillings.

To Maryon Edwards, Clement Chaundler and Elizabeth Hayward, five shillings apiece, and to William Scott, George Smith and Samuel Medcalf, three shillings, four pence, apiece, and to Thomas Maninge, Thomas French and Richard Goodwyn, two shillings, six pence, apiece.

Witnesses: George Coe, Robert Willms and Thomas Smithe.

2. ELIZABETH COOKE, a daughter of Thomas Cooke, the elder, of Pebmershe, County Essex, married Edmund Reade (sometimes called Colonel), of Wickford, in the same county.

3. MARGARET READE, a daughter of Edmund and Elizabeth (Cooke) Reade, married John Lake of Irby (or Erby), England. After the death of her husband, the widow, with her daughters Hannah and Martha, came to New England in the ship "Abigail," and arrived on these shores October 6, 1635.

4. MARTHA LAKE, a daughter of John and Margaret (Reade) Lake, married November 15, 1647, Thomas Harris of Ipswich, Massachusetts.

1. PIPPIN<sup>1</sup> of Heristal, Austrasian Mayor of the Palace under the last Merovingian kings; died A. D. 714.

2. KARL (or Charles), surnamed "Martel" (the Hammer), third son of Pippin of Heristal, was born about 688, and in 715 (or 714) became undisputed Mayor of the Palace and real ruler of the Franks, the titular kings being mere puppets in his hands. He died October 22, 741, at Quiercy on the Oise, leaving two sons—Pippin and Carloman.

3. PIPPIN I., called "the Short," acquired his brother Carloman's half of their father's kingdom about 747, when the latter retired to a monastery in that year. In 751 he was crowned King of the Franks by the English monk St. Boniface, at Soissons, Childeric—the last of the Merovingians—having been deposed. He married Bertrada and had two sons, of whom the eldest was Charles, known later as Charles the Great. Pippin died in 768.

4. CHARLEMAGNE<sup>1</sup> (or Charles the Great), King of the Franks (768-814), and Roman Emperor (800-814), was born April 2, 742, perhaps at Aix-la-Chapelle. He married (1) a daughter of Desiderius, King of the Lombards, but returned her to her father be-

cause she bore him no children. He married (2) Hildegard, daughter of the Swabian duke, Godfrey. He died January 28, 814, and was buried in a cathedral of his own erection at Aix-la-Chapelle (Aachen).

5. LOUIS I., "Debonarius," or the Pious, third son of Charlemagne and Hildegard, King of Aquitania (781-814) and Emperor (814-840). He married (1) Irmingard and (2) Judith the Fair, of the Welf house of Bavaria.

6. CHARLES II., "the Bald," fourth son of Louis I. by Judith. He was King of Neustria and Burgundy (840-877), and Emperor and King of Italy (875-877). He married Ermentrudis, by whom he had Louis "the Stammerer."

7. LOUIS II., "the Stammerer," King of France (877-879). Married Princess Adelheid.

8. CHARLES III.,<sup>1</sup> "the Simple," third son of Louis II. and Adelheid, King of France (892-929). He was opposed by Odo and Robert—Counts of Anjou—and Rodolph, Duke of Burgundy, who broke his power at the battle of Soissons in 923. Rodolph became King of the West Franks (923-936). Charles the Simple married the Princess Edgiva, granddaughter of Alfred the Great of England, by whom he had Louis "d'Outremer."

9. LOUIS III. (IV.), "d'Outremer," King of France (936-954); and married in 939 the Princess Gerberge (or *a*), daughter of Henry the Fowler, Emperor of Germany.

10. CHARLES, DUKE OF LOWER LORRAINE,<sup>1</sup> second son of Louis d'Outremer and Gerberge. On the death of his childless nephew, Louis V.—the "Faineant," or Sluggard (grandson of Louis III.)—the great barons chose Hugh Capet King of France in his

stead, and Charles died fighting for the crown. The reason for the exclusion of Charles is to be found in the words which the old chronicle puts in the mouth of Bishop Adalberon—"what dignity could we confer upon Charles, who hath not honor for his guide, who is enfeebled by lethargy, and who, finally, hath lost head so far that he hath no shame in serving a foreign king (Otto III. of Germany, Emperor), and in misuniting himself to a woman taken from the ranks of the knights, his vassals;"<sup>2</sup>

CHARLES married (1) Bonne, daughter of Godefroi d'Ardenne, and (2) Lady Agnes, daughter of Henry, Count of Vermandois and Troyes.

11. GERBERGE, COUNTESS OF LORRAINE,<sup>1</sup> daughter of Charles of Lorraine and (presumably) Lady Agnes;<sup>4</sup> married Lambert I, Count of Louvain and had—

12. LAMBERT II., DUKE OF LORRAINE AND COUNT OF LOUVAIN, married Ode, daughter of Godelon, Count of Lorraine and son of Duke Charles; died 1061 (?).

13. HENRY II., DUKE OF LOWER LORRAINE AND OF BRABANT, son of Lambert II and Ode; died 1075 (?), leaving a son, Godfred.

14. GODFRED I., DUKE OF LOWER LORRAINE AND BRABANT,<sup>3</sup> married (1) Ida, daughter of Albert, third Count of Namur; (2) Sophia, daughter of Henry IV., Emperor of Germany. Died 1140.

15. COUNTESS ADELICIA (or Adeliza), the Fair

18. ROBERT TATTESHALL II., the first to bear the title of "Baron," being summoned under this designation to the Parliament of 1295; married Joan, daughter of Ralph Fitz-Ranulph, Lord of Middleham, York.

19. EMMA DE TATTESHALL,<sup>1</sup> daughter of Robert II. and Joan; married Adam de Cailly (or Cayley), Lord of Court Manners.<sup>1</sup>

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JOSIAH BARTLETT, born in Amesbury, Massachusetts, November, 1728, died May 19, 1795: married Mary B of Newton, New Hampshire, at Kingston, on January 15, 1754 (she died 1789); 1765, elected representative from Kingston to the Legislature of the Colony of Massachusetts, 1770-1775. Lieutenant-Colonel and Colonel of the Seventh regiment of militia; delegate to the Continental Congress at Philadelphia, 1775-1776, and second member to sign the Declaration of Independence: May to November, 1778, member of the Continental Congress at Yorktown. He performed valuable services in collecting and recruiting soldiers during the Revolutionary War and was created Muster Master in 1780: in the same year he was appointed Chief Justice of the Court of Common Pleas, but in 1782 he succeeded Judge Thornton on the Supreme Court of New Hampshire, of which he became Chief Justice in 1788. 7. MILES HALL, born November 22, 1795; died April, 1857; married December 31, 1813, Polly Wheelock (born December 9, 1795, and died in Kalamazoo, Mich., February 22, 1881).

8. AMANDA J. HALL born January 1, 1834, near Cleveland, Ohio; married Russell Edward Morey (born Hartwick, New York, April, 1825, and died in California, July 19, 1853) in Kalamazoo, Michigan, on January 1, 1850; their daughter was Ella I. Morey.
