INTRODUCTION

This little book does not pretend to be a real genealogy, but merely a record of some of the descendants of John Hoskins of Plymouth, England, who came to America in 1630.

It is hoped that some one better qualified in such work will, by adding to it, correct such errors as have crept into it in spite of all our care. We cannot take the blame for the omissions, but must hold those responsible who did not reply to the letters sent to them or failed to send in their change of addresses.

Where differences in dates are found, the historian took the one which was found most frequently, whether in private or public records.

No one who has not attempted this type of work, can ever realize the care needed to avoid mistakes or the labor required for correcting them. We have found in the labor of collecting and arranging this material for this history, a very pleasant but an expensive pastime. If our labor shall prove acceptable to the large family in whose behalf it has been performed, we shall certainly never regret the weariness or the expense or the criticism.

The following notes were taken from the book,
"GOOD OLD DORCHESTER" by William Dana
Orcutt. A narrative history of the town 1630-1893.

"A common purpose made these people, who were almost unknown to each other, the closest friends. The Rev. John White of Trinity Parish, Dorchester, in Dorset, England had been the means of persuading them to make this strike for liberty and happiness. Rev. White had given his assistance and money to the settlers at Plymouth. He has been termed the Patriarch of Dorchester by his contemporaries and the father of Mass. Colony by later writers. As he did not regard the ceremonial to be of vital importance, he did not separate from the church.

His moderation however, made him unpopular with the authorities and the Cavalry of Prince Rupert destroyed his house and carried away his library, forcing him to go to London.

He interpreted the scriptures with clarity. He was Rector of Trinity over 40 years. Yet New Dorchester within whose boundaries he never set foot, probably remembers him better than does Old Dorchester in whose behalf he labored so long. What better monument than that which his own exertions raised for him in the new world?

The emigrants met together in the new hospital in Plymouth, England, and associated themselves into church fellowship, choosing Mr. John Maverick and Mr. John Warham to be their ministers and leaders. The early part of the day was occupied by a farewell sermon by Mr. White and the latter part in completing arrangements for voyage.

They set sail from Plymouth on the 20th of March 1630 in the "Mary and John", a ship of 400 tons' burden, commanded by Capt. Squeb.

No one knows who was discoverer of Boston Harbor, but the first record of it was made in 1614 by Capt. J. Smith. He gave the coast the name of New England, sailing with a crew of 8 men. He named the Charles River, altho only knowledge was from Winslow

Preparations were made to gather emigrants for a great colony and a fleet of 14 vessels was the result. The "Mary and John" was the first ship to arrive, having on board 140 souls. Chief among the company besides the ministers were Messrs. Clap, Rossiter, Ludlow, Glover, Johnson, Terry, Smith, Gallope, Hull, Stoughton, Cogan, Hill, Southcote, Lovell, Duncan, Pinney, Richards, Way, Williams and Tilly.

Capt. Roger Clap, Rossiter and Ludlow acted in capacity of Assistants of Directors of the Stockholders. Men such as Henry Wolcott, Thomas Ford, George Dyer, William Gaylord, William Rockwell, and William Phelps had good standing as the older members of the party.

Capt. John Mason, Richard Southcote and Quartermaster John Smith possessed military experience.

The largest portion of company naturally consisted of young men, such as Isreal Stoughton, Roger Clap, George Minott, George Hale, Richard Collicot and Nathaniel Duncan.

The voyage tho a long one was not uncomfortable and the ship reached Nantasket Point, the present Hull, on the 30th of May (O.S.) 1630. The landing showed the calm spirit which had taken possession of these emigrants. One by one they left the "Mary and John" and as their feet touched the soil of the new World, each offered a silent prayer of thanksgiving, then after all had assembled they are said to have joined in the following hymn:

Thou Lord has beene our sure defence

It had been understood that the voyagers were to be brought to the Charles River, but owing to either a misunderstanding or to perversity on the part of Capt. Squeb they were put ashore on the Point, "a forlorn wilderness, destitute of any habitation and most other comforts of life".

A month after settlement of Dorchester colonists the rest of fleet with Gov. Winthrop's "Arbella" at head, arrived at Salem, and decided to settle on point of land which was called Charlestown in honor of Charles I. They remained a short time and crossed river to Shawmut (which means "near the neck") as the present Boston was then called.

Dorchester was first settlement in what is now Suffolk Co., but it was not until 4 months later that it received the name by which it is now known. It might be in Honour of Rev. White of Dorchester, England. It is interesting to see where Old Dorchester received her name. It was once known as Durnovaria, derived from two Celtic words - Dwr or Dwyr and Var, which signify "water and way". Thus it meant water-way or channel. Later town made seat of Government for that part of country and changed name to Dorchester.

There was great terror of rattle snakes with which the country swarmed, and of dangerous animals which prowled by night. The Indians too whose disposition toward the white men was entirely unknown were a source of anxiety by night and day. There had been a treaty signed by the Indians and English at Plymouth in 1621.

The Indians brought corn to trade. Some supplies were sent from Holland and from Ireland and corn came from Virginia but there was much hunger.

Capt. Clap once remarked, "I do not remember ever I did wish in my heart that I had not come into this country or wish myself back again to my father's house: Yea I advised some of my dear brethren to come hither also".

1633 marked an important epoch in progress of Colony. They chose Selectmen or Townsmen. 12 were chosen to order affairs of Plantation, having monthly meetings. The names are not given but the 1634 record give the names of Mr. Newbury, Mr. Stoughton, Mr. Woolcott, Mr. Duncan, Goodman, Phelps, Mr. Hathorne, Mr. Williams, George Minot, George Gibbes and Mr. Smith. The first order was dated Oct. 8, 1633.

On Oct. 19, 1630, 24 men became freemen. Among them John Hoskins, William Gaylord, Bigot (Bogot), Eggleston and the two ministers. Others (64) became freemen later, among them Walter Filer (brother of Ann) and Jonathan Gillett.

It is now known how land was divided but freemen enjoyed division of land. Probably private means, size of families were taken into consideration. Largest landholders were those who held stock in England under patent. Each stockholder to amount of 50 pounds entitled to an immediate dividend of 200 acres, a home lot in America and 50 acres for each member of his family. Those without stock could claim 50 acres for head of family and as much more as the governor and council might award. 50 acres to master for every servant transported to the Colony.

All undivided and unallotted land extending from Blue Hills to Plymouth line was given in 1637 to town of Dorchester. The grant being confirmed by General Court in 1720. This contained 40,000 acres. After 1707 it was known as the "Great Grant".

Dorchester was chosen by early settlers on account of the abundant pasturage Great Neck (South Boston) afforded their cattle.

The summer of 1638 Winthrop tells us there came over 20 ships and at least 3,000 persons."

EXCERPTS FROM DIFFERENT SOURCES

In the book "Bronson and Box" by Mrs. Harriet F. Parker, Copyrighted 1902 on page 285 Admiral Sir Anthony Hoskins of London makes the following statement:

The Hoskins Family originally went with William the Conqueror from Nuremburg, Germany to England in 1066. The first Hoskins was an Earl and he became the founder of the English "Hoskins" Family.

Today in Nuremburg people of distinction bear the name of Hoskins. The name was spelled in various ways, the following being a few of the most common: Hoskyne, Hosken, Hoskin, Honsking, Hoaskins, Harskins, Harskines, Haskin, Haskyn, Haskings, Hasken, Hoskon, Hiskin, Hausken, Haskens, Horskin, Harskin, Harskins, Hodgskins, Askens, Asken, Hotchkiss, Hopking, Hoskell, Hawkins, Hutchins, Hodgkins, Hoskinson, and Hodgkinson. Today the prevalent spellings are Hoskins, Haskins, Hoskin and Haskin.

The following paragraph is taken from a letter dated Aug. 12, 1953 from Alice Hoskins to Luella H. Nitschke:

"We are descendants of John Hoskins who was a Baron in Herefordshire, England. He with others fled to America during the period of Charles I, the King who taxed the rich to furnish ships. He left a son John b. 1612 in England who became the Baron and head of the Hoskins (Hoskyns) family there. There was also a Sir Clement Hoskyns, Dean of Corpus Christus College in Cambridge, who translated the Bible in recent years for the Original. He had a daughter, Lady Alice Hoskyns who married the titled lad who was the personal secretary of the Prince of Wales before his marriage."

The Hoskins Genealogist, Chesterland, Ohio, reported the following recently:

"Three hundred and forty years ago (1616) a man named Nicholas Hoskins stepped from the ship "Edwin" on to the eastern shore of Virginia. In the years that followed other men named Hoskins came to America from England and Ireland. John Hoskins came from Plymouth, England to Connecticut in 1630 on the ship "Mary and John", Robert Hoskins settled in Virginia in 1670. William Hoskins landed at Taunton, Massachusetts in 1645. Thomas Hoskins came to North Carolina in 1670. Dr. Hoskins and Rev. Peter Hoskins came to Providence and later removed to Pennsylvania before 1700. By 1790 there were at least 150 Hoskins families in the U.S.A. with about 900 members."

There have been many different descriptions of the voyage to America from England in 1630. The following was taken from the book, "From Under a Colonial Roof-Tree" by Arria S. Huntington and was found in the Syracuse Genealogical Library.

"The Great Emigration of 1630 brought hither nearly 100 Anglicans in eleven vessels under the leadership of John Winthrop, who later became Governor. This resulted in the settlement of Boston. It was preceded by an advance guard of 140 emigrants "Godly families and people" in the ship "Mary and John", which sailed March 20, 1630 from Plymouth and arrived in America May 30, 1630. This ship of 400 tons was in charge of Capt. Thomas Squibb (or Squeb) and her passengers came from the Counties of Dorset, Somerset and Devon. They were under the leadership of Rev. John Maverick and Rev. John Warham, two clergymen of the established church of England who had broken away from its practices. (These two ministers' names head the list of members on a plaque at the left of the altar in the Windsor Church across from the Walter Filer House, built in 1640 and still standing.) This was not an independent movement as it was known to and encouraged by the Winthrop contingent which was in process of formation in London.

The "Mary and John" was 19 days at sea before the Winthrop fleet started from Solent.

The destination was to be Mattapan but Capt. Squibb apparently did not deem it his obligation to go there and it was not until the arrival of the Winthrop fleet that the controversy was adjusted. Instead of anchoring in the Charles River as had been planned, Capt. Squibb disembarked the whole company in a wild spot at Nantasket where they were left for one week to shift for themselves. At the end of the week they were picked up and set down with thanksgiving at Dorchester (now a part of Boston), Mass. The following winter brought severe privations. Permanent dwellings were erected during the summer months.

Their historian says: They suffered Hunger and saw no hope in an Eye of Reason to be supplied, only by Clams and Muscles and Fish. It was not accounted a strange thing in those Days to drink Water and to eat Samp or Hominie without butter and Milk".

It is related that "a good man, who had asked his neighbor to a dish of clams, after dinner returned thanks to God, who had given them to suck of the abundance of the seas and of treasure hid in the sands."

Even Groundnuts and acorns were articles of food, and the Indians who brought their own stores of corn were welcomed as benefactors.

Yet the minds of these high-spirited adventurers were not occupied alone with material necessities or daunted by discomforts. Their deepest concern was for security in political and religious privileges. With their Anglo-Saxon birthright of liberty came a conviction of their right of self-government. The belief of the Puritans in individual responsibility to Divine law was intense. To them the sacredness of personality was embodied in the citizens, or "free-men".

On the day of sailing from Plymouth, England, a church had been organized. Of their ten weeks on the ocean one of the number wrote: "So we came by the good hand of the Lord through the deeps comfortably, having Preaching and expounding of the Word of God every day."

By 1636 the Dorchester Church had lost its first pastor, Rev. Maverick. Soon afterwards about half the members with other Dorchester residents followed Rev. Warham to a new settlement in Conn. This became the present town of Windsor. Later other colonies from Roxbury, Cambridge, then called Newtown, Hartford and Wethersfield formed part of this active and hopeful community and a General Court was instituted. At that meeting Rev. Hooker maintained that "the foundation of authority is laid in the free consent of the people".

The Constitution then adopted by the freemen of the three towns was the "first known to history that created a Government, and it marked the beginning of American democracy." Its federation of independent towns, its extended suffrage, the different form of representation in the Assembly and the upper House, all formed a republican government similar to that adopted later by the U. S.

EXCERPTS FROM HOSKINS REUNION RECORDS

1904 - 1956

The Hoskins Picnic was organized Aug. 23, 1904 through the earnest efforts of Willis G. Hoskins and a picnic was held on that day at Lake Side Park at the foot of Owasco Lake. Sarah A. Lyon was the first Secretary.

At the second picnic (1905) Mrs. Hetty Underhill was appointed Historian. Also at this picnic it was decided that our Annual picnic should be held on the third Wed. in Aug. unless necessarily changed. At this picnic a request by Willis Hoskins and Mrs. Ida Simpson was made at the Pavilion to either make or hire our coffee made. This was refused, so they walked a quarter of a mile to the first house where they were allowed to make it.

At the third picnic (1906) the coffee was purchased by the cup at the Pavilion. At this picnic Edson Gillette of Marcellus attended and during his remarks, requested that while he was not related to the Hoskins' family except by the marriage of his great Aunt Thirza Gillette to Gaylord Hoskins, he would like to be adopted into the Hoskins family.

At the fourth picnic (1907) Mrs. Sarah A. Lyon sent in her resignation as Secretary due to illness and Eleanor H. Baker was elected to fill her place. At this picnic a committee was appointed to find all the facts possible of the Hoskins Family. Mrs. Sarah Lyon was appointed to find out and give a complete list of the living descendants and their addresses of the Alson Hoskins family; Mrs. Martha Hoskins to do the same on the Harlow Hoskins family and Mrs. Hetty Underhill on the Pierre Hoskins family.

At the fifth picnic (1908) Mrs. Hetty Underhill gave a very interesting report on the Hoskins History, but due to being unable to ascertain certain facts to make the history complete, it was decided not to have it recorded by the secretary until completed which she thought she could have accomplished before the next picnic. It was voted at this meeting that what expense was incurred by the historian in obtaining the missing fact should be paid at our next picnic by our members.

At the sixth picnic (1909) Mrs. Hetty Underhill gave another very interesting report on the Hoskins Family. She had worked very faithfully during the year, had been to Connecticut and searched the records but was unable to find the missing link to complete the history. Altho her expenses had been promised at the previous picnic she refused this.

At the seventh picnic (1910) it was voted to notify each family two weeks before the picnic hoping to interest more members and have a better attendance. A collection was then taken to defray the expenses of postage, cards, etc. This first collection was \$1.21.

At the eighth picnic (1911) it was voted that all members who are not able to attend the next picnic, be requested to write the President or Secretary. At this meeting a collection of \$5.72 was taken to defray expenses of postage, cards, coffee etc.

Before our ninth annual picnic (1912) a new Pavilion had been built at the Park. At this time Mrs. Thirza Edwards was elected Historian.

At the tenth picnic (1913) Mrs. Sarah Lyon was elected Historian. Mr. Amasa Parker proposed that the records of our previous Historian, Mrs. Underhill be secured and filed with the Secretary. At this meeting a collection of \$4.00 was taken, making a total of \$12.29 in the Treasury. Expenses were paper 48¢, cards and

postage 75¢, coffee \$1.60, making a total of \$2.83 and leaving a balance of \$9.46.

At the eleventh picnic (1914) the Secretary received a letter from James Hoskins of St. Louis, Mo. requesting that his son's name, Arthur C. Hoskins be added to the list of members of the Hoskins Family. At this meeting the Historian, Mrs. Sarah Lyon suggested that each family be appointed to continue the History of the family. The President, Willis Hoskins thought the History complete with the exception of the connecting link, that cannot be found, might be completed by the Historian as far as possible and put in shape to preserve.

At the twelfth picnic (1915) the President Willis Hoskins suggested that the younger people be put in office so that they would be encouraged to attend. Gaylord Hoskins was elected President. At the same time Luella Hoskins suggested that we have two Historians instead of one and Leland Hoskins and Winifred Hoskins were elected. At this meeting it was first voted that dinner should be served at 1 P. M.

From the twelfth to the twenty-third reunions there did not seem to be very much of importance reported.

At the twenty-fourth reunion (1927) it was voted to combine the Secretary and Treasurer offices.

At the twenty-seventh reunion (1930) the name of the Park was changed to Enna-Jettick Park and a large covered picnic area was added. At this picnic it was again mentioned that Willis Hoskins started the picnics.

At the thirty-first reunion (1934) it was voted that the Secretary should answer all letters of regret sent in answer to cards of invitation sent out. At this reunion there was a new committee consisting of Luella Hoskins, Mrs. Satie Hoskins and Stella Finn, appointed to find the missing link which Mrs. Hetty Underhill had never been able to find. There had been no Historian appointed since our 23rd picnic in 1926. Mrs. Anna Hoskins had served from 1920/1926. The same committee of Historians continued until 1947. No one appointed in 1948

Mrs. Eleanor H. Baker continued as Secretary-Treasurer actively until 1948 when due to her illness, Mrs. Frances W. Hoskins acted as Secretary. From then until 1951 Mrs. Stella D. Finn acted as Secretary-Treasurer. In 1952 she was elected to that office.

The thirty-ninth reunion (1942) was held, altho the Park was closed. No more reunions were held until Tues. July 30, 1946 due to the war, shortage of gas, etc. This our fortieth reunion was held because Mr. and Mrs. Joseph Hamilton were here from Michigan. We gathered about 6 P. M. for supper. No notices were sent out as it was suddenly decided to have it. At this reunion the time of gathering was changed to either the first or last Wed. of July, whenever the Hamiltons could come.

During this lapse of time the name of the Park had been changed to Emerson Park.

At the forty-first reunion (1947) it was decided to have the picnic the 3rd Wed. in July.

At the forty-second reunion (1948) it was decided to change from the mid-day meal to supper at 6 P. M. to better accommodate people working in shops, etc. The date to remain the same, the 3rd Wed. in July.

At the forty-third reunion (1949) Mrs. Luella H. Nitschke was elected Historian with Leland Hoskins as Assistant.

At the forty-fourth reunion (1950) Historians Mrs. Luella H. Nitschke and Mrs. Satie Hoskins were elected. At this meeting the picnic dinner was changed back to 1 P. M. of the third Wed. in July. \$8.70 collection was taken. Held in Auburn Savings

Bank was \$19.76 making a total of \$28.46. Expenses for coffee, cream, ice and paper for tables were \$7.85, leaving a balance of \$20.61.

At the forty-seventh reunion (1953) the date was changed to the 4th Wed. in July. At this picnic it was decided not to take a collection as were collecting interest. Balance on hand was \$22.65. Expenses were \$5.23 leaving \$17.42 to be carried over. At this time a committee was formed of Stella Finn, Frances Hoskins, Ed. Hoskins, Sr., and Vivian Hoskins with the Historian, Luella H. Nitschke as chairman to prepare the geneological information for printing.

At the forty-eighth reunion (1954) it was voted to buy a coffee pot as it was thought we had imposed on the good nature of the Half Acre Church long enough. Lynn and Lloyd Hoskins, sons of Harold and Evelyn Hoskins born April 23, 1954 are believed to be the first male twins bearing the name of Hoskins to be born in Cayuga County since Fred E. and Frank M. Hoskins born Oct. 18, 1867 (87 years ago). During the past year our Historian, Luella H. Nitschke went to Hartford, Conn., where she found the name of Gaylord Hoskins' father, Asa, the missing link for which we have long been searching. The Draper Index of the Revolutionary War Pension Lists, Conn. State Archives, State Library, Hartford, Conn. lists Asa Hoskins as the Revolutionary War Soldier under whom the children of Hitty Clark Adams, widow of Rhoderick Adams, qualified for pension in Onondaga County, New York. At this time Alice Hoskins (H. H.), Geneologist of E. Windsor Hill, Conn. was present.

At the forty-ninth reunion (1955) the picnic was again held on the 3rd Wed. in July and was voted to be held on the same date in 1956.

At the FIFTIETH REUNION (1956) a Photographer took a picture of those present. A collection of \$15.30 was taken. Expenses were \$7.04 leaving \$8.26 to be added to a balance of \$13.62, making a total balance on hand of \$21.88.

Willis Hoskins was President 12 years from 1904-1915. He attended 26 successive reunions.

HOSKINS HISTORY

1630 - 1957

On the 20th of March 1630, the ship "Mary and John" set sail from Plymouth, England for America. Among the passengers was John Hoskins a Baronet of Hereford shire and his son Thomas, who was a young man and the second son of John and his wife who had died in England. Thomas was born in 1610. His brother, John Hoskins, had remained on his father's estate in England and was the ancestor of the present line of Sir Edwin Clement Hoskyns, who is a Baronet.

She left a share of her property to her granddaughter, Mary Hoskins Marshall and John Hoskins, son of her step-son Thomas Hoskins. John and Ann had three children.

Perhaps his cousin Elisah Clark walked with him as he later settled in Syracuse. Elisah was a son of Ashel and Elizabeth Clark. Gaylord engaged in shoe making for 30 years, carrying on a thriving business. He and Thirza attended the Howlett Hill Universalist Church while they lived at Onondaga Hill. Gaylord was a very good man. At his death the following was written about him: "Mr. Hoskins was one of those men of whom it can be truly said, 'the world was made better by his having lived in it for nearly three score years and ten'. In his quiet way he made many friends who miss him sorely now. His thoughts were of others more than of himself, helping those who needed his help, being a friend to those upon whom the world looked down. Honest and upright in every way, never knowingly wronging anyone, believing always that doing unto others as you would that others do unto you to be one of the cardinal principles of right living." Mr. Hoskins was very deaf and was deprived of his sight for 5 yrs, having to give up his shoe making business. When his vision was restored he engaged in Agricultural work. He first bought a 65 acre farm in Onondaga Co. Then in 1841 he purchased and moved to a 157 acre farm in town of Springport, Cayuga Co. Later he moved to Fleming, Cayuga Co.
