INTRODUCTION.

DURING a visit to Chester County, Pa., in the summer of 1884, the writer made copies of some family records and obtained a little information relating to his ancestors and early relatives in the Hambleton line; and as interest in the subject increased, he opened correspondence with members of different branches of the family, as their names and addresses were gradually ascertained, with the hope of at least tracing out the immigrating ancestor and finding out whence he came. This work was commenced for the writer's own satisfaction, but others expressed such an interest in the matter that it was soon determined to prepare for publication, in form of a family record, such information as might be collected, and to trace out the different branches of the family as far as practicable.

With the effort and research thus far made, the earliest known ancestor found is James Hambleton, of Solebury, Bucks County, Pa., a Quaker, and a member of Buckingham Monthly Meeting in 1720, as shown by the records of that meeting. He died in 1751, leaving a large farm and a family of children, which are mentioned in his will. From whence he came is yet a matter of tradition and inference. Most of his descendants in the male lines, including the children of the women who were born Hambletons, have been traced out and recorded, and whatever knowledge they possessed relating to the earlier generations of the family earnestly solicited. The records of wills and deeds in Bucks County

tween them, and lived on it; that the name was Hamilton and not Hambleton, but William's second wife changed the *il* to *ble*, and her children took that name, and it was then taken up by Stephen's family. She had never heard of James Hambleton, the father of William and Stephen, though she still lives on a part of the original Hambleton farm, is very bright and intelligent, and possesses much knowledge of earlier generations of the family.

Now, as will appear by the record, William and Stephen were without doubt both born in Bucks County; their father James had before them owned the farms on which they lived, and the name is uniformly spelled with *ble*, in the early Monthly Meeting records, and also in the last wills of James, William and Stephen, and in the deeds and will of William's eldest son, the *il* being first generally adopted by William's younger sons, whose descendants still use that spelling.

This goes further to show how very unreliable tradition is where *definite* information is desired concerning family history and pedigree.

The inferences to be drawn from well-known facts would seem to be different from the traditions in regard to the origin of the family.

As will be hereafter shown, HAMBLETON is a very old English name, of Anglo Saxon origin, probably much older than the Scotch and the Scotch-Irish form, with the *il*. As far as the facts have been ascertained, the spelling of the name with *ble* is very rare in Scotland and Ireland, while it is the form most always used in England in former times. Then again we first find James settled in a neighborhood made up mostly of English immigrants; his friends and associates, judging from the names, were mostly English; all

his children, with possibly one exception, intermarried with persons of genuine English names; three of them, with certainty, married into families that came directly from England to Bucks County, and remembering the clannishness as to nationalities among immigrants, and the disposition to settle, associate and intermarry with those of their own nation, it would seem much more probable that James or his father came from England than that they were either Scotch, Irish, or Welsh.

As to family traits and peculiarities, some marked ones appeared through several generations. The men generally were above the average in height, large-chested, muscular, enduring, and inclining to be spare and thin after middle life, with long sharp faces and prominent noses. They had heads of good size, prominent in the lower part of the forehead and very high in the crown. The most marked mental characteristics were great firmness of character, persistency, high moral purpose, strong sense of duty, integrity, thrift, and practical common-sense. The family has furnished no brilliant geniuses, and no persons of large wealth or great renown. For several generations they were mostly Quakers and well-to-do farmers. They were brought up in the simple habits, moderate tastes, and honest purposes of an intelligent rural community, and have belonged to the solid middle classes of society, whose firmest belief was in the sacredness of truth, and the worthiness of moral virtue.

In their Quakerism they seem to have inclined to the liberal, progressive side, and when the society divided, about 1827, in those sections and neighborhoods that offered an opportunity of choice, they nearly all went with the Hicksites, who seem to have adopted the Unitarian view of Christ, the Universalist doctrine of future punishment, the

genuine Quaker spirit of practical morality, and their own ideas of divine revelation. As those of later generations of the family have dropped out of Friends' Meeting, a few have joined other churches, but much the larger number have inclined to Rationalism, and slid into doubt and disbelief concerning the common orthodox dogmas of religion.

They have expended their moral enthusiasm in advocating and advancing the various moral reforms of their day, rather than in devotion to the doctrinal phases of religion. Those of the generation preceding the late war were especially firm and ardent workers in the anti-slavery movement, and active agents on the "Underground Railroad," assisting fugitive slaves in large numbers, and though bred in the peace principles of Quakerism, which opposed all war and fighting, a goodly number of their sons went into the army, mainly from their interest in the emancipation of the slaves.

The following remarks are extracts from letters of several elderly Friends, who have had a wide acquaintance with the family :

"The early generations of Friends affected to despise all worldly rank and honors, yet under all some of them did feel pride of family; and the Hambletons I have known were not wanting in that feeling, though affecting to be very democratic. But their aspirations and ambitions were mostly for godliness, and always for refinement of mind and manners, and the cultivation of the noblest instincts of human nature."

"Though not many of the family have achieved great honors, the most of them have had reputations for morality, integrity and uprightness. For several generations they have planted themselves upon the rock of moral principle and reform."

"They have been a highly respectable family. Whilst none have become world-widely known, but few have turned out bad."

"Of the numerous tribe, I never knew one to be convicted of a penal crime, to be a county pauper, or to be accused of being very rich. They have been moral and temperate, and generally lived to a fair old age. Some years ago five generations were got together in Erie County, New York."

"While none have risen to great wealth or eminence, but few have

descended to extreme poverty, and fewer still to vice and crime. They have nearly all been self supporting, and fairly well off in the last half of life. They have always sustained a high character for uprightness, honesty and fair dealing."

While the descendants of the first William nearly all remained in Bucks County and vicinity, and are not very numerous at the present day, Stephen's children, with the exception of one daughter, all left their native county and went westward for newer lands and settlements. They and their descendants have faithfully fulfilled the scriptural injunction, "Be fruitful and multiply, and replenish the earth and subdue it," for they are to-day a numerous tribe, and are scattered over every northern State and Territory west of New England, besides eight Southern States and Canada. They still incline to settle on the frontiers of civilization, to subdue the wilderness, and grow up with the new country, and like their forefathers seek farms and lands for their principal investments. And although so many of them have been pioneers, surrounded by the poor moral atmosphere of frontier life, and like other settlers in the wilderness, deprived of many opportunities for education and culture, but few of them have degenerated to illiteracy or indifference to moral and intellectual improvement.

THE NAME IN ENGLAND.

Hambleton or Hambledon, the older form of the name, according to most writers on names, is without doubt of Anglo Saxon origin, and is a very old, though not a very common English name of both places and families.

"In Ford, in Ham, in Ley, in Ton,
The most of English surnames run."

Dixon, in "SURNAMEs," says that the English terminations "ham," "ley," and "ton," are rendered by *home, field*

and *town*. The significance of the Anglo-Saxon word "ham" is "home, house, dwelling, village, farm."

"DON is down or hill, as SHELDON, shell hill; SHELTON, shell town."

Taylor, in "WORDS AND PLACES," p. 78, says: "The suffix *ton* constitutes a sort of test word, by which we are able to discriminate the Anglo-Saxon settlements." "It is the most common termination of English local names."

March, in "EAST LANCASHIRE NOMENCLATURE," says: "Of the words which the Saxons borrowed from the Celts, two of the most important are *dun* and *dene*. *Dun* is down, a hill; but sometimes designates a "hill-fortress."

"Hameldon and Hambledon Hill is the hill or fortress of Hamall."

In the south part of Hants or Hampshire; a section which was conquered and permanently settled by the Saxon invaders, under Cerdic, about the year 495, is the river Hamble, emptying into Southampton waters; and at its mouth is the very old port or town of Hamble, mentioned in a writ issued by King Edward I., about the year 1300. Some 20 miles inland, and eastward from this port, in the higher and more hilly country, is the town of Hambledon (Hamble hill). In this same county was the ancient Hundred of Hambledune, (Hamble down, or hill), mentioned in Domesday Book, compiled in 1086. Parishes of Hamble and of Hambledon are also found in the same county. Names of other places in England are: *Hambledon*—parishes in Bucks and Surrey; *Hamblton*—towns in Yorkshire and Lancashire, and a parish in Rutland: also, Hambleton Hills, in Yorkshire. This is the usual spelling of the name of these hills, though formerly it was sometimes given Hambledon, and in one edition of the "ENCYCLOPEDIA BRITANNICA" it is Hamilton.

Mr. S. H. Needles, in his Book on the Maryland Family of Hambletons, quotes a verse from an old ballad called "Hambledown Hill," in which was celebrated the famous battle of these hills, wherein the Scots were defeated in 1402:

"At last they hied with ilk his band,
To Brae of Humbledun,
Where Douglas and his army lay,
Wi' knights of great renown."

Mr. Needles also mentions that in the records of the old church of Pool, England, situated a little to the west of Hants, are found these names:

James Hambleton, son of James and Sarah Hambleton, baptised July 16, 1669.

Leonard Hambleton, son of James and Sarah Hambleton, baptised Oct. 29, 1671.

Among the names of places in England none of that of Hamilton have been found, except one or two that have been changed in later times from the former spelling of the name. No place of the name of Hambleton has been found in Scotland or Ireland, while those of the name of Hamilton are found in both, and families of the latter name are very common there.

Edmunds, in "NAMES AND PLACES," says that Hamilton, a surname, is

"From Hambledon, the seat of Sir Gilbert de Hambledon, the founder of the Scotch Ducal family of Hamilton, in the 13th century."

In "PATRONYMICA BRITANNICA," is mentioned:

"HAMBLETON—Parishes, etc., in Rutland, Lancaster, Buckingham and York."

"HAMILTON—A corruption of Hambledon, a manor in Buckinghamshire."

"William de Hambledon, a younger son of Robert de Beaumont, third Earl of Leicester, is said to have gone, about the year 1215, into Scotland, where he was well received by Alexander II. From him sprung all the noble and other Scottish lines of Hamiltons."

"A foolish tradition places the emigration of Hambleton from England to Scotland a century later, in the time of Edward II, and connects it with his having taken part with the murderers of that king's favorite, Spencer. Compelled by the monarch's resentment to leave England, and being closely pursued into the forest, Hambleton and his squire changed clothes with a couple of woodmen, whom they accidentally met, and the better to sustain their assumed character, seized a saw and began to cut down a tree; while engaged in this act, their pursuers passed by, and De Hambleton, finding his attendant's gaze directed towards them, hastily cried out '*through*,' and thus diverted him from the imprudence of revealing his features to their view. From this circumstance continues the legend, the Hamiltons borrowed their crest, '*an oak tree penetrated transversely, in the main stem, by a frame saw*,' and their motto, '*through*.'

"The Hamiltons are a migratory race, and are to be found in almost every region of the world."

The gradual changes in sound and spelling which have taken place in many English names, have always been in the direction of easier pronunciation and spelling. As examples, Leicester, Cockburn, Campbell, Norwich, are now pronounced, Lester, Coburn, Camel, Norich, and frequently spelled in the latter manner; and so the change from Hambleton to Hambleton, and from both to Hamelton and Hamilton, is a natural one, and has taken place not only in England and Scotland, but in some cases in America, as will appear hereafter in the record.

George Fox, in his journal, (star, page 269), after speaking of going over into Scotland, in the year 1657, and visiting Dumphreay, Douglass and Heads,

"Where we had a blessed meeting, in the name of Jesus, and felt Him in the midst."

Further says:

"Leaving Heads, we went to Badcow, and had a meeting there, to which abundance of people came, and many were convinced, amongst whom was *one* that was called a Lady, convinced. From thence we passed towards the Highlands to Wm. Osborn's house. Afterwards we came back to Heads, Badcow and Garshare, where the said Lady Margaret, Hambleton was convinced, who afterwards went to warn O. Cromwell and Charles Fleewood of the day of the Lord that was coming upon them."

In "BURKE'S LANDED GENTLY," is mentioned:

"John Constance, an eminent merchant, and alderman of Norwich,"

• * * "purchased the Weston estates in 1726. . He married Sarah, daughter and co-heiress of JOHN HAMBLETON, Esq., of Banham, in Norfolk."

In "CHAMBER'S INDEX TO NEXT OF KIN," by Edward Preston, 4th Edition, London, 1878, among those who have been advertised during the last 150 years, as persons wanted in England to inherit property, and for other legal and family affairs, are found the following .

From various works on horses and the turf, it is learned that during the reign of Queen Anne, who was a devotee to horse racing, races were established at several places in Yorkshire, and "continued to be the regular sport at York and Hambleton," and in 1727 only a dozen royal plates were run for in England, one of which was at "Black Hambleton, in Yorkshire." From a horse called "Darley's Arabian," imported about 1700, from Turkey or Arabia, by a Mr. Darley, of Yorkshire, were descended all of the best English race horses, many of the most celebrated of which, for

over a century, have been named Hambletonians, and some of them have been expressly mentioned as being Yorkshire horses. Whether the name when first applied to the horses was derived from the town, the hills, or some person by the name of Hambleton, has not been ascertained. From "Messenger," a celebrated horse of the same stock, imported from England to Philadelphia in 1788, are descended all of the different lines and families of Hambletonian horses in America; and thus the name as applied to horses was brought to the United States from England.

OTHER HAMBLETONS IN AMERICA.

In the "NEW ENGLAND GENEALOGICAL REGISTER," vols. 9, 10, 11, 14, 15, and 26, taken from "EARLY RECORDS OF BOSTON," are mentioned:

"William Hambleton was married to Mary Richardson 7:6: 1654, by Richd. Bellingham, Govr."

"HAMBLETON—GUSTAVUS, sonne of William and Mary, borne 7 Augt. 1654."

"ELIZABETH, dau. of William and Mary, borne 13 Dec., 1655."

"SARAH, dau. of William and Mary, borne 7 Aprill, 1657."

"Abraham, ye sonne of William Hambleton, and Mary his wife, borne 23th December, 1661."

"In Boston, July 28, 1702, Isaac Hambleton was fined 20s. " for traveling on the Lord's day from Dedham to this town, in contempt of law."

"Isaac Everett m. Elizabeth Hambleton, May 21, 1728."

In same, vols. 6, 7 and 9, taken from "EARLY RECORDS OF NEW HAMPSHIRE," mention is made of

"Solomon, son of David Hambleton, b. 10 Aug., 1666.

Jonathan, son of David Hambleton, b. 20 Dec., 1672.

Daniel Hambleton was taxed at Cochecho in 1667.

Daniel was dead in 1710—had sons David and Gabriel.

Gabriel had a grant in 1701. (Dover items.)"

In "GENEALOGIES AND ESTATES OF CHARLESTON, MASS.," is mentioned:

"John Hambleton, in 1658, 'had four acres of woods and three commons.'

In the assessment of New York City, 1676, is found the name of Robert Hambleton.

The most extensive family of Hambletons in this country is probably that of Maryland, an account of which was prepared and published in 1876 by Mr. S. H. Needles, of Philadelphia, a descendant of the family. The first ancestor of this family definitely known, was William Hambleton, of St. Michael's River, Talbot County, Md., who purchased large tracts of land there, from Lord Baltimore and others, in 1659, and subsequently, as shown by the county records. The family tradition is that William's father came to this country from Scotland. William died, leaving a will dated March 6, 1675, in which he mentions his wife Sarah and his children, John, Edward, Samuel, Philemon, Mary, Frances and William. He devises to them 1,300 acres of land, besides his home plantation, called Martingham, situated on the east shore of the Chesapeake, a short distance from the present city of Easton, which is still in the possession of his descendants. To John is given "200 acres of land on Chester River, being part of a tract of 800 acres called Price Hill," and Philemon is given 300 acres, "called Hambleton's Hermitage adjoining to Price Hill." No mention is made of children of any of these sons, except that the second William had three sons, namely, William, John and Philemon, and several daughters.

It is possible that our progenitor, James Hambleton, of Bucks County, was a son of John, Edward, Samuel or Philemon, sons of the first William, though no evidence has been discovered pointing that way. It is also possible that he was a descendant of one of the New England Hambletons above mentioned, though being a Quaker as he was, it

is more likely that he or his father came over with the colony of early Quakers that settled Eastern Pennsylvania and New Jersey.

The descendants of this Maryland family seem to have settled principally in the Southern States, though some of them have been found in the southern part of Ohio, Indiana and Illinois, and further west. Among the sons of this family were William Hambleton, a captain in the Revolutionary war, though the name was spelled Hamilton in his commission; Samuel Hambleton, a purser in the navy, who was wounded by a cannon ball in the battle of Lake Erie, under Commodore Perry; and John N. Hambleton, paymaster in the U. S. Navy, who died in 1870. Also, some noted politicians in the South, and several very prominent business men, merchants and bankers in Baltimore.

William Hambleton was in the list of American prisoners at Forton Prison, England, 1777 to 1779.—*N. E. Gen. Reg. Vol. 33.*

In Smith's History of Delaware County, mention is made of Archibald Hambleton, and his father, living about the close of the Revolutionary war, near the present village of Coatesville, in Chester County, Pa.

In the Register's office of Philadelphia, Book G. 5, page 301, is recorded a deed, dated May 3, 1744, from David Fulton to William Hambleton, yeoman, for 143 acres of land in Cheltenham, Philadelphia County.

There are a number of Hambletons in and about St. Louis, Mo., descendants of Samuel and Mark Hambleton, brothers, who came to this country some forty or fifty years ago, from Staffordshire, England. Their father and grandfather were named Samuel, and the father removed to Staffordshire from Oldem, on the borders of Yorkshire, England, the early home of their family.

From a correspondent to the "RICHMOND DESPATCH":

"At the Bermuda Assizes, held Nov. 11 and 12, 1650—The Jury of our Sovereigne Lord, the Kinge, doe present George Washington, of Hambleton Tribe, Taylor, as a false Traytor against our most gracious and dread Sovereaigne and his Liedge Lord, the Kinge, &c., havinge not the feare of God in his hearte, but seduced by the Instigation of the devil, maliciously and traytoriously on the 25th day of December, in the year of our Lord, 1648, at the house of Roger Axon, in the said Tribe, did then and there advisedly and directly speak and say in the hearing of said Roger Axon, these words, to-wit—'The King has sould his Subjects to Popery'; etc."

One cannot fail to notice the repetition of the names, William, Samuel, John, Sarah, and a few others, in all the different families of Hambletons that have been found or mentioned, whether in England, Boston, Pennsylvania or Maryland. This coincidence suggests a common origin of all the families.

EXPLANATIONS AND ABBREVIATIONS.

THE plan adopted in this record has been to number the HEADS of principal families and branches, in consecutive order, from 1 to 46; the name of the person so numbered being immediately preceded by the number in heavy figures, whenever such person is mentioned in the work; thus, 3 Stephen, 8 John, 19 James. The descendants in the female lines have been followed out no further than the children of the women who were born Hambletons, for the reason that to trace out the numerous descendants of those women would require considerable time and labor, and would very much delay the publication of this book, as the writer is still engaged in active business, and cannot at present give much further attention to the subject. But if other members of the family wish to pursue the subject further, the writer will gladly furnish them with all the additional information he possesses.

All the old family records were kept in the form usual with Friends, giving *numbers* instead of *names*, to months, and the days of the week, but for uniformity, dates, as of births, deaths, etc., are all herein given, in the customary form of the present day.

RECORD.

1. James Hambleton, of Solebury, Bucks county, Pa., who died in July, 1751, was a farmer, and owned a large tract of land, (one account says 600, another 800 acres), at what is now Center Hill, in the Township of Solebury, which has since been divided into a number of farms. On an old map, dated in 1706, as shown in Davis' History of Bucks County, this tract is marked as belonging to Stephen Beakes, and is without doubt the same land which was conveyed to James from Matthew Hughes and Elizabeth Hughes, executrix of the last will and testament of Stephen Beakes, dec'd, and John Beakes, heir of Stephen Beakes, by deed dated March 27th, 1721, and entered of record, May 9th, 1792.

He was a Quaker, and a member of Buckingham Meeting, in Bucks county, in 1720, as will appear from the following extracts from the records of that Monthly Meeting. [Buckingham Monthly Meeting was established by Falls or Fallington Quarterly Meeting, on the 24th of the 9th mo., 1720, and so has no records previous to that date.]

" At our Monthly Meeting, the 7th day of ye 12 mo., 1720.

" At this meeting, David Wilson, of Chester meeting, made Complaint of James Hambleton by a letter, that he kept him to Long out his mony, and that he expects his mony with Speed, or his Liberty to get it otherways, therefore this meeting appoints John Dawson and Thomas Canby to Speak to James Hambleton againe In order that He may Satisfy David Wilson In his Just demands, or give his Reasons to next meeting."*

* In Smith's History of Delaware County, David Wilson's name appears in a list of the taxable residents and owners of real estate, of the Township of Chester, in the year 1722.

"At our Monthly Meeting, ye 7th day of ye 1st mo., 1721. According to appointment of last meeting, James Hambleton was Spoke to, and offers to Spare Cows, Horses, or any goods he hath, to satisfy David Wilson in his Just demands untill full, this meeting orders Thomas Canby to write to David Wilson, and Inform him of James' offering ye 7th day of ye."

"At our Monthly Meeting, ye 4th day of the 2d mo., 1721. Thomas Canby wrote to David Wilson abt. James Hambleton's Bussiness, according to the meeting's order, but as yet Received no answer."

"At our Monthly Meeting, ye 6th of ye 12th mo., 1721. Thomas Head and Samuel Pickering, having left their differences to this Meeting, who persuaded them to chouse friends to end It, and they chose Thos. Watson and John Dawson, with the assistance of Henry Paxson and James Hambleton, and Make report to next meeting."*

"1st of 1st mo., 1726.

"At this meeting Thomas Hartley and Elizabeth Paxson declared their Intentions of marriage with each other, it being the Second time, and those Friends that were appointed to Inspect into the Sd Thomas's clearness and Conversation Report they find nothing to obstruct their said Intentions, therefore the meeting Leaves them to their liberty to consummate their marriage accordig to The good order of Truth, and appoints James Hambleton and Thomas Canby, Junior, to See It decently accomplished, and make report thereof to next meeting."

James is frequently mentioned as a member of Committees in the subsequent minutes of these records, and the name is spelled sometimes with *el*, and once with *il*.

Col. Davis, in his History of Bucks County, in speaking of a mine on a certain farm about two and one-half miles south of New Hope, says that The Proprietaries sold the tract to William Coleman, and that he about 1750 sold it to James Hamilton and others.

The original will and inventory of personal property, of which the following are true copies, are still on file with the Register of Wills, for Bucks County.

"*Be it remembered.* this 9th day of the seventh month, in the year of our Lord one thousand seven hundred and fifty one, that I, James Hambleton, of Solebury, in the County of Bucks, yeoman, being weak of body but of perfect and sound mind and memory, praised be God for the same, and calling to mind the mortality of my body, I do make this my will and testament in manner and form following, viz:

* In explanation of these complaints, it may be well to state that it was contrary to the order of Friends, for one Friend to sue another in law without the consent of the monthly meeting, and the differences between members were generally settled by directions of the meeting.

Imprimis. I will that all my just debts and funeral expenses be fully paid and discharged by my executors hereinafter named, with all convenient speed after my decease.

Item. I will that two hundred acres of my land whereon I now live be sold for that purpose, which shall be taken off that line adjoining Thomas Hartley's land by a straight line, and each end shall be of an equal distance, with the buildings and improvements appertaining thereto, and I do give my said executors full power to sell, convey, release and confirm the said land and premises to any person or persons purchasing the same, in as free, full and ample wise as I myself might or could do whilst living, and also to make sale of all my movables and personal estate, what is hereinafter mentioned only excepted.

Item. I give and bequeath to my son Stephen Hambleton all the residue of my land, after the said two hundred acres be taken off as aforesaid, to him, his heirs, executors, administrators or assigns forever, and also one hundred pounds lawful money of Pennsylvania, to be paid eighteen months after my decease, and also two cows and two horses, and one bed and furniture fit for winter, on condition that he, his heirs, executors, administrators or assigns, find and provide for his mother, my well beloved wife Mary, a warm and convenient room, and provide her with firewood sufficient, and keep her a horse and cow, winter and summer, with pasture and fother necessary and pay her ten pounds lawfull money of Pennsylvania yearly, and at the expiration of each severall year during her widdowhood.

Item. I give and bequeath to Mary, my well beloved wife, one horse named Norman and one cow, and goods to the value of twenty pounds, in such goods as she shall choose out of my household goods and the residue to be sold as aforesaid.

Item. I give and bequeath to my daughter Grace, besides her share hereafter mentioned, six pounds lawfull money, aforesd. to be paid in manner aforesd.

Item. I give and bequeath all the rest and residue of all my estate to my son William Hambleton and my son-in-law Samuel Armitage, my daughter Mary, my daughter Gennet and my daughter Grace, share and share alike, equally to be divided, only the share bequeathed to my son Samuel to be divided equally between him and his two sons or the survivors of them, to wit: James and John, the said divisions to be made and legasys to be paid within eighteen months after my decease.

I will that nothing herein be understood to discharge any of my children herein mentioned from any debt or obligation they shall owe me at my decease.

And lastly, I do constitute, nominate and appoint my son-in-law, Samuel Armitage, and my son Stephen Hambleton, my executors of this, my last will and testament, hereby revoking and disannulling all former wills,

legacies, bequests and executors by me aforesaid and at any time made, and do confirm and declare this to be my last will and testament.

D. 1758, between Samuel Armitage, of Solebury Township, county of Bucks, weaver, and Stephen Hambleton, of Said township, yeoman, they being the executors of the last will and testament of James Hambleton, late of said township, yeoman, deceased, of the one part, and William Hamilton, of said township, yeoman, one of the sons of said James Hamilton, of the other part; Whereas, said James Hamilton by force and virtue of some good conveyance or assurance in the law, duly had and executed, became in his lifetime lawfully seized in his demesne, as of fee, of and in, among other lands, the piece or tract of land hereinafter mentioned, and being so thereof seized, he, the said James Hamilton, did make his will and testament in writing, bearing date the 9th day of the seventh month, A. D. 1750, and thereby devised in these words (quoting the will).

Now, this Indenture witnesseth that the Executors, Samuel Armitage and Stephen Hamilton, for and in consideration of the sum of four hundred pounds, lawful money of Pennsylvania, unto them well and truly paid by the said William Hamilton at and before the sealing and delivery hereof,

the receipt whereof the said executors, Samuel Armitage and Stephen Hamilton, do hereby acknowledge, and thereof do acquit and forever discharge the said William Hamilton, his heirs, etc. (conveying and describing the land). To have and to hold unto the said William Hambleton, his heirs and assigns, to the only proper use and behoof of him, the said William Hambleton, his heirs and assigns forever, under the yearly quit rent hereafter accruing for the premises, to the Chief lord of the fee thereof; and the said Samuel Armitage and Stephen Hambleton, etc., do covenant, etc., with the said William Hambleton, etc.

James' widow, Mary (^{Beaker}~~Greenleaf~~), died in 1756, and left a will dated Sept. 6th, 1756, in which the name is written throughout Hamilton, but is signed Hambleton. She therein mentions her sons, William and Stephen Hamilton; daughters, Grace Roberts, Jinnet Austin, and Mary Paxson; and grandchildren, James and John Hamilton, Nicholas, Samuel and Hannah Austin, and James and John Armitage.

* The husband of Mary, and the wives of Stephen Hambleton and his son James, and the several other Paxsons who afterwards intermarried with the Hambletons, were descendants of James Paxson, who came to Bucks county, Pa., from March Gibbons, Parish of Bucks, England, in 1682. He was a Quaker and brought his certificate from Bucks Monthly Meeting, in Buckinghamshire, date Feb. 3, 1682.

son of Thomas; also gives to his wife "the whole still house with the stills, the mill and press, and the several utensils for carrying on the distilling business"; also directs that "my plantation whereon I now live be divided into two parcels as follows," describing them, and gives one part to his son Joseph, and the other part to his son William; and gives to his son Thomas Hambleton "all that plantation whereon he now lives, called Temple Bar, with the fishing on the shore and the island in the river Delaware opposite thereto, and their several appurtenances"; appoints his sons Joseph and William as his executors. In this will the name is written throughout and signed "Hambleton" "Temple Bar" is said to be the present site of Lumberville.

In Davis' History of Bucks County it is stated that in 1785 the present site of Lumberville was owned by George Wall and William Hamilton, and that Hamilton died about 1797, and left his estate to his son Thomas, who sold it in 1807.

* * * * "At this meeting the some of ye friends appointed, attend the marriages of Thomas Paxson and Mary Hambleton, of Stephen Hambleton and Hannah Paxson, of Thomas Remington and Hannah Gill, and of Jonathan Shaw and Sarah Good. Reported they were decently accomplished."

Stephen's will, dated April 24, 1804, and proved May 31, 1806, gives a part of his farm, with buildings, to his wife during widowhood, a part to his son Aaron, and directs the remainder to be sold; gives one hundred cents to his grand daughter Letitia, and makes bequests to each of his children, giving sons twice as much as daughters. His widow Hannah made a will dated Jan. 3, 1810, proved Dec. 13, 1812, in which she names and makes bequests to each of her children and her grand daughters Hannah Wiggins and Hannah Thorpe.
