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PREFACE

THE following uncompleted History of the Kingman Family in America was compiled and prepared for the press by the author, and the work begun some years ago. Before one hundred pages were printed, Mr. Kingman died, leaving no manuscript which has been found relating to any generations of the family beyond the sixth, which is unfinished.

The sheets containing the valuable information concerning these earliest records have been stored for many years, and it is now thought advisable to bring the work to light by publishing it just as it was left by the author—leaving further compilation to be made later by other hands, and printed, if deemed best, at a future time.

SKETCH OF LIFE OF THE AUTHOR,

As contained in the "Memoirs of the New England Historic Genealogical Society" for 1904.

BRADFORD KINGMAN, the son of Josiah Washburn and Mary (Packard) Kingman, was born in the town of North Bridgewater, now the city of Brockton, January 5, 1831. He was a lineal descendant of Henry and Joanna Kingman, who came from Weymouth, England, in 1635, and were among the earliest settlers of Weymouth, Massachusetts. The line of descent is as follows: Henry¹ and Joanna (——), John² and Elizabeth (——), Henry⁸ and Bethia (Howard), Henry⁴ and Mary (Allen), Seth⁵ and Judith (Washburn), Josiah Washburn⁶ and Mary (Packard).

Young Kingman attended the public schools of his native town and the Adelphian Academy in North Bridgewater, and later was a student in Williston Seminary at East Hampton, Massachusetts. He studied law in the office of Lyman Mason, Esq., of Boston, attending lectures at Harvard Law School, and was admitted to the Suffolk bar, in April, 1863. He was appointed justice of the peace by Governor Andrew in January, 1864, and was trial justice for the trial of criminal cases for Norfolk county, many years; was notary public for the same county, and commissioner of deeds for several States. He removed to Brookline in May, 1856.

Mr. Kingman had from his youth a special fondness for historical and genealogical studies, and made them a specialty in connection with his legal profession. He gave much attention to local history and published several works, and was a contributor to many magazines and newspapers. Among these contributions may be mentioned "Historical Sketches of the Churches of North Bridgewater, Mass.," published in the Congregational Quarterly; "Memoir of Deacon Lewis Bradford," of Plympton, Massachusetts; "History of Andover" and "North Andover" in the History of Essex county; and "History of the City of Brockton" in the History of Plymouth county in 1884. In 1892 he published an illustrated volume on the Epitaphs of Burial Hill, Plymouth, containing twenty-three hundred inscriptions. 1866 he published an elaborate History of North Bridgewater, Massachusetts, of about seven hundred pages, with extensive lists of families, and in 1889 he wrote a history of Brookline for the "History of Norfolk County." In 1894 he published the "History of Brockton." In October, 1870, Mr. Kingman became the pioneer in newspaper enterprise in Brookline by publishing the "Brookline Transcript," of which he was the editor and proprietor for nearly three years.

He was a life member of the New-England Historic Genealogical Society, elected in 1861; also a member of the Pilgrim Society, of Plymouth, of the Essex Institute, of Salem, of the Weymouth Historical Society, and of the Webster Historical Society, Boston. He was a corresponding member of the Maine and Wisconsin State Historical Societies, of the Bostonian Society, and of the Dedham, Old Colony, and Old Bridgewater Historical Societies. While Mr. Kingman was a local historian of note in his own country, he also had extensive opportunities of acquiring information from the records of many hundred towns in Europe, and gathered a large amount of material in the line of family history and genealogy in that country. In 1888 and '89 he spent some time in England for the sake of historical investigation. He died in Boston, July 19, 1903.

FIRST GENERATION.



ENRY KINGMAN was the ancestor of that portion of the KINGMAN family to which the author of this work belongs. The first definite information concerning him in this country is found in a list of passengers "Bound

for New England," and known as the "Hull Party" or Company, under the leadership of Rev. Joseph Hull, a native of Somersetshire, England, a graduate of St. Mary's Hall, Oxford, a preacher of note in the south and west of England. This list was dated at a time when the eyes of all Europe were directed to this western world, to which so many had preceded them. Mr. Hull was a Rector of Northleigh in Devonshire, where he had labored for eleven years, and, in common with others in his immediate locality, was fired with zeal and enthusiasm to follow many of those who had already reached this new country.

A company was formed of one hundred and five members divided into twenty-one families, which set sail on the twentieth day of March, 1635, from Weymouth, Dorsetshire, an enterprising and thrifty town on the west coast of England.

At the end of forty-six days on the ocean and an uneventful passage, they sailed into Massachusetts Bay on the sixth of May, 1635, leaving the settlement of Hull on the left, and came to an anchorage before Governor's Winthrop's "little village" of Boston, where they remained until July 2d, waiting permission of the General Court to locate. After reconnoitreing for some time they decided Wessaguscus was their best location. They immediately passed in among the numerous islands in the bay and entered Fore River, and came to anchor about four miles from the mouth of the same. JOHN PORTER, Deputy Cleark to Edw. THOROUGHGOOD.

Having arrived at the place of their choice, preparations were made for life in earnest. The most sheltered spot in the locality, afterwards and now known as Mill Creek, was selected. Rude shelters were erected at first, and these soon after gave way to more substantial dwellings on the farms. Of the wisdom of their choice for the purposes of permanent settlement we shall have no doubts, if we will read a description of the place as given by writers of that day.

Two years previous to their landing, Wood, in his "New England Prospect," describes the situation as follows :----

"This as yet is but a small village; yet it is very pleasant, and healthful, very good ground, and is well timbered, and hath good store of hayground. It hath a very spacious harbour for shipping before the town, the salt water being navigable for boats and pinnances two leagues. Here the inhabitants have good store of fish of all sorts, and swine, having acorns and clams at the time of year. Here is likewise an Alewive river."

During the early settlement of the place known as "Wessaguscus," Morton in his "New English Canaan," writes as follows :----

"And when I had more seriously considered of the bewty, of the place, with all her faire indowments, I did not thinke that in all the knowne world it could be paralel'd. For so many goodly groues of trees; dainty fine round rising hillucks; delicate faire large plaines, sweete cristall fountaines, and cleare running streames, that twine in fine meanders through the meads, making so sweete a mumering noise to heare, as would even lull the sences with delight a sleepe, so pleasantly doe they glide upon the pebble stones, jetting most jocundly where they doe meete; and hand in hand runne downe to Neptunes Court, to pay the yearely tribute, which they owe to him as Soveraigne Lord of all springs."

Soon after Rev. Mr. Hull and his Company arrived in Weymouth and for eight years up to the time of the removal of Rev. Samuel Newman to Rehoboth in 1643 the town had gained rapidly and became one of the most important of any in the Massachusetts Colony. A record of the lands and their owners, while not perfect, is quite good, and serves to show who occupied the soil, with the number of acres held by them.

Among those who are mentioned in these lists we find the following :---

The Lands of Henry Kingman.

Twelue acres in the westerneck first giuen to John Whitmarsh bounded on East, with the land of Nicholas Onisepherus and Richard Whitmarsh, on the west & with the land of John Allin, the sea on the north, the land of Thomas Holbrooke on the south,

Three acres in the westerneck first given to William Smith, bounded on the East and south with the land of William Smith, on the north with the land of Thomas White, on the south with the comon.

Three acres first given to Edward Poole, bounded on the East with a highwaie, on the west with the land of William Hayard, on the north with the land of Enoch Hunt, on the south with the land of Ralph Allin.

ffower acres first giuen to George Allin bounded on the East with a high waie, on the west with the sea, his own land on the north, and the land of Ralph Allin on the south.

Three acres in the Easterneck of saltmarsh first given to M^r. Buslem bounded on the north with the bay, on the south with the back River.

Two acres of salt marsh neere "burying Iland" first giuen to Aingell Holard bounded on the East and south with the land of Robert Martin, on the west with the creeke, on the north with m^r Parkers marsh.

Six acres in the westerneck first given to Samuel Butterworth bounded on the East with the comon, on the west with a highwaie.

Mr. Kingman continued to add to his possessions from time to time, till he became what was called in that time a large owner.

The following deed is the first conveyance of land to Henry Kingman, which after a complete examination of both town and county records, we have been able to find :

Deed of Land from William Richards to Henry Kingman, situated in Weymouth, Mass.

 W^m Richards of Waimouth, for and in consideration of Fifty Pounds to him in hand payd, did grant vnto HENRY KINGMAN of Waymouth, his dwelling house in Waymouth, together wth his lott adjoyning to it, being twenty Acres more or less, as also two Acres of salt marsh adjoyning to the upland and foureteene rodd of upland more joyneing to the forenamed vpland more or less, being bounded on the north wth the sea, Thomas Streame south, the sea East, & Thomas Holbrooke, Junio'r & Henry Kingman west. Also one Acre salt marsh in the towne of Braintre lyeing close by the fferme house of M^r W^m Tyng together wth the fence thereto belonging wth the great lott, swamp lott & Comons of right belonging. This was by a deed of sale, dated 12, 3, 1648.

The settlement was made in that section of the town of Weymouth known as "Old Spain," or North Weymouth, on the lands extending from "Burial Hill" to the sea. On the second day of September, 1635, the name of the plantation was changed by order of the General Court to Weymouth, which name it has retained to the present day, and from whence the descendants of the families of that date have become numerous and widely scattered over every section of the United States, its Territories, the British Provinces and the Canadas. This town is, next to Plymouth, the oldest town in Massachusetts, and the oldest in Norfolk County, and has a history extending over two and three quarter centuries.

From that town those bearing the name of *Kingman* in this country originated, and are those of which we are writing.

Henry Kingman immediately entered upon the duties of citizenship, and was admitted a freeman of the Colony of Massachusetts Bay, March 3, 1636; this being conclusive evidence that he was a member of some Congregational church, as no person could exercise the right of suffrage or hold any public office until he was admitted a freeman by the General Court. At the same meeting of the General Court, he was licensed to keep a ferry, as appears by the following record:

"Thomas Aplegate was discharged of keepeing the fferry at Waymothe, and Henry Kingman lycensed to keepe the saide fferry during the pleasure of the Court. March 3, 1636."

"Henry Kingman, the ferryman, of Waymoth, is granted for this yeare to take twopence apiece for transportation of people, 12 March, 1637-8." In addition to his other calling as ferryman, he was licensed to keep an inn, or house of entertainment.

His services were often called into requisition for the public, both in the town and colony, and his frequent appointment on committees in laying out roads and other public duties indicates the confidence placed in him as a reliable person, and of good judgment, and that his services were valuable and appreciated.

Mr. Kingman's attention was given largely to agricultural pursuits, very naturally, and necessarily incident to the life of a pioneer in a new and unsettled country; and we find at an early date among the division of lands, that he received his share. The following list gives several tracts assigned to him at different dates, such as:

In 1636, 42 acres, near Fresh Pond, now "Whitman's Pond." In 1651, he is among the property owners (amount not stated). In 1663, 14 acres, Lot No. 34. In the second division, near Braintree line, 42 acres, Lot No. 38.

Mr. Kingman early exhibited an active and enterprising spirit, and entered into public affairs with energy, courage and an unceasing activity, and soon became one of the leaders in the colony; a prominent and influential man, taking an active interest in all measures calculated to improve the town and enhance its prosperity. Many of his descendants have also inherited the same progressive spirit, and have been leaders in public affairs.

"At a General Court held at Newetowne the 2nd day of the 3rd month, 1638, for elections, Henry Kingman was chosen Deputy."

"Att a Court of Election held at Boston the 27th of the third month, anno 1652,

"Henry Kingman was chosen Deputy for Waymothe, Mass."

"At a Gennerall Courte of Elections, held at Boston, 26 May, 1657,

"The names of the Deputies retourned from the severall tounes to serve at this Generall Court were,

"Weimouth: Henry Kingman."

"25th Dec. 1648, Thomas Holbrooke, Henry Kingman, Nathell Adams, a committee of Waymouthe, Mass. and Stephen Kingsley & Samuel Bass of Braintry, were appointed a committe for laying out of a highway for the Country from Weymoth to Dorchester."

"The retourn of Tho Holbrooke, Henry Kingman, & Nathaniell Addams, of Weimouth, and Stephen Kingsley & Samuel Basse, of Braintree, as committe appointed by order of the Generall Courte for the laying out of the country highway betwene Weimouth & Dorchester wch the Court apprved & confirmed to be recorded according to their agreement in the Court records : ---

"Itt is ordered, that the country highway from Weimoth to Dorchester shall lie thro psent wonted highway from Weimouth to Braintree meeting fower rods wide — and whereas at the said meeting house the said way house, cannot conveniently be had at one end thereof, that therefore the said way to runne there two rods at one end and two rods at the other end thereof, and then to fall fouer rods againe, at a marked stump a little beyond the said meeting house, and so that breadth to a stump of a tree nere Henry Neales home house, and thence to be carryed the said breadth to the lott called Hudsons lott, rectifying the way which now is by taking it of through seueral nookes, as it is markt, and through the said Hudsons lott the same breadth to the hill, going doune towards the brooke, and thence till tenn Poles beyond the brooke, six rods wyde, and then to Lye flower rods wyde vnto Dorchester bounds, as it is markt by severall markes for that purpose. May 8, 1649.

Mr. Kingman died in Weymouth, Mass., July 5, 1667.

Will of Henry Kingman.

THE last will and testament of Henry Kingman, of Waymoth aged 74 yeares or thairabout being sound of boddy but of perfect Memmory doo committ my soule and boddy to god and appointe my body to be dessently buryed and all my debts honestly payed, and all the rest of my worldly goods I dispose of as folow:

I do give to my sonn Edward Kingman my dwelling house with all my housing pertaining thair-unto, and my orchards with all the appurtinantes therto belonging, and I doo give him as much land a Joyneing thairto as will make it 20 acres, further, I doo give him two third partes of myne own comon lott, further, I doo give to my sonn Edward that peece of Meddo that was John Allens, and more meddo, I do give him an acre neerest to my house of that which was Mr. Jenners. further I do give to my son Edward my fether bed that I Ly on, and all the furniture therto belonging.

I doo give to my sonn Thomas Kingman halfe the rest of the land that I have adjoining to my house except it be too acres which I shall hereafter express, further I doo give to my sonn Thomas the other too acres of meddo, which I have which was Mr. Jenners. further I do give to my Sonn Thomas 25 acres of upland that Lyeth neare and about Samuell Whites house, further, I doo give to my Son Thomas Third parte of my own comon lot, further, I doo give to my sonn Thomas that fether bed which he lyeth on and all that doth belong thereunto.

I doo give to my son John Kingman, the two acres of land that I above reserved and it shall be neare his house from his barne to his planting lot as convenient as it may bee. further, I doo give to my sonn John, the other halfe of my land at home. further, I do give to my son John the two acres of meddo that I have which was William Richards and lyeth neare the tyed mill, and my son John shall have one acre of upland that lyeth along by the meddo to make meddo of it hee will. further, I do give to my son John half the comon lot, that did belong to my ould Brother Holbrooke, which I had of him. further, I doo give to my sonn John, the cow that he hath of myne in his hand allreddy.

I doo give to my daughter Holbrook, twelve pounds. further, I do give to my daughter Holbrooke, the chest that stands at my beds feet.

I doo give to my daughter Davis ten pounds.

I doo give to the children of my daughter Barnard, ten pounds, they bee now five. they shall be payed when they cum to bee of age, the sons at twenty yeares ould, and the daughters at eighteen, and if either of them dy before, his portion shall be divided to the rest.

Lastly, I doo appoint my three sons above expressed to bee my Executors, and to fulfill all my will as abouve written, and to divide the rest of my estate among them equally, and hereunto I have set my hand and seall this twenty fourth day of May in ye years of our Lord one Thousand six hundred and Seventy Seven.

SECOND GENERATION.

The next we find of him is at the time of King Philip's War, when men were wanted for service in protecting our frontier towns. The town of Weymouth responded in a liberal manner, and when a call was made during the early part of 1675 and hostilities had begun and that town had been attacked, twelve of the young men, from among the most promising of that locality, entered promptly into the service, as volunteers, doing valiant service under the command of Capt. Isaac Johnson, as appears in a return made out at Dedham Plains, December 10, 1675, nine days previous to the destruction of the Narraganset fort.

JOANNA KINGMAN² (*Henry*¹), daughter of Henry and Joanna Kingman. She was born in England, about 1624; married THOMAS HOLBROOK, who was born in England and came to this country in the same ship with his wife. He was one of the earlier settlers of that portion of Weymouth, Mass., known as "Old Spain," and was an active, prominent and useful man, and often called to positions of responsibility in public affairs. He held the office of "townsman" (equivalent to selectman) for several years.

THOMAS KINGMAN² (*Henry*¹), son of Henry and Joanna Kingman. He was admitted Freeman, October 12, 1681. He was a large land owner and of much influence in public matters.

The father died 1805. His will was dated December 30, 1703, and was proved April 1705. His wife was REBECCA ———.

WILL OF THOMAS KINGMAN.

In the name and Fear of God, Amen.

I Thomas Kingman Sen'r, of Weymouth in the County of Suffolk, in her Maj'tys Provinces of the Massachusetts Bay in New England, being old and not knowing how soon it may please the Almighty in his all wise Providence to call me out of this World, And being now of a sound and disposing mind, Do firstly and chiefly give and Bequeath my Soul into the hands of its Almighty maker hopeing for its Salvation through the Merits and Mediation of Jesus Christ alone, And for the setting of my house in order, and better Settlement of that Temporal Estate that God hath Given me, Do Dispose of it in manner following: Ordaining, making and appointing this to be my last Will & Testament, and do hereby make void & null all former Wills whatsoever by me made or ordained to be made.

Imprimis. After my just Debts, and Funeral Expenses are paid, I Give & Bequeath unto my well Beloved Wife, Rececca Kingman the use Benefit & improvement of all my Homestead where I now Dwell containing, Thirty Acres of Land, consisting of orchard, broke up Land, and Pasture, with all the Housing & Building, thereon. Also Three Acres of meadow lying in "Kingmans Neck" commonly so called in Weymouth, during her natural Life. And if it should so happen that my said Wife should Remove out of the House and Quit the State, That then my Will is That my son Henry who is to Enjoy the Part of my Estate after my Wifes Decease Shall pay to my Said Wife Twenty Pounds in or as money, to be at her own Disposal as she shall see cause.

Item. I Give and Bequeath unto my eldest son Thomas Kingman Twenty Acres of Land where his house stands which I bought of the Widow Mary Rane lying in Weymouth, Also I Give to my son Thomas Two acres of Land on the West Side of the highway where his Barn stands; also Two acres of salt marsh Lying in Brantry, also one Acre of Upland and meadow lying adjoining to the Three Acres before mentioned in "Kingman's Neck" to him and his Heirs.

Item. I Give and Bequeath unto my son John Kingman and his Heirs Fifty acres of Land with the Buildings thereon Lying in the upper Division in Weymouthe which I bought of Thomas Drake & Ephraim Burle and Zachariah Bicknell &c. And also two Acres of Salt mairsh lying in Brantrey adjoining to the other two acres which I Gave to my son Thomas in Brantrey to him and his Heirs.

Item. I Give and Bequeath to my son Henry Kingman all that my Homestead before mentioned containing Thirty Acres or thereabouts, consisting of orchard, broke up Land and Pasture with all the Housing and Building thereon, Also I Give to my son Henry Three Acres of Meadow lying in "Kingman's Neck" commonly so called, in Weymouth, all which I Give to my son Henry after my said wifes Decease or her removal out of the House; always Provided, and my Will is That my Son Henry Kingman shall keep and maintain his Brother William Kingman, four years after my Decease upon his own proper cost and charge if he should continue so long, This I Give to my son Henry and his Heirs.

Item. I Give and Bequeath unto my three daughters Hannah, Lydia and Sarah, That Pasture in Weymouth lying between Colonel Hunt's Land and Lieut. Nashes Land containing Thirty Acres or thereabouts to be devided as followeth—That is to say, Twelve Acres to my Daughter Hannah and Ten Acres to my Daughter Lydia, and the remainder to my Daughter Sarah. Provided always, and my Will is that if my son Thomas Kingman see cause to pay unto my Daughter Sarah, Twenty-five pounds in or as Money, then when he shall have that Part of Land which I give to my Daughter Sarah, This Thirty Acres of Land is to be Divided Equally as to the Quality of it.

Item. I Give unto my son Thomas Kingman and my son Henry Kingman, That piece of Land and meadow which lyes between the Two acres, which I Gave to my son Thomas before, and the Thirty Acres which I Gave to my Three Daughters being about Six Acres, on Condition that they keep and maintain my son William Kingman, Five years after the Four years are Expired, which my son Henry is to maintain him. And if my son William should outlive his term of Time, Then my Will is that my Three sons, Thomas, John and Henry shall maintain him equally between them, Dur-I Give to all my Grand Children Five Shillings apiece in or as ing his life. money, to be paid to them by my Executors within one year after my decease; and further my will is that my Household Goods and moveables and stock, shall be improved to pay my Debts so far as is needful, and the Remainder is to be divided between my son Henry and my Three Daughters Hannah, Lydia & Sarah. And my Will is that all my outland not men-tioned in my will before, that it be Divided Equally for Quantity and Quality, between my Three sons Thomas, John & Henry, And if any of my sons or either of them should die without issue, That then his Part shall be Divided between the Surviving Brothers, And also that if either of my Daughters should Die without Issue, then her Part shall be Divided between the Surviving Daughters, And I do nominate and appoint my Beloved Wife, Rebecca Kingman to be Executrix, and my son Thomas Kingman to be Executor to this my last Will, and I do do Desire my Loving Friends Elder John Rogers, and Colonel Ephraim Hunt to be Overseers to see that this my Will be fulfilled, and do hereby make void and null all other Wills, and do declare this to be my Last Will and Testament.

JOHN KINGMAN² (Henry¹), son of Henry and Joanna King-He was born in England, 1633. Brother to Thomas above man. named, came over with the other members of the family and settled in Weymouth, Mass., in 1635. Here he was the owner of considerable land, and followed the occupation of farming, in which he was quite successful, and added to his possessions from time to time as he needed, till a new field opened before him and he removed to the then "West Parish" of Bridgewater, now known as West Bridgewater. He purchased a farm of Michael Bacon, Jr., of Billerica, Mass., which had formerly belonged to his uncle Daniel Bacon, in 1685, the farm on which Caleb Kingman afterward resided. He is the ancestor of nearly all, if not all of the name of Kingman who have resided in the four parishes of Bridgewater and other towns of the Old Colony and Cape Cod. His descendants have become numerous, and are scattered over every section of the country, a large number of whom have resided within a small radius of the old homestead in West Bridgewater-in East Bridgewater, Bridgewater, and North Bridgewater (now Brockton). Mr. Kingman was one of the first of the name to reside in Bridgewater. Coming to Weymouth, at the early age of two years, his early life and training was at that place, where he spent fifty years, and then removed to Bridgewater. He was a plain, honest farmer, firm and reliable, persevering in his labors, and became a large holder of land. Besides the lots purchased of Mr. Bacon, he was constantly having accessions by grants, in different localities.

His wife was ELIZABETH ———.

Here follows a Deed of Sale of land which John Kingman conveyed about the time he removed to Bridgewater, and it is supposed he sold out his possessions, having at that time expectation of removing his residence.

Deed of Sale from John Kingman to Capt. John Holbrook.

TO ALL CHRISTIAN PEOPLE, to whome this present deed of sale shall come, John Kingman of Weymouth, in the Massachusetts Colony in New England, and Elizabeth his wife sendeth Greeting, Know ye, That the said John Kingman and Elizabeth his wife for a valuable consideration to them in hand paid, and secured to be paid by Capt. John Holebrooke of Weymouth, in New England aforesaid. The Receipt whereof they do acknowledge themselves therewith fully satisfied, contented and paid. And those of and every part and parcel thereof do acquit and discharge the said John Holebrooke, his Heirs Executors, Administrators and Assigns, and every of them for ever by these presents. Have given, granted, bargained and sold, aliened, enffoefed and confirmed. And by these presents Do fully, clearly, freely and absolutely Give, Grant, bargaine and sell, aliene, enfoefee and confirme unto the said John Holebrooke his heirs and assignes forever.

All that his upland lying and being in Weymouth upon the neck commonly called Jenner's Neck, the Orchard only excepted, being by estimation Thirty acres more or less. Bounded Southerly with the Land of Samuel Holebrooke. Westerly with a Cartway going to the meadow, and the land of Thomas Kingman and the said Holebrook. Northerly with the Land of Thomas Kingman. Easterly with the Land of James Nash, Thomas Dun and Samuel Holebrooke, with a Barne standing upon the said Land. Also another parcel of Land upon the said neck, belonging to the aforesaide Thirty acres more or less. Bounded southerly with the Land of Thomas Kingman. Westerly with the Land of the said John Holebrooke and the Salt River. Northerly with the salt meadow. Easterly with the Land of John Rogers. Also, Two Acres of salt meadow be it more or less, bounded southerly with the aforesaid Upland, Westerly and Northerly with the Salt River, Easterly with the meadow of John Rogers. June 15, 1757, died Ephraim Thayer, suddenly, in the 88th year of his age, occasioned, as is supposed, by a violent blow in his forehead, with the sharp end of a rail, at the barn door, where he was found dead. About 1765, he removed from the "Robinson neighborhood" to Central Street, and resided in a house which stood where the late Daniel P. Edson lived and died. A short distance east of his house was his place of business. His store was a favorite resort, as the number of country merchants at that day was not large, and from these the Bridgewater soldiers of the Revolutionary army were supplied with ready-made clothing. At the commencement of the Revolution, he was elected commander of the local militia in the East District, or east half of the East Precinct of Bridgewater, and continued in that office till 1784. He was in command of a company in Col. Edward Mitchell's regiment "att the Alarm at Squantum or 'Braintree Farms' in March, 1776." In 1780 he represented Bridgewater at the General Court. He was an energetic business man, and interested in iron manufactures, was an owner in the forges of the East and South Parishes. He was of a cheerful disposition, complaisant, and had a great fondness for children, who always reciprocated his regard for them. His kindness to strangers was proverbial, many of whom could bear witness to his hospitality. Ardently attached to the clergy, he was gratified if he could lighten

their labors or promote the welfare of the people. He was extremely fond of music, and was for many years a leader in that part of public worship. For many years he kept a diary of passing events.

Mr. Kingman was a farmer, and resided on the homestead where he was born, on Summer Street in North Bridgewater. In addition to his agricultural pursuits, he had what was very common in his day, a nail shop, in which nails had to be forged singly. Having a large family, and mostly boys, they were early learned to be efficient in that business, and he was a large manufacturer. Machines for cutting nails from iron plates had not been invented at that time. He also raised considerable tobacco for his own use and his neighbors. When the Revolutionary war broke out we find him in Capt. Nathan Packard's company, Major Eliphalet Cary's regiment, and marched on the Alarm to Rhode Island, July 22, 1780. He was also in Capt. John Thompson's company, in September, 1786. Previous to the division of the old town of Bridgewater, he was a member of the school committee in the North Parish. He was a man of robust constitution, of a humorous disposition, of a kindly, good nature, never giving offence, and fond of anything which contributed to merriment, always having a story on hand to tell with good effect. His company was much sought after by his friends and fellow townsmen, and his witty sayings are remembered, and often mentioned in social circles at the present day.

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

Isaac Kingman, the father of Levi, and his family removed from Worcester to Goshen, Mass., shortly after the Revolution, and settled on what was the "Shaw place." The subject of this sketch early removed to the East Village of Cummington and entered the store of Robert Dawes & Co., and soon became the successor of that firm. In 1820, he enlarged his store building, and in 1821 opened a public house, of which he was proprietor for a dozen years or more, when he retired from active mercantile business to attend to his agricultural interests, in which he was assisted by his boys. His house was always a favorite resort for the people of Cummington and others, and the large building near the "Old Elm Tree" will long be remembered by the travelling public. Mr. Kingman in his early life (1812-1814) was a successful manufacturer of what were well known as "Tuscarora Socks," a patent overshoe. They were a very popular and useful article, and had an extensive sale. Mr. Kingman was a public spirited man, and took a lively interest in every day life. One who knew him well, writes : "There was no stauncher abolitionist in western Massachusetts. He always had a prophet's chamber at the disposal of Garrison, or Phillips, or any one of their Guild. It was owing to him more than to any other person that Cummington was the best anti-slavery town in that section of the State. He was a man of remarkable self-control, and his life was a continual tendency from good to better things." He and the poet Bryant were boys together, the poet being five years the younger.

During the centennial year, Mr. Kingman invited his children home to unite in celebrating his eighty-seventh birthday. We take pleasure in giving the invitation a place in this connection.

An Aged Man Calling His Children Home.

My children are gone from the old house at home, And I'm left to wander almost alone; It doth not become me to grieve and to mourn, For children and bees have to leave their first home.

Now come back, my dear children, come home in the morn, And celebrate the day your father was born; Be here in good season, precisely at noon, And remember the day, the fourteenth of June.

If all my children should come home from the West, It would make me feel happy, cheerful and blest. Come then to the hills, the rocks and the earth, And fill the old house, the place of your birth.

I know you dislike our rocks and our hills, But we never shall swap them for your ague and chills; Come, feeble and sickly, come, see for yourself, Come, make us a visit and get your good health.

The East and the West have no cause to complain, One furnishes clothing and the other fine grain; I would not, if I could, alter either one mite, For He that formed both has made them just right.

Don't be over anxious to get rich in a day, For thieves may break in and steal it away; Rather give heed to what you've been told, Which is better, far better, than bonds or fine gold.

To the widow and the fatherless be generous and true; Help the poor and the needy, wherever you be. We can't do too much if we do all we can, For the fatherhood of God and the brotherhood of man.

Eighty-seven years of my life's passed away, It seems but a month, a week, or a day; While viewing the past I solemnly vow That I'll trust in my Maker, who cares for me now.

If you are not ready and want longer to wait, It may be with me forever too late; When your father calls, you may be deaf or be dumb, But when my Father calls, I've got to go home.

CUMMINGTON, MASS., 1876.

In 1879, three years later, the celebration of the ninetieth birthday of the venerable Levi Kingman, the father of ex-Senator Kingman, at Cummington, on Saturday, June 14, was an event of much The company included all his children, three sons local interest. and three daughters, coming from five different States, and about seventy others, kindred and neighbors. A bountiful collation was served in the open air, at small tables, on the lawn, arranged with exquisite taste. The gathered group, with the blind patriarch for its central figure, formed a picture of rare beauty. Several congratulatory letters were read and a neat poem from Rev. John W. Chadwick. Among the letters was one from Gov. Talbot, who alluded playfully to the fact that Mr. Kingman offered him the village school when he was a student at the Cummington Academy. Brief addresses were made by Lorenzo Tower, W. W. Mitchell, Dr. Kimball, Landlord Babbitt, and by two of the sons, Augustus and Rolden. But the great speech of the occasion was made by the blind old man of ninety. With a strong and ringing voice he gave a sketch of his ninety years' journey. Its whole tone was cheerful, with touching allusions to the long-continued and tender care of his daughter Martha, and a reverent acknowledgment of that Providence which had guided his footsteps through all the years of his pilgrimage.

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ABNER KINGMAN⁶ (Abner, ⁵ John, ⁴ John, ³ John, ² Henry¹), son of Abner and Susanna (Leonard) Kingman, was born June 20, 1772, in Middleboro', Mass. He married LYDIA, born 1770, daughter of Thomas Paddock of Middleboro', November 5, 1793.

This family resided at Warren, R. I., for a short time, and removed to Providence, R. I., in August, 1805, where he engaged in the shoe trade. Previous to this date, he had been a school teacher. He remained in Providence until the latter part of 1827, when he closed his business, and removed to Boston, Mass., in March, 1828, where he remained in broken health until the death of his wife, November 28, 1832. About a year later, while on a visit to his daughters in New Haven, Conn., he died, August 14, 1833, and then ended the earthly life of an exemplary Christian, an influential man, highly cultivated in mind and manners. We know of no better way to give the personal history of this good man than by quoting from a religious newspaper, written a short time after his decease:

"He was a deacon in the church in Providence during the most of twenty-two years. His early advantages for mental and moral improvement were very limited, but what might be called an innate taste for mental culture and general elevation of character prevailed against obstacles. He became a Christian at the age of eighteen, but did not make a public profession of his faith until he was twenty-three. Few men during a Christian walk of forty years have made a happier exhibition of the fruits of divine grace. No one thing in the exhibition of his character was especially striking. In all the relations of life the supreme bent of his soul was manifest. In every scene he aimed to walk as one who had become a partaker of the divine nature and in whose soul the Spirit dwelt.

"Almost equally he discharged the duties that devolved upon him as a husband, a father, a member of Christ's body, a citizen, a servant for Jesus' If more conspicuous in either relation, it was in his family; next, sake. in the church. His sabbath day observance was marked and special. He perpetually urged on all the members of the family the practical shining forth of Christian principle to regulate mutual, every day intercourse. As a member of the church, he was esteemed especially for his holy example, instructive council, and enlarged benevolence. With whatever church he became connected, he was calculated to excite reverence and esteem, and gradually, though unsought, yet by weight of character to become a pillar. He was deeply interested in the critical study of the scriptures, and in introducing the young to such acquaintance. His soul was constantly going forth out of self. In reformation of morals, in healthfulness of public sentiment, in all departments of general benevolence, he had a deep interest. His views on all subjects to which he gave his attention were clear and comprehensive. He had uncommon balance of mind. His social feelings were strong, tender, and widely branching out. His love for his children and his solicitude for their Christian welfare were most marked; and it was his constant prayer that he might deeply feel his solemn obligations to train his children up for God.

Mr. Kingman was the son of a farmer and tanner, and followed the same occupation, and succeeded to the old homestead at North Middleboro', where he became the head of a family of twelve children. He held a major's commission in 1812; but, two persons holding the same office in the same regiment, he was excused from serving. He was a firm and consistent member of the Congregational Church in North Middleboro', and was its first sabbath school superintendent, in 1818. He was of a strong robust nature, and morally strong, of good judgment, and in all the positions he was called to fill he performed their duties in accordance with the saying, "Act well your part, there all the honor lies"; and here we may be permitted to quote from one who writes as follows concerning the characteristics of the Kingman family: "Strong attachment to and high admiration of each other; ambition, not in the acquisition of wealth or goodly apparel, but in the acquisition of knowledge." It may well be said, "A Kingman is a good friend and true, but not an enemy to be desired."

On the seventh day of March, 1848, there was held a family meeting at the old homestead, at which were present five generations, including Mrs. Dean, the mother of Mrs. Kingman, on which occasion Rev. Sylvester Holmes preached a sermon, and an original hymn appropriate to the occasion by Mrs. Fanny Dean Holmes, wife of the preacher, was sung:

Mr. Kingman was a very active business man, and engaged in ship building. He resided in East Bridgewater in a house later occupied by Mr. Chamberlain, opposite the Common, and opposite the soldiers monument. He went to Hanover, Mass., in or about 1799, where he launched, in 1800, the ship "Miantinomo," 281 tons, of Norwich, Conn., named after a famous Narraganset sachem. She was seized by the Spanish, and condemned at Valparaiso in 1801. In 1801, he built the schooner "Union" for Mr. Jackson of Plymouth, Mass. In 1802, brigantine "Callisto," 190 tons, of Boston, Mass. In 1803, ship "Nanking," 290 tons, of Boston. In 1804, two ships. In 1805, three ships. In 1804, ship "Roller," 293 tons, of Boston; ship "Ann," 296 tons, of Baltimore, Md. In 1805, ship "Laura," 293 tons, of Boston; ship "Romeo," 312 tons, of Boston. During the same year, ship "Susan," 311 tons, of Plymouth. Of this latter ship, Mr. Kingman was the owner. It is said by L. Vernon Briggs, in his excellent and elaborate work on ship building on the North River at Hanover, Mass., that the vessels Mr. Kingman built averaged larger than those built at any other yard in Hanover, nearly all being over 300 tons. In 1806, Mr. Kingman built the ship "Charleston and Liverpool Packet," 325 tons, of Boston. In 1807, ship "Isabella," 308 tons, of Hingham, Mass. In 1808, Mr. Kingman formed a partnership with his son-in-law, Hon. Elijah Hayward, and they built in company until Mr. Kingman's death. In 1810, Mr. Kingman had built ship "America," 362 tons, in which he was owner. He also erected the well known tavern, afterward kept by Joseph Pocorny, Henry Costley, Frank Howard, William Rand and W. B. Ames, respectively. It is now known as the "Hanover House." Mr. Kingman was at one time engaged in ship building in Belfast, Me. After the decease of Rev. Samuel Angier at East Bridgewater, he purchased the Angier house and grounds, took down the old "manse" which had stood over eighty years, and erected a large dwelling house and several other buildings. He died April 27, 1812, aged 40 years. A few years after his decease the buildings were all removed, and the house, with some additions, constitute the "Hyland House" at Bridgewater, Mass.

POLLY KINGMAN⁶ (Marlboro,⁵ Ebenezer,⁴ John,³ John,² Henry¹), daughter of Marlboro and Sibyl (Haskell) Kingman, was born in Waterford, Me., November 18, 1797. She married EPPs BURNHAM, born August 16, 1794, of Bridgton, Me., October 16, 1818. The father died at Chelsea, Mass., June 27, 1853. The mother died May 12, 1861.

The father when a boy assisted his father in clearing up a lot of land in Bridgton, and afterward learned the sailmaker's trade. Soon after his marriage, his father gave him a farm adjoining his own, in the cultivation of which he spent much of his time. His son Daniel removed to Mexico in 1841, where he married a Mexican girl. In 1861, he was shot by an Indian near Eagle Pass, Texas, leaving a wife and two daughters. Epps Burnham, accompanied by his son Charles, left Boston in the fall of 1852 for Galveston, Texas, to visit his son Daniel at Samona, Mexico. On his return, leaving Charles to follow next day at Houston, he took passage on the steamer "Farmer" which was racing, opposition to the steamer "Neptune," and when within four miles of port it blew to pieces. At the time of the explosion he was in his berth, and had one of his arms shattered by the opening and closing of timbers on him, rendering it necessary to amputate the arm. His baggage, clothing, money and all was lost, and he was obliged to enter the hospital at Galveston, where he received tolerable care.
