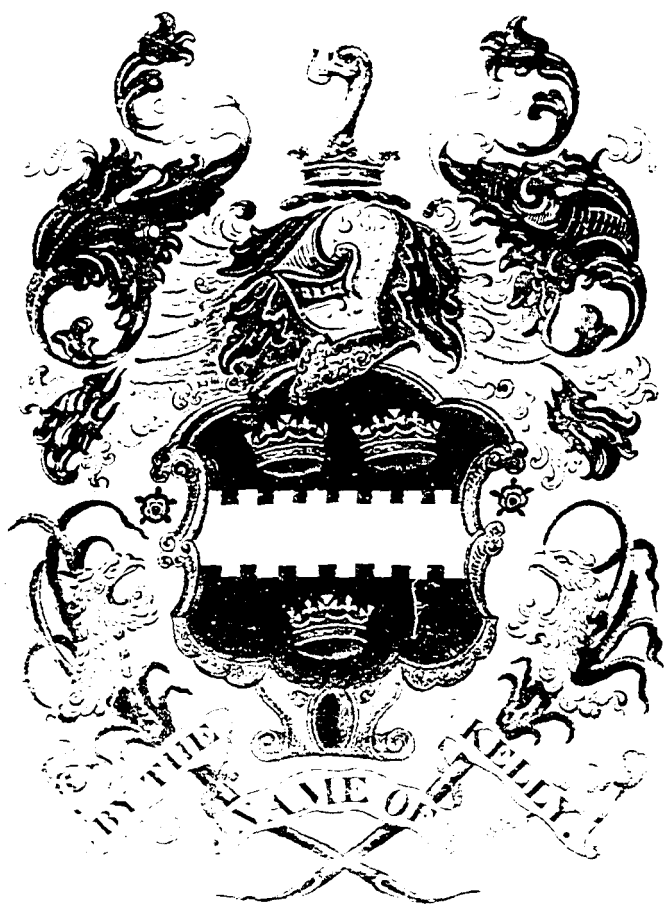

## INTRODUCTION.

The examination of a collection of old family papers, with dates ranging through the entire century preceding the Revolution, first suggested the idea of writing a history of the posterity of John Kelly, of Newbury. These papers were looked over with eager curiosity, even in his boyhood, by the compiler of the present work; and he had hardly passed beyond that early period of his life when he found that the facts presented by them, collated with certain public documents within easy reach, would afford no inconsiderable amount of definite, as well as interesting, knowledge of one of the early New England families. He therefore arranged a methodical and tolerably complete account of the first five generations, and a few of the numerous branches were traced down to the descendants of John Kelly, of Newbury, who were then living. The work was then laid aside. No attempt at preparing this account for publication was made until after a lapse of more than forty years, when it was thought best to extend the field of inquiry over the entire period covering the history of the family in this country.

In the earlier portions of this record is preserved all that could be learned respecting the personal history of the members of the first two or three generations who lived so long ago that little or no knowledge of them has come down in ordinary ways to their descendants now living. Notices, more or less extended, are furnished of those, mostly in the later generations, whose course of life was such as to afford a wider and more enduring recognition. Anecdotes and incidents of little importance in themselves are in many cases given as affording the means of marking individuality more distinctly than could be done by mere records of date, residence and occupation. In all cases it has been the wish of the compiler to avoid fulsome eulogy.

This work was intended to embrace all the descendants of John Kelly, of Newbury, who were born to the family name, together with the children, in the first generation, of those who, in the female line, acquired other surnames. Each individual inheriting the surname of the family is marked numerically by a figure or by figures placed at the left hand of the name, on its first appearance

in the list. This marking proceeds in consecutive order, and thus forms a regular series, commencing with the progenitor of the race and continuing through eight generations. The comparatively few persons of the ninth and tenth generations are placed in immediate and orderly connection with the account of the father and grandfather. After each name is placed a figure pointing out ordinally the generation to which the individual belongs. This marking is used in every instance in which a member of the family is mentioned in any connection whatever, and thus becomes, through references methodically made and intelligible at sight, the means of tracing pedigree in either direction.

While this family has furnished but few men of prominence in the history of our country, it may be characterized, as are other typical New England families, by soberness and thrift, and by devotion to religion, to education, and to all that relates to the public good.

The compiler has taken great care in copying such information as has been sent him, but, as omissions and errors are unavoidable, blank pages have been provided at the end of the book. These pages will also be found useful for additional records. The compiler will be thankful to be notified of any needed corrections or additions.

He here wishes to express his thanks to Messrs. Asa P. and David Kelly, of Chicago, for their appreciation of the time and labor involved in a work of this kind, and for their generous aid in its publication; also to Edward A. Kelly, Esq., and Mr. Fitzroy Kelly, of Boston, and to all who, by their interest and courtesy, have made this compilation possible.

## THE NAME OF KELLY.

The small parish of Kelly in Devonshire, England, has given name to, or taken its name from, a family which has there held its manorial seat for many centuries, and "whose members," says Burke, "may look back beyond the conquest and derive themselves from the ancient Britons." Mr. Shirley says the manor and advowson have been in this family at least from the time of Henry II. Branches divergent at various times from this old family seated themselves at Exeter and other places in Devonshire, and doubtless gave their share of emigrants to the New World. The name of the parish and family was anciently spelled Kelleigh, but became Kelly before this latter form was known elsewhere.

Reginald Kelly, Esq., the present head of the Devonshire House, has furnished from "the principal Registry of the Lord Bishop of Exeter," a list of all the persons, eleven in number, whose wills were admitted to probate, or on whose estates letters of administration were granted during the first half of the seventeenth century, in the Bishopric of Exeter. One of these persons was Richard Kelly, of Exeter (date 1645).

A Norman origin has also been claimed for Kelly as an English name. The N. E. Hist. Gen. Soc. Register, Vol. II, No. 1, gives a reprint of one of the four existing copies of the Roll of Battle Abbey. This reprint contains the name of Le Sire de Cailly. In a foot note is the remark that this is the name Kelly, or Kelley, which is found in a great many different spellings. It should here be stated, however, that the descent from Le Sire de Cailly, marked out by the law of primogeniture, is given under the name Cayley, in Burke's Enc. of Heraldry. Other lines may perhaps have written "Kelly."

One authority makes Kellie a diminutive of Charles.

In Ireland, Kelly has been for centuries one of the most common of surnames. Originally it was Ceallach, which, in the Irish language signified strife, war. It was taken as the personal appellation of a certain warrior who lived in one of the earlier centuries of our era. "*A quo*," says the Irish genealogist, the "surname

O'Kelly." The pedigree of this line is traced by the antiquaries of Ireland, in their way, back through sixty-five generations to Heremon. Indeed, it is claimed that the ancestry of Milesius of Spain, the father of Heremon, is itself traceable quite to Adam!

A Welsh scholar, resident in Utica, N. Y., writes: "Kelly is not a Welsh name in its present form. There was a word something like it, Cellyn, pronounced Kellyn. This word means the wood that is called holly in English."

Lower, in his "English Surnames," says: "Thousands of English surnames are derived from villages and towns." The district of Kelly in Devonshire may have gotten its name from the old Celtic word, and, in very ancient times, may in turn have given it as a surname to the principal landholder in the locality.

In the Isle of Man, a family of the name of Kelly has from time immemorial possessed a small freehold.

Kellie occurs in the titular designation of the noble Scotch House of Erskine. The title Earl of Kellie, is taken from a district of the shire of Fife, anciently called Kellie-shire. On old maps and in old books relating to Scotland and her history, the name is often spelled Kelly.

The above is only a small part of much interesting matter that has been gathered, and which would take too much space in this volume. In all his investigations, however, the compiler has encountered the same difficulties that beset most genealogists in tracing the transatlantic origin of early American families.

As is stated in the account of the first John Kelly, of Newbury, the probabilities seem to be in favor of his descent from some branch of the Devonshire family.

As written by the descendants of the early immigrant, the shorter form, Kelly, was the only one in use for more than a century. As written by others, it has been spelled and misspelled in every conceivable way, Kelley seldom appearing until its comparatively recent adoption by individual members of several branches of the Newbury race.



## FIRST GENERATION.

1. John Kelly<sup>1</sup>, one of the early settlers of Newbury, Mass., is said to have come to that place from the town of Newbury, England, in the year 1635.

Nothing is known of his history previous to his appearance in New England; and the records of the new settlement in which he made his home contain but few references to him during the nine years which intervened between the traditionary date of his arrival and the recorded date of his death.

Among the earlier grants of land made in the town is the following: "To John Kelly an House Lott of four acres over the Great River, be it more or less; bounded by the River on the north, John Pemerton on the west, by the way on the south, and John Merrill on the east. Also a planting Lott of four acres on the same Neck, be it more or less; and is bounded by John Merrill on the west, Abraham Tappan on the east, the way on the north and the marsh on the south."

The date of this grant is not given, but there is authority for saying that like many others of the same kind, it was made at some time during the year 1639.

The "Great River" is the river Parker, near the mouth of which, on the northern bank, the colonists first seated themselves. The "Neck"—Newbury Neck—is that portion of the town which lies between the river Parker on the north, and the boundary line of Rowley on the south, extending eastward to Plum Island Sound. It consists in large part of salt marsh, lying along the river, however: and, rising from it to a considerable height by a steep, rocky bank, is a tract of upland of sufficient extent to form two or three farms of moderate size. On this tract were laid out the house lot and planting lot of John Kelly.

A house lot seems at some time to have been assigned to him in a different locality. This appears from a later record, having reference to his only son, to whom was granted a lot of four acres, described as having the "Comon" on the west and south, and as "bounded with stakes, being granted by the Towne for his father's House Lott."

Neither of the two house lots thus assigned to the first John Kelly was accepted by him, or, if accepted, was made use of in the way contemplated; for when he built his house he located it on the north side of Oldtown Hill, at a considerable distance from the little community on the banks of the river Parker. This was considered a very daring proceeding, as the remoteness of the situation from the principal settlement exposed him to the attacks of wild beasts and savage Indians. The remonstrances of his fellow citizens took the form of a vote of the town, declaring that if he should lose his life in consequence of his temerity, "his blood should be on his own head."

The precise spot on which his house stood seems to be pointed out with a degree of probability by some circumstances which will be mentioned in connection with a notice of the house built by his only son.

It is related of John Kelly, that on one occasion, hearing a disturbance in his enclosure during the night, he sprang from his bed, and, without stopping to dress himself, rushed out of the house, and, with a club attacked and killed a wolf, which was making havoc with his sheep.

In a walk about the place, not long after his arrival in Newbury, he is said to have descried a plant whose large leaves he supposed might furnish a substitute for the cabbage—a vegetable of which he was very fond; and accordingly, with what might seem to be a characteristic want of consideration, had it prepared for his table. The consequence was a violent illness which came near terminating his life.

Hon. John Kelly, late of Exeter, N. H. (154 John<sup>6</sup>), a noted antiquary, speaking of "the first John Kelly," says: "He appears to have had considerable property, for he brought goods in two large chests, which fell to his grandson Richard" (4 Richard<sup>5</sup>). This supposition is hardly borne out by the record. The number of original grantees in Newbury was ninety-one, to each one of whom was granted a quantity of land proportional to the amount of property already held in possession. The name of John Kelly is not among the "rich" who receive grants of large extent.

[NOTE.—One of the two chests just now mentioned is at present, (1884) in the possession of Simon Merrill, of Hampstead, N. H., whose wife is a descendant in the seventh degree from the early New England settler (385 Hannah<sup>7</sup>). The other chest was owned not many years since by Edmund Kelly, of Newport, N. H. (372 Edmund<sup>7</sup>)].

Nothing can be said respecting the origin, ancestry and connections of John Kelly beyond what is contained in a few meager family traditions. Of these, the one which can be traced farthest back, and which has come down in a direct line of transmission, asserts that he was born in Exeter, County of Devon, England, and suggests a connection with some branch of a family which took its name originally from the parish of Kelly in Devonshire, which has held its seat there seven centuries certainly, and probably for a much longer period, and from which individuals are known to have gone at various times to make their homes in the city of Exeter.

In Coffin's History of Newbury a different account is given of the origin of "John Kelly, the first who came to this country." It is there said that "his father emigrated from Ireland to Newbury, England, became attached to a lady of rank; and, having on one occasion by his courage successfully defended her father's house when attacked by robbers, obtained his consent to a marriage with his daughter." This statement is wholly unsupported by corroborative facts or historical references. John Kelly died December 28, 1644.

## SECOND GENERATION.

CHILDREN OF 1 JOHN<sup>1</sup> AND ——— KELLY.

2. 1 Sarah<sup>2</sup> born February 12, 1641. A. Sarah or Mary Kelly married John Belconger, April 12, 1666, and had a daughter, Mary, born December 7, 1666.

3. 11 John<sup>2</sup> born July 2, 1642, married Sarah, daughter of Deacon Richard Knight, May 25, 1663. Sarah Knight was born March 23, 1648. John Kelly took the "Freeman's Oath" May 19, 1669. Besides the house lot which had been laid out for his father and which was afterward assigned to himself as already mentioned, another grant of land was made to him by the town, viz.: "five acres of marsh in the Great Marsh." Also, "there was granted to John Kelly the cutting of five acres of meadow in Cypress Swamp, provided the Towne's Heards shall not be hindered, but have free Egress and regress through the same at all times." The copies of these grants in the "Proprietors' Books" are without date.

In the "tax list" of the town of Newbury made in the year 1688, the "valuation" of John Kelly is as follows: "Heads 3, Houses 2, Plowlands 14, Meadow 20, Pasture 7, Horses 4, Oxen 3, Cows 5, Three years old 3, one year old 3, Sheep 12, Hogs 4." In a notice of the second John Kelly contained in Morrison's History of Windham, N. H., it is said that he was the largest farmer except one in Newbury. This could be true of him only at a much later date than that of the "valuation," and also only as limited to what is now the town of West Newbury. Before the year 1690 certainly, and probably before the date mentioned, 1688, month of August —, John Kelly built a house at the foot of Gravel Hill, on the west side of the road. While a company of men, many years ago, were digging in the field on the opposite side of the road from this house, they came, at the depth of several feet from the surface, upon the remaining walls of an old cellar. Mr. C. M. Lunt, who was born in the Kelly house spoken of above, a few years before it was taken down, and who still lives in the neighborhood, is confident, as are others, that this is the cellar over which

stood the house built and occupied by the first John Kelly, and owned by his son. The situation of the spot on which were located the two houses of the second John Kelly is low. The view eastward extends over a narrow strip of upland and the outspread marshes of Newbury to the sand-hills of Plum Island, and to the blue waters of the ocean beyond. Close by on the south is Oldtown Hill with its broad open pastures. Westward lies a stretch of marsh and low level upland, while, in a northerly direction an elevated tract of land, two miles away, hides from view the abodes, the places of business and the public edifices of the fair city of Newburyport, just beyond.

John Kelly removed with all his children, except his firstborn son, from his home at Oldtown to the "Upper Woods" in Newbury, now West Newbury, as early as the year 1694. The place on which he located is on Worth's Lane not far from its termination at the river. He was very early authorized to keep a ferry at Holt's Rocks.

In the long contest between Rev. Mr. Parker and a portion of his church—the first church in Newbury—John Kelly, while he remained at Oldtown, was uniformly on the side of his pastor. His name is one of the signatures affixed to the covenant adopted by the second church in Newbury (first church in West Newbury) at its organization October 20, 1698. The names of himself and his wife, Sarah, are in a full list of the members of the second church at the time of the ordination of Rev. Mr. Tufts, June 20, 1714. His wife died soon after this date, and he married March 15, 1716, Lydia Ames, of Bradford.

His name as affixed by his own hand to legal documents is always written John Kally. His wife wrote, Sarah Kelly.

3. John<sup>2</sup> Kelly died March 21, 1718.

## THIRD GENERATION.

CHILDREN OF 3 JOHN<sup>2</sup> AND SARAH (KNIGHT) KELLY.

4. 1 Richard<sup>3</sup> [1 John<sup>1</sup>, 3 John<sup>2</sup>] born February 28, 1666: married first, Sarah, daughter of Lieut. James Smith. She was born April 12, 1668. He lived at Oldtown, probably in the house occupied by his father before removing to the "Upper Woods" (West Newbury), though he owned and may possibly have dwelt in another house in the neighborhood, having come into possession of the "housing," as well as "the greater part of the lands in Newbury" belonging to his maternal grandfather, Deacon Richard Knight.

Richard Kelly was a carpenter by occupation, but came to be at one time the holder of pretty extensive landed possessions. He was the owner of several slaves. The two receipts following are printed in Coffin's History of Newbury: "Reseved of Richard Kelly of Newbury, the sum of thorty eayght pound in full, mony for a Spanish Ingun boy named Sesor, by our judgment under ten eyr old, in the eyr 1714, reseved by me this day of jentry, being the fifteenth of jentry 1718; I say by me, Cutting Noyes."

"November 4th, 1725. I, the subscriber, do one and acknowledge that I have sold to Mr. Richard Kelly a nagrow man caled Reuben; for which I have received an hundred pounds in bills of credit, Jonathan Poore."

The wife of Richard Kelly died August 15 (or 25), 1725, and he married, second, Mrs. Hannah Greenough, whose maiden name seems to have been Hannah Dole, and who was born in Newbury in 1685. This second marriage took place October 16, 1725.

Mr. Kelly died June 18, 1734. He had no issue.

The will of "Richard Kelly, carpenter, of Newbury," made May 15, 1734, was offered for probate July 15, 1734. The executor was the testator's nephew and namesake, 17. Richard<sup>4</sup> Kelly of Amesbury (Merrimac), who in youth and early manhood had been a member of his family. The inventory of Richard Kelly's estate was presented July 1, 1734. The real estate consisted of "the buildings and 104 acres of land."

Several papers from the hand of Richard Kelly have been preserved. Among the manuscripts that have come down from him is his "Book of Accounts." On the first page of this book he writes: "1698, november the 1st day I bot this book in boston, and it cost too shilings." The entries on its pages are chiefly charges for work at his trade performed by himself and by those in his service. He wrote his name in this book, as on all his papers, Richerd Kelly. His hand writing is peculiar. It is so close and crowded as to be read with difficulty.

5. II John<sup>2</sup> [1 John<sup>1</sup>, 3 John<sup>2</sup>], born June 17, 1668; married Elizabeth Emery, November 16, 1696. He lived in West Newbury on his father's homestead. His name, with that of his wife, is on a list of "members in full communion" in the second church in Newbury (first church in West Newbury), at the time of the ordination of Rev. Mr. Tufts, June 30, 1714. Their names occur in a list of the members of the same church fourteen years later.

This "third John Kelly" bought land in Amesbury (now Merrimac) at a place called "ye Champion Land," March 28, 1709. This purchase is of interest as being the first indication that attention had become directed to a locality on or near which, two branches of the Kelly family shortly after seated themselves, where many of the race have been born and have died, and where some who bear the ancestral name still hold their cherished homes.

John Kelly died November 29 (30 Cof.) 1735; "will proved Dec. 15, 1735." The will was signed November 10, 1735, his eldest son, 14 John<sup>1</sup>, being appointed executor. Inventory presented January 6, 1736. The real estate consisted of the homestead in West Newbury, eighty acres with buildings, a house and sixty acres of land in Amesbury (Merrimac), ten acres of salt marsh and a "river lot" near Muzzey's Lane.

6. III Sarah<sup>2</sup> born September 4 (1 Cof.) 1670, married, Henry Hale September 11, 1695. Children, Thomas, born, November 15, 1696. Sarah born, October 21, 1698. Enoch, born, October 11, 1702, died in infancy. Enoch and Edmund twins, born, October 7, 1703. This last named Edmund married Martha Sawyer, May 16, 1728, and died May, 1788. Among the descendants from Sarah Hale was the late Hon. Selma Hale, of New Hampshire.

7. IV Abiel<sup>3</sup> [1 John<sup>1</sup>, 3 John<sup>2</sup>] born, December 12, 1672.

married Rebecca, daughter of Samuel Davis of Haverhill, January 15, (5 Cof.) 1697. He was one of twenty-four persons who in 1796 "wished the second meeting house in Newbury to be located on Pipe Stave Hill, and not on the plains." He and his wife were members of the second church in Newbury (first church in West Newbury) at the time of Rev. Mr. Tuft's ordination, June 30, 1714.

With his brother, 10 Jonathan<sup>3</sup>, and eight others he received on petition, September 24, 1718, a grant from the town of eighty rods of the flats above Holt's Rocks, as fishing ground, "upon condition that they pay yearly one salmon each to Rev. Mr. Tappan and Rev. Mr. Tufts."

He was resident in Newbury (West) as late as April 17, 1727. This appears from a document of that date bearing his signature. Nine months later he was in Methuen (Salem, N.H.) On January 17, 1728, he, with his son Richard, both of that town, bought of James Eaton, of Haverhill, eighty acres of land in Methuen, one of the corner bounds of which was at a point "on the top of Spicket Hill." March 15, 1729, he bought of John Renwee, joiner, of Methuen, a certain tract of land "situate lying and being in Haverhill and Methuen, by estimation 200 acres." It is described as "being on the south side of a path leading to Capt. Wainwright's Spicket Meadow, so called;" and as having on one side the old Spicket path, and on another side Spicket meadow, "but reserving and leaving sufficient way for people to fetch their hay from out said meadow, joining said land."

He, with his wife, was dismissed from the second church in Newbury (First in West Newbury) in November, 1729, in order to join the church in Methuen. He was one of a committee appointed to lay out "a burying place" in the North Parish in Methuen (Salem, N. H.) in the year 1736. The parish voted, December 17, 1739, "to Abiel Kelly, for bords, the sum of 1. 3. 0." The boards were for a meeting house which was going up at the time. He was elected parish clerk the year previous.

The date of his death is thus given in the records of Salem: "Abiel Kelly desest on June ye 18, 1750."

S. v Rebecca<sup>3</sup>, born April (May, Cof.) 15, 1675, married James Browne. No record of her marriage has been found, but James and Rebecca Browne jointly give receipt, May 16, 1735, for money



paid by the executor of the will of their brother, 4 Richard<sup>2</sup>. Children: Sarah, born November 8, 1701. John, born October 30, 1703. James, born May 25, 1708. Rebecca, born February 17, 1710. Samuel, born July 7, 1712, married, probably, Hannah Pike, his cousin, and daughter of Hugh and 12 Hannah<sup>2</sup> (Kelly), Pike.

9. vi Mary<sup>2</sup>, born May 27 (24, Cof.), 1678, married William Davis, of Haverhill, December 31, 1700. She signed receipt by "mark" for money paid to her by the executor of the will of her brother, Richard. Date, January 25, 1736.

She died December 5, 1736. Her husband died September 11, 1753. Her name is written "Mary Calce" in the records of Haverhill. Children: Mary, born November 29, 1701, died February 14, 1702. Mary, born March 28, 1703, died January 6, 1710. Deborah, born November 30, 1705. Abigail, born June 20, 1708. Mary, born April 10, 1711, died December 19, 1718. Sarah, born June 14, 1714. William, born November 23, 1719, died June 27, 1720. Judith, born March 12, 1722.

10. vii Jonathan<sup>2</sup> [1 John<sup>1</sup>, 3 John<sup>2</sup>], born March 20, 1681, married Hester, daughter of Deacon Benjamin Morse, July 6, 1702. One month later his father conveyed to him twenty-five acres of the homestead. On this he lived just a quarter of a century.

He, with his wife, united with the Second Church in Newbury (First Church in West Newbury), March 8, 1713.

Jonathan Kelly bought of Jeremiah Davis, of Amesbury, June 21, 1726, forty acres of land in Amesbury (Merrimac), "being in the Third Division behind the pond." Consideration, £220. This tract of land "abutted on a highway next Burching meadow," and was bounded on the west by land of Joseph Carrier. He sold his house in West Newbury, together with twenty-six acres of land, to Abel Merrill, Jr., April 17, 1727. Price, £500. His wife, "Heaster Kelly," gave her signature to the deed. Soon after this sale he removed to West Amesbury (Merrimac), settling on the lot bought of Mr. Davis. His house, which was on this purchase, was situated in a solitary place, at the western base of "Long Hill." The spot is not now approached by any roadway regularly laid out.

He and his wife were dismissed in April, 1730, from the church in West Newbury "to join Rev. Mr. Wingate's church." His name appears several times on the records of that church, in connection with various church committees.

March 5, 1754, he made a settlement of accounts with Timothy

Harvey, who, for a period of seven years, had "carried on his place." He writes "Jonathen Kelly."

Rev. John Kelly, of Hampstead, N. H., 162 John<sup>6</sup>, in childhood often saw him after he had reached the great age of ninety years, and described him as being "low in stature, thick-set, and of a ruddy countenance."

11. VIII Joseph<sup>2</sup> [1 John<sup>1</sup>, 3 John<sup>2</sup>], born December 1, 1683, married Jane Heath, of Haverhill, December 23, 1706.

Two years before his marriage he bought of his father twenty-five acres of land in West Newbury, "being a part of the forty-sixth and forty-seventh lots in the river division of freeholds." This tract adjoined one of similar extent already in possession of his brother, Jonathan. Deed dated December 29, 1704.

By a deed dated September 23, 1717, John Heath, of Haverhill, conveyed to Joseph Kelly "all right and title to a place in Haverhill called the Heath farm," on which said Heath was living. It consisted of twenty-five acres. It was situated in East Haverhill, and was no doubt the one which, down to the present time, has been owned and occupied by some one bearing the family name, and standing in a direct line of descent from Joseph Kelly.

Together with several others living in the easterly part of Haverhill, among whom was his son, 47 Joseph<sup>4</sup>, he petitioned the general court, under the date of May 25, 1743, for permission to form a parish in East Haverhill.

He was "dismissed with his wife from the Second Church in Amesbury (church in Merrimac) November 5, 1744, "in order to their being gathered with others into a church in East Haverhill."

He and his son signed a petition in opposition to a petition calling for a "new meeting of the town." The counter petition bore date May 23, 1748.

He wrote his name "Josaph Kelly."

12. IX Hannah<sup>3</sup>, born November 17, 1686, married Hugh Pike, of Haverhill, June 30, 1714. Mr. Pike probably lived in that part of the town which, on the running of the State line in 1741, fell within the town of Plaistow, N. H. Among several children were John, born ——. He gave a receipt, February 4, 1735, to the

executor of the will of his uncle, 4 Richard<sup>3</sup> Kelly, for payment of charges against said Richard's estate. Hannah, born March 31, 1715, married Samuel Browne, who was, perhaps, her cousin, as intimated in the notice of S Rebecca<sup>2</sup>.

Hannah Pike gave receipt to the executor of 4 Richard<sup>3</sup> Kelly's will for delivery of a "fether bead" which was bequeathed to her by her honored uncle, Richard Kelly. "Signed by her mark." Date, July 2, 1734. Nearly two years later, May 12, 1736, "Samuel Browne and Hannah his wife" gave receipt to the same person for the payment of a legacy bequeathed to Mrs. Browne in the will of their uncle Richard Kelly. Hannah Browne's signature to this paper is written in full, and in a tolerably fair hand. She seems to have obtained a husband, and to have learned to write—most valuable acquisitions truly—in the interval between the dates of her two receipts. In the later receipt, the one signed by her jointly with her husband, she is mentioned as "the wife" of Samuel Brown. When referred to a second time in the document she is called "Hannah Pike alos (alias) Brown."

13. x Abigail<sup>3</sup>, born March 5, 1691, married Samuel Currier, of Haverhill, June 30, 1714. Her husband was born in 1685.

Samuel and Abigail Currier had ten children, of whom seven were sons. Asa, the youngest son, married Rebecca Plummer, of Hampstead, N. H., March 22, 1757. He was a soldier in the army of the Revolution, was in the battle of Bunker Hill, died at West Point, in 1781.

[NOTE.—The "Scheme" of 48 John<sup>2</sup> says that one of the daughters of the second John Kelly married a Mr. Burpee, of Rowley. A second husband?]

## FOURTH GENERATION.

CHILDREN OF 5 JOHN<sup>3</sup> AND ELIZABETH (EMERY) KELLY.

14. i John<sup>4</sup> [1 John<sup>1</sup>, 3 John<sup>2</sup>, 5 John<sup>3</sup>], born October 9, 1697, married Hannah, daughter of Capt. Somes, of Gloucester, Mass., December 31, 1723. He was admitted to the Second Church in Newbury (First Church in West Newbury), August 6, 1722. He lived on the spot on which he was born, or near it, until past middle age. He then went to Atkinson, N. H., and there remained until his death, which occurred April, 27, 1783. He died of cancer. His wife died July 8, 1776. Their gravestones, standing side by side, are still to be seen near the western angle of the cemetery in Atkinson.

## CHILDREN, 48-56.

15. ii Elizabeth<sup>4</sup>, born —. An Elizabeth Kelly married Edmund Worth, of West Newbury. Published November 2, 1718. Children: Edmund, born October 1, 1719; Stephen, born July 6, 1722.

Elizabeth, the daughter of 5 John<sup>3</sup> Kelly, widow probably of Edmund Worth, married in 1725, Stephen Morse, of West Newbury, and had children as follows: Thomas, born June 30, 1726, married Elizabeth Bartlett, was a weaver. Stephen, born 1727-28, married Judith Carr, died in West Newbury, June 1, 1753. Elizabeth, born 1730. Judith, born 1732. Sarah, born 1734. Anthony, born 1736, married Betty Platts. Lived in Pembroke, N. H.

16. iii Judith<sup>4</sup>, baptized March 29, 1702, married Joseph Moody. Lived in West Amesbury (Merrimac) near the Rocks Village in East Haverhill. She died December 20, 1738.

A Judith Kelly married Joseph Little, November 27, 1722. Both of West Newbury. This could hardly be any other than the Judith who later, by a second marriage, became the wife of Mr. Moody. Joseph Little was born, April 20, 1701.

17. iv Richard<sup>4</sup> [1 John<sup>1</sup>, 3 John<sup>2</sup>, 5 John<sup>3</sup>], born March 8, 1704. He says: "June 5th in the year 1717 I went from my father's to live with my uncle Richard (4 Richard<sup>3</sup>), at Oldtown, being about thirteen years and six months old." December 20, 1725, while yet with

his uncle, he married Hannah Bartlett, of Newbury. She was the daughter of John Bartlett, and not distantly related to Hon. Josiah Bartlett, of Kingstown, N. H., governor of the State of New Hampshire, and a signer of the Declaration of Independence.

[NOTE.—As nearly as can be learned from a somewhat confused collection of names and dates, she would seem to have been a cousin of the illustrious statesman.]

"I removed my family," he writes, "to Amesbury, between the 20th and 30th of April, in the year 1727." The farm on which he settled in Amesbury (now Merrimac) is at Birch Meadow. He bought it April 17, 1727, of his cousin, 24 Richard<sup>2</sup> (who had lived on it about five years), and his uncle, 7 Abiel<sup>2</sup>, a joint owner.

Mr. Kelly's occupation in early manhood was that of a shoemaker. In later life he was the owner and cultivator of a large farm.

For a time he was commander of the Second Foot Company of Militia in Amesbury. His commission bears date of March 21, 1757. He was for several terms one of the board of selectmen of the town.

Among the bequests made to him by his uncle, 4 Richard<sup>2</sup>, was a negro slave, Reuben. This person remained in the family, in the capacity of a servant, for many years.

Capt. Kelly, during a large portion of his mature life, was in the frequent practice of taking down, in short-hand, the sermons preached in the regular services of the meeting-house on Sundays. His mode of abbreviated writing appears, from an inspection of a partial list of his "characters," to have been devised expressly for the purpose of reporting religious discourses of the style and general character prevalent in his day, but to have been wholly inadequate for reproducing public utterances on general subjects.

Capt. Kelly died June 18, 1774.

Several papers left by him possess considerable interest for the local historian and antiquary. Quotations and abstracts from them have appeared in Coffin's History of Newbury, Merrill's History of Amesbury; also in Chase's History of Haverhill.

His wife survived him several years. She loaned a sum of money to the town of Amesbury in the year 1780.

Hannah, wife of Capt. Richard Kelly, was a woman of ardent temperament, strong will, and almost incredible power of physical endurance. Taking offense at some remark made to her by her pastor, Rev. Mr. Wingate, in censure of her treatment of the slave

Reuben, she left his communion, and connected herself with the Presbyterian Church in Newburyport. It is related of her that on Sundays, when the weather was favorable, after performing the ordinary morning duties of her household, she would walk to Newburyport—a distance of ten miles—attend two services in Rev. Mr. Parkers Church, in each of which the sermon was two hours in length; then at night watch with some sick person, if she could find one in town, and early on Monday morning walk home and enter upon the usual toilsome task of the day.

On one occasion her husband put up a stone wall at no great distance from the house. This proved to be little to her liking, and she quickly removed a portion of it, two rods in length, with her own hands.

Wearied at length with her frequent journeys to Newburyport, and feeling, perhaps, the infirmities of approaching age, she gave up her connection with the Presbyterians, and joined herself to the Baptists—New Lights, as they were called—who held their meetings in different houses in her neighborhood. She, however, took care not to share in all the extravagances which marked their first appearance in her neighborhood.

Age as it came upon her brought its soothing influences, and the last years of her life were years of peacefulness and content. The father of the writer remembered her as a pleasant, genial old lady, sitting by the fireside with her knitting-work or her Bible in her hand.

18. v Stephen<sup>4</sup>, born July 9, 1706; died, it is said, at the age of sixteen years.

19. vi Mary<sup>4</sup>, born December 31, 1708; married Samuel Sawyer, July 9, 1728. Her name is in the list of "those admitted to full communion" in the Second Church in Newbury (First in West Newbury) "since the great and terrible earthquake." Her name is among the "young women" then admitted. The date was October 29, 1727.

Mr. Sawyer lived in West Newbury; had a son, John, born February 23, 1746.

20. vii Hannah<sup>4</sup>, born March 2, 1711, married Stephen Bailey, of West Newbury, May 12, 1729. She died January 10, 1784. Mr. Bailey died July 2, 1797, aged eighty-nine. Children: Sarah,

born January 2, 1732, died in infancy. Stephen, born October 23, 1736. Enoch and Daniel, twins, born April 26, 1741. Joshua, born August 27, 1744. Sarah, born October 29, 1746. Amos, born May 26, 1750.

The Bailey place is on Worth's Lane, midway between the river and the road to Groveland.

21. viii Lydia<sup>1</sup>, born May 31, 1713, married John Morse. Lived near the "Deacon Tenney place," on the road to Craneneck hill.

Children : Lydia born—, died in infancy. Mary, born March 28, 1736, married Abner Chase, of Amesbury. John, born December 31, 1738, married Dorothy, daughter of Timothy Morse. Lydia, born February 5, 1740, married first Samuel Sawyer, married second Joseph Chase. Timothy, born 1743, married Huldah Smith, of Ipswich. Sarah, born August 19, 1745, married David Harri-man, of Plaistow, N. H. Jonathan, born October 17, 1747, married first Mary Moody, married second Judith Brown, lived in Newburyport (Rev. James Morss, D.D. of Newburyport, said to have been a grandson of John and Lydia (Kelly) Morse, was born in that city October 25, 1779). Daniel, born April 17, 1750, married Mary Challis, lived near "Kelly's Brook" in West Newbury. Elizabeth, born 1752, married Nicholas Short, of Newburyport. Judith, born 1754, died 1756. Amos, born 1757, died 1775.

22. ix Daniel<sup>1</sup> [1 John<sup>1</sup>, 3 John<sup>2</sup>, 5 John<sup>3</sup>], born May 9, 1716, married Mercy Smith, of Newbury, October 30, 1734. He lived in West Amesbury (Merrinac), near its western limit. All his father's lands in that locality were devised to him, "provided he pay to his six sisters," etc., which condition was duly performed. A will of Daniel Kelly, written by the hand of his brother, 17 Richard<sup>1</sup>, and signed by himself, but never presented for probate, is dated February 18, 1773. His wife was then living. This will is authority for several items given in their appropriate places.

23. x Sarah<sup>1</sup>, born October 6, 1718, married first Amos Clark, who removed to Hamstead, N. H. Children : Judith, born October 5, 1740. Thomas, born March 7, 1743. Moses, born March 25, 1746. Priscilla, born March 13, 1748. Amos, born —, died January 10, 1750. Amos, born October 22, 1751. Jonathan and Eliz-

abeth, twins, born March 31, 1754. Jonathan died January 4, 1756. Jonathan, born April 30, 1756.

Of these children one, Moses, lived in Warner, N. H. Another, Amos, lived in Hampstead, N. H. Jonathan went to Alexandria, N. H. Priscilla, who married a Mr. Taylor, also lived in Alexandria.

Sarah, widow of Amos Clark, married second, Mr. Hadley.

24. XI Moses<sup>4</sup>, born July 20, 1721. "By his father's will he was to have thirty acres of the southerly end of the homestead in West Newbury, but he died before reaching his majority."

#### CHILDREN OF 7 ABIEL<sup>3</sup> AND REBECCA (DAVIS) KELLY.

25. I Richard<sup>4</sup> [1 John<sup>1</sup>, 3 John<sup>2</sup>, 7 Abiel<sup>3</sup>], born October 24, 1697, married Susannah Hoyt, of Amesbury, September 28, 1721. She was born February 20, 1697. Her father was William Hoyt, a grandson of John Hoyt, one of the earliest settlers in the town of Amesbury.

Conjointly with his father, Richard Kelly bought, December 13, 1722, a lot of land in Amesbury (West), originally the lot of Robert Quenbe. On this spot he lived a few years and here three of his children were born. The place was sold to his cousin, 17 Richard<sup>4</sup>, April 17, 1727, as elsewhere stated, and soon after with his father he removed to Methuen (Salem, N. H.).

In 1738 he was one of "a committee to provide stuff for a meeting-house." He and two others were a committee calling "a meeting of the voters of the North Parish in Methuen," the call bearing date April 18, 1740.

It is recorded of him that he "was baptized and admitted to the Haverhill Church January 21, 1728." This must have been very soon after his removal from Amesbury. It is further stated that with others he "was dismissed from the Haverhill Church to form a new Church in Methuen" October 26, 1729.

He held a commission of captain in the Provincial militia.

26. II Sarah<sup>4</sup>, born August 14, 1699. (1700 Newbury Rec.)

27. III Mary<sup>4</sup>, born ———, baptized March 29, 1702, died February 26, 1706.

28. IV Rebecca<sup>4</sup>, born September 20 (26 Cal.), 1705, married



Daniel Peaslee, of Haverhill, July 21, 1724. This was without doubt Daniel Peaslee, Esq., afterward of Salem, N. H., a prominent man in the early history of that town.

29. v Abiel<sup>4</sup> [1 John<sup>1</sup>, 3 John<sup>2</sup>, 7 Abiel<sup>3</sup>], born February 19, 1707, married Ruth Peaslee, of Haverhill, June 3, 1728. With his brother Richard he "was dismissed from Haverhill Church to form a new church in Methuen." October 26, 1729.

On the day of his marriage he bought of his father fifty acres of land in Methuen (Salem, N. H.). In 1738 he was "collector of the North Parish."

He died intestate and Enoch Bartlett, of Newbury, was appointed January 26, 1746, administrator of his estate, which was "rendered insolvent." Among the creditors "were Rebecca Kelly and Abiel Kelly, who was his father."

30. vi Mary<sup>4</sup>, born May 27, 1709, married John Hackett April 29, 1731.

31. vii Abigail<sup>4</sup>, born March 16, 1712, married David Dow June 20, 1736.

32. viii Hannah<sup>4</sup>, born March 14, 1714, married John Lowell November 14, 1732. Had son, John, born October 19, 1733.

33. ix Mehitabel<sup>4</sup> } twins, born August 18, 1716.

34. x Ruth<sup>4</sup> }

Mehitabel<sup>4</sup> Kelly married Peter Merrill, published March 1, 1738. Had a daughter, who was the wife of Daniel Gordon, and who died December 2, 1764. Another daughter, Ruth, died December 12, 1780.

Ruth<sup>4</sup> Kelly married Edward Clark, Jr., of Methuen. Children: Elizabeth, born January 15, 1737. Sarah, born May 12, 1739. Mehitabel, born April 18, 1744. Edward, born August 30, 1746.

CHILDREN OF 10 JONATHAN<sup>2</sup> AND HESTER (MORSE) KELLY.

35. i Ruth<sup>4</sup>, born April 15, 1704, married first Abel Merrill, of West Newbury, December 12, 1721. Children: Abel, born September 12, 1722. Sarah, born May 7, 1727. Stephen, born June 10, 1731; lived in Warner, N. H. Nathaniel, a clergyman. Abigail, married Nathaniel Knight, of Newbury, afterward of Atkinson, N. H. She was the mother of Betsey Knight, wife of 165 Simeon<sup>6</sup> Kelly, of Plaiston, N. H.

Ruth, widow of Abel Merrill, married second Mr. Emerson, of Hampstead, N. H.

36. ii Esther<sup>4</sup>, born October 14, 1707.

37. iii Jonathan<sup>4</sup> [1 John<sup>1</sup>, 3 John<sup>2</sup>, 10 Jonathan<sup>3</sup>], born October 10, 1709, married Hannah Blaisdell. Lived near his father.

When a child he one day wandered away from the house into a cornfield and became lost in it. His mother, in her search, having discovered him, approached the spot where he was sitting, and finding she was not perceived thought she would playfully surprise him. She accordingly rushed upon him with a sudden call, which so terrified him that he went into fits. Some mental peculiarities, which characterized him through life, were attributable perhaps to the lasting effects of this fright.

His occupation seems to have been, in part at least, that of a weaver. He sold his homestead and a piece of woodland in Kingstown, N. H., to 64 John<sup>2</sup> Kelly, April 23, 1778, and removed to Hampstead, N. H., where he died in January, 1780.

#### CHILDREN, 92-100.

38. iv Benjamin<sup>4</sup> [1 John<sup>1</sup>, 3 John<sup>2</sup>, 10 Jonathan<sup>3</sup>], born December 10, 1711, married Rebecca Bartlett, sister of the wife of 17 Richard<sup>4</sup> Kelly, October 17, 1736. She was a very amiable and conscientious woman. A few days before his marriage, October 6, his father "in consideration chiefly of parental affection for a dutiful son," gave him a deed of fifteen acres of land, it being the western portion of the homestead. On this was located his dwelling house, which stood a few rods only from the margin of the meadow which gives name to the neighborhood—Birch Meadow. He died before April, 1771, for, on the 5th day of that month, his widow "let the place to the halves" to 105 Samuel<sup>3</sup> Kelly, a nephew of her husband. Widow Rebecca Kelly sold land in Kingstown, N. H., formerly owned by Benjamin Kelly, to 62 John<sup>3</sup> Kelly. The deed is dated Goffstown, N. H., February 21, 1798. In that town was the residence of Samuel Kelly, named above, who had become her son-in-law. Late in the year 1780, Widow Rebecca Kelly loaned to the town of Amesbury the sum of £75.

#### CHILDREN, 101-103.

39. v Anna<sup>4</sup>, born February 20, 1714. An Anna Kelly was the second wife of Nathaniel Sanders, of East Haverhill; had one child.

40. vi Sarah<sup>4</sup>, born March 3, 1716.

41. vii Samuel<sup>4</sup> [1 John<sup>4</sup>, 3 John<sup>4</sup>, 10 Jonathan<sup>4</sup>], born July, 1718. He lived in the neighborhood of his father, on a farm, which was a part of the original purchase at Birch Meadow. The house in which he lived is said to have been built by himself in the year 1740. It is a substantial structure, and is now (1880) in a good state of repair.

He sold his farm June 6, 1774, to Ezekiel Sargent, husband of 163 Betsey<sup>4</sup> Kelly, and removed to Hampstead, N. H. The house in which he lived in that town was a large two-story building that stood on the west side of the old stage road from Haverhill to Concord, N. H., and about half a mile southward from the "Four Corners," in Hampstead. The later years of Mr. Kelly and his wife were spent with a son-in-law, Reuben Mills.

Mr. Kelly was by occupation a farmer. He possessed naturally great mechanical ingenuity, and by persistent individual effort acquired remarkable skill in that direction. Mrs. Mary Wilson, of Dunbarton, N. H., a granddaughter, who remembers being present at his funeral, writes; "My grandfather Kelly made a clock that was used in the family. I have heard my father tell where it went, but I have forgotten." The writer of these notes has in his possession a copper spoon mold made by him from fifty pennies. He died September 29, 1810.

The name of his wife was Elizabeth Heath. She was a sister of Bartholomew Henth. She died March 14, 1810.

42. viii Martha<sup>4</sup>, born October 9, 1722. She or a sister married Mr. Mullikin, of Bradford.

#### CHILDREN OF 11 JOSEPH<sup>4</sup> AND JANE (HEATH) KELLY.

43. i Mary<sup>4</sup>, born October, 1707, baptized October 6.

44. ii Sarah<sup>4</sup>, born August 14, 1709, married Benjamin Pillsbury, of Amesbury, January 15, 1735.

45. iii Jane<sup>4</sup>, born June 21, 1711. A receipt given by her to the executor of the will of her uncle, 4 Richard<sup>4</sup> Kelly, is dated

December 12, 1734. It was for "six pounds in money for servis done for the said Richard deceased." She wrote "Jene Kelly." She was afterward Mrs. Brown.

A Jane Kelly was dismissed from the Second Church in Amesbury (church in Merrimac), and recommended to that under the care of Rev. Mr. Tufts, in West Newbury, March 28, 1756.

46. iv Judith<sup>4</sup>, born May 11, 1714, married Samuel Plummer December 29, 1747. She was dismissed from the Second Church in Amesbury (Merrimac) at the same time with her father and mother and brother Joseph to unite with the church in East Haverhill at its organization, November 5, 1744.

The birth dates of the children of Samuel and Judith Plummer are recorded in Hampstead, N. H. They are as follows: Ann, born November 27, 1748. Kelly, born November 30, 1751, he lived in Hampstead. Ichabod, born November 20, 1754. Judith, born April 5, 1757.

47. v Joseph<sup>4</sup> [1 John<sup>1</sup>, 3 John<sup>2</sup>, 11 Joseph<sup>3</sup>] born July 23, 1716, married Elizabeth Hastings, May 14, 1740. His church relations are referred to in the account of his sister, Mrs. Plummer. It must here be added that he was chosen a deacon of the church to which he belonged in 1757. In the notice of his father is mentioned his connection with the organization of East Parish.

A list of the members of the Third Foot Company in Haverhill, March 17, 1757, contains his name, but without the customary "jun," an indication that his father had deceased prior to that date. In 1778 and 1779 the town of Haverhill borrowed of him the amount of £80.

## FIFTH GENERATION.

CHILDREN OF 14 JOHN<sup>4</sup> AND HANNAH (SOMES) KELLY.

48. I John<sup>5</sup> [1 John<sup>1</sup>, 3 John<sup>2</sup>, 5 John<sup>3</sup>, 14 John<sup>4</sup>] born October 15, 1724, married Hannah Hale in Newbury, July 3 (4 "Scheme"), 1749, when about thirty-five years of age he removed from West Newbury to Salem, N.H. The place where he first lived in that town was near the summit of Spicket Hill, on a road or pathway which formerly passed over the hill at its highest point. Later he lived near the southern base of the hill, on the road leading from Salem Village to Scotland Hill in Haverhill.

He was town treasurer of Salem several years, was one of the selectmen in the years 1768-1772, and "once again" in 1775. He sustained the office of deacon in the church in Salem more than forty years. His grandson, 302 Samuel<sup>7</sup> Kelly now (1880), living at the age of ninety-two years in Salem, N. H., remembers being often led to church in childhood by his hand. Says "he was a man of few words." Deacon John Kelley died December 18, 1807. His widow died November 27, 1811, aged eighty-five years.

[NOTE.—The "Scheme of his ancestral line" made use of as an authority in this work was taken down from his lips in the last year of his life.]

49. II Prudence<sup>5</sup> born November 1 (or 2), 1726, married Capt. John Knight, October 18, 1749. Lived in Atkinson, N. H. Capt. Knight was born in Newbury, July 8, 1727, died October 10, 1799. His wife died February 17, 1782. Children: Sarah, born July 2, 1750, married Jacob Clark of Hopkinton, N. H. John, born March 22, 1752. Hannah, born February 22, 1754, married John Atwood, of Atkinson, N. H. Judith, born May 2, 1756. Jeremiah, born January 26, 1759. Prudence, born April 2, 1760. Elizabeth, born September 13, 1762. Mary, born March 29, 1765. Margaret, born April 25, 1768. Tristram, born January 31, 1771. Lived on his father's place in Atkinson. Was the father of Deacon Bailey Knight.

50. III Hannah<sup>5</sup>, born November 22, 1728, unmarried. She lived many years with her brother, Rev. William Kelly, in Warner, N. H.

51. iv Elizabeth<sup>5</sup>, born May 8, 1732.

52. v Judith<sup>5</sup>, born May 26, 1734.

(Did one of these two last named marry a Mr. How? Mrs. Clough and Mrs. Woodbury, sisters, of Salem, N. H., and born to the surname How, speak of Deacon John Kelly as being their grandfather.)

53. vi Moses<sup>5</sup>, [1 John<sup>1</sup>, 3 John<sup>2</sup>, 5 John<sup>3</sup>, 14 John<sup>4</sup>], born March 15, 1739. In the "Scheme" the year of his birth is given one year earlier; married Lydia Sawyer November 10, 1757. "She was very beautiful." She was daughter of Dr. William Sawyer of the "Dalton Place" in West Newbury. (Her mother was Lydia, daughter of Israel Webster, a prominent citizen of New Hampshire in his day, and nearly related to the father of Daniel Webster.)

Moses Kelly settled first in Atkinson, N. H., near the limit of Salem, it is believed, and seems for a time to have been accounted a citizen of the latter town. He was one of a committee chosen January 13, 1773, to give deeds of the pews in the meeting-house newly erected in Atkinson. The births of his children, except that of his youngest one, were recorded in that town, though two or three of the later ones were born after his removal thence. "Moses Kelly, gentleman," of Atkinson, bought of Timothy Ferrin, of Goffstown, N. H., May 7, 1773, a tract of land in the latter town. He soon afterward removed to this spot and here became interested in military matters. "Henniker, July 5, 1777. Twenty-two men enlisted from Henniker, forming the larger part of a company known as the Second Company of the 9th New Hampshire regiment of militia, commanded by Col. Moses Kelly, of Goffstown."

Col. Kelly held the office of high sheriff of Hillsborough County for thirty years. He received his appointment under the British Crown. "His appearance in court was imposing, dressed as he was in a scarlet coat, white vest, buff-colored breeches and white top boots. He also wore a cocked hat and a gold hilted sword."

"That event which is annually celebrated in our country as the birthday of the nation was proclaimed by Moses Kelly, Esq., sheriff of the county, with beat of drum, on the 18th of July, 1776, from the rock which stood near the meeting-house (in Amherst) before its removal."

From Goffstown Col. Kelly removed to Hopkinton, N. H. His name is not in the invoice of valuation of the former town for the year 1810, an omission indicating his removal thence prior to that

date. His wife died March 11, 1820, aged seventy-nine years, and he married a second time. He died August 2, 1826.

Col. Moses Kelly had in his possession a coat of arms which, it is understood, came down to him from 1 John<sup>1</sup>, of Newbury. It is now in the possession of 666 Edward<sup>1</sup> A. Kelly, Esq., of Boston, a great-grandson of Col. Moses. "He beareth *gules*, a fess embattled *argent* between three ducal coronets *or*, by the name of Kelly, being granted Anno Domini, 1473, to the Hon. Robert Kelly, of Doncaster, and from that grant descends to the name and family of Kelly." The following comment has been given in connection with this description: "The red field implies a great battle. The fess across, being prepared to defend both sides, and the three ducal crowns are hieroglyphic (?) of a complete conquest over a common enemy."

54. VI Stephen, born March 16, 1740.

55. VII Joshua<sup>1</sup> [1 John<sup>1</sup>, 3 John<sup>2</sup>, 5 John<sup>3</sup>, 14 John<sup>4</sup>], born February 13, 1742. In his youth he lived for a time in the family of Capt. John Sawyer, of South Amesbury (Merrimac); (Mrs. Sawyer was 58 Elizabeth<sup>1</sup> Kelly). Afterward he went to Atkinson, N. H., then a part of Plaistow, where he married Deborah, daughter of Col. David Page. After the birth of two children, whose birth-dates are on record in Plaistow, he removed to Conway, N. H. He, with several others, was induced to go to that place, which was included in the Pequawket country, by the glowing descriptions given of the richness of the soil, the abundance of game and other attractions of that region then but little known.

He was a soldier in the Revolutionary war, having enlisted as a private at the commencement of the war, through which he faithfully served, showing himself both brave and patriotic. 299 Samuel<sup>1</sup> Kelly, of Salem, N. H., now (1880) in his ninety-second year, remembers seeing Joshua Kelly when on a visit to friends in Salem and Atkinson.

He lived in Atkinson as late as 1765, but removed thence within two or three years from that date: for Rev. Dr. Paul Coffin, in his journal, published in Maine Historical Collection, mentions passing by the house of one Joshua Kelly of Pequawket, October 3, 1768.

His wife, born 1742, died October, 1812. He died May 1, 1822.

CHILDREN, 141-148.

56. 1x William<sup>s</sup> [1 John<sup>s</sup>, 3 John<sup>s</sup>, 5 John<sup>s</sup>, 14 John<sup>s</sup>], born October 31, 1744; graduated at Harvard College, 1767. He studied divinity with Rev. Henry True, of Hampstead, N. H.; ordained over the church in Warner, N. H., February 5, 1772. While an under-graduate in college he taught school two or three winters in Plaistow (Atkinson), and he is said to have been engaged in teaching for a certain period after his graduation.

The following notice of Rev. Mr. Kelly is from "Historical Sketches of Warner," by Dr. M. Long, in the Collection of the New Hampshire Historical Society:

"In the spring of 1771, Rev. William Kelly, a native of Newbury, Mass., was employed to preach as a candidate, and in November following he received a call to settle in the ministry, with a salary of £40 the first year, to increase £1 10s. a year till it should amount to £60, and twenty cords of wood annually. This call he accepted and he was ordained on the 5th of February, 1772; and on the same day a Congregational Church was gathered, consisting of seven male members."

At the time of Rev. Mr. Kelly's settlement in Warner, there were but fifteen houses in the town, "and about as many glass windows." The house built by him was the first one in the town with two stories.

After his dismissal, at his request, from the people of his charge March 11, 1801 he preached occasionally in several places in the vicinity of Warner. "He was a small-sized, fair-looking man—rather liberal in his religious creed, as compared with the orthodoxy of his time."

His wife was Lavinia, third daughter of Rev. Abner Bailey, of Salem, N. H. The marriage was on February 14, 1773. Mrs. Kelly was born June 27, 1756; died September 14, 1837.

Rev. William Kelly died of apoplexy May 18, 1813.

CHILDREN OF 17 RICHARD<sup>4</sup> AND HANNAH (BARTLETT) KELLY :

57. I Hannah<sup>5</sup>, born October 21 (23 Newbury Record) 1726 : married Bartholomew Heath, of Hampstead, N. H. Mr. Heath was a soldier in the French and Indian war. She died in 1810. Children : Nehemiah, born November 1, 1745 ; he lived in Warner, N. H., and was a deacon in the church in that place. Hannah, born December 6, 1746. Elizabeth, born August 27, 1748. Anne, born October 18, 1750 ; died October 28, 1754. Mary, born January 3, 1753. Richard, born November 12, 1754 ; died young. Jesse, born November 15, 1756 ; a deaf mute. Moses, born November 3, 1759 ; died June 6, 1763. Anne, born June 29, 1762. The following relating to her is from the *Exeter Newsletter* of September 6, 1847 : " Died in New London, N. H., August 24, 1847, Mrs. Anne Colby, aged 85 years and 56 days. She was born in Hampstead, N. H. \* \* was married December 29, 1785, to the late Joseph Colby, Esq., a native of Plaistow [of Amesbury, Mass., rather]. He came to New London, March 10, 1785 ; died April 19, 1843." Mrs. Colby was mother of Anthony Colby, governor of the State of New Hampshire. Judith, born August 20, 1764. Martha, born January 14, 1766. Richard, born January 25, 1768.

58. II Elizabeth<sup>5</sup>, born December 26, 1728 ; married Capt. John Sawyer, of West Amesbury (Merrimac). She died May 2, 1794. Capt. Sawyer died July 6, 1801, aged seventy-nine years. Children : John, Captain ; lived on his father's place ; was a butcher ; married his cousin (171 Lois<sup>4</sup> Kelly). Wiburd, born January 17, 1769 ; married his cousin (175 Hannah<sup>6</sup> Kelly). Symmes, a physician in Vermont. Elizabeth, born — ; married William Hoyt, of West Amesbury. Mrs. Bailey, of West Newbury. (Was Richard K. Sawyer, of West Amesbury, of this family ?)

59. III Mary<sup>5</sup>, born November 19, 1730 ; married, first, William Moulton, Esq., of West Amesbury (Merrimac) ; married, second, Deacon John Hoyt, of the same place. Her marriage with Deacon Hoyt took place November 27, 1788.

Her father, in his " Book of Accounts," says : " June 29, 1756. Then my daughter Mary removed from my house and home to her own ; and this is the account of what I gave my daughter Mary for service which she has done for me after she was eighteen years of age." A list of articles with values attached follows.

The will of Widow Mary Hoyt, dated April 11, 1801, mentions

the four children of her first husband: David lived in West Amesbury (Merrimac); born January 3, 1759. Moses, born October 2, 1767; lived in Bradford, Vt. Mary, married Isaac Rogers. Dorcas, married Mr. Bartlett.

60. iv Stephen<sup>1</sup>, born August 29 (28, Ames. Record). 1732. died "of canker in the throat," November 4, 1736.

61. v Richard<sup>2</sup>, born November 29, 1734, died "of throat distemper" March 14, 1750.

62. vi John<sup>3</sup> [1 John<sup>1</sup>, 3 John<sup>2</sup>, 5 John<sup>3</sup>, 17 Richard<sup>4</sup>], born October 22, 1736, married Elizabeth Hoyt, of West Amesbury (Merrimac), twin daughter of Reuben Hoyt. She was born March 29, 1739, was married June 5, 1758. Mr. Kelly lived near his father at Birch Meadow. He was an enterprising farmer. Besides the farm on which he lived, he owned one in Newton, N. H., and another in Plaistow, N. H. He had, besides, outlying lands in other towns. John Kelly was one of twenty-four soldiers "in the Second Foot Company in Amesbury who went in the alarm when Fort William Henry was taken." With four others he was chosen by the town in 1778, a "committee of correspondence, inspection and safety."

He died March, 29, 1821. His widow died February 21, 1826.

CHILDREN, 160-170.

63. vii Judith<sup>5</sup> born November 17, 1737, married Joseph Sawyer. Her father under date of November 3, 1756, writes: "My daughter Judith removed from my house to Darby Hill, so called, in Hampstead in the province of New Hampshire, and this is the account of what I gave her to make her equal to her sisters in portion." He then as in the case of each one of her sisters, adds a list of articles with values.

After the birth of six children the family removed to Warner, N. H., where there were other births.

Children: Abigail, born May 1, 1757. Edmund, born September 3, 1759; lived in Warner. Anna, born December 19, 1761. Jacob, born February 3, 1765. Moses, born February 27, 1767; married 145 Lavinia<sup>6</sup> Kelly, daughter of 55 Joshua. Sarah, born January 11, 1769. Richard K. Hannah. Lois.

64. viii Stephen<sup>6</sup> [1 John<sup>1</sup>, 3 John<sup>2</sup>, 5 John<sup>3</sup>, 17 Richard<sup>4</sup>], born November, 4, 1740 (November 15?), married Lois Sargent; published May 1, 1762. He was a farmer and lived on his father's place.

At a meeting of the town of Amesbury, June 26, 1778, a committee was chosen "to draft instructions for the Representative for the District concerning the Confederation," and "to lay said draft" before the town at an adjourned meeting. This committee consisted of the selectmen of the town and four persons additional, of whom one was Stephen Kelly. At a town meeting held September 17, 1779, he with five others was chosen "to see that the regulating prices are kept." He was one of the selectmen of the town in 1781, and in one or two succeeding years. He died of a fever in September, 1784. His widow died in 1818, in the family of her son Dr. Amasa Kelly, of Chichester, N. H.

[NOTE.—The birth-dates of the children of Stephen Kelly given from a Family Record, derived from Dr. Amasa Kelly, differ in some cases from those taken from the records of the town of Amesbury. Similar discrepancies have been found in connection with several other families.]

65. ix Esther<sup>a</sup>, born April 20, 1743; died July 29, 1743.

66. x Moses<sup>a</sup>, born August 12, 1748; died March 15, 1750. Capt. Kelly, the father, writes: "In 1736 the later end of October and ye beginning of November was a very sorrowful time in my family; for my wife and six children were sick, and Thomas Whitel that jived with me then: which sickness was that which was caled ye canker in the throate, and of which Stephen died. \* \* 1749-50, the later end of february and the beginning of March was again a very sorrowful time in my family, occasioned by ye canker or throat distemper, of which Judith was first taken and was exceding bad with it, bnt throw marcy recovered: but Richard and Moses died, John and Stephen recovered."

67. i Elizabeth<sup>a</sup>, born November 25, 1735; married Stephen Bartlett, Bath, N. H.

68. ii Mercy<sup>a</sup>, born September 10, 1737; died October 17, 1747, "of throat distemper."

69. iii Mary<sup>a</sup>, born May 31, 1739; died July 31, 1739.

70. iv Lydia<sup>a</sup>, born August 15 (10 Ames. Record) 1740; died October 20, 1747.

71. v Mary<sup>a</sup>, born June 3, 1742; died October 20, 1747.

72. vi Deborah<sup>a</sup>, born January 4, 1744; died October 29, 1747.

73. VII Moses<sup>5</sup>, born September 11, 1745; died October 30, 1747.

74. VIII Daniel<sup>5</sup> [1 John<sup>1</sup>, 3 John<sup>2</sup>, 5 John<sup>3</sup>, 22 Daniel<sup>4</sup>], born May 18, 1747 (May 13, says one), married Mary Webster, of Kingstown, N. H. He lived for a time in Danville, N. H., afterward in Sandown, N. H., and finally in Bradford, Vt. The town clerk of Bradford, 1879, writes: "Daniel Kelly, from Sandown, Rockingham Co., N. H., bought land in this town in 1797."

He died July 10, 1837. His wife, born September 29, 1749, died November 16, 1833.

CHILDREN, 186-193.

75. IX Moses<sup>5</sup>, born October 30, 1748 (a copy of a family record says, January 16, 1749). A will signed by his father February 18, 1773, but never proved, makes mention of him. No trace of him later can anywhere be found. He may have enlisted in the army of the Revolution, as two of his brothers did, but not so early as they. If so, and if he died before the close of the war, the silence respecting him may be accounted for by a remark in Mr. Merrill's History of Amesbury: "There are no lists or records of the men who were furnished at the several calls during the year 1778." It is also said: "The little book called the 'Witch Book' gives a very good account of the men [soldiers from Amesbury] up to 1778, when no more can be found."

76. X Jacob<sup>5</sup> [1 John<sup>1</sup>, 3 John<sup>2</sup>, 5 John<sup>3</sup>, 22 Daniel<sup>4</sup>], born in 1751, married Deborah, daughter of David Page, of Epping, N. H. He settled in Gilmanton, N. H., just before the commencement of the Revolutionary war. He was a "joiner" by trade.

Jacob Kelly and his wife were both members of the Congregational Church in Gilmanton. "Their children were all baptized in infancy by sprinkling, and all except the one which died in childhood were baptized by immersion in later life, and joined other churches."

Mr. Kelly died August 21, 1825. His widow died December, 1831, aged eighty-two years.

CHILDREN, 194-206.

77. XI Anthony<sup>5</sup> [1 John<sup>1</sup>, 3 John<sup>2</sup>, 5 John<sup>3</sup>, 22 Daniel<sup>4</sup>], born —; married, first, Miss Bradbury, of East Haverhill; lived on his father's place till late in life.

In the first week in August, 1776, upon a call for six men from the second company in Amesbury, Anthony Kelly, with five others, enlisted into the army. They received their bounty on the 8th day of that month.

He was a deacon in the Baptist Church in East Haverhill. His wife died in May, 1824, and he married, second, March 14, 1825, Nancy Bartlett, of Newton, N. H., whither he immediately removed. He afterward went to Candia, N. H., and died there at a very advanced age.

CHILDREN, 207-214.

78. XII Micajah<sup>5</sup> [1 John<sup>1</sup>, 3 John<sup>2</sup>, 5 John<sup>3</sup>, 22 Daniel<sup>4</sup>], born May 15, 1761; married, first, Mary, widow of Samuel Gilman, and daughter of David Page, of Epping, N. H., November 11, 1784. His wife died July 6, 1817, and he married, second, in November of the same year, the widow of Thomas Patten, of Lower Gilman-ton, N. H. This second wife died March 18, 1841, at the age of eighty-three years. Her maiden name was Sarah Gale. She was born in Kingstown, N. H.

Micajah Kelly went in his youth to Gilmanton, in order to serve an apprenticeship with his brother, Jacob, but he almost immediately, in the seventeenth year of his age, entered the army of the Revolution as a substitute for an older brother. He served as cook. After the expiration of his term of service he returned to his home in Gilmanton, but soon re-enlisted in the company of Capt. Lovett, in Col. Mooney's regiment of volunteers. At the end of his second term of service, in which the hardships of his situation came almost up with his capabilities of endurance, he relinquished the burdens of a soldier's life, and went to work at his trade. He afterward "went into the wilderness, and commenced clearing up himself a farm, occasionally working at his trade." He "was a devout man, and brought up his children in the old Puritanic fashion." He died December (November?) 19, 1844.

79. I Rebecca<sup>1</sup>, born December 22 (20, Ames. Rec.), 1722, married John Hastings, of Salem, N. H., June 9, 1743. Child, Rebecca, born September 5, 1754.

80. II William<sup>1</sup> [1 John<sup>1</sup>, 3 John<sup>2</sup>, 7 Abiel<sup>3</sup>, 25 Richard<sup>4</sup>], born in West Amesbury (Merrimac), October 5, 1725, married Sarah Beard.

After his marriage he resided a short time in Pelham, N. H.

The later years of his life were spent in West Haverhill, near the eastern extremity of West Meadow.

CHILDREN, 222-226.

81. III Richard<sup>2</sup> [1 John<sup>1</sup>, 3 John<sup>2</sup>, 7 Abiel<sup>3</sup>, 25 Richard<sup>4</sup>], born November 2 (7, Ames Rec), 1727, married Esther Palmer, December 3, 1753. "both residents of Haverhill." He was in Salem, N. H., in 1751, and known there as Richard Kelly, Jr. His name occurs in a list of the Second Foot Company of Haverhill, dated April 14, 1757. In the later years of his life his residence was on the northern declivity of "Sions Hill" in Salem. He died of "rose cancer."

82. IV Sarah<sup>3</sup>, born November 28, 1730.

83. V Samuel<sup>3</sup> [1 John<sup>1</sup>, 3 John<sup>2</sup>, 7 Abiel<sup>3</sup>, 25 Richard<sup>4</sup>] born March 2, 1733, married Elizabeth (Betsey) Hall, of Methuen, December 2, 1761. He was a member of the Second Foot Company in Haverhill, April 14, 1757. He afterward owned and lived upon a farm, situated on the turnpike in Salem, about a mile northward from the railroad station.

His grandson, 541 Samuel<sup>7</sup>, of Calais, Me., says: "He bore a captain's commission in the Revolutionary times." The date of his death is unknown. His wife survived him and died in Gilmantou, N. H., about the year 1820. Her husband's remains were removed from Salem and reburied by her side in that town.

[NOTE.—In 1820 a widow, Elizabeth Kelly, was married to Israel Ober. If she was identical with the relict of Capt. Kelly, as is said, it would seem that she must have survived a second husband.]

CHILDREN, 233-240.

84. VI John<sup>5</sup> [1 John<sup>1</sup>, 3 John<sup>2</sup>, 7 Abiel<sup>3</sup>, 25 Richard<sup>4</sup>], born April 8, 1735 (April 28, says his granddaughter Lucinda); married Catharine Langley, of Andover, May 8, 1759. The father of this lady was an Englishman who married Miss Sinkley against the mother's wishes, and came immediately with his young bride to New England. Mr. Sinkley, the father, had held some official position under the British Government. The year before his marriage

John Kelly bought of Joseph Haynes, of Methuen, sixteen acres of land, on which he subsequently made his abode. It is now (1878) the homestead of Niles How.

Mr. Kelly was a stonemason and farmer. His name is on the pay roll of the company of Capt. James Jones, made after the fight at Concord. His service was that of drummer. He died about the commencement of the present century. His widow, Catharine Kelly, died at Kennebunk, Me., about the year 1825. Her age was ninety-five years.

85. VII Susannah<sup>5</sup>, born November 11, 1733.

CHILDREN OF 29 ABIEL<sup>4</sup> AND RUTH (PEASLEE) KELLY.

86. I Elizabeth<sup>5</sup>, born July 13, 1729, died May 16, 1730. (Baptized August 3, 1729.)

87. II Elizabeth<sup>5</sup>, born March 27, 1731.

88. III Abigail<sup>5</sup>, born April 27, 1732.

89. IV Abiel<sup>5</sup>, born May 2, 1735, died September 2, 1736.

90. V Abiel<sup>5</sup>, born January 31, 1737.

91. VI Joseph<sup>5</sup>, born August 3 (or 30), 1740.

[NOTE.—It may become a question whether or not this is the notorious Capt. Joseph Kelly, of Nottingham, West (now Hudson), N. H., whose history, as well as that of a large portion of his posterity, has become known.]

CHILDREN OF 37 JONATHAN<sup>4</sup> AND HANNAH (BLAISDELL) KELLY.

92. I Hannah<sup>5</sup>, born March 9, 1734.

93. II Esther<sup>5</sup>, born July 10, 1735.

94. III Jonathan<sup>5</sup> [1 John<sup>1</sup>, 3 John<sup>2</sup>, 10 Jonathan<sup>3</sup>, 37 Jonathan<sup>4</sup>], born December 24, 1736. Ent. int. of marriage with Sarah Whicher, widow, in Amesbury, November 22, 1760; widow Whicher's maiden name was Sarah Foot. He was one of twenty-four soldiers from the second military company of Amesbury who "went in the alarm when Fort William and Henry was taken."

He was "draughted" August 15, 1757. Jonathan Kelly, Jr., and Judith Eastman, of Hopkinton, N. H., were published in Amesbury, September 12, 1778. The date of the death of his first wife is not known. After his second marriage he lived for a time in Hopkinton. In 1796 he was in Rochester, Vt. This appears from

a receipt given by him, in which that town is expressly mentioned as his place of residence. Date of receipt, June 20, 1796. Later he was in New Chester (now Hill), N. H. Perhaps he was with his son, Dr. (251 Timothy<sup>6</sup>) Kelly, a practicing physician there.

CHILDREN, 251-254.

95. iv John<sup>5</sup> [1 John<sup>1</sup>, 3 John<sup>2</sup>, 10 Jonathan<sup>3</sup>, 37 Jonathan<sup>4</sup>], born July 14, 1739, married Sarah Noyes, of Plaistow, N. H. He resided in Plaistow after his marriage—an event which did not take place until he had quite reached the meridian of life. He chose the place of his abode in a secluded portion of the town. He was a pious and most exemplary man. His principal occupation before taking up his residence in Plaistow, was school-teaching. He taught in Nottingham, Goffstown and other towns in New Hampshire. His last term of teaching was in Plaistow, in 1788.

CHILDREN, 255-263.

96. v Mary<sup>5</sup>, born May 18, 1743; married Daniel Kimball, and lived near the eastern shore of Kimball's Pond in Amesbury.

[NOTE.—This pond is the "Lake Attitash" of Whittier's poems.]

In consequence of being obliged to pay a note which he had signed as a surety for a brother-in-law, Mr. Kimball was obliged to sell his place in Amesbury. He also sold a flock of sheep given to his wife by her father. "Grieved" at parting with her sheep, Mrs. Kimball refused to sign the deed of sale of the farm; and also declined to accompany her husband, when he removed to Weare, N. H., where he purchased a house, with a few acres of land in connection. She went to live with a daughter, Mary, who "kept house" for a Mr. Currier in Bow, N. H.

She is described as being of medium height, in figure "thin and spare, with a small face, light gray eyes, and a light complexion; was high-spirited, and somewhat eccentric in her ways." She visited her native neighborhood after she had completed her four-score years. Her erect form and her firm and rapid footsteps as she walked its streets, are still well remembered.

Her children were: John, a singing master. He died in Auburn, N. H., leaving an only child, a daughter; Jonathan, of Haverhill, whose daughter was the maternal grandmother of Prof. J. K. Colby; Mary, already mentioned, unmarried. Mrs. Kimball, died in Bow, in 1839.



97. vi Ebenezer<sup>5</sup> [1 John<sup>1</sup>, 3 John<sup>2</sup>, 10 Jonathan<sup>3</sup>, 37 Jonathan<sup>4</sup>], born June 3, 1745. Ent. int. of marriage with Mrs. Mary Runnells, of Amesbury, June 11, 1777.

Soon after the battle of Lexington he enlisted in the Massachusetts service, "for the preservation of the liberties of America."

He lived several years of his married life in Deering, N. H.

98. vii Moses<sup>5</sup> [1 John<sup>1</sup>, 3 John<sup>2</sup>, 10 Jonathan<sup>3</sup>, 37 Jonathan<sup>4</sup>], born April 2, 1748. Ent. int. of marriage with Elizabeth Fling, of Amesbury, April 20, 1776. Lived in Deering, N. H. His name is on the tax list of Weare for the year 1786. He sold to his only son December 23, 1830, a portion of the homestead in Deering. He died in 1836.

CHILDREN, 265-270.

99. viii Richard<sup>5</sup> [1 John<sup>1</sup>, 3 John<sup>2</sup>, 10 Jonathan<sup>3</sup>, 37 Jonathan<sup>4</sup>], born January 29, 1750, married Abigail Ober, of Salem, N. H., 1782.

He was a tailor by occupation.

He enlisted in the army of the Revolution in the early part of December, 1776, and received a bounty of £8. He enlisted again August 16, 1777, on a call for one-sixth part of the "abled bodied men," with the offer of £4 10s. per month.

The births of his children are on record in Hampstead, N. H. He was in Deering, N. H., in 1788, for he "bid off" a pauper in that town at the town meeting for that year. He was a citizen there until 1799, but soon after that date left for some place unknown.

Abigail Kelly, widow of a Richard Kelly, was living in Boston, on North Street, in 1821. In 1825 she was with her son Israel Kelly, on Ann Street, Boston, and remained there several years. The widow, Rebecca Kelly, also lived in that town, as appears from a deed dated February 21, 1798, conveying to 62 John<sup>5</sup> Kelly, her right of ownership in land lying in Kingstown, N. H., formerly the property of her husband, 38 Benjamin<sup>4</sup> Kelly. The deed is witnessed by her daughter, Sarah Kelly. The Christian name of the wife of Samuel Kelly, of Goffstown was Sarah. It thus appears certain, almost, that this Samuel, of Goffstown was son of 41 Samuel<sup>4</sup> Kelly, and that he married his cousin Sarah, daughter of 38 Benjamin<sup>4</sup> Kelly.

Her youngest sister, Grace Fletcher, was his first wife of Hon. Daniel Webster, who became acquainted with her in Mr. Kelly's family, and married her in his house.

Mr. Kelly was high sheriff of Merrimac County, N. H., 1814 to 1819. "He was Marshal of the District of New Hampshire during the presidential term commencing with the inauguration of Gen. Harrison, and Pension Agent during the presidency of Gen. Taylor, and that of Mr. Fillmore." Upon his appointment to the office of district marshal he removed from Salisbury to East Concord, "where he purchased the well-known residence of the late Stephen Ambrose, Esq."

"Mr. Kelly was held in high regard by his fellow-citizens, and was widely known, especially among that class who constituted the business people of New Hampshire." "He faithfully discharged all his public trusts." "He was a member of the congregational church in East Concord at the time of his death, which occurred March 10, 1857."

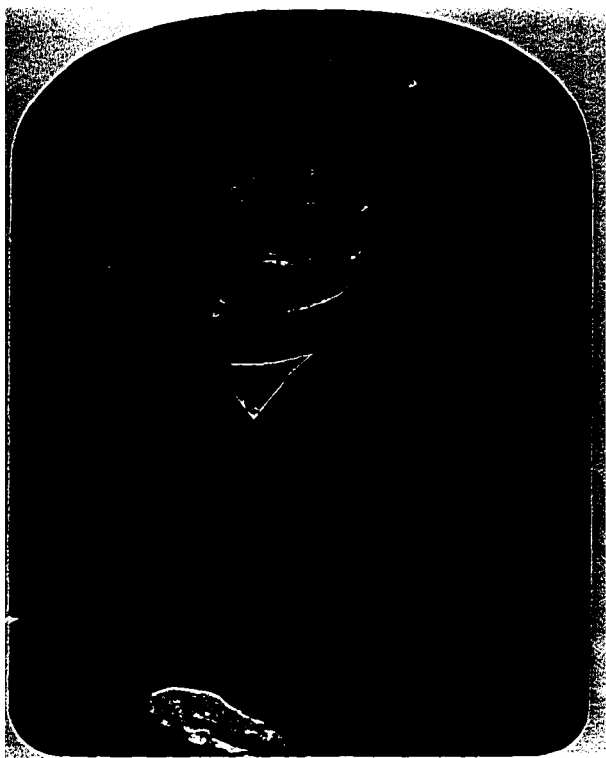




REBECCA FLETCHER KELLY.

and care. He resided on his farm, in Conway, until 1860, when he moved to Iowa, where all his children, except Samuel, who followed soon after, had gone to live, in Scott and Muscatine Counties.

" He died September 10, 1864.

" After his death, his widow passed her remaining years in a beautiful home on the Bluffs in Davenport, Iowa, close by the 'Father of Waters,' devoting herself to works of charity and in the cause of religion. From early youth, the Bible had been to her an inseparable companion; a lamp to her feet and the rule of her heart; and her life was a joy to all who knew her."

She died May 6, 1879.

A very interesting obituary notice of this remarkable woman written by Pres. G. F. Magoon, was published in the *Christian Mirror*, Portland, Me., May 31, 1879. Also a notice of her was in the *Advertiser*, Chicago and New York, January 5, 1879.

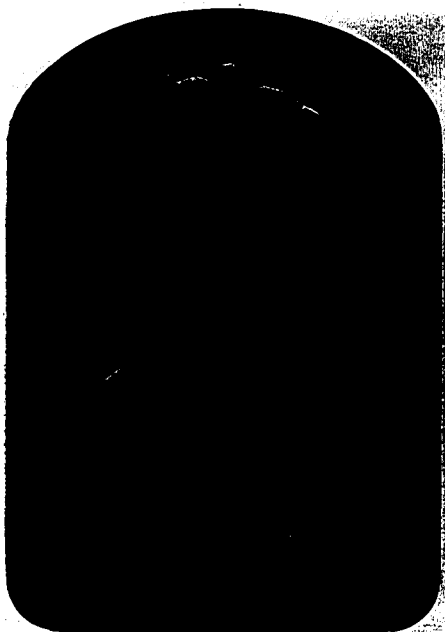

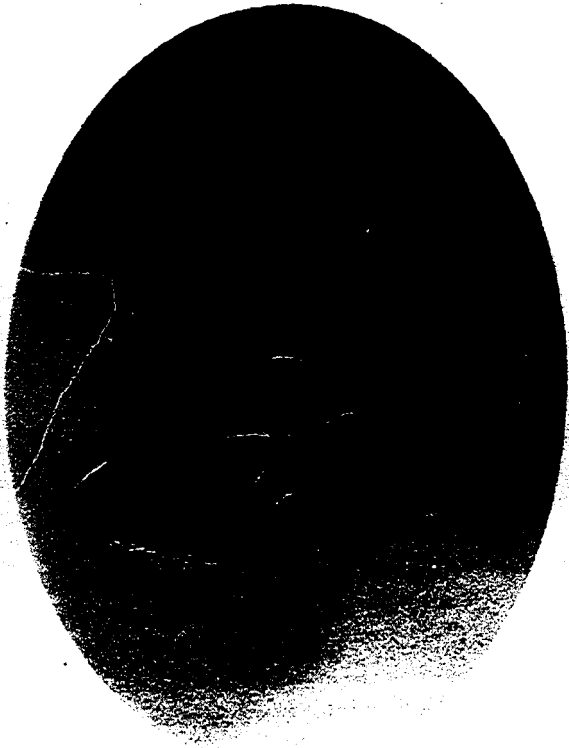

He married Susan, daughter of Lieut. Andrew Hilton. She was born July 4, 1792. Date of his marriage, August 18, 1817.

In 1831 he received the appointment of register of probate for the county of Rockingham, and immediately removed to Exeter. He was a member of the executive council of the State in 1846-47. The year previous he had represented Exeter in the Legislature.

He was treasurer of Phillips Academy, Exeter, elected in 1842, and trustee of Dartmouth College, elected in 1848. In 1849 he was appointed pension agent at Portsmouth, N. H.

Hon. John Kelly was a learned antiquary. He contributed "Ecclesiastical Memoranda" for Moore & Farmer's Collection and furnished numerous genealogical papers for other publications. He was a man of high character and many accomplishments. "He was a peacemaker, discouraging all unnecessary litigation, and striving to effect reconciliation between belligerent parties at the sacrifice of his own personal advantage. He demonstrated that it was possible to be a lawyer, and at the same time a Christian gentleman controlled by his convictions of duty and the teachings of the Bible." "He was a most genial associate, attracting to himself a host of friends and admirers." He was withal "a man of keen wit, quick repartee, and a prince of story-tellers."

He died in Exeter, November 3 (4?) 1860.

Studied theology with Rev. Dr. Hemmenway, of Wells, Me. Ordained in Hampstead, N. H., December 5, 1792. On the 8th of August of the next year he married Abigail, daughter of Deacon John S. Dearborn, of Chester, N. H. Rev. Mr. Kelly died in Hampstead November 23, 1848. His widow died May 23, 1850.

The sermon at the funeral of Rev. Mr. Kelly was preached by Rev. Dr. French, of North Hampton, N. H., who, after an account of his character, attainments and labors, says: "Such was the aged, venerated and beloved minister whose funeral the Holy Providence of God has called us to attend. We revere his memory, and would gather instruction from his life." Among the memorial notices of Mr. Kelly which appeared in various public journals was one of particular interest in the *Massachusetts Observer*. It was written by Rev. William Cogswell, D. D. The quotations which follow are from a somewhat extended notice, in an address by Isaac W. Smith.

Esq., of Manchester, N. H., delivered at the centennial celebration, of Hampstead, N. H., July 4, 1849. "There was no dissenting voice against his settlement, though for the ten years previous there had been no settled minister here, and many ineffectual efforts had been made to procure one. \* \* It is worthy of mention that Mr. Kelly outlived every individual who was a member of his church at the time he became connected with it. \* \* The result of his labors is known to us all. Scandal never moved its tongue to defame his character or oppugn his motives. In ripe old age, after almost half a century spent in the work of the ministry, he went down to the grave beloved and lamented by all who knew him."

A very considerable number of the productions of Mr. Kelly's pen appeared in print. They consisted chiefly of sermons delivered on special occasions, controversial tracts on religious subjects, essays on the study of the English language, and sketches of local history.

"He was a steady-minded man of few words." He died July 4, 1843. His widow, January 31, 1847.

CHILDREN OF S3 SAMUEL<sup>5</sup> AND ELIZABETH (HALL) KELLY.

233. i Benjamin<sup>6</sup> [1 John<sup>1</sup>, 3 John<sup>2</sup>, 7 Abiel<sup>3</sup>, 25 Richard<sup>4</sup>, S3 Samuel<sup>5</sup>], born April 29, 1763. At the age of fourteen years he accompanied his father (who, it is said, was an officer in the army) to Cambridge, and there remained for a time, acting in the capacity of waiter. At the age of eighteen he commenced the study of medicine with Dr. Haseltine, of Haverhill. In the records of Salem, N. H., is an order dated March 22, 1786, to "pay to Dr. Benjamin Kelly, 2 pounds and 2 shillings for keeping school." Later in the same year he commenced the practice of his profession in Northwood, N. H. In 1797 he removed to Loudon, N. H., where he remained until 1801, when he made a final removal to Gilmanton, N. H. Dr. Kelly's wife was Mary, daughter of Maj. Gile, of Nottingham, N. H. She was born July 7, 1767; married February (January?) 16, 1787, and died December 10, 1856.

Dr. Kelly died March 23, 1839. He had long been a zealous

and consistent member of the Baptist Church, having made a profession in that denomination in 1793. A biographical notice of him was published in the *Baptist Register*, Concord, N. H., April 25, 1839. A notice of him and his family may likewise be found in Lancaster's History of Gilmanton, N. H.

Mr. Kelly settled in New Hampton, N. H. Mrs. Ober, whose relationship to him is not clear (see 83 Samuel<sup>5</sup>), and "Len," a colored man belonging to the family went with him to that town. He afterward removed to Canada and died there. His widow with two sons went to Ohio or Illinois.

He was in the battle of Bunker Hill, having taken his father's place in the army as a private. He had previously commenced the study of medicine with Dr. Haseltine, of Haverhill. He afterward went on board the "Buccaneer," a privateer from Beverly, Mass., as a private; but on the death of the surgeon was appointed to the vacancy. He spent some time in France, became a Free Mason, and, it is said, studied his profession there. He returned to his native country in 1783, and soon settled as a physician in Weare, N. H., where he continued



in practice until disabled by epilepsy. Betsey Southwick, who became the wife of Dr. Kelly, "was from a stylish family." Her father lived in Danvers, Mass., but afterward bought a large farm in some part of New Hampshire.

The name of Langley Kelly appears on the books of Haverhill in connection with a loan of £90 made by him to the town June 10, 1778. A year later he loaned to the town a similar amount.

He died about the year 1817.

CHILDREN, 551-558.

242. II Lucy Porter<sup>6</sup>, born September 3, 1762; married Samuel Gray, of Pepperelborough (Saco), Me., February 11, 1791 (March 11?). "Mr. Gray was a liberally educated man and taught school." It is said that he was unfortunate in some commercial adventures, went away from his home and no trace of him was ever found. His wife, with a son and a daughter, after living for a time with friends in various places, finally took up her abode in Weare, N. H. A few years later, the son, learning that a person bearing his father's name, was living at some point in the West, went in search of him, but never returned. The daughter, whose name was Hannah, died April 7, 1815. The death of Mrs. Gray occurred March 24, 1844 or 1845.

John L. Hadley, Esq., of Weare, writes: "I had the care of Mrs. Gray in her last days in part, and I have to say that if ever a saint lived on earth, she was one." Testimony the most ample is given from various other sources, to her uncommon excellence of character.

243. III Phineas Tyler<sup>6</sup> [1 John<sup>1</sup>, 3 John<sup>2</sup>, 7 Abiel<sup>3</sup>, 25 Richard<sup>4</sup>, 84 John<sup>5</sup>], born July 27, 1764. He was a hatter in Saco, Me., the first manufacturer of hats in that town; became wealthy; married, first, Charlotte Warren, of Saco. After the birth of two children (sons) she died of "epidemic spotted fever," August 18, 1796, aged twenty-six years. Mr. Kelly married, second, Elizabeth Warren, sister of his first wife. He died suddenly in the street, in the year 1804. "A man of great influence."

He was a large ship owner, and it was one of his vessels which introduced the fatal disease of which his wife and sister died.

244. IV Isaac<sup>6</sup> [1 John<sup>1</sup>, 3 John<sup>2</sup>, 7 Abiel<sup>3</sup>, 25 Richard<sup>4</sup>, 84 John<sup>5</sup>], born June 26, 1766; married Nancy Chase, of Deering, N.

H., January 31, 1793. He was a hatter, and did business for a time in Wear, N. H., but gave it up at length by reason of ill health, and studied medicine with his brother, Dr. Langley Kelly. He commenced practice in his profession in Washington, N. H., where two of his children, the fifth and sixth, were born. He went thence to Waterboro, Me. After the death of his wife and the dispersion of his children, he went to live with his daughter, Mrs. Ayer, in Newfield, Me. He died December 19, 1852. His wife, who was a daughter of Dudley Chase, was born November 4, 1772, and died July 18, 1806.

[NOTE.—Mrs. Ayer, 562 Nancy<sup>7</sup>, says: "My father had the Kelly Coat of Arms, and daughter Abby (wife of Rev. Daniel Waterhouse) sent it by the captain of a steamer running from New York to Liverpool. He took it to the Court of Chancery, where he found fourteen or fifteen names of Kellys, men and women, who had left money for American heirs, but a duplicate of the Coat of Arms could not be found."

John A. Kelly, Esq., of Saco, 959 John A. <sup>8</sup>, says, date September 19, 1878: "My father (560 John<sup>7</sup>) had the Coat of Arms belonging to the family, left by his father (243 Phineas<sup>7</sup>) at his death, but it was spirited away, and is now in possession of some of the descendants of Dr. Kelly, of Newfield (Dr. Isaac). I have a rough draft of it in pencil taken by my brother Phineas, while on a visit to Newfield more than thirty years ago." This draft has been examined. It bears no resemblance to the Coat which has come down from Col. Moses (53 Moses<sup>3</sup>) Kelly.]

CHILDREN, 561-567.

245. v John<sup>6</sup> [1 John<sup>1</sup>, 3 John<sup>2</sup>, 7 Abiel<sup>3</sup>, 25 Richard<sup>4</sup>, 84 John<sup>5</sup>], born June 5, 1768; married. One authority says he lived in Lynn. Another thinks he was in Londonderry, N. H. A third supposes he must have lived "near his folks," for one day during his last lingering illness he remarked that if he "should feel as well the next day he would go to see his father."

He had two children, sons, it is said. Their names are not known.

246. vi Catharine<sup>6</sup>, born June 22, 1770; married, February 19, 1795, Philip Hadley; lived in Vermont; had two sons and two daughters. One of the sons was thrown from his horse and had his neck broken.

After the birth of her youngest child Mrs. Hadley lay in bed sixteen years; but at length, it is said, "was cured by faith and prayer," and rode, on one occasion, from Vermont into Maine, to visit friends residing in the latter State.

247. vii Abiel<sup>6</sup> [1 John<sup>1</sup>, 3 John<sup>2</sup>, 7 Abiel<sup>3</sup>, 25 Richard<sup>4</sup>, 34 John<sup>5</sup>], born October 14, 1772; married Polly, daughter of Lieut. Edmund Morse, of Hampstead, N. H., June 7, 1792. He was a hatter. "Was one of several enterprising young men who settled in Kennebunk, Me., near the first of the present century." His wife died December 5, 1825. He died later, in the family of his son-in-law, Alexander Warren, Esq.

CHILDREN, 568-572.

248. viii Mary<sup>6</sup> (Polly), born March 20, 1774. "She was very handsome." Died at the age of twenty-two years of an epidemic fever while on a visit to her brother Phineas T., in Saco. (See 243 Phineas T.)

249. ix Joseph<sup>6</sup>, born August 26, 1776; not married. He was a hatter working as a journeyman in several places. At length "set up business" in Lubec, Me.; died there.

250. x Susanna<sup>6</sup>, born March 16, 1779; married Dr. John Perkins, of Methuen, November 15, 1801. Dr. Perkins settled in Rochester, N. H., in 1807; resided there till 1815, when he removed to Jaffrey, N. H. He and his wife are both said to have died in Providence, R. I. They had two sons and three daughters. One of the sons, a graduate of Dartmouth College, was a physician. The other son, John Kelly, was killed by a railroad accident. The name of one of the daughters was Narcissa.

CHILDREN OF 94 JONATHAN<sup>5</sup> AND SARAH (WHICHER-FOOT) KELLY.

251. i Timothy<sup>6</sup> [1 John<sup>1</sup>, 3 John<sup>2</sup>, 10 Jonathan<sup>3</sup>, 37 Jonathan<sup>4</sup>, 94 Jonathan<sup>5</sup>]. Born December 12, 1761; married Joanna Newcomb, December 28, 1783. "Both of Newbury" at the time of their marriage. Miss Newcomb was originally from Gloucester, Mass. Timothy Kelly served as a soldier in the Revolutionary army. Practiced as a physician in Candia, N. H.; went thence to New Chester (Hill), N. H., where he continued in his profession, and where he died February 19, 1845. Mrs. Kelly died in the same year.

Traditions of his early life represent him as a youth of uncommon native gifts, but with only imperfect and irregular educational advantages. Shortly after his death a highly commendatory notice of him, written by Rev. G. S. Dearborn, appeared in a religious

(Methodist) newspaper, and was later copied into the *Christian Advocate*.

H., a daughter of whom, Lucinda Bowen, married a Mr. Walker, and was the mother of Isaac F. Walker, of North Weare, N. H., who is authority for many genealogical facts given in this connection. He says "Mrs. Bowen was a good Christian woman." She died at the age of eighty-eight years.

254. IV Ebenezer<sup>6</sup> [1 John<sup>1</sup>, 3 John<sup>2</sup>, 10 Jonathan<sup>3</sup>, 37 Jonathan<sup>4</sup>, 94 Jonathan<sup>5</sup>]; married Betsey Cheney, of Bristol, N. H. He was born September 9, 1768. He learned the trade of painter in Boston, was for a time on a farm in Newbury, where his first child was born. Later he was a cloth manufacturer in Bridgewater, N. H. Afterward, with a Col. Lewis, kept a hotel and store in that town.

He was next in Haverhill, N. H.; then went to Geneva, N. Y., where he painted and made spinning-machines. He died in Marion, N. Y., March 13, 1829. His wife, to whom he was married April 16, 1789, survived him. She died at the age of eighty-five years at Marion, N. Y., in the family of her daughter, Mrs. Osborne. Her death occurred in the year 1858.

Ebenezer Kelly "was a tall, strong well-proportioned man, modest, kind and firm—a Presbyterian in religious profession."

Among the friends of Mr. Kelly were the father and one of the uncles of Daniel Webster.

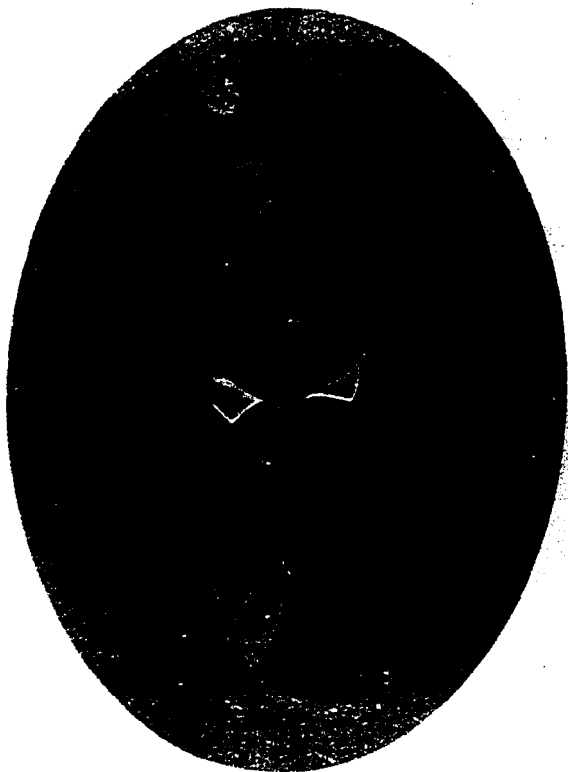
On the recommendation of Daniel Webster, he was appointed agent of the "Ten Proprietors' Tract," so called, in eastern Maine, a property then owned by David Sears, William Prescott and Israel Thorndike. He established his residence at Frankfort, Me., in September, 1825, and commenced the practice of his profession, and the discharge of the duties of his agency. His legal practice soon became extensive, and he at once took, and ever after retained, a high position at the bar. "He was especially proficient in Real Estate laws and matters, and in this direction particularly his professional counsel was widely sought." The pressure of business in the way of his profession, and the care of his private concerns, were such that he could give comparatively little attention to political affairs. He, however, felt it to be a duty to enter actively into the presidential campaign of 1840; and he continued to be influential in the Whig party until 1852, when that party made Gen. Scott its candidate for President of the United States. In doing

this it most unwisely, and even unjustly, as he thought, overlooked Mr. Webster, whom he regarded as the ablest statesman of his country, and who was, moreover, a personal friend, whose intimacy he had long enjoyed.

One writer says of Mr. Kelly: "I think I never knew a man of such absolute independence of thought and action." He is further characterized as "an extensive reader, a fine writer, an able and eloquent speaker, a wise and sagacious counsellor, and an accomplished gentleman." Died August 18, 1885.

He gained the cause for his client, to the surprise and admiration of his friends and the dismay of his opponents; but before he could reach his home was struck down with a fatal attack of pleurisy. He died in Henniker, N. H., July 3, 1855. His wife was Lucilla S. Peirce.

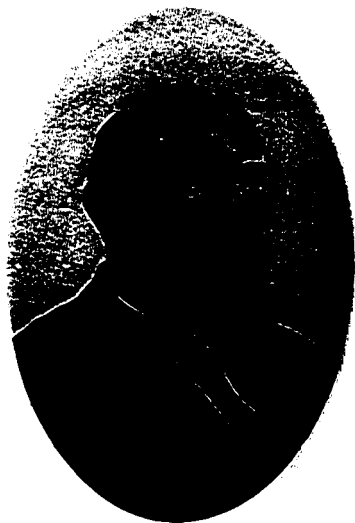

"WHEREAS, We have heard with feelings of deep sorrow of the death of Moses Kelly, Esq., who was the first president of this bank:

"Resolved, That in the death of Mr. Kelly this community has lost a citizen whose thorough honesty and uprightness of character, as shown during his long residence among us, has won the respect of all.

"Resolved, That we tender to the bereaved family and friends of the deceased our heartfelt sympathies in this their deep bereavement.

"Resolved, That as a token of respect we will attend the funeral.

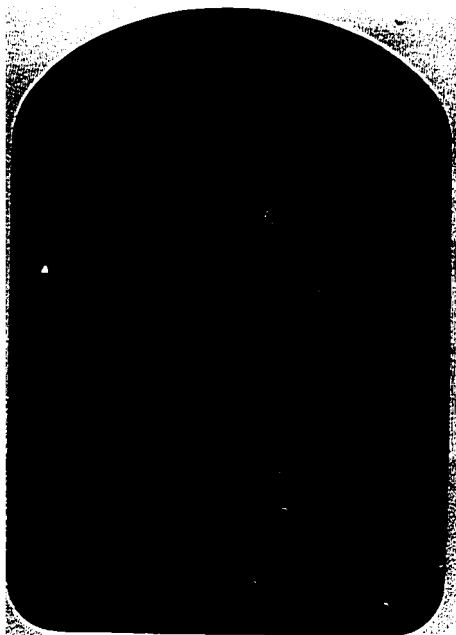
"Resolved, That these resolutions be spread on the minutes and a copy be forwarded to the family of the deceased."

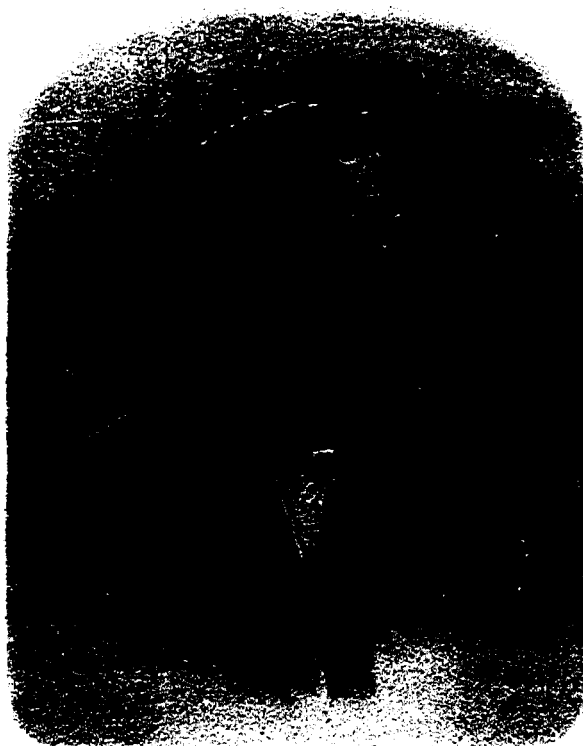

He entered the N. E. Conference as a clergyman in June 1822. He writes in 1877 as follows: "I have been stationed twice in Concord, N. H.; have been chaplain of the Legislature there, four sessions; have been chaplain of the State Prison two years. I have preached in Portsmouth, N. H. two terms; in Newmarket, Dover, Great Falls and Rochester. Have been twenty-two years in Massachusetts, at Lawrence, Charlestown, Worcester, Newburyport, Lynn, Waltham, Boston and Quincy." Rev. Mr. Kelly married Mary Ann Sherburne of Concord, N. H., May 17, 1827. She died in Newmarket, N. H., November, 29, 1828, leaving an infant child. He married, second, Emeline H. Robinson, of Portsmouth, N. H., August 5, 1830. She died in Lynn, February 2, 1866, and he died in Quincy, September 6, 1883.

He married second, Mary Perry, of Bradford, Mass., April 17, 1822.

Mr. Kelly made an attempt to lead a colony of settlers to Oregon. His journey thither by way of New Orleans, through Mexico and the Californias, occupying nearly two years. "was attended with incredible hardships and the severest disappointments." He arrived at the mouth of the Columbia River in October, 1834, abandoned by every one who had commenced the journey with him. He spent the ensuing winter in Oregon; and, in March, 1835, went from Fort Vancouver to Honolulu, S. I. On the 9th of August of that year he embarked for home, and reached Bristol, R. I., December 9.

Some time after his return from the Pacific coast, he presented to the Senate of the United States a memorial praying for a grant of land in Oregon. This memorial was supported by numerous testimonials, in the form of affidavits and certificates of various kinds, exhibiting among others, the names of John P. Bigelow, secretary of Massachusetts; William C. Brown, editor of *Zion's Herald*; David Green, secretary of A. B. C. F. M.; J. McNeil, surveyor of the port of Boston; Joseph Hall, navy agent; etc. A petition in aid of the prayer of Mr. Kelly, has among its signatures the names of T. H. Perkins and George Bancroft.

While teaching in Boston, Mr. Kelly compiled and published several school books. He also wrote and issued, in 1829, an account of Oregon. This work was prepared with the view of calling atten-

tion to the importance of the early settlement of that region of country, and as introductory to the enterprise he was then projecting. At one time during his stay in Boston, he became the owner of a considerable amount of shipping. He also, while still a resident in that city, purchased an estate in Palmer, Mass., on which he settled after his return from his expedition to Western America. His life in its later years was a solitary one. His mind, it is said, had become decidedly disordered. He died about the year 1873. His wife died in Bradford, on the 18th of October of that year. Her age was eighty-one years. Mr. Kelly "was a tall, well proportioned man: weight 180 pounds. Had dark hair, light gray eyes—was fluent in speech."

In his youth he was in a store in Barnstead, N. H.; when still a young man, he went to Calais, Me. His life was one of great activity and enterprise: and was attended with many remarkable circumstances. In telling of several instances of great danger to which he had been exposed, he mentions particularly a marvelous escape from foundering during a terrific gale as he was crossing St. Andrew's Bay; his boat being the only one out of a considerable number crossing at the same time, "that lived to make a harbor." "After this," he writes, "I was spending some days in the camps, where my men were lumbering. In going from one camp to another in the evening, I met three hungry wolves. The snow was four feet deep; but there was a good hay-road. They put up their deadly howl, which gave me a start. I ran on my back tracks,

and reached the camp when they had come within four rods of taking me."

Mr. Kelly was a justice of the peace, a bank director, and a railroad commissioner for fourteen years. He assisted in forming the first Sunday-school in the region, and was the first Sunday-school superintendent. He was a deacon in the Baptist Church in Calais. "They say," he writes, "I laid the first iron rail in the State. It was on a short road of two miles to Elliottown, which I made for hauling lumber." He died April 22, 1885.

The story as told by Alexander Warren, Esq., of Kennebunk, is as follows:

"While the young man was at work in the shop one day, a man came along with a two-horse team loaded with kegs of gunpowder, delivering it at the stores. In handling it some of the powder got scattered amongst the straw in the cart, and on the side-walk. Some idle boys saw it, and the first thing the man with the team knew of the matter, they had set fire to the powder, and it had caught the straw in the wagon. The street in which the team stood led straight to the wharf, and was all clear. The man saw the danger, and in an instant started the horses on a run, supposing they would go straight across the wharf, into the river. But as they were going to pass the shop in which Abbot was at work, he saw the team without a driver, and ran out to stop it. The man screamed to him to let it pass, but, before he could be made to understand the powder exploded, killing him and the horses, and doing much damage on the street." This accident occurred June 2, 1823. The young man thus suddenly and sadly deprived of life was about to be married to a Miss Kief, of Kennebunk.

562. ii Nancy Chase<sup>7</sup>, born May 22, 1795; married Andrew Tyler Ayer, December 19, 1817. Mr. Ayer was born March 16, 1795. He and his wife have lived together in the village of Newfield, Me., sixty-one years. In making this statement, in 1879, Mrs. Ayer takes occasion to add that her husband "runs his carding machine every summer," and that she, herself, has the sole management of household matters.

[NOTE.—During the year just now mentioned, 1879, Mrs. Ayer with her own hand, prepared several papers, containing a large amount of valuable and well-arranged information respecting her father's branch of the Kelly family, and other nearly allied branches. The vigor of mind, the



vivacity, the sportiveness even, displayed in her correspondence, which was continued at intervals for a period of four years, are truly remarkable in a person of her advanced age; and the carefulness and accuracy manifest in her statement of genealogical facts, are equally remarkable.]

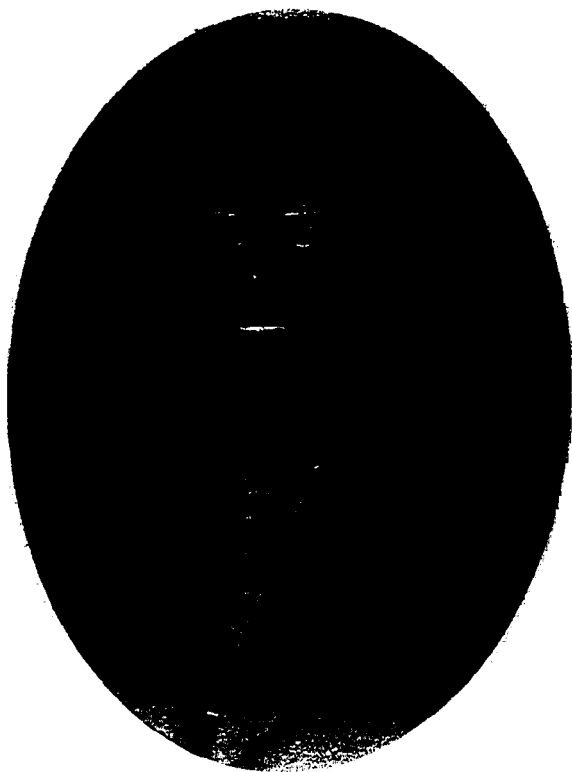

From Fort Keough, Mont. Territory, Mr. Kelly made, in 1878, a visit to his friends in the State of New York. Mr. Jarvis of Elmira, N. Y., who met this gentleman during his stay in that city, says that everything in his aspect, his manner, his personal appearance in all points, bear testimony to the truth of the representation given above. He is reserved, but not unsocial; observant, but assiduously polite. The piercing look of his dark eye is said to possess a strange, indescribable potency, to betoken a character at once strongly marked and inscrutable.
