"John Larrabee was born in Lynn, Mass., in 1757 or 1758. His father was lost at sea when he was a child, and he went to live with an uncle in Lynn, Mass. When but fifteen years of age he ran away, taking his last farewell of his widowed mother (he used to relate that when he had decided to take "French leave" of his uncle, he went to bid his mother farewell and left her under a tree weeping) and enlisted in the Colonial Army. He served as wagoner until his first term expired, then re-enlisting during the war and was honorably discharged at its close. He settled in Virginia, and it does not appear that he ever returned to his early home, and was lost to the family in Lynn. He married a Miss Hicks for first wife, and she had one son. She died in 1800, and in 1801 he returned to Ohio and settled near Newark, Licking County, where he died Feb. 6, 1846. His second wife was a Miss Smith, by whom he had three sone and five daughters.

"From a history of the pioneers of Licking County, Ohio, we learn that he was the son of a sea-faring man, who is supposed to have been impressed into the British service, as he was never heard from after leaving his move near Lynn. The son, John, was bound out to an uncle (said to have been Isaac), who worked him hard and gave him no advantages for education. While in the army he participated in many engagements, was one who helped capture the Hessians at Trenton, and about that time his feet were badly frozen. He received a pension many years. He was employed at one time, after coming from the army, against the Indians. After a residence at, or near, Marietta, on the Virginia side of the Ohio River, he went down in a canoe to explore the rich bottom lands and pitched on the Ohio side. Here he lived for several months in an enormous, hollow sycamore tree, said to have been ten feet in diameter. Here eleven persons settled and were known as the "Larrabee colony". After erecting a cabin and raising a crop of corn he returned for his family, and in the autumn of 1801 carried them up to their new home in the wilderness. In his early life he was under Quaker influence (this is a strong clue to his connection with the family of Ephraim Larrabee, of Lynnfield, Mass., who was a member of the Society of Friends, as was Ephraim's son, Daniel, who went to Baltimore), but was a member of the Disciples Church for the last thirty years of his life. He was a man of correct habits, industrious and honest; weighed about 350 pounds and was helpless some time before his death. He said he had a brother William and sister Joanna."

Tradition says he was "bound out" to learn the shoemaker trade, as a boy; that he was seven years in the army and received no wound at all; and that he came from France with his mother and father when he was two years old. The Saco Valley account showing him with uncles in Lynn, would place him in that group of Larrabee kin, descendents of Stephen, from England or Ireland, in about 1650, but earlier from France, which could account for the garbled tradition about France.

The Veteran's Administration, Washington, D. C., have this corroborating information of tradition. His number is S 41743. He enlisted early in 1775, May, served eight months, private in Capt. Hart's Co., Col. Sargent's Massachusetts

Regiment. Re-enlisted in 1776, served one year. Re-enlisted Jan. 1777, in Capt. Drury's Co., Col. John Crane's Regiment of Artillery; discharged Feb. 9, 1870, Morristown, N. J.; re-enlisted and served three years, being discharged at West Point. He was 69 years old in 1822, when the pension was granted, making his birth-date 1753; his wife was living and the eight children by his second marriage are listed with their ages in 1822. His certificate number is 14, 596, Ohio Agency. He died in Madison, Licking County, with pension arrears from Sept. 4, 1845 to March 13, 1846 paid to the widow Dolly.

The son, John, would have been out on his own at the time the pension was granted in 1822, especially as he was a son by a first wife.

A family tradition says that he died at the age of 87, which would make his birthdate 1759, but some discrepancy is often found in the case of such a broken early childhood.

History of Oblong, Illinois.

The record sale of land from the Government is to a Myers or Mitchel in 1836. The first man to build here was a John Watts, the home was in the southeast part of the Prairie, in 1840.

It was first called "Hen Peck"; there was a family here by the name of Henry Peck, its supposed the 'ry' was dropped as the little station for the railroad was listed as Hen Peck. The first mail was addressed this way until it was changed to Oblong on account of the country around here was oblong shape.

A Judge D. O'Dell bought 80 acres here and built a home here with one room used as a Post Office. The first Postmaster was a Joel Ziegler, in 1855.

The first brick store was built by Wm. Woods in 1865-60. It was a one story building for some time and later made into a two story one.

The oldest Monument in the Cemetery is a Joseph Woods, dated 1844. There are 5 graves with it that have only head stones or markers. Near the Cemetery they built their first school house, in 1865.

The first mill in town was built in the East part of town, built by the Kirtland Bros., who used big stones to grind the grain. This was destroyed by fire and they built a modern mill on the same ground.

The first mill on the Prairie was built on the creek, Northfork, where one of the sills can be seen in the water. This mill was run by water. A man by the name of Flyne had charge, in 1865.

The first railroad was built in 1882, through Hen Peck, which was a narrow gauge track and called The "Dinkey". It ran from Effingham, Ill. to the Indiana-Illinois State line. A new deed in 1883 for righteway was known as the Springfield, Effingham & Southeastern R.R. Co.

On May 12, 1886 the Indiana & Illinois Southern and the Bloomfield R. R. Co. was consolidated under the laws of Illinois and Indiana with the title of Illinois and Indiana Southern R. R. Co.

Effingham to the Illinois-Indiana State line was 56.50 miles. Later it was extended to Switz City, Ind., making 87.75 miles. All the narrow gauge tracks.

Later the Illinois Central bought this line and built a regular gauge track. In 1906 oil was found in and around Oblong, which turned it into a 'Boom' town for awhile. Now it has a population of 1500 in 1945.

This history of the railroad for Oblong was given me by C. E. Beeman, taken from the files from the Illinois Central R. R. in Chicago, Ill.

The earliest history of the Larrabee Family was given me by Mrs. Teneriffe Temple Larrabee, of 1971 Myra Ave., Los Angeles, Calif. The rest has been collected by me through many years of visiting, writing relatives and friends. Thanks to all.

While I know these records may not all be correct, but nevertheless, its value will increase with its age. A Family record which goes back only one generation is of itself of little value in determining our Genealogy, but realizing the fact that had someone of our progenitors done what we are doing now, we would be able to trace our lineage much more satisfactorily.

Fifty years hence, however, this record will be treasured much more highly than at present, and it is suggested that each family make additions as the occasion arises.
