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Foreword.

Some weeks ago, in the St. James' Club, I found myself seated next an old friend, the Baron van Haeften, who had lunching with him M. Georges Cattai, the Secretary of the Egyptian Legation in London. I had only recently proved, through female lines, two separate descents from Hugh de Lusignan X. "Le Brun," to the Essex family of Lukin, and the Baron had been much interested in this result, particulars of which will be found on page 3.

At lunch, therefore, he asked me if I had made any more de Lusignan discoveries, when I told him I was somewhat intrigued by the fact that I had found two XIII. Century Knights named respectively Philip Lucyen and Piers Lucyon, who bore arms identical with those of Geoffrey Lukyn, who had a Grant from Henry VIII. in 1542, of the Manor of Mashbery, in Essex, and further, that their Arms bore a striking resemblance to those of de Lusignan.

I added that I wondered if these Knights could be proved to be cadets of the older ruling family, when we were surprised to hear M. Cattai join in the conversation, and at once accept as a fact what I had merely advanced as an improbable surmise. He told us that for some years he had been greatly interested in the history of the de Lusignans, and that in 1387 a mediæval Romance had been written in France, entitled "Le Roman de Melusine." He then started to tell us the story, and made it so fascinating in the telling, that I determined to use it as an introduction to the Pedigree of the Lukyn family, on which I have been engaged for some years. I have had, of course, to greatly condense the story as originally written, but trust that the coincidence of the Arms, and the constant repetition of the name Geoffrey in the pedigrees may plead my excuse for its inclusion.

My thanks are due to Mr. Bower Marsh for expert research in connection with earlier Essex Manorial Records; to Major Thomas Shepard, F.S.A., for his delightful heraldic illustrations; and to Olivia, Lady Trotter, and Mr. Robert Ketton, of Felbrigg Hall, respectively, for their kind permission to reproduce the portrait of Robert Lukin, and that of the four Lukin brothers, by W. R. Bigg, R.A. I am also indebted to the Reverend R. E. Johnston, Author of "From Ulundi to Delville Wood," for allowing me to use the interesting illustration from that work, of Major-General Sir Henry Timson Lukin, K.C.B., with his two distinguished colleagues.

* The Romance of Melusine.

There was once a King of Albany, named Elynas, who while hunting, after the death of his first wife, heard angelic singing when approaching a fountain to quench his thirst. There he saw a beautiful lady who was quite unknown to him and, on approaching her courteously, she informed him that her name was Pressyne, and that she was amusing herself while her servants retired. He became enamoured of her, and declaring his passion, she undertook to marry him if he would solemnly promise never to see her in childbed, to which condition he at once consented.

They long lived happily together, until one day, when she had given birth to three lovely daughters named Melusine, Melior and Palatyne, the King's son, Nathas, by his first wife, who hated his step-mother, persuaded his father to go and see his beautiful children. Quite forgetting his vow, the King entered the chamber where Pressyne was lying with the three infants, when, after upbraiding him, she at once disappeared with the children and was never seen again. Elynas was greatly distressed and lamented for seven years, when his people, thinking him mad, made Nathas King in his stead.

Meantime, Pressyne had gone to Avalon, or the Lost Isle, where she brought up her daughters, and every morning took them to a high mountain, called Elyneos, and showed them the land of their birth. On being questioned by Melusine, Pressyne told them the story of their father's breach of faith, which made the girls decide to punish him for the sorrow he had caused their mother, so they imprisoned him on a mountain in Northumberland. When, however, they told Pressyne what they had done, she upbraided them for their unfilial conduct, and as a punishment she condemned Melusine, as the eldest

* The "Roman de Melusine, ou de Parthenay, ou de Lusignan," was written in 1387 in Latin prose by Jean d'Arras for the amusement of the Duchesse de Bar, sister of Charles V. of France and of John, Duc de Berri, Governor of Languedoc. It was re-written in French octosyllabic verse, about 1450, by La Coudrette, a Poitevin, for William, Lord of Parthenay. A fine translation of the latter in English was presented to the Library of Trinity College, Cambridge, by Beaupré Bell of Beaupré Hall, Norfolk, and experts are of opinion that it was written by an East Anglian, about 1500. A fine prose copy is in the British Museum, and was published by the Early English Text Society in 1866, and revised and reprinted in 1899.

and most in fault, to have the lower part of her body turned into a serpent's tail every Saturday, until she finds someone who will marry her and promise never to see her on that day. Should he break his promise her punishment must last until the Day of Judgment, and she must appear before her Castle for three days whenever it shall have a new Lord, or when one of her descendants is about to die. Melior was condemned to keep a Sparrow Hawk in a Castle in Armenia until the Judgment Day, subject to certain conditions, while Palatyne was to be imprisoned on Mount Guygo in Arragon, with her father's treasure until one of their lineage should deliver her and obtain the Treasure. After living for many years on the mountain, King Elynas died and was buried by Pressyne, who erected a richly decorated tomb to his memory, bearing his statue together with a gold plate inscribed with the details of their story. A giant named Grymault was appointed to guard the tomb for ever.

The story goes on to say that Aymery, Earl of Poitiers, having adopted Raymond, youngest son of Guy, Earl of Forez, was accidentally killed by his adopted son while boar hunting, and that the latter, riding aimlessly about absorbed in grief for his action, unconsciously approached the Fountain of Soif, subsequently called Lusinia, where three beautiful maidens were disporting themselves. As he took no notice of them, one, who was Melusine, was greatly annoyed, and, not realising that he was riding when asleep, gently reproved him, when he suddenly awoke and asked pardon for his negligence. They naturally fell in love with each other, and Melusine undertook to marry Raymond, provided he vowed never to see her on a Saturday, while she promised him all earthly prosperity.

She then told him to go to the new Earl of Poitiers, who was unaware that Raymond was accidentally responsible for the father's death, and to demand as a boon as much land as could be enclosed by a hart's skin. This gift being granted, and the deed signed and sealed, Raymond and a number of Barons proceeded to the Fountain and the skin, having been sliced into long thin strips, was found to enclose a large tract of land, on which Melusine at once commenced to build a Castle which she called de Lusignan * after her own name.

* The Castle of Lusignan was actually founded by Hugh de Lusignan II. ("Le Bien Aimé") in the tenth Century, and later was conspicuous for its "Melusine's Tower" and "Geoffrey's Gateway," the latter so called from the colossal statue of "Geoffrey au grand dent" which surmounted it. It was rased to the ground in January 1574-5 by the Duc de Montpensier.

Raymond and Melusine, according to the Romance, had ten sons,* the first eight, while otherwise finely formed, being born with a blemish. They were 1, Uryan, King of Cyprus, born with one eye blue and the other red ; 2, Oede, Comte de la Marche, with a face like fire ; 3, Guion, King of Armenia, with one eye lower than the other ; 4, Anthony, King of Luxemburg,† marked with a lion's claw on his cheek ; 5, Raynold, King of Bohemia, with only one eye ; 6, Geoffrey, Lord of Parthenay, with a great tooth on one side of his mouth (au grand dent) ; 7, Fromont, with a tuft of hair on his nose, who was burnt by Geoffrey in the Abbey of Maillezais ; 8, Horrible, with three eyes, one in the middle of his forehead, who was killed, by the advice of Melusine, to save him from Wickedness ; 9, Raymond, Comte de Forez, and 10, Thierry, who succeeded Geoffrey as Lord of Parthenay.

After many years of happiness, Raymond, on the persuasion of the Earl of Forez, who insinuated that Melusine met other men on a Saturday, broke into her room on that day, and saw, as she lay in her bath, that she had a serpent's tail. She however, forgave him this time as he kept her secret, but, some time afterwards, hearing of the death of his son Fromont who had been burnt by Geoffrey for disgracing his family by becoming a monk, he blamed Melusine, and, in a moment of rage, he called her a serpent in front of the assembled company. Melusine swooned with horror and then, after giving Raymond two rings § saying that as long as he or his heirs had one of them they would never be discomfited in law or defeated or killed in battle, she bade him farewell, glided out of the window in the

* Of these ten sons, four are actually historical, namely :

1. Guy, King of Jerusalem, afterwards King of Cyprus, who died in 1196.
2. Hugh de Lusignan VIII., Comte de la Marche, called Oede, Odo, or Eudes.
3. Aymery, called Uryan, who succeeded Guy as King of Cyprus 1196-1210.
4. Geoffrey de Lusignan, Lord of Vouvent and Mervent, in Poitou, who having destroyed the Abbey of Maillezais in 1232, re-built it as a penance, and was buried there.

† The Luxemburg family had no historical connection with that of de Lusignan, but so fascinated were they with the old Romance that they actually altered their genuine pedigree to include Anthony, 4th son of Melusine.

§ In another part of the story, omitted here, Melusine gives to each of her sons, Uryan and Guyon, a ring, when they go away to conquer their future kingdoms, saying that while they wear them and remain true Knights, they will never lose in a good cause, nor be hurt by magical arts or poison.

form of a blue and gold striped serpent* and passed three times round the Castle uttering a mournful and terrible cry. Notwithstanding her eternal torment the Romance relates that Melusine frequently returned at night in her mortal shape for the purpose of nursing her two youngest sons, Raymond and Thierry. Raymond was subsequently absolved by the Pope and became a hermit at Montserrat, in Arragon, where he died at a great age.

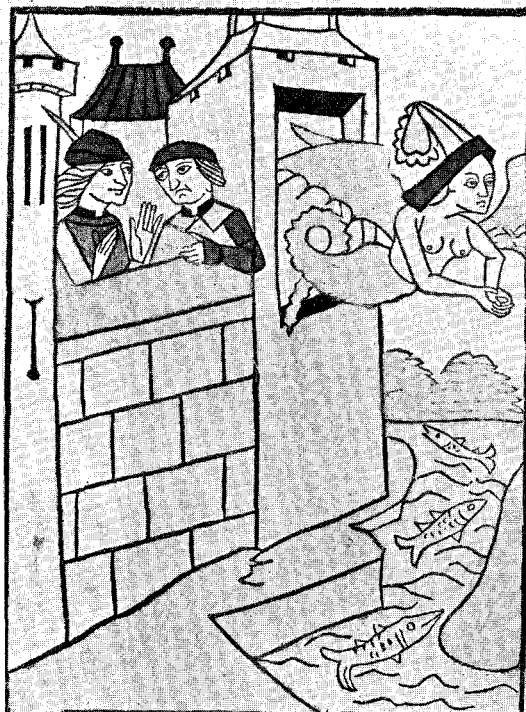
Geoffrey au grand dent, the bravest of all the brothers, subsequently performed prodigies of valour, slaying the Giant Grimault in Northumberland, and thereby discovering all the wonders of the enchanted mountain, including the tomb of his grandfather, Elynas, and incidentally the story of his own origin from the gold plate placed there by Pressyne.

* The Armorial bearings of Guy, King of Cyprus, were "Argent a lion rampant gules," but Hugh and Geoffrey de Lusignan, his brothers, used the lion on a field "barry of ten or and azure." This apparently explains the mediæval idea of the stripes on Melusine when she turned into a serpent.

Lusignan, Lucyen & Lucyon,

1. **Sir Geoffrey de Lusignan**,¹ granted Wardship of Henham Manor, Essex, 6 August, 1261; Protection as King's brother, 10 August 1263; holds Manor of Wigton, Norfolk, at time of his death, 20 May, 1275; married to Joan, Lady of Jarnak, who has custody of all his lands in England and Ireland during minority of his son and heir, Geoffrey; she nominated attorneys 6 September 1307, while staying overseas. He was half-brother of Henry III., and brother of William de Valence, Earl of Pembroke. *Arms*: Barry of twelve, or and azure, a lion rampant gules.
2. **Sir Geoffrey de Lusignan**,² son and heir; had livery of his father's lands 18 August 1289; mentioned among Knights making truce with France; has demesne lands at Wigton, Norfolk, 1296; the King grants to him Louth, Castle Fraunke, and Dys in Ireland, 3 November 1302; licence to let 200 acres of land and 400 acres of heath and pasture at Wigton, Norfolk, 16 October 1305; writ for his inquest post mortem 8 February 1308; his widow, Petronilla, nominates attorneys 20 June 1317; the Justiciary of Ireland is to assign dower to her 30 March 1321.

Philip Lucyen,³ summoned as Armiger to serve overseas 7 July 1297; Lord of Muscote and Brockhull, Northants, 5 March 1316; qualified for knighthood.

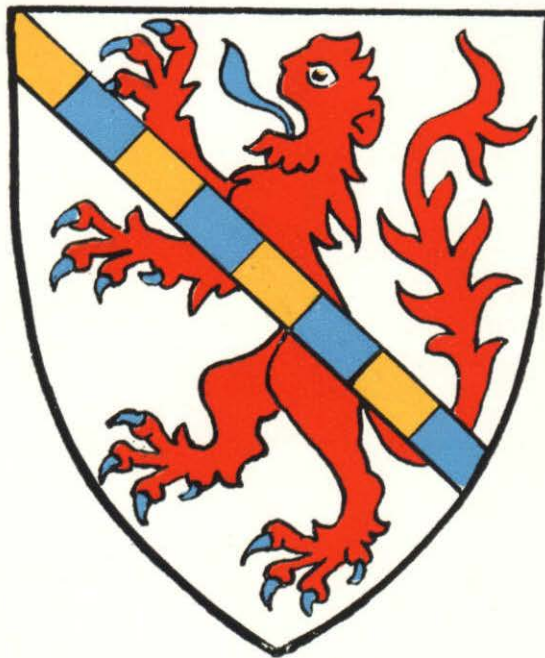
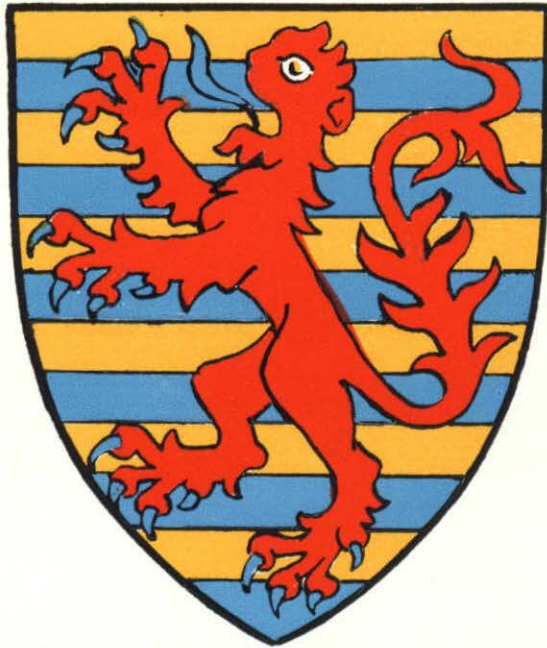

Lovekyn of London and of Kingston, co. Surrey.

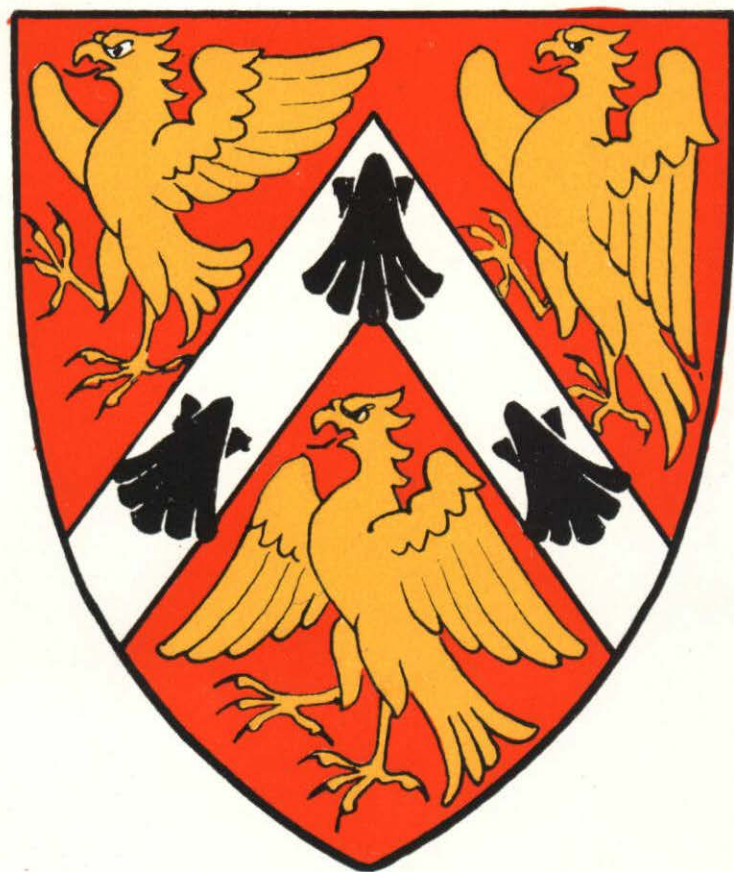
Edward Lovekyn,² of Kingston, in the County of Surrey, a Citizen of London, is first mentioned in 1292 in the will of Adam Pikeman,¹ Citizen and Fishmonger of London, as inheriting a tenement in Candlewykestrete in the City of London; in 1305 he built a chapel to St. Mary Magdalen in his native town of Kingston, and both he and his brother

(1363) as son of Edward Lovekyn⁴ but in the Register of Bishop Stratford, as son and heir of Robert Lovekyn; was Alderman of Bridge Ward and Sheriff of London in 1342; Mayor of London in 1348 and Lord Mayor in 1358 and 1366, the last time being on the direct nomination of the King; Member of Parliament for London 1344, 1346, 1348 and 1360; on 3 May 1355 he endowed the family Chapel at Kingston with two messuages in the Parish of St. Michael, Crooked Lane, London, of the value, of four pounds annually,² and 35/- in annual rents, and nine messuages, ten shops, one mill, one hundred and twenty-five acres of land, ten acres of meadow, and one hundred and twenty acres of pasture, all in the parish of Kingston; built and endowed the Magdalen Hospital at Kingston in 1367, and founded St. Michael's College there in connection with it; provided a sum of no less than £200 towards the £20,000 required by Edward III. for his expedition to France in 1346; his large mansion in Thames Street passed to Sir William Walworth (the famous Lord Mayor of London who slew Wat Tyler in Smithfield in 1381), and subsequently, in 1434, became the Hall of the Fishmongers' Company; died 4 August 1368, and buried in front of the Altar in the Church of St. Michael, Crooked Lane, which he had previously built at his own cost. His will¹ dated 27 July 1368, was enrolled in the Court of Hustings 11 November 1368, "his servant, William de Walworth," being one of his executors. In it he leaves

certain sums for masses for the souls of his two wives, Mabel and Margaret, also of Gilbert de Mordon and others, and to his nephew, **John Lovekyn**, he bequeathes a tenement in Candlewykstrete (possibly the same as that left to Edward Lovekyn, by Adam Pikeman in 1292). His monument was restored by the Fishmongers' Company in 1562. His first wife Mabel was apparently the widow of Henry Gubbe, Citizen and Fishmonger of London, as her daughter, Letitia Gubbe, is also mentioned in his will, but he left no issue by either of his wives, Mabel or Margaret,¹ the latter of whom subsequently married Sir William Walworth, her will dated 12 January 1393, being enrolled in the Court of Hustings 20 July 1394.²

Geoffrey Lovekyn, possibly a brother of the Mayor, and father of the latter's nephew, John Lovekyn, mentioned above; on the 7th February, 1359, an inquisition was taken before John Lovekyn, the Mayor, and the Sheriffs, by oath of Geoffrey Lovekyn, into the conduct of certain mercers of the City in attacking the Lombard merchants.³

John Lovekyn,² mentioned as his nephew, by John Lovekyn, the Mayor, in his will dated 27 July 1325, whereby he is left a tenement in Candlewykstrete, in the City of London. He was probably the father of John Lovekyn of Kingston,¹ who in 1356 granted lands there to John and Agnes Wenge.

Roger de Lovekyn,¹ of Kingston, a minor, was presented in 1301, by the Abbot and Convent of Chertsey, to the Rectory of Clandon, Surrey, to which he was collated 13 May 1313 on receiving Holy Orders, but in 1315 he exchanged the living for that of Esher.

Katherine Lovekyn,¹ of Kingston, widow, daughter and heir of Robert de Ely, Citizen and Fishmonger of London, granted in 1403, property in London to William Chichele of Cheshire.

Lovekin of London and of Bearsted, co. Kent.

- i. **George Lovekin**, Citizen and Merchant Taylor of London, was born in Paris and was granted Letters of Denization for himself and the heirs of his body 14 June 1476¹; on the 19th November 1485² he received a Grant for life, from 6 October last, of the office of Sergeant Tailor of the Great Wardrobe with 12^d a day, 100/- a year for a house hired by him in the City of London, and of a livery of vesture for winter and summer at Christmas and Whitsuntide; Warden of the Merchant Taylors' Company in 1486; built the Chantry of St. George in the Church of St. Nicholas Acon, Lombard Street. Will dated 4 March 150 $\frac{3}{4}$ (P.C.C. 6 *Holgrave*), no probate. By his first wife he left issue two sons and a daughter:

- (1) **Arthur Lovekin**, of Bearsted, co. Kent, "a Childe of the Chapel Royal" at the funeral of Henry VII in April 1509, and at Coronation of Henry VIII 24 June 1509³; as a King's Scholar at Westminster a Warrant was given for a gown of tawny cloth for him 20 November 1511⁴; appointed Clerk to the Master of the King's Works at Tournay 28 March 1517; buried with his wife Anne in Bearsted Church in 1546. Will dated 4 March 154 $\frac{5}{8}$, proved (P.C.C. 27 *Alen*) in 1546, in which he mentions a John Lovekin.

- (2) **George Lovekin**, of London, born c. 1480; Clerk of the King's Stable 1509⁵; had a licence to import 100 tuns of Gascon wine 25 July 1510; Water Bailiff of King's Lynn 20 October 1509; Supt. of Armory and Gallery at Greenwich June 1518; Furbisher at the Field of the Cloth of Gold 1520⁵; Controller of the King's Works in England 24 March 1528-9; died before 2 July 1535. His wife Philippa, Chamberer in the Household of the Queen, Anne of Cleves, in 1540⁶; married 2ndly John Osborne, marriage licence at Faculty Office 23 July 1546.

- (1) Elizabeth, aged under 21, 4 March 150 $\frac{3}{4}$.

- (3) **Robert Lovekin**, mentioned in his father's will 4 March 150 $\frac{3}{4}$ as "child by second wife, who has friends on his mother's side."

Lovekyn of Lovekynsmede, in Good Easter, co. Essex.

1. **John Lovekyn**, of Lovekynsmede¹ and Kettylshalfyard,² in Good Easter, in the County of Essex; held Lovekynsmede 26 July 1454, and surrendered Kettylshalfyard 26 July 1454 to Thomas Lovekyn. He left issue two sons.

(1) John Lovekyn, of whom presently.

Although Richard Luckyn, or Lukyn, of Lukynsmede (*see page 10*), in his will, dated 28 July 1540, mentions Geoffrey Lukyn of High Ongar, as his "cousin," no proof has yet been found to definitely identify Geoffrey's father. Essex, as his "cousin," 28 July 1540; Lord of the Manors of Mashbery and Matching, co. Essex,² which he purchased from Henry VIII., and of the Manor of Mountness, co. Essex, from the Lady Mary Tudor, 32 Henry VIII. (1541); for these Manors and for a house in St. Botolph's, Bishopsgate, he paid the large sum, at that time, of nearly £600; his inquest post mortem³ taken at Chelmsford 10 January 1549 (3 Edward VI.), shows that he was also seized of property at Writtle, Newland, and a moiety of lands called Bovyldes and Frankelyns in Southminster, Moyland, and Steeple, all in Essex, and in Belfers *alias* Chalkes, in Roxwell and Newland, also in Humfreys in Margaret Roothing, and in Smallshoes in Good Easter; died 1 November, buried at Mashbery 6 November 1549. Will dated 15 October 1549, proved (P.C.C. 4 *Tasche*) 27 February 1553. Further adm'on was granted 8 February 1575, to Henry Lukyn of Roxwell, co. Essex, the grandson. 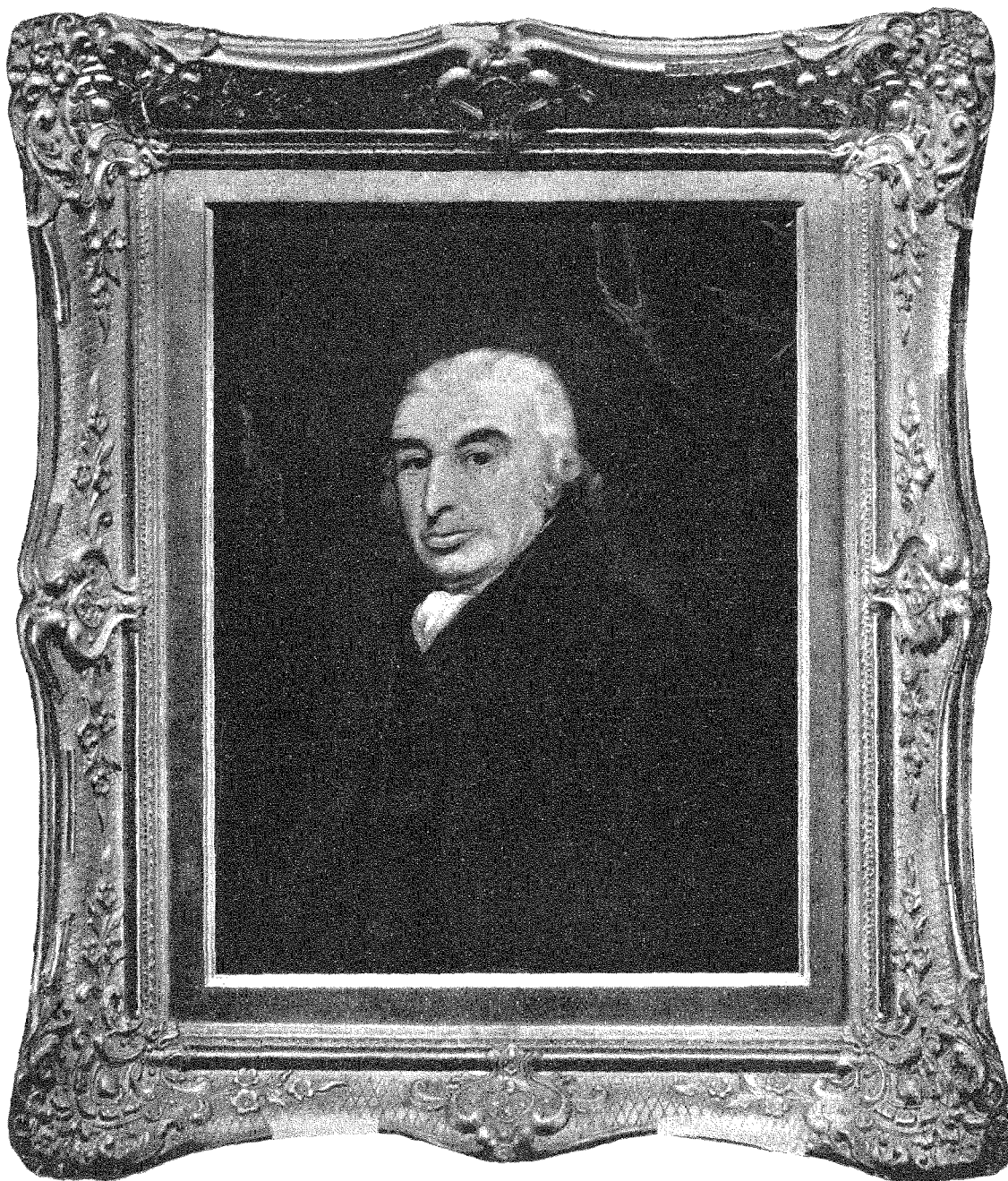

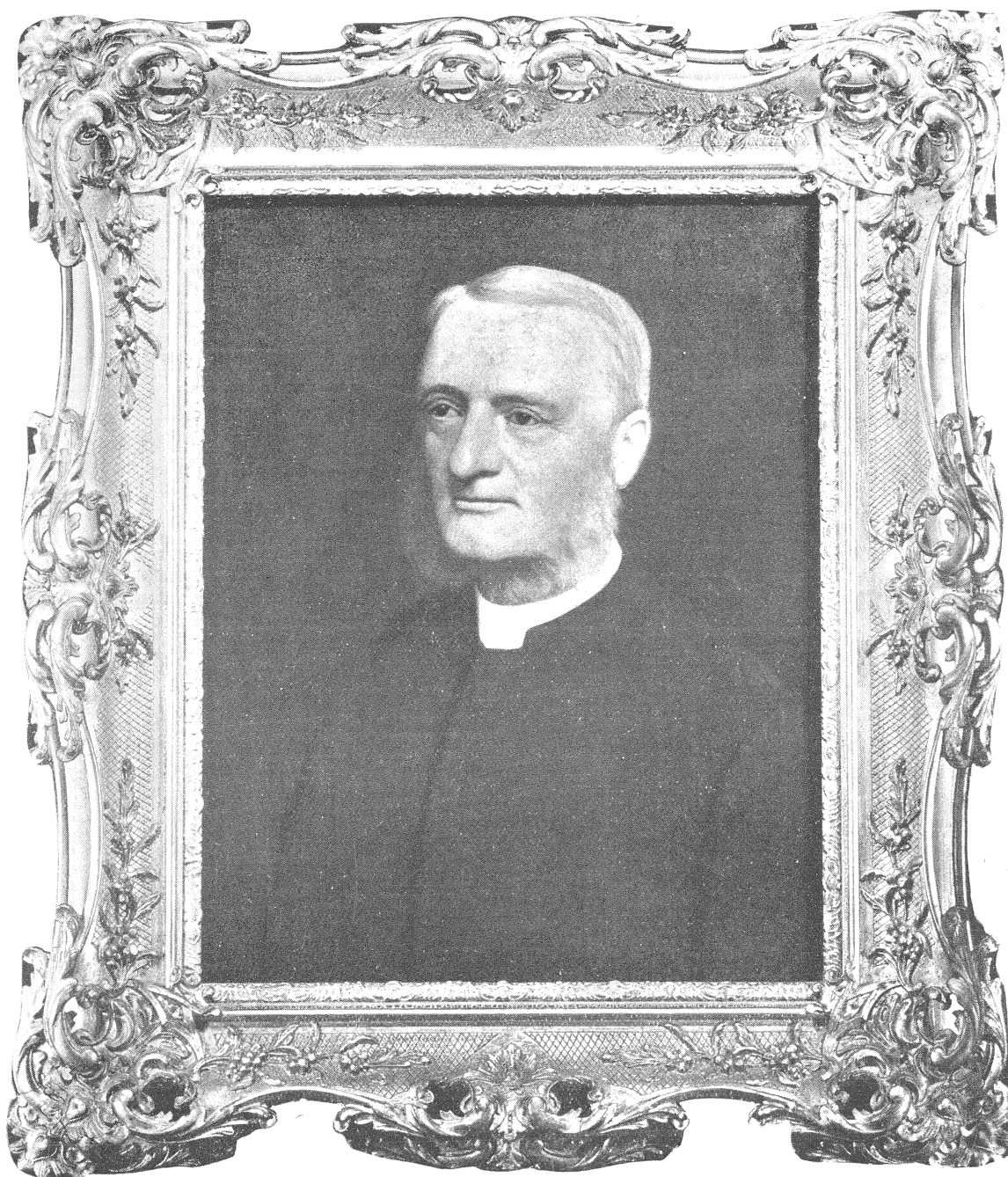

Essex; baptised at Braintree 26 September 1739; of Christ's College, Cambridge, LL.B. 1797; D.C.L. of St. Alban's Hall, Oxford, 23 June 1798; Rector of Felbrigg and of Aylmerton, co. Norfolk; Prebendary of Westminster 1797; Dean of Wells 1799; died at the Deanery, Wells, 27 November 1812, and buried at Felbrigg; married at Hanworth, co. Norfolk, 30 June 1767, Catherine, elder daughter and coheir of Robert Doughty of Hanworth Park, by Margaret his wife, daughter of Weyman Lee; she, who was born at Hanworth 27 February 1748, died at Brighton, aged 66, 15 April 1814, and was buried at Hove, co.
