INTRODUCTORY REMARKS.

The following record has been obtained by careful study of genealogical and historical works found in the Congressional Library at Washington, D. C., and in the Astor Library at New York City. I have had, in addition to this, the advantage of an old record and "family tree" made by my grandfather, Col. Johnson Mason, for my father, who left it to me. It is now in possession of Edward C. Mason, my nephew. Col. Johnson Mason was born in 1767 and lived till 1856. His grandmother, Mary Arnold Mason, was born in 1703 and lived till 1798, at which time Col. Johnson was 31 years old. As they both lived in Medfield, and he was interested in genealogy, he probably had many conversations with her on that subject, and obtained from her much of the information which enabled him to make out the record for my father. Her grandfather, Dr. Return Johnson, was living in Medfield in 1679, only three years after the Indians burned the town. Ebenezer Mason was her husband's father and lived until she was fifty years old. She probably had her information, and the story of the massacre, from Ebenezer himself, who was eight years old at the time of the massacre in 1676. I have not been able to establish the connection between this Mason family and any of the Masons of England. I insert here, however, all the facts that I have been able to gather concerning the various Masons of England, in order to keep in compact form material that has been collected from many different sources, as an assistance in case of future researches.

The earliest mention I find of the name is of "Robert Le Mason" of Norwich, Norfolk. His son, John, gave the advowson of the church at St. Bartholomew to the church at Windham. This was about the year 1300.

An English squire of Staffordshire had three sons, all of whom emigrated to America about the year 1630.

Rev. John Mason of Water Stratford, Bucks, published, about the year 1650, a collection of hymns and tunes for church service.

William Mason of York, published an "Essay on Church Music" in the year 1795.

A Mason family was originally settled at Egmonton, Nottinghamshire. This family removed to Eaton, same county, in the time of Queen Elizabeth.

A Sir John Mason was Chancellor of the Duchy of Lancaster in the time of Henry the Eighth.

Thomas Mason, 19 years old, came to America in the ship Primrose from Gravesend, July 27, 1635.

Among the Landed Gentry that are mentioned by Burke there are several families of Masons, all having "coats of arms." Berry's County Genealogies lists a Mason family of Monketon, coming originally from the Isle of Thanet, Kent, also having a "coat of arms" differing from those listed in Burke's Dictionary. The description of this latter coat of arms borne by Thos. Mason of Monketon is as follows:

Per Pale ar. and sa. a chevron between three billets, all counterchanged. Motto: "Demeure par la Verite."

Mason families are to be found in Grade, Cornwall, London, Stafford, Warwick, York, Buckinghamshire, Norfolk, Kent, Essex, Northumberland and Nottinghamshire.

Among the earliest settlers in this country are several different branches of the Mason family.

Capt. Hugh Mason of Watertown, Mass., is the ancestor, in this country, of one of these branches. His descendants lived in Boston and New Hampshire, and among them are many distinguished men, notably Jonathan Mason of Boston and New Hampshire, a celebrated lawyer and United States Senator from New Hampshire.

Major John Mason, who settled in Dorchester, Mass., is the head of another branch. He removed to Connecticut, was the commander of the expedition against the Pequot Indians and at one time Deputy Governor of the State. Daniel Mason, one of Maj. John's descendants, married Elizabeth St. John, who was a relative of Queen Elizabeth, a descendant of Charlemagne and of Alfred the Great, and was connected and related to a large number of the most prominent families of the English nobility. Jeremiah Mason, the distinguished lawyer and friend of Daniel Webster, was a member of this branch.

Ralph Mason of Boston is the first of another branch. Some of his descendants are still living in that city.

Col. George Mason of Virginia, the head of the southern family, was an officer in the army of Charles Second of England.

Capt. John Mason of New Hampshire, who, together with Sir Fernando Gorges, obtained from Parliament a grant of all that territory which is now the State of New Hampshire, had no sons. John Tufton, who married into this family, took the name of Mason and pushed the suit to establish the claim to these lands. Among the descendants of the latter is Prof. Otis Tufton Mason of the National Museum at Washington. The claim to the New Hampshire land was never fully established, and the rights were finally sold to an English syndicate which failed to realize from it.

There was another branch in Vermont, one in Rhode Island and one or two others in Massachusetts. Concerning each of these branches, a good deal of information can be found in Bond's Genealogies and in Savage's Genealogical Dictionary.

The ancestor of the branch of which this book contains a record, is Robert Mason of Roxbury and Dedham, Mass. Many of the settlers of Roxbury were of John Winthrop's company, and came from the town of Nazing, on the river Lee, Essex Co., England. This was in 1630, and Robert Mason may have been of this company. Two facts, taken in conjunction, make this conclusion quite probable. The first, that no mention of this Robert is made in the existing emigration lists which the English law required. The second, that the lists of Winthrop's company have all been lost.

Among Robert's descendants are many who have been well-known and distinguished citizens in their day and generation. They have been town officers, state representatives, ministers, lawyers, and soldiers in the French and Indian wars, the war of the Revolution and the war of 1812. In the year 1834 there were twenty-seven of Robert's descendants who were graduates of New England colleges. Rev. Thomas Mason of Northfield was one of the most prominent divines of his day. Col. Johnson Mason of Medfield was town clerk for nineteen years, treasurer for one year and state representative four or five times. Joseph Mason of Worcester, a well known lawyer and city official and author of a standard work entitled "Massachusetts Practice," was of this branch, also Rev. Edward B. Mason, D. D., pastor of prominent churches in Indianapolis and Detroit, now of Brunswick, Maine, the seat of Bowdoin College.

A great love of music has been one of the characteristics of many of this branch, and several of them have made this art, or the lines of business connected with it, the business or profession of their lives. Barachias Mason of Medfield taught singing as long ago as 1750. The well known Dr. Lowell Mason, and also his brother Timothy B., the head for many years of the principal music store of Cincinnati, were of this branch, as were four presidents of the Mason & Hamlin Organ and Piano Co., and also Dr. William Mason of New York City, the distinguished pianist and composer.

This musical vein might indicate that Robert, who was born in England, was perhaps connected with the family of Rev. John of Water Stratford, heretofore mentioned. Robert of Roxbury, Capt. Hugh of Watertown and Major John of Dorchester all came to this country about the year 1630. They may have been the "three sons of Squire Mason of Staffordshire," all of whom "emigrated to America about the year 1630." Daniel G. Mason, according to a tradition in the family, established a connection of the Medfield Mason family with a Mason family in England having the following coat of arms:

Per Pale. ar. and sa. a chevron between three Mason's squares, all counterchanged. Crest, a stag's head erased, sa. attired or. ducally gorged gold.

I have not been able to ascertain how he succeeded in tracing this connection.

The plan followed in making this record is of the simplest kind, and individual lines can be quickly and easily traced.

The names are entered by generations counting from Robert of Roxbury.

All the children of the oldest son in each generation are entered first in their respective generations. Then the children of the second son, etc., etc., through the generation. To separate the generations a double red line is drawn across the full width of the page. To separate families in the same generation a single red line is drawn part way across the page from the red line on the left.

Each name as it is entered is numbered in regular order, this individual number being placed on the left of and *immediately* preceding the name. Immediately preceding this individual number stands the individual number of that person's father.

With this numbering system the individual line of any member, starting with the generation of which he is a member, can be readily traced back to the first generation.

The record is acknowledged to be very incomplete. The compiling of a complete record involved an expenditure of time, money and labor which it was not in the power of the writer to give to the work.

FIRST GENERATION.

Robert Mason, was born in England about the year 1590. He was probably one of John Winthrop's Company, which settled the town of Roxbury in 1630. His wife died at Roxbury in April, 1637. He moved to Dedham, Mass., and was an original land holder there in 1642. Died there in 1667, October 15th.

SECOND GENERATION.



Thomas, came to Dedham, Mass. from Roxbury with his father. and two brothers John and Robert. At the death of their father in 1667, the three brothers were administrators of his estate. Thomas was one of the first settlers of Medfield, Mass. He went there from Dedham with his brother Robert about 1650. He was one of the signers of the Medfield Memorial to the General Assembly in 1664, and was a subscriber to the building fund of Harvard College at Cambridge. He was born about 1625, and married April 23d, 1653, Margery Partridge of Dedham, a sister of John and William,* descendants of Richard de Pertriche of Wishanger Manor, Gloucestershire, England. She died in 1711, was born about 1625. Thomas and two of his sons were killed by the Indians in the attack on Medfield led by Monaco, under King Philip. His widow afterward rebuilt the house and subsequently married — Stacy. At her death the property was left to her son Ebenezer Mason. Thomas died February 21st, 1676.

John, removed from Roxbury to Dedham with his father and two brothers. He married Mary Eaton, daughter of John Eaton of Watertown, on May 5, 1651. He was probably the ancestor of John of Dedham, Abigail and Hánnah of Dedham, and John and Hitty of Dover.

^{*}William Partridge of Salisbury in 1638, died 1654, was son of John of Olney Bucks, England. He married Ann —. Margery was probably his daughter—but may have been his sister. John of Olney Bucks was descendant of Richard de Pertriche.

 Battelle of Dedham in January, 1767. She was the daughter of
 Mark Whitney of Hopkinton and widow of Jonathan Battelle
 of Dedham. Barachias died in 1783. He was a graduate of
 Harvard College in 1742, a land surveyor, selectman for five
 years, an inn holder, keeping a tavern at the house where Captain Samuel Sadey formerly lived, which was the property left to
 him by his mother, Mary Arnold Mason, a daughter by a
 previous marriage of Captain Sadey's wife Mary Johnson. He
 also "taught music" during a period of about twenty years.
 Parades were held at his house of the first companies of soldiers
 that started for the war after the alarm at Lexington, April
 19th, 1775.

- Abner, born Medfield February 26th, 1741. He married Phebe Harding in 1771. Was a soldier during the war of the Revolution. He removed to Medway in 1778, after selling out his Medfield property to his brother Asa. His heirs still own the property in Medway, died November 7, 1825.
- 22-46 Asa, born in 1727, married in 1755 Beriah Fisher of Wrentham, lived in Dover and afterwards in Dedham. Later moved to Medfield, 1777 and bought his brother Abner's interest in their father's estate. He was killed by a fall in his barn in 1803.

^{*}Priscilla Wheelock, wife of Silas Mason 42, was great grand-daughter of Ralph Wheelock, "the founder of Medfield," a graduate of Cambridge University in England, a Minister and a Representative to General Assembly, filled all of the prominent offices in the town at various times.

34 - 64Johnson, born at Medfield August 7th, 1767, married Caty Hartshorn May 27th, 1791. She was a great, great, great granddaughter of Henry Adams, who was born in England in 1604, came to Medfield in 1652, was killed by Indians February 21st, 1676. He was the principal military officer of the town, the first town clerk, selectman and representative repeatedly, and one of the most prominent men in town affairs, in its history. Her great grandfather was Samuel Smith. His mother was trying to escape, carrying him, an infant, in her arms, at the time of the massacre in 1676. She was killed, and he was stunned and left for dead, but recovered consciousness and crept into his dead mother's arms, where he was afterward found by the townspeople. Caty Hartshorn's brother, Moses Hartshorn, was a soldier in the war of the Revolution, first as "Minute Man" and afterwards soldier. Johnson Mason died November 13th, 1856. He was a pioneer in the straw weaving trade. He

was commissioned as Captain of Militia in 1800, as Colonel in 1803, was town clerk for nineteen years, town treasurer for one year, selectman for three years and Representative to the Massachusetts General Assembly in 1809, 1811, 1821 and 1843. He inherited the estate of his father Barachias on North Street, opposite Dale.
Arnold, born at Medfield May 5th, 1770, died unmarried September 14th, 1837.
William, born at Princeton November 19th, 1764, died March 24th, 1847. He was a minister settled at Bangor, Maine, and elsewhere.
Sarah, born May 23rd, 1767, died May 11th, 1845.
Thomas, born at Princeton May 28th, 1769. He married Lydia Kendall December 11th, 1800, second Sophy Brainerd January 24th, 1804. Graduated at Harvard College in 1796, ordained minister at Northfield in 1799. Representative to General Assembly eight years, died January 3rd, 1851.
Mary, born at Princeton October 16th, 1771, died February 7th, 1852.
Elizabeth, born May 17th, 1774, died May 8th, 1853, married Joseph Clark.

He married Abby Gregory September 3rd, 1817. When eighteen years of age he was leader of the church choir and also leader of a village band,

playing the clarinet himself. Removed to Savannah, Georgia in 1812. He became widely known as composer and publisher of

church music. He returned to Boston in 1827, was conductor of the Handel and Haydn Society and one of the founders with George James Webb of the Boston Academy of Music. He received from the University of New York the degree of Doctor of Music. His influence on the musical education of the people of this and other countries was far reaching and exceedingly beneficial. He died at Orange, N. J., August 11th, 1872. His wife died in October, 1889.

Timothy Battelle, born November 17th, 1801 at Medfield, married first Alma Harding, daughter of Timothy Harding and Esther Mason of Medway, November 1st, 1821. His children by her were Alma, Lucretia, Addison, Henry, Mary and Abigail. He married second *Abigail Hall, daughter of Captain Samuel Hall and Sarah Cheney, May 25th, 1837. Their children are Edward B., Helen A. and William L. He engaged in the music trade in Cincinnati and composed and published a great many church tunes. He was an intimate friend of Dr. Lyman Beecher, and played the organ and led the choir in his church at Cincinnati. He, and Rev. Dr. C. B. Boynton, were appointed a committee, by the Kansas League of Cincinnati (a society devoted to the interests of the cause of Anti-Slavery) to make a trip through Kansas in the Autumn of 1854 and report as to its

^{*}Abigail Hall's great grandmother was Sarah Wiswall, a daughter of Captain Noah Wiswall, a Captain in the Colonial Service, who commanded a company in the French and Indian War in 1690. He marched to the defense of Casco in May of that year. July 6th, after leaving Cocheco, they came up with the enemy in the woods, and a severe battle was fought in which Captain Wiswall was killed at Wheelwright Pond, Lee, New Hampshire. The General Assembly voted a grant of land to his children in consideration of their father's services. He was a son of Elder Thomas Wiswall who came from England to Dorchester in 1635, and was a Representative to General Assembly in 1646, and a ruling elder of the first church in the City of Boston. Sarah Wiswall's grandfather was Deacon John Jackson who was baptized in the Parish of Stepney, London, England in 1602. He was one of the first settlers of Cambridge. His father Christopher Jackson died at Stepney Parish in 1632.




