INTRODUCTION.

The Rev. J. H. DeMille spent a large part of his life in making researches and collecting records, both in England and America, for a genealogy of the Mead family which he published.

It is a work of great value to the Mead family, but now out of print.

The copy of his work from which the following history of the family is taken has no date of publication, but it contains records as late as August 3rd, 1882, and probably was published shortly thereafter.

A much larger and more comprehensive history and genealogy of the Mead family was published in 1901 by Spencer P. Mead containing the Mead Coat-of-Arms, and the history of the family in England and America, including their record in the Colonial wars, the Revolutionary war, the war of 1812, the war with Mexico, the Civil war, and the war with Spain.

When it was published the author believed that JONATHAN,⁴ (*John*,³ *John*,² *William*,¹) died in 1712, unmarried (Mead Genealogy, page 211) and hence he could not publish the various lines which now are known to be descended from the above Jonathan.

In the summer of 1915 Spencer P. Mead re-examined the Greenwich records and found positive proof that JONATHAN,⁴ (*John*,³ *John*,² *William*,¹) did not die in 1712 but married Esther Butler, had the seven children whose names appear in the following pages and removed to Nine Partners, Dutchess Co., N. Y.

This volume is intended to be a supplement to the more important work of Spencer P. Mead.

The historical section contains as much of the history of the family as is of direct interest to the descendants of JONATHAN,⁴ (*John*,³ *John*,² *William*,¹). The genealogical section contains the record of the ancestors of the above Jonathan⁴ and the record of his descendants as far as information could be obtained.

A few of the descendants of Jonathan⁵ and Nehemiah,⁵ like some of their ancient English forbears, have added a final "e" to their name, but the correct form—Mead—has been used in this volume. Let each make the addition for himself or herself if so disposed.

There are at least two Meade families in America both being of Irish extraction and neither of them in any way connected with our English Mead line.

The rule that the female line shall be carried forward only one generation has not been observed, as this is a family affair rather than a formal genealogy and the girls have received the same treatment as the boys.

The reader is referred to the Spencer P. Mead genealogy for a complete history and record of the other descendants of William¹ Mead.

EXPLANATORY NOTE.

The heads of families carried forward are numbered consecutively. The number preceding a name or the number in parenthesis following a name in italics is the consecutive number of that name.

To find the line of ancestry of any one, for example Philip⁶ Mead, turn to the index at the end of the volume which shows that Philip⁶ Mead may be found on page 23, where he appears as the third child of 7 Nehemiah⁵ Mead after whose name is given his ancestry in italics *Jonathan*⁴ (5), *John*³ *John*,² *William*.¹ Turning back in the consecutive numbers to No. 5 is found on page 22, the account of 5 Jonathan⁴ Mead whose ancestry is given in italics in similar manner, his father being *John*³ (4), etc. Turn back in like manner to 4 John³ Mead on page 22, 3 John² Mead on page 21, and 1 William¹ Mead on page 21.

To find the descendants of any name, for example Philip⁶ Mead whose name first appears on page 23, turn to his consecutive number (14) which is found on page 25, where you will note that the consecutive numbers of his sons who are carried forward are 18, 19 and 20. Proceed in like manner to find the later descendants.

HISTORY OF THE MEAD FAMILY.

Instead of attempting to write a historical sketch of the family which would necessarily be based on the researches of the Rev. J. H. DeMille, the author has copied a few pages of his history as follows:—

The Meade family came originally from Somersetshire, into Co. Essex, about the reign of Henry VI. (A. D. 1422), and first settled at Elmdon, then spread into Wendon Loughts, and into Cheshall and Henham. It will be noticed that the name is sometimes spelled with, sometimes without, the final “e.” According to Burke’s Armory there seem to have been eight distinct Mead families in England; four having the “Pelican” and four the “Trefoil” as the feature of the “Coat of Arms.”

George, the purchaser of the estate of Nortofts, Co. Essex, kept his first court there, April 17, 1593, and died May 22, 1602, being succeeded by his eldest son, John.

He was of Lincoln’s Inn, and married Dorothy, daughter of Sir Thomas Wendy, of Kasling Field, in Cambridgeshire, Knight, by whom he had John, and Elizabeth, wife of Sir Samuel Brown, one of the Justices of the Common Pleas. Besides the Manor of Nortofts, and one messuage, called Sculpus, parcel of the said Manor, he had other estates in the parish, of which, by his will dated 24th March, 1629, he devised to his wife Dorothy, a part, during her life, in recompense of her dower or jointure, remainder to his son and his wife and their respective heirs. He died April 3, 1629, and was buried in the chancel of the Church. This family seems to have been as follows:

John of Henham. Family is first mentioned in 1422. His sons were: John II, Robert, George.

John II married Elizabeth, daughter of Nicolla Colin, and had, 1, Thomas, whose son was John; 2, John III, who married Jane, daughter of John Glasscock, and had, John IV, who married Elizabeth, daughter of Robert Sanford, and had 14 children, viz., Sons—John V, Robert, Thomas, George, Philip, William, Andrew, &c., Daughters—Ann, Elizabeth, Agnes, Susan, and Esther; 3, Robert, and 4, William.

George, third son of John I, married Dorothy, daughter of Sir Thomas Wendy, and had John, who married Elizabeth, daughter of William and Dorothy (Barrington) Mewes and had 1, John,

who died childless; 2, Joan, who married Roger Rant; 3, Dorothy, who married John Marshall.

This George was the purchaser of Nortofts, as stated before. John the father dying in 1602 was succeeded by his eldest son and heir, John. This John had also a son John, to whom he gave Daton Hill estate. The son and heir of this John, was John Mead, Gent. (final "e" omitted).

THOMAS MEADE, ESQ.

Sept. 12, 1571, Richard Cutts and Mary his wife, had licensse to alienate a moiety of the manor of Wiggepitts and Mountealys. and Dogworths, to Reginald Meade (all of Co. Essex). His nephew, Thomas Meade, Esq., one of the Justices of the King's Bench, made a partition of this estate with Sir Henry Cutts, and died May 26, 1585. Thomas, his son, afterwards knighted, who died Sep. 18, 1617, is said to have then held the Manor of Wiggepitts. John Meade, Esq. was the son of Sir Thomas.

A few years after 1559, Thomas Meade Esq. purchased the estate of Wendon Loughts, Co. Essex. He was bred to the law, and was called to the degree of Sargeant in 1567, and constituted one of the Judges of the King's Bench, Feb. 3, 1578. His father, Thomas Meade Esq. was the first of the family who came into Co. Essex and settled at Elmdon.

On the North wall of Marlborough Church, Co. Leicester, on a monument of black marble, with Coat-of-arms Chevron between three pelicans, appears the following inscription:

Near this place is interred the body of James Mead with his forefathers,
Esquires

Also the body of Henry, son of James Mead.

He married Ann, daughter of William Croft of Peckleton, esq.

Also the body of William, son of Henry Mead, who married Elizabeth,
daughter of Charnell Petty of Tetsworth, in Oxfordshire, Esquire.

Also the body of Charnell, son of William Mead who married Elizabeth,
daughter of William Hewitt of Stretton, Esquire.

Also the body of William, son of Charnell Mead, who married Susannah,
daughter of Matthew Floyer of Heints, in Staffordshire, Esquire.

Also the body of William, son of William Mead, who married Elizabeth,
daughter of Edward Wilson,

Rector of Milston, with an infant.

I pass with melancholy state
By all these solemn heaps of fate
And think, as soft and sad I tread,
Above the venerable dead,
Time was, like me, they life possessed
And time shall be, when I shall rest.

A comparison of the dates given above, with those of the ancestor of the American branch of the family, will show how nearly contemporary they all were, and a further comparison of the Coat-of-arms, leads to a strong conviction of their being of one and the same origin.

The Coat-of-arms is thus described: "Sa. Chev. er. bet. 3 Pel. Vul. or." The motto as given in the Latin is "Semper Paratus," all of which being explained thus:

Sa.—the field is sable, i. e. black; Chev. a chevron, represented as the two rafters of a house joined well together,—er. i. e. ermine, the chevron is gold color, but powdered black,—3 Pelicans vul. i. e. wounding themselves, according to the old tradition, that the pelican picked its own breast to nourish its young. The pelican, among the Egyptians was symbolical of the four paternal duties, viz. Generation, Preservation, Education, and Good Example.

THE FAMILY IN AMERICA.

The Mead Family of Greenwich, Fairfield Co., Conn., was originally from England, and came to this country shortly after the Mayflower had landed its load of Pilgrims on the shores of Massachusetts. It has generally been the tradition in the family that two brothers came over; that one stopped at the Eastward, while the other came to Horse-Neck. That two brothers, or possibly three, came over is very probable, as it would not be natural for one to come alone, could he find a relative to join him in his adventures. In the "History of Lexington, Mass." we find that Gabriel Mead was one of the earliest settlers of that place, as also David. The dates of their arrival, and of William at Horse-Neck (or rather Stamford) agree with one another, leading to the conclusion that all three were near relatives; furthermore the Coat-of-arms of both branches is identical, which is almost proof positive. It is not fully determined from what part of England the Connecticut family came; but searches that have been made there seem to show a starting place somewhere near London, possibly Greenwich, Co. Kent.

The first record of any Mead in Fairfield Co. is the following in Stamford Town Records: "Dec. 7, 1641, William Mayd received from the town of Stamford, a homelot and 5 acres of land." This William was undoubtedly the ancestor of the Fairfield Co. Meads. His wife died Sep. 19, 1657. We have record of three children, Joseph, born in 1630, the ancestor of the Ridgefield and North Fairfield Co. Meads; Martha, who married John Richardson, of Stamford, and John, the ancestor of the Horse-Neck Meads. The two sons, Joseph² and John,² seem to have migrated (though it proved only a temporary sojourn) to Hempstead, L. I.

John² removed from Hempstead, L. I. to Greenwich (Horse-neck) in 1660. It was in this village that he purchased land; the date of the deed is Oct. 26, 1660, and is as follows, *verbatim et literatim*.

These presents witeneth an agreement made between Richerd Crab of Grenwich on ye one side & John mead of Hemstead on Long Island on ye other side, viz: ye sd Richard Crab hath sould unto ye sd John Mead all his houses & Lands yt sd Richerd Crab hath in Grenwich with all ye Apurtenances. Rights & Privileges & Conveniences yt doth belong unto ye sd houses & Lands or shall here after belong unto them namely ye

house yt Richerd Crab liveth in. ye house yt Thomas Studwell liveth in with ye Barne yt is on ye other side of ye hye waye; also ye home lott ye house stands on being bounded with a fence about them Lying on ye North west side against ye home lott also Eightene Acres of Land in Elizabeth neck more or less. being bounded on ye sea on ye East ans south east and a fence on ye west norwest & ye north. also ye Rig (ridge?) with five acres of Meadow Lying in it more or les. ye rig being bounded by ye Sea on ye south east. Williamses Land on the east & a fence on ye north-west. ye hye waye & hubert (Hubbard?) & angell Husted land on ye west; also three acres of meadow in ye Long meadow & one acre of Meadow by ferris. bounded by Jeffere ferris Land onye southwest and ye Cove on ye west and Northwest: ye hyeWaye on ye East & northeast & five acres of meadow in myanos neck. all these above spesified I do acknowledge to have sould unto ye above sd John Mead. his heaires & asignes fully & freely to be posses forever & for ye just & full performance hereof I have hereunto subscribed my hand Anno 1660 October 26 Daye.

Towns Man.

The tenacity with which the Meads have held their lands, and their love of home are by no means the least of their virtues, and it has been no uncommon thing for the same house and farm to have been handed down through five or six generations. Indeed some of the original purchases of land by the first families of Meads still remain in the possession of their descendants.

John² Mead, who bought land of Richard Crab, married Hannah Potter, daughter of William Potter of Stamford. This "William Potter in his will dated March 9, 1684-5, gives to the church in Stamford five pounds to be improved for the use of the Lord's Table. The silver cups now in the service of the table of the First Congregational Church are still witnesses to this bequest."

John² Mead's family consisted of eight son and three daughters. Their names were John,³ Joseph,³ Jonathan,³ Ebenezer,³ David,³ Benjamin,³ Nathaniel,³ Samuel,³ Hannah,³ Abigail,³ and Mary Elizabeth.³ The first marriage among these children seems to have been Hannah,³ who married John Scofield, of Stamford, July 10, 1677. The second was John,³ who married Ruth Hardy, daughter

of Richard Hardy of Stamford in 1681. This is the first marriage recorded in Greenwich. Hannah Scofield had seven children; John³ had four: viz. John,⁴ Jonathan,⁴ Nathaniel⁴ and Elizabeth.⁴ All the Fairfield Co. Meads, and those of Westchester Co. in the region of Salem and Lewisboro, are derived from this John, the original purchaser of land in Greenwich.

The following anecdote which has been preserved by tradition shows his character. One day when he had become quite an old man, as he was going for his grist at the mill at Dumpling Pond, before he reached Myanos River, he overtook an old Quaker jogging slowly along loaded with a heavy budget. In a real spirit of kindness, he offered to take the Quaker's load upon his horse and thus give him a lift on his journey. "No," replied the Quaker, "thee don't get my bundle. I can read men's thoughts. Thee wants to get my bundle, and then thee'll run off. Thee don't get my bundle." "Very well," was the simple reply; and so they went slowly on together. At last they came to the brink of the Myanos, and here Mr. Quaker was really in trouble. How to cross the river, two or three feet deep, dry shod, was quite a problem. But he gladly accepted a second offer of assistance from the horseman. The bundle was mounted in front, John in the middle, and the Quaker behind. Arriving at the center of the stream, in pretending to adjust his stirrup, John Mead caught the Quaker by the heel, and gave him a gratuitous bath. Such treatment was too much for even Quaker forbearance, and the victim with his hands full of pebbles, would have taken summary vengeance, had not the other party threatened to put the bundle under a similar course of treatment. This threat, and the lecture that followed it gradually cooled off the man's anger. Mead informed him that all had been done for his good, to teach him a lesson, and the lecturer said he hoped he would never again profess to read men's thoughts. "For," said he, "I asked you to ride the first time in all kindness, and you refused; but at the second time of asking, I really intended to do as I have just done." So saying, and tossing back the bundle, he rode on, leaving his companion to apply the moral as he thought proper.

Among the many traditions of the old members of this family, there is one which it seems strange was never inquired into for the purpose of settlement by those interested in their history. The question has been often raised whether this John had any daughters in his family. There is a will on record made by this John, in which all his sons are mentioned by name. In this will he gives away land, and there are no names of daughters, leading to the

supposition there were none. John² Mead married Hannah Potter, daughter of William Potter, as before stated. William Potter in his will (referred to above) mentions the children of his son-in-law, John² Mead, and among them are the names of Hannah, Abigail, Elizabeth. There is also the following record: Scofield, John, and Hannah Mead, married July 10, 1677. This Hannah must have been the same one mentioned in William Potter's will. But there is double proof that this John had daughters, in a will drawn up by him the same day, and evidently in the same hand, as the one in which the sons only are named. The one naming sons only, bequethes land, and is recorded in Greenwich "Land Records." The other makes bequest of money, and is recorded in Fairfield "Probate Records." This accounts for the existence of the two wills. Both of them are curiosities of antiquity, and are well worth being preserved.

Know all men by these prefent that I John Mead Senie of grenwich in the Collonie of Conecticut for ye Love goodwill & affection which I have and bare towards my naturall Son John Mead of ye Towne of grenwich & Collonie aforesd have given & granted & do by these prefent fully Clearley and absolutely give & grant unto my Sd Sonn John mead now defeased: his Sonn John mead my grandson a certaine persale of Land & meadow Lying & being in grenwich bounded by ye Land that I John mead Sene bought of John Bowers north & a line drawn from ye north East Corner of ye Land I bought of Angell Heusted Jur to a grate rock Lying in ye frunt fence all these Lands lying within this Compas with ye house as it is bounded; ye frunt of sd land being bounded upon thee high way west the Reare upon sea South East upon these Confiderations following I give and grant clearely & absolutely ye above mentioned land to him his heaires & afsignes. Imprimis yt hee fully Confirme yt Contract yt was betwene his father & his Uncle Ebinezer mead & by that hee pay to his Brother Jonathan & nathan mead when they com to bee of eage five pounds to Each of them & to his Sister Elizabeth mead fortie Shilings: Item I give & fully grant unto ye afore sd John two acres in ye home lott Jnsted of yt which ye sd John his father now defeased had of me in ye South feild disposing of that in ye South feild as I see Convenient. Further Know all men by these prefent yt I John mead Senie afore sd for ye Lovegoodwill & affection which I have & beare towards my Naturall Sonn Joseph Mead of ye Towne of grenwich have given & granted & by these presents do fully Clearly & absolutely give & grant unto my sd Sonn Joseph mead his heaires & afignes a certaine persale of Land & meadow Lying in Myanos neck esteemed feven acres be it more or Les as it is Bounded Item I give unto my sonn Joseph mead his heires & afignes three acres of Land in Stanford South feild neare ye uper gate be it more or Les as it is Bounded Further Know all men by these prefent that John Mead Senie afore sd for ye Lovegoodwill & affection which I have & beare Towards by Naturall Sonn Ebinezer Mead of ye Towne of grenwich afore sd have given &

granted & by these Prefents do fully Clearly & absolutely give & grant unto by sd Sonn Ebinezer his heaires & afignes a Persale of meadow in ye Haffucke meadow Esteemed two acres & an halfe be it more or Les ye Bounds being known to ye sd Ebinezer.

Further Know all men by these present yt I John Mead Sanir afore sd for ye Love goodwill & affection which I have & beare towards my Naturall Sonn Jonathan Mead of ye Towne of Grenwich afore sd have given & granted & by these prefents do fully clearly & absolutely give & grant unto my sd Sonn Jonathan his Heaires & afignes an home Lot Layd out to mee at horse neck and all my Lands Lying within horse neck feild & a Persale of Land Containing three acres more or Les Lying at ye South East End of yes Widow Hows Lott.

Further Know all men by these Prefents yt John Mead Senir afore sd for ye Love good will & affection which I have & Beare towards my Naturall Sonn Benjamin Mead of ye Towne of Greenwich afore sd have given & granted & do by these Prefents give & grant Clearly fully & absolutely: unto my sd sonn Benjamen these persales of Land & meadow here after Expreft Viz five acres of Land at Sticklins brock as it is Layd out to mee: and all my Lands & meadow Lying & being at that place Commonly Called Colcob as is Layd out to mee & Ten acres of upland above ye Road aded now to ye five Further Know all men by thefe prefent yt I John Mead Senior afore sd for ye Love & good will & affection which I have towards my Naturall Sonn Nathaniel Mead of ye Towne of Greenwich afore sd have given & granted & by these Prefents do fully Clearly & absolutely give & grant to my Said Sonn Nathaniell his heaire & afignes an acre & Twentie rods of meadow in ye Southffeild as it is Bounded: Likewife seven acres of Land Lying at a place Cauled Cnock also two Thirds of my Lands as it shall bee Layd out of that Eftate in Patrigrs List

East which Persale of Land was not mentioned before Provide yt ye sd Sam'll heaires & assignes do well & Honorably mainetaine his mother with a Convenient Room in ye Houfe such a Room a shee shall cheufe & with such other Things as may be Sutable for her Comfortable Subfiftance during her widdowhood & that hee pay out to his brother Nathaniell afore sd Twentie pounds in Provefion Pay as it Pafeth from man to man amoungft us.

It will be noticed that even as early as the date of this will, part of Greenwich had the name of "Horse Neck," although it has been asserted that this name was given on account of the break neck ride of General Putnam during the Revolution.

The will making mention of the daughters, is recorded in Fairfield Probate Records (Vol. 1, p. 196) and is a very curious document. It seems strange that two wills should be drawn up the same day and both be valid, but it is explained by the fact that wills giving away lands were recorded in the town where the lands were located, while those bequeathing personal property were recorded in the county Probate Office. This second will is as follows, *verbatim et literatim*:

Whereas I John Mead Sen r of Greenwich in the Collony of connecticut though at present in reasonable health yet being sencable of my bodily weakness and Infirmities of ould age and not Knowing the day of my departure out of this world do make this my Last will Testament in manner and form following: first I Comit my Soul into ye hands of Allmity God hoping for Saluation from the Riches of his Grace through the allone merrits of Jesus Also I Commit my body to ye Earth decently to be buried and there to rest unto the Resurrection of the Just: And for my wuldly Est. boath Reall and Personall I dispose of it as followeth Imprimis All my Just debts and funerall Charges being paid by my wife whom I make my Sole Executrix my will and I do will and bequeath unto my Eldest Son John Mead the Just Sum of five Shilings besides what I have alredy Giuen him to be paid by my Executrix

² my will is and I do will and bequeath unto my Son Joseph Mead ye Just sum of five Shilings besides what I haue alredie giuen him to be paid by my Executrix

³ my will is and I do will and bequeath unto my Son Ebenezer Mead the Just sum of five Shillings besides what I haue alredie giuen him to be paid by my Executrix

Thus far the text of the work of the Rev. J. H. DeMille has been followed, giving a verbatim copy of the first purchase of land by our ancestor John² in Greenwich, Conn., in 1660 and his wills of real and personal property.

The following copy of the will of ENOS⁵ (*Jonathan*,⁴ *John*,³ *John*,² *William*¹) is also taken from the DeMille book. It is written on the stamped paper which was one of the causes of the Revolutionary war:

In the Name of God, amen. I Enos Mead of Charlotte Precinct in the county of Dutches and Province of New York, Being in good health and perfect memory (Blessed be God therefore) do this nineteenth day of December, in the fifteenth year of the Reign of the Lord, George the third of Great Britain France and Ireland King, Defender of the Faith &c. and in the year of our Lord Christ, one Thousand Seven Hundred and Seventy four, make and Publish this my last will and testament, in manner and form following (that is to say) Imprimis, I commend my Soul into the Hands of almighty God, who gave it me; and my body to the earth from whence it came, in hopes of a joyfull Resurrection, through the Merits of my Saviour Jesus Christ; and as for that worldly Estate wherewith it has pleased God to bless me I dispose thereof as follows. I give and dispose thereof as follows, and first it is my will and I do hereby order and direct that my Executors hereafter named do in the first place pay off and discharge all my Just debts & funeral Expences out of my Personal Estate, and in case my personal estate should be insufficient to discharge the Same then and in sutch case it is my will that my Executors Should Sell and Dispose of so much of myland at or in Charlotte County within this Province, as to make up the Same, and as to the Remainder of my Estate I Dispose thereof as follows viz: I give to my Loving wife Melasen in Lew of her dowry & thirds, one fether ber bedstead beding and furniture thereunto belonging, also the one-third part of the Remainder of my personal Estate to her and her assigns. I also give to my said wife the one third part of all my Real Estate during her natural life. Item. I give and devise to my Son Gideon, Eighty acres of Land off of my homestead farm Bounded Easterly by Land of Capt Moses Harris, South by Land of Thomas wolsey, north & west by other lands of mine. comprehending the South Lott commonly called the South Meadow also two Lotts North of said lot and South of the lot whereon Said Gidion now Dwelse, also two and a half of the lot Said Gidion now lives on at the East End to include his house, also two Lotts north of Said last mentioned Lott and if the aforesaid Described Lotts Encluding the wood Land on the East of them should not contain Eighty Acres then to ad to the Northernmost Lott with a parrallel line on the North Side as much as to make up the Eighty acres. I also give and Devise to my Said Son Gidion one certain lott of land lying in Charlotte County in Somerestt Township No. I also give & Devise to my said Son Gidion Six hundred acres of land out of my Right to land I have on the west Side of Delaware River as yet undevided to him his heirs and assigns.

I give and Devise to my Son Michael 100 acres of land being a part of the farm I live on Bounded Northerly by the line called Bushes line weft by Land of James Winans South by Lott No. 19 of the great division of the great nine partners or the line called Edsalls line and East by other land of mine So far east as to contain Eighty acres with a line parrallel with the west Side. I also give and Devise to my Said Son Michael as Much Land in Somerseth Township in the County of Charlotte and of my Right on the west Side of Delaware River, as I hereinbefore have given to my son Gidion, to be holden to my Said Son Michael his heirs and assigns. Item. I give to my Daughter Melasen the wife of Israel Thompson four hundred acres of Land out of my Right in the aforementioned tract of land on the west Side of Delaware River to her her heirs & affigns. I also give to my Said Daughter Melasen fifty Pounds Currency. Item. I give to Lockwood Smith who late had my Daughter Nancy to wife four hundred acres of land out of my aforeSaid Right to land on the West Side of Delaware River to him his heirs and affigns. Item. I give the Remainder of My Estate Boath Real and Personal to my two Sons William and Levy Mead to them their heirs and affigns to be equally divided between them they first paying my Just debts & the Legacy to my Daughter Malasen and lastly I do hereby nominate, constitute and appoint my beloved Sons William and Levy Mead and my Trusty friend Enos Thompson Executors of my last will and Testament Hereby Revoking disalowing and annulling all and Every other will and wills Testament and testaments by me heretofore made Declaring this and none other to be and contain my last will and Testament. In witness whereof I have hereunto Sett my hand Seal the day and Year first abovewritten.

The following is a copy of the will of NEHEMIAH⁵ (*Jonathan*,⁴ *John*,³ *John*,² *William*¹), which was admitted to probate in New York County January 27th, 1764:

In the name of God, Amen the twentyfirst day of May Anno Dominie one thousand seven hundred and Sixty I Nehemiah Mead of Cromelbow Precinct in Dutchess County and Province of New York Yeoman being very Sick and weak in body but of perfect mind and memory thanks be given unto God therefore calling unto mind the Mortality of my body and knowing that it is appointed for all men once to Die do make and ordain this my last Will and Testament that is to say principally and first of all I give and recommend my Soul unto the hands of God who gave it and for my Body I recommend it to the Earth to be buried in a Christian like and decent manner at the discretion of my Executors nothing doubting

but at the general resurrection I shall receive the same again by the mighty Power of God and as touching such Worldly Estate wherewith it hath pleased God to bless me in this Life with I give devise and dispose of the same in the following manner and form.

Imprimis, I give to my well beloved Wife Sarah Mead one third part of all my land and moveables in Cromelbow Precinct above said the land during her life and the moveables goever Excepting one hundred acres which I bought of Godfried Hendrick she shall have no part and at her Decease I give it to my Daughter Sarah Mead to her and her heirs and assigns forever.

Item. I give the remainder part of my land to my four sons to Nehemiah⁶ Mead Joseph⁶ Mead Phillip⁶ Mead and Noah⁶ Mead that is to say all my land or farm where I now live Excepting one hundred Acres which I bought of Godfried Hendrick to them their heirs and assigns forever to be equally divided amongst them after Sarah Mead my Wife has had her third part. I likewise constitute make and ordain my two Brothers Enos⁵ Mead and Jonathan⁵ Mead both of Cromelbow Precinct aforsd my Executors of this my last Will and Testament and impower them to Sell that hundred Acres of land I bought of Godfried Hendrick and my moveable Estate that is to say the two thirds I have not given to my Wife and to pay my debts with the Produce and if any be left to be equally divided amongst my children and I do hereby give a certain Right of land which I put in for called the Delaware Right unto my four sons before named to be equally divided amongst them to them their heirs and assigns forever and I do hereby utterly disallow revoke and disanull all and every other Testaments Wills Legacies and Executors by me in any ways before this time Willed named and bequeathed ratifying and confirming this and no other to be my last Will and Testament In witness whereof I have hereunto set myhand and Seal the day and year first above written.

Nehemiah Mead his X mark (L.S.)

Signed Sealed Published Pronounced and Declared by the Said Nehemiah Mead as his last Will and Testament in the Presence of us the Subscribers. Samuel Barker Samuel Barker Junr. his X mark. Freelove Barker her X mark.

It will be noticed that these wills devise rights on the Delaware water front. These "rights" were declared unconstitutional by the courts and were of no value.

There seems to be no direct evidence connecting the American Mead family with either of the English families, but DeMille thinks the indirect evidence is strong enough to warrant us in claiming connection with the English family having the Pelican as the feature of its coat-of-arms.

APPENDIX

A

ROGERS.

Much has been written on the subject of the Rogers ancestry and many claim descent either from John Rogers the martyr, John Rogers the famous preacher of Dedham, Eng., or Thomas Rogers a passenger in the Mayflower.

In the preface to *The Life of John Rogers the Martyr* by Joseph Lemuel Chester we find that he married Adrian Pratt and had eleven children, viz.: Daniel, John, Ambrose, Samuel, Philip, Bernard, Augustine, Barnaby, Susan, Elizabeth and Hester.

Thus far no one seems to have been able to show descent from this line.

We are interested chiefly in the line of William Rogers the progenitor of the Rogers family of Long Island.

James Swift Rogers of Roxbury, Mass., prepared a genealogy of this line, but his death prevented publication. His manuscripts were turned over to the New England Historic and Genealogical Society.

The following is taken from his manuscripts. William Rogers embarked in the barque Philip, Richard Morgan captain, for Virginia, June 20, 1635, aged thirty-five years (Virginia, according to Bradford's History of Plymouth Plantation was that portion of country between 34° and 45° north latitude.)

He was the identical William Rogers of Wethersfield, Conn., and Huntington, Long Island. He was at Wethersfield, Conn. about 1636 and probably removed to Stamford, Conn. 1641 with the Wethersfield Company. He was a resident of Southampton, Long Island 1642-45-46-55 and was given a one hundred and fifty pound land right in the division of the Southampton land May 10, 1649.

He was at Hempstead, Long Island, in 1643 with the Stamford company and was one of the original proprietors, having a grant in the first division of lands. He probably returned to Southampton and remained there until 1656 when on July 30 Jonas Wood, William Rogers and Thomas Wilks purchased from the Indians for themselves and their associates what has been known as the Eastern Purchase of the town of Huntington. He had a three hundred pound right in this land.

He died at Huntington, N. Y., not long after settling there, leaving a widow, Ann Rogers and several children. He left no will and no record of a settlement of his estate has been found.

His widow Ann Rogers made a will Nov. 22, 1669, and it was proved Feb. 21, 1670. Jonathan Rogers though not mentioned in the will is shown to be a son by various deeds between the sons calling each other brothers and because it appears in the Huntington records that he owned considerable land that had belonged to William Rogers.

Jonathan remained in Huntington and was the ancestor of the Rogers families of that town. None of his brothers remained there.

Ann, the widow is thought by some to be Ann Sherman of Edmund, baptized at Dedham, Eng., Sept. 15, 1601. Edmund Sherman and Rev. John, his son were at Wethersfield, Conn. 1637 and the father died in New Haven.

"My theory has been that Thomas Rogers of Watertown, John of Plymouth, James of Newport, William of Huntington, Henry of Brookhaven, and Joseph of Plymouth, were brothers. Thomas of Watertown was born about 1588, John, James and William about 1600, Henry about 1602 and Joseph, perhaps around 1604. Thomas of the Mayflower, was evidently a widower and of an age to be father of Thomas of Watertown."

The foregoing, all of which is taken from the manuscripts of James Swift Rogers shows that Ann Sherman, perhaps the wife of William Rogers of Huntington, was born at Dedham, Eng., and suggests a possible connection of William Rogers with the Rev. John Rogers of Dedham, Eng.

Savage, vol. 3, p. 569, states that Thomas Rogers came in the Mayflower 1620 with his son Joseph and died early next year, and further states that Bradford informs us that "the rest of his children came over, are married and (1650) have many children."

If Bradford had given the names of the other children their descendants would have been truly grateful. The statement taken from the James Swift Rogers Manuscripts regarding the other children of Thomas of the Mayflower is probably true, but it is not accompanied by evidence.

American Ancestry, vol. 4, p. 149, states that William Rogers of Hempstead, Long Island, 1647, was a son of Thomas Rogers of the Mayflower. This claim does not seem to have been challenged but unfortunately the author does not state his authority.

In "The Refugees of 1776 from Long Island to Connecticut" by Frederick Gregory Mather, 1913, p. 532, it is stated that the Rogers family of Long Island descend from John Rogers the Martyr and from Thomas Rogers of the Mayflower.

On the same page others state that there is no proof of this claim, and on the same page Charles L. Albertson gives another line of descent from John the Martyr and states that this is the direct line of the Rogers family of Long Island but the line given seems to be quite improbable.

In the History of Suffolk County, New York, p. 6, we find "some say William Rogers was a son of Isaiah and a descendant of John of Dedham,—others Jonathan, Noah, Joseph, Thomas a passenger on the Mayflower."

Probably some of these claims have a foundation in fact. Let us hope that some capable investigator will pursue the subject and reach a definite conclusion.

APPENDIX

B

DENTON.

THE REV. RICHARD¹ DENTON graduated from Catherine Hall, Cambridge University, England, in 1623 and preached seven years in Colby Chapel, Halifax parish, Yorkshire, England.

American Ancestry, vol. 10, page 187, states that he was born in 1586. Probably religious persecution drove him to America. He preached in Wethersfield, Conn., Stamford, Conn. and Hempstead, Long Island. He was the first Presbyterian minister in America. He returned to England and died in Essex. Cotton Mather in his *Magnalia Christi Americana* (London, 1702) book 3, chapter 9, has the following:

“The Life of Mr. Richard Denton.”

“The apostle, describing the false ministers of those primitive times he calls them clouds without water carried about of winds.”

“As for the true ministers of our primitive times they were indeed carried about of winds though not the winds of strange doctrines, yet the winds of hard sufferings did carry them as far as from Europe into America. The hurricanes of persecution whereon doubtless the prince of the power of the air had his influence drove the heavenly clouds from one part of that heaven, the Church, into another, but they were not clouds without water. Where they came they came with showers of blessing and rained very gracious impressions upon the Vineyard of the Lord.” “Among these clouds was our pious and learned Mr. Richard Denton, a Yorkshire man who having watered Halifax in England with his fruitful ministry was by a tempest then hurried into New England where first at Wethersfield and then at Stamford his doctrine dropped as the rain, his speech distilled as the dew as the small rain upon the tender herb and as the showers upon the grass.”

“Though he were a little man yet he had a great soul, his well-accomplished mind in his lesser body was an Iliad in a nut shell. I think he was blind of one eye, nevertheless he was not the least among the seers of our Israel. He saw a very considerable of those things which eye hath not seen. He was far from cloudy in his conceptions and principles of divinity whereof he wrote a sys-

tem entitled *Soliloquia Sacra* so accurately considering the four-fold state of man in his i. Created Purity, ii. Contracted Deformity, iii. Restored Beauty, iv. Celestial Glory, that judicious persons who have seen it very much lament the churches being so much deprived of it."

"At length he got into heaven beyond clouds and so beyond storms waiting the return of the Lord Jesus Christ in the clouds of heaven when he will have his reward among the saints."

"EPITAPHIUM."

"His jacet fruitur tranquilla sede Richardus Dentonus cujus fama perennis erit. Incola jam coeli velut astra micantia fulget. Qui multis fidei lumina clara dedit."

The name of his wife is unknown. The children remained in America.

Mr. W. B. Denton of Detroit, Mich., to whom we are indebted for the material of this Appendix, has prepared a Genealogy of the Denton family which it is hoped he will publish.
