“OH TAKE ME BACK TO SWITZERLAND,  
MY OWN, MY DEAR, MY NATIVE LAND.”

“For the birth of the name of Neff, one must turn to Switzerland. That most charming of all divisions of Europe, within whose confines, the climates of nearly every part of the known world are lent. “From lands of snow to lands of sun,” and whose physical peculiarities, so well known, have produced as results a strong, rugged, yet thoroughly refined, people.

To one part of this picturesque land, the attention of the reader is directed: it is the Canton, not inaptly “Called an epitome of all Switzerland,” and which should be termed the parent of Protestantism, Zurich.

Around this canton cling many memories dear to the Protestant of America. For was it not in the Cathedral of Zurich, “to which office he was installed December, 1518,” that Zwingli preached, and openly opposed the teachings of the Roman Catholic Church?

Far away in 1531 near the village “that is so pleasantly situated, at the foot of the Albis range, and at the entrance of the Alpine world,” the ancestor, Adam Naf, distinguished the name and placed the family historically prominent in the struggle of Protestantism in Southern Europe.

On the 11th day of October, more than 400 years ago, Adam Naf, at Kappel, rescued the standard of Zurich from desecration. On the 11th day of October, 1881, at Kappel, the 350th Anniversary of his heroic deed was celebrated. Gathered together on that day were the neighboring families of Naf, in Switzerland, to honor and celebrate this good and great man’s act.

“Thus circumstanced and surrounded this canton Zurich, should, and did play a particular and weighty part in the conflicts raging in Switzerland in the struggle against the Roman Catholic power—its people, individually as well as collectively, even down to latter days, feeling the influences thus brought to bear upon all. Turning our thoughts particularly to this canton, it will be found that these influences have shaped even the course of the lives of those who become of deep interest as the story of this volume rolls on.

“In the reformed religion, Zurich must be accorded leadership, for in her train followed “Berne, Basel, Schaffhausen, a great part of Glarus, and the exterior communities of Appenzell,” and on account of their devotion bore the proud title of “Calvanistic or reformed cantons.”

“Standing those opposed to the power and teachings of Rome with her allies, the “five cantons” leagued together to defend the old faith, it is not surprising that persecution should have been present here.

“The conditions were no different here than in other countries where the iron hand of Popery had made red the land.

“The persecution, however, appeared in Switzerland in a milder form.

“It was a kind of persecution (and it is indulged in even to-day in a modified form), that although lacking the rigor and severity of the religious movements elsewhere, and unknown to the world, yet had the effect to drive the men of Zurich, and the other Protestant cantons, hither and thither over the earth.”

## THE BATTLE AT KAPPEL AND THE NAF FAMILY

In the first half of the 13th century, in the dispute between spirituality and citizenship of Zurich which had become subject to the emperor only, the new popular preachers, the preaching or Dominican monks, had founded their first monastic establishment in the jurisdiction of the present Switzerland. Their place of worship is standing to this day, the overslender choir serving science, the 1611-14 renewed nave consecrated to the Dominican church community. In the same place where the Dominicans were zealously devoted to science and mysticism, Zurich's new infinitely rich spiritual life is ere long awakened, thanks to the uniting of the public book treasures. And the impetus to this freer scientific struggle goes back to the time of our humanist Zwingli. As a symbol of the valiant struggle won, new time now beams, since the August days of the war year 1915, a glass window between the old pre-reformation House of God and the new Temple of Science. If the visitor steps thru the south portal decorated with a Latin inscription, into the nave dedicated to the community service, he sees opposite him in one of the new walls of the central library the quietly contrasted monumental glass-window symbolizing:

Ulrich Zwingli's Farewell and Departure for the Battle at Kappel with the comforting exhortation of Zwingli, on the battlefield, at the bottom of the picture

"Loyal people be comforted and fear not.  
If we must suffer alike, the cause is good."

The stately stained glass picture fills the more than three meters high and wide Gothic window in the north aisle not far from the pulpit. Let us have the Reverend Alexander Nuesch describe the picture, whose reproduction in our pamphlet unfortunately does not do justice to the color splendor:

The picture holds quite closely to the well-known representation by Ludwig Vogel, however, partly with a newer conception and newer grouping and makes a salutary, abundantly satisfying, and even touching impression. In the middle we see the marked personality of the Reformer full of pensive melancholy, filled with sad presentment of death, extends his hand to wife and children in farewell, but the other people too press forward in order to say a last farewell to the venerated man. To the right and left one catches sight of soldiers who are ready for the departure, commander Schmid of Kusnacht, the standard-bearer and a sturdy youth in the

canton colors of the land taking leave to the one dearest to him. It is the 11th of October, 1531, on which day from 700 to 800 marched out to the ominous battle of Kappel; in the background rises St. Mary's church with its two towers of that time, flanked by old historic buildings; the representation itself is framed by dark-toned grape and vine garlands in order to make the color contrast and the perspective more effective, and over all the suffering face of the Thorn-crowned beams in golden rays, in order to symbolize the tragedy of the departure and the result of the battle.

Design and composition of the representation originated with the artist Walter **Naef-Bouvin**, the life-sized figures are copied from the best examples of the good old school and the master-work itself comes from the colored glass studio of Heinrich Rottinger, Oetenbachdasse, Zurich I. The magnificent glass picture however is a pious bequest and a gift worthy of the greatest thanks of the family **Naef-Michel**, on the Mauer, in memory of the deceased Edwin **Naef-Michel** to the church and community. Every visitor and spectator will find a keen enjoyment in the picture, and the community may consider itself fortunate to possess in its church such a jewel of the highest artistic value and specific Zurich character.

With this picture stand both the artist Mr. Walter **Naef-Bouvin** as well as Mr. Edwin **Naef-Michel**, member of the church wardenship for many years whose heirs bequeathed the glass window, in certain relations, in decided however to the further picture of Ludwig Vogel, not known to the public, that the battle of Kappel itself has to do with the protection and saving of the Zurich standard. To the kind direction of Prof. Paul Schweizer and the esteemed willingness of the owner of the picture Canton Councilor F. O. Pestalozzi-Jung-hans is due the possibility of the first reproduction in the next pamphlet of the Zwingliana. Both Mr. Naefs descend from Adam Naf of Vollenweid who took part in the rescue of the standard. Ludwig Vogel with his most excellent talent for composition has created here an effective grouping. The protection of the hard-fought-for standard holds the middle ground. The artist used here, cleverly, (as Martin Usteri), the historical sources, such as Heinrich Bullinger's which effervesces with them; for Bullinger with great conscientiousness noted down and wrote exactly the recital concerning the rescue of the standard from the word and declaration of the nearest participants, the worthy Kleinhans Kambli, Hans Huber, Adam Naf and Uli Dantzler. This he expressly emphasizes at the end of his description which shows that he as former cloister teacher at Kappel was well acquainted with

the condition of the country, and knew how to use these oral reports cleverly and intuitively. Bullinger's source account allows the comprehension of this battle episode to be more closely defined, for one of the witnesses, none other than our Adam Naf died before the 7th of November, 1571; on this day the sons received in his stead the newly bestowed Sennhof at Kappel. It must have been composed however after July 5, 1550, for not until this day did Naf receive from the council thru investiture and partition of the possession of the Kappel cloister the newly created Sennhof as free fief, a further recognition of his deed which Bullinger in his History of the Reformation could still have made use of.

Ludwig Vogel represents the moment, following Bullinger, when the standard-bearer holds in his one hand the city standard wrested from the dying standard-bearer Schwyzer and defends himself with the other. One of the enemies is already grasping for the shaft of the standard, another falls with his hand in the damask and tears a piece out of it. Kambli, however drives the one away with his sword and calls for help to save the honor and symbol of Zurich. As, however, the might of the enemy is about to bear him to the ground, Adam Naf of Vollenweid runs forward with a sword and cuts off the head of the other one who has grasped the standard so that the blood spurted on it; afterwards the blood was plainly seen there. Jungherr Tumysen with his halbred runs forward too and with the help of Adam Naf scatters the enemy to the extent that Kambli with the standard can get up again and go his way.

The Kappel banner and the Naf sword, which are deposited in the Swiss State Museum have been the subjects of investigation of the late Dr. Zeller-Werdmuller in the *Zwingliana* of 1902. The both trophies were the subjects of individual study. The leather sheath in which the sword has always been kept shows remarkably well the marks of the Sprungli arms stamp, a M. S., possibly of one or two Marx Sprunglis. The participation of a Marx Sprungli in the battle can not be up till now authenticated, not even by the chronicler Bernard Sprungli, who used Antistes Bullinger as his source in his description of both Kappel wars. Zeller-Werdmuller considers the possibility, that already in those days an exchange of sword sheaths had occurred. We might place for the further possibility, that even the sword, that Ludwig Vogel, according to his reproduction, has certainly not seen, had not been originally the property of Adam Naf. Bullinger expresses himself thus, Naf had run forward with a sword, while

he let Kambli cut away with his sword, likewise Tumysen with his halbred. Quite similarly runs the entry in the civic publication of March 10, 1533, Naf had cut off the head of an enemy with his sword. Adam Naf was indeed an ax guard under the command of Hans Huber of Tufenbach, who had ordered him with others to push forward into Buchwaldi. But even as such he could and must be armed with a sufficient weapon, possibly a two-hander. Be it as it may with the original possession of this sword, it is at least another somewhat displaced tradition to be rightly placed. It does concern the rewards which Adam Naf received as his share for his help in saving the standard. In J. Egli's Book of Heraldry of Zurich, as with E. Egli, the Battle of Cappel, and in the genealogical register published by E. Naf-Hah is told, Adam Naf had received an estate for his bravery—E. Egli even speaks of a gift—and was given civic rights. In reality Naf had first received civic rights March 10, 1533 for himself and the Sennhof at Kappel as a mere free fief for six years, not until July 5, 1550, in no manner whatever as a gift. The gift on May 11, 1532 to Uli Dantzler of Nanikon with the so-called Pannergutli at Nanikon may have contributed to the erroneous comprehension of the gift. Bullinger has incorporated this presentation deed in text in his history of the reformation. Of the presentation of civic rights to Dantzler on the other hand no trace is found in civic record, and, however, since then his family appears enfranchised ostensibly since 1531 thru gift. If it is not a question of a mere error of omission, it may perhaps be taken for granted that the bestowal of civic rights in 1440 on Hans Tentzler of Nanikon later executed at Blutmatte was still valid or recognized. In the civic record on the other hand the presentation of civic rights is likewise noted.

The entry of the presentation of civic rights to Adam Naf in the civic records of the civic archives of Zurich runs as follows: "Adam Naf of Husenn has been freely granted the right of citizenship by my lords on account of his integrity, when he at the battle of Cappel helped save my lord's standard, honor and mark and cut off the head of an enemy in the act of taking the standard with a battle-sword."

Besides Adam Naf has already received a gift of 20 pounds from the treasury, "since he has helped save the standard."

Bullinger reports, strangely, nothing of these presentations of civic rights, altho he does relate quite decisively, the Council at Zurich had shown its gratitude to Adam Naf by

the granting and division of the estates of the Kappel cloister. In the two plans of 1546 and '48 the administration considered a more productive and less costly management of the cloister estates at Kappel. These estates were divided and granted as three free fiefs: Sennhof, created out of the former Sennti, that is, Sennerei, the timber land, and the tavern.

On July 5, 1550, the mayor and council as overseers, protectors and managers of the cloister at Kappel granted for their better use and benefits to the honorable, and their beloved and loyal Adam Naf of Vollenweid as a legal free fief for six years, the Sennhof of the cloister with the Sennhouse, all barns and hay sheds in the following farms, likewise stabling and whatever stabling there is in the new granary at Sennhouse. But the threshing-floor and the forester in this granary are to be at the disposal of the officials at Kappel, and Naf is not to keep the councilors from threshing in the granary.

Naf received in fief:

In meadows: 53 Mannwerke

In pastures: 94 Jucharten

In fields:

In the first Zelg: G-7 Jucharten in Schuren

In the second Zelg: G-7 Jucharten in Hagenweid

In the third Zelg: 3 Jucharten in Baltenschwend

4 Jucharten in Iselperg

Fields to be ploughed and cultivated.

(Mannwerk and Juchart are Middle High German words of measure which have the same meaning: as much as a man can plough in a day with two oxen.)

Besides he may take wood designated by the councilors from the woods of the cloister at Kappel for building, burning and fencing.

The six year free fief agreement begins on the 16th day of October, 1550.

This fief right is stipulated in detail in nine articles. Naf has accordingly the tenth of all the crops he raised and has to pay a yearly fief rent of 400 pounds. On the other hand he receives for the better cultivation of the land 500 sheaves of litter from the cloister's tenth.

For this "sennti" the council sells him:

25 cows at 10½ gulden.

16 cows not milking at 6 gulden.

12 this year's calves at 2½ gulden.

66 klaster of hay—each klaster 3x6 ft.

21 loads of litter and 300 sheaves of straw, each load of litter and 100 sheaves 1x10.

Nothing at all is said of Adam Naf's deed in the battle of Kappel in the fief agreement. However, this sennti grant in spite of that is considered by Bullinger as a further recognition of his former courageous act. In the draught of the fief papers for his sons in 1571 is expressly added, the council granted this sennhof to the late Adam Naf "for his loyal services and on account of his integrity." Anyway Adam Naf found the fief rent too high, so that already on Nov. 10, 1551, he again wanted to give up the grant. His appointment as deputy-warden of Hausen and Hengst can be considered a further distinction, an office he exercised from 1561-1568. The council presented him besides at Vollenweid in 1549 with a window, in 1562 with a coat of arms, and renewed and increased such gifts to the different members of the family in the 17th century. At the religious festival of the year 1562 Adam Naf as deputy-warden of Hausen in his turn presented the council with a whole ox.

Adam Naf did not manage the newly built Sennhof himself; he remained rather at the farm of his brother Hans at Vollenweid in the Hausen district, while his sons in part moved to Kappel and with their children gradually caused to be built the small hamlet Nafenhauser. A division of the upper and lower Sennhof took place a little before 1617.

The family form "Nevo" can already be shown in the 13th century in Zurich and neighborhood. In the Zurich district Nevo appear in the year 1340 at the manor or "Niedorn Horwe in the Horgerberg on the Egg. The hamlet Rengg on the Albis in the present parish of Langnau was probably the point of departure for the majority of all the present Naf families of the Canton of Zurich. In the Sempach war on the 2nd and 10th of January 1386 Rudi Naff of Rengg who managed a manor belonging to the Kappel cloister and Hans Naf who managed a manor belonging to Rengg at Schnobelburg won the civil right of Zurich.

Hans Naf the ancestor of the Nafs of Kappel came to the manor Vollenweid in the Hausen district either direct from Rengg or the roundabout way over Thalwil. In 1495 when he, contrary to prohibition, entered the military service of the French, he is designated as Heli Huber's son-in-law at Vollenweid. After he took part as a free vassal in the Milan campaign and the battle at Marignano, he fell in 1531 with Konrad and Rudolf Naf in the battle at Kappel.

Hans Naf left four sons, of whom Adam and Marx at least took part in the battle. The latter was wounded and was compensated for a part of the physician's charge by the council; he lived in Heisch near Hausen. A third son Rudolf,



who in 1536 managed a manor on the Albis, is the ancestor of a large **Miller-family** at Langnau, Gottikon and Zurich, who in part (Zacharias and his son) likewise received Zurich civil rights in 1603 and from whom the present "fore Buchenegg" in the Stallikon district received the name "Nafenhauser." These emigrated in the first half of the 18th century from Wallisellen to America, and there numerous representative Neff's descend from these Nafenhausers. The offspring of a fourth son Hans still flourish today at Hausen.

Our Adam Naf tried his fortune as a young attendant of the Warden family Huber in the Vollenweid at Gluckshafen in 1504. Hans the father and Tryni the mother appeared at Hofen with the step-parents Uli and Adelheid Huber in the Vollenweid. We have to present then Adam Naf in the battle of Kappel as a man in his best years. From him descends the entire present old Zurich Naf family (authenticated), a part of which still lives in Kappel.

Adam Naf departed this life before November 6, 1571, for on this day the loved and faithful Adam, Jacob and Joachim Naf of Vollenweid again received as free fief from the mayor and council at Zurich the Sennhof of Kappel cloister in place of their departed father, which he received in fief on account of his faithful service and integrity. Adam was the most able of them. The same relatives stood guarantee for them, who in 1550 stood for Adam Naf the elder, among them the brothers Marx Naf of Heisch and Rudi Naf at Ratolsperg.

These three sons of old Adam too on August 12, 1575 were honored by receiving the Zurich civil rights on account of their departed father's services at Kappel. At that time Joachim lived at Rifferswil and in 1587 moved to the Mill at Maschwanden. Their brother Heinrich on the other hand (who as nearly as 1564 lived on the Sennhof at Kappel and in the same year was separated from his unfaithful wife Margaretha Grob of Cham), became either shareholder at the Sennhof or a citizen at Zurich. As a dowry transaction of the year 1570 shows, old Adam had several daughters, altogether at least nine children.

Verena: Husband Felix Suter of Zimmerburg.

N.: Husband Heini Berli of Heisch.

Anna: Husband Gorius Russer.

Elsbeth: Husband Wolfgang Berli, Heini's brother.

N.: Husband Peter Bar of Uerzlikon.

The free fief estates of Upper and Lower Sennhof were on May 5, 1915 changed into hereditary fiefs, and only yet in the memory of the Nafs still living today in Kappel have

the properties in that place become the real property of the different Naf families. Great plans of the free fiefs of the Kappel district of the years 1738 and 1805 give exact information concerning the Naf families who held the fiefs of Upper and Lower Sennhof at that time.

The historical significance of the family was only rightly awakened in the 19th century. A charming copper engraving of the All-Zurich music society by M. Usteri, and F. Hegi in 1814 shows the Zurich family at the exhibition of the Naf sword at Kappel. On the occasion of a procession of the meissen guild in 1820 the guild represented the saving of the banner by Adam Naf. The sword of Adam Naf under a canopy followed the genuine old Zurich banner carried by a descendant, master Rudolf Naf, member of the guild at Meissen; the latter received the commemorative medal of the Saffron Guild. The first honor of uniting the members of the family goes to Architect Emil Naf-Hah, who drew up a genealogical tree, arranged the 350 year commemorative celebration and finally on May 11, 1884 instituted the Naf family foundation with family celebrations.

In 1900 Karl Naf-Gallman in Kappel bequeathed the sword of the founder of the family Adam Naf to the family; in 1904 Mrs. Gertrud Tneichler-Naef founded the house foundation and in 1913 Edwin Naef-Michel left to the new institution the one family house in Kappel, more exact the half of the Lower Sennhof house. In this house lately a fitting living room in late Gothic style has been furnished by Architect Alfred Naf.

The following is a copy of the obituary of Edwin Naef sent to Mrs. Neff, wife of E. E. Neff, M. D., by the daughter Isabelle, at the time of his death.

“With great sorrow we notify kinsmen, friends and well known acquaintances with a heartfelt love, in memory of a true and faithful husband, father, brother, brother-in-law and uncle, Edwin Naef Michael, who died suddenly at 5 o'clock of apoplexy at the age of 59 years.

It is very interesting to know that the original Naefen house at Kappel, which was owned by Mr. Edwin Naef of Zurich, Switzerland, belongs now to the Naefenstiftung.

The Naefenstiftung is an institution to give money to poor Naefs for study, etc. The house will be arranged as a holiday station for the Naefs, and will in the future always be in the possession of the Naefs.

“It was a mild autumnal day of the year 1881. From different sides we saw on the 11th of October members of the Naf family journeying to Kappel, the village that is so pleasantly situated at the foot of the Albis range and at the entrance of the Alpine world.

“Joined with their family relations who live there, they wished to hold a family festival in grateful memory of their ancestor, Adam Naf, who, 350 years before, in the battle near Kappel, rescued the standard of Zurich.

“In the early morning, streaks of mist hung over the landscape, but little by little the country brightened up, and when the festal pilgrims entered Kappel they were greeted by clear sunshine. In the Hotel Muehle (Mill), where at that time one of the Nafs was landlord, the stranger guests found the most cordial welcome, not only on the part of the landlord, but also from the already assembled members of the family, who are here domiciled in Kappel.

“The large room of the house had been ingeniously adorned with ivy and all sorts of national emblems by well wishing

hands, and on the south wall sparkled the ancestor's ancient sword and escutcheon, embroidered with wreaths. At ten o'clock A. M. the number of partakers had grown to nearly seventy. In joyful association they exchanged greetings, learned to know each other, and forthwith grew together into a family, and took refreshment as they needed it.

"Towards eleven o'clock all the participants went up the main street to Zwinglisten (Zwingli monument,) whither the serious part of the festival had been removed. Around the monument the neighbors had wound wreaths and had erected a simple platform before it. On the left and right of this platform were placed the boys and girls, who had been dressed in the ancient Swiss costume and the colors of Zurich.

"Around about these the other festival folks placed themselves. On the opposite elevated side of Albis street a considerable multitude of people from the neighborhood assembled themselves. The whole presented all the more a picturesque and festival sight, as the scene was sweetly lighted by the autumnal sun.

"Then a member of the Naf family ascended the platform to deliver an address, the tenor of which was as follows:

**"Honored Ones, Dear Relatives and Friends:**

"To this memorable place I bid you all at the outset, in the name and by order of the committee that has invited you to to-day's celebration, a hearty welcome.

"Last New Year an honored friend (From foot note, the architect, Mr. Emil Naf, Hatt) surprised and rejoiced us with a newly prepared ancestral tree of our race, from Adam's time down, for which hearty thanks ought to be here returned to him. The thought soon became public that it would be nice if all persons who there stand so peaceably together on the paper should also come together in nature once, so far as they are yet living, in order to look one another in the eye, and fellow like to press the hand.

"This idea found, wherever one expressed and discussed it, everywhere general approbation. Therefore it was not difficult to come to the resolution to lay hands to the work and to invite to a little festival all, young and old, who are reckoned in our family.

"We were at first undecided, whether we ought to call the reunion together at Zurich or our native town, Cappel. But soon the leaning towards the original home overruled, and

with jubilant hearts we joined in the watchword: Let the native and homely Cappel be our place of meeting and festivity: There, where Zwingli stood so faithful to his work, and sealed it with his heart's blood—there, where our blessed ancestor heroically swung the battle sword and rescued the banner of Zurich—there, and in no other place, shall our meeting again be celebrated.

“Concerning the time of our coming together we soon came to an agreement. Today's 350th anniversary of the battle of Cappel, of Zwingli's death, and of the glorious deed of our ancestor, appeared to us without any thing farther as the time as if given for our purpose. We accordingly let our invitations fly joyfully out into the world in every direction, where people dwell in whose veins the blood of the Nafs flows.

“Our hope did not delude us. You received our invitation kindly, and today, the 11th of October, have completely burst upon Cappel.

“Not only from the neighboring Naf houses, but from greater distances many of you have hastened hither.

“Thanks for this, and to all a hearty welcome to this consecrated spot of earth.

“May the hours of our association be such that they shall remain a happy recollection to us to the end of our life. May this be our reward, that old ties of friendship, of love, and fellowship be renewed among us, and new ones be knit and that our hearts may glow more powerfully for the highest blessings of life, for which there was once a struggle in this place; and when we return home in the evening, each one to his sphere of life, may it be with the feeling in the heart and the acknowledgement on the tongue: It was a beautiful, good day: thank God that I was permitted to live, to see and celebrate it:

“The unostentatious festival, that unites us today, belongs undoubtedly to the most peculiarly pleasing that can take place. It is of a sad, domestic sort, passes quietly away and in a narrow frame, and yet our view is by it involuntarily widened, fatherland and church stir our hearts, the forms of heroes of former days move before our eyes. The historical ground, upon which we stand, the delightful country that lies in sunshine before us, lend our festival a superior ratification.

“Even nature speaks here powerfully to the soul.

“In few places does a more charming, sublime panorama present itself than from here towards the south, where Rigi dips its foot in the dark waves of Lake Zug, and Pilatus

stretches aloft its rough, wonderful rock peaks, and in the back ground the snow mountains with their glaciers and piles of last year's snow tower towards heaven. Still more charmingly than here by Zwingli's monument an outlook presents itself to the friend of nature, yonder on the heights towards Ebertsweil, than which he can scarcely have found one more wonderful far and near.

"Yet much more cordially does this rural neighborhood address us for this reason, because we call it more strictly our home. With it the career of most of us is most closely linked.

"Many of you have yet at this hour, here your sphere of action, your family, the place in which you daily work with and care for your dear ones, are rejoiced and bear the burdens that are laid upon you, till you go to your eternal home. Many of us were born here. Down yonder in the houses, that look up from between the trees at us, stood our cradles. Over these meads we wandered in the happy time of youth, plucked flowers on them, and wound them into wreaths. Through those forests we strode and meditated on harmless adventures, till riper age and the seriousness of life called us to go other ways. It seems to me as if every tree and every path in this neighborhood would tell me many things of that time of youth, free from care, that has long since vanished; and this morning when I once again from a distance saw the church spire of my native place wink over at me, my heart longed to break forth in the Jubilee-Home, over every thing in the world—for thee only do our hearts beat, thou alone art our world. O, let us greet thee anew and embrace thee with thankful love, thou dear, trusted home: Let those, who here stay year in and year out in joy and in sorrow, greet thee: Let us, who were born here, but later have found our little place far from thee, greet thee: Let those also, who see thee today for the first time, greet thee: Receive us all kindly and peaceably, let us be right glad of thee, awake in our hearts new love to thee: But when we remember the historical consequence, that belongs to this vicinity, we can not refrain from deeper and more earnest expressions.

"Yonder stood and yet stands in its ruins the Cistercian Convent, founded in the year 1185 by the barons of Eschenbach. Many storms passed over it in the course of the century. It was long a lamp of knowledge, faith and Christian life for a wide circuit. When other cloisters had long since fallen in with every possible ruin, men yet lived behind its walls, who had preserved hearts open for the truth and every thing good, and fostered an influential school. It early opened



its doors to the Reformation; its last venerable abbot, Wolfgang Joner, fought in the battle for the cause of the gospel, fell alongside of Zwingli, and was buried with hundreds in the 'old cellar in the barn' (at Scheuren). That brings me to the memorable, war-like event, of which Cappel was the scene, 350 years ago. At least, in brief I will and must join in that event, in order to place the deed of our family sire, Adam Naf, in the right connection and in the proper light.

"From 1519 on, Ulrich Zwingli, in Zurich, from the pulpit of the great Cathedral, worked for the renovation of the Christian belief and life in the ground of the simple, wholesome gospel of Jesus Christ. His reformation ideas found approbation first in Zurich, then also in Berne, Basil, St. Gallen, and elsewhere. The interior cantons, on the contrary, the five old places, remained conservative, and showed themselves resolved, in respect to the main points, to abide by the teachings and customs of the hitherto church. Mutual collisions arose, which increased from year to year. Political intentions and personal interests, that mixed in, made the separation so much greater and more dangerous.

"In the year 1527 the reformed classes made us the Christian citizenship, an alliance for the promotion of the reformation ideas. The Catholic places replied by going into an alliance, at Waldsbüt, in April, 1529, with Austria, the old hereditary enemy of the members of the alliance, that had been repulsed on the Morgarten near Sempach and Nafels, at so dear a price. From this resulted the first Cappel war. What would have been better fought out by the weapons of the spirit, of faith, and of love, they must, alas, decide by the sword.

"On the 9th of June, 1529, the standard of Zurich, with 4,000 men, moved toward Cappel. On the following 10th of June, the declaration of enmity was sent over to the (5) five cantons, that had collected on the Baarerboden, and on the same day the boundary was crossed and the little territory of Zug was invaded by soldiery. The common people in both camps were, however, not so hostile as many of their leaders. Mutual visits were made. Well known is the charming tradition of a repast of milk soup on a land-mark on heaps of stone or turf.

"The noble Landamman (a Swiss magistrate), Hans Aebli, of Clarus whose heart was long since almost wrung, over confederates being willing to go to war against each other, observed an inclination towards a friendly intercourse on both sides.

“Like a second Niklaus of the Flue, in the last agreed upon hour, he placed himself between the combative camps. His pathetic plea for peace found a hearing. Negotiations were brought about and led to the wished for result. Without a drop of blood having flown the first public peace was brought about on the 25th day of June, 1529. The same required, among other things, that the five cantons should give up the documents relating to the confederation with Austria. After long delay it was given up. In the hall of the convent in this place Landamman Aebli tore it into shreds, that its contents should not be known and the flame of passion kindled anew. But the troops of both parties returned home exulting, glad of the peace, to their cottages. But the gaping wound was only superficially closed. The peace was not to be of long duration. Zwingli, who looked deeper, had prophetically foretold it, when he said to Aebli, ‘Alas, dear good father, this peace is our destruction.’ The old frictions continued and new ones were added; on both sides the souls constantly became more incensed. As early as the year 1531 the second Cappel war followed, after several acts of hostility on both sides had occurred and the reformed had decreed against the interior cantons an embargo on the exportation of grain. This time it was the Catholic clans who got the start of the careless reformed with the declaration of war. On the 9th of October their messengers assembled at Brunnen and resolved to resort to arms. On the 9th and 10th of October they drew their war power together near Zug on the Baarerboden.

“In order to offer resistance, the people from the neighborhood first of all assembled near Cappel. Many messengers hastened to Zurich to make the danger known there. On the 10th of October, in the evening, Zurich sent a vanguard of several hundred, and with a few guns, by way of the Alvis, under the lead of Sir George Goldli, of Tiefenau, and Peter Fussli, captain of rifles. At the same time the people of Kilchberg, Thalweil, and Horgen were warned to set out for Cappel. Upon new alarm reports Zurich, finally, in the evening at seven o’clock, let the common storm be promulgated, in order to be able soon to follow with the main standard. But it was too late, for as early as the next day, Wednesday, the 11th of October, on the day of the inoffensive infant, a bloody battle took place at Cappel. I must surely, for want of time, forbear to paint in detail the particulars of this fight, yet I must mention the main points, because that much will be necessary to bring the deed of Adam Naf plainly before our eyes. The army of the five cantons, on the 11th of October, on the Baarerboden, held its divine service, prayed five Pater-

nosters and five Ave Marias, and sent a messenger with the challenge to Cappel. Then it set forth and towards noon appeared beyond the convent in Schonenbuhl (Sconen Hill) and on Mount Islis. Goldli, with the vanguard and the forces from the neighborhood, took a position at Scheuren; that is, near the now existing Naf houses. Many urged him to retreat to the wall situated at Munchbuhl (Munch Hill); others advised against it, and Goldli was not willing to give his consent. Forthwith a fight developed between the vanguard of the five cantons and Goldli's troops. The former advanced by way of Langfeld towards the latter, but were kept in check by the Zurich guns, and were not able, from the difficulties of the ground, to come nearer. They soon desisted from further advance and withdrew to their own by way of Lindenfeld. In the afternoon the army of the five cantons changed its position. From the south side of the convent it moved by way of the Bidenlos meadow to the chapel of St. Marks, past the present churchyard, by way of Hofacker and Allenwinden to Ebertsweiler summit. During this dislocation many Zurichers wished to fall upon the enemy, as they imagined, 'now they are ours'; but Goldli and others hindered it. The Catholics had scarcely reached the summit when the Zurichers, with the main standard, came up, between three and four o'clock, led by Rudolf Lavater, governor of Kyburg, originally Glaser, and William Toning, captain of rifles, landlord of the Red House, accompanied by Ulrich Zwingli as chaplain. The troops were tired and numbered scarcely 700 men. When at the Albis some advised to wait the arrival of the troops marching behind. Lavater and Zwingli exhorted them to hasten forward in order to assist their distressed brothers.

"The Zurichers, at most 2,000 men, had to oppose themselves to 8,000 enemies, it is said. Immediately after the arrival the Zurichers arranged their battle lines. The 'upper troop' or right wing took position at Scheuren, beyond the Naf houses; the 'hinder troop' or left wing behind the Zwingli monument, northeast from the same. The latter wing constituted the 'power band', with the main standard. It was decided by the leaders in the camp of the five cantons to defer the attack till the following day. But John Jauch, of Uri, ventured into the Scheuren wood, a little beech grove, between Ebertsweiler summit and the main force of the Zurichers, that had been left unoccupied. He looked on just as a part of the Zurichers withdrew towards Munch Hill, and disorder on their account reigned. The moment seemed to him a favorable one for an attack. With a few hundred he rushed forth independently from the beech grove towards the enemy.

The leader of his party quickly perceived it to be advantageous not to leave Jauch in the lurch, but to take up, with all his force, the battle independently begun by him. And so they advanced in two divisions towards the Zurichers from the beech grove out against the left wing, behind the Zwingli monument, and through the Cappel meadow, against the right wing at Scheuren. Vehemently surged the fight; it was fought with heroic courage; the Catholics saw themselves repeatedly pressed back. But the superiority was too great. In an hour's time, towards five o'clock, the dice had fallen and the battle was decided fatally to the Zurichers. The wing at Scheuren was pressed back, and the enemy now succeeded in falling upon the side of the wing behind the Zwingli monument. Yonder, by the moss-covered tomb and the Zwingli tree was the most bloody struggle. Yonder the standard-bearer, John Schweizer, held aloft the banner of Zurich, and, like a hero, inflamed the fighters to its defense. Yonder, in the midst of the danger, stood the leaders, Lavater and Toning, the latter of whom fell. Yonder, in the foremost ranks, Zwingli exhorted the fighters and comforted the dying, till he himself, wounded on head and thigh, sank down, crying out 'What is this for a calamity? You are able to kill the body, but not the soul.' The motion of the fight became constantly more violent; but the standard-bearer would not yield. The enemy pressed constantly more powerfully on the troop of Zurichers; these fell by hundreds around the standard. Now flight became the order of the day with the rear guard, especially after Zuger had mingled himself with the Zurichers and called to them, that they should fly and save themselves. After long resistance the standard-bearer, Master John Schweizer, of the forges, was also carried away. He reached the mill stream. When he attempted to cross he fell in, and weighed down by his arms, he perished. Standard-bearer Kleinbaus Kambli rescued the banner from the hands of the dying one, and hastened farther with it. Some of the enemy overtook him; one of these had already seized the banner; Kambli cried: 'Is there no honorable Zurichers there to save his army's banner?' This Adam Naf, from Vollenweid, heard. This was the decisive moment, when this dear man approached as rescuer of the standard. As arquebusier, under John Huber, of Teufenbach, he had already fought manfully in the battle. Now he courageously swung his sword that he carried with him, and struck from its body the head of the enemy that had seized the banner. Jungbaus Thumysen, who afterwards fell near the church in Hansen, aided him in the fight with the halberd. Kleinbaus Kambli was able to hurry farther

with banner. On the other side Ulrich Denzler, of Nanikon, took it and brought it uninjured to the Albis. Kambli also recovered himself, and was able during the night to mount the hill. On the field of battle and in the flight the Zurichers left 512 of their number behind, among them 25 clergymen, 26 members of the council, and 65 other citizens of the town. Two large graves, one at the old cellar at Scheuren, and another on the right of the road to Zurich, before you come to the mill creek, were afterwards their resting place. The Catholics took their killed, the number of whom has remained unknown, with them, and placed them in the church-yard at Baar. The approach of night made an end of the pursuit of the fleeing Zurichers at the foot of the Albis. The five cantons turned back to the field of battle, thanked God, and unfortunately cooled the passion of their enraged souls yet on the dead and wounded.

“Zwingli, lying in the struggle of death, was also discovered among these. After he refused to deny his faith, Captain Bockinger, from Unterwalden, gave him the death thrust. In the morning, despite the dissuasions of many leaders, his body was quartered and burned by the executioner from Lucerne. But Chaplain John Schonbrunnar, of Zug, who had formerly been canon of the Cathedral of Our Lady, in Zurich, spoke this magnanimous word concerning the dying Zwingli: ‘Of whatever faith you were, you were still a good ally.’ Zwingli’s body they have killed and burned, but his soul lives, and his work for God has not yet been destroyed. The word of truth, that his mouth announced, resounded yet again to-day in our hearts. His blood, that they have poured out, became holy seed, from which ripened, and shall further ripen, fruits which remain forever. After this battle followed many disturbances and events unfavorable to the Reformation, like the battle on the Gubel.

“Finally negotiations for peace were brought about. A month later on, the 15th and 16th of November, the second public peace was arranged in a meadow near Deinikin, between Cappel and Baar, by ambassadors from both sides, and on the 20th of November, it was ratified in Zug. That it was a more unfavorable one for the reformed than the first one is evident. Delays of all sort, that had occurred simultaneously between the city and province of Zurich, found their release through the Cappel letter agreed upon on the 1st of December. Subsequently, at Zurich, an investigation was instituted against Lavater, the leader of the main force, and against Goldli, the commander of the vanguard, because they were

accused of having brought on the sad result of the battle by inconsiderate, yea treasonable actions.

"Both went forth from the investigation as guiltless. Lavater retained the office of Judge of Kyburg, and afterwards rose to great honor as he filled the office of Burgo-master for 13 terms from 1544. He died in 1557. Goldli, on the contrary, found it necessary to leave; he changed his settlement to Constance, where he died in 1536.

"His brother Casper, who had already years before taken up his abode at Lucerne, fought at Cappel in the ranks of the five cantons.

"After the war the council of Zurich honored several men, who had distinguished themselves in battle, by especial rewards and high attestations of honor.

"Kleinbaus Kambli, the bearer of the banner, and one of the rescuers of the same, received the management of the governorship of Egislau (1532-44). To Ulrich Denzler, of Nanikon, was presented the citizenship of Zurich, and the so-called 'little banner estate,' was given out to him. The council, in the spring of 1533, likewise honored and rewarded our worthy ancestor, Adam Naf, of Vollenweid, by bestowing upon him and his descendents the citizenship of the town of Zurich, further with the surrender in fee of the herdsman's house at Scheuren, on extremely advantageous conditions.

"We have assembled here to-day in order to lay upon the grave of this, our noble ancestor, Adam Naf, a wreath of honored and thankful remembrance. We honor and praise his bravery, his courage, his presence of mind, with which he distinguished himself during and after the battle. We honor and praise his love for the fatherland and for his narrower home, which inflamed him to expose his heart to the enemy.

"We honor and praise his hearty assent to the good cause of the gospel, which drove him into the ranks of those who fought around Zwingli. We honor and praise his love to wife and child, which pressed the sword into his hand to fight that his homely hearth might not be invaded.

"He was a brave old ally, a whole man, to whom God and the fatherland and family lay near to the heart, and it fills us with noble pride to be able to call him our sire.

"At this celebration of the memory of him we bow to show ourselves worthy of him, to stand as he, true to the banner of our country, to Zwingli's church, to the pure gospel and word of God, to wife and child.

"On this soil, which drunk the blood of the noblest, we pledge our word to fight for everything that is good, and that

please God: to exhibit a heart glowing for whatever benefits home, church and our family.

"May scions never be wanting even to the latest descendants of our race, who may do honor to our ancestor, and worthily plant his name wider. Three and a half centuries now has the dear God, blessing and guarding, ruled over our family. From the depths of our hearts we to-day with one accord present to him for this the offering of thanks.

"But may he be with us still farther, carry us on and on, on the wings of his power and love, and permit the Naf trunk to bear to the latest time twig and branches, healthy and green with life.

"The circumstances that it was held in the open air, on the consecrated spot itself, where, 350 years before, the battle heavy with consequences took place, lent to this simple festival a peculiar charm, and significance.

"At the thought of what took place here once, many an eye was moistened. After they had given themselves up to various earnest observations in the way of conversation, for a while longer they took leave of the Zwingli monument in order to make the Naf houses a visit, of which Adam's family mansion was adorned with wreaths. A few decades ago still only Nafs lived here. Modern time has now asserted its right even here, as a part of the houses have passed into strange hands. From the Naf houses a pleasant foot path leads through green meadows to the near convent. This way this festival caravan now took in order to reach the church of the former convent, the no longer public church. As a precious monument to Gothic art it stands there in the midst of green meadows in face of the majestic mountains.

"With hearts lifted up the feast fellows wandered through its holy spaces, the lofty middle nave, the two side naves, the great choir. The existing grave-stones spoke of times long past of the founders and supporters of the convent. The paintings on glass yet remaining restored by Rottinger, awakened a suspicion of the splendor that had once spread over this house of God, of the holy art that had once found here a consecrated place. The dates, 1527 and '28, on the pulpit and baptismal font, recalled those days when the gospel came to light again here, in order to awake a new spring time for souls. And that it might not end with the mere thoughtful looking at the silent, venerable spaces, but might elevate the hearts, some choral songs were harmoniously sung.

"With this closed the earnest part of the celebration.

"The proper hour was now at hand to return to the 'Mill,' in order at a festive meal to yield themselves to generous joy and come yet nearer to each other.

"All the guests were well entertained by their relative, the landlord. Whatever strengthens mankind and rejoices his heart was richly provided.

"Soon one mouth after another opened itself in order to regale the assembled ones with mental delights in prose and poetry, and to give expression to the enthusiastic and earnest holiday thoughts that moved the hearts of all. Two strange guests, who had in a friendly manner accepted the invitation to the feast, also spoke to the company; the clergyman of the place of festivity, and a curate from Lake Zurich, who without knowing of the pictured celebration was making a visit to the field of battle.

"The deed of the ancestor was praised in song. We heard his battle sword speak in poetical representation. The family tree was ingeniously and humorously arranged and grouped. The glasses resounded to the welfare of the young generation. A second toast was given to the absent ones.

"The festival mood was kept up by declamation; in the midst of all, letter and telegrams of greeting from Zurich, Yoerdon, and Pesth were read. In the course of the beautiful sunshiny afternoon, a part of the festival guests took a walk to the Ebertsweiler summit, past the little forest that had been so fatal for the battle. All saw themselves richly rewarded and refreshed by the outlook to the plain of the Baarerbodens (ground about Baar), the Rigi, and Pilatus, and the snow peaks of the wreath of Alps. On their return they found the young world engaged in song and dance. Once again the entire company assembled. But swiftly flew the hours and only too early fell the night on the native fields and warned the far dwelling ones to return home.

"Surely all went home with thankful feeling in the heart; those were hours of joy and pleasure that we have spent in celebration. We were united by a family festival of the most beautiful kind; at the same time we felt our breasts strike higher for fatherland and church, for that which remains above all change.

"What on that day was found out may work on in the souls of all and ripen to precious fruits. After 50 years, when the most of us are no longer here, be it permitted a new generation, happy, fresh, and free to celebrate the 400th Jubilee of our family and of the battle of Cappel.



“Under the protection and blessing of the Most High, may the race of Nafs grow and flourish on and on.

Amen”

“To those of the name of Neff this locality should be always cherished, for upon Adam Naf and his descendants was bestowed the citizenship of the town of Zurich. But its charm does not end with this signal character. Down yonder beyond Cappel in the houses that look up from between the trees stood the cradles of others of our name, upon whose lives the world has paid its tribute of honor. From this rugged country came Barbara Neff, whose faith in the reformed religion was as firm and solid as the hills of her native Zurich. She could not be shaken, and for her cause, she together with many of her heroic countrymen, suffered death between 1630 and 1643.\*

“Almost within the influence of the Cistercian Convent Felix Neff was born. He who was an earnest Protestant and zealous worker became, when twenty-one years of age, a pastor of the High Alps, going from hamlet to hamlet on the mountains of Switzerland, bearing the good news of the gospel, every-where his presence being hailed with delight, turning many souls from the darkness into the light.

“His energy and earnestness being greater than his physical strength, the latter gave way at the age of thirty-one, he dying on the 12th of April, 1829.\*\*

“From this sublime locality, where one can look towards the south where Rigi dips its foot in the dark waves of Lake Zug, and Pilatus stretches aloft its rough, wonderful rock peaks,” came Timoleon Carl von Neff, an artist of eminence, who wandered from these artistic scenes to die in Russia.\*\*\* How strange it is that the spot of all others that should rejoice the heart of the artist, and which should produce the largest number of such people, is of all others so devoid of artists; but if one does find embosomed within his soul there such talent, as did Timoleon, they wander to other countries less picturesque.

“Out of this land filled with grand memories and grander scenes, Paul Neff went forth to make his name famous as a publisher at Stuttgart, and who now points with pride to his ancestral home in Switzerland.\*

“In the midst of all the grand and majestic scenery of the place rise the mounds to mark the graves of four brothers who fell in one battle, an undoubted attestation of the valor of the name.\*\*

“In this locality, where the Neff family are so prevalent, it is gratifying to learn, as a historical fact, that its people are among the most prosperous and best educated workingmen in Europe.

“And it is comforting to people whose parentage claims home there, that its people were so progressive and advanced as to make it one of the earliest seats of the cotton manufacture in Europe, and that its looms and spindles have for years produced a product in demand throughout civilization.

“Its corn and pasture lands, its vineyards and orchards, are evidences of the quiet peaceful industry of a people whose representatives scattered out upon the earth are making their lives a reflection of their fatherland. With all these facts before one it will be no wonder if the mind turns eagerly to any chronicle or romance regarding the name of Neff. Do not believe that all that is to follow will be sunshine.

“The heroes are human as are all others who enter into this history, and may err, and as “into each life some rain must fall, some days be dark and dreary,” so we may find it to have been for them and their descendants. What in the lives of any of those whose history may enter into the chapters of this volume is good and Christ-like, take that home to yourself—and wherein they have done ill forgive, and may their failure be but as a lighthouse, to turn you away from the same reef.”

The compiler had the extreme pleasure of being in Zurich, Switzerland, on October 11, 1931, to attend the anniversary of Adam Naef and the Neff family. It being commemorated in conjunction with that of Ulrich Zwingli.

Since Adam Naef figured so prominently in the battle of the Reformation, it was decided by the members of the family of that period to commemorate the historic occasion every fifty years, this being the 400th anniversary.

Our drive of thirty miles to Kappel from Zurich was through a beautiful green valley with winding streams, and foliage with the most gorgeous autumnal tints and shades.

In the old church of the village were displayed relics such as sword, battle axe and helmet, also a banner which Adam Naef rescued in the battle, it having been made in the year of 1437 and is in a fine state of preservation.

We had lunch with members of the Naef family in the original "Naefen Hause" built in the 13th century, with its quaint furniture, porcelain stove, etc., and paintings on the walls and ceilings depicting scenes of the period.

The day was bright, sunshiny and warm. The people began to gather from far and near until the knoll in the midst of this beautiful green valley, surrounded by high mountains, was covered with an estimated number of over 25,000.

Here is the grave and monument of Zwingli where the speakers stood, three in number. A microphone was installed and the great mass of people could hear every word they uttered.

The first speaker described Zwingli and his work, on what he thought was the simple truth among the people in and about the Canton of Zurich to the time of the battle.

The second described the battle, Zwingli sacrificing his life, and the rescuing of the banner by Adam Naef.

The third described the influence the battle of the Reformation had on the religious beliefs on future generations.

The exercises were interspersed with music by a band playing "Old Swiss Folk Songs" and the multitude singing, which was most impressive as the melodies reverberated from the hills 'round about.

Thus ended the day so full of interest and beauty, bringing together friends and relatives from far and near, many being in their native Swiss garb, adding a distinctive touch to the already wonderful setting of hill and vale and snow-capped peaks beyond, only such a scene as lovely Switzerland can offer. And yet, sad—for many gathered there can only trust that future generations may carry on what is, and has been so sacred and reverently observed for so many centuries in the past.

Francis Neiff, Heinrich Neiff and Johann Heinrich Neiff, were banished from Switzerland on account of their religious opinions (Mennonites) and were amongst the earliest Settlers of Lancaster County, Penna., about the year 1717 and were naturalized in the year 1829 settled in what was called, Manner Land, now Mannor Township, Lancaster County, Pa.

Francis had sons born to him, Daniel, Henry, Jacob and three Daughters, one was married to Staines, one to Keller and one to Flory.

Francis Son) : Daniel was married to Miss Erb, who had sons born to them, Henry, John, and Jacob and two Daughters; Barbara was married to D. Musselman, afterward to Dwt. P. Levine; Anny was married to Isaac Kauffman.

Francis Son), Henry marriage not known,) who had one son, Henry, moved to Virginia 12 miles above Wheeling, and had five Daughters, names not known, one was married to Emanuel Reigard Lu-t., one was married to Musser, and one to Rohrar, one to Steaman and one to Trydle.

Francis Son.—Jacob was married to Miss Kauffman, by whom he had sons, Henry who died single, John married Miss Swar, Jacob married Miss Gohanous who had five Daughters, Elizabeth married to Miller, afterward to Nipley; Barbara married Myers, afterward to Heneberger; Anny married J. Swar (Miller); Magdelene married to Sehner; Susan married to Ruth Jacob; second wife Miss Archer, children; Catherine married H. Cassel, Polly Flory and Henry who died Single.

Francis Son)—John marriage not known, nor any of his family.

Daniel's Son. Henry was married to Miss Oberholser, had sons Christian, Henry, Daniel, John, David and Jacob and three Daughters, Barbara married to Henry Brubacher, Magdalene married to Isaac Kauffman, Nancy married to Joshua Kehler.

"The purpose of this chapter is to assist the readers in  
 the history of the Neffs in general in this country.

"The names of Neiff, Naff, Naef, Noef, Naf, and Neff oc-  
 cur frequently in the cantons of Switzerland, especially in the  
 Protestant cantons.

"Prior to 1749, when Rudolf and Jacob Naf arrived in this  
 country, many Swiss, bearing the name of Neiff, Naef, Neyf,  
 Nef and Neff, are recorded as having landed in this country.\*  
 They subsequently all became Neff; hence the confusion aris-  
 ing regarding relationship and descent. To quote also from a  
 letter from Canton Zurich, it would appear that the dif-  
 ference of spelling the name, which is seen even there, does  
 not always denote a marked family distinction, but is rather  
 the result of location. Says the writer: 'The different ways of  
 writing Naf, Naff, Neff, are, to my mind, without significance;  
 nearly the same change has taken place here also; true Naf  
 is usually written, and the old records have this spelling  
 only.'\*\*

"Relative to the immigrations of the Swiss, particularly  
 those bearing the name of Neff in some form, a few interest-  
 ing extracts will be made, bearing more particularly upon the  
 three of the name Neiff, viz: Francis Neiff, Heinrich Neiff and  
 Johann Heinrich Neiff, who settled in Lancaster County,  
 Penna., prior to 1715.

"At this critical juncture (1683), the Mennonites were  
 persecuted in Switzerland and driven into various countries—  
 some to Alsace, above Strasburg, others to Holland, etc.,—  
 where they lived simple and exemplary lives—in the village as  
 farmers, in the towns by trades—free from the charge of any  
 gross immoralities, and professing the most pure and simple

principles, which they exemplified in a holy conversation. Some of those about Strasburg, with other High and Low Germans, transported themselves about the year 1683, by the encouragement of William Penn, to Pennsylvania and settled principally at Germantown; the greater part of whom were naturalized in 1709. The French army having crossed the Rhine, the distressed Palatines, persecuted by their heartless Prince, plundered by a foreign enemy, fled to escape from death, and about six thousand of them, for protection to England, in consequence of encouragement they had received from Queen Anne, by proclamation in 1708. Among these were a number to be mentioned in the sequel of our narrative.

"Many also had, prior to the issuing of Anne's proclamation, determined to seek refuge in America. The Canton of Berne in Switzerland had employed Christopher de Graffenreid and Louis Mitchel, or Michelle, as pioneers, with instructions to search for vacant lands in Pennsylvania, Virginia or Carolina.

"One of these, Michelle, a Swiss Miner, had been in America prior to 1704 or 1705, traversing the country to seek out a convenient tract to settle a colony of their people on.

"Many of the ancestors of those who first settled in this country (Lancaster, Pa.), whose lineal descendants still possess the lands purchased and improved by them, were beheaded, some beaten with many stripes, others incarcerated, and some banished from Switzerland. Of those who suffered, and who might be mentioned, were Hans Landis, at Zurich, in Switzerland, Hans Miller, Hans Jacob Hess, Rudolph Bachman, Ulrich Miller, Oswald Landis, Fanny Landis, Barbara Neff,\* Hans Meylin, and two of his sons—all these suffered between 1638 and 1643. Those who emigrated to Pennsylvania had fled from the Cantons of Zurich, Berne, Shaffhausen, Switzerland, to Alsace, above Strasburg, where they remained for some time, thence they came to the Province of Pennsylvania.

"Of Francis Neiff, it is recorded, as follows:

"And Francis Neiff took up lands on the west branch of the little Conestoga prior to 1715.

Not to weary the reader with general details of individual settlers, we shall present a public document, possessing more than ordinary interest to the numerous descendants of those whose names are recorded in it . . . it is an act passed

Anno Regni Georgii II., Regis Magnae Britanniae, Franciae et Hiberniae tertio October 14, 1729:

“Whereas, by encouragement given by the Honorable William Penn, Esq., late Proprietary and Governor of the province of Pennsylvania, and by permission of his Majesty, King George the First, of blessed memory, and his predecessors, Kings and Queens of England, etc., divers Protestants, who were subjects to the Emperor of Germany, a Prince in amity with the Crown of Great Britain, transported themselves and estates into the province of Pennsylvania between the years **one thousand seven hundred and one thousand seven hundred and eighteen**: and since they came hither have contributed very much to the enlargement of the British Empire, and to the raising and improving sundry commodities fit for the markets of Europe, and have always behaved themselves religiously and peaceably, and have paid a due regard and obedience to the laws and government of this province: And whereas, many of said persons, to-wit, Martin Meylin, Hans Graaf, and others, all of Lancaster County in the said provinces, in demonstration of their affection and zeal for his present Majesty’s person and Government, qualified themselves by taking the qualifications and subscribing the declaration directed to be taken and subscribed by the several Acts of Parliament made for the security of His Majesty’s person and Government, and for preventing the dangers which may happen by Popish Recusants, etc., and there-upon have humbly signified to the Governor and Representatives of the freeman of this province, in General Assembly, that they have purchased and do hold lands of the proprietary and others, His Majesty’s subjects within this province, and have likewise represented their great desire of being made partakers of those privileges which the natural born subjects of Great Britain do enjoy within this province; and it being just and reasonable that those persons who have bona fide purchased lands and who have given such testimony of their affection whatsoever, as any of His Majesty’s natural born subjects of this province can do or ought to enjoy by virtue of their being His Majesty’s natural born subjects of His Majesty’s said province of Pennsylvania, and obedience to the Crown of Great Britain, should as well be secured in the enjoyment of their estates as encouraged in their laudable affection and zeal for the English Constitution.

“BE IT ENACTED BY THE HON. PATRICK GORDON, ESQ., Lieut. Governor of the province of Pennsylvania, etc., by and with the advice and consent of the freemen of the said province in General Assembly met, and by the authority of the same, that Martin Meylin, Hans Graaf, etc., Francis



Neiff,\* Francis Neiff, Jr., etc., Henry Neiff, etc., John Henry Neiff,\*\* John Henry Neiff, Jr., etc. (the names are numerous), all of Lancaster County, be and shall be to all intents and purposes deemed, taken and esteemed His Majesty's natural born subjects of this province of Pennsylvania, as if they and each of them had been born within the said province; and shall and may, and every one of them shall and may within this province take, receive, enjoy; and be entitled to all rights, privileges and advantages of natural born subjects as fully, to all intents and constructions and purposes whatsoever, as any of His Majesty's natural born subjects of this province can, do, or ought to enjoy by virtue of their being His Majesty's natural born subjects of His Majesty's said province of Pennsylvania.\*

\*"Francis Neff, his sons Francis, Jr., Henry and Daniel, and the sons of Daniel, namely: Henry and Daniel grandsons of Francis, the elder, were all natives of Switzerland. On account of religious persecutions, being Mennonites, they fled from their Vaterland to Alsace, thence they emigrated to America and settled at a very early date on a small stream, Neff's run, which empties into the west branch of the Little Conestoga, where the great ancestors took up a large tract of land, and which is still owned by some of the lineal descendants of the male and female issue. As it may be interesting to the numerous descendants of one of the first families in this part of the country, we insert a brief genealogy of Francis Neff's progeny as furnished us verbally by Mrs. Magdalen Sehner, aged 79, the great granddaughter of Francis, the elder, and granddaughter of Daniel Neff, who had four sons and two daughters, viz: Henry, Daniel, John, Jacob, the grandfather of Jacob K. Neff, M. D., of Lancaster; Barbara, who intermarried with Musselman, and Ann married to Isaac Kauffman; Henry, the oldest son of Daniel Neff, married a Miss Oberholtzer, their children were John, Daniel, David, Jacob, Henry, and one daughter, Mrs. Keller, Dr. John Eberle's grandmother.

The original homestead is now principally owned by Gottlieb Sehner and Jacob Neff. We seek for the descendants of Francis Neff in the male lineage, the numerous Neffs in Lancaster and Huntingdon county, Pennsylvania, and in Virginia. In the female, the name of Musselman, Kauffman, Miller, Mayer, Henneberger, Schwar, Sehner, Ruth, Cassil, Florey, KELLER, EBERLE,—the two last are noticed in the sequel—Bear, Brandt, Shelly, Bowman, and others, principally in this county.

\*\*John Henry Neff, known as the 'Old Doctor', a brother of Francis Neff named. He was undoubtedly the first regularly bred physician in Lancaster county. Who has not heard of Doctor Hans Heinrich Neff? So well was Dr. Neff known, that when the boundaries of townships were fixed upon, June 9th, 1729, one of the lines of Manheim township is thus defined: "Thence down the said creek to the 'Old Doctor's Ford'," Hans Henry Neff, Doctor of Physic, had taken up land on the Conestoga, a few miles from the present site of Lancaster city. Among his descendants are, besides the Neffs, Millers, Tchantzs, Kendigs, Weavers, Bears, and others. The Neffs were of those "who many years since came into this province under a particular agreement with the late Honorable Proprietor, William Penn, at London, and had regularly taken up lands under him. And who it appears to me, "said Gov. Gordon, January 13th, 1729, by good information, that they have hitherto behaved themselves well, and have generally so good a character for honesty and industry as deserves the esteem of this government and a mark of regard for them."

"We also find record of the naturalization of Henry Neaf, Jr., in Lancaster County. Out of all these facts it is interesting to gather that the name has ever been one commanding respect."

The relationship of any of these Neiffs of Lancaster County, Penna., to Rudolph and Jacob who settled in Germantown in the year of 1748 and who were the ancestors of Miss Elizabeth Clifford Neff, author of Naf-Neff History 1886, will strike the reader as very remote and one can only be claimed prior to the coming of the ancestors to America.

A little paragraph which is here quoted, may serve as an insight into the character and success of these worthy Menonites.

"Holding peace principles, and taking very little if any part in the affairs of government, they taught their young men that the first great duty of life was each man TO MIND HIS OWN BUSINESS. Practicing upon his maxim they encouraged industry by their own examples, and discouraged ambition by a representation of the evils necessarily following in its train. Devoting themselves and their families to religion they labored and were happy.\*

"This sentiment must have been embodied and taught by those of the German Reformed belief, as well as the Menonites, for it is so truly a characteristic of the Neff family "to attend to their own business," which they equally expect to find those doing with whom they are brought in contact. As a consequence, when others do take it upon themselves to attend to other business than their own, and that other, being any thing relating to a Neff; they usually find that they have aroused a spirit of defensive resentment that will not hesitate at obstacles that would baffle others not inheriting these traits.

"From the extracts made, the reader will observe that the Neff's of Huntingdon County, Pennsylvania, and the family in Virginia, are all descendants of this immigration to Lancaster County, Pennsylvania, prior to 1715; it is also more than probable that the other Neffs around and about Philadelphia, Pennsylvania, who were not descendants of Rudolf or Jacob Naf, are also descended from this Lancaster County immigration. In Ohio, too, are found those of the name, who trace their lineage back to either Huntingdon or Lancaster Counties, Pennsylvania.

"That the Neffs generally command respect and esteem, though not rising or even aspiring to great prominence, is

evident from the following quotation from a communication of one who himself bore one of the offices named in the extract. The name is getting very numerous; scattered over the whole country, and while no one of the name has reached any prominent position, it is gratifying to know that for good citizens and general respectability and thoughtfulness they will compare favorably with any other of equal numbers. Some years ago there was a Neff each in the Legislatures of Illinois, Indiana, Michigan, Pennsylvania, and Ohio, and Secretary of State in Indiana at the same time. Five adjoining States you see."

**DEED OF LAND PURCHASED FROM WILLIAM  
HUGHES BY FRANCIS NEUFF IN 1731**

John Penn, Thomas Penn & Richard Penn, Esqs: True and absolute proprietaries and Governors in chief of the provinces of Pennsylvania and the counties of New Castle, **Rent** and **Lesse's** on Delaware. To all unto whom these presents shall come send greeting. Whereas, in pursuance and by virtue of a warrant from the law commissioners of Property under the **Lessor** seal of our said province, bearing date the twenty-fifth day of the month of February, in the year of our Lord 1717/8 there was surveyed in the same year unto William Hughes, a certain Tract of land situate on Conestogoe Creek, in the county now called Lancaster, containing six hundred and twenty-five acres. And Whereas, in and by a certain Deed poll bearing date the thirtieth day of October, Anno 1731, for the consideration therein mentioned, He the said William Hughes, Did grant, Bargain, and sell unto Francis Neuff of the county of Lancaster, aforesaid Chirurgeon, that part of the said Tract of Land which lyes on both sides Conestogoe Creek, and being divided by the said creek, the upper or West Part thereof Begins at an Elm Tree near the said creek at a corner of a Tract of land formerly of the London company, thence by the same North West One Hundred and twenty perches to a White Oak thence, by land of Joseph Light South West fifty-one perches to a black Oak by the said creek, thence up the same by the several courses thereof about five hundred and sixty Perches to the place of Beginning, and the other part thereof lying on the lower or East side of the said creek, Begins at a White Oak near the said creek on the lower side thereof opposite to the Elm Tree before mentioned, thence by Land formerly of the London company East by North twenty-seven perches to a White Oak, thence by same Land South by East One hundred & forty Eight perches to a corner of the other part of the said William Hughe's Land, thence by the same West by South one hundred and twenty-six perches to Conestogoe Creek, thence up the same by the several courses thereof two Hundred and Sixty perches to the place of Beginning, containing together two Hundred and twenty-five Acres and the allowance of six acres on each Hundred for Roads and Highways, as in and by the survey thereof, remaining in the survey or General's office may appear. Now at the instance and request of the said Francis Neuff, that we would be pleased to grant him a confirmation of the same. Know Ye that in consideration of the sum of twenty-two pounds ten shillings,

Lawful money of Pennsylvania, to our use heretofore paid by the said William Hughes, the receipt whereof we hereby acknowledge, and thereof, do acquit and forever Discharge, the said William Hughes and Francis Neuff, their Heirs and assigns by these presents, and also for the yearly Interest herein after mentioned and reserved. We have given, granted, released, and confirmed, and by these presents for us, our heirs, and successors, Doe give, grant, release, and confirm, unto the said Francis Neuff, and his Heirs, the said two Hundred and twenty-five Acres of Land, as the same is now set forth, bounded and Limited as aforesaid, with all Mines, Minerals, Quarries, Meadows, Marshes, Savannah, swamps, crippled Wood, Under wood, Timber, and Trees, ways, waters, Water courses, Liberties, Profitts, advantages, commodities, Hereditaments, and appurtenances, whatsoever, to the said two Hundred and twenty-five Acres of Land, belonging or in any wise appertaining, and lying within the Bounds and Limits aforesaid (Three full and clear fifth parts of all Royal Mines free from all Deductions and Reprizals for Digging and Refining the same only excepted and hereby reserved) & also free leave Rights, and Liberties, to and for the said Francis Neuff, his Heirs and assigns, to stawk, Hunt, Fish, and Fowl, in and upon the hereby granted land and premises, or upon any part thereof To Have and To Hold, the said two tracts of Land as before described, containing together two Hundred and twenty-five Acres of Land and premises hereby granted, (except before excepted) with their appurtenances unto the said Francis Neuff, his Heirs and Assigns, To the only use and behoof of the said Francis Neuff his Heirs and Assigns forever. To Be Holden of us, Our Heirs and successors, proprietaries of Pennsylvania, as of our Mannor, or reputed Mannor, of Conestogoe in the county of Lancaster, aforesaid, in free and common Soccage, by fealty only, in lieu of all other services, Yielding and Paying, therefore yearly to us Our Heirs, and Successors, at the town of Lancaster, at or upon the first day of March, in every year, from the first survey thereof, One English Silver Milling for each Hundred Acres, and in proportion for the twenty-five Acres of the same or value thereof, in Coin Current according as the exchange shall then be between our said province and the city of London, to such person or persons as shall from time to time be appointed to receive the same, and in case of non-payment thereof within Ninety Days next after the same shall become due, that then it shall and may be Lawful for us, Our Heirs and Successors, Our and their Receiver, or Receivers, unto and upon The hereby granted Land and premi-

ses, to Re-Enter and the same, to hold and possess, until the said Paiment and all arrearages thereof, together with the charges accruing by means of such non-payment and Re-Entry aforesaid, be fully paid, and Discharged. In Witness whereof, the said John Penn and Thomas Penn, in their own Right, and by authority from the said Richard Penn, have caused the great seal of the said province to be hereunto affixed at Philadelphia, this eleventh day of April, in the year of our Lord, One Thousand Seven Hundred and thirty-five, the Eighth year of the reign of King George, the second over great Britain, & and the seventeenth year of our government.

At an afternoon tea given in our honor by our cousin, Mrs. Isabelle Hegi-Naef, at her home, Ruschlikon Rathaus, Zurich, we were introduced to Mr. Amberger, a noted genealogist of Switzerland, who kindly gave us from his voluminous records the following direct lineage of the Neff family down to the present time.

The first Neffs who moved from Lancaster County, Penna., to Huntingdon County, Penna., were John and Jacob a younger brother with their families about the year 1785.

They settled one-fourth of a mile above Petersburg, Penna., on the banks of the Blue Juniata.

John purchased 250 acres of land, which was afterward known as the William W. Stryker farm, and Jacob bought

427 acres of what was afterward known as Benjamin K. Neff farm or River Ben as he was familiarly known.

Here they erected buildings, reared their families, spun their flax, raised their grain, distilled their whiskey, erected a wharf, and constructed arks on which during a freshet in the Spring of the year especially, they loaded their produce and floated or rafted it to Philadelphia or Baltimore, selling the arks for lumber and the produce in exchange for merchandise as they were in need, such as mules, horses and other necessities for a livelihood. If they did not get live stock they made the return journey on foot.

I have been informed that great iron rings with staples sunken into the rocks with lead in the Susquehanna River near Harrisburg, Penna., as a means of easing the arks over the rapid and more shallow stretches of the river, are still there.

It was a well established custom among the older Neffs, to give an annual dinner during the Winter season, to their immediate families, many of which I well remember being in my Father and Mother's home.

They were truly joyous occasions in the eyes of young America.

A copy of the original deed to land given to my grandfather on my father's side.

To all to whom these presents shall come, Daniel Neff and Mary, his Wife of the Township of Porter and County of Huntingdon and Commonwealth of Pennsylvania, sendeth greeting; Know ye that the said Daniel Neff and Mary, his wife, for and in consideration of the sum of fifteen hundred Dollars to them in hand paid and other valuable considerations thereunto, moveing hath remised, released and forever quit-claimed, and by these presents doth for themselves and their Heirs, remise, release and forever quit-claim unto Andrew Neff, (of the Township, County and Commonwealth aforesaid), and to his heirs and assigns forever all the estate, right, title, interest, claim and demand whatsoever of them the said Daniel Neff and Mary, his wife, of, in or to a certain tract or parcel of land, situate in the township and county aforesaid and bounded as follows: Beginning at a pine on the bank of the Frankestown branch of Juniata thence up the same South Eight degrees East twenty-two perches, South thirty-two and one half degrees East sixty-three and five-tenth perches South fourteen degrees East thirty-seven and five-tenth perches to a post thence by other land of said Daniel Neff South Eighty-six degrees West Eighty-four perches to a White Oak North fifteen degrees West forty-six perches to a Walnut South seventy-nine degrees West fifty-three perches to a post, by a marked White Oak, thence by land of the Heirs of John Spencer and Henry Swope North Four degrees East twenty-six perches to a stone heap thence North sixty degrees East one hundred and fifteen perches to the place of Beginning Containing fifty-four acres, one hundred thirty-four perches and the usual allowance. It being part of the same tract of land which the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania by Patent bearing date the Ninth day of January one Thousand Eight hundred and twenty-seven did convey and confirm unto Daniel Neff Partee to these Presents, with the appurtenances: And also all the estate, right, interest, use, possession, claim and demand of them the said Daniel Neff and Mary, his wife in, to and out of the same either in Law or Equity, or otherwise, To have and to hold the said tract or parcel of land and premises above mentioned unto the said Andrew Neff, his heirs and assigns to the only proper use and behoof of him the said Andrew Neff, his heirs and assigns forever so that neither they the said Daniel Neff and

Mary, his wife, nor their heirs nor any other person or persons for them or in their names or right shall or may by any ways or means whatsoever at any time hereafter claim, challenge or demand any estate, right title or interest of in or to the said lands and premises or any part thereof, but from all and every action and actions, estate, right, title, interest, claim and demand of, in, or, to the premises or any part or parcle thereof they and every of them shall be forever barred by these presents. And the said Daniel Neff and Mary, his wife, and their heirs the said lands, tenements, hereditaments and premises with the appurtenances to the said Andrew Neff, his heirs and assigns against them the said Daniel Neff and Mary, his wife, and their heirs shall and will warrant and forever defend. ## BENJAMINE NEFF, SR., OR BACHELOR BEN, SOMETIMES CALLED

Andrew Neff, Benjamine's Father, and my Grandfather was thrown from his horse, below Alexandria, and killed, when on his way to his home.

At the time Benjamine was 17 years old and being the oldest of the family, the responsibility of carrying on the farm and help caring for his younger brothers and sisters, devolved largely upon him, so they always looked upon him more as a father than that of a brother.

He had always lived in the home where he was born and was the owner of that portion of the Old Homestead Farm upon which is situated the homestead buildings. The portion across the river he sold to my father.

His duty to his mother and family were such that he never married. He procured a farm for each and all of his brothers.

In politics, he was first a Whig, then a Republican, which he was identified with since its organization. He would never accept any official position, and thought his work at home sufficient to keep him busy, and was regarded one of the most thorough and successful farmers in Porter Township.

He has commanded the highest respect and esteem of the entire community in which he has spent his entire life. It was a remark quite frequently heard that Uncle Ben, the name by which he was familiarly known, did not have an enemy in the world.

Just and honorable in all his business relations, it may be truly said of him, his word was as good as his bond.

He was very quiet and unassuming in his manner, not given to much talk, but when he did speak he had something to say worth listening to, in business, as well as in social circles.

Uncle Ben was a devout member of the German Reformed Church in Alexandria for a period upwards of forty years, and an Elder in the same church for fifteen years.

THE OLD HOME

Dearly beloved kindred of Our Father.

Grace be unto you, and peace, from God Our Father and from the Lord Jesus Christ.

Our Fathers, away back into the ages, as far as we can trace our genealogy, were God's own dear people, and you who are assembled this 14th day of September, A. D. 1887, under the roof of one of the old homesteads to celebrate the 71st birthday of the oldest living member of the family name inheriting the blood of our ancestors.

Dear Cousin Benjamin you do most worthily contribute by this gathering to honor our father's good name, and show your well deserved affection to him who has for so long a time lived among you, as the chief par excellence, in every trait that adorns human character.

During all my life of nearly three score years, I have known Cousin Ben, as we younger cousins always called him, as our big cousin, and he was like the first King, a head and shoulders above all.

Then he had a big heart also, so big that he could never do a little mean action. I shall always look back with unalloyed pleasure to those boyhood days, when together we worked in the harvest fields with that great company of 16 cradlers with Cousin Andy- with his 56 in. cradle leading off with the broadest cut ever made. Thirty-two hands were kept busy tying sheaves and us boys were kept busy carrying the sheaves to Cousin Ben and Uncle Daniel to shock, and then too, how busy Aunt Betsy and Cousin Eliza and Polly were one day, and Cousin Ann Eliza, Susan and Fanny at Uncle Daniel's were the next day, in baking and cooking for that hungry crowd.

Dear sweet cousins, those halcyon days are forever gone. In all those bustling times, there stood Cousin Ben, without fuss or feathers, always serene and calm as a May day morn. Himself as the governor, controlling the vast machinery, that moved without a jar. Great is Cousin Ben.

I also look back with pleasure to the quiet days I spent there in the pear time, also the Rambo apples that Andy and I enjoyed, then again when the dear girls would say dinner is

ready, it would do you good to see how we gathered around that plain big table with plenty on it.

I recollect my seat was on the bench next to the wall, the cousins all around and Cousin Ben at the head. There was peace and plenty there. Then again I liked to get into the Canoe, to cross the river, when Cousin Ben pushed I always felt all right.

And now for a moment, let me switch off the track. There was a time, when our young cousins, as they entered manhood and womanhood, also entered the marital life, and there was a time, too, in which all the dear cousins were tickled by the rumor that our Big Cousin Ben, too, was looking at one of our own beloved among the Friendschaft who would most certainly have been most heartily welcomed at the Old Homestead.

Here again, Cousin Ben showed his great unselfishness in deciding to live for others as well and thus continue to remain as he is today, as he has been, and as he ever will be, first in the hearts of all his beloved cousins.

And now, my most dearly beloved in the flesh, I do most sincerely congratulate you all on this most auspicious occasion. Oh how gladly would I unite with you to do honor and pay respect and shake hands and clasp hearts with all of you as you gather today.

My testimony of Cousin Benjamin Neff is this. He is a man amongst men, a model in person and in qualities, without a blemish.

Among friends, he is the most kindly, cherished and true. Among the kindred, there is none like him. Let him have, therefore, as Benjamin of old, a double portion of your hearts best love, and let him hereafter have the title he so richly deserves, Benjamin the beloved.

And now, my dearly beloved in closing these hasty and unpremeditated thoughts, let me ask of each and all of you in whose veins run our ancestral blood, to highly resolve that from this day henceforth, you will seek to perpetuate to the last generation the good name of Neff.

The Lord bless thee and keep thee.

The Lord make his face shine upon thee, and be gracious unto thee.

The Lord lift up his countenance upon thee, and give thee peace. Amen.

John A. Neff, was one of the greatest Sunday School workers and leaders of his time.

He founded Meadow Chapel in South Philadelphia, and began with less than a dozen children gathering in a little shack, in a neighborhood which was for the most part a swamp.

One Sunday morning as he was going down to teach the few boys and girls gathered there, he met at the corner of Lombard street, a dirty little boot-black, who asked if he could shine his shoes, he said no, but in talking with the little fellow asked him if he would go with him to see some other little boys and girls he was going to talk to, he finally consented and continued going every Sunday afterward.

The boy's name was John Wanamaker, who in after years contributed all his success to John A. Neff taking him to Sunday school which teaching he faithfully observed continuously until his death.

Meadow Chapel gradually grew to a great institution for the study of the Bible, under the guidance, first by John A. Neff and afterward by John Wanamaker, it was later called Wanamaker's Bible Class, and all his long, busy and useful life he was always present if at all possible to be there.

### DANIEL GROVE NEFF

Daniel Neff was the son of Andrew Neff. He attended the common school in the Little Old Log Schoolhouse, situated on the banks of the Juniata River, close by the Old Aqueduct which carried the water in the canal and the boats across the river at that point.

I went to school in the same building, and well remember the whittling and carving on those old wooden desks and benches some of which would do credit to an artist.

He subsequently attended a private Subscription School during the Winter months, grew to strong, sturdy manhood, of the finest physique, and was the largest of the Neffs, being 6 ft. 2 in., very erect, and weighing 230 pounds.

He enjoyed a fair degree of Musical training, both vocal and instrumental, and had the good fortune to live in the days of the good old fashioned country Singing School which met in the various Schoolhouses in that vicinity, the decline of which is much to be regretted, since nothing has as yet been devised to take its place. He was among the first to own a Cabinet Organ, (The Mason Hamlin), introduced into this part of the country.

Daniel Neff was quiet and unassuming, of a kind gentle disposition, possessing a dignity all his own. He was a devout member of the German Reformed Church in Alexandria, Pa., and for years sang in the church choir and held the office of first Deacon, then Elder in the church.

In politics he was a staunch Republican and being a great reader, kept well informed on the current events of the day, forming his own opinions and acting accordingly. He never aspired to public office, much preferring to live a quiet life on his farm, which to him was by far the most pleasant and independent of all the occupations.

Daniel Neff married at the age of 24, Susan Neff, daughter of John Neff, in 1852, who died suddenly, September 30, 1891. She was an excellent type of a sincere Christian woman, wife, mother and friend, active in church enterprises, and in all charitable movements. She was an earnest advocate of the principles of the Women's Christian Temperance Union, and did much work for the cause.

My Father through his mother and Uncle Ben fell heir to the portion of The Old Homestead Farm, situated just

across the Juniata river, consisting of 115 acres. It was minus buildings of any description. He erected the buildings, getting the timber from the woods, hauling it to the saw mill owned by his brother-in-law, to be cut into the proper building material.

After this was done, he began to clear the land of stumps and stones of which there was scarcely any end on a good portion of it. He then planted trees, fruit orchards, and many pines around the house, of different species as well as various other evergreens, there was a beautiful hedge of Arbor Vitae between the yard and the garden, which was great admired by all visitors.

All this required unlimited hard work and sacrifice, for quite a long time, in order to accomplish the goal for which they started out to obtain, but with strict economy and perseverance, they finally began to realize their life's dream.

Daniel Neff was one whose word was as good as his bond, at all times and one who was frequently approached for advice along many lines. A man of few words, but these were to the point. His passing was one of the Old School of which there were but few left.

## JULIAN A. NEFF

The Neffs, with few exceptions, were musically inclined and had varied degrees of talent in the art, from the rending of folk songs and classical productions to the composition of songs, instrumental and band music to quite a creditable degree.

Jule Neff, son of a prominent physician in Huntingdon, Pa., very early in life showed talent as a future band leader and at the age of fourteen played in the Huntingdon Band, later becoming leader of the organization, while still quite young.

He followed various occupations, but was principally employed by the Pennsylvania Railroad Company in Altoona, Penna., for many years, and in the meantime devoting much time to the study of music.

In 1887 he accepted the position as Leadership of the Altoona City Band, which he maintained continuously for forty years.

When Jule Neff assumed charge of the band it was an average organization, and he immediately set himself to the task to build it up, with men gathered from the shops and road, from everywhere, men who played because music was their greatest love. He taught them and held them together, and brought glory to them for years after, and perfected a band second to none in the state or elsewhere. Under his able leadership and patience in the instruction, the almost phenomenal reputation early procured was maintained until the end of his long leadership as bandmaster.

The Altoona City Band traveled far and wide, and played at many notable functions throughout the Eastern part of the United States, viz., at the inauguration of Presidents Garfield, Harrison, and Roosevelt, and of Governors, General Beaver and Hastings.

While its appearance at Conventions and in parades were without number, and in many cities from New York and Philadelphia in the East to Chicago and St. Louis in the West.

Quite frequently in competition with bands made up of those who devoted their entire time to the study and practice of music. They retained continuously, first position, whether in concert or on parade.

You frequently heard it said that Jule A. Neff in his full uniform wielding his baton on march in front of his band was

in a class all by himself. Really a Majestic Military Marcher leading his band to the music he himself composed.

Jule Neff was a composer of some note, more especially marches, etc., for his band, and whilst his numerous compositions were never copyrighted, yet they were played from coast to coast.

He wrote music for the love of it, and for his individual organization, and presented copies of the manuscript to various band leaders.

Very few of his compositions were given titles; they for the most part were known by numbers.

The passing of Jule A. Neff was not only a severe loss to the community in which he lived but to the music loving people at large.

### Colonel Daniel J. Neff

Colonel Daniel J. Neff, the dean of the Blair County Bar and one of the oldest and most distinguished lawyers in this section of the state, died at noon January 27, 1916 in the Hahnemann Hospital in Philadelphia, Penna., in his 85th year, of Pneumonia, following an operation.

Daniel J. Neff was the son of Daniel and Mary Huyette Neff, both deceased and was born in Porter Township Huntingdon County, Penna., January 3, 1831.

He attended the schools of Alexandria and the Huntingdon academy. Later he entered Marshall College, Mercersburg, from where he graduated in 1851. Three years later he left home and after reading law with the late Hon. S. S. Blair at Hollidaysburg. Mr. Neff entered the Poughkeepsie Law School in New York State.

He studied under the private tutorship of Homer A. Nelson, a prominent Poughkeepsie Lawyer, later secretary of New York State. Completing his law course, Mr. Neff returned home in 1856 and was admitted to the Blair County Bar. He opened an office in Hollidaysburg and soon moved to Tyrone. In 1860 he came to this city, residing here until his death.

He was one of the founders of the Blair County Bar Association and was always deeply interested in the advancement of his chosen profession. In 1868 Mr. Neff was appointed solicitor for the Pennsylvania Railroad company, which he held, until his death. He was interested in various financial enterprises and was one of the incorporators of the Second National Bank of this city. Mr. Neff was the first solicitor of Altoona when this city was incorporated in 1868 and served several terms in that capacity.

Mr. Neff was a consistent member of the Second Presbyterian Church and for many years was an officer, taking a deep interest in the workings of the church. It was said of him that he never argued a case in court without quoting a passage of scripture at the beginning.

As a friend, Mr. Neff was the most loyal and faithful. He loved to quote the words of the immortal Bard: "The friends thou hast, and their adoption tried, grapple to thy soul with hooks of steel."



In the early days of Mr. Neff's career as a lawyer, he was an untiring student, and his earnest, logical and convincing words as an advocate were unsurpassed. As a counsellor, he was always conservative and safe, and in the preparation of legal papers, he was most thorough. These qualifications, with the experience of a thorough education and practice, and by the close application to precedents, he was unerring in his conclusions, and in all his undertakings he was a marvel of success.

As a lawyer, he has finished his bright career.

He never forgot the friends of his boyhood days, nor those of his riper years. It was his delight in social intercourse to grow reminiscent, and to recall the pleasure incidents of the past. He loved to picture in glowing colors, qualities of his friends, the many rich and amiable traits of the great men with whom he came in contact.

"It is pleasant to know,  
That not with life's precarious fire,  
The immortal ties of nature shall expire.  
These shall resist the triumphs of decay,  
When time is o'er and worlds have passed away.  
Cold in the dust the perished heart may lie,  
But that which warmed it once shall never die."

### Golden Wedding Anniversary—1915

"Maplehurst", the home of William Neff at Neff Station, Huntingdon County, Pa., was the scene of a delightful social event last Tuesday evening. It was the occasion of the celebration of the golden wedding anniversary of William Neff, aged 82 years, and Margaret Cordelia Neff, nee Howard, aged 73 years, who were married fifty years ago, on December 28, 1865, by Rev. E. Bridenbaugh, at Gettysburg, Pa. This was the first golden wedding anniversary celebrated by the Neff family of Huntingdon and Blair Counties.

Guests were present from Altoona, Huntingdon, Alexandria, Petersburg, Quakertown and Philadelphia, Pa.; Fayette, Iowa; and Faribault, Minn. They were received by Mr. and Mrs. William Neff, Professor Charles D. Neff, Rev. and Mrs. E. L. McLean, Miss Amelia Neff, and Joseph Huyette Neff. The six children of Mr. and Mrs. Neff, their three grandchildren, and the only surviving brother of Mr. Neff, Colonel Daniel J. Neff, were all fortunately able to be present upon this occasion.

Dr. E. E. Neff, of Altoona, Pa., who recently visited the old Neff homestead in Cappel, Switzerland, in the vicinity of which many Neffs still reside, acted as master of ceremonies. Professor Charles D. Neff presided at the piano; after rendering a suite of marches, when the strains of Mendelssohn's familiar wedding march were heard, Mr. and Mrs. Neff, escorted by Rev. and Mrs. McLean, entered the parlor, which was draped with evergreen, and ornamented with potted plants. The aged couple, in apparently more joyous spirits than fifty years ago, were united a second time in marriage by Rev. McLean.

After the marriage ceremony Miss Mildred Little of Petersburg sang "Oh, Promise Me", and a quartette consisting of Messrs. Kell, Master, C. D. Neff, and Myers, sang "Love's Old Sweet Song." A sketch of the history of the William Neff family was read by Rev. Charles W. Levan, D. D., pastor of the Reformed Church at Alexandria, Pa., of which the Neff family are members.

After the family history had been read, Miss Mildred Little sang, "The End of a Perfect Day." Then Dr. E. E. Neff gave some reminiscences of his visit among the Neffs in Switzerland. He had visited the old Neff homestead where Adam Neff lived 400 years ago. It is still in a good state of preservation, and a reunion of the Swiss Neffs is held

there biennially. The Swiss Neffs, on account of their valuable services to the Republic, are influential and held in high repute. Dr. Neff also exhibited letters and photographs of the Swiss Neffs. But the most interesting article in this exhibit was the Neff coat of arms, cast in bronze, the original of which he had secured in the National Museum in Zurich, Switzerland. The coat of arms of the Neff family consists of a shield, surmounted by a helmet and crest, commemorating the achievements of the Neffs in war. Upon the shield are embossed a new moon and two stars, indicative of a belief in the waxing destiny of the family. On some of the coats of arms a patriarchal cross appears, commemorative in a special manner of the achievements of Adam Neff and other members of the family of that period.

## JOHN KAUFFMAN NEFF

For nearly half a century, was identified with the best and most progressive interests of Williamsburg, Pa., and as a representative business man stood high, not only in Blair county, Pa., but in other sections, notably in the south.

He was descended from Francis Neff, who came from Switzerland to America and located in Pennsylvania, under William Penn, and who was the progenitor of most of the Neffs known in Pennsylvania history since his time.

Among the early settlers of Huntingdon county was Jacob Neff, who migrated from Lancaster county and made his new location near the forks of the Juniata river, a short distance above Petersburg, Pa.

One of his sons was John K. Neff, the subject of this memoir, who was born March 29, 1902, in Huntingdon county, on March 26, 1828, he married Susannah, daughter of Major John Huyette of Huntingdon, (a native of Maryland, and one of Huntingdon county's early settlers), and with his wife and father-in-law removed in the spring 1829 to the village of Williamsburg, in Blair county, Pa.

Huyett and Neff bought the Williamsburg Mill property, and embarked with a show of much spirit upon the business of milling and merchandising.

Before the completion of the canal Mr. Neff carried on a considerable business in "Arking" on the Juniata, and kept himself in a general way sharply busy in pushing the interests of his adopted home to the front.

Until within a few years of his death, (which occurred Dec. 20, 1876), he was constantly engaged in active business pursuits, and was one of the leading spirits in the development of Blair county's industries. He was the head of the firm of Neff, Dean and Co., who in 1857 built the Juniata Furnace at Williamsburg, Pa., and in 1869 he founded with other capitalists, the Rome Iron Manufacturing Company of Rome, Ga., for the purpose of erecting at the last named place an extensive rolling mill and nail factory. The enterprise was a complete success and today occupies a prominent place among the important manufacturing industries of that section of the South.

Mr. Neff was a man of warm impulses, sanguine and cheerful temperament, and advanced ideas, ever alive to the

needs of the hour, he was ever ready to exercise judicious council in the development of advanced thought where it concerned business prosperity. He allowed no man to take the lead where it was possible for himself to lead, and so he came to be known as a prominent and substantial factor in the commercial and manufacturing world.

He was for twenty years an official in the Presbyterian church, always a church worker, and a strong example of close attendance upon divine worship. He was frequently called upon to administer public office in the township, and in that capacity always displayed discretion, judgment, and ability.

He was much given to travel, and not only visited the South and East at various times, but crossed the continent twice. He loved travel for the sake of that broadening of human purpose that comes through observation beyond the narrow confines of home, and a familiarity through personal contact with the men, manners, and things of far as well as near localities. He lived respected, and died sincerely mourned by the people of the community within which he passed the greater portion of his life. His record is a valuable heirloom to his posterity, to whose heart many of the lessons of which he was the teacher, may be proudly and profitably taken.

His widow survived him, and in the old mansion at Williamsburg, dwelt with her children and grandchildren, a worthy member of that guild whose later years abide within the realm of peaceful and comforting old age.

Mrs. Neff had passed her seventy-seventh year, but advancing time had rested lightly upon her and left her still well nigh, as bright and active as she was a score of years ago. Her living children were William L. Neff and Elizabeth H. Neff.

William Alfred Neff, moved to Cleveland, Ohio, in 1858, was during the greater part of the period of his residence, engaged in the operation of stone quarries and in the sale of their product.

He was born in Huntingdon county, Penna., April 5, 1828, and was a son of Isaac Neff, a prosperous resident of that locality.

The schools of his native county afforded him his opportunities for intellectual training and as the years passed by the habits of a retentive mind and an observing eye added greatly to his knowledge.

He also gained from each experience of life the lesson that it contained. Mr. Neff continued a resident of his native state until about 29 years of age, when he went to Cleveland,

in company with his wife, and at first they boarded in the French Block, in old Bond street where he remained for about a year and a half.

After arriving in the city Mr. Neff became associated with Henry Smith in the real estate business, but as he wished to engage in an independent venture, he withdrew from that association and purchased land near the Shaker settlement on what is now Shaker Heights, there he owned and operated extensive stone quarries, furnishing stone for many of the city's leading buildings and homes.

He was not long in establishing a good patronage in that line and continued in that business until his death which occurred Dec. 28, 1895, each year making a steady growth in the enterprise which claimed his attention.

In 1856, in Huntingdon county, Penna., Mr. Neff was united in marriage to Miss Eliza Mong and unto them was born seven children, of whom four are now living. William A., Frank Howard, Mrs. Annie King of New York City and Harry Allison.

Many years ago Mr. Neff purchased two acres of land for a home on 105th Street and the family still reside there in one of the pleasantest residences of the city.

In his political views Mr. Neff was a Republican, who gave earnest endorsement to the principles of the party. He kept well informed on the questions and issues of the day whether political or otherwise, and sought the public welfare not only through the exercise of his franchise but also in cooperating with many movements for the public good. Although he held membership in the Presbyterian church in Pennsylvania, soon after going to Ohio, he and his wife transferred their membership to the Euclid Avenue Congregational church, to which he was actively devoted throughout his remaining days.

His christian faith was the guiding spirit in his life and led him not only to render justice but also mercy and aid by his kindly spirit and generous assistance, many fellow travelers on life's journey.

This letter was copied from the Biographical Section of the History of Cleveland, Ohio.

The letter does not make note of the fact that, William A. Neff, was Mayor of Cleveland, for several years.
