### An Old Settler Passed Away.

Mrs. Clarissa Northup passed away on the 25th of July, at Balaton at 8 a. m. She was born in Rhode Island in 1813. When very young, she moved with her family to New York, Allegany county. In 1833 she was married to Caleb Northup of Hornsville, N. Y. In 1843 they came to Dodge county, Wisconsin, where they lived until 1855, when they came to Minnesota. They had nine children of whom six survive them, namely: Mrs. C. A. Grover and J. B. Northup, Osakis, Minn.; Mrs. S. P. Child, St. Paul; Mrs. Henry Davy, Balaton; Mrs. H. Griffith, Tracy; O. W. Northup, Blue Earth. Her remains was laid to rest by the side of her husband. She had been a lifelong Christian, having joined the Methodist Church when a very young girl, and has lived an every day Christian life. She died peaceful and happy; her trust in her Savior was perfect. She was conscious until a short time before her death. She was greatly beloved by all who knew her. Just before she died, she looked up and said: "Now open the blinds, as I want to see the sun rise once more." And after the request had been granted, she said: "Now close the window and put out the lights, and leave me, you can do no more for me, and I want to be very quiet and rest." Then she closed her eyes and sank peacefully to sleep.

The members of the Methodist Ladies' Aid Society arrived with baskets of edible ammunition charged upon the home of Mr. and Mrs. Henry Davy and completely overpowered one member of the family, Grandma Northup. When the surprise of the attack had subsided, social pleasantries and reminiscences of the past sped the hours. The "ammunition" was then disposed of to the satisfaction of all. Leaving a silver thimble and other gifts as tokens of love and esteem, the conquering force retreated, wishing Grandma Northup many happy returns of the day.

The Ladies' Aid Society of the M. E. Church gave Grandma Northup a very pleasant surprise Saturday afternoon at the home of her daughter Mrs. W. H. Davy, the occasion being her eighty-fifth birthday. As slight tokens of regard and esteem they presented a gingham apron and beautiful silver thimble. Those who know this grand old lady are made better by her association.

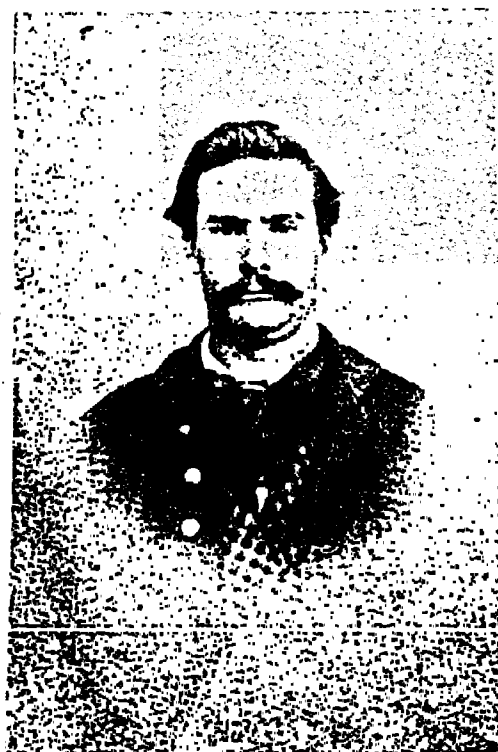

## OBITUARY

Lucy Griffith died at four o'clock last Friday morning, at her home in Amiret, aged twenty-six years. Lucy had been suffering for several weeks with that dread disease—consumption, and her many friends, while deeply sorrow stricken at the thought of losing her, felt that it was well when her suffering came to an end. She was born in Warsaw, Rice County, on July 25, 1876, but for several years her home had been in this part of the state, at Balaton, north of Tracy, and more recently at Amiret where her mother, sister and three brothers still reside.

Lucy was everywhere loved for her sweet and gentle disposition, and for abiding christian character; the constant stream of visitors during her recent illness, from Balaton, Tracy and the whole community around Amiret, testified to the fact that she had a large place in the affections of those who knew her. She was a patient sufferer, never complaining of her own hardships but always thinking of the comfort of others, and she died trusting in the Lord Jesus Christ as her Savior and friend.

The funeral was held at the M. E. church on Sunday morning, and in spite of the heavy rain which was falling, the church was filled and a long procession followed the remains to their last resting place where loving hands had lined the grave with evergreens, and where they buried her body amidst beautiful white flowers, a fitting emblem of her pure character. Lucy is at rest, and has gone to that happy home where "God shall wipe away all tears from the eyes, and where there shall be no more of sorrow, nor of crying, neither shall there be any more pain, for the former things have passed away."

Blue Earth City, Minn., August 10, 1890.

I will write the history of Caleb Northrup's family as far back as I know:

The Northrups were from England. Three brothers came over in the "Mayflower" and settled in the Eastern States. Thomas was in the "Revolutionary War". He had a number of brothers and sisters. When the war was over he came home, met Miss Sarah Gardner, whom he afterward married. Her mother's maiden name was Sarah Ollen. She was born and reared in the city of London. Thomas Northrup and wife had five sons and four daughters: Thomas, Uriah, Gardner, Ely and Caleb; Sarah, Huldah, Susan and Mariah. Caleb was my husband. Thomas married Mary-Ann Burden; Sarah married Henry Worden; Uriah married Laura Smith; Gardner died when a young man; Ely married Rosilla Donaldson; Huldah married Corban Worden; Mariah married Stillman Smith; Caleb married the writer, Clarissa Burdick. My father's name was Uriah Burdick. I was born in Rhode Island. My father moved from Rhode Island to the state of New York, Alleghany County, town of Hornellsville. My mother's name was Olive Sutlief, Rhode Island lady. Most all of my father's folks live in Rhode Island now. My grandfather's name on my father's side was ~~John~~, and my grandmother's name was Mary Peckham. My grandfather's name on my mother's side was Gad, and my grandmother's was Catherine Squires. *Jenabod Burdick & Mary*

My children's names: 1st.- Sarah A. Northrup, born in the town of Hornellsville, Stuben county, New York, June 29, 1835; John B. Northrup Hornellsville, Stuben county, New York, June 15, 1837; Olive M. July 25, 1839, Hornellsville, Stuben county, New York; Clara A. Nov. 5, 1841, Hornellsville, New York (Stuben county); Vesta M. June 18, 1844, Dodge county, Wis. Susen E. was born June 26, 1847, Hubbard, Dodge county, Wis. Harriett L. was born Oct. 3, 1849, Hubbard, Dodge county, Wis. Charles Wesley Northrup was born May 11th, 1849, Hubbard, Dodge county, Wis. Sarah married Charles Grover; John married Miss Lucretia Haseltine; Olive married LaFayette Grover; Clara married Simeon P. Child; Susan E. married Henry Davey; Harriett L. married Hulbert Griffith; Charles W. married Eliza Durren. All of their husbands were Americans.

My husband died in 1871, Nov. 10th. He is laid to rest in the Warsaw cemetery, Rice county, Minn. We were married in Alfred, Alleghany county, New York, Sept. 15, 1833. Rev. Hull officiated. Elder Matson preached my husband's funeral sermon. We joined the M.E. church in 1833. Warsaw was our home until Caleb, my companion, was called away by death. He lived a Christian life. How many times I have heard him pray that we might be an unbroken family. I feel that he is at rest at the right hand of God; and may the Lord give us grace, and help us all to live so that we may meet him at the beautiful gate where there is no more sorrow, trouble or care, is my prayer.
